Tuesday, January 14, 2020

The 219th Legislative Session began at 12:00 Noon, in the Patriots Theater at the War Memorial, in Trenton, New Jersey.

Ms. McKnight read the following:

THIS BEING THE TIME FIXED FOR THE BEGINNING OF THE LEGISLATIVE SESSION, THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF NEW JERSEY IS NOW CALLED TO ORDER TO EFFECT THE ORGANIZATION FOR THE CONDUCT OF ITS BUSINESS FOR THE FIRST ANNUAL SESSION OF THE TWO HUNDREDTH AND NINETEENTH SESSION.

Ms. McKnight read the following Certificate of Election:

The New Jersey State Police Color Guard presented the Colors.

Detective Cindy Chavez of the Woodbridge Township Police Department led in the Pledge of Allegiance.

JFK Memorial High School student Philip Chun performed the National Anthem.

Mr. Coughlin administered the oath of office to Assemblyman Erik K. Simonsen.

Mr. Bramnick administered the oath of office to Assemblyman Antwan L. McClellan.

Mr. Coughlin administered the oath of office to Assemblyman William F. Moen, Jr.

Mr. Bramnick administered the oath of office to Assemblywoman Jean Stanfield.

Mr. Bramnick administered the oath of office to Assemblyman John Catalano.

Mr. Bramnick administered the oath of office to Assemblyman Gerard Scharfenberger.

Mr. Bramnick administered the oath of office to Assemblyman Brian Bergen.

Mr. Coughlin administered the oath of office to the returning members of the General Assembly.

Mr. Benson nominated Assemblywoman Linda Carter to be Temporary Chair, which was seconded by Mr. Karabinchak, and passed by voice vote.

The Clerk began to read the Assembly Organizational Resolution - Assembly Resolution No. 1.

Ms. Jimenez moved to waive the reading of the organizational resolution and the resolution itself. The motion was seconded by Mr. Houghtaling.

The Assembly adopted by voice vote, Assembly Resolution No. 1, an resolution which organized the General Assembly for the Two Hundred and Nineteenth Legislature, amended certain Assembly Rules, and established a special committee.

A motion was made by Mr. Spearman, seconded by Mr. Calabrese, nominating Dana M. Burley, of Camden County, as Clerk of the General Assembly.

Ms. Burley was elected Clerk of the General Assembly by voice vote.

Ms. Reynolds-Jackson administered the Oath of Office of Clerk of the General Assembly to Dana M. Burley.

A motion was made by Mr. Schaer, seconded by Ms. Jasey, nominating Assemblyman Gordon M. Johnson, of Bergen County, as Speaker Pro Tempore.

Mr. Johnson was elected Speaker Pro Tempore of the General Assembly by voice vote.

Mr. Coughlin administered the Oath of Speaker Pro Tempore to Assemblyman Gordon M. Johnson.

Mr. Coughlin administered the Oath of Majority Leader to Assemblyman Louis D. Greenwald.

Majority Leader Greenwald addressed the General Assembly.

Mr. Coughlin administered the Oath of Minority Leader to Assemblyman Jon Bramnick.

Minority Leader Bramnick addressed the General Assembly.

A motion was made by Ms. Pintor Marin, seconded by Mr. Burzichelli, nominating Craig J. Coughlin, of Middlesex County, as Speaker of the General Assembly.

Mr. Coughlin was elected Speaker of the General Assembly by voice vote.

The Honorable Barry Albin, Justice of the Supreme Court of New Jersey, administered the Oath of Office of Speaker of the General Assembly to Craig J. Coughlin.

Speaker Coughlin addressed the General Assembly.

The Woodbridge High School Choir performed God Bless America.

The Benediction was delivered by Rabbi Avi Richler, Chabad of Gloucester County, in Mullica Hill, New Jersey.

The Assembly reconvened in the Assembly Chamber at 3:06 p.m.

The Speaker called the House to order.

The Speaker announced:

Notice of the calendar for this session of the General Assembly having been sent to the members of the General Assembly, the Secretary of the State and the State House Press and posted in accordance with the Open Public Meetings Law, I declare the General Assembly to be in session.

Upon calling the roll, the following members answered the call and the Speaker declared a quorum present:

Majority Leader Greenwald moved that the Assembly adopt a Senate Concurrent Resolution calling for a joint legislative session to receive the State of the State Address from the Governor.

Which motion passed by voice vote.

Speaker Coughlin recognized Senate Majority Leader Weinberg who moved that this joint session of the 219th Legislature come to order, which was seconded by Assembly Majority Leader Greenwald and passed by voice vote.

Speaker Coughlin announced that he was advised by the Secretary of the Senate and the Clerk of the General Assembly that a Quorum was present at this joint session of the 219th Legislature.

The Invocation was delivered by Retired Sister of Mercy, Sister Burzichelli, Aunt of Assemblyman Burzichelli.

Assemblyman Freiman led in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Speaker Coughlin recognized Senate President Sweeney who informed the joint session that the Governor had arrived.

Governor Phil Murphy delivered his State of the State Address to the joint session of the 219th Legislature.

The Benediction was delivered by Rabbi Jerome David, from Temple Emanuel, in Cherry Hill, New Jersey.

Speaker Coughlin recognized Assembly Majority Leader Greenwald who moved that this joint session of the 219th Legislature be adjourned, which was seconded by Senate Majority Leader Weinberg and passed by voice vote.

Speaker Coughlin declared the joint session adjourned.

The Speaker declared the Assembly to be in routine business.

Speaker Coughlin received a letter from Senator Anthony M. Bucco informing the Speaker that he would not be taking the oath of office for the 25th Legislative District Assembly seat during the reorganization of the 219th Legislature because he intended to continue serving in the Senate.

The following bills and resolutions were read for the first time by their titles and referred by the Speaker to the committees indicated:

Assembly No. 101, by Assemblyman DEPHILLIPS, Higher Education -- Provides tax credits to companies contributing to loan and loan redemption program for residents who attend institutions of higher education in State and work at such company upon graduation.

Assembly No. 102, by Assemblyman DEPHILLIPS, Judiciary -- Creates a Business Court.

Assembly No. 103, by Assemblyman DEPHILLIPS, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Establishes certain ethical standards and financial control requirements for State authorities.

Assembly No. 104, by Assemblyman DEPHILLIPS, Judiciary -- Establishes a Special Medical Malpractice Part in the Superior Court.

Assembly No. 105, by Assemblymen DEPHILLIPS, ROONEY, PETERSON, Wirths, Space and Webber, Appropriations -- Extends certain federal income tax advantages of individual health savings accounts to individual taxpayers under the New Jersey gross income tax.

Assembly No. 106, by Assemblyman DEPHILLIPS, Judiciary -- Requires personnel at gated communities and multi-unit complexes to allow service of process.

Assembly No. 107, by Assemblymen DEPHILLIPS, ROONEY and Assemblywoman DECROCE, Higher Education -- "Madison Holleran Proper Reporting Act"; requires institutions of higher education to post information on student suicides and attempted suicides on website.

Assembly No. 108, by Assemblymen DEPHILLIPS, ROONEY, JOHNSON, Thomson, Peterson, Assemblywoman DiMaso, Assemblymen Wirths and Space, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Revises and updates public utility franchise process; allows State's political subdivisions to revoke franchises; increases certain penalties.

Assembly No. 109, by Assemblyman DEPHILLIPS, Science, Innovation and Technology -- Provides assistance to business accelerators and incubators and startup businesses located within those business accelerators and incubators.

Assembly No. 110, by Assemblyman DEPHILLIPS, Law and Public Safety -- Exempts volunteer fire companies from paying annual charitable registration fee.

Assembly No. 111, by Assemblymen DEPHILLIPS, BRAMNICK, COUGHLIN and Assemblywoman DeCroce, State and Local Government -- Requires election by certain public employees of certain health care benefit plans; prohibits payments by public employers for waiver of such plans.

Assembly No. 112, by Assemblyman DEPHILLIPS, Assemblywoman SCHEPISI and Assemblyman JOHNSON, State and Local Government -- Provides for vacancy in county surrogate, clerk, register of deeds and mortgages, and sheriff offices occurring 70 days before general election to be filled at second succeeding general election.

Assembly No. 113, by Assemblyman DEPHILLIPS, State and Local Government -- Concerns business entities employed by the Governor or the office of Governor to conduct certain investigations.

Assembly No. 114, by Assemblyman DEPHILLIPS and Assemblywoman DECROCE, Judiciary -- Bars public entities and public employees from entering into confidential settlements of claims against them; provides that such settlements constitute public records.

Assembly No. 115, by Assemblymen DEPHILLIPS, DIMAIO, THOMSON, Space and Wirths, Commerce and Economic Development -- Repeals surtax imposed on certain businesses.

Assembly No. 116, by Assemblymen DEPHILLIPS and ROONEY, Health -- Requires physician to offer to test patient for dihydropyrimidine dehydrogenase deficiency prior to patient undergoing chemotherapy.

Assembly No. 117, by Assemblyman DEPHILLIPS, Assemblywomen SUMTER and SWAIN, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Makes supplemental appropriation of up to \$10 million to DOT for construction of highway guard rail along entirety of Route 208 through Franklin Lakes, Wyckoff, Hawthorne, Glen Rock, Fair Lawn, and Oakland in sections without highway guard rail, where necessary to ensure health and safety of motorists and residents whose properties abut Route 208.

Assembly No. 118, by Assemblymen DEPHILLIPS and MCKEON, State and Local Government -- Adds member from Judicial Retirement System to State Investment Council.

Assembly No. 119, by Assemblymen DEPHILLIPS, ROONEY and Assemblywoman DeCroce, State and Local Government -- Removes 48-hour provision for acceptance of ballots postmarked by election day; increases penalties for violation of ballot messenger and bearer limits and candidate prohibition.

Assembly No. 121, by Assemblymen SPACE, WIRTHS and Webber, Environment and Solid Waste -- Allows for exclusion of certain properties from Highlands preservation area.

Assembly No. 122, by Assemblymen SPACE and WIRTHS, State and Local Government -- Repeals sections of law pertaining to transfer of civil service and non-civil service employees of terminated local health agency to superseding agency.

Assembly No. 123, by Assemblymen SPACE and WIRTHS, Education -- Eliminates expansion of preschool education programs in "School Funding Reform Act of 2008."

Assembly No. 124, by Assemblymen SPACE and WIRTHS, Community Development and Affairs -- Prohibits the imposition of affordable housing need and related fees upon the local transfer or move of a business.

Assembly No. 125, by Assemblymen SPACE and WIRTHS, State and Local Government -- Expands scope of review of Pension and Health Benefits Review Commission.

Assembly No. 126, by Assemblymen SPACE and WIRTHS, State and Local Government -- Provides that certain absentee ballots will be counted if received within ten days of election.

Assembly No. 127, by Assemblymen SPACE, HOLLEY and WIRTHS, Community Development and Affairs -- Eliminates supplemental realty transfer fee and one percent fee on transfers of certain commercial real estate and tax on sale of controlling interests in certain commercial real property.

Assembly No. 128, by Assemblymen SPACE, GIBLIN and Wirths, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Establishes motor vehicle registration for street rods and custom motor vehicles.

Assembly No. 129, by Assemblymen SPACE, WEBBER and WIRTHS, Law and Public Safety -- Requires access to law enforcement guidelines for processing firearms permit applications upon public records request.

Assembly No. 130, by Assemblymen SPACE, WIRTHS and Assemblywoman Munoz, State and Local Government -- Requires eligibility checklist and audit for enrollment in PERS of certain public employees who provide professional services; imposes fine on certifying officer or supervisor for ineligible enrollments.

Assembly No. 131, by Assemblymen SPACE and WIRTHS, Agriculture -- Provides for no net loss of DEP lands for fishing, hunting, and trapping purposes.

Assembly No. 132, by Assemblymen SPACE and WIRTHS, Agriculture -- Provides that farm, farmstand, or other agricultural operation selling firewood obtained from property other than seller's shall not be considered a lumber yard.

Assembly No. 133, by Assemblymen SPACE, WEBBER, Peterson and Wirths, Law and Public Safety -- Authorizes chiefs of part-time municipal police forces to issue firearms ID cards and handgun purchase permits.

Assembly No. 134, by Assemblymen SPACE and WIRTHS, State and Local Government -- Requires certain documentation as proof of voter identity to vote; updates procedures for challenging voters regarding proof of identity.

Assembly No. 135, by Assemblymen SPACE, TALIAFERRO and Wirths, Agriculture -- Authorizes Sunday bow hunting on federal military installations and William J. Hughes Technical Center.

Assembly No. 136, by Assemblymen SPACE and WIRTHS, Agriculture -- Clarifies that Fish and Game Council has sole authority to regulate freshwater fishing, hunting, and trapping.

Assembly No. 137, by Assemblymen SPACE, MCKEON, WEBBER and Wirths, Judiciary -- Provides for early termination of terms of office for certain appointed municipal court positions when two or more municipalities enter into agreements to establish joint or shared municipal courts.

Assembly No. 138, by Assemblyman SPACE, Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Assemblymen Wirths, DePhillips, Bramnick and Assemblywoman DeCroce, Oversight, Reform and Federal Relations -- Decreases Alcoholic Beverage Tax rate paid on certain liquors.

Assembly No. 139, by Assemblymen SPACE, MAZZEO and Wirths, State and Local Government -- Permits governing body of municipalities having population of 30,000 or less to serve as local board of health; validates certain actions.

Assembly No. 140, by Assemblymen SPACE, WIRTHS and Peterson, Education -- Requires school district's general fund tax levy account for at least 25 percent of school district's total general fund revenue; provides four-year phase-in.

Assembly No. 141, by Assemblyman SPACE, Assemblywoman TUCKER and Assemblyman Wirths, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Provides for retained eligibility for members of NJ National Guard or reserve component called to active federal military service who met fire department maximum age requirement at closing date of civil service examination.

Assembly No. 142, by Assemblymen SPACE and Wirths, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Excludes bonuses for reenlistment or voluntary extension of enlistment in armed forces from gross income.

Assembly No. 143, by Assemblyman SPACE, Education -- Restricts Commissioner of Education's authority to reject school district's budget proposal.

Assembly No. 144, by Assemblyman SPACE, Assemblywoman PINKIN and Assemblyman WIRTHS, Judiciary -- Provides for appointment of certain municipal court judges at the local or county level.

Assembly No. 145, by Assemblymen SPACE, WIRTHS and Rooney, Judiciary -- Clarifies definition of reasonably necessary deviation when legally transporting firearm or weapon in motor vehicle.

Assembly No. 146, by Assemblymen SPACE, DIMAIO and Wirths, Judiciary -- Permits possession of certain types of ammunition and increases penalties for possession for an unlawful purpose.

Assembly No. 147, by Assemblymen SPACE, JOHNSON, Wirths, Assemblywoman DeCroce, Assemblymen Burzichelli and Calabrese, Law and Public Safety -- Allows members of Junior Firefighter's Auxiliaries to perform certain fire support duties.

Assembly No. 148, by Assemblymen SPACE and WIRTHS, Agriculture -- Requires Dept. of Agriculture to provide for electronic submittal of milk dealer license applications.

Assembly No. 149, by Assemblyman SPACE, Law and Public Safety -- Establishes "New Jersey Fire and EMS Crisis Intervention Services" telephone hotline.

Assembly No. 150, by Assemblymen SPACE, WIRTHS, JOHNSON and DiMaio, Agriculture -- "New Jersey Safe Haven for Protection of Domestic Companion Animals Act."

Assembly No. 151, by Assemblymen SPACE and WIRTHS, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Exempts certain water quality management structures, funded by certain federal and State grants, from real property taxation.

Assembly No. 152, by Assemblymen SPACE, WIRTHS, Assemblywoman DECROCE, Assemblymen Auth, Dancer, DiMaio, Peterson, Webber, Assemblywoman Schepisi, Assemblymen Peters, Thomson, Kean, Assemblywoman DiMaso, Assemblymen Clifton and DePhillips, Women and Children -- Establishes "New Jersey Born-Alive Abortion Survivors Protection Act."

Assembly No. 153, by Assemblymen SPACE, MCKEON and WIRTHS, Environment and Solid Waste -- Directs DEP to develop model ordinance for municipalities to regulate deposit and storage of soil and fill materials.

Assembly No. 154, by Assemblyman SPACE, Commerce and Economic Development -- Requires EDA administer small business loan program to provide loans to small businesses owned or controlled by certain veterans.

Assembly No. 155, by Assemblymen WIRTHS and SPACE, Environment and Solid Waste -- Prohibits State departments and agencies from considering or requiring compliance by Highlands planning area municipalities with Highlands regional master plan in certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 156, by Assemblymen WIRTHS and SPACE, Environment and Solid Waste -- Sunsets "Highlands Water Protection and Planning Act" five years after date of enactment unless certain conditions are met.

Assembly No. 157, by Assemblymen WIRTHS, SPACE, Webber, Rumpf, Bramnick, Dancer, DiMaio, DeAngelo, Assemblywomen Munoz, DeCroce and Assemblyman Rooney, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Removes authority of MVC to increase certain fees; sets certain fees by statute.

Assembly No. 158, by Assemblymen WIRTHS, SPACE, Assemblywoman DECROCE and Assemblyman Peters, Environment and Solid Waste -- Provides for direct property tax relief from Highlands Property Tax Stabilization Fund.

Assembly No. 159, by Assemblymen WIRTHS and SPACE, State and Local Government -- Repeals "Statewide Non-Residential Development Fee Act."

Assembly No. 160, by Assemblymen WIRTHS, SPACE, HOLLEY and HOUGHTALING, Agriculture -- Requires voter registration forms be made available when applying for hunting, fishing, or trapping license.

Assembly No. 161, by Assemblymen WIRTHS, SPACE and AUTH, Oversight, Reform and Federal Relations -- Repeals the "Agreement Among the States to Elect the President by National Popular Vote."

Assembly No. 162, by Assemblymen WIRTHS and SPACE, State and Local Government -- "Property Assessment Appeal Transparency Act"; revises content of required annual notification of real property assessment.

Assembly No. 163, by Assemblymen WIRTHS and SPACE, Law and Public Safety -- Eliminates prohibition against purchasing more than one handgun in calendar month.

Assembly No. 164, by Assemblymen WIRTHS and SPACE, Law and Public Safety -- Prohibits release of illegal immigrants from correctional facilities.

Assembly No. 165, by Assemblymen WIRTHS, SPACE and Peterson, Education -- Requires preschool tuition rates equal actual cost per pupil.

Assembly No. 166, by Assemblymen WIRTHS, SPACE, Giblin and Peterson, Labor -- Requires certain contractors to verify work authorization of newly hired employees.

Assembly No. 167, by Assemblyman WIRTHS, Agriculture -- Permits farm income averaging credit under the New Jersey gross income tax.

Assembly No. 168, by Assemblymen WIRTHS and SPACE, Education -- Limits annual increase in tuition rates charged by school districts, county vocational school districts, county special services districts, jointure commissions, and private schools for students with disabilities to two percent.

Assembly No. 169, by Assemblymen WIRTHS, CAPUTO, Space, Assemblywoman Vainieri Huttle, Assemblymen Peterson and DiMaio, Education -- Concerns speech rights of student journalists at public schools and public institutions of higher education.

Assembly No. 170, by Assemblymen WIRTHS and Dancer, Agriculture -- Prohibits harassment of farmers engaged in farming operations.

Assembly No. 171, by Assemblymen WIRTHS and Space, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Requires Chief Administrator of MVC to conduct wanted person check of all applicants for licenses, permits, and identification cards.

Assembly No. 172, by Assemblyman WIRTHS, Assemblywomen VAINIERI HUTTLE, Chaparro, Assemblyman Peterson, Assemblywoman DeCroce, Assemblymen Giblin and Space, Community Development and Affairs -- Allows long term tax exemption extension for certain low-income housing.

Assembly No. 173, by Assemblyman WIRTHS, Assemblywoman MURPHY, Assemblyman SPACE, Assemblywoman Pinkin, Assemblymen DePhillips and Webber, Oversight, Reform and Federal

Relations -- Expands scope of New Jersey Regulatory Flexibility Act dealing with economic impact of rules on small businesses.

Assembly No. 174, by Assemblyman WIRTHS, State and Local Government -- Eliminates requirement for State residency for public officers and employees with limited historic exceptions.

Assembly No. 175, by Assemblymen WIRTHS and SPACE, Education -- Requires minimum geographic cost adjustment for school districts in all counties.

Assembly No. 176, by Assemblymen WIRTHS, MAZZEO, SPACE, Verrelli and DeAngelo, State and Local Government -- Prohibits person from contracting for public work if person is barred from receiving federal contract.

Assembly No. 177, by Assemblymen WIRTHS, Space, DePhillips, Thomson, Assemblywomen DeCroce and DiMaso, Education -- Provides that school district may not prohibit active or retired law enforcement officer or registered security officer from carrying firearm in performance of school security duties if authorized under State law to carry.

Assembly No. 178, by Assemblymen WIRTHS, FREIMAN and SPACE, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- "Motor Vehicle Insurance Verification Act"; requires Motor Vehicle Commission to establish online motor vehicle insurance verification system.

Assembly No. 179, by Assemblyman WIRTHS, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- Requires Mandated Health Benefits Advisory Commission to study financial impact of all enacted mandated health benefits.

Assembly No. 180, by Assemblymen WIRTHS, DePhillips, Assemblywomen Munoz, DiMaso, Schepisi, Assemblyman Thomson and Assemblywoman DeCroce, Labor -- Provides small businesses with gross income tax or corporation business tax deduction for wages paid to minimum wage employees.

Assembly No. 181, by Assemblymen WIRTHS, SPACE and DIMAIO, Agriculture -- Increases minimum civil fine for harassing person taking wildlife and increases criminal penalty for subsequent offenses.

Assembly No. 182, by Assemblyman WIRTHS, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Requires public utilities and cable television companies to accommodate and relocate facilities when necessary for transportation infrastructure projects at direction of DOT.

Assembly No. 183, by Assemblymen WIRTHS and SPACE, Environment and Solid Waste -- Prohibits State's participation in multi-state cap-and-trade program to reduce carbon emissions from transportation sector.

Assembly No. 184, by Assemblymen WIRTHS, EGAN, SPACE, Assemblywoman Munoz, Assemblymen Verrelli, DeAngelo, Giblin and Assemblywoman DeCroce, Labor -- Establishes Office of Labor Law Enforcement.

Assembly No. 185, by Assemblymen WIRTHS and SPACE, Commerce and Economic Development -- Expands EDA small business loan program to include certain broadband telecommunications service providers.

Assembly No. 186, by Assemblymen WIRTHS and Space, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Directs BPU to allow broadband telecommunications service providers to use poles belonging to public utilities or CATV companies in certain instances.

Assembly No. 187, by Assemblymen WIRTHS and SPACE, Environment and Solid Waste -- Permits business entities and nonprofit organizations to adopt certain responsibilities related to stormwater management basins; provides corporation business tax credit for adoption of stormwater management basins in certain watersheds.

Assembly No. 188, by Assemblyman WIRTHS, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Allows local units to offer broadband telecommunications service under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 189, by Assemblywomen CARTER and TIMBERLAKE, Consumer Affairs -- Prohibits sale and distribution of nail products containing dibutyl phthalates, toluene, or formaldehyde.

Assembly No. 190, by Assemblywomen CARTER and DOWNEY, Judiciary -- Eliminates statute of limitations for civil actions arising from sexual assault and other crimes and offenses of a sexual nature committed against a person 18 years of age or older.

Assembly No. 191, by Assemblywomen CARTER, REYNOLDS-JACKSON and Assemblyman SPEARMAN, Judiciary -- Increases amount of credit for incarceration resulting from default of court-imposed financial obligation or motor vehicle penalty.

Assembly No. 192, by Assemblywoman CARTER, Assemblyman KENNEDY, Assemblywomen TIMBERLAKE, Murphy and Pinkin, Science, Innovation and Technology -- Establishes "New Jersey STEM Scholars Grant Pilot Program" in Department of Education.

Assembly No. 193, by Assemblywoman CARTER, Assemblymen CALABRESE, SPEARMAN and Assemblywoman Timberlake, Science, Innovation and Technology -- Requires disclosure of breach of security of geolocation data.

Assembly No. 194, by Assemblywoman CARTER, Assemblymen CHIARAVALLOTI and Mukherji, Agriculture -- Requires registry of animal rescue organizations; requires animal rescue, pet shop, shelter, or pound notify person adopting or purchasing animal of animal's behavioral and medical history; designated as "Rocky's Law."

Assembly No. 195, by Assemblywoman CARTER and Assemblyman KARABINCHAK, Science, Innovation and Technology - - Requires Commissioner of Labor and Workforce Development to conduct study and issue report on impact of artificial intelligence on economic growth.

Assembly No. 196, by Assemblywoman CARTER, Assemblymen KENNEDY, FREIMAN, Bramnick, Assemblywoman Munoz, Assemblymen Zwicker and DiMaio, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Requires NJT to conduct feasibility study on restoring one-seat ride to Manhattan on Raritan Valley Line.

Assembly No. 197, by Assemblywoman CARTER, Assemblyman MUKHERJI and Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Human Services -- Expands availability of NJ Family Care Advantage program.

Assembly No. 198, by Assemblywoman CARTER, Science, Innovation and Technology -- Establishes New Jersey Public Interest Technology Network.

Assembly No. 199, by Assemblywoman CARTER and Assemblyman MORIARTY, Labor -- Concerns joint liability for payment of employer tax law.

Assembly No. 200, by Assemblywoman TUCKER, Assemblyman CAPUTO, Assemblywoman MCKNIGHT and Assemblyman Giblin, Oversight, Reform and Federal Relations -- Requires applicants for liquor licenses and license transfers to notify residents within 200 feet of licensed premises.

Assembly No. 201, by Assemblywoman TUCKER, Assemblymen CAPUTO, WIMBERLY, Assemblywoman MCKNIGHT, Assemblyman Johnson and Assemblywoman Jasey, Oversight, Reform and Federal Relations -- Prohibits certain sales of alcoholic beverages within 1,000 feet of schools or religious institutions.

Assembly No. 202, by Assemblywoman TUCKER, Assemblyman CAPUTO, Assemblywoman MCKNIGHT, Assemblymen Johnson, Giblin, Moriarty, Assemblywomen Jasey and Chaparro, Women and Children -- Requires mandatory registration of family day care providers.

Assembly No. 203, by Assemblywomen TUCKER and CHAPARRO, Women and Children -- Establishes a 500 foot drug free zone around child care centers.

Assembly No. 204, by Assemblywoman TUCKER, Assemblymen CAPUTO, HOLLEY, Wimberly and Assemblywoman Chaparro, Law and Public Safety -- Broadens municipal arson investigators' powers.

Assembly No. 205, by Assemblywoman TUCKER, Education -- Requires parents who intend to home-school their children to inform the school district of that decision; requires school district to maintain record of each home-schooled child in the district.

Assembly No. 206, by Assemblywoman TUCKER, Assemblymen CONAWAY, JOHNSON, SCHAER, DANIELSEN, Burzichelli, Assemblywoman Gove, Assemblyman Rumpf, Assemblywoman Munoz, Assemblymen Benson, Coughlin, DeAngelo, DiMaio, Giblin, Mazzeo and Armato, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Broadens eligibility for certain veterans' benefits by eliminating requirement of service during specified dates or in specified locations.

Assembly No. 207, by Assemblywoman TUCKER, Law and Public Safety -- Permits certain special law enforcement officers to carry firearms at all times when in State.

Assembly No. 208, by Assemblywoman TUCKER, Assemblymen DeAngelo, Rumpf, Assemblywomen Gove and DeCroce, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Grants certain leaves of absence for Vietnam Veterans of America conventions.

Assembly No. 209, by Assemblywomen TUCKER, VAINIERI HUTTLE, Assemblyman WIMBERLY, Assemblywomen Sumter, Mosquera, Assemblyman Caputo and Assemblywoman Lampitt, Human Services -- Establishes Disparity in Treatment of Persons with Disabilities in Underrepresented Communities Commission in DCA.

Assembly No. 210, by Assemblywoman TUCKER, Assemblyman CAPUTO, Assemblywomen SUMTER and CHAPARRO, Homeland Security and State Preparedness -- Requires minimum level of police staffing based on municipal population and violent crime rate.

Assembly No. 211, by Assemblywoman TUCKER, Assemblymen GIBLIN, WEBBER, MUKHERJI, Assemblywoman Gove, Assemblyman Rumpf, Assemblywomen Munoz and Chaparro, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Makes consent to register with Selective Service part of driver's license application process for males under age 26.

Assembly No. 212, by Assemblywoman TUCKER, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Establishes pilot program in DOE to recruit, select, and train veterans for school security positions in school districts.

Assembly No. 213, by Assemblywoman TUCKER, Assemblyman Rumpf and Assemblywoman Gove, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Adds Sons of The American Legion to list of organizations whose representatives receive paid leaves of absence to attend State and national conventions.

Assembly No. 214, by Assemblywoman TUCKER, Assemblymen CAPUTO, GIBLIN, Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Assemblymen WIMBERLY, McKeon, Assemblywoman Lampitt, Assemblymen Schaer, Danielsen, Assemblywomen Mosquera, Pinkin, Quijano, McKnight, Assemblymen Chiaravalloti, Coughlin and Assemblywoman Jasey, Human Services -- Increases personal needs allowance to at least \$50 for low-income persons residing in certain facilities.

Assembly No. 215, by Assemblywoman TUCKER and Assemblyman CAPUTO, Senior Services -- Requires minimum temperature in senior citizen housing projects to be maintained at 70 degrees from October 1 to May 1.

Assembly No. 216, by Assemblywomen TUCKER, JASEY and Reynolds-Jackson, Women and Children -- Requires various measures to address effects of low levels of lead exposure.

Assembly No. 217, by Assemblywomen TUCKER, GOVE, Assemblymen HOLLEY and Rumpf, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Modifies laws regarding compensation and leaves of absence for certain public employees who served in the military; requires public employers follow certain policies and procedures for leaves of absence.

Assembly No. 218, by Assemblywoman TUCKER, Assemblyman TALIAFERRO and Assemblywoman MCKNIGHT, Law and Public Safety -- Concerns training of employees about access to public facilities for individuals with service or guide dogs.

Assembly No. 219, by Assemblywoman TUCKER, Assemblymen CAPUTO, Conaway, Assemblywomen Lampitt, Mosquera and Pintor Marin, Women and Children -- Creates self-defense justification for victims of domestic violence.

Assembly No. 220, by Assemblywoman TUCKER and Assemblyman CHIARAVALLOTTI, Homeland Security and State Preparedness -- Requires training for constables.

Assembly No. 221, by Assemblywoman TUCKER, Assemblyman CAPUTO, Assemblywoman SUMTER, Assemblyman AUTH, Assemblywoman Mosquera, Assemblyman Holley, Assemblywoman Speight, Assemblymen Giblin, DiMaio, Wimberly, Assemblywomen Timberlake and Reynolds-Jackson, Law and Public Safety -- Establishes certain benefits for Class Two special law enforcement officers; allows arson investigators to carry a firearm at all times.

Assembly No. 222, by Assemblywoman TUCKER, Assemblyman HOLLEY, Assemblywomen LOPEZ, Jimenez, Assemblymen Space, Wirths, Assemblywomen Mosquera and McKnight, Human Services -- Requires hospitals and homeless shelters to provide information on services and resources to individuals who are homeless or military veterans.

Assembly No. 223, by Assemblywomen TUCKER, TIMBERLAKE, Assemblymen CAPUTO and Giblin, Housing -- Provides forbearance of residential mortgage foreclosures under certain circumstances; places additional requirements on attorneys, residential mortgage lenders, and courts, as part of foreclosure process.

Assembly No. 224, by Assemblyman DEANGELO and Assemblywoman CHAPARRO, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Allows corporation business tax and gross income tax credits to businesses paying a salary differential to National Guard members or reservists on active duty.

Assembly No. 225, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Assemblywoman QUIJANO, Assemblymen BENSON and Coughlin, Commerce and Economic Development -- Provides tax credit under corporation business tax and gross income tax for certain costs incurred in purchase and installation of certain environmentally responsible business equipment.

Assembly No. 226, by Assemblymen DEANGELO, Giblin, Egan and Coughlin, Education -- Establishes reward program in DOE for districts with high academic performance and low per pupil expenditures.

Assembly No. 227, by Assemblymen DEANGELO, BENSON and Assemblywoman Reynolds-Jackson, State and Local Government -- Increases State appropriations to Energy Tax Receipts Property Tax Relief Fund by \$387 million to restore municipal aid reductions from Fiscal Years 2009, 2010, and 2011.

Assembly No. 228, by Assemblymen DEANGELO, KEAN and Thomson, Education -- Excludes certain increases in school security expenditures from tax levy and appropriation cap, as applicable, for municipalities and counties.

Assembly No. 229, by Assemblymen DEANGELO, WIMBERLY, DANIELSEN and Assemblywoman Murphy, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Requires telecommunications companies to provide prorated refunds for service outages of longer than 24 hours.

Assembly No. 230, by Assemblymen DEANGELO, BENSON and WIMBERLY, Higher Education -- Allows gross income tax deductions for contributions by certain taxpayers to New Jersey Better Educational Savings Trust (NJBEST) Program and provides a State match for contributions to NJBEST accounts for families meeting certain income guidelines.

Assembly No. 231, by Assemblymen DEANGELO, WIMBERLY and GIBLIN, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Establishes uniform rates for water and sewer services for residential use based exclusively on metered consumption.

Assembly No. 232, by Assemblyman DEANGELO and Assemblywoman QUIJANO, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Provides corporation business tax credit for certain investment in broadband infrastructure in underserved communities.

Assembly No. 233, by Assemblymen DEANGELO and KARABINCHAK, Commerce and Economic Development -- Provides corporation business tax credit and gross income tax credits for purchase and installation of certain electric vehicle charging stations.

Assembly No. 234, by Assemblymen DEANGELO and Peterson, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Requires telephone utility to temporarily suspend local exchange telephone service for up to six continuous months when requested by residential customer; allows customer to keep telephone number when resuming service.

Assembly No. 235, by Assemblymen DEANGELO, TALIAFERRO and Assemblywoman MURPHY, Higher Education -- Establishes a gross income tax credit for attendance at New Jersey county colleges.

Assembly No. 236, by Assemblyman DEANGELO and Assemblywoman PINKIN, Homeland Security and State Preparedness -- Requires State to offer surplus State Police vehicles to certain volunteer fire and emergency service organizations.

Assembly No. 237, by Assemblyman DEANGELO and Assemblywoman DOWNEY, State and Local Government -- Provides general election, primary, and school election sample ballots may be sent to registered voter by electronic mail if so requested.

Assembly No. 238, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Budget -- Directs the Division of Taxation to produce instructional materials on the appropriate gross income tax treatment of certain deferred compensation plans.

Assembly No. 239, by Assemblymen DEANGELO and Coughlin, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Requires Division of Rate Counsel to evaluate NJT fare increases and determine whether increases are necessary and fair to NJT customers.

Assembly No. 240, by Assemblymen DEANGELO, HOLLEY, ROONEY and Assemblywoman Mosquera, Homeland Security and State Preparedness -- Establishes certain requirements for 9-1-1 public safety answering points and public safety dispatch points.

Assembly No. 241, by Assemblymen DEANGELO, CHIARAVALLOTI, Assemblywomen Vainieri Huttle, DeCroce and Timberlake, Judiciary -- Bars sex offenders from jobs which primarily consist of contact with children.

Assembly No. 242, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Assemblywoman DOWNEY and Assemblyman HOUGHTALING, Human Services -- Clarifies that persons unable to write because of disability may execute legal signatures using fingerprint or other identifying mark.

Assembly No. 243, by Assemblymen DEANGELO, DANIELSEN and WEBBER, Higher Education -- Requires tuition bills of public institutions of higher education to include details on student fees and opt-out provision for student-managed entertainment fees, and requires certain institutions' websites to include student fee information.

Assembly No. 244, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Commerce and Economic Development -- Establishes manufacturing machine and metal trade apprenticeship tax credit program.

Assembly No. 245, by Assemblyman DEANGELO and Assemblywoman PINTOR MARIN, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Provides PFRS member in federal or State military service who is injured or killed with disability or death benefits.

Assembly No. 246, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Assemblywoman PINTOR MARIN, Assemblyman COUGHLIN and Assemblywoman Chaparro, Higher Education -- Authorizes county colleges to establish and operate student dormitories.

Assembly No. 247, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Oversight, Reform and Federal Relations -- Increases number of temporary permits that may be issued to sell alcoholic beverages.

Assembly No. 248, by Assemblymen DEANGELO, BENSON, Assemblywomen JASEY, Sumter, Murphy and Assemblyman Karabinchak, Education -- Requires instruction on information literacy in curriculum of students in grades kindergarten through 12.

Assembly No. 249, by Assemblymen DEANGELO and HOUGHTALING, Labor -- Requires prompt payment of certain construction contracts.

Assembly No. 250, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Assemblywoman QUIJANO, Assemblyman MUKHERJI, Assemblywomen Murphy, McKnight, Chaparro, Assemblymen Mazzeo and Armato, Housing -- Establishes fire safety standards and protocols for certain light frame residential construction; requires placards identifying primary structural systems of buildings.

