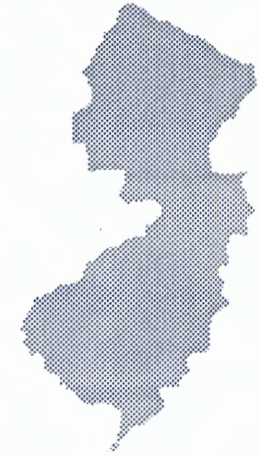

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PREFACE

The 1990-91 edition of Vital Education Statistics is the seventeenth in a series which began in 1974-75. It marks the fourteenth year of a revised series using data derived from updated survey instruments supported by detailed and illustrated instructions. This year the data is being reported in a single volume divided into four sections rather than the two volume format that had been followed over the past decade.

As in the previous editions, each section contains narrative and tabular data to accommodate both reader and user preferences. A glossary of data terms and copies of the instruments used to collect the data are provided in the appendix at the end of the publication.

Section I contains school district and school organization data; Section II reports student enrollments, dropouts and follow-up of graduate data; Section III contains certificated staff data including assignment, degree, age, experience and mobility; and Section IV reports non-certificated support staff data by position classification, sex and racial origin.

The data published in the Vital Education Statistics series are descriptive and were designed to establish a core data base to aid in reporting on the condition of education in New Jersey. County data analysts collected the instruments from the school districts and transmitted them to the State Department of Education. It is hoped that these data, when joined with other department data, will lead to insights from which policy can be developed.

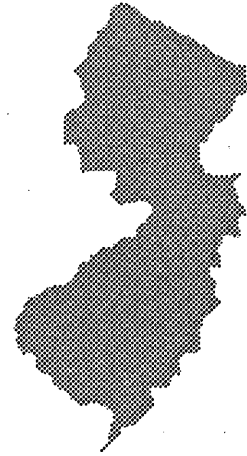
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INTRODUCTION

INTRODUCTION

This introduction presents selected trend data characteristics of public elementary and secondary education in New Jersey between 1986-87 and 1990-91. The data show the status of schools, students and staff in the public elementary and secondary education system over the past five years.

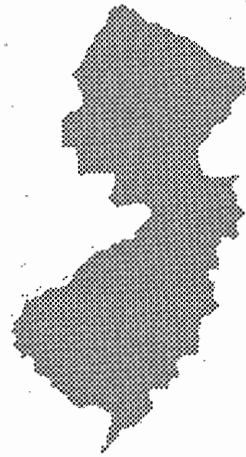
INTRODUCTION (CONT.)

SYNOPSIS OF TRENDS

1986-87 TO 1990-91

- * Statewide, enrollments in the period between 1986-87 and 1990-91 decreased by 1.6 percent or an average of 0.32 percent per year. Elementary school enrollments increased by 5.8 percent. This marks the fourth consecutive time in the 17 years of Vital Education Statistics publications that an increase is reported for elementary school enrollments. Secondary school enrollments decreased by 15.6 percent over this period for an average of 3.1 percent per year.
- * The number of schools increased by 21 or nine-tenths of one percent of the total reported in 1986-87. Schools for the handicapped increased by 8. Secondary schools decreased by 16 or 4.1 percent of those operating in 1986-87. Elementary schools increased by 29 or 1.6 percent of those operating five years ago.
- * The total number of dropouts decreased by 22.8 percent between 1986-87 and 1990-91. The number of dropouts classified as "minority" increased by 6.2 percent.
- * Although the number of public high school graduates decreased by 11.4 percent between 1986 and 1990, the percent of those "continuing education" increased by 6.9 percent. The percent of 1990 graduates continuing their education was 73.7 percent.
- * An increase of 3,668 in the number of certificated staff employed was reported between 1986-87 and 1990-91. This was a 3.8 percent increase over the 96,348 certificated staff reported in 1986-87.

- * Classroom teachers make up 79.9 percent of the total full-time certificated staff, with educational support services personnel accounting for 11.4 percent and administrators/supervisors 8.7 percent. Since 1986-87, the percentage of administrators/supervisors increased by nine-tenths of one percent from 7.8 percent to 8.7 percent and educational support services personnel decreased by 2.4 percent from 13.8 percent to 11.4 percent.
- * More minorities were employed in full-time certificated staff positions. Minorities increased from 12.1 percent of the full-time administrators/supervisors certificated staff in 1986 to 12.7 percent in 1990. Likewise, certificated minority classroom teacher increased from 11.1 percent in 1986 to 12.2 percent in 1990 and minority educational support services personnel increased from 11.9 percent to 12.2 percent over the same period.
- * The trend from 1986-87 to 1990-91 shows a decrease in male and an increase in female full-time certificated staff. In 1986-87, males accounted for 34.1 percent and females 65.9 percent of the total full-time certificated staff. In 1990-91, males represented less than one-third (31.3 percent) of the total full-time certificated staff and females accounted for more than two-thirds (68.7 percent).

DISTRICT AND SCHOOL INFORMATION

TABLE I: OPERATING AND NON-OPERATING NEW JERSEY PUBLIC SCHOOL DISTRICTS BY COUNTY. For the fourth time since 1983-84, there was a change in the status of the number of school districts operating or non-operating. The number of operating districts increased from 590 to 592 as the numbers in Salem and Warren counties each increased by one. The number of non-operating districts increased from 26 to 27 with the addition of one in Warren County. The increase from 616 to 619 districts affected the status in only two counties, as Salem increased from 14 to 15 and Warren from 25 to 27.

TABLE II: UNIVERSE OF LOCAL, COUNTY AND STATE OPERATING EDUCATIONAL AGENCIES. This table was first published in the 1981-82 Vital Educational Statistics and showed 601 operating administrative units in the state. Between 1981-82 and 1984-85, there was a reduction in the number of Type I units from 53 to 52, the number of Type II units decreased by three to 527, the county units decreased by 1 and state units increased by 10. In 1985-86, there was a decrease of 9 operating administrative units from 606 in 1984-85 to 597 in 1985-86. In 1990-91, the number of County Special Services increased by 2.

Thus, of the 597 operating units in 1990-91, 575 are local school districts, 17 are county units and 5 are state operated units.

TABLE III: NEW JERSEY PUBLIC SCHOOL DISTRICTS BY COUNTY AND SIZE OF ENROLLMENT. This table was introduced in the 1982-83 edition and there have been no significant changes in the size of districts over the period. Three hundred and eleven or 52.5 percent of the 592 operating districts enroll between 0 and 999 students. One hundred and eighty-seven or 31.6 percent of the total operating districts enroll between 1,000 and 2,999 students. The remaining 94 or 15.9 percent had enrollments which ranged from 3,000 to the high of 48,433 students.

