MINUTES

STATE OF NEW JERSEY,
HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY, TRENTON.

TUESDAY, January 11th, 1927.

This being the day designated by the Constitution for the assembling of the One Hundred and Fifty-first Legislature of the State of New Jersey, the House was duly called to order at 12 o'clock (noon) by Frederick H. Brodesser, of Union County, Clerk of the last House, who presided pending the organization of the House.

Prayer was offered by Rev. Charles D. Sinkinson of Christ Methodist Protestant Church, Atlantic City, New Jersey.

Chandless, of Bergen County, a member-elect, by whom the oath of office shall be administered to the members-elect.

Mr. T. L. Hanson offered the following resolution, which was read and adopted:

Resolved, That the Hon. Clifford R. Powell, of Burlington county, who is a Master in Chancery of this State and a member-elect of this House, administer the oath of office to the Speaker and other officers when they are elected.

Mr. Barison administered the oath of office to Mr. Chandless, who administered the oath of office to the members-elect.

All the members present signed the roll.

Mr. T. L. Hanson offered the following resolution, which was read and adopted:

Resolved, That the House do now proceed with the election of Speaker.

Mr. Altman, of Atlantic County, presented the name of Anthony J. Siracusa, of Atlantic county, in nomination for Speaker, as follows:

I have the great honor to propose as definite Speaker of this, the one hundred and fifty-first legislative session of the State of New Jersey, Anthony J. Siracusa. I am doing this in conformity with usage and custom, but I do it also because I desire, and you certainly desire with me, to pay homage to the man himself. Of his character, none can speak with more definiteness and with more positiveness than I, his lifelong friend, a friend from boyhood through all the elementary stages of youth into manhood. From my own association and friendship, I find him unqualifiedly and unequivocally a man. What more can one say?

Siracusa might not exactly express himself in flowery language, or might not impress one oratorically—his integrity, his common sense, his courage and his unequalled experience are the qualities offered to this assemblage. Without bureaus, committees, officials or emmissaries to manufacture sentiment in his favor; without intrigue or effort on his part, Siracusa is the candidate whose supporters have never threatened to bolt, who was unopposed for this position, and all his Republican colleagues unanimously voiced their approval of his selection as Speaker of this session. As they say, as his constituents say, he is a Republican who never varies or wavers. He and his friends have stood by the creed and the candidates of this Republican party holding the right of majority as their very essence of faith and meaning to uphold that faith against the common enemy, and not those sort

of Republicans who from time to time deploy between the lines and forage on one side or the other. He is steadfast, faithful and loyal to his party, to the principles of Republicanism and to his fellow men. These characteristics merit reward, and his reward today is that of the unopposed candidate for Speakership.

I look into the future and see even greater honors and fruitful achievements for him in public life, due to the fact that he is as he is. In his home community his people recognize his sterling worth, and recently in recognition of his keen analytical mentality and in recognition of his ability as a member of the bar his constituents and his party have appointed him to a position of trust in his community, that of Assistant City Solicitor of Atlantic City.

If you have observed him in debate here, he displayed, by virtue of his legislative experiences, intelligence, firmness and poise of character which have carried him and us by means of his leadership through a stormy period of legislative enactments. Not always has his path been easy, with one-half of the assemblage crying against him and a hostile group seeking to prevent our and his success, and internal dissension within trying to besmirch and disorganize; through all this he has remained calm. He has shown himself able to meet, with that calmness, the great emergencies of government. He has trodden the perilous heights of public duty, and against all the political shafts hurled at him, shafts that might be termed antagonism of political opposition, he has borne unharmed. There has been no flaw found in his armor, no stain upon his shield.

I have learned, and you have learned since we have had relations with him, and since we have had opportunity to observe him in a legislative sense, to admire the power of his direction and the force and good sense of his actions; but more than this, those who know him, who have worked in close connection with him, have acquired for him a real affection. Those who, like ourselves, have seen him work in these recent times, know how much he is united with us and with what ardor he is working for that which we ourselves desire, for we all desire the same thing. We desire before all to lift from the shoulders of the humanity of the State the frightful weight which might press them, so that humanity may continue to enjoy the freedom that the sovereignty of the great State of New Jersey can give to their citizenry by intelligent legislative enactment led by such a sterling legislator. Thus, ladies and gentlemen, it is not only to the Speaker of this session of the House of Assembly of the State of New Jersey, it is to Anthony J. Siracusa, that we propose we should give the Speakership of this assemblage.

The nomination was seconded by Mr. Read, of Cape May county.

The nomination was also seconded by Mrs. Summers, of Passaic county.

Miss Carty, of Hudson county, placed in nomination for Speaker the Hon. Mrs. Marian Urbanski, of Hudson county, which nomination was seconded by Mrs. Finn and Mr. Barison, of Hudson county.

Mr. T. L. Hanson moved that the nominations for Speaker be closed, which motion was adopted.

The Clerk declared the Hon. Anthony J. Siracusa elected Speaker of the General Assembly for the session of 1927.

The Clerk requested Messrs. Chandless, Compton and Miss Carty to act as a committee to escort the Speaker to the bar of the House, where he took and subscribed to the oath of office, and was then escorted to the chair.

Upon assuming the chair the Speaker addressed the House as follows:

I first wish to express my sincere appreciation of the great honor conferred upon me by the members of the New Jersey House of Assembly. It is my hope that you will have no occasion to regret your action in selecting me as Speaker.

Important matters of legislation will be considered at this session, such as the continuation of our State Highway System which contemplates a program of an extent never before undertaken. We will be called upon to decide the best method of financing so

that too great a burden shall not be placed upon our citizenry. Will it be by further bond issues, a gasoline tax or a combination of both?

To the House of Assembly, the popular branch of the Government, and most responsive to the will of the people because of its annual selection, is committed the important constitutional function of originating revenue measures. Tax matters, the most vital concern of government, must originate in the House of Assembly, and it is therefore the duty of the members of the House, and the Speaker promises his best effort, to see that measures which tax our people are of a character which will not only equitably distribute the burden, but include only such measures as are vital and necessary.

Governmental cost must be reduced, and it can best be accomplished in the House of Assembly where tax measures originate.

The Executive and the upper branch of the Legislature more removed from the popular will than the House of Assembly have functions not nearly as important as those committed to the House under the Constitution with respect to taxation. Careful scrutiny of all revenue measures should be the most important function of the session.

Our official attention has been called to the crime wave now prevalent, not only in our own State, but throughout the nation. Can further legislation bring any remedy, or must the remedy, if any, come through a better enforcement of our existing laws covering the commission of the more serious crimes? In this connection the Legislature will be called upon to consider the advisability of creating a more centralized system of detecting and punishing crimes such as the proposed Department of Justice.

It is also our duty to study and if possible to remedy, in some manner, our present system of nominating party candidates for office. Throughout the country there is now a hue and cry against the expenditure of huge sums of money in the procuring of public offices. We must have some method of eliminating this condition and at the same time preserve every prerogative of the individual voter.

Every member of this House has undoubtedly received many communications charging serious election irregularities in certain sections of our State. The election bureaus are creatures of the Legislature and their members are selected by us. It is our duty, as representatives of the people, to properly investigate the alleged conditions. In this manner it would be determined

definitely whether the fault, if any, lies with the election bureaus or with those charged with enforcing our laws.

The Legislature will undoubtedly again be called upon to take some action with reference to prohibition. A great many of our people are urging a referendum to determine the will of the people of New Jersey; others are asking that we petition Congress for some relief; others demand a repeal of the Hobart act, and still others ask that we leave the matter entirely with our representatives in Washington. It is our duty to decide just which of these courses shall be taken.

I wish to recommend the continuation of the policy instituted at the last session of the Legislature of not adjourning until at least ten days after the submission of the Appropriation bill. It is our individual duty to study the Appropriation bill and the Budget Message, and not throw the entire responsibility upon the members of the Appropriation Committee.

The Zoning amendment and the other Constitutional amendments will again be taken up by us as will legislation dealing with our water policy. These are only a few of the matters of importance with which we will be called upon to deal.

Let us consider these matters thoroughly and yet as briefly as may be consistent with the importance of the work before us.

It has been said repeatedly that too many laws are being enacted. Let us, therefore, introduce only such laws as we consider necessary so that the session will not be unnecessarily prolonged. We can be aided greatly to this end by the various committees which shall report out only such legislation as is worthy of passage.

At this time I wish to call to your attention the fact that during the past it seems to me there has been too much lost motion in the conduct of the business of the House. There is no reason why the sessions should not be opened and closed at scheduled times, and to this end I would request that the members convene as promptly as possible, it being my intention to call the House to order at the designated hours.

It will be expected that the various officers of the House shall attend strictly to their duties, which means regular attendance while the House is in session, so that our business may be properly conducted.

There has been much adverse criticism by the public, and justly so, that the Legislature passes too many bills which take effect immediately on their passage. This is unjust to the people of the

State who are affected by these laws without first having had an opportunity to study them. I, therefore, recommend that only those bills be made to take effect immediately that are designated to take care of some pressing need.

In conclusion, I wish to again thank you for your expression of confidence in selecting me as Speaker of the One Hundred and Fifty-first session of the House of Assembly. I am happy in the consideration shown Atlantic county, whose great constituency I represent. May we deal with each other fairly and impartially and may our endeavors prove of lasting benefit to the people of the State of New Jersey.

Mr. T. L. Hanson offered the following resolution, which was read and adopted:

The Speaker declared Frederick A. Brodesser unanimously elected Clerk of the General Assembly for the session of nineteen hundred and twenty-seven, and he took and subscribed to the oath of office, administered by Mr. Comstock, of Passaic county, who is a Master of Chancery of New Jersey.

Mr. T. L. Hanson offered the following resolution, which was read and adopted:

Resolved, That the Speaker appoint forthwith a committee of three to wait upon the Governor and inform him that the House

of Assembly has organized by the election as Speaker of the Hon. Anthony J. Siracusa, of Atlantic county, and of Frederick A. Brodessa, of Union county, as Clerk of the House, and is now ready to proceed to business and to receive any communication he may be pleased to make.

The Speaker named Messrs. Knight, Clift and Mrs. Urbanski as the committee.

The committee appointed by the Speaker to wait upon the Governor reported that he would communicate with the House.

A message was received from the Governor, by the hands of his Secretary, as follows:

GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE.

STATE OF NEW JERSEY,

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT,

JANUARY 11, 1927.

To the Legislature:

To you as members of the One Hundred and Fifty-first Legislature of New Jersey, I respectfully offer the following matters for your consideration. The first three subjects are of such major importance as to demand immediately your careful thought and attention, so as to insure proper legislation at this session.

Generally speaking, our State is in excellent condition. Its financial situation is not only sound, but equaled by few other commonwealths. We are one of the few States, if indeed, not the only one in the United States, whose bonds were sold on a four per cent interest basis. This, however, is a condition rather to be maintained than to be changed by unwise and lavish appropriations.

During the last legislative session an attempt was made to standardize salaries, and many increases were made which should effectually make unnecessary any further increases during the present session.

Incorporated in my Budget Message you will find an especially clear and comprehensive statement of the funds received and disbursed by the State. I recommend a careful study of this statement, as it will enable you to keep your campaign pledge

to economize in the expenditure of the State's money. A great deal of time was spent upon this tabulation and it is worthy of more than passing consideration. I commend it to the business men of our State, and would be glad to receive any suggestions or criticisms they may have to make concerning it. There is in it much of interest and enlightenment; one item which should give us pause is the fact that while the ratables in the State increased in five years 39.05%, the net debt of our municipalities increased 50.02%.

WATER.

The subject of a supply of water for domestic and industrial uses continues to be one of our most important public questions. The Legislature of 1925 designated a Water Policy Commission to study the problem of developing an adequate supply of potable water for the entire State, as required, and the methods to be employed in securing such supply. This Commission reported so late in the session of 1926 that it was not possible for that Legislature to give the subject the attention which its importance demanded. The session was continued over into July for the purpose of giving special and deliberate study to the report of the Water Policy Commission.

The conclusions and recommendations of the Commission, some twenty-one in all, were set forth fully in its report, dated February 27, 1926. The principal recommendation in the report was one authorizing the issuance by the State of New Jersey of ten million dollars of bonds for the purpose of acquiring land for the construction of future water supplies. A bill was submitted to the Legislature by the Commission for the purpose of carrying out this recommendation.

This recommendation and the other proposals of the Commission were not sufficiently definite to win public support. They failed to strike that chord of public sympathy which every great public undertaking must have to be a success. I felt constrained to write a Special Message to the members of the Legislature, under date of June 22, 1926, pointing out what I considered the weaknesses of the program proposed. Very wisely the Legislature took no definite action on the report of the Water Policy

Commission, but continued it for further study and an additional report. A new report will, no doubt, be forthcoming at the present session. When this report is received, I would urge the Legislature to proceed with caution and deliberation. The public should be given ample time to study and digest the report of the Commission, and the municipal authorities of our several municipalities should be invited to participate at public hearings in a discussion of what is proposed. After all, the municipalities are the ones most vitally affected. It is important, of course, to anticipate and plan for additional future water supplies, but it is more important that these plans be formulated with wisdom, with foresight, and with deliberation.

HIGHWAYS.

The value and necessity of improved highways throughout the State is so generally conceded that it is not necessary for me to stress this phase of the situation.

A comprehensive plan has been prepared and submitted to you by the State Highway Commission, which, after some corrections and changes are made, to make it fairly generally satisfactory to the various communities, will provide a very excellent Road System for some twenty years to come. The estimated cost of completing the system is \$163,500,000. While the major portion of this amount will be paid out of revenues already defined, there will remain some sixty to eighty millions to be raised, and the problem is as to the best method of doing this.

There are numerous suggestions which might be offered. It is my purpose to draw your attention to only three or four which are, perhaps, of value.

