To the Governor and Commander-in-Chief:

Pursuant to law, I have the honor to submit the following report of the principal operations of this department for the fiscal year ended October 31, 1896:

The military supplies of the State, consisting of ordnance and ordnance stores, camp and garrison equipage, surgical instruments and Quartermaster's stores are ample in quantity, and kept in a condition of efficiency ready for immediate use in case of emergency. Company commandants are required by law to report annually the actual situation, condition and number of arms and accoutrements, the property of the State, in their possession. Such as are reported defective in any way are ordered returned to the State Arsenal for such cleaning and repairs as may be necessary. The returns made for the past year show the arms to be in their average fair condition, fully adequate in point of general efficiency to meet the necessities of actual service, should the assistance of the uniformed militia at any time be unhappily needed for the suppression of riot or disorder within the borders of our State.

With the exception of another division added to the Battalion of the East, Naval Reserve, there have been no changes in the uniformed organizations of the militia during the year.

The National Guard, as at present constituted, consists of sixty (60) companies of infantry, two (2) troops of cavalry, two (2) Gatling gun companies, and a hospital and ambulance corps. Under the law approved February 12, 1895, the organization known as

the Naval Reserve of New Jersey came into existence, consisting at present of six divisions equal to as many companies of the National Guard. The uniforming, arming and equipping, providing camp and garrison equipage, ship and Quartermaster's stores, transportation, subsistence, etc., for encampments, naval reviews, parades, battalion drills and inspections for this large body is the particular duty of this department, and involves considerable thought and much labor throughout the entire year. Notwithstanding the increased activity of this department, owing to the augmentation of the uniformed militia, no addition has been made to the clerical assistance in this office or the number of employes at the State Arsenal since 1876, as the allowance then fixed by law for compensation has never been changed, and is not sufficient to warrant any accession to the present force.

ENCAMPMENT.

The Second Brigade, National Guard, consisting of the Third, Sixth and Seventh Regiments, Infantry, Second Troop, Cavalry, Gatling Gun Company B and the Hospital and Ambulance Corps, under command of Brigadier and Brevet Major-General William J. Sewell, encamped at Sea Girt from July 18 to 25, 1896, receiving pay for six days.

STATE CAMP GROUNDS.

The most important addition to the permanent structures at the Camp Grounds since last year is the commodious and beautiful frame building for messing the troops, from designs by Architect Wentworth, of Paterson. It has comfortable seating capacity for

twelve hundred men, and is fitted up with arrangements of the latest approved kinds for cooking and serving the food. Another improvement is the new mess hall at brigade headquarters, of the same general design of architecture

SOLDIERS' PLOT—FAIRMOUNT CEMETERY, NEWARK, N. J.

Joint resolution to provide for the care and preservation of the Soldiers' Plot, Fairmount Cemetery, in the City of Newark, State of New Jersey.

1. Be it resolved, by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey, That the sum of five hundred dollars be and is hereby appropriated, to be paid by the treasurer of the State on the warrant of the Comptroller, for the care and preservation of the Soldiers' Plot, and the monument thereon, in Fairmount Cemetery, in the City of Newark, State of New Jersey.

2. And be it resolved, That the moneys hereby appropriated shall be expended under the direction of the Quartermaster-General, with the approval of the Governor; and that the Quartermaster-General shall keep an accurate account of such expenditures, which account shall be printed in his annual report, and that this resolution shall take effect immediately.

Approved May 15, 1894.

The provisions of this resolution have been carried out, and this hallowed spot now presents an appearance befitting the resting

place of the brave men who have been laid to rest in this beautiful cemetery.

RECEIPTS FROM THE UNITED STATES.

Under the several acts of Congress making appropriations for arming and equipping the militia of the several States and Territories, stores to the value of \$9,342.65 have been drawn during the year, leaving a balance on the books of the War Department to the credit of this State of \$15,676.26.

The balance due the State out of the naval militia appropriation of 1896, amounts to \$481.43. The naval appropriation for 1897 has not yet been apportioned amongst the several States.