TABLE IV: NEW JERSEY PUBLIC SCHOOLS BY COUNTY AND TYPE OF SCHOOL. This table displays the type of schools which compose the state's public elementary/secondary educational system. Column 12 reports a total of 2,272 public schools which is an increase of 8 from the 2,264 reported in 1989-90. Of this total number of public schools, 1,884 are elementary and 388 are secondary. In comparison with 1989-90, increases were reported in the number of elementary schools (3), middle schools (9), four-year high schools (1), and elementary handicapped schools (6). Declines in school types were as follows: six in approved junior high schools (21 to 15); one in three-year high schools (12 to 11); two in other high schools (20 to 18); and two in secondary handicapped schools (20 to 18).

A comparison of the total number of schools by county between 1989-90 and 1990-91 shows that increases occurred in eight counties. Counties showing increases were: Camden (1), Gloucester (2), Mercer (1), Monmouth (2), Ocean (1), Passaic (1), Somerset (1) and Union (1). Counties showing decreases were: Salem (1) and Sussex (1). There were no changes in Atlantic, Bergen, Burlington, Cape May, Cumberland, Essex, Hudson, Hunterdon, Middlesex, Morris, and Warren.

Of the 388 public secondary schools in New Jersey, 41.8 percent or 162 schools had enrollments between 500 and 999 students; 24.0 percent or 93 schools had enrollments between 1,000 and 1,499; and 9.5 percent or 37 secondary schools had enrollments which ranged from 1,500 to a high of 4,161 students. Thus, 24.7 percent or 96 of the secondary schools in New Jersey enrolled fewer than 500 students.

Of the 1,884 public elementary schools in New Jersey, 1,372 or 72.9 percent had enrollments between 0 and 499, and 468 or 24.8 percent had enrollments between 500 and 999. Thus, 44 or 2.3 percent of the elementary schools had enrollments which ranged from 1,000 to a high of 1,413 students.

TABLE V: SPECIAL SELECT PROGRAMS WITH ENROLLMENTS BY COUNTY. This table reports on programs that the schools of New Jersey have established to meet the identified needs of their students and the numbers being served. The following table compares the students reported enrolled in 1989-90 with the numbers reported enrolled in 1990-91 by showing increasing, no change, and decreasing program enrollments.

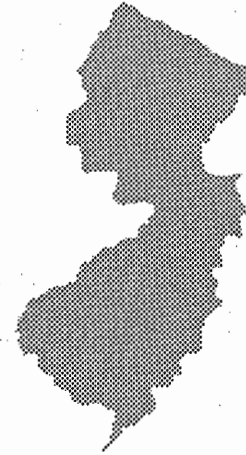

SECTION TWO

STUDENT INFORMATION

STUDENT INFORMATION

This section contains information on student enrollments, dropouts and high school graduates. Of the 11 tables, five contain enrollment data, three carry dropout data, and three contain high school graduate follow-up information. All of the data reported are as of October 15, 1990. These data are used to prepare enrollment projections and to develop lists of schools that have high concentrations of low income pupils. In addition, the data are supplied to the National Center for Education Statistics and are made available to the public upon request.

ENROLLMENTS

TABLE VI: STUDENT ENROLLMENTS IN NEW JERSEY PUBLIC SCHOOL DISTRICTS BY COUNTY AND GRADE. This is a membership table, i.e., pupils enrolled during the last day of school prior to October 16, 1990. As of October 15, 1990, 1,089,646 public school students were enrolled. The data are reported for day school students and were compiled from individual school reports submitted by each district. The special education pupils shown in Column 17 are students enrolled in self-contained classes. "Mainstreamed" special education students are reported with the regular students at their respective grade levels.

Enrollment increases were in the Pre-k, kindergarten, grades 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, and self-contained special education categories. Between kindergarten and grade 3, 7,512 more students were enrolled than in 1989-90. Although enrollment decreases are shown for grades 9, 10, 11 and 12, there was an overall increase of 3,383 students in the total enrollment of Grades 4 through 12. This was the first increase in this grade group in a decade. Self-contained special education enrollments increased by 2,546 students.

Compared with 1989-90, there was an overall increase of 13,614 students. As projected from the trend of the declining enrollment rates through the 1980s, the 20-year declining enrollment trend was reversed. The 13,614 student increase in the total enrollment is a 1.26 percent increase that marks the beginning of an increasing enrollment trend. This trend is projected to continue through the 1990s.

TABLE VII: ELEMENTARY SCHOOL ENROLLMENTS IN NEW JERSEY PUBLIC SCHOOL DISTRICTS BY COUNTY AND GRADE. This is the first of two tables separating students into elementary and secondary school categories. Note that seventh and eighth grade students appear in both elementary and secondary counts, depending upon the type of school in which they were enrolled. On October 15, 1990, 765,165 elementary students were on roll, 21,156 more than were reported in September 1989. Twenty counties showed increases which ranged from a high of 11.0 percent to a low of 1.2 percent. Nine counties showed enrollment increases of 1,000 or more students: Gloucester (2,627), Mercer (2,408), Camden (2,140), Middlesex (1,884), Bergen (1,669), Hudson (1,480), Atlantic (1,159) Passaic (1,083) and Monmouth (1,068).

TABLE VIII: SECONDARY SCHOOL ENROLLMENTS IN NEW JERSEY PUBLIC SCHOOL DISTRICTS BY COUNTY AND GRADE. In 1990, 324,481 secondary school students were on roll in grades seven through twelve. This was 7,515 fewer students than were reported in 1989. There were five counties in the state with a secondary enrollment higher than was reported in 1989. The counties were: Hudson (200), Essex (199), Atlantic (160), Middlesex (155) and Cape May (119).

Seven counties showed decreases of greater than 450 students: Burlington (468), Monmouth (473), Cumberland (494), Camden (642), Morris (735), Mercer (1,923) and Gloucester (2,023). In the remaining nine counties, the declines ranged from a high of 322 to a low of 59. Overall, 18 counties showed increases in their total enrollments from 1989-90 to 1990-91 with the range of the high at 2,039 and the low at 7. The three counties with decreasing enrollments were: Morris (269), Cumberland (260) and Salem (218).

TABLE IX: PUBLIC SCHOOL STUDENTS ENROLLED BY COUNTY AND RACIAL/ETHNIC ORIGIN. The total enrollment by county is shown in the five prescribed federal racial/ethnic categories. Of the total number of students, 34.8 percent were reported as "minority"--an increase of 0.9 percent over 1989. In comparison with 1989, there was a decrease of 737 or 0.1 percent in the white enrollment, an increase of 1.4 percent or 2,876 students in the black enrollment, an increase of 7,763 students or 6.5 percent in the Hispanic enrollment, an increase of 54 students in the American Indian/Alaskan native enrollment, and an increase of 3,685 students or 8.3 percent in the Asian/Pacific Islander enrollment.

