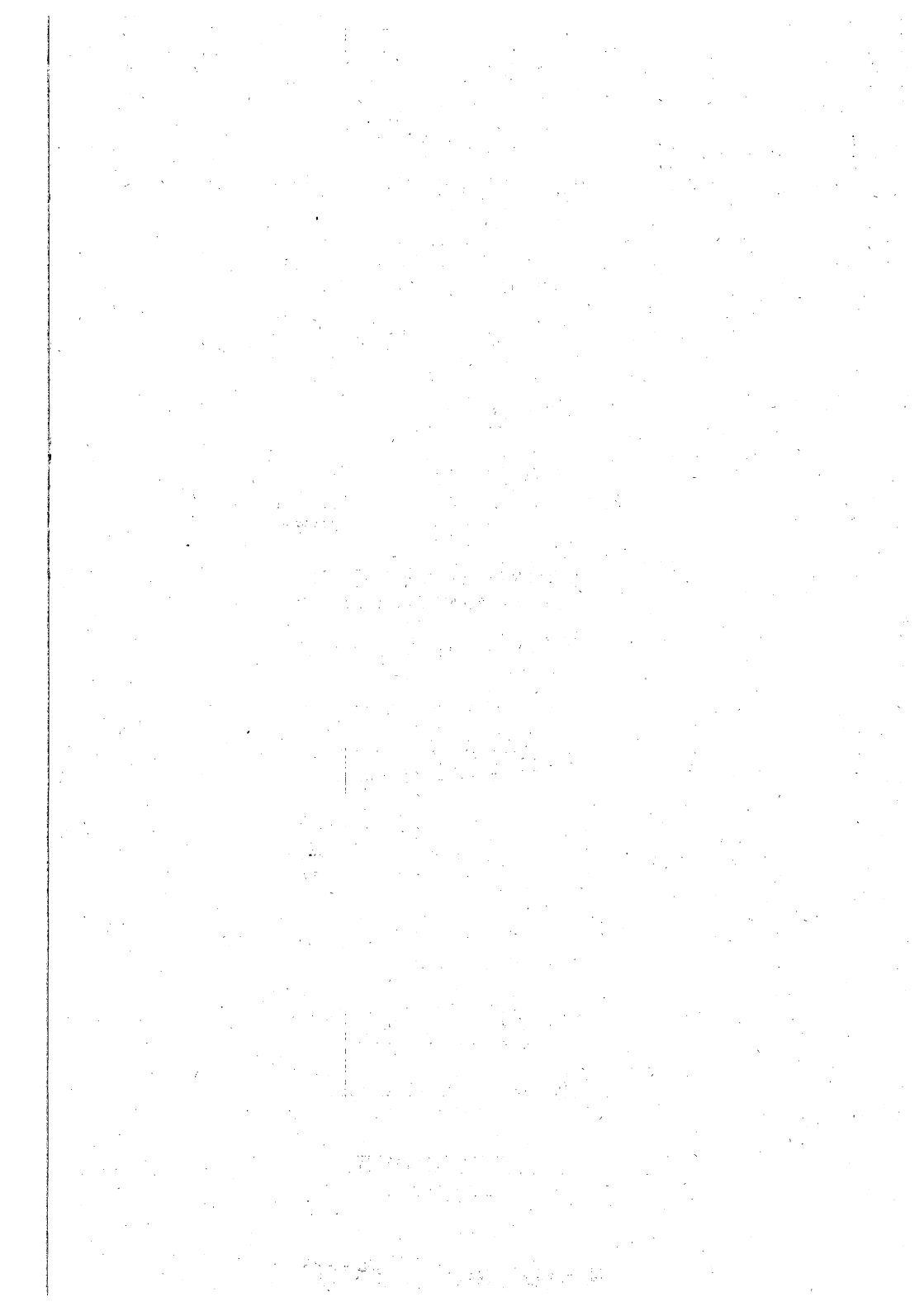

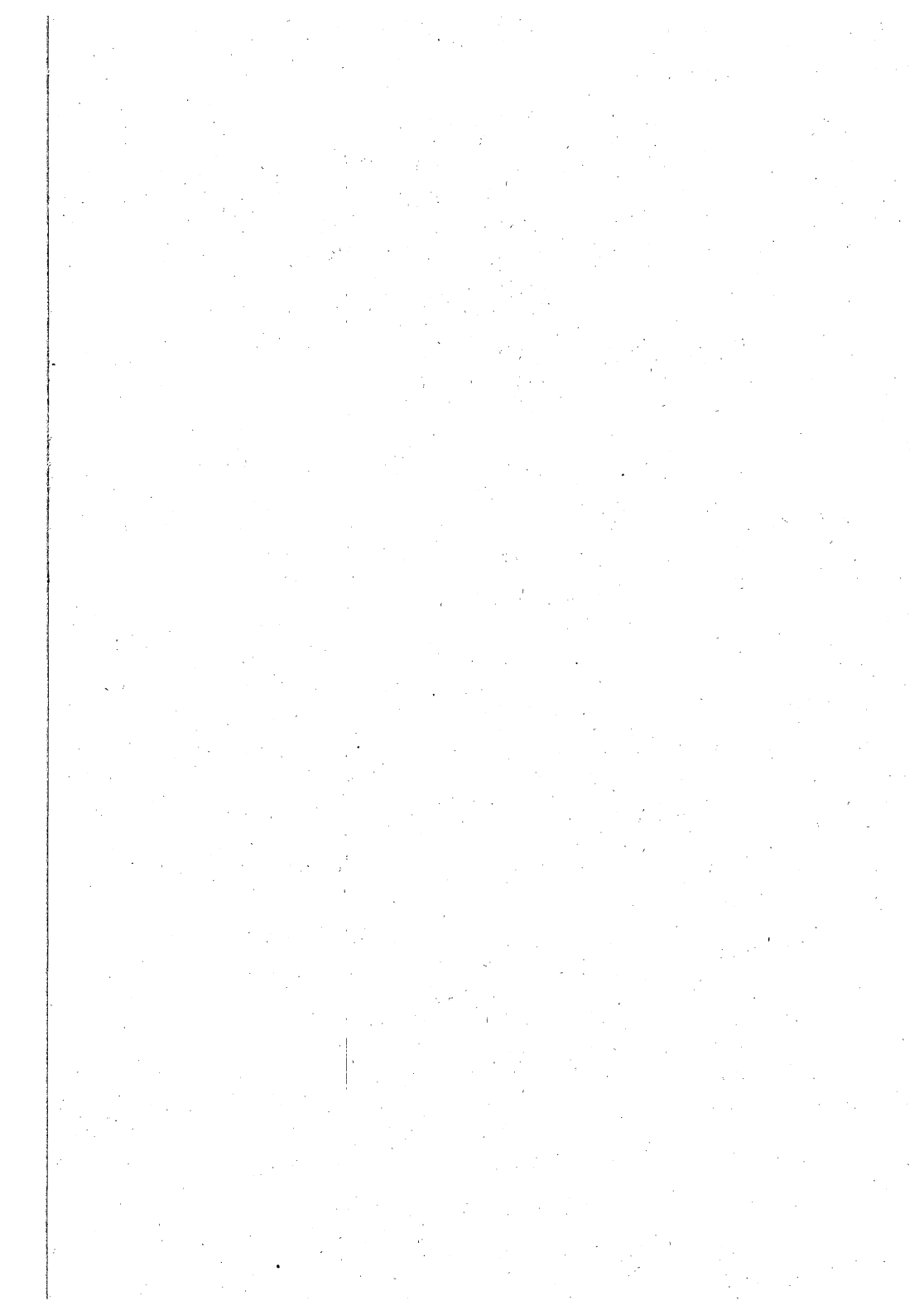

STATE OF NEW JERSEY

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY

TUESDAY, January 9, 1951.

Organization proceedings of the One Hundred and Seventy-fifth Session of the General Assembly of New Jersey, the fourth session under the Constitution adopted by the people in 1947, at noon Tuesday, January 9, 1951.

The Clerk of the House of Assembly, Philip C. Wadsworth, of Bergen County, called the House to order and read the following call:

“This being the second Tuesday of January, the time fixed for the beginning of the legislative year, and by virtue of the authority vested in me as Clerk of the One Hundred and Seventy-fourth Session, the General Assembly of the State of New Jersey is now called to order to effect the organization for the conduct of the business for the One Hundred and Seventy-fifth Session.”

The Clerk introduced the Rev. Everett W. Palmer, pastor of the First Methodist Church of Asbury Park, N. J., who opened the session with prayer.

The National Anthem was sung by Mrs. Elsa Brennecke, accompanied by Mr. J. Arthur Reines.

Thompson, of Monmouth County, as Speaker and of Philip C. Senator Hannold offered the following resolution, which was read by the Clerk and adopted:

Thereupon Senator Littell appointed the following: Senators Hannold and Davis and Assemblymen Cavinato and Neutze.

The Committee escorted Governor Alfred E. Driscoll to the rostrum and, upon being presented by Senator Littell, he delivered his Annual Message as follows:

FOURTH ANNUAL MESSAGE

Mr. President, Mr. Speaker, Members of the Senate and General Assembly:

The 175th session of the Legislature will be meeting during a period of national peril. It will be called upon to assume grave responsibilities. These responsibilities transcend in importance all partisan or personal considerations. This Legislature is fortunate in having fine leadership in both parties.

The critical character of our time has at long last and belatedly been officially recognized by our Federal Government. A state of emergency exists that is without parallel in the history of our country.

By whatever name you call it, armed conflict is a bitter experience. We hope and pray that the desperate armed conflict in which the representatives of the United Nations, including our own gallant and heroic forces, are presently engaged may be confined to the Korean Peninsula. We pray that the strengthened forces of freedom will prevail. That is the goal that we now seek to achieve by hard work, good leadership and careful planning.

We have not—we will not—abandon our hope for a peaceful world. The blow against which we now prepare may never fall. The stronger we grow in spirit and strength, the less likely we make world conflict.

The cause of freedom compels us to engage in a total mobilization of our resources and the resources of all freedom-loving people. Halfway measures, or measures born of desperation or hysteria rather than wise and prudent planning, will not suffice. In fact, such measures are bound to consume our resources without accomplishing our

purpose. We cannot afford to pit weakness against power. History discloses that strong nations, composed of determined, free people, survive. The weak perish. Accordingly, each of us, as well as every level of government, must be prepared resolutely to make a forthright, unstinting contribution to the cause of freedom.

In the mobilization of our resources, the strengthening of our defenses, and the "stockpiling" of armed forces of men and materiel, we must not lose sight of a basic fact. Our objective is peace, not war.

We seek real peace—peace with honor. In seeking freedom for ourselves, we recognize that freedom, to be preserved, must be shared with freedom-loving peoples who are prepared to pay the price that freedom exacts from those who enjoy its benefits. It has been well said in this way: "No one can be perfectly free till all are free."

We insist upon a full opportunity to exercise our inalienable rights as free people.

Accordingly, we should neither counsel a withdrawal from our common undertaking with the forces of freedom, nor should we participate in any appeasement of the forces of tyranny and slavery.

What part can we play in this catastrophic struggle of arms and ideas that is the dominant fact of our lives? Having been too complacent in the past, we should now take care to avoid a frightened hysteria in the future. We are citizens of no mean State. New Jersey has occupied a proud position in the entire history of our great Nation. It has been a good leader in the age-old struggle for freedom. Our communities have echoed to the tramp of alien armies. On our soil, desperate battles have been fought, the price of freedom paid, and victories won. With such a history, it is not for us to be stampeded. With our heritage, we may well counsel calmness and hardheaded realism. There is work to be done. That work must be done in an atmosphere of calm assurance. Where there is a will in the hearts and minds of our citizens to work together and, if need be, to

fight together for a common cause, we may be assured that right will prevail.

During the past four years, we Jersey men and women have been engaged in the great task of strengthening our State Government. In a very real sense, we were engaged in a program of preparedness and conservation—preparedness against any and all eventualities; conservation of the basic values of our Republic. We have been putting our house in order. Today, we are better prepared to withstand the forces of tyranny than at any time in the history of our State. Our new Constitution has proved a mighty bulwark. Our judicial system, the keystone of our republican form of government, has been formally recognized as the best in the country. Our Bill of Rights, and its supporting legislation, has confounded our enemies and nullified their propaganda.

We have moved forward on a great many different social and economic fronts. We have refused to fritter away our resources, with the result that today our citizens, although hard-pressed by mounting Federal taxes, are in a better position than those of any other State in the Nation. We have demonstrated that it is possible for a government to be prudent as well as progressive.

Since the great fact of our time is war and the threat of war, prudence as well as the inter-dependence of our society requires us to measure all of our activities in terms of their contribution to the defense program, the mobilization of our resources, and the security of our State and Nation.

It is apparent today, as it has been for some time past, that neither our mighty Nation nor strong State can be expected, in the face of these critical times, to undertake all of the tasks that would properly enlist our sympathies and support in peacetime. Significantly, my 1948 Annual Message recognized as a first priority "the control of inflation." With respect to the cost of "an adequate national defense" which, I maintained held a top priority, I stated that we must be prepared to spend "enough to win."

In recent months there has been a noticeable tendency on the part of various levels of government, particularly the Federal Government, to concentrate on new tax and spending proposals, to the neglect of plans for the curtailment of unnecessary services and the achievement of substantial economies—economies that students of government, researchers and practical administrators have demonstrated time and again may be achieved without any interference with vital services. If we are to maintain a sound economy, well-balanced judgment compels us to think as much in terms of economy as in terms of services required to prepare our country against any eventuality.

I am proud to report that the New Jersey National Guard, both Army and Air, has continued to expand. Our citizen soldiers have continued to perfect themselves in their training to a degree second to none in the country. During the late summer and early autumn of last year ten National Guard units were called into the Federal service by the President. The bulk of the National Guard presently remains within the State and is undergoing a greatly increased training program. Our Naval Reserve—Naval Militia—has already contributed a large proportion of its personnel to the Fleet. Accordingly, a substantial portion of the men remaining in our Naval Militia and Naval Reserve are recruits undergoing intensive training.

All of these Services are upholding their best traditions. They are a vital part of our National Defense program.

Civil defense, the protection of the people of our State in the event of disaster resulting from enemy action, sabotage or natural causes, has received, and I am confident will continue to receive, your full, alert and active consideration. Our basic law has been described by the Council of State Governments as one of the “most complete” in the country.

On March 3rd of last year, pursuant to comprehensive legislation adopted in 1949, I put into effect the New Jersey

Civil Defense Plan and charged each municipality with the establishment of local civil defense organizations in accordance with the provisions of that Plan. I am pleased to report that all municipalities in the State have organized Civil Defense Councils. Most of these Councils have recruited and are now training volunteers to be used in either a peacetime or wartime emergency.

Our Civil Defense Program offers to each citizen of New Jersey an opportunity to participate in the national defense program. The growing number of volunteers who are offering their skills and their energy for the mutual protection of themselves, their neighbors and their communities is encouraging. Many additional volunteers are required.

We have placed first emphasis in the Civil Defense program on the organization of auxiliary fire and police forces, the mobilization of public health agencies, and basic training programs. In all of these activities we have had the wise leadership of the men who direct our Department of Defense, including particularly Major General Edward C. Rose; and Leonard Dreyfuss, Director of Civil Defense.

Four months ago the Governors of New York and New Jersey agreed upon the broad outlines of a plan for mutual aid and assistance for the protection of the people of both States in the event of enemy action. Following this undertaking, a compact was agreed upon prescribing the procedure and details for mutual military aid in the event of an emergency. This compact is subject to your ratification. A measure providing for ratification by this Legislature is being introduced today. I urge your favorable consideration of this proposal. In addition, provision should be made for inter-State civil defense and disaster compacts.

While the national peril requires a national program and the Constitution of the United States wisely charges that Congress shall "provide for the common defense," the States co-operatively and individually have thus far been required to provide Civil Defense leadership.

A huge civil defense expenditure program has been authorized by the Congress and approved by the President less than a week ago. This legislation conflicts with a basic concept of this administration—that wherever possible all substantial civil defense projects should have real peacetime significance. Our program would conserve our resources and avoid the economic exhaustion that is the earnest hope and expectation of our enemies.

The Federal program for “shelters and protective facilities” contemplates the expenditure of large sums of money by both the State and Federal governments. Entirely apart from the size of the expenditure, I am gravely concerned by the fact that the program admittedly falls far short of taking care of all of our citizens in critical areas.

We must reject the intimation that some of our citizens may be saved and some are expendable. Realism requires us to recognize that in times of emergency there are varying degrees of peril to which citizens in the same category may be exposed. We do not, however, deliberately plan for such a situation and, in fact, we plan to avoid such a contingency.

The Federal proposal will require a careful consideration of the facts, expert advice and guidance, and a painstaking weighing of the merits of many projects, all vital to the defense effort, before we are in a position to determine their relative merits. In the meantime, an immediate appropriation is required to meet the added administrative costs of our growing civil defense agency. Legislation for this purpose is being introduced today.

Some calculated risks must be taken if projects of first importance are to be completed within a reasonable length of time with available manpower, resources and finances.

In a time of serious crisis, we are afforded a fresh opportunity to recognize the intricate inter-dependence of individuals and groups in our modern society. In our concentration upon the security of the Nation, we cannot afford to overlook the welfare of the individual upon whom the

Nation relies for its strength. Therefore, we must continue to strengthen and provide those essential services without which no modern nation may successfully function.

We must bring to the task of government a balanced judgment comprehensive in its point of view and imaginative in its search for the answers to the problems of the day. Among the activities which, so tested, would rate the higher civilian priorities in our defense environment, I commend the following to you:

Our veterans of service in Korea and those who are presently being called into the armed forces must be assured substantially the same rights and privileges as those given to the veterans of World War II.

Until the fateful day when the professional services of a doctor or nurse are required, the average citizen is inclined to minimize the magnificent contribution that the members of these professions make to the welfare of our society. The mobilization of our forces is placing, and will continue to place, an ever-increasing burden upon our doctors and nurses, of whom there are already too few. We have been developing plans to meet all possible contingencies in the essential service these professions render our citizens.

Under the leadership of your State Government, private hospitals, public health agencies, and other professional organizations, have been participating in this planning. Extensive programs are being formulated. We may confidently expect the continued co-operation of these groups in the full implementation of the plans.

It is apparent that provision should be made for additional training programs as well as professional education. This is a Civil Defense project with real peacetime significance. The New Jersey Medical College Commission has been studying this problem for some time and we may expect its report during the present session of the Legislature.

Effective local public health administration is a vital ingredient in any civil defense program. Our State Department of Health is now rendering comprehensive consultant services to those communities desiring to measure the adequacy of their present health activities. This State service is based upon the premise that sound action is dependent upon full knowledge of local health requirements.

The development of the most effective local public health units will require inter-municipal co-operation and the further consolidation of this municipal activity for the purpose of achieving desirable efficiency as well as economy. Legislation has been prepared by the Governor's Committee on Local Health Administration providing for district health services and the strengthening of inter-municipal co-operation. The recommendations of this Committee merit your careful consideration and support.

Last year we substantially strengthened our employment security programs. It is fortunate that we did so. The transition to a full war-time economy will inevitably result in some hardships. It is difficult to prophesy the length or the extent of these hardships. It takes time to re-tool an industry. The inflationary spiral that existed a year ago, I am sorry to report, has been permitted to continue unchecked. As a result, pending the comprehensive study now under way, we are once again compelled to adjust our insurance programs including sickness benefits and unemployment compensation and to increase present maximum payments, as well as to extend coverage, to permit these programs to accomplish their primary objectives.

Other legislation needed to assure smooth industrial relations and further perfect our employment security program includes: improvement in Workmen's Compensation procedure and elimination of remaining inequities in the law; a State Labor Relations Law; and the strengthening of our minimum wage law. The equality of women before the law as guaranteed by the new Constitution should also be further implemented.

Important new amendments to the Social Security Act adopted by the Congress of the United States last year make it desirable that our statutes in New Jersey be likewise amended. The consolidation of all State welfare services in one State department a year ago was a very decided step in the right direction. Our present relief functions are administered according to several varying formulæ, including aid to the aged, aid to dependent children, aid to the blind, and two types of general assistance. These are not only administered under different formulæ but at different levels of government. This arrangement is neither economically sound nor administratively desirable. It is an arrangement that is in conflict with the spirit, if not the letter, of the new Federal Social Security Act and places in jeopardy important portions of the proposed matched-fund program outlined in the new Federal Security legislation.

The Federal legislation establishes a new and important category comprising the totally and permanently incapacitated. These unfortunate members of our society who are totally and permanently incapacitated and in need of assistance should not be carried on our emergency relief rolls. Social justice and prudent administration support a determination to provide assistance to needy persons in this category apart from the emergency relief program. The new Federal legislation also broadens the base of contribution for the needy aged by including those in public institutions. Other provisions of the new Federal Social Security Law will likewise require your consideration and action.

The Federal Social Security Act affords us a proper opportunity to revise our own statutes and to adopt a modern welfare code, consistent with modern concepts of assistance to the needy. We should adopt objective standards for determining and measuring need. These standards should be State-wide in application and, as nearly as possible, subject only to such variations as may be necessary by the type of recipient—the same for all classes and categories of public assistance.

A consolidation of our social security activities, the simplification of our procedures, and the adoption of standards consistent with those prescribed in the Federal Social Security Act, will result in a very substantial saving of money to the counties and municipalities. It will likewise result in a substantial increase in State and Federal financial participation in the various programs. Of greater importance, it will provide a better and more equitable service! While I have objected to the extension of Federal grants-in-aid, to oppose this program at this particular time would hurt our municipalities without accomplishing my basic objective—the reallocation of State-Federal service responsibilities and taxes and the reduction of Federal non-defense expenditures.

In my Second Annual Message to the Legislature, I discussed the need for research in the causes and prevention of long-term chronic illness. In the field of general medicine the technician, the scientist, the doctor and the public health official have performed modern miracles. They have lengthened the span of life and cut down the incidence of acute sickness. We have reached the point in New Jersey where we are ready to place even greater emphasis on prevention than on cure and custody. I propose an integration and consolidation of all State activities engaged in the task of prevention.

A year ago, provision was made for the liberalization of our teachers' pension program. This year we are confronted with the task of appropriating money to meet that commitment. We must continue to revise, upward, minimum teachers' salaries and to strengthen our teacher salary schedules if we are to attract and keep the best teachers in our State. Pending a report from the State School Aid Commission, the State will strive to maintain its State-aid program at present levels. A sound and adequate teachers' compensation and pension program is a good investment if the vitality of the blood stream of our Republic is to be maintained and strengthened.

The hard facts of life require that we re-examine each service rendered by government. Of each service we must ask: "Is it necessary under present circumstances?" We must conserve our resources, refraining from any new expenditures unless their necessity is clearly and unequivocally demonstrated. This is no time for waste or extravagance. All levels of government will be expected to observe the strictest economies.

Each proposal for a capital improvement must be tested and the need for it proved in the bright light of present circumstances including high costs, scarce materials and a reduced supply of labor.

At the present time, we are engaged in a capital improvement program for our Department of Institutions and Agencies. The overcrowded conditions that presently exist in our institutions, the known hazards, which the program is designed to eliminate, the great need for additional mental hospital facilities, compel me to state that unless conditions take a decided turn for the worse this program should be continued. These additional facilities will permit us to expand and intensify our treatment of the mentally ill with assurance that an increasing number of patients may be returned to a productive society.

With respect to our State highway program—it is apparent that modern highways are a prime war-time requirement. We will be constantly examining our highway program in the light of changing circumstances.

We expect the Turnpike to be completed this year. Provision should be made for the extension of the Turnpike to a connection with the New York Thruway. We may confidently expect the Turnpike, upon its completion, to be one of the Nation's greatest wartime and peacetime assets.

It is desirable to create an additional Authority within the Highway Department so that it may be prepared, if necessary, to undertake the construction and operation of certain strategic bridges, parking facilities, and highways having war-time significance, on a pay-as-you-go basis.

The interstate crossings of the Delaware and Hudson Rivers have a National defense as well as State significance. The present crossings of these rivers are already approaching capacity and, in some instances, the flow of traffic is in excess of capacity. Additional crossings are, therefore, required now. Any heightening of the present emergency would increase this need. The plans for these additional crossings should be completed at once. The construction of additional crossings should be given a priority consistent with their peace and wartime significance.

In my own approach to the task of Civil Defense, I have personally placed heavy emphasis on the need for control against panic and the orderly handling of great masses of people during a period of extreme peril. This control should begin in each room of each factory, shop, office, school and in each home and extend in varying degrees throughout the State.

In time of peril, there is no substitute for orderly discipline. Adequate transportation and communication facilities, permitting the free and uninterrupted flow of traffic and information, are necessary if we are to maintain the reasonable Civil Defense controls to which I have referred and permit, as nearly as possible, the continuous productivity of our economy.

The Departments of Defense, Highways, Public Utilities and Health have been engaged in a study of this problem. Consideration has been given to the maintenance of essential utility services, including the interchange of power and water facilities. The need for greater security for our power and telephone lines, including the desirability of placing these lines underground, has been recognized.

Once again I am compelled to stress the critical need for additional water supplies for our State. An adequate water supply, important in peacetime, is doubly important in a period of national emergency. Pending agreement upon an acceptable plan for additional water supplies within the

State, provision should be made this year for the completion of the Delaware and Raritan Canal Water Supply Project as authorized by the Legislature in 1948. The completion of this project will make available an additional 75 million gallons a day for an important industrial area of the State. This is a short-range measure which should be followed by long-range projects designed to protect and promote the health and welfare of the people of our State.

The most attractive of the latter projects is the plan proposed by one of our inter-State commissions—The Inter-State Commission on the Delaware River Basin. This agency, pursuant to a previous legislative authorization, has presented a program for the development of the water resources of the Delaware River watershed that, with certain modifications, I have accepted in principle and believe should be speedily adopted.

Our growing industries and increased population require additional water supplies. Our communities bordering on the Delaware River will be greatly helped by the steady flow of water in the river that would be provided by the program. I am convinced that this project may be completed on a pay-as-you-go basis. It is of major importance. I hope that you will give the program your support.

While it may be necessary for us to defer some of our programs, there should be no deferment in our planning for the future. I am increasingly impressed with the need for adequate master plans encouraging the orderly development of our State and its political subdivisions. The development of a modern co-ordinated transportation system that I have outlined in previous messages continues to be essential if our State is to continue to grow. The system is likewise an essential ingredient in our security program.

The State Police are an integral part of our Civil Defense program. In fact, one of the first and most important steps in the development of a Civil Defense program is to provide for the control of traffic and the prevention of lawless activities. The strengthening of the State Police and all of

our other important law enforcement agencies is, accordingly, a project that has peace-time as well as war-time significance. No State is secure that either harbors or tolerates habitually lawless elements. Respect for the law is a principle second only in importance to the great principle of equality before the law.

The Department of Law and Public Safety, as well as other State agencies, should be permitted to employ specially qualified retired members of the State Police Force, receiving a pension, under a reasonable arrangement that would protect the individual as well as the State.

The adoption of a Uniform Traffic Code is again recommended. The need for greater uniformity in traffic regulations throughout the country is every day becoming more apparent. Good traffic laws as well as effective enforcement can help to reduce the toll of needless traffic accidents and its appalling waste of invaluable manpower.

During this period when we are revising and modernizing our Motor Vehicle procedures and practices with respect to the issuance of drivers' licenses, examinations, suspensions, revocations, as well as motor vehicle registrations, it is appropriate that we should make provision for driver-training courses in all of our high schools. In this comprehensive program our purpose is threefold: the reduction of traffic accidents, greater efficiency and economy in administration, a fair and enlightened consideration of the problems of those who use our highways.

Effective law enforcement requires readily available Courts providing speedy and scrupulously fair hearings for those charged with violation of the law. In only one respect have we fallen somewhat short of this goal. More than fifty of our municipalities do not have a Municipal Court. Each of our municipalities, consistent with the principle of home rule, should be required, either independently or, preferably, in conjunction with a neighboring municipality, to maintain a Municipal Court.

The Magistrates presiding over these Courts should be trained in the law. While many of our magistrates have performed notable services despite a lack of technical training, and these should be permitted to complete their terms, the qualifications for this important judicial position should include adequate professional training.

The proper administration of these Courts appears to require the appearance of a prosecuting official. It is my considered judgment that laws relating to our Municipal Courts should be generally revised. Much progress has been achieved in the administration of these Courts. It is apparent, however, that there is room for considerable improvement, particularly in the handling of motor vehicle cases. More nearly uniform procedures and practices in these Courts is desirable.

In addition, I repeat my previous recommendations that the authority to appoint jury commissioners be transferred to the Supreme Court, where it naturally belongs; for the jury system is an integral part of the judicial system. Likewise, the authority of the Chief Justice to appoint park commissioners should be transferred to the Executive branch of government.

The very important revision of Titles 2 and 3 of our Revised Statutes is in competent hands. While the work of the Revision Commission may not be completed during the regular session of the Legislature, it is my hope that the report of the Commission will receive your consideration and approval this year. It is my hope that we may accelerate the basic revision of our statutes, and that thereafter provision may be made for continuous yearly revisions.

