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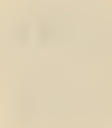

STATE OF NEW JERSEY
GENERAL ASSEMBLY

TUESDAY, January 8, 1963.

At 12 o'clock noon today, Tuesday, January 8, 1963, Speaker John W. Davis of Salem County, called to order the One Hundred and Eighty-seventh session of the General Assembly (the sixteenth under the Constitution adopted by the people in 1947) by reading the following call:

“This being the second Tuesday of January, the time fixed for the beginning of the Legislative year, the General Assembly of the State of New Jersey is now called to order.”

Prayer was offered by Rev. Peter J. Matthews, S. J., Instructor, Fordham Preparatory School, Bronx, N. Y.

Mr. Crabiel offered the following resolution, which was read by the Clerk and adopted:

Be It Resolved, That the Speaker appoint forthwith a committee of six to wait upon the Governor and inform him that the General Assembly has organized by the election of the Honorable Elmer M. Matthews of Essex County as Speaker, and of Ernest T. Scheidemann of Passaic County, as Clerk of the One Hundred and Eighty-seventh Session

of the General Assembly of New Jersey, and is now ready to proceed to business.

The Speaker appointed a committee of six, consisting of Messrs. John W. Davis, Salem County; Maurice V. Brady, Hudson County; G. Edward Koenig, Burlington County; Charles E. Farrington, Mercer County; Raymond H. Bateman, Somerset County; Douglas Rutherford, Sussex County.

Mr. Crabiell offered the following resolution, which was read by the Clerk and adopted:

Be It Resolved, That the Clerk of the General Assembly be directed to inform the Senate that the General Assembly has organized by the election of the Honorable Elmer M. Matthews of Essex County as Speaker, and Ernest T. Scheidemann, of Passaic County, as Clerk of the One Hundred and Eighty-seventh Session, and has proceeded to business.

Doren, Middlesex County; David Mandelbaum, Essex County; James M. McGowan, Union County; Carmine F. Savino, Jr., Bergen County; Alfred N. Beadleston, Monmouth County.

Mr. Crabiell offered the following resolution, which was read by the Clerk and adopted:

Be It Resolved, That the rules of the General Assembly for the 1962 session be adopted as the official rules for the first three weeks of the session of 1963.

Be It Resolved, That Eileen Bigley, daughter of Mr. A. Donald Bigley of Camden County, be adopted as daughter of the General Assembly for 1963; and Elmer M. Matthews, Jr., son of Speaker Elmer M. Matthews of Essex County, be adopted as son of the General Assembly for 1963.

Mr. Crabiell offered the following resolution, which was read by the Clerk and adopted:

Be It Resolved, That the number of copies of the Legislative Manual apportioned by law to the General Assembly be distributed under the direction of the Clerk of the One Hundred and Eighty-seventh General Assembly as follows: To each member of the General Assembly twenty (20) copies; to the Clerk, twenty (20) copies; to the Assistant Clerk, Speaker's Secretary, Clerk to the Majority Leader and Clerk to the Minority Leader, each two (2) copies; to the Journal Clerk, Sergeants-at-Arms, Supervisor of Bills, Bill Clerk, Calendar Clerk, Assistant Journal Clerks,

Assistant Bill Clerks, Assistant Supervisors of Bills, Assistant Sergeants-at-Arms, Pages, Legislative Correspondents and Reporters, each one (1) copy.

Mr. Crabiell offered the following resolution, which was read by the Clerk and adopted:

Be It Resolved, That until further order the printer be authorized and instructed to provide supplies and services as listed herein:

1. One thousand (1,000) copies of all bills for the use of the General Assembly and for all public distribution, and seven hundred (700) copies of all official reprint bills;

2. Five hundred (500) copies of the weekly Minutes for the use of the General Assembly;

3. Mail to each member of the General Assembly, properly perforated and cut for filing, as soon as possible after they are printed, the following: One copy of each part of the Minutes of the General Assembly; one copy of each part of the Journal of the Senate; one copy of each printed bill and resolution;

4. Mail to the Clerk of the General Assembly, Secretary to the Speaker, Assistant Secretary to the Speaker, Clerk to the Majority Leader, Clerk to the Minority Leader, printed copies of all bills and Minutes of the General Assembly and Journal of the Senate, properly cut for filing.

Mr. Crabiell offered the following resolution, which was read by the Clerk and adopted:

Be It Resolved, That no floor passes be issued by any officer or member of the General Assembly other than the Speaker, with the further provision that the privilege of the floor may be extended by a resolution duly adopted.

Mr. Crabiell offered the following resolution, which was read by the Clerk and adopted:

Be It Resolved, That the Speaker be and is hereby authorized to appoint such assistants as he may deem necessary.

Mr. Crabiell offered the following resolution, which was read by the Clerk and adopted:

Be It Resolved, That each member of the General Assembly be authorized to secure secretarial services at an annual compensation of four hundred dollars (\$400.00) per member.

Mr. Crabiel offered the following resolution, which was read by the Clerk and adopted:

Be It Resolved, That Robert Burke be appointed as Special Bill Clerk, who shall be responsible for the distribution of printed bills and resolutions at such times as the Legislature is not in session, at a yearly compensation of eight hundred dollars (\$800.00), payable at such times as the other officers and employees of the General Assembly are paid.

Mr. Crabiel offered the following resolution, which was read by the Clerk and adopted:

Be It Resolved, That the working staff of the General Assembly shall at all times be subject to the direction of the Speaker and the Clerk, who shall have authority to designate to any member of the staff such duties as may be required.

Mr. Crabiel offered the following resolution, which was read by the Clerk and adopted:

Be It Resolved, That in the absence of the Clerk, the Assistant Clerk shall perform all duties imposed by law and the rules of the General Assembly upon the Clerk.

Mr. Crabiel offered the following resolution, which was read by the Clerk and adopted:

Be It Resolved by the General Assembly (the Senate concurring):

That all payrolls and bills for expenditures incurred by either House be passed for payment only after approval by the Secretary of the Senate or the Clerk of the General Assembly and the Chairman of the Ways and Means Committees of the respective Houses.

Mr. Crabiel offered the following resolution, which was read by the Clerk and adopted:

The Senate and General Assembly met in joint session for the purpose of hearing the annual message delivered by Governor Richard J. Hughes.

FIRST ANNUAL MESSAGE

Mr. President, Mr. Speaker and Members of the Senate and General Assembly:

About a year ago, in my inaugural address, I mentioned what I hoped would be a watchword for New Jersey during the next four years: Government unafraid to act in the people's service. Today, as I come before you to discharge my constitutional obligation to communicate the condition of the State, I think we may share a sense of achievement in the work that we have done, together, in this positive spirit. There is much yet to be achieved, but we have demonstrated that fully responsive government is well within our capability.

In 1962, New Jersey proved anew the capacity of a free and democratic system to act with determined purpose and necessary speed to meet the needs of the people.

In March of that year, we were confronted with an unprecedented natural disaster that threatened the destruction of our great resort industry with lasting damage to our seashore and other communities and posed a consequent threat to the economic and social well-being of the entire State. We responded very quickly with a body of legislation that has been translated into a meaningful program of recovery, with benefits that will be tallied for years to come. And this ability to master circumstances was demonstrated in other areas. We were able to turn a seeming impasse into a golden opportunity by combining into one unified program two apparently dissimilar projects, a great world trade center to maintain the leadership of the Port of New York, so vital in the life of our State, and the transformation of a bankrupt railway system into the keystone of a metropolitan transit network. Thus will be sustained the viability of scores of New Jersey com-

munities; thus will be served the day-by-day needs of thousands of New Jersey commuters.

Again, there had been growing in this State, over the years, a concern over the controlling, and perhaps stifling, role of government in the distribution of milk, an essential of life for millions. This administration came to share this concern and ordered a searching review of the tangled pattern of controls that had developed. That examination produced a recommendation that we start anew to guarantee the consuming public of New Jersey the benefit of fair competition. This action required legislation to insure against monopoly and unfair trade practices that would victimize the consuming public just as inevitably as would arbitrary price regulations. You were quick to respond to this need, and, while preserving the accomplished benefits to the consumer, to assure maintenance of the markets of our dairy farmers during the transitional period.

And other instances could be recalled, in which, during the past year, you and I acted together, swiftly and justly, in the interest of the people.

We would do well, I am convinced, to retain this sense of urgency, if we are to meet the diverse problems of growth and progress that remain our unfinished business. The growing pride of the people in this State, which we all can sense, is there for our support. But there is also a growing concern of the people as to the future, which should sober us and guide us to ever higher achievement. And thus we have, together, a responsibility to the people of this State that transcends partisan interest or gain—a responsibility which is really bipartisan, resting upon us equally, because our programs are to benefit not Republicans or Democrats, as such, but all the people, *pro bono publico*. This responsibility, because of the very critical importance of the problems we must solve, is one which simply cannot be fulfilled in the face of extreme political partisanship.

There is, for instance, no Democratic or Republican way of dealing with urban renewal, with mental health, with highway construction. Traffic safety is not a partisan matter; death stalking our highways does not recognize political affiliation.

In making these observations, I recognize that our political parties do differ on some matters, indeed on some basic philosophies, and that the Legislature may well have its own views as to the desirability and specific detail of any program. But if we are determined to work together for the benefit of the people, these differences can be accommodated and become a source of strength leading to ever sounder, more acceptable programs.

No program for legislative action can be unfolded fully, of course, without a comprehensive discussion of its fiscal aspects. This week, we are to receive the Tenth Report of the Commission on State Tax Policy—a document which will have important bearing on the determinations we will make, not only for 1963, but for a much greater span of New Jersey's future.

This report, in its full scope, will be the product of a labor of almost two years. It will warrant the careful attention, not only of Governor and Legislature, but also of the public of New Jersey. I, therefore, will not attempt to treat with this report and with the basic financial considerations it certainly will evoke until January 28 at which time I shall deliver to you a special message.

To insure a clear delineation between the long term implications arising out of the report and the recommendations I will make in my annual budget message, I am requesting a postponement in the delivery date of the budget message to February 11. Legislation to that effect will be introduced today.

AN OBLIGATION TO ACT

Foremost among the responsibilities of government is the obligation to safeguard the lives of the governed. Nowhere in state government is this responsibility more manifest than in the effort to stem the swelling tide of death and injury on the highway. Therefore, I place this matter at the head of my list for legislative consideration.

Today, more than three million drivers and two and one-half million vehicles are licensed by the State of New Jersey. The death-dealing potential underlying these statistics is almost incalculable. It reaches into every home, humble or great. It imposes on us a solemn obligation to act—to act with speed and decision.

In 1961, 778 persons died on our highways. The most recent figures indicate that 1962 saw a grim increase of some 16 per cent. This means that more than 900 persons died on New Jersey highways last year and that there was an accompanying increase in injury with all its tragic consequences.

During the past session, I recommended certain revisions in our motor vehicle laws. Their design was to reduce the incidence of drinking and driving.

Alcohol has become a major factor in the area of traffic safety. New Jersey operates a comprehensive alcohol determination program. It is recognized as the best in the country. An autopsy is conducted on all persons who have been killed as a result of a motor vehicle accident if death resulted within the six-hour period preceding examination.

In 1961, there were 463 such autopsies. For the first eight months of 1962 there were 372 examinations. These examinations reveal an alcohol factor with approximately 60 per cent of all drivers who are killed in motor vehicle accidents.

Without question, our existing laws for dealing with drivers who insist on drinking alcoholic beverages are inadequate. The law now provides for a presumption of drunkenness if the blood alcohol content is 0.15 per cent or greater by weight. This level was set in 1939 pursuant to a recommendation of the American Medical Association. In 1960, the American Medical Association had occasion to reconsider this problem and recommended that 0.10 per cent be accepted as prima facie indication of drunkenness and went on to state that "many individuals are under the influence in the 0.05 to 0.10 per cent range."

New Jersey has had, within limits of the law, a forceful program of traffic safety. We cannot expect to achieve good results in this area, however, if we are content with past efforts.

I cannot urge you too strongly to adopt the "driving while impaired" legislation and the implied consent law that is essential to enforcement of this and other control measures. Both of these programs represent realistic attempts to reduce death rates that approach the awesome. Adequate safeguards have been placed in these laws to protect our motorists from arbitrary and unreasonable acts on the part of law enforcement officials. No person can be requested to take a drunkometer test unless he has been arrested under reasonable circumstances. The only test that a motorist can be required to take is a breath test. His right to have a physician of his own choosing administer breath or other tests is preserved. Every motorist is entitled to the results of the test he had taken and is also granted the right to a hearing to contest the reasonableness of the arresting officer's actions. With extensive safeguards such as these, I can see no reasonable basis for opposition to the passage of implied consent legislation.

But, as I have repeatedly indicated in making these proposals, I am not inflexible. I shall always be willing to listen to reasonable modifications. I must caution the Legislature, however, against any revisions which would render the law incapable of dealing with the serious situation we now face. It is not sufficient to have a traffic safety program in name only. We must have traffic safety in fact.

In addition to the laws relating to drunken driving, there will be re-submitted to you legislative proposals revising our laws relating to lighting requirements and brakes upon our commercial vehicles. Both of these proposals will bring our law into general conformity with the requirements imposed by the Interstate Commerce Commission. For the well-being of all motorists, it is necessary that all commercial vehicles be equipped with the most modern safety devices.

New Jersey has been the nation's leader in the establishment of interstate traffic law enforcement agreements. Many of our sister states have, or soon will have, under consideration two proposed interstate compacts—The Driver License Compact and the Vehicle Equipment Safety Compact—which seek to introduce uniform

provisions among all the states on these subjects. These proposals warrant our careful study.

I recently approved the joint resolution providing for a study of the conduct of motor vehicle driver education programs in secondary schools. This commission, as soon as it is appointed, will devote itself to this most important aspect of traffic safety. Its recommendations will require close attention.

Our efforts in the field of highway safety have crossed State lines. It is unfortunate that we border on a state determined for some reason to maintain age restrictions on drinking which are weaker than those of the other 49 states. The tragic impact of this differential on our young people and those they encounter on the highways after a drinking trip to New York has been amply demonstrated. Although we have not yet been successful in persuading the State of New York to take meaningful action, we shall not abandon our efforts to save the lives threatened by the continued existence of this discordant law.

TOWARD MORE EFFECTIVE GOVERNMENT

I have often expressed my conviction that State government can and must assist more fully our counties and municipalities to better perform their duties and responsibilities. The burden that our local officials now carry is staggering. This can best be seen by comparing budgets—present and past.

Ten years ago local budgets, including those of school districts and counties, totaled approximately \$650 million. This year these budgets will reach, and may exceed, the sum of \$1.5 billion.

The State has the ability and the responsibility to assist our local officials in carrying out their tasks more efficiently and effectively. If the hundreds of millions in local taxes are to be spent wisely and in the public interest, it is incumbent upon the State to place at the disposal of our local governments the considerable information and leadership we have to offer. There can be no question that our local governments want and need such State cooperation. Indeed, a resolution to that effect was adopted

as recently as the League of Municipalities Convention last November.

You are all aware that I have previously proposed, in general terms, that a new department be established in State government which would be vested with the responsibility of devoting itself to the problems of our communities. No State agency now has that specific responsibility.

In the desire to make this new department as effective and useful as possible, I directed a study of the means by which such a department could best be organized. This study is now completed and, based upon its findings, I shall submit legislation to establish a 15th department in State government to be known as the "Department of Community Affairs."

The existing functions which would be transferred to the new department include: (1) all housing and urban renewal activities carried on by the State including the operations of Bureau of Tenement House Supervision and the Bureau of Housing; (2) the Division of State and Regional Planning; (3) the Division of Local Government and the Local Property Tax Bureau; and (4) the Divisions on Aging and Youth.

In addition to these existing functions, the new department should be authorized to undertake the study of municipal problems and activities and to coordinate the distribution of State services to local governmental units. The department also should have a statistical unit which can act as a repository for factual data of use to our local governments and which could be capable of providing local governing officials with such information as required to permit the efficient operation of government.

In many senses, this is a modest proposal. But, to the extent it will provide for the first time a comprehensive State agency with the clear responsibility for actively assisting our local governments in their search for solutions to problems, it is a bold step. It is a step we must take now if we wish to preserve and maintain local government units as a vital force in our system of government. To achieve the benefits of home rule in its fullest measure, we must assist local governments in solving their problems, or reconcile ourselves to the inefficiency and waste of haphazard growth.

THE BALANCED COMMUNITY—HOUSING

We cannot turn our attention to the important problems of our communities generally without giving serious consideration to their requirements in one particular area. This is the need for the construction of middle income housing units in our urban centers. This need for housing is most sharply mirrored in the problems of our six largest cities.

These cities have a total population of well over 1 million. They represent a vital force in the culture and economic life of this State. Yet five of the six cities suffered a loss of population during the past decade—a decade which saw our State's population increase by almost $1\frac{1}{4}$ million. We all can recognize that the problems of our larger and older cities are extremely complex. What has been happening to them is merely symptomatic of conditions throughout the nation.

While action on many fronts may be necessary to arrest this disturbing trend, fundamental to any solution of the problems of our cities is the construction of adequate housing at a reasonable rental for the middle income families who traditionally have served as the foundation of a balanced community life. Unless these families can be retained by our cities, our other efforts will have only limited success.

The failure to provide decent middle income housing in established urban centers is forcing many of our people, particularly young families, to take up residence in suburban and rural areas which all too often are ill-equipped or unequipped to handle them and the demands for public services they bring with them. In addition, the urban renewal programs, designed to revitalize our central cities, are being stymied because of the lack of middle income housing. This housing shortage is preventing the required relocation of families and compelling local agencies to earmark urban renewal lands for purposes not in keeping with an overall plan for balanced community development.

In November 1956, the Legislative Middle Income Housing Study Commission found that there was a need for middle income

housing in the State and that State financial assistance was required. The bills to implement this bi-partisan finding have never been approved by the full Legislature. If there was a need for middle income housing in 1956, there is an even more pressing demand for such housing today. We can continue to ignore this problem only at our peril.

By permitting our cities to decay, we harm more than the cities. The tax plight of our farmers, which I discuss in this message, is directly attributable to the demands for education and other services which former city dwellers are placing upon our rural areas. Furthermore, decay of the cities is injurious to the urban businesses which provide a livelihood for so many suburbanites.

Thus, the problems of the urban counties must be the concern of the people of our rural counties. They are partners in developing a balanced economy in this State which is essential to the viability of all our communities, urban, suburban and rural.

Since the bills which have been before this Legislature on middle income housing now are more than five years old, I have directed my staff to review this entire subject. Numerous conferences have been held with governmental officials, and representatives of public and private groups expert in the field of housing. Since the legislative report of 1956, New York State has embarked on a successful middle income housing program. We should benefit from their experience also. This spring I shall submit a comprehensive proposal for State participation in a program of middle income housing construction.

CIVIL RIGHTS—A TIME FOR CANDOR

On this hundredth anniversary of the Emancipation Proclamation, no discussion of the problems of our communities would be meaningful without a candid look at the question of equal rights for all our citizens. Of prime concern in New Jersey is the existence of inequality in housing opportunities for minority groups. Related to this inequality are myriad other problems: school segregation, spread of crime, health concerns, economic restriction and, for the minority groups, an overall dimming of the bright promise of America.

This state long has been a pioneer in seeking to guarantee the equality that first was spelled out in the Declaration of Independence. Our Division on Civil Rights, one of the first such bodies in the nation, has recorded solid achievements in its field. But, it has been handicapped over the years in translating high hopes into solid achievements by the absence of basic statutory weapons.

Nowhere is this authority more needed than in the area of equal housing opportunity. You have had before you for three years a "Fair Housing" bill that would guarantee our continued leadership. Heretofore, the Senate has been willing only to pass a diluted version of this program which offers as much opportunity for evasion as for achievement. I renew my plea for conclusive action on the matter of fair housing so noble words can become effective deeds.

Tied to full implementation of civil rights is the proposed transfer of the Division on Civil Rights from the Department of Education to the Department of Law and Public Safety. For reasons I have emphasized since my campaign for Governor, such a move would result in more effective enforcement without a diminution of the educational aspects of the civil rights programs. I have heard no open opposition to this change and if there exist any non-substantive differences, I am sure they can be resolved.

In another area, we should move to protect the rights of minority groups. At present, our law permits the employment by the courts of interpreters skilled in certain foreign languages. This authorization does not extend to the Spanish language, in which assistance is most needed in the New Jersey of today. Therefore, I shall submit proposed amendments of this law.

AN HISTORIC CELEBRATION

New Jersey is preparing to celebrate its 300th anniversary in 1964. Acting with foresight and wisdom we have created the New Jersey Tercentenary Commission. That Commission has done its work well. The proof of this is the thousands of our citizens who are preparing in scores of different ways to join enthusiastically the first statewide celebration.

Two Tercentenary developments are particularly pleasing. The business community of New Jersey is giving remarkable support, financial and otherwise, to Tercentenary planning and to the New Jersey Tercentenary Pavilion at the 1964-1965 New York World's Fair. Of equal importance, nearly 300 New Jersey municipalities and 20 counties have several thousand Tercentenary committeemen hard at work planning for 1964.

Soon this State will step off into a commemorative year that will instill in all a pride in community that will serve our State for years to come. I count it my good fortune that, as Governor, I will have the privilege of joining with all Jerseymen in telling a dynamic story of three centuries of people, purpose and progress. I know the Legislature will want to continue to support this important work.

A GROWING ECONOMY

New Jersey has maintained its position among the nation's leading states with substantial gains in population, business and employment. Our continued prosperity requires that government provide the conditions and services essential for vigorous economic growth.

We must approach the necessary investment in our economic growth with a spirit of enterprise recognizing that adequate public facilities and services—in law enforcement, in zoning and planning, in education, in transportation—are the assets which really attract enduring business and industry to our communities.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Business and industry traditionally have found a natural attraction in New Jersey's location with its easy access to great markets. However, there are many other factors which influence industrial and business location. And, prospective industrial citizens should have readily available to them an accurate and informative inventory of the State's assets—availability of labor and industrial locations, transportation facilities, water supply, tax policy to name but a few. Further, they should know that in New Jersey they will find a State government determined to assist them in

becoming established as partners in the New Jersey business community.

I intend to explore fully the means by which we can assure business and industrial leaders that they will receive full support from the Office of the Governor in gaining the information and assistance required for sound industrial growth for themselves and for New Jersey. And, in this pledge of assistance, I know that I can offer the full cooperation of New Jersey's business community, to those who wish to join us here.

As we all are vitally concerned with the national economic indicators which chart the pattern of the national economy, so it is essential for us to have sound data on the activity of the New Jersey economy. The Governor's Cabinet Economic Committee is attempting to provide this economic information in its Monthly Report, which recently has been made public and which you receive regularly. It is our hope that this information will become increasingly useful to business and government leaders as planned improvements are incorporated in the Monthly Report and as basic studies on various vital aspects of our economy are implemented.

THE LABOR FORCE

Legislative accomplishments during 1962 affecting the program of the Department of Labor and Industry to maintain us as a productive people included the Construction Safety Act, the Manpower Training and Retraining Act, and an interim increase in weekly workmen's compensation benefits.

Administratively, employment services were strengthened through stepped-up counseling, testing and placement activity; a successful training plan was inaugurated under the Area Redevelopment program, whereby unemployed or casual, low-paid seasonal farm workers are being taught new, higher paid skills; and the important Manpower Training and Retraining Act of 1962 was implemented to the end that modern society's need for technicians might be met and that New Jersey might continue to offer industry its traditional asset—one of the nation's most skilled and adaptable labor forces.

Special attention has been focused on the urgent problems of youth, featuring the establishment in Newark of one of the nation's two pilot research projects on Youth Career Development. In addition, the department has developed a summer program of community service to migrant farm families; established safety codes relating to pressure vessels and other mechanical equipment as well as our 100,000 construction workers; expanded the Vocational Rehabilitation Program; increased the minimum hourly wage rates of over 18,000 laundry, cleaning and dyeing occupations employees; and contributed in no small measure to a year free, with one or two exceptions, from major work stoppages.

Looking to the future, there will be resubmitted for your further consideration an urgently needed revision of our antiquated and inadequate laws relating to worker health and safety that follows the pattern of action established by passage of the Construction Safety Act, as well as legislation extending a statutory minimum wage to adult males and to occupations presently not covered. In addition, I shall present to you a proposal for an administratively feasible means of pre-determining prevailing wage rates applicable to public contracts and a long overdue labor relations law providing effective machinery for the peaceful settlement of labor-management disputes. I urge the Legislative Committee reviewing the Workmen's Compensation law to complete its studies as quickly as possible so that final action can be taken on this subject this year. New Jersey, as a modern industrial state, has lagged too long in these areas.

PUBLIC EMPLOYMENT

As a candidate, I found that pensions and retirement benefits for teachers and public employees occupied much of my attention. During the campaign, I pledged myself to support legislation which would restore originally anticipated benefits to those teachers and public employees whose retirement plans were affected adversely by changes in the Federal Social Security law. The enactment into law of Senate Bills Nos. 16 and 44 represent, I believe, a complete fulfillment of that pledge.

I also pledged to support legislation which would afford the members of our two major pension systems the opportunity to

purchase, at their own expense, supplemental pension coverage to compensate for the Social Security offset from their pension. Legislation to carry out this pledge will be resubmitted to you early this year.

Important as retirement rights are, however, I think it is necessary that we recognize that our first concern must be the present needs of our employees. Retirement benefits are geared to the salary earned while employed. If our employees are treated fairly during their working years, they will be treated adequately during their years of earned retirement.

In line with this policy, consideration is being given to salary revision and adjustment as well as increases in the mileage rate paid for the use of personal automobiles for State business. I expect to make specific recommendations in my budget message.

The State has been considering means by which we can most effectively recruit and utilize personnel. Diverse training programs for State employees are now or soon will be in effect. These programs include in-service training, tuition and programs for courses that will improve employee work performance and training which will qualify employees who do not have college degrees to be eligible for promotion to certain positions for which a college education has been a pre-requisite.

Since the establishment of the Department of Civil Service, there has been a marked change in the responsibilities of government as well as significant changes in the structure of government itself. These changes make it desirable to review the effectiveness and appropriateness of our existing Civil Service provisions. During the past year, the Civil Service Department has undertaken its own study. This study has included such matters as veterans' preferences, the function of unclassified Civil Service positions and unclassified and promotion procedures. As soon as recommendations are available they will be brought to your attention for your consideration.

TRANSPORTATION—A CATALYST

In my inaugural message I mentioned that "our problems in nearly every field arise from the inevitability of growth and the

demands of progress." That growth has continued during the past 12 months and the progress achieved in many areas of our State now demands that we sharpen the focus of our attention upon the free movement of people and goods—a catalyst for our burgeoning urban economy.

Significant strides were made in the field of transportation during 1962. Legislation authorizing the purchase of the Hudson and Manhattan Railroad by the Port of New York Authority; setting up a new agency to build and operate an Expressway from Camden to Atlantic City; permitting the State Highway Department to include essential ferry facilities in its Passenger Service Contract Program and also allowing it to participate in the cost of permanent commuter railroad improvements necessary to consolidate and coordinate service with the Hudson and Manhattan Tubes; approval of the bi-state compact setting up the Delaware River and Bay Authority; emphasis on plans for a high-speed transit line in South Jersey; and a number of important administrative moves by the Highway Department have laid the groundwork for a new era in transportation.

Now it is up to us to consolidate these gains and to ensure that the maximum benefit is realized from them.

The backbone of New Jersey's overall transportation network today is our State highway system. All of you are aware of the tremendous demands placed upon it and of the fact that many sections of highway are carrying traffic far in excess of design capacity. Likewise, I am certain that you have been made aware by your local officials that every mile of new state highway completed and put into service generates new demands upon county and municipal roads. It is a fact that the legislation now in effect has "frozen" State aid to counties and municipalities for local roads at a constant level for the past several years.

The combined current need for more and improved State and local highways, even without regard for the enormous traffic growth expected in the next decade, forces a realization that additional substantial expenditures are required.

It is much the same story with mass transit. Our passenger service contract program is designed to keep the commuter rail-

roads alive until certain capital improvements and consolidations enable us to determine whether they will ever be able to stand on their own feet. The sum now provided annually by the State for this program, which amounts to the equivalent of one mile of urban interstate freeway, must be continued. We must seek to make effective use of the Commuter Benefit Tax, a levy which must be set aside for the needs of transportation between New York and New Jersey.

The problem of improving our overall transportation facilities thus becomes a problem of providing adequate financing. And to achieve proper planning and orderly execution, this financing should be made available on a long-term basis. A number of possibilities have been under consideration for some time and I hope to present a concrete proposal to you in the very near future. Since all of our modes and means of transportation are closely interwoven, so that a change in the character of highway transportation quickly affects the rail carriers, it can be seen that only a solution affecting all of the facilities I have mentioned could be expected to produce the best results.

The large number of railroad grade crossings in our State, and the potential hazards at many locations, require consideration of a substantial program of grade crossing elimination. This problem, by its very nature, also must be incorporated in any solution to our long-range transportation needs.

These needs must be explored—and explored with vision and imagination. To this end I have requested Rutgers, The State University, to sponsor a statewide forum, including regional meetings, to develop the breath-taking vista of New Jersey's transportation horizons. This will afford the fullest and most immediate consideration of the State's transportation needs as an integrated whole.

From this will emerge the blueprint upon which our transportation future will be built—indeed, upon which the future of our State depends.

UTILITIES—A FOUNDATION

Years of study and discussion were culminated last year in the adoption of the first major revision of the Public Utilities Law since its enactment in 1911. It can be expected that this major accomplishment will facilitate both the regulation and the operations of the utilities which serve as the foundation of a modern economic and community life.

Utility rate reductions resulting from private conferences, conducted in an admirable spirit of cooperation, without the necessity for protracted expensive formal rate proceedings, brought to New Jersey consumers an annual saving of \$11.5 million in gas, electric and telephone service charges.

Close attention will be paid in coming months to the several proposed railroad mergers presently pending before the Interstate Commerce Commission to assure continuance of essential railroad freight and passenger service in New Jersey and to the establishment through joint efforts of Pennsylvania and New Jersey electric utilities of mammoth mine-mouth generating stations and ultra high voltage transmission facilities. Should legislative needs develop, they will be presented to you.

JETPORT—THRUST INTO THE FUTURE

New Jersey views with optimism the possibility of a giant new thrust into America's economic future with our State as its spearhead.

In accordance with my request to the Administrator of the Federal Aviation Agency a feasibility study on air traffic control for the proposed jetport in the Burlington-Ocean County area is underway at the National Aviation Facilities Experimental Center at Atlantic City. Evaluations of the study will be reported in May of 1963.

I am hopeful that this study will indicate that air traffic control will be capable of accommodating a new international jetport in the Burlington-Ocean County area. In addition to air traffic control considerations, the Burlington-Ocean County area is a most advantageous site as regards weather, noise, construction costs

and future expansion—factors being investigated in a second study by the FAA which will be available about the same time the results are reported on the air traffic control study.

A jetport in the Burlington-Ocean County area would not only serve New Jersey but this entire section of the Northeast. Such a jetport would be one of the few airports capable of satisfying the regional needs of the supersonic transport. Aviation authorities do not envision more than six airports of this type in the Continental United States and, therefore, the responsibilities for constructing and maintaining such a facility go beyond state boundaries.

The legislative action that will be required depends, of course, upon the outcome of the current studies. As soon as the results of these studies are available, I shall bring them to your attention together with such recommendations as are appropriate considering the conclusions reached.

Because of the regional concept of a Burlington-Ocean jetport I am going to ask the Federal government to reappraise the Federal Aid to Airports Act as it applies to financial participation in airport construction. Such re-evaluation should consider broadening the class of airport facilities items eligible for federal construction aid.

THE MEADOWLANDS—A REDISCOVERED OPPORTUNITY

Last June, I suggested to the Meadowlands Regional Development Agency, an organization composed of the municipalities sharing the land of the Hackensack River Meadows, certain steps essential to any program for realization of a rediscovered opportunity in the development of these wetlands. This included a survey of riparian lands, participation and coordination in the comprehensive survey by the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers, and the preparation of a comprehensive regional master plan.

I am pleased to report that significant progress has been registered on these points. The State Bureau of Navigation has commenced on a survey of the riparian land in the Meadows, with a view to a final resolution of this issue in 1963.

The comprehensive survey by the Corps of Engineers is also underway and full cooperation has been achieved among the local state and federal agencies involved in this project. This survey will continue for several years, during which time there will be mutual exchange of information and a close coordination of activities.

In addition, the State has submitted to the Meadowlands Regional Development Agency a suggested planning program for the region emphasizing land use, economy and transportation considerations. Upon adoption of this planning program by the Agency, a regional planning board will have to be created in order to be eligible for a Federal grant. The application for this grant will be submitted by the State on behalf of the regional planning board, and will be matched by State and local funds.

Our continuing efforts will be required to achieve the ultimate objective of reclaiming and developing the Meadows. To this end an application for a demonstration study on the techniques and processes of intermunicipal action has been filed with the Federal Housing and Home Finance Agency. I am requesting an appropriation of \$25,000 towards this study. This amount is to be matched by Federal funds.

Further, I am requesting the appropriation of the sum of \$25,000 which, when combined and pooled with funds from other sources, will provide for the preparation of the comprehensive plan.

I believe that this program can lead us to our common goal, the successful reclamation and productive development of the Hackensack Meadowlands on a basis which will be of benefit to all our citizens.

THE FINANCIAL UNDERPINNING

The continued vitality of our financial institutions is an essential underpinning for the economic growth of the State. I stated last May at the New Jersey Bankers Association Convention that “* * * nothing will serve as a more effective brake on economic progress than an inadequate banking system which fails to recognize the financial needs of the state as they exist today and the demands that will spring from the expansiveness of tomorrow.”

We must examine our banking structure to insure it is capable of meeting our needs. In doing this, due regard must be had for placing our financial institutions in a position to compete favorably with similar institutions in nearby states while preserving a healthy competitive status within our own State.

With this in mind, the Department of Banking and Insurance, together with the Banking Advisory Board, is considering proposals to liberalize the restrictions placed on branch banks. Their recommendations will be submitted for your consideration as soon as they are completed.

The need for a similar revision of the savings and loan association law has been recognized by that industry itself. Last year, a comprehensive revision was placed before you. I understand that it will be re-introduced this year. The suggestions of that industry warrant your close attention.

The Department of Banking and Insurance also has under review the need for supervision of mortgage companies. These companies are not now supervised or regulated by any agency except to the extent that they are subject to the laws concerning real estate brokers and salesmen. These companies hold large sums of money in escrow and handle extensive financial arrangements. From time to time, complaints have been received by the Department of Banking and Insurance alleging irregularities in these activities. The Department cannot satisfactorily investigate or resolve these complaints without some degree of regulatory authority. Proposals concerning the supervision of these companies will be submitted for your consideration.

A MORE PRODUCTIVE DOLLAR

The State Investment Council—a pioneer in administering the investment of public moneys—has admirably demonstrated the wisdom of its creation in 1950. In the past 12 years, the number of separate State funds which it administers has increased from 18 to 28 and these have been classified into groups having similar investment requirements. As a result of the constant supervision of these investments, the aggregate value of securities held in the funds has increased from \$349 million to more than \$1.1 billion

and the effective rate of return achieved has been increased from 2.37% to 3.73%. As an aid to its quest for greater efficiency and higher earnings, the Council requires legislative authorization for the establishment of combined accounting procedures for our major pension funds. Bills for this purpose will be resubmitted for your consideration.

AN ASPECT OF TAXATION

While I am reserving an overall discussion of taxation for my fiscal and budget messages, there is one area involving taxation with which we should come to immediate grips. This concerns local real and personal property taxes. Since the decision in *Switz v. Middletown* in 1956, the law concerning the assessment of real and personal property has been in a state of uncertainty. For several years following that decision, the Legislature itself was incapable of devising a satisfactory formula to resolve the assessment problem. An apparent compromise solution was achieved in 1960 with the enactment of Chapter 51. Implementation of this law, which was to have become effective in the year 1962, twice has been delayed. The purpose of these postponements was to give all interested parties ample opportunity to review the potential effects of Chapter 51 and to make such corrections or modifications as seemed justified. The time has come, however, when we must face this question directly.

The Legislature has had two years to consider possible modifications of the law. To the extent that such modifications are desirable, there will be opportunity to enact them during this session. I will consider carefully any revisions the Legislature feels to be necessary, but I must stress the fact that time is short.

I do recommend that the Legislature act promptly on proposals to amend the Constitution to permit tax exemptions for qualified veterans and persons over the age of 65 to be fixed at a dollar amount deductible from the tax bill. Such action is necessary if we are to give the people of this State an opportunity to resolve the confusion that has resulted from the court's decision in the second *Switz* case concerning the computation of such assessments. Legislation also should be enacted to implement these constitu-

tional amendments, if adopted by the people, so that the new method of computing these tax exemptions can be operative from the tax year starting in 1964.

OF FARMS AND TAXES

Because of the heavy industrialization of our State, there is the tendency to forget that agriculture remains a most important asset of this Garden State. Twenty-eight per cent, 1,431,000 acres, of the State's lands are devoted to agriculture. Agricultural production accounted for \$312 million in 1962.

The value of agriculture to New Jersey, however, cannot be measured in dollars alone. Our State derives much benefit from the fact that this vast land acreage is devoted to a profitable enterprise at the same time that it preserves open space for our people. The value of such open land can be measured, in part, by our present \$80 million Green Acres program of land acquisition. Moreover, the spiritual, moral and community strength of agriculture and those engaged in agriculture, forms an indispensable part of the very character of this "Garden State" and I am determined that family farming shall not disappear from the New Jersey scene.

We all realize that the New Jersey farmer has been beset by many problems. Some of his problems are caused not only by the legitimate competitive factors which all businessmen must meet but by the fact that his activity requires large land holdings. As local governing units have turned more and more to increased real property taxes to support education and other necessary functions of government, the tax burden of our agricultural people has increased sharply. To an extent this is inevitable and justifiable in view of the increased value of land in New Jersey. We cannot, however, expect agriculture to remain thriving in this State unless we can bring to this activity some element of tax stability.

I have appointed a committee on farm land tax assessment which is now engaged in preparing a constitutional amendment to permit agricultural and other open lands to be assessed by standards that would maintain these lands in their present socially

desirable uses. The public is entitled, however, to safeguards against abuse of this law by those seeking speculative gain.

I expect the committee to report its recommendations to me and the Legislature in the very near future. As soon as its proposals are ready, I shall request that you give them priority consideration.

ON OTHER MATTERS AGRICULTURAL

MILK

Since 1933, with few exceptions, New Jersey consumers have purchased milk at or above minimum prices established by the State. Unfortunately, over the years it has become increasingly difficult to determine whether the prices fixed by State government bear any reasonable relationship to the production costs of the milk industry. The uncertainty of costs in this area prompted the State Supreme Court last summer to set aside minimum prices which had been established by the Office of Milk Industry. Following this action, I appointed a milk study committee to review the entire situation. This committee recommended and I concurred that all minimum prices should be removed. This was done by the Office of Milk Industry.

The removal of minimum prices restored the milk industry to a competitive position and provided lower milk prices for the benefit of our consumers. The removal of price regulations, however, brought with it the threat of unfair competition and the possibility of a price war. To guard against such a development and to protect the integrity of this essential industry, we agreed upon legislation providing for a six-month moratorium in the milk industry. This moratorium was established with price levels which resulted from competition, thus preserving for the consumer the benefits received from fair competition while extending to the industry a measure of price stability.

During the moratorium period, the Department of Agriculture and the Office of Milk Industry will proceed to establish and implement a uniform system of accounting and reporting of actual costs of marketing this vital commodity. Once established,

this system should provide the basis for orderly milk marketing. Some legislation may be required to accomplish the necessary re-orientation of the Office of Milk Industry so that it can function effectively as a regulator rather than price fixer. Such proposals will be brought to your attention as they are developed.

