*His Excellency, Joseph D. Bedle, Governor and Commander-in-Chief:*

The Quartermaster General reports:

The whole number of arms, the property of the State, serviceable, is twenty-three thousand one hundred and fifty, (23,150).

Unserviceable, three hundred and ninety-one, (391).

Total number of different calibres, twenty-three thousand five hundred and forty-one, (23,541).

Whole number in hands of National Guard, three thousand and seventy-three, (3,073).

Number in the Arsenal, nineteen thousand eight hundred and six, (19,806).

Number loaned to schools, colleges, academies, independent organizations, &c., six hundred and sixty-two, (662).

Number of cannon of different calibres, the property of the State, forty (40), making seven (7) complete batteries, comprising caissons, battery wagons, forges and implements; also two (2) Billingshurst batteries with implements, and two (2) Gatling guns with carriages, limbers and firing implements. Of the above there have been issued ten (10) cannon with caissons.

There have been received from the United States during the year, forty (40) Springfield rifles, cadet, calibre 45, breech loaders, and forty (40) Springfield carbines, calibre 45, breech loaders.

There have been received from military companies during the year, eight hundred and seventy-one (871) muskets and rifles.

In accordance with orders from the Commander-in-chief, and to complete the reorganization of the National Guard under the act approved March 9, 1877, the following companies, consisting of fifteen (15) of infantry and two (2) of cavalry, were disbanded:

- Companies A and H, First Regiment.
- Companies E and H, Third Regiment.
- Companies A and B, Fifth Regiment.
- Companies G and I, Sixth Regiment.
- Companies G and H, Seventh Regiment.

Companies A, B, D, E and H, Eighth Regiment.  
Cavalry Companies A and B.

The arms and accoutrements issued to these companies have been generally turned into the State Arsenal, and the commanding officers have been required to account for the deficiency.

The First, Third, Fourth, Sixth, Seventh and Ninth Regiments, and the Second Battalion of the National Guard, are armed with Springfield rifles, breech loaders, calibre 45; the Fifth Regiment is armed with the muzzle loading rifled muskets. The Eighth Regiment was disbanded during the year, by general orders from headquarters to reduce the companies to the number authorized by the act approved March 9, 1877.

The National Guard consists of forty-seven (47) companies of infantry and one battery of artillery.

But eight (8) companies have made the annual returns required by law. They report generally the good condition of the arms and equipments. Section 18 of the Act for the Organization of the National Guard requires these returns to be made on or before the first day of December of each year. All the companies were early requested to make their returns at the close of the fiscal year, in order that the condition of the arms and accoutrements in their possession could be stated in my report, which is required to be in your hands on the fifteenth of November, but as above noted, eight only have reported. It is presumed that nearly all the companies will comply with the law during the present month.

By the statement furnished in the appendix, you will observe the total expenditures on militia account for the past year are thirty-six thousand nine hundred and seventy-seven dollars and seventy-six cents (\$36,977.76), of which one thousand eight hundred and fifty dollars and seventeen cents (\$1,850.17) is for the purchase and repair of arms, ammunition, ordnance, clothing, and camp and garrison equipage; twenty-nine thousand five hundred and seventy-two dollars and seventy-seven cents (\$29,572.77) is for armory rent by act of the Legislature; three hundred and thirty-eight dollars and eighty-nine cents (\$338.89) was expended for expenses, transportation and pay of Company B, Sixth Regiment, while doing guard duty at an execution at Mays Landing; one thousand four hundred and eighty-nine dollars and fifty-nine cents (\$1,489.59) for the centennial celebration of the Battle of Princeton, authorized by resolution of the Legislature adopted April 21, 1876; four hundred and ninety-eight dollars and sixty-five cents (\$498.65) were expended on account of the encampments at Cape May and Trenton, leaving the current expenses three thousand two hundred and twenty-seven dollars and sixty-nine cents (\$3,227.69). The

amount expended for calling out the National Guard to preserve the peace and in aid of the civil authorities during the railroad riots, is fifty-three thousand six hundred and fifty-three dollars and one cent (\$53,653.01). The claims outstanding will not exceed, I believe, one thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500), exclusive of railroad transportation.

In tabular statements and detailed abstracts accompanying this report will be found full particulars of issues, receipts and disbursements on account of the National Guard.

On the twenty-first of March, 1876, a concurrent resolution was adopted by the Legislature authorizing the Quartermaster General "by and with the consent of the Governor, to furnish two independent companies, designated as A and B, of the Washington Continental Guards of Princeton," organized for the purpose of celebrating "the one hundredth anniversary of the battle of Princeton in a fitting and proper manner," with "two hundred stand of arms and equipments," provided that the loan "shall not extend beyond the period of two years." Under the authority of this resolution sixty (60) stand of muskets and accoutrements were issued to Captain Green for the use of Company A, on the twenty-fifth of May, 1876, and one hundred (100) stand were issued to Captain Margerum, for the use of Company B, on the thirtieth of December, 1876. Captain Margerum returned his issue on the eighth of January, 1877. Those issued to Captain Green remain in his possession, and must be returned in May next, unless the Legislature grants an extension of the period for which they were loaned. The same Legislature, on the twenty-first of April, 1876, authorized the Governor "to order to the said celebration at Princeton so many regiments of the National Guard as he may deem proper to take part therein." Under this authority the First and Seventh Regiments were directed to participate in the celebration, the cost for transportation amounting to one thousand four hundred and eighty-nine dollars and fifty-nine cents (\$1,489.59).