First. By utilizing the balance of the present bond issue; to issue \$80,000,000 in bonds, spread over a period of five years, commencing 1928, at the rate of \$16,000,000 per annum, which, together with Federal aid and allotment from motor vehicle fees, will produce the required sum.

Second. Utilize the balance of the present bond issue, provide for additional \$30,000,000 fund, spread over a period of three years at the rate of \$10,000,000 per annum, which moneys, to-

gether with a gasoline tax of 2 cents per gallon, to be collected for a period of seven years, will raise the sum required and, approximately, \$12,000,000 more.

Third. Utilize the balance of the present bond issue, collecting a gasoline tax of 2 cents per gallon during a period of seven years, and so revise the motor vehicle fees as to produce 30% more revenue in each year, for, approximately, nine years. This method, if followed, would raise, approximately, \$190,000,000, but would postpone some of the construction for a longer period than originally estimated.

Lastly, I might suggest to you the wisdom of assessing some part of the cost of the Road System upon the land specially benefited thereby, as is the practice in municipal improvements. A striking illustration of what might be regarded as an evil of having the State at large pay for major improvements and the land peculiarly benefited by the improvement escape, except in so far as it shares its proportion of the State's expenses, is in the increase of land values in Bergen County, which came as a result of the projected Hudson River bridge.

Of all these suggestions, I favor the plan of utilizing the balance of the present bond issue, plus the raising of additional funds over a five-year period. It is my understanding that the State is in a position to refund, without increasing the tax upon the people, a bond issue of at least \$60,000,000. Therefore, it is my thought that the amount to be raised over the five-year period should be not more than \$60,000,000, which, with the increase in motor vehicle fees, which it is more than likely will exceed the amount estimated, should be sufficient when added to the other revenues specified. It has been the experience of the past that the motor vehicle receipts each year exceed the estimated amount.

If this suggestion be followed, the roads can be more rapidly constructed and the necessary funds raised and the bonds refunded without in any way increasing the tax or the burden upon the people.

CRIMES.

I am presenting to you today copy of a report made to me by a commission appointed by me to investigate the causes of crime and to suggest remedies therefor.

To incorporate in this message any analysis or review of the commission's work would undoubtedly lengthen it. Some of the recommendations are matters of administrative detail, which can be taken up by the heads of police departments throughout the State.

However, a number of modifications and changes in existing laws are suggested.

The report should be studied, of course, with particular attention being paid to those recommendations which can be put into effect by your body.

CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION.

I am opposed to piece-meal changes in or amendments to our Constitution. That instrument is so archaic and so inadequate to meet the conditions of the present day as to require a complete revision. That can only be effectively secured through the medium of a Constitutional Convention, and I urge upon you the creation of the necessary agencies to formulate a complete, whole and harmonious program making the required changes in the organic law.

For the reasons stated, and also because the purpose of the measures is to confuse the voter with respect to the issues of the campaign in which the various officers will be elected, I am opposed to extensions of the terms of the legislative representatives and the Governor, and to the change which will provide for the election of the Governor in the same year in which the Presidential electors are chosen. No good can come of such change. The interests of the State are important, and the questions to be presented to the voters should be clear-cut and not confounded and confused with any National issues. The measures proposed to be passed at your session and to be submitted to the people, in my judgment, are vicious and should be defeated.

DIRECT PRIMARIES.

The movement to substitute the Convention System for the Direct Primaries is the subject of much discussion, and the general belief is that its only purpose is to deprive the people of their right to a voice in the nomination of candidates for office.

I am opposed to this change. The Direct Primary has proved satisfactory and has been successful ever since it was substituted for the Convention System. To return to the nomination of candidates by delegates in convention assembled would, in my opinion, be a step backward. While it is generally known and conceded that vast amounts of money have been expended in the nomination of candidates under the Direct Primary System, a similar condition would prevail in conventions, yet with this difference—the public would never know how much money was expended. Under the Direct Primary System, a so-called political boss can remain only so long as the people desire him. The power that enthroned him can likewise dethrone him, for it is in the hands of the people. Under the Convention System that power is lost to the people.

JUNE PRIMARY.

I think that we are pretty generally agreed that the maintaining of the June Primary System is a mistake, and I therefore recommend that the September Primary be restored.

PROHIBITION.

The shocking results of the Government's policy in denaturing alcohol have centered public attention upon a new development of the Prohibition problem. The amazing attitude of the representatives of the Anti-Saloon League that poisonous substances should be used by the Government to render unpotable alcohol released for commercial uses is, perhaps, the best evidence that can be offered that they themselves regard the effort to enforce the Eighteenth Amendment, through the medium of the Volstead Act, as a colossal failure.

I know the American people, and I know they will never stand for legalized murder by the wholesale of our citizens in this manner.

Public opinion in this country, although slow to crystallize, when the people are aroused, becomes an irresistible force. Opportunity was recently afforded to the citizens of a number of our States to express their opinion as to the necessity of a change in the present intolerable conditions. In practically every commonwealth in which such a referendum was had the vote was in the affirmative.

New Jersey should remain in the vanguard where it has always been on questions of public importance, and I urge upon you prompt action along two lines: First, the submission to the people of the State of a referendum, which will permit them to express their views; and, secondly, the repeal of the Hobart Act

STATE'S RIGHTS.

In my Inaugural Message I drew attention to the constantly increasing encroachment by the Federal Government upon the powers reserved to the States. Others have become alarmed at this usurpation of power, and, at the present time, many of our States, through their Governors, are meeting in conference to organize resistance to such practice on the part of the Federal authorities.

I deem it of such great importance that I again reiterate the necessity, if our people wish to remain free, of guarding against a gradual absorption by centralized power of the prerogatives of the sovereign States.

STATE PARKS.

While we are considering the industrial development and commercial advantages of our State, we should not overlook the fact that "man does not live by bread alone," and we should aim to make our State attractive by developing our wonderful park and parkway opportunities. With our rivers, lakes, mountains, meadows, sand dunes and highways, we have abundant possibilities for development along these lines. For instance, part of

our present waste meadow lands in the northern counties could be made into a delightfully long parkway, extending for many miles. Because of State expenditures already looming up before us, I do not recommend the immediate allocation of any vast sums for this purpose; yet I respectfully suggest that a Commission should be appointed with sufficient funds to consider the situation, to the end that a plan be prepared linking up all existing parks and suggesting a general park scheme for the entire State.

TRANSIT FACILITIES.

The problem of improved transit facilities among the communities of Northern New Jersey and between those communities and New York City has been the subject of serious study by the North Jersey Transit Commission, established by the Laws of 1926. This Commission will report as to the progress of its work during the 1927 legislative session. A careful study of that report, I am assured, will serve not only further to demonstrate the far-reaching importance, to the State as a whole, of these studies, but also the tremendous difficulties and the enormous amount of work confronting this unsalaried Commission before there can be solved the legal, financial and engineering problems involved in the establishment of a rapid transit system, functioning not only within the boundaries of our own State, but requiring as well the crossing of the political and geographical barrier of the Hudson River. Such a plan, when fully developed, will affect in one way or another every railroad with terminal facilities on the west bank of the Hudson, and will require the active co-operation of the public authorities of our sister State of New York for its practical realization. Much work remains to be done, and I sincerely urge the careful study of the report by the Legislature and the provision of sufficient funds to allow of the further unhampered prosecution of this great project, upon the solution of which depends to a large extent the full realization of the economic possibilities of northern New Jersey.

PORT OF NEW YORK AUTHORITY.

The Port of New York Authority is now engaged in building three bridges—two across the Arthur Kill, connecting New Jersey with Staten Island, New York, and another across the Hudson River, connecting the upper part of the Borough of Manhattan with Fort Lee. The Port Authority has been able to market bonds at exceedingly advantageous prices, indicating the judgment of the financial world as to the merits of the projects and the faith of the public in the Port Authority. Of these securities, \$14,000,000 worth were sold to provide funds for the Arthur Kill Bridges, and \$20,000,000 worth to defray the expenses of the initial construction of the Hudson River Bridge. The Port Authority may be expected shortly also to announce plans for another bridge between New Jersey and Staten Island, this time giving direct connection between Bayonne and Port Richmond.

The various projects upon which the Port Authority is engaged will bring Northern New Jersey closer in a business and social sense to the great City of New York, and facilitate the interchange of goods and the intercommunication of the population of the two sections. There can be no question that such projects as its Comprehensive Plan, which will provide direct rail communication for freight transportation between all parts of the Port District, will result to the benefit of both States and the local communities. There is no surrender of sovereignty on the part of New Jersey, when it enters into an arrangement whereby it secures its rightful share of the advantages of the harbor of New York, the greatest harbor in point of natural situation and development in the world, nor can there be any question that, as the projects of the Port Authority approach fruition, there will be a greatly augmented flow of population and wealth to New Jersey; and an intensive industrial and commercial development, with a consequent benefit to the whole State.

THE NEWARK MEADOWS.

With the metropolitan area tunneling, bridging and resorting to all conceivable means of expansion, and with all the municipal authorities within the metropolitan district creating commissions to study the mistakes of the past and devise plans for remedying these mistakes, definite consideration must be given to the 27,000 acres of marsh lands adjoining Newark Bay and its tributaries. These marsh lands extend from Elizabeth, north-eastward to Hackensack and Englewood, a distance of about eighteen miles.

The Newark meadows have an area of approximately 7,289 acres, and the Hackensack marshes a total area of about 20,000 acres.

It seems as if a wise Providence provided these meadow lands and dictated that they should not be developed, because within the confines of these meadows a city the size of New York could be properly planned and developed, with ample room for expansion, and I predict that if guided properly, the next twenty-five years will show a development in this area that will out-rival any development the world has ever known.

At the last session of the Legislature I had introduced and passed a bill authorizing the Board of Commerce and Navigation to make a survey and report on the development of the meadow lands. This report will be in your hands shortly.

I believe that the work is of such magnitude that it should not be delegated to any commission having other functions, and that a commission should be created whose only function should be the preparation of a comprehensive plan for the development of this entire area.

During the course of the session I shall present for your consideration a bill creating a commission to do this work.

BLACKWELL, DIVORCE ACT.

While this act is still with us, it is no less pernicious, and to preserve the American home I again recommend its repeal.

PLACES OF PUBLIC ASSEMBLY.

My attention has been drawn to the fact that there are many communities in the State which do not have building codes or ordinances, or other regulations prescribing and requiring certain standards to which buildings or other structures to which the public is to be invited, must comply. I suggest that a law be passed which will require, in the absence of a building code or such ordinance, submission to the State Department of Labor of the plans and specifications for the construction of structures for public assembly.

BEACH POLLUTION.

This grave menace to the attractiveness and development of our shore resorts will, I believe, never be fully removed until all dumping of refuse is prohibited. In our efforts to relieve this nuisance, we have had the active support of the Secretary of War. Under date of November twenty-third last he submitted to me a report from the City of New York in which the promise is made to proceed rapidly with the installation of reduction plants to take care of all the garbage of that city.

It seems to me that Congress and the Secretary of War should be memorialized by your body to the end that a reasonable time limit should be set, at the expiration of which all dumping of garbage will be prohibited.

HOUSING.

In the strict sense of the word, there are no slums existing in New Jersey at the present time. There are, however, in the larger cities, certain small areas which are congested. These districts are so small, however, that they cannot be termed slums. Buildings in these districts are old, but have been made to comply with the present laws, and are as habitable as it is possible to make them. The removal of what bad conditions remain in these districts is a matter for local enforcement.

The Tenement House Department, whose primary object is, of course, the protection of the lives and health of occupants

of tenement houses, is endeavoring at all times to secure legislation where possible to reduce the cost of buildings without in any way impairing the safety of the occupants.

Living conditions in the tenement houses have been improving steadily for the past twenty years, and it is only a question of a short time until all over-congested districts will be removed. I do not feel that any new laws are necessary, but a strict enforcement of the sanitary code in the municipalities.

INSTITUTIONS AND AGENCIES.

I have visited many of our institutions and conferred with members of the Board of Control and of the Boards of Managers, in an effort to co-operate in this important work.

I am impressed with the fact that under the new Commissioner, marked improvement has been shown. He is energetic, capable, has common sense and keeps his feet on the ground.

MILK SUPPLY.

Milk is a produce which is of vital importance to our people. The farmers of our State are endeavoring, and succeeding, I believe, in furnishing a pure and wholesome supply. They are greatly hampered, however, by the fact that each municipality sets up a standard of its own, thus making it difficult for the farmer to meet all of the individual demands.

A general standard should be set, and it seems to me that if your body, in its wisdom, would appoint a committee to look into the matter, with the end in view of getting all the health authorities to agree upon a standard program, it would facilitate the farmer and insure a stable condition in this highly important field.

CONCLUSION.

There are other matters to which I shall call your attention as occasion may demand.

In conclusion, may I assure you that my attitude will continue to be one of co-operation, for, after all, we are here to advance the best interests of a State which is growing so rapidly

and which is surrounded by so many opportunities that it demands unselfish devotion, our best thought and unbiased judgment if it is to receive its full measure of prosperity.

REPORT OF CRIME COMMISSION.

JANUARY 11, 1927.

To Honorable Governor A. Harry Moore:

YOUR EXCELLENCY—We have the honor to present the following report relating to crime in New Jersey, for submission to the Legislature, with such recommendations as you may deem appropriate.

Much stress has been laid upon the term "Crime Wave." Whether or not this term is justified is of little moment, for academic or statistical niceties will not down the fact that the people of this State have suffered from many acts of banditry which have been both spectacular and violent. The criminal element has been constant and persistent in its attack on organized society, in which it has shown a plan marked by boldness and deliberation, and it stands as a challenge to law and order. This commission, with a view to the making of recommendations to meet this abnormal situation, have conferred, held meetings, examined reports and statistics of various commissions, both national and state, and sought the opinions and suggestions of many officials whose contact with the administration of criminal law made their advice valuable. In addition, we invited suggestions from individuals generally. With this data before us and aided by our own personal experience in matters germane to the issue, we make the following recommendations:

THE CAUSES OF CRIME.