To a greater degree than is perhaps realized, the security of our citizens is dependent upon their ability to accurately and quickly ascertain their rights. From an administrative point of view, a welter of antiquated, often conflicting, laws makes it difficult to reach a prompt decision on important issues. Such a welter promotes frequently expensive delays. Not the least of the statutes requiring revision is

cumbersome, antiquated Title 48, encompassing the laws relating to public utilities. Pending such a revision, provision should be made now for the creation of a revolving fund to provide the funds necessary to insure the presentation by the Department of Law and Public Safety and the Department of Public Utilities of all the facts for the protection of the public in rate proceedings.

The loyal and efficient service of our State employees should be recognized. Many of these employees may be called upon to perform additional duties during the emergency. Those who man our services have felt the cruelty of an inflation that has made their personal problems, as well as the State's fiscal problems, increasingly difficult. I will discuss this issue and, in fact, all of our burdensome fiscal and budgetary requirements in the Budget Message. They have been complex in the past. Inflation has made them even more complex.

As a matter of course, we will adhere to and strengthen our Civil Service principles and practices. There is no substitute for experience. A competent career service is essential and must be preserved.

We will continue to recognize that a social system, a philosophy of life, or a government that fails to produce in the interests of all the people, will not long endure in an age where wholesale destruction may explode out of the skies while mankind is too slowly testing old values and seeking new guides.

This is a time of great challenge. As Americans, we have embarked upon an undertaking that will not be completed in a month or a year. The struggle between freedom and slavery, between liberty and tyranny, will be a long one. We should prepare ourselves accordingly. We cannot afford to prematurely exhaust our energies or our resources. In terms that a runner would understand, our

race is not a mad dash for freedom but, rather, a marathon in which we have a crafty, unscrupulous adversary.

The goal is clear. I entertain no doubts with respect to the ultimate victor. Our Nation of free people, under Divine Guidance, is destined to surmount and survive the present crisis as it has survived previous crises.

It is for us to so conduct ourselves and perform our tasks that future generations will recognize that in a time of adversity our hearts were strong and our minds were clear. We will want the record to disclose that we were not afraid, that we provided wise leadership, and that we made our fair contribution to the general welfare of our State and our Nation.

The past record of achievement gives me a clear right to state my confidence in your ability to perform your important duties wisely and constructively. In the performance of these duties you will have the full co-operation of the Executive Branch of your Government.

BUDGET MESSAGE

To the Members of the Senate and General Assembly:

This is my fifth Budget Message. It is submitted at a time when the country faces enormous problems. The free world is engaged in a struggle for survival. It is opposed by aggressive and sinister forces. The defense of freedom is as essential as it is expensive. It must receive first consideration.

The President of the United States, in his Economic Report to the Congress, dated January 12, 1951, stated: "Although our economic strength is now greater than ever before, very large new burdens of long duration are now being imposed upon it." These new burdens, including the cost of Defense, either have been or soon will be translated into huge new national taxes.

The wasted years since the cessation of hostilities on V-J Day failed to produce either an adequate program for National Defense or a much needed working Federalism, so essential in a country of our size and complexity. In a period of national emergency, the danger of a military dictatorship under the plea of necessity is very real. The continuation of responsible representative government during such a period is very largely dependent upon our capacity to maintain a working Federalism, in which services and responsibilities are delegated to the appropriate levels of government. It is likewise to be regretted that we still lack a comprehensive program for a modern, integrated tax system for the adequate support of our various levels of government. The nationalization of our government and the centralization of our financing have proved expensive and inefficient. This fact is particularly regrettable when we consider the imperative need to put our tax dollars into full production in the Defense effort.

Until such time as the National Government abandons tax policies based upon expediency and ceases to improvise from year to year, it will continue to be difficult for the States and their political subdivisions to develop adequate long-range, fair governmental policies and tax programs.

The National Government has, however, persisted in its assumed right to dominate practically all taxes. It has, in the assertion of this assumed right, transformed our economy from one of free private enterprise to an enterprise largely controlled or influenced by government direction.

Against this dismal background, and until such time as the policies of our National Government are clearly defined, it is almost impossible to present a State budget with any assurance that it will meet the State's requirements more than a year hence.

There are certain facts, however, that are known and which may serve as guides as we consider the State's budgetary requirements.

The proposed Federal budget for the fiscal year 1951-52 has reached a size that would have exceeded the imagination of prudent men and women a few years ago. New Jersey's share of the proposed \$71,500,000,000 Federal budget will exceed \$2,300,000,000. If such a Federal budget is adopted, New Jersey citizens and business activities will be called upon to pay the National Government approximately \$1,000,000,000 more during the next fiscal year than they paid during the last fiscal year.

It is the height of folly for any level of government to ignore the obligations and tax levies of other levels of government. It is the weight of the total tax burden that must be appraised and considered if we are to maintain our free economy and protect the welfare of our citizens. It is the total impact of all taxes that may promote or destroy a productive society.

The stark facts of our economic life include the regrettable cost of inflation as well as the cost of Defense. It is perhaps significant that in my first budget message, and thereafter in successive budget messages, I stressed the dangerous "inflationary trends that have troubled industry, management, labor and all levels of government during the past year." These inflationary

forces have not been checked and the consequences have been disastrous. Exorbitant taxes and swollen governmental expenditures under present-day circumstances are among the chief contributors to inflation.

Many of our citizens, compelled to live on fixed incomes, are presently staggering under the burden of inflated prices and high taxes. We must not forget the plight of these citizens. The inflationary spiral has likewise made many of the problems of government more acute and even more difficult of solution than was the case a year ago. In the performance of many of the State's essential services, costs have risen faster than income.

New Jersey has demonstrated a capacity to be prudent as well as progressive. I propose that we continue these policies. If we would be prudent, we should continue to operate our government on a pay-as-you-go basis, confining expenditures to those that may be paid from available revenues. We must place as much emphasis upon ability to pay as upon the need for services. The Budget that I now propose for normal current operations for the fiscal year 1951-52 does not require new taxes.

The proposed Budget is not a blueprint for the spending of State revenues. It constitutes a challenge to save money and to spend less than the amount recommended for appropriation. It is my hope that you will examine each service of government, eliminating any that you may conclude to be unnecessary during the present emergency. We must continue to practice strict economy.

An examination of the proposed Budget will disclose the extent to which we achieved our objectives during the previous fiscal year. We have "held the line." We have the lowest State budget of any comparable State in the country, the lowest per-capita State tax collection in the Nation, and fewer State employees in proportion to our population than any other member of the Union. In achieving these desirable objectives, it must be recognized that we have necessarily been forced to limit a number of services that you and I, in common with many of our citizens, believe are important and, indeed, necessary. A number of these essential services will require our special attention.

REVENUES

It is becoming increasingly difficult to accurately estimate the revenue that the State will receive from its limited taxes more than a year in advance of the date when those taxes are collectible. Practically all of our State's taxes are highly vulnerable in a period of national emergency. In an era of inflation, with increased business activity, many of the Federal taxes, as well as many of the taxes levied by a substantial majority of the States, may be expected to produce substantially more tax revenue with no change in tax rates. This is not the case in New Jersey.

It is my hope that the members of the Legislature will give the fifth report of the Commission on State Tax Policy its careful attention. In previous messages to the Legislature, I have enumerated the inequities in our present tax structure that I believe require correction.

In my Budget Message for the fiscal year 1950-51, it was estimated that we could conservatively anticipate a surplus balance, as of June 30, 1951, of \$2,805,461. I am pleased to be able to report that since that budget message was submitted, operating savings, lapsed balances in various accounts, and an increase in anticipated revenues, now support our estimate that the balance, as of July 1, 1951, after provision has been made for deficiencies for the fiscal years 1949 to 1951, inclusive, will be \$16,220,599. In a very real sense, this increase in the anticipated balance, as of July 1, 1951, is the product of the careful controls that are presently exercised by the Division of Budget and Accounting and the Division of Taxation in the Department of the Treasury.

It is estimated that revenues for 1951-52 should total \$164,734,712. This is an increase of \$9,711,601 over the income originally estimated for the current year. It is important, however, to stress again the vulnerability of our present taxes. In the event the National Government determines to ration gasoline or alcoholic beverages or to curtail racing, it would be necessary to revise radically our present estimates. The proposal that the Federal Government substantially increase certain excise taxes also imposed by the States will, if adopted, undoubtedly result in diminishing tax revenues for the States.

The schedules attached to this message cover three budgets: first, Current General State Operations; second, State Aid (cash assistance to our counties, municipalities and school districts); and third, Capital Improvements. The following table summarizes estimated income, as well as proposed allocations for the three budgets:

BUDGET I**CURRENT STATE OPERATIONS**

The various State departments presented to the Budget Director requests for appropriations totalling \$93,923,047. After careful and painstaking study and a due consideration for the general tax burden presently imposed upon our citizens, these requests were reduced to \$83,365,306. This figure is approximately 49% of the total of the three budgets. It is apparent that anticipated revenues for the next fiscal year exceed recommended appropriations for the same year for current State operations by more than \$81,000,000. Thus, as I have stated in previous budget messages, the State has ample revenues with which to meet the cost of current State operations and even to expand essential services. If, however, you will turn to the Second Budget, covering the State's expanding cash assistance programs, frequently referred to as State Aid, our budgetary problems will become more apparent and understandable.

Department of Institutions and Agencies

Of the total amount recommended for current State operations, \$25,318,000, or more than 30% of the total State Operations Budget, has been allocated for the support of the humanitarian welfare program of our Department of Institutions and Agencies. This Department operates our three mental hospitals, nine correctional institutions, four feeble-minded institutions, and five other specialized institutions—all engaged in the task of caring for more than 25,000 patients and inmates. Provision has been made in this budget for additional personnel required in these institutions and the additions that are presently being built to provide adequate service for the growing number of patients and inmates.

Food and fuel costs for our institutions for the next fiscal year will exceed last year's estimates by approximately a half million dollars. This increase in the cost of operation is typical of similar increases in other departments due to inflation, for which provision has necessarily been made throughout the Operating Budget.

This Department of Institutions and Agencies will continue its traditional welfare services, including aid and care for more than 5,000 blind persons. In addition, however, the Department may be called upon to perform certain new duties if the Legislature approves of the recommendation contained in my Annual Message, proposing the adoption of modern welfare codes. Accordingly, provision should be made for the transfer of appropriations in the event the welfare codes are adopted.

Department of Education

The sum of \$10,107,200 has been allocated in the proposed budget for the support of the Department of Education. This sum represents more than 12% of the current State Operating Budget. Included within this amount are allocations for the support of our teachers' colleges, the State University, and the Newark College of Engineering.

Our colleges and university are confronted with many perplexing problems. They may expect lower enrollments and higher costs. It is almost impossible to estimate the number of students that may be expected to attend these institutions.

Department of Law and Public Safety

I recommend a sizeable increase in the appropriation for the Department of Law and Public Safety. The increase is approximately \$650,000 and results in a total recommendation of \$7,900,000 or approximately 9.5% of the State Operating Budget. This increase includes provision for strengthening our State Police and law enforcement activities. This move is part of our Civil Defense program. It is also necessary if we are to provide adequate policing of our highways, and continue the new crime prevention duties that our State Police have assumed. The increase likewise reflects the cost of new machinery required for our new five-year motor vehicle license plate program. While the cost of the new machinery is included in the proposed budget, the program will result in a saving to the State, over the five-year period, after provision has been made for the payment of the machinery, of more than a half million dollars.

Department of the Treasury

The recommended appropriations for the Department of the Treasury include provision for the new Division of Investments. The accomplishments of this Division have amply justified its creation.

Department of Highways

To provide for the operation and maintenance of our vast Highway system, I recommend the sum of \$10,751,750. Our growing Highway system, including the new bridges that have been built during the past three years, requires additional personnel for maintenance and operation. The sum of \$305,000 has been included for this purpose.

* * * * *

The cost of operating all the other departments of government show either slight decreases or remain at approximately the 1951 level, indicating that careful management has resulted in the absorption of the cost of the normal employee salary increments.

Debt Service

In the 1930's, the gross debt of the State was almost \$200,000,000. At the present time, the gross bonded debt of the State is \$99,070,000. This budget provides for the first time an amount for servicing the \$25,000,000 bond issue, approved by the citizens of our State in 1949 for the modernization of our hospitals and institutions and the construction of additional hospital facilities. The proposed budget includes a total allocation of \$7,000,000 to cover debt service on all outstanding bonds.

Pensions

Slightly over \$3,000,000 is recommended for pensions and contributions to pension funds for the fiscal year 1951-52. This is approximately \$650,000 more than the amount appropriated for the present fiscal year. This substantial increase reflects increased salaries now being paid our State employees.

Salaries and Wages

Included in the schedules are total recommended appropriations for salaries and wages amounting to \$49,550,000. This figure is approximately \$2,130,000 more than the amount appropriated for the present fiscal year and provides for normal salary increments for our State employees, as well as additional personnel for our Departments of Institutions and Agencies, Law and Public Safety and Highway. I have recommended the abolition of 140 positions and other departmental personnel savings, which will total \$527,000. In addition, we should continue our policy of not filling vacancies created by resignation or otherwise, except in those cases where it is clearly demonstrated that the personnel is required to maintain essential service on an efficient basis.

A careful study is being made of our salary structure, the effect of the increased cost of living upon our State employees, and the need for the elimination of inequities that have appeared in our salary structure. It is apparent that some salary adjustments will be necessary, and plans therefor have been substantially completed. The events within the past few days have raised serious questions which must be resolved before we can make specific recommendations. Funds have been reserved to finance the final recommendations.

Civil Defense

At the present time, it is virtually impossible for us to anticipate the full impact of our Civil Defense program. Accordingly, I recommend that provision be made in the Appropriations Bill, permitting the Governor to transfer from any appropriation that may be made, such funds as may be necessary to meet any emergency which may arise as the result of military aggression or sabotage.

BUDGET II

STATE AID

The total requests for appropriations for State Aid amounted to \$71,873,439. The recommended State Aid Budget totals \$67,107,527. The budget follows the pattern of State Aid established during the past three years. It provides for three broad categories of aid, namely: aid for education, welfare and highways. The budget also provides for a continuation of the State's program for the strengthening of police and fire pension funds, beach protection, as well as certain other miscellaneous programs.

The amount recommended for aid to education equals \$35,013,078. Of this sum, \$25,039,650 will be distributed to local levels of government as aid to education and includes all the categories of aid outlined in the statutes including State subsidies for county superintendents, one-half of the excess cost to educate crippled children; operation of Vocational and Industrial Schools; and direct distributable aid under statutory formulas. This amount is precisely the amount requested by the State Board of Education. Any revision of this grant should await the report of the State School Aid Commission. The balance, or \$9,973,428, will go to the Teachers' Pension and Annuity Fund, as the State's contribution to this fund for 1951-52. This sum is approximately \$1,650,000 higher than the amount appropriated in the current appropriation bill, indicating again the impact of the higher salaries paid school teachers throughout the State, and also the legislative changes which have liberalized the provisions of this pension system.

There is included in this budget a recommended appropriation of \$13,461,520 for the State Aid Program covering all welfare categories. This appropriation is based on last year's pattern. If the program proposed in my Annual Message is adopted, it should be possible for our counties and municipalities to reduce their appropriations for their welfare programs approximately

\$6,000,000. Under the program, the State would be called upon to increase its support for these welfare programs by approximately \$3,000,000. This sum is included in the reserve.

There is also included in this budget a recommended appropriation of \$15,845,556 to continue our present State Aid to counties and municipalities for the maintenance, construction, reconstruction and other administrative costs of our local roads. This sum is approximately \$580,000 more than the amount contained in the appropriation bill for the present fiscal year. It does not, however, represent an increase in cash available for allotment to the counties and municipalities. The Projects Division of the State Highway Department has been transferred from the General State Operations Budget to the State Aid Budget, inasmuch as the Projects Division is exclusively engaged in the administration of highway State Aid projects.

BUDGET III

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS

Total requests for capital improvements amounted to \$41,625,175. These requests have been reduced to \$19,256,646. We have no assurance that we will be permitted to proceed with our capital improvement programs even on a limited basis. The critical shortage of steel and increase in costs may compel us to defer many of our plans.

Within the proposed budget, however, \$133,000 has been allocated to the Department of Law and Public Safety for dual purpose buildings for our law enforcement agencies and \$125,000 to the State University for equipment for its new buildings. There has been allocated to the Highway Department \$18,998,646 for highway construction. We are fully aware of the need for a modern highway system in our State. We have been engaged in the most important highway construction program in the history of New Jersey during the past three years. We undertook the highway program at a time when many timid counselors in other States were suggesting that capital improvements should be deferred until the inevitable "depression." Adequate highways are an essential part of any realistic civil defense program. The State Highway Department is presently engaged in the preparation of a long range highway program with particular emphasis on the highway needs of our metropolitan areas.

At this time I can only repeat the statement made in my Annual Message: Each proposal for a capital improvement must be tested and the need for it proved in the bright light of present circumstances including high cost, scarce materials and a reduced labor market.

CONCLUSION

In the event we are called upon to appropriate large sums for either military or civil defense, it will be necessary either to reduce very substantially services presently being rendered by your government or to increase our tax revenues. As circumstances

change, we must be prepared to change our policies. If the Legislature grants the emergency transfer powers that I have requested, you have my assurance that these powers will be invoked only when necessary to provide for the safety and the welfare of our citizens.

SPECIAL MESSAGE

To the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

In 1945 Governor Walter E. Edge, desiring to preserve the historic Princeton property known as Morven for uses in keeping with its rich traditions, purchased the estate with the announced intention of ultimately having it become the property of the State of New Jersey as a gift from Mrs. Edge and himself. So far as it was possible for him to do so at that time, Governor Edge carried out this intention by entering into an agreement of purchase under which he accepted a deed to the property which gave him a life interest and conveyed the fee to the State of New Jersey. This conveyance to the State is expressly declared to be “for the exclusively public use of maintaining the said property as an executive mansion for the use of successive Governors of the State of New Jersey, or if its use as such an executive mansion should for any reason become inappropriate or be abandoned; then for the uses of a State museum or an historic site; and if both of the above defined uses should be abandoned, the said property to revert,” according to the deed, to Governor Edge, his heirs and assigns forever. While the deed was recorded on February 28, 1945, the State has not yet taken formal action to accept the gift.

The year 1951 marks the 250th anniversary of the beginning of construction of Morven, and it is therefore particularly appropriate that we consider its ultimate disposition at this time. Moreover, I have recently received a formal offer from Governor and Mrs. Edge to deed the property to the State immediately, free and clear of all encumbrances and subject only to the use restrictions which the original deed to Governor Edge contained. By their original offer of this generous gift to the State of New Jersey, as well as by their recent renewal of the offer, the Edges have demonstrated an enduring interest in the great traditions of our State, as well as a notable recognition of the need to preserve for future generations those historic sites which help to etch into the records of history the values for which Americans have long fought and died. I know I speak for all the people of New Jersey when, as Governor, I express our deep appreciation to Walter E. Edge and Mrs. Edge for this most gracious offer of public benefit.

Morven is one of those few places which has an extraordinary historical background significant in the life of our State as well as Nation. It was originally built in 1701 on land purchased from William Penn by Richard Stockton, grandfather of the signer of the Declaration of Independence. Some sixty years later, the charming Annis Boudinot Stockton gave Morven its name inspired by a popular romantic poem of the time. The property, located in one of the most attractive areas of present day Princeton, is full of the traditions befitting its origin. It has been the home of Richard Stockton, "The Signer," a President of the Council of the Colonies before the Revolution, two United States Senators and others prominent in the public life of New Jersey. General Cornwallis, pursuing Washington in 1776, made his headquarters there, and from there was obliged to flee after the memorable Battle of Princeton. When the Continental Congress met in Nassau Hall for a time during 1783, Morven was the rendezvous of prominent men of the day, including General Washington. Some eighteen Presidents of the United States and most Governors of New Jersey have shared in Morven's hospitality.

The Stockton family continued to reside at the estate until the late Bayard Stockton died in 1932. Prior to its acquisition by the Edges, the estate was occupied by Brigadier General Robert W. Johnson, who made a number

of improvements to modernize the residence in keeping with the distinguished tradition of Morven. The environment, condition and history of the property make it eminently fitted for dedication to public use.

Conscious as we are of this generous gift, the State of New Jersey would be lacking in appreciation were it to permit the generosity of its benefactors to undermine their own reasonable needs. It has been my conviction for some time that Mrs. Edge and the Governor have learned to love Morven and might want to continue to make it their home. Even though the Edges have wholeheartedly offered to make their gift effective immediately, I would recommend that in accepting the property we provide appropriate assurance that no one, not even the State of New Jersey, has a right to interrupt, disturb or even trouble the residence of Governor or Mrs. Edge at any time so long as either one of them desires to make his or her home in Morven.

In order to carry out these purposes, I have today requested the majority leader in the Senate to introduce appropriate legislation.

The Speaker introduced Assemblyman Arnold Smith of Passaic County, who delivered the following address in commemoration of the birthday of Abraham Lincoln:

Mr. Speaker, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly:

It is refreshing indeed that we pause today in the course of our customary legislative duties in order to commemorate the 142nd anniversary of the birth of Abraham Lincoln, a person who has emblazoned a most remarkable and noble record upon the pages of the history of mankind.

No youth could have attended our schools and not have learned of the life, the character and the toils of Abraham Lincoln, the man who dedicated his life to the proposition that all men are truly created equal. I am certain that the saga of this impoverished boy who was raised in a humble log cabin and who subsequently journeyed onward to become our sixteenth President, is a story well known in the main to all of us.

It is stimulating to review the pages of history and to read of the fame, the glory and the courage of Lincoln from his birth until his untimely and mournful death, and to read further of his glorious and lifetime crusade to uphold his principles and philosophies of government and to do all within his power to strengthen the bonds of our Union.

A hasty glance at the many works and biographies dealing with Lincoln vividly portrays for us the picture of his star of destiny as it rose and transcended through the heavens and we are able to see the unfurling of Lincoln as a youth studying by the light of his fireside in order to educate himself. At all times he had the capable assistance of his step-mother who knew the inner soul of young Abe so very well. We see Lincoln moving on and we envision his attempts to earn his living as a storekeeper. We learn through the pages of these books of his athletic prowess, of his military service, and of his uncanny ability as an attorney. It is said in regard to his practice of the law that the elements of his power over an adversary were his perfect lucidity of statement, his great fairness in the treatment of both sides of a case, and his wonderful skill to conduct a common mind along the chain of his logic to his conclusion. I might say that these same legal skills were later to be found throughout his many activities, his letters and

his speeches and thus it is with good foundation that many persons describe Lincoln as a master of words. His Address at Gettysburg, his Second Inaugural Speech, his letter to Mrs. Bixby who lost five sons in the Civil War, all are considered to be exceptionally fine pieces of American Literature and masterpieces in simplicity coupled with penetrating but beautiful wording.

Then came the point in his life when he exhibited an interest in matters political and he subsequently was elected to the Illinois Legislature and to the Congress. Those achievements were followed by his unsuccessful run for United States Senator against Stephen Douglas, during which election campaign he and Douglas engaged in their famous debates. In regard to those debates, Douglas was led at a later date to comment that Lincoln afforded him more difficulty than all of the Abolitionists combined. Thereafter, Lincoln went on to become the Republican candidate for President and on November 6, 1860, he was elected to the highest office within our Nation.

His presidential administration saw the high point of the growing struggle between the States of the Union and during his term the North and the South became engrossed in a great Civil War. To Lincoln, this armed conflict between the sister States was a climactic peak in the history of our Nation and proved a test of the strength of our adherence to our democratic theory of government whereby we recognized our country as being ". . . one nation indivisible with liberty and justice for all."

Our Civil War President was subsequently re-elected for a second term and it was during his second administration that the smoke of the battles between the States filled the air no longer; for victory and peace had finally come for the Union armies, and the principles of the Great Emancipator.

Unfortunately, after the war years, Lincoln was not able to direct the complete task of reconstruction for a mortal shot fired by an assassin had sapped this great man of his very life. Thus, the last chapter in the life of a truly great American had come to an abrupt and mournful end.

In studying the life of Lincoln, we are impressed with the fact that he was a man of great humility and warmth and that he was an individual seized of a most strong con-

science, and he was possessed of certain fundamental principles which served him as pathways to destinies of righteousness. We know that Lincoln followed his principles and beliefs in a most firm manner but not in an obstinate way. For we need only to examine a few lines of Lincoln's letter to Horace Greeley to realize his fairmindedness in this regard. Those lines are as follows:

"I shall try to correct errors when shown to be errors, and I shall adopt new views so fast as they shall appear to be true views."

To persons everywhere, Abe Lincoln represents an example of the growth which is possible in this Great Nation of ours for all men who are possessed of intelligence, a will to succeed and a desire to aid their fellow man. Yes, Abraham Lincoln stands out as a vivid illustration of the fact that America is truly a land of equal opportunity for all.

It is interesting to note that as we stand faced today with certain national and international crises, the following words spoken by Lincoln in his Second Inaugural Address may still serve as a worthy creed:

"With malice toward none, with charity for all, with firmness in the right as God gives us to see the right, let us strive on to finish the work we are in, to bind up the Nation's wounds, to care for him who shall have borne the battle and for his widow and his orphan, to do all which may achieve and cherish a just and lasting peace among ourselves and with all nations."

And, further as we observe the birth of Lincoln and pay honor to him, I say that we should pause and give thought to the fact that we must repledge and restrengthen our allegiance to this form of government of the people, by the people and for the people so that this Nation shall not perish from the earth. And we should be strongly mindful that we must fulfill our pledge and that if we falter, then the torch by which the footsteps of mankind are being lighted onward and upward will lose its flame and men throughout this world will become lost in the darkness of ignorance and despotism.

There is then reposed upon us, as the guardians of those liberties which Lincoln cherished so well, a solemn and sacred trust to preserve and carry high the brightly lit

torch of liberty and freedom so that all of the peoples of the world might partake of its benefits. Let us all then be appreciative of the fact that the task of carrying the torch of liberty and freedom is an assignment to be energetically taken up by each and every one of us, and we must not falter in this task of preserving and perpetuating that torch of liberty and freedom.

The Speaker recognized Mr. Jamieson, of Warren county, who received permission to read a letter written by Lieut. Samuel Ely, of the 20th Regiment Pennsylvania Cavalry, written in 1863 to his mother following his encampment in Gettysburg for the dedication of the cemetery by President Abraham Lincoln.

WHEREAS, These moneys are deposited in the general treasury of the United States and not earmarked specifically for the purpose of paying the cost of the unemployment insurance program in the various States; and

WHEREAS, New Jersey employers have paid under this excise tax the sum of \$91,380,000 from 1938 to 1950, inclusive, while the Federal Government has returned to New Jersey for the administration of its employment security program during the same period only \$41,674,281; making an excess of \$49,705,719 in the moneys paid to the Federal Government over the grants to this State for the operation of the program; and

WHEREAS, The grants made to New Jersey for the operation of its unemployment insurance and employment service systems are not sufficient for an adequate administration of the employment security program; therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED *by the Senate (the General Assembly of the State of New Jersey concurring):*

1. The Congress of the United States is hereby memorialized to adopt legislation which will insure the return to each

of the several States amounts sufficient for an adequate administration of the employment security program.

2. The Secretary of State is hereby directed forthwith to transmit a copy of this concurrent resolution, properly authenticated, to the President of the United States, to the respective presiding officers of the United States Senate and the House of Representatives, and to all the Senators and Representatives from New Jersey in the Congress of the United States.

3. This concurrent resolution shall take effect immediately.

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 106

To the General Assembly:

I am returning herewith, without my approval, Assembly Bill No. 106, for the following reasons:

This measure would require the Director of the Division of Motor Vehicles in the "Department of the Treasury" (the reference should be to the Department of Law and Public Safety) to issue special registration plates to an applicant who is the holder of an unrevoked and unexpired official amateur radio license issued by the Federal Communications Commission.

The plates are to bear the official amateur radio call letters assigned to such applicant by the Federal Communications Commission and these call letters are to be in lieu of the usual markings. A fee of \$2.00 in addition to the regular fee is required for each registration issued under the authority of Assembly Bill No. 106.

The amateur radio operator is a useful citizen, frequently performing highly meritorious services with which I have had some personal familiarity.

If this bill were approved, however, the Division of Motor Vehicles would be required to manufacture on an individual basis registration plates to be issued to such applicant. Whereas, it is the present practice to manufacture plates in series, this would not be possible in the case of plates issued to amateur radio operators under the pro-

posed law due to the individuality of the call letters assigned to the various amateur radio stations. If this bill were enacted into law it would substantially increase the costs of the plates as well as the cost of administration. These increased costs would substantially exceed the \$2.00 payment.

It should also be noted that the bill makes no provision as to what should be done with a special registration in the event the amateur radio station license is revoked by the Federal Communications Commission during the life of the registration.

If an exception is made in favor of amateur radio operators, similar exceptions will be requested by other meritorious groups.

Accordingly, I am constrained to return the bill without my approval.

