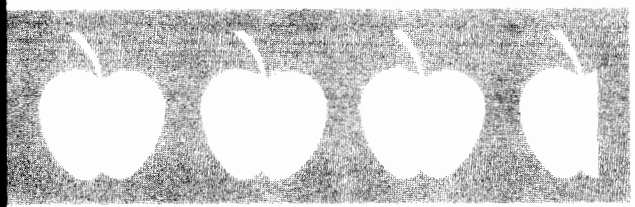
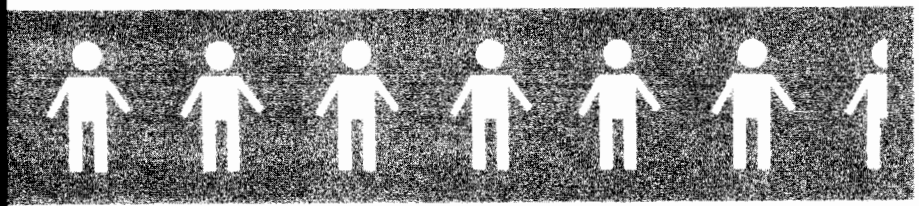




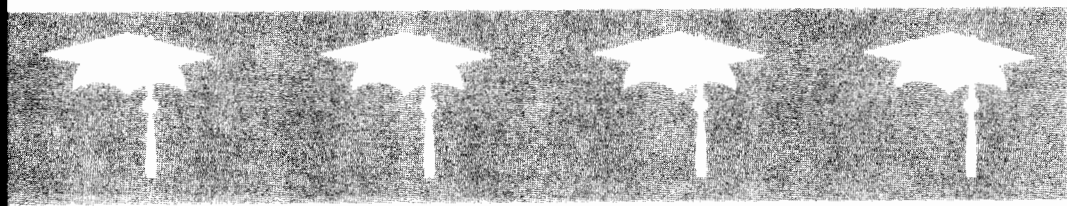

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PREFACE

The 1987-88 edition of Vital Educational Statistics is the fourteenth in a series which began in 1974-75. It marks the eleventh year of a revised series using data derived from updated survey instruments supported by detailed and illustrated instructions. It is the tenth year that the publication has been produced in two volumes. A glossary of data terms is provided.

As in the previous editions, Volume I contains school district and school data, including enrollments, dropouts, and graduate data. Each section contains narrative and tabular data to accommodate both reader and user preferences.

Volume II of Vital Educational Statistics is a separate publication and deals exclusively with certificated and non-certificated staff data.

The data published in the Vital Educational Statistics series are descriptive and were designed to establish a core data base to aid in reporting on the condition of education in New Jersey. It is hoped that these data, when joined with other department data, will lead to insights from which policy can be developed.

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INTRODUCTION

This introduction presents selected trend data characteristics of public elementary and secondary education in New Jersey between 1983-84 and 1987-88. The four sets of data show enrollments, dropouts and graduates over the past five years; and the schools that housed the public elementary and secondary pupils.

INTRODUCTION (CONT.)

SYNOPSIS OF TRENDS

1983-84 TO 1987-88

Statewide, enrollments in this period decreased by 4.8 percent or an average of 0.96 percent per year. Elementary school enrollments increased by 0.10 percent. This marks the first time in the 14 years of Vital Educational Statistics that an increase is reported for elementary school enrollments. Secondary school enrollments decreased by 13.1 percent over the period for an average of 2.6 percent per year.

The number of schools decreased by 41 or 1.8 percent of the total reported in 1983-84. Schools for the handicapped increased by two (2). Secondary schools decreased by 27 or 6.6 percent of those operating in 1983-84. Elementary schools decreased by 16 or 0.8 percent of those operating five years ago.

The total number of dropouts increased by 0.5 percent between 1983-84 and 1987-88. The number of dropouts classified as "minority" increased by 13.7 percent.

Although the number of public high school graduates decreased by 11.9 percent (between 1983 and 1987) the percent of those "continuing education" increased by 4.3 percent. The percent of 1987 graduates continuing their education was 68.0 percent.

DISTRICT AND SCHOOL INFORMATION

Table I There was a change in the status of the number of school districts operating or non-operating for the first time since 1983-84. Although the number of operating districts remained unchanged at 592, the number in Sussex County decreased from 27 to 26 and the number in Union County increased from 23 to 24. The number of non-operating districts increased from 24 to 26 with the additions of one in Morris County and one in Sussex County. The increase from 616 to 618 districts effected the status in only two counties with Morris increasing from 42 to 43 and Union from 23 to 24.