Assembly No. 251, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, State and Local Government -- Limits contributions to legal defense fund of candidate for or holder of elective public office; requires reporting thereof to ELEC.

Assembly No. 252, by Assemblymen DEANGELO and Verrelli, State and Local Government -- Permits State employment on temporary basis of workers with certain skills to perform routine maintenance in State facilities.

Assembly No. 253, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, State and Local Government -- Prohibits businesses that outsource jobs overseas from receiving State contracts or grants; prohibits investment of State funds in such businesses.

Assembly No. 254, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, State and Local Government -- Requires written security plan when school is polling place and open to students; provides that schools may be used as polling places only under certain circumstances; makes an appropriation.

Assembly No. 255, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, State and Local Government -- Makes total property tax exemption for 100% disabled veterans retroactive to effective date of determination of total disability; requires State to reimburse municipalities for reimbursement of property taxes paid to veteran.

Assembly No. 256, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, State and Local Government -- Exempts certain personal information from State's open public records law; bars attorney's fees award in denial of access proceeding in certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 257, by Assemblymen DEANGELO, HOUGHTALING, MUKHERJI, Danielsen, Assemblywomen Pinkin, Murphy, McKnight, Lopez, Downey and Vainieri Huttel, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Requires DCA to provide certain information on low-income home energy assistance program, annually update its low-income home energy assistance program handbook, and provide quarterly training sessions on administering program.

Assembly No. 258, by Assemblymen DEANGELO, THOMSON and Benson, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Requires all new State buildings to have solar or geothermal energy systems, where feasible.

Assembly No. 259, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Provides civil service preference to military service members who did not serve in theater of operation but received campaign or expedition medal.

Assembly No. 260, by Assemblymen DEANGELO, WIRTHS, SPACE, Assemblywoman DeCroce, Assemblyman DePhillips and Assemblywoman Murphy, Telecommunications and Utilities -- "Vegetation Management Response Act"; concerns vegetation management related to electric public utility infrastructure.

Assembly No. 261, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Law and Public Safety -- Requires mandatory imprisonment for child luring and requires certain information about Megan's Law to be provided to sex offenders annually.

Assembly No. 262, by Assemblymen ARMATO and MAZZEO, Health -- "Steven Schmincke's Law"; facilitates sober living home construction financing.

Assembly No. 263, by Assemblymen ARMATO and MAZZEO, Health -- Requires persons picking up prescriptions for Schedule II controlled dangerous substances to present identification.

Assembly No. 264, by Assemblymen ARMATO and MAZZEO, Health -- Permits patients to indicate that they should not be prescribed opiates and certain other controlled substances in prescription monitoring program information.

Assembly No. 265, by Assemblymen ARMATO, BENSON and DEANGELO, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Provides credits under corporation business tax and gross income tax for qualified wages of certain disabled veterans.

Assembly No. 266, by Assemblymen ARMATO, MAZZEO, Benson and DeAngelo, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Eliminates veterans' gross income tax deduction requirement that New Jersey National Guard member serve in federal active duty status.

Assembly No. 267, by Assemblymen ARMATO, MAZZEO, Peterson and DeAngelo, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Makes persons with New Jersey National Guard service and NGB 22 form eligible for certain veterans benefits.

Assembly No. 268, by Assemblymen ARMATO, MAZZEO, Assemblywomen MURPHY, DOWNEY, Vainieri Huttle and Assemblyman Houghtaling, State and Local Government -- Bars use of certain funds and nondisclosure agreements to settle sexual assault and harassment claims against certain State officers and employees, members of Legislature, and candidates.

Assembly No. 269, by Assemblymen ARMATO and MAZZEO, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Provides civil service preference to military servicemembers who served in humanitarian Operations Provide Comfort and Provide Comfort II.

Assembly No. 270, by Assemblymen ARMATO and MAZZEO, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Makes General Fund supplemental appropriation of \$50,000 to DMVA for air quality studies to support campaign for award of F-35 Joint Strike Fighter Jets at 177th Air National Guard base.

Assembly No. 271, by Assemblymen ARMATO, MAZZEO and VERRELLI, Judiciary -- Designates drug court program as the "special probation recovery court program" in statutes.

Assembly No. 272, by Assemblymen ARMATO and Mazzeo, State and Local Government -- Requires board of elections to use voter's signature on certificate of mail-in voter to create signature record in Statewide Voter Registration System.

Assembly No. 273, by Assemblyman ARMATO, Assemblywomen VAINIERI HUTTLE, MURPHY, Assemblymen Calabrese and Mazzeo, Women and Children -- Concerns sexual harassment.

Assembly No. 274, by Assemblymen ARMATO, Mazzeo and Assemblywoman Murphy, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Establishes program to provide assistance to qualified veterans in in-patient and out-patient treatment programs to travel to medical counseling in State.

Assembly No. 275, by Assemblyman ARMATO, Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE and Assemblyman Mazzeo, Judiciary -- Allows drug- or alcohol-dependent person admitted into court-ordered supervisory treatment program to reduce amount owed on court-ordered fines and certain other financial obligations upon successful completion of program.

Assembly No. 276, by Assemblymen ARMATO, MAZZEO, Assemblywoman MURPHY and Assemblyman Mukherji, Human Services -- Prohibits pharmaceutical manufacturer from owning or operating drug rehabilitation facility licensed in State.

Assembly No. 277, by Assemblymen ARMATO and KARABINCHAK, Health -- Requires public members of Drug Utilization Review Board to disclose financial interests and benefits received from and investment interests held in pharmaceutical manufacturers.

Assembly No. 278, by Assemblymen ARMATO, MAZZEO, Assemblywomen MURPHY, Swain and Assemblyman Tully, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Extends certain benefits to veterans who received a badge, medal, or ribbon for serving in federal military campaign or expedition.

Assembly No. 279, by Assemblymen ARMATO and MAZZEO, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Requires preservation of employee benefits and contractual rights as condition of sale of Atlantic City International Airport.

Assembly No. 280, by Assemblymen ARMATO, MAZZEO and Assemblywoman Murphy, Education -- Provides excused absence for public school student who participates in musical performance at military funeral, including playing "Taps."

Assembly No. 281, by Assemblymen ARMATO, DEANGELO, MAZZEO, Assemblywoman Gove, Assemblyman Mukherji, Assemblywoman Murphy and Assemblyman Benson, State and Local Government -- Defines indigent veteran and veteran status for certain veteran interment purposes.

Assembly No. 282, by Assemblyman MAZZEO, Education -- Requires executive county superintendents to submit school district consolidation plan to Commissioner of Education within one year and every five years thereafter and commissioner to approve or modify plan within six months of submission.

Assembly No. 283, by Assemblyman MAZZEO, Community Development and Affairs -- Establishes "Atlantic City Growth Tax Credit Program" to grant tax credits to promote the development of non-rental housing in Atlantic City.

Assembly No. 284, by Assemblyman MAZZEO, Agriculture -- Establishes requirements for sale and planting of running bamboo.

Assembly No. 285, by Assemblymen MAZZEO, DANCER and ARMATO, Tourism, Gaming and the Arts -- Removes seven-day limitation for continued operation of casinos and racetracks in event that a state of emergency is declared.

Assembly No. 286, by Assemblymen MAZZEO and CAPUTO, Tourism, Gaming and the Arts -- Limits State Lottery drawings to two per day per game.

Assembly No. 287, by Assemblymen MAZZEO and JOHNSON, Environment and Solid Waste -- Expands authorization for clamming on Sundays.

Assembly No. 288, by Assemblymen MAZZEO and ARMATO, Health -- Requires the Division of Consumer Affairs to establish electronic monitoring system for pain management agreements, to be linked to, and used in association with, Prescription Monitoring Program.

Assembly No. 289, by Assemblymen MAZZEO and ARMATO, Labor -- "Tipped Wage Worker Protection Act."

Assembly No. 290, by Assemblymen MAZZEO, CAPUTO and ARMATO, Tourism, Gaming and the Arts -- Requires State Lottery Commission to notify Legislature of proposed State Lottery game prior to commencement of new game.

Assembly No. 291, by Assemblyman MAZZEO, Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Assemblymen ZWICKER, McKeon, Holley and Assemblywoman Murphy, State and Local Government -- Establishes "New Jersey Elections Security Act."

Assembly No. 292, by Assemblymen MAZZEO, Armato, Wirths and Freiman, Agriculture -- Provides limited civil liability immunity to farmers hosting agritourism activities.

Assembly No. 293, by Assemblyman MAZZEO, State and Local Government -- Requires release of performance guarantee if municipal governing body or engineer fail to meet certain deadlines.

Assembly No. 294, by Assemblymen MAZZEO, ARMATO, MUKHERJI, Assemblywomen Murphy, Reynolds-Jackson, Assemblymen Verrelli and Benson, State and Local Government -- Requires release of bid list prior to bid date under "Local Public Contracts Law."

Assembly No. 295, by Assemblymen MAZZEO, ARMATO, Assemblywoman Murphy, Assemblyman Spearman and Assemblywoman Downey, Labor -- Creates rebuttable presumption in workers' compensation cases of respiratory disease of casino employees working in smoking areas.

Assembly No. 296, by Assemblymen MAZZEO and ARMATO, State and Local Government -- Deletes public bidding exception for local public contracts for water supply and wastewater treatment services in cities of first class.

Assembly No. 297, by Assemblymen MAZZEO, ARMATO and KARABINCHAK, Commerce and Economic Development -- Expands eligibility for tax credits for development of qualified wind energy facilities.

Assembly No. 298, by Assemblymen MAZZEO, HOUGHTALING, ARMATO and Assemblywoman Downey, Agriculture -- Allows commercial farms to hold 14 special occasion events per year.

Assembly No. 299, by Assemblymen MAZZEO and ARMATO, Oversight, Reform and Federal Relations -- Allows alcoholic beverages to be consumed outdoors in Atlantic City Tourism District.

Assembly No. 300, by Assemblymen MAZZEO and HOUGHTALING, Science, Innovation and Technology -- Provides

corporation business tax credits and gross income tax credits to small business employers and farm employers for increases in certain mandatory employer contributions.

Assembly No. 301, by Assemblymen MAZZEO and ARMATO, Law and Public Safety – Upgrades assault on attorneys to aggravated assault.

Assembly No. 302, by Assemblymen MAZZEO, ARMATO, MUKHERJI, Houghtaling, Assemblywoman Downey, Assemblymen Freiman, Zwicker, Assemblywoman Murphy and Assemblyman Conaway, Military and Veterans' Affairs – Makes General Fund supplemental appropriation of \$750,000 to DMVA for ancillary transportation for residents of Veterans' Memorial Homes.

Assembly No. 303, by Assemblymen MAZZEO and ARMATO, Science, Innovation and Technology – Makes FY 2020 supplemental appropriation of \$450,000 for National Aviation Research and Technology Park.

Assembly No. 304, by Assemblymen DANIELSEN, HOLLEY, Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Assemblymen Wimberly, Coughlin, Space, Wirths and Assemblywoman Lopez, Law and Public Safety – Establishes offense of criminal mischief committed on historical sites.

Assembly No. 305, by Assemblyman DANIELSEN, Law and Public Safety – Enhances penalties for false incrimination and making fictitious reports.

Assembly No. 306, by Assemblymen DANIELSEN, MAZZEO, Assemblywoman PINTOR MARIN, Assemblymen Webber, Rooney, DePhillips, Assemblywomen Murphy and DiMaso, Judiciary – Immunizes from civil liability first responders who forcibly enter property to provide emergency assistance.

Assembly No. 307, by Assemblymen DANIELSEN and JOHNSON, State and Local Government – Designated Kevin Apuzzio's Law; allows municipalities to provide increased survivor pensions for certain volunteer emergency workers and requires municipalities to provide health and life insurance coverage to volunteer firefighters.

Assembly No. 308, by Assemblyman DANIELSEN, Assemblywoman JASEY and Assemblyman BENSON, Higher Education – Establishes the New Jersey School Counts County College Scholarship Program.

Assembly No. 309, by Assemblyman DANIELSEN, Assemblywoman JASEY and Assemblyman BENSON, Higher Education – Requires development of longitudinal data system that

maintains individuals' data from preschool through entry into workforce.

Assembly No. 310, by Assemblyman DANIELSEN, Assemblywoman JASEY and Assemblyman BENSON, Higher Education -- Directs Secretary of Higher Education to establish performance-based funding plans for public institutions of higher education.

Assembly No. 311, by Assemblyman DANIELSEN, Homeland Security and State Preparedness -- Exempts experienced firefighters from certain requirements.

Assembly No. 312, by Assemblymen DANIELSEN, MUKHERJI, Assemblywoman MURPHY, Assemblyman Verrelli, Assemblywomen McKnight, Mosquera and Downey, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Prohibits public utility from terminating service for nonpayment unless customer is provided certified letter at least 10 business days prior to scheduled termination date.

Assembly No. 313, by Assemblyman DANIELSEN, Education -- Provides adjustment to school district tax levy cap for expenditures associated with opening of new school facility during budget year.

Assembly No. 314, by Assemblymen DANIELSEN and HOLLEY, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- Requires financial institutions to cash payroll checks under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 315, by Assemblyman DANIELSEN, State and Local Government -- Designates "New Jersey State Song" as State song.

Assembly No. 316, by Assemblyman DANIELSEN, Health -- Prohibits smoking within 20 feet of areas outside of indoor public places or workplaces.

Assembly No. 317, by Assemblyman DANIELSEN, Assemblywomen VAINIERI HUTTLE, MURPHY and Assemblyman McGuckin, Agriculture -- Requires annual inspection of certain veterinary facilities.

Assembly No. 318, by Assemblyman DANIELSEN and Assemblywoman LAMPITT, Education -- Authorizes establishment of charter school payment reserve account in school districts.

Assembly No. 319, by Assemblyman DANIELSEN, Agriculture -- Requires certain veterinary facilities to obtain signed consent form for unsupervised overnight stays of domestic companion animals.

Assembly No. 320, by Assemblymen DANIELSEN, MCKEON and Assemblywoman DECROCE, Science, Innovation and Technology -- Requires State to review and approve digital payment platform.

Assembly No. 321, by Assemblyman DANIELSEN, Education -- Establishes certain procedural requirements to enroll or withdraw child from school district.

Assembly No. 322, by Assemblyman DANIELSEN, Assemblywomen LOPEZ and JIMENEZ, Labor -- Provides certain protections for temporary laborers.

Assembly No. 323, by Assemblyman DANIELSEN, Judiciary -- Permits member of Judicial Retirement System to defer retirement to serve as county prosecutor.

Assembly No. 324, by Assemblyman DANIELSEN, Education -- Modifies various aspects of charter school program including approval, student admissions and enrollment procedures, and board of trustee membership.

Assembly No. 325, by Assemblyman DANIELSEN, Higher Education -- Establishes position of Ombudsman of Student Discipline to serve within Office of the Secretary of Higher Education.

Assembly No. 326, by Assemblymen PETERS, Space, Wirths, Thomson and Karabinchak, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Provides free admission to State parks, forests, and beaches for certain veterans and military personnel.

Assembly No. 327, by Assemblyman PETERS, Judiciary -- Makes it crime of the fourth degree to apply for employment or volunteer position with public entity or public official if person has purpose to deceive or injure.

Assembly No. 328, by Assemblyman PETERS, State and Local Government -- Provides televisions in State buildings will display closed captioning for programming.

Assembly No. 329, by Assemblyman PETERS, Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Assemblymen Johnson and DePhillips, Women and Children -- Permits use of public schools and school district property for certain child care services for children younger than school age.

Assembly No. 330, by Assemblymen PETERS, Wirths and Space, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Prohibits MVC from charging fee for restoring driver's license suspended due to mental or physical condition.

Assembly No. 331, by Assemblyman PETERS, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Removes principal place of business requirement of "Set-Aside Act for Disabled Veterans' Businesses."

Assembly No. 332, by Assemblyman PETERS, State and Local Government -- Declares elective public office vacant when office holder changes political party while in office.

Assembly No. 333, by Assemblyman PETERS, Education -- Provides that in certain cases vacancy in membership of board of education of limited purpose regional school district will be filled by majority vote of board of education of constituent district represented by former board member.

Assembly No. 334, by Assemblyman PETERS, Agriculture -- Authorizes hunters to ride in bed of pickup trucks under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 335, by Assemblymen PETERS and Auth, Commerce and Economic Development -- Establishes position of Economic Development Auditor in EDA.

Assembly No. 336, by Assemblymen PETERS and Auth, Commerce and Economic Development -- Establishes Office of Economic Development Inspector General in EDA.

Assembly No. 337, by Assemblymen PETERS and Auth, State and Local Government -- Redefines governmental affairs agent to include those persons performing activities for more than one hour in calendar year.

Assembly No. 338, by Assemblymen PETERS and Auth, State and Local Government -- Establishes "Local Governmental Process Activities Disclosure Act;" expands lobbying disclosure requirements to local level.

Assembly No. 339, by Assemblyman KEAN, Assemblywomen Munoz and Schepisi, Labor -- Concerns eligibility for unemployment benefits for certain seasonal workers.

Assembly No. 340, by Assemblyman KEAN, Health -- Requires health care representative to make health care decisions for incapacitated patient in accordance with patient's religious beliefs.

Assembly No. 341, by Assemblyman KEAN, Agriculture -- Requires DEP to establish artificial reef plan for commercial and recreational fishing.

Assembly No. 342, by Assemblyman KEAN, Labor -- Concerns eligibility for unemployment compensation benefits for certain seasonal employees.

Assembly No. 343, by Assemblyman KEAN, Agriculture -- Establishes restrictions and requirements for use of fishing gear and conch, fishing, and lobster pots on artificial reefs.

Assembly No. 344, by Assemblyman KEAN, State and Local Government -- Exempts sales of county property from certain requirements under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 356, by Assemblymen KEAN, BRAMNICK, Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Assemblymen Webber and Thomson, Education -- "Opportunity Scholarship Act"; establishes pilot program in Department of Treasury providing tax credits to taxpayers contributing to scholarships for low-income children.

Assembly No. 357, by Assemblymen KEAN and THOMSON, Tourism, Gaming and the Arts -- Permits municipality to use proceeds of beach access fees for areas near beach facilities that are significantly affected by beach tourism; requires municipality to provide explanation of expenditures on website.

Assembly No. 454, by Assemblymen CATALANO, MCGUCKIN and Assemblywoman Munoz, Education -- Requires school districts to provide instruction on the dangers of texting while driving as part of the Core Curriculum Content Standards in Comprehensive Health and Physical Education.

Assembly No. 477, by Assemblymen WEBBER, ZWICKER, DANIELSEN, Assemblywoman DOWNEY, Assemblymen Wirths and Space, State and Local Government -- Requires Commissioner of Community Affairs to compile and annually update list of all unfunded State and federal mandates on municipalities and counties.

Assembly No. 478, by Assemblymen WEBBER, MORIARTY, Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Assemblyman Peterson, Assemblywoman Munoz, Assemblymen Space, Coughlin, Mazzeo, Daniels, Houghtaling, Assemblywoman Downey, Assemblymen McKeon, Chiaravallotti and Wirths, Budget -- "Transparency in Government Act"; provides for establishment of State public finance website.

Assembly No. 479, by Assemblymen WEBBER, SPACE and Wirths, Budget -- Requires interpretive statements of State general obligation bond act public questions to include certain fiscal information.

Assembly No. 480, by Assemblymen WEBBER and SCHAER, State and Local Government -- Prohibits legislative aide who works, or worked, directly for legislator in district office from making political contribution greater than \$30 per election to that legislator; prohibits receipt of such contribution.

Assembly No. 481, by Assemblyman WEBBER, Assemblywomen DECROCE, MUNOZ, Assemblymen DiMaio, Dancer, Space and Wirths, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- "The New Jersey Healthcare Choice Act"; permits health insurers licensed in other states to provide coverage in New Jersey under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 482, by Assemblymen WEBBER, Space and Wirths, Labor -- Excludes overtime pay of certain employees from gross income tax.

Assembly No. 483, by Assemblymen WEBBER, DIMAIO, Peterson, Space and Wirths, Women and Children -- "Prenatally and Postnatally Diagnosed Conditions Awareness Act in New Jersey."

Assembly No. 484, by Assemblymen WEBBER and HOLLEY, Agriculture -- Establishes procedure for notification to, and review by, municipalities of certain grant and loan applications for acquisition or development of lands for recreation and conservation purposes.

Assembly No. 485, by Assemblyman WEBBER, Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Assemblymen MAZZEO, DiMaio, Space and Wirths, Commerce and Economic Development -- "Home-Based Jobs Creation Act"; classifies certain home businesses as accessory uses needing no use variances in residential zone; authorizes municipalities to limit or exclude certain warehousing, manufacturing, or retailing activities.

Assembly No. 486, by Assemblymen WEBBER, SPACE and Assemblywoman Munoz, State and Local Government -- Prohibits dual elective office holding and holding of elective office and public office or position.

Assembly No. 487, by Assemblyman WEBBER, Assemblywoman DeCroce, Assemblyman McGuckin, Assemblywoman Schepisi and Assemblyman Clifton, Labor -- Prohibits terminal leave compensation for local government employees.

Assembly No. 488, by Assemblymen WEBBER, MUKHERJI, DiMaio and Assemblywoman Chaparro, Health -- Excludes certain Medicaid income from gross income tax.

Assembly No. 489, by Assemblymen WEBBER, BURZICHELLI, WIRTHS and Space, Environment and Solid Waste -- Revises timeframes for issuance of certain construction permits by DEP in 90 days.

Assembly No. 490, by Assemblymen WEBBER, HOLLEY and Assemblywoman CHAPARRO, Housing -- Permits landlords to take actions after death of tenant in certain situations.

Assembly No. 491, by Assemblymen WEBBER, DEANGELO and Thomson, Judiciary -- Creates the crime of victimization of a senior citizen or a person with a disability.

Assembly No. 492, by Assemblymen WEBBER, HOUGHTALING, Coughlin and Assemblywoman Pinkin, Commerce and Economic Development -- Prohibits awarding of economic development subsidy to business if payment of principal and interest on previously awarded loan or loan guarantee is greater than 24 months overdue.

Assembly No. 493, by Assemblymen WEBBER, DIMAIO, Assemblywoman SUMTER, Assemblymen Johnson, Kean, DeAngelo and Chiaravalloti, Women and Children -- Creates special license plates supporting Autism Awareness.

Assembly No. 494, by Assemblymen WEBBER, Space and Wirths, Education -- Requires explanatory statement on ballot question for school district capital projects to include certain information.

Assembly No. 495, by Assemblymen WEBBER, HOLLEY, SPACE and Wirths, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Creates exemption from certain MVC fees for prisoners of war.

Assembly No. 496, by Assemblyman WEBBER, Assemblywomen Munoz, Vainieri Huttle, Assemblymen Peterson, Wirths, Space and Giblin, Budget -- Allows gross income tax deduction for charitable contributions to certain New Jersey-based charitable organizations.

Assembly No. 497, by Assemblymen WEBBER and Peterson, Education -- Requires students to pass test identical to United States Citizenship and Immigration Services civics test as part of high school graduation requirements.

Assembly No. 498, by Assemblymen WEBBER, DEANGELO and Assemblywoman DECROCE, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Requires MVC to accept emergency medical technician and paramedic certification cards as two points of documentation for purposes of MVC identification verification program.

Assembly No. 499, by Assemblyman WEBBER, Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Assemblymen Peterson, Chiaravalloti and Assemblywoman Munoz, Consumer Affairs -- Requires telemarketers making sales calls to display their name and telephone number on any caller identification service.

Assembly No. 501, by Assemblyman WEBBER and Assemblywoman DeCroce, State and Local Government -- Requires municipalities comprised within regional school districts to share certain payments received in lieu of taxes with counties and regional school districts.

Assembly No. 502, by Assemblyman WEBBER, Women and Children -- Authorizes disclosure by DCF of child abuse and neglect information to religious institutions.

Assembly No. 504, by Assemblyman WEBBER, Appropriations -- Consolidates all categories of gross income for cross-claiming of net losses and allows 20 year loss carryforward under the New Jersey gross income tax; repeals alternate business income calculation.

Assembly No. 505, by Assemblyman WEBBER, Law and Public Safety -- Increases penalties for certain criminal offenses committed against elderly and persons with a disability.

Assembly No. 506, by Assemblyman WEBBER, Judiciary -- "Medical Philanthropy Act"; provides physicians who provide uncompensated care with \$250,000 cap on noneconomic damages in actions alleging medical malpractice.

Assembly No. 507, by Assemblyman WEBBER, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Requires MVC to refund certain motor vehicle registration fees.

Assembly No. 508, by Assemblyman WEBBER, Assemblywoman DECROCE, Assemblymen Space and Wirths, Labor -- Concerns workers' compensation insurance requirements for certain corporations and partnerships.

Assembly No. 511, by Assemblyman WEBBER and Assemblywoman DECROCE, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Designates Morris Plains rail station as "Frank J. Druetler Station - Morris Plains, New Jersey."

Assembly No. 512, by Assemblymen WEBBER, HOUGHTALING, MAZZEO, DANIELSEN, Johnson, Peterson, Assemblywoman Mosquera, Assemblymen Conaway, DeAngelo, Assemblywomen Tucker, Downey, Assemblyman Space and Assemblywoman Murphy, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Authorizes veterans property tax exemption for totally disabled veterans who did not serve in theater of war.

Assembly No. 513, by Assemblywoman JIMENEZ, State and Local Government -- Provides that civil service make-up examinations not include the same questions as the original examination.

Assembly No. 514, by Assemblywoman JIMENEZ and Assemblyman JOHNSON, Women and Children -- Expands number of disorders included in newborn screening program.

Assembly No. 515, by Assemblywomen JIMENEZ and Vainieri Huttle, Homeland Security and State Preparedness -- Establishes guidelines for dissemination of vital records.

Assembly No. 516, by Assemblywoman JIMENEZ, Regulated Professions -- Provides for reciprocity of certain out-of-State EMT certification.

Assembly No. 517, by Assemblywoman JIMENEZ, Assemblyman WIMBERLY, Assemblywoman REYNOLDS-JACKSON, Assemblyman Giblin, Assemblywomen Downey, Timberlake, McKnight, Tucker and DeCroce, Women and Children -- Requires employers and birthing facilities to notify insured pregnant women if their health insurance coverage is not subject to 48-hour maternity law.

Assembly No. 518, by Assemblywomen JIMENEZ, LAMPITT, Assemblyman CHIARAVALLOTI, Assemblywomen Vainieri Huttle and Mosquera, Homeland Security and State Preparedness -- Requires criminal history record background checks for public employees handling vital records.

Assembly No. 519, by Assemblywoman JIMENEZ, Assemblyman WIMBERLY, Assemblywoman REYNOLDS-JACKSON, Assemblyman Holley, Assemblywomen McKnight and Tucker, State and Local Government -- Provides voter registration assistance to persons completing parole, probation, and criminal sentences.

Assembly No. 520, by Assemblywoman JIMENEZ, Assemblymen WIMBERLY, GIBLIN and Assemblywoman Tucker, Commerce and Economic Development -- Amends Health Enterprise Zone law to allow municipalities more discretion in granting property tax exemptions to medical offices.

Assembly No. 521, by Assemblywoman JIMENEZ and Assemblyman CHIARAVALLOTI, Commerce and Economic Development -- Expands eligible municipalities under the "Urban Transit Hub Tax Credit Act" to include Harrison Town in Hudson County.

Assembly No. 523, by Assemblywoman JIMENEZ, Health -- Requires clinical laboratory that provides services for accountable care organization to establish clinical laboratory testing advisory board.

Assembly No. 524, by Assemblywomen JIMENEZ, QUIJANO, Assemblymen SCHAER and Holley, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Waives certain commercial driver license fees for veterans and spouses of veterans.

Assembly No. 525, by Assemblywomen JIMENEZ, MURPHY and Quijano, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Waives certain professional and occupational licensing fees for veterans and spouses of veterans.

Assembly No. 526, by Assemblywoman JIMENEZ, Assemblyman CONAWAY and Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Health -- Establishes "Fund to Prevent Use of Tobacco and Electronic Smoking Devices"; supports activities to prevent use and promote awareness of associated health conditions.

Assembly No. 527, by Assemblywomen JIMENEZ, QUIJANO, Assemblyman BENSON and Assemblywoman Vainieri Huttle, Agriculture -- Establishes Animal Cruelty Offender Registry; prohibits purchase, adoption, and breeding of animals by animal cruelty offenders.

Assembly No. 528, by Assemblywomen JIMENEZ, QUIJANO and CHAPARRO, Judiciary -- Prohibits release of home addresses of certain public safety employees by governmental entities.

Assembly No. 529, by Assemblywomen JIMENEZ and MCKNIGHT, Women and Children -- Provides employee time off for events regarding education of their children.

Assembly No. 530, by Assemblywoman JIMENEZ, Assemblyman MUKHERJI, Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Assemblymen GIBLIN, MORIARTY, Benson, Assemblywomen Mosquera, Tucker, Jasey, Murphy, Downey, Swain, Assemblyman Tully, Assemblywoman Reynolds-Jackson, Assemblymen Burzichelli, Mazzeo, Armato, Assemblywoman McKnight, Assemblymen Mejia, Daniels, Egan, Houghtaling, DeAngelo, Wimberly, Assemblywomen Speight, Sumter, Lopez, Timberlake, Assemblymen Zwicker, Calabrese, Assemblywoman Chaparro and Assemblyman Freiman, Human Services -- Establishes minimum certified nurse aide-to-resident ratios in nursing homes.

Assembly No. 531, by Assemblywoman JIMENEZ, Women and Children -- Prohibits transport of certain child passengers in front seat of motor vehicle.

Assembly No. 532, by Assemblywoman JIMENEZ, Law and Public Safety -- Increases statute of limitations for prosecution of vehicular homicide.

Assembly No. 533, by Assemblywomen JIMENEZ, SCHEPISI and CHAPARRO, State and Local Government -- Requires property record cards and tax maps prepared in conjunction with revaluations to be produced in electronic format.

Assembly No. 534, by Assemblywoman JIMENEZ, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Requires DOT and Division of Highway Traffic Safety to conduct study on vehicle size and weight enforcement.

Assembly No. 535, by Assemblywomen JIMENEZ, SCHEPISI and CHAPARRO, Regulated Professions -- Removes examination requirement for relicensure as real estate broker, broker-salesperson or salesperson by licensed real estate referral agents under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 536, by Assemblywoman JIMENEZ, Assemblyman MUKHERJI, Assemblywomen CHAPARRO and DECROCE, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Dedicates unencumbered revenue collected from vehicle size and weight enforcement to Transportation Trust Fund.

Assembly No. 538, by Assemblywomen JIMENEZ and VAINIERI HUTTLE, Judiciary -- Permits counties to provide videoconferencing in involuntary commitment hearings.

Assembly No. 539, by Assemblywoman JIMENEZ, Assemblymen GIBLIN, Johnson, DePhillips, Wimberly, McKeon, Greenwald, Assemblywoman Timberlake, Assemblymen Mejia, Calabrese and Assemblywoman McKnight, Regulated Professions -- Permits certain physical therapists to perform dry needling.

Assembly No. 540, by Assemblywomen JIMENEZ, SPEIGHT, Assemblymen MUKHERJI, Benson and Johnson, Health -- Expands Medicare health care coverage to all New Jersey residents.

Assembly No. 541, by Assemblywoman JIMENEZ and Assemblyman MEJIA, State and Local Government -- Allows local contracting unit to accept bid up to five percent more than lowest responsible bid under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 542, by Assemblywoman JIMENEZ, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- Requires health benefits coverage for orthotic and prosthetic appliances from licensed podiatrists.

Assembly No. 543, by Assemblywoman JIMENEZ, Assemblyman GIBLIN and Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Regulated Professions -- Revises psychologist training requirements.

Assembly No. 544, by Assemblywoman JIMENEZ, Tourism, Gaming and the Arts -- Authorizes municipalities to request certain information from transient space marketplaces.

Assembly No. 545, by Assemblywomen JIMENEZ and CHAPARRO, Housing -- Criminalizes owner or landlord knowingly renting dwelling to tenant that is illegal occupancy which causes serious bodily injury to or death of another person.

Assembly No. 546, by Assemblyman AUTH, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- "Consumer Freedom From Unwanted Expense in Health Insurance Coverage Act."

Assembly No. 547, by Assemblyman AUTH, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- "Health Care Consumer's Out-of-Network Protection, Transparency, Cost Containment and Accountability Act."

Assembly No. 548, by Assemblyman AUTH, Law and Public Safety -- Permits certain firefighter training courses to be taken online.

Assembly No. 549, by Assemblyman AUTH, Environment and Solid Waste -- Requires DEP to reimburse local units for costs incurred in responding to emergencies in State parks and forests.

Assembly No. 550, by Assemblymen AUTH and DiMaio, Judiciary -- Establishes civil immunity for damages arising out of birth injury or congenital defect for physicians providing prenatal care under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 551, by Assemblymen AUTH and DIMAIO, Regulated Professions -- Permits licensed electrical contractors to perform certain gas piping work.

Assembly No. 552, by Assemblyman AUTH, Judiciary -- Provides parties offering public remarks before Senate committee concerning

qualifications of Superior Court judge nominees, upon motion, change of venue on family actions, to vicinage other than vicinage where nominee is assigned if confirmed.

Assembly No. 553, by Assemblymen AUTH, Space and Wirths, State and Local Government -- Provides for agreement between Secretary of State and AOC to match information in Statewide voter registration system with certain jury records in order to identify and remove ineligible non-citizen voter registrants from system.

Assembly No. 554, by Assemblyman AUTH, Higher Education -- Requires institutions of higher education to provide greater assistance to certain students with military obligations.

Assembly No. 555, by Assemblymen AUTH, Space and Wirths, Judiciary -- Gives priority to applicants for firearms purchaser identification card and permits to purchase handguns when domestic violence restraining order is in effect.

Assembly No. 556, by Assemblyman AUTH, State and Local Government -- Permits municipalities to issue two separate property tax bills to property taxpayers; requires fire districts, school districts, and county governments to share in burden of property assessment appeal refunds.

Assembly No. 557, by Assemblyman AUTH, Law and Public Safety -- Establishes housing expense reimbursements for families of certain public safety officers killed in line of duty.

Assembly No. 558, by Assemblyman AUTH, Consumer Affairs -- Requires Internet service providers to keep confidential subscriber's personally identifiable information unless subscriber authorizes Internet service provider in writing to disclose information.

Assembly No. 559, by Assemblyman AUTH and Assemblywoman DECROCE, Higher Education -- Provides for inclusion of students who receive equivalent instruction elsewhere than at school in NJ STARS Program.

Assembly No. 560, by Assemblymen AUTH and Peterson, Education -- "Empower the Principal Act"; eliminates local school superintendents and prohibits schools from having more than one assistant or vice-principal.

Assembly No. 561, by Assemblyman AUTH, Education -- Includes adjustment aid in calculation of districts' payments to charter schools under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 562, by Assemblyman AUTH, Regulated Professions -- "Pharmaceutical Representative Licensing Act."

Assembly No. 563, by Assemblyman AUTH, Judiciary -- Authorizes manufacture and sale of firearm silencers and sawed-off shotguns to law enforcement and members of Armed Forces and National Guard.

Assembly No. 564, by Assemblyman AUTH, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Requires NJTA and SJTA to display amount of tolls paid in lanes used for electronic toll collection system, commonly known as E-ZPass.

Assembly No. 565, by Assemblyman AUTH, State and Local Government -- Establishes New Jersey Property Tax Relief and Education Empowerment Program to provide both property tax relief to citizens and educational grants to certain students enrolled in nonpublic schools.

Assembly No. 566, by Assemblymen AUTH, KEAN, Assemblywomen SCHEPISI, DiMaso, Assemblymen DePhillips, McGuckin, Clifton, Wirths, Space, Dancer, Thomson, Johnson, Assemblywomen Vainieri Huttel, Lampitt, Assemblymen Mukherji, Egan, Mejia, Assemblywoman Munoz, Assemblyman Rumpf, Assemblywoman Gove, Assemblyman Peterson and Assemblywoman Chaparro, State and Local Government -- Requires State parks, forests, State-owned beaches, and MVC offices to remain open to public if emergency is declared due to failure to enact general appropriation law as prescribed by NJ Constitution.

Assembly No. 567, by Assemblymen AUTH, DANIELSEN, MCKEON, Kean, Holley, Thomson, Space, Mejia and DiMaio, Tourism, Gaming and the Arts -- Provides that amounts remaining in inactive Internet gaming accounts will be abandoned property after three years under unclaimed property law.

Assembly No. 568, by Assemblyman AUTH, Assemblywomen JIMENEZ, SCHEPISI, DiMaso, Assemblymen Clifton, Rooney, DiMaio, Thomson, Dancer, Peters, Peterson, Space, DePhillips, Assemblywomen Chaparro, McKnight and Assemblyman Chiaravalloti, Judiciary -- Creates offense of making false child abuse report; permits assessment of penalty.

Assembly No. 569, by Assemblyman AUTH, Education -- Modifies conditions for regional school district use of property assessments as basis for apportionment of costs to participating municipalities.

Assembly No. 570, by Assemblyman AUTH, State and Local Government -- Concerns county government dissolution.