The one hundred and first Legislature adopted a joint resolution, which was approved by your Excellency on the ninth of March, 1877, directing the Quartermaster General "to place such amount of insurance against fire upon the State Arsenal buildings and the property contained therein as he and the Governor shall deem proper and advisable." Upon consultation with your Excellency, and after receiving several bids from agents of insurance companies, both foreign and home, it was thought to be the best interests of the State, owing to the large amount of money that would be required to place an adequate sum on the buildings, not to insure at once, but place the buildings in a very much safer condition than heretofore, by making water connection, laying pipes, putting in fire plugs, and, if ne-

cessary, placing fire extinguishers within the buildings. By these improvements it is believed that the insurance can be effected, if deemed necessary, at much less rates, and the work is now being pushed forward. Besides the family residing in the arsenal dwelling, a watchman has been employed for the past three months, who is on duty all night.

An unusual number of officers of the National Guard have availed themselves during the past year of the privilege of accounting for property unavoidably lost or destroyed while in their possession. In many instances where the property is accounted for under section 6 of the act approved March 18, 1868, the officers have been relieved. In all cases affidavits were required, which were submitted to your Excellency for final action.

Since the passage of the act forbidding encampments a number of companies have had special encampments of their own members, and have applied to this office for transportation and the necessary camp and garrison equipage. Transportation has not been furnished, but where the encampment was authorized or sanctioned by the commandant of the regiment to which the company was attached, camp and garrison equipage has been loaned, and promptly returned upon breaking camp.

The usual quantity of powder and cartridge bags has been supplied, as heretofore, to the Washington Headquarters Association of Morristown, for the purpose of firing salutes.

On the twentieth of July the first intimation of trouble between the various railroad lines, throughout the State, and their employees was received at this place. The men having struck, seemed determined to prevent others from occupying their places, and attempted to stop the running of trains. In this emergency, and the attitude of the men being so formidable, and other lawless elements intervening, the entire National Guard was ordered on duty at various points in the State, the main body being concentrated at Phillipsburg under the command of Brevet Major General Sewell. This Department was actively employed day and night, during the continuance of the strike, a period of about three weeks, in furnishing transportation, issuing rations and forwarding supplies, and, after the return of the troops, in receiving stores turned in and paying the expenses incurred in the service. Credit is due to the employees of this Department for their willingness to give their services at unusual hours, day or night. Colonel Hoy, of your staff, was detailed by you as Paymaster to pay the men, and performed that arduous duty with promptness and despatch, and in his returns to this office his payments were accounted for in a highly satisfactory and commendable manner. The total expense on account of this service to the present date is, as before stated, fifty-three thousand six hundred and fifty-three dollars and one cent, (\$53,653.01). The officers and men of the National Guard responded promptly to

the order calling them out, and they are entitled to the thanks of the State authorities and the commendations of all good citizens. Nearly the entire expense on account of this service has been paid through this office, your Excellency having been pleased to make me Disbursing Officer. In the appendix will be found a statement of the amounts paid, vouchers for which are on file in this office. The Board of Directors of the Trenton Banking Company notified me on the third of August that they had adopted the following resolution: "*Resolved*, That the cashier be authorized to allow the Quartermaster General of the State to draw such amounts as may be needed for the expenses of the military, upon filing in the Bank the official obligation of the Governor to reimburse the same." It was found necessary to draw one thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500), under this resolution, before any advance could be made by the Comptroller upon your requisition, under section eighty-five of the act for the organization of the National Guard, which amount was promptly reimbursed on the seventh of August, in a deposit of ten thousand dollars, (\$10,000).

Under your direction, and in accordance with section two of the joint resolution, approved April 6, 1876, tendering the thanks of the Legislature to the late officers of the Soldiers' Children's Home, of New Jersey, I empowered Messrs. Potsdamer & Co., of Philadelphia, to engrave a testimonial certificate, embodying the above mentioned resolution. They succeeded in getting up an artistic and appropriate design, which I submitted to the examination of Senator Hill, Chairman of the Joint Committee on Soldiers' Children's Home, and several other gentlemen familiar with lithographic and steel engraving, and they expressed themselves as much pleased with it. After inclosing the testimonials in suitable frames, obtained of Messrs. Hall & Garrison, of Philadelphia, to whom the work of making the frames was awarded by contract, I forwarded one to each of the following named ladies, who had served from time to time as officers of the Home since its organization:
