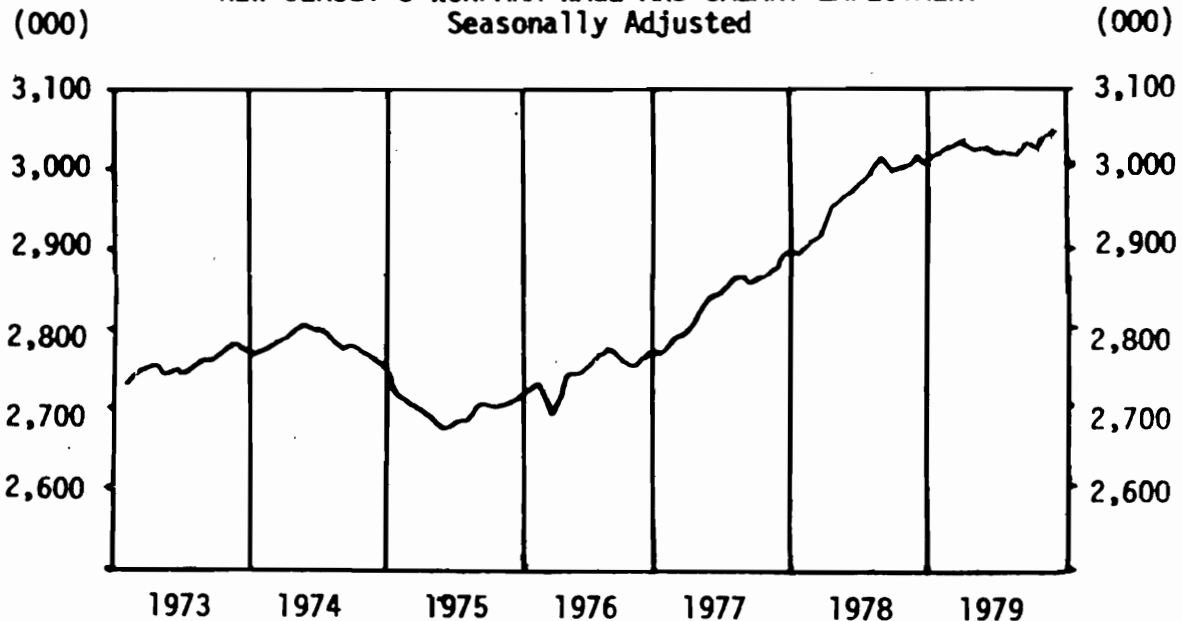
Seasonally adjusted nonfarm wage and salary employment in New Jersey increased by 2,900 from 3,037,100 in October to an all-time record employment high of 3,040,000 in November. All of the increase was in the private sector.

The private sector's increase of 4,800 was spurred by a gain of 4,600, after adjustment for seasonal patterns, in nonmanufacturing. The manufacturing sector declined by 1,700.

Before seasonal adjustment nonfarm wage and salary employment increased by 2,900 to 3,056,700, as manufacturing declined by 6,200, and nonmanufacturing increased by 9,100.

The retail trade sector, up by 7,300, accounted for about 80% of the seasonally unadjusted nonmanufacturing increase. Seasonal hiring for the holidays and several openings of large general merchandise and food stores were primary reasons for the increase. Other nonmanufacturing sectors with increases were government, up by 6,200, and finance-insurance-real estate, up by 1,100. The construction industry's decline of 1,000 was less than normal for this time of year. Small declines occurred in mining, transportation-communication-public utilities, and services.

In the manufacturing sector both the durable goods and nondurable goods industry groups had small declines. For the most part, these declines were in line with seasonal expectations.

In the durable goods sector five industries decreased, four industries increased and one (fabricated metals) remained unchanged over the month. Transportation equipment, which declined for the third consecutive month, had the largest drop, as 2,200 automotive workers were placed on temporary furlough due to lack of consumer demand. Miscellaneous manufacturing, down by 900, had the next largest demand.

Among durable goods industries with increases, primary metals up by 900, had the largest increase. A return of 500 striking workers accounted for most of this increase.

The fabricated metals industry had offsetting economic changes with employment expansion in fabricated structural metals products offsetting a seasonal layoff of 200 at a metal canning firm.

In the nondurable goods sector, five industries decreased, three increased, and two were unchanged. The apparel industry had the largest decrease, due to an employment drop at women and children's outerwear firms. The rubber and plastics industry declined by 700 as a layoff of 300 at a plastic product firm occurred. All industries with increases had only minor improvements, with printing and publishing, up by 300, having the largest increase. In the petroleum, industry, which remained unchanged, strikes by 300 workers offset a slight improvement in employment at other firms.

After adjustment for seasonal influences, manufacturing decreased by 1,700 to 792,400, with the November level 11,900 below the 1979 peak reached in January.

Most of the decrease occurred in the nondurable goods sector, which declined by 1,400. The decreases were generally across the board with only printing and publishing, up by 200, showing an increase.

In the durable goods sector, employment drops occurred in all industries but primary metals, up by 900, nonelectrical machinery, up by 1,600, and electrical equipment, up by 700.