I am returning herewith, without my approval, Assembly Bill No. 136 for the following reasons:

This bill would blanket into the classified service of the civil service, without examination, the secretary and engineers now employed by municipal plant management commissions established pursuant to Chapter 245 of the Laws of 1946. Article VII, Section I, paragraph 2, of the State Constitution provides, in part that "Appointments and promotions in the civil service of the State, and of such political subdivisions as may be provided by law, shall be made

according to merit and fitness to be ascertained, as far as practicable, by examination, which, as far as practicable, shall be competitive; . . ." Article IV, Section VII, paragraph 9, subparagraph (5), of the Constitution prohibits, among other things, the enactment of special laws creating or increasing "tenure rights of any public officers or employees." The provisions of Assembly Bill No. 136 are in conflict with both of these provisions of the Constitution.

Accordingly, I am constrained to return the bill herewith without my approval.

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 145

To the General Assembly:

I am returning herewith, without my approval, Assembly Bill No. 145 for the following reasons:

The purpose of this bill is to establish Saturdays, between June 15 and September 15 in each year, "as public holidays" with respect to the transaction of business in public offices. Under existing law, Saturdays during July and August are considered "as public holidays."

Assembly Bill No. 171 of 1950 was designed to accomplish the same purpose as the instant bill. In returning Assembly Bill No. 171 to the Legislature without my approval, on July 8th of last year, I stated:

"The public business is a business of service for the convenience, welfare and safety of the people. To this end it is our obligation to keep public offices open at all reasonable hours. In this respect government cannot

and should not hope to emulate some private businesses which have seen fit to close on Saturdays. Many State and local services, including hospitals and police, must operate around the clock without interruption. Many offices, accordingly, may neither conveniently nor properly be closed, so-called public holidays to the contrary notwithstanding. Any increase in public holidays is bound to increase the cost of government.

“As employers, we can well appreciate the advantages of a five-day week for employee morale. But a five-day week for employees does not necessarily require a five-day week for the public business or an increase in the number of public holidays. Through careful administration, the management of public offices may in many instances arrange for a five-day week where this arrangement is proper and in the public interest. There is presently sufficient authority for the operation of public offices on Saturdays, other than those during July and August, with a skeleton force.

“While I sincerely hope that public employees can enjoy the greatest possible leisure consistent with their public trust; the conditions of work and paramount requirements of service to the public differ so widely in different departments and agencies, let alone in the different counties and municipalities, that the subject of Saturday closing cannot properly be regulated with any more uniformity than is already provided by law.”

For the same reasons, I am constrained to return Assembly Bill No. 145 without my approval

To the General Assembly:

I am returning herewith, without my approval, Assembly Bill No. 177 for the following reasons:

This bill would authorize the destruction of woodchucks "at any time, and in any manner, from April first to October first of each year."

In the reorganization act of 1948 which established the Department of Conservation and Economic Development (P. L. 1948, c. 448) the Legislature delegated to the State

Fish and Game Council authority to adopt, after notice and hearing, a State Fish and Game Code—the Code to include, among other things, regulations establishing open and closed seasons for hunting and fishing. The provisions of our law authorizing adoption of a code are looked upon as model legislation by many of our sister States. There would appear to be no sound reason for reverting to the earlier practice of effecting changes in open and closed seasons for hunting and fishing in every instance by piecemeal legislation.

Also, Assembly Bill No. 177 would have the effect of removing all restrictions upon the shooting of woodchucks with rifles. This is a field of sport in which regulation is most imperative, due to the dense population of the State and the fact that woodchucks may be found near dwellings, public highways and the like. The unsupervised use of rifles would constitute a serious threat to the safety of our citizens.

Accordingly, I recommend that regulation of the subject covered by Assembly Bill No. 177 be permitted to remain with the State Fish and Game Council. I am therefore returning the bill herewith without my approval.

I am advised that this is not the case, and that the Division of Local Government has approved appropriations by municipalities operating singly to render bedside nursing care, pursuant to the authority granted by R. S. 44:5-1.

There is also grave doubt as to the wisdom of the provision of the bill permitting a school district, independently and without regard for other programs or integration of local health programs, to enter into a contract to provide public health service. This provision of the bill can only lead to confusion, and overlapping of functions and services.

Accordingly, I am constrained to return Assembly Bill No. 189 without my approval.

I am returning herewith, without my approval, Assembly Bill No. 243, for the following reasons:

The bill imposes mandatory pension requirements upon Hudson County. It provides that any clerk or deputy clerk of a district court of a first class county of less than 800,000 population who is 65 years old and has been for 30 years continuously in such office or position and in a similar office or position of a former city district court of the county, shall be entitled to retire on a pension of not less than half-pay, the exact amount of such pension to be fixed by the freeholder board. Such clerk or deputy clerk may be

retired for physical or other disability which shall have developed during his term of office, if he has reached the age of 60 and been in continuous service for 25 years:

The widow of a person so retired, or of a clerk or deputy clerk who died in his office or position after 25 years of continuous service, would under this bill be entitled to a pension of not less than half the salary received by her husband at the time of his retirement or death, the amount to be fixed by the freeholder board, provided she married her husband prior to his retirement and before he reached age 50. (If the marriage occurs after the effective date of this measure, the surviving spouse must not have been more than 15 years younger than her husband at the time of the marriage.)

To be entitled to the benefits proposed by the bill, the clerk or deputy clerk must file with the county treasurer within 30 days after the effective date of the bill a written authorization to deduct 3% of his salary. If advantage is also sought to be taken of the widow's pension provision, authorization must be filed within the same period permitting an additional 2% deduction.

Assembly Bill No. 243 makes no pretense of actuarial soundness. It provides for employee contributions only, but does not set up a fund into which the contributions must be paid. It is obvious that insofar as the county is concerned, the pension arrangement created by this bill would operate on a current obligation basis.

Assembly Bill No. 243 is not in accord with the general policy of sound local pension legislation. It is the kind of bill which would encourage other and equally unsound pension proposals.

Accordingly, I am returning the bill herewith without my approval.

Since the introduction of this bill, the Division of Employment Security, Department of Labor and Industry, has made a further study and analysis of the effect of the enactment of this legislation upon the payment of benefits. I am advised that extending the period of appeal by five days would mean that the time for appeal would expire by the thirty-third day following the beginning of the benefit year. This means that if benefit checks should be held until the appeal period expires, checks covering the first, second and third compensable weeks of the benefit years could not be mailed out until the thirty-third day of the benefit year.

It is apparent that prompt payment of benefits cannot be accomplished by the enactment of this proposed legislation unless the administrative agency is called upon to take the administrative risk of issuing the first three checks before the date of appeal has expired. The alternative would defeat our primary objective of prompt payment of benefit claims. Normal procedure should require that the first payment be made not later than two weeks after the expiration of the first compensable week.

The bill would make it a misdemeanor, and also impose an additional penalty of \$200 therefor, for a person, while on a public hunting and fishing tract or other State-owned

lands under the control of the Division of Fish and Game in the Department of Conservation and Economic Development, to remove vegetation, soil, equipment or buildings therefrom, or to injure or destroy the same in any manner.

The proposed measure makes no exception in favor of a person removing vegetation, soil, equipment or buildings from such State-owned lands with the authority and permission of the Director of the Division of Fish and Game, or some other appropriate official.

The bill fixes a penalty of \$200 for each offense, "whether or not such person has been criminally prosecuted for such violation." If a person has already been prosecuted for a misdemeanor under another law (e. g., R. S. 2:174-2), on precisely the same set of facts, it would appear that this would be a defense to prosecution for a violation under Assembly Bill No. 392.

This measure would permit a motor vehicle registered in the name of a decedent to be operated by a duly licensed driver who is the surviving spouse or other member of the decedent's family, or by such driver authorized to drive the vehicle by the surviving spouse or other member of the family. Such operation would be permitted under and by virtue of the registration certificate issued for the vehicle to the decedent for a period not exceeding six months after his death, pending the granting of letters testamentary or letters of administration upon his estate.

The proposed legislation raises several difficult problems. The provision permitting operation of a motor vehicle by virtue of the registration certificate issued to the decedent could very well result in a situation where, decedent having died just before the end of the registration year, the registration would in effect be extended under this bill for a period of six months. Thus, proper consent having been given, the vehicle would be operated on the highways of this State under an expired registration.

Also lacking is any provisions as to insurance responsibility in the event of an accident causing property damage, or injury or death to an individual.

I am returning herewith, without my approval, Assembly Bill No. 480 for the following reasons:

This bill provides for the payment of an annual pension of \$2,500 to any court stenographic reporter who has served continuously as such "during twenty or more years" in the county courts of any county of the second class having a population of 275,000 to 325,000, or in the Superior Court, or any of the former courts to whose jurisdiction the Superior Court has succeeded, or in any or all of such courts. The provisions of the bill would apply to a stenographic reporter who is 65 years of age or more, who is physically incapacitated from further service as a court stenographic reporter, as shown by the certificates of two reputable physicians, and who "has retired or shall retire."

This measure is reminiscent of Assembly Bill No. 479 of the 1950 legislative session which was returned without my approval. The present bill is even less desirable since it singles out for special and preferential treatment, without any apparent basis, court stenographic reporters of one county.

As stated in my message returning Assembly Bill No. 479 last year, "It is desirable that any legislation providing for the retirement of court stenographers should be prepared on a comprehensive basis, after careful study."

Also, this bill presents difficult problems of construction and would undoubtedly result in conflicting interpretations, and perhaps costly litigation. Its provisions could be interpreted to apply to part-time court stenographers or those paid on a per diem basis, as well as to full-time court stenographers. It is also conceivable that, under this bill, a pension claim could be made upon the basis of continuous service for five or ten years *during* a period of 20 years or more.

Finally, the title of the bill is defective in that it purports to supplement Chapter 10 of Title 3 of the Revised Statutes. This reference is inapplicable. Apparently what was intended was a supplement to Chapter 10 of Title 43.

Accordingly, I am returning the bill without my approval.

It would circumvent innumerable provisions of law which have been set up to protect the public interest by requiring the deliberation and public notice of an ordinance. Each municipality is fully able to accomplish the results of this bill for itself, according to the merits of the local situation, whereas blanket validation of this kind will give the sanction of law to unforeseeable and perhaps even illegal actions.

Two other measures, Senate Bill No. 61 and Senate Bill No. 103, which validate the job status of municipal officers and employees affected by recent judicial decisions holding that their positions could only be created by ordinance, are reasonably specific in their application. When it is recognized, moreover, that a local governing body is free to fix compensation at any time, subject to the limitations of subtitle 3 of Title 11 where that Title has been adopted

by the municipality, it is apparent that a blanket validation of past compensation, such as is proposed by Assembly Bill No. 490, is neither desirable nor especially helpful.

I am therefore returning the bill without my approval.

The State Constitution requires that once a municipality has adopted the civil service system, appointments and promotions shall be made "according to merit and fitness to be ascertained, as far as practicable, by examination, which, as far as practicable, shall be competitive; . . ." (Article VII, Section I, Paragraph 2.)

R. S. 11:21-6 provides for covering all employees in the classified service of a municipality at the time it adopts Title 11. This established procedure, as well as the constitutional requirement, would be violated by the present bill. It would command that certain firemen who had been "temporarily employed" by the particular city and who had been laid off following the adoption of Title 11 by the voters of the city, must be reinstated as permanent employees in the competitive class which is protected by civil service tenure. The bill is unconstitutional. Any such "reinstatement" may not be effectuated by any act of the Legislature under the salutary requirements of our new State Constitution.

The bill follows upon two previous laws which I have approved. But neither of those laws purported to give civil service status to admittedly temporary employees. I am informed that the bill would benefit three men, appointed as temporary firemen for such period as permitted by law. In due course an examination was held and the men failed. Upon certification of names from the civil service eligible list established as a result of the examination, these men had to be laid off. Much as I regret my inability to help these men the principles of civil service must be protected from erosion by efforts to meet special situations.

Accordingly, I am constrained to return this bill without my approval.

It should also be noted that the bill contains no provision that the deed shall have been duly recorded in the manner required by law, or that the bill is to be effective only where no court action has been instituted or is pending directly attacking the validity of such conveyance on grounds other than failure to report and obtain court approval of the sale.

S. 3:25-21, is to allow an executor, trustee or administrator with the will annexed, to make a bona fide sale pursuant to testamentary power and without court approval, within the year following testator's death, free and clear of the statutory lien of decedent's debts.

Court approval of such a sale is desirable and does not unreasonably burden the courts. Although it is argued that the proceeds of the sale become available for the payment of decedent's debts, it is entirely possible that a sale made pursuant to a testamentary power might have been for a sum which the court would not approve as reasonable and fair. In such circumstances the estate would suffer, and the creditors with it. That the creditors might have some other remedy is not in point; the estate is always entitled to maximum realization from the sale of its assets.

Accordingly, I am constrained to return the bill without my approval.

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 603

To the General Assembly:

I am returning herewith, without my approval, Assembly Bill No. 603, for the following reasons:

The statement attached to the bill refers to a number of deeds and mortgages on record in this State which are made to the grantee or mortgagee as "trustee" or "agent," without other language therein showing a trust or expressly limiting the grantee's or mortgagee's powers, or naming those for whose benefit the same is made, and where there is no language contained in any other recorded instrument showing the same and the terms and provisions thereof.

The proposed legislation provides that the use of the words "trustee" or "agent," in such cases, shall not be deemed to give notice or put upon inquiry any person acquiring an interest in such land that a trust or agency

exists, or that there are beneficiaries other than those disclosed by the record, or any limitations on the grantee's power to sell or mortgage the lands or on the mortgagee's power to assign, release or satisfy the mortgage held by him. Assembly Bill No. 603 would free any purchaser, mortgagee or lessee of any such grantee designated as "trustee" or "agent," or the assignee of a mortgagee similarly designated, from responsibility for the proper application of any purchase or mortgage money. The provisions of the bill are not to apply to actions now pending or heretofore determined in any court of this State, nor to actions brought prior to the expiration of four years from the effective date of the bill in which any such deed, lease or mortgage heretofore recorded is called into question, or in which the right of any beneficiaries in the lands described therein are involved.

The words "trustee" or "agent," or words of similar import following the name of a grantee or mortgagee in a recorded instrument, should be notice to the world that the grantee or mortgagee has strictly limited powers. The mere fact that the terms and conditions of the trust or agency, or the names of the beneficiaries, are not set out in the instrument itself or in some other recorded instrument, should not permit one who deals with such grantee or mortgagee to ignore the possibility of an existing trust or agency, or to be freed from responsibility for the application of any purchase or mortgage money.

Those who execute deeds and mortgages wherein the grantee or mortgagee is expressly designated as "trustee" or "agent" should not have their intention and plan frustrated by legislation such as is here proposed. Under Assembly Bill No. 603 one can readily conceive of a situation where a purchaser, mortgagee, lessee or assignee for value know, outside the record, the purpose for which or the beneficiaries for whom the trust or agency was intended. They thus deal with full knowledge and should not be relieved of the duty of seeing to the application of the purchase or mortgage proceeds.

"Trustee," "agent," or words of like import have a common acceptance. This bill would destroy the established duties and obligations that flow from the use of such express and clearly understood language in recorded instruments.

For these reasons, I am constrained to return Assembly Bill No. 603 without my approval.

SECOND COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE FOR ASSEMBLY BILL No. 650

To the General Assembly:

I am returning herewith, without my approval, Second Committee Substitute for Assembly Bill No. 650, for the following reasons:

The purpose of this bill is to authorize the Board of Public Utility Commissioners, in fixing "just and reasonable" rates for auto bus operators, when it finds that the "operations have been conducted in an honest, efficient and economical manner," to fix rates on the basis of an operating ratio which shall be in the proportion which operating revenue deductions, including charges for depreciation and taxes, shall bear to the total operating revenues. The bill specifically provides that in the application of such operating ratio "the operating revenue deductions, including charges for depreciation and taxes, shall not be less than ninety per centum (90%) nor more than ninety-five per centum (95%) of the total operating revenues resulting from such rates, to the extent that the board may find it just and reasonable." Thus the bill purports to establish a new standard of "reasonableness" for rates for auto buses.

It is generally recognized that rate-making is a proper legislative function. The Board of Public Utility Commissioners, to which the Legislature has delegated its rate-making power, when it fixes rates is carrying out the policy established by the Legislature. The policy heretofore established by the Legislature is to be found in the statement in R. S. 48:2-21 (b) that rates shall be "just and reasonable." While R. S. 48:2-21 requires the Board to conform to standards of "reasonableness," it does not specifically state what the Legislature regards as "reasonable." Under these circumstances, as was to be expected, the courts have been called upon by judicial decision to define standards of "reasonableness."

The Board and, for that matter, the Legislature may not establish a rate which the court will hold "unjust, unrea-

sonable, insufficient or unjustly discriminatory or preferential." (R. S. 48:2-21 (b)). In the performance of its difficult duties, the Board of Public Utility Commissioners has been, and indeed should be, vested with broad discretion in the exercise of its authority.

The serious question raised by the bill is whether the new standard purported to be established by the Legislature is "just and reasonable." Equally serious is the question whether or not the bill, if it becomes a law, will restrict or broaden the discretionary authority presently vested in the Board of Public Utility Commissioners.

The legislative history of the bill is interesting. As introduced on March 5, 1951, its purpose, as indicated in the statement attached to the bill, was to permit the Board of Public Utility Commissioners to apply the principle of "operating ratio" in rate cases involving "independent" bus companies. The first Committee Substitute for Assembly Bill No. 650 differed from the original bill in many important respects. Thereafter, a second Committee Substitute for Assembly Bill No. 650 was reported favorably with certain material changes. The bill as finally adopted contained additional changes and applies to all bus operators. It is apparent that within the limited period of time that this bill was before the Legislature there was considerable change in legislative thinking on the subject. In my judgment, further study is desirable.

After consultation with the President of the Board of Public Utility Commissioners, and a review of the decision of the Supreme Court in the case of *Public Service Co-ordinated Transport vs. State*, 5 N. J. 196, I am certain that the provisions of R. S. 48:2-21 and R. S. 48:2-21.1 empower and authorize the Board of Public Utility Commissioners to meet every reasonable objective of Assembly Bill No. 650 between now and the next regular session of the Legislature.

At the present time there is pending before the Board of Public Utility Commissioners certain applications to fix rates. It seems unwise to change the rule and to establish new standards while these proceedings are in process.

Assembly Bill No. 650, as it is presently drawn, appears to me to limit rather than expand the broad discretionary power now vested in the Board of Public Utility Commis-

sioners. The Legislature in establishing the standard of reasonableness gave to the Board a wide discretion with respect to the precise rate it may determine to be reasonable. In other words, there may be more than "one correct answer." *I. C. C. vs. Union Pacific Railroad*, 222 U. S. 541, 550. In *United States vs. Chicago, M., St. P. & P. R. R.*, 294 U. S. 499, 506, Mr. Justice Cardozo referred to a "zone of reasonableness." Or, as Mr. Justice Heher stated in *Atlantic City Sewerage Co. vs. Board of Public Utility Commissioners*, 128 N. J. Law 359, 366, affirmed 129 N. J. Law 401, "There is no formula making for certainty in the exercising of this authority. The estimation of the fair value base is not controlled by arbitrary rules. It is not 'a matter of formulas,' but rather of 'a reasonable judgment' grounded 'in a proper consideration of all relevant facts.'"

The current bill, however, states that the operating revenue deductions, including charges for depreciation and taxes "shall not be less than ninety per centum (90%) nor more than ninety-five per centum (95%) of the total operating revenues resulting from such rates, * * *." In the first Committee Substitute the corresponding figures were 85% and 90%. Thus the bill, while purporting to liberalize present standards, may in fact restrict those standards.

Despite its apparent limitations, the current bill establishes a formula that might, under unhappy circumstances, be subject to abuse either way—against the public and in favor of the bus operator, or vice versa. By its very limitation in the establishment of a new "limited" standard it may well provide the excuse for some future substitution of an arbitrary decision for "a reasonable judgment."

Apparently as a condition precedent to the adoption of the operating ratio standard, the Board would be required to find that the operations of the applicant have "been conducted in an honest, efficient and economical manner." It is entirely possible that this requirement would place an intolerable burden upon the present staff of the Board of Public Utility Commissioners. It would require the Board to determine the reasonableness of salaries and to examine operating methods and procedures heretofore regarded as within the more or less exclusive jurisdiction of management. If the Board is to be asked to assume this responsibility it will need substantial additions to its staff. No provision has been made to meet this requirement.

Because I am confident that the Board of Public Utility Commissioners presently is vested with ample statutory authority to accomplish all reasonable and meritorious objectives of the sponsor of this bill, I am constrained to return it without my approval with the recommendation that the entire subject be given further consideration between now and the next regular session of the Legislature.

Also, there is no requirement in the bill that the portion of the fire district to be annexed about the fire district to which it will be annexed, so as to form a compact unit.

Accordingly, I am constrained to return this bill without my approval.

The stated purpose of the amendments to the Agricultural Co-operative Associations Act of 1924 (R. S. 4:13-1 *et seq.*) proposed by this is to clarify its provisions, to authorize such associations to utilize modern methods of capitalization already in use by many cooperatives and which have been approved by the federal tax authorities, and to make other improvements in the law. Among the latter are provisions relating to the orderly distribution of the assets of cooperatives upon dissolution, after payment of debts and other liabilities, and provisions that will strengthen the supervision of the Department of Agriculture over these associations.

Sections 7 and 8 make reference to certain provisions of "this section" when the obviously intended reference was to "this act."

Accordingly, I am returning herewith Assembly Bill No. 103 for reconsideration and with the recommendation that amendments to the Bill (Official Copy Reprint) be made as follows:

On page 6, section 7, line 8, change the word "section" to the word "act".

On page 6, section 8, line 3, change the words "section, together" to the words "act, together", and change the words "section, to each" to the words "act, to each".

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, paragraph 14 (b) of the State Constitution, I am returning herewith, for reconsideration and with my objections, Assembly Bill No. 112.

Sections 19:14-8 and 19:14-10 of the Revised Statutes prescribe the order of arrangement of titles of office on the general election ballot. The object of the bill as originally introduced was to place the names of candidates for freeholder ahead of the names of candidates for coroner. Subsequent amendments to the bill were obviously intended to make this change in ballot arrangement applicable only in counties having twelve or less freeholders. However, the amendments were made to section 19:14-8 only, whereas they should also have been made to section 19:14-10. Moreover, the amendments to section 19:14-8 were deficient because certain offices were omitted in the order of arrangement.

Accordingly, I am returning herewith Assembly Bill No. 112 for reconsideration and with the recommendation that amendments be made to the bill (Second Official Copy Reprint) as follows:

On page 1, section 1, line 11, after the word "sheriff" delete the comma and insert in lieu thereof a semicolon.

On page 1, section 1, line 12, after the word "supervisor" delete the comma and insert in lieu thereof a semicolon.

On page 1, section 1, line 13, before the word "coroners" delete the comma and insert in lieu thereof a semicolon.

On page 2, section 1, line 16A, after the semicolon following the word "Senate" insert: "Governor; member of the House of Representatives; member of the State Senate;"

On page 2, section 1, line 16B, change the word "member" to "members".

On page 2, section 2, line 7, before the word "Such" insert: "In counties having twelve or less freeholders," and change the capital "S" in "Such" to a small "s".

This Bill represents a substantial improvement in our statutes (Article 4 of Chapter 7 of Title 4 of the Revised Statutes) governing the distribution, sale and transportation of insecticides.

Problems relating to insecticides, however, involve public health as well as agricultural programs of our State Government. Assembly Bill No. 123 does not sufficiently recognize several important public health aspects of the overall problem.

Accordingly, after conferring with the Secretary of Agriculture and the State Commissioner of Health, I am returning the measure herewith, with the recommendation that amendments to the Bill (Second Official Copy Reprint) be made as follows:

On page 5, section 2, line 111, delete the semicolon and the words "and which," and insert ", which instructions, if complied with, would be adequate for the protection of the public in accordance with such rules as may be adopted for such purpose by the Director of the New Jersey Agricultural Experiment Station, after consultation with the State Commissioner of Health;".

On page 5, section 2, delete line 112, in its entirety.

On page 5, section 2, line 114, delete the word "and," and insert the words ", which warning or caution statement,".

On page 5, section 2, line 115, delete the semicolon and insert the words ", in accordance with such rules as may be adopted for such purpose by the Director of the New Jersey Agricultural Experiment Station, after consultation with the State Commissioner of Health;".

On page 17; section 24, line 3, after the word "poisons," insert the words "except as otherwise expressly provided by this act,".

On page 17, section 24, line 5, after the word "acts" insert the words ", pertaining to the distribution, sale and transportation of economic poisons,".

On page 17, immediately following section 25, insert the following new section:

"26. Nothing contained herein shall in any way be construed to alter, limit or repeal any of the functions, powers and duties of the State Department of Health or the State Commissioner of Health or any local board of health, as otherwise provided by law."

On page 17, section 26, line 1, change the section number "26" to section number "27".

This notice is a useful and needed requirement. It facilitates service of process where the Secretary of State has not yet received a certificate of change of principal office from the board of directors of the corporation, as required by the provisions of R. S. 14:4-5.

Accordingly, I am returning herewith Assembly Bill No. 170 for reconsideration and with the recommendation that amendment be made to the bill (Official Copy Reprint) as follows:

This bill would amend Chapter 302 of the Laws of 1949, a comprehensive and carefully considered measure fixing the annual salaries of county district court judges, by increasing the salary of the judges of the Monmouth County District Court from \$4,000 to \$7,000. The original bill proposed a \$7,500 salary; this figure was changed by amendment to \$6,000 and finally fixed at \$7,000.

The \$6,000 salary proposed at one point during the passage of the bill through the Legislature would appear to be a more reasonable figure. I am informed that some time ago, when the calendar of the Monmouth County District Court was rather heavy, outside district court judges sat in Monmouth County to bring the calendar up to date. Procedures were then established to make certain that the two regular district court judges would spend two full days each week in the trial of cases. The judges will be sitting approximately 35% of the time a full-time County Court judge would sit. The \$6,000 salary would be 37.5% of the salary of such full-time County Court judge.

The \$7,000 salary figure proposed under Assembly Bill No. 215 would be out of line with the volume of work being handled in the Monmouth County District Court and the time required therefor.

Accordingly, I am returning herewith Assembly Bill No. 215 for reconsideration and with the recommendation that amendment be made to the bill (Third Official Copy Reprint) as follows:

On page 2, section 1, line 30, delete the words and figures "seven thousand dollars (\$7,000.00)" and insert in lieu thereof the words and figures "six thousand dollars (\$6,000.00)".

R. S. 18:13-19 presently authorizes boards of education to reduce the number of supervising principals, principals *or* teachers, when the reduction is due "to a natural diminution of the number of pupils" in the school district. Although dismissal by reason of such reduction is based on seniority, the present law is not clear on certain phases of seniority and the re-employment rights of those whose positions are abolished.

Assembly Bill No. 222 would amend R. S. 18:13-19 by adding superintendents and assistant superintendents to the other categories of positions mentioned in the present section. It proposes a reasonable method of determining seniority and re-employment rights in the various fields of administrative, supervisory, teaching or other educational services under standards established by the Commissioner of Education, with the approval of the State Board of Education. Provision is made for advisory service by the Commissioner of Education to local boards of education with respect to the application of such standards to a particular situation.

In printing the original bill, the words "or teachers" in R. S. 18:13-19 was changed to "and teachers." This substantial change was not indicated as a proposed amendment. This change from "or" to "and" may raise a serious problem of interpretation.

Accordingly, I am returning herewith Assembly Bill No. 222, for reconsideration and with the recommendation that amendment be made to the bill (Second Official Copy Reprint) as follows:

On page 1, section 1, line 7-8, change the words "and teachers" to the words "or teachers".

I am advised that these annual registrations do not cover a calendar year. In fact, under the section proposed to be amended by this bill annual certificates of registration are required to be obtained on or before November 1st of each year. The registration certificates issued are for the period beginning November 1st and ending October 31st of the following year.

In addition, the bill as originally introduced contained a section supplementing Chapter 6 of Title 45 of the Revised Statutes. The supplementary matter was deleted by amendment in Legislature prior to final adoption of the measure. The title to the bill, containing reference to the supplement, was not amended to conform with the deletion.

Accordingly, I am returning Assembly Bill No. 254 herewith for reconsideration and with the recommendation that amendments to the bill (Second Official Copy Reprint) be made as follows:

On page 1, Title, line 1, after the word "dentistry", delete the word "and".

On page 1, Title, line 2, after the word "therefor", insert the word "and".

On page 1, Title, lines 2 and 3, after the words "section 45:6-10" delete ", and supplementing chapter six of Title 45,".

On page 3, section 2, line 1, after the word "immediately" insert a period and delete the remainder of the line.

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, paragraph 14 (b) of the State Constitution, I am returning herewith, for reconsideration and with my objections, Assembly Bill No. 256.

The apparent object of the bill is to authorize a licensed agent of an insurance company to countersign policies of insurance by an attorney or attorneys in fact. The amendment to section one provides for filing the names of the person or persons authorized to act as such attorney or attorneys in fact for such agent, with the Commissioner of Banking and Insurance.

An error apparently occurred in drafting the amendatory language to section 15 of the original act, contained in section 2 of the bill. As this section now reads, a licensed agent could not countersign insurance contracts for and on behalf of his company unless there was on file with the Commissioner of Banking and Insurance an unrevoked certificate authorizing the agent to countersign by an attorney in fact named therein. Obviously, the amendment was not intended to restrict the countersigning of insurance policies to licensed agents who have filed the names of attorneys in fact with the Commissioner.