MARKETING PROCEDURES

The Department of Agriculture is reviewing two measures of extreme importance to our agricultural industry which were before you for consideration last year. The egg marketing proposal is being revised to incorporate suggestions made at the public hearing held by the Senate. The Agricultural Marketing Order Authorization Act also will be modified to some extent. Both of these proposals are essential to the orderly marketing of New Jersey products in New Jersey markets and to the well-being of agriculture. They warrant the complete and immediate support of the Legislature.

PROTECTING A RESOURCE

The great Atlantic storm of last March left in its wake personal tragedies as well as serious financial and safety problems for the State, county and municipal governments.

Governmental agencies have worked to provide, first, emergency shore protection and, then, more permanent protection to restore the beaches and their protective structures to pre-storm status. Restoration will continue through the winter and spring to assure completion—a monumental undertaking, but an essential activity in view of the role of the seashore in the economic and community life of the entire State.

A conference was held in November, 1962, with officials of shore municipalities to obtain local views of the task ahead. The estimated cost of essential construction was reported at \$14 million. This does not include additional work proposed by a number of shorefront municipalities under the Federal Accelerated Public Works Act of 1962.

Federal and State engineers are carefully examining the shore protection needs for today and tomorrow. All levels of govern-

ment must act in concert to restore the shore area and to extend shore protection against erosion and future storms, as well as for accommodation of our growing population.

Much serious thought and effort has been given by this administration to the establishment of shorefront parks. Planning and action in this direction have advanced. It is appropriate that New Jersey, the early champion of beach protection and preservation for the citizen, again should take a leading position in this area.

GOVERNMENT IN HUMAN TERMS

As a goal of government the common good must include the many needs of man: his education, recreation, his health and safety. For society requires sound, well-balanced citizens for its health as well as their happiness. Further, a sense of social justice flows naturally from any concept of the common good to a just concern for the less fortunate who, through circumstances often beyond their control, find themselves in need of a helping hand.

Let us never forget that government is the people's instrument for joint accomplishment.

EDUCATION

The aspirations of society have been most clearly mirrored in the plans made for its youth. Educational opportunity is the hallmark of American society. In New Jersey, no other area of governmental activity commands more attention or a greater share of our resources than does education.

In 1962 the school population in New Jersey continued the steady increase of recent years, further driving home the fact that our schools will continue to make significant demands on the public income. These demands highlight the importance of a long needed revision of Title 18—the School Law—prepared by the Department of Education and now being circulated among school administrators throughout the State. I know it will receive your intensive consideration.

Main attention is now shifting to the State's role in the field of higher education. In May, we received from the State Board of Education the Strayer Report which made long needed projections of college enrollments and provided estimated costs of capital construction. Last year we opened the door to meeting these needs by enacting a bill providing for two-year county colleges. The State, the counties and the students would share the cost of these important facilities.

Also in the field of higher education was our action to amend the State scholarship law to raise the number of out-of-state scholarships from 15 to 35 per cent of the total. This action was taken to meet a critical need in certain sections of the State.

As we review the estimates of the numbers of our youth who will be seeking higher education in the years ahead, we know that our present facilities, public and private, are inadequate to meet the demand. We cannot but wonder whether the present pattern of distribution of our resources is efficient. More importantly, we must ask whether our facilities can measure up to the demands of excellence in education which are so essential to growth and leadership in a complex society.

We have reached a point where it is necessary to undertake a searching review of all our resources for higher education, both public and private, to evaluate their effectiveness in imparting quality education to an increasing number of students.

I therefore propose a broad study of the future of higher education in this State, and I shall appoint a panel of impartial authorities for this important evaluation.

GREEN ACRES—A PROGRESS REPORT

Toward the enrichment of our own lives and the lives of succeeding generations, we have made progress in 1962 that has evoked national attention. In November, 1961, the people approved a bond referendum to provide \$60 million to buy lands for parks and other conservation and recreation purposes. For State purchases, \$40 million was set aside, and \$20 million was dedicated to State matching assistance for county and municipal purchases.

Eight new State park and recreation areas currently are under purchase negotiations. Thirteen existing State park and recreation areas are scheduled for additions. Together, they will add an estimated 44,500 acres to our State park system.

The apparent success of this phase of the Green Acres program, however, should not obscure the fact that the Green Acres legislation, other than for the actual land purchase price, does not provide for land development. The addition of new public land areas brings upon us the responsibility of protecting, maintaining and developing such areas so that the public may utilize them for recreational purposes. Although development need not and should not be on a crash program basis, sufficient facilities should be provided as soon as possible so that the public may enjoy the benefit of these open spaces.

NATURAL AREAS COUNCIL

During the past year, a Natural Areas Section was established in the Bureau of Parks and Recreation in accordance with chapter 51 of the Public Laws of 1961. This section is responsible for the acquisition and preservation of natural areas with unique value for educational, scientific and aesthetic purposes. A Natural Areas Council has been appointed and a program is underway utilizing parts of existing State-owned lands and additional lands to be acquired under the Green Acres Program. A much needed step toward the preservation of New Jersey's natural heritage has been taken.

INSTITUTIONS AND AGENCIES

Nowhere is the impact of government more clearly translated into human terms than in the area of institutions and agencies. Thus, we can view with considerable satisfaction the progress made to date in implementating the capital development program to expand and improve facilities in the Department of Institutions and Agencies. Under the initial appropriation early in the year, five projects moved swiftly to construction. You recently appropriated the remainder of the \$40 million bond issue for three additional projects upon which bid results are pending. The

addition of these new and improved facilities to our operational program will reduce markedly the problems which have confronted our institutions and their staffs.

Of equal importance in the area of improved service was the embodiment in legislation of the major recommendation of the Alexander Study Commission, which called for the reorganization of the Division of Welfare. The beneficial effects to be derived from simplification and improvement of administrative practices in this area can be expected to eliminate much of the misunderstanding attendant upon our welfare programs.

In addition, we also have strengthened the hand of agencies disbursing public assistance to cope with problems of fraud, misrepresentation and deceit, and have made available to county welfare boards the authority to file complaints in affiliation proceedings.

To maintain the impetus thus given to our public welfare and assistance programs, I suggest to you the following areas appropriate to further legislative activity:

MENTAL HEALTH

Rapid scientific, medical and social advances have made possible the elimination of much human suffering while reducing the burden of caring for the mentally ill and mentally retarded in State facilities. Yet, the downward trend in population of our State mental hospitals, which has been giving us much reassurance in the last five years, has shown signs of reversing itself. With the rate at which the total population of our State is increasing, we cannot hope to keep abreast of this great human problem unless we take prompt advantage of every insight modern medical practice provides. I urge your fresh consideration of the mental health bills which will make available simplified procedures for voluntary admissions to promote early, effective treatment without the stigma or expense of court commitment. With this legislation, we can proceed with the development of a broad, modernized program of diagnosis, treatment, care and rehabilitation while providing standards for determining impartially the responsibility of relatives and public agencies to pay for needed care.

Since the Community Mental Health Services Legislation became effective on July 15, 1957, we have seen an unprecedented citizens' interest, coupled with action on the community and county level, result in a significant increase in professional services for the mentally ill. Most counties already are spending more than the 20 cents per capita which current statutes authorize the State to provide for such services. I soon shall submit to you legislation which will provide for increased State financial participation to the end that additional mental health services may be made available.

BOARDING AND NURSING HOMES

Community facilities directed toward the care of the aging are expanding rapidly to meet the needs of this growing segment of our population. Because of the insecurities inherent in the situation of aged citizens, we have a particular responsibility to make certain that good quality care is provided in the varied types of facilities required by their individual needs.

Similarly, it is apparent that our community hospitals and related medical facilities must be operated in such manner as to insure the provision of a high standard of care and treatment.

To better achieve these goals, I shall suggest that our licensing programs for such facilities be strengthened and that constant vigilance be exercised by the authorities charged with this responsibility.

AID TO CHILDREN OF UNEMPLOYED

Recent Federal welfare legislation has reemphasized the basic values of administering public assistance in a manner that strengthens family unity. A new plan would make available to us additional Federal matching funds—amounting to \$5.7 million annually—if we widen the scope of our children's assistance program. This program now is restricted to situations where at least one parent is out of the home or incapacitated. The broadening would include those needy families with children in which the dependency results from the unemployment of the parent. At present, provision is made for such families only through the

General Assistance program, administered by the municipalities which share the program's cost with the State. The redefinition of the New Jersey program which I shall submit to you will totally relieve the municipalities of direct financial responsibility for such cases since matching costs will be shared by the State and counties. The social and fiscal significance of this new plan merits the serious consideration of the Legislature.

KERR-MILLS IMPLEMENTATION

While reiterating our strong support for the President's program to finance medical care for senior citizens through Social Security, we cannot lose sight of the concurrent need for State legislation keyed to the Kerr-Mills Act of 1960, which would provide grants to the medically indigent. Such legislation, permitting us to share Federal funds now available, is essential from two standpoints: as a stopgap until Congressional approval of the well-merited Social Security approach, and, thereafter, for cases which may fall outside the Federal medicare program.

PLACEMENT OF CHILDREN

Present laws relating to interstate placement of children for foster care, adoption or treatment are wholly inadequate. Closer cooperation in the areas of investigation, supervisory control and maintenance of responsibility, through adoption of the Interstate Compact on the Placement of Children, can make available increased opportunities for good placements by broadening the geographic area within which proper safeguards could be assured. Legislation to that end will be presented to you in the near future.

THE PUBLIC'S HEALTH

The fact that New Jersey is the most urbanized State in the nation is most clearly impressed in the area of public health. Problems attendant to growing population and population densities are magnified in the area of sanitation, air and stream pollution and disease control.

During the past year, important legislative and administrative steps were taken to strengthen our air pollution law and to implement the State's sanitary code. In dealing with stream pollution,

the Department of Health reviewed and approved plans for the construction of \$50 million worth of stream pollution control projects. The department's authority to approve plant location on water sources was extended to include non-potable as well as potable watersheds.

As is always the case with growth, what already has been accomplished is but a small part of what remains to be done. The Department of Health, through the Commission on Radiation Protection, is considering amendments to the radiation code which would permit the State to assume responsibility for certain licensing and regulatory functions now conducted by the Atomic Energy Commission. Consideration also is being given to the development of programs for State financial aid to local health departments so that all of our citizens, no matter where they may live, work or play, may have the protection of essential public health services. At the present time, many of our localities are having difficulties in meeting the minimum standards of performance for local health departments which have been established by the State. The problems of providing adequate public health nursing services also are under review. They will be given intensive consideration at a Governors' Conference on Community Nursing Services March 6. To the extent that these programs and other plans now under consideration by the department need legislative assistance, proposals will be submitted to you during the course of the session.

There remain before you, however, several proposals which were recommended last session which have not yet been passed. The bill to grant to the Department of Health the authority to restrict the type of sewerage facilities that can be installed in areas hereafter developed could be considered a priority item. For too many of our municipalities, the problem of financing a program for sewage disposal is compounded because unsuitable sewerage facilities were utilized at the time that housing developments were constructed. In addition, the bill regulating the disposal of sewage and other materials from craft operated upon the waters of this State is essential to the effective control of water pollution. It will be resubmitted to you this year.

A new measure developed jointly by the Department of Health and the Attorney General's office should receive immediate consideration. This bill will provide for the licensing and control of commercial blood banks. There have been a number of recent instances of communicable diseases being spread through the use of contaminated blood which was obtained from commercial blood banks. This presents such a high danger to the general public that it should be brought under regulation immediately.

TO MEET THE PERIL

Still fresh in the minds of all are the anxious days of October when the storm clouds of the Caribbean served as a chilling reminder that the State, no less than the nation, must hold itself prepared against the awesome possibility of global conflict. In this area of urgency, several important projects demand prompt conclusion. The Emergency Civil Government Commission shortly will recommend legislation to provide for an orderly line of succession to the offices of the Executive, the Legislature and the Judiciary in the event of catastrophic enemy attack. Thereafter this group will extend its study to encompass government on the county and municipal level.

Recently we cooperated in the enactment of legislation authorizing a limited exemption from real property taxation for the construction of radiation fallout shelters in the home. Additionally, funds were appropriated for a study to determine the feasibility of establishing a shelter for the relocation of governmental operations in the event of such emergency. Now let us promptly resolve the question of school fall-out shelter construction and proceed to the enactment of such enabling legislation as is necessary and appropriate.

A program for the effective preservation of essential records and documents has also been developed. Legislation on this subject soon will be presented to you.

THE STRUCTURE OF GOVERNMENT

If government is to be responsive to the needs of the people and the communities in which they live, it must not burden them with suffocating regulations or prolonged delay in carrying on their business. Service to the people should be characterized by efficiency, by equity, by integrity in all branches and levels of their government.

From time to time it may be necessary to reorganize our government structure and to revise our procedures. A general survey of the operation of State government by a special Committee on Efficiency and Economy is nearing completion. Its recommendations, when implemented, should enable us to conduct an even more efficient government at the State level. But there are certain specific areas of reform which I should like to call to your attention now.

THE COURT SYSTEM

It is now becoming fairly well known throughout the State that the shape of our court system may require further modification. We can, with propriety and understanding, view the complaint of our county court judges that while the burdens and responsibilities of their office can be equated with those of the Superior Court judges, the remuneration and other benefits derived from their station are disproportionate in comparison with the technically higher court. Such matters as judges' salaries, pensions, tenure and the like are presently under review to the end that detailed recommendations soon will be presented to you.

LAW AND PUBLIC-SAFETY

I have noted various problem areas which are rendered more acute because of the growth and development of our State. These factors have their impact also in the area of law enforcement. A growing and changing population which is as highly mobile as New Jersey's places the utmost stress upon our law enforcement officials. For this reason, it is imperative that the Legislature approve measures which will better equip our law enforcement officials, both State and local, for the continuing fight for effective

law enforcement. I reiterate my previous request for the passage of a mandatory police training program for our municipalities. The Legislature should also act promptly on the proposals to authorize a uniform system of crime reports and to permit essential evidence to be obtained from a witness, by court order, without incriminating the witness.

Another proposal which will be resubmitted for your consideration is the proposed modernization of the tenement house laws. It is essential that this law be revised before the functions of the Tenement House Bureau are transferred into the new Department of Community Affairs.

The Department of Law and Public Safety will also submit several new proposals designed to protect the general public. The Department's Bureau of Securities has found its present program inadequate to the extent that it does not regulate real estate syndication. Such activities now amount to a multi-million dollar undertaking in New Jersey. They should be regulated.

The Department will also submit proposed revisions of the weights and measures laws and the laws concerning cemetery corporations. In both of these areas, it is essential that our laws be updated so that we can provide maximum protection to the general public.

LAW REVISION

Throughout this message I have commented upon the need to modernize certain titles of the Revised Statutes. These included our laws relating to corporations, education and weights and measures. In addition, other parts of the Revised Statutes require updating. The work on Title 40, it is to be hoped, is about to be concluded. Commissions have been created to revise our laws relating to eminent domain and riparian lands. Other commissions have been established to review the laws relating to elections and insurance.

Merely specifying these areas indicates the magnitude of the task. The basic inadequacy of our existing program of law revision is amply demonstrated, I believe, by this constant requirement of revision. Law revision should be of a continuing nature rather

than a sporadic attempt every 10 or 15 years to update what has become obsolete in the intervening period. In this age of technical achievement, it would be well if we took advantage of techniques which were unknown and unavailable just a few decades ago.

I have been informed that a University of Pittsburgh project is placing the laws of Pennsylvania and New Jersey on electronic data processing equipment. This work, although of great potential value to the State of New Jersey, has proceeded to this point without cost to us. There remains, however, a certain amount of work to be done before the full benefits of this program can be obtained. The cost of that work is estimated to be \$13,000. Considering the great utility this material will have in the revision work now being done, I shall request the Legislature to appropriate this amount.

CONFLICTS AND LOBBYISTS

Those who serve in or deal with government owe the general public the duty of conducting their affairs in a proper manner. New Jersey lacks the fundamental legislation, however, which would delineate the boundaries of proper conduct.

I renew my request for a conflict of interest law forbidding government officials and employees from engaging in activities or retaining private interests which conflict with their public responsibilities. The necessity for this legislation should be apparent to all. Because of an impasse between the Houses of the Legislature on this subject, I have directed my staff to undertake a review in the hope of developing a proposal acceptable to all. Such a proposal will be submitted to you in the near future.

A related subject is that of lobbying. While lobbying for or against legislation is a valid exercise of democratic rights, it is highly desirable to require the registration of those lobbyists who do so on a professional basis. The general public has a right to know who they are and whom they represent.

A REGULATORY OBLIGATION

New Jersey's natural advantages as a leading recreational State have been enhanced by the rising public interest in boating. This activity has imposed a regulatory obligation on the State.

The registration of power vessels as authorized by the Boat Numbering Act of 1962 has commenced. By April of this year approximately 20,000 boats will be registered with the State. Over the next three years, we will be renewing 75,000 boat registrations previously issued by the United States Coast Guard. During the forthcoming boating season, approximately 120,000 craft of 10 or more horsepower will be using New Jersey waters.

Most boat owners are sensible seamen. But the counterpart of the reckless driver on the highways now appears in greater numbers on the waterways. A small child, unlicensed and unaccompanied, may pilot a pleasure boat as long as 65 feet in New Jersey as well as most other states.

Operation by the reckless or inexperienced operator endangers the safety and pleasure of thousands of other boaters, swimmers and fishermen. Between January 1 and November 30, 1962, there were 151 marine accidents, bringing death to 51 and injury to 83 in New Jersey. During the year, 1961, there were 121 marine accidents involving 31 deaths and injury to 80.

These statistics indicate clearly that we must more efficiently regulate this activity. Therefore, I have requested that the Boat Regulation Commission devote special attention to the problems of boating safety—particularly in relation to the operation of power vessels on tidal waters of the State—and make recommendations on the licensing of power vessel operators. These recommendations will warrant serious attention.

EFFECTIVE STATE SERVICE

After almost a year of work and preparation, the Uniform Commercial Code was put into operation by the Department of State on January 2. Full facilities now are available to the banks, savings and loan institutions, credit unions, small loan companies and members of the bar who will function under this important codification. Streamlining of the department's administrative procedures has brought about substantial improvement in efficiency coupled with a reduction in the cost of operation with respect to the handling of correspondence and the administration of the election laws. Corporate annual report filings were increased to

64,000 as the result of an intensive drive and an impressive increase in the number of foreign corporations registering to do business in the State has been noted.

Further progress in these directions will depend upon the Legislature's favorable consideration of legislation that will be resubmitted to bring the fees charged by the Secretary of State into line with those charged by other states for like services. In addition, while the Revision of Title 14 (Corporations) is still in preparation, I will present several needed changes in that title for your interim consideration as well as a proposal for revision of our Trade-Mark Law.

CONCLUSION

Let us, then, proceed with the important business with which our fellow citizens have entrusted us. The world is growing up very quickly around us, and we must be neither laggard nor haphazard in planning our own growth and progress. In the Divine plan, it is ordained that we pass this way but once, and opportunities ignored in 1963 may never come within our reach again.

Our fellow citizens will hold us to a strict accountability, not for authorship but for achievement, not for political maneuver but for joint success, not for words but for action. And this is the essence of justice, for they have given us the tools we need to do the job—the stimulation inspired by their growing interest in government, the courage justified by their support, the sense of responsibility compelled by their trust and confidence. For my part I pledge every cooperation of my office, and hope that we can work together in a meaningful partnership.

Now let us turn, together, to our duty of shaping a body of law that will serve as guide and spur for a vital State.

The Senate and General Assembly met in joint session.

Speaker Matthews turned the chair over to the President of Senate, Mr. Ozzard who presided over the Joint Session.

SPECIAL MESSAGE TO THE LEGISLATURE

A PROGRAM FOR THE 1960s

Mr. President, Mr. Speaker, Members of the Senate and General Assembly:

The time has come when the people of New Jersey have reached a crossroads in the life of the State. We have been traveling to this point inevitably, not only during the brief year of my administration, but for many years before that. Now we have arrived at this point of decision—a judgment on fiscal policy which, in every sense of the word, is a judgment on the very future of New Jersey.

It is our present duty to decide whether New Jersey is to continue as a vital State, whether it shall seize the opportunities of dynamic growth in the important years ahead of us, or whether it shall flinch at the threshold of what should be the most meaningful period of progress in its history.

No one should be lulled into the nostalgic, but false, notion that it is possible in the complex world of today to stand still. As I have said recently to you, the world is growing up very quickly around us, and we must make sure that our own growth is neither laggard or haphazard. If

we do not provide for progress, we will slide downhill into a mediocrity of which neither we nor our posterity will be proud. For there is no middle ground in the competition of growth. The decisions which we must make now will mold our destiny as a State and determine whether we shall lead, or follow, in the years ahead. I want New Jersey to lead, and I think you share that view.

For the past few weeks we have had before us a valuable document, the Tenth Report of the Commission on State Tax Policy. Not only have the members of this commission labored devotedly on a review of our fiscal structure, but they have explored the demands of the future on the public purse. In particular, they have dealt in their study of almost 2 years with the needs of education, which has become, and rightfully so, a primary obligation of government in New Jersey.

Their report serves as a foundation for the Program for the 1960s which I today propose that you and I, with the help of the people of New Jersey, begin to construct.

A Massive Effort

The fundamental obligations of a State such as New Jersey are clearly defined by government in its existing scope. True, there are new areas into which State government probably will venture in the coming years. But our basic responsibility today is to meet fully the demands of existing programs. And these indeed are great. Today I am proposing a massive new effort in 3 basic fields—education, transportation and institutional effort. Each represents an historic State responsibility, and the result of these efforts will be felt throughout the public structure.

In large part, I propose that we deal with the capital needs of this State. Thereby, we truly plan for the future. At the same time, I recommend that we undertake a broad expansion of State participation in the operating costs of our public educational system. This follows substantially the principal recommendation of the Commission on State Tax Policy and represents a significant step toward easing the “maldistribution of the burden of the cost of State and local government” discerned by the commission as well as by almost all other students of New Jersey’s tax structure.

School costs have contributed in large part to the fact that New Jersey now has the highest per capita property

tax burden in the United States. Most of us cannot but agree with the Commission's finding "that the local property tax burden is unduly heavy, having reached the point at which in many municipalities it cannot be increased . . . and that it is a deterrent to business and unfair to homeowners." Therefore, to achieve a better balance, I propose that the State increase substantially its help to local government in education as well as other areas.

In most of our previous thinking, there have seemed to be but two alternatives before the government of New Jersey: to stand still, a concept which we know to be impossible or, in order to meet the needs of the State, to impose a broad based tax, meaning either a sales or personal income levy. Indeed, most of the members of the Commission on State Tax Policy were divided, basically, only between a sales or income tax.

For many years, this State has been justly proud of the fact that it has developed its present position of leadership without imposition of either such burden. Our fiscal picture is a singular one. Today, 48 States levy a sales or income tax or both. Another State is in the midst of debating such a tax program. While I always have shared our traditional pride in our freedom from such taxation, I nevertheless came to realize that it might not always be so.

It was for this reason that, upon my nomination for this office in 1961, I fought, and fought hard and successfully, to exclude from the Democratic platform its traditional pledge against new taxes. I did this not for any love of taxes, but because I was determined as Governor to do my full duty; and I wanted no impediment in the way of fulfillment of that duty.

And thus it was that in that platform we pledged:

. . . continued opposition to any form of personal income or general sales tax unless it becomes clearly and irrevocably necessary to the maintenance of services essential to a modern and progressive State.

Through the length and breadth of New Jersey, in home and in marketplace, I defined and repeated this pledge a thousand times over: that when the time would be reached that substantial need was demonstrated beyond any question, and when no possible alternative would be seen to exist, then and only then would I advocate that this State embrace a broad based form of taxation.

So that when I assumed the office of Governor, as all my fellow citizens must have understood very clearly, I did not accept the inevitability of a present commitment by New Jersey to a broad based tax.

And I do not accept it today.

While requesting that the Tax Policy study be broadened to include the full range of New Jersey's resources, my administration undertook its own review of the State's fiscal posture. The Tax Policy study, and my own review, and all that I have seen about me in this State and learned, without exception, have established to my mind that there is indeed a substantial need for money, and that a failure to meet this need would amount to a betrayal of New Jersey's future.

But by the same token, and from the same evidence, I cannot concede that no alternative exists to the imposition of a sales or income tax.

An Alternative

There is, in fact, an alternative, and I present it now for your consideration.

The key to the success of such proposal is the utilization of a solid and untapped resource of the future—the revenues of the New Jersey Turnpike, a highway which already serves as a link for the commerce of America. With proper utilization, it can become a financial foundation for New Jersey's growth. Without this magnificent asset, I would not present the program I do today.

This program for translating the abundance of the Turnpike into the future benefit of the State differs, I believe, from a number of proposals previously advanced. It envisions the full retirement of the Turnpike debt by 1972. With your authorization, the State, after this debt is retired, can plan on an annual return of approximately \$42 million from the operation of the Turnpike. According to reliable and conservative projections, this sum would remain after maintenance, operating and improvement costs have been provided.

Without revision of our basic tax structure, these sums would facilitate retirement of a \$750 million bond issue which I hereby propose. The proceeds of these bonds would meet New Jersey's principal capital construction needs of the 1960s.

The availability of these funds would free from our present budget many millions now appropriated for such capital purposes. And I propose that we use these millions.

I propose that they be employed for a broad expansion of State school aid and in prudent provision for retirement of the debt to be assumed.

Allocation of this \$750 million would be made over a five-year period and its first benefits could be achieved in the fiscal year which we shall begin next July 1. If we undertake this program, I propose that we appropriate \$150 million of the total in that year and in each of the four succeeding years. Actual application of much of this money would not be completed until 1970 or perhaps 1971. With proper allocation, I am convinced that New Jersey will have, as we enter the decade of the 1970s, the modern physical plan indispensable to the conduct of vital public business, and to our full participation in the dynamics of America's growth.

I propose that the \$150 million be allocated annually in the following manner: \$70 million for highway construction, \$5 million for grade crossing elimination, \$20 million for State aid for county and local highway construction, \$12 million for capital programs for institutions and agencies, \$25 million for higher education facilities, \$2 million for construction of the recently authorized community college facilities, and \$16 million for local school district construction programs.

By provision of the \$75 million for highway construction and grade crossing elimination, a sum of \$42 million would be freed from the current budget. The \$20 million allocated for county and local highways would remove the present \$8 million appropriation from present appropriation patterns. Because the bond issue would provide \$16 million for local school construction, the present budget would be relieved of this obligation. Thus, a total of \$66 million would be released from existing State appropriations.

Of this sum, I propose that we appropriate \$50 million annually for increased State aid for current expenses of local school districts, now at an annual level of \$74.3 million. This increased appropriation could be made in line with revised formulas recommended by the State Tax Policy Commission. It compares with an increase of \$67.4 million

in aid for operating expenses recommended by the Commission.

The remaining \$16 million would be set aside to meet the debt service obligations of the \$750 million bond issue for the transitional period between the time debt service begins and the date on which Turnpike surpluses become available.

In this program, we will be acting—and acting with determination—in three of the most important areas of State concern. Let us consider the results.

The Results

The additional \$50 million a year which we will channel to school districts for operating expenses will serve as a tool with which we can rework our present State aid formula. We can take cognizance of the special needs of school districts with exploding populations and minimal tax ratables. We can bring the State's "foundation program" into better line with present-day reality. These actions were a most important recommendation of the Tax Policy Commission. While it is true that this program will not provide the full sums recommended by the Commission, I am convinced that we herewith make meaningful provision that fits within present fiscal reality in this State.

In the field of higher education, we would come near to meeting the full projections of need. Last year, the State Board of Education received the "Strayer Report" on the Needs of New Jersey in Higher Education. That important document projected, to 1970, needed State capital construction expenditures of \$134 million for our public institutions of higher learning. In this program, we provide \$125 million, essentially meeting the need as defined in the Strayer Report. Furthermore, we allocate a total of \$10 million to meet the State's share in bringing to reality the bold new program for community education that we envisioned with the passage of the Community College Act of 1962.

This massive investment in educational facilities will bear a rich return for all the people of New Jersey. As we observe daily, the development of the industry of the future—electronics, chemicals, pharmaceuticals, research and so many others—is directly related to the excellence of a State's educational facilities. In building these college and

university facilities, we are building jobs for ourselves and our children. We are bringing a new prosperity to the business of this State. We are creating communities rich in social and cultural opportunity. And above all, we are passing on to our children the opportunity to prepare themselves for the fuller life that awaits those with the learning demanded by these complex times.

Transportation, of course, has a direct connection with the economic vitality of the State. Our efforts in this field have expanded greatly since enactment of the Federal interstate highway program and with public programs to maintain rail commuter service. Nevertheless, full realization of the opportunities of this program and corollary progress has been hampered by financial considerations. We do not deal here with all potential areas for transportation activity. To do so would require almost inexhaustible funds. But we do bring to bear on the problem many additional millions. And the immediate problem is a desperate one, as anyone who has risked his life on Route 22, or fumed in traffic delays at the Lincoln Tunnel, or hungered for new east-west crossings in Central and South Jersey, can testify. Even without a vision of the future, it would be necessary for us to move determinedly on this aspect of our highway program.

But there is an even broader impact. The availability of fine new highways in all sections of our State will bring new lustre to our attraction for business and industry. With these new highways, our all-important resort industry can plan to maintain its position as a leader in the nation.

Further, our increased transportation expenditure also will have an effect on local tax rates. It should be remembered that we will be increasing by 150 percent annual State allocations for county and local highway construction. Thus local and county governing bodies will be required to make a smaller demand on property taxpayers for such moneys. Combined with school aid, we thus will be directing \$62 million in increased State aid for local property taxpayers.

I propose today allocation of \$60 million for institutional construction. This is in addition to the funds provided by the various bond issues of the post-war years. The return on this investment, unlike that in the other areas, cannot be so directly measured in dollars and cents. Nor need it be. It represents the State acting to meet perhaps its highest

responsibility, its responsibility to its people most in need of help. These are the mentally handicapped, the young law-breakers who stand on the threshold of further crime or rehabilitation for a useful life, and others whose last hope rests in the concern of the State.

This need cannot be minimized by anyone who has heard, as have I and my predecessors, the pleas of an anguished parent for a place in a State institution for his disturbed or retarded child, a child who cannot receive the care he needs at home and whose presence there brings tragedy to family life.

I ask your thorough study of these proposals and for your passage of the necessary legislation. This will include a bill to revise the basic Turnpike Authority law to permit general State use of Turnpike funds following retirement of the debt, and the necessary bond proposal.

A Joint Task

Then it shall be our joint task to take this program to the people. Our Constitution requires their approval of this bond issue. The necessary bills are being prepared by my office.

We open here no vast new areas for State spending. We strive merely to meet the responsibilities we assumed with our public offices. And importantly, we meet the demands of growth within our present fiscal framework.

One of those responsibilities, of course, is the duty to conduct the affairs of the State government with efficiency as well as equity. Toward that end, I sometime ago appointed a Committee on Efficiency and Economy and charged it with the review of the full operations of the State government. Its report, as you know, recently was submitted to me. It points the way to economies, and I have taken steps to begin their implementation. While welcome, these possible savings, certainly limited in extent, do not relieve us of the duty to find the hundreds of millions demanded of us by the New Jersey of the 1960s.

To suggest that these needs of the future can be met by economies, uninitiated by responsible Governors and undiscerned by bi-partisan Appropriations Committees over the past many years, would be sophistry of the rankest order.

By this bond issue financing, the State does assume substantial interest costs. Here again, I am convinced that we

are acting in a fiscally prudent manner. The experience of the same post-war years that produced the public demands which we are meeting also developed an experience of steadily increasing capital costs, for government as well as for business and for the individual citizen.

For example, the United States Department of Commerce Construction Cost Index shows since 1949 an average annual increase of 3.6 percent. This compares with the anticipated interest cost of the bond issue you are to consider. Therefor, the economies achieved by rapid and large-scale construction can offset the cost of borrowing these huge sums.

In the vast new highway programs there is still another factor of economy. New Jersey is one of the most rapidly urbanizing States in the nation. Each year, land values rise along an almost astronomical curve. This new program will permit advance right-of-way acquisition on a scale never before seen in New Jersey. Throughout America, and particularly in our dynamic State, we can see where a dollar spent yesterday could have saved many more dollars today.

In Morris County, for example, land scheduled to be acquired for Interstate Route 80 has tripled in value in the last two years. One instance related to me by Commissioner Palmer involved open land right-of-way having a market value of \$1,000 an acre which, because we lacked funds to buy advance right-of-way, only a few years later cost us \$15,000 an acre.

Thus we would spend today to save tomorrow.

We should further remember that the economic vitality of New Jersey, with the certain availability of the Turnpike millions, places this bond issue well within the range of our State's credit capability.

Two weeks hence, I shall present to you my annual Budget Message. That document will deal with the recurring needs of State government. It will not take up the requirements of these broad programs for the future. As I have publicly said, there will be a mandated increase over the present revenue and spending programs. I shall propose to meet those needs by modifications in our present tax structure, not by any basic revision.

The Tax Policy Commission has made significant comments about the need for substantial revision—in addition to expansion—of our tax base. The objective of these recommendations is the infusion of a higher degree of equity into New Jersey fiscal policy. Furthermore, we stand in the shadow of court directives requiring similar revision. I am ready to work intensively with you in those areas during this year. I am confident that we shall achieve far-reaching solutions to those problems.

Today I have dealt with what I consider the State's basic needs. I feel that I have dealt with them in a manner that will enable New Jersey to enhance its already outstanding position of leadership in the life of America.

Should you, or the public by rejecting any referendum you might authorize, choose not to follow this road, then it will be our joint obligation to return to the certainty of a broad based tax. There can be no turning back in meeting our destiny as a great State. We must choose; and our choice must be one of responsibility and vision.

BUDGET MESSAGE

Mr. President, Mr. Speaker, Members of the Senate and General Assembly:

Today I present to you a budget of transition—transition between a state striving merely to keep its head above water in meeting the year-to-year demands of its development, and a state that is preparing boldly to come to grips with its future.

Today I come before you for the third time in a little more than a month.

In my Annual Message, I presented a program which outlines the full spectrum of this State's legislative and administrative needs.

Two weeks ago I presented this administration's "Program for the 1960s", a plan to meet the capital needs which are basic to any other public achievement by the State government.

Now, I present to you a double-edged program which, in one phase, discusses maintenance and necessary expansion of existing State activity and, in another aspect, plans the integration of this established activity with the capital program that, with your approval, will go before the people in November.

Accommodating our present revenue structure to the public responsibilities of 1963-64, I propose expanded or improved service in many vital areas. As I said two weeks ago, we can make this accommodation without resort to a broad based tax.

We will be required, however, to make provision for new or additional revenues in the sum of \$37.5 million. This is necessitated by the mandatory requirements of normal growth and by a need to work modest improvements into existing State services and programs.

This budget calls for an expenditure of \$547,479,498 which represents a net increase of \$37,148,367 over appropriations in

force for State programs in the current fiscal year. This increase results principally from statutory requirements of our State aid programs including State aid to education and welfare, normal merit increments for State employees, an overdue salary adjustment for State employees, mandated pension fund requirements, additional staff for many of our institutions for the mentally retarded and the mentally ill, and for our State-supported institutions for higher learning.

RECOMMENDED REVENUE PROGRAM

After serious consideration of the many possible sources of revenue which have been suggested to balance the budget, I have concluded that the most feasible and yet equitable program should consist of the following :

1. Revision of racing dates and an increase in the amount retained from the parimutuel pools at the State's three flat racing tracks to produce an additional \$4 million.

This would include elimination of the so-called "dark days," involving extension of the present 150-day racing meet to 169 days without extending the racing season beyond the presently planned closing date in early November.

This would produce \$2.5 million.

The present assessments against the pools at racing meets would be increased by 1 per cent to be shared equally by the State and by the tracks. Each would obtain \$1.5 million.

These revisions, I am assured, would benefit the State and improve racing at our tracks. The increased revenue for the tracks would enable them to enhance New Jersey racing with more adequate daily purses. Present regulations require the tracks to devote 43.2 per cent of such increase to improvement of purses. Our racing program must maintain its attractiveness in the face of heightened competition from nearby states.

2. Revision of alcoholic beverage taxes to produce \$12.8 million.

This would include an increase from $3\frac{1}{3}$ cents to 8 cents a gallon on beer, the first increase in this tax since repeal of Prohibition. This would produce \$5.6 million. The taxes on still wine and vermouth which now stand at 10 cents and 15 cents a gallon, respectively, would be raised to a flat 25 cents to produce an additional \$1.2 million.

The levy on liquor would be raised from \$1.50 to \$2.00 a gallon. This would bring an additional \$6 million a year.

3. Assessment of a surtax—for State use—on the present levies imposed for local use on electric, gas, telephone and telegraph utilities. The tax presently apportioned to municipalities from these sources would in no way be disturbed. The surtax would be 20 per cent of present collections from electric and gas companies. The surtax collections from telephone and telegraph utilities—the tax base of which differs from electric and gas operations—would be made proportional.

These revisions will produce approximately \$18.5 million.

In connection with the taxes now assessed, it should be noted that all of the proceeds are returned to the municipality in which the property of the public utility is situated. Today, adjoining municipalities receive no benefit from these taxes, although they frequently render educational and other services to those who are employed in the operation of such utility installation. By applying this surtax, an element of equity will be accomplished. The revenue derived by the State will be utilized for the benefit of all its citizens.

It also should be noted this surtax will require the utilities to bear only half of the tax as a charge against their net earnings. This will result because such a tax will be deductible by the utilities for Federal income tax purposes. Since these companies generally are in the 52 per cent bracket, their income taxes will be reduced by 52 per cent of the amount of surtax.

Before recommending this burden on the dynamic utility industry of this State, I took many factors into consideration, including the obvious fact of the partnership between these utilities and the State government in the continued growth of New Jersey. The effect of this tax will be watched very closely during the coming fiscal year.

4. A general upward revision of miscellaneous motor vehicle fees—not including registration or drivers' license fees—to yield \$2.2 million. Information submitted by the Attorney General indicates that many existing service charges are lower than the cost of issuance and administration. In addition to providing needed revenue, these fees should be raised as a matter of equity.

This represents my proposal for a revenue program to balance the 1963-64 budget. It is important to note that none of these changes will require additional administrative costs.

With regard to possible new sources of revenue for ensuing years—within the framework of our present fiscal structure—it might be well for the Legislature to consider the advisability of night harness racing, particularly in view of the steadily continuing competitive pressure from our neighboring states which will have a sure impact upon our existing racing revenues.

BUDGET REQUESTS

Formal requests which were presented to the State Budget Director totalled \$770,872,384. These included funds for capital construction in the Departments of Education, Institutions and Agencies and, to a limited degree, in the Highway Department. The Highway Commissioner refrained from requesting funds for the greatly broadened construction program the department is prepared to undertake should large additional sums become available. I point this out to indicate that even the formal requests made for 1963-64 do not portray the full needs of the State.

Aside from the requests presented by the various State departments, there have been other proposals from citizen groups, suggesting that New Jersey should embark on programs which

would exceed one billion dollars. Of necessity, we have made substantial reductions in these requests. As a result, \$222 million was cut from the amounts requested. This sum of course includes capital projects which we hope to provide through capitalization of future turnpike revenues.

EDUCATION

The amount recommended for education in 1963-64 is \$222.9 million or \$17.5 million more than the \$205.4 million appropriation of 1962-63. Thus, the State's programs for education will receive the major share of the budget increase.

INCREASED ENROLLMENT

Increased enrollment at the State University and State Colleges necessitates a recommendation for 248 additional faculty members and 154 other employees at a cost of \$2,465,000. As I indicated in last year's Budget Message, the pressure for education generated by the high birth rate in the late 1940s continues to intensify and will become even more apparent throughout this decade. Colleges and universities throughout the United States will feel the pressure of increasingly larger high school graduating classes. New Jersey no longer can rely on the migration of its students to out-of-state schools for higher education to minimize the impact of the demands on our institutions. Our sister states

are faced with the same problem and must treat first with the needs of their own young people.