Assembly No. 571, by Assemblymen AUTH and ROONEY, Judiciary -- Requires defendants charged with certain crimes to be placed in home confinement prior to trial.

Assembly No. 572, by Assemblyman AUTH, State and Local Government -- Revises procedure for determining real property tax appeal outcomes.

Assembly No. 573, by Assemblymen AUTH, WEBBER, Thomson, Wirths, DePhillips, Space and DiMaio, State and Local Government -- Prohibits candidates from nomination for more than one elective office at primary or general election.

Assembly No. 574, by Assemblyman AUTH, Assemblywoman DIMASO, Assemblymen WEBBER, DiMaio and Assemblywoman Schepisi, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Requires that fuel stations specify taxes levied on motor fuel sales.

Assembly No. 575, by Assemblymen AUTH, THOMSON, DiMaio, DePhillips, Assemblywoman Schepisi, Assemblyman Peters, Assemblywoman DeCroce and Assemblyman Mejia, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Requires certain toll road operators and bi-state agency to allow drivers to choose towing company.

Assembly No. 576, by Assemblyman AUTH, Assemblywoman DECROCE, Assemblymen DiMaio, Peterson, Dancer, Thomson, Assemblywoman DiMaso, Assemblymen McGuckin and Clifton, Judiciary -- Makes it a crime of the first degree to coerce a patient to request medication pursuant to the "Medical Aid in Dying for the Terminally Ill Act" or to forge a patient's request for such medication.

Assembly No. 577, by Assemblymen AUTH, Space, Dancer and DiMaio, Judiciary -- Repeals "Medical Aid in Dying for the Terminally Ill Act."

Assembly No. 578, by Assemblyman AUTH, Assemblywoman DiMaso, Assemblymen Peters and Kean, Science, Innovation and Technology -- "Stop Social Media Censorship Act"; creates private right

of action for users of social media websites whose political or religious speech has been deleted or censored by social media websites.

Assembly No. 579, by Assemblymen DIMAIO, WIRTHS, Space and Dancer, Women and Children -- Requires physicians to provide patients opportunity to undergo obstetrical ultrasound or sonogram within 48 hours of performing abortion.

Assembly No. 580, by Assemblymen DIMAIO, WIRTHS and Space, State and Local Government -- Requires public referendum prior to issuance of general obligation bonds by local units.

Assembly No. 581, by Assemblymen DIMAIO, SPACE and WIRTHS, Human Services -- Requires proof of lawful presence in the United States to obtain certain benefits.

Assembly No. 582, by Assemblymen DIMAIO, SPACE and WIRTHS, Environment and Solid Waste -- Prohibits DEP from imposing conditions on projects exempt from "Highlands Water Protection and Planning Act."

Assembly No. 583, by Assemblymen DIMAIO and Space, State and Local Government -- Requires State compensation of property owners for certain property devalued due to certain environmental laws; and requires State agencies to evaluate proposed administrative rules for potential to constitute taking of real property.

Assembly No. 584, by Assemblyman DIMAIO, Labor -- Requires boards of education to provide more detailed information on compensation of school district employees not covered by collective bargaining agreements.

Assembly No. 585, by Assemblymen DIMAIO, Peterson, Giblin, Space and Wirths, Agriculture -- Permits sale of raw milk under certain conditions and establishes raw milk permit program.

Assembly No. 685, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE and Assemblyman CONAWAY, Health -- Provides that Maintenance of

Certification is not required for licensed physicians to perform certain professional activities in State.

Assembly No. 686, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Assemblymen DANCER and BENSON, Human Services -- Provides for establishment of internal Statewide discharge planning list to facilitate prompt and efficient discharge and transfer of patients with mental health or substance use disorders from hospitals to community-based residential facilities.

Assembly No. 687, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Health -- Authorizes pharmacists to dispense HIV prophylaxis without individual prescription under certain circumstances; mandates prescription benefits coverage.

Assembly No. 688, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Health -- Requires psychiatric hospitals to provide certain notices and reports of major, moderate, and minor injuries occurring therein, and requires DOH to investigate causes of major and moderate injury.

Assembly No. 689, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Health -- Establishes Office of the Independent Monitor of State Psychiatric Hospitals.

Assembly No. 690, by Assemblywoman SUMTER and Assemblyman BENSON, State and Local Government -- Excludes from income for gross income tax and PAAD eligibility purposes victims' remuneration for involuntary internment received under judgments or settlement agreements.

Assembly No. 691, by Assemblywoman SUMTER and Assemblyman Schaer, Commerce and Economic Development -- Authorizes creation of urban enterprise zones in Garfield, Harrison, Keansburg, and two joint urban enterprise zones, one in Cliffside Park and Fairview, and one in Buena Vista Township and Buena Borough.

Assembly No. 692, by Assemblywoman SUMTER, Assemblyman WIMBERLY, Assemblywomen Jimenez and Tucker, Human Services -- Allows direct deposit of adoption subsidy payments.

Assembly No. 693, by Assemblywoman SUMTER, Assemblyman WIMBERLY, Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE and Assemblyman WEBBER, Human Services -- Expands role of temporary guardian to include arranging placement of alleged incapacitated person in appropriate, less restrictive environment.

Assembly No. 694, by Assemblywoman SUMTER, Assemblyman HOLLEY, Assemblywomen MOSQUERA and MCKNIGHT, Women and Children -- Creates the Office on Women's Research and Policy and appropriates \$150,000.

Assembly No. 695, by Assemblywoman SUMTER, Assemblyman WIMBERLY, Assemblywoman MCKNIGHT, Assemblymen Holley, Coughlin and Schaer, Human Services -- Requires DHS to give priority to temporary rental assistance over use of hotels or motels in emergency assistance to Work First New Jersey recipients.

Assembly No. 696, by Assemblywomen SUMTER, DECROCE, PINKIN, Assemblymen SPACE, MORIARTY, Assemblywoman Jimenez and Assemblyman Kean, Regulated Professions -- Requires professional boards to provide for online processing of application for licensure or renewal.

Assembly No. 697, by Assemblywomen SUMTER and VAINIERI HUTTLE, Law and Public Safety -- Prohibits disclosure of personal information pertaining to certain health care workers who are victims of assault; makes violation disorderly persons offense.

Assembly No. 698, by Assemblywoman SUMTER, Assemblyman MUKHERJI, Assemblywomen QUIJANO, Pinkin, Assemblymen Caputo, Holley, Assemblywomen Reynolds-Jackson, McKnight and Assemblyman Zwicker, State and Local Government -- Requires incarcerated individual from State to be counted at residential address for legislative redistricting purposes.

Assembly No. 699, by Assemblywomen SUMTER, PINTOR MARIN, Assemblymen WIMBERLY, MUKHERJI, McKeon, Caputo, Assemblywomen Downey, Chaparro and Tucker, Law and Public Safety -- Establishes program allowing certain applicants to perform community service in lieu of paying motor vehicle surcharges.

Assembly No. 700, by Assemblywoman SUMTER, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- Requires biannual audit of managed care plan provider networks.

Assembly No. 701, by Assemblywoman SUMTER, Assemblyman BENSON, Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Assemblymen HOUGHTALING, WIMBERLY, Assemblywoman Jimenez, Assemblymen Zwicker, Egan, Johnson, Assemblywomen Pinkin, McKnight, Downey, Timberlake and Lopez, Labor -- "New Jersey Call Center Jobs Act."

Assembly No. 702, by Assemblywoman SUMTER, Assemblyman MAZZEO, Assemblywomen MURPHY and Reynolds-Jackson, State and Local Government -- Provides State information technology contracts will require use of software to document computer use by contractor.

Assembly No. 703, by Assemblywoman SUMTER, Assemblyman MUKHERJI, Assemblywoman MURPHY, Assemblymen Johnson and Benson, Judiciary -- Permits union officials who represent probation officers to participate in all union activities.

Assembly No. 704, by Assemblywoman SUMTER, State and Local Government -- Requires periodic reevaluation of real property.

Assembly No. 705, by Assemblywomen SUMTER, MURPHY, DOWNEY, McKnight and Assemblyman Houghtaling, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Requires NJTA to implement certain roadside maintenance safety policies.

Assembly No. 706, by Assemblywomen SUMTER, SWAIN, VAINIERI HUTTLE, TIMBERLAKE, Jimenez, Chaparro, Murphy, Lampitt, Reynolds-Jackson, Speight, Tucker, Mosquera, McKnight, Downey, Lopez and Jasey, Health -- Establishes maternity care standards for general hospitals providing maternity care.

Assembly No. 707, by Assemblywomen SUMTER, REYNOLDS-JACKSON, Assemblyman JOHNSON, Assemblywomen Speight, Vainieri Huttle, Murphy, McKnight, Assemblyman Conaway and Assemblywoman Jasey, Women and Children -- Requires New Jersey Office on Minority and Multicultural Health to study racial disparities on sexual and reproductive health of African-American women.

Assembly No. 708, by Assemblywoman SUMTER, Education -- Requires school district or nonpublic school to provide appropriate counseling services to student-athlete who makes complaint against coach or sports official.

Assembly No. 709, by Assemblywoman SUMTER, Assemblymen KENNEDY, MUKHERJI and Assemblywoman Vainieri Huttle, Human Services -- Establishes Division of Advocacy for Developmentally Disabled within Office of Public Defender; designates public defender for developmentally disabled clients in criminal cases.

Assembly No. 710, by Assemblywomen SUMTER, CARTER, TIMBERLAKE, Assemblyman Giblin, Assemblywoman Reynolds-Jackson, Assemblyman Holley, Assemblywoman Vainieri Huttle,

Assemblyman Karabinchak and Assemblywoman Chaparro, Law and Public Safety -- The "New Jersey Youth Justice Transformation Act;" annually appropriates \$100 million to Juvenile Justice Commission.

Assembly No. 711, by Assemblywomen SUMTER, TIMBERLAKE, REYNOLDS-JACKSON, Jasey and Assemblyman Wimberly, State and Local Government -- Establishes "New Jersey Reparations Task Force."

Assembly No. 712, by Assemblymen JOHNSON, BENSON, COUGHLIN, Assemblywoman Gove, Assemblymen Rumpf, Space, Wimberly, Wirths and Assemblywoman Murphy, Judiciary -- Transfers probation employees from Judiciary to State Parole Board.

Assembly No. 713, by Assemblymen JOHNSON and WEBBER, Judiciary -- Prohibits lawyers and law firms who lobby public entity from simultaneous employment or contract with that public entity.

Assembly No. 714, by Assemblymen JOHNSON, BRAMNICK, DANIELSEN, WIMBERLY, Assemblywomen JIMENEZ, DOWNEY, Lampitt, Assemblyman Houghtaling, Assemblywoman Mosquera, Assemblyman Verrelli and Assemblywoman Murphy, Law and Public Safety -- Requires notification of local law enforcement prior to expungement of certain mental health records of prospective firearms purchasers.

Assembly No. 715, by Assemblyman JOHNSON, State and Local Government -- Prohibits business receiving State development subsidies from making certain campaign contributions.

Assembly No. 716, by Assemblyman JOHNSON and Assemblywoman Pinkin, Higher Education -- Confers civil service status on police officers employed by Rutgers University.

Assembly No. 717, by Assemblymen JOHNSON, SCHAER, Assemblywomen VAINIERI, HUTTLE, SCHEPISI, DOWNEY, Assemblyman McGuckin, Assemblywomen Jimenez, Murphy, McKnight, Assemblymen Freiman, Wimberly and Tully, Judiciary -- Provides for jurisdiction for prosecution for certain crimes against minors committed outside New Jersey.

Assembly No. 718, by Assemblyman JOHNSON, Judiciary -- Establishes award of attorney's fees to prevailing party in municipal services dispute.

Assembly No. 719, by Assemblyman JOHNSON, State and Local Government -- Extends from one to two years after leaving employment period during which Executive Branch department heads cannot act as governmental affairs agent.

Assembly No. 720, by Assemblyman JOHNSON, Assemblywomen MOSQUERA and VAINIERI HUTTLE, Women and Children -- Establishes supervised community reintegration program for certain victims of domestic abuse.

Assembly No. 721, by Assemblyman JOHNSON and Assemblywoman Chaparro, Law and Public Safety -- Clarifies that civilian public safety directors of municipal, county, and State police departments do not have police powers.

Assembly No. 722, by Assemblyman JOHNSON, Law and Public Safety -- Imposes requirements on video visitation service contracts for inmates in certain correctional facilities; requires correctional facilities to allow contact visits.

Assembly No. 723, by Assemblymen JOHNSON, WIMBERLY, Assemblywomen MCKNIGHT, TUCKER, Pintor Marin and Assemblyman Chiaravalloti, Commerce and Economic Development -- Prohibits disqualification of certain minority-owned and women-owned businesses for certification.

Assembly No. 724, by Assemblyman JOHNSON, Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Assemblymen SCHAER, MCKEON, Assemblywoman Chaparro, Assemblyman Zwicker, Assemblywomen Pinkin, Tucker, Murphy and Assemblyman Rooney, Judiciary -- Includes crime of creating false public alarms as form of bias intimidation.

Assembly No. 725, by Assemblymen JOHNSON, SCHAER, Assemblywomen VAINIERI HUTTLE, Schepisi, Assemblyman Rooney and Assemblywoman Pintor Marin, Oversight, Reform and Federal Relations -- Allows municipality to issue permits to sell alcoholic beverages in residential redevelopment areas.

Assembly No. 726, by Assemblymen JOHNSON, KENNEDY, BENSON, DEANGELO, Assemblywomen VAINIERI HUTTLE and Chaparro, Environment and Solid Waste -- Provides sales and use tax exemption for sales of plug-in hybrid vehicles.

Assembly No. 727, by Assemblyman JOHNSON, Appropriations - Provides gross income tax exclusion for capital gains from sale of certain employer securities by qualified businesses that result in net positive benefit to State.

Assembly No. 728, by Assemblyman JOHNSON and Assemblywoman REYNOLDS-JACKSON, Law and Public Safety -- Requires correctional facilities to provide voting rights information packets to inmates.

Assembly No. 729, by Assemblyman JOHNSON, Assemblywomen DIMASO, VAINIERI HUTTLE, Assemblyman Mukherji, Assemblywomen Reynolds-Jackson and Speight, Judiciary -- Expands categories of individuals who may bring a claim under wrongful imprisonment statute.

Assembly No. 730, by Assemblyman JOHNSON, Law and Public Safety -- Requires halfway house employees to complete police training course.

Assembly No. 731, by Assemblyman JOHNSON, State and Local Government -- Increases contribution limit by counties and municipalities to volunteer first aid, ambulance, and rescue squads.

Assembly No. 732, by Assemblyman JOHNSON, Tourism, Gaming and the Arts -- Modifies powers and allocation of Historic New Bridge Landing Park Commission.

Assembly No. 733, by Assemblymen JOHNSON, MUKHERJI and HOLLEY, Commerce and Economic Development -- Provides sales and use tax exemption for sales of fuel cell devices and systems and certain tangible personal property powered by fuel cells.

Assembly No. 734, by Assemblyman JOHNSON, Judiciary -- Prohibits false or secret compartments in motor vehicles under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 735, by Assemblyman JOHNSON, Health -- Establishes "Opioid Prevention and Rehabilitation Program Fund" and tax on opioid drugs.

Assembly No. 736, by Assemblyman JOHNSON, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Establishes gas public utility bill credit for certain customers.

Assembly No. 737, by Assemblyman JOHNSON and Assemblywoman MURPHY, Higher Education -- Requires Higher Education Student Assistance Authority to consider combined income of all cosigners on application for participation in New Jersey College Loans to Assist State Students (NJCLASS) Loan Program.

Assembly No. 738, by Assemblymen JOHNSON, HOUGHTALING and CONAWAY, Environment and Solid Waste -- Provides corporation business tax credits and gross income tax credits for purchase of hydrogen fuel cell vehicles.

Assembly No. 739, by Assemblymen JOHNSON, FREIMAN and Assemblywoman DiMaso, Law and Public Safety -- Affords civil immunity to certain police officers.

Assembly No. 740, by Assemblyman JOHNSON, Science, Innovation and Technology -- Requires State agencies in awarding contracts for purchase of items that require power source to consider items powered by fuel cells.

Assembly No. 741, by Assemblymen JOHNSON, CONAWAY, ZWICKER, Assemblywoman Timberlake, Assemblymen Houghtaling and Karabinchak, Science, Innovation and Technology -- Establishes NJ Fuel Cell Task Force to increase use of fuel cells in State.

Assembly No. 742, by Assemblyman JOHNSON, Science, Innovation and Technology -- Provides sales and use tax exemption for sales of machinery and equipment and sales of natural gas used to generate electricity in certain fuel cell facilities.

Assembly No. 743, by Assemblyman JOHNSON, Judiciary -- Requires sentences of imprisonment for committing more than one criminal homicide upon place of public worship or religious organization be served consecutively.

Assembly No. 744, by Assemblyman JOHNSON, Law and Public Safety -- Requires law enforcement agencies to provide internal affairs and personnel files of law enforcement officers to other agencies under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 745, by Assemblyman JOHNSON, Assemblywoman PINKIN, Assemblyman KARABINCHAK, Assemblywomen DeCroce, Vainieri Huttle and Assemblyman Webber, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Criminalizes fraudulently pretending to be transportation network company driver.

Assembly No. 746, by Assemblymen JOHNSON, KENNEDY, MUKHERJI, Assemblywoman Vainieri Huttle and Assemblyman Karabinchak, Health -- Requires certain ambulances to carry epinephrine.

Assembly No. 747, by Assemblymen JOHNSON and KARABINCHAK, Environment and Solid Waste -- Restricts discharge of firefighting foams containing perfluoroalkyl or polyfluoroalkyl substances for training or testing purposes.

Assembly No. 748, by Assemblyman JOHNSON, State and Local Government -- Makes various changes to law addressing meetings of public bodies to provide public with greater access to meetings and information about meetings.

Assembly No. 749, by Assemblyman JOHNSON, State and Local Government -- Makes certain access changes to open public records act; requires inclusion of certain State financial information on open data website; creates program for development of local websites; makes appropriation.

Assembly No. 750, by Assemblyman JOHNSON, Assemblywoman PINKIN, Assemblymen HOLLEY, MUKHERJI, CAPUTO, WIMBERLY, Assemblywomen Mosquera and Chaparro, Law and Public Safety -- Grants certain employment protections to campus police officers.

Assembly No. 751, by Assemblyman RUMPF, Assemblywomen GOVE, Vainieri Huttle, Assemblyman Giblin, Assemblywoman Munoz and Assemblyman Wimberly, Judiciary -- Requires local government notification of sex offender registration and prohibits sex offenders from living near schools, child care centers or playgrounds.

Assembly No. 752, by Assemblymen RUMPF, JOHNSON, Assemblywoman GOVE, Assemblymen Bramnick, Giblin, Assemblywoman Munoz and Assemblyman Wimberly, Judiciary -- Requires prosecutor to determine risk of re-offense under Megan's Law prior to offender's release from incarceration.

Assembly No. 753, by Assemblyman RUMPF, Assemblywoman GOVE, Assemblymen Space and Wirths, Labor -- Excludes certain illegal aliens from workers' compensation and temporary disability benefits.

Assembly No. 754, by Assemblyman RUMPF and Assemblywoman GOVE, Environment and Solid Waste -- Requires DEP to assume responsibility for dredging of waterways providing boat access to lagoon communities; appropriates \$6,000,000.

Assembly No. 755, by Assemblyman RUMPF and Assemblywoman GOVE, Environment and Solid Waste -- Establishes special dredging account; directs \$5,000,000 of sales tax collected annually be deposited therein; directs DEP to administer account and dredging program with certain requirements.

Assembly No. 756, by Assemblyman RUMPF and Assemblywoman GOVE, Environment and Solid Waste -- Appropriates \$26,140,000 for dredging projects and dredged material disposal projects related to navigational waterways.

Assembly No. 757, by Assemblyman RUMPF, Assemblywoman GOVE, Assemblyman MCKEON and Assemblywoman Lampitt, Commerce and Economic Development -- Revises law concerning sexually oriented businesses.

Assembly No. 758, by Assemblyman RUMPF, Assemblywoman GOVE and Assemblyman DANCER, Judiciary -- Requires court to consider results of domestic violence assessment before dissolving certain domestic violence restraining orders.

Assembly No. 759, by Assemblyman RUMPF and Assemblywoman GOVE, Commerce and Economic Development -- Prevents use of condemnation to acquire residential and other private property under redevelopment laws.

Assembly No. 760, by Assemblyman RUMPF and Assemblywoman GOVE, Human Services -- Increases personal needs allowance to \$55 for low income persons residing in certain facilities.

Assembly No. 761, by Assemblyman RUMPF, Assemblywoman GOVE, Assemblymen Space and Wirths, State and Local Government -- Bars companies which hire illegal aliens from public contracts, grants, loans, or tax incentives for seven years.

Assembly No. 762, by Assemblyman RUMPF and Assemblywoman GOVE, Law and Public Safety -- Increases prison time for certain persons convicted of a motor vehicle offense when license suspended for DUI.

Assembly No. 763, by Assemblyman RUMPF, Assemblywoman GOVE and Assemblyman Kean, Law and Public Safety -- Extends penalties for driving under the influence to include any substance that impairs driving ability; deems driver's consent to non-invasive drug tests.

Assembly No. 764, by Assemblyman RUMPF and Assemblywoman GOVE, Law and Public Safety -- Criminalizes fifth or subsequent drunk driving offenses.

Assembly No. 765, by Assemblyman RUMPF, Assemblywomen GOVE, Munoz, Assemblymen Space and Wirths, State and Local

Government -- Ends the transitional energy facilities assessment, caps the State use portion of State energy tax revenues and ensures the balance of such State revenues are paid annually as municipal aid.

Assembly No. 766, by Assemblyman RUMPF, Assemblywomen GOVE, Munoz, Assemblymen Space, Dancer and Wirths, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Authorizes free hunting, fishing, and trapping licenses and free admission to State parks and forests for individuals with certain types of military service.

Assembly No. 767, by Assemblyman RUMPF, Assemblywoman GOVE and Assemblyman McGuckin, Senior Services -- Reestablishes senior citizen supplemental stabilization aid.

Assembly No. 768, by Assemblyman RUMPF and Assemblywoman GOVE, Judiciary -- Clarifies that harassment made anonymously or otherwise through electronic communication devices constitutes a petty disorderly offense.

Assembly No. 769, by Assemblyman RUMPF and Assemblywoman GOVE, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Requires BPU to provide funding for purchase and installation of photovoltaic technologies for age-restricted community clubhouse facilities from societal benefits charge.

Assembly No. 770, by Assemblyman RUMPF and Assemblywoman GOVE, Judiciary -- Requires use of electronic mail for community notification under Megan's law.

Assembly No. 771, by Assemblyman RUMPF and Assemblywoman GOVE, Judiciary -- Requires certain offenders to register under Megan's Law; upgrades the crimes of invasion of privacy and peering into a window of a dwelling for a second or subsequent offense.

Assembly No. 772, by Assemblyman RUMPF, Assemblywoman GOVE, Assemblymen Wirths and Space, State and Local Government -- Requires certification that persons directly or indirectly receiving State monies or privileges are not unauthorized aliens.

Assembly No. 773, by Assemblyman RUMPF and Assemblywoman GOVE, Judiciary -- Provides for mandatory terms of imprisonment for certain sexual assaults upon a minor; amends murder statute.

Assembly No. 774, by Assemblyman RUMPF, Assemblywoman GOVE and Assemblyman McGuckin, Law and Public Safety -- Provides for immediate driver's license suspension under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 775, by Assemblyman RUMPF and Assemblywoman GOVE, Judiciary -- Establishes "Internet Predator Investigation and Prosecution Fund" with \$200 assessment on persons convicted of certain offenses.

Assembly No. 776, by Assemblyman RUMPF and Assemblywoman GOVE, Judiciary -- Makes public officers or employees convicted of certain crimes or found at fault in certain civil actions liable and subject to pension garnishment for public legal expenses and illegally obtained funds.

Assembly No. 777, by Assemblyman RUMPF and Assemblywoman GOVE, Labor -- Prevents intoxicated employees from receiving workers' compensation.

Assembly No. 778, by Assemblyman RUMPF and Assemblywoman GOVE, State and Local Government -- Requires any individual seeking elective public office to disclose when filing petition of nomination whether he or she has been convicted of a criminal offense.

Assembly No. 779, by Assemblyman RUMPF and Assemblywoman GOVE, Tourism, Gaming and the Arts -- Allows CRDA to finance certain highway projects outside of Atlantic City Tourism District.

Assembly No. 780, by Assemblyman RUMPF, Assemblywoman GOVE, Assemblymen ROONEY, McGuckin, Space, Dancer, Peterson and Wirths, Law and Public Safety -- Allows certain drug dealing offenses to be graded by "units," rather than weight, of controlled dangerous substances.

Assembly No. 781, by Assemblyman RUMPF and Assemblywoman GOVE, Agriculture -- Provides for payment to small municipalities, in certain cases, of certain penalty moneys assessed for violations of fish and game laws.

Assembly No. 782, by Assemblyman RUMPF and Assemblywoman GOVE, Homeland Security and State Preparedness -- Establishes civil action for damages against organizations that support terrorism.

Assembly No. 783, by Assemblyman RUMPF and Assemblywoman GOVE, Environment and Solid Waste -- Authorizes municipal dredging of lagoon community waterways and levying of special assessment or issuing of bonds to finance such dredging.

Assembly No. 784, by Assemblyman RUMPF and Assemblywoman GOVE, State and Local Government -- Authorizes municipalities to adopt ordinances requiring maintenance and repair of certain wharves, piers, docks and bulkheads.

Assembly No. 785, by Assemblyman RUMPF and Assemblywoman GOVE, Commerce and Economic Development -- "Invest in New Jersey First Act;" requires preference in awarding certain contracts for critical infrastructure projects.

Assembly No. 786, by Assemblyman RUMPF and Assemblywoman GOVE, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Provides that trespassing in nuclear power plant is third degree crime.

Assembly No. 787, by Assemblyman RUMPF and Assemblywoman GOVE, Law and Public Safety -- Makes escapees responsible for apprehension costs.

Assembly No. 788, by Assemblyman RUMPF and Assemblywoman GOVE, State and Local Government -- Caps State use portion of energy tax revenues and ensures balance of such revenues are paid annually as municipal aid.

Assembly No. 789, by Assemblyman RUMPF and Assemblywoman GOVE, Community Development and Affairs -- Prohibits seller of real estate to transfer realty transfer fee liability to buyer.

Assembly No. 790, by Assemblyman RUMPF and Assemblywoman GOVE, Transportation and Independent Authorities - - Directs DOT and NJT to study and report on transportation infrastructure needs in coastal counties.

Assembly No. 791, by Assemblyman VERRELLI and Assemblywoman REYNOLDS-JACKSON, Housing -- Establishes guidelines for creditworthiness determinations concerning affordable housing programs.

Assembly No. 806, by Assemblyman VERRELLI and Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Human Services -- Requires DOC to ensure inmates have opportunity to participate in Medicaid pre-enrollment and enrollment sessions at least 60 days prior to release; requires applicable inmates to receive Medicaid card at release.

Assembly No. 807, by Assemblyman VERRELLI and Assemblywoman REYNOLDS-JACKSON, Labor -- Provides corporation business tax and gross income tax credits for businesses that employ formerly incarcerated individuals.

Assembly No. 905, by Assemblywoman GOVE and Assemblyman RUMPF, Agriculture -- Provides immunity from civil liability for persons performing animal rescue and authorizes formation of emergency animal rescue response units.

Assembly No. 906, by Assemblywoman GOVE, Assemblyman RUMPF and Assemblywoman DECROCE, Senior Services -- Establishes "Seniors Helping Seniors Who are Blind or Visually Impaired Demonstration Program" in DHS; appropriates \$360,000.

Assembly No. 907, by Assemblywoman GOVE and Assemblyman RUMPF, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Allows gross income tax filers to designate contributions to VetGroup, Inc. for services for veterans.

Assembly No. 908, by Assemblywoman GOVE, Assemblymen RUMPF and Greenwald, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Authorizes special license plate for distinguished service medal recipients.

Assembly No. 909, by Assemblywoman GOVE, Assemblyman RUMPF, Assemblywoman Munoz and Assemblyman DePhillips, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Provides certain veteran benefits to veterans of the global war on terror conflicts and those of certain military engagements served during certain periods.

Assembly No. 910, by Assemblywoman GOVE and Assemblyman RUMPF, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Requires State to reimburse counties and municipalities for salary and fringe benefit costs of employee on official leave of absence for military service in war on terror; makes an appropriation.

Assembly No. 911, by Assemblywoman GOVE, Assemblyman RUMPF, Assemblywoman Munoz and Assemblyman Johnson, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Extends veterans' property tax exemption to tenant shareholders in cooperatives and mutual housing corporations.

Assembly No. 912, by Assemblywoman GOVE and Assemblyman RUMPF, State and Local Government -- Allows PERS ordinary disability retiree to earn up to \$3,000 in PERS-covered employment annually before cancellation of disability benefit and reenrollment in PERS.

Assembly No. 913, by Assemblywoman GOVE and Assemblyman RUMPF, Community Development and Affairs -- Extends payment of homestead property tax reimbursement to non-eligible surviving spouse for portion of tax year during which deceased spouse lived.

Assembly No. 914, by Assemblywoman GOVE, Assemblymen RUMPF, BENSON, Wirths and Space, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Permits certain portion of municipal development trust funds to be spent on housing affordability assistance to veterans.

Assembly No. 915, by Assemblywoman GOVE and Assemblyman RUMPF, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Makes annual compensation paid to surviving spouses of certain blind or disabled veterans payable from date of veteran's death.

Assembly No. 916, by Assemblywoman GOVE, Assemblymen RUMPF, SPACE, Assemblywoman Tucker, Assemblymen DeAngelo, Benson, Johnson and Wirths, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Establishes task force to study issues facing returning members of the United States Armed Forces and New Jersey National Guard and make recommendations on how State should address issues.

Assembly No. 917, by Assemblywoman GOVE, Assemblymen RUMPF, BENSON, Assemblywomen MCKNIGHT and Munoz, Law and Public Safety -- Increases penalties for identity theft when victim is a senior citizen or veteran.

Assembly No. 918, by Assemblywoman GOVE, Assemblymen RUMPF and MCKEON, Tourism, Gaming and the Arts -- Dedicates up to \$400,000 annually of fees collected at Island Beach and Liberty State Parks to special funds to be used to support certain park programs, and makes appropriations from the funds.

Assembly No. 919, by Assemblywoman GOVE, Assemblymen RUMPF, BENSON, Assemblywomen DECROCE, Munoz and Tucker, Law and Public Safety -- Creates new offense of theft by financial exploitation of a vulnerable person.

Assembly No. 920, by Assemblywoman GOVE and Assemblyman RUMPF, Appropriations -- Converts loan awarded to Barnegat Bay Decoy and Baymen's Museum from loan to grant.

Assembly No. 921, by Assemblywoman GOVE and Assemblyman RUMPF, Higher Education -- Clarifies that non-credit courses are eligible courses under the volunteer tuition credit program.

Assembly No. 922, by Assemblywomen GOVE and Schepisi, Tourism, Gaming and the Arts -- Establishes NJ Business and the Arts Commission to promote art Statewide.

Assembly No. 923, by Assemblywoman GOVE, Assemblymen RUMPF, Space and Wirths, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Creates New Jersey Servicemembers' Civil Relief Act.

Assembly No. 924, by Assemblywoman GOVE and Assemblyman RUMPF, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Exempts veterans' organizations from motor vehicle registration fee.

Assembly No. 925, by Assemblywoman GOVE and Assemblyman RUMPF, Labor -- Revises current law permitting paid leave of absence for municipal police officers.

Assembly No. 926, by Assemblywoman GOVE and Assemblyman RUMPF, Agriculture -- Provides for discounted resident trapping license fees for senior citizens.

Assembly No. 927, by Assemblywoman GOVE, Assemblymen RUMPF, KEAN and Assemblywoman DeCroce, Homeland Security and State Preparedness -- Allows certain volunteer firefighters, rescue and first aid squad members to claim \$5,000 income tax deduction.

Assembly No. 928, by Assemblywoman GOVE and Assemblyman RUMPF, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- "Breann's Law" requires health insurers, the State Health Benefits Program and NJ FamilyCare to provide "out of network" coverage for children with catastrophic illnesses.

Assembly No. 932, by Assemblywoman GOVE, Assemblymen RUMPF, ARMATO and Mazzeo, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Continues tax exempt status of certain real property owned by disabled

veterans during reconstruction of homes destroyed by flood, storm, or other act of God.

Assembly No. 933, by Assemblywoman GOVE and Assemblyman RUMPF, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Exempts disabled veterans from beach buggy permit fees.

Assembly No. 934, by Assemblywoman GOVE, Tourism, Gaming and the Arts -- Permits New Jersey Historical Commission to develop manual for counties and municipalities to use to plan celebration of 250th Anniversary of ratification of Declaration of Independence.

Assembly No. 935, by Assemblywoman GOVE and Assemblyman RUMPF, Tourism, Gaming and the Arts -- Requires DOT to develop common design for signs that indicate historic district or site.

Assembly No. 936, by Assemblywoman GOVE and Assemblyman RUMPF, Tourism, Gaming and the Arts -- Authorizes DOT and historic entities to accept gifts and grants for purchase and erection of historic markers and signs.

Assembly No. 937, by Assemblyman KARABINCHAK, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Requires construction of sidewalks along certain routes within certain radius of public schools.

Assembly No. 938, by Assemblyman KARABINCHAK, Appropriations -- Establishes NJ Gross Income Tax EasyFile Program; pilot program to allow Division of Taxation to prepare gross income tax return forms for certain taxpayers.

Assembly No. 953, by Assemblyman KARABINCHAK, Regulated Professions -- Requires architects disclose insurance coverage.

Assembly No. 967, by Assemblyman CONAWAY, Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Assemblyman BENSON, Assemblywoman MURPHY, Assemblymen Armato, Mazzeo and Assemblywoman Reynolds-Jackson, Health -- Prohibits use of coupons, price rebates, and price reduction promotions in sales of tobacco and vapor products.

Assembly No. 968, by Assemblyman CONAWAY, Assemblywoman PINKIN, Assemblymen MUKHERJI, DANIELSEN, Benson, Assemblywoman Murphy, Assemblyman Chiaravalloti, Assemblywomen Sumter, Reynolds-Jackson, Assemblyman Schaefer, Assemblywoman McKnight, Assemblyman DeAngelo, Assemblywoman Swain and Assemblyman Tully, Environment and Solid Waste -- Requires DEP to adopt Statewide plan to reduce lead exposure from contaminated soils and drinking water.

Assembly No. 1314, by Assemblywomen MOSQUERA and MURPHY, Law and Public Safety -- Permits certain fire police units to appoint fire police officers.

Assembly No. 1315, by Assemblywoman MOSQUERA and Assemblyman MORIARTY, Senior Services -- Requires installation of grab bars in certain public restrooms.

Assembly No. 1316, by Assemblywoman MOSQUERA, Assemblyman DEANGELO, Assemblywomen QUIJANO, SUMTER, Assemblyman SCHAER, Assemblywoman LAMPITT, Assemblymen McKeon, Benson, Assemblywomen Jasey, Vainieri, Huttle, Assemblyman Danielsen, Assemblywoman McKnight, Assemblymen Chiaravalloti, Coughlin and Assemblywoman Pinkin, Human Services -- Provides \$21 minimum annual energy assistance to qualified families.

Assembly No. 1317, by Assemblywoman MOSQUERA, Assemblymen GREENWALD, BENSON, Assemblywomen LAMPITT, VAINIERI, HUTTLE, Assemblyman DANIELSEN, Assemblywoman SUMTER, Assemblymen Caputo, Johnson, Assemblywomen Jasey, Jimenez, Assemblymen Giblin, McKeon, Assemblywoman Tucker, Assemblymen Coughlin, Zwicker, Houghtaling, Assemblywoman Downey, Assemblymen Conaway, Holley, Assemblywomen Pinkin and Reynolds-Jackson, Law and Public Safety -- Revises certain laws concerning domestic violence and firearms.

Assembly No. 1318, by Assemblywomen MOSQUERA, VAINIERI, HUTTLE, MURPHY, Jasey, Reynolds-Jackson and Assemblyman Calabrese, Law and Public Safety -- Requires criminal history record background check for rifle and shotgun purchases.

Assembly No. 1319, by Assemblywoman MOSQUERA, Assemblyman SCHAER, Assemblywomen LAMPITT, VAINIERI, HUTTLE, Assemblyman Verrelli and Assemblywoman Murphy, Human Services -- Establishes Behavioral Mental Health Advisory Board in Division of Mental Health and Addiction Services in DHS.

Assembly No. 1320, by Assemblywoman MOSQUERA, Human Services -- Requires DHS to take action to raise public awareness of privacy laws that prevent disclosure of health care enrollment information to immigration authorities.

Assembly No. 1321, by Assemblywomen MOSQUERA, CHAPARRO and VAINIERI, HUTTLE, Human Services -- Requires

DHS to create English and Spanish-language Internet websites to promote enrollment in affordable health care plans.