Eight counties exceeded the state average of 34.8 percent minority: Hudson, 72.4 percent; Essex, 68.5 percent; Passaic, 52.3 percent; Union 47.8 percent; Cumberland, 44.8 percent; Mercer, 40.2 percent; Atlantic, 39.7 percent; and Camden, 37.4 percent.

TABLE X: PUBLIC SCHOOL ENROLLMENT BY GRADE, RACE AND SEX. This table appears for the second time in Vital Education Statistics because of the large number of requests received for these data. Because it is only the second appearance, there are no comparisons that can be cited from prior years of publication.

DROPOUTS

The three tables in the "Dropout" series were developed using the data reported by the public elementary and secondary schools on the students who discontinued school before completing the prescribed course of study during the 1989-90 school year.

Of the 13,894 reported students leaving school, 12,826 or 92.3 percent were known to have discontinued school and 1,068 or 7.7 percent had moved to a new residence and the school status was unknown. When compared with the 15,257 reported known dropouts in 1988-89, the 12,826 is a decrease of 15.9 percent or 2,425 students. There was an increase from 1,016 to 1,068 between 1988-89 and 1989-90 in the new residence school status unknown category.

TABLE XI: PUBLIC SCHOOL STUDENT DROPOUTS BY COUNTY AND REASON. The table reports the known and unknown reasons for dropouts by county. The reason categories reported are in conformity with Handbook V, Student and Pupil Accounting of the National Center for Education Statistics. The categories consolidate approximately 20 detailed explanations of reasons for discontinuing school. The detailed explanations of the categories may be found in the glossary at the end of the report.

Two major categories account for nearly two-thirds (65.3 percent) of the total dropouts. There were 6,458 or 46.3 percent "Dissatisfied With School/ Behavioral/Academic Difficulty" and 2,641 or 19.0 percent due to "Economics/Entered Employment".

TABLE XII: PUBLIC SCHOOL STUDENT DROPOUTS BY COUNTY, GRADE AND SEX. The basic categories of grade and sex are reported in this table. Slightly less than half (48.5 percent) of the total reported dropouts were in grades 10 and 11. This percent is increased to 87.2 percent when grades twelve (18.1 percent) and nine (20.6 percent) are added. The remaining 12.8 percent are distributed over special education (7.9 percent), grades seven and eight (3.2 percent) and Pre-k thru six and ungraded (1.7 percent).

In comparison with 1988-89, the dropouts as percentages of grade enrollments decreased by 0.6 percent from 4.3 percent to 3.7 percent in the ninth grade, by 0.5 percent from 5.2 percent to 4.7 percent in the tenth grade, by 0.3 from 5.0 percent to 4.7 percent in the eleventh grade, and by 0.4 from 4.0 percent to 3.6 percent in the twelfth grade. Special education dropouts decreased by 0.4 percent from 2.3 percent to 1.9 percent.

The ninth grade class entering high school in 1985-86 and graduating in June 1989 had a dropout percentage of 16.7 percent. This rate was calculated by adding the 1985-86 ninth-grade dropouts (3,722), the 1986-87 tenth-grade dropouts (4,698), the 1987-88 eleventh-grade dropouts (4,501) and the 1988-89 twelfth-grade dropouts (3,083) and dividing by the 1985-86 ninth-grade enrollment (95,861). The ninth-grade class entering high school in 1986-87 had a dropout percentage of 16.9 percent. (4,016 + 4,538 + 3,794 + 2,514 divided by 87,477 = 16.9 percent.)

The ratio between the sexes shows little change. Males discontinuing school were 57.5 percent of the total dropouts, a decrease of 1.4 percent from the 58.9 percent reported for 1988-89. The percentage of females discontinuing school increased from 41.1 percent in 1988-89 to 42.5 percent in 1989-90.

TABLE XIII: PUBLIC SCHOOL STUDENT DROPOUTS BY COUNTY AND RACIAL/ETHNIC ORIGIN. The state's public school dropouts are reported by racial/ethnic origin. In comparison with the 1988-89 school year racial/ethnic percentages of the total reported dropouts, the percentage of white dropouts decreased by 1.0 percent, black dropouts increased by 0.8 percent, Hispanic dropouts decreased by 0.1 percent, and American Indian/Alaskan native, Asian and Pacific islander categories were without change.

GRADUATES

The three tables in "The Follow-Up of Graduates" series were developed with data reported by the public high schools from their studies conducted in the fall of 1990 of the 1989-90 graduates. The 69,824 graduates in 1989-90 was a decrease of 8.4 percent or 6,439 from the 76,263 reported in 1988-89. Of the 70,438 twelfth graders enrolled on September 30, 1989, 99.1 percent graduated. In comparison over the past five years, this percentage ranks as the highest in the period.

When the graduates are taken as a percentage of the ninth graders reported enrolled in the public secondary schools in September four years earlier, the graduation rate is 79.8 percent. This percentage is the second highest in the past decade following the 80.4 percent in 1987-88 and equal to the 79.8 percent in 1983-84.

TABLE XIV: FOLLOW-UP OF 1990 PUBLIC HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATES BY COUNTY AND STATUS. The status of the 1989-90 graduates in the fall of 1990 is reported. Of the total graduates, 73.7 percent or 51,482 had elected to continue their education. This continues the upward trend of percentage of graduates continuing their education which began with the 61.9 percent reported in 1979-80. A similar trend is evident in the enrollment of graduates in a college or university where the percentage has increased annually from 53.6 percent in 1979-80 to 61.2 percent in 1986-87 to 65.1 percent in 1988-89 to 67.7 percent in 1989-90. On the other hand, the percentage of graduates continuing in other education in this period has been declining. The 6.1 percent reported for 1988-89 was a decrease of 0.3 percent from the 6.4 percent reported in 1987-88 and the 6.0 percent reported for 1989-90 is a decline of 0.1 percent. The percentage of graduates employed also continued in decline from 28.3 percent in 1979-80 to 20.6 percent in 1988-89 to 18.4 in 1989-90.

TABLE XV: FOLLOW-UP OF 1990 PUBLIC HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATES BY COUNTY AND RACIAL/ETHNIC ORIGIN. The racial/ethnic distribution of the public high school graduates is shown. Of the 69,824 graduates, 26.1 percent or 18,196 were minorities. This was an increase of 2.0 percent over the 24.1 percent reported in 1988-89. Eight counties in 1989-90 exceeded the statewide average of 24.1 percent minority graduates. They were: Hudson, 63.1 percent; Essex, 53.9 percent; Union, 39.4 percent; Passaic, 37.9 percent; Cumberland, 36.7 percent; Mercer, 30.2 percent; Atlantic, 29.7 percent and Camden, 26.3 percent.

Districts reported that of the minority graduates, 14.3 percent were black, 7.7 percent were Hispanic and 4.0 percent were American Indian/Alaskan native and Asian/Pacific islanders.

TABLE XVI: FOLLOW-UP OF 1990 PUBLIC HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATES AT COLLEGES OR UNIVERSITIES BY COUNTY AND RACIAL/ETHNIC ORIGIN. This table shows the public high school graduates who enrolled in colleges or universities by racial/ethnic origin. Of the 47,305 graduates enrolling in colleges or universities, 36,545 (77.3 percent) were white, 5,453 (11.5 percent) were black, 2,813 (5.9 percent) were Hispanic, 2,461 (5.2 percent) were Asian or Pacific Islander, and 33 (0.1 percent) were American Indian/Alaskan Native.

Of the graduates attending colleges and universities, the percentage attending in-state increased from 56.6 percent in 1988-89 to 58.7 percent in 1989-90. Graduates attending out-of-state colleges decreased from 43.4 percent in 1988-89 to 41.3 percent in 1989-90.

SECTION THREE

CERTIFICATED STAFF INFORMATION

CERTIFICATED STAFF INFORMATION

This section contains 20 tables which show the status of the certificated staff employed full and part-time in New Jersey. For this report, the certificated staff is divided into three categories that define the major assignments or positions in education. The categories are: administrators/supervisors, classroom teachers, and educational support services personnel. The tables report the staff in these categories by location of assignment (system-wide or central office, elementary and secondary), sex, racial/ethnicity, age, experience, level of academic preparation, and mobility (entering and leaving).

TABLE XVII: FULL-TIME AND PART-TIME CERTIFICATED STAFF EMPLOYED IN THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS OF NEW JERSEY BY COUNTY AND MAJOR ASSIGNMENT CATEGORY. This is the basic table in this series. On October 15, 1990, 100,016 full-time certificated staff members were employed in New Jersey public schools. This was 581 more than were reported on September 29, 1989. Between 1989 and 1990, the number of administrators and supervisors increased by 62, the number of classroom teachers increased by 289 and the number of educational support service personnel increased by 230.

The number of part-time certificated staff increased by 94 from 3,894 in 1989 to 3,988 in 1990. Of the part-time certificated staff, 67.8 percent or 2,704 were classroom teachers, 31.2 percent or 1,246 were educational support service personnel and 38 or 1.0 percent were administrators/supervisors.

TABLE XVIII: FULL-TIME AND PART-TIME CERTIFICATED STAFF ASSIGNED SYSTEM-WIDE BY COUNTY AND MAJOR ASSIGNMENT CATEGORY. Certificated staff in this category refers to those individuals who are employed in the district central office and/or are itinerant with assignments that cover two or more schools. Of the 100,016 full-time certificated staff, 11,252 or 11.3 percent were reported in system-wide positions and of these positions, the highest percentage, 38.9 percent or 4,375, were in the classroom teacher category. The second highest percentage, 35.0 percent or 3,936 were reported in the category educational support services personnel and the remaining 26.1 percent or 2,941 were administrators/supervisors.

Of the 998 part-time certificated staff in system wide positions, 46.6 percent or 445 were in classroom teacher positions and 53.7 percent or 536 were support services personnel with the remainder, 1.7 percent, in administration/supervision.

TABLE XIX: FULL-TIME AND PART-TIME CERTIFICATED STAFF ASSIGNED TO ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS BY COUNTY AND MAJOR ASSIGNMENT CATEGORY. This table shows that 56.4 percent or 56,373 of the total 100,016 full-time certificated staff and 59.3 percent or 2,363 of the total 3,988 part-time certificated staff are assigned to the elementary schools. The 2,768 full-time administrators/supervisors reported in elementary school positions represent 31.8 percent of the total 8,706 administrators/supervisors; of the 79,886 reported classroom teachers, 61.8 percent or 49,402 were elementary teachers; and 36.8 percent or 4,203 of the 11,424 full-time certificated educational support services personnel worked in elementary schools.

Of the total full-time certificated elementary staff, 4.9 percent are administrators/supervisors, 87.6 percent are classroom teachers and 7.5 percent are educational support services personnel.

The total number of full-time certificated elementary staff increased for the seventh year. From 1989 to 1990 there was an overall increase of 1,489 in the total staff. The largest increase, 1,118, occurred in the classroom teacher category and was followed by an increase of 307 in the educational support services personnel category. The number of staff in the administration/supervisory category increased by 64 from 2,704 in 1989 to 2,768 in 1990. Part-time elementary certificated staff increased from 2,258 in 1989 to 2,363 in 1990.

TABLE XX: FULL-TIME AND PART-TIME CERTIFICATED STAFF ASSIGNED TO SECONDARY SCHOOLS BY COUNTY AND MAJOR ASSIGNMENT CATEGORY. This table shows that 32.4 percent or 32,391 of the total full-time certificated staff and 15.7 percent or 627 of the total part-time certificated staff are employed in the secondary schools. Of the 32,391 full-time certificated staff, 9.3 percent or 2,997 were administrators/supervisors. The 26,109 classroom teachers represent 80.6 percent of the full-time certificated secondary staff and the 3,285 educational support services personnel represent 10.1 percent. The 26,109 classroom teachers were a decrease of 854 from the 26,963 reported in 1989 and the 3,285 educational support services personnel were a decrease of 38 from the 3,323 reported in 1989.

The number of part-time certificated staff in secondary schools decreased in administrators/supervisors and classroom teacher positions.

Classroom teachers decreased by 31 from 568 to 537 in 1990; and administrators/supervisors decreased by one, from seven in 1989 to six in 1990.

TABLE XXI: FULL-TIME ADMINISTRATORS AND SUPERVISORS EMPLOYED IN THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS OF NEW JERSEY BY COUNTY, SEX AND DEGREE. This is the first of three tables which show the sex and academic degree of the full-time certificated staff in the public schools by major position assignment.

Approximately 68.5 percent or 5,965 of the administrators/supervisors are male and 31.5 percent or 2,741 are female. Between 1986-87 and 1990-91 the number of female administrators/supervisors increased from 1,791 to 2,741, an increase of 950 or 53.0 percent. The number of males in administrator and supervisor positions in this period increased by 253 from 5,712 to 5,965.