The requirements of the future are well portrayed by the Strayer Report on 'The Needs of New Jersey in Higher Education. In 1963-64 total enrollment of both full-time and part-time students in New Jersey's institutions of higher education will approximate 91,800 students. This enrollment, when equated to full-time students will total 39,900, an increase of 4,000 over the 35,900 of 1962-63. We plan, however, appropriations of \$25 million annually from our capital bond issue for the essential construction at public institutions of higher learning.

STATE SCHOLARSHIPS

For the first time, this budget will reflect the cost of our new scholarship program for four full college classes. The number of scholarships will increase in 1963-64 by about 1,500 to a total of 10,570 with a value of \$3,672,000, or \$541,000 more than was appropriated in the current year.

STUDENT LOAN PROGRAM

During the coming year, we will be providing for the fourth year of the new student loan program. It is estimated that funds provided in this budget to underwrite loans to be made next year will permit 2,100 additional loans in the amount of \$1,487,500 to be guaranteed by the State. Altogether, there will be nearly 5,000 such loans with a guaranteed value of \$3,227,000.

STATE AID FOR EDUCATION

State aid to local districts for education in this budget will amount to \$113,431,921, an increase of \$6,764,301 over the current fiscal year. This increase will provide added sums of \$3.6 million for formula aid to local districts; \$1.1 million for transportation aid; \$600,000 for school building aid, and \$700,000 in aid for maladjusted and atypical pupils. In addition, we made provision for inclusion of \$50 million in additional formula aid to

local school districts. This would result from approval of the capital program which would release other funds presently allotted to capital purposes.

In addition, \$600,000 is included to inaugurate our new community college program. This amount should provide planning and architectural services for those counties which may embark on this program during 1963-64.

The capital program will permit a further appropriation of \$2 million annually over the next five years for the State's share of community college construction costs.

I also have included \$1,071,335 to equip and prepare the site for the new cultural center which is planned to open its doors to the public during the fiscal year 1963-64.

Also recommended as the State's share of actuarial requirements for the Teachers' Pension and Annuity Fund is \$55,486,899, an increase of \$7,592,925 from the current year. Of this sum, \$3,194,000 represents the 1963-64 cost of the passage of Senate No. 16 which provided both social security and State pension benefits to those members of the Teachers' Pension and Annuity Fund who lost anticipated benefits through changes in Federal law.

INSTITUTIONS AND AGENCIES

For the State to discharge its most personal obligation—the obligation to those in its care—there is recommended \$112,762,209, an increase of \$5,350,728 over the current appropriation. The recommendation includes \$68,937,709 for operation; \$38,479,500 for State aid; and \$5,345,000 for capital construction.

The additional sum includes the establishment of 329 new positions. Of these, 143 are allocated to the institutions for the mentally retarded in order to establish a more adequate staff for care and treatment of the severely handicapped.

During the last few years, we have sought to release to the community the more self-sufficient patients, many of whom had been supplementing employees in approved work programs at the

institutions. This trend has continued and the population of the institutions for the mentally retarded increasingly is composed of those less able to render service. It is therefore necessary to employ more paid personnel to perform these services.

Unlike previous budgets for the State hospitals for the mentally ill, there appear, for the first time, 38 additional patient care positions to provide basic services for children diagnosed as brain-injured and emotionally disturbed. This recommendation is necessarily limited to basic care because our knowledge of these afflictions is limited and the results, to date, of treatment programs have been so disappointing for these patients. We shall maintain and strengthen our efforts to find new avenues of accomplishment—and of hope—in this grim area.

Funds in the amount of \$175,000 are recommended for the Division of Welfare to administer the recently enacted program of medical assistance to the aged.

The State aid recommended for the various welfare programs operated by the Department of Institutions and Agencies, is \$1,950,000 over the current year. The recommendation includes provision for the State's share of the new Kerr-Mills program to which I have just referred. There is also included \$1,350,000—\$214,000 more than the current year—as the State's share for community mental health services. This sum will cover the cost of legislation which I proposed in my annual message. It will raise the per capita allowance for this purpose from 20 cents to 25 cents.

The area of institutional effort is another in which we propose to take a giant step in the future with our capital program. On adoption of this plan, this budget would make provisions for the first of five annual appropriations of \$12 million for vitally needed institutional facilities.

All activities and services of this Department are continually being evaluated. As an example, the Diagnostic Center is studying the disposition of original admissions.

The value of the psychiatric residency program in staff recruitment at our State hospitals again was demonstrated this year. Ten psychiatrists, all graduates of the program, accepted staff positions

in our psychiatric facilities. No comparable source of qualified psychiatrists is available to us.

National Institute of Mental Health grants are received from time to time. Of particular significance, is a grant for study of the development of psychiatric-geriatric nursing facilities in connection with community hospitals. This represents an attempt to cope with the increasing admissions of such patients to State and county hospitals.

The Neuropsychiatric Institute is activating, as a demonstration project, a regional mental health center encompassing all-inclusive psychiatric in-patient and out-patient treatment services for a designated geographic area.

STATE EMPLOYEES SALARIES

If New Jersey is to maintain a high level of public service, it is essential that New Jersey maintain an adequate level of public compensation. Our State employees are aware of their increasing responsibility and of the need to conform with modern-day requirements of performance. The rewards of such employment should be consistent with such standards.

To that end, I directed the Department of Civil Service to undertake careful studies of pay rates in comparable public and private employment. The Department conducted a survey of 46 companies in New Jersey and neighboring areas in the Delaware Valley. The study compared, by title, the minimum of the State's salary ranges with the average starting pay for comparable positions. Another phase of the study also compared, by title, the mid-point in the State's present salary ranges with the mid-point of the average salary range in effect in the Federal Government, New York State, Connecticut, Pennsylvania, New York City and Philadelphia.

The findings of the study lead me to recommend, as a matter of equity and sound business judgment, a series of improvements in the State compensation plan. I propose:

- (1) Elevation of each employee by one range grade and the payment of an across-the-board increment on July 1st.

This further contemplates that each employee will receive a normal increment in his new range on his anniversary date of employment ;

- (2) Selective range revision for certain titles in the skills, the semiskills, the protective services and technical and professional areas ;
- (3) Raising every full-time employee to an annual salary rate of no less than \$3,000.

The last general adjustment in salaries of cabinet officers was made three years ago. The need for high level performance—carrying with it an obligation by the State for adequate remuneration—is even more manifest in positions of leadership such as those of department and division heads. Moreover, the effect of the salary range revision program will reduce the necessary differential between the salaries of top career employees and the heads of the organizations in which they work. To maintain the balance, I have included funds to raise salaries of cabinet officers by \$2,500 and of most division directors by \$1,000.

Total cost of these changes will be \$9,560,000. I point out to you that only \$60,000 of this sum will be needed to provide the increments for the cabinet officers and division heads.

Furthermore, this budget will include an additional \$2.3 million in State contributions to the Public Employees' Retirement System. Of this, \$1.4 million represents costs resulting from the adoption of Senate No. 44, the bill which accomplishes for certain State employees the same results as Senate No. 16 for a specified group of teachers.

I am now studying the question of salary increases for Judges at both the State and county levels and will support legislation being prepared which will change their statutory salary scales. When such legislation is ready for introduction, I recommend that it include the necessary appropriation to carry it out.

LAW ENFORCEMENT

The sum of \$22,392,305 is recommended for the operation of the Department of Law and Public Safety, an increase of \$1,483,870.

It includes funds for the Division of State Police to provide 60 additional troopers. It further enables a 50-cent-a-day increase in the allowance for maintenance of members of this essential organization.

I also have included in the pension section of the budget the sum of \$3.2 million as the first payment by the State to place the State Police Retirement and Benevolent Fund on an actuarially sound basis. The State House Commission, under present statute, is responsible for the administration of the Fund. For the past few years, the State Investment Council has issued warnings that necessary reserves soon will be inadequate for the payment of pensions to retired State troopers.

As a result, the State House Commission directed that actuarial studies be made to determine the condition of the fund and the additional revenues needed to place the fund on the same actuarial basis as are our other major pension funds. The results of these studies have been presented to the entire force. Its members have agreed to certain necessary revisions of present benefits and to an increase of the percentage of employee participation by new members. Legislation will be presented to enable implementation of the actuary's recommendation. The funds I am recommending will support such legislation.

MOTOR VEHICLE DIVISION

Recommendations for the operation of the Division of Motor Vehicles include \$162,000 to embark on a safety-oriented program of issuing reflectorized rear plates on cars. The program will begin on January 1, 1964.

In addition, \$105,955 is provided for 30 new positions in this agency to strengthen its internal management, to tighten its pro-

cedures to deal with violation drivers, and to expedite the analysis and pin-pointing of accident-frequent road locations. Additional funds are being recommended to better allow for overtime resulting from necessary week-end and holiday road patrol, as well as the manning of inspection stations. An additional outdoor vehicle inspection lane has been included for Levittown, Burlington County.

I include funds for the Division's computer system for electronic processing of driver information. This will produce, in the Spring of 1965, one of the most advanced driver control systems in the country. We thus will possess a more powerful instrument for improved traffic safety on the roads of this State.

CONSERVATION AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

I am recommending appropriations of \$11,333,266 for this Department. These funds include an additional \$250,000 for development of our forests, parks and recreational facilities, \$300,000 for the first payment for amortization of the Spruce Run and Round Valley Water Development Bonds and \$125,000 for State aid to handicapped veterans and veterans' orphans. I also have included the sum of \$350,000—\$100,000 more than this year—for promotion that will translate the State's recreational, agricultural and industrial advantages into accelerated industrial and commercial development.

In the current fiscal year, because of the devastating storm of last March, \$4 million was appropriated to this Department for rehabilitation of our shorefront, in addition to the customary annual appropriation of \$1 million in State matching funds for beach protection.

Again, last December, a supplemental appropriation of \$1 million was made which, together with \$1 million in local funds, was available to match \$2 million of Federal funds under the Public Works Acceleration Program. When the supplemental appropriation was made, it was generally agreed that it would take the place of the \$1 million that would have been included in the forthcoming budget.

Nevertheless, if resources are available after next June 30, I would support additional appropriations for beach protection that could match Federal funds provided by continued implementation of the Accelerated Public Works Program.

HEALTH

I have recommended \$4,062,467 for the Department of Health, or \$332,732 more than the present year. This additional sum will permit the hiring of 22 new employees in vital programs.

The increase in venereal disease in our metropolitan areas requires constant vigilance. We also must expand the tuberculosis surveillance program to move closer toward eradication of this dread disease. While it is true that modern techniques make it possible to treat tubercular patients at home, it is equally true that the present trend away from institutions exposes all to greater risks from active carriers. These funds will augment those presently used to gather facts on active carriers.

Furthermore, we plan to expand our programs in environmental health, drug and food control, air sanitation and radiology.

TREASURY

In addition to the funds required for the operation of the Department of the Treasury, there is recommended \$1,685,000 for capital purposes—an increase of \$762,000 over that now available.

With the completion of the new Education Department Building, the new Library Building, Museum and Cultural Center, we must turn our attention to acquisition of the balance of the land in John Fitch Way for which we are under contract with the City of Trenton. Funds recommended include \$500,000 for this purpose. In addition, \$650,000 is provided to round out the State House area through the purchase of properties between the State House and Willow Street, and \$500,000 to complete the electrical system serving the State House, State House Annex and the newly constructed State Education Building, Cultural Center, Library and Museum.

HIGHWAY

The amounts recommended for the operation of the Highway Department, for new construction and for State aid to local districts total \$90,266,000, or \$1,918,000 more than was provided in the current year. Our expanded capital program, if adopted, would add \$30 million for State construction and \$12 million in State aid to counties and municipalities.

New positions have been recommended to bolster the Right-of-Way Division, engineering services in the Construction Division and maintenance of the State's highway system. A large portion of the cost of new positions will be charged to Federal aid. The sums recommended will enable us to continue to match the full Federal aid allotted to New Jersey by the Federal government.

Of the recommendations, \$12 million will be available for construction of state roads, the cost of which is not matched by the Federal government. The total amount recommended, together with Federal matching, will provide a construction program of \$125.6 million. This is exclusive of the new program.

To continue our present program of contracting for commuter service with railroad carriers there is included \$6 million, the same amount provided in the current year.

LABOR AND INDUSTRY

This Department has been provided with \$7,719,155, representing \$615,752 more than present appropriations. The bulk of the increase—\$400,274—is for the operation of the Rehabilitation Commission, one of our most vital programs. The active caseload here will rise next year to 3,947 persons from the caseload of 3,479 on last June 30th. In all, 14 additional positions are provided to handle this increase and to continue, on a matching basis, activities heretofore supported wholly from State funds in the Workmen's Compensation Division, or wholly from Federal funds, as a rehabilitation project. Within this sum is \$292,129 for additional services to clients served by the Commission and for extension, improvement, research and demonstration projects.

This effort will reap a rich human reward as well as substantial public savings in welfare payments that otherwise would have been required.

Personnel has been added in the Division of Workmen's Compensation to handle the growing number of hearings and claims. I also have included additional positions in the Bureau of Engineering and Safety of the Division of Labor to improve administration of the industrial and construction safety laws. And, not in the least, added funds will enable the Disability Insurance Service to cope with the increasing number of claims resulting from recent statutory changes affecting eligibility of expectant mothers.

OTHER PROGRAMS

I have presented to you the areas of State government in which the fiscal impact is the heaviest in the new year. Other departments, no less important, will require additional funds in lesser sums.

In the Department of State, additional money is recommended to staff the section handling Uniform Commercial Code activity. These funds are more than offset by the fees we can anticipate. The same is true of the Department of Banking and Insurance. Increases in this agency are, in the main, offset by additional revenues which it produces.

Adequate funds are provided for modest improvement of operations in the Departments of Civil Service, Agriculture, Defense, Public Utilities and the miscellaneous executive commissions.

I have not included funds in this budget for the first year's operation of the Department of Community Affairs which I discussed in my First Annual Message. The legislation to be submitted in this session establishing such a department will provide for its needs well within the context of available funds.

A FINAL WORD

This then is my proposal for financing the multi-faceted needs of a great state in a year of continuing change. I believe that this

program, when coupled with our capital proposals, meets those needs with responsibility, with the required imagination and with a sense of the capacity of the tax-paying public to do its share in the maintenance of essential public service.

I have not sought to evade my constitutional duty to propose specific courses of action. On you now devolves the obligation to study and question these proposals. I suggest that you do so with meticulous and intensive care. I particularly direct this suggestion to your able Joint Appropriations Committee which has a traditional mandate to scan, not only the budget recommendations, but the entire operation of the State government. This Committee, and indeed, the entire Legislature, can be assured of the full cooperation of this administration in seeking all necessary facts and any desired explanations of this data.

I look forward to working with you from this point in the evolution of a sound fiscal program for the forthcoming year. We are engaged in a most serious business and I commend it to your sober and cooperative consideration.

Amend page 1, Title, line 4, following “(P. L. 1960, c. 51)” insert “and making an appropriation therefor”.

Amend page 2, section 3, line 1, delete section 3 in its entirety and insert the following sections in lieu thereof:

“3. On or before July 1, 1963, each person owning tangible personal property used in business within the taxing district during any part of the 12-month period ending December 31, 1962 shall prepare and file with the Director of the Division of Taxation an appropriate return of such personal property in such form and containing such information relating thereto as the director prescribed for the tax year 1963 pursuant to the provisions of the act hereby supplemented, in Returns of Tangible Personal Property used in Business, Forms PT-1, PT-1A and PT-1F and implementing instructions and regulations. Said forms, instructions and regulations shall be revised as necessary to carry out the purposes of this act. The returns shall list such property according to its fair value as of the last accounting year for Federal income tax purposes completed prior to April 2, 1963, and a separate return shall be filed for personal property situated in each taxing district. All such returns shall set forth the penalties provided in section 4 of this act and shall be signed by the owner or his authorized agent.

“4. Any property owner required to file a return under this act, who fails or neglects to file a return within the time prescribed herein or who shall file a willfully false or fraudulent return, shall be assessed a penalty of \$25.00 per day for each day of delinquency provided that the total penalty for such property owner shall not exceed \$500.00 and, provided, further, that in the case of a taxpayer whose business personal property, at cost, does not exceed \$25,000.00, there shall be imposed in lieu of such a penalty the appropriate penalty listed below:

\$5.00 where the delinquency does not exceed 30 days;
\$10.00 where the delinquency does not exceed 60 days; \$20.00 where the delinquency does not exceed 90 days; \$25.00 for each additional 30 days in excess of 90 days, provided that in no event shall the total penalty for such property owner exceed \$100.00.

“All penalties shall be enforceable and collectible by the Director, Division of Taxation pursuant to the penalty enforcement law (chapter 58 of Title 2A of the New Jersey Statutes) in a summary manner. The director, if satisfied that the failure to file on time was excusable, may abate or remit the whole or part of any penalty.

“5. The returns required to be filed under this act shall not be used as a basis for determination of any assessment but shall be used by the director only for the purpose of compiling and tabulating statistical information which he shall use for the purpose of analyzing the statutory law relating to the taxation of personal property used in business and making recommendations required under section 38 of the act hereby supplemented. All returns filed pursuant to this act shall be destroyed within 1 year from the date filed with the director.

“6. (a) All returns filed pursuant to this act shall be considered confidential and privileged and neither the director nor any employee in the Division of Taxation or any employee charged with the custody of such returns shall divulge or disclose any information obtained from said returns. Neither the director nor any employee engaged in such administration or charged with the custody of any such returns shall be required to produce any of them for inspection of any person or for use in any action or proceeding.

“(b) Nothing herein contained shall be construed to prevent:

“(1) The publication of statistics and information provided such materials have been so classified as to prevent the identification of a particular return and the items thereof; or

“(2) The director, in carrying out the purposes of this act, from disclosing the name and address of any person required to file under this act and information as to whether such person has complied with the provisions of this act.

“7. The assessors and public officials of the municipalities of the State concerned with the application of the provisions of chapters 4 and 4a of Title 54 of the Revised Statutes shall co-operate with the Division of Taxation to the extent required by the director thereof and shall assist the director in distributing the forms provided for in section 3 of this act. On or before June 1, 1963, such assessors and public officials shall furnish to the director a list of the names and addresses of the taxpayers within their jurisdiction to whom they have mailed or distributed such forms. The director, within the limitation of available appropriations shall reimburse such municipalities for any costs incurred by them for printing and envelopes and for the cost incurred for postage used in mailing.

“8. There is hereby appropriated to the Division of Taxation in the Department of the Treasury the sum of \$100,000.00 or so much thereof as shall be required to carry out the provisions of this act.

“9. This act shall take effect immediately.”

Mr. Crabiel moved the adoption of the Assembly amendments to Senate Bill No. 101.

Add the following Rules to be numbered 15:1A, 15:1B, 15:1C, 15:1D, 15:1E, 15:1F, 15:1G.

15:1A. Whenever any member of the General Assembly shall desire to introduce any bill, which if enacted, would increase or decrease State revenues or increase State expenditures or would require the appropriation of State funds not set forth in dollars therein, he may request, in writing, the Legislative Budget and Finance Director to prepare and certify to him a fiscal note containing an estimate in dollars of the amount by which State revenues

would be increased or decreased, or by which State expenditures would be increased, by reason of the enactment thereof, or of the amount of appropriation of State funds which would be required to carry out its purposes if it should be enacted, and he shall forward with such request a copy of said proposed bill.

15:1B. Whenever any proposed bill is delivered to the Committee on Revision and Amendment of Laws of the General Assembly for examination as to form prior to its introduction, the committee shall also determine whether such a bill, if enacted, would increase or decrease State revenues or increase State expenditures or would require the appropriation of State funds not set forth in dollars therein. If the committee shall determine that the bill will have such effect upon State revenues or expenditures, the committee shall, upon approval of the bill for introduction, endorse upon the original and each copy of said bill, a notice stating that examination of the bill indicates that such a fiscal note may be required for said bill, addressed to:

(a) The chairman of the committee to which said bill is designated to be referred, or

(b) The Speaker, if said bill is designated by him not to be referred.

15:1C. If the chairman of the committee to which any Senate or Assembly bill shall have been referred or the committee thereof, or, if such bill is not referred but is not immediately advanced to second reading after first reading then the Speaker shall determine that the effect of such bill, if enacted, would be to increase or decrease State revenues or to increase State expenditures or to require the appropriation of State funds not set forth in dollars therein and if the chairman of the committee or the committee or the Speaker, as the case may be, shall decide, in his or their opinion, that the statement attached to the bill, if any, does not set forth such effect completely or accurately, he or they may request the Legislative Budget and Finance Director, in writing, to cause to be prepared and to certify to him a fiscal note for the bill.

15:1D. Whenever any bill of the character described in Rule 15:1A is introduced and advanced to second reading, a fiscal note may be required to be furnished to it only by special order of the House and in case such an order is made the preparation of a fiscal note to said bill shall be

requested, in writing, of the Legislative Budget and Finance Director by the Clerk of the General Assembly.

15:1E. When any request for a fiscal note is received by the Legislative Budget and Finance Director, said director shall thereupon make written request of the Director of the Division of Budget and Accounting in the Department of the Treasury to have such fiscal note prepared and furnished promptly to him (the Legislative Budget and Finance Director) according to law or that he certify to said Legislative Budget and Finance Director that no such dollar estimate can be made, stating the reason therefor as required by law.

15:1F. Whenever any fiscal note to any bill shall be forwarded by the Director of the Division of Budget and Accounting, to the Legislative Budget and Finance Director, the said director shall examine the same as to its accuracy and

(a) if he finds it to be accurate, he shall approve it, or

(b) if he finds it to be inaccurate, he shall prepare an accurate fiscal note for the bill

and he shall promptly have delivered in person or by certified mail, to the introducer whose name first appears upon the bill, a copy of the fiscal note so approved with a notice of such approval or a copy of the fiscal note prepared by him, as the case may be, with a notice that such introducer may object to such fiscal note within 5 days after the receipt of such notice.

If such introducer shall so object, the Legislative Budget and Finance Director shall, after giving consideration to such objection, determine the final form in which such fiscal note shall be certified by him and he shall certify such determination to such introducer and he shall also certify the fiscal note so approved or determined upon by him, to the Clerk of the House if such fiscal note was requested by an introducer of said bill or by said Clerk, or to the chairman of the committee or the committee to which the bill has been referred, or to the Speaker of the House, if, and according as, any one of them may have requested the same and said certificate shall be printed and distributed in the same manner as bills are printed and distributed.

15:1G. A Fiscal note shall not be required of a bill of the character described in Rule 15:1A if its effect upon State

expenditures is attributable to administrative costs and expenses.

Amend Rule 15:21 by adding the words "entered upon the Journal," in the third paragraph, second line, after the word "nays," and fifth paragraph, third line, after the word "nays."

Add the following Rule after Rule 15:28 to be numbered 15A:1.

PRINTING OF BILLS, JOINT RESOLUTIONS AND CONCURRENT
RESOLUTIONS

15A:1. In printing legislative bills, joint resolutions and concurrent resolutions:

a. All numbers shall be expressed in Arabic figures except where a number begins a sentence and in all dates figures shall be used even in cases in which the dates are written at length in the bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution,

b. Material enclosed in bold-faced brackets shall be printed without change in all copies of the bills, joint resolutions and concurrent resolutions notwithstanding that by subsequent amendment part of the material so enclosed is to be included in the bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution,

c. A footnote shall be annexed to the first page of each bill which contains material enclosed in bold-faced brackets to the following effect:

Explanation—Matter enclosed in bold-faced brackets [thus] in the above bill is not enacted and is intended to be omitted from the law.

d. Material underlined shall be printed by substituting italics for the underlined material and omitting the underlining, and material included in italics shall be so printed,

e. Amendments to Assembly bills, joint resolutions and concurrent resolutions adopted during their progress through the House shall be printed separately only by order of the Speaker but amendments to Senate bills, joint resolutions and concurrent resolutions, so adopted, shall be printed separately and the Senate bill, joint resolution or

concurrent resolution, so amended, shall not be reprinted with such amendments included therein.

f. In printing bills, joint resolutions and concurrent resolutions which have been amended, with the amendments included, all material intended to be omitted by the amendment shall be printed in the bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution in its proper place enclosed in stars or asterisks and bold-faced brackets thus—

* [thus] *

and all material intended to be added by the amendment shall be printed in its proper place in italics enclosed in stars or asterisks—

* *thus* *

notwithstanding that the material to be added is part of the material enclosed in bold-faced brackets in the original bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution or in any amendment thereof previously adopted by the House and if the bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution is amended a second time, double stars or asterisks shall be used and additional stars or asterisks shall be used in the same manner as successive amendments are adopted.

g. The form of amendment to be adopted by the House will remain the same as at present for use in the Journal and amendments, when printed separately, shall be printed in the form in which they are written but the above rules shall be followed in including the amendments in reprints of bills, joint resolutions or concurrent resolutions,

h. Italics shall not be used in printing any material except the material hereinbefore designated to be printed in that manner and except material occurring in the enacting or resolving clauses of any bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution.

other sentence or commitment, he shall be discharged from such imprisonment by the officer in charge of the county jail or workhouse.”

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 100

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, paragraph 14(b) of the Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 100, with my objections, for reconsideration.

This bill, identical to Assembly Bill No. 303 of 1962, which I returned for reconsideration in that year, would amend in two respects the law which prohibits minors from entering any licensed retail liquor establishment for the purpose of purchasing or consuming any alcoholic beverage and from purchasing or consuming said beverage or misstating their age in order to do so. First it would increase the penalty on conviction from a fine "not exceeding \$50.00" to a fine "of not less than \$100.00 and not exceeding \$200.00". Second, it would require peace officers and alcoholic beverage enforcement officers in every case to make complaints and to prosecute or assist in the prosecution of any minor who violates this statute.

The problems created by minors who violate the alcoholic beverage law have been given continued close attention by my administration. Proposals tightening the law directed at

the driver who drinks are now before the Senate. A continuous campaign to have the State of New York conform its minimum age for consumption of alcoholic beverages to that of its neighbors is being waged by this administration. I approach, therefore, this legislation, as I did its 1962 counterpart, from a sympathetic viewpoint. At the time I returned the latter bill to the General Assembly I made the following statement:

“I am in full agreement . . . with the provisions of the bill which provide for an increased fine for the violators of this law. A greater fine should help deter minors from seeking to consume alcoholic beverages in public places. The provision . . . however, which would eliminate the discretion now residing in law enforcement agencies as to the prosecution of minors, while commendable as to intent, is not likely to improve law enforcement efforts.

“Apprehension of the minor who violates the alcoholic beverage law is but one part of the problem. Prosecution of those adults who willingly supply such minors with alcoholic beverages is an even more important aspect of the problem.

“Our law enforcement agencies have found the minor to be an essential witness in any criminal or disciplinary prosecution of a licensee who may be charged with sale to a minor. It has also been our experience that when minors are prosecuted, the case the State may have against the licensee often cannot be proved. It is readily apparent that a minor would be inhibited from testifying against the licensee if he is also under the threat of prosecution. He could properly refuse to testify by recourse to the constitutional protection against self-incrimination. This is not to state that there are not instances where the minor should be prosecuted and punished. The decision as to the best procedure to be followed, however, should be left in the hands of our enforcement officials and not predetermined by legislative fiat. The practical experience our law enforcement officials have gained through many years of enforcing this law justifies the decision to leave to the discretion of such officials the question whether prosecution of a minor is the appropriate course to follow.”

Bearing in mind the Legislature's decision to present to me for action a bill identical to the one returned by me last year, I have carefully reconsidered my views on this measure. However, I find the experience and logic which compelled me to take the action I did last year still to be valid today.

Accordingly, I am returning Assembly Bill No. 100 for reconsideration, with the recommendation that it be amended as follows:

On page 1, title, line 7, delete “, and supplementing chapter 1 of Title 33,”.

On page 2, section 2, lines 1 through 5, delete this section in its entirety.

On page 2, section 3, line 1, delete the numeral “3” and insert in lieu thereof the numeral “2”.

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 285

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, paragraph 14(b) of the Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 285, with my objections, for reconsideration.

This bill was introduced to provide clearly that the statutory width limitation on commercial motor vehicles contained in R. S. 39:3-83 and 39:3-84 applies to the dimensions of the load as well as to the vehicle itself. The need for this clarification arose when the Superior Court recently ruled that the present limitation applied only to the dimensions of the vehicle itself, *State v. Patfol, Inc.*, 76 N. J. Super. 287 (App. Div. 1962) reargument denied 76 N. J. Super. 572 (App. Div. 1962). It also provides that the dimensions of the safety equipment, which are not included in measuring

the width of the vehicle for the purpose of these sections, shall be regulated by the Director of Motor Vehicles. I am in complete agreement with the intent of these amendments.

After the bill was introduced, however, it was amended to permit the use of any size truck tractor where the length of the semitrailer does not exceed 40 feet in length. This would permit an exception to the present 50 foot limitation on the length on the truck tractor and semitrailer combination.

Until recently there was a 35 foot limitation on the length of semitrailers. The Legislature was persuaded to delete this so that the trucking industry could use longer semitrailers with modern shorter truck tractors and still be within the over-all 50 foot limitation. The purpose of this amendment is to permit those companies still utilizing older model truck tractors to benefit by the deletion of the 35 foot limitation on the length of semitrailers.

Although I can understand the desire of these companies to use longer trailers in order to remain in competition I cannot approve of such an unlimited exception. Pursuant to this amendment, certain tractor and semitrailer combinations could be as long as 58½ feet. I would, therefore, recommend that such a combination be permitted provided that the over-all length does not exceed 53 feet. I have been informed that such an exception would not endanger our roads or create a traffic hazard and would in most cases meet the needs of the proponents of this amendment. I also recommend that the bill be amended to clarify the right of the director to charge a fee for a special permit.

Accordingly, I am returning Assembly Bill No. 285 for reconsideration, with the recommendation that it be amended as follows:

On page 2, section 1, line 35, after the words "from the director." insert the following sentence "The application for such permit shall be accompanied by a fee fixed by the director."

On page 3, section 2, line 10, after the words "from the director." insert the following sentence "The application for such permit shall be accompanied by a fee fixed by the director."

On page 4, section 2, line 50B, after the word "length" delete "." and insert " ,".

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On page 4, section 2, lines 50C and 50D, delete "Use and operation of a semitrailer which exceeds 40 feet in length is authorized".

On page 4, section 2, line 50E, delete the "50" and insert "53".

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 344

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, paragraph 14(b) of the Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 344, with my objections, for reconsideration.

Assembly Bill No. 344, in part, provides that all “public records shall be readily accessible for examination by the citizens of this State, with certain exceptions, for the protection of the public interest” and further provides that such records may be copied by hand.

I am in full agreement with this aspect of the bill. Any member of the general public should have the unobstructed opportunity to review the public records that are kept and maintained by our State and local governments unless the disclosure of such documents should impair the ability of the State to operate or expose to needless scrutiny confidential information about our citizens such as that contained in tax returns and similar reports.

There is, however, an aspect of this bill that requires clarification. Assembly Bill No. 344 provides that any person can photocopy, with his own equipment, any or all of the public records of government unless the custodian shall find that there is a risk of damage or mutilation of such records in which case copies must be made and supplied to such person at the rate of \$0.50 per page with a lower rate for quantity purchases. This places on the custodian the unreasonable burden of accommodating as many persons and their equipment as may wish to reproduce public records unless he can sustain a finding that such equipment constitutes a risk to such documents. In addition, it would encourage commercial enterprises to reproduce governmental material and information in wholesale quantities because of the low cost involved. Much of this data undoubtedly would have been obtained at great cost to the governmental agency involved. It is not necessary to the stated public purposes of this bill to so disregard the rights and responsibilities of governmental officials.

I have returned this bill to the Legislature today in the hope that it can be reconsidered before the spring recess. The general purpose of this legislation deserves the full support of everyone.

For this reason, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 344 for reconsideration, with the recommendation that it be amended as follows:

On page 2, section 2, line 16, delete "or, if approved by the custodian, by a".

On page 2, section 2, lines 17 through 30, delete these lines in their entirety and insert in lieu thereof:
"and shall also have the right to purchase copies of such records. Copies of records shall be made available upon the payment of such price as shall be established by law. If a price has not been established by law for copies of any records, the custodian of such records shall make and supply copies of such records upon the payment of the following fees which shall be based upon the total number of pages or parts thereof to be purchased without regard to the number of records being copied:

First page to tenth page \$0.50 per page,
Eleventh page to twentieth page 0.25 per page,
All pages over 20 0.10 per page,

“If the custodian of any such records shall find that there is no risk of damage or mutilation of such records and that it would not be incompatible with the economic and efficient operation of the office and the transaction of public business therein, he may permit any citizen who is seeking to copy more than 100 pages of records to use his own photographic process, approved by the custodian, upon the payment of a reasonable fee, considering the equipment and the time involved, to be fixed by the custodian of not less than \$5.00 or more than \$25.00 per day.”

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, paragraph 14(b) of the Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 60, with my objections, for reconsideration.

This bill would amend the law to increase the salary of jury commissioners in fifth class counties having a population "between 100,000 and 150,000 and in excess of 200,000."

The present salaries of jury commissioners were fixed in 1944. Such salaries are not adequate today in light of the responsibilities placed upon the jury commissioners. Rather than increase the salaries of only a few of these commissioners, therefore, I would recommend that all the salaries be adjusted to reflect today's economic conditions.

The present formula for determining salaries is based on the classification of counties. This method has caused obvious inequities. For example, in Monmouth County, having a population of 334,401, the commissioners are paid only \$500.00 per annum, while in Mercer County, having a population of 266,392, the commissioners receive \$750.00 per annum. Therefore, I would further recommend that the salary categories be changed to reflect the population of the county as indicated in the latest census. The suggested categories and salaries contained herein have been approved by the Supreme Court and seem realistic in view of present conditions.

For this reason, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 60 for reconsideration and recommend that it be amended as follows:

On page 1, section 1, line 4, after the word "receive" insert "annual".

On page 1, section 1, lines 5 to 10, starting with the words "\$900.00 per annum", delete the remainder of the sentence and insert in lieu thereof:

"In counties having 800,000 or more inhabitants, \$2,000.00;

"In counties having 600,000 or more and less than 800,000 inhabitants, \$1,750.00;

"In counties having 400,000 or more and less than 600,000 inhabitants, \$1,500.00;

"In counties having 200,000 or more and less than 400,000 inhabitants, \$1,250.00;

"In counties having 100,000 or more and less than 200,000 inhabitants, \$1,000.00; and

"In counties having less than 100,000 inhabitants, \$750.00."

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 291

To the General Assembly:

I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 291, without my approval, for the following reasons:

Assembly Bill No. 291 is a special bill to authorize the Borough of Belmar to lease to private interests for a period not in excess of 99 years approximately 9 acres of beach and ocean frontage upon which there could be constructed a "motel, hotel, apartment hotel, apartment building, or a restaurant building". A map of this property

reveals that the entire parcel of beach from the Belmar Fishing Club to the Shark River Inlet jetty would be made available for exclusive private use. The proposed structure could extend from Ocean Avenue to the Riparian Commissioner's exterior line, a point several hundreds of feet beyond the high water line.

The officials of this municipality have sought approval for such a long term lease because the beach area in question is unsuitable for bathing. They have concluded the economic interests of their community can best be served by converting this area of unobstructed beach property to a commercial use. I certainly respect the sincere desire of these officials to see their community grow and thrive. I cannot, however, agree with their conclusion that the interests of the municipality specifically and the State in general would best be served by the destruction of such a beachfront area.

The Borough of Belmar is one of this State's many outstanding ocean front communities. At the present time, with the exception of several fishing piers, the entire beachfront of this area is available to the general public. No significant obstruction has been erected between the boardwalk, which traverses the length of the community, and that great natural asset of this State, the Atlantic Ocean. Indeed, this unobstructed view of the ocean is probably the finest asset of the community.

The value to the community and to the State of an ocean front readily available to everyone and unencumbered by intervening structures cannot be estimated, but it is high. The necessity to preserve natural areas and scenic vistas has been recognized in this State through the creation of the Natural Areas Council and the adoption of Green Acres programs.

The State in recent years has adhered to a policy of opposing any legislation which would permit the conversion of our public beaches to private use. See Veto of Senate Bill No. 207 (1957). Shore front municipalities which have sought the right to lease public lands for long term periods have been required to preserve the beachfront areas for the use of the general public. C. 115, P. L. 1960; C. 12, P. L. 1963. I believe this to be a wise policy.

If the local officials can devise plans which would permit the use of a portion of the property in question while still

preserving the public's right of access to the Ocean, I would give such plans full consideration. The authorization set forth in Assembly Bill No. 291, however, is much too broad.

To the General Assembly:

I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 289, without my approval, for the following reasons:

This bill would amend the 1941 statute commonly referred to as the Rabies Control Act, which provides for the canvassing, registration and control of dogs, to delete any specific reference to the "chief of police of each municipality, or the chairman of the police committee thereof" as the person to whom the responsibility for conducting the annual canvass of dogs and other dog control procedures shall be assigned. It would provide that such responsibilities shall be assigned to "any person appointed for the purpose by the governing body of the municipality."

Initially, it should be noted that the present law does authorize the governing body of a municipality to appoint, in preference to the named police officials, any other person such a body may prefer. To this extent, the bill serves no useful purpose whatsoever. By deleting all reference to police officials, however, the bill apparently seeks to encourage the vesting of responsibilities with persons other than our law enforcement officials. I cannot conclude this would be a desirable result.

The State Department of Health has informed me that the law enforcement agencies in this State are now best

equipped, empowered and trained to handle the canvassing, registration and control requirements of the Rabies Control Act. The present system has worked so satisfactorily that there have been no reported rabies cases in humans in this State for more than 10 years. This record certainly justifies continuation of the responsibility for rabies control in the hands of law enforcement officials. This is especially true since any municipality which has available to it trained personnel better equipped to carry out this program than law enforcement officials now can assign such persons the responsibility for administering its local program.

ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 311

To the General Assembly:

I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 311, without my approval, for the following reasons:

Assembly Bill No. 311 would authorize the appointment of a special administrator to receive process in litigation against the estate of a resident motorist who became non-resident after his involvement in an accident on the highways of this State and thereafter died.

Together with a companion bill, Assembly Bill No. 307, this legislation was inspired by the case of *In re Estate of Gardinier*, 74 N. J. Super. 217 (App. Div. 1962), where the Court discerned an implicit legislative policy of excluding the estates of such deceased motorists from liability to substituted service. The policy was inferred from a comparison between two closely related sections of the Motor Vehicle Act. It was pointed out that R. S. 39:7-2 authorizes substituted service upon the personal representative of a deceased nonresident motorist by serving the Director of the Division of Motor Vehicles, while N. J. S. A. 39:7-2.1 contains no comparable provision for substituted service

upon the representative of a resident motorist who died nonresident after the accident. The silence of the latter section in this respect led the Court to conclude that the Legislature intended to restrict the scope of *in personam* jurisdiction to situations concerning deceased motorists who were nonresident at the time of the accident.

On June 3, 1963, after the passage of Assembly Bills Nos. 307 and 311, the Supreme Court reversed the judgment of the Appellate Division, holding that the legislative silence did not bespeak the positive policy determination found by that Court. 40 N. J. 216. The action of the Court, however, did not completely obviate the need for legislation to cure the unwarranted discrepancy between these two classes of deceased motorists. The ultimate result of *Gardinier* was only to permit administration under N. J. S. 3A:6-10, which requires the existence within the State of "property" of the decedent. Thus as the law now stands, the estate of a deceased nonresident motorist can be reached in all events by substituted service under R. S. 39:7-2, while the estate of a resident motorist who died nonresident remains beyond reach unless there are assets here. I thoroughly agree that there should be no distinction in this area based upon "the irrelevant fact that one deceased was a resident at the time of the mishap while the other was not." *In re Estate of Gardinier, supra* (40 N. J. at 267).

