- Acquisition of 148 acre McNeil Farm adjacent to Goosepond State Park
- Acquisition of 180 acre Arrow Park adjacent to Sterling Forest
- Acquisition of 460 acre Torme Valley parcel adjacent to Harriman State Park.
- Awarding of management contract for the Bear Mountain Inn Complex with Guest Services. The 20 year lease will provide \$3 million in capital improvement as well as an annual fee.
- Minnewaska State Park Preserve experienced a 3,100 acre forest fire. One of the largest in New York State in decades.
- Budget issues in New York and New Jersey resulted in personnel hiring freezes and a \$400,000 reduction in New York seasonal staff position resulting in significant winter service reductions.
- Portions of Stony Point Battlefield, including the lighthouse, were closed for several months in the Spring to protect nesting Bald Eagles.
- Handicap accessible improvements to the pedestrian tunnel providing access to the pool and Trailside Zoo and Museum under Route 9W were opened on June 5, 2008.
- Opening of Sterling Forest Lakeville Ironworks Trail.
- Portions of County Route 106 in Harriman were closed by Orange County due to deteriorated culverts causing significant impact of the operations several group camps.
- Second Annual Knickerbocker Ice Festival was held with record crowds
- \$35,000 grant received from Consolidation Edison of New York, in part ship with Friends of PIPC to renew support of educational programs at Trailside Museums and Zoo, Group Camp Regional Museums and Rockland Lake Nature Center