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 298

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, paragraph 14 (b) of the State Constitution, I am returning herewith, for reconsideration and with my objections, Assembly Bill No. 298.

This bill deals with one of the tragic aftermaths of the South Amboy explosion of May 19, 1950. The widows and orphans of some of the men who lost their lives in that explosion have, in a number of cases, been unable to prove the fact of death by identification of the bodies of their lost ones. The bill would seek to assist these distressed people by declaring 31 individuals, named in the bill, to be dead. While the list was undoubtedly prepared with care, neither the Legislative nor the Executive Branch of the government has any way of verifying its accuracy before giving it the stamp of law. We should certainly be cautious lest we declare dead a person who is in fact alive.

Present law provides for the establishment of a presumption of death in certain cases. One of these is the presumption of death which arises from seven consecutive years of absence (R. S. 3:42-1). Under the statute the presumption may be overcome by proof that the person "was alive

within that time." The present bill makes no similar provision even though the time elapsed is little more than a year. Another presumption of death depends upon a written finding made by the Secretary of War, the Secretary of the Navy, or certain other federal officers and agencies, pursuant to the Federal Missing Persons Act. Since 1945 the State has accepted a finding under that statute as presumptive evidence of death. (Laws of 1945, c. 46) Under this statute, proof that a person was in fact alive may overcome the presumption of death.

It is important to note that in each case the legislation creates only a presumption, and that a long, unexplained absence or an official determination by a responsible public officer is the basis of the presumption. In addition, the courts of this State apply the so-called "special peril" doctrine to permit a presumption of death prior to the expiration of seven years. This doctrine would seem to apply under the circumstances of the present bill. In the case of *Lukens vs Camden Trust Co.*, 2 N. J. Super. 214 (1948) the court summarized its holding:

"The death of an absent person may be inferred or presumed before the expiration of seven years where, in connection with other particular circumstances, it appears that within that period he encountered some special peril or came within range of some impending or imminent danger which might reasonably be expected to destroy life."

To look to the process of legislation for an absolute declaration of death is to place upon the Legislative and Executive Branches a responsibility for which we have neither the facilities nor the moral right to discharge. In order to render all possible assistance to those affected, however, we may establish a presumption of death based upon the certification of local authorities who are in the best position to determine the facts.

Accordingly, I am returning herewith Assembly Bill No. 298 for reconsideration and with the recommendation that amendments be made to the bill (Official Copy Reprint) as follows:

On page 1, Title, line 3, strike out "and declared".

On page 1, section 1, lines 1 and 2, strike out all of said lines and insert in lieu thereof the following:

"1. The county prosecutor of the County of Middlesex, upon proof submitted to him, or from other information, sufficient to satisfy him that any person of those listed below may reasonably be presumed to have lost his life in the explosion which occurred in the harbor of the City of South Amboy on May 19, 1950, shall issue his certificate that such person is presumed to be dead, stating the date, circumstances and place of such death:".

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, paragraph 14 (b) of the State Constitution, I am returning herewith, for reconsideration and with my objections, Assembly Bill No. 313.

A new pension to widows and children of policemen and firemen for ordinary death, is a desirable and necessary benefit, especially in light of the depreciation in the value of insurance policies and pension benefits due to national inflation. The Bill would provide an annual pension of \$1,000 to the widow and surviving children of any policeman or fireman who died under conditions where no accidental death benefit would otherwise be payable under the Police and Firemen's Retirement System (Laws of 1944, c. 255).

The value of this new benefit would be very substantial. Based upon the capital required to pay \$1,000 per annum to a widow until death or remarriage, on the basis of a three per cent interest rate and the mortality table adopted by the pension board, an actuarial estimate of the value has been made as follows:

Age of Widow at Death of Member	Value of Annual Pension of \$1,000
30	\$22,882
35	21,675
40	20,311
45	18,790
50	17,119

Our Police and Firemen's Retirement System fund has been established at great pains on a sound actuarial basis. The annual contributions which are paid into the fund are designed to meet the cost of paying the benefits available. Basically, these contributions are made in equal shares by the policeman or fireman and his employer, except for benefits related to accident or death in the performance of duty. Those familiar with the origin of the present sound pension and retirement system will recall that the investigations that preceded its adoption showed that pensions to widows and children had proved very costly under the old unsound pension law, and they were not included in the new law originally in order to avoid their cost on the one hand; and the past mistakes of including them without adequate provision for paying their cost on the other.

The present bill includes no service requirement so that any married member of the Retirement System, from the month he enters service, would have the benefit of insurance worth many thousands of dollars. The bill requires no reserves to be accumulated to provide this benefit, and would place upon the State Treasury the burden of making the contributions necessary to provide pension payments to the widows and children. This would be a cost to the State, as estimated by a leading actuary, which would eventually run over \$1,000,000 a year. The State has no funds with which to meet this expense. Of even greater importance, the method of financing the proposed benefits would depart from the principle of an actuarially sound benefit structure upon

which we have built the whole new system. It would restore the old discredited, non-actuarial and non-reserve ideas which eventually destroyed the solvency and security of police and firemen's pensions, and resulted in the adoption of a completely new system in 1944.

I should be very pleased to add my unqualified approval to this bill if it were actuarially sound. The bill has genuine merit, and the policemen and firemen of this State, and their families, are entitled to the assurance that as soon as proper financing provisions are included, the proposed benefits will become operative. In order to provide an opportunity to accomplish this result, I am recommending that the effective date of the measure be postponed for six months beyond that stated in the bill, and that it be enacted as a law subject to the adoption of appropriate legislation to protect the promised benefits with an actuarially sound basis of contributions.

To accomplish this result, I am returning Assembly Bill No. 313 for reconsideration and with the recommendation that amendments be made to the bill (Official Copy Reprint) as follows:

On pages 2 to 7, inclusive, delete sections 2 and 3 in their entirety.

On page 7, delete section 4 in its entirety, and insert in lieu thereof the following:

2. This act shall take effect on July first, one thousand nine hundred and fifty-two, provided that on or before that date legislation shall have been adopted to provide for the actuarial determination and apportionment of the cost of the pension to widows and children on ordinary death provided by this act, and for the payment of such cost by the members and their employers, or either of them, either with or without an option to each member to accept the added benefits and their cost."

It is inconceivable that one could be charged with and tried for violating regulations respecting "et cetera."

In addition, there is a technical error in the introductory language of sections 1, 2 and 3, in that no reference is made to the Revised Statutes.

Accordingly, I am returning herewith Assembly Bill No. 358, for reconsideration and with the recommendation that amendments to the bill (Official Copy Reprint) be made as follows:

This bill would authorize the submission to referendum of a proposal to issue State bonds in the sum of \$15,000,000 for the purpose of construction, reconstruction, development, extension, improvement, equipment and facilities of State Teachers' College buildings. Additional facilities for our State Teachers' Colleges are urgently required. Accordingly, I am in complete agreement with the purpose of this measure. Any doubt, that I may have with respect to the virtues of the measure are directed at the proposed method of financing the improvements.

In every new undertaking the State must consider the need for the project as well as its ability to finance the project. In other words, we must consider the over-all financial position of the State. In this respect it should be noted that Assembly Bill No. 557 provides for the payment of the proposed bonds and the interest upon the same from

revenue to be derived from a 15 per cent surtax on the transfer of property, taxable under Chapter 34 of Title 54 of the Revised Statutes. The new surtax would be established by a companion measure, Assembly Bill No. 558.

The proposed surtax would increase New Jersey "death taxes" substantially beyond those in neighboring States. We have traditionally sought to maintain a preferred tax position for New Jersey citizens. The proposed surtax would place New Jersey at a competitive disadvantage. In addition, it is entirely possible that a 15 per cent sur-inheritance tax would produce less revenue with a higher rate than the present tax. Removal of a very few large estates from the State could result in a substantial reduction in anticipated inheritance tax revenue. Inheritance tax revenues are unpredictable at best. While they totaled 14.9 million dollars gross in 1947, the average for the past three years was 8.6 million dollars.

For the foregoing reasons, I recommend that there be no increase in tax rates in this State at this time. Solely because I believe that the voters of the State should be given an opportunity to pass upon the proposed additions to the facilities of our State Teachers' Colleges without further delay, I am recommending that there be a dedication of so much of the inheritance and estate tax revenues, under present laws, as may be necessary to provide for the payment of principal and interest of the bonds authorized by Assembly Bill No. 557 subject, of course, to the contemplated referendum.

Accordingly, I am returning herewith Assembly Bill No. 557 for reconsideration and with the recommendation that amendments be made to the bill (Official Copy Reprint) as follows:

On page 6, section 17, delete lines 4 to 7B, inclusive, in their entirety, and insert in lieu thereof the following: "(a) Revenue derived from the tax imposed upon the transfer of property real and personal, taxable under Chapter 34 of Title 54 of the Revised Statutes, as amended and supplemented, or so much thereof as may be required."

On page 7, section 17, immediately following line 25, insert the following new paragraph:

“If on or before the thirty-first day of December in any year the issuing officials shall determine that there are moneys in the General State Fund beyond the needs of the State, sufficient to meet the principal of bonds falling due and all interest payable in the ensuing calendar year, then and in that event such issuing officials shall by resolution so find and shall file the same in the office of the State Treasurer, whereupon the State Treasurer shall transfer such moneys to a separate fund to be designated by him, and shall pay the principal and interest out of said fund as the same shall become due and payable, and the other sources of payment of said principal and interest provided for in this section shall not then be available, and the receipts for said year from transfer interitance taxes above referred to shall thereupon be considered as part of the General State Fund, available for general purposes.”

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 561

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article B, Section I, paragraph 14 (b) of the State Constiution, I am returning herewith for reconsideration and with my objections, Assembly Bill No. 561.

This bill is designed to implement the carefully-prepared anti-discrimination program which has been adopted by the Legislature, in co-operation with the Executive, during recent years. The program has worked well and has produced a wholesome atmosphere of community relations and understanding in place of the former mistrust, friction and ineffective system of legal redress.

This bill to prevent discrimination against school children by reason of their observance of a religious holiday fits into the existing program. It is particularly important, however, that new legislation in this difficult field should be administratively feasible and should meet the reasonable needs of local school systems for full and complete records. Since there appeared to be some doubt on this score in the bill as presented to me, amendments have been prepared after consultation with the representatives of the Department of Education to clarify the purpose and operation of the legislation. These amendments have the full support of the sponsor, and the State Department of Education agrees that they will greatly improve the workability of the measure.

Accordingly, I am returning herewith Assembly Bill No. 561 for reconsideration and with the recommendation that amendments be made to the bill (Second Official Copy Reprint) as follows:

On page 1, section 1, line 3, after the word "absence" delete the comma and the remainder of the line.

On page 1, section 1, delete line 4 in its entirety.

On page 1, section 1, line 5, delete the words "member, or".

On page 1, section 1, line 6, delete the words "any test" and insert the words "an alternate test".

On page 1, section 1, line 6, after the word "examination," insert the words "for any which he missed by reason of such absence,".

On page 1, following section 1, insert two new sections to read as follows:

"2. For the purposes of the administration of this act, any absence because of religious holidays shall be recorded as excused absence on the pupil's attendance record or on that of any group or class of which he is a member. Any transcript or application or employment form or any similar form on which information concerning a pupil's attendance record is requested shall show, with respect to absences, only absences other than absences excused because of religious holidays.

“3. The Commissioner of Education, with the approval of the State Board of Education, shall prescribe such rules and regulations as may be necessary to carry out the purposes of this act. Such rules and regulations shall include, but not be limited to, a list of holidays on which it shall be mandatory to excuse a pupil under the provisions of this act. Nothing herein contained shall be construed to limit the right of any board of education, as its discretion, to excuse absence on any other day by reason of the observance of a religious holiday.”

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, paragraph 14 (b) of the State Constitution, I am returning herewith, for reconsideration and with my objections, Assembly Bill No. 651.

The stated purpose of Assembly Bill No. 651, amending R. S. 45:6-20, is to permit an internship or residency for a longer period than now provided in the statute, and to provide for a fee for the issuance or renewal of certificates by the State Board of Registration and Examination in Dentistry.

In the course of its passage through the Legislature, this bill was amended to include internship or residency in private licensed hospitals and in private institutions. Although this addition was made in the opening clause of R. S. 45:6-20 (see line 5 of the Second Official Copy Reprint), a related clause requiring public display of the certificate issued by the Board to an interne or resident (lines 11-12) was not amended. Also, R. S. 45:6-20, the subject of Assembly Bill No. 651, is inter-related with R. S. 45:6-21. Although the latter section mentions dental internes it does not anywhere refer to residents, nor does it refer to private licensed hospitals or private institutions. I am advised by the State Board of Registration and Examination in Dentistry that the two sections should apply equally to residents and internes, whether practicing in public or private licensed hospitals or other public or private institutions. Accordingly, and if the two sections are to be consistent, R. S. 45:6-21 should contain the same changes as were made in R. S. 45:6-20.

I am, therefore, returning herewith Assembly Bill No. 651 for reconsideration and with the recommendation that amendments be made to the bill (Second Official Copy Reprint) as follows:

On page 1, title, line 2, after the word "amending" delete the words "section 45:6-20" and insert in lieu thereof the words "sections 45:6-20 and 45:6-21".

On page 1, section 1, line 11, before the word "hospital" insert the words "or private licensed".

On page 1, section 1, line 12, after the word "public" insert the words "or private".

Immediately after section 1 insert a new section 2 to read as follows:

"2. Section 45:6-21 of the Revised Statutes is amended to read as follows:

"45:6-21. The services rendered by any such interne or resident shall be strictly confined to the inmates and registered patients of the public or private licensed hospital or other public or private institution to which he is attached, and shall be performed under the supervision of a regularly licensed dentist of this State, who shall be a member of the staff of such hospital or institution. Every public or private licensed hospital or other public or private institution to which any such interne or resident is attached shall be subject to inspection by the board, or by its duly accredited inspectors or representatives."

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, paragraph 14 (b) of the State Constitution, I am returning herewith for reconsideration and with my objections, Assembly Bill No. 656.

A revision of the law regulating the storage in refrigerated warehouses and locker plants of food or drink is particularly timely in view of the great increase in the cold storage of foods since the adoption of the Cold Storage Law a number of years ago. The widespread use of frozen foods has been one of the outstanding developments of the intervening period.

I am advised that Assembly Bill No. 656, as introduced, was the product of a joint effort by representatives of the State Department of Health and of the refrigerated warehouse industry. The Department considers the revision a definite improvement over the existing legislation.

During the progress of the bill through the Legislature the definition of "refrigerated warehouse" in section 1 was amended so that a manufacturer or distributor utilizing its refrigerated warehouse space exclusively for its own use was added to the list of those exempted from the definition. Neither of the two added exemptions were in the old law. The proposed exclusion of manufacturers and distributors does not appear to be in the public interest.

The State Department of Health also advises me that the language of the bill leaves in doubt whether adequate provision for inspection is made to enable public health officers effectively to carry out the responsibilities imposed upon them.

Accordingly, I am returning herewith Assembly Bill No. 656 for reconsideration and with the recommendation that amendments be made to the bill (Second Official Copy Reprint) as follows:

On page 1, section 1, line 7, delete the words "eating club, manufacturer or distributor" and insert in lieu thereof the words "or eating club".

On page 5, section 15, immediately following line 2, insert the following new paragraph:

"The State Department of Health and the local board, and any officer or employee thereof shall, in the performance of any duty imposed by this act, at all times have full access to any refrigerated warehouse or locker plant for purposes of inspection and enforcement of the provisions of this act, and may examine and open any package or container which is believed to contain any article in violation of this act."

As originally introduced, the bill permitted the governing body to submit the public question on its own motion, but required it to do so upon a 20 per cent petition of the registered voters. As the result of a Senate amendment, the filing of such a petition would leave the submission of the question to the discretion of the governing body.

If the bill is to have any serious purpose, filing of a substantial petition, such as one signed by 20 per cent of the registered voters, should require action upon the part of the governing body. The bill should also be perfectly clear as to the nature of the question to be submitted to the electorate.

Accordingly, I am returning Assembly Bill No. 670 for reconsideration and with the recommendation that amendments be made to the bill (Second Official Copy Reprint) as follows:

On page 1, section 1, line 5, delete the word "may" and insert in lieu thereof the word "shall".

On page 1, section 1, line 9, delete the entire line and insert in lieu thereof the following: "the (title of governing body) of this municipality instead of by the voters by referendum as in the past?"

On page 1, section 2, line 1, after the word "voting" insert the words "on the question".

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, paragraph 14 (b) of the State Constitution, I am returning herewith, for reconsideration and with my objections, Assembly Bill No. 680.

This Bill would authorize members of the Teachers' Pension and Annuity Fund, protected by tenure under the Education Laws (Title 18 of the Revised Statutes) who have become or may hereafter become unemployed by reason of the creation of a regional school district or a consolidated school district, to continue as members of the Fund. The measure further provides that any such member who subsequently is employed at a salary lower than that which he was receiving in the school district at the time that he became unemployed shall be permitted to pay into the Pension Fund the same amount that he was paying prior to becoming unemployed. Upon the withdrawal, retirement or death of such member, the benefits payable to the member or his beneficiary would be the same as if his salary or compensation had not been at a lower amount.

The Bill does not contain any provision relating to interest accruals on accumulated funds after two years of absence without pay. In addition, at least one definition in

R. S. 18:13-25 (the definition of "average salary") will be obscure if the bill is approved in its present form.

Also, the reference in the Title to the bill to "article three, Title 18 of the Revised Statutes" is incorrect. The laws relating to the Fund are contained in article 3, chapter 13, Title 18 of the Revised Statutes.

Accordingly, I am returning Assembly Bill No. 680 herewith for reconsideration and with the recommendation that amendments be made to the bill (Official Copy Reprint) as follows:

On page 1, Title, line 2, after the word "three" insert the words ", of chapter thirteen,".

On page 1, section 1, line 1, after the words "provisions of" insert the words "chapter 245 of the Laws of 1947 or".

On page 1, section 1, line 1, after the word "membership" insert the words "and interest accrual".

On page 1, section 1, line 2, delete the word "members" and insert in lieu thereof the word "member".

One of the amendments contained in Assembly Bill No. 686 would delete the above underscored provision. This amendment appears to enable counties of the second class to engage in park development and operation without a referendum in any case, whether or not the park was originally established with federal aid. This is contrary to the long-established, sound practice in New Jersey requiring referendum by the voters.

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Accordingly, I am returning herewith, Assembly Bill No. 686 for reconsideration and with the recommendation that amendments be made to the bill (Official Copy Reprint) as follows:

On page 1, Title, line 2, after the word "amending" delete the words "sections 40:37-252 and" insert in lieu thereof the word "section".

The purpose of this Bill is to provide for the establishment of the Barnegat Lighthouse State Park and for its maintenance and operation by the Department of Conservation and Economic Development. The powers proposed to be vested in that Department would include the power "to lay out, construct and maintain roads and ways within said park; to lay out, construct and maintain roads between and connecting any separate portions of said park, and for this purpose to acquire rights-of-way upon and across any

intervening lands; and to lay out, construct and maintain connecting roads and ways from points within said park to other public roads outside of and adjacent thereto." These functions properly belong in the State Highway Department and not in the Department of Conservation and Economic Development.

In addition, section 4 of the Bill would permit the Department of Conservation and Economic Development to vest in its employees the necessary "police power for the abatement of nuisances, stopping of abuses and protection and management of such park." Sound public policy would require that the exercise of this function be subject to the approval of the State Department in which all of our major law enforcement agencies and activities are now integrated, *i. e.*, the Department of Law and Public Safety.

Accordingly, I am returning herewith Assembly Bill No. 693 for reconsideration and with the recommendation that amendments be made to the Bill (Second Official Copy Reprint) as follows:

On page 2, section 2, line 6, after the word "public" delete the word "and" and insert in lieu thereof the words "; and the State Highway Department shall have the authority:".

On page 2, section 4, line 3, after the words "The said department shall", insert the words ", subject to the approval of the Attorney General and in accordance with such regulations for the protection of the public safety and welfare as the Attorney General shall prescribe."

On page 2, section 4, lines 3 and 4, after the words "to vest in" delete the words "its employees the necessary police power" and insert in lieu thereof the words "such of its employees as it may determine to be necessary the powers and duties of peace officers".

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, paragraph 14 (b) of the State Constitution, I am returning herewith, for reconsideration and with my objections, Assembly Bill No. 709.

I am in accord with the stated purpose of this Bill, which is more specifically to define "common drug addict" under the Disorderly Persons Law.

As the Bill is now written, a person accused of being a common drug addict may escape being adjudged a disorderly person if he can show to the satisfaction of the court that he obtained the drugs from a person duly authorized by law to treat sick and injured human beings "and that such drugs were used in connection with such treatment." The obvious intention was to refer to drugs obtained from a physician and used in connection with the treatment of the person who is accused of being a common drug addict. However, the present language of the amendment is subject to a much broader interpretation.

In order to insure that the Bill will have the effect intended, I am returning Assembly Bill No. 709 herewith for reconsideration and with the recommendation that an amendment to the Bill (Official Copy Reprint) be made as follows:

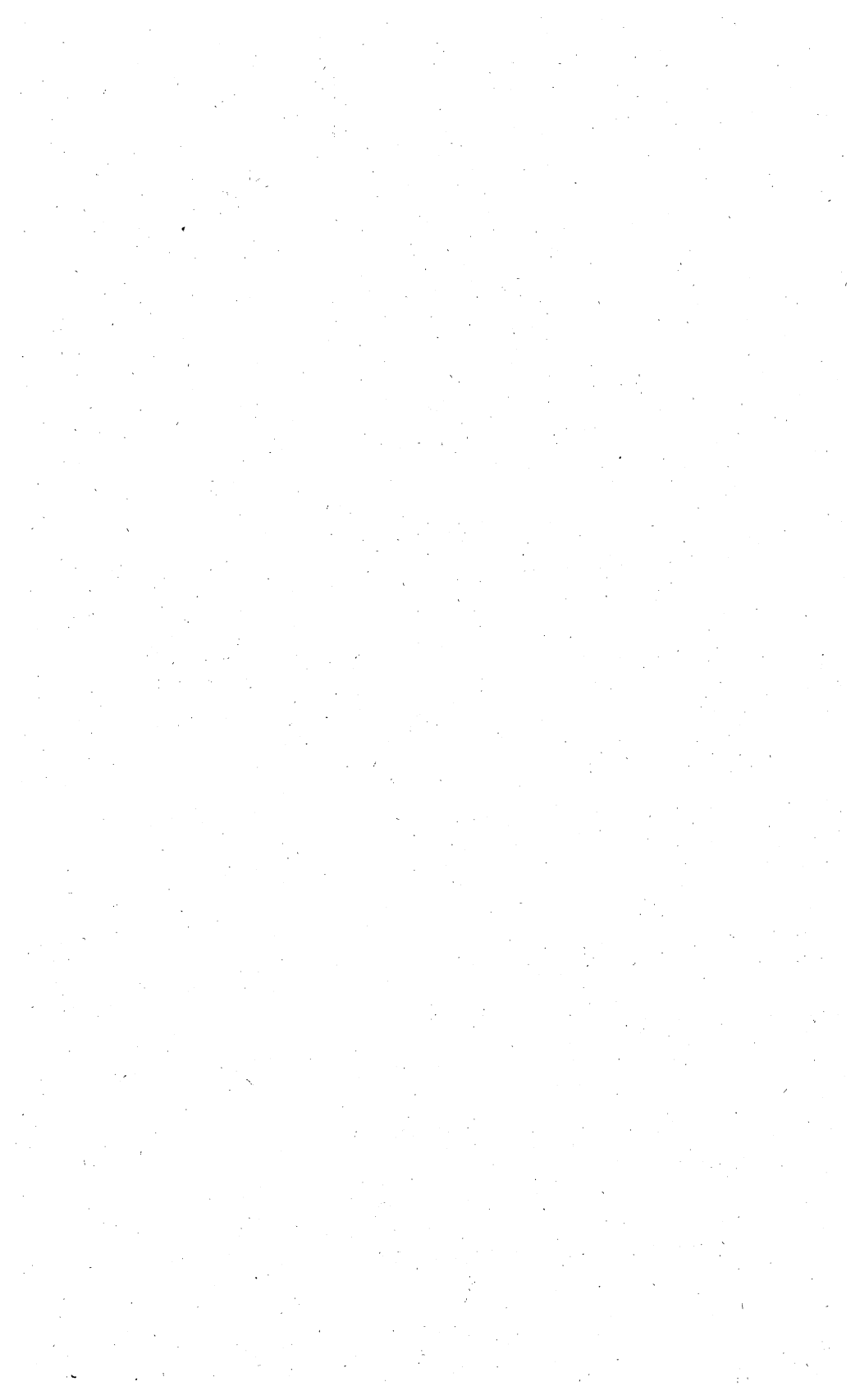

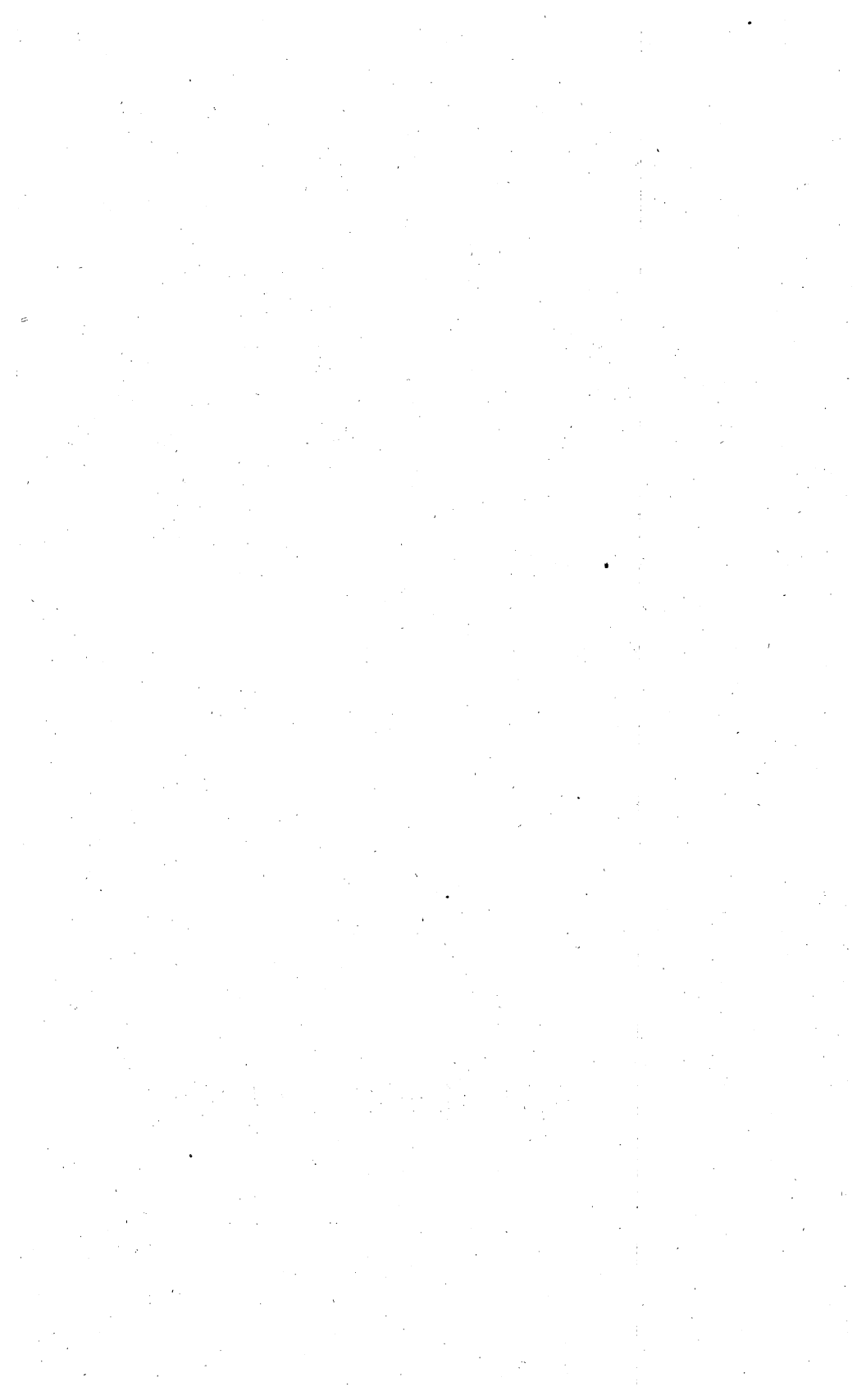

Amends "Anti-discrimination Act" by prohibiting discrimination by employers, or labor organizations, because of age or because of liability to induction or recall into the Armed Forces—A. B. 383—198, 304, 308, 886.

Amends "Anti-discrimination Law" by prohibiting discrimination by employers, or labor organizations, against persons over 21 and under 56 years, because of age—A. B. 457—249, 342, 351.

Appropriations—

Appropriates \$250,000 to State Department of Defense for administration and implementation of New Jersey Civil Defense Plan—A. B. 3—36, 55, 83, 88, 368.