For this reason, I have today signed Assembly Bill No. 307, which rectifies this situation by authorizing substituted service through the Director of the Division of Motor Vehicles in the case of a resident motorist who died nonresident, in the same manner now provided for substituted service upon the personal representative of a deceased nonresident motorist. Having done so, I see no necessity for the enactment of Assembly Bill No. 311, which is intended to provide the same remedy through the more cumbersome device of securing court appointment of a special administrator. It has not been suggested that special administration is required where the deceased motorist did not reside in the State at the time of the accident. To authorize such administration in a case where the decedent was a resident when the accident happened would only perpetuate the meaningless distinction which Assembly Bill No. 311, according to its statement, is intended to eliminate.

Accordingly, I am returning Assembly Bill No. 311 without my approval.

I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 214, without my approval, for the following reasons:

This bill would increase to "not less than \$300.00 nor more than \$1,000.00" the present compensation range for members of municipal councils in municipalities having less than 5,000 inhabitants which are located in counties of the first class. According to the statement it carries, this is the only change contemplated and made by the bill.

I have no fundamental disagreement with this purpose. The compensation range which would here be raised was established sometime ago and revision seems appropriate to reflect current standards and circumstances. In point of fact, I approved last year another amendment of this same section which increased the salary range for certain other municipal councilmen.

It appears, however, that the draftsmen made an error in preparing this legislation. As now written, the bill might well be interpreted as eliminating the present statutory ranges for all municipalities having populations in excess of 5,000 inhabitants which are located in counties of the first class.

Since there is no way to determine whether this elimination was approved by the Legislature with some particular design in mind, I feel obliged to return this bill without my approval for further consideration.

In the preparation of any future legislation in this area, I would also suggest that a complete review of all salary ranges specified in the section be undertaken. Such further revision as is needed might then be made at one time in a consistent, instead of piecemeal, manner.

To the General Assembly:

I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 211, without my approval, for the following reasons:

This bill permits veteran members of the Public Employees' Retirement System to purchase prior service credit for such time as the member was engaged in "creditable public service or military service."

Under the present law, veteran members receive free credit for time spent in military service provided the member was in public service in this State prior to such service. Veteran members also receive free credit for all public employment within this State prior to joining the pension system. This bill raises the question whether the veteran members are now to be permitted to buy credit for such public service as to which they have already received free credit.

Also ambiguous is what is meant by the term "creditable public service." No attempt at definition of this term is made in the bill. Is it to be limited to public service within this State, or does it also include service for any public body—whether other state, federal or perhaps even foreign? If the term is used in its broadest sense, it will extend a

privilege to former public servants from outside this State which, in the vast majority of cases, is not extended to our employees who may seek further public employment outside of New Jersey.

In addition, the bill places no limit on the amount of service credit which can be purchased. Thus, it would permit a veteran member, having a minimum amount of service in this State, to retire on a State-supported pension based almost entirely on public service credits earned elsewhere. In point of fact, there is nothing in the bill to prohibit such an individual, already receiving a pension from another public body, from buying service credit in the Public Employees' Retirement System for the time on which that pension is based, with contributions by his current employer, so that he might thereafter receive two pensions.

The bill also involves significant cost factors. It provides that the purchase price for such prior service credit shall be based on the employee's current salary, leaving to the present or future employer the further financial burden that will undoubtedly result from the fact that the amount of pension to be paid will be based on salary at the time of retirement. In addition, it places liability for the employer's share of the cost of such prior service credit on the present employer. The extent of this potential liability cannot be effectively estimated, however it is clear the bill would be costly. The imposition of this financial burden is in conflict with the traditional purpose of employer contributions to the pension system, for these are intended as a form of additional compensation to public servants in recognition of long and faithful service to this State.

If the Legislature now intends to embark upon a new course involving recognition of and reward for public service rendered elsewhere, it should do so only after full and careful consideration of the questions here raised.

To the General Assembly:

I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 464, without my approval, for the following reasons:

This bill would broaden the definition of "veteran" which is contained in the Teachers' Pension and Annuity Fund—Social Security Integration Act (P. L. 1955, c. 37) by extending the terminal date for World War II service to December 31, 1946. At present, veteran status and the special treatment accruing therefrom is limited in both the Teachers' Fund and the Public Employees' Retirement System to persons with at least 90 days active service in the Armed Forces of the United States, between September 16, 1940 and September 2, 1945, or of her allies, between September 1, 1939 and September 2, 1945.

It has been estimated that some 300 members of the Teachers' Fund would derive veteran status from enactment of this legislation. As such, they would be entitled to the immediate return of all contributions made to the pension fund prior to January 1, 1955 and would, in addition, benefit from the advantageous computation of retirement allowances for veterans. The bill provides for funding, by the State and the employing school boards, of the liability created by this veterans credit over the remaining period of the 30-year amortization of the liability established in 1957. Previous bills for this purpose have carried statements indicating an estimated cost to the taxpayers, at one level of government or another, of \$140,000.00 a year, or \$4.2 million in total, in the form of public contributions to the teachers' pension system.

Similar legislation was disapproved by my predecessor on two different occasions. I find the reasons advanced by Governor Meyner in his veto messages relative to Assembly Bill No. 231 of 1957 and Assembly Bill No. 169 of 1961 equally compelling today.

Additionally, it must be noted that the Legislature only recently (Laws 1963, Ch. 120) restricted the definition of veteran by imposing a cut-off date of July 27, 1953 with respect to qualifying service during the Korean emergency. In view of this, extension of the terminal date for World War II service does not appear appropriate or consistent. For nearly 20 years, the Teachers' Fund and the Public Employees' Retirement System, as well as Civil Service preferences (R. S. 11:27-1) and local tax exemption provisions (P. L. 1951, c. 184), have been operated effectively by reference to a cut-off date of September 2, 1945. There appears to be no compelling reason why there must or should be an extension of this period at this late date.

For these reasons, I am returning Assembly Bill No. 464 without my approval.

To the General Assembly:

I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 375, without my approval, for the following reasons:

This bill would authorize judges of the Juvenile and Domestic Relations Court, at their discretion, to hold to bail juveniles charged with juvenile delinquency offenses.

The Legislature, at the time it established the Juvenile and Domestic Relations Court, felt it was important to clearly set out its intent as follows:

“It is hereby declared to be a principle governing the law of this state that children under the jurisdiction

of said court are wards of the state, subject to the discipline and entitled to the protection of the state, which may intervene to safeguard them from neglect or injury and to enforce the legal obligations due to them and from them." N. J. S. 2A :4-2.

Since its conception, this Court has striven to correct and rehabilitate youthful offenders rather than to exact retribution. In the case of *In Re E1*. 26 N. J. Misc. 285, 288 (Cty. Ct. of Qu. Sess. 1948), the Court ably summarized this Court's duty as "the protection of pliant youth against demoralizing reproach as a consequence of infraction. Its major care is for the quality of the judicial and corrective environment in which youth is to be placed when its delinquency necessitates the public processes of inquiry and discipline."

Therefore, the procedure established for this Court is one in which the juvenile delinquent is not treated as a criminal but rather as a "ward of the state."

The effect of this bill would be to introduce for the first time the concept of "bail" in cases dealing with youthful offenders. There is little doubt that bail is so associated with crime and criminal procedure, and so foreign to the *parens patriae* philosophy of the juvenile and domestic relations court law, as to defeat at least in part the objectives sought in establishment of a separate court to handle juvenile offenders.

The decision whether to hold a child in detention or to release him should not depend on the availability of a bail bond. It should depend on the consideration of such factors as whether proper care, control or supervision would be afforded the child if released to his parents pending hearing, whether there is a strong likelihood of the child running away or committing an offense dangerous to himself or the community pending hearing, and whether psychiatric or other studies are required pending hearing for the best interests of the child.

Moreover, I have seen no evidence to substantiate a need for this type of legislation. Under the present law, the judge of the Juvenile and Domestic Relations Court is authorized at his discretion to release a juvenile to the "custody of a parent, guardian or custodian, or of a probation officer or other person appointed by the court," N. J. S.

2A:4-32. Furthermore, the officer who takes a youthful offender under the age of sixteen into custody shall, unless impractical or otherwise ordered by the Juvenile and Domestic Relations Court, release the child upon the promise of the parent, guardian or custodian to be responsible for the appearance of the child in Court at the time fixed, *Id.*

It is my opinion that not only is the present procedure adequate but in fact preferable to that which would be established by this bill. Presently, the judge, in determining whether the youthful offender is to be released, can take into consideration the needs of the juvenile as well as the competency of the person who will receive custody. The use of the bail procedure, on the other hand, would result in the question of release being partly dependent upon the financial ability to post bail.

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 165

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, paragraph 14 (b) of the Constitution I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 165, with my objections, for **reconsideration**:

This bill would require a municipality to refund to the holder of a tax sale certificate any amount he paid which is "in excess of the amount paid for the redemption of the property", provided such redemption takes place within five years from the date of the sale of the tax certificate.

The absence of adequate statutory guide lines governing, at the time of redemption, the rights of a tax sale certificate

holder who has paid more than the amount required to redeem was pointed out by the Supreme Court in the case of *Dvorkin v. Dover Township*, 29 N. J. 303 (1959). The present statutory provision relates only to the right of the holder of the tax certificate who has paid less for his assignment than the amount required to redeem, where redemption occurs during an action to bar the right of redemption. In such case the holder is entitled to receive, out of the money paid for the redemption, only the amount he actually paid to the municipality with interest thereon. He is prevented from reaping a profit. N. J. S. A. 54:5-114.8. The law is silent, however, as to what should be done where the amount paid by the redeemer during the suit is less than the amount paid for the tax certificate and as to the holder's right where redemption occurs before the institution of an action to bar the right of redemption.

In the *Dvorkin* case the Supreme Court, at page 314, interpreted the law as requiring that "the bidder be made whole in event of redemption. A contrary conclusion results in a forfeiture . . ." The passage of this bill clearly indicates the Legislature's concurrence with the Supreme Court's interpretation and with the desirability of setting to rest any doubts that may still exist.

While the amendment now proposed in this bill, if read together with N. J. S. A. 54:5-114.8, might be said to embody the sense of the *Dvorkin* decision, the effect of the supplementary language contained in section 2 is to negate that decision insofar as all outstanding tax sale certificates are concerned. Furthermore, the approach suggested in the bill would not only leave in doubt, but might well considerably complicate, the situation of any holder of a tax certificate where redemption occurs before an action is instituted to bar the right of redemption. The bill would simply require the municipality to pay over to such holder any amount he paid "in excess of the amount paid for the redemption of the property". It does not, nor does any other statute, specify that under such circumstances a holder is entitled to receive the full amount paid for the tax certificate.

I suggest, therefore, that the bill be amended to clearly spell out the requirement that, in any of such situations, the municipality shall return to the holder the full amount paid for the tax certificate. Similarly, it should be made

clear that the amendment here contemplated is not intended to affect the case now covered by N. J. S. A. 54:5-114.9 where, after the sale of the tax certificate, the holder buys out the interest of the person having legal title to the property. As the Supreme Court stated in the *Dworkin* case, this provision is "necessary in order to prevent the municipality from being defrauded . . ." id at 318.

Accordingly, I am returning Assembly Bill No. 165 for reconsideration, with the recommendation that the bill be amended as follows:

On page 1, Title, line 1, after the words "An Act to amend" delete "and supplement".

On page 1, section 1, line 7, insert before the word "Upon" the following: "Except as provided for by section 1 of chapter 45, P. L. 1950,".

On page 1, section 1, line 7, delete "Upon" and insert in lieu thereof, "upon".

On page 1, section 1, line 7, before the word "amount" insert the word "full".

On page 1, section 1, line 7, after the word "amount" delete ",".

On page 1, section 1, line 8, delete "if any,".

On page 1, section 1, lines 10 and 11, delete "in excess of the amount paid for the redemption of the property,".

On page 1, section 2, lines 1 to 4, delete this section in its entirety.

On page 1, section 3, line 1, delete this line in its entirety and insert in lieu thereof "2. This act shall take effect immediately."

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 162

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, section 14(b) of the Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 162, with my objections, for reconsideration.

Assembly Bill No. 162 would provide that where a motor vehicle is registered in the names of two married persons as husband and wife, title shall be presumed to vest in both with right of survivorship, for purposes of effectuating the transfer of record ownership to the survivor without the necessity of presenting evidence of administration of the predecessor's estate.

While I have no objection to facilitating the procedure for obtaining a revised certificate of ownership or registration certificate for a motor vehicle by a surviving spouse in cases of joint ownership, this bill, as drafted, presents certain technical problems. The references to the certificates in question do not conform with the terminology used throughout the Motor Vehicle Act and should be corrected. In addition, the title of this act should be more specific in its reference to the section of Title 39 which it is intended to supplement.

I am accordingly returning Assembly Bill No. 162 for reconsideration, with the recommendation that it be amended as follows:

On page 1, Title, line 1, delete "AN ACT concerning motor vehicles." and insert in lieu thereof "An act concerning title to certain motor vehicles, and supplementing chapter 3 of Title 39 of the Revised Statutes."

On page 1, section 1, line 1, delete "title to" and insert in lieu thereof "that".

On page 1, section 1, line 3, delete "such registration" and insert in lieu thereof "the registration certificate".

On page 1, section 1, line 4, delete "title", and insert in lieu thereof "certificate of ownership".

On page 1, section 1, line 5, after "registration", insert "certificate".

Creates a 9-member bipartisan Commission to Study Capital Punishment, 3 each appointed by the president of the Senate and Speaker of the Assembly, 3 citizens appointed by the Governor, to evaluate the conditions under which it has been applied in the State, and to its purported deleterious moral and social effect; requires report to the present or next Legislature and to the Governor—A. J. R. 27—814.

Creates a 9-member bipartisan Commission to Study Capital Punishment, 3 each appointed by the president of the Senate and Speaker of the Assembly, 3 citizens appointed by the Governor, to evaluate the conditions under which it has been applied in the State, and to its purported deleterious moral and social effect; requires report to the present or next Legislature and to the Governor—S. J. R. 3—805, 806, 915.

Caps—

Prohibits the sale of cap guns and caps—A. B. 24—68.

Cerebral palsy—

Designates the month of January, 1964, as "United Cerebral Palsy Month"—A. J. R. 28—1053, 1084, 1085.

Check cashing—

Requires every common carrier, which pays its employees by check or draft to furnish cashing facilities, without cost or fee to employee; prescribes penalty of \$100 for each offense—A. B. 265—154, 706, 711.

Requires every person directly connected with a licensee in the check cashing business to submit to being fingerprinted; increases the fees for application and a check cashing license; permits the licensee to charge $\frac{3}{4}\%$ instead of $\frac{1}{2}\%$, or \$0.25, whichever is larger, of the check, but in no event shall more than \$3.00 be charged for cashing any check, draft or money order; increases fee for investigation of applicant from \$50 to \$100, initial license fee from \$100 to \$200, annual license fee from \$25 to \$50—A. B. 278—157.

Child welfare—

Increases from 50% to 75% of the full amount of any funds received by the State from the Federal Government as Federal participation with respect to expenditures made by a county welfare board for assistance for dependent children, after deducting the amount of such Federal participation; effective January 1, 1964—A. B. 232—148, 301, 501.

Authorizes the Governor to enter into interstate compacts on the placement of children with all other States—A. B. 312—111, 140, 144, 172.

Provides that the State shall pay to each county welfare board the full amount received from the Federal Government for assistance to dependent children plus an additional amount equal to 75% of the balance of expenditure after deducting the amount of Federal participation—A. B. 521—438, 501, 833.

Cigarette tax—

Requires all persons who store unstamped cigarettes in the State, to file a report—A. B. 390—198, 270, 271, 346, 807.

Increases from 7¢ to 8¢ the tax on a package of cigarettes; changes the distributors discount on revenue stamps from 3% to $2\frac{7}{10}\%$; effective May 31, 1963—A. B. 764—946, 947, 996.

City of Asbury Park—

Authorizes the City of Asbury Park to lease certain municipal lands; inoperative until it shall be adopted by ordinance of the Mayor and Council of the City of Asbury Park—S. B. 109—294, 295, 357, 430, 433, 523.

Civil Rights Division—

Transfers the Division on Civil Rights from the Department of Education to the Department of Law and Public Safety—A. B. 365—167, 241, 301, 359, 360, 363, 419.

Civil service—

Provides that civil service appointments shall be made from the eligible list or extension thereof, such appointments to take effect before the expiration of the eligible list—A. B. 66—76, 261, 262.

Requires Civil Service Commission create a 3-member grievance committee in each department of State Government or in each smaller unit thereof as the commission may deem appropriate; authorizes creation of similar grievance committees in all political subdivisions or agencies of the State; defines powers of such grievance committees and vests supervisory authority in the Civil Service Commission and in the Board of Mediation; appropriates \$30,000—A. B. 131—92, 242.

Permits Civil Service Commission to refuse to examine an applicant, or after examination, to refuse to certify as eligible, an applicant for a police or fire department job who has been dishonorably discharged from the armed forces—A. B. 444—270.

Provides that the Civil Service Commission shall make no determination of merit and fitness for appointment or promotion in the classified service where it is found impracticable to determine merit and fitness, except after public hearing upon 15 days' prior notice thereof—A. B. 469—368.

Requires the chief examiner and secretary of the civil service to be in the competitive division of the State service—A. B. 752—916, 917, 964, 965, 1070, 1122.

Coin-operated machines—

Requires an attendant be present when a coin-operated laundry or dry cleaning establishment is open; not applicable to installations within an apartment house for the sole use of the owners and tenants of the building—A. B. 34—70, 256, 257.

Condemnation—

Provides that corporations transporting gas, petroleum or liquid petroleum products may take or acquire land by condemnation—A. B. 157—97.

Provides that the value of land or other property acquired in connection with development or development of a blighted area shall be determined as of the date of the declaration of blight by the governing body—A. B. 240—150, 597, 599.

Permits a public agency to enter upon or take property for public use, in advance of a final determination of the amount of compensation—A. B. 245—150, 597, 599.

Contests—

Permits certain "box top contests" and door prize distribution—A. B. 741—812, 866, 868, 933.

Contracts—

Prescribes contents of contracts for instruction in physical or social skills, or for the use by an individual patron of a dance hall studio, ballroom, gymnasium, or other physical or social training facility; applicable to all contracts to be executed or renewed after January 1, 1964—A. B. 729—810.

Corporations—

Validates corporations provisions in the certificate of incorporation otherwise prohibited by law as improperly restrictive of the discretion or powers of the directions provided all the incorporate or holders of record of all outstanding shares have authorized such a provision—A. B. 44—72.

Establishes the procedure that a registered agent of any corporation shall follow when he desires to resign as the registered agent—A. B. 174—118, 228, 231, 274, 282, 550.

Permits the renewal or continuation of a limited partnership association for a period not to exceed 20 years from the expiration of its former term—A. B. 196—122, 228, 231, 276, 911.

Provides that the stockholders of every stock corporation shall jointly and separately be personally liable for all debts, wages or salaries due and owing to any of its laborers, servants or employees other than contractors, for services performed by them for such operation—A. B. 241—150.

Provides that where all the shares of a corporation are owned beneficially and of record by either 1 or 2 stockholders, the number of directors may be less than 3 but not less than the number of stockholders—A. B. 393—237, 256, 258, 273, 421.

Exempts from corporation business tax any non-stock corporations organized under the laws of this State or any other State to provide mutual ownership housing under Federal law by tenants—A. B. 626—496, 707, 711, 800, 838, 942.

Requires every domestic and foreign corporation doing business in the State to file a report within 60 days after the date of incorporation or registering to do business; provides that foreign corporations shall have the same rights and privileges as a domestic corporation; increases the annual corporation reporting fees—A. B. 697—666, 787, 791, 807, 832, 997.

Provides that no corporation shall be subject to a \$200 fine if it has not filed the annual corporate report provided a report is filed within 30 days after requested by the Secretary of State—A. B. 757—1005.

Permits a corporation with the consent of all the stockholders who are entitled to vote, to dispense with its annual meeting—A. B. 765—1006.

Provides that no corporation shall be subject to a \$200 penalty for not filing the corporate annual report, provided the report is filed within 30 days after receipt of written demand from the Secretary of State, and shall pay a fee of \$10 for filing of same with an additional fee calculated on the basis of \$1 for each default in filing such report prior to June 1, 1963, and \$10 for each year thereafter—A. B. 772—1101.

Counties—

Permits the freeholders to appoint a clerk to the jury commissioners, and fix his compensation; provides that all clerks in office on the effective date of the act shall be placed in the classified service of the Civil Service—A. B. 4—64.

Provides that every constable shall hold office for a term of 3 years—A. B. 138—94.

Increases from \$10 to \$12 a day the maximum compensation to be paid constables while attending the Superior and County Courts in certain counties—A. B. 151—96, 173, 227, 228, 281, 808.

Counties (continued)—

Permits the freeholders of any county without a park commission, to acquire by condemnation, any land for public recreation, exempts lands owned by a public utility—A. B. 171—117, 260, 261, 312, 594, 714, 715, 742.

Permits the freeholders of any county to acquire, by condemnation, lands for public recreation, exempts lands owned by a public utility—A. B. 172—118, 260, 261, 313, 594, 595, 714, 715, 743.

Grants all rights, privileges and duties of State parole officers to county probation officers while supervising prisoners released from county institutions—A. B. 175—118, 291, 292, 314, 595.

Requires the Superior Court to reimburse the counties for services performed by the Chief Probation Officer for the court—A. B. 270—155.

Authorizes a County Bridge Commission to turn over to the county money obtained as proceeds of a judgment received in favor of the commission—A. B. 281—139, 187, 436.

Provides that all necessary expenses incurred by the Commissioner of Registration, the Superintendent of Elections, and the Custodian of Voting Machines in first class counties shall not exceed, in the aggregate \$655,000 per annum—A. B. 294—160, 241, 358, 362, 417, 876.

Permits any second class county to have a Juvenile and Domestic Relations Court Judge—A. B. 324—111, 112, 130.

Provides that the county clerk or registrar shall refuse to record any deed unless the address of the grantee is marked upon the face of the instrument offered for record—A. B. 358—193, 483, 487, 675.

Provides that all employees except the secretary and chief engineer, of a county park commission in first class counties having a population of less than 700,000, employed as of July 16, 1959, shall come under control of the Civil Service Commission—A. B. 363—194, 429, 430, 515, 911.

Increases the total amount which may be received as reimbursement grants from Federal and State funds in each county for community health projects from 20 to 30 cents multiplied by that county's population—A. B. 364—171.

Authorizes any county board of freeholders to aid financially and cooperate with the county planning board acting as a redevelopment agency—A. B. 449—364.

Increases from \$5,000 to \$7,000 the maximum amount of annual salary of any county employee in a county having a population of from 300,000 to 325,000 inhabitants in figuring the death benefit of an employee who has worked less than 5 years—A. B. 570—444.

Provides that under the county employees' pension fund in counties having a population of from 300,000 to 325,000 inhabitants, where an employee leaves no dependent 75% of all moneys deducted for the pension shall be paid to such person or persons as shall be designated for the purpose by the employee, if no such designation shall have been made or if the person or persons so designated does not or do not survive, the moneys shall go to the estate of the deceased employee—A. Permits the freeholders of a first class county on the request of the board of park commissioners to issue bonds up to \$500,000 over and above the total amount heretofore authorized by law—A. B. 643—548, 597, 600, 639, 943.

Counties (continued)—

Provides that each political county committee shall elect a vice-chairman of the opposite sex of the chairman instead of a vice-chairlady—A. B. 655—608, 647, 656, 692, 735.

Permits the freeholders of any county to appropriate annually to any non-profit organization funds for the purpose of defraying the necessary expense incident to the diagnosis and treatment of mentally retarded and physically handicapped persons—A. B. 656—606, 866, 869, 892.

Provides that any county employee who has served in the employ of such county continuously, or in the aggregate, for a period of 30 years, and who shall have attained the age of 55 years shall be retired on half pay—A. B. 685—612, 649, 659.

Permits a county, with less than 200,000 population, to establish a free county library for all the municipalities within the county—A. B. 691—665, 706, 710, 767, 918.

Permits the freeholders of a second-class county on the request of the board of park commissioners to issue bonds up to \$500,000 over and above the total amount heretofore authorized by law—A. B. 781—1102.

Amends the law governing county bridge commissions to authorize the acquisition, improvement and replacement of bridges, and the financing of same—S. B. 117—294, 295, 357, 602, 603, 642.

Requires county hospitals in first-class counties having a population between 700,000 and 900,000 to admit patients upon application of a treating physician, who cannot obtain admission within a reasonable time to a voluntary hospital in the county—S. B. 209—804, 805, 867, 870.

Provides that each county having a population in excess of 800,000 shall appoint 4 full-time juvenile and domestic relations court judges, having a population between 600,000 and 800,000 2 judges, having a population not less than 305,000 nor more than 370,000 1 judge, salary to be the same amount as paid to the County Court judge—S. B. 218—972, 973.

Permits second-class counties having a population between 375,000 and 425,000 to assume the operation of any city vocational school—S. B. 237—802, 803, 857.

County prosecutors—

Requires the county prosecutor and each assistant prosecutor to devote his entire time to his official duties and shall not engage in the private practice of law; provides that the prosecutor's annual salary shall be equal to that paid to a judge of the County Court of the county; prevents any prosecutor or assistant to be a candidate for election or engage in any partisan political activity; effective January 1, 1964—A. B. 108—87.

Courts—

Increases the compensation for jurors of the Superior and County Courts, grand and struck jurors, from \$5 to \$10 for each day's attendance, and eliminates provision authorizing the county freeholders to reduce the compensation, increases mileage allowance for such jurors from \$.02 to \$.05 per mile; effective January 1, 1964—A. B. 13—65, 174, 175, 502.

Permits the judge of any County Court other than first class counties to appoint Spanish language interpreters, permits the sheriff in first class counties having a population over 800,000 inhabitants to appoint the interpreters—A. B. 22—67, 107, 174, 241, 272, 273, 306, 382.

Courts (continued)—

Provides that a patient may be admitted to the New Jersey Neuropsychiatric Institute by order of a court in which the person has been convicted of crime and awaits sentence or before which he is charged with a criminal offense—A. B. 40—71, 175, 484, 487, 508, 945.

Requires a blood test of any reputed father and testimony of the mother unsupported by other evidence to be corroborated in some material, particular by other evidence, in any bastardy proceedings—A. B. 64—75.

Provides for the establishment of public defenders by the county freeholders or for compensation of counsel assigned by the County and Superior Courts to represent indigent defendants in criminal cases; provides that the Governor will appoint the public defenders—A. B. 86—79, 179, 503.

Provides that the county district court shall have jurisdiction of any case involving up to \$3,000—A. B. 92—84, 107, 176, 177, 227, 229, 310, 878.

Permits a court hearing a mental competency proceeding to order a trial by jury; extends the jurisdiction of County Courts and the Superior Court to make determinations; permits a guardian to be appointed for the person or his property, or both; effective January 1, 1964—A. B. 113—88, 178, 256, 258, 477, 503, 512, 706, 712, 735, 741.

Permits a judge to allow compensation to attorneys whom they have appointed to represent defendants in murder cases, whether or not an indictment is later found, or whether or not a murder charge is later reduced to a charge of manslaughter, or whether or not the charge is tried in the juvenile and domestic court—A. B. 137—93, 175, 483, 486.

Provides for the payment of reasonable and necessary expenses for indigent defendants in criminal cases who are assigned counsel by the court, upon application to and approval by a judge of the County Court or Superior Court, Law Division—A. B. 141—94, 175.

Requires every action at law by the parent or guardian of a person under the age of 21 years for damage derived by reason of an injury to such person caused by the wrongful act, neglect or default of any person to be commenced by the parent within the same period of time as is provided by law in the case of the person so injured—A. B. 144—94, 175.

Permits the judge of a first-class county juvenile and domestic relations court and county district court to designate from among the court attendants a person to act as his sergeant-at-arms—A. B. 208—124, 483, 485, 564.

Increases from \$.20 to \$.30 the amount to be paid for a copy of each folio of the original transcript of the stenographic record in any court—A. B. 242—150, 734.

Increases the compensation for jurors of the Superior and County Courts, and grand and struck jurors, from \$5 to \$10 for each day's attendance, and eliminates provision authorizing the county freeholders to reduce such amount; increases the mileage allowance for such jurors from \$.02 to \$.10 per mile; effective January 1, 1964—A. B. 248—151.

Provides that if a second offense of drunken driving occurs 10 or more years after the previous conviction the court may, in its discretion, suspend the sentence of imprisonment, impose a fine of not less than \$200, nor more than \$500, and place the person on probation—A. B. 254—152, 482, 485, 501, 529, 565.

Permits the judge of any County Court to appoint Spanish language interpreters—A. B. 283—157, 300.

Courts (continued)—

Provides that the Superior Court shall consist of 65, instead of 44 judges; provides that upon Supreme Court designation county clerks and surrogates shall act as deputy clerks of the Superior Court—A. B. 297—110, 173.

Permits County Courts, surrogates courts and county district courts to microfilm and destroy court records—A. B. 399—237, 291, 292, 347, 551.

Permits every County Court judge, with freeholder approval, to appoint a secretary, who shall be a stenographer, at a salary not exceeding the civil service range for secretaries to judges of the Chancery Division of the Superior Court; prescribes salaries of secretaries to Superior Court Law Division judges in the range of those fixed for Chancery Division judges, or if the judge be the assignment judge, in the range of Appellate Division secretaries—A. B. 401—237, 358, 362.

Increases the Superior Court fees—A. B. 403—238, 430, 432, 466.

Requires all appeals taken from judgments of county district courts and Juvenile and Domestic Relations Courts in support or bastardy proceedings to go to the County Courts—A. B. 404—238, 270, 271, 350.

Permits the County Court, to which a guardian of minor is accountable, to authorize the sale of any lands or any part thereof or interest therein and to pledge lands of a minor or mental incompetent when necessary for his proper support or education—A. B. 406—238, 270, 271, 351.

Permits county district court judges, with freeholder approval, to appoint stenographic reporters to keep court records, at annual salaries between \$6,000 and \$7,500, or at a per diem rate of \$30, or to use sound recording devices and operators; increases filing fees by \$2 in cases other than tenancy and small claims matters—A. B. 407—239, 358, 362.

Requires every municipal court magistrate or acting magistrate to be attorney at law admitted to practice for at least 3 years, applicable only to appointments made after enactment; inapplicable to a further appointment of a magistrate now in office—A. B. 428—268, 358, 362, 421.

Requires the court clerk to be furnished with the name of the party contacting the agent for a bonding company or the surety for the placing of a bail bond, the premium or fee for the bond and name of the party paying the premium, when bail is furnished by a corporate surety—A. B. 439—239, 358, 362, 424.

Provides that an assigned counsel in any criminal case shall receive compensation by the court, payable by the counties, for his services and expenditures—A. B. 447—364.

Permits the service of an arrest warrant, issued out of a county district court in contempt proceedings, in any county in the State—A. B. 450—364, 446, 483, 486, 516.

Courts (continued)—

Provides that appeals from contempt proceedings in municipal courts shall be taken to the County Courts, instead of the Superior Court, Appellate Division—A. B. 454—365, 483, 486, 517.

Provides that all the time served by a sergeant-at-arms of the Superior Court shall be taken into consideration in fixing his salary range—A. B. 455—365, 483, 486, 683.

Abolishes the juvenile and domestic relations courts, transfers their jurisdiction to the Superior Court, authorizes the Superior Court to be increased by 15 judges—A. B. 461—366.

Increases the maximum age of a petit juror from 70 to 75 years of age—A. B. 504—377.

Provides that any petit juror who doesn't receive their customary wages from their employer while serving on the jury shall be compensated up to \$25 for each day's attendance—A. B. 507—377.

Provides that any Supreme or Superior Court judge who has served 10 years or more as a judge of a juvenile and domestic relations court shall be retired upon attaining the age of 70 years—A. B. 535—439, 532, 534, 835.

Increases the jurisdiction over which the division of small claims in county district courts shall have, from \$100 to \$200—A. B. 538—440, 597, 600, 686.

Provides summary and simplified judicial proceedings under which a representative payee could be appointed solely for the purpose of receiving and administering public assistance payments on behalf of an individual requiring this protection—A. B. 617—664, 867.

Provides that when the father of an illegitimate child has been determined by the order or judgment of a court, such child shall be treated the same as if he were the legitimate child of such father, so that the child and his issue shall inherit and take from such father, and such father from the child and his issue—A. B. 630—496.

Validates certain proceedings in the former court of chancery which of necessity, were more than 14 years ago—A. B. 637—550, 597, 600, 704, 890, 1099.

Regulates the making of agreements of settlement, or the execution, or the granting of releases in personal injury cases—A. B. 679—605, 647, 657, 840.

Provides that any magistrate now in office or who shall be reappointed in any municipality having a population of not less than 5,000 nor more than 15,000 shall not receive a pension when his salary is less than the amount of his pension—A. B. 702—726.

Courts (continued)—

Provides that when a court order has been issued directing a person to make payments for support and the person fails to comply, the court may issue a wage assignment—A. B. 715—728, 789, 792, 820.

Grants tenure to any county district court judge who shall have served 2 full terms and who shall have been appointed to a third time, provides that he shall be retired upon attaining the age of 70 years at $\frac{1}{2}$ of the annual salary—A. B. 750—1004.

Permits a summons to be served in or out of the county upon a third party defendant in any action brought in any county district court—S. B. 95—299, 300, 356.

Authorizes retirement of chief or associate justice of Supreme Court or judge of Superior Court, having served 15 years continuously and in the aggregate as a member of the Supreme Court, Superior Court or Advisory Master to the Superior Court, the last 10 years having been served in the Supreme or Superior Courts, who attains the age of 65, on pension of three-fourths of salary; provides for widow's pension; prohibits practice of law; authorizes assignment to special judicial duties without further compensation; applies to persons now or hereafter holding such office—S. B. 130—804, 805, 1063, 1083.

Provides that every county having a population between 500,000 and 600,000 shall have full-time juvenile and domestic relations court judge, salary to be the same amount as paid to a judge of the County Court—S. B. 196—721, 915, 916.

Permits the judge of any County Court other than first-class counties to appoint Spanish language interpreters, permits the sheriff of first-class counties having a population over 800,000 inhabitants to appoint the interpreters—S. B. 225—721, 722, 795, 796, 856.

Provides that County Court judges shall receive a \$20,000 salary, and permits their assignment to sit in the Superior Court; establishes tenure in office for such judges after 10 years consecutive service, and serving in the third term, and prescribes retirement at age 70 at $\frac{1}{2}$ of annual salary—S. B. 248—701, 702, 703, 756, 862, 863.

Provides that there shall be 2 County Court judges in each county in the State; effective January 1, 1964—S. B. 277—993, 994.

Crimes—

Defines various acts and elements of crimes by persons over 21 years of age upon female and upon woman obviously pregnant, unlawfully and against their will, involving carnal knowledge by savage, brutal and ferocious force or violence as a high misdemeanor, subject to the death penalty unless a jury recommends life imprisonment—A. B. 65—75, 669.

Establishes the punishment for committing a crime with a gun, device or instrument from which may be fired or ejected any gas or vapor—A. B. 78—78, 140, 142, 278, 875.

Prohibits as a misdemeanor orally or by knowingly sending or delivering any letter or writing which threatens or demands to extort money or any valuable from any person—A. B. 85—79, 140, 142, 179, 250, 291, 310, 877.

Includes the sex crimes of "incest" and "private lewdness" within the category of those offenses which require examination, after conviction, of the individual at the Diagnostic Center—A. B. 222—146, 227, 229, 274, 286.

Crimes (continued)—

Requires all local and county police authorities to make a quarterly report to the Attorney General with respect to number, nature and disposition of crimes in their jurisdiction, and such other information regarding crime as the Attorney General may specify; requires the Attorney General to collate such information and report thereon annually to the Governor and the Legislature—A. B. 432—239, 358, 361, 422.

Defines sodomy as a crime against nature, committed with man or beast, by the anus or by or with the mouth—A. B. 496—374, 648, 657, 752.

Creates an 11-member Administration of the Criminal Law Study Commission, 2 members each of the Senate and Assembly, 2 citizens appointed by the Governor, 1 judge each from the Superior Court and County Court appointed by the Chief Justice, the Attorney General or deputy Attorney General, a county prosecutor appointed by Attorney General, the Commissioner of the State Department of Institutions and Agencies, to review and evaluate the laws of this State, and the administration thereof relating to crimes, delinquency, criminal procedure, probation, parole and other relative matters pertinent to a study of fundamental causes of crime and delinquency; requires final report to Governor not later than January 15, 1964—A. J. R. 3—99, 227, 229, 425.

Includes in the definition of a disorderly person anyone who obtains or attempts to obtain anything valued at less than \$200 by false statement or by impersonation—S. B. 202—993, 994.

D

Delaware River bridges—

Provides that there shall be no toll charge for any fire or police department vehicle using the bridges across the Delaware River between the cities of Camden and Gloucester City and Philadelphia, Pennsylvania—A. B. 29—69, 174, 175.

Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission—

Permits the Delaware River Joint Commission to effectuate additional bridge, tunnel, railroad, rapid transit transportation facilities and port improvements and development purposes within the port district—S. B. 146—586, 587, 713, 714, 852, 928, 961, 962.

Delaware River Port Authority—

Authorizes the Governor to enter into a supplemental compact with Pennsylvania to make mandatory, rather than discretionary, provisions authorizing the Delaware River Port Authority to enter into agreements with any municipality in which it has acquired property since 1950 for other than bridge, tunnel or passenger transportation purposes, to compensate such municipalities for loss of tax revenues on such property; subject to enactment by Pennsylvania of similar provisions—A. B. 25—68, 789, 793, 960.

Prescribes the veto powers of the Governors of the State of New Jersey and of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania over the actions of their respective commissioners appointed to the Delaware River Port Authority—A. B. 680—611, 706, 711.

Dental service corporations—

Permits the formation of nonprofit dental service corporations and dental service plans; prescribes regulations for the establishment, maintenance and operation of the corporations and plans—S. B. 1—297, 299, 354, 712, 714, 957.

Dentistry—

Provides for the registering of dental laboratory operators and assistants by the State Board of Registration and Examination in Dentistry—A. B. 38—71.

Increases the penalty from \$300 to \$500 for the first offense of practicing dentistry without a license—A. B. 67—76, 177, 178.

Changes the name of the State Board of Registration and Examination in Dentistry to the New Jersey State Board of Dentistry—A. B. 69—76, 140, 144, 183, 499.

Disaster relief—

Memorializes the President of the United States to provide disaster relief to citizens of the State who have been rendered homeless and destitute by reason of the devastating brush fires—S. C. R. 17—716.

Memorializes Congress to provide disaster relief to citizens of the State who have been rendered homeless and destitute by reason of the devastating brush fires—S. C. R. 18—716.

Discrimination—

Extends the prohibition against unlawful employment practice committed against an individual because of race, creed, color, national origin or ancestry to include such an act against him because of any such factors involving his spouse or other relative—A. B. 145—95, 175.

Extends the definition of "a place of public accommodation" in the "Law Against Discrimination" to mean any establishment, facility or business which makes accommodations, advantages, facilities or privileges available to the general public—A. B. 146—95, 175.

Prohibits discrimination by any banking or lending institution which is licensed by the State—A. B. 247—151.

Prohibits discrimination in the rental of real property except the rental of an apartment in a 2-family dwelling where the other apartment is maintained by the owner as the household of his family and the rental of rooms by the owner or occupant of a 1-family accommodation—A. B. 314—111, 140, 144, 173, 215.

Prohibits any private secondary or post-secondary school from requesting or suggesting submission of a photograph of an applicant or inclusion within application forms or admission requirements of requests for information as applicants' race, color, national origin or ancestry—A. B. 561—437.

Prohibits discrimination by any insurance company against any person because of race, creed or color—A. B. 644—549, 647, 656, 692.