The degree status of administrators and supervisors improved between 1986-87 and 1989-90. The number of no degrees reported in 1986-87 was 23 while in 1990-91 it was 15, a decrease of 8 or 34.8 percent. Administrators and supervisors holding bachelor's degrees increased by 94; from 269 in 1986-87 to 363 in 1990-91 and the number holding the master's degree increased from 6,317 to 7,276. There was an increase of 18.3 percent from 854 to 1,010 in the number holding the doctorate degree in the five-year period.

TABLE XXII: FULL-TIME CLASSROOM TEACHERS EMPLOYED IN THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS OF NEW JERSEY BY COUNTY, SEX AND DEGREE. This table shows the status of classroom teachers and follows a trend similar to that reported for administrators and supervisors. In this category, 71.5 percent or 57,156 of the 79,886 reported full-time classroom

teachers are female and 28.5 percent are male. Between 1986-87 and 1990-91, male classroom teachers decreased by 1,161 and female classroom teachers increased by 5,489. Thus the percentage of females in this period increased from 68.4 percent of the total in 1986 to 71.5 percent in 1990 and the percentage of males decreased from 31.6 percent to 28.5 percent. When the sex composition of the total 1990-91 full-time certificated staff reported is compared with 1986, the male classroom teacher's category shows a decrease. In 1986, male classroom teachers represented 24.8 percent of the total 96,348 reported full-time certificated staff. In 1990, male classroom teachers represented 22.7 percent of the total 100,016 full-time certificated staff.

The degree status of classroom teachers was relatively unchanged between 1986-87 and 1990-91. The percentage of full-time certificated classroom teachers holding bachelor's degrees in 1986-87 was 62.8 percent and 62.5 percent in 1990-91. The percentages holding the master's degrees were 35.5 percent in 1986 and 36.1 percent in 1990 and the percentages with doctorates were 0.6 percent in 1986 and 0.6 percent in 1990.

TABLE XXIII: FULL-TIME EDUCATIONAL SUPPORT SERVICES PERSONNEL EMPLOYED IN THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS OF NEW JERSEY BY COUNTY, SEX AND DEGREE. This table shows the status of the full-time certificated educational support services personnel.

Of the 11,424 reported educational support services personnel, 8,817 or 77.2 percent are female and 22.8 percent male. The percentage of males decreased 1.8 percent from 24.6 percent of the educational support services personnel in 1986 to the 22.8 percent in 1990.

The degree status of the full-time certificated educational support services personnel shows decreases in the percentages of none and bachelors degrees. There was a decrease of 0.7 percent from the 1.5 percent no degrees reported in 1986 to 0.8 percent in 1990. The percentage of full-time certificated educational support services personnel holding bachelor's degrees decreased from 34.4 percent in 1986 to 27.0 percent in 1990. The percentage holding master's degrees increased from 60.7 percent in 1986 to 68.4 percent in 1990 and the number holding doctorates increased from 2.9 percent in 1986 to 3.1 percent in 1990.

TABLE XXIV: FULL-TIME ADMINISTRATORS AND SUPERVISORS EMPLOYED IN THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS OF NEW JERSEY BY COUNTY AND RACIAL/ETHNIC ORIGIN. This is the first of three tables showing the racial/ethnic distribution of full-time certificated staff. Of the administrators and supervisors serving full-time, 7,601 (87.3 percent) were white, 926 (10.6 percent) were black and 157 (1.8 percent) were Hispanic. The number of minority staff members in administrator/supervisor positions continued to increase with the number of black administrators/supervisors increasing from 736 in 1986 to 926 in 1990 and Hispanic from 89 in 1986 to 157 in 1990.

TABLE XXV: FULL-TIME CLASSROOM TEACHERS EMPLOYED IN THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS OF NEW JERSEY BY COUNTY AND RACIAL/ETHNIC ORIGIN. Of the 79,886 reported classroom teachers, 70,204 (87.9 percent) were white; 7,631 (9.6 percent) were black; 1,676 (2.1 percent) were Hispanic; and 375 (0.4 percent) were American Indian/Alaskan Native, Asian or Pacific Islander. Between 1986-87 and 1990-91, the percentages of white, black, Hispanic, American Indian/Alaskan Native and Asian/Pacific Islander in the teaching staff showed relatively minor changes.

TABLE XXVI: FULL-TIME EDUCATIONAL SUPPORT SERVICES PERSONNEL EMPLOYED IN THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS OF NEW JERSEY BY COUNTY AND RACIAL/ETHNIC ORIGIN. Of the 11,424 reported educational support services staff, 10,040 (87.9 percent) were white; 1,148 (10.0 percent) were black; 189 (1.7 percent) were Hispanic; and 47 (0.4 percent) were American Indian/Alaskan Native or Pacific Islander. Between 1986-87 and 1990-91, there was a decrease in the percentage of white, an increase in the percentage black, and no change in Hispanic and American Indian/Alaskan Native or Asian/Pacific Islander students.

TABLE XXVII: FULL-TIME ADMINISTRATORS AND SUPERVISORS EMPLOYED IN THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS OF NEW JERSEY BY COUNTY AND AGE DISTRIBUTION. This is the first of three tables showing the distribution of the full-time certificated staff by position and age. The administrators/supervisors 48.8 years median age in 1990-91 is the highest of the three reported classifications and is an increase of 0.2 years over the median age of 48.6 that was reported in 1986. Of the 8,706 administrators/supervisors, 67.7 percent or 5,896 are between the ages of 42 and 57 years and 16.9 percent or 1,470 are younger than 42-years-old.

TABLE XXVIII: FULL-TIME CLASSROOM TEACHERS EMPLOYED IN THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS OF NEW JERSEY BY COUNTY AND AGE DISTRIBUTION. As the administrators and supervisors group represented the oldest of the three position assignments, the classroom teachers represent the youngest with a median age of 43.8 years. Of the 79,886 full-time certificated classroom teachers, 48,518 or 60.7 percent are between the ages of 34 and 49 years. There are 6,354 or 8.0 percent who are 58 years and over. The classroom teachers median age increased by 4.2 years from the 1986 median of 39.6 to 43.8 years in 1990.

TABLE XXIX: FULL-TIME EDUCATIONAL SUPPORT SERVICES PERSONNEL EMPLOYED IN THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS OF NEW JERSEY BY COUNTY AND AGE DISTRIBUTION. The median age of the full-time certificated educational support services personnel was 46.9 years. In this category of 11,424 full-time certificated staff, 3,372 or 29.5 percent are between 18 and 41 years of age and 6,328 or 55.4 percent are between the ages of 42 and 57. Educational support services personnel median age increased by 1.7 years from 1986 when the median age was 45.2 years.

When the total age distribution data are viewed, Bergen, Morris and Union counties have the oldest staffs in terms of median years and the youngest staffs would appear to be in Cape May, Gloucester and Warren counties.

