

## STANDARDS & GOALS MISSION OUTLINED

Assembled to begin an "important task," members of the Juvenile and Adult Justice Advisory Committee heard speeches that outlined their mission from Governor Brendan T. Byrne, Attorney General William F. Hyland and John J. Mullaney, SLEPA Executive Director. The 49-member committee, appointed by the Governor, officially initiated the State's Standards and Goals effort at the October 29th conference in North Brunswick.

The meeting was opened by Mullaney who welcomed the "distinguished members" and thanked them for their willingness to survey the State's criminal justice system in an attempt to establish standards and goals to improve the system of justice.

"Our focus is on specific and measurable standards of performance," Mullaney pointed out, and not general exhortations such as "crime should be controlled" or "our citizens should become more involved." These cannot be measured, nor can we specifically determine where we stand in their achievement, he said.

"This standards and goal effort," Mullaney explained, "is a planning process by which we identify what it is we wish to achieve and where we stand in attaining the desired achievements." Mullaney declared that "Standards and Goals define what could be. They are targets, not predictions."

"For citizens, quantitative goals provide a means for judging the effectiveness of criminal justice operations. For legislators these goals may serve as guidelines for funding and legislation. For our State and local criminal justice agencies, they are focal points for the allocation of resources.

The end result, he concluded, will be to provide "opportunities for action" which will continue to maintain New Jersey in the forefront of criminal justice system

improvement.

Calling the standards and goals activity "the most important project in the public domain," Governor Byrne said their work would be of continuing interest "to me personally and to the State of New Jersey."

The Governor reinforced his concern saying that of the many requests for him to serve on national committees, he selected the National Advisory Council on Standards and Goals as the only activity in which he would participate. The Governor is National Advisory Council Chairman.

### VICTIM ASSISTANCE NOTED

Highlighting a specific problem

area, Attorney General Hyland told the group that the criminal justice system is almost totally offender oriented. Officials within the system, he said, were aware of the problems and needs of victims but are not able to solve them. He noted that of 28,746 violent crimes committed in 1973 only 549 victims applied for compensation, with slight increases the following year.

The Violent Crimes Compensation Board, however, does not have enough money and manpower to process and compensate qualified victims of violent crimes. During 1973 and 1974, the Board

## GOVERNOR BYRNE APPOINTS STANDARDS & GOALS COMMITTEE

Governor Byrne appointed Professor Robert Knowlton as Chairman of the Juvenile and Adult Justice Advisory Committee. Professor Knowlton is a distinguished author, professor of law at Rutgers University Law School and Chairman of the Criminal Law Revision Committee.

The Committee was later subdivided into four subcommittees to discuss the draft package of research data and preliminary standards. awarded about 40% of the claimants with an average payment of \$2,900 after a six month processing period.

The Attorney General disclosed that "Victim Assistance Legislation" being proposed by Congressman Peter Rodino would provide 50% matching funds for states that have Violent Crimes Compensation Boards. New Jersey leadership is evidenced by the fact that it is one of 12 states with an established Board.

Convening the afternoon session, Edward Strapp, SLEPA Standards and Goals Project Director, directed the members to subcommittees where they discussed various aspects of a draft package of research data and standards. The package contained preliminary standards on victim assistance, adult pretrial services, pre-judicial alternatives and community crime prevention.

The committee will address standards affecting other areas of the criminal justice system during subcommittees meetings and future conferences. The Advisory Committee will report its findings to the SLEPA Governing Board for its review and approval.

Once approved by the Governing Board the model standards and goals will be used as a plan of action to bring about changes throughout the State's criminal justice system. Implementation of these goals and standards will be accomplished by either legislation, court rule, executive order or voluntary compliance of local, county or State criminal justice agencies.

# ***Criminal Justice Students Up 33%***

A recent survey of student enrollment in criminal justice education programs at New Jersey colleges reveals that student enrollment increased more than 33% for the 1974-75 academic year over the previous year. According to the survey, there were 8442 students enrolled in criminal justice programs in the State.

Each year the Council of Educational Institutions for Law Enforcement (CEILE) compiles the survey by means of questionnaires administered to participating institutions.

The survey revealed that enrollment in two-year programs totaled 4488 and was distributed

as follows: Atlantic Community College 330; Bergen Community College 541; Brookdale Community College 589; Burlington County College 181; Camden County College 597; County College of Morris 556; Cumberland County College 116; Essex County College 350; Gloucester County College 179; Mercer County College 150; Middlesex County College 162; Ocean County College 231; Somerset County College 209; and Union College 297.

Enrollment in four year programs was 3901, with the following distribution: Glassboro State College 1275; Jersey City State College 250; Kean College 125; Monmouth College 21; Rider College 62; Rutgers Univ. 390; Stockton State College 190; Trenton State College 757; and, William Paterson College 831. In addition, there were 53 students enrolled in the graduate Criminal Justice program at Rutgers.

Thus, the total number of students enrolled in statewide criminal justice programs for the academic year 1974-75 was 8442. This represents a 33.7% increase over last year's figure of 6316. Of these, 4512 (approx. 12.6%) were in-service police officers. The survey also revealed that approxi-

mately 441 police officers were enrolled in other degree programs.