Provides that the Superior Court shall have power, on application by the Director of the Division of Civil Rights at any time after a complaint has been filed, to grant temporary injunction relief pending final adjudication of any unlawful employment practice or unlawful discrimination as may have occurred—A. B. 686—664.

Prohibits discrimination in the rental of real property except the rental of an apartment in a 2-family dwelling where the other apartment is maintained by the owner as the household of his family and the rental of rooms by the owner or occupant of a 1-family accommodation—A. B. 782—1102.

Transfers the Division on Civil Rights from the Department of Education to the Department of Law and Public Safety—S. B. 78—722, 723, 782, 783.

Drugs—

Permits a court to commit to a public hospital, for a period not exceeding 60 days, an habitual user of any narcotic drug accused of any crime—A. B. 39—71, 175, 484, 487, 507, 909.

Provides that any person who sells any narcotic drug to any person under the age of 21 instead of 18 shall be punished by imprisonment at hard labor for not less than 10 years and no such sentence shall be suspended—A. B. 190—121.

Increases the penalties for narcotic drug conviction as follows: sale, gift or administration to a person under 18, imprisonment at hard labor for 20 years to life; illegal sale or manufacture, fine of \$2,000 and 10-20 years sentence for the first offense, \$5,000 and 20-30 years for second offense, and \$5,000 and 30 years to life for third and subsequent offenses; provides that no sentence shall be suspended—A. B. 316—162, 501.

Prescribes a mandatory sentence of imprisonment at hard labor for 20 years to life for persons who hire, use or employ a child under 18 to transport, carry, sell, prepare for sale or offer for sale morphine, cocaine, heroin, opium or any derivative, or marihuana, for any illegal purpose—A. B. 317—162, 383, 501.

Designates it a misdemeanor for any person, other than a pharmacist, to sell any preparation or mixture or compound of drugs containing codeine or any barbiturate to any person under 21 years of age, without a written prescription of a physician, dentist or veterinarian—A. B. 318—163, 501.

Prohibits as a disorderly person offense the possession or having in control of, amphetamine, barbiturate, barbitual, hypnotic or somnifacient drugs, tranquilizers or any legend drug other than a narcotic in any form unless obtained from a duly licensed physician, veterinarian or dentist, or on a valid written prescription—A. B. 319—163, 250.

Provides that sentence may not be suspended after conviction of, or plea of guilty or non vult to, criminal violations involving the manufacture or sale of narcotic drugs—A. B. 320—163, 501.

Requires a prescription for a narcotic be on a special narcotic prescription form of a type and design established by the Department of Health; requires prescription to be retained in a separate file—A. B. 440—240.

Prescribes certain items or medicinals that shall be sold only at professional service areas of a pharmacy or drug store by a registered pharmacist, or any pharmacy interne or senior or junior pharmacy student working under the supervision of the pharmacist—A. B. 527—380, 447, 501, 701.

Defines "non-poisonous patent or proprietary medicines" as packaged drugs and medicines which are sold to the general public under a trademark, trade name, or other trade symbol privately owned and properly labeled whether or not registered in the United States Patent Office—A. B. 548—441, 701.

Defines "patent or proprietary medicines" as those packaged drugs, medicines and medicinal preparations which are properly and adequately labeled and branded with the provisions of Chapter 5 of Title 24 (Food and Drugs) of the Revised Statutes and which are sold, offered, promoted and advertised by the manufacturer or distributor thereof directly to the general public under a trade mark, trade name, or other trade symbol; "non-poisonous" shall mean and include those preparations which are not dangerous to health when used in the dosage or with the frequency or duration prescribed, recommended or suggested on the label—A. B. 589—493, 701.

E

Education—

Permits boards of education to make payroll deduction with consent of the employee, for dues to an employee organization which has as one of its objectives, improvements in the terms or conditions of employment—A. B. 45—72, 596, 598, 739.

Requires that public school bus transportation be provided for school children who are obliged to walk on highways because of inadequate sidewalks or side paths in areas determined to be unsafe by the Commissioner of Education, upon petition of the board of education; provides that such school district shall be entitled to State school aid as in other districts furnishing bus transportation—A. B. 51—73, 177.

Permits a school district board of education to provide for transportation to and from public school for children other than those who live remote from a schoolhouse, or are mentally retarded or physically handicapped, the cost thereof not to be used in calculating State aid for pupil transportation—A. B. 93—109, 227, 230, 392, 393, 911.

Changes the standard for appointment of appropriations to be raised for regional school districts from that based on "average daily enrollment," to "the number of pupils enrolled on the last school day of September of the current school year"—A. B. 97—85.

Permits regional school district boards of education to acquire lands, up to 45 acres in extent, and situate in whole, or in part, within municipalities adjoining the regional school district—A. B. 101—86, 257, 258, 311, 595.

Authorizes boards of education and vocational school districts to purchase food supplies for home economics classes without advertising for bids—A. B. 182—119, 359, 363, 414.

Requires boards of education to accept kindergarten children on or before October 1st following the opening of school; permits a board of education to refuse to accept a transfer pupil who does not meet the board's entrance qualifications; effective July 1, 1963—A. B. 187—120, 257, 258, 623.

Permits boards of education to award a school building contract to the lowest bidder on a single over-all contract or to individual subcontractors—A. B. 229—147.

Eliminates the \$15,000 maximum amount of money that may be appropriated for the education of war orphans—A. B. 282—140, 157, 228, 232, 287.

Authorizes boards of education to accept gifts for higher education scholarship awards, provides for the management of property so received—A. B. 284—158, 241, 242, 273, 359, 363, 416, 733.

Permits a student who due to a change in financial circumstance is unable to continue in college without financial assistance and has withdrawn from college within a period not greater than 1 year prior to the date of his application, to apply and be admitted to competitive examination, for a State competitive scholarship—A. B. 352—166, 241, 257, 258, 343, 876.

Provides for the appointment of a construction co-ordinator by the general contractor, with authority to direct the co-ordination of all school construction work, permits the general contractor to certify payments to specialty contractors, permits a single bid on all jobs less than \$50,000; requires contractors to perform a controlling portion of the work with their own labor forces, effective 120 days after enactment—A. B. 425—268, 502, 531, 536.

Education (continued)—

Permits notices of school district elections to contain the number or numbers assigned to one or more of the election districts established—A. B. 426—268, 359, 363, 468, 914.

Permits the board of education to keep the election polls open between 7:00 A. M. and 9:00 P. M. if the board deems it necessary—A. B. 433—269, 359, 363, 423, 596.

Provides that any school district participating under the "State School Aid Act of 1954" shall not receive a reduction in equalization aid for the succeeding school year when the district has an increase in average daily enrollment over the next preceding year—A. B. 434—269.

Requires a $\frac{2}{3}$ vote of the voters of the entire school district to vote in favor of a proposal creating a regional school district—A. B. 437—240.

Increases the minimum salary schedule for teachers and other certified full-time professional employees of the board of education—A. B. 463—367, 405, 406, 446, 470, 502, 731.

Permits the dissolution of the boards of education of constituent school districts which form a regional district to include all the educational functions formerly conducted by the separate districts—A. B. 473—369.

Provides boards of education a choice of methods determining apportionment of school costs, ratables or average daily enrollment, between districts voting to consolidate in the same manner as is authorized for districts voting to form a regional school district—A. B. 474—369.

Designated the "Municipal and County Educational and Cultural Authorities Law," provides for the establishment of municipal and county educational and cultural authorities, prescribes the organization and powers and duties, authorizes the authorities to issue bonds—A. B. 480—371.

Increases by \$200 the State aid to school districts, for each pupil the district receives that resides on property owned by the State—A. B. 485—372, 405, 406, 472, 876.

Provides that every board of education shall require all persons proposing to bid on any contract with the board for public works in the amount of \$50,000 or more to be classified by the State Board of Education as to the character and amount of public works on which they shall be qualified to submit bids—A. B. 486—376.

Increases the State aid to schools from \$200 to \$350 per pupil in resident enrollment; appropriates \$71,300,000 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1964 if enacted into law on or before June 10, 1963—A. B. 517—378, 446.

Increases the maximum amount of the capital foundation program for each school district from \$30 to \$45 per pupil in resident enrollment; appropriates \$8,300,000 to such purposes for the 1963-64 fiscal year if this act becomes law before June 10, 1963—A. B. 518—379, 446.

Permits a tuition grant, not in excess of \$500 per year, be approved by the Commission of Education for a child who has been admitted or is eligible for admission to the State School for the Deaf, for special instruction or educational facilities not available in the school—A. B. 584—491, 866, 868, 879.

Requires all campaign material published in a school election to bear on its face complete data as to its donor, requires complete record of same to be maintained for 2 years—A. B. 624—496, 532, 534, 574, 877.

Education (continued)—

Defines "school zone" as that portion of a highway which is either contiguous to territory occupied by a school building or is where school crossings are established in the vicinity of a school, "school crossing" as that portion of a highway where school children are required to cross the highway in the vicinity of a school—A. B. 648—608, 705, 709, 840.

Permits a Board of Education to provide for the retirement on pension of a secretary of the board who has served in such office for 30 or more years on a part time basis and 10 or more years on a full time basis and who by reason of age at the time of his appointment as a full time secretary was ineligible for membership in a contributory pension system—A. B. 665—609, 707, 711, 831.

Amends the "Higher Education Assistance Authority Act," (P. L. 1959, c. 211) permitting the State Board of Education to approve institutions of higher education; increases the amount of a loan from \$1,000 to \$1,500 for any school year and the total amount from \$5,000 to \$7,500—A. B. 667—609, 648, 657, 693, 734, 930, 931, 932, 933.

Provides that the proportion which the number of teachers holding emergency and provisional teaching certificates assigned to any school in a school district bears to the total number of teachers assigned to the school, shall be equal throughout the schools in the district; applicable to teacher assignments for the school year commencing in September 1964—A. B. 704—726.

Requires all private correspondence schools to obtain a \$1,000 surety bond; effective January 1, 1964—A. B. 727—809.

Requires a teachers' contract to include all conditions relating to the termination of the contract, in the event of a female teacher's pregnancy—A. B. 738—812.

voids any teacher's contract requiring the suspension or termination of such contract in the event of pregnancy unless it is shown that the continuation would be injurious to the health and welfare of the teacher, foetus or the pupil under the direct charge of the teacher—A. B. 749—853.

Revises the formula of the "State School Aid Act of 1954" by increasing equalization aid from \$50 to \$70 per pupil, and State aid from \$200 to \$315 per pupil in resident enrollment, effective July 1, 1964—A. B. 767—1007.

Validates certain proceedings at meetings or elections of school districts, and any bonds or other obligations issued or to be issued pursuant to such proceedings—A. B. 773—1055, 1072.

Provides that the Higher Education Assistance Authority shall pay up to 5% interest on any education loan, during the borrowers continued enrollment, but not to exceed 5 years in a qualified institution of collegiate grade, thereafter a maximum of 3% interest shall be paid by the borrower any interest in excess of 3% shall be payable by the authority—A. B. 783—1102.

Increases from \$400 to \$700 the amount of each State competitive scholarship—A. B. 784—1102.

Creates a 7-member bipartisan commission, 2 Senate, 2 Assembly, 3 appointed by the Governor, 1 a licensed architect, 1 a representative of organized labor, and 1 a member of the State Federation of District Boards of Education to make a study of the practicability of development of standard plans for school buildings which could be made available to local boards of directors—A. J. R. 16—102, 302, 880.

Education (continued)—

Creates a 7-member bipartisan commission, 2 Senate, 2 Assembly, 3 citizens appointed by the Governor to make a study of the laws of the State and rules and regulations adopted pursuant thereto governing the establishment and setting up of public school districts and zones as they relate to the possible establishment of segregated public school districts and public schools; appropriates \$10,000 to the commission; requires a report no later than the second Tuesday in December, 1963—A. J. R. 23—668.

Creates a 12-member bipartisan commission, 3 Senate, 3 Assembly, 2 citizens appointed by the Commissioner of Education, the New Jersey Congress of Parents and Teachers, the New Jersey Education Association to study the adequacy of existing bus transportation for school children and the hazard involved in walking to school—A. C. R. 37—445, 787, 843, 879.

Establishes the method of apportioning the membership and appropriation of a regional board of education when any school district unites to form a regional district comprised of 2 or more municipalities—S. B. 24—478, 479, 795, 797, 898.

Permits boards of education to employ duly licensed dentists to be known as school dentists—S. B. 58—234, 235, 359, 360.

Permits special educational services, with State aid to be provided for emotionally disturbed and socially maladjusted pupils in privately operated nonprofit educational facilities—S. B. 72—399, 870, 871, 900, 1063.

Constitutes the State Federation of District Boards of Education as a corporation, with corporate powers—S. B. 73—298, 300, 426.

Permits municipal boards of education to convey lands no longer required for school purposes to volunteer rescue squads—S. B. 94—137, 138, 359, 361, 641.

Permits a board of education to renew temporary loan bonds provided that after three years the principal outstanding is reduced at least to the same extent as if permanent bonds had been issued, and provided that after the third year the temporary financing is procured through competitive bidding—S. B. 200—721, 722, 795, 797, 853.

Authorizes boards of education of school districts to close schools under its jurisdiction on general and primary election days—S. B. 256—990, 991.

Prescribes the apportionment of expenses for any school districts which united after January 1, 1961, to form a regional district, comprised of 2 or more municipalities—S. B. 268—935.

Requires a board of education to bear the cost of the defense of any board member whenever a civil or a criminal action has been brought for any act, or omission, arising out of and in the course of the performance of his duties, where such action results in final disposition in favor of the member—S. B. 270—991, 1063, 1064.

Authorizes 2 or more boards of education to co-operate in the purchasing of school supplies—S. B. 271—992, 1063.

Elections—

Provides for use of voting machines in all counties, presently limited to first- and second-class counties; requires State House Commission provide such voting machines when not furnished by county freeholders; appropriates \$500,000 for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1963, proposes appropriations for the fiscal years beginning July 1, 1964 and July 1, 1965 of the sums certified by the State House Commission to be necessary to complete purchase of voting machines—A. B. 11—65, 382.

Elections (continued)—

Provides that a voter shall be deemed a member of that party in which he voted at primary election until at least 1 subsequent annual primary election elapses, instead of until 2 such elections elapse—A. B. 12—65, 174, 175.

Provides that in counties having a population of 700,000 or more inhabitants and in counties having a population of not less than 300,000 or more than 400,000 inhabitants and in counties having a population of not less than 150,000 or more than 200,000, each municipal clerk shall certify to the county clerk the full and correct names and addresses and political party of all candidates for nomination for public office—A. B. 55—73, 142, 247.

Prohibits as a misdemeanor the disclosing of the results of absentee ballots prior to the closing of the polls—A. B. 90—108, 140, 144.

Changes the date for primary elections for all parties from the third Tuesday in April to the second Tuesday in June; provides that the delegates and alternates to the National Convention of each party be chosen in each congressional district or State territorial subdivision on said date; changes the date for the distribution of election information by the Secretary of State from March 10th to May 1st—A. B. 148—95, 140, 143, 179, 241.

Requires the offices of the Secretary of the State, the county clerks and municipal clerks to be open from 9:00 o'clock A. M. to 4:00 o'clock P. M. on fortieth day preceding primary election to receive candidate petitions—A. B. 180—119, 358, 362, 413.

Changes the primary election date from the third Tuesday in April to the first Tuesday in June—A. B. 201—123.

Provides that the municipal clerk of a municipality governed by a municipal council and a municipal manager shall draw lots to determine the order in which the names of the candidates for the council shall appear upon the ballots—A. B. 263—154.

Permits county election boards to rent voting machines to any recognized organization whose rules require elections by secret ballot—A. B. 346—191, 383.

Requires employees be given 2 hours from work to vote on election days without losing any pay; prohibits violations as a misdemeanor and prescribes penalties; effective July 1, 1963—A. B. 348—191, 383.

Requires the commissioner of registration to provide evening registration facilities for those persons entitled to vote, to be open from 6:00 to 9:00 P. M. at least 3 days a week during each of the 9 weeks which precede the close of registration; effective July 1, 1963—A. B. 349—191.

Permits county election registration commissioners to furnish information as to eligibility of voters, and district wherein registered, to any person making such inquiry in writing—A. B. 351—191.

Increases from \$30 to \$50 the amount of compensation a member of the district board of elections shall receive for services rendered in a primary election; increases from \$7.50 to \$12.50 the fee to be paid members of the district board of elections for addressing and mailing sample ballots where the county board of elections does not mail same—A. B. 387—198.

Permits a voter to vote a straight party ticket for all of the candidates of the party by marking a square on the ballot at the left of the party designation—A. B. 414—266.

Elections (continued)—

Provides that a referendum for the adoption of civil service shall not be resubmitted to the voters of any municipality oftener than once in 2 years—A. B. 431—268.

Requires the county board of elections to be responsible for assuring that members of district boards of elections receive instructions as to their duties and responsibilities in the conduct of elections—A. B. 508—377.

Provides that any civilian voter who claims the right to vote by absentee ballot by reason of temporary disability shall complete the required certificate but need not supply a physicians certificate—A. B. 531—438, 483, 486, 503.

Repeals the requirement of publication of a description of the boundary lines of each election district in municipalities having more than one district—A. B. 532—438.

Changes the primary election date from third Tuesday in April to the second Tuesday in June—A. B. 542—440.

Changes the run off date from the fifth Tuesday to the seventh Tuesday following a municipal election in municipalities operating under the "Optional Municipal Charter Law" (P. L. 1950, c. 210)—A. B. 543—441.

Amends the Absentee Voting Law to provide that such ballots be issued to persons who will be, instead of expect to be, absent from the State; specifies the authorities who may take the oath; effective July 1, 1963—A. B. 579—444.

Amends the election laws to provide that no person shall pay any money or other valuable consideration to or for any person for the doing or procuring to be done of any act forbidden to be done by the laws relating to primary or general elections; requires all printed campaign material to bear upon its face a statement of the person paying for same, requires complete records of all campaign material for a period of 2 years—A. B. 623—495, 532, 534, 638, 877.

Provides that the superintendent of elections in first class counties shall receive a salary of not less than \$5,000 or more than \$7,500 per annum as the freeholders of the county shall determine—A. B. 649—608, 669, 789, 792.

Increases from \$8,500 to \$10,000 the maximum annual compensation of the clerk of the county board of elections in first class counties—A. B. 652—608, 669, 866, 869.

Requires a person filing a petition as a primary election candidate to file a certificate stating that he is not a member of, or identified with any other political party, that he has not voted in the primary election of any political party other than the party named in the petition in the last 2 primary elections—A. B. 712—727, 788, 789, 792.

Increases the minimum and maximum salary of the members of the county boards of election; effective January 1, 1964—A. B. 718—729, 789, 792.

Increases the minimum salary payable to superintendents of elections in Passaic and Monmouth counties from \$4,000 to \$9,000, permits the freeholders to increase the salaries to not more than \$11,000; effective January 1, 1964—A. B. 719—729.

Deletes from the election laws the requirement that on the ballot candidates shall be arranged in groups and the groups bracketed in all cases where the petitions endorsing such candidates request such grouping—A. B. 746—813.

Prescribes the procedure for repair or substitution of a voting machine which becomes out of order during the time that the polls are open, and bipartisan examination and verification—S. B. 23—235, 236, 602, 604.

Elections (continued)—

Amends the law requiring the assignment of policemen to election district boards during elections to make the same permissive, in the discretion of the municipal police department, instead of mandatory—S. B. 82—723.

Permits a county deputy clerk to issue an absentee voting ballot—S. B. 111—294, 295, 357, 602, 604, 968.

Prohibits as a misdemeanor the registering of applicants for permanent registration at any place other than the places and under conditions authorized by law—S. B. 152—478, 480, 795, 796.

Prohibits the distribution by any person of any election material containing comments relative to a candidate for elective office unless such material is signed by such person with his true name and address; prescribes penalty of \$10,000 and, or 1 year imprisonment—S. B. 157—479, 480.

Electrologists Licensing Act—

Designated "The Electrologists Licensing Act (1964)," provides for the registration and licensing of electrologists by the Board of Medical Examiners—A. B. 771—1100.

Emergency government—

Designated the "Emergency Interim Executive and Succession Act," provides in the event of attack upon the United States, for the continuity of the executive functions of the government of the State by providing for additional officers who can act as Governor and for emergency interim succession to other executive offices of the State—S. B. 120—402, 403, 532, 538, 581, 630, 638, 654, 655, 661, 850.

Authorizes the establishment of an emergency temporary location or locations for the seat of government for the State and authorizes the exercise of governmental powers and functions there—S. B. 121—402, 404, 532, 538, 582.

Amends the oath of office of the acting governor to make it applicable to other possible successors to the powers and duties of the Governor—S. B. 122—403, 404, 532, 538, 582.

Eminent domain—

Provides that tax exempt employee benefit trusts shall not be deemed to be invalid as violating any existing law, statutory or otherwise, against perpetuities or suspension of the power of alienation—A. B. 58—74, 140, 143, 307.

Escheated funds—

Provides that escheated "personal property" shall also mean and include moneys deposited with any county welfare board for the account of any person who shall have died leaving no liens or next of kin or other persons entitled to receive said moneys—A. B. 310—161, 227, 229, 514.

Permits the State Treasurer to claim, obtain and recover any escheated moneys of persons whose whereabouts have been unknown for 5 successive years that have not been reported and delivered to the State Treasurer for safekeeping; prescribes procedure—A. B. 645—607, 790, 794, 839.

Estates—

Provides that investments held in a trust estate shall not be changed by reason of fluctuation in the values of such investment, notwithstanding that the value of the limited legal investment in such trust estate exceeds 60% instead of the 40% of the aggregate value of all the property which constitutes the principal of the trust estate—A. B. 391—364, 483, 487, 681.

Provides for a summary hearing in the County Court with an adjudication of death and when necessary the appointment of a personal representative of the decedent to administer his estate—A. B. 769—1053, 1094.

Ethical standards in government—

Prohibits specified activities by legislators, State officers, employees and appointees, and prescribes standards of conduct with respect to conflict of interest between the public duties and personal interests of such persons; lists specific agencies which are prohibited to appear before; prescribes penalties; creates a 5-member bipartisan Commission on Ethical Standards in Government, within the Department of Law and Public Safety, to administer the act—A. B. 139—116.

Prohibits specified activities by legislators, State officers, employees and appointees, and prescribes standards of conduct with respect to conflicts of interest between the public duties and personal interests of such persons; prescribes penalties; creates a 5-member bipartisan Commission on Ethical Standards in Government, within the Department of Law and Public Safety, to administer the act—A. B. 158—97, 291, 292, 348.

Prohibits the Attorney General, deputy and assistant attorney general, and legal assistants in the Department of Law and Public Safety from being candidates for elective public office or engaging in partisan political activity while holding office—S. B. 47—234, 235.

Prohibits political activity by county prosecutors, assistant prosecutors, legal assistants to prosecutors, county detectives or investigators—S. B. 53—234, 236.

Regulates specified activities by legislators, State officers, employees, and appointees with respect to conflicts of interest between their public duties and their personal business or professional interests; establishes a Commission on Ethical Standards in the Executive Branch, provides for the establishment of a standing ethics committee in each House of the Legislature—S. B. 97—294, 296, 356.

Explosives—

Prohibits as a disorderly person the discharging of explosives in the ground within a distance of 200 feet of any pipe distributing or transmitting manufactured, mixed or natural gas—A. B. 301—111, 785, 786, 791, 831.

F

Federal aid—

Memorializes Congress to review the existing Federal grants-in-aid to State and local units of government with the purpose of accomplishing a more equitable distribution of such grants among the States—A. C. R. 17—168.

Memorializes the President of the United States to provide disaster relief for the citizens of this State who have been rendered homeless and destitute by reason of the destruction of their homes by a series of devastating brush fires—A. C. R. 47—698, 913.

Memorializes the Congress to provide disaster relief for the citizens of the State who have been rendered homeless and destitute by reason of the destruction of their homes by a series of devastating brush fires—A. C. R. 48—698, 913.

Fees—

Increases the licensing fee for retail cigarette dealers operating vending machines from \$1 to \$10—A. B. 33—70, 171, 175.

Permits an attorney to commence action for the recovery of fees, charges and disbursements from their clients by forwarding a copy of same, by certified or registered mail, in a sealed envelope with proper postage prepaid and return receipt requested, to the client or his legal representative at his last known address—A. B. 186—120, 483, 486, 509.

Increases from \$2 to \$20 the fee to be paid by the plaintiff to the Secretary of State for service upon a nonresident aircraft, operator, pilot or owner, effective July 1, 1963—A. B. 292—109, 142, 212.

Increases the fees charged by the Secretary of State; effective July 1, 1963—A. B. 298—110, 139, 144, 217, 218, 288.

Increases from \$.25 to \$.50 the fee for dog registration tag; permits each municipality to fix the annual dog license fee to be not less than \$1.50, instead of \$1.00 nor more than \$3.50, instead of \$3; in the absence of such a local ordinance, the license fee shall be \$1.50 instead of \$1; effective July 1, 1963—A. B. 299—110, 140, 144, 173, 213.

Permits an attorney to commence action for the recovery of fees, charges and disbursements from their clients by forwarding a copy of same, by certified or registered mail, in a sealed envelope with proper postage prepaid and return receipt requested, to the client or his legal representative at his last known address—A. B. 304—160, 383.

Increases from \$.25 to \$.50 the fee for administering an oath or taking an affidavit—A. B. 389—198, 270, 271.

Increases from \$5 to \$10 the license fee for operators of water and sewage disposal treatment plants—A. B. 611—495, 532, 537, 573.

Prescribes a general schedule of increases in fees and costs chargeable by surrogates—A. B. 640—550, 651, 660, 765, 999.

Permits an attorney to commence action for the recovery of fees, charges and disbursements from their clients by forwarding a copy of same, by certified or registered mail, in a sealed envelope with proper postage prepaid and return receipt requested, to the client or his legal representative at his last known address—S. B. 66—234, 236, 359, 361, 966.

Fines—

Requires all motor vehicle fines and costs collected by the county clerks as a result of appeals from the municipal courts be forwarded to the municipalities wherein the original trial was held; effective July 1, 1963—A. B. 117—116, 241, 301.

Provides for a uniform monetary credit, against a fine, at a given rate per day, for all offenses whether served in State or county penal institutions—A. B. 415—266, 483, 486, 584, 585, 627, 911.

Fire extinguishers—

Prohibits as a disorderly person offense, the selling, offering for sale, buying, exchanging, possessing or giving away of any fire extinguisher containing carbon tetrachloride; specifies a fine of not more than \$100 or imprisonment for not more than 60 days or both; effective January 1, 1964—A. B. 551—441.

First Aid Month—

Designates the month of August as "First Aid Month"—S. J. R. 11—592, 593, 654, 662, 848.

Fish and Game—

Permits the Director of Fish and Game to issue fishing licenses, without fee, to residents of the State 65 years of age or over—A. B. 178—119.

Permits the fishing for striped bass from March 1 through December 31 in the Atlantic ocean and from April 1 to December 31 in each year, from or in all other waters—A. B. 192—121, 176.

Provides that fishing clubs operated on private waters may be subjected to licensing requirements; effective January 1, 1964—A. B. 305—160, 261, 262, 514.

Specifies regulations relative to the dredging for oysters, clams and crabs, and the tonging of oysters and clams in certain specifically described portions of Delaware Bay—A. B. 430—268, 359, 363, 422.

Permits the Division of Fish and Game to revoke the license of any person violating any provision of any rules or regulations so promulgated by the division pertaining to commercial menhaden fishing—A. B. 556—442.

Permits the taking of carp year around in the Delaware Bay and the tidal tributaries of the lower Delaware; eliminates the requirement that fishing nets in the Delaware Bay be removed from Saturday afternoon to midnight Sunday—A. B. 593—493.

Permits foreign visitors the privilege of hunting while visiting the State—A. B. 596—494, 532, 534, 573.

Permits the Commissioner of Conservation and Economic Development to regulate the striped bass season—A. B. 622—495, 532, 534, 563.

Creates a residents family fishing license with a fee of \$10, permitting the parents and their children between the ages of 14 and 21 to fish—A. B. 689—665, 734, 878.

Permits the use of certain mechanical devices designed to scare or repel marauding birds and other wildlife from the destruction of property—A. B. 694—666, 789, 794, 892.

Flood control—

Permits the freeholders in agreement with the county park commission to enter upon and use lands owned or under the jurisdiction of the park commission for the purpose of constructing and maintaining flood control projects—A. B. 83—79, 228, 231, 278.

Food—

Requires every container of fruit juice to have a statement plainly printed thereon specifying exactly the sugar or nonsugar content and if any coloring matter has been added; violators shall be a disorderly person—A. B. 203—123, 484, 487.

Proposes several amendments to the Food and Drug Law affecting editorial changes, penalties for interference with law enforcement, artificial coloring of meats, labeling of horse flesh, food standards, definition of dietary beverages, collection of fines, egg breaking establishment license period, and general conformation to modern food and drug practices—A. B. 633—497, 614, 651, 652, 660, 690.

Prescribes the marking of open or closed packages containing potatoes, provides penalties; appropriates \$15,000 for enforcement; inoperative for 60 days after enactment—A. B. 693—666, 706, 710, 820, 830, 941.

Ford, Henry—

Commemorates the centennial of the birth of Henry Ford, founder of Ford Motor Company—A. C. R. 44—609, 843, 1002.

Fraternal societies—

Permits fraternal benefit societies to pay the annual \$2 license fee for their insurance agents—A. B. 220—126, 256, 257, 337.

Deletes the requirement that juveniles shall automatically become members of the adult branch of a fraternal benefit society upon attaining the minimum age of adult membership—A. B. 748—1004.

Fuel—

Requires a periodical statement of the amount of liquid fuel delivered, be rendered to the consumer having a meter permanently attached and properly secured—A. B. 744—813, 895.

G

Garden State Parkway—

Relocates the toll gates on the Garden State Parkway north of Belleville Avenue, Bloomfield, to a point north of Watchung Avenue, Bloomfield—A. B. 276—156.

Good Samaritan Act—

Designated "The Good Samaritan Act of 1963"; provides immunity to civil damages liability to any person licensed to practice any method of treatment of human ailments who in good faith renders emergency care at the scene of an accident—A. B. 62—75, 106, 178, 291, 292, 311, 499.

Governor's Budget Message—

Requires the Governor to transmit his budget message to the Legislature for the fiscal year July 1, 1963 to June 30, 1964, on or before February 11, 1963—A. B. 47—54, 55, 82, 137.

H

Health—

Authorizes local boards of health to compel owners of residential buildings having more than one family who have agreed to provide heat all year round, so that the temperature shall always be kept at or above 68° between 6:00 A. M. and 11:00 P. M.; requires owners of commercial buildings where heat is provided to maintain such temperatures during usual working hours between September 15th and May 15th—A. B. 19—67, 256, 258, 394, 506.

Provides that data collected by the Department of Health, pertaining to the health of any named person, procured in connection with research studies approved by the Public Health Council for the purpose of reducing the mortality or mortality from any cause or condition of health shall be kept in the confidence of the department—A. B. 193—121, 227, 228, 284, 875.

Extends until December 31, 1963 the time in which certain resident physicians may attain accreditation from an approved hospital—A. B. 243—150, 227, 229, 272, 339, 732.

Removes the requirement of giving color and nationality in reporting a person infected with a venereal disease, or of a person bitten by a dog; deletes the requirement of submitting 2 signed photographs in applying for a barber's license—A. B. 410—265.

Proposes the repeal of the law requiring migrant laborers to show evidence of 90-day examination for venereal diseases, or to submit to examination—A. B. 411—265, 532, 537.

Eliminates the requirement of chiropractors to take annual refresher courses—A. B. 462—366, 503, 532, 537, 683.

Authorizes the disposition by an individual of part of his human remains for the advancement of medical science or the replacement or rehabilitation of diseased or worn-out parts of organs of other human beings—A. B. 547—441, 483, 486, 567, 876.

Amends the laws concerning the disposal of dead bodies and vital statistics—A. B. 554—545, 867, 868, 878, 928, 932.

Requires the State Department of Health to study the various geographical areas of the State to determine whether any such areas should be restricted as to the types of sewerage facilities which may be thereafter constructed in such areas—A. B. 614—663, 706, 710, 763.

Amends R. S. 45:9-2, governing the practice of medicine and surgery, by deleting technical provisions relating to the inability of persons working as assistants to osteopaths, chiropractors, optometrists, and other limited practitioners—A. B. 638—550.

Memorializes Congress to enact legislation providing for payment for hospital services, skilled nursing home services, and home health services furnished to aged beneficiaries under old age, nursing and disability insurance program—A. C. R. 8—53, 83.

Health (continued)—

Prohibits the issuance of an optometrist's license to anyone practicing optometry in any store not exclusively devoted to the practice of optometry or other health care professions where unrelated merchandise is displayed—S. B. 77—593, 713, 715, 1064, 1082.

Establishes the qualifications of certain persons to be admitted to examination for license to practice medicine and surgery and to be admitted to practice upon passing examination; inoperative on December 31, 1963—S. B. 83—298, 300, 356, 603, 604.

Increases the total amount which may be received as reimbursement grants from Federal and State funds in each county for community health projects from 20¢ to 25¢ multiplied by that county's population—S. B. 85—235, 236, 260, 427.

Grants legal protection to those individuals who supply technical ancillary services to licensed physicians and whose services are not presently encompassed in the provisions of the medical practice act—S. B. 138—934, 935, 987.

Amends the law governing the registration of physical therapists by redefining the exemption of various therapists categories—S. B. 173—543, 544, 602, 603, 904, 1086, 1092, 1093.

Provides for the licensing of blood banks by the Commissioner of Health, provides for penalties for violations; effective 90 days after enactment—S. B. 181—481, 654, 662, 700.

Grants legal protection to those individuals who supply technical ancillary services to licensed chiropractors—S. B. 199—724, 725, 796, 970.

Designates the month of April as "Cancer Control Month" in this State—S. J. R. 1—235, 236, 247, 338.

Declares the week of March 3 through 9, 1963, as "Save Your Vision Week"—S. J. R. 4—235, 236, 247, 338.

Designates the week of February 3 through 9, 1963, as "Children's Dental Health Week"—S. C. R. 13—233, 234.

Highway Authority—

Places the administration and governing of the New Jersey Highway Authority, as a continuing corporate entity, under the direct jurisdiction of the State Highway Commissioner; terminates the terms of the authority's present 3 members; effective 60 days after enactment—A. B. 26—68, 106, 173.

Authorizes and directs the State Highway Authority to enter into agreements with municipalities, wherein it acquires lands for its projects, to pay such municipalities reasonable sums to compensate for the loss on tax revenues on such lands—A. B. 27—69, 175, 241, 502.

Places the administration and governing of the New Jersey Highway Authority, as a continuing corporate entity, under the direct jurisdiction of State Highway Commission; terminates the terms of the authority's present 3 members; effective 60 days after enactment—A. B. 30—70, 106, 173.

Highways—

Permits the State to control roadside advertising in areas adjacent to the Federal Interstate System—A. B. 6—52, 228, 231, 290, 291, 558, 646, 676, 948, 949.

Highways (continued)—

Authorizes the State Highway Department to pay counties or municipalities up to 90% of the cost of repairing damage to public roads caused by vehicles weighing over 40,000 pounds and licensed as "constructors" (R. S. 39:3-20); specifies the procedure for application, approval and payment of such funds—A. B. 75—77, 172, 173, 866, 868, 879, 886, 925, 1001.

Designates as a Freeway Route No. 31A, beginning at State Highway Route 31 (Route 206 (1953) north of Princeton, and thence to a point at or near Hightstown and connecting there with State Highway Route No. 33 eastwardly of Hightstown—A. B. 153—96, 260, 262, 312.

Directs the Highway Commissioner to add to the State highway system the route beginning at the intersection of Cape May County road No. 585 with Route No. 9 at Burleigh in Cape May County and extending along and including Cape May County road No. 585 in a southeasterly direction to the northeasterly line of the city of North Wildwood—A. B. 163—98.

Relocates the toll gates on the Garden State Parkway north of Belleville Avenue, Bloomfield, to a point north of Hoover Avenue, Bloomfield—A. B. 539—440.

Requires the Highway Commission to add to the highway system, Route No. 72, beginning in Stafford Township, Ocean County at the present Route 72 in the vicinity of Route U. S. 9: thence in a southeasterly direction over new location joining with the new Manahawkin Causeway in Stafford Township; designated a freeway—A. B. 582—445, 482, 484, 570.

Permits the Highway Commission to acquire, by condemnation, any public land which he may determine is reasonably necessary for any highway project owned by any county or municipality—A. B. 594—494, 531, 536.

Provides that where the route of a State highway has heretofore or hereafter been fixed and mapped by the Highway Commissioner, he shall be deemed to have vacated any parts thereof not included in the highway as so mapped—A. B. 597—445, 531, 535, 890.

Requires a supplemental permit fee of \$200 to erect, maintain or use billboards along the State highways; effective April 1, 1964—A. B. 713—728.

Prescribes white and yellow as the colors to be used in specified highway markings—A. B. 721—731, 767, 1003.

Directs the State Highway Commissioner to build a prescribed new freeway in the Elizabeth area—A. B. 722—729.

Permits a 35-mile per hour speed limit on any through street or highway having 2 or more traffic lanes in each direction in which traffic is permitted—A. B. 778—1101.

Creates an 8-member bipartisan commission, 2 Senators, 2 Assemblymen, a representative of the Department of Law and Public Safety, and a representative of the State Highway Department, 1 citizen each appointed by the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the General Assembly to study and recommend means of improving highway safety—A. J. R. 25—728, 879.

Creates a 6-member bipartisan commission, 3 Senate, 3 Assembly to study the legality and practicability of the dissolution of the Turnpike and Highway Authorities and transfer their functions, powers and duties to the Highway Department—A. C. R. 2—103, 106, 382, 669.

Highways (continued)—

Permits the State, a county or municipality to erect and maintain upon the recommendation of the Board of Public Utilities Commissioners, railroad advance warning signs and other appropriate official traffic signs, including stop signs, where any highway crosses a railroad at grade—S. B. 298—294, 296, 356, 430, 432, 577, 1087, 1091.

Authorizes the State Highway Department to pay counties or municipalities up to 90% of the cost of repairing damage to public roads caused by vehicles weighing over 40,000 pounds and licensed as "constructors" (R. S. 39:3-20); specifies the procedure for application, approval and payment of such funds—S. B. 147—724, 725, 978, 979.

Homestead Tax Exemption Law—

Designated the "Homestead Tax Exemption Law" establishes a homestead exemption of \$5,000 on full value or 50% of the full value of the homestead, whichever is less—A. B. 168—109, 175, 502.

Horizontal Property Act—

Designated the "Horizontal Property Act" provides for the creation of horizontal property regimes—S. B. 161—591, 592, 654, 662, 903, 1085, 1086, 1088, 1089.

Horse-drawn vehicles—

Regulates the operation of horse-drawn vehicles, owned or operated, in the business of carrying passengers, for hire, by a driver furnished with the vehicle or by any other person—A. B. 566—443, 531, 535, 753.

Hospitals—

Prohibits the Department of Institutions and Agencies and the Hospital Licensing Board to deny approval for new and additional hospital facilities or application for licenses to operate a hospital on the sole ground that adequate hospital or nursing home facilities are already available in the area—A. B. 489—436.

Housing—

Designated the "Elderly Persons Housing Law"; permits the establishment of private nonprofit corporations for moderate rental housing for elderly persons; authorizes State and municipal co-operation and financial assistance pursuant to the Federal Loan Program under Title II of the Housing Act of 1959—A. B. 42—72.

Designated "The State Middle Housing Law of 1963"; authorizes the Public Housing and Development Authority to loan resident builders, housing corporations, redevelopment companies, and co-operatives up to 90% of the cost to build housing for middle income families; repeals "The State Housing Law of 1949" (P. L. 1949, c. 303)—A. B. 416—266.