Table II This table was first published in the 1981-82 Vital Educational Statistics and showed 601 operating administrative units in the state. Between 1981-82 and 1984-85, there was a reduction in the number of Type I units from 53 to 52, the number of Type II units decreased by three to 527, the county units decreased by one (1) and state units increased by ten (10). In 1985-86, there was a decrease of nine (9) operating administrative units from 606 in 1984-85 to 597 in 1985-86. In 1987-88, the number of operational Type II School Districts was decreased by one and the number of Commissions increased by one with the establishment of an Educational Jointure Services Commission in Union County.

Thus, of the 597 operating units in 1987-88, 578 are local school districts (a reduction of one from 579), 14 are county units (an increase of one from 13), and 5 are state operated units.

Table III This table was introduced in the 1982-83 edition and there have been no significant changes in the size of districts over the period. Three hundred and six (306) or 51.7 percent of the 592 operating districts enroll between 0 and 999 students. One hundred and eighty-nine (189) or 31.9 percent of the total operating districts enroll between 1,000 and 2,999 students. The remaining ninety-seven (97) or 16.4 percent had enrollments which ranged from 3,000 to the high of 50,888 students.

Table IV This table displays the type of schools which compose the state's public elementary/secondary educational system. Column 12 reports a total of 2,247 public schools which is a decrease of four (4) from the 2,251 reported in 1986-87. Of this total number of public schools, 1,843 are elementary and 404 are secondary. In comparison with 1986-87, increases were reported in the number of elementary schools (3) and the number of six-year high schools (4). Declines in school types were as follows: four in middle schools (234 to 230); three in four-year high schools (246 to 243); one in other high schools (20 to 19); one in vocational high schools (43 to 42); and two in elementary handicapped schools (54 to 52).

A comparison of the total number of schools by county between 1986-87 and 1987-88 shows that increases occurred in two counties. In Cape May County the number increased from 30 to 31 and in Cumberland County from 57 to 60.

Counties showing decreases were: Bergen, from 265 to 263; Essex, from 223 to 220; Gloucester, from 81 to 80; Mercer, from 88 to 87; and Monmouth, from 160 to 159. In the remaining 14 counties, no changes were reported from 1986-87.

Of the 404 public secondary schools in New Jersey, 41.1 percent or 166 schools had enrollments between 500 and 999 students; 24.0 percent or 97 schools had enrollments between 1,000 and 1,499; and 13.6 percent or 55 secondary schools had enrollments which ranged from 1,500 to a high of 4,381 students. Thus, 21.3 percent or 86 of the secondary schools in New Jersey enrolled fewer than 500 students.

Of the 1,843 public elementary schools in New Jersey, 1,379 or 74.8 percent had enrollments between 0 and 499, and 422 or 24.0 percent had enrollments between 500 and 999. Thus, 42 or 1.2 percent of the elementary schools had enrollments which ranged from 1,000 to a high of 1,418 students.

Table V This table was introduced in the 1984-85 edition of Vital Educational Statistics Volume I and is appearing for the fourth year. It reports on programs that the schools of New Jersey have established to meet the identified needs of their students and the numbers being served. The following table compares the students reported enrolled in 1986-87 with the numbers reported enrolled in 1987-88 by showing increasing, no change, and decreasing program enrollments.

SECTION II

STUDENT INFORMATION

STUDENT INFORMATION

This section contains data on student enrollments, dropouts and high school graduate follow-up information. Of the 10 tables, four contain enrollment data, three carry dropout data, and three contain high school graduate follow-up information. All of the data reported are as of September 30, 1987. These data are used to prepare enrollment projections and to develop lists of schools that have high concentrations of low income pupils. In addition, the data are supplied to the National Center for Education Statistics and are made available to the public upon request.

ENROLLMENTS

Table VI is a membership table, i.e., pupils on roll during the last school day of September 1987. There were 1,092,982 students on roll in the public schools as of September 30, 1987. The data are reported for day school students and were compiled from individual school reports submitted by each district. The special education pupils shown in Column 17 are students on roll in self-contained classes. "Mainstreamed" special education students are reported with the regular students at their respective grade levels.

Enrollment increases were in the Pre-Kindergarten, Kindergarten, Grades 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 12, Post Grad. and Self-Contained Special Education categories. Between Kindergarten and Grade 3, there were 5,399 more students than in 1986-87. Although enrollment increases were shown for Grades 4, 5, and 12 in 1987-88, there was an overall decline of 20,249 students in the total enrollment of Grades 4 through 12. Self-contained special education enrollments increased by 1,882 students.