Assembly No. 1340, by Assemblyman BENSON, Assemblywomen LOPEZ, Murphy and Pinkin, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Requires certain water suppliers to reimburse residential customers for drinking water testing and filters under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 1341, by Assemblyman BENSON and Assemblywoman MURPHY, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Requires water supplier to notify affected municipalities, school districts, charter schools, and nonpublic schools of violations of drinking water quality standards.

Assembly No. 1342, by Assemblymen BENSON, CONAWAY, Assemblywoman QUIJANO, Assemblymen Wimberly, Mukherji, Johnson, Moriarty and DeAngelo, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Requires health care facilities to test for and remediate lead in drinking water, and disclose test results.

Assembly No. 1348, by Assemblyman BENSON, Housing -- Requires new one- and two-family residences to be equipped with fire extinguishers.

Assembly No. 1349, by Assemblyman BENSON, Assemblywomen DECROCE, PINTOR MARIN, Murphy and Assemblyman Johnson, Budget -- Makes FY 2018 supplemental appropriation of \$165,950,000 from the revenues and other funds of NJ Transportation Trust Fund Authority.

Assembly No. 1352, by Assemblymen BENSON and MUKHERJI, Higher Education -- Removes exclusion of "nonimmigrant aliens" from qualifying for in-State tuition rates at public institutions of higher education under certain conditions.

Assembly No. 1382, by Assemblyman HOLLEY, State and Local Government -- Establishes additional homestead property tax reimbursement based on school portion of property tax bills for certain seniors.

Assembly No. 1383, by Assemblyman HOLLEY, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Permits veteran to receive credit toward licensure as licensed practical nurse upon completing certain military medical training programs.

Assembly No. 1384, by Assemblyman MOEN, Higher Education -- Requires four-year institutions of higher education to offer accelerated three-year baccalaureate degree programs.

Assembly No. 1385, by Assemblyman MOEN, Higher Education -- Requires members of governing boards of public institutions of higher education to complete a training program developed by Secretary of Higher Education.

Assembly No. 1517, by Assemblymen ROONEY, BURZICHELLI and Assemblywoman MURPHY, Agriculture -- Exempts law enforcement and certain other emergency personnel from liability for breaking into motor vehicle to rescue animal under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 1518, by Assemblyman ROONEY, State and Local Government -- Prohibits use of schools as polling places.

Assembly No. 1519, by Assemblymen ROONEY, DEPHILLIPS, CONAWAY, Assemblywomen DeCroce, Swain and Assemblyman Karabinchak, Health -- Authorizes first responders to obtain, administer, and dispense opioid antidotes, with immunity, pursuant to Statewide standing order issued by State health official; makes clarifying changes to "Overdose Prevention Act."

Assembly No. 1520, by Assemblymen ROONEY, JOHNSON and DEPHILLIPS, Higher Education -- Increases age of dependent for whom gross income tax exemption for higher education expenses may be claimed from under 22 years to under 25 years.

Assembly No. 1521, by Assemblymen ROONEY, BURZICHELLI, Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Assemblymen BENSON, Thomson, Dancer and DiMaio, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Authorizes creation of special license plates commemorating horse as State animal.

Assembly No. 1522, by Assemblyman ROONEY, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Requires certain cable television companies renewing system-wide franchise to make cable television service available within certain municipalities.

Assembly No. 1523, by Assemblymen ROONEY and CHIARAVALLOTTI, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Creates "Congestion Pricing Cost Relief Commission."

Assembly No. 1524, by Assemblymen ROONEY, KARABINCHAK and Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Requires DOT to provide additional information in annual report on pavement condition and conduct pavement lifecycle cost analysis; make report available to public.

Assembly No. 1525, by Assemblyman ROONEY, Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE and Assemblyman WEBBER, Education -- Requires certain candidates for employment with DOE to undergo criminal history background check.

Assembly No. 1526, by Assemblymen ROONEY and Giblin, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Requires transportation network companies to provide riders with certain information and to issue illuminated identifying markers; requires MVC to create transportation network company driver database.

Assembly No. 1527, by Assemblymen ROONEY, KARABINCHAK, Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Assemblymen Verrelli, Peterson, Assemblywoman Pinkin, Assemblymen Mazzeo, Armato and DiMaio, State and Local Government -- Raises pay for election workers to \$300 per day.

Assembly No. 1528, by Assemblymen ROONEY and KARABINCHAK, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Prohibits MVC from charging service fees for online services.

Assembly No. 1529, by Assemblyman SPEARMAN, Judiciary -- Provides that application for voluntary discharge of personal representative for estate need not be consented to by parties in interest if governing document indicates successor representative; authorizes possible payment of commission.

Assembly No. 1530, by Assemblyman SPEARMAN, Law and Public Safety -- Requires motorized scooters to be equipped with safety flags when operated on public roadway or bicycle path.

Assembly No. 1531, by Assemblymen SPEARMAN and KARABINCHAK, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Permits license plate frames which do not obscure numbers or letters on motor vehicle license plates.

Assembly No. 1532, by Assemblyman SPEARMAN, Education -- Requires use of common enrollment system in renaissance school districts.

Assembly No. 1533, by Assemblyman SPEARMAN, Assemblywomen REYNOLDS-JACKSON, Schepisi and Murphy, Housing -- Requires reservation of portion of tenant-based vouchers under State rental assistance program for persons displaced due to redevelopment of an affordable housing development; provides displaced persons with affordable housing priority status.

Assembly No. 1534, by Assemblymen SPEARMAN, CHIARAVALLOTI, Assemblywoman QUIJANO and Assemblyman Calabrese, Labor -- "New Jersey Works Act"; Permits businesses to create pre-employment training programs in partnership with nonprofit organizations or educational institutions; provides tax credit to businesses that provide financial assistance to pre-employment training programs.

Assembly No. 1535, by Assemblyman SPEARMAN, Assemblywoman REYNOLDS-JACKSON, Assemblymen Holley, Verrelli, Assemblywomen Speight and Murphy, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Revises certain penalties for illegal operation of snowmobile, all-terrain vehicle, or dirt bike.

Assembly No. 1536, by Assemblymen SPEARMAN, MUKHERJI and Assemblywoman Murphy, Labor -- Concerns sign fabrication, prevailing wage requirements, and project labor agreements.

Assembly No. 1537, by Assemblyman SPEARMAN and Assemblywoman Murphy, State and Local Government -- Extends economic recovery term under "Municipal Rehabilitation and Economic Recovery Act."

Assembly No. 1538, by Assemblyman SPEARMAN, Law and Public Safety -- Changes allocation of fines collected for motor vehicle violations in certain municipalities.

Assembly No. 1539, by Assemblyman SPEARMAN, State and Local Government -- Requires appointee to be removed from civil service eligible list upon appointment to position.

Assembly No. 1540, by Assemblyman SPEARMAN, Oversight, Reform and Federal Relations -- Allows municipalities to revoke and reissue plenary retail consumption licenses that are inactive for five years.

Assembly No. 1541, by Assemblyman SPEARMAN, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Permits person operating bicycle approaching stop sign to reduce speed instead of stopping, unless required for safety, before entering intersection.

Assembly No. 1542, by Assemblyman SPEARMAN and Assemblywoman LOPEZ, Consumer Affairs -- Prohibits person under 18 years of age from using tanning bed.

Assembly No. 1543, by Assemblyman SPEARMAN, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Exempts certain individuals from vehicle registration and driver's license fees.

Assembly No. 1544, by Assemblyman SPEARMAN, Environment and Solid Waste -- Requires public water systems to replace customer lead service lines at expense of all public water system customers.

Assembly No. 1545, by Assemblyman CLIFTON, State and Local Government -- Requires use of direct deposit and Internet for State, local government, and school district employee compensation and certain retirement payments and information.

Assembly No. 1546, by Assemblyman CLIFTON, State and Local Government -- Permits counties to charge a fee to fund infrastructure through voter approval.

Assembly No. 1547, by Assemblymen CLIFTON and Dancer, Agriculture -- Requires disclosure of original purchase price for land to be sold to a county, county agriculture development board, or municipality for farmland preservation purposes.

Assembly No. 1548, by Assemblyman CLIFTON, Tourism, Gaming and the Arts -- Authorizes Division of Travel and Tourism to accept gifts and grants to promote NJ tourism.

Assembly No. 1549, by Assemblyman CLIFTON, Tourism, Gaming and the Arts -- Authorizes NJ Historical Commission to establish program to promote developing historic projects on website and collect donations for projects on behalf of historic site or organization.

Assembly No. 1550, by Assemblymen CLIFTON and Chiaravalloti, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Requires omnibus drivers to inspect bus at end of route for passengers with disabilities.

Assembly No. 1551, by Assemblymen CLIFTON, BENSON, DANIELSEN and THOMSON, Health -- Requires testing for infectious disease for certain persons who have been administered opioid antidote by first responder.

Assembly No. 1552, by Assemblyman CLIFTON, State and Local Government -- Increases percent of public employees' charitable contributions that may be spent on administrative costs.

Assembly No. 1553, by Assemblymen CLIFTON and ROONEY, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Requires DOT to conduct study and issue report on use of rock salt on roadways.

Assembly No. 1554, by Assemblyman CLIFTON and Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Health -- Establishes Overdose Fatality and Near Fatality Review Board.

Assembly No. 1555, by Assemblymen CLIFTON and DANCER, Consumer Affairs -- Includes certain canvassing and solicitation activities as violation of consumer fraud act.

Assembly No. 1556, by Assemblymen CLIFTON and BENSON, Environment and Solid Waste -- Requires State to purchase certain vehicles when purchasing new vehicle.

Space, Wirths, Assemblywomen Lopez and Vainieri Huttle, Agriculture -- Clarifies sales tax collection responsibilities of horse-boarding businesses in New Jersey.

Assembly No. 1564, by Assemblyman HOUGHTALING, Agriculture -- Revises equine animal activities law in accordance with recommendations of New Jersey Law Revision Commission to clarify responsibility and liability issues.

Assembly No. 1565, by Assemblymen HOUGHTALING, TALIAFERRO, MAZZEO, SPACE and Wirths, Agriculture -- Creates alternate voting members on county agriculture development boards.

Assembly No. 1566, by Assemblymen HOUGHTALING and TALIAFERRO, Oversight, Reform and Federal Relations -- Clarifies certain responsibilities of licensed wineries and retail salesrooms.

Assembly No. 1567, by Assemblyman HOUGHTALING, Assemblywoman DOWNEY, Assemblymen EGAN, Verrelli, Assemblywomen Lopez and Jasey, Labor -- Concerns health insurance benefits for locked-out workers.

Assembly No. 1568, by Assemblymen HOUGHTALING, MAZZEO, Dancer, Armato, Wirths and Space, Agriculture -- Establishes Loan Redemption Program for Teachers of Agriculture in Higher Education Student Assistance Authority.

Assembly No. 1569, by Assemblyman HOUGHTALING, Assemblywomen DOWNEY and MURPHY, Budget -- Prohibits State from investing pension and annuity funds in manufacturers of firearms or firearm ammunition.

eliminates requirement that graduation proficiency test be administered in eleventh grade.

Assembly No. 1625, by Assemblywomen LAMPITT, JASEY, CARTER, Mosquera, Vainieri Huttle, Assemblyman Mukherji, Assemblywomen Timberlake, Pinkin and Reynolds-Jackson, Science, Innovation and Technology -- Directs DOE to develop outreach program to encourage young women and minorities to pursue post-secondary degrees and careers in STEM.

Assembly No. 1626, by Assemblywoman LAMPITT, Assemblymen MCKEON and MUKHERJI, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Requires EDA to establish loan program for certain costs of electric-powered school bus purchases by local school districts and school bus contractors.

Assembly No. 1627, by Assemblywoman LAMPITT, Education -- Establishes task force to examine and make recommendations regarding professional development requirements for public school teachers and school leaders.

Assembly No. 1628, by Assemblywomen LAMPITT, TIMBERLAKE and Assemblyman Giblin, Education -- Directs DOE to conduct study on feasibility of using and expanding virtual learning in school districts with teacher shortages.

Assembly No. 1629, by Assemblywomen LAMPITT and JASEY, Education -- Provides expedited determination by State Board of Examiners on application for teaching staff member certification if certain criteria are met.

Assembly No. 1630, by Assemblywoman LAMPITT, Assemblyman GREENWALD, Assemblywomen TIMBERLAKE, Jasey, Vainieri Huttle, Reynolds-Jackson, McKnight, Quijano, Assemblymen Benson and Danielsen, Education -- Clarifies that school district is not required to restrict access to school meals if school meal bill is in arrears.

Assembly No. 1631, by Assemblywomen LAMPITT, JASEY, DOWNEY, Vainieri Huttle, Reynolds-Jackson, Assemblyman Benson, Assemblywoman McKnight, Assemblymen Thomson and Caputo, Education -- Requires school districts take certain actions to increase participation in free or reduced priced meal programs; prohibits shaming students with school meal bills in arrears; prohibits certain district actions in collecting unpaid school meal fees.

Assembly No. 1632, by Assemblywomen LAMPITT, REYNOLDS-JACKSON, Assemblyman CAPUTO, Assemblywomen Vainieri Huttle, Jasey, Assemblyman Danielsen, Assemblywoman McKnight, Assemblyman Benson and Assemblywoman Downey, Education -- Requires school district to establish "School Meal Fund" to assist students with school meal bill in arrears.

Assembly No. 1633, by Assemblywomen LAMPITT, MOSQUERA and DOWNEY, Women and Children -- Allows gross income tax credit for portion of certain child care expenses.

Assembly No. 1634, by Assemblywoman LAMPITT, Higher Education -- Requires Higher Education Student Assistance Authority to reduce monthly loan repayment for New Jersey College Loans to Assist State Students (NJCLASS) loan borrowers who have child enrolled in Grow NJ Kids-rated child care program.

Assembly No. 1635, by Assemblywomen LAMPITT and DOWNEY, Health -- Permits authorization for dispensation of medical marijuana through telemedicine and telehealth under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 1636, by Assemblywomen LAMPITT, VAINIERI HUTTLE, TIMBERLAKE and Assemblyman Houghtaling, Women and Children -- Expands scope of law enforcement sexual assault training; codifies certain responsibilities of county sexual violence programs and rape care advocates.

Assembly No. 1637, by Assemblywoman LAMPITT, Assemblymen MUKHERJI, KARABINCHAK and Assemblywoman Vainieri Huttle, Women and Children -- Requires NJ Youth Suicide Prevention Advisory Council to prepare report regarding suicide prevention instruction in public schools.

Assembly No. 1638, by Assemblywoman STANFIELD, Housing -- Restricts occupancy of dwelling unit in age-restricted community to older adults following resale.

Assembly No. 1639, by Assemblywoman STANFIELD and Assemblyman DeAngelo, Labor -- Provides corporation business tax and gross income tax credits for businesses that employ apprentices in DOL registered apprenticeships.

Assembly No. 1640, by Assemblywoman STANFIELD and Assemblyman DeAngelo, Education -- Requires DOE to include military-connected student identifier in student-level database; requires

district inform teacher when military-connected student enrolls in class taught by teacher.

Assembly No. 1641, by Assemblywoman STANFIELD, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Requires public utilities to mail customers detailed explanation of rate settlement agreements prior to final BPU vote.

Assembly No. 1642, by Assemblywoman STANFIELD, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Requires public utilities to provide customers notice of request for increase in rates; revises requirements related to hearings on proposed rate increases.

Assembly No. 1643, by Assemblywoman STANFIELD, Homeland Security and State Preparedness -- Establishes Good Samaritan Law to provide immunity from civil liability for veterinarians or emergency responders who assist animals at accident scene or emergency.

Assembly No. 1644, by Assemblywoman STANFIELD, Education -- Requires school district monitoring system, New Jersey Quality Single Accountability Continuum (NJQSAC), to include assessment of number of district employees trained in administration of epinephrine to students for anaphylaxis.

Assembly No. 1645, by Assemblywoman QUIJANO, Assemblymen BENSON, WEBBER, CHIARAVALLI, Assemblywomen Vainieri Huttel and DeCroce, Homeland Security and State Preparedness -- Creates fourth degree crime of operating drone equipped with weapon.

Assembly No. 1646, by Assemblywomen QUIJANO, CHAPARRO, Assemblymen HOLLEY, WIMBERLY, MUKHERJI, Mejia and Assemblywoman Speight, Community Development and Affairs -- Establishes "Security Deposit Assistance Pilot Program" in Passaic, Union, Essex, Hudson, and Gloucester counties, appropriates \$210,000.

Assembly No. 1647, by Assemblywomen QUIJANO, DECROCE, Assemblymen BENSON, DEANGELO and Assemblywoman Chaparro, Judiciary -- Upgrades assault on victims who are disabled.

Assembly No. 1648, by Assemblywomen QUIJANO and MCKNIGHT, Education -- Directs Division of Fire Safety in Department of Community Affairs to survey fire suppression systems in public and nonpublic school buildings.

Assembly No. 1649, by Assemblywoman QUIJANO, Judiciary -- Prohibits posting or publishing on Internet home address or telephone number of certain judges and prosecutors.

Assembly No. 1650, by Assemblywoman QUIJANO, Labor -- Limits certain provisions in and enforceability of restrictive covenants.

Assembly No. 1651, by Assemblywomen QUIJANO, VAINIERI HUTTLE and Assemblyman BENSON, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Requires boil water notices to be provided by certain public water systems via telephone, email or text message.

Assembly No. 1652, by Assemblywoman QUIJANO, Higher Education -- Requires institutions of higher education to test for lead in drinking water annually, report test results, and install lead filters or treatment devices.

Assembly No. 1653, by Assemblywomen QUIJANO, PINKIN, Assemblymen KARABINCHAK, HOLLEY, Calabrese, Johnson, Assemblywoman Jasey, Assemblymen McKeon, Chiaravalloti, Assemblywoman Lopez, Assemblymen Kennedy, Conaway and Houghtaling, Commerce and Economic Development -- Encourages development of zero-emission vehicle fueling and charging infrastructure in redevelopment projects.

Assembly No. 1654, by Assemblywoman QUIJANO, Consumer Affairs -- Requires State, county, and municipal employees and certain State contractors to complete cybersecurity awareness training.

Assembly No. 1655, by Assemblywoman QUIJANO, Education -- Provides that State pay high school equivalency exam fees for low-income individuals.

Assembly No. 1656, by Assemblywomen QUIJANO, CHAPARRO, Jasey, Assemblymen McKeon, Houghtaling and Assemblywoman McKnight, Housing -- Requires fire suppression systems in new single and two family homes.

Assembly No. 1657, by Assemblywoman QUIJANO, Assemblyman DEANGELO, Assemblywoman REYNOLDS-JACKSON, Assemblyman HOLLEY and Assemblywoman Timberlake, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- Prohibits use of education, occupation, and credit score as rating factors in automobile insurance underwriting.

Assembly No. 1658, by Assemblywoman QUIJANO and Assemblyman MUKHERJI, Law and Public Safety -- Provides earned time credits to reduce parole eligibility date for inmates who participate in substance abuse treatment program.

Assembly No. 1659, by Assemblywoman QUIJANO, Assemblymen BRAMNICK, MUKHERJI, Assemblywomen SUMTER, DOWNEY, Assemblymen DANCER and Peterson, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- "New Jersey Insurance Fair Conduct Act."

Assembly No. 1660, by Assemblywoman QUIJANO, State and Local Government -- Increases accidental death benefit for surviving spouse or surviving children of certain PERS members and retirants; provides accidental death benefit to beneficiary of certain PERS and PFRS members and retirants; redefines child.

Assembly No. 1661, by Assemblywoman QUIJANO, Oversight, Reform and Federal Relations -- Decouples State tax provisions from federal prohibition on cannabis business expense deductions.

Assembly No. 1662, by Assemblywomen QUIJANO, JIMENEZ, DeCroce, Murphy and Vainieri Huttle, Education -- "Mallory's Law"; revises provisions required in school district's anti-bullying policy; provides for civil liability of parent of minor adjudicated delinquent for cyber-harassment or harassment; and increases certain fines against parents.

Assembly No. 1663, by Assemblywomen QUIJANO, VAINIERI HUTTLE, Assemblymen KARABINCHAK, Holley, Assemblywoman Pinkin and Assemblyman Schaer, Homeland Security and State Preparedness -- Establishes "New Jersey Nonprofit Security Grant Program."

Assembly No. 1664, by Assemblywoman QUIJANO, Judiciary -- Bars the disclosure of personal identifying information of grand jury witnesses except for name; creates a fourth degree offense for attorney disclosure.

Assembly No. 1665, by Assemblywomen QUIJANO and PINKIN, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- Revises certain permissible rating factors for premiums charged for individual and small employer health benefits plans.

Assembly No. 1666, by Assemblywomen QUIJANO and VAINIERI HUTTLE, Law and Public Safety -- Prohibits mail order, Internet, telephone, and any other anonymous method of ammunition sale or transfer in New Jersey.

Assembly No. 1667, by Assemblywoman QUIJANO and Assemblyman SCHAER, Law and Public Safety -- Authorizes Class Three special law enforcement officers to provide security in places of religious worship; makes certain clarifications concerning their use in nonpublic schools.

Assembly No. 1668, by Assemblywoman QUIJANO, Judiciary -- Imposes certain duties on persons or entities engaged in business pertaining to criminal records and imposes penalties for disseminating expunged record; increases maximum fine for current disorderly persons offense.

Assembly No. 1669, by Assemblywoman QUIJANO, Assemblyman FREIMAN and Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- Requires health insurers to limit copayments for insulin.

Assembly No. 1670, by Assemblywoman QUIJANO, State and Local Government -- Requires electronic voting system vendors disclose financial ties prior to electronic voting system approval by Secretary of State.

Assembly No. 1671, by Assemblywoman QUIJANO, Law and Public Safety -- Requires DLPS to establish and make available to law enforcement agencies training materials concerning interactions with hearing impaired; requires annual training for law enforcement and contracting with qualified interpreters.

Assembly No. 1672, by Assemblywoman QUIJANO and Assemblyman CAPUTO, Education -- Establishes "School Opening and School Closing Student Safety Task Force" to review safety of students when schools open and close for school day.

Assembly No. 1673, by Assemblywomen QUIJANO, REYNOLDS-JACKSON, VAINIERI HUTTLE, Downey and Assemblyman Houghtaling, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- Requires health insurance companies to cover lead screenings for children 16 years of age or younger.

Assembly No. 1674, by Assemblywoman QUIJANO, State and Local Government -- Requires gender neutral elected office titles on ballots.

Assembly No. 1675, by Assemblywoman QUIJANO, Higher Education -- Prohibits academic degree-granting institutions from entering into revenue sharing arrangements with financial institutions for consumer financial products or services and regulates consumer financial products or services marketed to students.

Assembly No. 1676, by Assemblywoman QUIJANO and Assemblyman DEANGELO, Homeland Security and State Preparedness -- Provides accidental death benefits in certain circumstances to surviving spouse and surviving child of SPRS member or retiree who participated in 9/11 World Trade Center rescue, recovery, or cleanup operations.

Assembly No. 1677, by Assemblywoman QUIJANO, Environment and Solid Waste -- Establishes "Residential Water Quality Assurance Program" in DEP; requires certain disclosures from residents and property owners regarding lead in drinking water.

Assembly No. 1678, by Assemblyman BURZICHELLI, Education - - Prohibits boards of education from charging students a fee to participate in extracurricular activities.

Assembly No. 1679, by Assemblymen BURZICHELLI, BENSON, Assemblywoman MOSQUERA and Assemblyman Wimberly, Commerce and Economic Development -- The "New Jobs for New Jersey Act."

Assembly No. 1680, by Assemblyman BURZICHELLI, Regulated Professions -- Revises law concerning partnerships, limited partnerships, and limited liability companies.

Assembly No. 1681, by Assemblyman BURZICHELLI, Tourism, Gaming and the Arts -- Establishes Student Loan Lottery with winnings applying only to outstanding student loans.

Assembly No. 1682, by Assemblyman BURZICHELLI, Assemblywoman JASEY and Assemblyman MCKEON, Education -- Prohibits school districts from joining associations which oversee Statewide interscholastic sports unless association limits certain student-athletes who repeat middle school grade to only six consecutive semesters of interscholastic eligibility after entering ninth grade.

Assembly No. 1683, by Assemblyman BURZICHELLI, Assemblywoman PINTOR MARIN, Assemblymen MUKHERJI, Dancer, Giblin and Assemblywoman Chaparro, State and Local Government -- Maintains property tax exemption for certain nonprofit hospitals with on-site for-profit medical providers; requires these hospitals to pay community service contributions to host municipalities; establishes Nonprofit Hospital Community Service Contribution Study Commission.

Assembly No. 1684, by Assemblyman BURZICHELLI, Agriculture -- Clarifies provisions with regard to pet trusts.

Assembly No. 1685, by Assemblyman BURZICHELLI and Assemblywoman MURPHY, Health -- Requires patient to receive notification of abnormality in chest x-ray; designated as Claudia's Law.

Assembly No. 1686, by Assemblyman BURZICHELLI, Health -- Reduces ambulatory care facility assessment.

Assembly No. 1687, by Assemblyman BURZICHELLI, Agriculture -- Requires DEP to obtain approval from Secretary of Agriculture prior to levying penalties against farmers.

Assembly No. 1688, by Assemblyman BURZICHELLI, Housing -- Expands municipal authority to license and inspect residential rental property.

Assembly No. 1689, by Assemblymen BURZICHELLI, TALIAFERRO, Assemblywoman MOSQUERA and Assemblyman BENSON, State and Local Government -- Increases annual income limitation for senior and disabled citizens' eligibility for \$250 property tax deduction and bases future annual income limitations on annual CPI changes.

Assembly No. 1690, by Assemblymen BURZICHELLI and DANCER, State and Local Government -- Requires all school and nonpartisan municipal elections, and permits fire district elections, to be conducted on day of general election in November.

Assembly No. 1691, by Assemblyman BURZICHELLI, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Requires public utility holding companies owning electric generation and electric transmission facility assets to divest either all electric generation or all electric transmission facility assets to unaffiliated companies.

Assembly No. 1692, by Assemblyman BURZICHELLI, Environment and Solid Waste -- Expands applicability of cap on "Spill Compensation and Control Act" tax liability to all successors in interest of certain taxpayers.

Assembly No. 1693, by Assemblymen BURZICHELLI and Houghtaling, Tourism, Gaming and the Arts -- Disqualifies casino license applicant for five-year period if person substantially closed casino property in State; revokes license; reinstates license eligibility under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 1694, by Assemblyman BURZICHELLI, State and Local Government -- Increases amount of allowable temporary appropriations by a local unit prior to adoption of its budget from 26.25% to 35% of its total of appropriations in preceding fiscal year.

Assembly No. 1695, by Assemblyman BURZICHELLI, Homeland Security and State Preparedness -- Prohibits enforcement, for a period of 12 months, of homeowners' association bylaws prohibiting domesticated animals if owner is FEMA designated displaced individual following emergency declaration by President or Governor.

Assembly No. 1696, by Assemblyman BURZICHELLI, State and Local Government -- Permits police departments to donate unclaimed bicycles to nonprofit organizations.

Assembly No. 1697, by Assemblyman BURZICHELLI, Judiciary -- Permits marriage or civil union license to be obtained in any municipality in the State.

Assembly No. 1698, by Assemblyman BURZICHELLI, Agriculture -- Creates rights of action for pecuniary damages against person committing certain harm to domestic companion animal.

Assembly No. 1699, by Assemblymen BURZICHELLI, SPACE and WIRTHS, Agriculture -- Authorizes deer hunting with firearm on Sundays on private property.

Assembly No. 1700, by Assemblymen BURZICHELLI, MUKHERJI, GIBLIN, Assemblywomen Reynolds-Jackson and Jimenez, Oversight, Reform and Federal Relations -- Creates new permits to allow certain restaurants to sell alcoholic beverages and allows for issuance of additional alcoholic beverage licenses; provides tax credit under corporate business tax and gross income tax for loss in value to certain alcoholic beverage licenses.

Assembly No. 1701, by Assemblyman BURZICHELLI, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Establishes special license plates for fire police officers.

Assembly No. 1702, by Assemblymen BURZICHELLI and TALIAFERRO, Environment and Solid Waste -- Prohibits DEP from demolishing or requiring removal of certain cabins or similar structures located in certain tidal wetlands.

Assembly No. 1703, by Assemblyman BURZICHELLI, Judiciary -- Upgrades certain types of assault against sports officials to aggravated assault.

Assembly No. 1704, by Assemblyman BURZICHELLI, Assemblywomen LOPEZ, PINKIN, Assemblymen DePhillips, DiMaio and Peterson, Human Services -- Requires Department of Human Services to review Medicaid reimbursement to nursing homes under Managed Long-Term Services and Supports Program.

Assembly No. 1705, by Assemblyman BURZICHELLI, Appropriations -- Imposes tax upon retail sales of liquid nicotine; repeals floor tax on liquid nicotine.

Assembly No. 1706, by Assemblymen BURZICHELLI, ZWICKER, FREIMAN, DePhillips, Space and Wirths, Appropriations - - Allows deduction from New Jersey gross income of certain capital gains from sale or exchange of New Jersey qualified small business stock held for more than five years.

Assembly No. 1707, by Assemblymen BURZICHELLI, HOUGHTALING, Assemblywoman DOWNEY, Assemblymen DANCER and Giblin, Tourism, Gaming and the Arts -- Makes supplemental appropriation of \$20,000,000 from General Fund to New Jersey Racing Commission for horse racing purse subsidies.

Assembly No. 1708, by Assemblyman BURZICHELLI, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- Requires workers' compensation and PIP coverage for medical marijuana under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 1709, by Assemblymen BURZICHELLI, TALIAFERRO, VERRELLI, Wirths and Space, Agriculture -- Appropriates \$450,000 for Hooked on Fishing-Not on Drugs Program.

Assembly No. 1710, by Assemblyman BURZICHELLI, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Authorizes alternative procedure for sale of municipal sewerage systems to public utilities.

Assembly No. 1711, by Assemblyman BURZICHELLI, Assemblywoman REYNOLDS-JACKSON and Assemblyman KARABINCHAK, Oversight, Reform and Federal Relations -- Allows municipality to renew or deny inactive Class C alcoholic beverage retail licenses.

Assembly No. 1712, by Assemblymen BURZICHELLI and KARABINCHAK, Regulated Professions -- Concerns disclosure of certain information prior to sale of real estate.

Assembly No. 1713, by Assemblyman BURZICHELLI, Agriculture -- Authorizes Sunday firearm and bow hunting for deer on certain lands.

Assembly No. 1714, by Assemblyman BURZICHELLI, Environment and Solid Waste -- Allows BPU to increase cost to customers of Class I renewable energy requirement for energy years 2022 through 2024, under certain conditions.

Assembly No. 1715, by Assemblyman BURZICHELLI, Labor -- Imposes contribution requirements on the use of automated customer service kiosks by employers.

Assembly No. 1716, by Assemblyman KENNEDY, Assemblywomen MCKNIGHT, MURPHY, Tucker and Downey, Human Services -- Allows primary caregiver of handicapped person and person with autism to apply for and use handicapped parking.

Assembly No. 1717, by Assemblyman KENNEDY, Assemblywoman PINKIN and Assemblyman CALABRESE, Consumer Affairs -- Prohibits certain violations of terms of service for Internet ticket sales.

Assembly No. 1718, by Assemblymen KENNEDY, ROONEY, Mukherji and Benson, Consumer Affairs -- Requires certain notifications and free credit reports for customers following breach of security of personal information within business or public entity.

Assembly No. 1719, by Assemblymen KENNEDY, HOLLEY, Assemblywoman DECROCE, Assemblyman DEANGELO and Assemblywoman Murphy, Higher Education -- Requires institution of higher education to have automatic external defibrillator on premises of each athletic facility and student center.

Assembly No. 1720, by Assemblyman KENNEDY and Assemblywoman PINKIN, Consumer Affairs -- Prohibits sale of certain cleaning products containing triclosan.

Assembly No. 1721, by Assemblyman KENNEDY, Health -- Requires certain restaurant chains to provide sodium information for items offered for sale.

Assembly No. 1722, by Assemblyman KENNEDY, Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE and Assemblyman CHIARAVALLOTTI, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Requires door to operator's cabin be locked on NJT trains.

Assembly No. 1723, by Assemblyman KENNEDY, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Requires public utility performing road excavation to repave part of road that was excavated if that road had been repaved in previous five years.

Assembly No. 1724, by Assemblymen KENNEDY, BENSON and Assemblywoman DOWNEY, Agriculture -- Prohibits use of chlorpyrifos insecticide.

Assembly No. 1725, by Assemblymen KENNEDY, BENSON and MUKHERJI, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Requires certain telecommunications, cable television, and public utility service providers to notify public entities of service discontinuance five business days prior to shutoff.

Assembly No. 1726, by Assemblyman KENNEDY, Health -- Requires presence of basic life support ambulance during all competitive eating events.

Assembly No. 1727, by Assemblyman KENNEDY, Assemblywoman JASEY, Assemblyman CHIARAVALLI, Assemblywoman Downey and Assemblyman Karabinchak, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Permits undesignated non-binary gender individuals to indicate "X" for sex on any driver's license or non-driver identification card issued by MVC.

Assembly No. 1728, by Assemblywoman MCKNIGHT, Assemblyman DANIELSEN, Assemblywoman Chaparro, Assemblymen Coughlin, Holley, Assemblywoman Murphy and Assemblyman Benson, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- Requires depository institutions to provide paper account statements to elder adults.

Assembly No. 1729, by Assemblywoman MCKNIGHT, Assemblyman CHIARAVALLI, Assemblywomen VAINIERI HUTTLE and Chaparro, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Requires certain providers of transportation services to develop and publish route schedules.

Assembly No. 1730, by Assemblywoman MCKNIGHT, Assemblymen CHIARAVALLI, HOLLEY, Assemblywoman Chaparro, Assemblyman Verrelli, Assemblywomen Reynolds-Jackson, Murphy and Speight, Housing -- Requires lobby security for certain senior citizen high-rise buildings in areas with high violent crime rates.

Assembly No. 1731, by Assemblywoman MCKNIGHT, Assemblymen WEBBER, MUKHERJI, Assemblywoman DOWNEY, Assemblymen Holley, Chiaravalloti and Assemblywoman Chaparro, Law and Public Safety -- Prohibits release of personal identifying information of violent crime victims and witnesses under State's open public records law.

Assembly No. 1732, by Assemblywomen MCKNIGHT and SUMTER, Law and Public Safety -- Authorizes protective order for certain witnesses or victims against actor who attempted to prevent or obstruct them from reporting crime to police.

Assembly No. 1734, by Assemblywoman MCKNIGHT, Law and Public Safety -- Establishes procedures for intake and record keeping of certain 9-1-1 calls.

Assembly No. 1735, by Assemblywoman MCKNIGHT, Law and Public Safety -- Requires law enforcement officers to have updated photograph.

Assembly No. 1736, by Assemblywomen MCKNIGHT, CHAPARRO, MOSQUERA, Speight and Reynolds-Jackson, Women and Children -- Concerns counseling for children who were either physically present or who may have seen or heard act of domestic violence.

Assembly No. 1737, by Assemblywomen MCKNIGHT, VAINIERI HUTTLE and Chaparro, Education -- Requires parent or guardian to annually notify school district in writing of intention to home-school child; requires school district to compile and post on district website number of home-schooled children.

Assembly No. 1738, by Assemblywomen MCKNIGHT, MUNOZ, Assemblyman CAPUTO, Assemblywoman CHAPARRO, Assemblyman McKeon, Assemblywomen Timberlake and Speight, Housing -- Establishes the "Safe Sanitary Subsidized Rental Housing Bill of Rights."

Assembly No. 1739, by Assemblywoman MCKNIGHT, Judiciary -- Imposes mandatory fine and education requirement for certain prostitution offenses committed within 500 feet of a school, registered day care or licensed child care facility property; creates fund.

Assembly No. 1740, by Assemblywomen MCKNIGHT, CHAPARRO, DOWNEY, Murphy, Assemblyman Benson, Assemblywomen Reynolds-Jackson and Speight, Housing -- Prohibits late penalties from being made against senior citizen tenants in certain senior citizen rental housing in certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 1741, by Assemblywomen MCKNIGHT, MURPHY and SPEIGHT, Women and Children -- Requires restaurants to provide healthy beverages with meals designated for children.

Assembly No. 1742, by Assemblywomen MCKNIGHT, QUIJANO, CHAPARRO, Reynolds-Jackson and Timberlake, Housing -- Clarifies and expands landlord registration procedures; creates certain rights for tenants; makes certain changes concerning tenant notifications, inspections, and maintenance in multiple dwellings; permits percentage of affordable housing obligation to be satisfied by certain rehabilitation projects.

Assembly No. 1743, by Assemblywomen MCKNIGHT and REYNOLDS-JACKSON, Education -- Establishes three-year pilot program for school-based mentoring in public schools located within 1,000 feet of gunfire.

Assembly No. 1744, by Assemblywomen MCKNIGHT and VAINIERI HUTTLE, Law and Public Safety -- Requires Attorney General to develop program to assist schools in identifying at-risk youths.

Assembly No. 1745, by Assemblywomen MCKNIGHT, REYNOLDS-JACKSON and CHAPARRO, Appropriations -- Provides for voluntary contributions by taxpayers on gross income tax returns to State aid for public schools.

