A PIONEER IN DEAF EDUCATION

Dr. Gertrude S. Galloway

1930 - 2014

Gertrude S. Galloway

Gertrude "Gertie" Scott Galloway passed away at her home on July 17, 2014 after a battle with cancer. Gertie was the first Deaf superintendent of MKSD, (1999) and the first Deaf female Superintendent to be appointed in the United States. She was the first woman president of the Conference of the Educational Administrators of the Schools and Programs for the Deaf. Also, she was the first woman to be elected president of the National Association of the Deaf, and was the first female president of the Deaf Seniors of America (DSA).

Her many leadership roles with deaf organizations included: vice president and president of the Maryland Association of the Deaf, vice president of the Gallaudet College Alumni Association (GCAA), and president of the Free State chapter of the GCAA. In 1986, former President Ronald Reagan appointed her as chair of the Pre-College Committee on the National Commission of the Education for the Deaf, which presented a report, "Toward Equality-Education of the Deaf", that contained important recommendations to Congress for improving the quality of education for deaf and hard of hearing people.

She attended the Kendall School for the Deaf in Washington, DC, and earned her BA from Gallaudet College. While teaching mathematics at the Maryland School for the Deaf (MSD), she worked



towards an M.A. in deaf education from Western Maryland College (now McDaniel College).

After receiving her degree, she was promoted to assistant principal at MSD's Columbia campus and stayed in that position until 1990. During this time, she had an important role in establishing new elementary school programs

and programs for students with multiple disabilities. She taught psychology and women's studies at Hood College in Frederick, and American Sign Language at Western Maryland College.

Before Gertie became superintendent of MKSD in 1991 she earned a doctorate in special education administration from Gallaudet in 1993, and in 2002 she was awarded an honorary degree from the University. After retiring in 1999, she was DSA president from 1999 to 2005.

Gertie was an avid sports fan. She loved her Washington Redskins and watching tennis. She lived her life in service to her family, friends and community. She is quoted saying "...so many things happened to me without really making plans for them... the winds kept on blowing me, throwing me off the courses in many ways...so I danced to the winds." She will be missed.

MKSD has many fond memories of Gertie. She gave her best to the students and the school. Ron Goodwin, former superintendent, stated in a previous *Katzenbach School News* issue: "Dr. Gertrude Galloway was one of the nicest, and most caring and humble people I have ever met."

Gertie is preceded in death by her parents, sister Meda, and children Dawn and Vance. She is survived by her daughter Shayne Galloway and four grandchildren, Morgan and Tyler Reeves and Brit and Dane Galloway, her brother and sister-in-law Roger and Pauline Scott of Delaware and several nieces and nephews.

A Message from Dr. Angel

Marie Katzenbach/New Jersey School for the Deaf has a rich history, full of treasures. One of our treasures is Dr. Gertrude "Gertie" Galloway, NJSD's first superintendent to be Deaf. When Dr. Galloway passed away this summer she left a very rich legacy. Not only was she the first superintendent of NJSD to be Deaf, she was also the first president of the National Association of the Deaf to be a woman and the first woman president of the Conference of Educational Administrators of Schools and Programs for the Deaf. In this issue of the *Katzenbach School News* you will find more "firsts" for this fascinating woman who broke down many barriers faced by Deaf people in the hearing world - and Deaf women in the Deaf community.

While I was studying for my doctorate at Gallaudet University and teaching at Gallaudet, I had the pleasure of getting to know Gertie on a personal level. People often acknowledge her accomplishments but these accomplishments do not tell the full story of Gertie. She was first and foremost a wonderful human being, a loving mother and a great friend. She will be sorely missed but her spirit lives on in the lives of those she touched and in the organizations that had the honor of her leadership. MK/NJSD is proud to have had the privilege of having her as its superintendent.

This past summer we shortened ESY to four weeks (instead of five) and extended the school day to insure students had sufficient instructional time. The reason for a four-week ESY program was to give our instructional and administrative staff an extra week to rest before the new school year began in September. We also put more emphasis on academics, spending more time during the day on reading and writing skills. Based on the comments we received from students, the changes we made for the ESY program were very successful.

Also in this issue is a story about our new itinerant program. The itinerant program is part of the newly created Center for Statewide Educational Support Services (SCESS). SCESS encompasses four programs – Specialized Child Study Team, Regional Consultant, Itinerant Program, and Audiology Program. SCESS is part of our transformation from a school that was focused on meeting the needs of Deaf and hard of hearing (D/HH) students on its campus to a school that is focused on meeting the needs of D/HH students throughout New Jersey.

There is much more happening at MK/NJSD as the enclosed pages will show. We hope you enjoy this issue of the *Katzenbach News* and agree that MK/NJSD is the place to be.

Expanded Services at SCESS

One of Marie Katzenbach/New Jersey School for the Deaf's goals is to help meet the needs of D/deaf and hard of hearing (D/HH) students on their local campuses and not just on our campus. Last year we created a new division, the Center for Statewide Educational Support Services (SCESS), to help us meet this goal. Two services that are offered through the Center include the Specialized Child Study Team (SCST) that provides diagnostic services for D/HH students and a regional consultant that provides free consultation to school districts. We are pleased to announce that the Center has expanded its services to include itinerant and audiology services. Both of these services are available to D/HH students and their school districts in the state of New Jersey.