Appropriates \$190,000 to South Jersey Port Commission for ensuing fiscal year—A. B. 129—49.

Appropriates \$3,105,780.27 to supplement State appropriations for fiscal year 1950-1951—S. B. 249—589, 590, 615.

Appropriates \$176,815,834.01 for State fiscal year 1951-1952—S. B. 250—589, 590, 591, 616.

Armed Forces—

Amends act concerning powers of attorney and acknowledgment of deeds by persons in armed forces during time of war, to include persons serving in present national emergency—A. B. 430—243, 322, 326, 548.

Amends act concerning probate fees on estates of persons, who died while on active duty in armed forces, to include those dying while serving in present national emergency—A. B. 439—245, 343, 569, 797.

Amends act concerning burial of members of armed forces dying on active duty, to include those dying while serving in present national emergency—A. B. 442—246, 342, 352, 570, 933.

Extends act concerning taking of oaths and acknowledgements before officers in armed services for duration of present national emergency—A. B. 453—248, 343, 352, 574, 933.

Extends act concerning probating of wills when subscribing witness is in service, in time of war, to include present emergency—A. B. 470—251, 343, 352, 632, 934.

Adds employes or officials of school districts, to category of those members of armed forces reserve components, eligible for leave of absence, with pay, for field training—A. B. 503—254.

Includes within the definition of the term, "in time of emergency", as applicable to leaves of absence for temporary and permanent school district employes, the period from June 23, 1950, to the termination of the present national emergency—A. B. 522—258, 380, 388, 664, 929.

Extends the law providing credits as a senior to junior high school students who enter the armed forces, to those on active service during national emergency on and after June 23, 1950—A. B. 523—259, 321, 327, 666, 937.

Auto races—

Provides for licensing of auto racing and exhibitions of driving skill; sets fees; prescribes safety requirements—A. B. 141—66.

B

Banking—

Permits additional member banks of the federal reserve system to qualify as reserve depositories for N. J. banks—A. B. 219—94, 305, 307, 392, 583.

Gives banking commissioner discretion to reduce period within which a bank may commence its internal examination following the commencement of an examination by the commissioner—A. B. 220—94, 305, 307, 393, 583.

Clarifies banks' authority to participate as co-lender in mortgage loans; increases percentage of F. H. A. insured loan which is excluded in determining whether a bank has reached the maximum amount it may have outstanding in mortgage loans—A. B. 257—103, 305, 307, 490, 1037.

Permits qualified banks to create Trust Committees when number of directors equals or exceeds 9; presently permitted only when more than 9 directors; permits officers of banks to serve as members of Trust Committee but only if a majority of members of Trust Committee are Directors of the bank—A. B. 387—199, 305, 308, 533, 933.

Provides that in trust with situs in New Jersey, created prior to September 1, 1939, and having beneficiaries resident in Germany, Austria, Hungary, Poland, Latvia, Lithuania, Esthonia or USSR not located for 6 years prior to January 1, 1950, the beneficiaries shall be presumed to have died intestate; permits trustee to distribute assets without liability to beneficiary—A. B. 454—248, 343, 352.

Extends act concerning execution of trusts by members of armed forces through present national emergency and 6 months thereafter—A. B. 426—243, 321, 325, 547, 718.

Includes stockholder of a merging bank, in act concerning rights of dissenting stockholder, under banking act—A. B. 595—272, 439, 444.

Provides for final adjustment of statements of accounts between banking institutions and depositors—A. B. 659—317, 542, 761, 1040.

Amends negotiable instrument law to place loss upon employer who has been induced by an employe to draw an instrument payable to a specified payee, the employe intending that the named payee should have no interest in the instrument—A. B. 660—317, 439, 444, 762, 821.

Authorizes Commissioner of Banking and Insurance to make corrective and validating instruments to correct errors, defects or omissions in certificates of dissolution filed by banks, or to replace lost or destroyed certificates—A. B. 716—789, 865, 866, 1047.

Establishes "prudent man", standard to govern investment and retention of trust monies by fiduciaries—S. B. 24—586, 587, 624, 627, 730.

Provides that bank deposits received after regular bank business hours be deemed received on next business day—S. B. 40—586, 587, 624, 627, 915.

Permits national banks to merge, or convert themselves into, State banks; prescribes procedure; requires approval by Commissioner of Banking and Insurance after certain requirements regarding capital stock, federal law, and plan of conversion are satisfied—S. B. 59—162, 163, 305, 306, 598.

Permits savings banks to invest, up to 50% of surplus, in interest bearing corporate securities with more than a 5-year maturity period, not to exceed 5% of corporation's issuance, or 2% of bank's assets, whichever is lesser—S. B. 200—698, 699, 779, 780, 973.

Banking (continued)—

Authorizes savings banks to make mortgage loans, secured by a camp meeting association first mortgage upon the lease of real property, where such lease has an unexpired term of, or is renewable for 25 years—S. B. 265—585, 624, 628, 775.

Amends definitions concerning legal investments, by banks, of common trust funds, to conform with the "Prudent Man" principle of trust fund investment proposed in S 24, 1951—S. B. 274—586, 587, 624, 628, 731.

Barber examiners—

Amends act concerning Board of Barber Examiners by increasing board membership from 4 to 5; the additional member to be a master barber—A. B. 210—92, 832.

Barnegat Park—

Creates Barnegat Lighthouse State Park to be operated under Dept. of Conservation and Economic Development—A. B. 693—501, 676, 679, 755, 756, 887, 972, 1156, 1163, 1189, 1213, 1246.

Battleship New Jersey—

Extends congratulations of the State of New Jersey to the officers and men of the U.S.S. New Jersey upon her reactivation and return to duty—S. C. R. 6—310, 311, 349.

Beach erosion—

Provides that cost of any project for protection and preservation of beaches and shore front, undertaken pursuant to action of State Beach Erosion Commission, be apportioned so that the State shall bear 70%, and the municipality or municipalities wherein project is undertaken shall bear 30%—S. B. 153—584, 585, 624, 628.

Memorializes the Congress to adopt legislation providing Federal aid in financing projects for protection and preservation of beaches and shore fronts—S. J. R. 2—113, 211, 216, 301, 359.

Beauty culture—

Amends act concerning beauty culture control by defining "beauty shop, beauty salon or hairdressing establishment"; changes qualifications for applicants for operators', teachers' and manager-operators' licenses; permits issuance of operators' license to those holding out-of-state licenses if such state extends reciprocity to licensees of this State—A. B. 273—121, 227, 229, 278, 321, 323, 397, 709, 711, 712, 847.

Fixes standards of education and experience for operator—A. B. 618—276, 549.

Bicycles—

Permits municipalities to require registration and licensing of bicycles; sets safety requirements—A. B. 163—69, 151, 153, 300, 359.

Bingo—

Permits municipalities to authorize holding of games of chance for religious, charitable or fraternal purposes; provides for referendum—A. B. 133—50.

Blind—

Permits State Commission for Blind to provide vending stands for blind on a rental basis; cost of repair and replacement of equipment to be assumed by operator of stand—A. B. 634—452, 496, 504, 757, 934, 1109.

Authorizes State Commission for the Blind to administer program of financial relief for needy blind persons; relieves county welfare boards of responsibility thereof and county freeholder boards from financial participation in cost; requires Commission disregard first \$50 monthly income of such persons in determining need; provides that necessary funds be included in Governor's annual budget message and in annual appropriations bill; effective January 1, 1952—S. B. 226—966, 968, 1043.

"Blue Cross" insurance—

Creates a 5-man commission to investigate "Blue Cross" insurance plan—A. J. R. 9—277.

Bogota—

Permits Borough of Bogota, Bergen County, to appoint George McCaffrey to police department—A. B. 483—237, 379, 387.

Bond issues—

Authorizes \$15,000,000 bond issue for construction and equipment of State Teachers' College Buildings; provides for repayment from funds collected under Transfer Inheritance Tax Law and from municipal and county tax ratables when there is an insufficiency to meet bond payments; provides for referendum at State election—A. B. 557—262, 815, 816, 817, 883, 1074, 1140, 1162, 1179, 1180, 1206, 1246.

Authorizes \$250,000,000 bond issue for highway improvements; requires referendum.—A. B. 684—454, 469.

Boundaries—

Relocates a portion of the division line between Absecon City and Pleasantville—A. B. 515—256, 379, 387, 610, 798, 1103.

Relocates and establishes boundary line between Haddonfield and Haddon Heights; apportions unpaid land taxes to municipality in which land is situate prior to relocation—S. B. 50—310; 311, 694, 695, 916.

Fixes boundary lines between City of Beverly and Townships of Delanco and Edgewater Park, all in Burlington County—S. B. 238—801, 803, 817, 868, 1002.

Bribery—

Increases fines in act concerning bribery and corruption of sporting contests—A. B. 625—345, 476, 477.

Increases penalties for bribery in sports from \$5,000 to \$10,000 and imprisonment not less than 10 nor more than 15 years; requires best efforts of contestants—A. B. 631—413.

Increases fine in act concerning bribery and corruption of sporting contests; makes it a misdemeanor not to report an attempted bribe—A. B. 632—345.

Increases fines in act concerning bribery and corruption in sporting contests; makes it a misdemeanor, subject to fine, not to report any attempted bribe—A. B. 708—621, 622, 832, 833, 895, 1037.

Building codes—

Broadens definition of words "building code" to include all forms of construction—A. B. 120—48, 549.

Building and loan—

Provides that "unclaimed money" in Court of Chancery and in Superior Court, arising from building and loan liquidation, be turned over to State Treasurer; rights of claimants not injured—A. B. 10—64, 150, 152, 221, 230, 561.

C

Cafeteria, State—

Authorizes establishment, operation and maintenance of cafeterias, on State property, for use of State employes and officials, under Division of Purchase and Property, Department of Treasury; creates a State Cafeterias Revolving Account in General State Fund—S. B. 209—419, 421, 441, 478, 687, 1217, 1221, 1225, 1235.

Camden-Philadelphia bridge—

Creates commission to study practicability of reducing tolls on Camden-Philadelphia Bridge—A. J. R. 5—106.

Creates a commission of 5—one member to be the Governor of New Jersey—to investigate rates charged on transit line over Camden-Philadelphia Bridge—A. J. R. 6—106, 363.

Cancer control—

Designates April as "Cancer Control Month"—S. J. R. 4—177, 178, 211, 216, 302, 359.

Cape May ferry—

Authorizes State Highway Commissioner to establish and operate ferry service between Cape May County and Lewes, Delaware, to enter agreements, acquire land interests, by purchase or condemnation, in New Jersey and Delaware, subject to Delaware and Federal laws; to apply for and accept Federal grants, with approval of Governor—S. B. 41—310, 311, 476, 477, 599.

Cemeteries—

Permits certain rural cemetery associations, whose corporate existence has terminated by lapse of time, to reinstate charters of incorporation in perpetuity—S. B. 234—649, 651, 814, 818, 978.

Check cashing—

Requires a license to engage in the business of cashing checks, drafts, or money orders, license to be issued by Commissioner of Banking and Insurance; fixes license fees; prescribes regulations for such a business; limits the charges a licensee may make for cashing checks, drafts or money orders; excludes banks from operation of act, but excludes cashing of checks without a consideration; provides name of act to be, "The Check Cashing Law"—S. B. 58—800, 802, 865, 867, 918.

Children—

Recognizes judgments or decrees of other States or territories of the United States pertaining to adoption of children—A. B. 205—81, 107, 110, 170, 230.

Prohibits the admission to theatres of unaccompanied children under 12 years of age unless special seating allocation provided; prohibits admission of unaccompanied children under 14 to theatres after 6 o'clock—July and August 7 o'clock; makes theatre manager who violates act a disorderly person—A. B. 253—102, 150, 154, 488, 760, 761.

Permits State Board of Child Welfare, with the approval of parent or guardian, to help maintain, and supervise children in deteriorating family situations, before court commitment of such children to State guardianship; permits Board to co-ordinate services with local and private child welfare agencies; effective January 1, 1952—S. B. 215—985, 987, 988, 1032.

Provides that written consent, required in adoption proceedings, may be made by one parent, or legal guardian, where due inquiry fails to disclose whereabouts of absent parent—S. B. 306—836, 1014.

Chiroprody—

Provides penalty for violations of act—A. B. 489—237, 549.

Civil defense—

Authorizes Government to enter interstate civil defense and disaster compacts with other states; U. S. territories, possessions, or District of Columbia—A. B. 2—36, 55, 82, 88, 377, 385, 427.

Provides that municipal expenditures for civil defense shall constitute State expenditure for the purpose of determining amount to be contributed by Federal Civil Defense Administration in matching contributions by State—A. B. 342—134, 209, 215, 433, 641.

Authorizes Director of Department of Defense to issue identification tags to school children—A. B. 574—268.

Authorizes Governor to enter into, amend, supplement or implement, compacts for mutual military aid and assistance with executive authorities of other states with prior or subsequent consent of U. S. Congress; defines emergency, describes general provisions of such compacts—S. B. 3—176, 177, 179, 224, 230.

Provides for legislative approval of mutual military aid and assistance compact between New Jersey and New York signed by Governors of the two states on December 12, 1950; compact set forth in bill to become effective upon approval by Legislatures of signatory states—S. B. 4—176, 177, 179, 225, 230.

Supplements the State Civil Defense Act by permitting mutual aid agreements regarding civil defense, between this State and other States, or political subdivisions thereof, or between two or more political subdivisions of this State; permits civil defense forces of such agreed States and subdivisions to exercise the duties, powers and privileges authorized in their own area, within this State in areas covered by such mutual agreement; authorizes the State and political subdivisions to accept gifts, grants or loans for civil defense purposes—S. B. 276—660, 865, 868, 961.

Civil service—

Defines "emergency" in the act providing for leave of absence to public employes entering the Armed Forces—A. B. 12—119, 285, 287, 330, 359, 520.

Extends veterans' civil service preference to persons entering the military or naval service after June 23, 1950 and before termination of the present national emergency—A. B. 14—186, 285, 290, 332, 359, 521.

Authorizes graduated additional vacation leave to permanent employes having over 10 years in classified service of counties, municipalities and school districts—A. B. 107—46, 320, 344, 349, 436, 437, 441, 481.

Extends civil service seniority rights, regardless of division or department, to all municipalities which have adopted commission form of government and Civil Service Law—A. B. 110—46, 108, 109, 222, 230.

Authorizes graduated, additional vacation leave, to permanent State employes in classified service having over 10 years service—A. B. 114—47, 344, 350, 436, 437, 441, 481, 990.

Establishes 8-hour work day and 5-day week for permanent officers or employes in classified State service; provides for equal time off, or equal pay for hours in excess of 40—A. B. 117—47, 151, 152, 924.

Establishes 8-hour day, 5-day 40-hour week for permanent officers and employes in classified service of counties, municipalities or school district; authorizes work in excess of such hours in "extreme urgency"; requires full compensation for overtime, and equal time off—A. B. 118—48, 151, 152, 808.

Provides for payment of accumulated sick leave pay on retirement, or death of an employe in the classified service of the State—A. B. 124—49, 151, 152, 473, 474, 593.

Provides that retiring civil service employes of counties, municipalities and school districts be entitled to payment for accumulated sick leave; that payment for accumulated sick leave of a civil service employe, who dies while in service, shall be made to deceased employe's widow, surviving husband or dependents—A. B. 125—49, 151, 153, 474, 594.

Permits representatives of New Jersey Civil Service Association to attend own convention with leave of absence with pay—A. B. 126—49, 151, 153, 220, 297, 359, 478.

Provides for payment of accumulated sick leave pay on retirement, or death of an employe in the classified service of the State—A. B. 130—49.

Permits board of chosen freeholders of a county, or governing body of a municipality, to establish all Saturdays as public holidays, for their public offices—A. B. 134—51.

Provides that officers, or employes, separated from the classified service because of reasons of economy or otherwise, and not for misconduct, be placed, where possible, in a lesser office or position; provides that such persons be granted a hearing before the civil service commission as to the bona fides and the legality of such separation or demotion—A. B. 135—51, 210, 211, 482.

Places under civil service, secretary and engineers of plant management commissions of municipalities—A. B. 136—81, 173, 174, 279, 280, 483, 970, 1088.

Provides that retiring civil service employes of counties, municipalities and school districts be entitled to payment for accumulated sick leave; that payment for accumulated sick leave of a civil service employe, who dies while in service, shall be made to deceased employe's widow, surviving husband or dependents—A. B. 137—51.

Civil service (continued)—

Provides for an increase and living wages adjustment for State employees; 20% increase if base pay less than \$3,600, 15% increase if less than \$6,000, 10% if in excess of \$6,000—A. B. 138—65.

Requires Director of Division of Employment Security in Department of Labor and Industry, to certify to Civil Service Service Commission the names of all division employees designated "investigators"; subjects "investigators" to provisions of civil service law as to tenure, classification and compensation—A. B. 184—73, 208, 212, 301, 359.

Places appointees of the Superintendent of Elections under Civil Service and in the classified service thereof—A. B. 239—121, 879.

Places employees of commissioner of registration having a total of 2 years' service in the classified civil service—A. B. 240—121, 879.

Provides that any discharged, suspended, fined or demoted civil service employee of the State, any county, municipality or school district shall have the right of appeal to the Commissioner—A. B. 255—102, 228.

Requires Civil Service Commission to create grievance committee of 3 members in each State department—A. B. 288—125, 539, 718, 719.

Redefines Veteran of World War II in Civil Service Law as those serving after September 16, 1940, for at least 90 days commencing on or before September 2, 1945—A. B. 332—131.

Provides for creation of grievance committee of three members in each State department; permits creation of grievance committees in all political subdivisions of State; establishes method for settlement of grievances; appropriates \$25,000 to Civil Service Commission for administration of Act—A. B. 542—341, 342, 476, 477.

Places all employes of county park departments under civil service—A. B. 579—269, 879.

Provides for leave of absence, for persons holding office, position or employment, other than for a fixed term, in the classified service to fill any elective public office—A. B. 703—582.

Provides that any municipal employee with one year's continuous service next preceding adoption of Civil Service, shall be deemed an employee of that municipality under Civil Service, if actively employed at time of adoption, despite prior lack of authorization by ordinance, or such employment—S. B. 61—648, 649, 677, 680, 918.

Confers Civil Service status on any presently employed, regular employee of any political subdivision, appointed under R. S. 11:3, who has completed probationary period, despite fact position not authorized, or compensation not fixed by valid ordinance or resolution—S. B. 103—705, 707, 864, 867, 944.

Provides that appointment of municipal Board of Health employees be made in accordance with Civil Service requirements, if Civil Service adopted by such municipality; confers Civil Service status without examination, upon such employe holding office on effective date of this Act—S. B. 115—517, 518, 577, 579, 731, 1218, 1220, 1224, 1232.

Establishes work week at 40 hours for State service; establishes procedure providing compensatory pay or time off, for overtime services—S. B. 252—589, 590, 591, 619, 620.

Communism—

Creates a 7-member commission to study and formulate programs for combatting communism—A. J. R. 7—134.

Comptroller-general—

Establishes a Comptroller General, appointed by Governor, salary of \$10,000, to serve for 15 years; prescribes functions—A. B. 578—269.

Condemnation—

Broadens admissibility of evidence in condemnation matters, by permitting consideration of illegal use, rule, option, or rental prices—A. B. 459—249, 343.

Provides that where land of one owner is being taken by condemnation, other owners of land to be taken for same purpose may apply for a joinder of defendants—A. B. 548—407, 941, 942.

Confidential communications—

Forbids physicians, surgeons, dentists, or nurses to disclose in court, or to any public officer, any confidential communication, or information acquired while attending a patient in professional capacity, unless information indicates patient was victim of a crime; dentists may disclose information necessary for identification purposes; patients may waive these restrictions—A. B. 230—96.

Conservation and economic development—

Amends 1950 Appropriations Act to permit use of fund of Department of Conservation and Economic Development, Division of Shell Fisheries, for operation of boat "Senator Firman M. Reeves" in enforcement of Shell Fisheries Laws—S. B. 107—372, 375, 405, 422, 772.

Authorizes Department of Conservation and Economic Development to convey certain State lands in Point Pleasant, Ocean County, to Gene Dunston, in fee—S. B. 244—471, 473, 496, 523, 1012.

Conveyances—

Permits unconditional conveyance by grantor holding title under a deed designating him as "trustee"; provides that under such designation purchaser, mortgagee, lessee or assignee need not see to application of any money—A. B. 535—265, 893, 895.

Provides that the words "trustee," "as trustee," or "agent" appearing in a deed without more, shall not give notice of a trust or limitation—A. B. 603—274, 381, 391, 769, 935, 1107.

Repeals act concerning court approval of sales by administrator c.t.a. or substituted administrator—A. B. 604—274, 381, 391.

Provides for single municipal search, instead of two, to cover both liens and improvements authorized but not assessed; fee for certificate increased from \$2 to \$3—A. B. 626—468, 577, 578.

Co-operatives—

Amends New Jersey Co-operative Association Law by authorizing co-operatives to maintain reserve funds for other than working capital; gives added powers to directors for distribution of assets—A. B. 103—45, 78, 293, 359, 1039, 1114, 1159, 1164, 1193, 1242.

Corporations—

Requires corporations moving principal office file a certificate announcing such change with Secretary of State (presently limited to moving to different county or municipality)—A. B. 170—70, 107, 109, 169, 230, 479, 1118, 1159, 1166, 1167, 1195, 1242.

Corporations (continued)—

Proposes corporation income tax of 2% on income over \$25,000; fixes \$75 as minimum tax; exempts ferry, railroad and canal companies and non-profit, fraternal and charitable organizations; allocates money received by State to pay interest and amortize proposed veterans bonus bonds; balance of tax to general State fund—A. B. 402—201.

Permits reinstatement of corporations after dissolution, by action of directors and of stockholders; requires unanimous consent be secured from surviving directors and all stockholders; requires reinstatement to be effected within one year of filing of certificate of dissolution—A. B. 460—250, 447, 448, 450, 580, 631, 797.

Authorizes any corporation, other than railroad or canal, to change the numbers of outstanding shares of any class of stock into a different number of shares of same class—S. B. 179—470, 472, 541, 544, 682.

Corporation Business Tax Act—

Exempts from, Federal production credit association organized under Farm Credit Act of 1933—A. B. 498—253, 384, 387, 653, 793.

Correct posture week—

Declares week of May 1st "Correct Posture Week"—A. J. R. 12—277, 460, 612, 928.

Counties—

Abolishes county "boulevard commissions" created pursuant to R. S. 27:17-2; transfers their functions, powers and duties to board of chosen freeholders—A. B. 266—104, 879.

Freezes number of members of boards of freeholders as now constituted, regardless of reclassification of counties resulting from 1950 Federal census—A. B. 345—191, 285, 290, 436, 458, 527.

Permits Board of Chosen Freeholders, or Boulevard Commissioners, to award damages to county or boulevard police disabled by injuries received in performance of duty; such amount, plus pension and workmen's compensation, not to exceed amount earned while employed—A. B. 482—236, 623, 625, 732.

Permits freeholder boards by appointment to fill vacant county offices for balance of calendar year, regardless of term fixed by law—S. B. 23—517, 518, 814, 818.

Permits freeholders to provide more than one office within county for election boards, without restriction to county court house or county seat—S. B. 32—162, 163, 175, 176, 226, 230.

Raises from \$500 to \$1,250, amount freeholder boards may expend for membership in board of freeholder associations—S. B. 184—419, 421, 942, 943, 1054.

County detectives—

Revises the law governing county detectives and county investigators; provides for number and salaries of each in certain counties; places county detectives in classified and county investigators in unclassified, Civil Service; to be known as "County Detectives and County Investigators Act (Rev. of 1951)"; effective July 1, 1951—A. B. 521—258, 384, 391, 620, 1072.

County parks—

Provides that boards of freeholders in second class counties having no county park commission, may maintain county lands which have been developed for use as a public park or public recreation place; heretofore authority existed only where such parks were developed by Federal Government—A. B. 686—469, 577, 578, 765, 1036, 1155, 1163, 1188, 1189, 1212, 1246.

Provides that no person be disqualified from serving as a non-salaried county park commissioner by virtue of occupancy of other county or municipal job, nor be disqualified from such county or municipal job by occupancy of park commissionership; except for person holding subordinate position in park commission concurrently with commissionership, or municipal court magistrate—A. B. 724—903, 1021.

Provides Governor, with advice and consent of Senate, appoint five-man County Board of Park Commissioners, for five year term, one appointment annually after original appointments; applies to counties over 200,000 presently having Park Commissions—S. B. 51—416, 420, 496, 506, 851, 852, 1053.

Permits United States Government to pay reasonable sum, in lieu of actual restoration to original condition, of county park commission lands leased by U. S.—S. B. 181—471, 472, 577, 579, 953.

Provides that the board of freeholders, in counties having Park Commissions, declare annually the sum to be raised for maintenance of such park system; said sum to be not less than $\frac{1}{2}$ mill, nor more than 1 mill, on each dollar of the assessed valuation of county tax ratables, unless the park commission shall certify that a sum less than the minimum is required; this act to become operative upon its adoption by a majority of the votes cast in such county upon a referendum at a general election—S. B. 278—805, 806, 942, 943, 1044.

County park police—

Provides for referendum on question of fixing duty, hours and salaries of county park police, upon petition of 1% of legal voters of a county—S. B. 125—559, 560, 694, 695, 947.

County physicians—

Authorizes county physicians to make, or order, an autopsy, in violent or sudden death cases—S. B. 22—281, 283, 381, 384, 914, 1216, 1219, 1222, 1229.

Courts—

Places jurisdiction of sales of personal property in County District Courts; establishes procedure and fees—A. B. 22—319, 406.

Defendant's failure to offer himself as witness shall not create any presumption against him—A. B. 115—47, 208, 211, 220, 549.

Requires affidavit of ownership, when cash money is deposited in criminal case in lieu of bail and recognizance—A. B. 140—65, 210, 212, 298, 359, 1034, 1035.

Permits clerk or deputy clerk of magistrates to commit defendant for failure to deposit bail—A. B. 159—68, 441, 442, 492.

Confers civil jurisdiction upon municipal courts, when the amount involved does not exceed \$100 and the action arises out of contract—A. B. 194—75, 173, 174, 484, 714.

Authorizes appointment of law secretaries by judges—A. B. 272—121, 549.

Courts (continued)—

Permits Appellate Division of Superior Court to order interception of telegraphic or telephonic communication, upon application by Attorney-General or county prosecutor; makes evidence obtained thereby admissible—A. B. 321—130, 209, 214.

Authorizes county court judge to appoint, when necessary, court interpreters of the Yiddish language—A. B. 322—130, 539, 718, 719.

Permits civil suits in contract or tort against the State of New Jersey; vests jurisdiction in Superior Court; establishes 2 year limitation of action; process to be served on Attorney-general, venue laid in Mercer County—A. B. 328—131, 209, 215, 552.

Provides that any public employe or officer refusing to testify, when subpoenaed, on ground of self-incrimination, shall forfeit his rights to tenure or pension—A. B. 373—196, 342, 350.

Increases exemptions from executions and civil processes from \$200 to \$500—A. B. 376—196.

Provides for distribution of New Jersey Reports and New Jersey Superior Court Reports—A. B. 417—344.

Authorizes photostatic, microphotographic and photographic reproduction of business writings and records—A. B. 435—245, 321, 326, 567, 836, 896.

Makes admissible in evidence, photostatic, microphotographic and photographic reproductions of business writings as records; notwithstanding availability of original—A. B. 446—246, 321, 326, 568.

Amends act concerning service of process upon nonresidents doing business in State, by requiring them to appoint county clerk as agent for service of process—A. B. 596—272, 343, 355, 896, 1040.

Provides for refund of master's fees and filing fees, to plaintiff or counter-claimant, in matrimonial actions discontinued before trial—A. B. 617—276, 577, 579.

Provides persons under subpoena in criminal cases involving unlawful gaming, bookmaking, lotteries, pool-selling or keeping of a gambling resort, shall not be excused from testifying or producing evidence, upon the ground of self-incrimination, and for immunity from prosecution of or the use of such testimony or evidence against such persons—A. B. 661—318, 441, 444, 887.

Provides 2-year limitation of prosecution in cases of embezzlement, conversion and misappropriation shall not begin to run until there has been a demand and refusal to account—A. B. 662—318, 441, 445.

Fixes venue for criminal prosecutions in cases of embezzlement, conversion and misappropriation in county where offender last resided—A. B. 663—318, 441, 445, 726, 727.

Designates causes for which Supreme Court may remove judge of superior, county, district or municipal court as misconduct in office, inability to discharge duties, intemperance, conviction of crime; after hearing before Supreme Court personally or by counsel—A. B. 677—414, 415, 496, 506.

Amends "Dangerous Articles Law" by providing that procedure for enforcement of penalties be in accordance with rules of Supreme Court; heretofore in accordance with "The Penalty Enforcement Law"—A. B. 678—453, 576, 578, 763.

Designates police, magistrates' and recorders' courts as "Municipal Courts"; continues in office police judges, magistrates and recorders until expiration of terms; provides 5-year term if reappointed; requires establishment of such court in municipality not having one at present—A. B. 688—469, 675, 676, 679.

