


vendors and entertainers for highlighting this *DEAF FEST*, a cultural celebration.

Creative Access History

reative
Access began
in the spring
of 1992 when a
group of Deaf, hard
of hearing, and hear-



ing individuals, parents and professionals of varied ethnic, racial and socio-economic backgrounds, met to address the issue of exclusion of deaf and hard of hearing people from the social and cultural fabric of our communities.

Concerned about the invisibility of Deaf and Hard of Hearing people in the cultural highways and byways of our City's vast array of cultural arenas, we set about the task of altering this picture significantly. Prior to that time, the Deaf community had indeed constituted a virtually invisible minority in most walks of life. Thus, we believed, that invisibility allows stereotypes to be perpetuated, and therefore saw visibility as the key to breaking down stereotypes about Deaf people, their language and their culture. Further, we viewed access to and participation in the arts and cultural life of any community as amongst the best means of achieving this. After all, has it not been demonstrated time and again, with the emergence and celebration of cultural diversity, that participation of and exposure to any minority culture, benefits all who are availed of it. Having described our primary purpose, our mission then became: to assure greater visibility, full accessibility, opportunity and inclusion of Deaf and Hard of Hearing people of all ages in the arts and cultural venues of Southeastern Pennsylvania, and to do so by bringing Deaf and Hard of Hearing people of all ages into the mainstream of Philadelphia area arts and culture by promoting American Sign Language and the Deaf culture wherever and whenever possible.

Though it is true that hearing loss crosses all lines, the key problem is the same for all, that is, the breaking down of communication barriers so that individuals who are Deaf and Hard of Hearing may have the option of having access to mainstream, hearing culture. However, from the start, the founding group of what came to be known as Creative Access, believed that to simply promote access to mainstream cultural events and programs would be leaving out an equally essential part of our mission: to promote and provide stages and forums in which to showcase the skills and talent of performers who are themselves of and about the DEAF culture, or who perform and enlighten us all, through the unique beauty of American Sign Language. This brings another hue to the already rich and diverse cultural arena we call the Delaware Valley.

With full communication access provided by DDHH, individuals were able to engage in a colorful question and answer session with UCMC. DDHH would like to thank Marc Friedman of UCMC for his hard work in arranging the site and food along with Joe Petrucci for his wonderful presentation.

Trenton Thunder Celebrates Awareness Day

The Trenton Thunder baseball team, a double-A affiliate of the New York Yankees, sponsored a deaf and hard of hearing awareness day along with the DDHH and Signs of Sobriety. More than 7,000 people turned out for the May 12 evening game against the Reading Phillies at the Waterfront Park in Trenton along the Delaware River.

Fireworks ended the exciting match up and closed the first deaf and hard of hearing awareness day at the Waterfront Park.

Special thanks go out to Brian Fox, assistant director of group sales for the Trenton Thunder and Bernadette Class of Signs of Sobriety. More than 130 students from MKSD attended the game along with a number of deaf and hard of hearing individuals in the crowd.

2005 NJLA Conference: The 3 R's: The Right to Read, The Right to Learn, The Right to Grow

ecently, the New Jersey Library Association (NJLA) hosted a joint presentation by the Division of the Deaf and Hard of Hearing (DDHH), represented by Director Brian C. Shomo and the New Jersey Library for the Blind and Handicapped (NJLBH), represented by Director Venetia V. Demson and by Deaf and Hard of Hearing Awareness Program Coordinator Christine O. Olsen. The program was given at the annual NJLA Conference on April 12 in Long Branch, N.J. The moderator was Allan M. Kleiman of the Westfield Memorial Library, Chair of the Special Populations Section.

The program, entitled "Hearing Your Deaf Customers," reached over 25 librarians attending the Special Populations Section meeting. It focused on the basics of library services to the Deaf and hard of hearing communities in all types of libraries. Venetia V. Demson kicked off the program with a welcome and introduction to the services supplied by the NJLBH. Mr. Shomo answered questions such as, "what do deaf or hard of hearing customers expect of their

library," and "what state and local resources are available for the Deaf and hard of hearing population". Mr. Shomo provided an explanation about individuals with hearing loss, covering the deaf, hard of hearing, deaf-blind, and late-deaf-ened adults. He covered cochlear implants, deafness and the family, and common myths about the deaf and hard of hearing communities. Mr. Shomo discussed various ways of communicating with a deaf person i.e. use of American Sign Language or use of an interpreter. Technologies such as Assistive Listening Devices (ALDs), Computer Assisted Real-Time Captioning (CART), and TTY, NJ Relay, Video Relay Services were also discussed.

