HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

ONE HUNDREDTH SESSION.

STATE OF NEW JERSEY, ASSEMBLY CHAMBER, TRENTON, January 11th, 1876.

At 3 o'clock P. M. the House met.

This being the time appointed for the meeting of the One Hundredth General Assembly of the State of New Jersey, and three (3) o'clock being the hour appointed for the organization of the House of Assembly, the House was called to order by Austin H. Patterson, of Monmouth county, clerk of the last House.

Prayer was offered by Rev. Dr. Hanlon, invoking the blessing of the Almighty upon the State during the Centennial year.

Upon taking the chair, Mr. Carscallen said:

Gentlemen of the General Assembly:

For the honor you have conferred upon me, I tender my sincere thanks. I regard it as more especially an honor, because of the peculiar period at which it is bestowed. We stand here to-day, legislatively on the line that divides two centuries, for this is the one-hundredth session of the Legislature of New Jersey. The nation is now preparing to celebrate our entrance on the second century of the republic, and both pride and patriotism concur in inviting us to make it a memorable period.

While we as representatives of the people of this State may not claim that we are wiser, and certainly not that we are more patriotic, than our ancestors or our predecessors in this body, yet how the responsibilities and labors of this position have increased.

The legislature of one hundred years ago represented a sparse population of a few thousands, and a wealth, yet undeveloped in an infant state. We represent a million of people, whose wealth is counted by millions, and a commonwealth that is crowned with the experience of an hundred years. Let us hope that we shall rightly appreciate and honestly discharge our duties.

It shall be my aim at all times to guard the rights of the minority, and to promote that harmony among the members of this House, which in the end shall redound to the honor of the State, and show that as legislators in all that concerns the public welfare, we have kept steadily in view things manly, pure and of good report.

Messrs. Bergen, Bird, Campbell, Conover, Dodd, Drake, E. H., Egan, Emson, Ferdon, Hannon, Hendrickson, Lodge, Mackey, Martin, Matthews, Owen, Rabe, Richman, Rue, Sanderson, Skellenger, Swayze, Winant.—23.

Mr. Scovel offered the following, which was read and adopted:

Resolved, That a committee of three be appointed to wait on the Governor, and inform him that the House has organized, and is ready to proceed to business.

Mr. Scovel also offered the following, which was read and adopted:

Resolved, That the rules of the last General Assembly be adopted for the government of the House until otherwise ordered.

The following rules weré thereupon adopted:

OF THE MEETING OF THE HOUSE.

1. Any member or members less than a quorum may meet and adjourn the House from day to day, when necessary.

2. Every member shall attend in his place precisely at the hour to which the House was last adjourned; and in case of neglect he shall be subject to a reprimand from the Chair, unless excused by the House; nor shall any member absent himself from the House for more than the space of a quarter

of an hour, without leave previously obtained.

3. In case a less number of members than a quorum shall be present after the arrival of the hour to which the House stood adjourned, they are hereby authorized to send their Sergeant-at-arms, or any other person or persons by them authorized, with a warrant duly executed, for any and all absent members, as the majority of such as are present may agree, and at the expense of such absent members, respectively, unless such excuse for non-attendance shall be rendered as the House, when a quorum is convened, shall judge sufficient. Immediately after the appointment of the Standing Committees, the members shall arrange among themselves their several seats appropriated their counties; and in case of disagreement the same shall be decided by lot.

OF THE DUTIES OF THE SPEAKER.

- 4. He shall take the chair at the hour to which the House shall have adjourned, and immediately call the members to order; and on the appearance of a quorum, shall cause the journal of the preceding day to be read, which may then be corrected by the House.
- 5. He shall preserve order and decorum, and in debate shall prevent personal reflections, and confine members to the question under discussion; but he shall not engage in any debate, nor propose his opinion on any question, without first calling on some member to occupy the chair. When two or more members rise at the same time, he shall name the one entitled to the floor.
- 6. He shall decide questions of order, subject to an appeal to the House, when demanded by any four members, on which appeal no member shall speak more than once, unless by leave of the House.

- 7. All questions before the House shall be stated by the Speaker, and distinctly put in the following form, to-wit: "As many as are in favor of (the question) will say aye;" and after the affirmative is expressed, "those of a contrary opinion, no." If the Speaker doubts, or a division be called for, the House shall divide; those in the affirmative of the question shall first rise from their seats, and afterwards those in the negative; and in case of an equal division the Speaker shall decide.
- 8. All Committees shall be appointed by the Speaker unless otherwise specially directed by the House.
- 9. All acts, addresses and joint resolutions shall be signed by the Speaker; and all writs, warrants and subpœnas issued by the order of the House shall be under his hand and seal and attested by the Clerk. If the Speaker be absent a less number of members than a quorum may appoint a Speaker pro tempore, who may sign any warrants or perform any act requisite to bring in absent members.
- 10. He shall have a general direction of the Hall, and he may name a member to perform the duties of the chair; but such substitution shall not extend beyond a second adjournment.

OF THE ORDER OF BUSINESS.

- 11. After the reading of the journal, the business of the first meeting of each day, shall be conducted in the following manner, to-wit:
- I. Letters, petitions, and memorials, remonstrances, and accompanying documents may be presented and disposed of.
 - II. Reports of Committees may be read.
- III. Original resolutions may be offered and considered; items of unfinished business referred; motions to reconsider and to appoint additional members of Committees made; and leave of absence, leave to withdraw documents and leave to introduce bills asked.

LEAVE FOR BILLS AND TO INTRODUCE BILLS.

IV. Bills and joint resolutions on a third reading may be taken up.

- V. The House shall then proceed in the order of the day, preference being always given to the unfinished business of the previous sitting; after which bills and joint resolutions of a second reading shall be taken in their order; and the House, in its afternoon session, will proceed to business as though there had been no adjournment of its morning sesion, excepting that original resolutions and leave to introduce bills of Committees be the first business in the afternoon session; and shall, on demand of the majority, proceed with the order of the day.
- 12. The Clerk shall make a list of all public bills and joint resolutions. He shall keep a separate calendar of private bills. No bills for granting, continuing, altering, amending or renewing a charter for any corporation, other than a municipal corporation, shall be placed on the calendar of public bills. All bills, public and private, shall be numbered according to time of their introduction into the House. They shall be taken up and considered in the order of time in which they were reported, or ordered to a third reading, as appears by the calendar; and the calendar shall be proceeded in until all the bills thereon are called up before the commencement of the calendar anew.
- 13. All messages shall be sent from this House to the Senate by the Clerk.

OF DECORUM AND DEBATE.

- 14. When a member is about to speak in debate, or communicate any matter to the House, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to the Speaker, confining himself to the question under debate, and avoiding personality.
- 15. If any member in debate transgresses the rules of the House, the Speaker shall, or any member may, call him to order, in which case the member so called to order shall immediately sit down, unless permitted to explain. The House shall, if appealed to, decide on the case, but without debate; if there be no appeal, the decision of the Chair shall be submitted to. If the decision be in favor of the member called to order, he shall be at liberty to proceed; if otherwise, he shall not be permitted to proceed without leave of the House; and if the case require it, he shall be liable to the censure of the House.

- 16. If a member be called to order for words spoken in debate, the person calling him to order shall repeat the words excepted to, and they shall be taken down in writing at the Clerk's table; and no member shall be held to answer, or be subject to the censure of the House, for words spoken in debate, if any other member has spoken, or other business has intervened after the words spoken, and before exception to them shall have been taken.
- 17. No member shall speak more than twice on the same question without leave of the House.
- 18. While the Speaker is putting any question, or addressing the House, none shall walk out of or across the hall nor in such case, or when a member is speaking, shall any one entertain private discourse, nor shall any one, while a member is speaking, pass between him and the Chair.
- 19. No member shall vote on any question in the event of which he is particularly interested, nor in any case where he was not within the bar of the House when the question was put.
- 20. Every member who shall be in the House when the question is put shall give his vote, unless the House for special reasons shall excuse him. All motions to excuse a member from voting shall be made before the House divides, or before the call of the yeas and nays is commenced; any member requesting to be excused from voting may make a brief verbal statement of the reasons for such request; and the question shall then be taken up without further debate.
- 21. Petitions, memorials, and other papers addressed to the House, shall be presented by the Speaker, or by a member in his place. A brief statement of the contents thereof shall be made by the introducer, and, if called upon, he shall declare that it does not, in his opinion, contain any indecent or reproachful language or any expressions of disrespect to the House, or any Committee of the same.
- 22. It shall be the duty of the Sergeant-at-Arms, at all times not to allow any person to smoke in the Assembly Chamber.

ON MOTIONS.

23. Every motion shall be reduced to writing, if the Speaker, or any member desire it.

- 24. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the Speaker, or, being in writing, it shall be handed to the Chair and read aloud by the Clerk, when it shall be deemed to be in the possession of the House and open to debate; but it may be withdrawn at any time before decision or amendment.
- 25. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received, but—
 - 1. To adjourn.
 - 2. A call of the House.
 - 3. To lay on the table.
 - 4. For the previous question.
 - 5. To postpone indefinitely.
 - 6. To postpone to a day certain.
- 7. To go into a Committee of the Whole on the pending subject immediately.
 - 8. To commit to a Committee of the Whole.
 - 9. To commit to a Standing Committee.
 - 10. To commit to a Select Committee.
 - 11. To amend.

Which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they are stated, and no motion to postpone to a day certain, to commit, or to postpone indefinitely, being decided shall be again allowed on the same day, and at the same stage of the bill or proposition.

- 26. A motion to strike out the enacting clause of a bill or joint resolution shall have precedence of a motion to amend and if carried shall be considered equivalent to its rejection
- 27. A motion to adjourn shall be always in order, except when the House is voting, or while a member is addressing the House, or immediately after the question to adjourn has been negatived; that, and the motion to lay on the table, shall be decided without debate.
- 28. Any member may call for a division of the question which shall be divided if it comprehends questions so distinct

that one being taken away from the rest may stand entire for the decision of the House; a motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible; but a motion to strike out being lost, shall preclude neither amendment nor a motion to strike out and insert.

- 29. When any motion shall be made and seconded, the same shall, at the request of any two members, be entered on the Journal of the House.
- 30. When a motion has been once made and carried in the affirmative or negative, it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing party to move for the reconsideration thereof on the same day, or on the next day of actual session of the House thereafter; all motions may be reconsidered by a majority of the members present, but bills to be reconsidered must have the same majority that would be necessary to pass them; and such vote on motion to reconsider shall be by taking the yeas and nays.
- 31. When a blank is to be filled the question shall first be taken on the largest sum, or greatest number, and remotest day.
- 32. The yeas and nays shall be entered on the Journal of the House, when moved for and seconded by five members, and in taking the yeas and nays the names of the members, including the Speaker, shall be called alphabetically.
- 33. The previous question shall be put in this form: "Shall the main question be now put?" It shall only be admitted when demanded by a majority of the members present, and its effect shall be, if decided affirmatively, to put an end to all debate and bring the House to a direct vote upon amendments reported by a Committee, if any, then upon pending amendments, and then upon the main question; if decided in the negative to leave the main question and amendments, if any, under debate for the residue of the sitting, unless sooner disposed of by taking the question, or in some other manner. All incidental questions of order arising after a motion is made for the previous question, and pending such motion, shall be decided, whether on appeal or otherwise without debate.
- 34. After the Clerk has commenced calling the yeas and nays on any question, no motion shall be received until a decision has been announced by the Chair.

OF COMMITTEES.

- 35. The following Standing Committees shall be appointed at the commencement of the session, until otherwise ordered:
 - A Committee on Ways and Means;
 - A Committee on the Judiciary;
 - A Committee on Agriculture;
 - A Committee on Education;
 - A Committee on Elections;
 - A Committee on Engrossed Bills;
 - A Committee on Municipal Corporations;
 - A Committee on the Militia;
 - A Committee on Claims and Revolutionary Pensions;
 - A Committee on Corporations;
 - A Committee on Banks and Insurance;
 - A Committee on Unfinished Business;
 - A Committee on Incidental Expenses;
 - A Committee on Stationery;
 - A Committee on Riparian Rights;
 - A Committee on Miscellaneous Subjects;

Which several Committees shall consist of five members each.

JOINT COMMITTEES.

The following Joint Committees, of five members each, shall also be appointed to act conjointly with corresponding committees to be appointed by the Senate:

- A Committee on the Treasurer's Accounts;
- A Committee on the State Prison;
- A Committee on Public Printing;

- A Committee on the Library;
- A Committee on the Lunatic Asylum;
- A Committee on Public Grounds and Buildings;
- A Committee on Commerce and Navigation;
- A Committee on Passed Bills;
- A Committee on Federal Relations;
- A Committee on Sinking Fund;
- A Committee on Soldiers' Children's Home;
- A Committee on Soldiers' Home at Newark;
- A Committee on Reform School for Boys.
- 36. The several Standing Committees of the House shall have leave to report by bill or otherwise.
- 37. No Committee shall sit during the sitting of the House without special leave.
- 38. All Committees appointed at the first sitting shall continue to act during every subsequent sitting of the same Legislature, or until they have reported on the business committed to them, or have been discharged.

OF THE COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE HOUSE.

- 39. In forming a Committee of the Whole House, the Speaker shall leave his Chair, and a chairman to preside in Committee shall be appointed by the Speaker.
- 40. The rules of proceeding in the House shall be observed, as far as practicable in Committee of the Whole, except that any member may speak oftener than twice on the same subject, but shall not speak a second time until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken; nor shall a motion for for the previous question be made therein.
- 41. All amendments made in Committee of the Whole, shall be noted by the Clerk, but need not be read by the Speaker on his resuming the Chair, unless required by the House.

ON BILLS AND JOINT RESOLUTIONS.

- 42. All bills and joint Resolutions shall be introduced by motion for leave, or on the report of a Committee, and the member offering the same shall indorse his name on them, that the Committee may confer with him should they so desire.
- 43. Every bill and joint resolution shall receive three separate readings in the House previous to its passage, but no bill or joint resolution shall be read twice on the same day, without special order of the House.
- 44. All bills and joint resolutions, after the first reading, shall be referred to appropriate committees; and when reported, printed for the use of the members.
- 45. All bills and joint resolutions may be made the order of a particular day, on which they shall be taken up in preference to others on the calendar; and the calendar of private bills shall not be taken up until the calendar of public bills shall have been gone through with.
- 46. All bills and joint resolutions, previous to their final passage by the House, all petitions, motions and reports, may be committed at the pleasure of the House.
- 47. All bills and joint resolutions ordered to be engrossed, shall be executed in a fair round hand, and no amendment by way of rider shall be received to any bill or joint resolution on its third reading.
- 48. On a motion to strike out any item in the incidental bill, the question to be submitted to the House shall be "Shall the item be retained in the bill?" and a majority of all the members of the House shall be necessary to adopt the same.
- 49. After the introduction of any private bill, the applicants for said bill shall, at their own expense, furnish the usual number of copies for the use of the members, unless the printing thereof be dispensed with by a special order of the House.
- 50. On the question of the final passage of all bills and joint resolutions, the yeas and nays shall be entered on the journal of the House.