This commission will not attempt to assign or determine causes of the present crime situation. The following, taken from the report of the New York State Joint Legislative Committee on the Co-ordination of Civil and Criminal Practice Acts, covers the situation well in the following language:

"Every conceivable cause has been assigned to account for the present situation. One asserts; another controverts. By some the World War is held largely responsible for the increase of crime, but this view is not ten-

able, as has been pointed out by a committee of the American Bar Association. Other causes assigned are the great mass of unenforceable laws; the decrease in social and moral responsibility on the part of people generally; the ease and facility with which persons can obtain the tools of criminals—the pistol and the automobile; the waning of religious faith; the breaking up of home life; the lessening of responsibility of the family; the modern doctrine of 'self-expression'; the departure from the old doctrine of discipline; the glorification of the criminal in the popular press and in fiction; the influence of moving pictures in similar fashion; the hip flask; narcotic drugs; the alien strain in our population; the display of great wealth; the automobile, permitting freedom of movement; the Bedouin life existence of the modern American and his greater mobility; excessive work; insufficient work; childhood complexes; the coddling of the criminal; glandular defects; brain lesions; urban conditions of living; a jazz existence; sentimentalism; the failure to enforce laws; and others too numerous to mention. Underlying all these is the necessity of the re-assertion of that broad and quickening religious feeling referred to by our President last fall in an address, in which he said:

“It is this absolute necessity for support of the Government outside of itself, through religion, that I wish to impress upon this assembly. Without that support political effort would be practically fruitless. It is not in any denominational or any narrow and technical sense that I refer to religion. I mean to include all that can be brought within that broad general definition. * * * While certain formalities of the past may have lost the hold they once had, I do not see any diminution in the steadfastness of the religious convictions of the people. * * * It (the country) needs more religion. If there are any general failures in the enforcement of the law, it is because there have first been general failures in the dis-

position to observe the law. I can conceive of no adequate remedy for the evils which beset society except through the influences of religion. There is no form of education which will not fail, there is no form of government which will not fail, there is no form of reward which will not fail. Redemption must come through sacrifice, and sacrifice is the essence of religion. It will be of untold benefit if there is a broader comprehension of this principle by the public * * *.”

REMEDIES.

The detection and arrest of the criminal is essentially a police problem, which calls for a system of policing commensurate with the emergency. Crime is not local. Neither municipal nor State lines serve as a barrier to criminal activity. Under the circumstances, there ought to be a close co-operation and a system of quick communication between the various police departments. To that end, a signal system should be established by all municipalities, whereby men on duty can be immediately notified as to the commission of a crime. The real problem is not found in the municipalities where an organized police force is maintained. The difficulty presents itself in the smaller communities or rural districts. A specific recommendation cannot be made at this time without further consideration as to some system by which a general notification could be made which would satisfactorily meet the problem. The Legislature should appoint a committee and make a sufficient appropriation to enable a careful inquiry as to the best means available to bring about the result of complete co-operation and co-ordination of service throughout the State. The use of the radio and a general alarm system have been suggested, but the feasibility of these plans depends upon further investigation. Some states have adopted the use of the stock ticker, each police headquarters being equipped, and the alarm sent out immediately. This would be beneficial in small communities, particularly where at times the Police Headquarters is untended by an officer, because this

would work automatically, and upon the officer's return the record would be there. In keeping with this thought, the police departments of the State should be equipped with modern appliances, such as automobiles, fire arms, or any other means that might be utilized in the prevention and detection of crime. The use of finger prints and photographs has demonstrated their worth in the detection of criminals. However, when arrests are made, and convictions had for offenses committed in localities not so equipped for such recordation, the files are incomplete in that respect. To meet this deficiency, the Commission recommends that each county probation office be equipped with an identiscope and a fingerprint outfit, and that the record of every person convicted or who pleaded guilty or non vult to an indictable offense, shall include his photograph or fingerprint or prints. In addition to the county record, there ought to be a bureau located at Trenton, wherein duplicate records, including photographs and fingerprints of persons convicted or who pleaded guilty or non vult to an indictable offense shall be filed. These records should be available to police departments generally for inspection or copy under the supervision of the directing head. This department could be made part of the Secretary of State's office or of the State Police, or made the subject of a department created expressly for that purpose. This need is urgent and should be instituted at once. And, if the central bureau, referred to in the next paragraph, comes into being, all records and data collected should form a part thereof.

It has come to the attention of this commission that in a recent case five different police departments were working all independently of each other, without any directing head. The commission suggests that a committee be appointed, made up of the same personnel designated to inquire into the merits of a system of broadcasting, as mentioned heretofore, or of others, to study this problem as to the advisability of the creation of a central bureau in charge of a State Commissioner of Public Safety, who shall have power to assume, at the direction of the Governor, the investigation of crime and bring about a closer co-ordination of police agencies throughout the State. The commissioner

should collect and classify criminal statistics and have authority to call upon all local offices for reports.

AUTOMOBILE REGULATIONS.

The use of the automobile by the criminal presents a difficult problem. Many suggestions have been made concerning the licensing and registration of automobiles. This Commission feels that power should be vested in the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles to inquire into the fitness of an applicant for any license, and to make a compliance with reasonable regulations fixed by the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles a condition precedent to the obtaining of any license or permit.

In most instances the automobile used by the criminal has been a stolen one. This, coupled with police statistics, that four out of five stolen cars were not equipped with a locking device, suggests the advisability of the compulsory use of some locking device on all motor vehicles. This will at least make it more difficult for the thief to steal a car.

FIREARMS.

The Legislature should seek appropriate national legislation by memorial to Congress, or otherwise, to permit the State control, through the various municipal units, in the distribution of all firearms which come into this State under the protection accorded to interstate commerce. The National Legislature should empower the State to so regulate the importation of firearms so that no one could obtain a firearm without the same passing through the hands of the police department of the municipality wherein the purchaser or applicant resides. This would discourage the promiscuous buying through mail-order houses, which is so prevalent today.

CRIMINAL RENDEZVOUS.

Testimony at recent trials is replete with stories of criminal associations and of the forming of friendships culminating in

robbery and murder by concerted action of men who meet in cabarets, clubs, coffee-houses, pool-rooms and restaurants. In many instances, the proprietor or manager is an ex-convict, wholly in sympathy with the criminal plans of the element which makes up his patronage. This commission is not unmindful of the statute concerning the maintenance of disorderly houses and the possibility of indictment for the harboring of thieves, drunkards, or other idle or vicious persons; but it recommends as a preventative measure the licensing of all clubs, road-houses, cabarets, coffee-houses, pool-rooms and restaurants, lunch-wagons or stands, conducted either on private property or along the public highways. The granting of such licenses should be vested in the governing body of the municipal unit wherein any such place is located. The purpose of this is not so much for the accrument of revenue as it is for control and regulation of such enterprise. Under this plan the revocation of the license could be immediate upon proof of the character of habitues or any good causes shown to the governing body. This commission recommends that upon complaint or petition by five citizens of the municipal unit wherein such club, road-house, cabaret, coffee-house, pool-room, restaurant, lunch-wagon or stand is situated presented to the Court of Common Pleas, and it appearing that a complaint had heretofore been made to the licensing body, the Court of Common Pleas, or any judge thereof, may summarily inquire, by taking testimony or otherwise, upon notice to the owner or proprietor of the said place, and, if the allegations are proved to the satisfaction of the said court or judge thereof, he may revoke said license..

This commission further recommends that the conducting of any of the enumerated places without a license issued by the body or person authorized to do so will constitute a misdemeanor.

CRIMES ACT.

The present Crimes Act was passed in 1898, and supplemented and amended from time to time since. In the main, however, it stands as originally enacted. The penalties provided therein in many instances seem inadequate. We recommend, therefore, the following changes:

Carrying concealed weapons. To read "carrying weapons about the person or in any vehicle." To read "seven" instead of three years' imprisonment.

Robbery. To read "twenty-five" instead of fifteen years.

Define "banditry" and "hold-up" and make the maximum penalty life imprisonment.

Assault with intent to rob. To read "fifteen" instead of seven years.

Larceny from the person. To read "ten" instead of seven years.

Breaking and entering buildings, etc., with intent to kill, etc. To read "twenty" instead of seven years.

Entering buildings, etc., with intent to kill, rob, steal, etc. To read "twenty" instead of seven years.

Manufacturing or having burglars' tools in possession. To read "ten" instead of seven years.

Burglary. To read "fifteen" instead of seven years.

Receiving stolen goods. To read "seven" instead of three years.

Assault with intent to kill, commit burglary, etc. To read "twenty-five" instead of twelve years.

This commission further recommends a severer penalty for a second offender who had been at a prior time sentenced to State prison, without the necessity of setting forth in the indictment an allegation of the first conviction, which is necessary under our present statute. This amendment would meet a condition wherein the prosecutor has learned of a prior conviction and servitude in State prison after plea or conviction in the instant case.

CRIMINAL PROCEDURE.

Our statutes relating to criminal procedure have anticipated many proposed reforms and are conducive to a prompt and speedy trial. To make it more adaptable to present needs this commission recommends a change in the challenging of jurors in criminal cases.

Under Sec. 80 of the Criminal Procedure Act of 1898, every person who shall be indicted for treason, murder, misprison of treason, manslaughter, sodomy, rape, arson, burglary, robbery,

forgery, perjury or subordination of perjury, and shall plead not guilty shall be permitted peremptorily to challenge twenty of the jury. These offenses are denominated as common law offenses in contradistinction to other statutory violations. Under this section the State is entitled to but twelve challenges. This inequality is apparent and puts the State at a great disadvantage. We recommend that this section be amended increasing the State's challenges to twenty, and further amended to provide that in the event of more than one defendant being indicted for any offense enumerated in this section, that twenty-two peremptory challenges be given, and, in the event of more than two being indicted, that for each defendant, two additional challenges be allowed and the total challenges to be divided equally among the defendants.

Sec. 81 provides for the peremptory challenging by the defendant or the defendants and the State of ten prospective jurors. The judicial construction of this section holds that the defendants' challenge must be joint. One defendant cannot challenge one juror and another defendant another juror; but each shall have a right to say whether a challenge shall be interposed. This situation opens the door to possible error and, with a view to meeting this we suggest an amendment to Sec. 81, providing that in the event of two defendants being tried that twelve challenges be allotted to the defendants, to be divided equally between them, and, in the event of more than two defendants being tried jointly that two additional peremptory challenges shall be allotted to each defendant, the total challenges to be divided among all of the defendants

SELECTION OF JURORS.

Sec. 82 of the Criminal Procedure Act provides that in all cases where any defendant in any indictment is entitled to twenty peremptory challenges is to have a list of the jury delivered to him previous to his trial and it shall be the duty of the sheriff or other proper officer to draw such list of forty-eight jurors from the general panel of jurors summoned to attend as jurors

at the term. In view of the fact that upon the exhausting of the forty-eight names the Court is privileged to summon the rest of the general panel; we see no good reason for continuance of the rule providing for the drawing of forty-eight names in the first instance. There has been considerable confusion as to the interpretation of this section and resulting in several dissenting opinions by our Court of Appeals with relation to the propriety of the drawing of jurors under this section. To avoid the possible miscarriage in a meritorious case due to technical error, we recommend that in place of the service of forty-eight selected names upon the defendant or defendants that a copy of the general panel drawn for the specific term be served at least two days before trial.

SENTENCES.

We recommend an amendment to the statute wherein the Court has power within six months after the passing of sentence to change the same so that it shall read thirty days.

APPEALS.

Much criticism has been directed to the delay in the determination of criminal cases on appeal. This undoubtedly is the result of the increasing number of cases on the calendar of both the Supreme Court and the Court of Errors and Appeals. This commission recommends that this subject be taken up with the Supreme Court with a view to working out some plan by rule for the expediting of criminal appeals.

Many appeals are prosecuted, based upon alleged errors which are groundless and have no merit. This is very often done for the purpose of delay in the execution of the judgment of the Court. To meet that we recommend that no writ of error be issued in a criminal case, except a capital offense, unless a certificate of reasonable doubt be issued by the trial court or by a justice of the Supreme Court on application.

We further recommend that no defendant be admitted to bail after conviction and pending the determination of the judgment

on appeal unless good cause be shown to the trial court. This will materially lessen the number of appeals sued out, and, consequently, reduce the number of cases before the appellate court.

JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5.

Joint Resolution creating a commission to be known as the Blue Law Revision Commission, and defining its powers and duties.

BE IT ENACTED *by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:*

1. There is hereby created a joint commission to be known as the Blue Law Revision Commission consisting of three members of the Senate, to be appointed by the President thereof, and three members of the House of Assembly, to be appointed by the Speaker thereof, for the purpose of making a full and complete investigation of the present-day observance of the Vice and Immorality act and the amendments thereto, with a view to revising the said act so as to comply with modern-day custom and popular demand, due regard being had to the fact that the American Sunday, as a day of rest, is a national institution.

2. The said commission, so constituted, shall organize by the selection of a chairman and secretary. The said Commission shall hold such hearings as may be necessary and at such places in the State as it may deem advisable, and shall report its recommendations to the next session of the Legislature in the form of a bill revising and modernizing the Vice and Immorality act and the amendments thereto, commonly known as the Blue Laws.

3. The members of the commission shall serve without salary but there is hereby appropriated the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00), which said sum, or so much thereof as may be necessary, may be expended to effectuate this resolution when such

sum is included in any annual or supplemental appropriation bill.

4. This joint resolution shall take effect immediately.

Approved March 23, 1926.

FINAL REPORT OF THE BLUE LAW REVISION COMMISSION.

