










These graphs show the percentage of students by 2015-16 PARCC performance level that fall into each of the three levels of growth based on their 2016-17 test scores.






Student Growth by Grade









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
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Teachers and Administrators - Level of Education

Courses, Curriculum, Instruction:	MLVRCS offers online textbooks in all middle school content areas. We offer: a Reader's and Writer's Workshop approach to literacy, Balanced Literacy, EveryDay Mathematics in grades K-5, ConnectEd for grades 5-8 Math, Algebra I by McGraw-Hill, TCI Social Studies, Discovery Education Science Techbook in grades K-8, Descubre el Español in grades K-4, and utilize Learning.com to enhance our Technology curricula.
Clubs and Activities:	MLVRCS offers a National Elementary Honor Society for students in grades 4-5 and a National Junior Society for students in grades 6-8. Our school also participates in the following Science/STEM competitions: Regional Middle School Science Olympiad (7th-8th grade), Clean Communities Environmental Student Exchange, Elementary Science Olympiad (4th-6th grade), and eCybermission (6th-8th grade).

Our school day commences at 7:55am and ends at 4:00pm. The school requires both a daily school uniform and a gym uniform. MLVRCS utilizes Schoolmint to warehouse our student applications, conduct our lottery, and warehouse student reregistration information. Parents may apply directly via a link on our school's website. We have transitioned to the Realtime Student Information System and utilize it to provide school communication through its Parent Portal. Class Dojo is also utilized as a vehicle for ongoing parent-teacher communication. Middle school students in grades 6—8 participate in a 1:1 Digital Literacy initiative with school provided Chromebooks (grade 6) and Samsung tablets (grades 7-8) that students take home on a daily basis in order to complete their assignments. These students also utilize our MakerBot Replicator and MakerBot Print in order to design items for STEM challenges during the school year.