Christine Olsen discussed deaf culture, American Sign Language, and Signed English. She covered communication rules when speaking to a person with hearing loss. Ms. Olsen explained the programs provided by the Deaf and Hard of Hearing Awareness Program (DHHAP) of the NJLBH, which provides deaf and hard of hearing individuals and libraries throughout the state with various books and videos on ASL, deaf culture, and related topics, as well as loaning devices such as baby cry signalers, bed vibrators, TV ears, and TTYs. Ms. Olsen also covered the Assistive Listening Technology Loan Program, sponsored jointly by the NJLBH and the DDHH, which provides eleven libraries throughout the state with materials and equipment for loan. Participating libraries are known as Regional Resource Centers. Both the Deaf and Hard of Hearing Awareness Program and the Assistive Listening Technology Loan programs allow people to try an expensive technical device before they buy it. Ms. Olsen concluded by covering the ASL Story Hours sponsored monthly by the NJLBH, which foster literacy for the deaf and are open to the public as well as to first through third grade students at the Marie H. Katzenbach School for the Deaf.

ASL Hours Promote English Literacy for Deaf and Hard of Hearing Children

he New Jersey Library for the Blind and Handicapped (NJLBH),held its monthly Children's American Sign Language (ASL) Story Hour on May 10. Jerald Stowell, New Jersey author and bonsai expert, read his first children's book, A Small World to Hold in Your Hand.

Following Mr. Stowell's presentation, eight first grade Katzenbach students signed to the audience about their favorite story hour therapy dog. Each showed an original drawing of his or her favorite dog and gave a brief explanation of why the dog is a favorite. Talking about their favorite dog was not only fun, but reinforced literacy skills by integrating composition and art.

More than eighty people attended, and the story hour was a huge success. Mr. Stowell fascinated his audience with living samples of various bonsai. He also demonstrated

the use of special bonsai tools to create them. The elegance and beauty of the tiny trees impressed the audience. Mr. Stowell presented an autographed copy of his book to the



Marie Katzenbach School for the Deaf library. Light refreshments were served after the story hour.

Signed by ASL interpreters provided by the N.J. Division of the Deaf and Hard of Hearing, and accompanied by a PowerPoint presentation illustrating each page along with the reader, NJLBH's monthly story hours enable deaf and hard of hearing children to enjoy simultaneously ASL and English versions of books, enhancing English literacy skills.

First through third grade students from the Marie H. Katzenbach School for the Deaf (MKSD) attended the story hour. Certified therapy dogs and their volunteer owners from the Kindred Souls Canine Center join the children at each monthly story hour, and owner and trainer Pete Campione teaches the children a new hand signal each month. The dogs love interacting with the children attending the story hour, also attended by home-schooled hearing children and students from three classes at the Hunterdon County ESC School in Lambertville. In two

of the classes, the students range in age from 16 to 21, have multiple disabilities, and use sign language as part of their daily routine.

Some students use sign language as their means of communication in conjunction with assistive technology



devices. The other class has students who range in age from 10 to 13 and have learning disabilities. They are learning sign language in their class through

their Speech Therapist and have used it as an educational tool, a means to learn about other people and as a second language.

Workshops and events such as the story hour are scheduled by Christine Olsen, Coordinator of the Deaf and Hard of Hearing Awareness Program at the New Jersey Library for the Blind and Handicapped.

The NJLBH, located at 2300 Stuyvesant Avenue in Trenton, is a division of the New Jersey State Library and provides public library services to those who can't see to read a book or to hold one. It offers over 96,000 books and magazines in Braille, recorded and large print formats; broadcasts 7 New Jersey newspapers statewide through a radio reading service; loans assistive technology from the NJ Commission for the Blind and Visually Impaired, and administers telephone access to 112



nationwide newspapers through Commissionsponsored NFB-NEWSLINE. For more information on the NJLBH, con-