TABLE XXX: FULL-TIME ADMINISTRATORS AND SUPERVISORS EMPLOYED IN THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS OF NEW JERSEY BY COUNTY AND TOTAL YEARS OF EXPERIENCE IN EDUCATION. This is the first of three tables which show the distribution of the full-time certificated staff by position and total years of educational experience.

The increasing degree status and median age for the administrators/supervisors full-time certificated staff is reflected in years of experience.

The median year of experience in education for the administrators/supervisors in 1990 was 23.7 years--an increase of 0.8 years from the median of 22.9 years in 1986. Of the 8,706 full-time certificated staff in this category 5,811 or 66.7 percent fell between the range of 15 and 29 years of educational experience. Of the total administrators/supervisors, 304 or 3.5 percent had fewer than 10 years of experience.

The administrators/supervisors category has the highest median age, the highest percentage of higher degrees held and more years of experience in education than either the classroom teachers or the educational support services personnel.

TABLE XXXI: FULL-TIME CLASSROOM TEACHERS EMPLOYED IN THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS OF NEW JERSEY BY COUNTY AND TOTAL YEARS OF EXPERIENCE IN EDUCATION. The teachers' median years of experience have increased from 1986 by 2.9 years to 15.9 years in 1990. Of the 79,886 full-time certificated classroom teachers, 14.1 percent or 11,230 had fewer than 5 years of experience and 2.2 percent or 1,737 were in their first year. 5.3 percent or 4,272 had more than 29 years of experience. The data show that the median age of teachers has increased. They hold higher degrees and have more experience.

TABLE XXXII: FULL-TIME EDUCATIONAL SUPPORT SERVICES PERSONNEL EMPLOYED IN THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS OF NEW JERSEY BY COUNTY AND TOTAL YEARS OF EXPERIENCE IN EDUCATION. The full-time certificated staff median years of experience increased by 1.8 years from the median of 14.9 years in 1986 to 16.7 in 1990. Of the 11,424 full-time certificated educational support services personnel, 1,269 or 11.1 percent had fewer than 5 years of experience and 780 or 6.8 percent had more than 29 years of experience.

TABLE XXXIII: FULL-TIME CERTIFICATED PERSONNEL ENTERING AND LEAVING NEW JERSEY PUBLIC SCHOOLS BY COUNTY AND ASSIGNMENT CATEGORY. The table summarizes the mobility of the full-time certificated staff into and out of the public school districts of New Jersey. It is a count of certificated individuals who were reported in a position in a district on September 30, 1989 but were not in that district on October 15, 1990

(leaving). Entering is the count of those individuals who were not reported in a district on September 30, 1989 but held a position in that district on October 15, 1990. Twenty-one reasons have been coded for entering and for leaving to provide users with data to study the supply and demand of certificated staff in the public schools of New Jersey.

The statewide data show more certificated staff entering than leaving. In the 1990-91 school year, the entering rate was 8.3 percent (approximately 8 full-time certificated staff per 100 employed). The statewide leaving rate was 7.6 percent (approximately 7 full-time certificated staff per 100 employed).

The entering rate exceeded the leaving rate in 20 counties in 1987-88, in 19 counties in 1988-89 and in 14 counties in 1989-90. In 1990-91, the entering rate was greater in 14 counties and equal to the leaving rate in 1 county.

TABLE XXXIV: NUMBER OF FULL-TIME CLASSROOM TEACHERS EMPLOYED BY COUNTY AND MAJOR ASSIGNMENT FOR SCHOOL YEAR 1990-91. Of the 79,886 full-time classroom teachers employed, 36.3 percent reported teaching in an elementary assignment and 63.7 percent reported teaching in a specific subject area assignment.

Of the 63.7 percent or 50,885 teachers in subject area assignments, 38,596 or 75.8 percent were employed in the following six fields:

TABLE XXXV: NUMBER OF FULL-TIME BEGINNING AND RE-ENTERING CLASSROOM TEACHERS EMPLOYED BY COUNTY AND MAJOR ASSIGNMENT FOR SCHOOL YEAR 1990-91. Of the 6,510 reported entering teachers, 63.2 percent or 4,112 were either beginning or "reentering" (returning to the classroom after leaves of absences or other employment) teachers. Of these 4,112 teachers, approximately 82.5 percent or 3,392 were either elementary (36.1 percent) or teachers in the following fields.

1. Special Education..... 19.8%

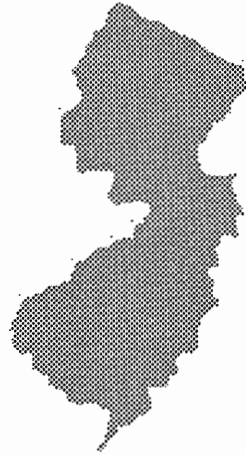

SECTION FOUR

NON-CERTIFICATED STAFF INFORMATION

NON-CERTIFICATED STAFF

This section contains three tables reporting data on the personnel employed in the public schools of New Jersey in positions for which a State Board of Education certificate is not a requirement. The tables provide data by racial/ethnic origin and sex of both full-time and part-time personnel in specific support services assignment categories. They also show the distribution of the full-time non-certificated staff by county, racial/ethnic origin, sex and assignment category.

TABLE XXXVII: FULL-TIME, PART-TIME INCLUDING NEW HIRES NON-CERTIFICATED SUPPORT SERVICES STAFF BY ASSIGNMENT, RACIAL/ETHNIC ORIGIN AND SEX. This is a composite table which reports the number of individuals employed in full-time and part-time non-certificated support services positions. A total of 59,067 persons were employed in support services in New Jersey public elementary and secondary education. Of this total, slightly more than four-fifths (80.2 percent) were employed full-time; more than two-thirds (70.5 percent) were female; and one-fifth (22.2 percent) were minority.

TABLE XXXVIII: FULL-TIME NON-CERTIFICATED SUPPORT SERVICES STAFF BY COUNTY, ASSIGNMENT AND SEX. In the 1990-91 school year, 47,359 full-time non-certificated support services personnel were employed in public elementary and secondary local education agencies. Of this total, 90.1 percent or 42,679 were employed in the assignment classification areas of Service Workers, Secretarial/Clerical and Teacher Aides. The largest number, 20,825 or 44.0 percent, were reported in service work assignments with the next largest number, 12,256 or 25.9 percent, in secretarial/clerical assignments. The smallest number, 629 or 1.3 percent, were reported in technician assignments.