Designated "The Public Housing and Development Guaranty Bond Act of 1963," authorizes creation of a \$25,000,000 State bond issuance debt, subject to referendum at the November, 1963, General Election, for construction of middle income housing under Assembly Bill No. 416, 1963—A. B. 417—266.

Authorizes municipalities, by ordinance, to provide for rent control of housing space—A. B. 528—380.

Housing (continued)—

Authorizes municipalities, by ordinance, to provide for rent control of housing space—A. B. 687—664.

Permits the use of not more than 10 one-unit burners having a burner diameter of 6 inches or less, housed in a metal container and resting on a metal surface under the tenement housing statutes—A. B. 703—726.

Designated the “New Jersey Housing Finance Authority Act of 1963,” creates the New Jersey Housing Finance Authority to finance and otherwise assist in the construction, operation and maintenance of housing projects—A. B. 742—812.

Hypnotism—

Provides that any person who shall hypnotize or attempt to hypnotize another person for purposes of entertainment is a disorderly person—A. B. 378—196.

I

Institutions—

Amends the law governing persons confined to institutions by court order, and requires persons admitted to the State sanatorium for convalescence from tuberculosis or respiratory disease be liable for care costs in the same manner and extent as required from mentally ill or retarded persons or relatives; effective January 1, 1964—A. B. 112—88, 178, 256, 258, 477, 503, 512, 706, 712, 735, 741.

Insurance—

Provides that no insurance company, corporation or hospital or medical service corporation shall be entitled to be subrogated by contract to any claim of the insured as against any third party for damages for hospital or medical services as to any hospital or physician's lien by reason of payment to the insured or any sum of money for his hospital or medical services; effective January 1, 1964—A. B. 199—122, 707, 712, 795.

Prohibits the imposition of a service charge by an insurance broker upon an insured unless a written agreement has been obtained specifying the amount of such charge; permits payment of a commission on workmen's compensation assigned risk insurance—A. B. 226—147, 256, 257, 337.

Authorizes the Commissioner of Banking and Insurance to disapprove and determine the rate of payment to a participating physician under a medical service corporation or medical service plan—A. B. 244—150.

Permits an insurance company to issue a group life insurance policy to a duly incorporated Fraternal Order of Police—A. B. 271—156, 228, 231, 242, 274, 287, 502, 875.

Provides that every insurance agent and broker shall be responsible in a fiduciary capacity for all funds received or collected as insurance agent or broker—A. B. 343—190, 256, 257, 343.

Prohibits the termination of any insurance policy due to default of premiums which are normally collected by insurance agents, during the period of a strike of the agents, extends the grace period to 31 days following the termination of the strike—A. B. 345—191, 383.

Insurance (continued)—

Provides that an insurance company is responsible for any insurance premium, except life insurance, paid to an authorized insurance broker—A. B. 377—196, 256, 257, 346.

Provides that a certificate of financial responsibility filed by an insurance company with the Division of Motor Vehicles upon the issuance of a new or amended public liability policy will supersede a previously filed certificate—A. B. 385—197, 706, 711, 964.

Permits admitted insurers to write insurance through any agents licensed in the State—A. B. 438—239, 358, 362, 888.

Prohibits an insurance company, which employs insurance agents whose duties include the collection of monthly or weekly premiums from establishing or enforcing any quota for the production of new business, or to terminate or threaten to terminate the employment of any agent for failure to attain a quota—A. B. 482—372.

Requires every applicant for an insurance brokers' license to be at least 21 years of age—A. B. 484—372, 406, 407, 471.

Excludes "independent insurance adjusters" from the provision of (P. L. 1939, c. 369), concerning the licensing of private detectives—A. B. 493—373, 406, 407, 475.

Prohibits making any charge for the substitution of an insurance policy or policies except as may be permitted by regulation of the Commissioner of Banking and Insurance; effective 3 months after enactment—A. B. 500—375, 406, 407, 476.

Prohibits the fixing of a rate, or issuance of a policy, for workmen's compensation or employer's liability insurance, by any insurance company or mutual association authorized to write same in this State, which discriminates unfairly between risks—A. B. 505—377, 405, 407, 752.

Provides that the timely payment of a premium on an existing insurance policy to an agent of the insurance company issuing the same, shall constitute the timely payment of the premium to the company, notwithstanding any provision of the contract to the contrary or any omission or failures on the part of such agent—A. B. 523—379, 820.

Provides that not more than $\frac{1}{3}$ of the members of the board of directors of any mutual insurance company incorporated under the laws of this State may be officers of such company or members of the immediate family of officers of such company; effective 120 days after enactment—A. B. 625—496, 532, 535, 575.

Permits an insurance broker to receive from a surplus lines agent a share of any commission or brokerage fee earned by the agent in connection with insurance of vessels, crafts or hulls, cargoes, marine builders' risks, marine protection and indemnity or other risks including strikes and war risks commonly insured under ocean or wet marine forms of policy—A. B. 639—550, 789, 793, 879, 891, 1122.

Permits a corporation to hold a certificate of authority issued by the Commissioner of Banking and Insurance to act as agent to transact the business of life insurance and life, accident and health insurance—A. B. 673—610.

Creates a 3-member bipartisan special Assembly committee, to study and investigate alleged discrimination practices by insurance companies in the issuance and renewal of policies of automobile liability insurance—A. R. 4—380.

Amends the law regulating group life insurance to permit coverage of noninstallment debtors, to redefine "debt," to permit classification by age, and to increase from \$250 to \$500 the amount that may be paid out for funeral or last illness expenses—S. B. 174—541, 542.

Amends the Standard Nonforfeiture Law (1943) and the Standard Valuation Law (1943) establishing modern tables as to the minimum valuation, standards for industrial life insurance policies and establishing modern mortality tables—S. B. 176—539, 540, 603, 604, 644.

Investments—

Authorizes fiduciaries to exchange securities held in trust, for other securities of the same issuer, or the issuer as recapitalized, reorganized, merged or consolidated, and to retain such securities after such exchange or conversion—S. B. 258—805, 806, 915, 939.

J

Juvenile delinquency—

Provides that the juvenile and domestic relations court shall have exclusive jurisdiction to hear and determine all cases of juvenile delinquency, except as otherwise provided by law—A. B. 70—76, 291, 292, 352, 410, 478, 508.

Defines juvenile delinquency as the commission of specified crimes, except murder, by a child under 16, instead of under 18 years of age—A. B. 170—117, 291, 412.

Permits a juvenile charged with juvenile delinquency to be held to bail—A. B. 375—196, 430, 432, 516, 999, 1048.

Defines juvenile delinquency as the commission of specified crimes, except murder, by a child under 16, instead of under 18 years of age—A. B. 658—606.

K

Kennedy Day—

Designates May 29 of each year as John Fitzgerald Kennedy Day as a day for the general observance of the memory of President Kennedy—A. B. 776—1101.

L

Labor—

Prohibits the cleaning of windows from the outside of specified multi-storied buildings, other than dwellings under 3 stories or having less than 3 families, unless anchors or other safety devices are provided and used, subject to the regulations of the Commissioner of Labor and Industry; prescribes penalties of fine and imprisonment for violators, operative 120 days after the effective date—A. B. 3—63, 649, 650, 651, 660.

Designated the "Worker Health and Safety Act," requires places of employment, including newspapers, to be constructed, operated and maintained with reasonable regard to the health and safety of the employees—A. B. 49—52, 106, 141, 145, 173, 211, 930, 931.

Labor (continued)—

Prohibits as a disorderly person any employer who has made an agreement to pay into a welfare fund and fails, neglects or refuses to make such payments within 30 days after such payments are required by the agreement—A. B. 87—79, 228, 232, 279.

Amends the law affecting injunction in labor disputes by making it applicable to all forms of interim relief; requires that plaintiff's oral testimony in suits for injunctive relief be recorded by the court, that plaintiff's indemnity bond be sufficient to cover attorney's fees, and that plaintiff use all reasonable methods, including negotiations, to settle a dispute before an injunction will issue—A. B. 88—80, 228, 232.

Provides that when an employer has agreed to accept a regular report from an employee of the amount of gratuities received, the average weekly amount of gratuities over a period of 6 months shall be added to the fixed wage to determine the employee's total weekly wage; if no record is kept, then the average weekly gratuities shall be fixed in accordance with a formula to be established by the Commissioner of Labor and Industry—A. B. 128—92.

Creates New Jersey Labor Relations Board of 3 members, appointed by Governor with Senate advice and consent for 6 years terms at \$15,000 salary, to investigate, hear and decide labor controversies and to prevent specified unfair labor practices; prescribes penalties; designated the "New Jersey Labor Relations Act;" effective September 15, 1963—A. B. 156—97.

Permits the Commissioner of Labor and Industry to enter into an agreement with the Federal Government or other States regardless if it is applicable solely to individuals who are not eligible for benefits under the unemployment compensation laws of this State or the Federal Government—A. B. 206—124, 358, 363, 415.

Requires railroad, express, and air carriers of passengers and freight having station or office facilities in the State to provide and maintain specified adequate sanitary facilities for the health and comfort of their employees—A. B. 213—125.

Requires railroad and express, carloading, and car-forwarding companies to pay employees weekly; effective immediately, but inoperative as to imposition of penalties until 6 months from the effective date of this act—A. B. 217—126, 430, 432, 624.

Provides that an employer who fails to place proper safeguards around machinery or to discontinue industrial practices dangerous to his employees, within a specified period, after notice from the Commissioner of Labor and Industry requiring same, be individually liable for an additional amount equal to any workmen's compensation award made to a worker injured as a result of such failure—A. B. 218—126.

Establishes a minimum wage rate of \$1.25 per hour for the first 40 hours of working time in any week and 1½ times the regular hourly wage thereafter, excludes domestic, hotel and restaurant employees; provides for the enforcement of the act—A. B. 228—147.

Prohibits as a disorderly person offense, the act of an employer to influence, request or require an employee to take or submit to a lie detector test as a condition of continued employment—A. B. 275—156, 291, 292, 341.

Prohibits employers from discrimination against employees whose wages are subject to execution, garnishment or other legal process—A. B. 479—371, 405, 406, 471, 502.

Labor (continued)—

Designated the "Minimum Wage Act of 1963," establishes a minimum wage rate of \$1.50 per hour for the first 40 hours of working time in any week and 1½ times the regular hourly wage thereafter; not applicable to agricultural employees—A. B. 688—665.

Designated the "New Jersey Prevailing Wage Act," provides that the prevailing wages in the locality, except in municipalities having a population of less than 35,000, be paid on public works contracts, imposes duties of enforcement on the Commissioner of Labor and Industry; effective January 1, 1964—S. B. 253—874, 875, 880, 977.

Land acquisition—

Permits the State in acquiring lands to foreclose the rights of redemption in the same manner and to the same extent as a municipality—A. B. 634—497, 646, 691.

Requires the Commissioner of Conservation and Economic Development to notify the planning boards of the county or counties and municipality or municipalities prior to entering into any contract for acquisition of lands under the "Green Acres Land Acquisition Act of 1961"—S. B. 211—586, 587.

Permits municipalities undertaking public sewerage and drainage improvement projects to take possession of real property, or interests therein, which are being acquired by condemnation, upon depositing the estimate compensation therefor with the Clerk of the Superior Court—S. B. 229—719, 720, 869, 871, 907.

Land sales—

Authorizes the sale of surplus State lands, unsuitable for State Police use, situated in Washington Township, Mercer County, at public auction to the highest bidder—A. B. 259—153, 706, 710.

Authorizes and directs the sale and conveyance of certain surplus State-owned lands and buildings located in the city of Trenton formerly used as a motor vehicle inspection station—A. B. 260—153.

Law day—

Designates May 1, 1963, as "Law Day USA," in the State—A. J. R. 21—375, 597, 599, 697.

Designates May 1, 1963, as "Law Day USA," in the State—S. J. R. 6—479, 481.

Law Revision—

Provides that the "Law Revision and Legislative Commission" shall consist of a Division of Bill Drafting and Legislative Service and a Division of Law Revision instead of a Division of Law Revision and Bill Drafting, prescribes their powers and duties—A. B. 716—730, 731.

Legislature—

Repeals chapter 27, P. L. 1962, requiring the preparation and furnishing of a fiscal note for bills proposed for introduction or pending in the Legislature—A. B. 651—548.

Legislature (continued)—

Creates a 5-member Assembly Investigating Committee, consisting of Assembly members appointed by the Speaker, with power to investigate public bodies receiving funds in whole or in part from the State—A. R. 1—54.

Creates a 5-member Law Enforcement Council of the Legislature; defines functions, powers and duties—A. C. R. 9—104.

Liens—

Requires a lien for services of hospitals, physicians and dentists be filed no later than 90 days after the date of the first treatment, care or maintenance—A. B. 136—93, 175.

Requires a copy of a mechanics notice of intention to be served within 5 days of filing upon the owner of the premises—A. B. 143—94.

Provides that a tenant seeking recovery of goods held in distraint for rent shall post cash or bond in an amount double only the rent claimed, and not double the value of the goods—A. B. 176—119, 227, 230, 283, 551.

Permits a hospital to file and enforce a lien, notwithstanding that all or part of its charges for treatment and care will be paid by a nonprofit hospital service corporation; establishes the basis on which the hospital will reimburse the corporation in the event the lien is paid—A. B. 325—164, 175.

Permits a medical service corporation to file and enforce a lien, when a medical service corporation has made payment to the physician for the services rendered; establishes the basis on which the physician would reimburse the medical service corporation in the event the lien is paid in whole or in part—A. B. 326—164, 175.

Provides that no lien may be asserted for repairs or accessories of a value of \$100 or more unless such work shall have been authorized in writing by the owner; effective 30 days after enactment—A. B. 728—810.

Provides that no Federal tax shall be a valid lien against any pledgee as well as any mortgagee purchase or judgment creditor until the notice thereof shall be filed—S. B. 56—298, 300, 355, 713, 715, 845.

Requires a lien for services of hospitals, physicians and dentists be filed no later than 90 days after the date of the first treatment, care or maintenance—S. B. 57—234, 235, 602, 603, 850.

Livestock—

Requires the use of humane methods in the slaughter and the preparation for slaughter of livestock; effective January 1, 1964—A. B. 506—377.

Permits the State, a county or municipality to regulate the passage of horses, cattle, sheep or swine along the highways, roads and streets—S. B. 210—541, 543.

Lobby Control Act—

Designated the "Lobby Control Act," requires the registration of lobbyists with the Secretary of State, and the reporting with such office of funds over \$100 contributed or expended relative to lobbying; excludes political committees; prohibits violations as a misdemeanor—A. B. 41—72, 107, 430, 432, 476, 501, 785.

Local Contracts Law—

Revises Chapter 6, Local Contracts Law, Title 40A, Municipalities and Counties; effective January 1, 1964—A. B. 732—810.

Local Land Use Law—

Designated the Chapter 7, Local Land Use Law, Title 40A, Municipalities and Counties, and repeals certain sections of Title 40 of the Revised Statutes; effective January 1, 1964—A. B. 181—109, 221, 222, 226, 252, 253, 302.

M

Medical and hospital service corporation—

Permits medical service corporations to issue master group contracts to employers and other policyholders—A. B. 306—160.

Permits a hospital service corporation and medical service corporation to issue combined contracts providing for hospital and medical care—A. B. 327—164, 175.

Authorizes medical service corporation to include a subrogation provision in their contracts—A. B. 328—164, 175.

Permits medical service corporations to provide, in group contracts covering at least 100 employees or members, for the adjustment of the rate of premium based on the experience of the group; provides for an annual general supervisory fee to be paid by medical service corporations—A. B. 329—164, 175.

Authorizes the Commissioner of Banking and Insurance to approve or disapprove practices, rules and procedures of a medical service corporation—A. B. 330—165, 175.

Permits medical service corporations to enter into agreements with other corporations, providing for underwriting group contracts to cover employees or members in this or any other State—A. B. 331—165, 175.

Provides that the Governor shall appoint, with the advice and consent of the Senate, 9 public trustees of hospital service corporations, 3 representatives of labor and 6 representatives of the general public; provides that not more than 16 of the 32 trustees shall be employees, directors, or trustees of hospitals, members of the medical profession or employees of a hospital or medical service corporation—A. B. 332—165, 175.

Permits hospital service corporations to enter into agreements with other corporations, providing for underwriting group contracts to cover employees or members, in this or any other State—A. B. 333—165, 175.

Authorizes the Commissioner of Banking and Insurance, rather than the Commissioner of Institutions and Agencies to approve the filing of a new certificate of incorporation of a hospital service corporation—A. B. 341—170, 406, 407, 465.

Authorizes a medical service corporation to include a subrogation provision in their contracts—S. B. 4—297, 299, 354.

Permits a medical service corporation to file and enforce a lien, when a medical service corporation has made payment to the physician for the services rendered; establishes the basis on which the physician would reimburse the medical service corporation in the event the lien is paid in whole or in part—S. B. 5—298, 299, 355.

Authorizes the Commissioner of Banking and Insurance to approve or disapprove practices, rules and procedures of a medical service corporation—S. B. 6—589, 590, 870, 872.

Permits medical service corporations to issue master group contracts to employers and other policyholders—S. B. 9—589, 590.

Permits hospital service corporations to issue master group contracts to employers and other policyholders—S. B. 12—589, 590.

Authorizes the Commissioner of Banking and Insurance to approve or disapprove practices, rules and procedures of a hospital service corporation—S. B. 13—589, 590, 870, 872.

Permits a hospital to file and enforce a lien notwithstanding that all or part of its charges for treatment and care will be paid by a nonprofit hospital service corporation; establishes the basis on which the hospital will reimburse the corporation in the event the lien is paid—S. B. 15—298, 299, 355.

Authorizes a hospital service corporation to include a subrogation provision in their contracts—S. B. 16—298, 299, 355.

Provides that 9 bipartisan public trustees of a hospital service corporation shall be appointed, 3 by the Governor, 3 by the President of the Senate, 3 by the Speaker of the General Assembly, 1 of each group to represent a labor organization and 2 representatives of the general public; provides that not more than 16 of the 32 trustees shall be employees, directors, or trustees of hospitals, members of the medical profession or employees of a hospital or medical service corporation—S. B. 17—298, 299, 355, 915.

Provides that services performed by bio-analytical laboratories shall be considered within the provisions of the law governing medical services organizations (P. L. 1940, c. 74)—S. B. 103—295, 296, 357, 406, 407, 522.

Provides that any hospital service corporation may contract to furnish health care services elsewhere than in a hospital by a voluntary nonprofit visiting nurse organization—S. B. 118—433, 434, 654, 661, 763.

Provides that every hospital service corporation and medical service corporation may be sued in civil actions in any county district court having jurisdiction of the subject matter of the suit and where the plaintiff bringing the suit resides in the county of such county district court—S. B. 197—541, 543.

Mental health—

Proposes a general revision of the laws governing mental health, designated as "The Mental Health Act of 1963"; effective January 1, 1964—A. B. 111—88, 178, 258, 259, 477, 503, 512, 707, 708, 709, 712, 735, 740.

Permits counties to provide space to private or nonprofit State corporations which provide aid or assistance for mentally ill and mentally retarded children—S. B. 74—397, 398, 795, 797, 901, 1117, 1118, 1119, 1120.

Permits county freeholder boards to make appropriations for the benefit of mentally ill and mentally retarded children—S. B. 76—396, 397, 795, 797, 901.

Authorizes charges for diagnostic services and treatment at a county center or institution for the diagnosis and treatment of mental disorders—S. B. 124—293, 358, 867, 870.

Milk industry—

Repeals (P. L. 1962, c. 182), "Emergency Milk Control Law of 1962" and (P. L. 1962, c. 181), increasing milk license fees—A. B. 564—443.

Extends from December 31, 1963 to March 31, 1964, the date of which the "Emergency Milk Control Law of 1962" shall become inoperative—S. B. 308—1065, 1066, 1077, 1078.

Minors—

Permits minors under 16 years of age to engage in professional theatrical productions between the hours of 7 A. M. to 11:30 P. M., minors under 8 years may engage in motion picture and television performance under the direct care and supervision of an adult—A. B. 154—96, 228, 232, 282.

Increases from \$100 to \$500 the value of any real estate and from \$1,000 to \$2,000 the value of the personal estate of any minor, that the parent or a person standing in loco parentis to the minor shall be entitled to receive without being appointed guardian—A. B. 167—117, 246.

Permits a minor instead of a person over 18 years of age to sign a contract for a student loan under the "Higher Education Assistance Authority Act" (P. L. 1959, c. 121)—A. B. 179—119, 648, 657.

Permits an unmarried or married pregnant minor to give consent to the furnishing of hospital medical and surgical care related to her pregnancy—A. B. 313—162, 503.

Designated the "New Jersey Uniform Gifts to Minors Act"; regulates and defines gifts of securities and moneys to minors; repeals P. L. 1955, c. 139—A. B. 610—494, 790, 794, 837, 1097.

Miscellaneous boards—

Creates a Board of Title Abstractors in the Department of Law and Public Safety to regulate the practice of title abstracting, provides for the licensing of title abstractors and provides for penalties for violations—A. B. 221—126, 273, 597, 599, 880, 1064.

Designated the "Motion Picture Review Board Act," provides for the establishment in the Department of Education of a Motion Picture Review Board, requires the advisory preview of certain motion picture films and their classification as suitable or unsuitable for exhibition before youth, provides for fees for such previews and classification and penalties for violations; appropriates for administration until June 30, 1964, \$50,000; effective 90 days after enactment—A. B. 224—146.

Miscellaneous boards (continued)—

Creates a 5-member New Jersey Collection Agency Board, within the Department of State, to regulate the practice and licensing of collection agencies; requires all persons engaged in such practice to be licensed, with specific exceptions—A. B. 384—197, 256, 257, 410, 707, 712.

Increases from 3 to 5 the number of members of the State Board of Public Accountants—A. B. 477—371.

Creates a 5-member Board of Recreation Examiners within the Conservation and Economic Development Department, to administer a permissive certification and registration plan for recreation administrators and supervisors; prescribes rules, regulations, qualifications and professional study standards in such field; prescribes qualifications and fees required of applicants for examinations—A. B. 544—544, 669, 850, 866, 869.

Designated "The State Plumbing License Law of 1963," creates a 7-member State Board of Examiners of Master Plumbers in the Department of Health to license and regulate the master plumbers; appropriates \$25,000 for the administration of this act until June 30, 1964; provides that no license shall be issued until 4 months after enactment—A. B. 583—607, 946.

Creates a Board of Safety Automotive Maintenance Service in the Department of Law and Public Safety to regulate and license automotive and apprentice automotive mechanics, service and apprentice service station attendants; establishes fees and penalties for violations; effective 90 days after enactment—A. B. 740—812.

Miscellaneous commissions—

Creates a 9-member bipartisan commission, 3 appointed by the Governor, 2 Senate, 2 Assembly, 2 citizens, 1 each appointed by the Senate President and Assembly Speaker, to make a study of the services, activities and functions of the Executive Branch of the State Government in the interest of the promotion of further economy; efficiency and improvement in the transaction of the public business of the State and to report annually to the Governor and Legislature; appropriates \$50,000 for the commission; commission ineffective at the expiration of 5 years after its effective date—A. B. 123—91, 177.

Provides that State Commission on Aging shall consist of 9 instead of 10 members—A. B. 663—547, 597, 600, 640, 930, 931.

Creates a 6-member bipartisan special General Assembly Committee to study the advisability and practicability of establishing a system for making toll-free emergency calls from public telephones, utilized in the State—A. R. 7—1006.

Creates a 15-member bipartisan, County and Municipal Government Study Commission, 3 Senate, 3 Assemblymen, 9 named by the Governor, 3 nominees of the New Jersey Association of Chosen Freeholders, 3 nominees of the New Jersey State League of Municipalities, 3 citizens of the State to study the structure of county and municipal governments, and interrelationship of State, county and municipal governments, and their present and future problems; requires a report on or before the second Tuesday in January, 1964; appropriates \$25,000—A. J. R. 2—99, 174, 788, 792, 896.

Creates a 13-member commission, composed of the Administrative Director of the Courts, 2 citizens appointed by Governor, 2 Senate, 2 Assembly members, 2 representatives of county freeholder boards, 2 municipal representatives designated by the State, League of Municipalities President, and State Bar Association President, to study the advisability of the creation of the office of Public Defender in several counties of the State—A. J. R. 4—99.

Miscellaneous commissions (continued)—

Creates a 12-member commission, 3 Senate, 3 Assembly, 3 appointed by the Governor, 3 appointed by the State League of Municipalities, with the purpose of recommending legislation to provide a simplification of the classification scheme—A. J. R. 5—100.

Creates a 14-member child labor laws commission; 3 Senate, 3 Assembly, 5 citizens appointed by the Governor and the Commissioners of Education, Institutions and Agencies, and Labor and Industry, to study the child labor laws; requires a report to the Governor and Legislature at this or the next Legislature—A. J. R. 10—101, 174, 879.

Creates a 10-member Unicameral System of Legislation Study Commission to study and compare advantages of unicameral and bicameral systems; 1 Senator and 1 citizen appointed by the Senate President, 1 Assemblyman and 1 citizen appointed by the Speaker, 1 Senator, 1 Assemblyman and 4 citizens, of whom 2 shall be nominees of the State League of Municipalities, appointed by the Governor; requires report to the Governor and Legislature—A. J. R. 11—101.

Creates an 8-member New Jersey Interstate Facilities Commission, 2 Senate, 2 Assembly, 4 appointed by Governor, of whom 2 shall be nominees of the New Jersey State League of Municipalities, to study interstate bridges, tunnels and facilities, and to examine port authorities and commissions as to their financing, potential benefits, returns and revenue; requires report to Governor and Legislature; appropriates \$10,000—A. J. R. 12—101.

Creates a 10-member bipartisan Method of Selection of County and Municipal Officers Study Commission, 2 Senators, 2 Assemblymen, 6 appointed by the Governor of whom 2 shall be nominees of the New Jersey State League of Municipalities, 2 nominees of the Association of Chosen Freeholders, to study the subject of the method of selection of county and municipal officers, including the study of statutes relating to same; requires report to the present or next Legislature and to the Governor with recommendations for specific changes in the statutory laws—A. J. R. 13—101.

Creates an 8-member Autonomous Authorities Commission, 2 Senate, 2 Assembly, 4 appointed by the Governor, of whom 2 shall be nominees of the State League of Municipalities, to study operation of autonomous authorities and their benefits or disadvantages to the general welfare of the citizens of the State; requires report and recommendations to Governor and Legislature—A. J. R. 14—102, 260, 262, 425.

Creates a 7-member bipartisan commission, 2 Senate, 2 Assembly, 3 citizens appointed by the Governor, 1 a representative of the New Jersey Bankers Association, 1 a representative of organized labor, and 1 a member of State Federation of District Board of Education to study the practicability of establishing a School District Revolving Fund in the General State Treasury, funds to be used for the purchasing of bonds, notes and other evidences of indebtedness of local and regional districts—A. J. R. 15—102, 302.

Creates a 7-member bipartisan commission, 2 Senators, 2 Assemblymen and 3 members to be appointed by the Governor, to study the laws of this and other States pertaining to economic development and to prepare legislation to modernize the same; requires a report on or before October 1, 1963—A. J. R. 17—102, 483, 485, 697.

Creates a 9-member bipartisan commission, 3 Senate, 3 Assembly, 3 citizens appointed by the Governor and the State Treasurer, to study and investigate the adequacy of existing laws relating to the taxation of State-owned lands by local taxing districts—A. J. R. 19—167, 302, 429, 432.

Miscellaneous commissions (continued)—

Creates a 15-member bipartisan commission, 2 Senators, 2 Assemblymen, a representative of the Division of State and Regional Planning, the Department of Health, the Division of the Aging, Division of Motor Vehicles, 5 citizens named by the Governor, a representative of the Mobile Home Owners Association, New Jersey Mobile Home Dealers Association, New Jersey Mobile Home Park Owner Association, 2 members of municipal governing bodies to study the subject of mobile homes, travel trailers, mobile home parks and travel trailer facilities; requires a report to the Governor and 1964 Legislature—A. J. R. 20—240, 301, 358, 362, 382, 530, 531, 575, 873, 874, 897.

Creates a 3-member commission, 1 Senate, 1 Assemblyman and 1 appointed by the Governor to investigate the feasibility of acquiring land at the expense of the State to be turned over to the Federal Government for the establishment and maintenance of a national cemetery in the southern part of New Jersey—A. J. R. 30—1053, 1075, 1076.

Creates a 4-member bipartisan legislative commission, 2 Senate, 2 Assembly, to represent the Legislature in matters relating to proposals for improvement, problems and complaints arising in connection with the operation of facilities by intra- and interstate commissions and authorities—A. C. R. 3—103.

Creates an 8-member commission, 2 Senate and 2 citizens appointed by the President of the Senate, 2 Assemblymen and 2 citizens appointed by the Speaker of the General Assembly to study the advisability of State regulation of fees charged by employment agencies—A. C. R. 7—104.

Creates a 6-member bipartisan commission, 3 Senate, 3 Assembly to study and recommend legislation relating to the education of brain-injured children—A. C. R. 11—104, 107, 142, 211, 215, 409, 501.

Creates an 8-member bipartisan commission, 2 Senators and 1 public member appointed by the Senate President, 2 Assembly and 1 public member appointed by the Assembly Speaker, the chairman of the South Jersey Port Commission, and the Executive Director of the Delaware River Port Authority, to study the practicability of consolidating the South Jersey Port Commission and the Delaware River Port Authority—A. C. R. 16—167, 241.

Creates a 6-member commission, 3 to be appointed by President of the Senate, 1 to be a Senator, 2 from the State at large, 3 to be appointed by the Speaker of the General Assembly, 1 an Assemblyman, 2 from the State at large to study the regulations of campaign expenditures by candidates for office—A. C. R. 20—168, 242.

Proposes an amendment to Article IV, Section 1, paragraph 3 of the Constitution to provide that the Legislature shall meet in two annual sessions and that any matter pending and undetermined in the first session shall be continued into, and may be acted upon, in the second session, each House to organize for each session—A. C. R. 21—168, 242.

Creates a 6-member bipartisan commission, 3 Senate, 3 Assembly to study the release procedures available to juveniles under the juvenile and domestic court law; requires a report to the 1963 Legislature—A. C. R. 24—169, 382.

Creates a 6-member bipartisan commission, 3 Senate, 3 Assembly to study the legality and practicability of the dissolution of the Turnpike and Highway Authorities and transfer their functions, power and duties to the Highway Department—A. C. R. 31—199, 669.

Miscellaneous commissions (continued)—

Creates a 6-member bipartisan commission, 3 Senators, 3 Assemblymen to study the intent and purpose of the constitutional and statutory phrase "with the advice and consent of the Senate"; requires a report to the 1963 Legislature—A. C. R. 34—375, 483.

Creates a 6-member bipartisan commission, 3 Senators, 3 Assemblymen, to study the effect of aircraft noises on the teaching environment in schools located in the proximity of airports and to recommend remedial legislation, if necessary to the 1964 Legislature—A. C. R. 51—1103.

Creates a temporary commission of 7 citizens appointed by the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Senate, to study the organization, the services, activities and functions of the Executive, Legislative and Judiciary branches in the interest of the promotion of further economy, efficiency and improvement in the transaction of the public business of the State and the relationship of the members of the 3 branches, ineffective 3 years after enactment; appropriates \$50,000—S. B. 108—297, 354, 532, 534, 538, 578, 579, 580, 988, 989.

Extends from October 1, 1960 until June 1, 1963, the date on which the Riparian Lands and Rights Commission (J. R. 1960, No. 11) has to submit its report—S. J. R. 8—592, 653, 661, 848.

Creates a 9-member bipartisan commission to study meadowland development, 3 appointed by the Governor, 3 by the President of the Senate and 3 by the Speaker of the General Assembly to make a study of the meadowlands of North Jersey for the purpose of developing a long-range comprehensive plan for the reclamation and development of the entire meadowlands area—S. J. R. 13—937, 938.

Reconstitutes and continues with the same members the Legislative Commission created under Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 2, 1960, Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 2, 1962, to investigate the administration and rate structure of the Hospital Service Plan of New Jersey—S. C. R. 2—127, 128.

Reconstitutes and continues the commission created by Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 25, 1957, reconstituted by Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 3, 1958, Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 4, 1959, Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 16, 1960, Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 3, 1962, to study ways and means to eliminate taxation on earnings of New Jersey residents who work in the other States—S. C. R. 4—127, 129.

Creates a 6-member bipartisan commission, 3 Senators, 3 Assemblymen, to consider the advisability of placing the administration of the New Jersey Turnpike and the Garden State Parkway under the control of the State Highway Commissioner—S. C. R. 10—479, 481.

Mortgages—

Requires the post-office address of any individual mortgage and the location of the principal office of any partnership, association or corporation named as mortgagee on any mortgage, offered for recording; effective 30 days after enactment—A. B. 160—98, 483, 487, 585, 742.

Provides that every chattel mortgage included in a mortgage of franchise and real estate shall be valid against the creditors of the mortgagor instead of the mortgagee—A. B. 699—667, 706, 710, 893, 1121.

Requires a mortgagor to be notified by the mortgagee in writing, not less than 5 days prior to the date fixed for closing of the mortgage loan transacted, that a title insurance policy is to be issued—A. B. 758—916, 966.

Mortgages (continued)—

Creates a 9-member bipartisan committee, 2 Assemblymen, 2 Senators, 5 citizens appointed by the Governor, 1 a real estate broker, 1 a member of the Mortgage Bankers Association, 1 a representative of the Savings and Loan League, 1 a member of the Bankers' Association to study practices involving the changing of excessive fees, discounts or other things of value for making or obtaining a mortgage loan or loans upon real estate, requires a report no later than the first week in February, 1964—A. J. R. 24—668, 707, 711, 843.

Provides that it shall be unlawful for any person to demand from any person, in connection with any agreement for the sale of one- or two-family dwelling house, any sum of money or valuable thing, for the making or obtaining a mortgage loan; effective on the sixtieth day after enactment—S. B. 171—540, 542.

Morven—

Directs a study of the expansion of "Morven" by acquiring property in the borough of Princeton and used by Miss Fine's School—A. J. R. 18—167.

Mosquito control—

Appropriates \$100,000 to supplement the State budget for the fiscal year 1962-63 for research in connection with mosquito control and mosquito experimentation within the State and \$1,000,000 to State aid to counties for mosquito control and extermination, none of such funds to be available for expenditure unless matched by Federal grants in aid for the said purpose—A. B. 52—73, 177, 301.

Provides that the freeholders shall include in the tax levy the amount of money approved for mosquito extermination commission, by the director, but in no year shall the amount raised exceed one mill on every dollar of assessed valuation regardless of the amount of assessed valuation—A. B. 388—198.

Motor fuels—

Revises certain administrative provisions of the Motor Fuel Tax Law—A. B. 295—109, 140, 143, 172, 188, 944.

Prohibits cash discounts or the use of trading stamps by a person selling motor fuels—A. B. 303—160.

Prohibits any motor fuel retail dealer to give any customer any rebate, concession, allowance, discount for cash or timely payment, or benefit of any kind or nature whatsoever, including property, merchandise, coupon, trading stamps or device; effective 30 days after enactment—A. B. 669—609, 614.

Motor vehicles—

Reduces from 90 to 30 days the time after which the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles shall sell seized vehicles at public sale; reduces from 2 weeks to 1 week the number of required times the notice of such sale must appear in the newspapers—A. B. 32—70, 174, 532, 534, 562.

Requires all passenger cars or commercial motor vehicles weighing less than 5,000 pounds to carry emergency warning devices for display to warn traffic of disabled vehicles on the highway—A. B. 37—71, 175.

Motor vehicles (continued)—

Provides that a person convicted of operating a motor vehicle while his ability to drive is impaired by alcohol between 10% and 15% weight in his blood shall lose his license for 6 months; if content is over 15% for 1 year; not applicable if he was convicted as a drunken driver for the same offense; prohibits the taking of a chemical analysis forcibly and against physical resistance by the defendant, provides for "implied consent"—A. B. 46—53, 55, 81, 220, 225, 249.

Increases the penalty for operating a motor vehicle while on the revoked list, from not less than \$100 to \$200 nor more than \$500, to \$1,000 or imprisonment in the county jail for not more than 90 days to 6 months—A. B. 72—76, 140, 145, 251.

Permits any person the right to demand a hearing prior to having his driver's license suspended or revoked by the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles; permits the defendant to have witnesses appear on his behalf provided he deposits with the commission the amount of the fees to be paid the witness—A. B. 84—79, 178.

Requires an implied warranty on the part of the seller, on any motor vehicle manufactured outside of the United States sold in this State, unless accepted in writing by the buyer, that the motor vehicle is constructed and equipped as required by law—A. B. 99—86.

Provides that a driver of any motor vehicle who is knowingly involved in an accident resulting in injury or death to a person and who fails to stop the vehicle at the scene of the accident is guilty of a high misdemeanor and shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$100, or more than \$5,000, or by imprisonment for not more than 5 years, or both—A. B. 105—87, 174, 787, 791.

Provides that a hit-and-run driver knowingly involved in an accident resulting in injury or death shall be fined not less than \$100 nor more than \$500 or be imprisoned for a period of not less than 30 days or more than 6 months or both, for the first offense and fined not less than \$500 or more than \$1,000 or be imprisoned for a period not less than 6 months or more than 1 year or both for a subsequent offense—A. B. 110—88, 787, 791.

Enables the Motor Vehicle Director to issue special registration plates, bearing the amateur radio call letters, to an applicant who holds an unrevoked and unexpired amateur radio license issued by the FCC; effective July 1, 1963—A. B. 115—89, 552.

Requires the drivers license to indicate the type of vehicle the licensee is authorized to drive—A. B. 133—92.

Permits a new motor vehicle title and registration to be granted to the survivor, when the original title was registered in the names of two individuals who are husband and wife, without the necessity of a short certificate, surrogate's affidavit or other evidence of administration—A. B. 162—98, 179, 483, 487, 622, 875, 1112, 1113.

Exempts from payment of registration fee for motor vehicles by any authority created by one or more counties or municipalities—A. B. 166—99, 597, 599, 614, 705, 709.

Permits a municipality to retain 50% of all fines and penalties collected for traffic violations occurring on any facilities of the New Jersey Highway, Turnpike, Port of New York or Delaware River Port Authority, and to forward the remaining 50% to the Director of Motor Vehicles; effective 30 days after enactment—A. B. 169—117, 241, 301.

Motor vehicles (continued)—

Provides for the service of process in cases where the person involved in a motor vehicle accident in this State is a resident at the time of the accident but thereafter changes his residence without giving the required notice—A. B. 195—121.

Provides that a judgment under the Motor Vehicle Security Responsibility Law shall be forwarded to the Director of Motor Vehicles at the request of the judgment creditor or his attorney—A. B. 280—157, 227, 230, 341.

Requires a special permit issued by the Director of Motor Vehicles for a house type trailer, exceeding the maximum limits, to be in the possession of the operator of the vehicle for which the permit was issued; safety equipment shall not be included in the dimensional limitations—A. B. 285—158, 223, 226, 241, 288, 551, 771, 772, 773, 774, 1004.

Provides for the service of a motor vehicle process on a former resident of the State—A. B. 307—161, 227, 229, 289, 876, 1042, 1043.

Authorizes the appointment of a special administrator to receive service of process in an automobile accident case where a resident of this State was involved in the accident and thereafter ceased to be a resident and then died—A. B. 311—161, 227, 229, 417, 807, 1042, 1043, 1044.

Provides that certain trailers or semi-trailers, registered as a separate class to move articles of an unusual size or weight, may under limited conditions and with proper restrictions, also be registered and used for normal commercial transportation; increases registration fee from \$150 to \$240, prescribes types of cargoes which may be transported under special registrations—A. B. 373—364, 482, 484, 529, 530, 566.

Requires "New Jersey Tercentenary 1664-1964" be imprinted upon any passenger car license plate issued for any period during the year 1964—A. B. 436—240.