51. Whenever a bill or resolution that has passed the House shall be carried to the Senate, all papers and documents relating thereto, on the files of the House, shall be carried with such bill or resolution to the Senate.

OF RULES.

- 52. No standing rule or order of the House shall be rescinded or changed without one day's notice being given of the motion therefor; nor shall any rule be suspended except by a vote of the majority of the whole number of members of the House.
- 53. When an Assembly bill is returned amended by the Senate, the report thereof by the Secretary of the Senate shall be taken as the first reading, and the same be entitled to a second reading, without a motion for that purpose; after its second reading the question shall be: "Shall the Senate amendments to Assembly bill, No. —, have a third reading?" If ordered to a third reading, the amendments shall be read, but these readings shall be on different days: the question shall then be: "Will the House of Assembly concur in the Senate amendments to Assembly bill No. —?" upon which question the votes shall be by ayes and nays. If concurred in by a majority of the whole House, the bill shall be re-engrossed, the amendments embodied therein and the re-engrossed bill examined and reported upon by the Committee on Engrossed Bills, and read in open Assembly, to the end that it may be known to be correctly engrossed, and then signed and certified as other bills.
- 51. Cushing's Manual shall in all cases, when not in conflict with the rules adopted by the House, be considered and held as standard authority.
- 55. No person shall be allowed on the floor of the House during its sessions, except State officers and members and officers of the Senate, unless by written permission of the Speaker.

Mr. Scovel offered the following:

Resolved, That a committee of three be appointed by the Speaker to invite the clergy of the city of Trenton to open the sessions of the House with prayer.

Which was adopted.

Mr. Scovel offered the following:

Resolved, That until otherwise ordered the standing committees of the House of Assembly shall be the same as during the session of 1875.

Which was read and adopted.

Mr. Scovel offered the following:

Resolved, That the usual number of copies of the Manual of the Legislature be purchased by the Comptroller, for the use of members and officers of this House.

Mr. Dodd moved to lay the resolution on the table.

The yeas and nays were called, with the following result:

Mr. Egan offered the following:

Whereas, The constitution of New Jersey provides that there shall be no establishment of one religious sect over another, and forbids the appropriation of money for the use of any society, association or corporation, or the passage of private, local or special laws for the management and support of free public schools; and whereas, the constitution of the state also declares that the legislature shall provide for the maintenance and support of a thorough or efficient system of free public schools, and makes the moneys raised for that purpose a sacred fund to be devoted to no other object; and whereas, notwithstanding these constitutional provisions

an effort has been made to unnecessarily alarm the friends of our free and unsectarian school system by promulgating the idea that there is danger of legislation inimical to it; therefore,

- 1. Resolved, (Senate concurring) That this legislature take the earliest opportunity to re-affirm the doctrine of a total separation of church and state, to declare that a system of free unsectarian schools is the settled and unalterable policy of this State, and to repudiate all idea of legislation in any way impairing the thoroughness and efficiency of our free schools, or the use of the moneys raised for their support in any manner not warranted by the letter and spirit of our constitution.
- 2. Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be forwarded to the Senators and Representatives in congress from this State.

Which was read and laid upon the table.

Mr. Mathews offered the following:

Resolved, That the Committee on Printing, when appointed, be directed to advertise for proposals for the current printing of the House of Assembly, and that the same be awarded to the lowest responsible bidder.

Which was read and laid on the table.

The Speaker appointed Messrs. Youngblood, Herring and Dodd to wait on the Governor and inform him that the House is organized.

A message was received from the Senate at the hands of its Secretary, Mr. Voorhees, as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I am directed by the Senate to inform the House of Assembly that the Senate has organized by the election of Hon. Wm. J. Sewell as President, and N. W. Voorhees as Secretary, and has proceeded to business."

Mr. Dodd, on leave, introduced

Assembly Bill No. 1, entitled

A Further Supplement to the act entitled "An act constituting a public road for the laying out, constructing, appropriating, improving and maintaining public carriage roads in the county of Essex," approved March 31, 1869.

Which was ordered referred to the appropriate committee, when appointed.

Mr. Cross, on leave, introduced

Assembly Bill No. 2, entitled

An Act to confirm the title to land sold by Maria Antonia Beck, as attorney in fact for John Beck to Valentine Maskart.

Which was ordered referred to the appropriate committee, when appointed.

Mr. Howell, on leave, introduced

Assembly Bill No. 3, entitled

An act to repeal certain acts relative to the township of Belleville, in the county of Essex.

Which was ordered referred to the appropriate committee when appointed.

Mr. Lewis, on leave, introduced

Assembly Bill No. 4, entitled

An Act relative to taxes.

Which was read a first time by its title, ordered to have a second reading, and referred to the Committee on Judiciary, when appointed.

The Speaker appointed Messrs. E. H. Drake, Hutchinson and Brewer, as a Committee on Clergy.

Mr. Scovel introduced the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Clerk be directed to inform the Senate that the House has organized by electing Hon. John D. Carscallen as Speaker, and John Y. Foster as Clerk, and has proceeded to business.

Which was read and adopted.

A message was received from the Governor by the hands of his Secretary, John A. Hall, as follows:

Gentlemen of the Senate and General Assembly:

This session of the Legislature is of unusual importance in the history of the State. The amendments to the constitution, recently adopted, have imposed upon you peculiar duties and responsibilities. To give shape and efficacy to laws intended to carry out their true purposes, is no easy task, but one upon which you will, no doubt, enter fully conscious of its magnitude and with the best interests of the people in view. whole, the amendments will be of incalculable advantage; vet some will need judicial construction before their meaning is definitely settled. It is our duty, however, to ascertain, as far as we are able, what seems to be their proper scope, and to enforce them by appropriate legislation. As questions of difficulty arise, the courts alone must be depended upon for As questions of final determination. When material and radical constitutional changes, such as these, are made it necessarily requires time to understand, with entire accuracy, the full force of the language used, and therefore the work of this session may be, in some respects, incomplete; but it is desirable that a system of laws, as complete as possible, in accordance with the amendments, should now be adopted. If, by a hearty, co-operation in all suitable measures, we can secure to the people the substantial fruits of the amendments, we will be doing a great public service. It is my purpose to call attention to some of their chief provisions, and more particularly to those upon which legislation is necessary.

RIGHT OF SUFFRAGE.

Section 1 of Article 2 is amended so that in time of war electors in the actual military service of the State, or of the United States, in the army or navy thereof, shall not be deprived of their votes by reason of absence from their election districts, and the Legislature is empowered to provide for the manner, time and place of taking such votes, and for the return and canvass thereof in the districts in which the electors reside. A law to this effect will be necessary.

Section 2 of the same article having been amended so as to read as follows: "The Legislature may pass laws to deprive persons of the right of suffrage who shall be convicted of bribery,"—while before it only applied to bribery at elections—I earnestly recommend the passage of a law depriving every person convicted of bribery of any kind, of the right of suffrage, unless pardoned, and that to be in addition to other penalties prescribed. These are times when sharp punishments are needed for all crimes in public office or affecting the purity of the ballot box. The less respectable and more ignominious such crimes can be made, the more protection there is against their commission.

· NOTICE OF BILLS.

In Article 4, Section 7, is inserted a new paragraph, that "No private special or local bill shall be passed unless public notice of the intention to apply therefor, and of the general object thereof, shall have been previously given. The Legislature, at the next session after the adoption thereof, and from time to time thereafter, shall prescribe the time and mode of giving such notice, the evidence thereof, and how such evidence shall be preserved." By referring to the amendment of Paragraph 4, in Section 7, it will be seen that "No general law shall embrace any provision of a private, special or local character." The evident object is to separate the two classes of laws, thereby preventingsurreptitious legislation, and, then, to secure to all persons interested fair notice of any bill not general. Heretofore the requirement of notice was only statutory, and that limited to a small class of special bills; but the language of this amendment is so strong that it prevents the passage of any private, special or local bill without previous notice. Whatever bills are within the scope of the existing statute concerning notices, if noticed according to its terms, could, in my judgment, be passed, and if applications have been voluntarily noticed, and the time and manner of notice are in conformity to such rule as the Legislature may adopt, applicable to such cases, although retrospective, yet I think the notice would be in substantial compliance with the amendments, and justify legislative action. For the future, a rule should be prescribed, so that the public may know precisely how to comply. It is important, also, that a mode of perpetuating the evidence of notice, as a record, should be provided.

GENERAL AND SPECIAL LAWS.

Private and Municipal Corporations.—It is now the settled policy of the State that legislation shall be by general laws in all cases practicable. This is the clear meaning of the new Paragraph 11, in Section 7 of Article 4. Special legislation has heretofore been a grievous evil. It has entailed upon the State a large expense, disturbed the harmony of laws and encouraged corruption. Last winter relief was, to some extent, obtained, but now, by the organic law, a uniform system is secured upon many of the most important subjects of legislation. This Paragraph 11 is an absolute prohibition against the passage of private, local, or special laws in certain enumerated cases, and among them are these: "Regulating the

internal affairs of towns and counties; appointing local offices or commissions to regulate municipal affairs;" also, "granting to any corporation, association or individual any exclusive privilege, immunity or franchise whatever;" also, "granting to any corporation, association or individual the right to lay down railroad tracks;" and also "providing for the management and support of free public schools." In addition to this prohibition, it is enjoined upon the Legislature to pass general laws providing for the cases enumerated in this paragraph, and for all other cases which, in its judgment, may be provided for by general laws. In the latter part of the paragraph it is also provided that "the Legislature shall pass no special act conferring corporate powers; but they shall general laws under which corporations may be organized and corporate powers of every nature obtained, subject, nevertheless, to repeal or alteration at the will of the Legislature." One marked feature of this paragraph is, that it cuts off all right to grant exclusive corporate privileges, and prevents the Legislature from conferring, by special law, any corporate powers. This is a very sweeping change. sive privileges should never be granted. They are unfair, and contrary to a sound State policy, and the policy is equally strong, that no corporate powers should be granted by special law when practicable to provide for them by general laws; but the wisdom of an entire restriction, except by general laws, is not free from doubt, and can only be determined by its practical results.

In common with the large majority in favor of this amendment, I am satisfied that it was best to adopt it and try it, for gross abuses need radical remedies. The corporate powers referred to in the last clause of the paragraph are not municipal. Municipal corporations are public. They have reference to, and are a part of, the system of government, and are not generally understood as coming within the ordinary designation of corporations; although they are corporations, yet of a distinctive kind—that is, municipal. A critical examination of other parts of the amendments will show that this distinction has been recognized. Besides, the fitness of language in the clause in question makes it applicable, by natural construction, only to corporations of a private nature.

There are several other considerations upon this amendment proper to be referred to. It will be seen that none of its provisions are retrospective. They do not repeal existing laws

upon the same subject matters. Constitutions, like statutes, must be construed prospectively and retrospectively, unless the intention otherwise is clear. But the duty of the Legislature cannot be discharged by leaving upon the statute book special laws affecting the public that are inimical to the true spirit of the amendments, where it is practicable and lawful to repeal them, and supply their places by laws conformable thereto. A failure in this defeats, to the extent thereof, the great purpose of the amendments.

Another consideration is, that constitutions of sovereign States are limitations upon legislative power, and that the inherent power of the Legislature is not abridged unless the same clearly appears. This principle is indispensable in the construction of constitutional language. There is serious dfficulty in determining the exact scope of this paragraph, and particularly in reference to municipal affairs. Take the third clause of subjects concerning which no local or special laws can be passed. The commencement of the amendment is: "The Legislature shall not pass private, local or special laws in any of the following enumerated cases, that is to say:" then follow the various cases, and among them the third: "Regulating the internal affairs of towns and counties; appointing local offices or commissions to regulate municipal affairs." Now take. in the same connection, the subsequent member of the paragraph, that "The Legislature shall pass general laws providing for the cases enumerated in this paragraph, and for all other cases which, in its judgment, may be provided for by general laws," and the question arises whether thereby the Legislature is prohibited from providing for the regulation of municipal affairs by local or special law in any other cases than "appointing local offices or commissions?" If not, then the amendment makes no change in the power to govern cities as heretofore, by local charters, except only as to local offices and commissions. In order to hold that legislation for cities must hereafter be by general laws only, the requirement to pass general laws for the cases enumerated in the preceding part of the amendment, if construed to be imperative and not subject to the judgment of the Legislature, must have relation to the regulation of municipal affairs as the substantive object intended in the clause, "appointing local offices or commissions to regulate municipal affairs."

After a careful examination, and in the light of the rule that powers of the Legislature not clearly taken away exist,

I am led to the conclusion that as to cities and all other muinicipalities, except towns and counties, the Legislature may yet pass local and special laws, save only for "appointing local offices or commissions," and wherever on particular subjects enumerated in the amendments it is prevented. "cities" is not in the sentence "regulating the internal affairs of towns and counties," and the object of the other sentence is to prohibit the regulation of all municipal affairs by any local or special law which provides for the appointment of local offices or commissions by the Legislature. The leading idea of the amendment, apart from the entire prohibition to grant corporate powers by special law, to my mind is this: That, in the cases enumerated, the Legislature cannot pass a local or special law, but outside of those as specified, the powers remain, to be exercised, however, by general laws, whenever in its judgment it can be. Although this leaves a vast field open for local legislation, yet no one can read this amendment without being satisfied of the obligation to adopt uniform laws whenever practicable, and in no case is it more important than in the government of cities. There is no good reason why all cities should not, in the main, be regulated by the same laws. Peculiar circumstances may sometimes require special acts, and it was no doubt wise not to restrict the Legislature in this respect; but there can be no difficulty in devising and applying an effective system of government for all cities, and the time has come when the interests of the public demand it. The facility with which designing men have obtained special laws to enable them to prosecute various schemes of extravagance and fraud, under the guise of public improvement and benefit, has been the source of much of our municipal burthens. Now is the opportunity, although late, to strike a blow for the protection of property in municipalities, by sweeping away devices in the forms of law under which these abuses have been perpetrated, and substituting plain, just and general laws alike applicable to all cities. When taxes in some of them range from two and a-half to three cents on the dollar, outside of assessments for improvements, it is expected that the thoughtful legislator will pause and consider how to correct it.

The power to make local improvement ought to be most scrupulously guarded, for in that lurks the greatest danger to private property. None of the ordinary street improvements should be made without the consent of the owners of at least three-fourths of the land along the line, and those who make

the assessments for damages and benefits should be appointed by the Circuit or Common Pleas Courts. The power which determines these assessments is judicial in its nature, and there is an appropriateness, as well as safety, in leaving the selection of those who shall exercise it to the courts.