Assembly No. 1746, by Assemblywomen MCKNIGHT and REYNOLDS-JACKSON, Higher Education -- Directs Higher Education Student Assistance Authority to grant deferment of New Jersey College Loans to Assist State Students (NJCLASS) student loan payments to new parent.

Assembly No. 1747, by Assemblywomen MCKNIGHT and JASEY, Education -- Prohibits school district from denying admittance to student due to tardiness or violation of dress code or school uniform policy.

Assembly No. 1748, by Assemblywoman MCKNIGHT, Assemblyman BENSON, Assemblywoman LOPEZ, Assemblymen

CHIARAVALLOTI, Rooney, Assemblywoman Reynolds-Jackson and Assemblyman Karabinchak, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Prohibits transportation network companies from engaging in surge pricing during state of emergency.

Assembly No. 1749, by Assemblywomen MCKNIGHT, VAINIERI HUTTLE, Assemblymen SCHAEER, Karabinchak and Chiaravalloti, Judiciary -- Amends statute that criminalizes display of symbols, objects, or graffiti exposing another to threats of violence to specifically include noose, burning cross, or swastika.

Assembly No. 1750, by Assemblywomen MCKNIGHT, CARTER, SPEIGHT and Reynolds-Jackson, Regulated Professions -- Permits chair or booth rentals for the purpose of providing cosmetology and hairstyling services or ancillary services.

Assembly No. 1751, by Assemblywomen MCKNIGHT, TUCKER, Assemblyman MUKHERJI, Assemblywoman DeCroce and Assemblyman Dancer, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Requires municipalities to designate parking spaces for disabled veterans and Purple Heart recipients.

Assembly No. 1752, by Assemblywoman MCKNIGHT, Law and Public Safety -- Requires signs to be posted and pamphlets to be distributed in emergency rooms regarding VCCO.

Assembly No. 1753, by Assemblywoman MCKNIGHT, Health -- Requires certain hospitals to establish bereavement areas.

Assembly No. 1754, by Assemblywoman MCKNIGHT, Assemblymen DANCER, CAPUTO, Assemblywomen Reynolds-Jackson, Timberlake and Downey, Education -- Requires instruction on cursive handwriting in public school curriculum.

Assembly No. 1755, by Assemblywomen MCKNIGHT, QUIJANO, Assemblyman CHIARAVALLOTI, Assemblywoman CHAPARRO, Assemblymen DeAngelo, Benson, Danielsen, Assemblywomen Murphy, Jimenez and Lopez, Consumer Affairs -- Requires Silver Alert System receive same broadcast alerts as Amber Alert System.

Assembly No. 1756, by Assemblywomen MUNOZ, DeCroce, Schepisi, Assemblymen DiMaio, McGuckin, Clifton, Dancer, Peterson and Webber, State and Local Government -- Prohibits payment to public employees at retirement for certain unused sick leave, provides

for forfeiture of payment for unused sick leave for certain criminal convictions, and requires documentation for use of sick leave.

Assembly No. 1757, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, State and Local Government -- Provides that public employee pension benefits are calculated on base salary exclusive of various forms of extra compensation.

Assembly No. 1758, by Assemblywomen MUNOZ, VAINIERI HUTTLE, QUIJANO, Tucker and Assemblyman Caputo, Human Services -- Concerns stalking and related restraining order protections for adoptive children and their adoptive parents victimized by persons whose parental rights to the adoptive children have been terminated.

Assembly No. 1759, by Assemblywomen MUNOZ, CHAPARRO and Assemblyman Johnson, Higher Education -- Establishes process for county colleges to offer baccalaureate degree nursing programs.

Assembly No. 1760, by Assemblywomen MUNOZ, JASEY, Assemblymen BENSON, COUGHLIN, Assemblywoman Sumter, Assemblymen McKeon, DeAngelo, Assemblywoman Schepisi, Assemblyman Dancer, Assemblywomen Downey, Speight, Assemblymen Mejia, Giblin and Assemblywoman McKnight, Health -- "Consumer Access to Health Care Act"; eliminates requirement of joint protocol with physician for advanced practice nurses to prescribe medication.

Assembly No. 1761, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Assemblymen WIRTHS, Webber, Space and Kean, State and Local Government -- Bars certain employees of certain public agencies from participating in PERS; repeals law permitting PERS and TPAF members on leave who work for labor organization to purchase pension credit.

Assembly No. 1762, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Regulated Professions -- Requires newly licensed registered professional nurse to attain baccalaureate degree in nursing within 10 years of initial licensure as a condition of renewal of the license.

Assembly No. 1763, by Assemblywomen MUNOZ, VAINIERI HUTTLE, DOWNEY, MOSQUERA, LAMPITT, Assemblyman BENSON, Assemblywoman Pinkin, Assemblyman Johnson, Assemblywoman McKnight, Assemblymen McKeon, Wimberly, Houghtaling, Assemblywomen Murphy and Timberlake, Judiciary -- Establishes mandatory domestic violence training for municipal prosecutors.

Assembly No. 1764, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Judiciary -- Provides for a mandatory term of imprisonment for assault involving domestic violence.

Assembly No. 1765, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Judiciary -- Expands types of abusive acts that constitute domestic violence under "Prevention of Domestic Violence Act of 1991."

Assembly No. 1766, by Assemblywomen MUNOZ and JIMENEZ, Judiciary -- Establishes minimum level of domestic violence training for judges and judicial personnel.

Assembly No. 1767, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Judiciary -- Expands domestic violence protection for adoptive parents.

Assembly No. 1768, by Assemblywomen MUNOZ, MOSQUERA, VAINIERI HUTTLE, DOWNEY, Assemblyman Dancer, Assemblywoman Lampitt, Assemblymen Rooney, Houghtaling and Assemblywoman Chaparro, Judiciary -- Establishes "Monica's Law" requiring evidence-based risk assessments in certain domestic violence cases.

Assembly No. 1769, by Assemblywomen MUNOZ, MOSQUERA, Assemblymen GREENWALD, Dancer, Assemblywomen Vainieri Huttle and Murphy, Judiciary -- Requires uniform response procedures for all domestic crisis teams established or participated in by law enforcement agencies, and strengthens Statewide supervision over teams.

Assembly No. 1770, by Assemblywomen MUNOZ, MOSQUERA, DOWNEY, Assemblymen CHIARAVALLOTI, WIMBERLY, Dancer, Assemblywomen Lampitt, Pinkin, Assemblymen Rooney, Houghtaling and Assemblywoman Murphy, Judiciary -- Requires training for law enforcement officers and county prosecutors concerning handling of domestic violence cases.

Assembly No. 1771, by Assemblywomen MUNOZ, VAINIERI HUTTLE, Assemblymen HOLLEY, WIMBERLY, Assemblywoman Mosquera, Assemblymen Chiaravalloti, Rooney, Assemblywoman Downey, Assemblyman McKeon and Assemblywoman Murphy, Judiciary -- Establishes Statewide program to provide treatment services for children exposed to domestic violence.

Assembly No. 1772, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Assemblyman DANCER and Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Judiciary -- Establishes standards for Batterers' Intervention Programs in domestic violence cases.

Assembly No. 1773, by Assemblywomen MUNOZ and JASEY, Higher Education -- Establishes tuition reimbursement program for certain advanced practice nurses who provide mental health care services in underserved areas in New Jersey.

Assembly No. 1774, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Assemblymen SPACE, DiMaio, McGuckin, Kean, Clifton, Bramnick, Peterson and Wirths, Appropriations -- Indexes for inflation taxable income brackets under New Jersey gross income tax.

Assembly No. 1775, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Requires settlement agreements concerning equal employment opportunity to be approved by NJT board of directors.

Assembly No. 1776, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Requires NJT to publish certain safety violations and establish mechanism to report unsafe conduct.

Assembly No. 1777, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Requires NJT to post certain employment and contract information on its website.

Assembly No. 1778, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Community Development and Affairs -- Allocates nondedicated portion of State realty transfer fee collections to municipal property tax relief.

Assembly No. 1779, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, State and Local Government -- Expands eligibility for property tax reimbursement program.

Assembly No. 1780, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Commerce and Economic Development -- Provides a corporation business tax credit for investment in certain manufacturing equipment, facility renovation, modernization, and expansion.

Assembly No. 1781, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Health -- Authorizes psychiatric advanced practice nurses to complete certain certificates required for involuntary commitment to treatment.

Assembly No. 1782, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Commerce and Economic Development -- Reduces number of manufacturing jobs required to qualify for NJEDA financing and incentive programs.

Assembly No. 1783, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Requires NJT to adopt plan to evacuate passengers when rail passenger vehicle becomes immobilized in tunnel.

Assembly No. 1784, by Assemblywomen MUNOZ and DECROCE, Health -- Authorizes visiting advanced practice nurses who are not certified by endorsement in New Jersey to engage in the limited practice of prescribing medications and devices, if they have appropriate educational qualifications.

Assembly No. 1785, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, State and Local Government -- Sets level for health care benefits; requires employee contributions; prohibits reimbursement of Medicare Part B; adds member to SHBP/SEHBP plan design committees; requires retirees to purchase health benefits through exchanges; provides subsidies for out-of-pocket costs.

Assembly No. 1786, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Health -- Provides that biennial renewal of license or certificate issued by New Jersey Board of Nursing is due on professional's birthday.

Assembly No. 1787, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Housing -- Increases and indexes maximum homestead property tax deduction under gross income tax.

Assembly No. 1788, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, State and Local Government -- Permits use of campaign funds to pay for child care expenses when incurred as direct result of campaign activity or holding elective office.

Assembly No. 1789, by Assemblywomen MUNOZ, PINTOR MARIN, DECROCE and Vainieri Huttle, Women and Children -- Requires State entities and agencies to provide child care services for full-time employees.

Assembly No. 1790, by Assemblywomen MUNOZ and DECROCE, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Changes reporting date and certain data requirements for NJT annual report; establishes penalty for failure to issue report in timely manner; and establishes quarterly reporting requirements.

Assembly No. 1791, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Health -- Requires hospitals to establish nurse staffing committees.

Assembly No. 1792, by Assemblymen PETERSON, WEBBER, Assemblywoman Munoz, Assemblymen Space, Bramnick, DePhillips and Wirths, Budget -- Phases out the transfer inheritance tax over two years.

Assembly No. 1793, by Assemblyman PETERSON, Human Services -- Permits tax credit against gross income tax for certain adoption expenses.

Assembly No. 1794, by Assemblyman PETERSON, Judiciary -- Requires foreign corporations providing electronic communication services or remote computing services to comply with New Jersey subpoenas, court orders and search warrants.

Assembly No. 1795, by Assemblymen PETERSON, DANCER, Giblin, Rumpf, Assemblywomen Gove, Schepisi, Assemblyman DeAngelo, Assemblywoman Munoz, Assemblymen Webber and Wimberly, Judiciary -- Revises child pornography law.

Assembly No. 1796, by Assemblymen PETERSON and WEBBER, Higher Education -- Excuses students with conflicts of conscience from certain class requirements of public institutions of higher education.

Assembly No. 1797, by Assemblymen PETERSON and Giblin, Commerce and Economic Development -- Allows New Jersey S corporations to elect to transfer corporation business tax credits to shareholders to apply against the shareholders' gross income tax liability.

Assembly No. 1798, by Assemblymen PETERSON, DiMaio, Space and Wirths, State and Local Government -- Requires municipal governing bodies and boards of education to provide sufficient time for all requested public comment at open public meetings.

Assembly No. 1799, by Assemblymen PETERSON, CONAWAY, McGuckin, DiMaio and Assemblywoman Munoz, Judiciary -- Clarifies that first aid, ambulance or rescue squads, as entities, have immunity from civil damages in certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 1800, by Assemblymen PETERSON, JOHNSON, WIMBERLY and Assemblywoman Tucker, Commerce and Economic Development -- Provides employers with various tax incentives for hiring persons with disabilities under insurance premiums tax, corporation business tax and gross income tax.

Assembly No. 1801, by Assemblymen PETERSON and DEANGELO, State and Local Government -- Authorizes design professionals to self-certify construction plans.

Assembly No. 1802, by Assemblymen PETERSON, WEBBER, THOMSON, McGuckin, Space and Wirths, Law and Public Safety -- Clarifies that chief of police or Superintendent of State Police has

burden of proving applicant's disqualification for permit to purchase handgun or firearms purchaser identification card.

Assembly No. 1803, by Assemblyman PETERSON, Assemblywoman LAMPITT, Assemblymen DANCER, McGuckin, Benson, Coughlin and Assemblywoman Munoz, Judiciary -- Upgrades domestic violence-related assault under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 1804, by Assemblyman PETERSON and Assemblywoman JASEY, Tourism, Gaming and the Arts -- Permits educational organizations to conduct bingo games with prizes for participating students under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 1805, by Assemblymen PETERSON, DANCER, THOMSON and Assemblywoman Munoz, Judiciary -- Provides mandatory minimum term of imprisonment for certain crimes of domestic violence.

Assembly No. 1806, by Assemblymen PETERSON and DiMaio, Labor -- Prohibits employment of illegal aliens and requires use of E-Verify program in public contracts.

Assembly No. 1807, by Assemblymen PETERSON, SPACE, DANIELSEN, McGuckin, DiMaio, Auth, Webber, Kean and Wirths, Law and Public Safety -- Establishes reasonableness standard for persons lawfully transporting firearm who deviate from course of travel.

Assembly No. 1808, by Assemblymen PETERSON and McGuckin, Judiciary -- Provides for an additional aggravating factor in sentencing person who has committed act of domestic violence against certain minors.

Assembly No. 1809, by Assemblymen PETERSON and DIMAIO, Law and Public Safety -- Permits use of LED lights in emergency warning light.

Assembly No. 1810, by Assemblyman PETERSON, Health -- Requires DOH to issue license to provide elective angioplasty services to certain qualifying hospitals located in counties of the third class.

Assembly No. 1811, by Assemblyman PETERSON, Housing -- Specifies just compensation when property is condemned for use by profit-making entity.

Assembly No. 1812, by Assemblyman PETERSON, Assemblywoman CHAPARRO, Assemblyman DIMAIO, Assemblywoman MCKNIGHT, Assemblyman Holley, Assemblywomen Murphy, Munoz, Assemblyman Auth, Assemblywoman Jimenez, Assemblymen Chiaravalloti, Mejia, Caputo, Assemblywomen Reynolds-Jackson, Carter, DiMaso, Assemblymen

Wimberly and Spearman, Judiciary -- Establishes presumption of joint legal and physical custody in child custody matters.

Assembly No. 1813, by Assemblyman PETERSON, Housing -- Requires calculation of need for low and moderate income housing units to be based current percentage of units occupied by low and moderate income individuals or families; revises "Local Redevelopment and Housing Law" to allow for senior citizen housing and community development.

Assembly No. 1814, by Assemblyman PETERSON, Appropriations -- Establishes net operating loss carryback deduction under corporation business tax.

Assembly No. 1815, by Assemblyman PETERSON, Agriculture -- Allows wineries that produce more than 250,000 gallons per year to directly ship certain wines to consumers.

Assembly No. 1816, by Assemblyman PETERSON, Consumer Affairs -- Exempts volunteer fire companies from charitable registration fees.

Assembly No. 1817, by Assemblyman PETERSON, Law and Public Safety -- Allows victims and relatives to witness parole hearings.

Assembly No. 1818, by Assemblyman PETERSON, State and Local Government -- Allows PFRS death benefits to be paid to supplemental needs trust for unmarried disabled child.

Assembly No. 1819, by Assemblymen PETERSON, WIRTHS and Space, State and Local Government -- Permits layoff plans as substitute for employment reconciliation plans for joint meetings or shared service agreements under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 1820, by Assemblyman PETERSON and Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Education -- Requires certain officers of education organizations to sign acknowledgement and undergo training concerning duties to report child abuse.

Assembly No. 1821, by Assemblyman PETERSON and Assemblywoman DeCroce, Judiciary -- Applies statutory ethics and conflicts-of-interest standards for casino industry regulators and participants to regulators of and participants in legalized marijuana marketplace.

Assembly No. 1822, by Assemblyman PETERSON, Law and Public Safety -- Authorizes use of force against intruder in a dwelling under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 1823, by Assemblymen PETERSON, THOMSON, PETERS, Rumpf, Assemblywoman Gove, Assemblyman Auth, Assemblywoman Munoz and Assemblyman McGuckin, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Requires school district to allow graduating student to wear military sash while participating in high school graduation ceremony.

Assembly No. 1824, by Assemblyman PETERSON and Assemblywoman DIMASO, State and Local Government -- Prohibits voter registration of standard driver's license or identification card applicants.

Assembly No. 1825, by Assemblywoman TIMBERLAKE, Labor -- Creates presumption that certain firefighters who develop cancer are eligible for workers' compensation and accidental disability pension.

Assembly No. 1826, by Assemblywoman TIMBERLAKE, Law and Public Safety -- Provides for reduction in suspended sentence, probation, or parole based on compliance with conditions of sentence; requires report on effect on recidivism.

Assembly No. 1827, by Assemblywoman TIMBERLAKE, Labor -- Concerns State-administered retirement savings plan; establishes "Garden State MEP."

Assembly No. 1828, by Assemblywomen TIMBERLAKE, MURPHY and Assemblyman Holley, Labor -- Establishes system for portable benefits for workers who provide services to consumers through contracting agents.

Assembly No. 1829, by Assemblywoman TIMBERLAKE, Budget -- Establishes surplus revenue reserve account in the Property Tax Relief Fund if certain levels of unanticipated gross income tax revenue are collected.

Assembly No. 1830, by Assemblywoman TIMBERLAKE, Assemblymen CAPUTO, GIBLIN, Assemblywomen Tucker and Jasey, Education -- Requires school districts to provide instruction on interacting with law enforcement as part of New Jersey Student Learning Standards in Social Studies.

Assembly No. 1831, by Assemblywomen TIMBERLAKE, TUCKER, Assemblymen MUKHERJI and Giblin, Labor -- Permits reimbursement of COBRA health benefit costs of survivors of certain deceased public safety employees; appropriates \$750,000.

Assembly No. 1832, by Assemblywoman TIMBERLAKE, State and Local Government -- Authorizes local contracting units to establish joint venture and set-aside programs.

Assembly No. 1833, by Assemblywoman TIMBERLAKE, Assemblyman GIBLIN, Assemblywoman TUCKER, Assemblyman CAPUTO, Assemblywomen Jasey, McKnight and Lopez, Consumer Affairs -- Prohibits sale of certain toy guns and imitation firearms.

Assembly No. 1834, by Assemblywomen TIMBERLAKE, TUCKER, REYNOLDS-JACKSON, Assemblymen Caputo, Giblin, Assemblywomen Sumter, McKnight, Assemblyman Wimberly and Assemblywoman Carter, Community Development and Affairs -- Creates "Community Wealth Preservation Program"; expands access for certain buyers to purchase property from sheriff's sales.

Assembly No. 1835, by Assemblywomen TIMBERLAKE, REYNOLDS-JACKSON, SUMTER, Assemblymen Caputo, Giblin, Assemblywomen Speight, McKnight and Assemblyman Wimberly, Housing -- Requires developers of residential housing to provide low, moderate, and middle income housing or pay fee.

Assembly No. 1836, by Assemblywomen TIMBERLAKE, JASEY and VAINIERI HUTTLE, Women and Children -- Requires employer to provide certain accommodations to employee who is breast feeding.

Assembly No. 1837, by Assemblywomen TIMBERLAKE, LAMPITT, VAINIERI HUTTLE, Murphy, Reynolds-Jackson, Speight, Tucker, Mosquera and Downey, Health -- "Listening to Mothers Survey Act"; requires DOH to establish survey to evaluate and improve maternity care access and services.

Assembly No. 1838, by Assemblywoman TIMBERLAKE, Assemblyman ZWICKER, Assemblywomen VAINIERI HUTTLE, McKnight, Lopez and Assemblyman Conaway, Science, Innovation and Technology -- Prohibits online education services from using and disclosing certain information, engaging in targeted advertising, and requires deletion of certain information in certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 1839, by Assemblywomen TIMBERLAKE and VAINIERI HUTTLE, Women and Children -- Requires child abuse

reporting hotline maintained by DCPD to provide information on resources available to victims and families.

Assembly No. 1840, by Assemblywomen TIMBERLAKE and VAINIERI HUTTLE, Health -- Revises requirements for emergency medical services delivery.

Assembly No. 1938, by Assemblywomen DIMASO, MUNOZ, SCHEPISI, Assemblymen Space, DePhillips, Thomson and Wirths, Education -- Requires school district to submit emergency communication policies and protocols to Department of Education for review.

Assembly No. 1939, by Assemblywomen DIMASO, MUNOZ, SCHEPISI, Assemblymen Space, DePhillips, Thomson and Wirths, Education -- Requires DOE to establish online school security resource clearinghouse.

Assembly No. 1940, by Assemblywomen DIMASO, MUNOZ, SCHEPISI, Assemblymen Space, DePhillips, Thomson and Wirths, Education -- Requires Police Training Commission to adopt training course on school emergency response.

Assembly No. 1941, by Assemblywomen DIMASO, MUNOZ, SCHEPISI, Assemblymen Space, DePhillips, Thomson and Wirths, Education -- Requires Commissioner of Education to review school safety and security plans.

Assembly No. 1942, by Assemblywoman DIMASO, State and Local Government -- Revises law governing assessment of real property.

Assembly No. 1943, by Assemblywoman DIMASO, Assemblymen CLIFTON, ZWICKER, Holley, Assemblywomen Carter, Murphy, Assemblyman Giblin, Assemblywoman Chaparro and Assemblyman Dancer, Oversight, Reform and Federal Relations -- Establishes license to allow wineries that produce more than 250,000 gallons per year to directly ship wine to consumers.

Assembly No. 1944, by Assemblywoman DIMASO, Assemblymen THOMSON and JOHNSON, Judiciary -- Affords civil immunity to private colleges and their police officers in certain cases.

Assembly No. 1945, by Assemblywoman DIMASO and Assemblyman CLIFTON, Consumer Affairs -- Requires automatic dialing device callers to disclose certain identifying information.

Assembly No. 1946, by Assemblywoman DIMASO, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Prohibits public utility from increasing rates until conclusion of hearing and BPU determination that rate increase is just and reasonable.

Assembly No. 1947, by Assemblywomen DIMASO, SCHEPISI and Assemblyman DePhillips, Education -- Directs school districts to establish policies and require training for employees on issues regarding child sexual abuse.

Assembly No. 1948, by Assemblywoman DIMASO, Tourism, Gaming and the Arts -- Permits continuation of horse racing and simulcast activities during state of emergency in 2018 notwithstanding deadline for advance notice to New Jersey Racing Commission.

Assembly No. 1949, by Assemblywoman DIMASO, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Requires handicapped parking signs to include non-emergency law enforcement contact number.

Assembly No. 1950, by Assemblywomen DIMASO and Vainieri Huttel, Judiciary -- Permits person admitted into court-ordered supervisory treatment program for drug or alcohol dependency to earn credit against amount owed on certain court-imposed financial obligations.

Assembly No. 1951, by Assemblywomen DIMASO and VAINIERI HUTTLE, Law and Public Safety -- Requires signs to be posted in emergency rooms regarding Victims of Crime Compensation Office.

Assembly No. 1952, by Assemblywoman DIMASO, State and Local Government -- Prohibits bill certified for fiscal note or estimate from being released from committee without fiscal note or estimate.

Assembly No. 1953, by Assemblywoman DIMASO, State and Local Government -- Provides that certain persons holding public office or employment who enter into certain civil settlement agreements with public entity will forfeit public office or employment.

Assembly No. 1954, by Assemblywoman DIMASO, Agriculture -- Establishes certain animal abuse offenses committed in manner manifesting extreme indifference to value of animal's life as crime of second degree; designated as "River's Law."

Assembly No. 1955, by Assemblywoman DIMASO, Law and Public Safety -- Allows certain qualifying projects to sell alcoholic beverages.

Assembly No. 1956, by Assemblywoman DIMASO, State and Local Government -- Provides that persons entering into civil settlement agreement with State entity must make full restitution; elected officials and employees with fiduciary or contracting responsibilities entering into such agreement will forfeit public office or employment.

Assembly No. 1957, by Assemblywomen DIMASO, LOPEZ and VAINIERI HUTTLE, Judiciary -- Authorizes award of monetary compensation, including attorney fees, to persons who obtain final orders under the "Sexual Assault Survivor Protection Act of 2015."

Assembly No. 1958, by Assemblywoman DIMASO, Agriculture -- Criminalizes impounding cat or dog in shelter, pound or kennel without consent of other party.

Assembly No. 1959, by Assemblywoman DIMASO and Assemblyman THOMSON, Community Development and Affairs -- Establishes program providing grants for Superstorm Sandy recovery in exchange for reduction of affordable housing obligation.

Assembly No. 1960, by Assemblywomen DIMASO, VAINIERI HUTTLE and Assemblyman DANCER, Judiciary -- Increases penalties for purposely desecrating any public monument, insignia, symbol, or structure, or place of worship or burial.

Assembly No. 1961, by Assemblywomen DIMASO and VAINIERI HUTTLE, Education -- "Madalyn's Law"; requires school districts to incorporate age-appropriate instruction on toxic shock syndrome and requires installation of signage in certain women's rooms to enhance public awareness of toxic shock syndrome.

Assembly No. 1962, by Assemblywoman PINKIN, Assemblymen COUGHLIN and DEANGELO, Law and Public Safety -- Creates white collar crime registry.

Assembly No. 1963, by Assemblywoman PINKIN, Assemblyman WEBBER, Assemblywomen MOSQUERA, DOWNEY, Assemblymen Danielsen and Clifton, Higher Education -- Prohibits public institutions of higher education from increasing resident undergraduate and graduate tuition and fees by more than 4% over the prior academic year.

Assembly No. 1964, by Assemblywoman PINKIN, Assemblyman MCKEON, Assemblywomen SUMTER, LAMPITT, VAINIERI HUTTLE, Assemblymen WIMBERLY, Coughlin, Assemblywoman Schepisi, Assemblyman Johnson, Assemblywoman Mosquera, Assemblyman Schaer, Assemblywomen Murphy, Tucker, Jimenez, Downey, Lopez, Assemblyman Rooney and Assemblywoman McKnight, Judiciary -- Establishes certain requirements for domestic violence training for certain judges and judicial personnel.

Assembly No. 1965, by Assemblywomen PINKIN and MURPHY, Homeland Security and State Preparedness -- Requires certain community residential facilities have standby emergency power generators.

Assembly No. 1966, by Assemblywoman PINKIN, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- Revises affidavit of merit requirement in professional malpractice cases.

Assembly No. 1967, by Assemblywomen PINKIN, MOSQUERA, Assemblyman BENSON, Assemblywoman JASEY, Assemblyman Johnson and Assemblywoman Reynolds-Jackson, Women and Children -- Establishes brain injury screening and education program in DCF.

Assembly No. 1968, by Assemblywoman PINKIN and Assemblyman Calabrese, Science, Innovation and Technology -- Provides gross income tax deduction for costs of certain green home improvements that increase building systems resiliency.

Assembly No. 1969, by Assemblywomen PINKIN, MURPHY, VAINIERI HUTTLE, McKnight, Mosquera, Swain, Lopez and Jasey,

Women and Children -- Requires lactation rooms be made available at certain PANYNJ airports.

Assembly No. 1970, by Assemblywoman PINKIN and Assemblyman ZWICKER, Higher Education -- Adds two student representatives to board of governors of Rutgers University.

Assembly No. 1971, by Assemblywoman PINKIN, Assemblymen CONAWAY and KARABINCHAK, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Directs BPU to develop and implement electric school bus pilot program.

Assembly No. 1972, by Assemblywoman PINKIN, Assemblyman CONAWAY, Assemblywoman DECROCE, Assemblymen Benson, Houghtaling and Assemblywoman Downey, Health -- "Ensuring Transparency in Prior Authorization Act."

Assembly No. 1973, by Assemblywoman PINKIN, Science, Innovation and Technology -- Increases tax credit provided for qualified investments under "New Jersey Angel Investor Tax Credit Act"; provides additional incentive to businesses located in certain enterprise zones.

Assembly No. 1974, by Assemblywoman PINKIN, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Requires BPU and electric public utilities to conduct energy storage analysis.

Assembly No. 1975, by Assemblywoman PINKIN, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Allows 50 percent credit against societal benefits charge to electric or gas public utility customers who install and maintain publicly available zero emission vehicle charging stations.

Assembly No. 1976, by Assemblywoman PINKIN, Environment and Solid Waste -- Authorizes NJ Infrastructure Bank to issue up to \$20 million in bonds to finance cost-effective energy efficiency improvements in State, local, and school district buildings.

Assembly No. 1977, by Assemblywomen PINKIN, PINTOR MARIN, Assemblymen DEANGELO, Benson, Holley, Assemblywoman Murphy, Assemblyman Conaway, Assemblywoman McKnight, Assemblymen Schaer, Tully and Assemblywoman Swain, Environment and Solid Waste -- Requires DOE and DCF to establish online reporting systems for schools and child care centers to report lead testing results.

Assembly No. 1978, by Assemblywoman PINKIN, Assemblymen KENNEDY, MCKEON, Conaway, Assemblywoman Vainieri Huttle, Assemblyman Calabrese, Assemblywomen Jasey, Carter, Downey, Assemblymen Caputo, Holley and Houghtaling, Environment and Solid Waste -- Prohibits use of plastic carryout bags, expanded polystyrene, and single-use plastic straws.

Assembly No. 1979, by Assemblywomen PINKIN, LOPEZ, Assemblyman KENNEDY, Assemblywoman Murphy, Assemblyman Holley, Assemblywomen Swain, McKnight and Assemblyman Verrelli, Environment and Solid Waste -- Requires paint producers to implement or participate in paint stewardship program.

Assembly No. 1980, by Assemblywoman PINKIN, Health -- Revises access and reporting requirements for New Jersey Immunization Information System.

Assembly No. 1981, by Assemblywomen PINKIN, LOPEZ, VAINIERI HUTTLE, Assemblymen Kennedy and Calabrese, Environment and Solid Waste -- Establishes "Plastic Pollution Task Force" to study ways to reduce and address plastic pollution.

Assembly No. 1982, by Assemblywomen PINKIN, LOPEZ, MCKNIGHT, Reynolds-Jackson, Vainieri Huttle, Pintor Marin, Assemblymen Tully, Conaway, Danielsen, Mukherji, Kennedy, Assemblywomen Sumter, Tucker, Jasey, Assemblyman McKeon, Assemblywomen Swain, Carter and Assemblyman Zwicker, Women and Children -- Requires certain corporations to appoint women to board of directors.

Assembly No. 1983, by Assemblywoman PINKIN, Assemblyman KARABINCHAK and Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, State and Local Government -- Requires New Jersey election officials to coordinate with relevant federal officials regarding election security.

Assembly No. 1984, by Assemblywoman PINKIN, Assemblyman KARABINCHAK and Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, State and Local Government -- Requires election equipment to be stored in secure facility.

Assembly No. 1985, by Assemblywoman PINKIN, Assemblymen KARABINCHAK and DANCER, Higher Education -- Expands volunteer tuition credit program to volunteers and eligible dependents enrolled in four-year public institutions of higher education and increases maximum value of tuition credit.

Assembly No. 1986, by Assemblywoman PINKIN, Assemblyman CONAWAY and Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- Prohibits preauthorization of certain ultrasound screenings covered under health benefits plans.

Assembly No. 1987, by Assemblywoman PINKIN, Regulated Professions -- Establishes limited medical license for retired physicians.

Assembly No. 1988, by Assemblywoman PINKIN, Assemblymen MUKHERJI, CONAWAY and Karabinchak, Regulated Professions -- Provides that average time to issue licenses to physicians shall not exceed 51 days.

Assembly No. 1989, by Assemblywoman PINKIN and Assemblyman CONAWAY, Health -- Revises effective date of P.L.2017, c.283 concerning licensure of one-room surgical practices.

Assembly No. 1990, by Assemblywoman PINKIN, Assemblyman KARABINCHAK, Assemblywoman LOPEZ and Assemblyman Dancer, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Requires newly-manufactured school buses to be equipped with global positioning system.

Assembly No. 1991, by Assemblywomen PINKIN and QUIJANO, Judiciary -- Directs AOC to establish training for judges concerning sexually violent offenses.

Assembly No. 1992, by Assemblywoman PINKIN, Assemblymen CONAWAY and HOUGHTALING, Health -- Establishes "NJ One Health Task Force."

Assembly No. 1993, by Assemblywoman PINKIN, Environment and Solid Waste -- Requires developers to offer electric vehicle charging stations as option in certain new home construction.

Assembly No. 1994, by Assemblywoman PINKIN, Assemblymen KARABINCHAK and CAPUTO, Education -- Establishes pilot program in which certain selected school districts equip school buses with global positioning systems and DOE develops school bus tracking application.

Assembly No. 1995, by Assemblywoman PINKIN, State and Local Government -- Requires registration of international student exchange visitor placement organizations with Secretary of State.

Assembly No. 1996, by Assemblymen BRAMNICK, WEBBER, Space, Wirths and Assemblywoman Munoz, State and Local Government -- Increases amount of, and income limit for eligibility to receive, senior citizens' and disabled persons' property tax deduction.

Assembly No. 1997, by Assemblyman BRAMNICK, Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Assemblymen Space and Wirths, State and Local Government -- Expands duties of State Auditor to include performance audits at request of legislator; establishes Performance Audit Committee, consisting of eight public members, to help conduct performance audits.

Assembly No. 1998, by Assemblyman BRAMNICK, State and Local Government -- Requires ballot question on approval of State bond issue to disclose total amount of debt of State or other entity, debt service on which is funded through annual State appropriation.

Assembly No. 1999, by Assemblymen BRAMNICK, MAZZEO, ROONEY, Space and Wirths, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Makes desecration of a military monument a crime of the third degree.

Assembly No. 2001, by Assemblyman BRAMNICK, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- Allows physicians to jointly negotiate with carriers over contractual terms and conditions.

Assembly No. 2002, by Assemblymen BRAMNICK, PETERSON and Wirths, Commerce and Economic Development -- Eliminates minimum corporation business tax on New Jersey S corporations.

Assembly No. 2003, by Assemblyman BRAMNICK and Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Judiciary -- Makes all persons convicted of sexual assault subject to the No Early Release Act; specifies that any use of force elevates sexual assault to aggravated sexual assault.

Assembly No. 2004, by Assemblymen BRAMNICK, Webber, Assemblywoman Munoz, Assemblymen Space, Kean and Wirths, Budget -- Reduces gross income tax rates by ten percent over three years.

Assembly No. 2005, by Assemblyman BRAMNICK, Assemblywomen SUMTER, Jimenez and Munoz, Consumer Affairs -- Requires notice prior to lapse of life insurance policy due to nonpayment of premium.

Assembly No. 2006, by Assemblymen BRAMNICK, DEANGELO, WEBBER, DANIELSEN, McKeon, Peterson, Assemblywoman Chaparro and Assemblyman Benson, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Allows military member to qualify for resident tuition rate at county college.

Assembly No. 2007, by Assemblymen BRAMNICK, BURZICHELLI and Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Agriculture -- Requires DEP to establish "private wildlife habitat certification program"; creates affirmative defense against municipal nuisance ordinances for properties certified under the program.

Assembly No. 2008, by Assemblymen BRAMNICK, Space and Wirths, Commerce and Economic Development -- Requires Director of Division of Taxation to study impact of State business income taxes on business out-migration, business formation, and employment.

Assembly No. 2009, by Assemblyman BRAMNICK and Assemblywoman SCHEPISI, State and Local Government -- Requires disclosure by independent expenditure groups; limits contributions to certain groups and committees performing public contracts; increases limits on contributions to political parties and candidates.

Assembly No. 2010, by Assemblyman BRAMNICK, State and Local Government -- Requires Governor and legislative leaders to meet together quarterly.

Assembly No. 2011, by Assemblymen BRAMNICK, Space and Assemblywoman Munoz, Transportation and Independent Authorities - - Authorizes Commissioner of Transportation to allow painting of blue line between double yellow centerline marking on public roads.

Assembly No. 2012, by Assemblyman BRAMNICK and Assemblywoman CARTER, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- "New Jersey Respect for Physicians Act;" requires prompt response by insurers to requests for prior authorization of health care services.

Assembly No. 2013, by Assemblymen BRAMNICK, Space and Wirths, State and Local Government -- Imposes daily fine of \$250 upon each member of Legislature during state of emergency due to failure to enact annual appropriations law.

Assembly No. 2014, by Assemblymen BRAMNICK and THOMSON, Appropriations -- Provides gross income tax deduction for certain donated vehicles.

Assembly No. 2015, by Assemblyman BRAMNICK, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- Provides that limitation on lawsuit option does not apply in accident caused by drunk driver.

Assembly No. 2016, by Assemblyman BRAMNICK, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- Requires motor vehicle insurance policies to include certain underinsured and uninsured motorist coverage.

Assembly No. 2017, by Assemblyman BRAMNICK, Assemblywomen DECROCE and Munoz, Housing -- Reforms procedures concerning provision of affordable housing; repeals "Statewide Non-Residential Development Fee Act."

Assembly No. 2018, by Assemblyman BRAMNICK, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Requires Petroleum Products Gross Receipts Tax rate reduction if certain Legislative action is taken that includes increases in other State tax rates and revenue; dedicates revenues from certain sales and use tax increases to "Transportation Trust Fund Account."