TABLE XXXIX: FULL-TIME NON-CERTIFICATED SUPPORT SERVICES STAFF BY COUNTY, RACIAL/ETHNIC ORIGIN AND SEX. Of the total 47,359 full-time non-certificated support services staff employed, 24.0 percent or 11,347 were minority. Of the full-time minority non-certificated support services staff employed, 18.3 percent or 8,656 were black, 2,387 or 5.0 percent were Hispanic and 304 or 0.6 percent were other minorities.

Of the total assignments, 31,615 or 66.8 percent were reported as being held by females and 15,744 or 33.2 percent were held by males.

COMPARISON OF SELECTED NON-CERTIFICATED STAFF DATA

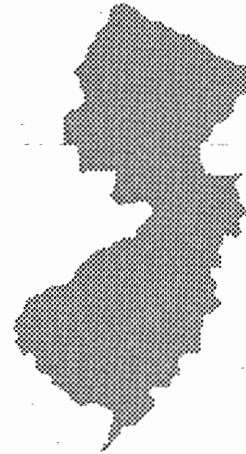

GLOSSARY

FALL SURVEY INSTRUMENTS

GLOSSARY

Administrative Exclusion: A legal action of an authorized party that compels a student to leave school before completing the prescribed course of studies. The legal action may be taken for reasons such as extreme misbehavior, incorrigibility and/or incarceration in a correctional institution.

Administrator/Supervisor: A staff member with valid certification who has been assigned the responsibility to manage or direct the activities of a district or a portion of these activities.

Advanced Placement Program: A series of courses for upper grade secondary school students intended to provide college-level instruction. Successful completion may enable the student(s) to by-pass the usual initial college courses in the subject area and begin the student's college work with a more advanced course and possibly with college credit. (This category does not include students enrolled in special programs for the talented or gifted.)

Apprenticeship/On-The-Job Training: Supervised training program for a beginner who wishes to learn a semi-skilled or skilled trade. The program is usually two or more years of work experience on the job supplemented with related classroom experience.

Art School: A non-degree granting post-secondary institution offering courses of varying length in preparation for occupations related to drawing, painting, sculpture, design, and similar arts.

Assignment: The specific group of activities for which a staff member has been given responsibility.

Business or Secretarial School: A non-degree granting post-secondary institution offering courses of varying length in preparation for technical business occupations.

Certificate: The legal document giving authorization, from the New Jersey State Board of Examiners, to perform the services to which the person is assigned.

Clerical/Secretarial Staff: Staff members in positions requiring skills and training for all clerical-type work including such activities as preparing, transcribing, systematizing or preserving written communications and reports; and of operating such equipment as bookkeeping machines, typewriters, tabulating machines and word processors. Includes bookkeepers, messengers, office machine operators, clerk-typists, stenographers, secretaries, hearing reporters, statistical clerks, dispatchers, payroll clerks and kindred workers.

College (four-year): A post-secondary institution offering a four-year curriculum and empowered to confer a bachelor's degree.

College (two-year): A post-secondary institution offering a two-year curriculum and empowered to confer an associate's degree.

Consolidated District - A legal entity established in accordance with New Jersey Statutes Title 18A Education Chapter 8 Article 5: Consolidated Districts.

Cosmetology or Barber School: A non-degree granting post-secondary institution offering courses of varying length in preparation for qualifying examinations and licensing.

County Special Services School District: A legal entity established in accordance with New Jersey Statutes Title 18A Education Chapter 46-29: County Special Services School District.

Degree: A title conferred by an approved college or university as official recognition for the completion of a course of study. (Only the highest degree conferred should be used in this report.)

Dissatisfied with School/Behavioral/Academic: The student withdrew from school before completing the prescribed course of studies for any one and/or combination of the following reasons: behavioral difficulty, academic difficulty, poor student/staff relationships, poor peer relationships, lack of appropriate curriculum, and/or an active dislike of one or more aspects of his/her school experiences.

Dropout: An elementary or secondary school student who has been in membership during the regular school term and who withdraws from membership before graduating from secondary school (Grade 12) or before completing an equivalent program of studies. Such an individual is considered as having discontinued schooling, whether this occurs before or after the student has passed the compulsory school attendance age and, where applicable, whether or not the student has completed a minimum required amount of school work.

Economic/Entered Employment: The student withdrew from school before completing the prescribed course of study for any one and/or combination of the following reasons: needed at home, encouraged by parents to leave school, inability to pay expenses associated with school attendance, to seek employment and/or had accepted employment.

Education Services Commission: A legal entity established in accordance with New Jersey Statutes Title 18A Education Chapter 6 Article 6: Educational Services Commission.

Educational Support Services Personnel: A staff member with valid certification who provides administrative, technical and logistical support to sustain and enhance the fulfillment of the objectives of a district's educational programs.

Entering: The source from which a staff member new to the school or district was recruited.

ESSIA Chapter 1: The federal Elementary/Secondary School Improvement Act chapter that provides federal funds to eligible schools for supplemental remedial programs which meet the special needs of students performing below minimum levels of proficiency.

Experience: A year of professional, educational employment (excluding current year) in a public school, college or university.

Expulsions: The action taken by a board of education compelling a student to withdraw from school for reasons such as extreme misbehavior, incorrigibility, or unsatisfactory achievement or progress in school work.

Full-Time: The period of time in each day required for full-time certificated staff employment shall be the number of hours prescribed by the local board of education, but shall be not less than four clock hours.

Government Service: Enlistment in the armed forces, the Job Corps or any other government sponsored program.

Home Economics: A consumer and homemaking program of instructional and laboratory experiences taught by a home economics teacher and which (1) contributes to personality development; (2) teaches the child's role in school and home life; (3) develops appreciation of the family; and (4) enriches the child's learnings in other areas such as foods and clothing.

Industrial Arts Program: A program of instructional and laboratory experiences which provides basic education related to the industrial and technological aspects of life through experiences with tools, materials and processes.

Industry Sponsored School: A technical, trade and/or vocational school sponsored by a private industrial firm primarily to train prospective employees.

Introduction to Vocations Program: A guidance program to enable students in Grades 7 through 10 to explore occupational opportunities. The program includes classroom instruction, "hands-on" activities, field trips, job visitation days and speakers from business and industry.

Laborers: Staff members in full-time positions performing manual labor and not classified in any of the other activity assignment area classifications.

Leaving: The relocation of a staff member from the site reported in the previous year.

Limited English Proficient: Students of Limited English Proficiency are pupils whose native language is other than English and who have sufficient difficulty speaking, reading, writing or understanding the English language as measured by an English language proficiency test so as to be denied the opportunity to learn successfully in the classrooms where the language of instruction is English. The State Board of Education in NJAC 6:31-1.1 et seq. has promulgated rules regarding the identification of limited English proficient students and the mandated programs that they are required to receive.