Inasmuch as private corporations can hereafter be organized only under general acts, such acts now in force will have to be thoroughly examined and adapted to the wants of the public; and wherein they fail to furnish all necessary corporate privileges other general laws should be passed. The corporation act of last session was carefully considered, and may not require much, if any change. That fully authorizes the formation of corporate companies for any lawful business or purpose except railroad, turnpike or any other companies which shall need to possess the right of taking and condemning lands; also, except insurance and banking companies, savings banks and other corporations intended to derive profit from the loan or use of money. These latter interests must, for the future, in new organizations, depend alone upon laws common to each, and wherein the present laws are insufficient, others should be supplied.

This amendment is fertile in questions which the Legislature will be obliged to settle, in order to appropriately legislate. I will refer only to one more of its provisions. cal or special law can be passed "Providing for the management and support of free public schools." By the amendment to Paragraph 6 of Section 7, Article 4, "the Legislature shall provide for the maintenance and support of a thorough and efficient system of free public schools for the instruction of all the children in this State between the ages of five and This is a most important constitutional eighteen years." guaranty of free schools, but how is it, in connection with the clause in paragraph eleven, to be carried out? The question is not free from difficulty, but my own judgment is, that the words "thorough and efficient system" do not necessarily require free schools to be maintained exclusively through the State Treasury, by State tax alone. The duty is upon the Legislature to provide such a system, but it may be in whole by State taxation, or in part by that means, and the rest by local taxation, and, so far as by the latter, the same must be authorized only by general laws. There must necessarily be local taxation for the erection and repair of school houses, and there is such a difference in the cost of supporting the schools through-

out the State, depending upon the tastes, habits and demands of the various localities, that no equal distribution of a State fund would afford free schools to all. To illustrate: A little over one-half of the schools of the State are now exclusively supported and kept open out of their share of the State funds, while the remainder are sustained by additional moneys raised by the local authorities. To reach this difficulty, there should be a system comprehending local taxation, as well as State, when necessary to secure free schools. Local taxation, by general law, is very different from local or special law author-The existing school law may not need much alteraizing it. tion to make it conformable to the amendments. The various local school acts now in force ought not to be hastily disturbed before a thorough system is devised, entirely practical in its operations, in the different localities. These observations are subject to what hereinafter follows in reference to the amendment on taxation, and as the same may be thereby qualified.

TAXATION.

The tax amendment is as follows:—"Property shall be assessed for taxes under general laws and by uniform rules according to its true value." Taxation is one of the most essential and absolute prerogatives of the State, and this amendment cannot be extended by any liberal construction. one of the inherent qualities of the power, that the Legislature shall select the objects of taxation, and this amendment does not cripple it in that respect. The point of the paragraph is not, that *all* property shall be taxed. It has reference only to the mode of imposing the burthen. It still remains for the Legislature to designate what classes of property shall be assessed; but, whatever is assessed shall be assessed in the manner provided by the amendment. The power to exempt necessarily follows from the power to select, and the Legislature may exempt as heretofore, but all exemptions must be general, as to the same objects or subjects. No special or local law can be passed exempting any particular property. All local and special laws are abrogated by force of the amendment, so far as they are not protected by contracts, or provisions in the nature of contracts with the State, affecting vested rights.

The amendment is imperative as to how property shall be assessed for the future, and it necessarily renders nugatory any

law antagonistic to it, saving, of course, assessments already made. In the absence of any further legislation, the present general tax law would furnish the rule of assessments throughout the State, and all exemptions would be according to that. Those exemptions are now numerous, and it will be for the Legislature to determine whether they shall be restricted. Alike, with other local laws, the act known as the "Five County Act," which exempts from taxation mortgages on lands, in localities therein named, in the hands of inhabitants, corporations or associations of such localities, are, in my judgment, repealed. The business interests of those localities have become adapted to that system of taxation, and how best to meet the exigency, is a question of sound practical judgment, upon which the public mind is greatly divided and which will require—as it will undoubtedly receive—most careful consideration. The agencies by which the assessment is made and the tax collected are undisturbed by this amendment. Uniformity in that respect is not required. Rates will also vary, as they must inevitably, as to county, city and township taxes, and the amendment does not affect that. As a mere question of power, apart from the policy, property could be assessed in clasess and at different rates, subject of course, to this—that each class or kind must be assessed by general law and unform rule in relation to each. The amendment is not that one uniform rule shall apply to all the objects of taxation in common. It recognizes the principle that there may be different rules, but each rule must be uniform. It seems to me that this is merely declaratory, by constitutional provision, of what is a fundamental principle in taxation. The points gained and secured by the amendment are these: First, that taxes shall be assessed by general laws, as distinguished from those in relation to a particular locality or object; and secondly, that in all assessments on the mere basis of value, that it shall be the true value, the provision as to the uniformity of rules being, as stated, only declaratory of an existing principle. What is a general law admits of discussion. State, county, city and township taxes are necessarily distinct. Laws applying to each kind of taxes separately, would, in my judgment, be general laws, provided they made no exception in favor of any locality of the same character—that is, county taxes could be assessed throughout the State alike in all counties, and so as to cities and townships respectively, but no exception could be made in favor of any county, city or township; and so could, if thought wise, some classes of property—as mortgages—be

made liable for State and county, or either, and not for other taxes. These are principles inherent in the power of taxation, and are not interfered with by the requirement of general laws. This remark is equally applicable to the subjects or objects of taxation. The prerogative of taxation cannot be limited in all its lawful modes of exercise, except by clear constitutional provision.

It is hardly necessary to say that this amendment does not apply to assessments for local improvements. Although within the taxing power, they are not taxes in the sense of the amendment. Neither does the requirement that property shall be assessed at its true value interdict all other species of taxation. A poll tax can yet be assessed, and the Legislature can yet compel railroad corporations, whose property is involved in the franchises, to pay annual or other sums according to a convenient standard, whether it be capital stock, the cost of the road, equipment and appendages, or otherwise. The difficulty intended to be reached by the words true value was the notorious fact that property in this State has universally been assessed on reduced values, the standard depending upon the caprice of those who make the estimates in particular localities, so that in adjusting State, county and other taxes there was no fixed basis. Now, the estimate must be according to the true value. Such is the substantial requirement of our general tax law, but it has always been disregarded.

What I have said under this head has been mostly in relation to the powers of taxation, and not as to the policy to be adopted. The immediate representatives of the people in the Legislature can judge what is best to harmonize the various interests of the State. An equal distribution of the burthen, as far as possible, should be the leading idea of any just system. The abrogation of the "Five County Act" makes the most trouble. Where that prevails, large amounts have been loaned on real estate mortgages, and there, taxes, by reason of the cities, are the highest. Investments are naturally made where exemptions are allowed. Now it is feared that, if mortgages are to be assessed according to the high rates in some cities, they will be forclosed, real estate sacrificed, and money seek investments elsewhere. This is a question mutually affecting the borrower and lender, and is difficult of solution. Saving banks are particularly interested in it. It may be that a middle line can be taken to reach the difficulty. There is a strong equity in assessing all mortgages, yet the various means of investment outside the State, by which taxation is escaped,

often prevent the borrower from obtaining money at his greatest need. A law should be so framed as to afford him opportunities of procuring money, and at the same time compel the mortgage holder to meet as much of his just burthen as possible. Capital should be kept in the State, yet we know that it will be taken out if it is to the interest of the owner. It may be, that if real estate mortgages are assessed for their proportionate part of State and county taxes, and exempted from other municipal taxes, and the mortgagor is allowed to claim a deduction to that extent, it will solve the problem. The details of such a plan could be readily worked out, both as to an adjustment of the ratables and rates, and I suggest it for consideration. increase of values ought to reduce the rates of municipal taxes, and this plan would impose upon mortgages a fair proportion of the whole. It is very evident that there is a serious difference, arising from local causes, in the demands of the people of the State on the principles of taxation. In the country, where the taxes are lighter, the subjection of mortgages to all taxation may not seriously compel the diversion of capital from the State. In cities and elsewhere where assessments are very high, that result would follow. There ought to be an adjustment of the different local interests on the principle or policy of what is best under the circumstances, and I strongly incline to the opinion that the plan suggested is, for the present, advisable. Whatever is done should be done promptly, in order that the public may early understand the law, and their interests be adjusted accordingly.

COMMON PLEAS JUDGES AND SHERIFFS.

None of the changes in the appointment of certain officers need be referred to, except that in reference to Common Pleas judges. The amendment providing for the nomination and appointment of these officers by the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Senate, necessarily supersedes the former provision for the appointment by joint meeting, although not in terms stricken out. There is a perfect antagonism between the two, and the amendment, being later, must have effect.

Sheriffs being elected for three years, are obliged to renew their bonds annually. A law compelling that is necessary.

NO DONATIONS.

Before closing this review of the amendment, I call attention to the paragraph against the donation or appropriation of

land or money by the State, or any municipal corporation, to or for the use of any society, association or corporation whatever. It requires no legislation to enforce it. It is intended to confine the expenditures of the State to the legitimate, exclusive purposes of government, and through regular official channels, and not have the people's money absorbed by societies, associations or private corporations, of whatever kind they may be, for mixed or other objects than the clear public good in its civil aspects, although oftentimes incidentally connected with it. The true policy of the State is always to expend public funds through its own official agencies, and for definite civil objects only.

WAR DEBT AND SINKING FUND.

The war debt of the State, at the end of the fiscal year, was two millions four hundred and ninety-six thousand three hundred dollars (\$2,496,300.) The amount of assets in the Sinking Fund towards its liquidation was then one million three hundred and sixty thousand four hundred and sixty-six dollars and seventy-two cents (\$1,360,466.72.) On the first day of January, instant, the debt was reduced by the payment of one hundred thousand dollars out of the State Fund, leaving a balance of two millions three hundred and ninety-six thousand three hundred dollars (\$2,396,300.) By deducting amount of the Sinking Fund, the debt would be one million thirty-five thousand eight hundred and thirty-three dollars and twenty-eight cents over assets devoted to its payment. bonds will not all mature until 1902. One hundred thousand dollars are paid each year from the taxes, together with such an amount for interest as will make up the deficiency of interest, from the Sinking Fund, and with these sums the matured bonds and the interest on the debt are paid. The bonds become due at the rate of one hundred thousand dollars a year, until 1891, when the amount varies each year from less to more, not exceeding two hundred thousand dollars any one year. In ten years the debt and the fund will be about equal, and, with safe management, the fund will pay the debt as it matures, and interest. This is an admirable system, giving great confidence to the bondholders and affording any easy means of payment. 1,443 1 . 1. 11 1 102

There is no State debt except the war debt.

Investments.

STATE FUND SECURITIES.

These, apart from the county surplus revenue bonds and the Centennial stock, consist of the separate stock of the Camden and Amboy Railroad Company and the joint stock of the Delaware and Raritan Canal and Camden and Amboy Railroad Companies, amounting to two hundred and eighty-eight thousand seven hundred dollars, at par value; also, bonds of the Joint Companies for twenty-four thousand dollars, and a bond of the Jersey City and Bergen Railroad Company for ten thousand dollars. The steady market value of these securities is over four hundred thousand dollars, and it should be the policy of the State to retain them, or others of equal amount, as it is convenient to use them as pledges for temporary loans when necessary.

SCHOOL FUND.

The School Fund, set apart and protected, under the constitution, for the support of free schools, consisted, November 1st, 1875, of the following:

Other rentals of lands under water, \$5,095 annually.

This fund is increasing rapidly, and chiefly from sales and rentals of lands under water.

AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE FUND.

The amount of the Agricultural College Fund is one hundred and sixteen thousand dollars (\$116,000), all invested in the war bonds of this State, and the interest of which is paid

to the Trustees of Rutgers College, towards the support of the Scientific School. The trustees have, in connection with this school, an experimental farm, from which great advantage is derived, not only to the students, but to the thoughtful engaged in agricultural pursuits throughout the State. The State is entitled to the education of forty students, free of charge as to tuition, in this school, the number being apportioned to the counties in proportion to the number of representatives in the Legislature, and to be received on certificates of appointment by the County Superintendents. Only twelve counties are now represented in the school.

The importance of a mechanical and agricultural education ought to induce the filling up of every scholarship by the counties entitled. One of the great errors of the times has been the disposition of young men to be diverted from those employments in which substantial labor is necessary to a livelihood, and to seek success by venture and fancied wit. No community can have a stable prosperity in which labor is not relied upon for support. Every means tending to elevate it and give it intelligent direction cannot but conduce to solid

growth.

RECEIPTS AND DISBURSEMENTS.

The receipts of the year from all sources outside of the Sinking Fund have been three millions four hundred and fourteen thousand five hundred and forty-three dollars and ninety-three cents (\$3,414,543.93), and the disbursements three millions three hundred and seventy-eight thousand six hundred and thirty-five dollars and sixty-nine cents (\$3,378,-635.69). The balance in bank at the close of the fiscal year to the credit of all the funds, excepting the Sinking Fund, was three hundred and eight thousand seven hundred and sixtynine dollars and five cents (\$308,769.05). Of this amount the sum of two hundred and eight thousand five hundred and eighty-five dollars and seventy-seven cents (\$208,585.77) belonged to the School Fund. Of the amount disbursed, one million two hundred and twenty-five thousand five hundred and ninety-two dollars and twenty-one cents (\$1,225,592.21) were the proceeds of the two mill tax on the dollar levied and collected for the support of free schools; also, as a part of the disbursements, there was paid the annual appropriation for the same purpose of one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000); and, in addition to that there was loaned, for the benefit of the School Fund, as permanent investments, two hundred and

forty thousand five hundred dollars (\$240,500). These amounts taken from the total of disbursements leave a balance of one million eight hundred and twelve thousand five hundred and forty-three dollars and forty-eight cents (\$1,812,543.48), for the other disbursements. It will thus be seen that the sum of one million three hundred and twenty-five thousand five hundred and ninety-two dollars and twenty-one cents (\$1,325,592.21), has been paid during the year from the Treasury for free schools, besides two hundred and forty thousand five hundred dollars (\$240,500) towards School Fund investments, and these amounts, not including various expenditures in behalf of State educational institutions, the Board of Education, and kindred educational purposes, which help make up the balance as stated. In this balance are the following items:

Deducting these special amounts; there remain eight hundred and two thousand seven hundred and twenty dollars and one cent (\$802,720.01) as the total of all the other State expenditures, the chief objects of which may be summarized as follows: Lunatic Asylum at Trenton, Home for Disabled Soldiers, Soldiers' Children's Home, Industrial School, Reform School, State Prison—costs of conviction and transportation, Normal School, support and education of Deaf and Dumb, and Feeble Minded, Pensions and Bounty, County and Lunatic Asylums, Militia and Military and Arsenal, Legislature, Judiciary, Executive, Board of Education, Geological, Riparian, Agricultural and other boards and commissions, including Sinking and School Funds, Printing and Stationery, &c., Library, Law and Equity Reports, Revisions of Statutes, Census, Repairs and Expenses of Public Buildings and Grounds, Insurance, annual and

special minor appropriations, Salaries and Fees and other current and incidental expenses in conducting the government too minute to classify; the particulars of all which expenditures appear in the Treasurer's report, to which your attention is specially called.