The itinerant teacher works with D/HH students in local school districts, their teachers and parents. All of the itinerant teachers are required to have certification as a teacher of D/HH students. They travel from school district to school district to provide educational services to D/HH students in local public schools. The Itinerant teacher has many roles and responsibilities besides just teaching, however, such as making sure D/HH students have appropriate/adequate support services, and monitoring student's language development. The itinerant teacher works very closely with each of the D/HH student's teachers in a

collaborative atmosphere to insure that the needs of the D/HH student are met. This includes helping public school teachers identify and implement ways to make curriculum accessible as well as improve social interaction between the D/HH student and his/her peers. The itinerant teacher also works closely with their teachers to provide suggestions and feedback that will insure that assessment and grading of the D/HH student is valid and reliable. Besides working with D/HH students and their teachers, the itinerant teacher also works closely with the D/HH student's parents, providing them with a wealth of information that will help their child be successful academically and socially.

Our audiologist provides on-site educational audiology services to school districts and D/HH student's teachers to insure that the audiology needs of the student are met. This includes coordinating the student's use of hearing aids, personal FM systems and/or classroom sound field systems in the educational setting. The use of our audiologist for on-site educational audiology services is a very cost effective option for school districts.

Each summer, Katzenbach School offers an Extended School Year (ESY) program for students from Kindergarten through High School. Ninety-five students attended the four-week program from July 8th through August 1st. There were programs for Elementary, Middle, and High School students. The school operates a day, as well as a residential program-- for students who wish to experience social interaction with their peers after regular school hours.

Certified teachers instruct academic classes in the mornings and afternoons are filled with team building and other enriching activities. The four weeks are enhanced by trips that coincide with the theme for each specific week.

Many weeks of planning are completed before that first day in July when the students arrive. The teachers, assisted by teaching assistants and one-on-one teacher's aides, do their best to incorporate learning into interesting and fun lessons for each age group. The summer program's intent is to prevent regression and improve skills in order to be ready when that first day of school begins in September!

The high school theme was "Life After This". The students learned about the choices they will have to make upon graduation from high school. Students attended trips related to attending college, employment, entrepreneurship, and apartment living. Academic lessons were geared toward these topics and students interacted with employers, business owners, human resource professionals, college tour guides, and federal employees. These experiences allowed the students to be exposed to life outside of Katzenbach.

A trip to the Philadelphia Naval Yard gave the students the opportunity to meet and interact with Jorge Flores, a deaf employee who works for the Department of Defense at the Naval Yard. Jorge shared his personal history, as well as his career background. Because of his many positive experiences working for the Department of Defense, he encouraged the students to consider employment with the federal government. Students were treated to a tour of the testing facility and the research and development area.

Who Can Attend ESY?

While Katzenbach students enjoy the Extended School Year Program, Deaf or hard of hearing students from other programs may attend. There are day as well as residential programs. Even students who reside close to MKSD sometimes choose to stay in the dorm in order to participate in the evening social activities that resemble summer camp. After a day of academic learning, as well as team building, students enjoy dinner and fun activities, such as barbecues, minor league baseball games, amusement parks, and just fun social time! Residential students start their day with a nutritious breakfast and then meet the day students for academic classes. Reading, Writing, and Mathematics are taught by certi-

fied teachers. After lunch, the students participate in team building activities and elective classes. Trips related to the theme for the week enhance learning and give valuable life experiences. ELMS ESY

Lower School

This summer program focused on reading, writing and math, and of course students learned new things related to the themes. Students went to the CLERC center on Wednesdays for story time. There was a story related to our theme and then a craft or activity after the story.

There were four themes for the summer program. For the first week, "Colonial America", students went to Olde City in Philadelphia PA. Students took a tour of Elfreth's Alley, which is the oldest street in the city. The houses were small and have been restored to what they looked like in the 1700's. Then the group traveled to Independence Hall where there was a re-enactment of the reading of the Declaration of Independence. The special theme related snack this week was butter, made by the students. Students put a marble in a baby food jar, filled it with cream and a pinch of salt then shook the jar very hard for about five minutes. The finished product was a delicious ball of butter.

Week two's theme was "Our Earth". Students learned about different things around the earth and the environment. Students enjoyed swimming in Atsion Lake. It is a cedar lake with red water! For the special snack, students made fruit skewers from fruit they cut up and dipped in yogurt.

Deaf Awareness was the theme for the third week. PSD came to visit and we had activities in the Jochem Center that allowed us to show pride in our culture with ASL poetry, handshape stories, and handshape art. PSD enjoyed lunch with the students. NJSD's students were treated to an assembly by the Mad Scientist. He made a plastic head melt and also made slime. At the end, he made students hair stand end!

Week four's theme was Character Education - Students went to Neshaminy State Park and enjoyed swimming in their pool. Students made a special snack of trail mix, but not for themselves. A name was picked out of a hat and a special batch was made for that person. It always feels good to give to others.



Middle School

Extended School Year for the Middle School students focused on four different themes: Greek Mythology and Astronomy, "Going Green", Engineering, and "Lost". During the morning sessions, the students participated in sustained silent reading for 20 minutes and then Fair View, MVL, and Math until lunch. After lunch students focused on the themes for the week.



For Greek Mythology and Astronomy week, the students visited the Trenton Planetarium to enhance their understanding of the solar system. The students also learned how to use coordinates to graph the fall and spring constellations. For an interesting and creative activity to demonstrate the students' understanding of Greek Mythology, the students created their own myth and acted out Greek skits. This helped them to learn more about ancient Greek life.

"Going Green" week taught the students about renewable energy, gardening, composting, harmful effects of pollution, plastic, and styrofoam. Students traveled to Atlantic City and visited the wind farm.

Engineering week focused on civil engineering projects and students built a mock amusement park, complete with roller coasters, using K'Nex and Legos. A trip to Dorney Park was the highlight of the week. Students were able to connect the science behind the creation of the various amusement rides.

The final week of ESY was an exciting one entitled "Lost". The students experienced an overnight camping trip, and also a trip to Lake Atsion where they learned about survival. Compass and map skills, survival cooking, and team building were activities students enjoyed.
