Twelve Constellations.

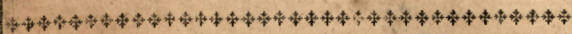

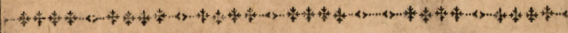

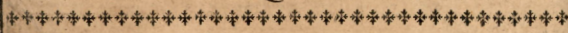

To cure the Itch. The best medicine yet known for the Itch is sulphur, which ought to be used externally and internally. The parts affected may be rubbed with an Ointment made of flour of sulphur two ounces, crude sal ammoniac, finely powdered, two drams; hogslard four ounces; half a dram of the essence of lemmon. About the bulk of a nutmeg may be rubbed upon the extremities, at bed-time, thrice a week.

QUAKERS GENERAL MEETINGS are kept,

AT Philadelphia the fourth firstday in the third and ninth months; at Wilmington, the first firstday in the fourth months; at Chester River, the next firstday after; at Duck Creek, the fourth seventhdays in the fourth and tenth months; at Salem, the third firstday in the fifth month; at Flushing, the last firstday in the fifth month; at Little Egg-Harbour, the first firstday in the sixth month; for Maryland, alternately at West River and Choptank, the first seventhday in the sixth month; at Newport, (Rhode-Island) the second sixthday in the sixth month; at Little Creek, the fourth seventhday in the tenth month; at Shrewsbury, the fourth firstday in the tenth month; at Lancaster, the fourth secondday in the eighth month; at Setacket, the first firstday in the sixth month; at Newtown, (Long-Island) the last firstday in the sixth month; at Westbury, the last firstday in the eighth month; at Nottingham, the first secondday after the second of the tenth month; at Cæcil, the seventhday following; and at Matinicock the last firstday.

Work to be done in GARDENS in the month of March.

SOW radishes, filetia, imperial, and cabbage lettice: Plant peas and beans: Make your beds of mint, balm, thyme, favory, sage, penny-royal, tansey, rue, and other durable herbs for household use, except lavender and rosemary, which are best deferred till April: Refresh the cucumber and melon beds with hot dung; and you may sow towards the latter end of the month for a full crop; sow cabbages and favoys for plants, to be transplanted; as also fellery for early blanching: Towards the middle of this month rake and dress asparagus beds; the buds of which will shoot in April; and now you may make new beds of asparagus in ground prepared for that purpose: Towards the end of this month, sow upon hot beds purslane and nasturtium; sow sallads, leeks, beets, fennel, dill and burnet; dress up strawberry beds, keeping them clean from runners, till the plants blossom, giving them water when necessary; slip and set sage, and where the soil is clay, or over-moist, mingle it with brick-dust. Water all young planted herbs carefully in the morning; destroy all weeds before they run to seed; and before the end of the month your garden ought to be completely cropped. Put French beans in warm ground, where they may be defended from cold winds; but do this in dry weather, because too much moisture will make them rot in the ground.

In the Fruit Orchard. In this month of March finish the plantation of fruit trees, and fill up all vacancies; also compleat the pruning of peaches: The beginning of the month is a fit time to prune such peaches, plumbs and cherries as have had one year's growth; which is to be done very discreetly, having regard to the vigour or weakness of the trees: Graft apples: Cut off the heads of those stocks which were inoculated last year, two inches above the bud slopewise, beginning the slope opposite the bud; and the dead wood, (called by some persons the cockspar) is to be clean cut off the second year in March, that the stock and cyon may the better incorporate and the wound be healed. Dig and clear the ground between rows of raspberries and gooseberries, which will strengthen the blossoms, and encourage the trees; and be sure to clear away all suckers and superfluous branches, and crop off all long overgrown shoots.