Permits a member of a recognized volunteer fire company to display on a motor vehicle owned by him and registered in his name a fire or police identification light; prescribes size and color and when they may be used—A. B. 472—369, 446, 447.

Authorizes the Director of the Division of Motor Vehicles to issue a special vehicle identification card to chauffeur driven or parent driven motor vehicles while being used for the transportation of amputees under the age of 17 years—A. B. 494—374, 430, 432, 475.

Provides that every motor vehicle driver license issued to a person under the age of 21 on the date of issuance shall be of a distinct color different from other drivers license, provides for replacement of special license by regular license upon holder attaining 21 years of age—A. B. 524—379, 531, 536, 583, 584, 614, 635, 945.

Requires the driver of a vehicle carrying gas, oil and other flammable mixtures parked for the purpose of unloading to place suitable blocks under the wheels to prevent it from moving—A. B. 526—379.

Permits the Director of the Division of Motor Vehicles or any magistrate in suspending or revoking a driver's license, in cases of hardship, to permit such person to use the license during certain hours or between certain points—A. B. 534—439, 551.

Provides for annual issuance of passenger automobile license plates—A. B. 536—439, 502.

Motor vehicles (continued)—

Provides for the disposition of motor vehicles removed from the highway, at the request or direction of a police officer, and placed on public or private lands—A. B. 552—442.

Requires every motor vehicle to be equipped with an outside rear view mirror on the drivers side; effective July 1, 1964—A. B. 557—442, 502.

Requires every motor vehicle having a rear window to be equipped with at least one device for cleaning rain, snow or other moisture from the rear window; effective July 1, 1964—A. B. 558—442.

Requires every motor vehicle to be equipped with a flare or other type of distress light which can be placed at the rear of the vehicle as a warning if the vehicle is stopped while on the highway for an emergency; effective July 1, 1964—A. B. 559—443, 502.

Provides that it shall be a good defense at a hearing to have a drivers license revoked due to a driving violation in another State, that at the time of apprehension for the violation, the driver wasn't notified that a report would be made to the Division of Motor Vehicles—A. B. 563—545, 788, 791.

Defines "farmer" for the purpose of issuance of a farmer license plate as any person engaged in the commercial, raising, growing and producing of farm products on a farm not less than 3 acres in area and who does not engage in the business of buying livestock or fur products for resale—A. B. 568—443, 502, 551, 706, 711, 836, 996.

Prescribes the required lights that vehicles in the State must be equipped with; effective on the 181st day after enactment—A. B. 574—444.

Requires every person engaged or employed to drive school buses to undergo periodic medical examination to determine his mental and physical condition to safely operate such vehicle—A. B. 575—444, 788, 792, 836, 878.

Prohibits as a disorderly person to groove motor vehicle tires either for his own use or for resale or for any owner of such tires; effective 90 days after enactment—A. B. 598—545, 597, 599, 755.

Permits any trailer or semi-trailer belonging to a nonresident registered under the laws of another State to transport interstate or foreign freight to one or more points in this State, provided such trailer or semi-trailer is operating in combination with a tractor registered in the State—A. B. 599—545.

Increases miscellaneous motor vehicle fees, not including registration or drivers license fees; effective July 1, 1963—A. B. 607—492, 747, 749, 750, 760, 914.

Permits a person whose driving privileges has been suspended and who is unable to obtain auto liability coverage anywhere, including under the assigned risk plan, to secure such coverage to meet the requirement by filing proof of financial responsibility as a condition to restoration—A. B. 615—664, 705, 709, 800, 801, 837.

Provides for an interstate compact in regard to driver licenses, between the State and other States; effective January 1, 1964—A. B. 616—664, 705, 709, 764.

Changes from March 31 to May 31 the expiration date of annual motor vehicle registration for all vehicles other than passenger automobiles; effective January 1, 1964—A. B. 646—608.

Motor vehicles (continued)—

Enables the Motor Vehicle Director to issue special registration plates for an additional fee of \$10, bearing the amateur radio call letters, to an applicant who holds an unrevoked and unexpired amateur radio license issued by the FCC; effective July 1, 1963—A. B. 647—547, 735, 879.

Provides that any person who drives a vehicle knowingly while on the suspended list, and who causes the death of another as a result, is a disorderly person; but provides that no record of a judgment or conviction hereunder shall be admissible in a civil action for damages arising out of the accident—A. B. 653—548.

Provides that no fee shall be charged for the registration of motor vehicles owned by a Young Men's Christian Association—A. B. 659—548.

Reduces from 90 to 30 days the time after which the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles shall sell seized vehicles at public sale; reduces from 2 weeks to 1 week the number of required times the notice of such sale must appear in the newspapers—A. B. 672—610, 648, 657, 695.

Prohibits the Director of Motor Vehicles from revoking the drivers license of a person who shall have been acquitted of charges brought in connection with the operation of a motor vehicle—A. B. 707—727, 788, 791, 915.

Provides for an interstate compact in regard to vehicle equipment safety, creates a Vehicle Equipment Safety Commission—A. B. 724—728, 788, 791, 820, 879.

Requires the driver of a vehicle approaching, or overtaking a summer day camp bus, which has stopped for the purpose of receiving or discharging any child, to stop until the child has entered or been discharged from the bus—A. B. 777—1101.

Subjects any driver fleeing from a police order to stop to a fine of not more than \$1,000, or imprisonment for a term of not more than 6 months, or both, in the discretion of the magistrate, and revocation of driver license for a period of not more than 90 days—A. B. 779—1101.

Creates a special bipartisan 4-member General Assembly committee to investigate the motor vehicle inspection stations in Bergen County—A. R. 5—667, 705.

Creates an 8-member commission, 2 Senate, 2 Assembly, the State Police Superintendent and Motor Vehicle Director, 2 to be appointed from the membership of the State League of Municipalities by the President thereof, to study the practicability of requiring that all motor vehicles using the State highways be equipped with speed limiting governors—A. J. R. 6—100, 879.

Creates an 8-member bipartisan legislative commission, 4 Senate, 4 Assembly, to study the advisability of continuance of the motor vehicle inspection program and the practicability of substituting facilities of private enterprise for the present State-operated system—A. C. R. 38—497.

Creates a 6-member bipartisan special joint legislative committee, 3 Senators, 3 Assemblymen to investigate the operation and administration, under regulations of the Division of Motor Vehicles, of the point system of disciplining traffic law violators—A. C. R. 45—611, 648, 665, 669.

Amends the law governing commercial motor vehicle gross weights—S. B. 64—234, 236, 359, 361, 641, 1087, 1088, 1089, 1090.

Increases the penalty for operating a motor vehicle while on the revoked list, from not less than \$100 to \$200 nor more than \$500, to \$1,000 or imprisonment in the county jail for not more than 90 days to 6 months—S. B. 65—396.

Motor vehicles (continued)—

Provides that no registered farm tractor vehicle shall be operated on a public highway at any time from sunset to sunrise, every such vehicle when operated, on a public highway shall have means adequate to control the movement of and to stop and hold such vehicle on any up or down grade—S. B. 204—591, 592, 654, 662, 905.

Permits vehicular angle parking in any town, with certain restrictions, with or without approval of the Director of Motor Vehicles—S. B. 240—724, 725, 870, 871.

Exempts trailers or a semitrailer drawn by another vehicle, used for commercial purposes from having to have a specified name plate affixed—S. B. 241—719, 720, 870, 871.

Permits municipalities and counties to fix and determine exceptions to the general State-wide speed limits fixed by law, as to local streets and roads under their respective jurisdictions without approval of the Director of Motor Vehicles—S. B. 274—992, 993.

Municipalities—

Authorizes municipalities, by ordinance, to provide for rent control, applicable only to multiple housing structures of 3 or more units, for a period of not more than 3 years—A. B. 2—63, 105, 382.

Permits municipalities to lease estates over State highways for development by private interests, permits lease to provide for payment in lieu of real estate taxes—A. B. 7—64, 140, 142, 187, 409.

Authorizes municipalities to provide for the continuance of public utility services (P. L. 48:2-13) during emergencies caused by their discontinuance for nonpayment of charges by other than those requiring and using such services, and where the lack of same would threaten persons, property and the public health and safety; authorizes expenditures for such purposes, and the requiring of reimbursement for same—A. B. 14—65.

Requires State compensate municipalities for loss of tax revenue from lands held by State supported colleges and universities; prescribes procedures—A. B. 73—77.

Authorizes any municipality to make a voluntary contribution of not more than \$3,000 to any duly incorporated Police Athletic League—A. B. 82—78, 179, 429, 431, 452.

Provides that the mayor of every municipality shall appoint, with the approval of the municipal governing body a municipal disaster control director for a term of 3 years—A. B. 95—85, 228, 231.

Permits the governing body of a municipality at which a ferry operating on interstate commerce regularly takes on and discharges passengers to create a committee to aid the continuance of the ferries and to appropriate funds for the purpose—A. B. 103—86, 139, 145, 184, 499.

Authorizes municipalities to lease real estate to any nonprofit youth organization, which has been incorporated for 25 or more years—A. B. 107—87, 429, 430, 453.

Permits any municipality, by ordinance, not to tax inventories, farm live stock, crops and produce, as referred to in R. S. 54:4-11, inoperative until the provisions of Chapter 51 of the Laws of 1960 became operative—A. B. 109—87, 106, 501.

Municipalities (continued)—

Provides for the reimbursement by the State to municipalities of the cost for furnishing public assistance; permits local assistance boards to file liens against the person and his estate—A. B. 142—94.

Permits certain second-class cities to pay salaries to members of the municipal excise commission—A. B. 149—95, 140, 143, 280.

Permits members of municipal boards of adjustment to receive annual salaries of not more than \$500 to be fixed by ordinance—A. B. 150—95.

Permits the board of commissioners of any five districts to lease to the township, at a nominal rental, space in any building owned by the five districts—A. B. 155—96, 482, 485, 674.

Permits any county or municipality to create a 7-member industrial commission—A. B. 159—97, 174, 224, 225, 226, 445.

Provides that $\frac{2}{3}$ of all the members of a 3-member municipal governing board or body or $\frac{3}{4}$ of a 4-member board, may pass a resolution—A. B. 185—120, 358, 362, 414, 717, 718, 869, 886.

Increases from \$1,000 to \$2,000 the maximum annual compensation a member of a township committee who is paid on a per diem basis may receive—A. B. 189—120.

Provides that the annual salaries of the members of the municipal council, governed by municipal manager law, situated in a first-class county and having less than 5,000 inhabitants shall be not less than \$300 or more than \$1,000 and in every municipality not situated in a first-class county having less than 5,000 inhabitants not less than \$150 nor more than \$500—A. B. 214—125, 531, 536, 623, 915, 1044.

Permits the mayors of municipalities, with more than 100,000 inhabitants having a "Mayor-Council Plan C" government to appoint certain confidential personnel and aides, in the unclassified service of the civil service, to serve at his pleasure—A. B. 238—149, 227, 230, 276, 1000.

Permits any 2 or more municipalities by written agreement to join in providing recreational lands and facilities—A. B. 255—152, 705, 709, 826.

Authorizes municipalities to inspect and close public buildings found to be hazardous to life and property by reason of danger of fire or explosion—A. B. 279—157, 598, 601.

Provides that the municipal governing body may appoint any person instead of the chief of police, to control and license dogs and kennels—A. B. 289—159, 261, 262, 342, 733, 818.

Prohibits occupancy of any building in any municipality that is incomplete and on which construction has been unduly interrupted or abandoned—A. B. 362—193, 274, 301, 648, 657, 826.

Requires municipal attorneys to prosecute any matter in the municipal court, when so requested by the magistrate, except where an attorney has been especially appointed for that purpose—A. B. 398—237.

Permits a municipal magistrate to deduct costs and fees from forfeited bail—A. B. 400—237, 270, 271, 347.

Requires all employees of municipal courts who handle funds in addition to the magistrate and clerk, to be bonded; permits coverage under a blanket bond; authorizes the local government board to make special bond requirements when deemed necessary; effective January 1, 1964—A. B. 402—238, 291, 293, 350.

Municipalities (continued)—

Permits an employee of any first class city having a population in excess of 400,000 inhabitants to purchase prior service credit in the cities employees retirement system, for time served in the armed forces—A. B. 408—264, 531, 536, 551, 628, 807.

Redefines "open spaces" which a municipality is authorized to acquire so as to further conservation and protection of natural resources, areas and historic sites within the State—A. B. 409—265, 429, 431, 467.

Permits a municipality to acquire real property by condemnation and to transfer the property to a housing corporation for use in housing projects—A. B. 412—265, 429, 431, 467.

Permits a municipality to retain a deputy chief of police or fire department until age of 70; applicable to any member who retired after July 1, 1960 or who became eligible or who shall become eligible to retire after said date—A. B. 435—269.

Permits a municipal street cleaning vehicle to be driven or operated along or over the sidewalk of the municipality for the purpose of cleaning said sidewalks—A. B. 448—364.

Provides that any fines and penalties imposed by any municipal court and moneys received as forfeitures of bail in causes within the jurisdiction of the municipal court shall be turned over to the custodian or custodians of the funds of the municipality or municipalities, unless otherwise provided by law—A. B. 451—365, 429, 431, 446, 517, 912.

Requires a municipal bond ordinance to be posted at least 1 week prior to the date of final consideration, on the bulletin board or other place upon which public notices are customarily posted in the principal municipal building of the municipality and that additional copies be made available—A. B. 501—375, 597, 598, 685, 945.

Authorizes any municipality to acquire lands for future school sites—A. B. 525—379, 552.

Permits a municipality to enter upon lands, wherein the municipality has instituted a condemnation action for the acquisition of a sewer line easement—A. B. 569—443, 552, 597, 600, 631, 647, 687.

Provides that in any city in which the members of the zoning board of adjustment are appointed by the board of public works, the members of the board may receive annual salaries of not more than \$1,500 to be fixed by ordinance—A. B. 572—444, 531, 536, 637.

Permits municipalities, by referendum, to become a corporate city, provides for the officers, government and powers of the cities—A. B. 668—609, 649, 658, 694, 941.

Permits a municipality having between 100,000 and 250,000 inhabitants governed under Mayor-Council Plan C of the Optional Municipal Charter Law (P. L. 1950, c. 210) to appoint a person who is receiving a pension as the director of a department—A. B. 677—605, 644, 701, 819.

Municipalities (continued)—

Permits a municipality having more than 100,000 inhabitants and governed under the Optional Municipal Charter Law (P. L. 1950, c. 210) to appoint as director of a department a person who is receiving a pension—A. B. 678—605, 644, 701, 819.

Permits municipalities to sell surplus, obsolete personal property, without advertising for competitive bids, to a volunteer fire company or a volunteer first aid squad—A. B. 692—665.

Increases from \$12,000 to \$18,000 the amount that a municipality may appropriate annually to aid a local volunteer fire company; effective January 1, 1964—A. B. 706—726, 819, 866, 869.

Permits any municipality to make a voluntary contribution of not more than \$3,000 to any nonprofit corporation which operates a Senior Citizen Center—A. B. 708—727, 829, 878.

Amends the "Municipal Planning Act (1953)," requires an applicant for any major subdivision for residential purposes to construct an adequate number of school rooms and set aside a minimum of 7% of the total land area for recreation purposes—A. B. 709—727.

Permits a municipality to pay an accidentally injured employee, arising out of and in the course of his employment, full salary during the time he is unable to perform his duties, and in event that a workmen's compensation award, for said injury, is made in favor of such person and against such municipality, the municipality shall be entitled to set off the amount so paid by way of salary—A. B. 725—809.

Authorizes any municipality to waive, release or modify any covenants conditions or limitations as to erection of buildings or any other use to be made of land imposed in sales and conveyances made prior to May 1, 1963, instead of March 1, 1959—A. B. 726—780, 781, 954, 955.

Permits a member of a city employees' retirement system to purchase prior service credit for full-time service in the employ of the board of education of the city which preceded his employment by the city—A. B. 735—811, 866, 868.

Permits a municipal street cleaning vehicle to be driven or operated along or over the sidewalk of the municipality for purpose of cleaning said sidewalk—S. B. 18—395, 488, 489, 521.

Permits any municipality to create a local industrial commission—S. B. 67—298, 300, 355, 795, 796.

Increases the limitation, from 10% to 15% of the assessed valuation of municipal real property, that a municipality may authorize for the issuance of bonds for a Sanitary Sewer Authority—S. B. 144—404, 405, 488, 524.

Provides that in any town in which the town clerk, collector of taxes and assessors have been appointed by the mayor and council, they shall continue to be so appointed notwithstanding the taking effect of the 1960 census—S. B. 158—479, 480, 526, 527.

Permits municipalities to provide sick leave of absence with pay for members of the beach patrol who are seasonal employees if they have been employed as such for a period of not less than 10 years—S. B. 212—479, 480.

Permits municipalities on tidal water bays, as well as ocean front, to lease, rent or hire public resort places and buildings; permits such lease to extend up to 25 years where the lessee is required to make substantial improvements—S. B. 227—541, 543, 796, 797, 972.

Municipalities (continued)—

Permits a municipality to cause the removal and reinterment of the bodies of indigents buried in municipal lands, which lands have not been used for that purpose for 20 years, to a more suitable place; permits such lands, if not needed for municipal purpose, to be sold—S. B. 246—804, 806, 807, 858.

National Guard—

Permits the Chief of Staff, by regulations, to prescribe the enlistment terms of the National Guard—A. B. 300—111, 140, 145, 213, 551.

Requires the State to pay New Jersey Army and Air National Guard technicians, whether or not paid in whole or in part from Federal funds, such portion of their salary or compensation as will equal any pay loss while on active service with the Army or Air Force—A. B. 502—376, 820.

New Jersey Home for Soldiers—

Permits disabled airmen and certain "Gold Star" mothers to be admitted to the New Jersey Home for Soldiers in Vineland; changes State resident requirement from 10 to 2 years—A. B. 197—122, 228, 231, 510.

Provides that any person admitted to residence in the New Jersey Home for Disabled Soldiers shall be referred to as a member of the home—A. B. 369—195, 653, 660, 668, 744, 819.

Provides that any property deposited by an inmate of a soldier's home and unclaimed at the death of the inmate, dying intestate, shall be deemed to be the property of the home, such property shall be held in trust for 3 years following the death of the depositor—A. B. 670—610, 790, 794, 880.

New Jersey Reformatory for Males—

Provides that the New Jersey Reformatory for Males shall include existing reformatories near Bordentown and Annandale and all new or additional institutions, provides that any male person between the ages of 15 instead of 16 and 30 years who has been convicted of a crime punishable by imprisonment in the State Prison, who has not previously been sentenced to a State Prison, may be committed to the reformatory—S. B. 235—804, 806, 867, 871, 977.

New Jersey Tercentenary—

Memorializes Congress to authorize and direct the Postmaster General to issue a special series of postage stamps in commemoration of the founding of the State of New Jersey—A. C. R. 13—105, 140, 175, 176, 177, 352, 498.

Nursing—

Reduces the age for professional nurse candidates from 20 to 18 years, increases the fees for professional and practical nursing examinations and registrations; effective July 1, 1963—A. B. 737—812, 867, 894.

Nursing homes—

Amends the nursing home licensing law—A. B. 288—158.

Amends the act requiring the licensing and regulating of private nursing homes—A. B. 498—374, 669, 706, 710, 801, 829, 879.

Proposes extensive changes in the rules, regulations and standards required in licensing of boarding and rest homes—A. B. 499—375, 669, 704, 705, 828, 879.

O

Obscenity—

Prohibits as disorderly conduct the exposing for view in any showcase or on any newsstand, visible to the public any book or magazine portraying the commission of a crime, having a cover containing an illustration of an immoral or indecent nature, or of persons indecently attired; effective July 1, 1964—A. B. 23—67, 174, 175, 382, 790, 794.

Permits a person, firm or corporation sought to be restrained under chapter 166, P. L. 1962, to demand a trial by jury; authorizes jury determination of issue of obscenity—A. B. 61—75, 140, 143, 185.

P

Paroles—

Permits the State Parole Board to consider an inmate for release or parole without requiring a personal appearance, where the inmate is physically unable to appear—A. B. 269—155, 291, 292, 340, 807.

Pensions—

Requires pension benefits from any retirement system to which the State has made contributions be paid semimonthly; effective July 1, 1964—A. B. 102—116.

Increases from \$1,200 to \$2,500 the annual pension that shall be paid to the dependents of a volunteer fireman who died as the result of injuries sustained in the performance of duty—A. B. 209—124, 381, 513, 945.

Provides that the calculation of service years in public employment to determine qualification for veterans' pension right shall include all service, whether full or part time, or with or without compensation, unless the service was rendered as a member of a subordinate board or body having non-governmental or advisory functions; these provisions to be retroactive, and any annulment of prior retirements for such reasons to be rescinded, with compensatory payment of such annulment period—A. B. 394—263.

Provides pension protection for certain library personnel in cities of the first class having a population of less than 300,000—A. B. 395—263.

Creates a 10-member bipartisan Public Pension System Study Commission, 2 Senate, 2 Assembly, 6 citizens appointed by the Governor, 2 of whom shall be nominees of the State League of Municipalities, to study the laws of the State and rules and regulations adopted pursuant thereto, governing the establishment and operation of the several pension systems for public

Requires every municipal probationary policeman to attend an approved police training course; effective July 1, 1963—A. B. 121—90, 140, 145, 177, 185.

Permits fire department vehicles returning to station from an emergency call to display a flashing red light, visible for 500 feet to the rear; prohibits any vehicle, other than official, to follow closer than 200 feet—A. B. 191—121, 260, 262, 273, 315.

Provides that policemen or firemen may apply for an accident disability retirement allowance if the disability was met in the performance of duty, not in an accident met in actual performance of duty within 5 years preceding such accident—A. B. 267—155.

Provides that a policemen or firemen accidental death benefit shall be paid if the death was met in performance of duty not if such death was an accident met in actual performance of duty, within 5 years preceding the date of such death—A. B. 268—155.

Port of New York Authority—

Printing—

Requires printing paid for with State funds be printed within the State and bears "union label" unless printer meets specified requirements; prescribes \$50 fine for violation—A. B. 231—143, 790, 794.

Creates a 6-member commission, 2 Senators, 2 Assemblymen, 1 employing printer and 1 employee of the printing trade to be appointed jointly by the Speaker of the General Assembly and the President of the Senate, to study the State Government's operation of printing plants, reproduction and duplicating units—A. Private detectives—

Repeals the law which permits the incorporation of private detective associations which may appoint "pursuers"—A. B. 675—605.

Permits a retired county, municipal or school employee to continue to be a member of the group insurance plan—A. B. 379—197, 597, 599, 887, 925.

Permits all elective county, municipal and school district officers to be eligible for membership in any group insurance plans, under the same terms as the other employees—A. B. 427—268, 531, 536, 566.

Requires that public employees be given leave of absence, with pay, to attend State or national conventions of the 78th Division Veterans Association—A. B. 441—269.

Grants tenure to any salaried person in the employ of the State, a county, municipality or school district, or any agency thereof, whose term of office is not fixed by law and who had a son or daughter killed in action in military service—A. B. 445—270, 787, 791, 888.

Entitles all civil service employees in the State service to administrative leave of absence for 5 days per calendar year for personal business, including religious observance, not to be charged against any other leave or overtime credit, shall not be taken in conjunction with vacation leave; effective July 1, 1963—A. B. 466—367, 597, 598.

Permits the State to make payroll deductions with the consent of the employee for payment to a credit union of the employees—A. B. 467—368, 597, 598, 684.

Entitles all civil service employees in county or municipal service to administrative leave of absence for 5 days per calendar year for personal business, including religious observance, not to be charged against any other leave or overtime credit, but not to be taken in conjunction with vacation leave; effective July 1, 1963—A. B. 468—368, 597, 598.

Establishes the procedure by which a public or school employee may organize an employee organization to negotiate agreements covering all the employees in the unit—A. B. 510—437.

Enables active members of the several State administration retirement systems to make voluntary additional contributions to provide annuities to supplement their retirement allowance provided by the systems—A. B. 529—380, 502, 551, 596, 597, 598, 636, 945.

Entitles all public employees to 5 days per calendar year of administrative leave of absence for personal business including religious observances—A. B. 560—443.

Changes from January 1, 1921 to January 1, 1922 as the date a person shall have been employed by the State, prior to the enactment of the State Employees' Retirement System, to be eligible to retire due to a disability—A. B. 604—663, 688, 998.

Provides that any public or school employee veteran member in office on January 2, 1955, who remains in service and who has or shall have been for 40 years in the aggregate in office, shall have the privilege of retiring and of receiving a retirement allowance of $\frac{3}{4}$ of the compensation received during the last year of employment—A. B. 666—609, 788, 792.

Public employees (continued)—

Provides that any person employed in the Executive Branch of the State Government, who is in the classified service of the civil service and who shall be appointed to any position under the Law Revision and Legislative Services Commission, shall hold the position with the same civil service rights as he had in the Executive Branch—A. B. 671—610, 649, 659, 694, 911.

Authorizes the payment of death benefits to certain State employees and retired State employees—A. B. 701—667, 789, 793, 807, 917, 1007.

Permits a leave of absence for a public employee to attend hearings, meetings, sessions and conferences of a qualified public employee organization of the State, composed solely of members holding office, position or employment under the State, if such organization is a chartered affiliate of such State-wide organization; such leave of absence not to exceed one working day in any one month—A. B. 763—1007.

Permits by action of the Civil Service Commission for State employees in the classified service continuously and who is on sick leave, and has retirement age to be retired and receive a lump sum for unused sick leave not exceeding 130 days; effective July 1, 1963—S. B. 33—645, 834, 859, 871, 899.

Provides a procedure whereby counties, municipalities, school districts and other public agencies, authorities and commissions may elect to participate in a health benefit program and provide coverage for their employees and their dependents—S. B. 46—540, 542, 602, 603, 640.

Requires that public employees be given leave of absence with pay to attend State or National conventions of the Army and Air National Guard Association of New Jersey, the National Guard Association of the United States, Ladies Auxiliaries of Veterans of Foreign Wars, Veterans of World War I, American Gold Star Mothers—S. B. 102—295, 296, 357, 430, 432, 583, 626, 860, 861.

Public Employees' Retirement System—

Provides that no reduction under the "Public Employees' Retirement-Social Security Integration Act," P. L. 1954, c. 84, shall be made in the case of any member born after January 1, 1880 and before January 1, 1887 who was a member of the Legislature for at least 3 years, served as a county prosecutor for at least 5 years and as a county court judge for at least 7 years—A. B. 152—96.

Permits any public employee veteran member who prior to enrollment as a member had either public or military service or both types of such service to purchase retirement prior service credit for the number of years equal to the time he was in public or military service—A. B. 211—125, 228, 232, 274, 284, 732, 1045.

Establishes in the Public Employees' Retirement System a reserve fund to which profits and earnings of the system's investment would be credited—A. B. 354—192, 261, 263, 345, 945.

Repeals section 59, integration of the Public Employees' Retirement System, P. L. 1954, c. 84, pertaining to Social Security offset—A. B. 368—195.

Grants a certain percentage of Social Security offsets in the Public Employees' Retirement System, based on the years of service a member had prior to 1955—A. B. 374—196.

Public Employees Retirement System (continued)—

Amends the "Public Employees' Retirement-Social Security Integration Act" (P. L. 1954, c. 84) to specify eligibility requirements for additional death benefit coverage—A. B. 418—267.

Permits a member of the Public Employees' Retirement System to purchase additional death benefit coverage—A. B. 443—255, 382, 429, 431, 468, 803.

Permits any county employee to purchase credit in the Public Employees' Retirement Fund for prior employment in the service of a county or municipality as the case may be—A. B. 471—368, 482, 485, 567, 997.

Amends the definition of "veteran" under the Public Employees' Retirement System (P. L. 1954, c. 84), to include any holder of a Haitian Campaign Badge or Medal—A. B. 537—439, 598, 601.

Provides that where an employee is a member of the Public Employees' Retirement System (P. L. 1954, c. 84), and is also a member of another retirement system, the amount of the Social Security contribution to be deducted shall be computed on the basis of the proportion that the member's compensation subject to this retirement system bears to the member's total compensation subject to such systems—A. B. 580—490, 531, 536, 569, 942.

Provides for the payment of interest on the contributions of a member of the Public Employees' Retirement System who withdraws, if he has only 3 instead of 5 years membership credit; clarifies the status of a member who retires on a reduced allowance prior to reaching the normal retirement age of 60, but who subsequently, re-enters public employment—A. B. 585—491, 531, 534, 570.

Provides for a deferred retirement allowance after 15 years instead of 20 years of service for a member of the Public Employees' Retirement System—A. B. 586—492, 531, 535, 571.

Provides that any person becoming a permanent employee of the State after January 2, 1955 and every veteran other than those whose appointments are temporary or seasonal becoming an employee of the State after January 2, 1955 shall become members of the Public Employees' Retirement System; provides that membership shall cease if he shall discontinue his service for more than 2 consecutive years—A. B. 587—492, 531, 535, 571.

Provides that loans to members from the Public Employees' Retirement System shall be on the basis of a calendar year instead of a fiscal year, provides for inclusion of interest in the return of a member's contribution in the case of accidental death of a member—A. B. 588—493, 531, 535, 572.

Amends the "Public Employees' Retirement-Social Security Intergation Act" (c. 84, P. L. 1954) to provide that a single account shall be established in the annuity savings fund for each member, provides that interest at the rate of 4% per annum shall be paid by each employer if payment of contributions is not made within 30 days after July 1—A. B. 618—664, 706, 710, 765.

Permits a member of the former State Employees' Retirement System who has withdrawn his accumulated deductions prior to January 1, 1955, and is now an employee of the State to become a member of the Employees' Retirement System—A. B. 695—666.

Provides that a member of the "Public Employees' Retirement-Social Security Integration System" (P. L. 1954, c. 84) who was at least 62 years old at time of retirement shall not be subject to social security reduction—A. B. 696—666.

Public Employees Retirement System (continued)—

Creates a 13-member joint legislative commission, 5 Senators, 5 Assemblymen and 3 citizens to be appointed jointly by the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the General Assembly to study the operation of the Public Employees' Retirement System and report its findings and recommendations to the Legislature—A. C. R. 29—198.

Permits employees of the Delaware River Basin Commission to enroll in the Public Employees' Retirement System—S. B. 31—433, 434, 488, 521.

Permits any member of the Retirement System of the State penal institutions who prior to November 1, 1945, was a holder of an office, position or employment in the State service, under temporary service, to purchase prior service credits in the retirement system for the years of the temporary service, the State shall not be liable for any payment to the system—S. B. 137—586, 587, 654, 661, 851.

Provides for the creation, management and operation of a county employees' pension system for county employees who have participated for at least 10 years in the Public Employees' Retirement System (P. L. 1954, c. 84)—S. B. 141—539, 855, 908.

Permits any county employee, employed for at least 10 years, to withdraw from the Public Employees' Retirement System—S. B. 145—539, 855, 908.

Permits veteran employees, who are members of the Public Employees' Retirement-Social Security Integration Act, to purchase prior Federal public service credits at their own cost—S. B. 223—591, 592, 869, 872, 906.

Amends the Public Employees' Retirement-Social Security Integration Act to provide that veteran township magistrates in specified categories shall not be affected by the reduction applicable to persons earning additional social security coverage under section 59 of the act—S. B. 280—993, 995.

Public records—

Requires all public agencies' records to be available for examination by any State citizen, except if the publication of such records would be contrary to the public interest; permits a citizen to bring an action in lieu of prerogative writ where inspection has been denied—A. B. 43—72.

Requires all public agencies' records to be available for examination by any State citizen, except if the publication of such records would be contrary to the public interest; permits a citizen to bring an action in lieu of prerogative writ where inspection has been denied; authorizes a charge of 50¢ per page or 40¢ per page for 10 or more copies of any records—A. B. 344—171, 227, 228, 253, 254, 353, 428, 445, 447, 450, 733, 775, 776, 777, 778, 779, 909.

Authorizes the return of fingerprints and photographs of certain persons acquitted or cleared of charges made against them—A. B. 734—811, 866, 869, 933, 1003.

Requires all public agencies' records to be available for examination by any State citizen, except if the publication of such records would be contrary to the public interest; permits a citizen to bring an action in lieu of prerogative writ where inspection has been denied; establishes fees of 50¢ per page or 40¢ per page for 10 or more copies—S. B. 96—589, 591.

Requires all instruments and papers, permitted by law, to be photostated when the board of freeholders has adopted a method of copying documents—S. B. 126—589, 591, 870, 872.

Permits records held in a custodial or fiduciary capacity to be recorded, copied or reproduced by photographic reproduction; permits the original to be destroyed—S. B. 273—935.

Public utilities—

Requires public utilities to file with the Board of Public Utility Commissioners the specifications and a map of any proposed gas pipeline to carry over 125 pounds pressure per square inch, and to notify each municipality through which same will pass of such filings, at least 30 days prior to its construction—A. B. 81—108, 173, 260, 262, 309, 717, 794, 929.

Repeals the public utilities antistrike law—A. B. 89—80.

Requires the Board of Public Utility Commissioners, in the making of an order permitting the abandonment or cessation of specified railroads services, to include a provision safeguarding against adverse effects upon interest of the employees of the railroad involved; specifies limits upon period of operation of such an order—A. B. 215—125.

The Board of Public Utilities Commission shall allocate the public's share of changing, reconstructing, relocating or modifying of protective devices or the constructing of any bridge pursuant to an order of the board—A. B. 266—155, 173, 261, 263, 416, 732.

Imposes a surtax on telephone and telegraph companies of 0.875% of such proportion of the gross receipts for the preceding calendar year as the length of the lines or mains in the State bears to the whole length of its lines or mains in the State, in case the gross receipts of any public utility for any calendar year shall not exceed \$50,000 the tax shall be computed at the rate of 0.35%; imposes a tax of 7/10 of 1% upon the gross receipts for the preceding calendar year from its business over, on, in, through or from its lines or mains in the State; effective July 1, 1963—A. B. 605—492, 746, 748, 749, 758, 950, 951.

Imposes a surtax on public utilities, except telephone companies of 0.875% of such proportion of the gross receipts for the preceding calendar year as the length of the lines or mains in the State bear to the whole length of its lines or mains in the State, in case the gross receipts of any public utility for any calendar year shall not exceed \$50,000 the tax shall be computed at the rate of 0.35%; imposes a tax of 1.3125% upon the gross receipts for the preceding year from its business over, on, in, through or from its lines or mains in the State; effective July 1, 1963—A. B. 606—492, 746, 747, 748, 750, 759, 951, 952.

Designated the "Public Movers Act," provides that the Board of Public Utility Commissioners shall regulate public movers of household goods and special commodities, provides for the issuing of certificates to public movers; appropriates \$90,000 to meet the cost of administration and enforcement until June 30, 1964; effective January 1, 1964, the commission may postpone the effective date but not beyond April 1, 1964—A. B. 654—608, 615, 849, 850, 891.

Enables certain electric public utilities corporations to develop hydro-electric power—S. B. 242—719, 720, 795, 796, 857.

R

Racing—

Requires every permit holder conducting horse races to keep a separate record of the total amount of money collected from the sale of tickets and admissions, provides for payment to counties and municipalities a percentage of the admission taxes collected—A. B. 1—63, 222, 223, 226, 411.

Authorizes off-track horse betting; provides for the specific kind, restricts and control; provides for submission on referendum at the next general election succeeding the forty-fifth day following the date of enactment—A. B. 328—69, 174.

Racing (continued)—

Reduces the maximum number of licensed harness racing tracks from 4 to 1—A. B. 134—93.

Increases from 50 to 80 days the total number of racing days that a permit holder may request for horse or harness racing—A. B. 509—437.

Permits the Racing Commission to allot a certain existing permit holder up to 6 additional racing days for running races, increases from 13% to 14% the amount that each permit holder shall deduct from the betting pool; increases the percentage of the betting pool that shall be paid to the State—A. B. 609—494, 747, 749, 751, 761, 912.

Provides that all audits of race tracks filed with the Director of the Division of Taxation and the Racing Commission shall constitute public records which shall be available for inspection in the offices where filed—A. B. 736—811, 925.

Creates a special 4-member bipartisan General Assembly investigating committee to examine the experience of operation of the 1962 extension of horse race meetings in the State and to ascertain whether the expenses charged against the pari-mutuel pools were authorized pursuant to law and rules of the Racing Commission—A. R. 6—723, 734, 769.

Creates a special 4-member bipartisan General Assembly Committee to determine the feasibility and advisability of the State holding and conducting horse race meetings now conducted by permit holders and whether additional revenue would accrue to the State—A. R. 8—1006.

Railroads—

Abolishes free railroad passes for State officers and employees—A. B. 106—87.

Requires railroad companies to equip track motor cars with an electric headlight and red rear light, each visible 300 feet, and with a windshield, windshield wiper and top cover—A. B. 194—121, 786, 787, 791.

Requires railroad companies to equip all diesel locomotive cabs with exhaust fans for ventilation; prescribes \$100 fine; effective 6 months after enactment—A. B. 216—126, 430, 432, 887.

Prescribes the required construction and equipment of railroad cabooses—A. B. 233—143.

Requires every railroad company to maintain a crossing watchman at every grade crossing which is not guarded by manually operated crossing gates, unless dispensed with by order of the Public Utility Commissioners—A. B. 253—152.

Provides that the railroad companies shall pay 15% and the Public Utilities Commission shall pay 85% of the entire expense of constructing any bridge over or under a railroad—A. B. 262—154, 173, 260, 261, 339, 732.

Requires every railroad company to maintain a crossing watchman at every grade crossing which is not guarded by manually operated crossing gates, unless dispensed with by order of the Public Utility Commissioners—A. B. 264—154.

Prohibits transportation within this State in a passenger train of any explosives or flammable liquid freight, or of tank cars in which flammable liquids have been carried, unless purged, except when transported in conformity to ICC regulations; permits the placing of freight cars on the rear of passenger trains—A. B. 286—158.

Railroads (continued)—

Prescribes standards of competence and minimum crews for operation of locomotives and trains—A. B. 413—265.

Extends the Hudson and Manhattan Railroad line to Bayonne; effective when identical legislation is enacted in the State of New York—A. B. 650—547.

Memorializes Congress to study the merger of railroads and to take action necessary to postpone approval of any further mergers pending the outcome of such study—A. C. R. 39—497, 531, 576, 808.

Permits the State Comptroller to release property of a railroad corporation, used for railroad purposes, from a lien under the Railroad Tax Law of 1948—S. B. 99—295, 296, 357, 430, 432, 577.

Exempts the value of improvements to passenger facilities made by a railroad under chapter 101, P. L. 1962, after January 1, 1963, from the operation of the Railroad Tax Law of 1948—S. B. 266—975, 976.

Real estate—

Designated the "Real Estate Syndication Offering Law" to regulate the public offering or sale of real estate securities; effective January 1, 1964—A. B. 545—441, 603, 614, 636, 1097.

Defines "Real Estate Securities" as any stocks, bonds, notes or evidence of interest or evidence of indebtedness, including co-operative interests and limited partnership interests given or issued as participation interests or investments, on real estate or in mortgage or leases of real estate, as defined and included in the Real Estate Syndication Offering Law—A. B. 660—548, 647, 656, 668.

Real estate brokers—

Requires a \$50 filing fee with any request to the Real Estate Commission for permission for a real estate broker to engage in sales in the State of a promotional nature of property located outside of the State; prohibits, as a misdemeanor any real estate broker or employee from distributing any false statements concerning any property, prescribes a fine of not more than \$2,500 or imprisonment for not less than 2 years, or more than 3 years, or both—A. B. 683—611, 647, 656, 663, 674, 696, 1098.

Establishes a revised schedule of fees for real estate brokers, agents and licenses—A. B. 684—611, 647, 656, 674, 696.

Requires any individual applying for a real estate salesman or broker's license to give evidence of satisfactory completion of certain courses of education in real estate subject; effective 180 days after enactment—A. B. 219—106, 126, 228, 231, 241, 285.