The Blue Law Revision Commission created by joint resolution of the 1926 Legislature to revise the Vice and Immorality act herewith submits for the ratification and enactment of the 1927 Legislature, a measure designed to carry out the mandate of the last Legislature, as contained in the aforementioned resolution, namely, "To revise the said act so as to comply with modern-day custom and popular demand, due regard being had to the fact that the American Sunday, as a day of rest, is a national institution."

The proposed measure has been prepared after many weeks' deliberation and investigation by members of the commission and is presented as the most practical method of meeting the present deplorable situation wherein a law of the State is continuously and universally violated in one part or another throughout the length and breadth of New Jersey.

For the purpose of further enlightenment, a public hearing, five hours in duration, was held December 1st, 1926, at the State House, in which every citizen was given full opportunity to present his or her views on the general observance and enforcement of the so-called Blue Laws. At this hearing, widely attended by Ministers of the Gospel; Representatives of the Lord's Day Alliance, the Religious Liberty Association and lay members of the Church from all parts of New Jersey, it was readily admitted by every speaker that the present act, so far as it relates to Sunday activities, was not only violated and ignored by the people themselves, but by public officials and administrative officers as well and should be altered to meet present conditions.

In spite of the divergent opinion expressed as to the extent of revision, two facts were conclusively established to the satisfaction of the commission and will be apparent to anyone, adult or minor, who will take the time to visit centers of population in different sections of the State and witness the forms of Sunday diversion engaged in by the residents of such localities.

The first fact confronting us, then, is that violation of the Blue Laws is not confined to any one section of the State but is State-wide in scope.

The second fact before us is that violation of the law is not uniform but varies widely in different localities.

Both of these facts are self-evident and therefore no general State-wide prohibitive statute arbitrarily declaring certain forms of innocent diversions legal, and others illegal will comply with State-wide modern day custom and popular demand. Lest there be any doubt, however, in the minds of any member of the Legislature, attention is respectfully called to an act of the Legislature known as the County Park act of 1920, by which the Legislature has made legal in county parks the Sunday playing and participating in sports, plays, games, recreations, concerts and amusements, that still constitute a direct violation of the Vice and Immorality act when engaged in by children of the State in any other portion of God's territory, other than the State-hallowed county parks. Here we have the absurd spectacle of the State proclaiming to the citizenry of New Jersey: It is entirely permissible and righteous for your children to play tennis and baseball, to swim and canoe, skate and sleigh on our property on Sunday but illegal and most sinful on your own property.

What right has the State to attempt to rewrite for God the precepts of the fourth commandment. If such acts on Sunday are sinful in the eyes of our Lord and Master on private property, they are surely just as sinful on public property and the State will never be able by legislation to deny it.

But three or four counties in the State are blessed with these sin-purging county parks, with the result that the children of Essex county, for example, may play their games on Sunday as law abiding citizens; but children of Passaic county and fifteen or sixteen other counties of New Jersey, which cannot boast of sanctimonious county parks, as criminals. What sort of reverence and respect for law can we hope to instill in the plastic minds of the younger generation, with our law so full of false inconsistencies and unjust discriminations.

In making legal Sunday games and other innocent forms of recreation in county parks, the State has set its stamp of approval on the playing of such games on Sunday, and the fact that there has been no clamor for the repeal of this so-called liberal Sabbath measure, since its passage seven years ago, by any religious denomination of New Jersey or any non-religious body of the State allows us to assume that the churches themselves have placed their stamp of approval on the provisions of the statute, and that the playing of such games and engaging in such diversions as are allowed under the County Park act of 1920 on Sunday are in accord with modern day custom and popular demand.

It will be of interest to note that our observations of the Sunday habits of the people of New Jersey to-day bring us to quite

a similar conclusion as the 1908 crime commission appointed by Ex-Governor Fort, nineteen years ago, as to the urgency of a liberal revision of the present prohibitory Blue Laws. An excerpt of this report reads as follows:

"We also find that the State has pursued a narrow policy with respect to wholesome athletic sports among the young. 'An idle head, the devil's workshop.' Young people, thousands of whom are forced to work six days in every week, have only Sunday for relaxation and recreation; harsh laws, made to fit other times, other peoples and other conditions, prevent the youth of to-day from finding harmless and healthful outdoor occupation on this day of idleness by witnessing ball games and other innocent outdoor sports, and thus encourage them to spend their time gambling and drinking and in places where they ought not to be.

"The plain and important remedy, in the opinion of this commission, is the revision of the so-called 'blue-laws' relics remaining on the statute books, so as to make sports, under reasonable restrictions relating to the maintenance of public order and the prevention of a nuisance, legal on Sunday, at least the afternoon of Sunday."

With these considerations before it, the commission has endeavored to carry out the mandate of the last Legislature by bringing the Blue Laws into conformity with modern day custom and popular demand, at the same time safeguarding to the people of New Jersey the right to observe without molestation the first day of the week as the Seventh day or Sabbath of the Lord. A solution of the problem offered by the commission for the consideration of the Legislature is contained in the proposed measure hereafter set forth. This measure would remove the stain of criminality from those innocent diversions, lawful in themselves on every other day of the week, upon which the State has already placed its official stamp of approval for Sunday as well, by the County Park act of 1920, provided the persons so participating do not disturb others in their observance of Sunday as the hallowed day of rest. Regulation of such Sunday diversion and amusement would repose in the governing body of the municipalities of the State with authority to pass ordinances, regulating the conduct of such diversions and forms of recreation, and controlling, regulating or restricting the commercialization of any and all such activities within their boundaries.

The passage of such a local option measure appears to us as the only practical way for the Legislature to comply with modern

day custom and popular demand, at the same time safeguarding to the individual his constitutional right of worshipping God according to the dictate of his own conscience.

We respectfully recommend the prompt enactment of such a law by the Legislature of New Jersey.

I concur in the above report in respect to the fact that there exists an unquestionable need for a modification of the present Sunday laws and undoubtedly their repeal in the majority of cases except perhaps commercialized amusements. However, it does not seem to me that local option as recommended in the report is the most advisable procedure as a remedy unless the same is ratified by the public and the voters. The observance of Sunday as the same may be affected by commercialized amusements is a matter which is based on public policy as dictated by the public conception of morality and can only be properly determined by the people of New Jersey at a State-wide referendum.

BE IT ENACTED *by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:*

1. Section one of the act to which this act is an amendment be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

That from and after the passage of this act it shall not be unlawful for any person or persons on the Christian Sabbath, or first day of the week, commonly called Sunday, to engage in or take part in any form of recreation, sport, amusement or occupation, that is not unlawful on other days of the week, provided that in so doing such person or persons does not disturb others in their observance of the first day of the week as the Sabbath; *provided, however,* that the governing bodies of the municipalities, or incorporated camp meeting associations of this State shall have the power to adopt such ordinances or rules as they may deem necessary and proper to control and regulate the conduct of such forms of recreation, sports, amusement or occupations, and to control, regulate, restrict or prohibit the commercialization of any such form or forms of recreation, sport, amusement or occupation, within their respective boundaries, and may prescribe fines and penalties for the violation of the same, which shall be enforced and collected in the same manner as is now provided by law for the violation of other ordinances and rules of such municipalities or associations.

2. All acts or parts of acts inconsistent with the provisions of this act be and the same are hereby repealed.

3. This act shall take effect the first day of April, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-seven.

To the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

In accordance with chapter 344 of the laws of New Jersey, approved July 19th, 1926, the Water Policy Commission undertook negotiations with commissions representing the State of New

York and the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania with reference to a compact as to the waters of the Delaware river.

We were ably assisted on the technical questions involved by Mr. Frank H. Sommer, general counsel of the commission, and by a staff of engineers consisting of Messrs. George W. Fuller, Morris R. Sherrerd and Charles F. Breitzke.

An agreement having been arrived at, the draft of the compact proposed is herewith transmitted. This has been signed by all of the representatives of New Jersey, except Mr. Edward L. Young, who found it impossible to accept the appointment to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Mr. Palmer Campbell.

We were aided in our study of the questions involved by the work of those who negotiated the compact previously rejected by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and the State of New Jersey.

We found it desirable at this time to propose only a partial allocation of the waters of the Delaware river in such a manner as to protect adequately the interests of New Jersey, since conditions may arise within the next twenty-five or fifty years which cannot be foreseen and properly dealt with in the compact now submitted.

We hold ourselves in readiness to answer any questions which may be asked or to submit such additional information as may be desired.

COMPACT AS TO THE WATERS OF THE DELAWARE RIVER.

THE COMMONWEALTH OF PENNSYLVANIA—THE STATE OF NEW
JERSEY—THE STATE OF NEW YORK.

COMPACT.

The Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, the State of New Jersey and the State of New York having appointed as commissioners, for the purpose of negotiating a compact with respect to the water resources of the Delaware river: Charles H. Miner, Robert Y. Stuart, Philip P. Wells, for the Commonwealth of

Pennsylvania; Willard I. Hamilton, Henry G. Parker, Harry Bacharach, S. Wood McClave, Carroll P. Bassett, F. Morse Archer, Edward L. Young, for the State of New Jersey; George MacDonald, Rudolph Reimer, Jefferson DeMont Thompson, for the State of New York; the said commissioners, after negotiations, have agreed upon the following articles:

ARTICLE I.

This compact, between the sovereign States of Pennsylvania, New Jersey and New York, is entered into to provide for the preservation of the Delaware river and, consistent with such object, to enable each of the said States to make use of a part of the waters thereof for the purpose of meeting present and reasonably prospective needs. This compact does not allocate the remaining waters nor fix any ratio or principle to govern future divisions.

ARTICLE II.

Where used in this compact, singular words shall be considered as including the plural, masculine words shall be construed as including the feminine and neuter, and the following terms and expressions shall have the meanings respectively designated for each:

(1) The term "waters of the Delaware river" means the surface waters originating within the Delaware drainage basin.

(2) The term "channel" or "channel of the Delaware river" means the bed of the Delaware river and the lands on and over which the waters of said river flow, beginning at the place where said river crosses latitude forty-two degrees ($42^{\circ} 00'$), the northern boundary of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, and extending thence continuously as the said river winds and turns down to latitude forty degrees twelve and one-half minutes ($40^{\circ} 12\frac{1}{2}'$) near Trenton Falls.

(3) The term "Delaware drainage basin" means the total area of both land and water from which the surface waters flow down to where the channel of the Delaware river crosses latitude forty degrees twelve and one-half minutes ($40^{\circ} 12\frac{1}{2}'$).

(4) The term "Upper Basin" means that part of the Delaware drainage basin from which the surface waters flow down to where the channel of the Delaware river crosses latitude forty-one degrees twenty-one and one-quarter minutes ($41^{\circ} 21\frac{1}{4}'$), below the mouth of the Neversink river and near the point which marks the boundary between the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and the States of New Jersey and New York.

(5) The term "Lower Basin" means that part of the Delaware drainage basin which is not embraced within the Upper Basin.

(6) The term "tributary" or "tributary of the Delaware river" means any watercourse, the waters of which naturally flow into the channel of the Delaware river.

(7) The term "development" means making water available for use or diversion by the construction of any intake, dam or other works.

(8) The term "develop" means to make available by development.

(9) The term "point of storage" means the place on a tributary or in the channel of the Delaware river at which a dam is maintained for the purpose of creating storage.

(10) The term "point of diversion" means the place at which water is diverted from a tributary or from the channel of the Delaware river.

(11) The term "diversion" when referring to the water of a tributary means the taking or removal from that tributary of water which is not returned into the channel of the Delaware river either above the point at which the tributary enters said channel or within a distance of twelve miles below that point, measured along the center line of said channel. When referring to the channel of the Delaware river this term means the taking or removal from said channel of water which is not returned into said channel or into the Delaware river below latitude forty degrees twelve and one-half minutes ($40^{\circ} 12\frac{1}{2}'$) within a distance of twelve miles below the place of taking or removal, measured along the center line of said channel and river.

(12) The term "divert" means to effect a diversion.

(13) The term "domestic and municipal" as applied to the use of water means the use of water by or for water-works serving the public.

(14) The term "sanitation" as applied to the use of water means the use of water for the conveyance of sewage and other wastes.

(15) The term "industry" as applied to the use of water means the use of water for manufacturing and industrial purposes, other than power, when the water used is not taken from water-works serving the public.

(16) The term "power" as applied to the use of water means all use of water, direct or indirect, for the generation of energy.

(17) The term "navigation" as applied to the use of water means the use of water for transportation and for the operation of water craft.

(18) The term "commission" means the Tri-State Delaware River Commission.

ARTICLE III.

For the purposes of this compact the order of importance and public value of water shall be: (A) domestic and municipal, (B) sanitation, (C) industry and power, and (D) navigation.

ARTICLE IV.

Subject to the duties and obligations imposed by this compact, any administrative department or political subdivision authorized in that behalf by or under the laws of any signatory State, or any corporation, partnership, association or person hereafter so authorized, may exercise the rights and privileges herein conferred on such State in conformity with such other terms and conditions as that State may impose and under such further requirements as the commission may prescribe in the exercise of its authority under this compact.

ARTICLE V.

Subject to the provisions of this compact, each signatory State may divert water from any tributary of the Delaware river within that State or from the channel or from both. The total quantity which may be diverted by each State in any one calendar year shall not exceed the following:

Pennsylvania—Three hundred twenty-eight and one-half (328½) billion gallons, which total quantity is equivalent to an average of nine hundred (900) million gallons daily.

New Jersey—Two hundred nineteen (219) billion gallons, which total quantity is equivalent to an average of six hundred (600) million gallons daily.

New York—Two hundred nineteen (219) billion gallons, which total quantity is equivalent to an average of six hundred (600) million gallons daily.

The quantities of water herein authorized to be diverted are in addition to all quantities of water which have heretofore been lawfully diverted by the normal operation of all works existing and in actual operation within each State in the Delaware drainage basin when this compact becomes effective, and the future diversion of water in quantities not exceeding those heretofore lawfully diverted by the normal operation of such works shall not be charged against the total quantity which may be diverted under authority of this article by that signatory State in which said works are located.