Assembly No. 2019, by Assemblyman BRAMNICK and Assemblywoman DECROCE, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Requires transportation capital project and infrastructure safety inspections to continue if emergency is declared due to failure to enact general appropriation law as prescribed by State Constitution.

Assembly No. 2020, by Assemblyman BRAMNICK, Assemblywomen DECROCE, MUNOZ and Assemblyman Auth, Housing -- Establishes "Commission on Statewide Affordable Housing Obligations" to determine Statewide need for low and moderate income housing.

Assembly No. 2021, by Assemblymen BRAMNICK, DANCER, Moriarty, DePhillips and Assemblywoman Munoz, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- Prohibits pre-approval or precertification of medical tests, procedures and prescription drugs covered under health benefits or prescription drug benefits plans.

Assembly No. 2022, by Assemblymen BRAMNICK, MORIARTY, Assemblywomen VAINIERI HUTTLE, Murphy, Assemblymen Caputo, Dancer and Assemblywoman Munoz, Health -- Prohibits pre-approval or precertification of cancer treatments, tests, procedures and prescription drugs covered under health benefits or prescription drug benefits plans.

Assembly No. 2023, by Assemblymen BRAMNICK and MORIARTY, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- "Health Insurance Claim Plain Language and Simplification Act."

Assembly No. 2024, by Assemblyman BRAMNICK, Assemblywomen VAINIERI HUTTLE and Munoz, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- Prohibits pre-approval or precertification of prenatal ultrasound screenings covered under health benefits plans.

Assembly No. 2025, by Assemblymen BRAMNICK and DANCER, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- Requires fee for filing or recording partnership's statement to be standard and not vary depending on number of partners.

Assembly No. 2026, by Assemblyman BRAMNICK, Assemblywoman MUNOZ and Assemblyman DANCER, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Permits veterans, for civil service purposes, to be defined as a veteran or disabled veteran under federal or State definition of veteran.

Assembly No. 2027, by Assemblyman BRAMNICK, Assemblywoman CARTER, Assemblyman ROONEY and Assemblywoman Vainieri Huttle, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- "Emma's Law"; requires school buses that transport students with special needs to be equipped with certain safety features.

Assembly No. 2028, by Assemblymen BRAMNICK and DEPHILLIPS, State and Local Government -- Requires voter who wishes to vote by mail to complete application for mail-in ballot each calendar year; repeals automatic vote-by-mail designation.

Assembly No. 2029, by Assemblyman BRAMNICK and Assemblywoman MUNOZ, State and Local Government -- Creates the "Local Unit Audit Teams" program in the Department of the Treasury.

Assembly No. 2030, by Assemblywoman PINTOR MARIN, Commerce and Economic Development -- "Port Support Zone Act of 2015."

Assembly No. 2031, by Assemblywomen PINTOR MARIN and SUMTER, Education -- Requires that school district's request for permission to use unrecognized position title include list of abolished positions and positions in which there have been layoffs and detailed job descriptions for them.

Assembly No. 2032, by Assemblywomen PINTOR MARIN, QUIJANO and CHAPARRO, Health -- Requires registration, inspection, testing, cleaning, and disinfection of cooling towers to control outbreaks of Legionnaire's Disease.

Assembly No. 2033, by Assemblywoman PINTOR MARIN, State and Local Government -- Requires State to reimburse counties for portion of holiday pay to county employees performing State services on certain holidays.

Assembly No. 2034, by Assemblywoman PINTOR MARIN, State and Local Government -- Decreases from 55 days to 21 days minimum time required to change political party affiliation prior to primary.

Assembly No. 2035, by Assemblywoman PINTOR MARIN, Labor -- Allows for sharing of family leave benefits between covered individuals under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 2036, by Assemblywoman PINTOR MARIN, State and Local Government -- Adjusts identification of first class cities and certain counties that may have certain unclassified positions in civil service to reflect 2010 federal census.

Assembly No. 2037, by Assemblywomen PINTOR MARIN, LAMPITT, Assemblyman BENSON, Assemblywomen VAINIERI HUTTLE, Mosquera and Murphy, Women and Children -- Requires various State departments to provide linkages to information on "baby boxes" and safe sleep education on their websites.

Assembly No. 2038, by Assemblywoman PINTOR MARIN, Assemblyman MUKHERJI, Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Assemblyman DANCER, Assemblywomen Chaparro and Timberlake, Judiciary -- Provides for civil actions against persons or entities profiting from commission of human trafficking offenses, or maintaining victims of such offenses.

Assembly No. 2039, by Assemblywoman PINTOR MARIN, State and Local Government -- Allows municipalities to adjust deadline to apply for short-term exemption or abatement for dwellings; requires provision of notice to purchasers of dwellings in areas in need of rehabilitation under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 2040, by Assemblywoman PINTOR MARIN, Judiciary -- Clarifies charitable role of health service corporations, revises membership of board of directors, establishes process to determine efficient level of surplus, and requires timely publication of certain information by DOBI.

Assembly No. 2041, by Assemblywoman PINTOR MARIN, Judiciary -- Upgrades crime of endangering person with a disability or elderly person.

Assembly No. 2042, by Assemblywomen PINTOR MARIN and SUMTER, Judiciary -- "Personal Injury Trust Fund Transparency Act;" requires plaintiff to file personal injury trust claims under certain circumstances; addresses allocation of trust claims; establishes scheduling and discovery requirements for certain tort actions.

Assembly No. 2043, by Assemblywoman PINTOR MARIN and Assemblyman CALABRESE, Financial Institutions and Insurance --

Requires provisions regarding sellers' obligation to deliver marketable and insurable title in certain residential real estate contracts of sale.

Assembly No. 2044, by Assemblywoman PINTOR MARIN, Environment and Solid Waste -- Requires owner or operator of industrial establishment applying for de minimis exemption from "Industrial Site Recovery Act" to certify as to no actual knowledge of contamination exceeding remediation standards.

Assembly No. 2045, by Assemblywoman PINTOR MARIN, State and Local Government -- Applies local public contract bid threshold amounts to local pay to play and prevailing wage laws.

Assembly No. 2046, by Assemblywoman PINTOR MARIN, Assemblymen DEANGELO and MUKHERJI, Education -- Authorizes executive county superintendent of schools to require implementation of shared services arrangements.

Assembly No. 2047, by Assemblywoman PINTOR MARIN and Assemblyman GIBLIN, Health -- Revises criteria for payment of charity care to certain hospitals.

Assembly No. 2052, by Assemblywomen PINTOR MARIN, MOSQUERA, DOWNEY and Lampitt, Human Services -- Revises State marriage license application form to permit certain changes in middle name and surname.

Assembly No. 2053, by Assemblywoman PINTOR MARIN, Commerce and Economic Development -- Changes eligibility requirements and benefits under Grow New Jersey Assistance Program; extends program application deadline.

Assembly No. 2054, by Assemblywoman PINTOR MARIN, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Upgrades crime of theft of scrap metal from transportation system.

Assembly No. 2060, by Assemblywomen PINTOR MARIN, MUNOZ and Assemblyman SCHAEER, State and Local Government -- Allows public office holder or candidate to use political contributions to pay for child care expenses related to office or campaign activities.

Assembly No. 2162, by Assemblymen MUKHERJI, JOHNSON, CHIARAVALLOTI and Assemblywoman Chaparro, Law and Public Safety -- Establishes "MarcAnthony's Law;" criminalizes use of defaced or stolen firearm to injure a police officer; enhances penalties for defacing a firearm.

Assembly No. 2165, by Assemblyman MUKHERJI and Assemblywoman CHAPARRO, Housing -- Permits up to seven dollar increase in surcharge for document recordation with county in support of county homelessness housing trust funds.

Assembly No. 2166, by Assemblyman MUKHERJI, Assemblywomen CHAPARRO, JIMENEZ, MCKNIGHT, Assemblymen CHIARAVALLOTI, Zwicker and Dancer, State and Local Government -- Permits voter to take photograph of own voted ballot and share it on Internet-based social media.

Assembly No. 2167, by Assemblyman MUKHERJI and Assemblywoman CHAPARRO, Law and Public Safety -- Upgrades

simple assault to aggravated assault if committed against crossing guard or parking enforcement officer.

Assembly No. 2168, by Assemblymen MUKHERJI and CHIARAVALLOTI, Education -- Requires high schools to offer computer science course.

Assembly No. 2169, by Assemblyman MUKHERJI, Assemblywomen CHAPARRO, QUIJANO, PINTOR MARIN and Assemblyman Kennedy, Homeland Security and State Preparedness -- Establishes program to reimburse local governments for federal grant funds lost due to "sanctuary jurisdiction" status.

Assembly No. 2170, by Assemblyman MUKHERJI, Assemblywomen SUMTER, Vainieri Huttle, Assemblymen BENSON, DeAngelo and Assemblywoman Chaparro, Higher Education -- Allows students to use certain grant awards during summer session.

Assembly No. 2177, by Assemblymen MUKHERJI and DEANGELO, Oversight, Reform and Federal Relations -- Increases craft distillery production limits; eliminates tour requirement for on-premises consumption; permits sale of snacks on craft distillery premises.

Assembly No. 2178, by Assemblyman MUKHERJI, Law and Public Safety -- Provides for issuance of certificate of rehabilitation to certain offenders with substance abuse disorders.

Assembly No. 2179, by Assemblyman MUKHERJI, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- Requires 90 days' notice of cancellation or nonrenewal of stop loss insurance for small employer health benefits plans.

Assembly No. 2227, by Assemblyman DANCER, Women and Children -- Requires certain psychiatric facilities to contact Division of Child Protection and Permanency if minor is to be discharged and parent or guardian is unable or unwilling to remove minor from facility.

Assembly No. 2228, by Assemblymen DANCER, Auth, Peterson, Space, DiMaio, Kean, Assemblywoman DeCroce, Assemblymen Wirths, Webber and DePhillips, Women and Children -- "Pain-Capable Unborn Child Protection Act"; bans abortion 20 weeks or more after fertilization.

Assembly No. 2229, by Assemblymen DANCER, WEBBER and Giblin, Judiciary -- Requires persons convicted of sex offense in foreign countries to comply with Megan's Law.

Assembly No. 2230, by Assemblyman DANCER, Agriculture -- Establishes restrictions and conditions for certain owners of preserved farmland to reacquire development rights for limited area of preserved farmland.

Assembly No. 2231, by Assemblyman DANCER, Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE and Assemblyman Benson, Education -- Establishes pilot program in DOE to provide assistive technology to elementary and middle school students with dyslexia and related conditions.

Assembly No. 2232, by Assemblyman DANCER and Assemblywoman DOWNEY, Labor -- Prohibits medical providers from reporting certain workers' compensation medical charges to collection and credit reporting agencies.

Assembly No. 2243, by Assemblyman DANCER, Judiciary -- Prohibits student who commits certain sexual offenses from attending same school building or using same school bus as victim of offense.

Assembly No. 2244, by Assemblyman DANCER, Assemblywomen MURPHY, TUCKER, Assemblymen Peterson, Kean, Assemblywoman Schepisi, Assemblymen Rooney, Wirths, Space, Karabinchak, Houghtaling, Johnson, Assemblywomen Gove, Pinkin and Assemblyman Rumpf, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Revises provisions of State law concerning claiming and proper disposal of remains of veterans and eligible spouses or dependents.

Assembly No. 2245, by Assemblyman DANCER, Human Services - Establishes procedures for involuntary civil commitment of children.

Assembly No. 2246, by Assemblyman DANCER, Assemblywoman PINKIN, Assemblymen Space, Wirths and Assemblywoman DiMasio, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Requires Adjutant General of DMVA to issue State flag to resident enrolling in federal service academy.

Assembly No. 2247, by Assemblyman DANCER and Assemblywoman MURPHY, Tourism, Gaming and the Arts -- Prohibits requirement of advance notice to New Jersey Racing Commission in order to continue horse racing and simulcast activities during state of emergency.

Assembly No. 2248, by Assemblyman DANCER, Judiciary -- Expands pretrial risk assessment to include acquittals for reasons of insanity.

Assembly No. 2249, by Assemblyman DANCER, Housing -- Provides that certain affordable manufactured home communities are inherently beneficial uses.

Assembly No. 2250, by Assemblymen DANCER, WEBBER and McGuckin, Judiciary -- Requires person convicted, or fleeing charge, of sex offense in foreign country to register under Megan's Law; requires law enforcement to inquire about immigration status of sex offenders and cooperate with federal immigration authorities.

Assembly No. 2251, by Assemblyman DANCER, Women and Children -- Requires DCF to establish certain training protocols for staff of children crisis intervention service units and screening centers.

Assembly No. 2254, by Assemblyman DANCER, Health -- Provides medical cannabis is not subject to State sales tax.

Assembly No. 2255, by Assemblyman DANCER, State and Local Government -- Requires both paper and automatic voter registration process at agency or office providing hunting, fishing, or trapping license.

Assembly No. 2256, by Assemblyman DANCER, Tourism, Gaming and the Arts -- Requires continuation of live horse racing for standardbred racetracks holding sports wagering license.

Assembly No. 2257, by Assemblyman DANCER, Education -- Provides emergency State school aid to certain school districts located in historic communities.

Assembly No. 2258, by Assemblyman DANCER, Education -- Establishes pilot program in DOE to use therapy dogs in public elementary school wellness programs.

Assembly No. 2259, by Assemblyman DANCER, Human Services - - "Integrated Co-occurring Treatment Facility Construction Bond Act," authorizes bonds for \$100,000,000 for facilities that treat substance abuse and psychiatric disorders, and appropriates \$5,000.

Assembly No. 2261, by Assemblyman DANCER, Tourism, Gaming and the Arts -- Establishes fund to care for retired horses and improve track safety.

Assembly No. 2262, by Assemblyman DANCER, Health -- Requires certain businesses to notify customers about availability of no-cost help with applying for public assistance programs.

Assembly No. 2263, by Assemblymen THOMSON and BRAMNICK, Labor -- Establishes training wage.

Assembly Concurrent Resolution No. 11, by Assemblymen SPACE, WIRTHS and Webber, Budget -- Amends Constitution to require that State tax bills pass both Houses of Legislature by three-fifths majority vote.

Assembly Concurrent Resolution No. 12, by Assemblymen SPACE, MCKEON and Wirths, Judiciary -- Proposes constitutional amendment removing gubernatorial appointment of certain municipal court judges.

Assembly No. 2342, by Assemblyman MORIARTY, Health -- Requires each hospital board of trustees to adopt a written policy governing conflicts of interest.

Assembly No. 2343, by Assemblyman THOMSON, Education -- Prohibits public school fund-raising activities which include unsupervised door-to-door sales by students.

Assembly No. 2344, by Assemblyman MORIARTY, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Requires motorcycle passengers to be 10 years of age or older.

Assembly No. 2345, by Assemblyman THOMSON, Law and Public Safety -- Grants full police status to special agents in the Department of the Treasury; authorizes special agents to carry firearms at all times.

Assembly No. 2346, by Assemblyman MORIARTY, State and Local Government -- Prohibits employees of certain organizations from enrolling in State-administered retirement system or health care plan of public employer.

Assembly No. 2347, by Assemblyman MORIARTY, Budget -- Prohibits investment by State of pension and annuity funds in hedge funds and derivative contracts.

Assembly No. 2348, by Assemblyman MOEN, State and Local Government -- Requires availability of free parking at polling places on Election Day.

Assembly No. 2349, by Assemblyman MOEN, Science, Innovation and Technology -- The "New Jersey Social Innovation Act"; establishes social innovation loan pilot program and study commission within EDA.

Assembly No. 2350, by Assemblyman VERRELLI, Law and Public Safety -- Establishes program allowing certain applicants to perform community service in lieu of paying motor vehicle surcharges.

Assembly No. 2351, by Assemblyman DANCER, Health -- "Informed Consent for Vaccination Act"; revises requirements for administration of vaccines to patients.

Assembly No. 2352, by Assemblyman DANCER, State and Local Government -- Permits fire districts to undertake capital projects upon resolution of board of fire commissioners.

Assembly No. 2353, by Assemblyman DANCER, Law and Public Safety -- Establishes identity check for suspects taken into custody on warrants.

Assembly No. 2354, by Assemblyman DANCER, Labor -- Requires certain physicians to perform examination for potential brain injury related to workers' compensation award; requires Commissioner of Labor and Workforce Development to mandate brain injury training and protocol for employers and insurance carriers.

Assembly No. 2355, by Assemblyman DANCER, Tourism, Gaming and the Arts -- Allows State residents who are outside of New Jersey to place wagers on horse races using account wagering system.

Assembly No. 2356, by Assemblyman DANCER, Education -- Excludes from gross income tax income received by student-athletes for use of their name, image, or likeness.

Assembly No. 2357, by Assemblyman DANCER, Law and Public Safety -- "Laci and Connor's Law," creates the offense of fetal homicide.

Assembly No. 2358, by Assemblyman DANCER, State and Local Government -- Creates Open Public Records Act Study Commission.

Assembly No. 2359, by Assemblyman DANCER, Education -- Provides supplemental appropriation to DOE to provide additional State aid to certain school districts.

Assembly No. 2360, by Assemblywoman CHAPARRO, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Requires electric public utility to charge residential rate for service used for electric vehicle charging by residential unit owners in planned real estate developments.

Assembly No. 2361, by Assemblyman DANCER, Law and Public Safety -- Allows places of worship to establish security program to select one person to carry handgun during religious services.

Assembly No. 2362, by Assemblyman DANCER, Housing -- Requires limited liability company to disclose ownership information when submitting deed for recording.

Assembly No. 2363, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Human Services -- Requires one member of board in charge of institution for persons with mental illness or developmental disability to be family member of resident.

Assembly No. 2364, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Regulated Professions -- Creates certain reporting standards for massage

and bodywork therapists, establishes parental permission standards for services to clients under 18.

Assembly No. 2365, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE and Assemblyman JOHNSON, Senior Services -- Makes supplemental appropriation of \$1,500,000 for Bright Side Manor in Teaneck to fund capital improvement costs.

Assembly No. 2367, by Assemblyman JOHNSON, Homeland Security and State Preparedness -- "Swift Access For Emergency Response Actions Preservation Program (SAFER APP)"; authorizes Attorney General to order turn-by-turn navigation systems to reroute vehicular traffic under certain conditions.

Assembly No. 2368, by Assemblyman SCHAER, Education -- Makes supplemental appropriation of \$15,100,000 from General Fund to DOE to increase per pupil funding for nonpublic security aid from \$150 to \$250.

Assembly No. 2370, by Assemblyman SCHAER, Law and Public Safety -- Establishes compassionate release program for certain inmates; repeals law that establishes medical parole.

Assembly No. 2372, by Assemblyman SCHAER, Budget -- Makes FY 2020 supplemental appropriation of \$10 million for New Jersey Nonprofit Security Grant Pilot Program.

Assembly No. 2373, by Assemblyman TALIAFERRO, Judiciary -- "Linnette Lebron's Law"; modifies procedures for marriage or civil union where a party is terminally ill.

Assembly No. 2375, by Assemblywoman PINKIN, Higher Education -- Allows gross income tax deduction for certain donations to the Rutgers University Foundation.

Assembly No. 2376, by Assemblywoman PINKIN, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Requires municipality to provide free beach access to certain veterans.

Assembly No. 2377, by Assemblywoman PINKIN, State and Local Government -- Requires distribution of homestead benefits on or before October 31 of the State fiscal year during which an appropriation is made.

Assembly No. 2378, by Assemblywoman PINKIN, Health -- Requires pharmacies to effectuate drug discontinuation orders.

Assembly No. 2379, by Assemblywoman PINKIN, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Excludes permit applications for construction of certain pipelines and related infrastructure from eligibility for automatic approval if DEP fails to take action on application within 90 days.

Assembly No. 2380, by Assemblywoman PINKIN, Regulated Professions -- Pertains to certain review and approval responsibilities of land surveyors.

Assembly No. 2381, by Assemblyman WIMBERLY, Law and Public Safety -- Requires blood sample to be obtained from driver involved in motor vehicle accident resulting in death; designated as "Michelle Sous' Law."

Assembly No. 2382, by Assemblyman WIMBERLY, Consumer Affairs -- Restricts use of motorized skateboards.

Assembly No. 2383, by Assemblyman WIMBERLY, Education -- Raises age requirement of compulsory school attendance from 16 to 18 years old.

Assembly No. 2384, by Assemblyman WIMBERLY, Law and Public Safety -- Imposes certain requirements on use of automated license plate readers by law enforcement agencies.

Assembly No. 2385, by Assemblyman WIMBERLY, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Requires Commissioner of Transportation to publish notice of certain transportation-related infrastructure projects and activities on Internet website, and directs State Comptroller to monitor publication of those notifications.

Assembly No. 2386, by Assemblyman WIMBERLY, Law and Public Safety -- "State Law Enforcement Officers' Bill of Rights."

Assembly No. 2387, by Assemblyman WIMBERLY, Education -- Provides that child study team members may be employees of the school district or of a DOE approved agency or clinic.

Assembly No. 2388, by Assemblyman WIMBERLY, Education -- Assigns financial responsibility of educating homeless student to district of attendance.

Assembly No. 2389, by Assemblyman WIMBERLY, Consumer Affairs -- Clarifies and codifies certain inflatable ride safety requirements.

Assembly No. 2390, by Assemblyman WIMBERLY, Consumer Affairs -- Enacts the "Reader Privacy Act."

Assembly No. 2391, by Assemblyman WIMBERLY, Environment and Solid Waste -- Changes types of development requiring CAFRA permit from DEP.

Assembly No. 2392, by Assemblyman WIMBERLY, Environment and Solid Waste -- Establishes special parking for hybrid, electric, and alternative fuel vehicles.

Assembly No. 2393, by Assemblyman WIMBERLY, Health -- Requires Division of Purchase and Property to provide additional notification of contracting opportunities to vendors or potential vendors providing or interested in providing home health care services to State agencies.

Assembly No. 2394, by Assemblyman WIMBERLY, Law and Public Safety -- Requires law enforcement agencies in this State to establish minority recruitment and selection programs; establishes reporting requirement.

Assembly No. 2395, by Assemblyman WIMBERLY, Law and Public Safety -- Increases fines for selling single cigarettes and cigarettes in packs of less than 20.

Assembly No. 2396, by Assemblyman WIMBERLY, Law and Public Safety -- Expands Office of Public Defender representation of juveniles.

Assembly No. 2397, by Assemblyman WIMBERLY, Oversight, Reform and Federal Relations -- Imposes \$0.25 surcharge on alcoholic beverages to be dedicated to Alcohol Education, Rehabilitation and Enforcement Fund.

Assembly No. 2398, by Assemblyman WIMBERLY, Senior Services -- Creates crime of victimization of persons with disabilities and senior citizens.

Assembly No. 2399, by Assemblyman WIMBERLY, Law and Public Safety -- Requires safeguards for anonymity and confidentiality with respect to communications presented through phone lines, electronic communication systems, or websites dedicated to accepting anonymous tips for use by law enforcement in criminal investigations.

Assembly No. 2400, by Assemblyman WIMBERLY, Judiciary -- Establishes "County Government Criminal Justice Reform Administration Fund"; increases certain fees and assessments.

Assembly No. 2401, by Assemblyman WIMBERLY, Agriculture -- "Responsible Dog Ownership Act."

Assembly No. 2402, by Assemblyman WIMBERLY, Law and Public Safety -- Clarifies procedures for restoration of driver's license after suspension; authorizes the court to waive imprisonment under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 2403, by Assemblymen WIMBERLY, SPEARMAN, Assemblywoman TIMBERLAKE and Assemblyman Calabrese, Senior Services -- Creates program for installing standby emergency power generators in new senior housing.

Assembly No. 2404, by Assemblymen WIMBERLY and SPEARMAN, State and Local Government -- Permits exterior-based property reassessments within eight years of last municipal-wide revaluation.

Assembly No. 2405, by Assemblymen WIMBERLY, SPEARMAN, Assemblywoman TIMBERLAKE and Assemblyman Calabrese, Housing -- Grants credit against business income taxes to developer of rental housing reserved for occupancy by veterans.

Assembly No. 2406, by Assemblymen WIMBERLY, CALABRESE and Spearman, Housing -- Designated the Equitable Disclosure Act of 2010, modifies provisions of MLUL concerning objectors to applications for development.

Assembly No. 2407, by Assemblyman AUTH, Education -- "Protecting Parental Involvement in Curriculum Act"; provides that parent may opt student out of learning material or activity that parent considers harmful.

Assembly No. 2408, by Assemblyman JOHNSON, Commerce and Economic Development -- Provides medical cannabis dispensaries permitted use status in certain zoning districts.

Assembly No. 2409, by Assemblyman WIRTHS, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Requires MVC to place notation on vehicle's registration certificate indicating registrant is deaf.

Assembly No. 2410, by Assemblywoman DOWNEY, Tourism, Gaming and the Arts -- Clarifies definition of "professionally managed unit" for transient accommodation taxes.

Assembly No. 2411, by Assemblyman MOEN, Human Services -- Requires initial Medicaid and NJ FamilyCare eligibility determinations to be made not later than 21 days following application submission; provides that NJ FamilyCare coverage is terminated whenever required premium is not paid for three consecutive months.

Assembly No. 2412, by Assemblyman MOEN, Higher Education -- Allows gross income tax deduction for employees for amounts paid by employers for certain educational assistance programs for employees and for employee's student loans.

Assembly No. 2413, by Assemblymen SPACE and WIRTHS, Commerce and Economic Development -- Prohibits for 10 years applicability of new State and local rules and regulations to certain manufacturing facilities.

Assembly No. 2414, by Assemblyman SPACE, State and Local Government – Makes various changes to civil service; permits institution of temporary layoffs; permits government entities to opt-out of civil service; requires civil service examinations be offered on continual basis.

Assembly No. 2415, by Assemblyman WIRTHS, Assemblywoman DECROCE and Assemblyman THOMSON, Appropriations -- Revises gross income tax rates for joint filers and similar taxpayers and designated as Marriage Penalty Elimination Act.

Assembly No. 2416, by Assemblyman DIMAIO, Assemblywoman DECROCE and Assemblyman THOMSON, Housing -- Allows gross income tax deduction for functional improvements and home repairs made to taxpayer's primary residence.

Assembly No. 2417, by Assemblyman WIRTHS, Assemblywoman DECROCE and Assemblyman THOMSON, Labor -- Reduces taxable wage base applied to certain tax contributions.

Assembly No. 2418, by Assemblyman MCKEON, Health -- Establishes Prescription Drug Affordability Board.

Assembly No. 2419, by Assemblyman BENSON, Agriculture -- Provides that solar and photovoltaic energy facilities and structures on farmland are not an inherently beneficial use, per se, for purposes of zoning approvals.

Assembly No. 2420, by Assemblyman BENSON, Agriculture -- Bans manufacture, sale, possession, importation, transportation, or use of certain traps.

Assembly No. 2421, by Assemblyman BENSON, Environment and Solid Waste -- Provides corporation business tax credit and allows gross income tax deduction for purchase and installation of electric vehicle charging stations.

Assembly No. 2422, by Assemblyman BENSON, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Directs installation of electric vehicle charging stations at service areas on State's toll roads.

Assembly No. 2423, by Assemblyman BENSON, Human Services - - Authorizes payment for services rendered in excess of 40 hours per week under agency with choice self-directed employee model within self-directed services program.

Assembly No. 2424, by Assemblyman BENSON, Agriculture -- The "Safe Playing Fields Act"; restricts use of lawn care pesticides at child care centers and certain schools, playgrounds, and recreational fields.

Assembly No. 2425, by Assemblyman BENSON, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Exempts commercial driver license holders and applicants from certain requirements if fingerprinting and background check has been conducted within previous year by certain federal agencies.

Assembly No. 2426, by Assemblyman BENSON, Agriculture -- Permits certified animal control officer to enforce municipal animal ordinances; requires such officer to report person suspected of committing animal cruelty to municipal law enforcement officer.

Assembly No. 2427, by Assemblyman BENSON, Homeland Security and State Preparedness -- "The Reliability, Preparedness, and Storm Response Act; requires public utilities to file certain information concerning emergency preparedness with BPU and increases certain penalties.

Assembly No. 2428, by Assemblyman BENSON, Environment and Solid Waste -- Creates Office of Sustainability.

Assembly No. 2429, by Assemblyman BENSON, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Establishes "Transportation Services Coordination Task Force."

Assembly No. 2430, by Assemblyman BENSON, State and Local Government -- Prohibits political contributions by county and municipal political party committees to other committees; increases certain penalties.

Assembly No. 2431, by Assemblyman BENSON, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- Requires insurers and SHBP to provide coverage for expenses incurred in screening for ovarian cancer.

Assembly No. 2432, by Assemblyman BENSON, State and Local Government -- Establishes "Local Governmental Process Activities Disclosure Act."

Assembly No. 2433, by Assemblyman BENSON, Health -- Requires Division of Mental Health and Addiction Services to facilitate establishment of four new recovery community centers.

Assembly No. 2434, by Assemblyman BENSON, State and Local Government -- Requires SHBP and SEHBP to provide coverage for health care benefits provided by physicians who terminate contract with federal Medicare program.

Assembly No. 2435, by Assemblyman BENSON, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- Requires health insurance coverage for hair headpieces for patients receiving chemotherapy treatment for cancer.

Assembly No. 2436, by Assemblyman BENSON, Judiciary -- Allows identity theft victims to petition for judicial determination of factual innocence.

Assembly No. 2437, by Assemblyman BENSON, Health -- Creates "Osteopathic Manipulative Medicine Pilot Program."

Assembly No. 2438, by Assemblyman BENSON, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Allows for a gross income tax deduction for any honorably discharged member of the US Armed Forces, reserve unit or national guard.

Assembly No. 2439, by Assemblyman BENSON, Health -- Establishes minimum registered professional nurse staffing standards for hospitals and ambulatory surgery facilities and certain DHS facilities.

Assembly No. 2440, by Assemblyman BENSON, Appropriations -- Indexes for inflation gross income eligibility caps and maximum exclusion amounts for pension and other retirement income under gross income tax.

Assembly No. 2441, by Assemblyman BENSON, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Requires DHS to employ Transportation Planning Coordinator to manage and oversee transportation services provided to DHS clients.

Assembly No. 2442, by Assemblyman BENSON, Science, Innovation and Technology -- Provides a sales and use tax exemption for sales of certain high-efficiency home heating equipment.

Assembly No. 2443, by Assemblyman BENSON, Health -- Allows gross income tax deductions totaling \$300,000 over five taxable years for certain primary care physicians.

Assembly No. 2444, by Assemblyman BENSON, Human Services - - Quinn Wilson's Law; provides a gross income tax credit for birth resulting in stillbirth.

Assembly No. 2445, by Assemblyman BENSON, Housing -- Prohibits condominium associations from assessing insurance deductibles to individual unit owners or groups of unit owners.

Assembly No. 2446, by Assemblyman BENSON, Consumer Affairs -- Requires motor vehicle dealers and repair facilities to prioritize repairs on vehicles that accommodate wheel chairs.

Assembly No. 2447, by Assemblyman BENSON, Senior Services -- "Senior Citizens Property Tax Deferral Act"; allows certain seniors to defer property tax payments.

Assembly No. 2448, by Assemblyman BENSON, Telecommunications and Utilities – Requires certain CATV companies to make CATV service available throughout residential areas of municipality within specified number of years after CATV company first provides service to municipality.

Assembly No. 2449, by Assemblyman BENSON, Consumer Affairs – Prohibits consumer reporting agencies from charging certain fees and including certain provisions in contracts with consumers.

Assembly No. 2450, by Assemblyman BENSON, Transportation and Independent Authorities – Requires DOT Commissioner to advertise availability of certain transportation programs and services.

Assembly No. 2451, by Assemblyman BENSON, Military and Veterans' Affairs – Permits veteran's property tax deduction for tax year when veteran was previously qualified to receive deduction and became owner of real property after October 1 of pretax year.

Assembly No. 2452, by Assemblyman BENSON, Science, Innovation and Technology – Requires EDA to establish innovation center for emerging technology and life sciences businesses in northern, central, and southern New Jersey.

Assembly No. 2453, by Assemblyman BENSON, State and Local Government – Authorizes issuance of special emergency notes to finance special emergency appropriations for payment of current year property assessment appeal refunds over three years.

Assembly No. 2454, by Assemblyman BENSON, Homeland Security and State Preparedness – Requires certain electric public utilities to file emergency response plan with Board of Public Utilities.

Assembly No. 2455, by Assemblyman BENSON, Science, Innovation and Technology – Establishes pilot program in DOE to support FIRST Robotics Programs in school districts.

Assembly No. 2456, by Assemblyman BENSON, Transportation and Independent Authorities – Provides that users of Access Link paratransit service are automatically eligible for and enrolled in motor bus and rail passenger discounted fare program.

Assembly No. 2457, by Assemblyman BENSON, Telecommunications and Utilities – Requires certain energy tax receipts to be paid directly to municipalities.

Assembly No. 2458, by Assemblyman BENSON, Environment and Solid Waste – Requires State to include distributed energy resource in

certain new State buildings and consider retrofitting certain existing State buildings with distributed energy resources.

Assembly No. 2459, by Assemblyman BENSON, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- Requires insurance coverage of diapers when medically necessary.

Assembly No. 2460, by Assemblyman BENSON, Environment and Solid Waste -- Requires child care centers to test for and remediate lead in drinking water, and disclose test results.

Assembly No. 2461, by Assemblyman BENSON, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Requires school districts to observe Veterans Day as school holiday.

Assembly No. 2462, by Assemblyman BENSON, Consumer Affairs -- Establishes notification standards for certain service contracts with automatic renewal.

Assembly No. 2463, by Assemblyman BENSON, Judiciary -- Upgrades crime of stalking when stalking activity is carried out or assisted by installation or use of communication or location monitoring program or device on cellular phone or wireless mobile device.

Assembly No. 2464, by Assemblyman BENSON, Women and Children -- Provides for voluntary contributions by taxpayers on gross income tax returns for ovarian cancer research.

Assembly No. 2465, by Assemblyman BENSON, Education -- Requires provision of instruction on safe user practices for certain websites and mobile applications as part of New Jersey Student Learning Standards for Comprehensive Health and Physical Education.

Assembly No. 2466, by Assemblyman BENSON, Housing -- Revises homestead property tax reimbursement eligibility requirements for certain claimants relocating homesteads within the same municipality.

Assembly No. 2467, by Assemblyman BENSON, Housing -- Provides for fair notice and opportunity to contest, or obtain waiver of a repayment of, overpayment of homestead rebate or credit and homestead property tax reimbursement.

Assembly No. 2468, by Assemblyman BENSON, Women and Children -- Extends gross income tax medical expense deduction to certain cord blood banking services.

Assembly No. 2469, by Assemblyman BENSON, Homeland Security and State Preparedness -- Sets forth certain standards to be followed by law enforcement agencies and fire departments when utilizing drones.

Assembly No. 2470, by Assemblyman BENSON, Education -- Establishes "School Bus Safety and Child Protection Act," requires periodic criminal background checks for certain school employees; and prohibits interference with school bus monitoring devices.

Assembly No. 2471, by Assemblyman BENSON, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- Requires appropriate insurance company to provide coverage to Good Samaritan injured at scene of accident.

Assembly No. 2472, by Assemblyman CONAWAY, Health -- Establishes Practitioner Orders for Life-Sustaining Treatment Form Registry.

Assembly No. 2474, by Assemblyman CONAWAY, Health -- Deletes prior authorization requirements by certain insurers for accessing certain health care services.

Assembly No. 2475, by Assemblywoman SPEIGHT, Education -- Requires teaching staff members and school board members to annually receive training on trauma-informed education.

Assembly No. 2476, by Assemblywoman MCKNIGHT, Education -- Provides gross income tax credit for certain homeschooling expenses.

Assembly No. 2477, by Assemblywoman MCKNIGHT, Community Development and Affairs -- Requires municipalities that have public swimming pools to provide information regarding "dry drowning."

Assembly No. 2478, by Assemblyman BRAMNICK and Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Housing -- Eliminates general purpose, supplemental and mansion realty transfer fees.

Assembly No. 2479, by Assemblywoman QUIJANO, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Allows gross income tax deduction for surviving spouses of certain veterans.

Assembly No. 2480, by Assemblywoman MURPHY and Assemblyman WIRTHS, Housing -- Clarifies association assessment payment and election participation requirements in planned real estate developments.

Assembly No. 2481, by Assemblywoman QUIJANO, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Excludes Armed Services combat zone pay from gross income taxation.

Assembly No. 2482, by Assemblywoman QUIJANO, Women and Children -- Requires counseling for certain domestic violence offenders.

Assembly No. 2483, by Assemblywomen MCKNIGHT and SPEIGHT, Education -- Establishes task force to examine school discipline practices including racial disparities and effectiveness.

Assembly No. 2484, by Assemblywoman QUIJANO, Judiciary -- Upgrades crime of false public alarm when act done knowing it will result in law enforcement response against certain persons.

Assembly No. 2485, by Assemblywoman QUIJANO, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Permits juror donation of statutory juror compensation to New Jersey Vet2Vet Hotline program.