Compared with 1986-87, there was a decline of 14,485 students. This was an increase of 5,758 students over the 8,727 decline reported between the 1985-86 and 1986-87 school years. It also marks the first time in the last eight years that the number of declining students reported for the current school year has been greater than the number reported for the preceding school year. The rate of decline in enrollments has increased by 0.53 percent from the decade low of 0.78 percent recorded in 1986-87 to 1.31 percent in 1987-88. If this condition continues, the end of the declining enrollments that had been predicted by the end of this decade will not occur.

Table VII is the first of two tables separating students on roll into elementary and secondary school categories. Note that seventh and eighth grade students on roll appear in both elementary and secondary counts, depending upon the type of school in which they were enrolled. On September 30, 1987, 726,305 elementary students were on roll, 3,353 more than were reported in September, 1986. Fourteen (14) counties, Atlantic, Burlington, Camden, Cape May, Gloucester, Hunterdon, Mercer, Middlesex, Monmouth, Ocean, Salem, Somerset, Union and Warren showed increases, which ranged from a high of 1,090 students in Mercer to 33 in Union. Of the seven counties showing a decrease in enrollments, the range was from a high of 1,616 in Essex to a low of 21 in Sussex.

Table VIII shows that in 1987, 366,677 secondary school students were on roll in grades seven through twelve, 17,838 fewer students than were reported in 1986. Two counties, Atlantic and Cumberland, showed increases of 182 and 192 students respectively.

Nine counties showed decreases of greater than 1,000 students: Bergen (1,765), Camden (1,164), Essex (2,909), Mercer (1,269), Middlesex (1,147), Monmouth (1,336), Morris (1,494), Passaic (1,244), and Union (1,642). In the remaining 10 counties, the declines ranged from the high of 832 to the low of 98. Overall, seven counties (Atlantic, Burlington, Cape May, Cumberland, Gloucester, Ocean and Salem) showed increases in their total enrollments from 1986-87 to 1987-88.

Table IX shows the composition of the total enrollment by county in the five prescribed federal racial/ethnic categories. Of the total number of students on roll, 32.5 percent were reported as "minority"--an increase of 0.4 percent over 1986. In comparison with 1986, there was a decrease of 14,383 or 1.9 percent in the white enrollment, a decrease of 1.9 percent or 4,063 students in the black enrollment, an increase of 1,149 students or 1.0 percent in the Hispanic enrollment, an increase of 15 students in the American Indian/Alaskan native enrollment, and an increase of 2,797 students or 7.9 percent in the Asian/Pacific islander enrollment.

Eight (8) counties exceeded the state average of 32.5 percent Minority: Hudson, 68.7 percent; Essex, 66.8 percent; Passaic, 49.2 percent; Union 45.3 percent; Cumberland, 43.9 percent; Mercer, 39.3 percent; Atlantic, 37.2 percent; and, Camden, 34.9 percent.

DROPOUTS

The three tables in the "Dropout" series were developed using the data reported by the public elementary and secondary schools on the students who discontinued school before completing the prescribed course of study during the 1986-87 school year.

Of the total 18,580 reported students leaving school, 16,841 or 90.6 percent were known to have discontinued school and 1,739 or 9.4 percent had moved to a new residence and the school status was unknown. In comparison with the 15,733 reported known dropouts in 1985-86, the 16,841 is an increase of 7.0 percent or 1,108 students. There was a decrease from 2,275 to 1,739 between 1985-86 and 1986-87 in the new residence school status unknown category.

Table X reports the Known and Unknown Reasons for Dropouts by County. The reason categories reported are in conformity with Handbook V, Student and Pupil Accounting of the National Center for Education Statistics. The categories are a consolidation of some 17 detailed explanations of reasons for discontinuing school.

Two major categories account for three-fifths (60.4%) of the total dropouts. There were 7,535 or 40.6% "Dissatisfied With School/Behavioral/Academic Difficulty" and 3,688 or 19.8% due to "Economics/Entered Employment". The detailed explanations of the categories may be found in the glossary at the end of the report.