ARTICLE VI.

Diversions allowable under Article V may be made by each signatory State from any tributary of the Delaware river within that State for use either within or without the Delaware drainage basin, subject to the following restrictions and limitations:

(1) Authority for every development shall be obtained, and every development shall be carried out, under the laws of the State in which it is located.

(2) On every tributary from which a diversion is made there shall be provided sufficient storage to insure the reserve flows required by this article.

(3) Within the Upper Basin, at all times during the months of July, August, September and October, there shall be released from storage and delivered into the tributary or into the channel of the Delaware river above the point at which the tributary enters said channel, a reserve flow equal to forty-five hundredths (0.45) of a cubic foot per second for each square mile of drainage area above the point of storage; during the remainder of the year such reserve flow shall be maintained only on the days when the flow from the drainage area above the point of storage is less than forty-five hundredths (0.45) of a cubic foot per second for each square mile of drainage area above the point of storage.

(4) Within the Lower Basin there shall at all times be released from storage and delivered into the tributary or into the channel of the Delaware river above the point at which the tributary enters said channel a reserve flow equal to fifteen hundredths (0.15) of a cubic foot per second for each square mile of drainage area above the point of storage.

ARTICLE VII.

Diversions allowable under Article V may be made by each signatory State from the channel of the Delaware river for use either within or without the Delaware drainage basin, subject to the following restrictions and limitations:

(1) All diversions shall be made in accordance with schedules which shall be prescribed from time to time by the commission. In the Upper Basin said schedules shall allow to each diverting State at least one-third of the flow over and above the reserve flow requirements; in the Lower Basin said schedules shall allow to each diverting State at least one-half of the flow over and above the reserve flow requirements. Any schedule prescribed by the commission authorizing the diversion of more than one-third of the divertible flow in the Upper Basin or of more than one-half

of the divertible flow in the Lower Basin shall not operate to create an irrevocable right to continue such excess diversion nor to prevent the commission from at any time modifying or changing any such schedule to allow to each diverting State in the Upper Basin only one-third of the divertible flow or to allow to each diverting State in the Lower Basin only one-half of the divertible flow, or to prevent the commission from at any time modifying or changing any such schedule in any other manner that may be necessary to meet the conditions existing at the time such change or modification is made.

(2) In the absence of storage at the place where the diversion is accomplished no water shall be diverted from the channel within the Upper Basin unless the flow in the channel is in excess of a reserve flow of forty-five hundredths (0.45) of a cubic foot per second per square mile of drainage area above the point of diversion. In every diversion, in the Upper Basin, made from a storage reservoir lying wholly or in part within the channel, a reserve flow equal to forty-five hundredths (0.45) of a cubic foot per second per square mile of drainage area above the point of storage shall be maintained at the point of storage at all times when the flow in the channel from the drainage area above the point of storage is greater than that amount; when the flow in the channel from the drainage area above the point of storage is less than forty-five hundredths (0.45) of a cubic foot per second per square mile, then a reserve flow equal to the flow from the drainage area above the point of storage shall be maintained in the channel at the point of storage.

(3) In the absence of storage at the place where the diversion is accomplished no water shall be diverted from the channel within the Lower Basin unless the flow in the channel is in excess of a reserve flow of twenty-four hundredths (0.24) of a cubic foot per second per square mile of drainage area above the point of diversion. In every diversion, in the Lower Basin, made from a storage reservoir lying wholly or in part within the channel, a reserve flow equal to twenty-four hundredths (0.24) of a cubic foot per second per square mile of drainage area above the point of storage shall be maintained at the point of storage at all times when the flow in the channel from the drainage area above the point of storage is greater than that amount; when the flow in the channel from the drainage area above the point of storage is less than twenty-four hundredths (0.24) of a cubic foot per second per square mile, then a reserve flow equal to the flow from the drainage area above the point of storage shall be maintained in the channel at the point of storage.

(4) The reserve flows required under this article at every point of diversion or of storage shall be in addition to water in transit which may be flowing in the channel at such point.

(5) Every storage reservoir lying wholly or partly within the channel of the Delaware river shall at all times be operated so as not to interfere with or retard the free passage of water in transit, of the required reserve flows and, except as otherwise permitted by the schedules prescribed by the commission, of that part of the flow in the said channel which may not be diverted by the State under the authorization of which State said storage reservoir was constructed.

ARTICLE VIII.

Each signatory State may authorize an appropriate department to designate as water in transit for the use of that State any or all water that has been or may hereafter be developed by storage for any purpose by or under the authorization of such State either on any tributary within said State or on the channel of the Delaware river. All water so designated shall be known as "water in transit" and may be permitted to flow into and down the channel of the Delaware river. All water which has been so designated shall be considered as having been diverted at the point of storage where it was developed and shall be charged against the total quantity of water which may be diverted by the designating State under the authority of Article V.

Water in transit may be removed from the channel of the Delaware river by or under the authority of the designating State. The daily rate at which water in transit may be removed from the channel shall not exceed the daily rate at which it is delivered and no greater quantity of such water may be removed than shall have been delivered into the said channel. All water in transit shall be subject to the reserve flow requirements of Articles VI and VII which apply at the point of storage where said water was developed. In the case of water in transit from any development completed prior to the date when this compact becomes effective said reserve flow requirements shall, so long as the existing authorization for such development continues in effect, apply only at times when water in transit from such development is actually flowing in the channel of the Delaware river.

Every designation of water in transit made under the authority of this article shall be evidenced by the filing with the commission of a declaration setting forth the contemplated uses of said water and any such designation may at any time be with-

drawn or amended without prejudice to its subsequent amendment or renewal. Notice of every amendment or renewal shall be given to the commission through the filing of a declaration, the provisions of which declaration shall not become effective until two years from the date of the filing thereof unless the commission shall, after hearing, fix an earlier date.

ARTICLE IX.

With the approval of the commission each signatory State may build dams entirely or partly across the channel of the Delaware river upon such terms and conditions as the commission, after hearing, may prescribe.

All such dams shall be built so as to conform to the requirements relating to physical construction and safety in the State or States in which they are located and shall at all times be operated so as not to interfere with any diversion that is in accordance with schedules prescribed by the commission nor with any water in transit.

ARTICLE X.

Notice of every development for diversion from any tributary shall be filed with the commission, prior to the beginning of construction, by the State in which the development is located or by the holder of the authorization for such development; said notice shall include a statement of the quantity of water proposed to be diverted, the purpose of such diversion and a copy of the authority for the development.

ARTICLE XI.

To evidence that the provisions of this compact are being complied with there shall be installed and maintained, in connection with every development which comes under the provisions of this compact, adequate and suitable equipment for measuring all necessary quantities and rates of water flow. Record of all water flows in connection with such developments shall be kept and furnished to the commission as the said commission may require. Said equipment shall be installed and maintained and said records shall be kept and furnished by the State or by the holder of the authorization for every such development.

ARTICLE XII.

No water from the Delaware drainage basin shall be diverted for use outside the boundaries of the States signatory to this compact. Except by legislative act no signatory State may give, grant or dispose of to another signatory State, or to the holder

of an authorization therefrom, any water allotted to it or developed by it under the provisions of this compact. The joint exercise by or under the authority of two or more of the signatory States of any right under this compact is hereby authorized.

ARTICLE XIII.

The signatory States, recognizing the importance of conserving the sanitary quality of the waters flowing in the channel of the Delaware river so that these waters may be used as sources of domestic and municipal water supplies, agree to co-operate in carrying out a policy for maintaining said waters in a sanitary condition at least equal to that which obtains as of the date when this compact becomes effective.

ARTICLE XIV.

The beneficial effects of forest covered areas on the regularization of stream flow, with attendant greater potential use of streams for domestic, industrial, navigation and other purposes, are recognized by the signatory States. Each signatory State agrees to adhere to a policy covering the establishment and maintenance of an adequate forest cover in the Delaware drainage basin and the maintenance of the highest practicable standards of protection from fire on these lands.

ARTICLE XV.

Each signatory State, in the exercise of any right under this compact, may take and condemn any property necessary for the construction, maintenance and operation of any dam in or across the channel of the Delaware river. Each signatory State may also take and condemn any rights to the use of or in water, the taking or condemnation of which rights is necessary to effect any allowable diversion made under this compact from any tributary or from the channel of the Delaware river. The power of condemnation herein conferred shall be exercised in accordance with the laws of the State in which the property or the rights to be taken or condemned are located. Any such property and rights, though devoted to a public use, may be taken and condemned in favor of any public use higher in the order of importance set forth in Article III.

ARTICLE XVI.

All damage to persons or property resulting from the exercise of any rights under this compact shall be determined under the

rule of damages, in accordance with the procedure, and in such manner as is provided by law of the State in which the damages are suffered. The damages suffered in the State of Pennsylvania shall be ascertained, recovered and paid as provided by the forty-first section of the act approved April twenty-ninth, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four (Pamphlet Laws 73) and the amendments and supplements thereto or any substitute therefor in effect when the development is authorized. The damages suffered in the State of New York or in the State of New Jersey shall be ascertained, recovered and paid as provided by any general or other now existing act applying thereto or any substitute for the same in effect when the development is authorized. The court or courts which have jurisdiction of the subject matter in the respective States shall have jurisdiction of the person of every party in interest for the purpose of notice, summons and hearing throughout all three signatory States.

ARTICLE XVII.

Any property of a signatory State or of the holder of an authorization of such State, acquired in the exercise of any right or privilege under this compact, which is located in any other signatory State shall be subject to taxation as private property under the general laws of the State in which it is located.

ARTICLE XVIII.

Nothing in any existing treaty or compact between any two of the signatory States shall be modified or changed or invalidated by anything herein contained except in so far as the same is repugnant to any provision of this compact.

ARTICLE XIX.

The Tri-State Delaware River Commission is hereby created as a body corporate to consist of not more than three members from each of the signatory States. Each State may, by appropriate legislation, provide for the designation, appointment and tenure of its members. Until such time as a signatory State shall by legislation otherwise provide, the Governor of such State is hereby directed to designate an appropriate officer or employee and may appoint not more than two other persons to represent said State as members of the Tri-State Delaware River Commission.

Each signatory State shall have one vote in the commission. Every decision, authorization or approval of the commission

shall require a unanimous vote of the States entitled to vote thereon. On matters pertaining only to the Lower Basin, the State of New York shall have no vote.

Every decision, authorization or approval rendered shall be accompanied by a certificate of the commissioners that the same is, in their judgment, in the public interest and such certificate shall state the reasons on which the decision, authorization or approval is based.

The powers and duties of the commission, in addition to those hereinbefore set forth, shall be:

(1) To make rules and regulations for the organization and the conduct of its business.

(2) To report annually to the Governors for the information of the Legislatures of the signatory States as to the developments under the terms of this compact and as to such other matters as may come within the purview of the commission.

(3) To report in like manner at intervals of not more than five years as to the existing and reasonably prospective needs of the signatory States and the extent to which and the manner in which each signatory State has exercised its rights under this compact.

(4) To observe the operation of all developments; to make such orders in writing after hearing as may be necessary to secure compliance with those provisions of this compact which are within the jurisdiction of the commission; and to institute any appropriate action or proceeding at law or in equity to enforce compliance with such orders and with the terms and conditions imposed in any decision, authorization or approval made by it.

(5) To require by order in writing compliance with Article XI.

(6) To make, modify and change the schedules referred to in Article VII.

(7) To make such examinations as may be necessary to ascertain the quantities of water heretofore lawfully diverted by the normal operation of all works existing and in actual operation when this compact becomes effective.

(8) The commission or any member thereof or any employee or other person duly authorized thereby is hereby empowered to enter without let or hindrance upon the lands and property upon which any development is being constructed, operated or maintained under this compact. Each State through its appropriate departments shall co-operate with the commission in obtaining such data, information and records as may be necessary in the performance of its duties.

(9) Whenever, by this compact, provision is made for action by the commission after hearing, notice of such hearing shall be given to the Governor of each State at least ten (10) days before the date set for such hearing.

(10) The Attorney-General of each signatory State or a deputy or assistant shall serve as the legal adviser of the commissioners representing that State.

(11) The commission is authorized to provide suitable offices and conveniences for the transaction of its business and to employ such technical and clerical assistance as may be necessary to enable it to carry out the duties imposed by this compact. The expenses of the commission shall be paid, share and share alike, from funds provided by each of the signatory States in such manner as the laws of the signatory States shall prescribe.

ARTICLE XX.

Notwithstanding anything contained in this compact, each State may institute any action or proceeding at law or in equity for the enforcement or protection of its rights or the rights of its citizens accruing under this compact or otherwise.

ARTICLE XXI.

The Governors of the signatory States, upon the request of any one of them, shall each forthwith appoint a commissioner, and the said commissioners are empowered to consider and recommend modifications of this compact and upon adoption by the legislative act of each and all of said States, the Congress of the United States having consented thereto, such modifications shall be in full force and effect.

ARTICLE XXII.

Should any part of this compact be held to be contrary to the constitution of any signatory state or of the United States all other severable parts of this compact shall continue to be in full force and effect.

ARTICLE XXIII.

The consent of the Congress of the United States to this compact shall in no wise affect any existing Federal statute.

ARTICLE XXIV.

This compact may be terminated at any time by concurrent legislative action of all the signatory States. In the event of the

termination of this compact all rights which may have become vested under its provisions shall remain and continue unimpaired.

ARTICLE XXV.

This compact shall be submitted for adoption to the Legislature of each of the signatory States at the several sessions beginning in the month of January, nineteen hundred and twenty-seven; and upon adoption by the legislative act of each and all of said States, the Congress of the United States having consented thereto, it shall be in full force and effect.