Courts (continued)—

Extends to second class counties, exception of court attendants from law preventing counties or municipalities refusing employment to persons because over 40—A. B. 691—469, 492, 493, 577, 578, 729, 930.

Provides for appointment of a district court judge in counties of the third class having more than 95,000 inhabitants not now having such judge; establishes annual salary of \$4,000—A. B. 714—789, 831, 861.

Establishes an 8-man committee to investigate administration of justice in the counties—A. C. R. 23—582, 675, 891.

Permits municipal courts established by two or more municipalities to adopt name descriptive of location in county instead of using names of all municipalities—S. B. 55—369, 374, 454, 455, 917.

Provides for refund of master's fees, to plaintiff or counter claimant, in matrimonial actions discontinued before trial—S. B. 102—705, 707, 832, 833, 1063.

Establishes jurisdiction of, and incorporates the First Judicial District of Ocean County; creates district court, provides for judge at salary of \$3,500, and employees of said court; upon appointment of district court judge, County Court judge shall cease holding county district court, except for cases then pending—S. B. 188—646, 650, 677, 680, 963.

Permits examination, in a State institution, of a person accused of a crime, without formal commitment or adjudication, where it appears to trial court that such person may be suffering from mental illness, and where welfare of society and ends of justice would be served—S. B. 196—517, 519, 694, 696, 722, 1011.

Credit Unions—

Broadens State chartered credit union powers to allow "blanket" bonding of officers; permits non-member, or spouse, to be co-maker on member loan; permits loans up to \$1,500, on new automobile with chattel mortgage or conditional sales lien, pledged bonds or securities, or assigned life insurance policies, if loan not in excess of 2/3 of value of security; permits 20% attorney collection fee—S. B. 127—706, 707, 779, 780, 948.

Crimes—

Makes sale, gift, loan, furnishing, delivery, purchase or possession of a "Spring Knife" a misdemeanor—A. B. 185—74, 108, 109, 335, 485, 486.

Makes it a misdemeanor to distribute anonymously written or printed matter intended to injure character—A. B. 668—319, 476, 477, 611.

Crippled children—

Includes children afflicted with cerebral palsy in the terms "crippled children and physically handicapped children" as used in act concerning pupils and conduct of schools—A. B. 297—126, 210, 213, 401, 641.

Includes children afflicted with cerebral palsy in the term "crippled children" as used in act concerning State school moneys and appropriation thereof—A. B. 299—126, 210, 213, 402, 793.

D

Delaware River—

Declares to be the policy and intent of the legislature that nothing contained in legislation authorizing the Governor to enter into compacts with other states relative to water resources of the Delaware River shall be construed to waive, release, modify, relinquish or abandon any existing right of this State to divert waters of the Delaware in and through the Delaware and Raritan Canal and feeder, or the use of waters so diverted—A. C. R. 25—829, 890, 1038.

Delaware River Basin Water Commission, created of 3 members each from New Jersey, New York and Pennsylvania to develop water resources of Delaware River basin under a compact with those States to be entered into by their Governors; commission to issue bonds without pledging State credit; power to condemn lands, lands lying under water, rights in land, riparian rights, water rights, waters and other property owned by a municipality, public district, public corporation or public authority; exempts New York City's existing and future water supply projects in the "basin" confined within New York State; compact not to interfere with that city's U. S. Supreme Court grant of 440,000,000 gallons daily from basin—S. B. 135—661, 662, 893, 894, 960.

Delaware River Bridge—

Authorizes the construction, operation and maintenance of a vehicular bridge, or tunnel, across the Delaware River, between points in Camden and Philadelphia, by The Delaware River Joint Commission; prescribes power of purchase, bond issuance, raise and pledge revenues, and eminent domain; requires Commission to have special reserve fund of \$22,000,000 before commencing construction; requires written consent of Governors of New Jersey and Pennsylvania before beginning construction—S. B. 308—897, 899, 901, 954, 956.

Authorizes Governor to enter a compact, on behalf of New Jersey, with Pennsylvania, to authorize the Pennsylvania Turnpike Commission and the New Jersey Turnpike Authority, alone or together, to construct, finance, operate and maintain a bridge across the Delaware River; effective upon enactment by both states in identical form, and upon signature of Governors of both states—S. B. 310—903, 905, 906, 959.

Delaware River Joint Commission—

Authorizes supplemental agreement with Pennsylvania whereby New Jersey members of Delaware River Joint Commission shall comprise the Governor, Camden County Director of Board of Freeholders, Mayor of Camden City, and 5 persons appointed by Governor (8 members are now elected by Legislature); requires public hearing before exercising eminent domain—A. B. 245—99.

Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission—

Authorizes Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission to acquire bridges, including approach highways, north of the Burlington-Camden county line, extending across the Delaware River, with approval of State concerned; authorizes combination, for financing purposes, of later acquired or constructed bridges, with trust indenture securing outstanding bridge revenue bonds; effective upon enactment by both New Jersey and Pennsylvania—S. B. 165—904, 905, 906, 955.

Delaware River Port Authority—

Redesignates The Delaware River Joint Commission as The Delaware River Port Authority; extends powers to operate more than one bridge or tunnel, and railroad or other facilities, within Camden and Philadelphia, necessary for efficient operation of the Port District, including port facilities for river commerce and a rapid transit system within 35-mile radius of said cities; provides method for appointment, for 5-year term, of Commissioners; prescribes powers of condemnation, purchase, raising of revenue, and authorizes Commission to compensate municipalities for loss of tax revenue—S. B. 309—898, 900, 902, 957.

Dentistry—

Authorizes dental board to suspend a license to practice dental hygiene for failure of licensee to procure an annual certificate of registration—A. B. 251—101, 304, 307, 488, 714.

Increases annual registration fee for active licensed dentists from \$4 to \$6; non-active license from \$2 to \$4—A. B. 254—102, 304, 307, 494, 495, 644, 645, 796, 871, 983, 984, 985, 1045, 1121, 1159, 1168, 1197, 1242.

Regulates practice of dental laboratory technology; provides for licensing dental laboratory technicians; prescribes penalties for violations—A. B. 856, 991.

Provides for regulation and licensing of "Dental Clinics"; defines same; provides penalties for violations—A. B. 649—315, 623, 624, 750, 751, 856, 991.

Permits person to practice dentistry as an interne or resident of a public hospital, provided such person furnish proof that he can fulfill requirements; may practice not to exceed three years (now one year) fee \$10 for certificate—A. B. 651—367, 497, 505, 749, 750, 991, 1148, 1162, 1184, 1185, 1210, 1245.

Disorderly persons—

Adjudges as disorderly a person who lets a female dog run at large—A. B. 216—94, 211, 213, 487.

Makes disorderly persons those persons who, loiter or remain at the scene of any accident or catastrophe in such manner as to hamper rescue work; provides penalty of \$500, or 90 days—A. B. 448—247, 851, 921, 982.

East Tewksbury—

Incorporates and erects the township of East Tewksbury, in Hunterdon County, out of territory now in Tewksbury township; requires a referendum, to be held within the described territory—S. B. 300—874, 876, 877, 962, 1004, 1005.

E

Education—

Increases the minimum salary of teachers from \$2,200 to \$2,500—A. B. 9—64, 173, 174, 220, 230, 871.

Preserves pension and tenure rights for high school teachers, in school districts uniting to form a regional high school district—A. B. 121—48, 77, 79, 159, 160, 295, 359, 1022.

Provides that "additional State aid for schools" to be made available to school districts (including regional) be determined by multiplying \$25 by average daily attendance in all school districts—A. B. 131—50.

Education (continued)—

Provides that State Commissioner of Education be appointed by State Board of Education with approval of Governor; fixes term of office for commissioner appointed by reason of death, resignation or removal of predecessor; continues present commissioner in office—A. B. 195—239, 380, 385, 821.

Permits boards of educations to pay premiums on group insurance for employees—A. B. 199—91, 151, 153, 337, 359, 583.

Prohibits boards of education from calling more than 2 special school elections within 6 months for the purpose of raising the district tax—A. B. 223—95, 151, 154, 394, 793.

Prevents a board of education from making commitments for expenditures until Attorney-General has approved the legality of the proceedings authorizing the issuance of bonds—A. B. 295—123, 210, 213, 429, 715.

Repeals from act establishing State Board of Education, that section forbidding disbursement of school funds to a religious institution—A. B. 317—129, 879.

Permits district board of education to raise funds in excess of school budget by issuance of promissory notes; fixes maturity date of note—A. B. 349—192, 321, 323, 729, 931.

Provides referendum where board of education is appointed by mayor, to determine whether method shall continue, or board be elected by voters—A. B. 385—237, 239, 447, 450, 530, 793.

Provides that where voting machines are used in school elections, the position of candidates' names be determined by drawing—A. B. 416—241, 423, 424, 538, 717.

Provides for assessment of dues by State Federation of District Boards of Education—A. B. 425—242, 304, 325, 567.

Provides that directors, field representatives, and assistants appointed by Commissioner of Education and employed for at least 3 years, shall be afforded a hearing before discharge for cause—A. B. 463—250, 321, 326.

Prescribes procedure for creation of new school districts; provides method of apportioning indebtedness between old and new district; creates Board of Review to hear and determine petitions for a referendum; repeals present law concerning creation of school districts—A. B. 466—251, 304, 326, 628.

Gives legal recognition, in charter, to educational work of college level, carried on at Bloomfield College and Seminary—A. B. 506—254, 381, 633, 798.

Excludes all inhabitants of U. S. military encampments from the population basis for State school equalization aid—A. B. 552—261, 411, 415, 416, 670, 935.

Requires that any public school pupil absent by reason of religious observance be counted as not absent on attendance records—A. B. 561—263, 676, 678, 830, 979, 1075, 1142, 1162, 1180, 1181, 1207, 1245.

Allows operation of school buses in pursuit of any educational, or extra-curricular, activity approved by district board of education, or authorized representative; such buses need not have "omnibus license plates" nor be subject to R. S. 48, Chap. 4 while so operated—A. B. 696—501, 502, 576, 579, 769.

Amends act relating to public schools by permitting an increase of 15% over the annual contractual amount of contracts extended and entered into prior to May 14, 1942, in addition to 15% increase presently allowed—A. B. 706—638, 639, 753, 755, 889, 990.

Education (continued)—

Requires referendum on question of whether appointment of school district boards of education shall be by mayor or by popular vote within district; restricted to second class cities of 100,000 or more according to 1940 census, having commission form of government, and to second class counties—S. B. 11—805, 814, 867, 913, 1216, 1219, 1222, 1228.

Permits boards of education to pay employees on semi-monthly basis—S. B. 33—176, 178, 211, 216, 340, 359.

Authorizes calling of special elections for purposes of financing and erecting school buildings, by consolidated school district education boards, prior to effective date of school district consolidation—S. B. 43—282, 284, 624, 628, 686.

Provides for annual audit of local school district accounts by registered municipal accountant, or certified public accountant, qualified and versed in school district financial law and accounting procedure—S. B. 174—706, 707, 753, 754, 951.

Requires publication of an annual report of comparative financial statistics of local school districts; compilation of such report to be joint responsibility of Division of Local Government and State Department of Education—S. B. 176—706, 708, 753, 754, 951.

Authorizes State, through State Board of Education, to convey a small tract of lands in Jersey City to said municipality—S. B. 223—986, 987, 988, 1069.

Raises from \$45 to \$55 in 1951-52 school year, and to \$75 thereafter, amount of State school aid payable to each school district for persons of school age, who are resident on untaxed state or county property, and who attend district public schools 3 months annually; \$45 for such persons residing on U. S. reservations, or who are children or wards of farm laborers—S. B. 240—873, 875, 877, 1012.

Provides that, when a municipality is divided in 2 or more municipalities, such shall constitute only one school district for 5 years after division and thereafter shall continue until legal voters of one municipality determine otherwise by an election; during continuance of the single school district, each municipality included shall have board of education representation therein as if said district were a consolidated school district—S. B. 301—875, 876, 877, 962, 1003, 1006.

Elections—

Requires that county committee file selection of candidates for vacancies in State Senate General Assembly, or county or municipal office, 34 days, instead of present 22 days, prior to general election; applies same provisions to candidates nominated by petition; provisions of act not applicable to legislative vacancies unless writ of election issue prior to 34 days preceding election—A. B. 109—46, 77, 79, 119, 228, 289, 482, 792.

Provides for rearrangement of election ballots so that names of candidates for Board of Chosen Freeholders appear before names of candidates for coroner—A. B. 112—47, 77, 79, 156, 230, 421, 422, 630, 1115, 1164, 1165, 1194, 1242.

Permits person to vote as an "absentee voter" who, by reason of work in his daily occupation, is unable to vote at proper time—A. B. 146—67.

Permits workers to be free from employment two hours between 8 a. m. and 4 p. m. on election day, without loss of pay, for purpose of voting; provides penalties for violations—A. B. 224—95, 539, 718, 719.

Elections (continued)—

Amends act concerning use of voting machines in primaries by extending from 2 to 4 days the time within which a candidate must file his petition requesting his name to be placed on same line with candidates who filed a joint petition—A. B. 275—122.

Provides that a vacancy occurring in a public office other than in Congress or State Legislature within 37 days next preceding the general election shall be filled at the second succeeding general election, previously 25 days—A. B. 279—123, 291.

Provides method of certifying voters in Armed Forces or in veterans' hospitals, prescribes duties of county clerks in preparing ballots for such voters—A. B. 343—190.

Permits workers to be free from employment two hours between 8 a. m. and 4 p. m. on election day, without loss of pay, for purpose of voting; provides penalties for violations—A. B. 371—196.

Provides for absentee voting in general, primary, municipal or special elections; prescribes form and method of application; prescribes form of absentee ballot and method of voting—A. B. 380—197.

Repeals act requiring police to check every voter on lists for every district in municipality—A. B. 471—252, 341, 352, 607, 793.

Requires employers to grant employees two-hour leave on election days; makes violation misdemeanor—A. B. 492—252, 756, 884.

Provides for evening vote registration facilities in counties of first and second class—A. B. 570—408, 777, 1049.

Amends law regulating filling vacancies in the office of surrogate by providing successor to be elected at second succeeding general election when vacancy happens within 37 days of a general election; presently 25 days—A. B. 653—829, 864, 866, 980, 1036.

Provides that vacancies happening in office of sheriff within 37 days next preceding a general election, shall be filled at second succeeding general election—A. B. 654—315, 440, 444, 760, 933.

Provides that vacancies happening in office of county clerk within 37 days next preceding a general election shall be filled at second succeeding general election; hertofore 25 days—A. B. 655—316, 440, 444, 758, 931.

Reduces voting age from 21 to 18 years. Amend Art. II, Par. 3, State Constitution—A. C. R. 1—51.

Proposes amendment of Article II, par. 3, State Constitution, by reducing voting age from 21 to 18 years; removes requirement that voter reside in county for 5 months preceding election—A. C. R. 6—76, 777.

Elevators—

Regulates use of elevators, dumbwaiters or moving stairways; provides for registration, inspection, submission of plans and construction thereof; for issuance, or revocation, of operating permits—A. B. 400—363.

Employment agencies—

Provides for the regulation and licensing of "employment agencies" and their employes; establishes qualifications for license; fixes license fees; provides penalties for violations—A. B. 384—198, 285, 290, 450, 460, 476, 524, 525, 581, 1059, 1133, 1161, 1174, 1175, 1202, 1244.

Employment security—

Amends act concerning unemployment compensation by new formula to determine when an employing unit ceases to be such—A. B. 20—234, 285, 323, 869, 938.

Excerpts from unemployment compensation coverage, services performed by individuals advocating overthrow of Federal or State government by violence—A. B. 108—46.

Provides new formula for determining length of disqualification period under Unemployment Compensation Act when unemployment is due to strike; eliminates disqualification because of lockout—A. B. 166—69, 756.

Permits a person disqualified for unemployment compensation benefits, when leaving work voluntarily without good cause, to requalify by working anywhere, at any job, and earning remuneration equal to 4 times weekly benefit rate; presently such person can only requalify by working in employment covered by New Jersey law—A. B. 172—70, 161, 300, 359. Eliminates requirement that unemployed demonstrate active search for work before receiving unemployment compensation benefits; changes wages in base year requirements from 25 times weekly benefit to flat \$150—A. B. 182—73, 777.

Eliminates workers contributions to unemployment compensation fund; provides for workers contribution of $\frac{1}{4}$ of 1% for temporary disability insurance under the State plan. (Heretofore $\frac{3}{4}$ of 1%.)—A. B. 221—95.

Amends Temporary Disability Benefits Law; removes requirement of employee contributions; requires collective bargaining agent to approve adoption of plan; requires plan election by secret ballot; extends coverage to include pregnancy; prohibits deduction of benefits because of supplemental payments from self-contributed insurance; eliminates requirement that employee demonstrate he actively seeks work; requires minimum base pay of \$150; provides for dependents allowance up to \$9; increases maximum benefits from \$26 to \$35—A. B. 249—100, 539, 718, 719.

Increases maximum weekly benefits under the "Temporary Disability Benefits Law" from \$26 to \$30; provides weekly dependency benefits of \$3 per person up to a maximum of \$9, for claimants having dependents; defines dependents—A. B. 258—103, 160, 162.

Amends "Temporary Disability Benefits Law"; eliminates employee contribution to private plans; requires approval of private plan by collective bargaining agent; requires unit covered by private plan be co-extensive with appropriate bargaining unit where one recognized; prohibits adoption of private plan unless employees consent by secret ballot; requires compensation as of first day of disability; extends coverage to include pregnancy; prohibits deduction of benefits because of supplemental payments from self-contributed insurance or welfare plan; increases maximum benefit from \$26 to \$30; provides for dependents allowance to maximum of \$9 weekly; requires minimum base pay of \$150; eliminates requirement that employee demonstrate he actively seeks work—A. Defines as "employing unit" under Unemployment Compensation Act, enterprises employing one or more persons on any 20 days in preceding calendar year, or \$1,000 or more during that year—A. B. 260—103, 150, 154.

Increases unemployment compensation weekly benefit rates from $\frac{1}{22}$ to $\frac{1}{20}$ of an individual's total wages in that calendar quarter in which total wages were highest during base year; increases maximum weekly benefits from \$26 to \$40—A. B. 261—104, 160, 162, 924, 1045.

Increases the maximum benefit rate of unemployment compensation from \$26 to \$30, with a \$3 a week allowance per dependent, up to a total of \$9; defines "dependent"—A. B. 268—105, 423, 424.

Employment security (continued)—

Amends act concerning reorganization of executive and administrative offices; creates executive director to head the Division of Employment Security; eliminates Employment Security Council; substitutes Employment Security Commission to administer Division of Employment Security; provides that Employment Security Commission, instead of Director of Division of Employment Security, shall establish appeal tribunals—A. B. 270—105.

Increases employer contribution rate; credits all workers' contributions to State Disability Benefits Fund, heretofore $\frac{3}{4}$ credited; eliminates employer contributions to Fund—A. B. 283—123, 539, 718, 719.

Provides for construction to be made in wills, where words of limitation are used in making the devise or bequest—A. B. 638—237, 406, 407, 608, 1075, 1146, 1162, 1182, 1183, 1209, 1245.

Evictions—

Extends until July 1, 1952, discretionary power of judges to stay eviction writs and warrants for six months—S. B. 90—310, 312, 380, 385, 533.

Explosives—

Regulates manufacture, having, keeping, storage, sale, transportation and use of explosives; empowers Commissioner of Labor and Bureau of Explosives of Department of Labor to enforce Act; provides penalties for violations—A. B. 408—202, 285, 291, 508, 566.

F

Fair price practices—

Amends law concerning trade names, trade-marks and unfair trade practices by permitting a buyer, for the purpose of discontinuing delivery, to resell at less than the minimum agreed price by giving trade-mark owner or producer 10 days notice of such intention and an opportunity to repurchase—A. B. 449—247, 381.

Fees—

Increases recording and filing fees from \$5 to \$10 for certificates of associations and corporations not-for-profit; and of societies, clubs, churches, religious societies and congregations required to be filed with secretary of state—A. B. 168—70, 405.

Allows sheriff a \$10. fee on a sale by virtue of an execution rather than a fee based on schedule of percentages of sum realized—A. B. 475—235, 343, 353.

Financial business tax law—

Exempts from, Federal production credit associations organized under Farm Credit Act of 1933—A. B. 494—253, 384, 646, 793.

Firearms—

Authorizes destruction of firearms seized by police in connection with law enforcement unless the court having jurisdiction shall order otherwise—A. B. 228—96, 209, 213.

Transfers the registration of manufacturers and wholesalers of firearms and other dangerous instrumentalities from Secretary of State to the Superintendent of State Police—A. B. 308—128, 209, 214, 403, 412, 643.

Provides for licensing of persons engaged in business of repairing firearms; fee \$100; licensing authority, Superintendent of State Police—A. B. 344—191, 285, 289, 826, 827, 856, 857, 979, 981.

Fire companies—

Permits incorporated fire companies, where former limited period of corporate existence has expired, to extend corporate existence perpetually, by filing of resolution, adopted by majority of members, with County Clerk—S. B. 95—470, 471, 541, 543, 920, 1216, 1219, 1223, 1230.

Congratulates Relief Fire Company No. 1, Mount Holly, upon Bicentennial anniversary, requesting Governor proclaim week of July 6, 1952 in commemoration; requests U. S. Postmaster General to issue commemorative stamp—S. J. R. 1—471, 473, 496, 522, 599

Commends members of volunteer fire companies and civilian defense units responding to duty during windstorm of November 1950—S. C. R. 1—113, 114, 157, 172, 173, 230.

Fire districts—

Permits board of commissioners of fire district, having paid fire department, to require 56 hours of duty per week for members; requires local referendum—A. B. 367—195, 285, 290, 529, 793, 1132, 1161, 1173, 1174, 1200, 1244.

Authorizes township committees, by ordinance, to annex portion of any fire district to any other fire district in the township, upon request of fire commissioners of districts affected—A. B. 652—315, 541, 542, 610, 989, 1113.

First-aid squads—

Increases amount counties, or municipalities, may contribute to first-aid and emergency associations, from \$1,000 to \$3,000; includes volunteer ambulance or rescue squad—A. B. 421—242, 303, 325, 409, 561, 1135, 1161, 1175, 1176, 1203, 1244.

Fish and game—

Increases fine from \$200 to \$500, and imprisonment for 30 days, for first offense, and increases fine from \$500 to \$2,500 and imprisonment for 60 days, for those netting food fish in coastal waters without a license—A. B. 148—67, 380, 385.

Amends act regulating "net fishing" to authorize use of "drifting gill nets" in Raritan Bay and a portion of Sandy Hook Bay; use of such nets presently restricted to Atlantic Ocean—A. B. 151—188, 380, 385.

Removes limitations establishing times when woodchucks may be destroyed—A. B. 177—72, 426, 427, 820, 1038, 1091.

Increases license fee for setting pound nets in Raritan Bay from \$10 to \$20; repeals section of act restricting licenses to residents of State; provides no pound shall be set in Atlantic Ocean. Permits hunting of muskrat to be regulated by State Fish and Game Code—A. B. 381—197, 357, 358, 523, 524.

Regulates hours for taking shad in Hudson River—A. B. 391—199, 342, 350, 549.

Fish and game (continued)—

Prohibits damaging, removal, or destruction of buildings, or equipment, on Public Hunting and Fishing Tract, or other State-owned lands, under control of Fish and Game Division, Department of Conservation and Economic Development; violation a misdemeanor—A. B. 392—199, 342, 350, 536, 793, 1097.

Provides for licensing and regulation of persons buying raw furs, hides or pelts; places licensing authority in Division of Fish and Game; licensee fee \$10—A. B. 399—201, 343, 351.

Includes within scope of law designating bookmaking or pool selling to be a misdemeanor, the conduct of such practices with respect to any contests of skill, speed or endurance of man or beast—S. B. 321—1042, 1043, 1058.

Gaming equipment—

Permits county prosecutor to donate confiscated gaming equipment to any public, private, charitable, religious or philanthropic institution, owned privately, or by any Federal, State, or municipal government; authorizes Attorney-General to regulate such disposition—S. B. 106—649, 651, 694, 695, 945.

Gasoline prices—

Creates commission of six—2 Senators, 2 Assembly members, 2 by Governor—to study fixing of gasoline prices, thereby preventing "price wars"; report to next session—A. J. R. 13—345, 439, 445, 724, 989, 1086.

Guthrie—

Vests title of escheated land in City of Beverly, Burlington County, in Sarah Richardson Guthrie—A. B. 304—127, 228, 433, 716.

H

Health—

Permits municipalities to join in creation of Consolidated Local Health Districts within a county, or to join in creation of County Local Health Districts; provides government by 7 member board of health, methods for, and terms of, appointment of boards and officers; budget revenue apportioned among joining municipalities according to proportion of tax rates within district; provides for municipal referendum on petition of 5% of registered voters within 2 or more municipalities accompanied by approval of State Commissioner of Health; same method for joining or withdrawing from established health district; provides Civil Service classification for necessary employees of health districts—A. B. 1—35, 156, 167, 218, 291, 359, 806, 807, 853.

Specifies degrees of punishment for violation of uniform narcotics law—A. B. 30—737, 740, 741, 824, 990.

Provides for seizure and forfeiture of motor vehicles, boats, other vehicles or personal property used for or in connection with violation of uniform narcotics law—A. B. 31—737, 740, 741, 825, 990.

Repeals section of "narcotic drug law" which prevents prosecution of violators who have been convicted or acquitted of the same violation under the Federal Narcotic Laws—A. B. 32—778, 826, 990.

Defines "economic poison," provides for regulation of manufacture, distribution, sale or transportation thereof—A. B. 123—48, 78, 79, 135, 136, 296, 359, 796, 1116, 1159, 1165, 1166, 1195, 1242.

Health (continued)—

Amends act concerning contract to provide public health service in municipalities or school districts, by permitting municipalities of school districts to separately enter into such contracts; heretofore only joint contract permitted—A. B. 189—74, 108, 109, 170, 230, 309, 1092.

Permits local Boards of Health to enforce adequate heating standards in buildings occupied or designed to be occupied as dwellings for 2 or more families, previously restricted to more than 2 families—A. B. 301—126, 227, 402.

Changes the name of the "Section of Examination, Licensing and Registration" in the State Department of Health to the "Bureau of Examination and Licensing;" requires all agencies and boards within Bureau to submit annual budget requests to the Commissioner of Health—A. Simplifies "transit permits," required for transportation of dead human bodies—A. B. 389—199, 304, 309, 535, 716.

Requires mouthpieces of all public telephones be equipped with disinfecting device, or be disinfected and sterilized every two weeks—A. B. 406—202.

Prescribes safety measures for operation of swimming pools; enforcement by local health board—A. B. 468—234.

Prohibits selling or dispensing of medicines or medicinal devices in vending machines; restricts sale and distribution of prophylactic devices to registered pharmacists or persons employed under their supervision in pharmacies—A. B. 491—252, 343, 353, 1047.

Requires regulations assuring health of employees, sanitation of plant and equipment, in connection with pasteurization of milk—A. B. 409—234, 345, 351, 422, 423, 507, 514, 559, 575, 816, 817.

Requires that plans for development of realty subdivisions, including proposed water and sewerage systems, be filed with the State Department of Health, and that said Department supervise, inspect, and control all such development and construction—A. B. 541—267, 440, 443, 667.

Requires grading and classification of "hot dogs" under supervision of Department of Health—A. B. 582—269, 879, 1050.

Increases schedule of license fees for operating a plant for manufacture of ice cream and related products—A. B. 657—317, 497, 505, 759.

Highways—

Authorizes State Highway Commissioner to acquire interstate bridges, either by purchase or condemnation, whenever permissible under Act of Congress or State law; to provide from tolls a sinking fund to amortize cost in 30 years; establishes Division of Interstate Toll Bridge Operations in State Highway Department, with Toll Bridge Director, to operate and maintain such bridges and approaches—A. B. 25—451, 495, 502.

Authorizes State Highway Commissioner to acquire Burlington-Bristol and Tacony-Palmyra Bridges over Delaware River, paying therefor from "capital improvement" fund of State Highway Department—A. B. 26—451, 495, 502.

Provides abbreviated form of condemnation of interstate toll bridges which State may be authorized to acquire—A. B. 27—452, 495, 502.

Highways (continued)—

Authorizes State Highway Commissioner to acquire fee simple in lands acquired or taken by condemnation—S. B. 140—966, 968, 1055.

Directs Highway Commissioner to add a Freeway to highway system, running from Route 31 north of Somerville, through vicinity of Boonton, to connection near New York State line—S. B. 142—801, 802, 865, 867, 949.

Directs Highway Commissioner to add to State highway system a route, to be designated as a freeway, from Route 8 in the vicinity of Columbia, paralleling Delaware River, to the Southerly abutment of the bridge, to be constructed by the Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission, across the Delaware River, in Pahaquarry Township—S. B. 156—801, 802, 865, 868, 1063.

Designates as freeway, all that portion of Route 8 to be constructed from vicinity of Still Valley, Warren County, to vicinity of West Portal, Hunterdon County—S. B. 157—800, 802, 865, 868, 950.

Authorizes State Highway Commission to acquire lands outside of rights-of-way proper, for storage use—S. B. 245—873, 875, 877, 993.

