

1968 BOND ISSUE AT WORK-The hospital laboratory has undergone a welcome transformation from manual to automated procedures. Among the new pieces of equipment are an electric device that enumerates red and white blood cells and platelets, a machine that provides vital information concerning the patients thyroid status, a system which provides information about residents' bleeding tendencies before operations are performed, a machine which will be used in post-operative therapy to indicate whether a resident is breathing properly, and a device which allows blood samples to automatically pass non-stop from one step to the next.

Two brand new departments created at V.S.S. include the Cytology and the Histology departments. The Hospital will now be able to perform its own pap smears, tissue sectioning and biopsy diagnosis.

NURSING SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM-The Personnel Department once again wants to remind all eligible employees that Vineland State School will again have the opportunity to participate in the Nursing Scholarship Program in 1973. It is through this program that public employees throughout the state are afforded an opportunity to pursue a career in nursing while they continue to maintain their employee status.

The major qualifications and requirements for candidates are as follows:(1) They must have been employed in direct resident care service for a minimum of one year by the beginning of the Fall term, 1973, (2) Must possess a high school diploma or an equivalency certificate issued by the New Jersey Department of Education, (3) Must waive sick leave, vacation, and holiday credits granted by the State as well as overtime compensation while in training status, (4) Must work in the Nursing Department of the Vineland State School when the training facility has its summer recess and (5) On satisfactory completion of training, the candidate is obliged to serve at an institution of the Department for a period of 2 years.

Candidates selected by the State Department Nursing Scholarship Committee will be entitled to: (1) Tuition at a two-year collegiate school of nursing or 3 years at a diploma school of nursing, (2) Receive the salary and increment for which they are eligible and (3) Receive vacation and holiday in conformity with the policies of the nursing school.

If you are interested in this program, it is your responsibility to gain admission to a county college or a diploma school of nursing on your own. In the event there is no community college in your county, you must apply to another county college where a tuition "Charge back" is available. The nearest diploma school of nursing is the: Helene Fuld School, West Jersey Hospital, Mount Ephraim and Atlantic Avenue, Camden, New Jersey, 08104.

Once you have applied to the college or school for acceptance in the fall semester, 1973, please furnish written notice stating your personal interest in the program to Mr. E.A. Gesty, Personnel Director, no later than February 23, 1973. Following this action you shall be interviewed by a local (Vineland State School) selection committee.



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
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
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