Assembly No. 2486, by Assemblywoman QUIJANO, Judiciary -- Restricts access to motor vehicle accident reports until 80 days after the accident.

Assembly No. 2487, by Assemblywoman QUIJANO, Labor -- "Healthy Terminals Act"; requires certain airport and train station workers to be paid certain wage rates and benefits.

Assembly No. 2488, by Assemblywoman QUIJANO, Health -- Prohibits excessive increases in prices charged for essential off-patent and generic prescription drugs and biological products.

Assembly No. 2489, by Assemblywoman QUIJANO, Consumer Affairs -- Prohibits commercial mobile service providers and mobile application developers from disclosing customer's location data to third parties.

Assembly No. 2490, by Assemblywoman QUIJANO, Labor -- Requires businesses receiving financial assistance from EDA be prohibited from any gender gap payment practice to their employees.

Assembly No. 2491, by Assemblywoman QUIJANO, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Clarifies excuse from jury service for members of the military or reserve under certain circumstances; repeals N.J.S.38A:4-6.

Assembly No. 2495, by Assemblyman GREENWALD, Education -
- Establishes "Einstein Scholars Program."

Assembly No. 2496, by Assemblyman GREENWALD, Higher Education -- Requires institutions of higher education to send out annual student debt letters; requires students enrolled in public institutions of higher education to complete course on student loan debt repayment.

Assembly No. 2497, by Assemblyman GREENWALD, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Prohibits toll-free passage for SJTA employees, officers, and members except while commuting or carrying out official duties.

Assembly No. 2498, by Assemblyman GREENWALD, Labor -- Requires Commissioner of Labor and Workforce Development to design and make available to public a webinar on TDI, family temporary disability leave, and family leave.

Assembly No. 2499, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Women and Children -- Provides corporation business tax and gross income tax credits for certain employer-provided child care expenditures.

Assembly No. 2500, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Consumer Affairs -- "Microphone-Enabled Devices Act"; requires user consent before enabling device microphone.

Assembly No. 2501, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Labor -- Concerns payment of leave time to employee in year of employee's retirement.

Assembly No. 2502, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Homeland Security and State Preparedness -- Requires emergency action plans for delivery of oxygen to patient residences during public health emergency.

Assembly No. 2503, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Science, Innovation and Technology -- "Innovate New Jersey Act"; establishes tax-free business incubators at institutions of higher education.

Assembly No. 2504, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Homeland Security and State Preparedness -- Requires assisted living residences and certain facilities under DCA, DCF, and DHS to be equipped with standby emergency power generators.

Assembly No. 2505, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Science, Innovation and Technology -- Authorizes EDA to provide financial assistance to certain business incubator facilities.

Assembly No. 2506, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Environment and Solid Waste -- Appropriates \$5 million to Cranford Township for flood control projects.

Assembly No. 2507, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Science, Innovation and Technology -- Establishes technology transfer assistance program in EDA.

Assembly No. 2508, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Health -- Establishes New Jersey Dietary Supplements Task Force to make recommendations concerning safety and regulation of dietary supplements sold in New Jersey.

Assembly No. 2509, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Regulated Professions -- Prohibits service repair contractors from charging hourly rates for travel time.

Assembly No. 2510, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Science, Innovation and Technology -- Establishes entrepreneur-in-residence pilot program.

Assembly No. 2511, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Health -- Requires hospitals to maintain passive audio or visual mechanism for alerting emergency department staff to presence of non-ambulance vehicles containing patients.

Assembly No. 2512, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Women and Children -- Provides for screening newborn infants for genetic mutations associated with hereditary hemochromatosis.

Assembly No. 2513, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Housing -- Permits eligible claimant who is proportionate owner paying entire property tax bill to collect entire homestead property tax reimbursement amount.

Assembly No. 2514, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Women and Children -- Provides rental and lease protections for victims of domestic violence, sexual assault, or stalking.

Assembly No. 2515, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Judiciary -- Provides affirmative defense to and permits expungement of certain trespass offenses committed as result of person's homelessness; provides for police training.

Assembly No. 2516, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Women and Children -- Expands the domestic violence statutes to encompass minors aged 16 and older.

Assembly No. 2517, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Women and Children -- Authorizes court to include in domestic violence restraining orders a provision making the order applicable to a pregnant victim's child upon birth of the child.

Assembly No. 2522, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Judiciary -- Permits juror donation of juror compensation to Legal Services of New Jersey through AOC; provides for payment of State matching funds, equal to juror donation amount, to same organization.

Assembly No. 2546, by Assemblyman SCHAER, Health -- "Uncompensated Pending Medicaid Beneficiary Payment Relief Act"; provides compensation relief to nursing facilities when resident's Medicaid eligibility determination is delayed more than 90 days.

Assembly No. 2547, by Assemblywoman MOSQUERA, Women and Children -- Requires installation of baby-changing stations in certain public restrooms.

Assembly No. 2548, by Assemblywoman TIMBERLAKE, Labor -- "New Jersey Fair Workweek Act."

Assembly No. 2549, by Assemblyman SCHAER, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- Requires certain health care providers, SHBP, and School Employees' Health Benefits Program to submit certain health care claims data to DOBI.

Assembly No. 2550, by Assemblyman BENSON, Senior Services -- Upgrades assault on victims who are elderly or disabled.

Assembly No. 2551, by Assemblyman BENSON, Judiciary -- Expands pretrial risk assessment to include history of domestic violence abuse and pending charges.

Assembly No. 2552, by Assemblywoman MOSQUERA, Health -- Requires Commissioners of DOH and DHS to perform language needs assessment.

Assembly No. 2553, by Assemblyman BENSON, Judiciary -- Establishes the "Mental Health Court Pilot Program" in several vicinages.

Assembly No. 2554, by Assemblyman BENSON, Education -- Provides additional State school aid to school districts experiencing enrollment increases due to conversion of age-restricted housing developments to non-restricted developments.

Assembly No. 2555, by Assemblyman BENSON, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Requires municipalities to provide certain information to property owners served by municipal water systems.

Assembly No. 2556, by Assemblyman BENSON, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Authorizes reciprocal agreements for enforcement of toll violations with toll authorities from other states; modifies penalties for toll violations.

Assembly No. 2557, by Assemblyman BENSON, Higher Education -- Makes various changes to tenure of faculty and other professional staff at State and county colleges.

Assembly No. 2558, by Assemblyman BENSON, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Establishes program allowing NJ licensed drivers to self-identify as having been diagnosed with post-traumatic stress disorder.

Assembly No. 2559, by Assemblyman BENSON, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Provides for increase in allowance paid to war veterans with certain service-connected disabilities.

Assembly No. 2560, by Assemblyman BENSON, State and Local Government -- Debars permanently from government contracting any person convicted of certain crimes involving government contracts.

Assembly No. 2561, by Assemblyman BENSON, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Requires NJT to equip trains with defibrillators.

Assembly No. 2562, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Budget -- Provides retirement allowance after 20 years of service regardless of age for members of PFRS.

Assembly No. 2563, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Requires public water systems to provide certain notice of boil water notices and violations of drinking water quality standards.

Assembly No. 2564, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Requires certain public water systems to publish certain financial and employee information on Internet.

Assembly No. 2565, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Establishes Mercer Regional Water Services Commission as oversight body over certain Trenton Water Works operations.

Assembly No. 2566, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Housing -- Requires Council on Affordable Housing to adjust municipal fair share to reflect job loss in a municipality.

Assembly No. 2567, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, State and Local Government -- Exempts from real property taxation during construction any building, or portion thereof, to be used for a property tax-exempt purpose.

Assembly No. 2568, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, State and Local Government -- Permits local unit to contract with private entities to lease advertising space on local unit's official Internet website.

Assembly No. 2569, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Requires DCA to verify that low-income home energy assistance benefits are not awarded to deceased individuals.

Assembly No. 2570, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Requires BPU to conduct biennial rate cases for public utilities; increases penalties for public utilities failing to comply with BPU orders.

Assembly No. 2571, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Requires DCA to verify income of low-income home energy assistance benefit applicants.

Assembly No. 2572, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Exempts disabled veterans and Purple Heart recipients from payment of municipal parking meter fees when vehicle bears veteran's or recipient's special license plate or placard issued by MVC.

Assembly No. 2573, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, State and Local Government -- Eliminates exception to public advertising and bidding requirements for certain public contracts involving insurance coverage and consulting services.

Assembly No. 2574, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Commerce and Economic Development -- Permits small businesses to qualify for loans from EDA for costs of energy audit and making energy efficiency or conservation improvements.

Assembly No. 2575, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, State and Local Government -- Requires State Building Authority to make certain payments in lieu of taxes for public safety facilities to municipalities; makes appropriation.

Assembly No. 2576, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Science, Innovation and Technology -- Establishes green infrastructure financing program.

Assembly No. 2577, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Commerce and Economic Development -- Provides incentives for certain businesses associated with military installations.

Assembly No. 2578, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Commerce and Economic Development -- Establishes "Solar Equipment Purchase and Installation Assistance Program" in EDA.

Assembly No. 2579, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Consumer Affairs -- Provides consumer protections under certain telecommunications service provider contracts.

Assembly No. 2580, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Requires public utility employees to immediately place 9-1-1 call to report emergencies that arise from work conducted by public utility employees.

Assembly No. 2581, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Concerns installation and maintenance of solar panels in common interest communities.

Assembly No. 2582, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Requires 30-day grace period prior to accrual of interest on late water and sewer bill payments.

Assembly No. 2583, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Directs BPU to conduct study to determine whether microgrid and distributed energy resource deployment will reduce length of power outages.

Assembly No. 2584, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Requires certain CATV companies to provide Internet service at public libraries with business customer class Internet access bandwidth and circuit capacity proportional to public libraries' needs.

Assembly No. 2585, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Consumer Affairs -- Directs BPU to require certain energy businesses to maintain recordings of telemarketing sales calls for three years.

Assembly No. 2586, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Requires CATV companies to provide free broadband Internet service and associated equipment to public libraries and, under certain circumstances, other municipal buildings.

Assembly No. 2587, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- Establishes liability for harm caused by defective trees.

Assembly No. 2588, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Appropriations -- Provides credits against corporation business and gross income taxes for employers of certain reservists.

Assembly No. 2589, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Senior Services -- Exempts senior homeowners from municipal building permit fees.

Assembly No. 2590, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, State and Local Government -- Revises sales and use tax treatment of garbage removal services.

Assembly No. 2591, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Housing -- Requires municipal agency under MLUL to notify prospective applicant of potential need for additional governmental approvals.

Assembly No. 2592, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Housing -- Clarifies scope of affordable housing obligations.

Assembly No. 2593, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Education -- Exempts fuel used for operation of certain school buses from petroleum products gross receipts tax and motor fuel tax; clarifies tax treatment of certain dyed fuel thereunder; clarifies determination of taxable estates of certain decedents.

Assembly No. 2594, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Housing -- Permits municipalities to use up to 15 percent of affordable housing trust fund monies to provide financial assistance grants to owners of real property that sustained certain weather-related damage.

Assembly No. 2595, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Commerce and Economic Development -- Authorizes political subdivisions to require recipients of economic development incentives to enter into community benefits agreements.

Assembly No. 2596, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Housing -- Requires retirement subdivision and retirement community to install electrical generator to provide electricity to common use area to be used as shelter in case of emergency.

Assembly No. 2597, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Agriculture -- Permits construction of electric transmission and distribution lines on certain areas of preserved farmland under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 2598, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Housing -- Limits job creation estimation under previous COAH regulations for warehousing activities.

Assembly No. 2599, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Agriculture -- Authorizes free hunting, fishing, and trapping licenses for certain retired members of NJ National Guard.

Assembly No. 2600, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Housing -- "New Townhouse Fire Safety Act"; requires automatic fire sprinkler systems in new townhomes.

Assembly No. 2601, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Requires motor vehicle inspection stickers to notify drivers of penalty for texting while driving.

Assembly No. 2602, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Allows utility lines necessary for certain solar energy generation facilities to cross municipally-owned preserved open space under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 2603, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Allows parent or guardian to be present during behind-the-wheel instruction of minor.

Assembly No. 2604, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Environment and Solid Waste -- Requires gradual replacement of incandescent light bulbs in public school buildings with compact fluorescent light bulbs whenever possible.

Assembly No. 2605, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Authorizes special Ancient Order of Hibernians license plate.

Assembly No. 2606, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Tourism, Gaming and the Arts -- Establishes procedures for nomination and election of members of New Jersey Hall of Fame; directs principal location of hall to be in or adjacent to New Jersey State Museum.

Assembly No. 2607, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Labor -- Revises definition of "public works projects" to permit project labor agreements for more projects.

Assembly No. 2608, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Consumer Affairs -- Requires cell phone warranties to last throughout initial service contract.

Assembly No. 2609, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Labor -- Concerns prevailing wage in certain public utilities work.

Assembly No. 2610, by Assemblyman DEANGELO, Labor -- Creates the New Jersey Advanced Manufacturing Council.

Assembly No. 2611, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, Judiciary -- Requires DCA, in consultation with Commission on Human Trafficking, to establish Statewide initiative for Red Sand Project.

Assembly No. 2612, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, Consumer Affairs -- Requires an annual State debt affordability analysis be included in the State Debt Report.

Assembly No. 2613, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, Judiciary -- Establishes civil action for damages for injury or death of certain animals in certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 2614, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, Science, Innovation and Technology -- "21st Century Integrated Digital Experience Act."

Assembly No. 2615, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, Regulated Professions -- Allows interment of cremated pet remains in certain cemeteries.

Assembly No. 2616, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Makes FY 2020 supplemental appropriation of \$2 million for Route 539, Joint Base McGuire-Dix-Lakehurst overpass project.

Assembly No. 2617, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, Labor -- Requires employers to provide hiring preference to employees who have reached maximum medical improvement following work-related injury.

Assembly No. 2618, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- The New Jersey Battlefield to Boardroom Act; Provides corporation business tax credits and gross income tax credits for qualified wages of certain veterans.

Assembly No. 2619, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, Education -- Establishes alternate route to expedite certification of teachers at early college high school programs.

Assembly No. 2620, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, Higher Education -- Establishes certain exclusions and credits under gross income and corporation business taxes for contributions to lifelong learning accounts.

Assembly No. 2621, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Allows \$250 gross income tax deduction for members of military on active duty.

Assembly No. 2622, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, Judiciary -- Requires movie theaters to provide effective communication devices for individuals with visual or hearing impairment; expands protections under "Law Against Discrimination."

Assembly No. 2623, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, Labor -- Allows corporation business tax and gross income tax credits to businesses employing certain persons with developmental disabilities.

Assembly No. 2624, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, Commerce and Economic Development -- Establishes a manufacturing reinvestment account program to incentivize capital investment and workforce training in New Jersey with income tax rate reductions, deferrals, and accelerated deductions.

Assembly No. 2625, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, Housing -- Provides refundable gross income tax credit for early principal payments on certain home mortgages.

Assembly No. 2626, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, Regulated Professions -- Conditions fiscal year 2020 appropriation for State professional boards on expenditure of \$250,000 to Board of Nursing to process and eliminate home health aide application backlog.

Assembly No. 2627, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, Housing -- Establishes New Jersey First-Time Home Buyer Savings Account Program; provides gross income tax benefits for certain contributions to and earnings on assets maintained in accounts established under program.

Assembly No. 2628, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, Labor -- Concerns labor contractors.

Assembly No. 2629, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, Labor -- Concerns job order contracts for public work.

Assembly No. 2630, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- Prohibits carriers that withdraw from New Jersey individual or small employer health insurance markets from acting as Medicaid program carriers in the State.

Assembly No. 2631, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, Environment and Solid Waste -- Requires water purveyors to conduct water loss audits.

Assembly No. 2632, by Assemblyman MUKHERJI, Senior Services -- Requires DOH to establish Alzheimer's disease public awareness campaign.

Assembly No. 2633, by Assemblyman MUKHERJI, Environment and Solid Waste -- Requires outdoor lighting fixtures installed or replaced by, or on behalf of State, or at projects receiving State funds, to meet certain criteria.

Assembly No. 2634, by Assemblyman MORIARTY, Consumer Affairs -- "Used Car Buyers' Bill of Rights"; prohibits certain "as is" sales of used motor vehicles.

Assembly No. 2635, by Assemblyman MORIARTY, Consumer Affairs -- Requires motor vehicle dealers provide loan application to consumers.

Assembly No. 2636, by Assemblywoman JASEY, Housing -- Concerns online marketing of affordable housing units.

Assembly No. 2637, by Assemblyman MORIARTY, Consumer Affairs -- "Used Motor Vehicle Dealer Licensing Act."

Assembly No. 2638, by Assemblyman MOEN, Judiciary -- Requires public transportation employees to complete training course on handling and responding to suspected human trafficking.

Assembly No. 2639, by Assemblymen MOEN and MAZZEO, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Authorizes issuance of Rowan University alumni license plates.

Assembly No. 2640, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Senior Services -- Creates crime of fiscal victimization against senior citizens or disabled persons.

Assembly No. 2641, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Health -- Revises procedures for processing incomplete Medicaid applications; exempts asset transfers of up to \$500 per month during look back period for determining eligibility for long-term care services.

Assembly No. 2642, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Health -- Requires hospitals to inquire whether patients have substance use disorder and establish protocols for providing or referring to treatment.

Assembly No. 2644, by Assemblywomen VAINIERI HUTTLE and SPEIGHT, Health -- Requires Medicaid cover emergency contraception without requiring prescription or other authorization.

Assembly No. 2645, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Health -- Directs Division of Medical Assistance and Health Services to collaborate for purposes of evidence-based policy review; makes an appropriation.

Assembly No. 2646, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Human Services -- Establishes Medicaid program to provide housing-related services to individuals experiencing chronic homelessness.

Assembly No. 2647, by Assemblywomen VAINIERI HUTTLE and SPEIGHT, Housing -- Permits temporary rental assistance for emergency assistance recipients.

Assembly No. 2648, by Assemblywomen VAINIERI HUTTLE and SPEIGHT, Health -- Establishes Medicaid demonstration project to cover room and board services for certain terminally ill patients in the home or other non-institutional setting.

Assembly No. 2649, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Senior Services -- Requires nursing homes to provide training to staff in behavioral health issues.

Assembly No. 2650, by Assemblywomen VAINIERI HUTTLE and SPEIGHT, Health -- Establishes performance and training standards for certain Medicaid transportation services and requires DHS to report compliance with standards.

Assembly No. 2651, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Judiciary -- Requires DOH to include certain response protocols in training course for employees of health care facilities regarding suspected human trafficking activities.

Assembly No. 2652, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Health -- Requires forms for informed consent for health care to be separate from forms related to assignment of insurance benefits or financial arrangements.

Assembly No. 2653, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Human Services -- Requires DHS to ensure that expedited benefits under Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) are made available to certain households.

Assembly No. 2654, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Health -- Requires DOH to update epilepsy website and increase public outreach efforts.

Assembly No. 2655, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Health -- Provides Medicaid and certain insurers access to Prescription Monitoring Program.

Assembly No. 2656, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Health -- Requires retail pharmacies to stock and dispense emergency contraception.

Assembly No. 2657, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Health -- Increases Medicaid reimbursement rates for certain evidence-based behavioral health services; designated as the Mental Health Access Act.

Assembly No. 2658, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Health -- Requires Commissioner of Health to establish public awareness campaign on toxic shock syndrome.

Assembly No. 2659, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Health -- Requires managed care plans, SHBP and SEHBP, to provide for reasonable accommodation in accessing providers for persons with physical disabilities.

Assembly No. 2660, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Health -- Requires Commissioner of Health to establish maternity care public awareness campaign.

Assembly No. 2661, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Senior Services -- Requires health insurers to provide coverage for positron emission tomography to diagnose Alzheimer's disease.

Assembly No. 2662, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Health -- Requires hepatitis B to be considered a priority under "Eliminating Health Disparities Initiative."

Assembly No. 2663, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Human Services -- Requires comparable level of services and supports to be provided to former residents of developmental centers transitioning to community placements and for placements to be located within 30 miles of closed centers.

Assembly No. 2664, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Senior Services -- Establishes commission to study impact of certain Medicaid reimbursement rate change on nursing homes.

Assembly No. 2665, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Senior Services -- Establishes Medicaid Managed Care Organization Oversight Program.

Assembly No. 2666, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Agriculture -- "Tonka's Law"; changes perimeter for bow and arrow hunting around certain buildings; requires property owner to provide notice to adjacent properties of any hunting activity.

Assembly No. 2667, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Law and Public Safety -- Requires establishment of processes to identify Medicaid-eligible incarcerated individuals who are awaiting pre-trial release determinations, are being released following period of incarceration, or are undergoing inpatient hospital treatment.

Assembly No. 2668, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Human Services -- Transfers Division of Mental Health Advocacy to DHS; re-titles director as Mental Health Advocate; provides diversion for mental health treatment for persons subject to prosecution in municipal court; appropriates \$15,000,000.

Assembly No. 2669, by Assemblyman MUKHERJI, Consumer Affairs -- Concerns certain motor vehicle ancillary production products and service contracts.

Assembly No. 2670, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Health -- Requires distribution of family leave informational materials to certain patients.

Assembly No. 2671, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Health -- Prohibits excessive charges for drugs developed by publicly funded research.

Assembly No. 2672, by Assemblyman WIMBERLY, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- Permits payment of only one co-payment or deductible for follow-up care or treatment after surgery or illness under certain health benefits plans.

Assembly No. 2673, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Health -- Directs Commissioner of Health to establish public awareness campaign concerning importance of vaccinations.

Assembly No. 2674, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Women and Children -- Establishes the authority of the court to order electronic monitoring of certain convicted domestic violence offenders.

Assembly No. 2675, by Assemblyman WIMBERLY, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- Requires notice of cancellation or nonrenewal of automobile and homeowners insurance policies to be sent by certified mail, return receipt requested.

Assembly No. 2676, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Judiciary -- Directs portion of Unclaimed Child Support Trust Fund be used to balance certain unpaid receivables of State agency responsible for disbursement of child support.

Assembly No. 2677, by Assemblyman WIMBERLY, Labor -- Prohibits certain employment actions against employees affected by a declared state of emergency.

Assembly No. 2678, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Education -- Establishes "Purple Ribbon Schools Program" in DOE to recognize public and nonpublic schools with positive school climate.

Assembly No. 2679, by Assemblyman WIMBERLY, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Allows person on police officer or firefighter eligible list who is unable to complete requirements for employment due to certain military service to have name placed on subsequent eligible list.

Assembly No. 2680, by Assemblyman WIMBERLY, Oversight, Reform and Federal Relations -- Expands cities permitted to regulate days and hours when packaged goods may be sold.

Assembly No. 2681, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Health -- Permits import of Canadian prescription drugs.

Assembly No. 2682, by Assemblyman MUKHERJI, Judiciary -- Concerns hospitality franchise agreements.

Assembly No. 2683, by Assemblymen MAZZEO and ARMATO, Law and Public Safety -- Criminalizes the manufacture, sale, and possession of controlled dangerous substance U-47700, known as U-4 or "Pink."

Assembly No. 2684, by Assemblymen ARMATO and MAZZEO, Health -- Authorizes public libraries to maintain supply of opioid antidotes and permits emergency administration of opioid antidote by librarian or other trained library employee.

Assembly No. 2685, by Assemblymen ARMATO and MAZZEO, Housing -- Concerns information on property condition disclosure statement.

Assembly No. 2686, by Assemblyman MAZZEO, State and Local Government -- Changes certain deadlines for 2020 primary election by three weeks.

Assembly No. 2687, by Assemblyman MAZZEO, Education -- Establishes loan redemption program for teachers in certain fields to redeem loan amounts received under New Jersey College Loans to Assist State Students Loan Program through employment in certain low performing schools.

Assembly No. 2688, by Assemblymen ARMATO and MAZZEO, Labor -- Requires reduced worker's compensation premiums for farm employers and small employers.

Assembly No. 2689, by Assemblyman MAZZEO, Budget -- "Holocaust Reparations Tax Exemption Act"; exempts value of certain payments to Holocaust survivors and their eligible descendants from transfer inheritance and estate taxes.

Assembly No. 2690, by Assemblymen ARMATO and MAZZEO, Judiciary -- Establishes special probation drug court eligibility for persons with certain previous criminal convictions.

Assembly No. 2691, by Assemblymen ARMATO and Mazzeo, Labor -- Provides tuition fee waiver apprenticeship courses.

Assembly No. 2692, by Assemblyman ARMATO, Homeland Security and State Preparedness -- Permits municipality to establish restricted parking spaces for certain volunteer firefighters.

Assembly No. 2693, by Assemblymen MAZZEO and Armato, Agriculture -- Establishes loan program and provides corporation business tax and gross income tax credits for establishment of new vineyards and wineries.

Assembly No. 2694, by Assemblymen MAZZEO and Armato, Education -- Requires New Jersey State Interscholastic Athletic Association to require criminal history records check for person to serve as official at athletic events sanctioned by association.

Assembly No. 2695, by Assemblymen MAZZEO and Armato, Higher Education -- Aligns contracting standards of Stockton University for its Atlantic City campus with those governing State public research universities.

Assembly No. 2696, by Assemblyman ARMATO, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Requires annual General Fund appropriation to DMVA for purposes of base realignment and closure.

Assembly No. 2697, by Assemblymen MAZZEO and Armato, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Waives boat safety course requirement for veterans and active duty members of military with maritime training.

Assembly No. 2698, by Assemblyman ARMATO, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Creates civil service preference for peacetime veterans.

Assembly No. 2699, by Assemblymen MAZZEO and Armato, Higher Education -- Authorizes Class Three special law enforcement officers to provide security at public and private colleges.

Assembly No. 2700, by Assemblymen ARMATO and MAZZEO, Tourism, Gaming and the Arts -- Requires NJ Division of Travel and Tourism prepare report on State travel and tourism industry recovery since Superstorm Sandy.

Assembly No. 2702, by Assemblymen ARMATO and MAZZEO, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Provides for increase and annual adjustment in allowance paid to war veterans with certain service-connected disabilities.

Assembly No. 2703, by Assemblymen MAZZEO and ARMATO, Agriculture -- Provides credits against corporation business and gross income taxes for qualified farmers that develop housing for their agricultural workforce.

Assembly No. 2704, by Assemblyman MAZZEO, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Provides spouses of military servicemembers with gross income tax credit, up to \$500, for professional relicensing fees incurred upon relocating to State.

Assembly No. 2705, by Assemblyman MAZZEO, Agriculture -- Authorizes temporary members to fill certain vacancies on Fish and Game Council.

Assembly No. 2706, by Assemblyman ARMATO, Homeland Security and State Preparedness -- Permits municipality to establish restricted parking spaces for certain emergency medical service volunteers.

Assembly No. 2707, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Consumer Affairs -- Prohibits certain video recordings in hotels and transient accommodations.

Assembly No. 2708, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Housing -- Allows therapy dogs in rental housing units; expands protection under "Law against Discrimination."

Assembly No. 2709, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, State and Local Government -- Revises statutes concerning permissible length of time between certain public questions in certain municipalities.

Assembly No. 2710, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, State and Local Government -- Restores property tax exemption for nonprofit hospitals with for-profit medical providers on-site; requires these hospitals to pay community service contributions to host municipalities; establishes Nonprofit Hospital Community Service Contribution Study Commission.

Assembly No. 2711, by Assemblywomen VAINIERI HUTTLE and SPEIGHT, Senior Services -- Clarifies intent of Legislature to protect certain senior tenants; aligns housing age restrictions with federal law.

Assembly No. 2712, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Housing -- Provides that cooperative sober living residences are inherently beneficial uses.

Assembly No. 2713, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Human Services -- Prohibits emergency homeless shelters from conditioning provision of shelter on enrollment in certain programs.

Assembly No. 2714, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, State and Local Government -- Permits municipal reorganization meetings to be held on alternative dates.

Assembly No. 2715, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, State and Local Government -- Imposes mandatory forfeiture of public office, position or employment upon conviction of certain offenses.

Assembly No. 2716, by Assemblywoman DOWNEY, Law and Public Safety -- "Marissa's Law"; provides for mandatory minimum term of imprisonment for leaving scene of accident resulting in death or serious bodily injury, except if operator reports accident; increases mandatory minimum term for reckless vehicular homicide.

Assembly No. 2717, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, Judiciary -- Provides for immediate issuance of marriage and civil union licenses; provides for 72 hour waiting period prior to ceremony.

Assembly No. 2718, by Assemblywoman DOWNEY, Labor -- Provides that certain employees of educational institutions are eligible for unemployment benefits under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 2719, by Assemblywoman DOWNEY, Senior Services -- Increases fines for failing to report suspected abuse or exploitation of institutionalized elderly person.

Assembly No. 2720, by Assemblywoman DOWNEY, Commerce and Economic Development -- Establishes "Comprehensive State Plan for Economic Development."

Assembly No. 2721, by Assemblywoman DOWNEY and Assemblyman HOUGHTALING, Human Services -- Requires Office of Information Technology to establish centralized, one-stop website resource guide to assist persons in navigating the State's developmental disability service system.

Assembly No. 2722, by Assemblyman MUKHERJI, Law and Public Safety -- Requires Commissioner of Corrections to institute 30-minute shift overlap in State correctional facilities.

Assembly No. 2723, by Assemblywoman DOWNEY, Science, Innovation and Technology -- Exempts from sales tax for two years certain highly fuel efficient vehicles and energy efficient appliances.

Assembly No. 2724, by Assemblyman BERGEN, Commerce and Economic Development -- Establishes credit under sales and use tax for certain small businesses that collect and remit sales and use tax.

Assembly No. 2725, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ and Assemblyman BRAMNICK, Regulated Professions -- Establishes compensation limits for licensed public adjusters during certain emergencies.

Assembly No. 2726, by Assemblyman DANCER, Housing -- Permits municipalities to require registration of vacant and abandoned properties and use registration fee proceeds to maintain these properties.

Assembly No. 2727, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Regulated Professions -- Provides exemption from 3-day cancellation provision of home improvement contract in case of bona fide emergency.

Assembly No. 2728, by Assemblyman DANCER, Human Services -- Expands membership and responsibilities of State Council of Developmental Disabilities.

Assembly No. 2729, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- Prohibits insurers from raising medical malpractice liability insurance premiums under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 2730, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Consumer Affairs -- Includes payday lending as a violation of the consumer fraud act.

Assembly No. 2731, by Assemblyman DANCER, Commerce and Economic Development -- Extends document submission deadlines under Economic Redevelopment and Growth Grant program and Urban Transit Hub Tax Credit program.

Assembly No. 2732, by Assemblywomen MUNOZ and DECROCE, Law and Public Safety -- Upgrades assault against servicemember to aggravated assault; expands crime of bias intimidation to encompass crimes and offenses committed against servicemembers.

Assembly No. 2733, by Assemblyman DANCER, State and Local Government -- Requires "miscellaneous revenues" in a municipal budget expected to be realized from municipal court to be listed under "Fines and Costs" line item.

Assembly No. 2734, by Assemblyman DANCER, Women and Children -- Requires reporting of animal abuse by certain child protection agency employees.

Assembly No. 2735, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- Increases amount allowed in initial prescription for opioid drugs in cases of acute pain.

Assembly No. 2736, by Assemblyman MCGUCKIN, Judiciary -- Provides that crimes committed outside the State under certain circumstances may be prosecuted in New Jersey.

Assembly No. 2737, by Assemblyman BRAMNICK, Law and Public Safety -- Permits municipal police officers to make arrests for any disorderly persons or petty disorderly persons offense outside the territorial limits of their municipality.

Assembly No. 2738, by Assemblyman MCGUCKIN, Environment and Solid Waste -- "Barnegat Bay Protection Act"; establishes Barnegat Bay Protection Fund, dedicates portion of sales tax on fertilizer, authorizes special license plates, and provides for donations.

Assembly No. 2739, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Women and Children -- Requires law enforcement agencies, correctional facilities, and State Parole Board to adopt maternity policies.

Assembly No. 2740, by Assemblyman MCGUCKIN, State and Local Government -- Permits any member of PERS to receive accidental

disability retirement allowance for disability resulting from participation in 9/11 World Trade Center rescue, recovery, or cleanup options.

Assembly No. 2741, by Assemblyman BRAMNICK, Judiciary -- Grants immunity from civil liability to persons reporting information concerning crimes related to terrorism.

Assembly No. 2742, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Judiciary -- Adds illicit fentanyl to Schedule I in the "New Jersey Controlled Dangerous Substances Act."

Assembly No. 2743, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Judiciary -- "Judy and Nikki's Law"; provides for life imprisonment without parole for persons convicted of murder of a child 16 years of age or younger.

Assembly No. 2744, by Assemblyman BRAMNICK, Law and Public Safety -- Creates disorderly persons offense of purporting to be public utility employee to gain access to residence.

Assembly No. 2745, by Assemblyman BRAMNICK, Judiciary -- Eliminates provision in bias intimidation statute concerning victim's perception of defendant's purpose; replaces provision with language concerning a "reasonable" victim.

Assembly No. 2746, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Creates home purchase grant program in HMFA for certain veterans who served in federal active duty; appropriates \$2,000,000.

Assembly No. 2747, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Judiciary -- Providing gross income tax exclusion for awards for unlawful gender-based compensation discrimination.

Assembly No. 2748, by Assemblywomen MUNOZ and VAINIERI HUTTLE, Judiciary -- Criminalizes act of "stealthling"; removing or tampering with condom during sexual activity without consent of one's sexual partner.

Assembly No. 2749, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Housing -- Requires compliance with notice and approval process under MLUL for construction of free-standing structures on certain publicly-owned property.

Assembly No. 2750, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Health -- Prohibits certain medical examinations on female patients without informed consent.

Assembly No. 2751, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Law and Public Safety -- Requires breath or blood test in motor vehicle accidents involving pedestrians.

Assembly No. 2752, by Assemblywoman DUNN, Judiciary -- Upgrades burglary of residence as crime of the second degree; upgrades it to crime of the first degree if committed while armed.

Assembly No. 2753, by Assemblywoman DUNN, Education -- Requires certain employees and candidates for public school employment or service and youth camp employees to undergo child abuse record information check.

Assembly No. 2754, by Assemblywoman DUNN, Judiciary -- Establishes crime of "sexual extortion": using explicit sexual images to extort victims.

Assembly No. 2755, by Assemblywoman DUNN, Health -- Provides gross income tax credit for value of certain voluntarily provided treatment of opioid use disorder and immunity from civil liability for such treatment.

Assembly No. 2756, by Assemblywoman DUNN, Judiciary -- Restores death penalty for persons who commit certain murders.

Assembly No. 2757, by Assemblywoman DUNN, State and Local Government -- Requires State Treasurer to distribute portion of revenue from sales tax to municipality in which sale is sourced.

Assembly No. 2758, by Assemblywoman DUNN, Health -- Provides for voluntary contributions by taxpayers on gross tax returns for New Jersey Commission on Cancer Research.

Assembly No. 2759, by Assemblywoman DUNN, Commerce and Economic Development -- Establishes Office of Economic Research in Department of State.

Assembly No. 2760, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Women and Children -- Provides that unlawful use, manufacture, or distribution of controlled dangerous substance by parent or caregiver in presence of child constitutes crime of endangering welfare of that child.

Assembly No. 2761, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ and Assemblyman BRAMNICK, Law and Public Safety -- Restricts access to motor vehicle accident reports under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 2762, by Assemblyman BRAMNICK, Law and Public Safety -- Makes it a crime of the fourth degree for a private citizen to use a tracking device to track another person without that person's consent.

Assembly No. 2763, by Assemblyman ZWICKER, State and Local Government -- "New Voter Empowerment Act"; permits 17 year olds to

vote in primary election if they turn 18 years old before next succeeding general election.

Assembly No. 2764, by Assemblyman ZWICKER, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Eliminates requirement under veterans' gross income tax exemption that taxpayer serve in active duty status or federal active duty status to qualify for exemption.

Assembly No. 2765, by Assemblyman HOUGHTALING, Tourism, Gaming and the Arts -- Changes designation on official State logo denoting manufacture of products in New Jersey.

Assembly No. 2766, by Assemblywoman DOWNEY, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- Requires health insurers to provide coverage for epinephrine for persons aged 18 or younger.

Assembly No. 2767, by Assemblywoman DOWNEY, Education -- Requires boards of education to include instruction, and adopt instructional materials, on climate change.

Assembly No. 2768, by Assemblyman HOUGHTALING, Agriculture -- Establishes housing of equine-related farm employees in facilities with horses under certain conditions as "Right to Farm" permissible activity; requires State Agriculture Development Committee agricultural management practice that permits such housing.

Assembly No. 2769, by Assemblywoman DOWNEY, Labor -- Requires State Employment and Training Commission member to specialize in serving transgender communities.

Assembly No. 2770, by Assemblywoman DOWNEY, Human Services -- Increases number of home health aide service hours provided to individual with disabilities residing on post-secondary school campus following initial assessment; Requires reassessment every six months.

Assembly No. 2771, by Assemblywoman DOWNEY, Human Services -- Provides that persons between 18 and 21 years of age with disabilities are eligible to receive direct support professional services from DHS.

Assembly No. 2772, by Assemblywoman DOWNEY, Human Services -- Authorizes certain Medicaid recipients residing on post-secondary school campus to participate remotely in meetings of non-medical nature regarding Medicaid benefits.