Table XI shows the basic categories of grade and sex. Slightly less than half (49.4%) of the total reported dropouts were reported in grades 10 and 11. This percent is increased to 89.6% when grades twelve (18.6%) and nine (21.6%) are added. The remaining 10.4% are distributed over special education (5.8%), grades seven and eight (3.2%) and Pre-K thru six and ungraded (1.0%). In comparison with 1985-86, the dropouts as percentages of grade enrollments increased by 0.7% from 3.9% to 4.6% in the ninth grade and by 0.6% from 4.7% to 5.3% in the tenth grade. In the other grades there were minor or no changes.

The ninth grade class entering high school in 1982-83 and graduating in June 1986 had a dropout percentage of 15.8 percent. This rate was calculated by adding the 1982-83 ninth grade dropouts (3,317), the 1983-84 tenth grade dropouts (4,112), the 1984-85 eleventh grade dropouts (4,709) and the 1985-86 twelfth grade dropouts (3,495) and dividing by the 1982-83 ninth grade enrollment (99,244). The ninth grade class entering high school in 1983-84 also had a dropout percentage of 15.8 percent. $(3,317 + 4,112 + 4,709 + 3,495 \text{ divided by } 99,546 = 15.8\%)$.

The ratio between the sexes shows little change. Males discontinuing school were 59.2% of the total dropouts, an increase of 0.2% from the 59.0% reported for 1985-86. The percentage of females discontinuing school decreased from 41.0% in 1985-86 to 40.8% in 1986-87.

Table XII shows the state's public school dropouts by racial/ethnic origin. In comparison with the 1985-86 school year, the percentage of white dropouts decreased by 3.5%, black dropouts increased by 2.9%, Hispanic dropouts increased by 0.6%, and American Indian/Alaskan native, Asian and Pacific islander categories were without change.

GRADUATES

The three tables in "The Follow-Up of Graduates" series were developed using the data reported by the public high schools from their studies conducted in the fall of 1987 of the 1986-87 graduates. The 79,376 graduates in 1986-87 was an increase of 0.8 percent or 595 from the 78,784 reported in 1985-86. Of the 81,896 twelfth graders enrolled on September 30, 1986, 96.9% graduated. In comparison over the past five years, this percentage ranks second to the 1982-83 high of 97.3%.

When the graduates are taken as a percentage of the ninth graders reported enrolled in the public secondary schools in September four years earlier, the graduation rate is 79.7%. This percentage is the second highest in the past decade, following the 79.8 percent in 1983-84.

Table XIII shows the status of the 1986-87 graduates in the fall of 1987. Of the total graduates, 68.0% or 53,970 had elected to continue with their education. This continues the upward trend of percentage of graduates continuing their education which began with the 61.9% reported in 1979-80. A similar trend is evident in the enrollment of graduates in college or university where the percentage has increased annually from 53.6% in 1979-80 to 56.4% in 1983-84 to 59.4% in 1985-86 to 61.2% in 1986-87. On the other hand, the percentage of graduates enrolling in other education in this period has been declining. The 6.8% reported for 1986-87 is a decrease of 0.5 percent from the 7.3% reported in 1985-86 and is the lowest percentage reported in the last decade. The percentage of graduates employed also continued to decline from 28.3% in 1979-80 to 22.2% in 1986-87.

Table XIV shows the racial/ethnic distribution of the public high school graduates. Of the 79,376 graduates, 22.6% or 17,928 were classified as minorities. This was an increase of 0.2% over the 22.4% reported in 1985-86. Seven counties in 1986-87 exceeded the statewide average of 22.6% minority graduates. They were: Hudson, 57.8%; Essex, 50.6%; Cumberland, 34.7%; Passaic, 34.7%; Union, 33.5%; Atlantic, 27.6% and Mercer, 24.6%.

Districts reported that of the minority graduates, 13.9 percent were black, 6.1 percent were Hispanic and the 2.5 percent were American Indian/Alaskan native and Asian/Pacific islanders.

Table XV shows the racial/ethnic distribution of the public high school graduates who enrolled in colleges or universities. Of the 48,558 graduates enrolling in colleges or universities, 39,682 (81.7%) were white, 5,008 (10.3%) were black, 2,146 (4.4%) were Hispanic, 1,661 (3.4%) were Asian or Pacific Islander, and 61 (0.1%) were American Indian/Alaskan Native.

Of the graduates attending colleges and universities, the percentage attending in-state decreased from 55.0% in 1985-86 to 54.6% in 1986-87. Graduates attending out-of-state colleges increased from 45.0% in 1985-86 to 45.4% in 1986-87.