Married or Pregnant: The student who withdrew from school to establish a household before completing the prescribed course of studies.

New Hires: Refers to persons who were hired for the first time or after a break in service for full-time employment in the district. PERSONNEL RETURNING FROM OFFICIAL LEAVES OF ABSENCE GRANTED BY THE DISTRICT ARE NOT COUNTED AS NEW HIRES.

New Residence: School Status Unknown: The student left school upon moving to a new residence and it is not known if the student entered a new school.

Non-Certificated Professional Staff: Staff members in positions for which a certificate issued by the State Board of Examiners is not required for the performance of professional services in the school or district. Includes persons engaged in administration, such as accountants and attorneys; in health services, such as doctors, dentists and psychiatrists; in facilities planning and operations, such as architects and engineers.

Nursing School: A non-degree granting post-secondary institution, usually associated with a hospital, which prepares students to become nurses.

Other Post-Secondary School: Any non-degree granting post-secondary school other than those defined in this glossary.

Other Type College: Any post-secondary degree granting institution other than those defined in this glossary.

Part-Time: A staff member whose total current assignments require less than his or her full-time services. A part-time staff member may be employed full-time for a part of the school year, part-time for a part of the school year, or part-time for the entire school year.

Physical, Mental, Social or Emotional Disability: A physical illness and/or a sensory disability disturbance which causes a student to withdraw from school before completing the prescribed program of studies.

Post-Graduate: Students who, after graduating from high school (Grade 12), re-enroll in the same or another secondary school for additional high school level courses.

Pre-Kindergarten: Students in a group or class organized to provide educational experiences for children during the year or years preceding the kindergarten and are part of the elementary school program under the direction of a professionally qualified teacher.

Program for Gifted and Talented: A program for students identified by professionally qualified personnel as being advanced in mental development and/or capable of high performance in one or more areas of special competence. Among these areas of competence are creativity, leadership ability, social adeptness and facility in the productive and performing arts. (This category does not include students enrolled in enrichment courses leading to advance placement.)

Program for Pregnant Students: A program for students who would otherwise drop out of school because of pregnancy. In addition to meeting all curricular requirements, such programs usually provide special personal and educational counseling services.

Program of Studies: A program is a combination of related courses and/or self-contained classes organized for the attainment of specific educational objectives e.g., a program of special education for handicapped pupils or a program of occupational (vocational) education.

Racial/Ethnic Groups: An individual may be included in the group to which he or she appears to belong, identifies with, or is regarded as belonging to in the community. However, no person should be counted in more than one racial/ethnic category. The categories are: white, not of Hispanic origin; black, not of Hispanic origin; Hispanic; American Indian or Alaskan Native and Asian or Pacific Islander.

Regional School District: A legal entity established in accordance with New Jersey Statutes Title 18A Education Chapter 13: Regional School Districts.

Reason Unknown: The student withdrew from school before completing the prescribed course of studies for reason(s) which are not known.

Salary: The total amount, specified by contract, to be paid for services rendered.

School District: A legal entity established in accordance with New Jersey Statutes Title 18A Education Chapter 8.

Type I is the legal classification of a local school district in accordance with New Jersey Statutes Title 18A Education Chapter 9-2.

Type II is the legal classification of a local school district in accordance with New Jersey Statutes Title 18A Education Chapter 9-3.

School Year: A calendar year which begins on July 1 and ends on June 30 of the following year.

Service Academy: An institution of higher education maintained by the federal government to prepare students for a professional career as officers in one of the armed services.

Service Workers: Staff members in positions performing paraprofessional services in cafeteria, maintenance, security, transportation, etc. Includes cafeteria workers; custodial workers with the responsibility for cleanliness of buildings, and operating such equipment as heating and ventilating systems; security workers with the responsibility for preserving the security of district property and keeping the buildings safe for occupancy; and transportation workers.

Shared Time Vocational: An arrangement whereby a student regularly and concurrently attends two schools which share direction and control of the student's studies. In this report, the time-sharing relationship is between a public secondary school and an area vocational school.

Skilled Crafts: Staff members in positions performing jobs which require special manual skills and a thorough and comprehensive knowledge of the processes involved in the work which has been acquired through on-the-job training and

experience, through apprenticeships, or other formal training programs. Includes mechanics, carpenters, electricians, plumbers, heavy equipment operators, stationary engineers, skilled machinery operators, compositors, typesetters and kindred workers.

Social Security Number: The unique identification number assigned to a person by the Social Security Administration.

Special Education: Students on roll in self-contained special education classes. (Special Education students who are mainstreamed are reported in their respective grade levels.)

State Compensatory Education: A program approved by the State Board of Education to provide preventive and remedial services supplemental to the regular school program to meet the special needs of students performing below minimum levels of student proficiency as required by NJAC 6:8-1.1 and 3.8.

State Operated School: A legal entity established in accordance with New Jersey Statutes Title 18A Education Subtitle 8 State Educational Institutions Part 2 Special State Schools: 18A:61-1 to 18A:61B-1.

Suspensions: Temporary dismissals (at least one school day) of students from school by a principal. These are official suspensions reported to the chief school administrator. A pupil is counted only once regardless of the number of times he or she was suspended.

Teacher: A staff member with valid certification who instructs students.

Teacher Aides: Staff members in positions performing assigned activities which assist certificated staff members perform professional-educational-teaching assignments. Includes persons such as teacher aides, library aides, playground aides, guidance aides, etc.

Technicians: Staff members in positions requiring a combination of knowledge and manual skill which has been obtained through approximately two years of post-high school education, such as is offered in many technical institutes and/or junior colleges, or through equivalent on-the-job training. Includes computer programmers and operators, film inspectors, projectionists, graphic artists, draftsmen, technicians (medical and dental) and similar occupations which cannot be properly classified in other activity area assignment classifications.

Technical, Trade or Vocational School: A non-degree granting post-secondary institution offering courses to prepare individuals for employment as skilled workers or draftsmen.

Technology for Children Program: A program to provide children with individualized experimental learning opportunities to develop interests and self-awareness. Technological world-of-work activities are integrated throughout the traditional curriculum with emphasis on the needs and interests of individual students.

Total Enrollment: A count of students on roll on the last school day of September.

Unemployed: Not employed at any paid work.

Ungraded: Students in a class which is not organized on the basis of grade and has no standard grade designation. (Students in self contained special education classes are not reported in this category.)

Vocational Education Program: Program offering education and training in such semi-skilled, skilled and/or technical occupations as agriculture, home economics, office occupations, distributive education and technical education.

Vocational School District: A legal entity established in accordance with New Jersey Statutes Title 18A Education Chapter 54 Article 3: County Vocational Schools.
