BOOKWORM'S CORNER

We had so much favorable response to our LA Theatreworks described dramas mentioned in the last newsletter that we thought

you would be interested in our three newest Blue Ridge Players selections—Row for Your Life, an original play based on the Johnstown Flood; Jeff Peters vs. Matrimony, by O.Henry; and The Star Boarder, an original play about a clever con man. Just call the Library for these or any of our other fine dramatizations.

We have several good titles to suggest to people who are newly blind or have low vision. How Do I Do This When I Can't See What I'm Doing? by Gerald Jahoda (RC36212 or BR9176) describes how visually impaired persons can gather and process information, including using assistive devices. With Low Vision Coping Marshall Flax (RC38113) offers information for everyone coping with visual impairment, including friends, family, and care providers. If Blindness Comes (RC38282) encourages the newly blind to ask "How can I do it?" rather than "Can I do it?"

We have a collection of wonderful suggestions from all you "bookworms" out there this issue.

In the non-fiction area we have Deep Water Passage by Ann Linnea (RC42467). This is a truelife action adventure recommended by Arthur Carlson. Pat Ward assures us that *The* Intelligence of Dogs by Stanley Coren is not to be missed by any dog lover. It's available in either cassette or braille – (RC40503 and BR10262).

One of our Readers Advisors, Rose Hinton highly recommends True Women by Janice Windle, (RC/FD37814). Its a family saga covering the years from 1831 to 1946, set in Texas, and Rose said she couldn't put it down!

Anna Thompson loved the historical romance *The Moon Below*, by Barbara Bickmore (RC39615, BR9820). A young mail order bride on her way to Australia falls in love with the ship's doctor.

I love historical romances, and one I can personally recommend is *The Cloister and the Hearth* by Charles Reade (RC40169) It's set in the late fifteenth century in Europe and it gives you a real feel for medieval life.

For those who prefer more modern romances, we have two good suggestions. Bonnie Weis-brot recommends *Paradise* by Judith McNaught (RC/FD33028 and LT18635). *Dear Emily* by Fern Michaels is a title enjoyed by Barbara Plocker. You can order it on cassette—RC40549. Both are about lost loves and remarkable recoveries.

Louis Bronstein says you can't go wrong with any mystery by Stuart Woods, especially *Heat* (RC40177 and LT18874). An ex-cop infiltrates

a dangerous and reclusive religious cult.

I hope the suggestions in this column give you all a lot of possible titles to carry you into the winter. Many thanks to all our kind contributors. It's always great hearing from you and passing along your choices!