GLOSSARY

Administrative Exclusion: A legal action of an authorized party that compels a student to leave school before completing the prescribed course of studies. The legal action may be taken for reasons such as extreme misbehavior, incorrigibility and/or incarceration in a correctional institution.

Advanced Placement Program: A series of courses for upper grade secondary school students intended to provide college level instruction. Successful completion may enable the student(s) to bypass the usual initial college courses in the subject area and begin the student's college work with a more advanced course and possibly with college credit. (This category does not include students enrolled in special programs for the talented or gifted.)

Alternate School: A school that offers a student a choice between it and the traditional school which most students in the district attend. The alternate school is frequently typified by modified curricular content, nonstandard classrooms, and/or instructional techniques based on individual students needs.

Apprenticeship/On-The-Job Training: Supervised training program for a beginner who wishes to learn, a semi-skilled or skilled trade. At the apprenticeship level, two or more years work experience on the job, supplemented by related classroom experience.

Art School: A non-degree granting, post-secondary institution offering courses of varying length in preparation for occupations related to drawing, painting, sculpture, design, and similar arts.

Bilingual Program: A State Board of Education approved instructional program conducted in English and a second language. Such programs are intended to meet the special needs of students who have a native language other than English or who have limited English speaking ability.

Business or Secretarial School: A non-degree granting, post-secondary institution offering courses of varying length in preparation for technical business occupations.

College (four-year): A post-secondary institution offering a four-year curriculum and empowered to confer a bachelor's degree.

College (two-year): A post-secondary institution offering a two-year curriculum and empowered to confer an associate's degree.

Compensatory Education Program: A program approved by the State Board of Education to provide preventive and remedial activities and services, supplemental to the regular school program, to meet the special needs of students performing below minimum levels of student proficiency as required by NJAC 6:8-1.1 and 3.8.

Continuing Education: A program extending opportunities for reading, study and training to young persons and adults following completion of or withdrawal from full-time school or college programs.

Cosmetology or Barber School: A non-degree granting, post-secondary institution offering courses of varying length in preparation for qualifying examinations and licensing.

Course: An organization of subject matter and related learning experiences provided for the instruction of pupils on a regular or systematic basis, usually for a predetermined period of time. Credit toward graduation or completion of a program of studies is given pupils for the successful completion of a course.

Credits Required for Graduation: Units of value awarded to all or some pupils for the successful completion of the work of a course or series of courses. (The minimum number of credits to be established by each high school are set forth in NJAC 6:27-1.4.)

Dissatisfied with School/Behavioral/Academic: The student withdrew from school before completing the prescribed course of studies for any one and/or combination of the following reasons: behavioral difficulty, academic difficulty, poor student/staff relationships, poor peer relationships, lack of appropriate curriculum, and/or an active dislike of one or more aspects of his/her school experiences.

Dropout: An elementary or secondary school student who has been in membership during the regular school term and who withdraws from membership before graduating from secondary school (Grade 12) or before completing an equivalent program of studies. Such an individual is considered as having discontinued schooling, whether this occurs before or after the student has passed the compulsory school attendance age and, where applicable, whether or not the student has completed a minimum required amount of school work.

Economic/Entered Employment: The student withdrew from school before completing the prescribed course of study for any one and/or combination of the following reasons: needed at home, encouraged by parents to leave school, inability to pay expenses associated with school attendance, to seek employment and/or had accepted employment.

Expulsions: The action taken by a board of education compelling a student to withdraw from school for reasons such as extreme misbehavior, incorrigibility, or unsatisfactory achievement or progress in school work.

Family Income: The combined incomes of all members of the student's family. Possible sources for this information are: the School Lunch Programs, Chapter I, County Welfare Boards or local survey.

Government Service: Enlistment in the armed forces, the Job Corps or another government sponsored program.

Home Economics: A consumer and homemaking program of instructional and laboratory experiences taught by a home economics teacher and which (1) contributes to personality development; (2) teaches the child's role in school and home life; (3) develops appreciation of the family; and (4) enriches the child's learnings in other areas such as foods and clothing.

Industrial Arts Program: A program of instructional and laboratory experiences which provide basic education related to the industrial and technological aspects of life through experiences with tools, materials and processes.

Industry Sponsored School: A technical, trade or vocational school sponsored by a private industrial firm, primarily to train prospective employees.

Introduction to Vocations Program: A guidance program to enable students in Grades 7 through 10 to explore occupational opportunities. the program includes classroom instruction, "hands-on" activities, field trips, job visitation days and speakers from business and industry.