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This loan is at five per cent., and was obtained under the tax act of 1875 by pledge of State securities, in anticipation of the receipt of taxes, and used on account of the appropriation to the Morristown Asylum. It will be paid the first of February ensuing.

The Comptroller's estimates for the year on the debit side amount to one million seven hundred and twenty-two thousand dollars (\$1,722,000), besides the school tax. These embrace the approximate liabilities for the fiscal year ending October 31, 1876, and those necessary to be met the first of January and July, 1877, on the war debt from the taxes of 1876. They include \$300,000, the unpaid balance of the appropriation of \$900,000 for the Morristown Asylum, and also \$255,000 due and to grow due from the State Fund to the School Fund. The estimate of probable revenue is about one million six hundred thousand dollars. This includes the tax of one and one-half mills, which, on the basis of the ratables of 1875, will amount to \$919,096.64, while the balance is to

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be derived from the usual sources of revenue. In my judgment, the estimate of \$1,600,000 is fully large, but, taking the Comptroller's estimates, which are carefully prepared, the expenditures exceed the income by \$122,000. With this exhibit, the Treasury can be kept during the present year, for, the estimates being precautionary are liberal, and some of the amounts will not be required until January and July, 1877, when the taxes of 1876 are received. Besides, in case of necessity, a temporary loan on State securities could be obtained. In no event should the taxes be increased.

Last August a fraud was discovered in the Treasury Department, committed by the Treasurer then in office. It consisted of the collection by him from the United New Jersey Railroad and Canal Companies, through the Pennsylvania Railroad Company on account of the revenues of the State, eighty-seven thousand three hundred and eighty-two dollars and eighty-six cents, which he failed to credit to the State or report to the Comptroller, as was his duty; but it was found that twenty-eight thousand three hundred and twenty-one dollars and twenty-two cents stood to his credit, as Treasurer, in a bank in Mount Holly. With that deducted, the deficiency was fifty-nine thousand and sixty-one dollars and sixty cents. It was also ascertained that there were other moneys in the same bank subject to his control, but not to his credit individually or as Treasurer. He afterwards gave to the Attorney-General a check or draft on that bank, for fourteen thousand nine hundred and forty-four dollars and ninety-two cents, which was passed by the bank to the credit of the State. This amount reduced the deficiency to forty-four thousand one hundred and sixteen dollars and sixty-eight cents (\$44,116.68), which is still unpaid. For that a suit is now pending against the late Treasurer and his bondsmen. He was arrested, and is now awaiting his trial on indictment.

On receiving information of this defalcation, the President of the Senate, the Speaker of the House of Assembly, the Secretary of State, the Attorney General and the Comptroller were requested to make an examination of the facts and report accordingly. Their report is presented herewith, for such action as the Legislature may think wise.

THE NEW INSANE ASYLUM.

The new asylum for the insane is now the heaviest burden upon the Treasury. The State owns a farm near Morristown,

of about four hundred acres, upon which is erected one of the finest and most substantial structures of the kind in the world. Its location is delightful and healthy, and the work has been well and faithfully done by the commissioners, consistently with the scope of such a design, and without compensation. There have already been expended by the State one million seven hundred thousand dollars. The plans were adopted under the law of 1871, and successive Legislatures have made appropriations toward the erection of the buildings. last session nine hundred thousand dollars were appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated at any time during the session, or necessary for the current expenses of the State, and in case of a deficiency in the Treasury, the appropriation to be qualified acordingly. sum six hundred thousand dollars were paid, the payment of the remainder having been deferred until after the receipt of taxes of 1875. With that, the site, and all structures, including a railroad of about two miles, will have cost two millions of dollars. The commissioners, in their report, to which I call special attention, state that three hundred thousand dollars more will complete the buildings and furnish them for patients, grade the grounds, erect fences, and maintain the institution for three months after it is opened. It was specially requested by me of the commissioners that an estimate be furnished of the entire cost of the completion, and the result is in the report. The speedy completion of this asylum is necessary, as the other is overcrowded, and inadequate accommodations exist in the counties. Whatever views may be entertained as to the magnitude of this work (and the wisdom of it is open to controversy), it is too late and unwise now to delay or cease its prosecution. If for the immediate present, the structure be too large, its full capacity will, in a very few years, be required for our own insane. In the meantime, it is expected that paying patients from other States may be obtained, by reason of the superiority of the location and accommodations. I recommend the additional appropriation. necessary, but subject to the same qualifications as the last, so that there may be no embarrassment to the Treasury. The object of that is to do the best that the condition of the finances will permit.

DEAF AND DUMB, ETC.

The cost for the deaf and dumb, the blind and feeble-minded, for the year, has been as follows:—Deaf and dumb,

\$25,179.22; the blind, \$13,643.89; and the feeble-minded, \$8,925.41—the total being \$47,748.52. In addition \$1,356.88 were disbursed for expenses of a commission previously appointed under an act looking to the education of these classes in this State. These unfortunates are now supported and educated in institutions in other States, and have been wellprovided for. The deaf and dumb have been sent chiefly to the New York Institution for the Deaf and Dumb in New York City, and the Pennsylvania Institution in Philadelphia. The former institution is now full, and for the present the State has been obliged to discontinue sending pupils there. The accommodation in Philadelphia is at present adequate for all new pupils, and even others from New York, should any change be necessary; but soon arrangements will have to be made for all our deaf and dumb in this State. Correspondence is pending with the managers in New York, and during the session the result will be communicated to the Legislature, so that the exigency, whatever it may be, can be met.

Should early provision have to be made in this State, I recommend that the building of the Soldiers' Children's Home—which will be abandoned for that purpose in the Spring—be fitted up for the deaf and dumb. From an examination recently requested and made, I am satisfied that it could easily be adapted to that use, and afford all convenient and suitable accommodation.

The commissioners recommended a site for this object near the city of New Brunswick, and the construction upon it of an institution. The Legislature, at its last session, failed to pass a bill for this purpose, but another was passed, at the solicitation of many of the citizens of that city, to tax the people there for the payment of a site, at a cost of over thirty thousand dollars, and then to present it to the State. It was not signed, for two reasons: one, that the bill to erect the building was defeated, and the other that, to my mind, it was illegal to tax any municipality to pay for property for the State at large. Besides, the policy of inducing the State to adopt any particular locality, by presentation from any municipal authority, effected through taxation, when the unwilling are obliged to pay alike with those who prefer to submit to it, is unsound, and derogatory to the true duty of the government in the equal protection of its people. The site selected is beautiful and desirable, and if the State were willing to embark in a new enterprise, none better could perhaps be found

for the object in view. Unless other than existing sources of revenue are sought, I do not see how it is possible now to undertake the construction of a new building. The State must discharge its duty to these afflicted children, but at present it ought to be done in a different way, and can be, at greatly less expense. The blind and feeble-minded are well cared for in neighboring schools, and the accommodation is ample for them. The ultimate design of the State should be to possess institutions of its own for all these classes, but the demands this year for other objects require that we abstain from being overburdened. Very little more than the amount now paid yearly for the deaf and dumb, ought to be required to place the Children's Home in a suitable condition, and maintain it for a year, for the whole of these children. They number about eighty.

PENSIONS.

By an act of March 12, 1874, it was provided that one hundred dollars per annum be paid all soldiers and sailors of this State who served in the war of 1812, and the widows of any such soldiers and sailors, in equal semi-annual payments, during their lifetime, but that it shall not apply to any persons who then were, or thereafter might be, in receipt of pensions under any special law of this State, or of any pensions from the United States for similar service, during the continuance of payment of such pension. The payments under this act during the year have amounted to \$40,757.52, some of them being for arrears between the date of the act and October 31, 1874. Three things are noticeable in this act: First, that it embraces soldiers and sailors whether they enlisted in the militia of the State or the regular service of the United States, and without reference to whether the service was for a few days or longer, or how discharged, or whatever their pecuniary circumstances may be; secondly, that it includes the widows of such, whether married before the treaty of peace or afterwards; and thirdly, that it does not apply to those who receive a pension under a special law of this State or from the United States. By the act of Congress, those of the militia and volunteers of the military and naval service of the United States who served sixty days in that war, and were honorably discharged, are entitled to a pension of eight dollars per month during their lives, from February 14, 1871. widows, also, are allowed the same amount their husbands would have been entitled to receive if living February 14, 1871, and if married prior to the treaty of peace, which was February, 1815.

The lists in the Adjutant-General's office show that twentysix soldiers and sailors are receiving pensions under our act, and two hundred and fifty-six widows. None of the twentysix served sixty days, their terms ranging from seventeen to fifty-eight. They were not out of the State, so far as can be gathered from the records or history, and, although ready for the defence of its coast, had no occasion for conflict. None of these, by reason of the short time on duty, received a United States pension. Of the widows three were married prior to the war, and nineteen during its continuance. Their husbands did not serve sixty days. All the rest of the widows were mar-ried after the treaty of peace, and may be scheduled as follows: Seventy between the treaty of peace and 1820; fiftyseven from 1820—1830; forty-eight from 1830—1840; thirtysix from 1840—1850; seventeen from 1850—1860, and six from 1860—1870. All these widows are not entitled to United States pensions, because their husbands died before February 14, 1871, or because they were married after the treaty of The husbands of twelve were in the United States army from two to five years, but they were married after the treaty of peace. The service of the husbands of the others may be stated as follows: Eight less than twenty days; sixtytwo from 20-30; twenty-two from 30-40; thirteen from 40—50; twenty-seven from 50—60; twenty-one from 60— 70; forty-five 70-80; thirty-six from 80-90; twenty-three from 90—100; ten from 100—110; and three from 110—125 These data are furnished by the Adjutant-General, and may be relied on.

I have felt it my duty to call the attention of the Legislature to this large expenditure, and the facts upon which it is justified. No government, State or National, should fail to recognize and liberally compensate its defenders; but is there not danger, under the general plea of such duty, that improper burthens may occasionally be imposed upon the people? This law should be repealed, or greatly abridged. If the act of Congress is deemed not sufficiently broad to meet all proper cases, I submit to the Legislature whether our act should not be modified so as to apply to soldiers and sailors who are not entitled to a pension from the United States, whatever the time of service may have been, and to widows only who were married prior to the treaty of peace, and whose husbands were

not so entitled. If this act is not repealed or altered, it will require, from a calculation based somewhat on the tables of mortality and the number and ages of those who have applied and yet to apply, about one hundred and sixty to seventy thousand dollars, at least, to satisfy its demands, besides what has already been paid.

I commend to your attention the suggestions of the Comptroller on this subject, and the facts in his and the Adjutant-General's Reports.

PRINTING.

The last year's expenditure for printing was seventy-eight thousand two hundred and five dollars and twenty-nine cents (\$78,205.29). For the year previous the amount was one hundred and thirteen thousand eight hundred and ninety-three dollars and thirty-four cents, (\$113.893.34), showing a large reduction. This was owing, chiefly, to the repeal of acts, last winter, authorizing the publication of laws in newspapers. The total paid for that purpose alone, in the year ending October 31, 1874, was \$67,333.80. The reduction would have been greater had it not been for the publication of the Constitutional Amendments and the accompanying printing of tickets, blanks, &c., the payments for which amounted to \$25,472.90 (the most of the bills for the year preceding the last having been paid within the last year.)

The Comptroller estimates fifty thousand dollars as sufficient

The Comptroller estimates fifty thousand dollars as sufficient for the current year. This, of course, assumes that the present status of the law will continue. Whatever may be the ultimate policy of the Legislature on this subject, I earnestly urge that no change be made this session, for the State cannot now afford it. If a printer of the laws is early designated, he could commence and continue his work during the session, and be able to furnish the pamphlets very soon after its close, which would be sufficient for all practical purposes.

STATE PRISON.

The total income from the State Prison last year was eightyone thousand five hundred and ninety-six dollars and thirty cents (\$81,596.30). Of this, \$10,000 were received on the forfeiture of a contract for labor, \$1,548.15 from a few incidental sources, and the balance (\$70,048.15) from labor of convicts. The cost of subsistence for the prisoners, and of fuel, light, clothing, and all other expenses except repairs and improvements, salaries, and some extra services, amounted to \$57,-941.69. This sum was paid out of the earnings. Deducting that, there remained \$23,654.61 as the net profits. Out of this, seventeen thousand dollars about, were paid for repairs and improvements. This sum is yet to be reimbursed from the Treasury to the Supervisor. With that amount, and certain available assets which he has from operations of preceding years, making in the whole amount \$42,000 together with the annual appropriation of \$10,000, and what will be received from labor, the Supervisor thinks no special appropriation will be necessary for the current year.

Few only of the prisoners have been employed since May 15th last, on account of the abandonment of a contract which certain shoe manufacturers had with the State for most of the labor of the prison, and which could be relinquished by its terms, on three months' notice in writing, and paying to the State ten thousand dollars. Owing, no doubt, to the depression of the times, those gentlemen availed themselves of that privilege. Since then, a contract has been executed with other parties for one year, at a moderate price, for the employment of about one hundred and fifty men, and negotiations are now pending with others for the labor of more, with what result is yet to be known.

But the foregoing statement does not exhibit the actual cost of the prison to the State for the last year. By reference to the treasurer's accounts it will be found that there were paid out of the Treasury \$66,215.40, as follows:

From the first item may be deducted \$175 paid on Inspectors' salaries, belonging to the preceding year, then \$66,035.40 will remain as the expense from the Treasury paid during the last fiscal year. The net amount in hands of the Supervisor is \$6,654.61 (allowing \$17,000 for repairs and improvements), and that taken from \$66,215.40, leaves \$59,560.79 as the cost to the State of the prison, over the income, for

the year. This does not include \$8,000 paid for gas works, heretofore referred to.

The \$17,000 will have to be paid to the Supervisor, and to meet that, salaries, and other disbursements from the Treasury during the present year, the Comptroller estimates \$84,000. That amount will be fully needed unless the expenses are reduced.

The health, discipline and conduct of the prisoners have been good.

I recommend an appropriation not exceeding five hundred dollars, toward the Prison Library, for the purchase of new books and the repair of old ones.

Inspectors of the State Prison having been stricken from the constitution by an amendment, it would seem that the statute providing for such officers should not be retained.

MILITIA.

The National Guard consists of eight regiments and two battalions of infantry, two cavalry companies, and two batteries of artillery. They are well officered, equipped and disciplined. There has been a reduction of four companies within the last year, and the recent inspection will probably cause a further reduction. The commander of the division has required that all companies be kept at least to the minimum standard, or be disbanded.

The expenditures of the last year, on militia accounts, have been \$44,725.22. As compared with the year previous, this is a decrease of \$32,241.13. Of the amount expended, \$31,-249.18 have been for regular allowances, under the law, to companies, regiments and brigade headquarters of the National Guard, over which the Commander-in-chief has no control.

SOLDIERS' CHILDREN'S HOME.