BE IT RESOLVED *by the House of Assembly* (the Senate concurring)

1 That the following amendment to the Constitution of this State having been proposed and agreed to by a majority of the

members elected to each of the two Houses of the Legislature of one thousand nine hundred and twenty-six, and entered on their journals, with the yeas and nays taken thereon, and referred to this Legislature and published as required by the Constitution, be and the same is hereby agreed to :

PROPOSED AMENDMENT.

Amend paragraph three, section one, article IV, of the Constitution of the State of New Jersey, to read as follows :

3. Members of the Senate and General Assembly shall be elected every second year beginning with the year one thousand nine hundred and twenty-eight, on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November; and the two houses shall meet separately in regular session on the second Tuesday in January next after the said day of election, at which time of meeting the Legislative year shall commence; and at other times the two houses may meet separately in special session upon the joint call of the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the General Assembly for the purposes of acting upon only such matters as are designated in the call

Amend paragraphs one and two, of section two, of article IV, to read as follows :

1. The Senate shall be composed of one Senator from each county in the State, elected by the legal voters of the counties, respectively, for four years; *provided, however,* the term of Senators elected in the year one thousand nine hundred and twenty-six shall be extended to four years from the commencement of their terms. The term of Senators elected in the year one thousand nine hundred and twenty-seven shall be extended to five years from the commencement of their terms. As soon as the Senate shall meet after the election to be held in the year one thousand nine hundred and twenty-seven there shall be selected by lot, under the direction of the Senate, three counties of those counties the term of whose Senators expires in the year one thousand nine hundred and twenty-nine and at the election to be held in the year one thousand nine hundred and twenty-eight the Senators from these three counties shall be elected for two years and the remaining four Senators shall be elected for a term of four years. If vacancies happen, by resignation or otherwise, the persons elected to supply such vacancies shall be elected for the unexpired term only.

Amend paragraph one, section three, article IV, of the Constitution of the State of New Jersey, to read as follows :

1. The General Assembly shall be composed of members biannually elected by the legal voters of the counties, respectively, who shall be apportioned among the said counties as nearly as may be according to the number of their inhabitants. The present apportionment shall continue until the next census of the United States shall have been taken, and an apportionment of members of the General Assembly shall be made by the Legislature at its first session after the next and every subsequent enumeration or census, and when made shall remain unaltered until another enumeration shall have been taken; *provided*, that each county shall at all times be entitled to one member, and the whole number of members shall never exceed sixty.

Amend paragraph three of article V of the Constitution of the State of New Jersey to read as follows:

3. Each Governor elected after the adoption of this amendment shall hold office for four years, to commence on the third Tuesday of January next ensuing the election for Governor by the people, and to end on the Monday preceding the third Tuesday of January, four years thereafter; and he shall be incapable of holding that office for four years next after his term of service shall have expired; and if a vacancy happens, by resignation or otherwise, the person elected to supply such vacancy shall be elected for the unexpired term only; and no appointment or nomination to office shall be made by the Governor during the last week of his said term.

Any specific amendment or amendments to the Constitution may be proposed in the Senate or General Assembly, and if the same shall be agreed to by a majority of the members elected to each of the two houses, such proposed amendment or amendments shall be entered on their journals with the yeas and nays taken thereon, and referred to the session of the Legislature then next to be convened, otherwise than in special session by call of the Governor, and shall be published for three months previous to meeting in such session next to be convened, in at least one newspaper in each county, if any be published therein, at least once in each month; and if in the session of the Legislature next to be convened as aforesaid, such proposed amendment or amendments, or any of them, shall be agreed to by a majority of all of the members elected to each house, then it shall be the duty of the Legislature to submit such proposed amendment or amendments, or such of them as may have been twice agreed to as aforesaid, to the people, in such manner as the Legislature shall prescribe, at the ensuing election to be held the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November; and if the people shall then approve and ratify such amendment or amendments, or any of them, by a majority of the electors qualified to vote for members of the Legislature voting thereon, such amendment or amendments so approved and ratified shall become part of the Constitution; *provided*, that if more than one amendment be submitted they shall be submitted in such manner and form that the people may vote for or against each amendment separately and distinctly; but no amendment or amendments relating to the same subject, shall be submitted to the people by the Legislature oftener than once in five years. In submitting any amendment or amendments to the people no vote shall be counted for or against any amendment where the voter shall have omitted affirmatively to vote for or against such amendment.

From his youth until the day of his death Mr Vanderbilt was intensely interested in the civic affairs of his State, and the period of his active participation in the government of the State of New Jersey exceeded one-third of the life of our State and Nation In 1874, at the age of thirty, Mr Vanderbilt entered the Legislature of this State as a representative of Mercer

county. So distinctive were his services during that year that he was re-elected to the session of 1875 and chosen Speaker by that body. In 1883 he was elected to represent Mercer county in the Senate of this State. On leaving the Senate, in the year of 1886, he devoted himself to the practice of law and to active personal interests in the civic affairs of his home town. In 1924, or fifty years after his first entry into the legislative halls of the State, he was again elected to represent Mercer county in this House. The breadth of his experience and the wealth of his knowledge placed him easily in the forefront of that distinguished body. It is the opinion of this, the one hundred and fifty-first session of the Legislature of the State of New Jersey, that the State has suffered a real bereavement in the passing of the Hon. George O. Vanderbilt and that it

The said bonds or other securities and any other obligations which the Port Authority may incur shall be issued and incurred upon such terms and conditions as the Port Authority may deem proper, subject, however, to the limitations of this act. As security therefor the revenues and tolls arising out of the use of the tunnel or tunnels shall be pledged for the repayment of the entire issue of the bonds and other securities issued for the construction thereof and for the repayment of any moneys advanced by the States, together with interest; it being the declared policy of the State that the said tunnel or tunnels so far as the payment of the bonds or other securities issued, and the repayment of moneys advanced by the State for the construction thereof, shall in all respects be self-sustaining."

ASSEMBLY CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 2.

BE IT RESOLVED *by the House of Assembly* (the Senate concurring):

1. That the following amendment to the Constitution of this State having been proposed and agreed to by a majority of the members elected to each of the two houses of the Legislature of one thousand nine hundred and twenty-six, and entered on their journals, with the yeas and nays taken thereon, and referred to this Legislature and published as required by the Constitution, be and the same is hereby agreed to:

PROPOSED AMENDMENT.

Amend Article IX of the State Constitution so as to read as follows:

Any specific amendment or amendments to the constitution may be proposed in the senate or general assembly, and if the same shall be agreed to by a majority of the members elected to each of the two houses, such proposed amendment or amendments shall be entered on their journals with the yeas and nays taken thereon, and referred to the session of the legislature then

next to be convened, otherwise than in special session by call of the governor, and shall be published for three months previous to meeting in such session next to be convened, in at least one newspaper in each county, if any be published therein, at least once in each month; and if in the session of the legislature next to be convened as aforesaid, such proposed amendment or amendments, or any of them, shall be agreed to by a majority of all of the members elected to each house, then it shall be the duty of the legislature to submit such proposed amendment or amendments, or such of them as may have been twice agreed to as aforesaid, to the people, in such manner as the legislature shall prescribe, at the ensuing election to be held the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November; and if the people shall then approve and ratify such amendment or amendments, or any of them, by a majority of the electors qualified to vote for members of the legislature voting thereon, such amendment or amendments so approved and ratified shall become part of the constitution; *provided*, that if more than one amendment be submitted they shall be submitted in such manner and form that the people may vote for or against each amendment separately and distinctly; but no amendment or amendments relating to the same subject shall be submitted to the people by the legislature oftener than once in five years. In submitting any amendment or amendments to the people, no vote shall be counted for or against any amendment where the voter shall have omitted affirmatively to vote for or against such amendment.

ASSEMBLY CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 3.

1. BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Assembly (the Senate concurring):

1. That the following amendment to the Constitution of this State having been proposed and agreed to by a majority of the members elected to each of the two houses of the Legislature of one thousand nine hundred and twenty-six, and entered on their journals, with the yeas and nays taken thereon, and referred to this Legislature and published as required by the Constitution, be and the same is hereby agreed to:

PROPOSED AMENDMENT.

Amend paragraph three, section II, Article IV, of the Constitution of the State of New Jersey, to read as follows:

3. Members of the senate and general assembly shall be elected every second year beginning with the year one thousand nine hundred and twenty-eight, on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November; and the two houses shall meet separately in regular session on the second Tuesday in January next after the said day of election, at which time of meeting the legislative year shall commence; and at other times the two houses may meet separately in special session upon the joint call of the president of the senate and the speaker of the general assembly for the purpose of acting upon only such matters as are designated in the call.

Amend paragraphs one and two of section II of Article IV, to read as follows:

1. The senate shall be composed of one senator from each county in the State, elected by the legal voters of the counties, respectively, for four years; *provided, however,* the term of senators elected in the year one thousand nine hundred and twenty-six shall be extended to four years from the commencement of their terms. The term of senators elected in the year one thousand nine hundred and twenty-seven shall be extended to five years from the commencement of their terms. As soon as the senate shall meet after the election to be held in the year one thousand nine hundred and twenty-seven there shall be selected by lot, under the direction of the senate, three counties of those counties the term of whose senators expires in the year one thousand nine hundred and twenty-nine and at the election to be held in the year one thousand nine hundred and twenty-eight the senators from these three counties shall be elected for two years and the remaining four senators shall be elected for a term of four years. If vacancies happen, by resignation or otherwise, the persons elected to supply such vacancies shall be elected for the unexpired term only.

Amend paragraph one, section III, Article IV, of the Constitution of the State of New Jersey, to read as follows:

1. The general assembly shall be composed of members biennially elected by the legal voters of the counties, respectively, who shall be apportioned among the said counties as nearly as may be according to the number of their inhabitants. The present apportionment shall continue until the next census of the United States shall have been taken, and an apportionment of members of the general assembly shall be made by the legislature at its first session after the next and every subsequent enumeration or census, and when made shall remain unaltered until an-

other enumeration shall have been taken; *provided*, that each county shall at all times be entitled to one member; and the whole number of members shall never exceed sixty.

Amend paragraph three of Article V of the Constitution of the State of New Jersey to read as follows:

3. Each governor elected after the adoption of this amendment shall hold office for four years, to commence on the third Tuesday of January next ensuing the election for governor by the people, and to end on the Monday preceding the third Tuesday of January, four years thereafter; and he shall be incapable of holding that office for four years next after his term of service shall have expired; and if a vacancy happen, by resignation or otherwise, the person elected to supply such vacancy shall be elected for the unexpired term only; and no appointment or nomination to office shall be made by the governor during the last week of his said term.

ASSEMBLY CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 4.

1. BE IT RESOLVED by the *House of Assembly* (the Senate concurring):

That the following amendment to the Constitution of this State having been proposed and agreed to by a majority of the members elected to each of the two houses of the Legislature of one thousand nine hundred and twenty-six, and entered on their journals, with the yeas and nays taken thereon, and referred to this Legislature and published as required by the Constitution, be and the same is hereby agreed to:

PROPOSED AMENDMENT.

1. In Article VII, section II, paragraph two, strike out the words "be appointed by the senate and general assembly, in joint meeting. They shall," so that the paragraph will read as follows:

2. Judges of the courts of common pleas shall hold their office for five years; but when appointed to fill vacancies they shall hold for the unexpired term only.

Any specific amendment or amendments to the constitution may be proposed in the senate or general assembly, and if the same shall be agreed to by a majority of the members elected to each of the two houses, such proposed amendment or amendments shall be entered on their journals with the yeas and nays taken thereon, and referred to the session of the legislature then next to be convened, otherwise than in special session by call of the governor, and shall be published for three months previous to meeting in such session next to be convened, in at least one newspaper in each county, if any be published therein, at least once in each month; and if in the session of the legislature next to be convened as aforesaid, such proposed amendment or amendments, or any of them, shall be agreed to by a majority of all the members elected to each house, then it shall be the duty of the legislature to submit such proposed amendment or amendments, or such of them as may have been twice agreed to as aforesaid, to the people, in such manner as the legislature shall prescribe, at the ensuing election to be held the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November; and if the people shall then approve and ratify such amendment or amendments, or any of them, by a majority of the electors qualified to vote for members of the legislature voting thereon, such amendment or amendments so approved and ratified shall become part of the constitution; *provided*, that if more than one amendment be submitted they shall be submitted in such manner and form that the people may vote for or against each amendment separately and distinctly; but no amendment or amendments relating to the same subject shall be submitted to the people by the legislature oftener than once in five years. In submitting any amendment or amendments to the people, no vote shall be counted for or against any amendment where the voter shall have omitted affirmatively to vote for or against such amendment.

3 Members of the senate and general assembly shall be elected every second year beginning with the year one thousand nine hundred and twenty-eight, on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November; and the two houses shall meet separately in regular session on the second Tuesday in January next after the said day of election, at which time of meeting the legislative year shall commence; and at other times the two houses may meet separately in special session upon the joint call of the president of the senate and the speaker of the general assembly for the purpose of acting upon only such matters as are designated in the call.

Amend paragraphs one and two of section II of Article IV, to read as follows:

1. The senate shall be composed of one senator from each county in the State, elected by the legal voters of the counties, respectively, for four years; *provided, however*, the term of senators elected in the year one thousand nine hundred and twenty-six shall be extended to four years from the commencement of their terms. The term of senators elected in the year one thousand nine hundred and twenty-seven shall be extended to five years from the commencement of their terms. As soon as the senate shall meet after the election to be held in the year one thousand nine hundred and twenty-seven there shall be selected by lot, under the direction of the senate, three counties of those counties the term of whose senators expires in the year one thousand nine hundred and twenty-nine and at the election to be held in the year one thousand nine hundred and twenty-eight the senators from these three counties shall be elected for two years and the remaining four senators shall be elected for a term of four years. If vacancies happen, by resignation or otherwise, the persons elected to supply such vacancies shall be elected for the unexpired term only.