Married or Pregnant: The student withdrew from school before completing the prescribed course of studies to establish a household.

New Residence: School Status Unknown: The student left school upon moving to a new residence. It is not known if the student entered a new school.

Nursing School: A non-degree granting, post-secondary institution usually associated with a hospital which prepares students to be nurses.

Open Classroom: A relatively large instructional area or multiclassroom space not separated by walls as in a traditional classroom. More important than these physical aspects is the accompanying philosophy of an open curriculum cooperatively developed by teachers and students without the constraints inherent in the usual prescribed curriculum.

Other Post-Secondary School: Any non-degree granting, post-secondary school other than the foregoing.

Other Type College: Any post-secondary degree granting institution other than the foregoing.

Physical, Mental, Social or Emotional Disability: A physical illness and/or a sensory disability, disturbance which causes a student to withdraw from school before completing the prescribed program of studies.

Post-Graduate: Students who after graduating from high school (Grade 12) re-enroll in the same or another secondary school for additional high school level courses.

Pre-Kindergarten: Students in a group or class organized to provide educational experiences for children during the year or years preceding the kindergarten which are part of the elementary school program and are under the direction of a professionally qualified teacher.

Program Completion: Curricular activities or program set by the local board of education as a prerequisite for graduation. The activities or programs shall be based on specific instructional objectives for an individual and/or group of individuals. In New Jersey, often described as "Plan B".

Program for Gifted and Talented: A program for students identified by professionally qualified personnel as being advanced in mental development and/or capable of high performance in one or more areas of special competence. Among these areas of competence are creativity, leadership ability, social adeptness and facility in the productive and performing arts. (This category does not include students enrolled in enrichment courses leading to advance placement.)

Program for Pregnant Students: A program for students who would otherwise drop out of school because of pregnancy. In addition to meeting all curricular requirements, such programs usually provide special personal and educational counseling services.

Program of Studies: A program is a combination of related courses and/or self-contained classes organized for the attainment of specific educational objectives e.g., a program of special education for handicapped pupils or a program of occupational (vocational) education.

Racial/Ethnic Groups: A pupil may be included in the group to which he or she appears to belong, identifies with or is regarded in the community as belonging to. However, no person should be counted in more than one racial/ethnic category. The categories are: White, Not Hispanic Origin, Black, Not Hispanic Origin, Hispanic, American Indian or Alaskan Native and Asian or Pacific Islander.

Reason Unknown: The student withdrew from school before completing the prescribed course of studies for reason(s) which are not known.

School District: A legal entity established in accordance with New Jersey Statutes Title 18A Education Chapter 8.

Type I is the legal classification of a local school district in accordance with New Jersey Statutes Title 18A Education Chapter 9-2.

Type II is the legal classification of a local school district in accordance with New Jersey Statutes Title 18A Education Chapter 9-3.

School Year: The "school year" begins on July 1 and ends on June 30.

Service Academy: An institution of higher education maintained by the federal government to prepare students for a professional career as officers in one of the armed services.

Shared Time Vocational: An arrangement whereby a student regularly and concurrently attends two schools which share direction and control of the student's studies. In this report, the time sharing relationship is between a public secondary school and an area vocational school.

Special Education: Students on roll in self-contained special education classes. (Special Education students who are mainstreamed are reported in their respective grade levels.)

Special Education Program: A special program for any student who is mentally retarded, visually handicapped, auditorily handicapped, communication handicapped, neurologically or perceptually impaired, orthopedically handicapped, chronically ill, emotionally disturbed, socially maladjusted or multiply handicapped.

Suspensions: Temporary dismissals (at least one school day) of students from school by a principal. These are official suspensions reported to the chief school administrator. Count each pupil only once regardless of the number of times he or she was suspended.

Technical, Trade or Vocational School: A non-degree granting, post-secondary institution offering courses to prepare individuals for employment as skilled workers or draftsmen.

Technology for Children Program: A program to provide children with individualized, experimental learning and opportunities to develop interests and self-awareness. Technological world-of-work activities are integrated throughout the traditional curriculum with emphasis on the needs and interests of individual students.

Total Enrollment: A count of students on roll on the last school day of September.

Unemployed: Not employed at any paid work.

Ungraded: Students in a class which is not organized on the basis of grade and has no standard grade designation. (Students in special education classes should not be reported here, but on the special education line.)

Vocational Education Program: Programs offering education and training in such semi-skilled, skilled or technical occupations as agriculture, home economics, office occupations, distributive education and technical education.
