Plan of the battle at Trenton, which took place on the 26th of December 1776, between a body of Americans under the command of General Washington, 6,000 men strong, and a brigade of Hessians under command of Colonel von Rall, in which 800 men of the latter were made prisoners of war.

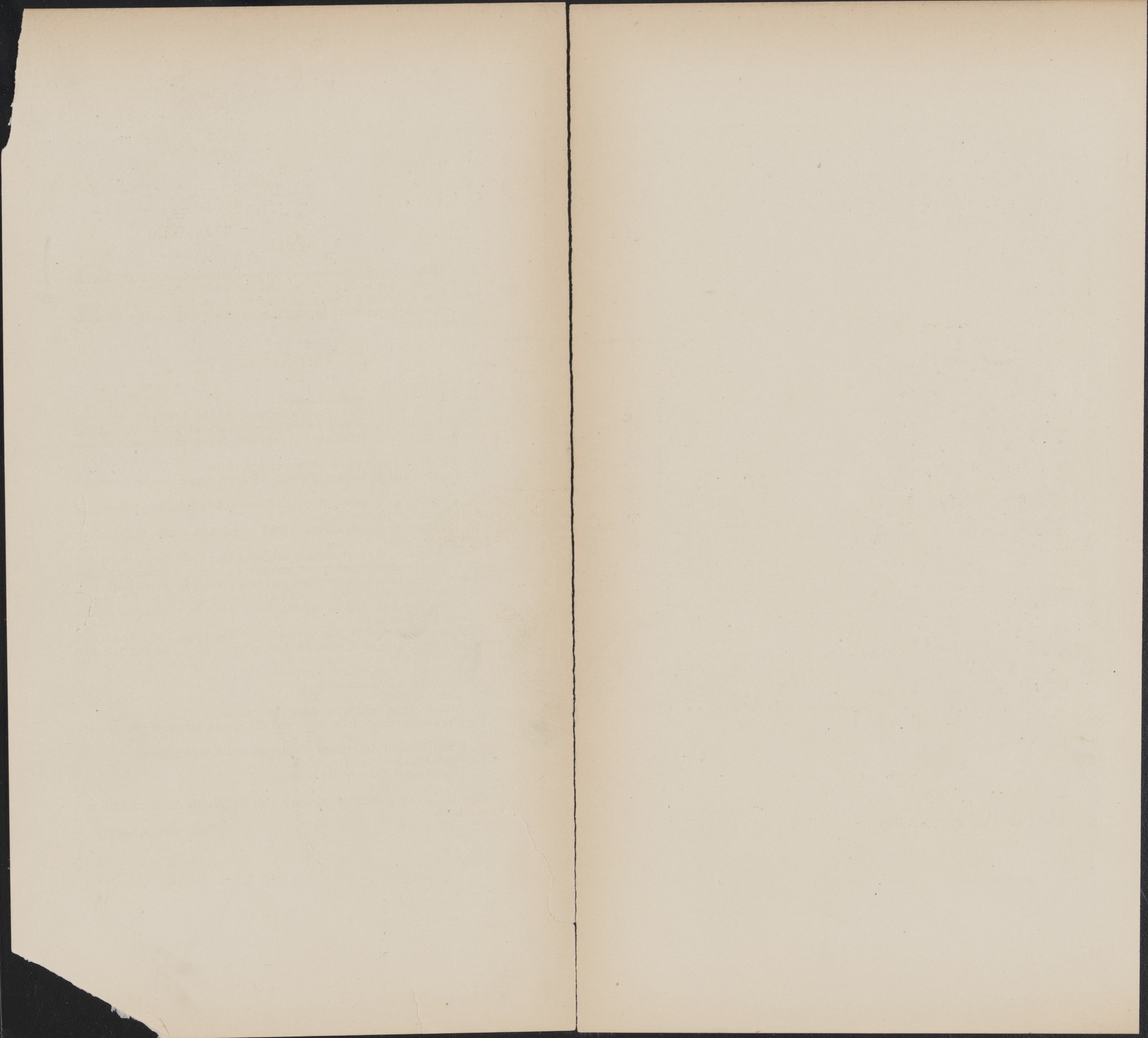
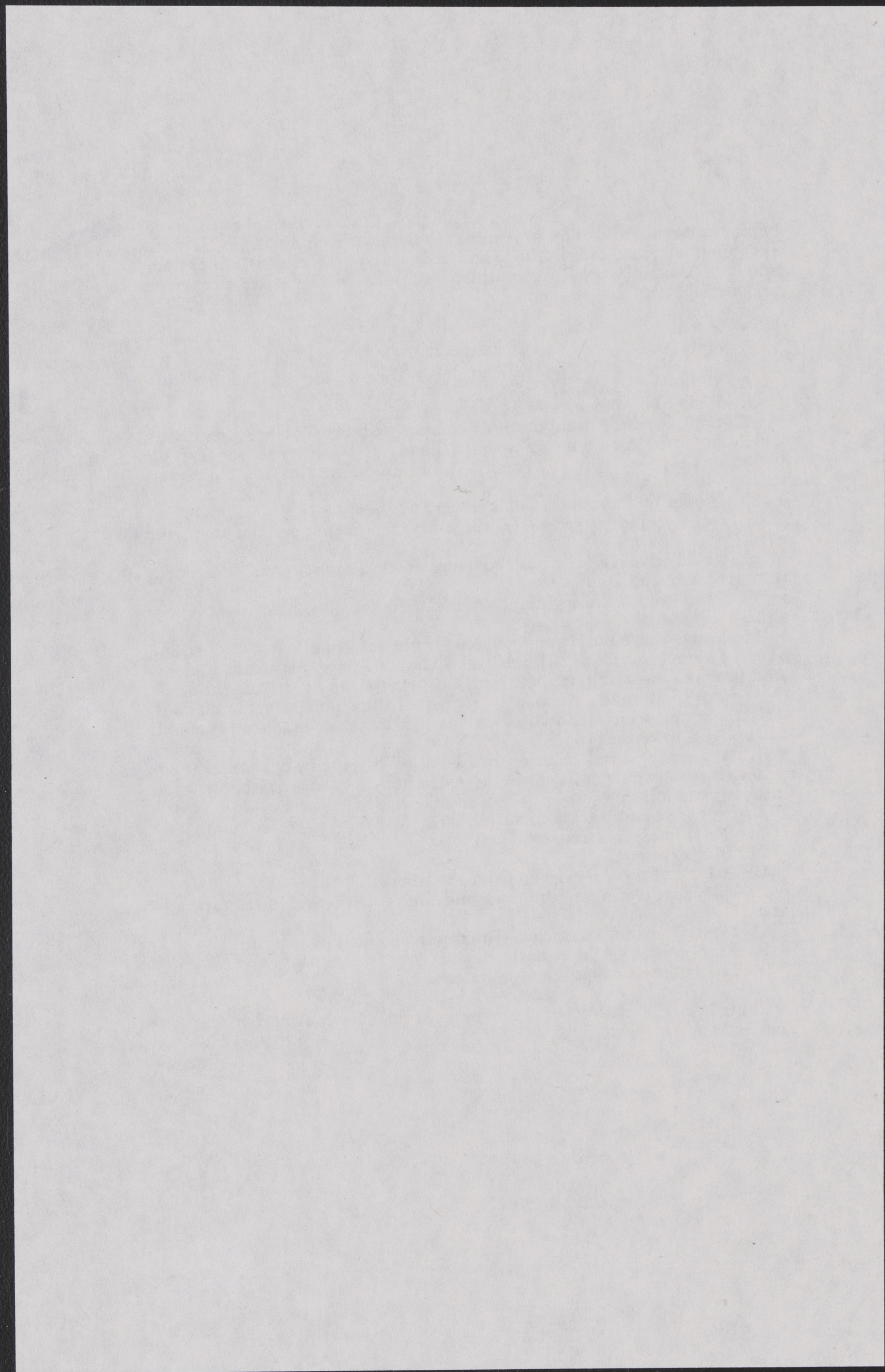