Directs Highway Commissioner to add to the highway system, a parkway running from Route 4 in Hackensack to the New York State line near Chestnut Ridge Road, to be known as Route S 101—S. B. 271—559, 560, 865, 869, 994.

Amends P. L. 1939, C. 105, creating State Highway Route 101, by requiring the construction of the portion between Harrison Avenue, Kearny, and Route 4, in Hackensack, as an access highway with grade separation—S. B. 272,—559, 560, 865, 868, 995.

Authorizes conveyance, by State House Commission, of a 30-foot right-of-way in North Brunswick Township, Middlesex County, to Transcontinental Gas Pipe Line Corporation, a Delaware corporation—S. B. 292—805, 806, 1033.

Designates parkway running southeasterly from Raritan River to Route 34 south of Route 33 as "The Horace Marvin Thorne Parkway" in honor of only Monmouth county citizen to receive Congressional Medal of Honor in World War II—S. J. R. 3—113, 114, 157, 158, 225, 230.

Highways (continued)—

Designates Blue Star Memorial Highway as a memorial to men and women who have served in armed forces during time of conflict of any war subsequent to establishment of Blue Star as a symbol of such service—S. J. R. 7—518, 519, 577, 579, 1028.

Holidays—

Closes public offices Saturdays between June 15 and September 15 in each year—A. B. 145—66, 151, 153, 299, 359, 479, 1089.

Holmes—

Vests title to personal estate of Mary Jane Holmes, West Deptford Township, Gloucester County, allegedly escheated to the State, in John E. Holmes and Arthur B. Holmes, stepsons of decedent—S. B. 319—835, 1026.

Hospitals—

Authorizes payments by counties and municipalities to hospitals for establishment and maintenance of special facilities and services—A. B. 21—315, 461.

Authorizes municipalities wherein emergency housing is erected, under Veterans Emergency Housing Law of 1946, to extend the term of emergency for 2 years; authorizes municipalities, public corporations or public agencies to purchase State's interest in such housing—A. B. 15—186, 286, 287, 333, 359, 516, 522, 562.

Redefines "blighted area" in act concerning redevelopment of said areas—A. B. 424—244.

Permits local housing authorities to make surveys, and initiate and carry out redevelopment plans, if authorized by the municipal government body—A. B. 516—256, 384, 387, 635.

Requires local housing authorities to submit annual estimate, and regular reports, of income and expenses, to municipality, without exception other than receipt or expenditure of Federal funds which are not an obligation of the municipality—A. B. 517—257, 384, 388, 635, 795, 1136, 1161, 1177, 1204, 1244.

Requires Redevelopment Agencies, created under P. L. 1949, chapter 306, to submit annual estimate, and regular reports, of income and expenses, to municipality, without exception other than receipt or expenditure of Federal funds which are not an obligation of the municipality—A. B. 518—257, 384, 388, 636, 795, 1137, 1161, 1176, 1177, 1205, 1244.

Permits a redevelopment agency to pay a service charge, in lieu of taxes, to a municipality, on property which such agency has acquired, or is managing, operating or maintaining, prior to actual clearance, redevelopment, or sale of the property—A. B. 519—257, 384, 388, 637, 796.

Further defines the meaning of "blighted area"—A. B. 520—258, 549.

Redefines the term, "blighted area," to include building conditions conducive to unwholesome living, untenable industrial buildings, unimproved land vacant for 10 years, which will not likely be developed by private capital, areas detrimental to community safety, health, morals or welfare, and land made unproductive by condition of title or diversity of ownership—A. B. 529—264, 380, 390, 638, 991.

Housing (continued)—

Authorizes a county, through action of the Board of Freeholders, to acquire lands and other property from the Federal Government, used for Veterans Housing projects, and to continue such use for the benefit of veterans and other people of the State—A. B. 533—265, 341, 354, 608, 936.

Permits limited dividend housing corporations to purchase veterans housing projects constructed under P. L. 1946, chapter 323; authorizes the Public Housing and Development Authority to consider applications for purchase made by such corporations—A. B. 539—266, 380, 390, 601, 794.

Authorizes the Public Housing and Development Authority to finance the purchase, by the agencies designated in the State Housing Law of 1949, of veterans housing projects; provides that housing co-operatives shall be governed solely by the rules of said Authority; extends to July 1, 1954, the time for making application under the State Housing Law of 1949; extends definition of veteran, under said Law, to include veterans of present national emergency—A. B. 540—266, 380, 390, 602, 798.

Removes restriction against initiation of new defense housing projects after termination of World War II, by extending authority through "National Defense Period"—A. B. 679—453, 495, 506, 746, 747, 749, 858.

Empowers redevelopment agencies to exercise same condemnation and eminent domain powers presently allowed housing authorities—S. B. 248—517, 519, 541, 558, 1006.

I

Indigents—

Places expense of burial of indigent persons dying in a county almshouse or welfare house, on county providing for said indigent—A. B. 694—513.

Industrial commission—

Renews for 10 years provisions of P. L. 1936, Chapter 184 whereby municipalities could create an industrial commission by appointment of mayor with approval of governing body, to develop municipally-owned property for industrial purposes; power to issue bonds without pledge of municipal credit; lease or sell land; erect buildings—A. B. 725—940.

Installment sales—

Amends "Retail Installment Sales Act" by redefining retail installment contract and sales finance company; adds definition of "purchase money chattel mortgage"—A. B. 320—130, 446, 449, 515.

Institutions and agencies—

Establishes "New Jersey Public Assistance Code;" provides for administration thereof by Department of Institutions and Agencies and by county and municipal departments of welfare; establishes method of financing; prescribes penalties for violations—A. B. 17—187, 831.

Provides that commitments may be made to Bordentown Reformatory with a sentence carrying a minimum and maximum term; permits subsequent transfer to New Jersey State Prison—S. B. 124—374, 376, 454, 456, 775.

Insurance—

Requires insurance companies to file a certificate disclosing names of attorneys or attorneys in fact authorized to countersign policies for their licensed agents; prohibits countersigning except by those so designated—A. B. 256—102, 304, 307, 489, 997, 1122, 1160, 1169, 1197, 1243.

Insurance (continued)—

Changes method of distributing insurance company contributions to State—A. B. 340—190, 549.

Permits fraternal organizations to contract with its members for life insurance policies not to exceed \$1,000—A. B. 378—197.

Amends act concerning financial coverage of taxicabs by increasing amount of insurance required—A. B. 436—245, 423, 425, 473, 501, 503, 557, 592, 613, 849, 998.

Substitutes for present policy provisions applicable to health and accident insurance, the provisions of the "Uniform Individual Accident and Sickness Policy Provisions Law" adopted by the National Association of Insurance Commissioners; authorizes Banking and Insurance Commissioner to enforce provisions thereof with respect to form and content of such insurance policies—A. B. 501—244, 441, 445, 450, 493.

Provides for continuance of group insurance policy after severance of employment—A. B. 546—260, 549.

Provides mutual insurance companies must have \$50,000 unencumbered assets to begin business; \$50,000 for each type of insurance to be written; and net cash assets of \$375,000 to commence writing fidelity and surety bonds; mutual fire insurance company must have net assets of \$300,000 to insure against one risk or hazard for more than double amount of legal exposure; provides for action for possession by Commissioner of Banking and Insurance, upon insolvency—S. B. 96—801, 802, 865, 867, 922.

Eliminates requirement that business of insured be shown upon a motor vehicle liability policy—S. B. 253—660, 865, 868, 1013.

Requires Commissioner of Banking and Insurance to establish a separate actuarial bureau, headed by a chief actuary appointed in accordance with Civil Service regulations, within the department; makes appointment of existing banking, insurance, and building and loan bureaus, mandatory instead of permissive, and removes power of Commissioner to fix salaries of the deputies—S. B. 312—874, 876, 877, 1029.

Interstate Facilities Commission—

Creates "New Jersey Interstate Facilities Commission" of six members to study interstate bridges, tunnels and facilities, and to examine port authorities and commissions as to their financing, maintenance, economy, operation, potential benefits, returns and revenue; appropriates \$10,000—A. Interstate Sanitation Commission—

Intra-Coastal Waterway—

Authorizes Commissioner of Conservation and Economic Development to execute agreements with Federal government for construction and operation of New Jersey Intracoastal Waterway, and to convey all interest, other than bridges, in Manasquan—Bay Head Canal to U. S., upon appropriation to free public school trust fund of fair value of such interest—S. B. 37—177, 178, 210, 216, 340, 359.

Italian-American veterans—

Makes labeled artificial flower, the daisy, official flower of the Italian-American World War Veterans of the United States, Inc.—A. B. 669—314, 457, 606.

Designates daisy, in labeled official form, as the recognized State souvenir of Italian-American World War Veterans of U. S.; restricts sales of such souvenir in labeled or artificial form, to members of such organization and its auxiliaries; provides that person violating such restriction be, upon conviction, deemed a disorderly person—S. B. 296—698, 700, 942, 944, 1050.

J

Judgments—

Reduces the time within which judgments may be revived from 20 to 10 years—A. B. 238—98.

Requires joint tort feasons in actions for personal injury, or property damage, to contribute pro rata share to judgments—A. B. 242—99.

Jury fees—

Increases compensation paid to petit jurors in Superior and County Courts from \$5 to \$12 per day; increases travel allowance from 2¢ to 5¢ a mile—A. B. 447—246, 539, 718, 719.

K

Kadishov—

Vests title to certain escheated land in Ocean County to Henry and Hazel Kadishov—A. B. 572—267, 344, 354, 603, 792, 1144, 1162, 1181, 1182, 1208, 1246.

L

Labor—

Empowers Commissioner of Labor and Industry to investigate wages in any business; appoint a wage board to investigate and recommend minimum wage; provides for method of appointing wage board members; provides for public hearing; commissioner may issue an order on board's recommendation; provides method of appeal; fixes penalty for violation of order—A. B. 7—63, 779, 780, 809, 811, 858.

Extends application of "Minimum Wage Act" to cover minors or women employed by hotels—A. B. 196—75.

Excludes employees engaged in "domestic" work from the provision of law regulating and standardizing method and time of payment of wages—A. B. 192—75, 362.

Permits Commissioner of Labor and Industry to set prevailing wage rate on public works in advance of contract letting—A. B. 235—106, 539, 718, 719.

Includes hotel employees in law establishing minimum wages for women and minors—A. B. 236—98, 539, 718, 719.

Repeals Chapter 38, Laws of 1946, and its amendments, providing plan for settling labor disputes in public utilities—A. B. 252—101, 278, 334.

Creates New Jersey Labor Relations Board of 3 members to investigate and adjudicate labor controversies and to prevent unfair labor practices; defines unfair labor practices—A. B. 267—105, 777.

Labor (continued)—

Requires employer to pay like wages to all workers doing comparable work, regardless of sex—A. B. 277—122, 382, 383, 386, 490.

Repeals act concerning labor disputes in public utilities—A. B. 284—124, 278, 718, 719.

Establishes minimum wage and maximum hour standards to be enforced by Director, Division of Labor, Department of Labor and Industry—A. B. 286—124, 539, 718, 719.

Forbids supplying or transporting strike breakers—A. B. 289—125, 539, 718, 719.

Establishes minimum wage and maximum hour standards for labor, to be enforced by Commissioner of Labor and Industry—A. B. 302—127, 457.

Creates New Jersey Labor Relations Board of three members to investigate and adjudicate labor controversies and to prevent unfair labor practices; defines such unfair labor practices—A. B. 339—133.

Establishes 8-hour work day and requires payment of prevailing rate of per diem wages for all laborers or workmen and mechanics employed by contractors doing work, or furnishing material, for State of New Jersey or any county, city, township or other municipality thereof; prescribes penalties for violations—A. B. 346—191, 342, 350, 743, 746, 824.

Establishes minimum wage standards in employment by individuals, partnerships, associations, corporations, business trusts, legal representatives, or any organized group of persons; exempts agriculture employment and domestic service in private home; creates a wage board—3 representing public, 3 employers and 3 employees—to fix minimum for each industry; wage orders to be issued by Commissioner of Labor and Industry—A. B. 353—193.

Creates New Jersey Labor Relations Board of 3 members to investigate and adjudicate labor controversies and to prevent unfair labor practices; defines unfair labor practices—A. B. 382—197, 439, 443.

Permits compulsory meal period for industrial employees to be suspended, by Governor's order, during war or prolonged national emergency, or by agreement between employer and employee if such period would be an undue hardship on employers—A. B. 545—260, 439, 443.

Makes nonpayment of wages a misdemeanor; prescribes fine—A. B. 594—272, 439, 444.

Requires that allied printing trades label shall be placed or appear on all printed matter chargeable to the State or any school district—A. B. 608—275, 539, 718, 719.

Repeals act providing for State mediation in public utility labor disputes—A. B. 665—318, 549.

Memorializes Congress to repeal National Labor Management Relations Act of 1947—A. C. R. 10—105, 539, 718, 719.

Permits employment of male minors, 14 to 16 years of age, until 10 P. M., and 16 to 18 years of age, until midnight, during regular school vacation periods—S. B. 42—586, 588.

Provides that no employment certificate be required for employment during regular school vacation seasons, of male minors, age 16 or over, at seashore or summer resorts, in non-hazardous occupations and where no hazardous machines are operated—S. B. 147—584, 585.

Lawyers—

Prohibits unauthorized practice of law; provides penalty for violation of not more than \$200 for first offense, \$500 for each succeeding offense said penalty to be sued for and recovered in name of State; establishes procedure; prescribes form of conviction and—in cases of default—a form of commitment; commitment limited to 30 days on default of first conviction, 90 days for succeeding defaults; excludes powers of banks, title insurance companies, real estate brokers, salesmen and auctioneers—A. Legislature—

Requires registration of lobbyists with secretary of state; prohibits lobbyists from entering either House of Legislature during sessions except by invitation—A. B. 169—70.

Directs distribution of Revised Statutes and supplements to each member of the Legislature who has not already received same from State—A. B. 231—96, 228, 395, 522.

M

MacArthur—

Expresses and records, in Legislative annals, appreciation and gratitude for the magnificent leadership and military achievements of General of the Army Douglas MacArthur—S. J. R. 10—782, 783, 869.

Mail service—

Memorializes Congress of the United States to restore mail delivery service which has been curtailed—A. C. R. 13—133, 209, 357, 359, 1037.

Manasquan River Bridge—

Designates bridge on Route 35 over Manasquan River between Brielle and Point Pleasant, as "Veterans of All Wars Memorial Bridge"—S. C. R. 5—283, 284, 381, 730.

Married persons—

Provides that a married person may contract to employ his, or her, spouse and may be sued for incidents arising out of such employment—A. B. 23—315, 406.

Married women—

Extends to married women same right to recover for loss of consortium by reason of injury to husband as presently extended to married men—A. B. 536—266.

McMullen—

Vests title of escheated land in the Borough of Stratford, County of Camden, to Theresa McMullen—A. B. 296—126.

Mechanics liens—

Provides that the right to file a mechanic's lien claim may be waived by filing with the county clerk a written waiver and release—A. B. 334—132, 549, 862.

Medical college—

Establishes State Medical College; prescribes methods for administration; prefers Jersey City Medical Center as location; appropriates \$2,000,000—A. B. 307—239, 879.

Medical examiners—

Establishes necessary qualifications for admission to the examination for a license to practice medicine and surgery—A. B. 331—131, 209, 214, 751, 752, 881.

Amends act concerning practice of medicine and surgery, so that it shall not apply to practice of "healing by mental means"—A. B. 479—235, 343, 353.

To provide for annual registration of persons practicing medicine, chiroprody, etc.—A. B. 486—236, 549.

Regulates the practice of medicine or surgery and the licensing therefor—A. B. 671—364, 549.

Mental deficient—

Continues the commission created last year to study the problems and needs of mentally deficient persons (J. R. 15, P. L. 1950)—A. J. R. 2—77, 112, 114, 171, 230, 309, 360.

Milton—

Incorporates Township of Milton in Morris County—A. B. 563—263.

Morris Canal—

Enlarges board of directors of Morris Canal and Banking Company from 3 to 12; requires all directors be members of Planning and Development Council in Department of Conservation and Economic Development—S. B. 34—282, 286, 304, 322, 685.

Mortgages—

Provides that chattel mortgage need not be recorded when chattels are sold with a house and said chattels are included in recorded real estate mortgage—A. B. 664—318, 441, 445, 726.

Provides that real estate and chattel mortgages assigned to husband and wife be deemed held by them as joint tenants—S. B. 99—371, 375, 454, 455, 923, 1217, 1220, 1223, 1231.

Requires both mortgagor and mortgagee to affirm veracity of facts contained in a chattel mortgage; requires filing of chattel mortgage within 5 days after execution with county recording officer; requires notice be given Director of Motor Vehicles by county recording officer, of discharge of chattel mortgage covering motor vehicle; recording effective for 3 years, renewable for successive 2-year periods—S. B. 168—836, 1006.

Morven—

Accepts gift of residence property known as "Morven," in Princeton, offered by former Governor Walter E. Edge and Mrs. Edge to the State of New Jersey—S. J. R. 8—559, 560, 865, 867, 1010.

Motor vehicle—

Revises and modernizes New Jersey Traffic Act, increases general speed rate to 50 miles per hour—A. B. 4—51, 77, 78, 110, 111, 164, 230, 557, 558, 614.

Describes lighting equipment permissible and required on motor vehicles—A. B. 5—52, 77, 78, 165, 230, 561.

Redefines definitions in motor vehicle law, makes additional definitions thereto—A. B. 6—52, 77, 78, 112, 165, 230, 561.

Authorizes Director, Division of Motor Vehicles, to issue registration plates bearing call letters to holder of amateur radio station license, in place of usual markings and at additional fee of \$2—A. B. 106—46, 323, 514, 708, 1087.

Reduces minimum age from 17 years to 16 years 6 months, for special learner's permit to operate motor vehicle during specified periods between September and June, while enrolled in a Behind-the-wheel Automobile Driving Education Course approved by State Board of Education; requires holders of permits to attain age 17 to be entitled to driver's license examination—A. B. 111—46, 77, 79, 155, 230, 309, 467, 509.

Provides for regulation and licensing of drivers' schools; places supervision thereof under Director of Motor Vehicles; fixes license fee at \$100—A. B. 116—65, 107, 109, 167, 230, 309.

Authorizes Director of Motor Vehicles to issue "special registration certificates" not requiring annual renewal, to those vehicles presently entitled to registration without fee—A. B. 153—68, 447, 449, 491, 708.

Removes requirement that motor vehicles bearing "dealers" license plates be used exclusively for dealers business; increases annual fee for "dealers" and "temporary" plates and registrations from \$25 to \$50—A. B. 154—68, 151, 153, 222, 230, 303, 312.

Permits Director of Motor Vehicles to replace, without fee, registration plates which, after 3 years, become illegible from exposure—A. B. 155—68, 441, 442, 491, 713.

Provides that automobile and motorcycle operator's license shall be for a 3-year period from date of issuance, renewable by mail; expiration date shall be birthday of licensee; fixes fees—A. B. 156—81, 441, 442, 719, 720.

Reduces from 3 to 2 years the time the Director of Motor Vehicles must retain on file, original applications for registration certificates and driver's licenses—A. B. 157—68, 151, 153, 223, 230, 522, 791.

Eliminates "willful or wanton" from act concerning death by a vehicle—A. B. 158—68, 441, 442.

Increases registration fee to \$20 for omnibuses carrying less than 9 passengers—A. B. 160—69, 151, 153, 294, 312, 358, 360.

Provides that special licenses to operate motor vehicles remain effective until revoked; previously renewal required yearly—A. B. 161—69, 441, 442, 507, 713.

Provides that no motor vehicle registration fee be required from veterans of World War II, who have lost one or both arms above wrist—A. B. 162—69, 173, 174, 228, 289, 484.

Provides flat \$10 registration fee for motor vehicles not used for hire, or for carrying passengers; presently 40¢ per horse power up to 29, and 50¢ above 29—A. B. 173—71.

Motor vehicle (continued)—

Clarifies present act concerning financial responsibility for damages caused by the operation of motor vehicles—A. B. 198—91, 879, 880.

Permits Director of Division of Motor Vehicles to issue special permits allowing vehicles to exceed the height and over-all limitations—A. B. 300—126, 209, 214.

Provides for free registration of motor vehicles not used for pleasure or hire, owned by veterans' organizations—A. B. 311—128, 210, 214, 403.

Prescribes a form to be filled out by physician, when examining a motor vehicle operator for intoxication—A. B. 351—192, 304, 308, 475, 600.

Extends time for filing notice of performance of contract under Motor Vehicle Law and simplifies procedure for prosecuting violators of this requirement; exempts those purchasers authorized to obtain free registration from requirement that purchaser of motor vehicle submit evidence of ownership to Director; simplifies prosecution of persons who falsely swear that certificate of ownership is lost—A. B. 354—193, 303, 308, 528, 931, 1128, 1201, 1243.

Provides that the commission of an act which constitutes a violation of the Motor Vehicle Law by a child of 17 or over, who holds a valid learner's permit, shall not constitute juvenile delinquency; provisions presently limited to holders of operator's licenses—A. B. 357—193, 454, 455.

Bans television sets in motor vehicles so installed that driver may view them while operating vehicle—A. B. 379—197, 449, 450, 565, 1074.

Requires all motor vehicles owned by disabled veterans presently registered without fee, be properly equipped with special attachments and devices to insure safe operation—A. B. 397—201, 343, 350, 365, 411, 640, 652.

Permits renewal of motor vehicle registration and driver's license by mail; repeals present registration act—A. B. 398—201, 502, 569.

Requires all motor vehicles to have "windshield stickers" containing name and address of owner thereof—A. B. 455—248.

Permits a surviving spouse, or members of the family, of a deceased person to operate a motor vehicle registered in name of decedent, for a period not exceeding six months after death, pending the granting of letters testamentary or letters of administration upon decedent's estate—A. B. 462—250, 343, 352, 594, 934, 1100.

Requires motor vehicles, be equipped with device capable of showing speed in miles per hour—A. B. 481—235, 343, 353.

Prohibits suspension or revocation of driver's license by commissioner of motor vehicles until licensee is found guilty of violation by a magistrate, sentence is imposed, and it is established that such licensee has committed at least five violations in preceding five years—A. B. 485—236, 381, 387, 437, 438, 443.

Provides that fines collected in municipal courts for violation of motor vehicle regulations be paid to municipality; that fines levied on complaint of county officers be paid to county; that fines levied on complaint of State officers be divided between the State and municipality—A. Requires that exhaust, of motor vehicles using diesel oil for operating purposes, be at the top of the vehicle, and at least 6 feet above the road; effective January 1, 1952—A. B. 543—260, 342, 354, 392.

Motor vehicle (continued)—

Removes from the motor vehicle classification requiring a license plate with an "X" designation any passenger car only partly used for commercial purposes—A. B. 551—261.

Provides that where motor vehicle violation occurs on boundary line of two municipalities, complaint may be made before magistrate of either municipality—A. B. 648—316, 541, 542, 609, 1040.

Creates "Motor Vehicle Safety-Responsibility Law (1951)," requires an operator of any motor vehicle involved in an accident within State, wherein a person is killed or injured or property damage in excess of \$100 sustained, to report such accident within 10 days to Director of Division of Motor Vehicles in the Department of Law and Public Safety; Director to determine amount of security necessary to satisfy any judgment resulting from accident and require such security to be deposited or license suspended; security requirement and suspension power not applicable to insured operators and under certain other specified circumstances; provides penalties for violations of act; provides method of insuring persons who are unable to acquire motor vehicle liability insurance, and for equitable distribution of such policies among the insurance companies of State—A. Reconstitutes joint legislative committee created by ACR 7, 1950, to study the improvement of the motor vehicle financial responsibility law of State—A. C. R. 22—513, 1044, 1059.

Requires motor vehicle purchaser to present, within 10 days after purchase, evidence of purchase and statement of encumbrance, or chattel mortgage, to Director of Motor Vehicles; prescribes fees—S. B. 169—836, 1007, 1026, 1218, 1220, 1224, 1233.

Mountainside—

Permits Borough of Mountainside, Union County, to appoint Emmet J. Dugan to police department—A. B. 630—237.

Municipalities—

Authorizes governing body of municipality to waive any restriction or condition placed on any land conveyed by it to a veterans' organization—A. B. 171—70, 343, 350.

Permits townships having population in excess of 20,000 to increase employees' salaries notwithstanding same heretofore fixed by referendum vote—A. B. 203—97, 150.

Permits municipalities to fix salaries of employees even though salaries were determined by referendum, provided referendum vote was prior to 1931—A. B. 204—97, 150.

Municipalities (continued)—

Permits municipalities to increase fee for dog license from \$2 to \$3—A. B. 209—92, 208, 212, 367, 415, 416, 486.

Gives municipalities regulatory powers in connection with furnished apartments—A. B. 226—95.

Permits any municipality to award damages to policemen or firemen permanently disabled in the performance of their duty upon the recommendation of any member of the governing body—A. B. 290—126, 539, 718, 719.

Increases to 4 years the terms of mayors presently having 2-year terms in cities of the third class in fifth class counties, other than cities having the commission or municipal council and municipal manager form of government; formerly applied only to fourth class cities—A. B. 336—132, 209, 215, 356, 359, 522, 742, 871, 872, 939.

Permits municipal "planning board" to review applications for subdivision of land only if a master plan for the community has been adopted; redefines "subdivision"—A. B. 356—193, 320, 323, 528.

Provides that municipalities having 40,000 to 90,000 population and governed by a board of commissioners, may increase compensation of mayor to \$6,000 and commissioners to \$5,000, subject to referendum—A. B. 366—195.

Racing—

Extends from 24 to 50 aggregate days, season permitted for harness racing in each calendar year—S. B. 297—702, 704, 753, 1041, 1042, 1043, 1061.

Racing (continued)—

Allows reasonable annual expenses, incurred in performance of duties, of chairman and commissioners of the Racing Commission, up to amounts of \$3,500 and \$1,000, respectively—S. B. 182—647, 650, 694, 696, 1019, 1218, 1221, 1224, 1234.

Railroads—

Permits appointment, as a railroad policeman, of a non-resident of this State, provided that the State of his residence extends a like comity to this State—A. B. 531—265, 322, 327, 426, 448, 449, 450, 882, 1037.

Requires that railroad companies equip track motor cars with a head-light visible at 300 feet, a rear red light visible at 300 feet, a windshield and windshield wiper, and a top cover—A. B. 542—265.

Requires railroads to pay wages weekly—A. B. 609—275.

Fixes standards of competence for railroad crew members and prescribes number required on railroad trains—A. B. 610—275.

Fixes minimum height and width for overhead railroad bridges—A. B. 611—275.

Creates 8-member committee to immediately investigate railroad disaster at Woodbridge, Feb. 7, 1951—A. C. R. 21—319.

Provides extension of time until June 30, 1953, for completion of authorized construction of a railroad, provided railroad corporation has expended money in construction, and shall file agreement with Secretary of State, subject to approval by Governor and Attorney-General, waiving right of exemption to taxation, privileges, and advantages, if any, under law or contract; railroad company that has filed such agreement heretofore receives extension without filing further agreement—S. Salaries—

Authorizes board of chosen freeholders, in counties of not less than 200,000 nor more than 300,000, and counties of not less than 325,000 nor more than 400,000, to increase salaries or compensation of clerks of the county courts, in excess of maximum salary presently prescribed by law—A. Provides for cost of living bonus for public employees—A. B. 213—93, 549.

Smith—

Wharton;" dam Mullica River at Weekstown, or Wading River at Wading River Village, to form reservoir with flow line 40 feet above tidewater; sell water to "South Jersey Water Authority District," consisting of 9 South Jersey counties already comprising "South Jersey Water Supply District;" right to issue bonds but "no power to mortgage real estate" (as previously declared unconstitutional); authority exempt from taxation; "holders of 25% in aggregate principal amount of bonds outstanding" may take over in case of default—A. State tree—

Adopts the "Dogwood" as the New Jersey State Memorial Tree—A. C. R. 2—51, 108, 172, 230, 368.

Taxation—

Includes stock car, midget automobile and roller derby exhibitions and performances within tax provisions of act re.: boxing and wrestling—A. B. 102—54, 108, 109.

Authorizes county clerk to record tax sale certificates held by municipalities at cost of \$.25, formerly \$2.50—A. B. 119—48, 108, 109, 327, 328, 364, 521.

Provides for compensation to municipalities by State appropriation for loss in taxes on land of State-supported colleges, or universities—A. B. 147—67.

Requires all monies collected from motor vehicle and gasoline taxes to be devoted solely to road and highway purposes—A. B. 180—73.

Requires all monies collected from cigarette taxes to be devoted solely to the support of free public schools—A. B. 181—73.

Rearranges installment payment of railroad taxes on second class property—A. B. 183—73.

Provides tenure for County Park Commission secretaries, after 14 years' consecutive service—S. B. 229—648, 651, 785, 974.

Theatres—

Requires operators of outdoor movie theatres to keep fire extinguishers on premises; subjects theatres to fire inspection; non-compliance a misdemeanor—A. B. 150—67, 448, 449, 820, 997.

Title companies—

Directs Attorney-General to investigate monopolistic tendencies of New Jersey title companies in connection with their refusal to insure titles made under the "In Rem Tax Sales Foreclosure Act"—A. C. R. 14—202.

