Nonfarm payrolls had dipped slightly by 1,600 from March to April primarily because of public sector cutbacks. At a seasonally adjusted total of 3,087,900 in April, nonfarm wage and salary employment had remained close to the record high of 3,094,400 set in February of this year due to the strength of the private sector.

Government employment declined for the sixth month in a row with the March-April decrease of 2,600 resulting from cutbacks in the programs funded under the federal Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA). In light of present federal budget policies, the government sector should continue to show reductions in the coming months.

Private sector employment in New Jersey reached an all-time high in February and has stayed approximately at that plateau with a minimal dip in March and a not quite offsetting gain in April. The nonfactory sector has been the most robust over the past several months depending on service employment for its mainstay. The service sector maintained its record high of 640,000 from March to April. Casino jobholding in Atlantic City has figured prominently in the surging growth in services with seven casinos open and two more gearing up for openings within the next few months. Trade also was a source of strength in April as employment rose over the month by 1,900 due to openings of retail department and grocery stores.

From March to April, however, total jobs in nonmanufacturing declined due, in most part, to government reductions and construction. Building employment went down by 2,600 to a seasonally adjusted volume of 117,100. Construction's sluggish performance reflected the lack of expansion in residential building brought about by high interest rates and expensive mortgage monies.

In the manufacturing division, employment increased by 1,900 for the first time in two months to 778,300, with all of this occurring in durable goods. No durable goods industries registered declines and over-the-month leading gainers were electrical machinery, up by 800 primarily in the electronic components segment; fabricated metals, up by 500; and nonelectrical machinery and transportation equipment, both up by 300. The increases were due mainly to scattered hirings. Nondurable goods declined by 600 because of scattered layoffs.

The weekly earnings of manufacturing production workers averaged \$317.87 in April, a drop of \$2.57 from March but an increase of \$23.61 from a year ago. After seasonal adjustment, the average workweek registered 40.9 hours, down by 24 minutes over the month. This reflects the decrease in overtime hours worked because of the Good Friday holiday in April.

## LABOR AREA COMMENTS

Total nonagricultural employment increased in April in eight of the state's ten major labor areas. The most substantial gain in jobholdings was registered in the Newark Labor Area, which rose by 6,500 over the month. Sizable gains of 2,800 were recorded in the Hackensack and Camden Labor Areas and of 2,400 in the Long Branch Area.

Most of the increases were noted in the nonmanufacturing division. The Newark and Hackensack gains were primarily in services and construction. The Camden gains were in construction and in trade, which rose because of openings of retail department stores.

The Atlantic City and Newark Labor Areas both recorded large over-the-year gains. Services accounted for most of the 9,300 rise in non-manufacturing in Newark and all of the 13,400 increase in Atlantic City, which brought Atlantic City's service sector employment to an all-time record high of 42,100 in April.

In the manufacturing division, activity was varied over the month with five areas showing increases of from 100 to 900, two areas remaining the same, and three areas registering declines of less than 200. The Camden Labor Area recorded the largest increase, up by 900, mainly because of returns from a strike in the primary metal industry.

## TECHNICAL NOTES

### Nonfarm Wage and Salary Employment

Employment data refer to persons on establishment payrolls who received pay for any part of the pay period which includes the 12th of the month. The data exclude proprietors, the self-employed, unpaid family workers, farm workers, and domestic workers in households. Salaried officers of corporations are included. Government employment covers only civilian employees; federal military personnel are excluded.

Persons on an establishment payroll who are on paid sick leave (when pay is received directly from the firm), on paid holiday or paid vacation, or who work during any part of the pay period but are unemployed or on strike during the rest of the period, are counted as employed. Not counted as employed are persons who, during the pay period which includes the 12th, are laid off, on leave without pay or on strike for the entire period, or who are hired but do not work during the period.

### Average Hours and Earnings

Hours and earnings data are derived from reports of payroll and man-hours for production and related workers in manufacturing. When the reported pay period exceeds one week, the payroll and man-hour figures are reduced to a weekly basis.

Average hourly earnings for manufacturing are on a "gross" basis, reflecting not only changes in basic hourly rates, but also such variable factors as premium pay for overtime and shift work, and changes in output of workers paid on an incentive plan. Excluded from average earnings are irregular bonuses, retroactive items, payments of various welfare benefits, and payroll taxes paid by employers.