Provides that the \$10 fee required with an application for a real estate broker's or salesman's license shall not be refundable—A. B. 223—146, 228, 231, 286.

Refuse collection—

Creates a Division of Refuse Collection and Disposal Control in the Department of Health, to regulate and license the business of collecting and disposing of refuse; appropriates \$50,000 for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of this act—A. B. 74—77.

Refuse collection (continued)—

Creates a Division of Refuse Control in the Department of Health to regulate and license the collection and disposal of solid waste; appropriates \$50,000 for administering this act until June 30, 1964—A. B. 621—495, 784, 846, 847, 878, 965.

Authorizes counties having a population between 750,000 to 900,000 to create a county refuse collection and disposal authority to acquire, finance and operate refuse collection and disposal systems—A. B. 628—809, 866, 867.

Religious holidays—

Authorizes any teacher of the Jewish faith leave of absence, without loss of pay, for 2 days in each year for the observance of Rosh Hashana and Yom Kippur—A. B. 423—267, 446.

Authorizes all public employees of the Jewish faith leave of absence without loss of pay for 2 days in each year for the observance of Rosh Hashana and Yom Kippur—A. B. 424—267, 446.

Revision of Statutes—

Revises various unrelated statutes by making technical amendments—A. B. 690—665, 706, 709, 766, 998.

S

Salaries—

Provides that the jury commissioner's salary of a fifth-class county, having a population in excess of 200,000 shall be \$750 per year—A. B. 60—74, 140, 143, 182, 550, 815, 824, 825.

Prohibits the reduction of municipal salaries in municipalities having a population over 80,000 in third- and fifth-class counties, in second-class counties having a population of less than 230,000, below the level established by referendum; provides that the salaries may be increased without referendum if a period of 2 years shall have elapsed between the last referendum; retroactive to January 1, 1963—A. B. 71—76, 256, 257, 308.

Establishes \$3,800 as the minimum annual salary of any school district janitor; effective July 1, 1963—A. B. 274—156.

Establishes the limits of the compensation of certain freeholders—A. B. 519—437, 552.

Increases from \$18,000 to \$20,000 the annual salary of a county district judge; effective July 1, 1963—A. B. 747—813, 878, 1062, 1063, 1071.

Eliminates the \$5,500 maximum annual salary for clerks to the grand juries in counties of the second and fifth classes having more than 25,000 inhabitants—S. B. 49—722, 723, 795, 796, 899.

Increases from \$20,000 to \$22,000 the annual salary of a County Court judge; effective July 1, 1963—S. B. 232—701, 702, 703, 757.

Provides for a survey to be made by an independent organization or group, to be selected by the Governor, to make a comparison of the salaries of representative jobs in State Government against similar jobs in private industry and Federal Government in the State; requires report by September 1, 1963; appropriates \$10,000 to such survey—S. J. R. 10—539, 540.

Securities—

Designated as the "Uniform Securities Law"; regulates and defines the practice of dealing in securities; specifies and prohibits fraudulent practices and prescribes criminal penalties and civil liabilities for violations; requires the registration of broker-dealers, agents and investment advisers and prescribes fees therefor; creates a Bureau of Securities within the Department of Law and Public Safety; repeals R. S. 49:1, the New Jersey Securities Law—A. B. 135—93.

Requires and regulates the registration of securities offered for sale or sold in the State; appropriates \$25,000 for administering the act until June 30, 1964; effective January 1, 1964—A. B. 565—489.

Sentences—

Provides that any person convicted of murder in the first degree where the jury recommends life imprisonment shall be imprisoned for life, without eligibility for suspension, reduction or remission thereof, or for probation or parole, until at least 20 years of said term shall have been served—A. B. 130—116, 735.

Sisters of Charity of Saint Elizabeth—

Guarantees the payment of indebtedness by any corporation incorporated by the Sisters of Charity of Saint Elizabeth for the purpose of maintaining a hospital, college or academy—S. B. 123—403, 404, 602, 604, 902.

Social security—

Memorializes Congress to take such action as may be necessary to provide for a substantial increase in the amount which may be earned by social security beneficiaries—S. C. R. 12—171, 172.

State agencies—

Requires the Secretary of State to have published, within 30 days of its filing, every rule of every State agency in a newspaper of State-wide circulation; effective 6 months after enactment—A. B. 705—726.

Creates a 6-member commission, 2 Senate, 2 Assembly, 2 citizens appointed by the Governor to study and recommend methods to improve the administrative procedures of State agencies and to prepare a State Administrative Procedure Act; requires report by January 1, 1964—A. J. R. 26—814.

State aid—

Requires the State to pay each municipality or sewerage authority an annual amount not to exceed 20% of the amount expended to meet required amortization and carrying charges on the obligations incurred in connection with the construction of the sewage or garbage disposal facilities; effective July 1, 1963—A. B. 16—66.

Requires State aid to municipalities for assistance of needy persons to be given irrespective of whether need arises from unemployment or loss of income due to a labor dispute—A. B. 234—148.

Increases from \$7,000,000 to \$18,000,000 the State aid for county roads and bridges—A. B. 273—156, 301.

Increases from \$7,000,000 to \$18,000,000 the State aid for county roads and bridges—A. B. 520—438.

State Government—

Provides for a continuous investigation of the efficiency and economy in the operations of State Government—A. B. 756—1005.

State House Commission—

Provides that the State House Commission shall be increased by the addition of 3 members each from the Senate and General Assembly, appointed on a bipartisan basis, to serve co-extensively with their terms as members of their respective houses—S. B. 192—434, 435, 488, 733, 734, 804, 805, 870, 872, 1063, 1064, 1076, 1077.

Provides that no contract shall be entered into on behalf of the State for any work to be financed from the proceeds of the sale of State obligated bonds without the approval of two-thirds of the membership of the State House Commission—S. B. 294—990.

State lands—

Permits the Governor to accept on behalf of the State the retrocession of all or part of the jurisdiction in and over lands heretofore or hereafter acquired by or ceded to the Federal Government—A. B. 612—547, 648, 657, 688, 1000.

Vests title in Jonathan Dwight Stern and Joseph Hoyt Stern of an undivided one-half interest in certain lands and premises whereof Daniel M. Stern died seized, which interest is alleged to have escheated to the State—A. B. 636—549, 648, 657, 689, 1099.

Authorizes the sale of certain State lands in the Township of Marlboro, Monmouth County, to the Old Brick Reformed Church of Marlboro Township—A. B. 762—1006.

Vests in Helen Smith, widow, the title of an interest in real estate of which Elizabeth Smith died seized and which is alleged to have escheated to the State—A. B. 768—1095, 1096.

Requires the Director of the Division of Purchase and Property to prepare a master list of all property, both real and personal, owned by the State, on or before July 1, 1964, and on or before July 1 in each year thereafter—S. B. 279—989.

State Police—

Repeals the State Police Retirement and Benevolent Fund, establishes the State Police Retirement System; effective July 1, 1963—A. B. 723—728, 847, 848.

State song—

Designates the State song as "I'm From New Jersey," composed by Red Mascara—A. B. 290—159, 648, 657.

Sunday observance—

Prohibits as a disorderly person the conducting of business on Sunday, except preparation and sale of drugs, meals, prepared food, perishable agricultural and horticultural products and nonalcoholic beverages—A. B. 91—80.

Sunday observance (continued)—

Prohibits the selling on Sunday at retail of groceries, fresh and frozen meat, poultry and fish, and fresh fruit and vegetables except dairy products, eggs, baked goods and meat, poultry and fish other than fresh or frozen and bulk prepared foods which are not prepackaged, fresh fruit and vegetables by farmers markets or roadside stands, hotels and restaurants, stores that close on Saturday instead of Sunday; violators shall be a disorderly person; effective 30 days after enactment—A. B. 204—123.

Surplus funds—

Authorizes the investment of surplus funds by counties, municipalities and school districts—A. B. 766—1007.

T

Tall Cedars of Lebanon—

Designates the week of March 16 through 23, 1963, as National Tall Cedars of Lebanon Week to promote muscular dystrophy research—S. C. R. 9—137, 216.

Taxation—

Provides for a tax revision convention, subject to State referendum, to convene on January 15, 1964; prescribes the method for appointment of delegates; appropriates \$150,000—A. B. 63—75.

Proposes a State referendum on November 5, 1963 to determine whether a tax revision convention of 81 delegates elected by counties shall be held, to meet on May 4, 1964 to agree upon and prepare a revised tax system for the State by September 12, 1964, for submission to the 1964 Legislature; provides for a special election on April 21, 1964; appropriates \$275,000 to be purposes of the act—A. B. 94—84.

Designated the "Sales and Use Tax Act," imposes a 3% tax on retail sales, storage and use of tangible personal property, and on the sales of services within the State; provides for the licensing of retailers; prescribes the method for collections; appropriates \$1,000,000; effective January 1, 1964—A. B. 104—86, 382.

Provides that inheritance tax shall be paid upon the transfer of property, real or personal, valued at more than \$500—A. B. 140—94.

Changes the effective date of P. L. 1960, c. 51 regarding personal property taxes from January 1, 1964 to January 1, 1965—A. B. 173—118, 173, 300.

Increases from \$5,000 to \$25,000 the tax exemption limitation on any parsonage and lot the same is erected on, together with the accessory buildings located on the same premises—A. B. 183—119, 227, 228, 283, 1001.

Permits the use of standard unaccelerated depreciation valuation prepared for use in reports required for Federal income tax purposes to be used in determining the fair value of tangible personal property used in business—A. B. 272—190, 219, 275, 733.

Requires a tax assessor evaluating real property to take into consideration the selling value, the rental value, any unusual features as to size, location; in the case of improved property, the cost, replacement cost less depreciation, and to make such determination according to his judgment by October next preceding the date the assessor is required to complete his assessments; effective October 1, 1963—A. B. 350—99, 175.

Taxation (continued)—

Deletes the \$25,000 limit on tax exemption for parsonages—A. B. 442—269, 483, 486, 682.

Repeals all of c. 51, P. L. 1960, personal property tax, except the section which authorizes the governing body of a municipality to determine not to tax tangible household personal property and personal effects—A. B. 483—372.

Increases the corporation business franchise tax from 1¼% to 5% of net income, but not less than an amount computed under existing sections—A. B. 513—378.

Provides that when and if a 3% selective State sales tax is enacted, \$30,000,000 of the net revenues thereof shall be set aside and made available as State aid to counties and municipalities for road purposes—A. B. 514—378.

Provides that when and if a 3% selective State sales tax is enacted, \$25,000,000 of the net revenues thereof shall be set aside annually for current operating expenses and capital improvements of higher learning institutions, 49% thereof for Rutgers University, and 51% for other enumerated schools; effective July 1, 1963—A. B. 515—378.

Exempts business inventories from taxation under c. 51, P. L. 1960; provides that the fair value of machinery and equipment, tools dies and jigs used in business shall be presumed to be ½ the original cost to the taxpayer—A. B. 516—378.

Imposes a 2% tax on retail sales, storage and use of tangible personal property and on the sales of services within the State, subject to referendum to be submitted at the next general election; dedicates the revenues to public education; provides for the licensing of retailers, prescribes the method of collection and penalties for violation; appropriates \$1,000,000; effective 90 days after referendum approval—A. B. 533—438.

Increases from 3% to 5% the municipal franchise tax on all omnibus operations in the State—A. B. 541—440.

Permits the use of standard unaccelerated depreciation valuation prepared for use in reports required for Federal income tax purposes to be used in determining the fair value of tangible personal property used in business; provides that aggregate equalized valuation of machinery, implements and equipment and all other personal property, other than inventories, farm machinery, farm live stock, crops and produce, shall be computed by multiplying the aggregate fair value by 25%—A. B. 591—493.

Designated the "Motor Carriers Road Tax Act of 1963," imposes a road tax equal to the rate per gallon of the motor vehicle fuel tax currently in effect on all motor carriers, except resident motor carriers, provides for the administration, appropriates \$350,000 to carry out the provisions of the act during the period ending June 30, 1964; effective June 1, 1963—A. B. 620—758, 762, 873, 953.

Increases from 8 to 12 months, after the death of the decedent, that the inheritance tax must be paid—A. B. 642—548, 788, 792.

Requires the municipal governing body of any municipality in which there exists a board of tax assessors to rearrange the terms of office of the members of the board in such a manner that the terms of office of a majority of the members shall never expire at the same time—A. B. 662—546.

Grants an exemption from taxation of the dwellings of widows of police officers and firemen killed in the performance of duty—A. B. 710—727, 866, 867, 879, 880, 893.

Taxation (continued)—

Creates a 9-member bipartisan Tax Exempt Property Study Commission, 3 citizens appointed by the Governor, 3 Senators and 3 Assemblymen, to study the subject of tax exempt real property, including a study of the statutes of the State relating to same, requires report to the present or next Legislature and the Governor—A. J. R. 9—100, 446.

Requests the Commission on State Tax Policy to make a study of the operation of the Constitutional provisions relating to tax exemptions based upon dollars of assessed valuation for the purpose of ascertaining whether such provisions operate to provide uniformity throughout the State; requires report to the 1963 Legislature—A. C. R. 22—169.

Memorializes Congress to amend the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 in order to allow individuals to deduct, for income tax purposes, their actual expenses incurred in traveling to and from work—A. C. R. 27—169, 226, 290, 498.

Memorializes the Congress of the United States to give consideration to pending legislation limiting the use of certain tax exemptions under Federal law in luring industry from one jurisdiction to another—A. C. R. 32—270, 483.

Changes the effective date of P. L. 1960, chapter 51, regarding personal property taxes from January 1, 1964 to January 1, 1965; requires report on the net book value of business machinery and inventories by August 1, 1963, provides that any business having less than \$25,000 worth of machinery and inventory shall submit a simplified form; appropriates \$100,000—S. B. 101—433, 434, 436, 454, 456, 464, 465, 558, 559.

Establishes several rebuttable presumptions relating to appeals taken from tax assessments on the grounds of discriminatory valuation—S. B. 166—724, 725.

Grants a \$50 deduction to any veteran, from the amount of any tax bill for taxes on real or personal property or both; applies to taxes due and payable in the year 1964 and thereafter—S. B. 309—1065, 1066, 1078, 1079.

Grants a \$80 deduction from the taxes assessed against certain real property of citizens and residents of this State of the age of 65 or more years, having an income not in excess of \$5,000 per year; applies to taxes due and payable in the year 1964 and thereafter—S. B. 310—1065, 1066, 1080.

Provides for the review and revision, by tax assessors and county boards of taxation, of their assessment lists for the 1964 tax year and the allowance of such veterans' exemptions as shall be allowed by law—S. B. 311—1065, 1066, 1067, 1081.

Tax Policy Commission—

Directs the Commission on State Tax Policy to complete its study of the railroad tax problem within the framework of the recommendations contained in its tenth report and to make final recommendations thereon; requires report on or before December 1, 1963—S. J. R. 12—702, 703, 860.

Tax sale certificates—

Requires a municipality to refund the excess amount paid for the redemption of property by a holder of a tax sale certificate or by his predecessor in title upon the purchase of the tax sale certificate from the municipality, provided the redemption is made within 5 years from the date of the sale and assignment of the tax sale certificate; effective July 1, 1963—A. B. 165—98, 483, 487, 622, 875, 1050, 1052.

Tax sale certificates (continued)—

Validates final decrees or judgments in proceedings to foreclose certificates of tax sale notwithstanding that the final decree was recorded after the expiration of 20 years from the date of the tax sale, provided the complaint was filed before the expiration of the 20-year period and no proceedings have been instituted or shall, within 30 days after enactment—A. B. 188—120, 483, 487, 564, 875.

Teachers' Pension and Annuity Fund—

Amends the Teachers' Pension and Annuity Fund-Social Security Integration Act of 1955 so as to include, in refunds to veterans, any contributions made in behalf of teacher-veterans by employing boards of education while they were in military service—A. B. 321—163.

Establishes in the Teachers' Pension and Annuity Fund a reserve fund to which profits and earnings of the fund's investments would be credited—A. B. 355—192, 261, 263, 345, 945.

Repeals section 68, integration of the Teachers' Pension and Annuity Fund, P. L. 1955, c. 37, pertaining to social security offset—A. B. 367—194.

Changes the terminal date for World War II veterans' service from September 2, 1945 to December 31, 1946, in the definition of "veteran" as used in the Teachers' Pension and Annuity Fund-Social Security Integration Act (P. L. 1955, c. 37)—A. B. 464—367, 405, 406, 635, 914, 1047, 1048.

Requires the Teachers' Pension and Annuity Fund to refund any contributions made in behalf of teacher-veterans by employing boards of education while they were in military service—A. B. 465—367, 405, 405, 827, 828, 844.

Provides that where an employee is a member of the Teachers' Pension System (P. L. 1955, c. 37), and is also a member of another retirement system, the amount of the social security contribution to be deducted shall be computed on the basis of the proportion that the members' compensation subject to this retirement system bears to the members' total compensation subject to such systems—A. B. 581—490, 531, 536, 569, 942.

Telephones—

Requests the Law Revision and Legislative Services to make a study of the use of telephone for certain unsolicited high-pressure sales efforts; requires a report to the 1954 Legislature—A. C. R. 49—1006.

Tenure—

Grants tenure to any superintendent of public works of any borough in a county of the first or second class who has held the office for a continuous period of not less than 5 years; applicable only to persons in full-time employment—A. B. 420—267, 705, 706, 709.

Permits any municipality, by resolution, to grant tenure to the clerk of the municipal court, who has held such office continuously for 10 or more years—A. B. 422—267.

Grants tenure to any building inspector of a township having a population between 20,000 and 30,000 governed by a commission form of government, who has held such office continuously for 15 or more years—A. B. 681—611, 706, 710.

Grants tenure to the secretary to the board of assessors of any city having a population between 140,000 and 250,000, who has held such office for 4 or more years—A. B. 682—611, 788, 792.

Trading stamps—

Regulates the issuance of trading stamps, provides for the licensing of trading stamp companies; inoperative until January 1, 1964—A. B. 421—239.

Provides that all trading stamps not redeemed within 4 years from December 31 of the year of issuance will be deemed abandoned and unclaimed and shall escheat to the State—A. B. 743—813.

Reconstitutes the special committee created by the Assembly in 1962 to study the use of trading stamps—A. R. 2—54, 55, 250.

Transportation—

Provides that the State shall reimburse the bus companies furnishing reduced student fares, the difference between such reduced student fares and the regular rates of fare—A. B. 359—182, 193, 274.

Trespassing—

Prohibits as a disorderly person any trespass upon the lands or premises, including locomotive, railroad car, of another, without invitation expressed or implied by the owner; effective January 1, 1964—A. B. 308—161, 227, 229, 428, 596, 598, 798.

Tri-State Transportation Commission—

Provides for an interstate compact between the States of New Jersey, New York and Connecticut, creating the Tri-State Transportation Commission, and prescribes the functions, powers and duties; effective upon enactment of similar legislation by the States of New York and Connecticut—A. B. 785—1103.

Turnpike Authority—

Authorizes and directs the New Jersey Turnpike Authority to enter into agreements with municipalities, wherein it acquires lands for its projects, to pay such municipalities fair and reasonable sums to compensate for the loss in tax revenue on such lands—A. B. 9—64, 241.

Appropriates New Jersey Turnpike Authority surplus revenues in an aggregate principal amount not exceeding \$430,000,000 for State aid to education; authorizes the State to guaranty payment of such amount; prescribes methods of repayment if required; creates a separate fund held by the treasurer, to receive and administer the funds as shall be prescribed by law; subject to State referendum at the November, 1963, General Election—A. B. 96—85.

Appropriates New Jersey Turnpike Authority surplus revenues in an aggregate principal amount not exceeding \$10,000,000 per year for State aid for county roads and bridges, authorizes the State to guaranty payment of such amount; prescribes methods of repayment if required; creates a separate fund held by the treasurer, to receive and administer the funds as shall be prescribed by law; subject to State referendum at the November, 1963, General Election—A. B. 120—90.

Appropriates New Jersey Turnpike Authority surplus revenues in an aggregate principal amount not exceeding \$430,000,000 for the use of State grants-in-aid for school building construction; authorizes the State to guarantee payment of such amount; prescribes methods of repayment if required; creates the State School Capital Construction Fund, held by the

Turnpike Authority (continued)—

treasurer as a separate fund, to receive and administer the funds as shall be prescribed by law; subject to State referendum at the November, 1963, General Election—A. B. 315—162.

Grants the Governor veto power over the actions of the Turnpike Authority; provides that surplus funds of the Turnpike Authority shall be used to pay the principal and interest for any bonds issued pursuant to the "New Jersey Public Roads and Highways Bond Act of 1963" and the "New Jersey Public Building Construction Bond Act of 1963"; extends the cessation of turnpike tolls until after the principal and interest of the bonds issued pursuant to the "New Jersey Public Roads and Highways Bond Act of 1963" and the "New Jersey Public Building Construction Act of 1963" have been paid—A. B. 602—544, 561, 910.

Requires the Turnpike Authority to continue to charge tolls for the use of the turnpike and to remit quarterly to the General Treasury all surplus revenues—A. B. 77—1100.

Creates an 8-member commission, 2 Senate, 2 Assembly, 4 at large, to study the practicability of toll reduction and lack of uniformity of toll rates on the New Jersey Turnpike; requires a report to the Legislature—A. J. R. 8—100.

Declares the intent and policy of the Legislature to be that surpluses of the New Jersey Turnpike Authority, exclusive of those needed for the expansion of turnpike facilities, be used solely for the purpose of retiring the outstanding Turnpike Authority bonds—A. C. R. 5—104.

U

Uniform Commercial Code—

Eliminates from the Uniform Commercial Code the requirement of notifying creditors of the seller of bulk transfers, where the relationship arises from personal or private transactions; effective January 1, 1964—A. B. 309—161, 647, 656, 799.

Permits the filing officers under the Uniform Commercial Code to provide an index entitled "Secured Transactions—Fixtures," and index all financing statements covering collateral which are to become fixtures in the index under the name of the record owner set forth in the statement—A. B. 540—440, 866, 869, 889.

Amends the Uniform Commercial Code with respect to presentment procedure and conditional sale contract or a trust receipt transaction—A. B. 733—814, 841, 999.

Provides that under the Uniform Commercial Code "Crops" include oysters on leased, licensed or owned beds—S. B. 201—803, 870, 872, 904.

United States Constitution—

Memorializes Congress to call a convention for the purpose of proposing an amendment to Article V of the Constitution of the United States, regarding methods of amending the Constitution—S. C. R. 7—128, 129, 359, 361, 631, 701, 913.

Memorializes Congress to call a convention for the purpose of proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the United States regarding States rights to reapportion—S. C. R. 8—128, 130, 359, 361, 631, 701, 988.

Urban Renewal—

Designated the "Urban Renewal Law," grants rights and powers to urban renewal agencies to eliminate or prevent the development and spread of deterioration and blight; effective January 1, 1964—A. B. 592—493.

Permits co-operative agreements between municipal housing authorities and redevelopment agencies and the State Highway Commissioner for the equitable sharing of the cost, acquisition and clearance, if any, of property necessary in whole or in part for both highway and blighted or urban redevelopment area purposes—S. B. 119—433, 434, 603, 604, 643.

V

Validating acts—

Validates certain deeds of conveyance of real property between husband and wife—A. B. 207—124.

Validates certain proceedings at meetings or elections of school districts and any bonds or other obligations issued or to be issued pursuant to such proceedings—S. B. 54—137, 138, 216.

Validates school district bond issuance proceedings notwithstanding the fact that the new bond authorization, together with existing authorized amounts, would exceed any limitation prescribed by R. S. 18:5-84, and provided State consent is given—S. B. 71—400, 401, 488, 522.

Authorizes and validates any agreement made under seal by a holder of a testamentary or nontestamentary power of appointment to a present or future exercise or nonexercise of the power of appointment—S. B. 136—586, 587.

Validates certain proceedings at meetings or elections of school districts, and any bonds or other obligations issued or to be issued pursuant to such proceedings—S. B. 203—539, 540, 654, 662, 856.

Validates certain proceedings at meetings or elections of school districts and any bonds or other obligations issued or to be issued pursuant to such proceedings—S. B. 208—477, 509.

Validates certain proceedings at meetings or elections of school districts, and any bonds or other obligations issued or to be issued pursuant to such proceedings—S. B. 269—723, 858, 859.

Veterans—

Provides that tenure shall be granted to disabled veterans notwithstanding that the appointment may have been for a fixed or stated period of time—A. B. 5—64.

Includes World War I service inductees "discharged from draft" within the definition of "veterans" as used in the Public Employees' Retirement-Social Security Integration Act (P. L. 1954, c. 84)—A. B. 50—73, 483, 485.

Provides that when a veteran receives a higher certification than any nonveteran on a civil service examination for promotion, the appointive power shall show cause before appointing a nonveteran over the veteran; effective July 1, 1963—A. B. 147—95.

Provides that a professional librarian's certificate shall be issued to a World War II veteran who has held a professional librarian's office or position since November 1, 1957, provided application is made not later than November 1, 1963—A. B. 323—163, 531, 537, 625.

Veterans (continued)—

Prohibits as a misdemeanor the wearing or using of the insignia of the "40 and 8" society, The Veterans of World War I or the Jewish War Veterans unless entitled to use or wear same under the regulations of the organization—A. B. 356—192, 866, 867.

Extends until July 27, 1953, the cut-off date for commencement of military service during the Korean conflict to qualify for civil service veterans preference—A. B. 357—192, 531, 536, 627, 944.

Changes the terminal date for World War II veterans' service from September 2, 1945 to December 31, 1946, and Korean emergency to include the date between June 23, 1950 and July 27, 1953, as used in the Teachers' Pension and Annuity Fund-Social Security Integration Act (P. L. 1955, c. 37—A. B. 371—195).

Establishes the Veterans Bonus Fund, into which the net proceeds of 4 additional days of horse racing shall be paid, such fund to be used to pay the notes issued to pay a State veterans bonus, if authorized by referendum—A. B. 396—264.

Authorizes veterans bonus payable by notes redeemable by January 1, 1973, provides for \$150,000,000 bond issue, sinking fund and amortization from revenues from 4 extra days of racing; provides maximum grants of \$250 for domestic service and \$450 for mixed domestic and foreign service; requires referendum at general election, November, 1963—A. B. 397—264.

Memorializes the Congress to authorize and provide for the construction and maintenance of a veterans hospital in the southern part of New Jersey—A. J. R. 29—1053, 1073, 1074.

Memorializes Congress to enact pension benefits for certain veterans of World War I—A. C. R. 40—549, 789.

Memorializes Congress to incorporate or charter the Italian-American War Veterans of the United States, Incorporated—S. C. R. 15—724, 725, 979.

Volunteer fire and first aid companies—

Exempts members of volunteer first aid and rescue squads from service on any panel of grand or petit jurors—A. B. 177—119, 273, 291, 292, 413, 446.

Provides liability immunity to members of volunteer fire companies providing emergency public first aid and rescue services or service for the control and extinguishment of fires—A. B. 555—442, 669, 686, 942.

Clarifies workmen's compensation insurance coverage for active volunteer firemen and first aid and rescue squad workers—S. B. 139—478, 479, 713, 715.

W

Wages—

Establishes a minimum wage rate of \$1.25 per hour for the first 40 hours of working time in any week and 1½ times the regular hourly wage thereafter, overtime not applicable to bus drivers; excludes domestic, hotel, restaurant employees, agriculture and processing workers, outside salesmen; provides for the enforcement of the act—A. B. 48—52, 106, 107, 141, 145, 173, 218, 219, 241, 242, 251, 252, 353, 354, 392.

Wages (continued)—

Provides that only one execution against or assignment of wages would be satisfied and paid by an employer at one time and the priority of payment would be governed by the order in which the same are presented to or served upon the employer—A. B. 59—74, 140, 143, 254, 255, 393.

Designated the "New Jersey Prevailing Wage Act," provides that the prevailing wages in the locality be paid on public works contracts, imposes duties of enforcement on the Commissioner of Labor and Industry; effective January 1, 1964—A. B. 76—77, 106, 228, 232, 274.

Prohibits as disorderly conduct the refusal, neglect or failure of an employer to pay wages or remuneration for services other than wages, or to sign an agreement which fails to specify the time of payment; provides penalty—A. B. 80—78, 174, 228, 232, 308.

Permits wage assignments by nonprofit corporations conducting hospitals for the care and treatment of patients, for the payment of the cost of such care and treatment—A. B. 164—98, 867.

Includes hotel employees within provisions relative to minimum wage standards for women and minors—A. B. 347—191.

Provides that no employer shall pay more than 10% of the aggregate on assignments of future wages of an employee on an execution issued against a trust fund or income from property—A. B. 446—256.

Permits 5% of a wage execution to be retained by any person, agent, treasurer or other fiduciary officer for expense and services in payment of the execution, deduction from each payment—A. B. 632—497, 648, 657.

Water policy and supply—

Regulates the diversion of surface waters of the State for domestic, commercial, industrial, agricultural and irrigation uses—A. B. 230—148, 307, 648, 649, 658, 769, 770, 1097.

Permits installation of devices established as safe and effective by experience and technological developments for use in the distribution of public water supplies—A. B. 302—111, 140, 144, 172, 214, 502.

Amends the definition of "Public Water Treatment Plant"—A. B. 745—813, 867, 896.

Water pollution—

Requires all new boats, equipped with marine toilets, manufactured after January 1, 1964, operating upon the waters of the State, be equipped with a sewerage disposal system; effective January 1, 1964—A. B. 361—167, 652, 660, 668, 703, 704, 798, 799, 832.

Prohibits as a disorderly person offense the discharging of certain matter or material into the inland tidal waters of the State or operating a vessel that contains toilet facilities not equipped with an operating chlorinator or other sewerage disposal system meeting the requirements of the State Department of Health; provides that the owner of the vessel shall be responsible for violations on his vessel—A. B. 456—365, 819.

Weapons—

Permits the sheriff of any county or the chief of police of a municipality, when an application for a permit to purchase a firearm is approved by the sheriff, to issue the permit—A. B. 235—149, 242, 382.

Weapons (continued)—

Requires all persons connected with a licensed detective agency, desiring a permit to carry a concealed weapon, to make application to and secure same from the County Court judge—A. B. 495—374, 483, 486, 519.

Requires an application for a permit to carry a firearm to have attached a report of a duly licensed physician on a form to be prescribed by the Superintendent of State Police attesting the applicants qualifications, both mental and physical, to be entrusted with firearms—A. B. 549—441, 597, 600, 1100.

Welfare—

Authorizes the county freeholders to share with the municipalities within their counties the cost of distribution by such municipalities of Federal surplus food commodities to the recipients of old age, disability and blind assistance of the rolls of the county welfare board and to other residents in such municipalities, eligible to receive Federal surplus food commodities—A. B. 239—149.

Provides that no petition for home life assistance shall be approved for a child or mother where it appears that such child is the third, or subsequent, illegitimate child, unless bastardy proceedings have been instituted—A. B. 277—157.

Increases the State's assistance from 50% to 75% of the balance of the Federal assistance to county welfare boards for expenditures for assistance to the disabled—A. B. 522—379, 446, 501, 833.

Permits the director of welfare to pay directly to the landlord any payment for rent due to a recipient of welfare eligible to receive permanent relief in the home—A. B. 530—380.

Directs the Division of Welfare to conduct research studies for the purpose of determining methods to achieve savings in public welfare programs by means of restoring individuals to maximum self-support; appropriates \$25,000 for administration until June 30, 1964—A. B. 751—1005.

Reconstitutes, with the same membership, the commission created by Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 25, 1959, to study the operation of municipal welfare and relief laws—S. C. R. 1—127, 129, 138.

Wills—

Permits a will to be deposited for safekeeping by the testator, or by any person for him, with the surrogate of the county in which the testator resides—A. B. 553—442, 706, 709.

Wiretapping—

Designated the "Eavesdropping and Wire Tapping Law," permits a Superior Court judge to issue an order permitting wiretapping by a county prosecutor, the Attorney General or the Superintendent of State Police where there is reasonable ground to believe that evidence is to be had of the commission of certain crimes; provides that a person found guilty of eavesdropping shall be guilty of a misdemeanor; prohibits as a disorderly person the illegal possession of any device that can be used for eavesdropping or wrongfully attempting to obtain information concerning the location of any telephone or telegraph wires or cables—A. B. 98—86.

Workmen's compensation—

Exempts from unemployment compensation brokers or dealers in the sale of mutual funds or other securities compensated wholly by commission—A. B. 56—74, 223, 226, 248, 499.

Permits an injured employee under Workmen's Compensation Act to select any licensed physician for treatment, without notice to employer; requires employers provide necessary medical care in emergencies and when notified in writing that employee does not desire to select a physician—A. B. 79—78, 174, 228, 232.

Eliminates the 10-day required waiting period with respect to the effective date of an employer's voluntary election to become subject to the Unemployment Compensation Act—A. B. 116—89, 228, 232, 280.

Permits payment of benefits under the Temporary Disability Benefits Law for the first 7 days of disability, if such disability continues uninterrupted for 4 weeks; effective July 1, 1963—A. B. 118—89, 221, 226, 411.

Revises and supplements the Workmen's Compensation Act relative to the Second Injury Fund by increasing its size from \$1,500,000 to \$3,000,000 and providing a new formula for determination of employers' liability for subsequent disabling injuries other than total permanent disability—A. B. 119—90, 140, 145, 186.

Requires the payment of special additional Workmen's Compensation benefits to totally and permanently disabled workers and to dependents where the benefit rate being paid such persons is less than the present rate, and equal to such differences, up to a maximum of \$40, requires same to be paid from the 1% fund—A. B. 122—90.

Changes the maximum weekly Workmen's Compensation benefit rate from \$45 for temporary and \$40 for permanent disability to 50% prior to 1963, 60% in 1963, and $\frac{2}{3}$ in 1964 and thereafter, of the average weekly wages earned by all employees covered by the Unemployment Compensation Law during the month of September preceding the calendar year in which the injury occurred, as determined by the Commissioner of Labor and Industry; increases the minimum from \$10 to \$15; effective July 1, 1963—A. B. 124—91, 174, 228, 232.

Requires all tips received by employees of hotels, restaurants, or catering facilities or services, to be considered as remuneration paid by the employer to the workers for all purposes of the Unemployment Compensation Law; effective July 1, 1963—A. B. 125—91, 358, 362, 412.

Increases value as part of "wages" under Workmen's Compensation Act from \$8 to \$30 weekly gratuities; if no record kept, from \$10 to \$15—A. B. 126—91.

Prohibits discrimination against an employee by his employer, as to his employment, because such employee has asserted rights to workmen's compensation benefits, or because he has testified, or is about to testify, for anyone asserting such benefit rights; prescribes penalties from \$100 to \$1,000—A. B. 127—92, 173, 242.

Amends the Unemployment Compensation Act to provide a scale of benefits equal to $\frac{2}{3}$ of a claimant's average weekly wage, maximum of 60% the first year and 66 $\frac{2}{3}$ % thereafter; repeals the "active search for work" provision, provides an alternate method of establishing eligibility; provides full coverage for employees where employers employ 1 or more, immediate coverage for employers who elect coverage pursuant to a collective bargaining agreement—A. B. 132—189.

Workmen's compensation (continued)—

Defines "accident" in the Workmen's Compensation law to mean an unusual event occurring in the employment environment other than a physical change in the employee—A. B. 200—123.

Provides that a person who voluntarily left work without good cause shall be disqualified to receive Unemployment Compensation benefits until he has earned at least 8 times instead of 4 times his weekly benefit rate—A. B. 202—123.

Provides that gratuities received regularly in the course of employment shall be included in determining an individual's total wages for the purpose of unemployment compensation and temporary disability benefits—A. B. 236—149.

Amends Workmen's Compensation Act to require payment of compensation for wages or earnings lost by a petitioner resulting from his attendance at any hearing held under this act; allows payment of compensation of wages lost by any other employee of respondent-employer whose attendance as a witness is required at such hearing—A. B. 237—149.

Permits a worker who has left work voluntarily to qualify for Unemployment Compensation benefits after earning 4 times his weekly benefit in any employment; limits disqualification because of labor disputes to those caused by strikes, and limits a strike disqualification to 6 weeks—A. B. 246—151, 405, 406.

Provides Unemployment Compensation and Temporary Disability Benefits for nonpermanent and temporary public employees—A. B. 251—152.

Permits an individual called for jury duty and who will not receive his usual or customary wages from his employer while serving to receive unemployment compensation benefits; effective July 1, 1963—A. B. 322—163.

Permits a workmen's compensation claim for death or injury by accident or occupational disease caused by exposure to ionizing radiation from sources inside or outside the body, to be filed within 2 years after the accident or within 2 years after disablement, whichever is later, or in case of a death claim, within 2 years of the date of death—A. B. 338—190, 358, 363, 418.

Provides that under workmen's compensation an amputation at or above the wrist shall be considered equivalent to the loss of the arm, an amputation at or above the ankle shall be considered equivalent to the loss of the leg—A. B. 339—190.

Permits an appeal from an interlocutory judgment, order, determination or action of the director, judge of compensation or referee from the Workmen's Compensation Division to be taken to the County Court only upon leave of that court granted, within such time as the Supreme Court may prescribe—A. B. 405—238.

Permits a claim for death benefits under provisions of section 34:15-51 workmen's compensation to be filed within 2 years after the last payment of compensation or within one after the death of the employee whichever is the longer—A. B. 452—365, 405, 406.

Prevents individuals, who are receiving retirement income from employer-pension plans and or Social Security which exceeds their weekly unemployment compensation benefit, from collecting unemployment compensation, permits individuals to receive the difference between their retirement pay and unemployment compensation when the retirement pay is less—A. B. 453—365.

Workmen's compensation (continued)—

Exempts from unemployment compensation, brokers or dealers or insurance company agents in the sale of mutual funds or other securities compensated wholly on commission bases, employed in the United States, the Virgin Islands and Puerto Rico—A. B. 497—374.

Voids all unemployment compensation and temporary disability benefits checks that have not been presented for payment within six years from the date of issuance—A. B. 613—663, 706, 710, 766.

Amends the Workmen's Compensation law to provide that temporary and total permanent disability benefits be paid at the rate of 66 $\frac{2}{3}$ % of weekly wages with a maximum of 66 $\frac{2}{3}$ % of the annual average weekly wage in covered employment and minimum benefits of \$15 per week, partial permanent disability benefits to be paid at the rate of 66 $\frac{2}{3}$ % of wages with maximum of 50% of the annual average weekly wage covered employment and minimum of \$15 per week; increases the full compensation period for widows from 350 to 450 weeks; increases dependent allowances; establishes an Uninsured Employers' Fund and a Board of Appeals; effective January 1, 1964—A. B. 674—610, 648, 658, 884.

Amends the Workmen's Compensation law by increasing the temporary disability minimum benefits from \$10 to \$15 a week and the maximum benefits from \$45 to \$50; increases the funeral expenses from \$400 to \$500; increases the full widows compensation from 350 to 450 weeks; effective July 1, 1963—A. B. 700—667, 735.

Provides that disability benefits payable pursuant to "Temporary Disability Benefits Law," (P. L. 1948, c. 110), shall be promptly paid through local employment offices; effective July 1, 1963—S. B. 205—645, 646, 795, 796.

Reconstitutes Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 18, 1962, to study the laws of the State and the practices and procedures thereunder pertaining to workmen's compensation—S. C. R. 6—128, 129.

Z

Zoning—

Permits the owner of any land and premises, valued in excess of \$1,000, by execution and recording of a claim to protect his intended use of the land and premises against changes in applicable zoning ordinances—A. B. 198—122, 260, 261.

Permits a municipality, by ordinance to provide for the elimination of nonconforming uses or structures found within a residential zone of the municipality; effective July 1, 1964—A. B. 252—152.

Permits the purchaser of any land and premises, valued in excess of \$1,000, by execution and recording of a claim, to protect his intended use of the land and premises against changes in applicable zoning ordinances—A. B. 661—546, 597, 600.

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