Trespassers—

Declares a trespasser on cultivated land, orchard or reforested land, a disorderly person; requires posting of signs by owner; fixes fines—A. B. 350—192, 321, 323, 440, 527, 990.

Turnpike Authority—

Authorizes exchange of lands, between State and New Jersey Turnpike Authority, in Chesterfield Township, Burlington County—S. B. 230—700, 703, 785, 973.

Provides enforcement measures for control of traffic on projects operated by New Jersey Turnpike Authority; requires toll for vehicle using project—S. B. 283—698, 699, 866, 868, 992.

Adds to the authorized route of the New Jersey Turnpike Authority, several optional routes within the state, including a route to the Delaware River; authorizes construction, operation and maintenance of a bridge across said river; such projects to be designated by Legislature, and approved by State Highway Commissioner—S. B. 311—907, 908, 959.

Validating Acts—

Validates sales by municipalities of public land not needed for public use—A. B. 208—92, 151, 154, 280, 338, 359, 479.

Validates leases approved by Public Housing and Development Authority made by municipalities to limited-dividend housing corporations for a period not exceeding 75 years, notwithstanding the land leased formerly used, dedicated, or acquired for park purposes—A. B. 316—129, 209, 214, 278, 279.

Validates the appointment of assistant city engineer in cities of the second class governed under the Municipal Manager form of government law who has been certified by the Civil Service Commission and has served 4 consecutive years—A. B. 324—130, 209, 214, 355, 359, 522.

Validates salaries and wages of municipal employees fixed by resolution or motion, rather than by ordinance—A. B. 490—252, 343, 353, 605, 833, 1102.

Validates tax sale certificate foreclosures, made 5 or more years ago, where service upon a dissolved domestic corporation was made, after due inquiry, upon any corporate officer, or upon the Chief Clerk of the Secretary of State—A. B. 504—254, 343, 353, 434, 583.

Validating Acts (continued)—

Validates school district meetings or elections, and bonds issued in pursuance thereof, where there was a failure to file a debt statement before the proceedings, or where the effect of the proposal adopted by the voters was not correctly stated, provided that said debt statement was filed prior to the bond issuance—A. B. 527—264, 321, 327, 410, 561.

Validates the creation of County Park Commissions, by adoption of measure by voters at a general election, where special monthly notices prior to election were not given—A. B. 528—264, 577, 578, 672, 937.

Validates chattel mortgages made under Veterans Loan Act—A. B. 573—268, 379, 390, 691.

Validates deeds given by administrators with the will annexed where terms of sale were inadvertently not submitted to Prerogative Court, Chancery Division of Superior Court or Probate Division of County Court—A. B. 601—273, 381, 391, 767, 935, 1105.

Intended to validate a sale of land not needed for public use where such land was sold at private sale—A. B. 692—470, 492, 493.

Validates affidavits to deeds, mortgages by commissioner of deeds or notary public, whose authority was void at time of taking—A. B. 722—847, 965, 966.

Validates sales of land by municipalities, where title is acquired by foreclosure of tax sale certificates, despite publication of sale more than 10 days prior to acceptance of bid by governing body—S. B. 69—310, 312, 321, 322, 598.

Validates appointments to sewerage authorities made prior to filing creation proceedings with Secretary of State; validates such creation proceedings if not heretofore questioned in any legal action—S. B. 72—647, 650, 694, 695, 784.

Validates terms of any letter or power of attorney made at any time by person in military service of U. S. or its allies, or merchant seaman serving outside continental U. S. in connection with war effort, notwithstanding death or incompetence of such person, until revoked by principal, or his executor, administrator or heir—S. B. 113—373, 376, 441, 446, 545, 945, 1217, 1220, 1223, 1232.

Validates school district bond issues despite clerical errors in, and failure to file, supplemental debt statements—S. B. 128—559, 560, 576, 614, 948.

Validates organization of any non-pecuniary corporation, formed prior to 1945, by less than 5, but no less than 3 persons—S. B. 255—986, 988, 989, 1066, 1227, 1221, 1225, 1236.

Veterans—

Extends to New Jersey veterans serving in Armed Forces after June 23, 1950 and before termination of present national emergency, same benefits under State Veterans' Loan Act presently accorded World War II veterans; extends, for one year, terminal date for making applications for veterans loans—A. B. 16—187, 305, 306, 333, 359, 982, 984, 1029, 1030.

Extends to New Jersey veterans of service in the Armed Forces after June 23, 1950 and before termination of the present national emergency, same benefits under State Housing Law of 1949 presently accorded World War II veterans; extends to July 1, 1954 time for making application under said law—A. B. 19—187, 285, 289, 428, 712.

Veterans (continued)—

Adds veterans of Korean War to act concerning disabled veterans, and to veterans preference in Civil Service—A. B. 167—69, 108, 109, 169, 230, 792, 1091.

Permits promotion outside of civil service rules of those veterans of war against Japan, Germany and Italy or any one of them, provided such veterans hold French medaille militaire or croix de guerre and were employed by counties, municipalities or school district on Jan. 1, 1949—A. B. 178—72.

Authorizes World War II bonus, payable by notes redeemable by 1961, principal amount of notes \$150,000,000; provides for amortization of notes by creating sinking fund from revenue of cigarette tax for next 10 years; grants maximum \$250 for domestic service and maximum of \$450 for mixed domestic and foreign service—A. B. 179—72.

Increases benefits for war orphans—A. B. 187—74, 151, 153, 549.

Permits motor vehicles owned by "Voiture Locale" be registered free—A. B. 206—81, 173, 174, 337, 359.

Liberalizes terms for veterans obtaining real estate salesmen's licenses—A. B. 214—93, 211, 212, 549.

Increases organizations whose publicly employed members are entitled to leaves of absence for conventions—A. B. 233—97, 549.

Permits issuance to disabled veterans of broker, solicitor, or insurance agent license, without examination or cost, provided veteran has completed course in insurance in approved school—A. B. 337—132.

Requires veterans passing civil service promotional examinations to be appointed in order of standing—A. B. 338—133, 423, 425, 545, 546, 772.

Amends act concerning exemptions from taxation, to include veterans having service-connected disability from osteochondritis resulting in permanent loss of use of both legs, resulting from traumatic injury to skeletal structure—A. B. 374—196, 406, 407, 770, 1073.

Amends act concerning relief to certain disabled veterans, to include veterans suffering from osteochondritis and having permanent loss of both legs, or having a permanent paralysis resulting from traumatic injury to skeletal structure—A. B. 377—197, 406, 407, 771, 1073, 1097.

Establishes tax exemptions on real and personal property for honorably discharged veterans who are citizens and residents of New Jersey and who have met, or shall meet, their deaths on active duty in time of war—A. B. 394—200, 320, 324, 536, 971.

Creates World War II Veteran Bonus Commission; authorizes \$175,000,000 bond issue for bonus payments; provides referendum; prescribes amounts to be paid to veterans—A. B. 401—201.

Increases from \$500 to \$1,000 the annual payment made to blind soldiers, sailors and marines—A. B. 404—202, 380, 386.

Authorizes Director, Division of Veteran's Service, Department of Conservation and Economic Development, to render financial assistance to veterans' organizations having full time, salaried, State service officers accredited by United States Veterans' Administration—A. B. 497—253.

Veterans (continued)—

Requires reinstatement of any honorably discharged World War II veteran, who was discharged without hearing, to position of fireman, in 2nd class cities with a population between 50,000 and 55,000, according to the last Federal census—A. B. 525—263, 476, 477, 663, 1074, 1104.

Permits free registration of motor vehicle by disabled veteran if qualified to receive a free motor vehicle from Federal government—A. B. 547—261, 380, 391.

Provides that disabled veterans of World War II, and of the present national emergency, upon admission to the State Bar, be entitled to receive a set of the Revised Statutes (1937), upon application therefor to the Secretary of State—A. B. 559—263.

Amends Act concerning Veterans Services Council by requiring that Council be composed of members of veterans organizations; defines veteran—A. B. 560—263.

Amends Act concerning promotion or employment of persons awarded Congressional Medal of Honor to include Distinguished Flying Cross or Silver Star—A. B. 581—269.

Exempts from taxation, dwellings of war veterans minus both hands or feet or a combination of hand and foot, includes certain other disabilities—A. B. 590—271.

Proposes amendment of Article VIII, Section 1, Paragraph 3, State Constitution, to extend \$500 tax exemption on real and personal property allowed widows of veterans dying while on active duty in time of war, to widows of veterans dying in other than time of war; limits exemption to duration of residence in the State—A. C. R. 3—76, 151, 673.

Proposes amendment of Article VII, Section 1, Paragraph 3, State Constitution, to extend \$500 tax exemption on real and personal property allowed widows of veterans dying while on active duty in time of war, to widows of veterans dying in other than time of war; limits exemption to duration of residence in this State—A. C. R. 12—133.

Memorializes State of New York, Veterans Administration and the United States Congress, not to discontinue at present, use of Halloran Veterans Administration Hospital by patients from New Jersey—A. C. R. 15—203.

Proposes amendments to Article VIII, Section I of State Constitution, to exempt from taxation the dwelling houses of New Jersey holders of "Congressional Medal of Honor"—A. C. R. 16—203, 408, 890.

Includes within statute governing allowances to paraplegics, hemiplegics and double amputees, veterans who sustain such injury in active military or naval service from June 23, 1950 until termination of present national emergency—S. B. 86—370, 375, 440, 445, 479.

Includes within statute governing allowances to blind veterans, those who sustain such injury in active military or naval service from June 23, 1950 until termination of present national emergency—S. B. 87—370, 375, 440, 445, 480.

Extends category of veterans entitled to \$500 annually, to those cases of hemiplegia or paraplegia resulting from service contracted disease; removes requirement that paraplegia or hemiplegia result from "traumatic" injury—S. B. 98—803, 804, 865, 867, 922, 1217, 1220, 1223, 1230.

Victory gardens—

Establishes and incorporates Borough of Victory Gardens, now part of Randolph Township, Morris County; effective upon majority vote of Randolph Township legal voters voting thereon—S. B. 137—517, 518, 541, 558, 683.

Vital statistics—

Amends Act listing contents of death and birth certificates by permitting State Department of Health to determine contents—A. B. 390—239, 304, 324, 535, 717.

Purposes to clarify law regulating reporting of stillbirths—A. B. 488—236, 304, 327, 387, 728, 937.

Permits State Commissioner of Health, with approval of Director of Division of Budget and Accounting, to make charges for statistical data or services requested by interested persons—A. B. 672—575, 676, 678, 762, 931.

Requires that State Registrar furnish birth, marriage or death certificate without fee for public pension requirements; likewise furnish U. S. Public Health Service with microfilm images of marriage and transcripts of death certificates—A. B. 713—720, 779, 780, 853, 972.

Vivisection—

Prohibits vivisection or experimenting with live animals in elementary or secondary schools; prohibits exhibiting of such animals; violation a misdemeanor—A. B. 355—193.

W

War damage—

Memorializes Congress to adopt means to insure citizens against loss or damage to person or property resulting from enemy action—A. J. R. 3—82, 108, 110, 172, 230, 520.

War effort—

Pledges cooperation between government of State of New Jersey and United States during present crisis—A. C. R. 8—82.

War orphans—

Amends War Orphans Act to include children of persons in armed forces during present national emergency—A. B. 429—243, 342, 351, 547, 797.

Water districts—

Provides for the election of commissioners in water districts and defines their powers and duties—A. B. 217—94, 209, 213, 339, 359, 479.

Water supply—

Authorizes construction and repair, by municipality, of roads and water mains on lands of camp meeting associations, with approval of governing bodies of both municipality and association, where lands of such association lie wholly within municipality—S. B. 114—373, 376, 541, 544, 946.

Amends the law concerning diversion of subsurface waters, and capping of abandoned wells, to make it effective upon any area, delineated as being within purview of said law, at any time—S. B. 322—966, 968, 1050.

Weights and measures—

Makes removal, or concealment, of marks of origin upon merchandise, a misdemeanor—A. B. 149—67, 108, 109, 168, 230.

Changes law for marking packages—A. B. 292—189, 549.

Regulates sale of solid fuels—A. B. 293—125, 549.

Provides penalty schedule for violators of Act—A. B. 294—189, 549.

Requires date on certificate of origin for solid fuels—A. B. 309—189, 549.

Requires sale of certain commodities by weight—A. B. 318—189, 549.

Repeals act requiring registration by persons selling weighing devices—A. B. 319—129, 549.

Provides for licensing of business of selling, or delivering, liquid fuel; makes decision of weights and measures the licensing authority; fixes fee—A. B. 410—240.

Provides schedule of fees—A. B. 413—240, 549.

Requires sale of ice cream in bulk by weight—A. B. 414—241, 549.

Requires sale of meat by weight—A. B. 415—241, 549.

Provides penalties for violations of Act—A. B. 537—266, 549.

Provides penalties for hindering enforcement of Act—A. B. 538—266, 549.

Welfare—

Creates a commission of 9 members to study the administration of welfare at the various levels of government in New Jersey; prescribes powers, functions and duties—A. J. R. 15—892, 938, 1056.

Welfare boards—

Provides for assistance to needy by the county welfare board to persons between 18 and 65 years of age, who are permanently and totally disabled by reason of any physical or mental impairment other than blindness; State to pay said board Federal assistance contribution for such persons plus 50% of additional cost—A. B. 33—882, 883, 925, 926, 927, 1035.

Includes children afflicted with cerebral palsy in Act concerning county assistance to crippled children—A. B. 104—65, 112, 114, 167, 230, 521.

Requires county welfare boards to obtain a reimbursement agreement from applicants for aid; provides that filing of a notice thereof shall operate as a judgment—A. B. 143—66, 208, 212, 298, 359.

Welfare boards (continued)—

Prohibits financial aid under the needy persons Acts, to those advocating overthrow of the government; affidavit or oath a condition precedent to such aid—A. B. 152—67, 814, 817.

Well diggers—

Requires permit to dig wells, at fee of \$3, and report of well completion, within 60 days, under penalty of \$25; exempts from "Well Diggers Act," drive point and hand dug wells; permits State Geologist and Division officers to enter lands containing wells for inspection purposes—S. B. 214—804, 894, 974.

Workmen's Compensation—

Repeals sections of workmen's compensation law relating to silicosis and asbestosis—A. B. 8—64, 150, 152, 292, 359, 969.

Provides that an employer or insurance carrier, who knowingly failed to make accident or compensable occupational disease reports as required by Workmen's Compensation Law, be deprived of "limitation of actions" defense contained in said law—A. B. 128—49.

Requires employers or insurance carriers providing medical treatment, or an employee who gets medical treatment, to obtain a physician's, surgeon's or hospital report concerning any injury or disease, forming the basis of a workmen's compensation claim; report to be furnished, upon request, to employee, employer or insurance carrier—A. B. 188—74.

Increases benefit schedules under Workmen's Compensation Act; eliminates section concerning inguinal hernia; requires reimbursement for loss of prosthetic devices or clothing; defines injury to include mental or physical harm, strain, disease or infection; governs admission of hospital records—A. B. 247—100, 539, 718, 719.

Provides general revision of Workmen's Compensation Act; specifies new procedure for prosecution of claims; creates State Insurance Fund—A. B. 248—100, 539, 718, 719.

Corrects typographical error in section of workmen's compensation act concerning schedule of compensation—A. B. 291—125, 343, 350.

Places penalty on employer for failure to comply with safety requirements as prescribed by law; doubles employer compensation contribution when injury results from such failure to comply; relieves insurance carriers from the extra compensation penalty; voids insurance contract that undertakes to assume such liability—A. B. 323—130, 227.

Increases allowable witness fees to prevailing party in Workmen's Compensation cases from \$50 to \$75; medical witness fees from \$150 to \$200—A. B. 330—131.

Repeals Act establishing an elective system of compensation for occupational disease known as silicosis; repeals section of Workmen's Compensation Act providing for notice to employer or insurance carrier, of occupational disease—A. B. 452—247.

Increases weekly compensation under Workmen's Compensation Act from \$30 to \$40—A. B. 458—249, 352, 879, 940, 1037.

Extends coverage under Workmen's Compensation Act to casual employees—A. B. 507—255, 539, 718, 719.

Workmen's Compensation (continued)—

Amends Workmen's Compensation Act by including dependency benefits of \$3 per person to a maximum of \$9 per week; eliminates limitations concerning hernia and occupational diseases; reimburses claimants for destruction of artificial appliances and personal effects; increases death and funeral benefits; allows free choice of physician; provides penalties for discrimination—A. B. 592—271, 941, 942.

Provides that accident causing injury or death to an employee resulting from "horseplay" or "skylarking," not instigated, nor taken part in, by employee suffering accident, be compensable under Workmen's Compensation Act as having arisen out of employment—A. B. 683—468.

Broadens construction of Workmen's Compensation Act to include injury sustained by active volunteer firemen during exhibition, parade, or authorized public showing—S. B. 70—310, 311, 321, 323, 532.

Provides that an employer, or his insurance carrier, pay employee's statutory legal costs and attorney's fees in an action against a 3rd person or corporation, whether amount recovered by employee is less or greater than employer's liability under the Workmen's Compensation Act—S. B. 231—648, 651, 1021, 1053, 1054.

World law—

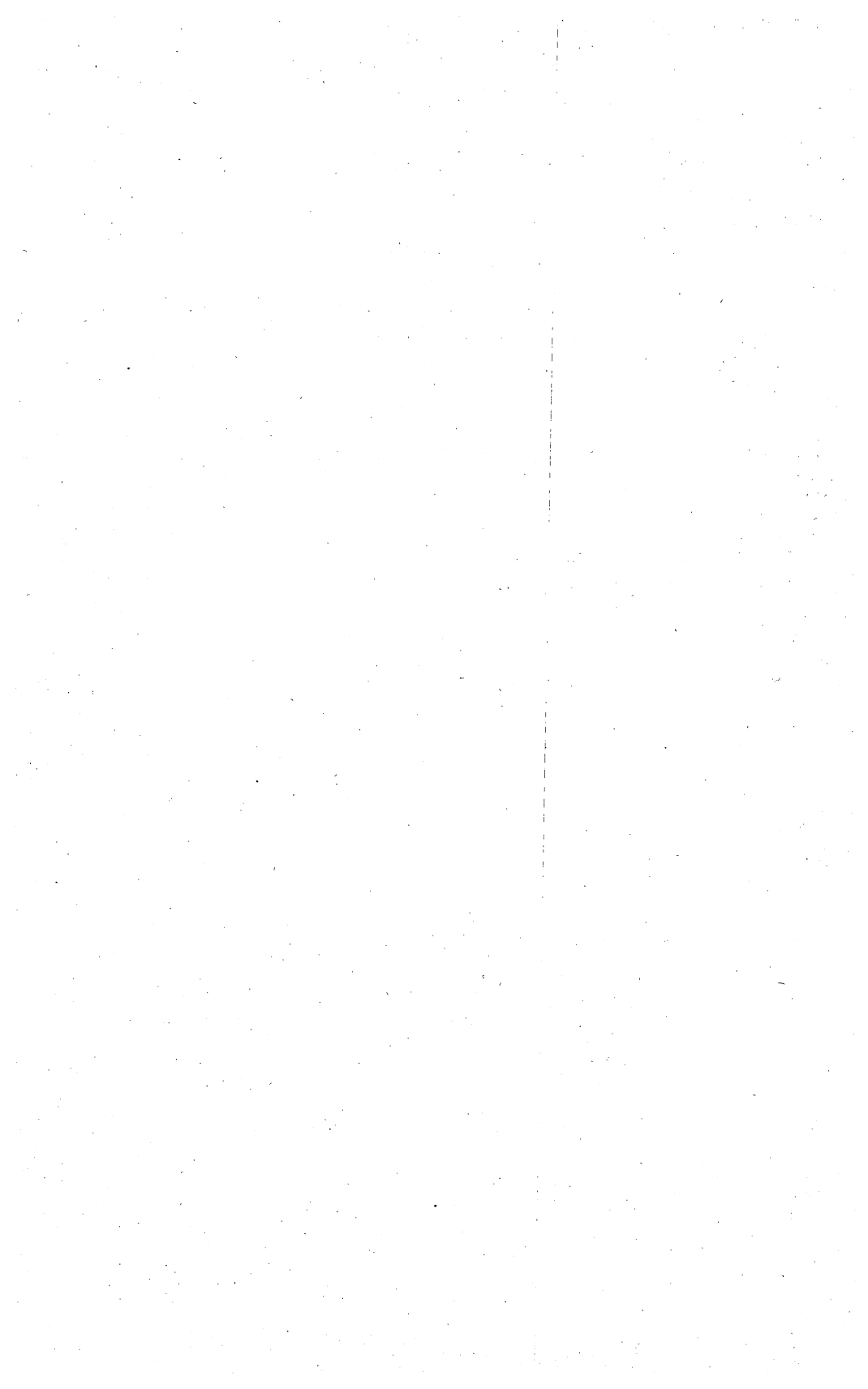
Provides for a referendum, at the 1951 general election, on the question of whether the 176th Legislature shall apply to Congress to call a convention proposing a Constitutional amendment granting the United Nations power to enact and enforce world law to prevent aggression, so long as such law does not abridge U. S. citizens' basic freedoms—A. B. 705—593, 623, 625, 626, 627, 978.

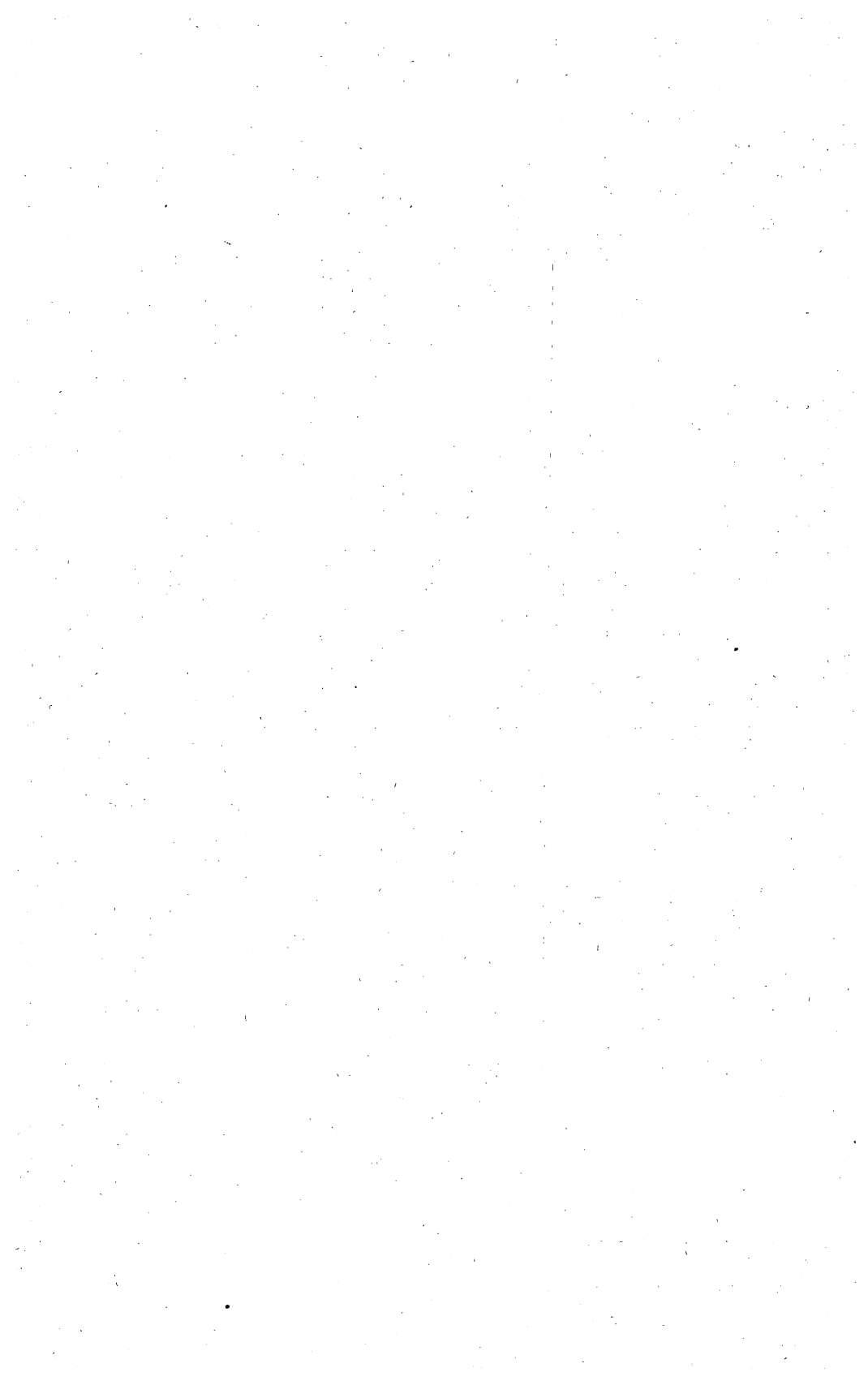
Rescinds concurrent resolution passed by 1949 Legislature memorializing the Congress of the United States to propose constitutional amendments to authorize the United States to join in a World Federal Government—A. C. R. 9—133, 475, 592, 927.

Zoning—

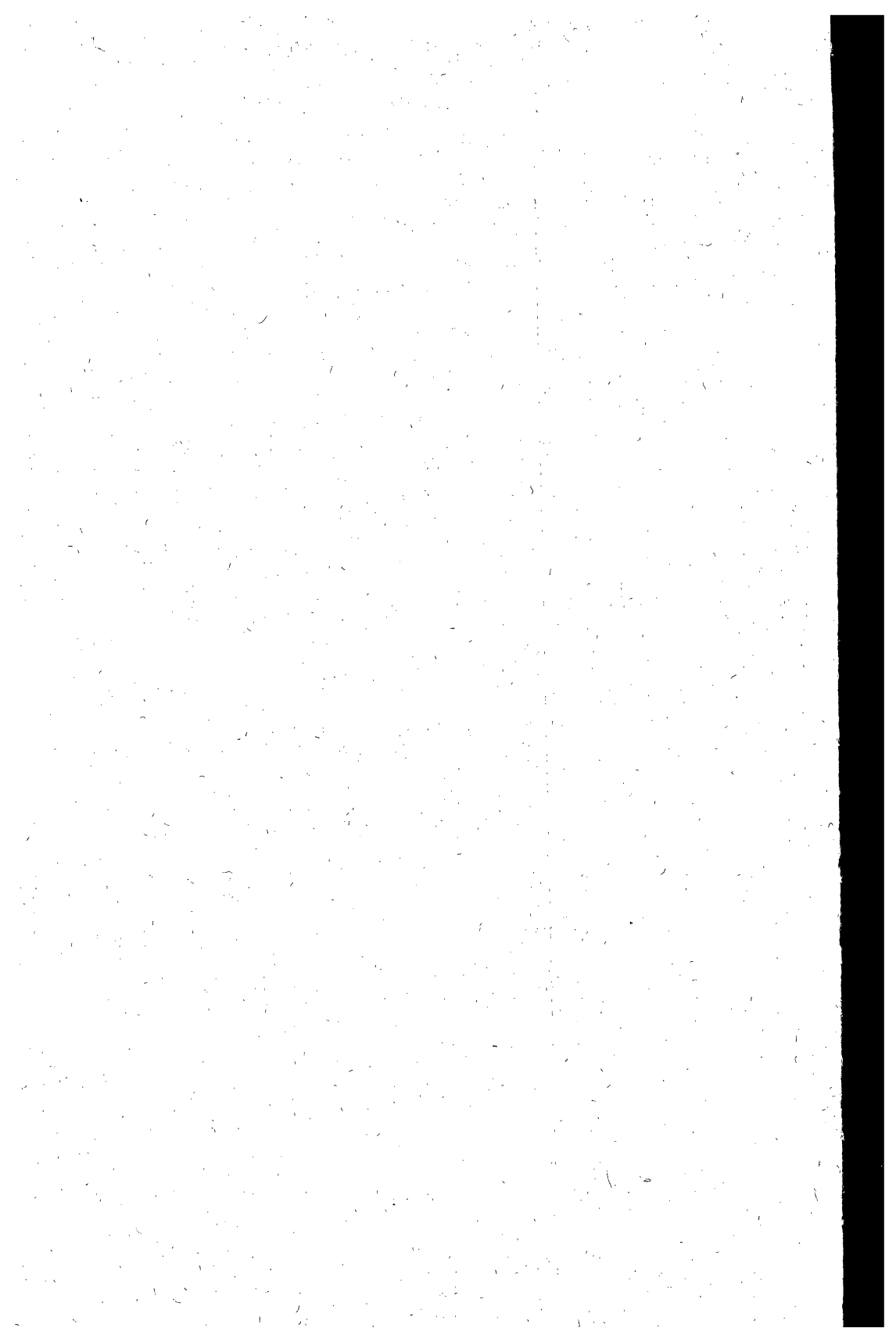
Requires persons appealing to Board of Adjustment in zoning dispute, to notify at least 5 days before hearing, all property owners "situate within or without the municipality" and within 200 feet of property to be affected—A. B. 461—249, 343, 352, 562.