Amend paragraph one, section III, Article IV, of the Constitution of the State of New Jersey, to read as follows:

1. The general assembly shall be composed of members bi-annually elected by the legal voters of the counties, respectively, who shall be apportioned among the said counties as nearly as may be according to the number of their inhabitants. The present apportionment shall continue until the next census of the United States shall have been taken, and an apportionment of members of the general assembly shall be made by the legislature at its first session after the next and every subsequent enumeration or census, and when made shall remain unaltered until further enumeration shall have been taken; *provided*, that each county shall at all times be entitled to one member, and the whole number of members shall never exceed sixty.

The following communication was sent to the desk and read by the Clerk:

To the Legislature:

The commission appointed under joint resolution No. 9 of the 1926 Legislature to make a survey of a site, or sites, desirable for the construction of a Federal hospital in the State of New Jersey, for the care, treatment and rehabilitation of New Jersey citizens who have served in the military and naval forces of the United States, and to confer with Federal authorities in regard to hospitalization, herewith presents to the Legislature of 1927 a report of its activities since its appointment.

The commission organized in March and immediately began consulting the various sources of information which would help them with their problems. The following information was obtained:

(1) There are approximately seven hundred New Jersey veterans in hospitals as the result of their war disabilities.

All of these, except what few can be cared for in State institutions, are compelled to go to Federal hospitals in other States for treatment.

(2) New Jersey at the present time has no Federal hospital of any description, while some of the neighboring States have as many as six.

(3) At one of the meetings held in the State House, Trenton, Colonel Arthur Pratt appeared before the commission, and on behalf of the Board of the American Legion Home at Ralston, tendered an offer of the site of the home, consisting of one hundred and twenty acres, for the location of a veterans' hospital.

The United States Veterans' Bureau has need at the present time for approximately five thousand additional beds for neuropsychiatric cases. To answer this need there has been introduced in the House of Representatives a bill authorizing an appropriation of \$16,000,000.00 for new hospitals.

This bill has been referred to the House Committee on Veterans' Legislation, which has conducted hearings. This House committee, however, has as yet made no recommendations either as to the amount to be appropriated or as to the location of the hospitals to be built.

Members of the commission have been in Washington and have discussed the matter with the New Jersey Representatives in Congress, and with General Hines, Director of the Veterans' Bureau. General Hines received the commission cordially and expressed himself as favorable to a New Jersey site for a veterans' hospital. The New Jersey Representatives in Congress expressed their willingness to co-operate.

It was learned that a number of States have offered sites for the location of Veterans' Bureau institutions free of charge to the Federal Government. We feel that an appropriation by the Legislature for the purchase of such a site would enhance New Jersey's chance of having a veterans' hospital located in this State.

The commission, therefore, recommends the appropriation of one hundred thousand dollars for the purchase of a suitable site; this appropriation to be used only in the event that the United States Veterans' Bureau decides to locate a hospital in this State.

The commission is willing to continue its activities if the Legislature deems it advisable.

Attached hereto are charts showing the States arranged according to the number of men in service during the war, and

also the location of New Jersey veterans in Federal and State institutions.

Be it resolved by the Senate (The House of Assembly concurring):

1. That the following amendment to the Constitution of this State having been proposed and agreed to by a majority of the members elected to each of the two houses of the Legislature of one thousand nine hundred and twenty-six, and entered on their journals, with yeas and nays taken thereon, and referred to this Legislature and published as required by the Constitution, be and the same is hereby agreed to.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT.

The Legislature shall have power to establish water supply districts, sewerage districts, drainage districts and meadow

reclamation districts: to alter and change the boundaries of any such district or districts so established; to provide for the election of commissions for such districts and to prescribe the organization, jurisdiction, powers and duties of such commissions; to vest in such commissions powers to undertake, develop, complete and operate any public work or improvement for water supply, sewage disposal, drainage and meadow reclamation, to incur indebtedness therefor, which said indebtedness shall be the debt of the district, to fund such debt and to provide for the levy, assessment and collection of special benefits and of taxes for the payment of any such indebtedness so incurred by such district.

The following communication and report was sent to the desk and read by the Clerk:

THE REPORT OF THE COMMISSION APPOINTED BY
JOINT RESOLUTION No 11, 1926, TO MAKE
A SURVEY OF THE TEACHERS' PENSION
AND ANNUITY FUND.

The commission organized by the election of the Hon Frank D Abell, President, and Hon. John Y. Dater, Secretary. The commission engaged the services of Woodward, Fondiller and Ryan of New York City, as actuaries to investigate the fund, and beg to transmit the accompanying report from which, on page 53, the following summary is made:

"1 The entire actuarial structure is sound, conservative and in harmony with the actual experience to date of the New York and New Jersey teaching corps and similar teachers' pension finds.

"2 The benefits provided are sufficiently large to provide adequate protection after retirement and yet not so large as to

make the cost prohibitive if sound methodical plans of financing obligations are used.

"3. The method of financing now in use is economical, equitable and in the best interests of the State.

"4. It is suggested that the teachers' salary deductions accumulation be shown on entirely separate statements to prevent confusion with the assets of the State's share of benefits."

In their letter of transmission and in reply to a special inquiry of this commission as to the requirements under the Pension and Annuity act for the year beginning July 1, 1927, the actuaries report that their conclusions as to the requirements of the pension funds actuary is in agreement, and adds the following comment:

"In a general way we may state that, as shown in our report, we have carefully verified the basic tables, the formulæ, the methods and the computations of the actuary of the fund and find them to be correct and in accordance with the requirements of the law.

"Indeed, the degree of agreement between the recent experience of the fund as regards rates of mortality, disability, withdrawal, and so on, and the underlying experience tables adopted by the actuary as the basis for his calculations is quite remarkable.

"We cannot see how the Legislature can do otherwise than make the appropriation certified by Mr. Buck without virtually nullifying the provisions of the present law."

This commission agrees with the fourth paragraph of the summary and recommends that the teachers salary deductions' accumulation be shown on entirely separate statements to prevent confusion with the assets of the State's share of the benefits. This commission instructed its actuary to make a most thorough and and conclusive investigation of the fund, and are unanimous in our belief that in no other way can the obligations of the State to the beneficiaries of the fund be served unless the annual requirement as certified is appropriated as provided in the law.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT.

The Legislature shall have power to establish water supply districts, sewerage districts, drainage districts, and meadow reclamation districts; to alter and change the boundaries of any such district or districts so established; to provide for the election of commissions for such districts and to prescribe the organization, jurisdiction, powers and duties of such commissions; to vest in such commissions powers to undertake, develop, complete and operate any public work or improvement for water supply, sewage disposal, drainage and meadow reclamation, to incur indebtedness therefor, which said indebtedness shall be the debt of the district, to fund such debt and to provide for the levy, assessment and collection of special benefits and of taxes for the payment of any such indebtedness so incurred by such districts.

ASSEMBLY BILL, NO. 9.

To the House of Assembly:

I return Assembly Bill No. 9 without approval, for these reasons:

As originally adopted in 1908, the act providing for the govern- ment of cities contemplated a balanced government, appointments to office of such agents and employees as were found necessary being made by the mayor, subject to confirmation by the city council, except in the case of city clerk, who was to be selected by the city council. Hence there existed a check upon arbitrary or ill-considered action on the part of the mayor in the selection of the city's agents.

That such scheme of government was sound and satisfactory is attested by the fact that various communities of the State have existed under this statute for almost twenty years without any substantial change in the respect referred to.

This bill works a complete change in the theory of government provided for such municipalities. Control of the city council over the acts of the mayor in appointments to office is completely removed so that, in effect, those municipalities which are functioning under this statute have substituted a new government, radically different from that in existence at the time the chief executive was chosen by the people.

Companion to this measure are Assembly Bills Nos. 10 and 11, which are likewise returned without approval, Assembly Bill No. 11 being particularly vicious, inasmuch as it legislates out of office all officers or persons holding positions in all departments, board, commissions or agencies in any city operating under such statute, and provides for the filling of the vacancies so created by the mayor of such city.

Assembly Bill No. 10 is passed to repeal those sections of the act in question which are found to be in conflict with the policy expressed in the two other bills.

The measures are clearly special, and are introduced in the interest of giving power to the mayor of Union City, in Hudson county, so that he may remove from office all those in office at the time of his election. Such grant of power is clearly an extension of authority which the people of the community do not desire the chief executive of their city to have.

To grant any power and authority now in aid of the settlement of a political controversy is violative of the principle of fair play, and contrary to the letter and spirit of the Constitution.

"All licensed land surveyors making any survey under the name of such licensee shall from and after the passage of this act maintain a place of business, upon which place of business there shall be conspicuously displayed a sign, which sign shall contain the name and address of such licensee and further the words "Licensed Land Surveyor." Any person violating the provisions hereof shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and punishable by a fine not exceeding one hundred dollars, and all proceedings shall be in the same manner as is provided for penalties authorized by the act to which this act is a supplement."

To the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

The Law Revision Committee, created under an act approved March 13th, 1925, P. L. 1925, pages 324 and 325, would respectfully report:

No appropriation having been made, for the use of the commission last year, because, as was suggested by the Chairman of the Appropriation Committee, the commissioners who were appointed under the act of March 12th, 1925, P. L. 1925, page 244, having begun their work and it being considered necessary that they should press the same as speedily as possible, it would not be necessary for the Law Revision Committee to perform any duties during said year, your commissioners have awaited the progress of the work above referred to.

The clerk of the said commission states that at present they have no suggestions to make to this commission concerning any defects in our present laws, or modifications which they desire now to recommend. Therefore, it was thought best to await the further progress of the Revision Commissioners and we could, therefrom, determine what recommendations might be made to some subsequent Legislature.

Your commission is hoping, however, that during the coming year it might accomplish something designed by the act creating it, after conference with the Revision Commissioners and their clerk.

There has been, by other commissions in other States, especially New York and Massachusetts, much research work accomplished. The Massachusetts commission sent one of its members to England, the commissioner spending considerable time there in endeavoring to cull, from the English laws, those matters which it might recommend as being beneficial, and an aid to the practice in the courts of Massachusetts.

The commission in New York has likewise made a lengthy report upon the work that it is and contemplates doing.

Your commission, therefore, makes this report, and asks for a small appropriation, for clerical services, that it might, if possible, make such investigation as may be necessary for it to get a proper start, and we would ask that the present session appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00, or such part thereof as may be needed for the purposes of clerical work and any other legitimate expense that may be incurred by the commission.

This bill accomplishes the same result as Senate Bill No. 37 of the 1926 session of the Legislature. While framed along somewhat different lines from the proposal of last year, its effect upon the public right is the same. For a definite, certain obligation to repair, Senate Bill No. 82 proposes to substitute one of uncertainty and indefiniteness, and likely to be productive of much litigation.

It is not clear how the obligation to pave, arising under this measure, if any, is to be enforced, and I fear, if this bill should become law, judicial construction of this feature of the measure would be unavoidable.

It seems to me to be better policy to allow the settlement of a proper rate of fare to stand or fall on its own merits, and not to involve it with relieving the trolley companies of fixed, determined obligations, substituting in their place others of such uncertain character; hence I am constrained to veto this measure.

This bill is offensive, and presents visions nauseous and disgusting, and constitutes, in my judgment, a distinct step backward in the administration of the public health law.

The following report was sent to the desk and read by the Clerk:

Report of Committee appointed to investigate a certain newspaper article which alleged that a member of the House was offered a bribe to change his vote on Committee Substitute for Assembly Bill No. 1:

The Committee appointed pursuant to the motion of the Majority Leader for the purpose of investigating certain statements appearing in newspapers concerning an alleged slush fund raised for the purpose of aiding in the passage of the liberal Sunday bill, reports as follows:

1. After examining all available witnesses, the Committee does not find any evidence of the acceptance of a bribe by any person connected with the House of Assembly.

2. The Committee has heard evidence to the effect that Assemblyman Hunt had been approached in a manner which he did not take seriously, considering it a joke, for which reason he made no effort to bring the matter to the official attention of the House.

3. The Committee further finds that the statements investigated were based on allegations of Assemblyman Dater, concerning remarks made by Assemblyman Hurd to him and other members to the effect that Mr. Hurd had been offered a bribe to change his vote on the bill. The evidence clearly discloses that Mr. Hurd was not directly offered any sum of money. His testimony on this point is as follows:

"As I was leaving the room, there was a group of members. Ten, or twelve were standing around the water cooler outside of that door, or what do you call it, the stenographer's room, and as I passed through that crowd some one, whose identity to me is unknown, made a remark to the effect, as nearly as I can remember it now, 'Well, I suppose that you will get about \$5,000 for switching your vote on the Sunday bill.' Well, we have heard those things remarked around the State House before in a joke so I simply said, 'Yes' or 'I suppose so,' or words to that effect, and went to my seat.

"That is all the story I have to tell. The bribe was not offered. The remark was passed and I can deny most emphatically that anyone approached me with the offer of any one single red-cent."

Mr. Hurd did not take the remark seriously, but, in jest, made the statement accredited to Mr. Dater and to other members,

who apparently were impressed. The Committee agrees with Mr. Hurd that his humor was "ill-advised".

4. The Committee was very much impressed by the testimony and attitude of Assemblyman Gabrielson, who testified that he had conducted an independent inquiry concerning rumors which had come to him. It had been his intention, if he found the rumors well founded, to mention them in speaking against the bill. Finding nothing, he stated to the Committee that he did not consider the rumors sufficient to warrant referring to them on the floor of the House.

5. The only person who appeared to take the remarks of Mr. Hurd seriously was Assemblyman Dater, who repeated the story which Mr Hurd had told in jest. Mr. Dater at least believed the story which he repeated; although in the opinion of the Committee he should not have made the matter public without first bringing it to the official attention of the House, or at least investigating its truth.