The home for Soldiers' Children has fulfilled its mission, and it has been a noble work. The ladies who have managed and devoted their energies to it are entitled to the lasting gratitude, not only of the children benefitted, but of the whole commonwealth. Their unremitting zeal and marked success will always be a prominent feature in the history of the State. The appropriation ceases in April next. The expenses

of the year is \$27,976, which includes a special appropriation of \$4,000. The number cared for during that time is one hundred and sixty-four; of these, only seventy-eight remained at the date of the report. (December 6, 1875), sixty boys and eighteen girls. Since the report, the President of the Home informed me that the girls will all be provided for at its close, and of the boys not over six will then remain. The Legislature will, without doubt, see that those who remain are taken care of, until places for them can be procured. If this property is not taken for a Deaf and Dumb Asylum, some provision should be made this session for its disposition.

INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL.

The Industrial School for Girls is now maintained exclusively by the State. That section of the original act which required payment from the counties for children sent was repealed at the last session. I mention the fact in order that the school may be better filled, if cases are presented to the justices of the Supreme Court, as more can be supported within the usual appropriation. The number in the school at the date of the trustees' report was only twenty.

OTHER INSTITUTIONS.

For information concerning the Lunatic Asylum at Trenton, the Home for Disabled Soldiers, the Reform School and the Normal School, I can only refer to the various reports, which are full, and contain the particulars of their management and the results of the year.

There should be better conveniences for labor of the boys at the Reform School, as soon as the income of the State will permit.

GEOLOGICAL BOARD.

The report of the State Geologist is a most valuable document, and the information it contains in regard to the growth and resources of the State is exceedingly gratifying to Jerseymen. I commend it to careful consideration. This board has become an established institution, and a necessity to the intelligent development of many of the material interests of the State.

BOUNDARY.

In the year 1874, the northern boundary line between New York and New Jersey was run by Prof. George H. Cook, of the Geological Board, the particulars of which appear in his report of that year, and in the last message of my predecessor in office. Many of the monuments cannot be found, and many of those found are not in the true line. The Legislature of New York at its last session authorized the Regents of the University of the State of New York, in connection with the authorities of this State, to replace any monuments which had become dilapidated or been removed on the boundary line. How far this will justify them in determining the true line is not exactly clear; but I recommend provision for like action on the part of this State, with power in conjunction with competent New York authority, to locate the true line, subject, however, to the approval of the Legislature.

LANDS UNDER WATER.

The Riparian Commissioners are prosecuting their duties with great benefit to the State. The business of the year ending December 1, 1875, exceeds that of any previous year. The particulars are fully given in their report and that of the engineer. There is a growing disposition among riparian owners to acquire the rights of the State in front of their lands.

Ex-Governor Olden, a most useful member of this Board, resigned after the close of the last session, and Hon. Amzi Dodd was appointed in his place.

CENTENNIAL.

The commissioners have been very diligent in providing for a proper representation of the State at the Centennial in Philadelphia. No State will reap a more durable benefit from the exhibition than this. The appropriation of last session is inadequate to meet their necessary expenditures; considerable of it will be consumed in the work of the Geological Board, in gathering and preparing its mineral and other specimens. These will be of permanent advantage after the exhibition, as it is intended to arrange and preserve them in the State House. The commissioners, alike with those of several other States, are erecting a building for the common use of

the people of this State, on the Centennial grounds. Such accommodations will be indispensable in the very nature of things, considering how many from this State, by reason of the proximity will visit the exhibition. I recommend a further appropriation to enable the commissioners to complete their duties under the law, and the construction of the building.

This year is not only the one hundredth of the nation, but of our constitutional existence as a State. The constitution under which we lived and grew in strength until 1844, was adopted July 2, 1776. Surely, we cannot fail to appropriately mark a period like this in our history.

SCHOOLS.

The Report of the State Superintendent of Schools to the Board of Education gives a very encouraging and satisfactory resume of the condition of the public schools. To secure free schools throughout the State is now a constitutional duty. Free schools are safeguards of the State and nation, and should be kept completely divorced from sectarian control or influence. It is a cardinal principle in our political economy, and fundamental in our system of government, that church and State must be kept perfectly separate; but mistaken notions arise oftentime in applying the principle. We should never lose sight of the fact that this is a land of Christian, or Bible, character and civilization, and that its teachings are the foundation of our virtue and social elevation. These, it is true, may and do assume different shapes in men's minds, in considering their relations to God, thereby inducing such religious sects and associations for worship as may be deemed necessary or better for that purpose, according to belief, but the great, undisputed, underlying doctrines of duty to God and man and individual virtue which make good citizens are in the Bible. and to exclude it from being read in schools is a retrogression toward heathenism. The simple reading of the Bible in schools is not the teaching of sectarian or peculiar religious belief, simply because it is used to establish religious creeds and forms. The schools should never be shut against the Our law is-perfectly just. Its words are, "that it shall not be lawful for any teacher, trustee or trustees to introduce into or have performed in any school receiving its proportion of the public money, any religious service, ceremony or forms whatsoever, except reading the Bible and repeating

the Lord's Prayer." This gives the Bible a fair chance in its influence upon civil character and duty to the Creator, while an exclusion of it is a terrible stride in making the State godless. Also, for the good of society and citizenship, the State in selecting the objects of taxation, can well afford to, and should, leave untouched by the assessor, all edifices for religious worship, and the land upon which they stand actually necessary for their convenient use, and so exclusively used.

There are other matters of Legislative care in the reports accompanying this message, but they contain all necessary information, without special reference.

STATE HOUSE.

The addition to the State House has been completed in a substantial and appropriate manner, and within the appropriation of fifteen thousand dollars (not including fixtures.) It affords large and convenient rooms and vaults for the Clerks of Chancery and Supreme Courts, which were much needed, while the third story is designed mostly for specimens of the Geological and Agricultural Boards, veteran flags and relics. The precedent of the commissioners in keeping this improvement within the sum authorized, is a good one. The main dome should yet be raised, to give symmetry to the whole structure. An appropriation of five thousand dollars will cover it.

SAVINGS BANK.

Incorporated savings and trust companies being creatures of the State, and intended for the public accommodation and benefit, should be subject to such reasonable inspection as will protect their customers from fraud and bad management. I am satisfied that a law should be enacted designating a special officer of the State to make examinations, at such times as he shall deem expedient, into the affairs of these institutions, and when found to be insolvent, or in such condition as to justify a receiver, to report the same to the Attorney-General, whose duty it shall be to take proceedings before the Chancellor to compel a discontinuance of business and the liquidation of their indebtedness. A law of this character carefully prepared, with proper safeguards against abuse, would be of great advantage to the public.

RAILROAD TAXATION.

The revenue received by the State from railroad companies is not near as large as it should be. These companies obtain their existence from the State, and their interests require more protection from the various departments of the government, State and local, than most others. They are undoubtedly of great public benefit, and the policy of the State has always been to deal liberally with them; but there is no good reason why they should not bear, relatively, a fair proportion of the public burthens. The circumstances of the times have increased taxes upon individuals, yet there has been no increase of State taxation upon railroads. This is not right. An effort was made in that direction by an act of April 2, 1873, entitled "An Act to establish just rules for the taxation of railroads," &c., but it has been substantially disregarded by them, owing, as it would seem, to some questions on its construction. That act, among other things, provides that all companies occupying and using railroads in this State, whether as lessees or otherwise, shall thereafter pay, "upon the cost, equipment and appendages of said railroads, respectively, a State tax after such rate of taxation as may have heretofore been fixed by law upon such companies, or in default thereof, after the rate of one-half of one per centum upon such cost." The general railroad act previously passed at the same session, provided that companies organized thereunder should pay a State tax of one-half of one per cent. on the cost, equipment and appendages of the road, including the cost of the road bed. To my mind, the purpose of the act of April 2, 1873, was to subject all railroads not having irrepealable charters to one uniform There are very few irrepealable charters; system of taxation. I think, not over three. All others are subject to the taxing power, according to the judgment of the Legislature. A recent case in the Supreme Court, and affirmed in the Court of Errors and Appeals, in effect, so decides. That case arose under this act, and it was claimed that the act could not reach charters in which there was a special provision for taxation, although subject to alteration, unless there had been an acceptance under its tenth section. The decision was otherwise, and the acceptance held to be necessary only when there was an irrepealable contract. Another reason, it is said, why the companies have not complied with the act is, that no change was contemplated by it in the terms of any provision for taxation in a charter which fixed a basis and rate of taxation. By carefully

examining the language quoted from the act of April 2, 1873, I think the objection more captious than sound.

The charters of the companies vary in the mode of taxation. Some provide for the payment of one-half of one per centum on the cost of the road, when the net income reaches seven per cent.; some, when it reaches six; some, on the cost of the road, equipment and appendages; some, on the capital stock; some, on the cost of the road, equipment and appendages, when the net proceeds reach a certain per cent., and some on the cost of the road alone, without equipment and appendages, and without reference to income. Many of the companies never reach an income over expenses, sufficient to bring them within their tax clauses. This results either from good or bad management. Some companies, which, by their charters, pay no tax on equipment and appendages, but only on the cost of their roads, will increase their own rolling stock to an immense extent, and use it upon leased or other lines which they run in connection with their main lines, and thereby pay no tax for equipment on the leased or connecting linés.

In my judgment, the object of the act of 1873 was to correct all this, and bring the companies which could be reached by the Legislature to a common standard. The United New Jersey Railroad and Canal Companies are bound to pay into the Treasury at least \$298,128.96 for each year, under an act of March 4, 1869, which abolished transit duties, and which was accepted by them, they having had an irrepealable contract on the basis of transit duties. The other companies altogether paid into the Treasury last year only \$298,492.32, and that was paid by thirteen of them, all the rest escaping, for the time being, on the ground that they were exempted by force of their charters. There may have been some exceptions, by reason of insolvency, but the statement is substantially true. By a fair estimate of the probable cost of the railroads in the State, excepting those with irrepealable charters, and including equipment and appendages, I am satisfied that it will amount to at least one hundred and twenty-five millions of dollars (\$125,000,000). A tax on that of one-half of one per cent. will produce \$625,000. That sum, with the revenue from the United Companies, would make about \$925,000, which, with the income from other sources, excluding school taxes, would nearly, if not entirely, with reasonable economy, after the asylum is completed, and with a cessation of extraordinary appropriations, pay all the ordinary expenses of the government, including the annual payments from the State Treasury towards the war debt. To relieve from all State taxation except for schools, should be the great aim of the Legislature, as soon as possible. It cannot be done this year, but if all railroads, not having irrepealable contracts, are required by a law this session, to pay one-half of one per cent to the State, according to the meaning, as I understand it, of the act of April 2, 1873, on a basis of the cost of the road, equipment and appendages, and the same is accurately estimated, I believe that, next year, the ordinary State tax can be reduced one-half, and the year after, dispensed with altogether. This, of course, does not include the school tax. One mode of taxation would then be adopted for all railroad companies whose charters are subject to alteration.

The act of April 2, 1873, should be amended (saving all claims of the State under it as it now stands) so that there can be no question about its meaning, and, besides that, summary and efficient means should be provided to collect the tax.

This subject is now only outlined, as it will probably be again referred to more specifically.

CONCLUSION.

How best to recover from the depression of the times, correct the evils that produced it, and become firmly established in prosperity, is engaging the attention of the thoughtful all over the land. The people are deeply in earnest about it, and demand a rigid accountability in office. Let us, in our several spheres, not disappoint them, and secure to them just laws and their faithful execution. Our commonwealth, cousidering its size, is excelled by none in everything that makes up the greatness of a State, and, if true to duty, its growth under Providence, must be rapid and strong.

Whereas, The constitution of New Jersey provides that there shall be no establishment of one religious sect over another, and forbids the appropriation of money for the use of any society, association or corporation, or the passage of private, local or special laws for the management and support of free public schools; and whereas, the constitution of the state also declares that the legislature shall provide for the maintenance and support of a thorough or efficient system of free public schools, and makes the moneys raised for that purpose a sacred fund to be devoted to no other object; and whereas, notwithstanding these constitutional provisions an effort has been made to unnecessarily alarm the friends of our free and unsectarian school system, by promulgating the idea that there is danger of legislation inimical to it; therefore,

- 1. Resolved, (Senate concurring) That this legislature take the earliest opportunity to re-affirm the doctrine of a total separation of church and state, to declare that a system of free unsectarian schools is the settled and unalterable policy of this State, and to repudiate all idea of legislation in any way impairing the thoroughness and efficiency of our free schools, or the use of the moneys raised for their support in any manner not warranted by the letter and spirit of our constitution.
- 2. Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be forwarded to the Senators and Representatives in Congress from this State.

Mr. Griggs moved to amend by striking out all after the words "whereas," and inserting the following:

Whereas, The constitution of New Jersey provides that there shall be no establishment of one religious sect in preference to another, and forbids the appropriation of money for the use of any society, association, or corporation, and the passage of private, local or special laws for the management and support of free public schools; said provision having been incorporated into the constitution by the people in the face of the opposition of the authorities and members of a prominent religious sect and a portion of the political party sympathizing with them; and whereas, the constitution of this state also declares that the legislature shall provide for the maintenance and support of a thorough and efficient system of free public schools, and makes the money raised for that purpose a sacred fund to be devoted to no other object; which declaration has become a part of the organic law, notwithstanding an organized and determined effort, stimulated by circular letters issued by a sectarian body to defeat the same; and whereas, notwithstanding the undoubted acquiescence of the public mind in the justice and propriety of the sentiments here expressed in favor of an absolute divorce of church and state, a bill was passed by the dominant party in the last house of assembly, proposing to establish a sectarian institution with extraordinary and objectionable powers: therefore.

1. Resolved, That this legislature hereby re-affirm the doctrine of a total separation of church and state, declares that a system of free unsectarian schools is the settled and unalterable policy of this state, and condemns all attempted legislation wherever originating, tending in any way to impair the thoroughness and efficiency of our free public schools, and the use of the moneys raised for their support in any manner not warranted by the letter and spirit of our constitution.

TRENTON, February 23d, 1876.

To the Senate and House of Assembly:

The Commissioners appointed under the act entitled "A further supplement to an act entitled "An act to appoint Commissioners to erect an addition and make repairs to the State House,' approved March thirty-first, one thousand, eight hundred and seventy-one," which supplement was approved March 18, 1875, beg leave respectfully to report:

This act authorized the Commissioners "to make such alterations in the State House as they and the Joint Committee on Public Buildings may deem necessary, to enable the several officers of the State government to properly and conveniently transact the business of their several departments;" appropriated the necessary amount "to pay for said alterations, not exceeding the sum of fifteen thousand dollars; and provided, "that no alterations as aforesaid shall be made until the plans and the contracts for the same shall have been first submitted to the Governor, the President of the Senate and the Speaker

of the House of Assembly, and shall have been approved by them."

Under the authority conferred by Section 3 of this act, His Excellency, the Governor, appointed Philemon Dickinson and Charles P. Smith, Commissioners to fill the vacancies occasioned by the resignation of Hon. Charles S. Olden and the demise of Thomas J. Stryker.