Nonmanufacturing jobholding increased by 4,600, with the trade sector up by 1,800, and the construction industry, up by 1,600 having the largest increases. Divisions with the largest decreases were services, down by 4,600; government, down by 1,900 (primarily due to a drop in local government employment) and transportation-communication-public utilities (largely in non-railroad transportation), down by 1,800.

Over-the-year nonagricultural wage and salary employment increased by 31,700, or 1.0%, with the nonmanufacturing sector accounting for all of growth.

In manufacturing, the nondurable goods sector dropped by 4,900, while durable goods decreased by 2,000. Among the manufacturing industries, transportation equipment, down by 6,000, had the largest decline. This drop largely reflected the automotive assembly cutbacks that have occurred since July. The apparel and rubber industries also

had sizable cutbacks over the year, down by 2,100 and 1,400, respectively. Industries with sizable expansions included electrical machinery, up by 3,100, and apparel and instruments, each up by 1,400. The electrical machinery industry year-ago figure was reduced by 1,700 striking workers; actual job growth over the year in this industry was also about 1,400.

Among the nonmanufacturing industries, the service sector, up by 26,100, had the largest annual expansion. All other industry divisions also showed smaller over-the-year growth.

LABOR AREA EMPLOYMENT COMMENTS

Before seasonal adjustment, nonfarm wage and salary employment increased from October to November in eight of the State's ten major labor areas.

The Newark Labor Area, up by 3,000, had the largest increase, due to expansions in the nonmanufacturing segment. The Jersey City Labor Area, down by 1,200, had the largest decrease, due primarily to declines in manufacturing.

In the manufacturing sector, eight areas recorded decreases, while two areas had increases. The New Brunswick-Perth Amboy-Sayreville Labor Area, down by 2,300, had the largest decrease because of a sizable layoff in transportation equipment due to lack of customer demand. The largest increase occurred in the Paterson-Clifton-Passaic Labor Area, up by 400, primarily in the durable goods sector.

In the nonmanufacturing sector, all areas registered over-the-month increases. Newark increased by 3,500, due to a large increase in government and in trade. The Hackensack and New Brunswick-Perth Amboy-Sayreville Labor Areas followed with increases of 2,800 and 2,000, respectively.

Over-the-year data revealed that total nonfarm employment increased in all areas except Hackensack and Jersey City, which decreased by 6,400 and 2,400, respectively. The Newark Labor Area, up by 12,900, registered the largest increase, due primarily to job expansions in services and in the manufacturing sector. The services segment also contributed to a substantial increase in the Atlantic City Labor Area, which rose by 12,600 from the same period last year.

HOURS AND EARNINGS

The weekly earnings of manufacturing production workers averaged \$288.81 in November, an increase of \$4.83 from October and an increase of \$23.38 from a year ago. The average hourly earnings of \$6.86 were up five cents from October and up 51 cents from a year ago. During the November survey week, production workers averaged 42.1 hours, compared with 41.7 hours a month ago.

On an unadjusted basis, 17 out of 19 primary manufacturing industrial groups had increases in weekly earnings over the month. The largest increase was in the petroleum industry, which rose by \$39.62 because a majority of petroleum refining employees worked on a paid holiday at premium rates. The transportation industry had the largest decline, dropping by \$17.69 because of decreased work due to lack of customer demand in the motor vehicles and equipment sector.

After seasonal adjustment, the average weekly hours increased to 41.9 hours from 41.7 hours in October and 41.6 hours in November, 1978.

The highest average weekly earnings in November were in the petroleum industry, which averaged \$474.55 for a 50.7-hour workweek. The highest hourly earnings of \$9.36 were also in the petroleum industry. The lowest average weekly earnings were in the leather products industry, with \$158.00 for a 37.8-hour workweek.

TECHNICAL NOTES

Nonfarm Wage and Salary Employment

Employment data refer to persons on establishment payrolls who received pay for any part of the pay period which includes the 12th of the month. The data exclude proprietors, the self-employed, unpaid family workers, farm workers, and domestic workers in households. Salaried officers of corporations are included. Government employment covers only civilian employees; federal military personnel are excluded.

Persons on an establishment payroll who are on paid sick leave (when pay is received directly from the firm), on paid holiday or paid vacation, or who work during any part of the pay period but are unemployed or on strike during the rest of the period, are counted as employed. Not counted as employed are persons who, during the pay period which includes the 12th, are laid off, on leave without pay or on strike for the entire period, or who are hired but do not work during the period.

Average Hours and Earnings

Hours and earnings data are derived from reports of payroll and man-hours for production and related workers in manufacturing. When the reported pay period exceeds one week, the payroll and man-hour figures are reduced to a weekly basis.

Average hourly earnings for manufacturing are on a "gross" basis, reflecting not only changes in basic hourly rates, but also such variable factors as premium pay for overtime and shift work, and changes in output of workers paid on an incentive plan. Excluded from average earnings are irregular bonuses, retroactive items, payments of various welfare benefits, and payroll taxes paid by employers.