6. Unfortunately Miss Jones was inconsistent in her attitude inasmuch as she repeated the remarks with apparent sincerity which she herself characterized to the Committee as a joke in the following words: "I think the man who offered it was joking." This she substantially repeated in numerous parts of her statement to the Committee. We utterly fail to understand her repetition of these remarks in a serious vein, for in her own statement on page 27 of the transcript she stated that she did not place any stock in the rumors. It seems to the Committee that in her statement she endeavored to make a mole hill of a mountain which she herself had created.

7. The Committee feels that the investigation was justified under the circumstances. It fails to find any irregularity, taint, or suspicion on the part of any of the proponents of this measure, or in its passage through the House.

In conclusion, the Committee regrets that members chose to repeat stories involving such serious charges without first calling them to the attention of the proper officials, or without any investigation on their part before making them matters of common gossip, tending to reflect discredit upon the members of the Assembly.

This is the bill intended to authorize a tax of two cents per gallon on gasoline sold in this State.

I do not believe in the principle of a gasoline tax. The tendency in other States has been to continually increase it, as, for instance, in Alabama the original tax of two cents is now four cents; in Idaho it was three cents, now four cents; in New Mexico it was three cents, now five cents; in Wyoming it is now three cents, formerly two and one-half cents, and the same seems to be true of several other States.

Then, too, it is well to consider upon whom the tax will fall. The manufacturer will not pay it; it will add to the cost of his product. The farmer will not pay it, because naturally he will add it to the cost of his produce. The tradesman will in turn add it to the cost of his stock, and the tax will fall upon the man who has no one else upon whom to visit the burden, and thus he

will not only pay his own tax, but will also be shouldered with the tax of those quoted above.

I believe that the State is in a position to refund, without increasing the tax burden upon the people, a bond issue of at least sixty million dollars, which, with the increase in motor vehicle fees, will be sufficient when added to other revenues.

There are other reasons but the above are sufficient.

The Medical Society of New Jersey and other interested people have protested against the passage of the bill because it provides that: "Said inspector or nurse shall lecture before the teachers, * * * instructing them concerning the methods employed to detect the first signs of communicable diseases and the recognized measures for the promotion of health and the prevention of disease," and they feel that a nurse is not competent to replace the physician in giving such instruction.

It also provides that: "A board of education may exclude from school any child whose presence in the schoolroom shall be certified by the medical inspector or nurse as detrimental to the health of the pupils in the school," etc., and they believe this clause might result in a pupil being dismissed from school for an alleged medical cause merely upon the report of a nurse, without that child having at any time been inspected or passed upon by any medical authority.

They also call attention to the fact that the word "registered" has been stricken out, and the word "nurse" left in, and they feel that this is a very serious condition, because it will permit school boards to appoint to such positions any person who calls herself a "nurse," requiring no evidence of her training or ability, and confer upon her all the authority which the State Medical Society felt even the "registered" nurse was not qualified to assume.

The House of Assembly met at 11 o'clock A. M., this being the time designated by the Governor for the assembling of the One Hundred and Fifty-first Legislature in Special Session.

Knowing that this situation was unintentionally brought about, and that there is no desire to disfranchise thousands of our citizens, I have recalled you so that a corrective measure may be adopted.

While I do not wish to unduly prolong this session, yet I am constrained to call your attention to a serious situation existing in our courts.

The increase has been greatest, of course, in the metropolitan areas: Bergen, Passaic, Essex, Hudson, Atlantic and Camden counties.

The Legislative Committee of the State Bar Association has made a most careful survey of the situation, and is convinced that some immediate relief is essential if litigants are to be afforded reasonably prompt disposition of their cases, and if our courts are to be kept fairly abreast of the demands of the constantly increasing growth and prosperity of our State.

May I express appreciation for your generous willingness to convene in special session for the purpose of considering these two matters solely?

DEAR SIR—In reply to your request I have made a thorough investigation of the word biannual. The results of this investigation are as follows:

BIANNUAL.

The word biannual (with the corresponding adverb biannually) is a comparatively recent word in the English language, the accurate meaning of which has not hitherto been settled. The editors of the great Oxford Dictionary found no instance of its use earlier than the year 1877. Stormonth's Dictionary, published 1884, and the Imperial Dictionary, 1885, do not enter the word.

It is formed from annual with the prefix bi-. This prefix has the sense of "two"; but the idea of "two" may apply in the sense of "twice" or of "half." Webster's International Dictionary defines the prefix bi- in its special application to periods of time as (b) "Lasting or occurring every two; as in biennial, appearing every two years, biweekly, bimonthly," and as (c) "Occurring or coming twice; as in biweekly, twice a week. In this sense equivalent to semi-, which is preferable to avoid ambiguity." It is from this double sense of the prefix bi- that the uncertainty as to biannual arises.

There is equal uncertainty about the analogous form biweekly. The Standard Dictionary (1923) gives only the meaning "once in two weeks"; Webster's International (1919) says: "every two weeks," fortnightly; also semi-weekly; the Century Dictionary (1911) gives the meaning fortnightly," but adds: "sometimes erroneously used for semi-weekly." Bimonthly is subject to precisely the same uncertainty as biweekly. Biyearly and bidaily apparently always mean "twice a year" and "twice a day", while bihourly always means "every two hours."

The use of biweekly, bimonthly, etc., show a state of contradiction and confusion which is bound to result in ambiguity as to the meaning of any and all terms of this type.

If we turn now to biannual, we find that the American dictionaries recognize only the meaning "occurring twice a year; semi-annual." This is the definition of Webster's International and the Standard; the Century gives this definition and adds: "arbitrarily distinguished from biennial." The Oxford English Dictionary Volume containing letter B published (1888) defines the adjective biannual as "half-yearly," but recognizes the noun biannual as equivalent to biennial, meaning a plant which springs from seed one year and flowers, bears fruit, and dies the next. The most recent authority to speak on the subject is Fowler's Dictionary of Modern English Usage (Oxford, 1926), a work which has a high standing among scholars, where the following entry is found:

Biannual, probably invented to stand to biennial as half-yearly to two yearly, is sometimes confused with and sometimes distinguished from biennial.

It will be seen that the Century Dictionary recognizes that the distinction in meaning between biannual and biennial (which always means "every two years") is only an arbitrary one, and that Fowler recognizes that the two words are sometimes confused.

It is a principle universally recognized among authorities on language that the correct meaning of a word is that which is given to it by intelligent users of the language. A dictionary tries to discover and record established usage; but it has no authority itself to decide on what is right and what is wrong. The question, then, comes to this; what is the meaning actually given to the word by present-day speakers in the State of New Jersey? I have asked individually twelve of my friends what is their understanding of the word. They are all of education and intelligence, who speak carefully. Six answered that biannual means "every two years", four that it means "twice a year", two were uncertain. This would indicate that the dictionaries have gone too far in limiting the meaning of the word "twice a year", when analogy with other similar words makes the meaning "every two years" equally reasonable, and when intelligent speakers often use it in this second meaning.

I therefore submit the following professional opinion:

1. The word biannual is logically capable of meaning either "twice a year" or "every two years."
2. Both of these meanings are present in the minds of intelligent contemporary users of the language.
3. The American dictionaries are not justified in recognizing only the meaning "twice a year."
4. The word is ambiguous, and its use is therefore unfortunate; but, when the word is used, its meaning must be in each case determined from the context.
5. If the present proposed amendment makes plain in other portions of its text that the intended meaning is "every two years", no court would be justified in ruling that its meaning is "twice a year."

From article appearing in the Newark Evening News of April 20th, 1927, purporting to be a statement of Dr. Frank H. Vizetelly, of New York, editor of Funk & Wagnall's New Standard Dictionary of the English language.

VIZETELLY'S ANALYSIS.

"Considering the words biannual and biennial solely from the linguistic point of view, it would seem somebody has been trying to make a mountain out of a very small mole hill, for both biannual and biennial mean, 'occurring or appearing every two years.' The words have been used also to signify what is correctly expressed by semiannual, that is, 'occurring twice a year.' Biannual plants which we speak of more commonly today as biennials were spoken of as bisannual plants two hundred years ago. Then, in course of time, the genius of language brought about the suppression of the s, but the term was formed from the Latin bis, 'twice' and annalis, 'lasting for one year,' ultimately from the Latin annus, 'year.'

"The words in question have been used arbitrarily. No one has yet seen the reason for this. Bi has been prefixed to adjectives indicating action, as occurring twice, but mostly adjectives of Latin origin, as biangular, bicentral, etc. Sometimes the prefix has been applied to English words, as bifold, biforker, bimonthly, biweekly, biyearly, etc. When the sense, 'occurring twice a year' is intended, semiannual is the correct term to use, for this is composed of the Latin semi-'half' and annual as explained above. That which occurs semiannually recurs at intervals of six months and, therefore, semiannually; but the word biannual is also frequently used with the meaning of 'occurring twice a year.' In the sense of half-yearly, biannual has been used in the language for more than fifty years. An example of such use is to be found in Chapter 12 of Ouida's 'Puck'—'Every half-year his lawyers transmitted him the biannual rental.' But the word has been used as the equivalent of biennial for as long a time. It came about normally, as one of the meanings of annual is 'lasting only one year; changed or superseded each year,' and these meanings, when qualified with prefix bi- have been interpreted as signifying 'lasting two years; superseded every two years.' What is more natural than for a gardener to plant our annuals and biannuals. He is much more likely to use the latter word than biennial. Samuel Johnson used biennial for 'occurring once in every two years' in No. 61 of 'The Rambler' in 1750, but in 1621 Howell used it in the sense of 'existing or lasting for two years; changed every two years.'

"It is interesting to note that bimonthly and biweekly have been used for 'lasting or continuing for two months or two weeks,' and also 'occurring or appearing every two months or weeks.' In addition to this, the terms are frequently used for

'occurring or appearing twice in a month or week.' In such terms as biannually, bimonthly, biquarterly, biyearly, etc., with the signification, 'occurring or appearing twice in the period specified by the adverb that follows,' the ambiguity could be avoided by substituting semi for bi-."

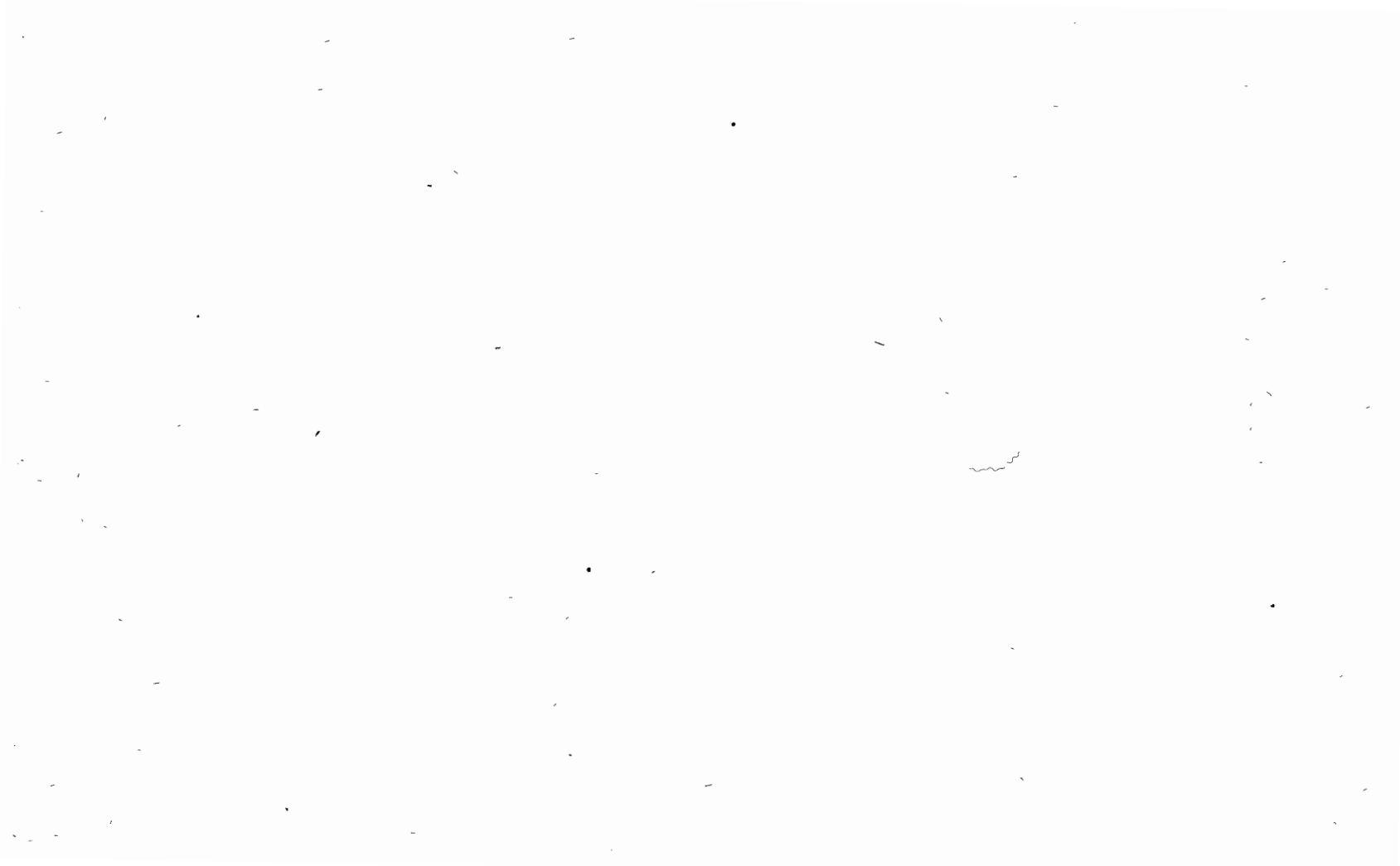