The Commissioners proceeded immediately to call a meeting of the persons authorized under said act to adopt and approve plans. Three plans were submitted, two made by Samuel Sloan and one by J. F. Stuckert. One of the plans of the former was adopted and the Commissioners were directed to proceed without unnecessary delay to have it executed.

Proposals were invited by public notice given in the Trenton papers, when the following bids were received:

The contract was awarded to Titus & Conrad, a reliable firm in Trenton, for the sum of eleven thousand dollars, they being the lowest bidders, and was executed on the twentyninth day of May, eighteen hundred and seventy-five, and was formally approved by the Governor, President of the Senate and Speaker of the House of Assembly. During the progress of the work it was found expedient, and greatly to the advantage of the State, in durability and finish, to change the plans and specifications in regard to the front elevation, requiring new ceilings in the first story, adding cornices and centre pieces to all the different apartments, and to add to the fire protection of the vaults. A contract for this purpose was executed on the eighth day of June, eighteen hundred and seventy-five, and approved by the Governor, President of the Senate, and Speaker of the House of Assembly, and which also provided for a heavier quality of roofing, tin and felting, the state paying for the felting, and the relative difference in the cost price of tin charged by the importers. Subsequently contracts were made for the plastering and cornice, stipulating that the plastering should be paid for at the rate of thirty cents per square yard, and cornice if to girt eighteen inches,

twenty-two cents per lineal foot, if between eighteen and twenty-five inches, twenty-five cents per lineal foot, and for all additional brick work at the rate of sixteen dollars per thousand.

The contracts were faithfully carried out, and the alterations have been substantially completed to the entire satisfaction of the Commissioners and the officers occupying the front of the building.

The improvements are extensive, permanent and all that can be desired. They consist in placing an additional story upon the main portion and two stories upon the wings, so that it shows a front of three stories. The second story is occupied by the Clerk in Chancery and the Clerk of the Supreme Court, each having three rooms and two vaults or fire proofs. Two rooms in the third story are occupied by the copyists of the Clerk in Chancery, and the balance of the story, containing five connecting rooms on the front, ninety-six by thirty feet, and two rooms in the rear, all now being furnished and fitted up as a Geological and Mineralogical Cabinet under the direction of the State Geologist, in which as soon as possible will also be deposited the battle flags, relics and trophies of the war of the rebellion. The total area made by the extension is eight thousand five hundred and twelve square feet, at a cost of about one dollar and seventy-six cents per square foot. The Geological and Mineralogical Cabinet contains three thousand six hundred and forty square feet.

The total cost of the improvements, paid out by the Commissioners to the present day, is fourteen thousand and thirty-four dollars and forty-six cents, (\$14,034,46,) vouchers for which have been filed in the office of the Comptroller of the Treasury. The account is stated as follows:

Which is amply sufficient to satisfy all outstanding claims.

The Commissioners performed their onerous and responsible duties without expecting or desiring compensation.

Throughout they were actuated by the motive that indicated that good and faithful work can be performed for the State under an economical appropriation, and that the honor of receiving the confidence of the State for the performance of a temporary duty, is sufficient compensation now, as at an earlier period of her history.

The Speaker presented the following communication from the Attorney-General as to the competency of the Legislature, under the amended constitution, to pass supplements to municipal corporations, being in reply to a resolution of the House requesting such opinion:

ATTORNEY GENERAL'S OFFICE, TRENTON, N. J., Feb. 21st, 1876.

Sir:—The Clerk of the House of Assembly delivered to ne a copy of a resolution, which is as follows:

"Resolved, That the Attorney-General of this State be requested to render an opinion to the Legislature, as soon as possible, as to the constitutionality of passing supplements to nunicipal corporations."

The question, as I understand it, is whether, under the constitution as it now is, the Legislature has the power to pass an act supplementary to the charter of a municipal corporation?

To answer the question in general terms, I say yes, in some cases.

The Legislature may pass such acts in all cases, except in hose in which the exercise of that power is prohibited by the constitution.

The resolution does not request me to point and specify the *xcepted* cases, but I venture to assume that that was the intenion of its mover; and, therefore, I will say that, according to my understanding, the amendments to the constitution dopted in 1875, restrain the Legislature as hereinafter tated:

- 1st. From passing any supplement to the charter of any municipality, the object or effect of which is to lay out, open, or alter or make any road or highway, or to confer power or authority on any municipality to lay out, open, alter or work any road or highway.
- 2d. From passing any supplement to the charter of any municipality, the object or effect of which is to vacate any road, town plot, street, alley or public grounds; or to confer power or authority on any municipality to vacate any road, town plot, street, alley or public grounds.
- 3d. From passing any supplement to the charter of any town regulating, or authorizing it to regulate, its internal affairs or any of them.
- 4th. From passing any act to regulate the internal affairs of any county, or of any number of counties less than the whole, in any special or peculiar manner; and from passing any act authorizing one or a part of the counties of the State to regulate its or their internal affairs in any special or peculiar manner.
- 5th. From passing any supplement to the charter of any municipality appointing local offices or commissions to regulate its municipal affairs.

[The word "offices," as used in this connection, I suppose to be equivalent to the word "officers."]

6th. From passing any supplement to any private, local or special act relative to selecting, drawing, summoning or empanneling grand or petit jurors.

But any supplement which merely *repeals* a private, local or special act relative to selecting, drawing, summoning or empannelling grand or petit jurors, heretofore passed, in my judgment, may be passed.

- 7th. From passing any supplement to the charter of any municipality, the object or effect of which is to, or enable the municipality to, create, increase or decrease the percentage or allowance of any public officer or officers during the term for which said officer was, or officers were, elected or appointed
- 8th. From passing any supplement to the charter of any municipality which changes, or authorizes the municipality to change the law of descent.

9th. From passing any supplement to the charter of any municipality, granting, or authorizing it to grant, to any corporation, association, or individual, any exclusive privilege, immunity, or franchise whatever.

10th. From passing any supplement to the charter of any municipality, granting, or authorizing the municipality to grant, to any corporation, association or individual, the right to lay down railroad tracks.

11th. From passing any supplement to the charter of any municipality providing, or authorizing the municipality to provide, for changes of venue in civil or criminal cases.

12th. From passing any supplement to the charter of any municipality providing or authorizing it to provide for the management or support of free public schools.

13th. From passing any supplement to the charter of any municipality assessing, or authorizing property to be assessed for taxes under a special law, or by special or exceptional rules, or otherwise than according to its true value.

There are other restrictions on the power of the Legislature, as to municipalities, contained in the constitution as it was prior to 1875, but I do not suppose the question submitted to me was intended to include them.

Any proposed supplement to the charter of a municipality, the object or effect of which is to do, or authorize the doing of any of the inhibited things hereinbefore mentioned, cannot be passed; but if the object or effect of the supplement is to do, or authorize the doing of a thing not included in the inhibited things, it may be passed; provided, public notice of the intention to apply therefor, and of the general object thereof, has been given.

This proviso suggests the question whether, before the Legislature has prescribed the time and mode of giving such notice, the evidence thereof, and how such evidence shall be preserved, a supplement to the charter of any municipality can be passed? My impressions are, that it cannot.

The reasons on which that impression rests are these: Ar ticle IV., Section VII., paragraph 9, says:

"No private, special, or local bill shall be passed unless public notice of the intention to apply therefor, and of the general object thereof, shall have been previously given."

This is an absolute prohibition, unless notice has been previously given.

But what notice, when, where and how given and how to be proved? Is the Legislature to judge, in each particular case, according to its view of the circumstances of that case, whether a sufficient notice has been given?

That would let in all the evils, real or supposed, which this paragraph was designed to exclude.

The last sentence of the paragraph seems to negative that view. As I understand it, every such notice must be given and proved in conformity to a general law to be passed by the Legislature.

After *prohibiting* the passage of any such bill unless notice has been previously given, it prescribes, as to that notice, as follows:

"The Legislature, at the next session after the adoption hereof, and from time to time thereafter, shall prescribe the time and mode of giving such notice, the evidence thereof, and how such evidence shall be preserved."

It will be observed that the notice is not to be conformable to any law before existing, but is to conform to a law afterwards to be passed.

To some extent the Legislature is to judge of the sufficiency of the notice. But they can only determine whether the notice produced conforms to, and fulfills the requirements of a general public law, as to such notices, previously passed. The passage of such a general, public law, in my view, must precede the passage of any private, special, or local bill. Such a general, public law should be framed, mainly, with reference to notices to be hereafter given, but I perceive no objection to inserting in such a law, a section providing that notices of application to the present Legislature, if their contents are, and the time and manner of their application have been, such as required by the new act, shall be deemed sufficient, if proved according to the requirements of the new act.

Many of the real and serious difficulties of legislating for municipalities by special or local bills, can not be overcome or avoided by answering or discussing general or abstract questions. The rules to be followed may be stated ever so plainly and clearly and yet, when you come to apply those rules to the provisions of any particular bill you will be very likely to encounter perplexing questions not before thought of and very difficult to answer, and to which very variant and conflicting answers will be given by persons of ability, learning, experience and general good judgment.

Such questions can only be finally answered and conclusively settled by the courts, but, from the nature of our institutions, you are *compelled* to consider, decide, and act upon such questions before the courts can consider or act upon them. The courts can only act in review of, and on an appeal from your action.

All I can do is to offer suggestions for your consideration, to be adopted or rejected by you as to you may seem best.

The primary and paramount duty of every member of the Legislature and of every State officer is to support the constitution of the United States and the constitution of the State of New Jersey, according to the best of his ability.

In an effort to perform that duty on my part, in obedience to the request of the Legislature, I have made the foregoing suggestions. They are entitled to, and can have no authority except such as *you* in the exercise of *your* best consideration and judgment, may see fit to give them.

OFFICE OF THE COMMISSIONERS OF THE STATE HOUSE EXTENSION, TRENTON, February 23d, 1876.

To the Senate and House of Assembly:

The Commissioners appointed under the act entitled "A further supplement to an act entitled "An act to appoint Commissioners to erect an addition and make repairs to the State House,' approved March thirty-first, one thousand, eight hundred and seventy-one," which supplement was approved March 18, 1875, beg leave respectfully to report:

This act authorized the Commissioners "to make such alterations in the State House as they and the Joint Committee on Public Buildings may deem necessary, to enable the several officers of the State government to properly and conveniently transact the business of their several departments;" appropriated the necessary amount "to pay for said alterations, not exceeding the sum of fifteen thousand dollars; and provided, "that no alterations as aforesaid shall be made until the plans and the contracts for the same shall have been first submitted to the Governor, the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Assembly, and shall have been approved by them."

Under the authority conferred by Section 3 of this act, His Excellency, the Governor, appointed Philemon Dickinson and Charles P. Smith, Commissioners to fill the vacancies occasioned by the resignation of Hon. Charles S. Olden and the demise of Thomas J. Stryker.

The Commissioners proceeded immediately to call a meeting of the persons authorized under said act to adopt and approve plans. Three plans were submitted, two made by Samuel Sloan and one by J. F. Stuckert. One of the plans of the former was adopted and the Commissioners were directed to proceed without unnecessary delay to have it executed.

Proposals were invited by public notice given in the Trenton papers, when the following bids were received:

Turman & Kite, 14,450	00

The contract was awarded to Titus & Conrad, a reliable firm in Trenton, for the sum of eleven thousand dollars, they being the lowest bidders, and was executed on the twentyninth day of May, eighteen hundred and seventy-five, and was formally approved by the Governor, President of the Senate and Speaker of the House of Assembly. During the progress of the work it was found expedient, and greatly to the advantage of the State, in durability and finish, to change the plans and specifications in regard to the front elevation, requiring new ceilings in the first story, adding cornices and centre pieces to all the different apartments, and to add to the fire protection of the vaults. A contract for this purpose was executed on the eighth day of June, eighteen hundred and seventy-five, and approved by the Governor, President of the Senate, and Speaker of the House of Assembly, and which also provided for a heavier quality of roofing, tin and felting, the state paying for the felting, and the relative difference in the cost price of tin charged by the importers. Subsequently contracts were made for the plastering and cornice, stipulating that the plastering should be paid for at the rate of thirty cents per square yard, and cornice if to girt eighteen inches, twenty-two cents per lineal foot, if between eighteen and twenty-five inches, twenty-five cents per lineal foot, and for all additional brick work at the rate of sixteen dollars per thousand.

The contracts were faithfully carried out, and the alterations have been substantially completed to the entire satisfaction of the Commissioners and the officers occupying the front of the building.

The improvements are extensive, permanent and all that can be desired. They consist in placing an additional story upon the main portion and two stories upon the wings, so that it shows a front of three stories. The second story is occupied by the Clerk in Chancery and the Clerk of the Supreme Court, each having three rooms and two vaults or fire proofs. Two rooms in the third story are occupied by the copyists of the Clerk in Chancery, and the balance of the story, containing five connecting rooms on the front, ninety-six by thirty feet, and two rooms in the rear, all now being furnished and fitted up as a Geological and Mineralogical Cabinet under the direction of the State Geologist, in which as soon as possible will also be deposited the battle flags, relics and trophies of the war of the rebellion. The total area made by the extension is

eight thousand five hundred and twelve square feet, at a cost of about one dollar and seventy-six cents per square foot. The Geological and Mineralogical Cabinet contains three thousand six hundred and forty square feet.

The total cost of the improvements, paid out by the Commissioners to the present day, is fourteen thousand and thirty-four dollars and forty-six cents, (\$14,034,46,) vouchers for which have been filed in the office of the Comptroller of the Treasury. The account is stated as follows:

Which is amply sufficient to satisfy all outstanding claims.

The Commissioners performed their onerous and responsible duties without expecting or desiring compensation. Throughout they were actuated by the motive that indicated that good and faithful work can be performed for the State under an economical appropriation, and that the honor of receiving the confidence of the State for the performance of a temporary duty, is sufficient compensation now, as at an earlier period of her history.

A message was received from the Governor, transmitting State Prison communications for the supervisor and physician of the State Prison, setting forth the overcrowded condition of that institution.

STATE OF NEW JERSEY, EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT,

TRENTON, February 28, 1876.

Gentlemen of the Senate and General Assembly:

I herewith submit two reports in regard to the over-crowded condition of the State Prison—one from the Supervisor, the other from the Physician. They are dated February twenty-first inst., and exhibit the following facts: On that day the number of convicts was 787; there are 530 cells in the prison, thirty are occupied by thirty-six females, two are used for the library, four for storage, and four reserved for the refractory. Deducting these, there remain 490 cells to hold 751 males. Of these cells 308 are capable of containing only one prisoner each, so that the remaining 443 prisoners must be crowded into 182 cells. These latter, the physician states were originally designed for single cells, but now used for two and three persons each.

These facts show an immediate necessity for additional accommodation, and I earnestly recommend that the Legislature examine into the matter, and make provision to meet the exigency.

Office of New Jersey State Prison, Trenton, Feb. 21st, 1876.

To His Excellency, Joseph D. Bedle:

SIR:—The prevalence of crime, and its just punishment, under our laws, have filled the State Prison with criminals far beyond its capacity. During the last three years the number of convicts has increased 44 4-10 per cent. The average number for the year ending October 31, 1873, was 545. To-day, it is 787, with indications of a constant increase. The whole number of cells in the prison is 530. Of these 30 are occupied by 36 female convicts, 2 are used by the library, 4 for storage, and 4 are reserved for the correction of the refractory and incorrigible. These taken from the whole number leave 490 cells to hold 751 male convicts. 308 cells are capable of holding only one each; there remains then only 182 cells for 443 convicts, 79 of these, therefore, must contain each 3 convicts, and the other 103 each 2. The bad effects of confining two or three criminals in one cell are too palpable to require an elaborate argument. My object in presenting the foregoing statement is to call attention to the absolute necessity of a large increase of cells.

I take the liberty of suggesting to your excellency the propriety of asking the Legislature to take this subject into consideration.

NEW JERSEY STATE PRISON, TRENTON, N. J., Feb. 21st, 1876.

To His Excellency, the Governor:

I have the honor to state that there are at present in the State Prison seven hundred and eighty-seven (787) prisoners. The cells in which this large number of convicts must be accommodated number five hundred and thirty (530); three hundred and thirty (330) of these are small and capable of accommodating but one occupant in each. Thirty-six of the convicts are females—to these are allotted thirty single cells; there then remain four hundred and fifty-one (451) persons to

be confined in the remaining two hundred cells. But some of these are necessarily occupied as store rooms and as places of correction for refractory prisoners. The institution has hospital accommodations for twenty (20) persons; there are at this time fifteen inmates.

The cells which are used as double ones are those in the two old wings These were originally designed for one person each. I need not suggest that this crowding of prisoners together is demoralizing to them and subversive of discipline. Neither isit necessary to state that it is deleterious to the health of convicts to live so crowded together. From these data your Excellency can readily see the needs of this institution in reference to increased room.

Office of the Attorney General, Trenton, March 1, 1876.

To the Hon. John D. Carscallen, Speaker of the House of Assembly:

Sir:—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt from the

Clerk of the House of Assembly, of a copy of a resolution, which is as follows:

"Resolved, That the Attorney General of this State be and he is hereby requested to render his opinion to this Assembly as to whether the Five County Act was abolished by the adoption of the amendments to the Constitution."

This resolution, as I understand, refers to the act entitled "An act relative to taxes in certain counties of this State," approved April 2, 1869, Laws 1869, page 1225.

The distinctive feature of that act is that in certain counties and parts of counties therein named, certain mortgages are exempted from taxation. Understanding the question to be whether that act, and the supplements thereto, were abolished by the amendments to the Constitution, adopted in September 1875,

I answer the question in the negative. The only one of the amendments likely to have given rise to the question submitted is paragraph 12, section 7 of Article 4, which is in these words:

"Property shall be assessed for taxes under general laws, and by uniform rules, according to its true value."

This contains no repeal of any then existing laws. It was spoken of in that part of the constitution which grants, defines and limits the rights, privileges and powers of the Legislature. It does not relate to past Legislatures, nor to the acts of past Legislatures. Its application is to the future and not to the past. It is directed to the Legislature and not to the Executive or Judicial departments. Its purpose was and is to prescribe the principle upon which all future tax laws shall be made. Its clear implication is that the Legislature shall make the tax law so that property shall be assessed under general laws and by uniform rules and according to its true value, and it prevents the making of any tax law contrary to that prescription; but until a new tax law is made assessors will be compelled to follow the laws which were in force in their several localities immediately prior to the adoption of the Constitutional Amendment.

The purpose of the amendments to the 7th section of the 4th article of the Constitution was not, by the amendments themselves, to repeal any laws then in force, but to restrain

and regulate the *future* action of the Legislature. The language of the amendments to that section do not indicate an interest or purpose, by the amendments themselves, to repeal laws then in force, much mischief would have ensued had not those amendments of themselves, immediately repealed all laws contrary thereto.

Adapting the laws to the requirements of the Constitution as it now is, was devolved upon the Legislature to be done after the adoption of the amendments.

Resolved, That the Committee on Judiciary be and the same are hereby requested to examine whether some system can be devised by which when an appropriation is made for any specific object, such appropriation can be credited to such object on the books of the treasury, and all bills incurred, chargeable against such appropriations, be paid by the Treasurer after being audited by the Comptroller of the State, and examined and found correct by such Commissioners, and no moneys actually pass into the hands of such Commissioners, and that said committee have leave to report by bill or otherwise.

Be it enacted by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey, That the State Treasurer be and he is hereby authorized and directed to send within five days from the passage of this act, a circular letter to each and every newspaper publisher of the State asking for sealed proposals, to be sent in within twenty days thereafter, for the doing of the public printing for the current year in manner, style and quality as follows, to-wit:

First. That all copy for the work which may be given them to do shall be delivered to them in accordance with the act

entitled, "An act relative to the public printing," approved March twenty-fifth, eighteen hundred and sixty-nine.

Second. That the work shall be done, completed and returned to the Treasurer on or before the first day of January next.

Third. That the style of the work and the quality of the paper to be used for printing pamphlets, journals, minutes and laws shall in all respects conform to that used for the same kind of work for the current year, specimens of which shall be kept on exhibition at the State Treasurer's office.

Fourth. That the quantity of each pamphlet, Senate journal, Minutes of Assembly, and pamphlet laws, shall be fixed by the Commission hereinafter named.

Fifth. That all bids or proposals shall designate the price per thousand ems for composition, the price per token of two hundred and fifty impressions of sixteen pages for the press work; the price per ream of each size and quality of paper, including the paper for covers, and the price per hundred copies of each for folding and stitching.

And be it enacted, That the Governor of the State, the President of the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Assembly, shall be a Commission, on behalf of the State, to receive from the Treasurer such proposals for the public printing as may have been sent him, and they, the said Commission, shall after due consideration make the awards to such person or persons, as in their judgment, or a majority of them, may best subserve the interests of the State: provided, that in no case shall all or any portion of the public printing be awarded to any one at a price greater than others, equally responsible, have offered to do the same work for.

And be it enacted, That the Commission above named, or a majority of them, shall fix the quantity to be printed of the pamphlet laws, Senate Journals, Minutes of the House of Assembly, and of each and every report presented to the Legisdature or Governor, of which reports so printed, fifty copies of each shall be for the State Librarian for binding together as legislative documents.

And be it enacted, That for printing one hundred and fifty copies of the public bills, ordered by either branch of the Legislature, there shall be paid at the rate of five dollars per sheet

of four foolscap pages, on good writing paper, with pica type, each page to contain thirty-one lines, and for such other printing as may be done for the State during the present legislative session, there shall be paid at the rate of seventy-five cents per thousand ems for composition. and seventy-five cents per token of two hundred and fifty impressions of sixteen pages for the press work.

To the General Assembly:

I return herewith without approval, Assembly Bill No. 164, entitled

An act to provide for the payment of the expenses of the submission of the constitutional amendments to the suffrages of the people of this State.

It is very general and its purpose not entirely clear. If intended to cover all the local expenses of the election, as I suppose it is, it would take from the Treasury ten thousand dollars at least, and probably a considerable amount more. The act submitting the constitutional amendments to the people, (Laws 1875, page 76), provided that "all officers of election who shall assist in conducting said election shall receive the same compensation and be paid in the same manner as is now provided by law in case of the annual election."

The election having been held under that provision, and the expense being now fairly distributed, the same as in all other general elections, there can be no public good in re-imbursing it from the treasury. The estimates for the year do not contemplate any such burthen as this, and it could not have been surmised that the existing law would be changed.

Our State resources will have all they can bear, without the payment of the amount required under this bill.

. If there are any expenses connected with the election, not legally payable under existing laws, the bill should state them

with sufficient certainty, so that there could be no question of the intention.

STATE OF NEW JERSEY, EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT, TRENTON, April 10th, 1876.

To the General Assembly:

Assembly Bill No. 257, entitled

An act relative to the government of cities,

Is returned without signature for the following reasons:

Under section 7, paragraph 11, of the Constitution, the Legislature is prohibited from passing any local or special law "appointing local officers or commissions to regulate municipal affairs." Further by paragraph 9, of the same section, no special or local bill can be passed without public notice. Although this bill purports on its face to be general yet it is unmistakbly local and special, and being so it is in violation of both of those clauses of the Constitution. It appoints local officers by extending terms of incumbents, and no notice has been given of its introduction. Had it in terms been made applicable to Jersey City, no one could question its unconstitutionality, but instead of that a description is given which is as clearly intended to apply only to that city. The bill has reference to any city now in a certain condition of government, that is to any city "now wholly or partly governed by local boards or commissions, whose members are chosen by the Legislature in joint meeting." Jersey City is the only city in the State answering that description. It can make no difference whether the city is designated by its corporate name, or by a description which means the same thing. The fact of the peculiar government of Jersey City is almost as well understood by the Legislature as the existence of the city itself, and any effort to locate this bill will foster it upon that city, and nowhere else; the bill being local and special is unconstitutional, not only in part but entirely, for want of notice and besides, in part, because it appoints local officers. Its purpose is chiefly two-fold, one to postpone the charter election, which takes place to-morrow, until the election for members of Assembly in November next, and to elect certain officers who are to be elected to-morrow and also others to take the places of those in Boards now filled by Joint Meeting, or by appointment by the Aldermen. The other purpose is to continue in office until the first day of December next, the Mayor and all present members of Boards, whose terms will expire previous to that time. Whether such persons were elected by the people or appointed by the Board of Aldermen. The term of the Mayor expires on the first of May next, but he can hold until his successor shall qualify. The terms of one-half of the Boards of Aldermen and Education, (being elective) expire in May next. These terms are definite without any right to hold over.

The Board of Finance and Taxation is appointed by the Aldermen and its members also hold for a definite term. It consists of five members, the terms of three of which will expire this week, but whether to-day or on Thursday next is not clear. The extension by special law of the terms of existing officers is as clearly contrary to the Constitution as an original appointment in the same way to new offices and terms by the Legislature would be. Were it not for these objections, which are to me insurmountable, I would cheerfully sign this bill. Should it be again passed, the result to my mind will most probably be a conflict of different claimants for the office of Mayor, also for seats in the Aldermen and Education and by the entire organization of the Board of Finance and Taxation.

This would be disastrous to the city in its finances, taxation and credit, and most seriously obstruct the necessary powers of its government. The emergency ought to be very great to justify such risks.

Mr. E. Drake, from the special committee on fees and salaries presented a supplementary and final report as follows:

Your committee have made a thorough inquiry into the compensation now received by the judiciary of the State, and submit herewith the evidence taken at their several sittings. We find that the compensation, in addition to the salary of \$5,000 fixed by law, is regulated by the amount of work performed, the judges presiding in the Circuits where population is densest and litigation heaviest, receiving the largest aggregate of fees. In other words, the laborer is paid according to the service rendered. The system is not the best, but it does not seem feasible to change it. Two plans have been suggested. One is that the Supreme Court Judges should be paid a fixed salary of (say) \$8,000 or \$10,000 each. But the objection is that it would be unfair to pay the judges of the lower Circuits the same sum as those presiding in the V, VI and VII Districts, where the business of a single term of Court is often greater than the business of the whole inof the other Districts. The salary now paid by law, with the accruing fees, is ample compensation for the actual service rendered in the cases of the lower District Judges, but double that amount would not be extravagant compensation for those of the V, VI and VII Districts, the latter fairly earn \$10,000 salary and fees in addition. The other plan proposed is to pay the judges equally, and then rotate them from district to district. The obvious objection to this is that it is impracticable, and that to attempt it would result in serious embarrassment to the judicial business of the State. Under the present system, each judge is interested in clearing up the business of each term as it comes. Delays and postponements are thus avoided and the cost of litigation is cheapened. were the rotary system to be adopted, the motive to industry and promptness would be removed; the Judge being responsible for no particular circuit would become indifferent for the progress of the business of all, and thus suits would accumulate and dockets become encumbered, while litigants waited indefinitely for the adjudication of their cases.

In point of fact it seems to your committee to be unfair

that the general body of taxpayers should be taxed for the payment of large salaries for the Judiciary; to do so would be to relieve the litigant class who are the only parties benefitted. It is right and proper that those persons who use the courts should pay for their maintenance, in so far at least as the service rendered is for their personal benefit rather than that of the public. So long as our judges remain content with the present system, certainly in view of the advantages which taxpayers generally derive from it, in exemption from taxation on its account the latter have no reason to complain. It may be added, however, in justice to our judges, that there is no reason to believe that they prefer the fee system to one of fixed salaries, as has frequently been alleged; but they recognize the difficulties of the situation and acquiesce on condition which they would be glad to escape.

The Judiciary of New Jersey has always maintained a high rank as to ability, purity and independence. Its decisions are quoted in the courts of every State in the Union. Our Judges are men of large acquirements, all of whom could earn at the bar very much more than they are paid by the State. It does not seem to your committee that their compensation should be diminished.

They ought not to be paid by fees, but as the case stands there does not seem to be any way in which they can be paid, consistently with the demands of justice, except in part by fees and in part by fixed salaries. Your Committee, therefore, refrain from making any recommendation in the premises, preferring that the whole subject should go over to some future Legislature, which may be able to devise a system in some respects superior to that now in existence.

TRENTON, April 17th, 1876.

To the General Assembly:

Assembly Bill No. 269, entitled "An act relating to the making of certain assessments in cities." Although in form general, is strictly local and special. The amendments to our constitution, taken together, are peculiar, and the distinction between private, special or local bills, and those that are general, is clearly intended. The line in some instances may be difficult of definition, yet its existence should be carefully regarded in order that the public in any particular locality may not be surprised by legislation affecting their own interests exclusively without previous notice. Paragraph nine of section seven, is an absolute prohibition against the passage of any local or special bill, unless upon notice. This bill purports to be an act relating to the making of certain assessments in cities, but by the first section it can only apply to any city which by the last state census, made in 1875, was shown to have over one hundred and twenty thousand inhabitants. Newark is the only city answering that description, and it is as clearly indicated as if the name had been mentioned.

will be observed that this is not a bill which may be applied to cities as they reach a certain population, but it is tied down to a certain condition of population in 1875. If the year had not been stated, the bill might have been construed to be applicable prospectively to cities whenever they reach the requisite population, by any last census, and even if that character of legislation is permissable under our constitution I do not see how by a mere avoidance of the name of the city to which the bill is intended to apply, and by the substitution of a description which necessarily includes that city alone, the inherent quality of the bill can be changed from local to general. After a careful examination of the cases in other States, under their various constitutions, I can find nothing to warrant the conclusion that the bill meets the requirements of our constitution. The merits are unobjectionable, but no notice of the bill having been given, and the bill being purely local I cannot sign it.

If this bill is not local, the constitutional provision for notice can be most easily avoided, and in effect it amounts to nothing.

TRENTON, N. J., April 16, 1876.

To the Senate and General Assembly:

The undersigned, your committee directed by a concurrent resolution, to inquire into the truth of certain charges, and also all other matters affecting the interests of the State Normal School, respectfully report that immediately after organization they had brought before them all such persons as it was believed would be able to give any information on the subject. Among these were the principal of the Normal School, the treasurer, members of the board of trustees, teachers, and others employed at the school, and business men who had had dealings with the institution. The committee took the testimony of these parties and in every way endeavored to thoroughly sift the matter in order to ascertain whether there were any circumstances existing detrimental to the institution, and whether any action was necessary on the part of the legislature to correct such evils.

The attention of your committee was particularly directed to statements of defalcation in the financial management of the school, and also of mal-administration on the part of the principal, and they found that the board of trustees had themselves investigated these matters and taken action upon them.

Your committee take pleasure in coroborrating the conclu-

sion of the board of trustees that no defalcation exists or has existed in the accounts of the school, either as kept by the principal or the treasurer. The moneys of the State in the hands of the treasurer have in every respect been expended properly and in accordance with law. The only possible ground for the charges made in regard to the funds of the school is in the fact that it had been a part of the duties of the principal of the school to collect the weekly charges from the pupils in the boarding houses and to disburse the same in meeting the expenses of that department. This condition of affairs continued until the appointment of an assistant treasurer in July, 1874, when the accounts of the principal were submitted to a committee appointed to examine them.

From the fact that no books of account had been kept by the principal, the auditing committee were compelled to rely upon bills, receipts and checks presented by the principal as evidences of payments made him. In consequence of this certain points arose in which there was doubt, and in all such cases the auditing committee required that the State should have the benefit of the doubt. To this the principal assented, and on this basis a settlement was effected by Mr. Johnson giving his check for the amount for which he could not clearly account.

From the testimony taken it appears that the attention of the board of trustees had been called at sundry times to disagreements existing between the principal and some of the teachers, and, in fact, with certain other parties with whom he was brought in contact.

The Board, while acknowledging the ability and devotion of Mr. Johnson to the interests of the school, and the success which had attended his administration of the important position of Principal, felt that existing circumstances, arising out of differences of views and of temperament, a lack of adaptability and of harmonizing sentiments and efforts, demanded a change. They, therefore, in February last notified Mr. Johnson, that his resignation, to take effect at the end of the term, would be accepted.

Your committee cannot fail to express their concurrence in the action of the board of trustees and the sentiments which caused it, not only in this particular matter, but in all others to which their attention has been directed.

So long as the board of trustees is constituted as it is at

present, of men of integrity and ability, earnest friends of the cause of education, always having the interests of the State at heart, your committee feel that the State can safely leave the institution in their hands, confident that its best interests will always be sought for and served.

STATE OF NEW JERSEY, EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT, TRENTON, April 19th, 1876.

To the General Assembly:

Assembly Bill, No. 177, entitled "An act for the government and regulation of the State Prison," is herewith returned without approval. By Section 2, provision is made for a board of inspectors to be chosen by the Legislature in joint meeting, and by Section 3, the appointment by the Keeper of his assistants and deputies, is to be made with the advice and consent of that board. The Keeper is a constitutional officer appointed by the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Senate, for a term of five years. The inspectors previous to the amendments were also constitutional officers, but by one of the amendments they were stricken from the Constitution. That fact is clear evidence, that the people intended that the responsible person for the custody of the prisoners should be the Keeper, and it could scarcely have been suspected at the time of the election, that he was to be made subordinate in any of the essential functions of his office to a mere statutory board.

The difficulty of this bill, however, is deeper than that, and is in my opinion, contrary to natural justice, and also to the constitution. One of the most stringent principles of the common law is that the Keeper of a Prison is responsible by indictment, for escapes resulting not only from his own voluntary acts or negligences, but for those of his deputies and assistants. The safe custody of prisoners is so important to the public, that the law exacts of the Keeper the greatest vigilance. It places the responsibility upon him and regards him as represented in his subordinates. It assumes that the

power of their selection exists in him and that he can control them. To make him liable for their conduct without that power would be gross injustice. The common law is not unjust and therefore the right of selection and responsibility for those selected go together. But what is proposed in this bill? It in no respect relaxes the legal liability of the Keeper for his assistants and deputies, but it requires of him as before, to give bond for the faithful performance of their duties, and then cripples him in the free choice of those for whose conduct he may be indicted. If the Keeper appoints those in whom he has confidence, he can be obstructed by the Inspector if so disposed, and the result may be that he must either give up his own judgment, and submit to those who have the confirming power, or go without deputies. This in effect would be a subjugation of his own will to that To leave him in the condition of responsibility sought by this bill, and then abridge his power of protecting himself is so unjust that these two features cannot stand together. Either the restraint upon his power of appointment must give way, or his individual responsibility be lessened.

But the office of Keeper being constitutional the Legislature cannot, in my judgment, take away any of its essential and inherent functions. His duties may be added to, or diminished, undoubtedly in many respects, yet there is a line where such action ends. If not so, the office is a shadow, and the position of Keeper may be reduced to that of a mere victualler. The chief duty and right of the Keeper is to have the legal custody of the convicts, and every personal official power necessary to secure it, is a part of the office. The right of appointment of deputies has always been recognized as an accompaniment of the duty of custody, and there can be no proper control without it. The fitness of things requires it, and the constitution is presumed to be based upon the recognition of an office in substance, with its fitting and necessary powers. As well might the Inspectors be authorized to take away from the Keeper the control of the keys, as to deprive him of the right freely to select those to whom he shall entrust them. The deputies are virtually the possessors of the keys, and have the bolts and bars in immediate control. Nothing but the most complete subordination of the deputies to the will of the Keeper, can protect himself and his office, and enable him to discharge his full constitutional duty.

This bill attacks the inherent nature and functions of the

office, and is, I am satisfied, unconstitutional. Under the statute, the Attorney-General has furnished to me his opinion reaching the same conclusion, and giving his reasons therefor. I annex a copy hereto, as a part of this message.

STATE OF NEW JERSEY, ATTORNEY-GENERAL'S OFFICE, TRENTON, April 17, 1876.

SIR:

You having submitted for my official opinion the question whether the Legislature, while holding the Keeper of the State Prison responsible for his deputies and assistants, has the right to deprive him of the exclusive power to select and appoint his deputies and assistants, as proposed by Assembly Bill No. 177. Article VII, Section 2, paragraph 3, of the amended constitution of this State declares that:

The Attorney-General, Prosecutor of the Pleas, Clerk of the Supreme Court, Clerk of the Court of Chancery, Secretary of State and Keeper of the State Prison, shall be nominated by the Governor and appointed by him with the advice and consent of the Senate. They shall hold their offices for five year." Prior to the recent amendments the constitution as to Keeper of the State Prison read thus: "The State Treasurer and the Keeper and Inspectors of the State Prison shall be appointed by the Senate and General Assembly in joint meeting. They shall hold their offices for one year and until their successors shall be qualified into office.

In making amendments this provision was stricken out and is no longer a part of the constitution. Inspectors of the State Prison are no longer constitutional officers. The constitution, as it now is, provides no officer for the control and government of the State Prison but the Keeper. He is made the chief and responsible officer of that establishment, by the supreme law of the land. He cannot be appointed by the Supreme law of the land. He cannot be appointed by the Senate and General Assembly in joint meeting, because the constitution says he must be nominated and appointed by the

Governor, with the advice and consent of the Senate. Nor can the essential and substantial powers and duties of the Keeper be conferred upon other officers who are to be elected by the Senate and General Assembly in joint meeting, because that would be to have the duties of the Prison Keeper performed by officers appointed by the joint meeting; it would be, in effect, to have the Keeper of the Prison appointed by the joint meeting. It would, by indirection, be an usurpation by the Legislature of a power confided by the constitution to the Governor and Senate.

The true rule, as I conceive, was stated by Chancellor Wallworth in the case of Warren vs. The People, 2 Denio, 281, viz:

"When the Legislature assumes the power to take from a constitutional officer the substance of the office itself, and to transfer it to another who is to be appointed in a different manner and to hold the office by a different tenure from that which was provided for by the constitution, it is not a legitimate exercise of the rights to regulate the duties or emoluments of the office, but an infringement upon the constitutional mode of appointment."

The third section of the bill in question requires the Keeper of the State Prison to give bond in the sum of five thousand dollars, with condition that he and his deputies and assistants shall well and faithfully perform the duties imposed on them by law. Then the second section of the bill provides "That for the supervision and control of the State Prison, as hereinafter provided, there shall be a board of five inspectors."

Next, the fourth section provides that the inspectors "shall have power to make such rules and regulations for the general government of the State Prison, and matters relating thereto as they may deem necessary and proper, consistent with the principles of separate confinement, the laws of this state and the independent powers specially given to their offices. * * * and all officers and persons connected with the prison shall conform to and obey the same."

It also provides that the "Keeper of said Prison shall receive from the hands of the sheriff, or proper officer every person convicted under the laws of this State, and sentenced to imprisonment and hard labor for any term not less than six months and safely keep him in his said prison according to the

laws of this State, and the rules and regulations of the prison, until he is discharged according to law, and he is placed under like obligations with regard to prisoners committed under the authority of the United States."

With regard to the appointment of deputy keepers and assistants the bill makes this provision: "And said keeper, shall have power to "appoint, with the advice and consent of the Board of Inspectors, such assistants and deputies as may be necessary and proper to enable him to execute the duties of his office. These provisions seem, if valid, to strip the keeper of all actual power and to reduce him to the position of a mere servant of the Inspectors. They may make such rules and regulations for the general government of the Prison and the matters relating thereto, as they may deem necessary and proper and 'officers,' (including the Keeper) connected with the prison, must conform to and obey the same. The Keeper is required to receive all prisoners sent to the prison according to law, and is made responsible for their safe keeping, and he is made responsible for and required to give security that the deputies and assistants will faithfully perform their several duties, but he is not permitted to appoint one of them without the advice and consent of the Inspectors. The substance of the constitutional powers and duties of the Keeper of the prison are to safely keep the prisoners delivered him during the periods for which they are, respec-tively sentenced, and to govern the institution of which he is the chief executive officer according to law, that by necessary implication, vests in the Keeper all the powers reasonably necessary to attain those two main objects, and, being in him, can not be placed elsewhere by the Legislature. But it is physically impossible for him to keep and care for the numerous prisoners, without the aid of deputies and assisttants, and the most substantial part of his office is to appoint those deputies and assistants, and when he is deprived of that power he is deprived of the substance of the office itself—of that without which the duties of the office cannot be performed.

If the Legislature were to enact that the Inspectors should be the custodians of the keys of the Prison, and that the Keeper could have access to the prison only with the "advice and consent of the Inspectors," it would, as to the Keeper, be a patent deprivation of his power and right, and it would be an equally clear transfer of his constitutional rights and powers to the Inspectors, and too palpably unconstitutional to admit of serious debate, and yet it is not more clearly unconstitutional than is the proposal to deprive him of the power of the power of appointing his deputies and assistants.

Originally from 1798 to 1838—the Keeper of the State Prison was appointed by the Board of Inspectors, and that Board was appointed by the Legislature in joint meeting. The Board of Inspectors during that time, could remove the Keeper whenever they deemed proper so to do, and the Keeper, with the approbation of the Inspectors, could appoint a deputy and a suitable number of assistants. During all that time the Keeper was the mere creature and servant of the Board of Inspectors, and if the present act becomes a law and is permitted to take effect, it will place the Keeper in the same dependent and helpless condition he was in from 1798 to 1838.

But by the act for the government and regulation of the State Prison, passed February 27, 1838, (Elmer's Digest 392,) 95, the Keeper of the State Prison was made elective by the Legislature in joint meeting and he was given the power "to appoint as many assistants and deputies as the Inspectors should deem necessary to properly enable him to execute the duties of his office."

The Inspectors might limit the number of deputies and assistants to the actual needs of the prison, but they were allowed no voice, or choice, or veto power as to the Keeper's appointments. Such has been the Keeper's right and power ever since—a period of thirty-eight years. In 1844 the Inspectors and Prison Keeper were both made constitutional officers, to be filled by the Legislature in joint meeting.

In 1875, by the constitutional amendments then adopted, the office of the Inspector of the State Prison was expunged from the constitution, and, as hereinbefore shown, the Keeper was made the sole constitutional officer of the State Prison. It is, therefore, not constitutionally possible for the Legislature to make the Inspectors the masters, and the Keeper their subordinate and servant as was the case from February 15, 1798 to Feb. 1838.

If the act I am now considering goes into effect the Board of Inspectors will exercise the highest and most extensive powers of any officers connected with the State Prison. No Keeper can be employed there without their advice and consent, and their rules are to be binding upon and implicitly

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obeyed by the Principal Keeper and all others in or about the establishment. That board will be the real Keeper of the Prison—all others their subordinates and servants, and yet a majority of that board is to be appointed by the Senate and General Assembly in joint meeting. It makes the statutory office paramount to the constitutional one. That cannot be. But by the late amendments to the constitution the people clearly manifested their will, to be that the office of Keeper of the State Prison should be paramount and subordinate to the inspectors of that institution.

The nature of the duties of the office, and the law as it now is, make the Keeper responsible for the official conduct of the deputies, assistants and servants in the Prison. The law in question proposes to continue that responsibility. It is not only proper but necessary that he should be subject to that responsibility. It is a personal responsibility and because it is so, reason and justice require that he should have the sole and free choice of his deputies and assistants. It is contrary to every principle of reason and natural justice to make the Keeper responsible for the conduct of any agents except such as 'he selects and appoints. The common law holds the sheriff responsible for the official conduct of his deputies and his jailors, but, at the same time, it allows to him the right to select and appoint his own deputies and jailors, of his own free choice, without the advice or consent of any other officer. Such a right is a necessary accompaniment of such responsibility, and any other rule is contrary to the fundamental principles of justice.

Doubtless the legislature may prescribe rules and regulations for the government of the State Prison, and it may appoint inspectors to see that the Keeper obeys and faithfully performs those rules and regulations, and all the laws of the state relative to his office, but I cannot perceive any power in the legislature to authorize officers of its own appointment to to make rules and regulations for the government and control of a constitutional officer, and because the act in question does, that it seems to me to be in excess of the power of that department of the government.

For the reasons and in the particulars hereinbefore men-

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tioned I am of the opinion that the act in question is contrary to and in violation of the Constitution.

To the press I am grateful for the fair consideration which its representatives have invariably awarded my official action, and the gentlemanly courtesy they have ever extended to me personally. I am well aware that I have not at all times come up to the full standard attained by my predecessors in the chair, yet I have never knowingly failed in my duty. I am therefore all the more obliged to these gentlemen who have faithfully and conscientiously given publicity day by day to the proceedings of the Legislature for their leniency in dealing with my shortcomings.

I have ever found them to be the faithful exponents of this body, and desire to add my personal tribute to their worth.
