## Advisory Board Vacancies

## Audiovision Hours Expanded

Audiovision, the Library's radio reading service, continues to grow. This November Audiovision added to its weekly broadcast 10 hours of south Jersey daily newspapers as well as two new topical programs, Consumer Counter and Audio Update. Starting in December Jim Elekes, Coordinator of Accessible Services for New Jersey Transit, will host a monthly feature, Transit Connections. Audiovision currently serves 1200 listeners in central and southern New Jersey.

## Easy Cassette Players

This player will play all four sides of a cassette automatically without having to take it out and turn it over. There are, however, some disadvantages to the player. Because it does not have a battery, it must always be plugged in when in use, greatly limiting its portability. Even more serious, if the cassette is removed before all four sides have been played, it will automatically rewind to the beginning of Side 1. Although it is easy to use, this new player is not the machine for readers who are able to use the present player. Readers who have avoided using cassettes because the machine is too complicated and are interested in the new player, however, should call Readers' Services at 1-800-792-8322 to discuss it further.

# Theater for the Visually Impaired

The Paper Mill Playhouse, well-known for its sign-interpreted performances, is making theater available to the visually impaired. A mini-workshop is given before a performance to describe scenery, costumes and other aspects of the play that depend on vision. Eventually they hope to have a service called Audio Description available. This service will allow visually impaired individuals to hear description of action, sight gags and other non-verbal action during the play through the use of head phones. ### Banking Assistance Available

United Jersey Bank's Investment Management Division has some new services to assist blind customers. All correspondence to blind customers can be done through cassette letters with a typed copy provided for use by a client's lawyer. United Jersey Bank can provide a bill-paying service whereby mortgage, utility, credit card, real estate tax, insurance and other periodic bills are paid directly by the bank. Assistance can also be given in tax preparation. The Bank can provide full portfolio management, and Trust officers assigned to accounts can arrange to visit clients semi-annually. The Library ships an average of 1,500 books and magazines every day.


Five members of the staff are true originals and have been with the Library since it was formally opened in late 1968.