Assembly No. 2776, by Assemblywoman PINKIN, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Establishes "Solar Roof Installation Warranty Program" in EDA and transfers \$2 million from societal benefits charge to initially fund program.

Assembly No. 2777, by Assemblywoman PINKIN, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Requires electric public utilities operating or providing service to certain LED street lights to charge customers only for actual costs.

Assembly No. 2778, by Assemblywoman PINKIN, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Requires public utilities and cable television companies to notify certain entities prior to removing mature trees.

Assembly No. 2779, by Assemblywoman PINKIN, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Requires BPU to establish demand response programs for electric public utility customers.

Assembly No. 2780, by Assemblywoman PINKIN, Health -- Prohibits pharmacies from charging additional fee for processing prescriptions transmitted by telephone or electronic means.

Assembly No. 2781, by Assemblywoman PINKIN, State and Local Government -- Requires immediate forfeiture of public office, position or employment, without application by the prosecutor, for public officials and employees convicted under federal law of certain public corruption offenses.

Assembly No. 2782, by Assemblywoman PINKIN, Environment and Solid Waste -- Requires certain State projects to be designed and managed to include sustainable landscapes.

Assembly No. 2783, by Assemblywoman PINKIN, Environment and Solid Waste -- Directs DEP to develop guidelines concerning State and local government purchase of goods made from recycled material.

Assembly No. 2784, by Assemblywoman PINKIN, Environment and Solid Waste -- Authorizes DEP rulemaking to prevent backsliding of certain State environmental regulations due to changes in federal law or regulation.

Assembly No. 2798, by Assemblyman SCHAER, Law and Public Safety -- Awards credits to reduce the parole eligibility date of inmates who participate in college and associate degree educational programming.

Assembly No. 2799, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, Science, Innovation and Technology -- Requires Business Action Center to establish "Entrepreneur Learner's Permit Pilot Program" for certain designated industries.

Assembly No. 2800, by Assemblyman SCHAER, Education -- Permits charter school to limit admission to single gender, students at-risk of academic failure, students with disabilities, or English language learners.

Assembly No. 2801, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Requires certain public utilities to provide customers notice of certain utility work that could impact traffic.

Assembly No. 2802, by Assemblyman SCHAER, Housing -- Establishes the "New Jersey Electronic Plan Review System."

Assembly No. 2803, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Concerns parking spaces restricted for persons with disabilities located near youth athletic fields.

Assembly No. 2804, by Assemblyman SCHAER, State and Local Government -- Adds to property tax levy cap exclusions increases in flood insurance premiums.

Assembly No. 2805, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Clarifies disabled veterans and Purple Heart recipients are not required to own vehicle to be exempt from municipal parking meter fees.

Assembly No. 2806, by Assemblyman SCHAER, State and Local Government -- Creates exclusion from municipal property tax levy cap for amounts necessary to provide required matching funds to qualify for grants and other funds.

Assembly No. 2807, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, Law and Public Safety -- Requires DLPS to establish training program to prepare law enforcement to interact with autonomous vehicles.

Assembly No. 2808, by Assemblyman SCHAER, Housing -- Requires certification of diligent inquiry in residential mortgage foreclosure actions to be filed by attorneys.

Assembly No. 2809, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, Law and Public Safety -- Requires revocation of parole for assaulting or threatening law enforcement officers.

Assembly No. 2810, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, Law and Public Safety -- Requires sexual assault forensic evidence to be preserved for 10 years.

Assembly No. 2811, by Assemblyman SCHAER, Law and Public Safety -- Permits service of parking tickets by mail.

Assembly No. 2812, by Assemblyman SCHAER, Consumer Affairs -- Requires certain furniture retailers to provide notice of furniture tip over risks; requires tip restraint devices be available for purchase.

Assembly No. 2813, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, Law and Public Safety -- The "Uniform Criminal Records Accuracy Act."

Assembly No. 2814, by Assemblyman SCHAER, Consumer Affairs -- Permits installation of GPS navigation devices which do not obstruct motor vehicle operator's vision.

Assembly No. 2815, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, Housing -- Authorizes HMFA to offer loans for purpose of refinancing certain residential mortgages.

Assembly No. 2816, by Assemblyman SCHAER, Consumer Affairs -- Establishes procedures for determining enforceability of standard form contracts; invalidates certain indemnification clauses.

Assembly No. 2817, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, State and Local Government -- Restores property tax exemption for nonprofit hospitals with on-site for-profit medical providers; requires these hospitals to pay community service contributions to host municipalities; establishes Nonprofit Hospital Community Service Contribution Study Commission.

Assembly No. 2818, by Assemblyman SCHAER, Judiciary -- Limits amount of appeal bond in civil actions to \$50 million.

Assembly No. 2819, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, Housing -- Establishes the "Mortgage Assistance Pilot Program."

Assembly No. 2820, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, State and Local Government -- Requires municipalities to accept complaints and provide certain municipal announcements by electronic means.

Assembly No. 2821, by Assemblyman SCHAER, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- Establishes New Jersey Commission on Health Insurance Network Adequacy.

Assembly No. 2822, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, State and Local Government -- Requires cost-benefit analyses and local government financial impact findings for approval of long term property tax exemption.

Assembly No. 2823, by Assemblyman SCHAER, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- Establishes waiver, rebate or payment of insured's deductible, copayment, or coinsurance by health care practitioner as a form of insurance fraud subject to criminal and civil penalties.

Assembly No. 2824, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, Housing -- Requires creditors to maintain vacant and abandoned non-residential properties under foreclosure.

Assembly No. 2825, by Assemblyman SCHAER, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- Requires carriers to classify medically necessary procedures as covered benefits and remit certain payments to hospitals for services rendered.

Assembly No. 2826, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, State and Local Government -- Requires Governor's annual budget message to include description and fiscal analyses of recommendations to raise State revenue estimated at \$1 million or more.

Assembly No. 2827, by Assemblyman SCHAER, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- The "Health Care Provider Network Transparency Act"; establishes requirements for granting access to certain health care provider discounts.

Assembly No. 2828, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, State and Local Government -- Reduces threshold for filing annual disclosure statement with ELEC from \$50,000 in public contracts to \$17,500.

Assembly No. 2829, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, Regulated Professions -- Upgrades penalties for violating certain veterinary practice licensure laws.

Assembly No. 2830, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- Requires health benefits coverage for buprenorphine and buprenorphine/naloxone for pain treatment without step therapy or fail-first protocols.

Assembly No. 2831, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, Regulated Professions -- Requires cosmetology and hairstyling licensees to complete domestic violence and sexual assault awareness education.

Assembly No. 2832, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, Regulated Professions -- Requires licensure of dog trainers.

Assembly No. 2833, by Assemblywoman JASEY, Education -- Modifies various aspects of charter school program including student enrollment procedures, revocation of charter, monitoring of charter schools, and collaboration between school districts and charter schools.

Assembly No. 2834, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, State and Local Government -- Designates blueberry muffin as State Muffin.

Assembly No. 2835, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, State and Local Government -- Requires municipalities and boards of education record public meetings and post recordings on Internet.

Assembly No. 2836, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, State and Local Government -- Exempts handwritten signature from public disclosure; requires redaction when posted on Internet.

Assembly No. 2837, by Assemblywoman JASEY, Education -- Limits use of student progress on standardized assessments to no more than 10 percent of overall evaluation.

Assembly No. 2838, by Assemblyman MUKHERJI, Women and Children -- Requires DHS to implement payment strategy to encourage the use of long acting reversible contraceptives.

Assembly No. 2839, by Assemblyman MUKHERJI, Women and Children -- Requires reporting of certain attempted and completed suicides by minors.

Assembly No. 2840, by Assemblyman MUKHERJI, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Directs certain unclaimed water utility deposits in Unclaimed Utility Deposits Trust Fund be paid to Statewide nonprofit utility assistance organizations meeting certain eligibility criteria.

Assembly No. 2841, by Assemblyman MUKHERJI, Commerce and Economic Development -- Authorizes creation of urban enterprise zone in Hoboken City.

Assembly No. 2842, by Assemblyman SCHAER, Health -- Imposes requirements on certain pediatric emergency departments; requires DOH to include information on pediatric emergency departments in its annual hospital performance report.

Assembly No. 2843, by Assemblymen MUKHERJI and CHIARAVALLOTTI, Labor -- Requires employers to provide paid leave to employees to vote in certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 2844, by Assemblyman SCHAER, Women and Children -- Permits up to 10 children to be cared for by a registered family day care provider.

Assembly No. 2845, by Assemblyman SCHAER, Health -- Revises requirements for certification of homemaker-home health aides, including establishing timeframe requirements for issuance of conditional and final certifications.

Assembly No. 2846, by Assemblyman MUKHERJI, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Permits certain local units and authorities to reduce water, and sewer, and stormwater fees and other charges for low-income persons.

Assembly No. 2847, by Assemblyman SCHAER, Health -- Establishes pilot program for incentive-based value payment system for home health agencies and health care service firms.

Assembly No. 2848, by Assemblyman MUKHERJI, Environment and Solid Waste -- Prohibits application of neonicotinoids on State, county, or municipal property.

Assembly No. 2849, by Assemblyman SCHAER, Aging and Senior Services -- Establishes pilot program for incentive-based value payment system for nursing homes.

Assembly No. 2850, by Assemblyman MUKHERJI, Health -- "New Jersey Public Water Supply Fluoridation Act."

Assembly No. 2851, by Assemblyman SCHAER, Health -- Requires practitioners to disclose business relationship with out-of-State facilities when making patient referrals to those facilities.

Assembly No. 2852, by Assemblyman MUKHERJI, Science, Innovation and Technology -- Directs New Jersey Cybersecurity and Communications Integration Cell, Office of Information Technology, and New Jersey Big Data Alliance to develop advanced cyberinfrastructure strategic plan.

Assembly No. 2853, by Assemblyman SCHAER, Aging and Senior Services -- Increases reimbursement rate for providers of adult medical day care services.

Assembly No. 2854, by Assemblyman SCHAER, Environment and Solid Waste -- Requires continuing identification and remediation of waste tire sites.

Assembly No. 2855, by Assemblyman MUKHERJI, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- Exempts certain credit unions from sales and use tax.

Assembly No. 2856, by Assemblyman SCHAER, Budget -- Prioritizes investment of State administered pension funds in in-state infrastructure project investments over comparable out-of-state infrastructure project investments.

Assembly No. 2857, by Assemblyman MUKHERJI, Commerce and Economic Development -- Provides CBT and gross income tax credit for certain capital investments in film production facility.

Assembly No. 2858, by Assemblyman SCHAER, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- Makes permanent certain temporary authorizations that expanded permitted investment by Director of Division of Investment of State of New Jersey Cash Management Fund and State pension funds.

Assembly No. 2859, by Assemblyman SCHAER, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Directs public utility to reimburse municipality for police services required for safe completion of public utility project no later than 60 days after municipality submits bill to public utility.

Assembly No. 2860, by Assemblyman SCHAER, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Establishes "Neighborhood Solar Energy Investment Program."

Assembly No. 2861, by Assemblyman MOEN, Women and Children -- Eliminates requirement to be without health insurance for three months prior to enrolling in NJ FamilyCare.

Assembly No. 2862, by Assemblyman SCHAER, Judiciary -- Concerns victim's right to rape care advocate under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 2863, by Assemblyman MOEN, Environment and Solid Waste -- Requires public water systems to provide notice of elevated lead levels in drinking water to customers and local officials; requires landlords to notify tenants of elevated lead levels.

Assembly No. 2864, by Assemblywoman DECROCE, Environment and Solid Waste -- Authorizes use of certain constitutionally dedicated CBT revenues for grants for prevention and remediation of harmful algal blooms.

Assembly No. 2866, by Assemblyman DANCER, Judiciary -- Requires court order to transfer person awaiting hearing for involuntary commitment from private hospital to State psychiatric hospital.

Assembly No. 2867, by Assemblywoman DIMASO and Assemblymen DIMAIO, State and Local Government -- Permits taxpayers to deduct the total amount of State property taxes paid on principal residence from gross income tax obligation.

Assembly No. 2868, by Assemblyman DANCER, Health -- Requires DOE to establish NJ Dyslexia website.

Assembly No. 2869, by Assemblyman DANCER, Health -- Expands prescription monitoring program to include veterinarians.

Assembly No. 2870, by Assemblyman BRAMNICK, Law and Public Safety -- Allows law enforcement officers to receive one-time emergency alerts on personal wireless communication devices.

Assembly No. 2871, by Assemblyman DANCER, Health -- Provides for Medicaid coverage and reimbursement for mental health services provided through telepsychiatry.

Assembly No. 2872, by Assemblyman DANCER, Aging and Senior Services -- Requires Commissioner of Health to examine certain records of nursing home residents' personal funds, and provides that misappropriation of funds is grounds for cause of action.

Assembly No. 2873, by Assemblyman DANCER, Health -- Requires State to reimburse counties for costs paid for maintenance of county patients in State psychiatric hospitals who are eligible for federal Medicare or Medicaid coverage.

Assembly No. 2874, by Assemblyman DANCER, Law and Public Safety -- Concerns financial responsibility for inmates and certain legally charged patients transferred to psychiatric hospitals.

Assembly No. 2875, by Assemblyman DANCER, Health -- Makes annual appropriation of \$425,000 for financial assistance program for persons with cystic fibrosis.

Assembly No. 2876, by Assemblyman DANCER, Human Services - - Requires DHS to establish sobriety standards and drug testing requirements for substance use disorder treatment centers and to conduct both announced and unscheduled inspections.

Assembly No. 2877, by Assemblyman DANCER, Community Development and Affairs -- Requires registration of certain vacant and abandoned properties with municipalities and provides enforcement tools related to maintenance of these properties.

Assembly No. 2878, by Assemblyman DANCER, Commerce and Economic Development -- Establishes standards for electronic tax lien sales.

Assembly No. 2879, by Assemblyman DANCER, Labor -- Exempts minimum wage requirements compensation paid to homemaker-home health aides.

Assembly No. 2880, by Assemblyman SPACE, Health -- Repeals requirement for general hospitals and State psychiatric hospitals to hold annual public meetings.

Assembly No. 2881, by Assemblyman BRAMNICK, Commerce and Economic Development -- Allows credit against gross income tax for certain eligible taxpayers pursuing education and employment in State.

Assembly No. 2882, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, State and Local Government -- Requires county clerks to send confirmation notice to vote-by-mail applicant that requests mail-in ballot at separate mailing address than address at which applicant is registered to vote.

Assembly No. 2883, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Human Services -- Establishes "Matthew's Law Limiting the Use of Restraints."

Assembly No. 2884, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Women and Children -- Establishes public awareness campaign concerning Period of PURPLE Crying program and shaken baby syndrome.

Assembly No. 2885, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Women and Children -- Establishes "Count the Kicks" public awareness campaign.

Assembly No. 2886, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Requires special paratransit vehicles to display flashing warning lights while discharging or receiving passengers.

Assembly No. 2887, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Creates motor vehicle offenses related to special paratransit vehicles.

Assembly No. 2888, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Commerce and Economic Development -- Expands eligibility under the Urban Transit Hub Tax Credit Act by broadening certain municipal qualifier provisions.

Assembly No. 2889, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Housing -- Requires evaluation of appropriateness of light frame construction for multiple dwellings and imposes moratorium on light frame construction until determination and recommendations are adopted.

Assembly No. 2890, by Assemblywoman LOPEZ, Regulated Professions -- Requires certain standards for professional and occupational boards considering applicants with criminal history records.

Assembly No. 2891, by Assemblywoman LOPEZ, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- "Digital Asset and Blockchain Technology Act."

Assembly No. 2892, by Assemblywoman LOPEZ, Human Services -- Establishes Restaurant Meals Program in DHS; permits certain individuals to use SNAP benefits at approved restaurants; requires participation by certain restaurants operated by institutions of higher education.

Assembly No. 2893, by Assemblywoman LOPEZ, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Makes various changes to current system for approval, issuance, administration, and discontinuance of various types of special license plates.

Assembly No. 2894, by Assemblyman WEBBER, Environment and Solid Waste -- Appropriates money from Trenton Capital City Aid to Lake Hopatcong Commission for mitigation and prevention of harmful algal blooms.

Assembly No. 2895, by Assemblyman SPACE, Agriculture -- Reduces residency requirement for resident hunting licenses from six months to 60 days.

Assembly No. 2896, by Assemblyman SPACE, Education -- The "School Safety and Security Act"; establishes penalties for certain criminal acts committed on school property.

Assembly No. 2897, by Assemblyman SPACE, Labor -- Provides dedicated funding for promotion of apprenticeships and apprenticeship programs from Workforce Development Partnership Fund.

Assembly No. 2898, by Assemblyman SPACE, Labor -- Prohibits payment of temporary disability benefits to incarcerated individuals.

Assembly No. 2899, by Assemblyman SPACE, Law and Public Safety -- Revises law governing training and duties of Junior Firefighters' Auxiliary members.

Assembly No. 2900, by Assemblyman SPACE, Education -- Limits annual increase in tuition rates charged by county vocational school districts to two percent.

Assembly No. 2901, by Assemblyman SPACE, Education -- Extends limit for nonpublic school busing to 30 miles in Atlantic, Burlington, Cape May, Cumberland, Gloucester, Hunterdon, Ocean, Salem, Sussex, and Warren Counties, and requires existing bus stops to be used.

Assembly No. 2902, by Assemblyman SPACE, Education -- Requires principals and teachers of public schools to conduct an oral recitation from the Declaration of Independence before the opening of school each day in grades 3-12; appropriates \$10,000.

Assembly No. 2903, by Assemblyman SPACE, Education -- "The Smarter Lunchroom Act;" promotes healthy food choices in school cafeterias.

Assembly No. 2904, by Assemblyman SPACE, Judiciary -- Revises procedures for securing permit to carry handgun.

Assembly No. 2905, by Assemblyman SPACE, Agriculture -- Establishes "Best Use of Ugly Produce Award Program."

Assembly No. 2906, by Assemblyman SPACE, Agriculture -- Concerns right to repair farm equipment and lawn mowers.

Assembly No. 2907, by Assemblyman SPACE, Agriculture -- Concerns endangered plant species in NJ.

Assembly No. 2908, by Assemblyman SPACE, Commerce and Economic Development -- Allows certain self-employed business owners to deduct their own pension plan contributions from gross income under the gross income tax.

Assembly No. 2909, by Assemblyman SPACE, Human Services -- Restricts use of electronic benefit cards by cash assistance recipients.

Assembly No. 2910, by Assemblyman SPACE, Law and Public Safety -- Requires women incarcerated in county correctional facilities to cover full cost of abortion.

Assembly No. 2911, by Assemblyman WEBBER, Homeland Security and State Preparedness -- Upgrades penalties for certain crimes committed during a state of emergency.

Assembly No. 2912, by Assemblyman WEBBER, Law and Public Safety -- Eliminates certain motor vehicle registration renewal.

Assembly No. 2913, by Assemblyman WEBBER, Homeland Security and State Preparedness -- Permits members of Community Emergency Response Teams to perform traffic duties under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 2914, by Assemblyman WEBBER, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Requires MVC to accept death certificate as proof of name change.

Assembly No. 2915, by Assemblyman WEBBER, Judiciary -- Permits juveniles to be admitted to drug court program under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 2916, by Assemblyman WEBBER, State and Local Government -- Requires public bodies under Open Public Meetings Act to display U.S. flag and recite Pledge of Allegiance at beginning of meeting.

Assembly No. 2917, by Assemblyman WEBBER, State and Local Government -- Requires newly-elected municipal, county, and State political party committee members to assume office upon certification for election and hold first meeting on second Saturday, second Monday, and second Tuesday following primary election, respectively.

Assembly No. 2918, by Assemblyman WEBBER, Education -- "School Children First Act"; establishes factors for determining compensation; requires principal consent for teacher placement; eliminates certain seniority rights.

Assembly No. 2919, by Assemblyman WEBBER, Education -- Eliminates public school district budget reduction appeals to the Commissioner of Education.

Assembly No. 2920, by Assemblyman WEBBER, Education -- Provides for the designation of new charter school authorizers and additional modifications of the charter school program.

Assembly No. 2921, by Assemblyman WEBBER, Education -- Requires school districts to allow home-schooled students to participate in school-sponsored extracurricular activities in the student's resident district.

Assembly No. 2922, by Assemblyman WEBBER, Education -- Places restrictions on unsolicited school budget communications sent by a board of education to school district residents 90 days prior to annual school election.

Assembly No. 2923, by Assemblyman WEBBER, State and Local Government -- Prohibits elected local government officers from accepting employment with law firm for a period of time if officer voted to award local government contract to firm.

Assembly No. 2924, by Assemblyman WEBBER, Housing -- Authorizes installation of automatic standby generators in certain residences without zoning or planning board approval.

Assembly No. 2925, by Assemblyman WEBBER, Housing -- Waives certain inspection fees for municipally owned affordable housing developments.

Assembly No. 2926, by Assemblyman WEBBER, State and Local Government -- Requires fire districts, school districts, and county governments to share in burden of property assessment appeal refunds.

Assembly No. 2927, by Assemblyman WEBBER, State and Local Government -- Permits municipalities to enter into shared service agreement for tax assessment.

Assembly No. 2928, by Assemblyman WEBBER, State and Local Government -- Increases interest rate paid on certain overdue refunds of tax overpayments.

Assembly No. 2929, by Assemblyman WEBBER, State and Local Government -- Prohibits the use of county and municipal vehicles by part-time elected local government officers.

Assembly No. 2930, by Assemblyman WEBBER, State and Local Government -- Establishes the State Debt Capacity Advisory Commission.

Assembly No. 2931, by Assemblyman WEBBER, Environment and Solid Waste -- Allows residents of certain Highlands municipalities to designate on gross income tax returns that a portion of gross income tax paid be returned to municipality of residence.

Assembly No. 2932, by Assemblyman WEBBER, Higher Education -- Makes membership in New Jersey Council of County Colleges optional.

Assembly No. 2933, by Assemblyman WEBBER, Commerce and Economic Development -- Eliminates \$375 minimum Corporation Business Tax on New Jersey S corporations with New Jersey gross receipts of less than \$100,000.

Assembly No. 2934, by Assemblyman WEBBER, Appropriations -- Re-establishes 6.37 percent as top marginal gross income tax rate.

Assembly No. 2935, by Assemblyman WEBBER, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Eliminates automatic increases of petroleum products taxes.

Assembly No. 2936, by Assemblyman WEBBER, Judiciary -- Prohibits wrongful life/birth suits.

Assembly No. 2937, by Assemblyman WEBBER, Judiciary -- Provides that will is not valid unless signed by testator or substantially written in testator's handwriting.

Assembly No. 2938, by Assemblyman WEBBER, Judiciary -- Limits liability for operators of buildings, facilities, or premises for certain sports, games, and amusement activities.

Assembly No. 2940, by Assemblyman WEBBER, Environment and Solid Waste -- Dedicates \$500,000 annually in revenues from vessel registration and renewal fees to NJ Greenwood Lake Fund.

Assembly No. 2941, by Assemblyman SPACE, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Requires electric public utilities to disseminate through social media and text message certain information during power outages.

Assembly No. 2942, by Assemblyman SPACE, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Authorizes creation of Combat Action Ribbon license plate.

Assembly No. 2943, by Assemblyman SPEARMAN, Judiciary -- Imposes enhanced penalties for threat that is transmitted to kill or do harm on school property.

Assembly No. 2944, by Assemblyman SPACE, Environment and Solid Waste -- Permits idling of motor vehicles on residential property.

Assembly No. 2945, by Assemblyman SPACE, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Requires electric public utilities to establish toll-free telephone number to be used by public for reporting damaged equipment and dangerous vegetation.

Assembly No. 2946, by Assemblyman SPACE, Judiciary -- Reinstates the death penalty for certain murders.

Assembly No. 2947, by Assemblyman SPACE, Agriculture -- Directs DEP to designate areas in each State park and forest for construction of bat houses.

Assembly No. 2948, by Assemblyman SPACE and Assemblywoman SUMTER, Environment and Solid Waste -- Provides that no more than four of the seven public members appointed to the Highlands Water Protection and Planning Council may be of the same political party.

Assembly No. 2949, by Assemblyman SPACE, State and Local Government -- Expands range of local units eligible to join an insurance fund established by a municipality or county under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 2950, by Assemblyman SPACE, Housing -- Authorizes municipalities that petition for or receive substantive certification pursuant to the "Fair Housing Act" to make certain affordable housing units available on a preferential basis to certain eligible persons.

Assembly No. 2951, by Assemblyman SPACE, State and Local Government -- Eliminates seniority in Civil Service and other jurisdictions for reductions in force in certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 2952, by Assemblyman SPACE, Aging and Senior Services -- Converts senior freeze reimbursement into credit applied directly to property tax bills.

Assembly No. 2953, by Assemblyman SPACE, Housing -- Exempts contaminated and industrially-zoned sites from affordable housing rules.

Assembly No. 2954, by Assemblyman SPACE, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Authorizes creation of vertical motorcycle license plates.

Assembly No. 2955, by Assemblyman MCKEON, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Designates portion of Interstate Route 280 in West Orange as "Governor Brendan Byrne Memorial Highway."

Assembly No. 2956, by Assemblyman MCKEON, Judiciary -- Establishes crime of possessing firearm during public demonstration for purpose of causing civil disorder.

Assembly No. 2957, by Assemblyman MCKEON, Women and Children -- Establishes task force to examine issues and make recommendations concerning youth sports, including abusive coaching, confrontational parents, and bullying of players.

Assembly No. 2958, by Assemblyman MCKEON, Housing -- Permits municipalities to require that new construction be solar ready.

Assembly No. 2959, by Assemblyman DEPHILLIPS, State and Local Government -- Prohibits candidates and elected public officials charged with crimes from using campaign contributions for their legal defense.

Assembly No. 2960, by Assemblyman DEPHILLIPS, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Provides gross income tax deduction to surviving spouses of certain veterans.

Assembly No. 2961, by Assemblyman DEPHILLIPS, Health -- Requires annual suicide prevention training for mental health practitioners.

Assembly No. 2962, by Assemblyman DEPHILLIPS, Law and Public Safety -- Requires reporting of first responder suicides to DOH.

Assembly No. 2964, by Assemblywoman REYNOLDS-JACKSON and Assemblyman VERRELLI, Housing -- Requires all creditors that acquire title to non-owner occupied residential property following foreclosure to notify municipality and common interest community.

Assembly No. 2965, by Assemblyman WEBBER, Education -- Expands authority of State Auditor on performance audits of school districts; requires State Auditor to issue report on school district audits from previous five years; requires appropriation of \$1.5 million to Office of State Auditor annually for such audits.

Assembly No. 2966, by Assemblyman SPACE, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Authorizes creation of Marine Corps Scholarship Foundation license plates.

Assembly No. 2967, by Assemblyman SPACE, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Requires electric public utilities to maintain registry of retired employees to undertake certain tasks during certain power outages caused by major events.

Assembly No. 2968, by Assemblyman SPACE, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Requires electric public utilities to maintain registry of licensed electricians to undertake certain tasks during power outages caused by major events.

Assembly No. 2969, by Assemblyman SPACE, Human Services -- Provides for drug testing of adult recipients of Work First New Jersey program benefits.

Assembly No. 2970, by Assemblywoman DOWNEY, Judiciary -- Strengthens location confidentiality for certain crime victims.

Assembly No. 2971, by Assemblyman WEBBER, Science, Innovation and Technology -- The "Digital Impersonation Prevention Act."

Assembly No. 2972, by Assemblyman WEBBER, Human Services -- Prohibits incarcerated individuals from receiving Medicaid, Work First New Jersey, or Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program benefits.

Assembly No. 2973, by Assemblyman WEBBER, Environment and Solid Waste -- Exempts construction, expansion, or renovation of building or structure owned and used by municipality or volunteer fire department from "Highlands Water Protection and Planning Act."

Assembly No. 2974, by Assemblyman WEBBER, State and Local Government -- Provides for priority consideration, by State, of permit applications by counties and municipalities with 10 or more shared services.

Assembly No. 2975, by Assemblyman WEBBER, Environment and Solid Waste -- Exempts expansion or reconstruction, within 125 percent of existing footprint, of municipal and county buildings and certain emergency services buildings from "Highlands Water Protection and Planning Act."

Assembly No. 2976, by Assemblyman WEBBER, Environment and Solid Waste -- Appropriates \$4 million from the Property Tax Relief Fund to DEP for mitigation and prevention of harmful algal blooms in Greenwood Lake; reduces Trenton Capital City Aid Program appropriation.

Assembly No. 2977, by Assemblyman WEBBER, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Requires transportation network company to provide live customer service representative and certain notification to riders.

Assembly No. 2978, by Assemblyman WEBBER, Health -- Prohibits using cadaveric fetal tissue obtained from elective abortion procedure for research purposes and using any cadaveric fetal tissue to research cosmetic treatments.

Assembly No. 2979, by Assemblyman WEBBER, Health -- "Addiction Medicine Philanthropy Act"; provides physicians who provide uncompensated care for treatment of substance use disorders with \$250,000 cap on noneconomic damages in actions alleging medical malpractice.

Assembly No. 2980, by Assemblyman WEBBER, State and Local Government -- Restricts sale and use of remaining State-owned portion of Greystone Park Psychiatric Hospital property in Morris County.

Assembly No. 2981, by Assemblyman WEBBER, State and Local Government -- Requires municipalities to file copies of tax abatement and exemption agreements with county chief financial officer and county counsel within 10 days of execution.

Assembly No. 2986, by Assemblyman WEBBER, Education -- Requires public schools to allow certain students not enrolled in the school to participate in interscholastic athletics.

Assembly No. 2987, by Assemblyman WEBBER, Higher Education -- Requires public institution of higher education to annually submit capital projects report to Secretary of Higher Education; requires secretary to post reports on website.

Assembly No. 2988, by Assemblyman WEBBER, State and Local Government -- Requires reduction in number of State vehicles over five fiscal years.

Assembly No. 2989, by Assemblyman BURZICHELLI, Oversight, Reform and Federal Relations -- Permits students over age 18 years to taste wine, spirits or malt alcoholic beverage for educational purposes while enrolled in authorized enology, distilling, or brewing training program.

Assembly No. 2990, by Assemblyman BURZICHELLI, Environment and Solid Waste -- Limits liability for persons who deliver heating oil to unregulated tanks for discharges from that tank under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 2991, by Assemblyman BURZICHELLI, State and Local Government -- Concerns local taxation of business personal property of local exchange telephone companies.

Assembly No. 2992, by Assemblyman TALIAFERRO, Agriculture -- Establishes certain requirements concerning animal rescue organizations, breeders, importation of cats and dogs, and sale or adoption of cats and dogs; revises shelter and pound law.

Assembly No. 2993, by Assemblyman TALIAFERRO, Agriculture -- Establishes "Jersey Canned Goods Program."

Assembly No. 2994, by Assemblyman TALIAFERRO, Agriculture -- Establishes "Jersey Frozen Foods Program."

Assembly No. 3001, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Women and Children -- Provides that children under care, custody or supervision of DCPP may not be home-schooled.

Assembly No. 3002, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Women and Children -- Allows gross income tax deduction for 50% of contributions of \$100 or more to domestic violence shelters.

Assembly No. 3003, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Health -- Exempts sales of condoms from sales and use tax.

Assembly No. 3004, by Assemblyman MUKHERJI, Human Services -- Revises eligibility for convicted drug offenders to receive general assistance benefits under Work First New Jersey program.

Assembly No. 3005, by Assemblyman ARMATO, Higher Education -- "Mental Health Early Action on Campus Act"; requires institutions of higher education to implement mental health programs and services.

Assembly No. 3006, by Assemblywoman LAMPITT, Science, Innovation and Technology -- Requires certain disclosures of intentionally deceptive audio or visual media.

Assembly No. 3007, by Assemblywoman LAMPITT, Higher Education -- Requires institutions of higher education to provide students with access to mental health care programs and services and to establish a hotline to provide information concerning the availability of those services.

Assembly No. 3008, by Assemblywoman LAMPITT, Regulated Professions -- "Lactation Consultants Licensing Act."

Assembly No. 3009, by Assemblywoman LAMPITT, Labor -- Increases reporting requirements for the NJ Basic Skills Training Program for Economic Growth.

Assembly No. 3010, by Assemblywoman LAMPITT, Higher Education -- Prohibits institution of higher education that provides child care from charging student-parent who receives child care voucher under "New Jersey Cares for Kids Program" an amount for child care in excess of voucher amount.

Assembly No. 3011, by Assemblywoman LAMPITT, Higher Education -- Prohibits institutions of higher education from requiring students who have children to purchase meal plans, live in on-campus housing, or pay gym fees.

Assembly No. 3012, by Assemblywoman LAMPITT, Education -- Requires public schools, and nonpublic schools which receive federal funding, to provide students with information on rights afforded under Title IX, and provide contact information for Title IX coordinator.

Assembly No. 3013, by Assemblywoman LAMPITT, Human Services -- Requires Division of Developmental Disabilities to make comprehensive list of its programs available to public.

Assembly No. 3014, by Assemblywoman LAMPITT, Human Services -- Transfers administration of programs for certain individuals with developmental disabilities from DHS to DCF.

Assembly No. 3015, by Assemblywoman LAMPITT, Human Services -- Directs certain recoveries of federal funds for services to persons with developmental disabilities be used for grants to support community infrastructure purposes.

Assembly No. 3016, by Assemblywoman LAMPITT, Education -- Requires carbon monoxide detectors in school buildings.

Assembly No. 3017, by Assemblywoman LAMPITT, Women and Children -- Permits pharmacists to provide self-administered hormonal contraceptives to patients over the counter.

Assembly No. 3018, by Assemblywoman LAMPITT, Health -- Establishes protection from adverse employment action for authorized medical cannabis patients.

Assembly No. 3019, by Assemblywoman LAMPITT, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Authorizes DOT, NJTA, and SJTA to permit BPU-certified persons to install and maintain solar photovoltaic panels on noise barriers erected on roads and highways.

Assembly No. 3020, by Assemblywoman LAMPITT, Science, Innovation and Technology -- Creates matching grant program for small businesses engaged in life sciences.

Assembly No. 3021, by Assemblywoman LAMPITT, Women and Children -- Establishes central registry for background checks of youth serving organization employees and volunteers.

Assembly No. 3022, by Assemblywoman LAMPITT, Education -- Requires school district that includes any of grades 9 through 12 to biannually provide to local Workforce Investment Board list of students who left school prior to graduation.

Assembly No. 3023, by Assemblywoman LAMPITT, Labor -- Concerns discrimination because of familial status.

Assembly No. 3024, by Assemblywoman LAMPITT, Science, Innovation and Technology -- Establishes innovation zone program to stimulate technology industry clusters around New Jersey's research institutions; allows certain technology businesses located in certain innovation zones to receive certain tax credits under Grow New Jersey Assistance Program.

Assembly No. 3025, by Assemblywoman LAMPITT, Health -- Permits young adult who is claimed as a dependent on a relative's tax return to receive Work First New Jersey General Public Assistance benefits.

Assembly No. 3026, by Assemblywoman LAMPITT, Health -- Requires retail health clinics to develop policies and procedures identifying services provided by the clinics.

Assembly No. 3027, by Assemblywoman LAMPITT, Labor -- Commits \$3 million from Supplemental Workforce Fund for Basic Skill to NJ Community College Consortium for Workforce and Economic Development.

Assembly No. 3028, by Assemblywoman LAMPITT, Education -- Establishes Statewide Assessment Review Task Force.

Assembly No. 3029, by Assemblywoman LAMPITT, Health -- Allows other licensed healthcare providers trained in evaluation and management of concussions in addition to physicians to provide written clearance for student-athlete return to competition.

Assembly No. 3030, by Assemblywoman LAMPITT, Labor -- Establishes NJ Supporting Knowledge and Investing in Life Long Skills Commission in the Department of State.

Assembly No. 3031, by Assemblywoman LAMPITT, Commerce and Economic Development -- Provides credit under corporation business tax and gross income tax for construction of buildings in accordance with certain energy and environmental performance standards.

Assembly No. 3032, by Assemblywoman LAMPITT, Housing -- Requires HMFA to establish "Sustainable Tiny Home Pilot Program" in three regions of State; appropriates \$5 million.

Assembly No. 3044, by Assemblywoman LAMPITT, Higher Education -- Requires public institution of higher education to notify the parents of certain dependent students, without prior consent of the student, when student receives mental health treatment at the institution.

Assembly No. 3045, by Assemblywoman LAMPITT, Higher Education -- Establishes Council of Women in Higher Education in Department of State to study and promote women's issues within institutions of higher education.

Assembly No. 3046, by Assemblywoman LAMPITT, Education -- Creates corporate business tax and gross income tax credits to fund education enrichment demonstration program.

Assembly No. 3047, by Assemblywoman LAMPITT, Education -- "Innovation Schools Act"; establishes process to develop innovation schools.

Assembly No. 3048, by Assemblywoman LAMPITT, Labor -- Requires employers to report certain allegations of sexual assault.

Assembly No. 3056, by Assemblyman GREENWALD, State and Local Government -- Authorizes school district that moves its annual school election to November to submit separate proposals for additional spending for budget year and subsequent budget year.

Assembly No. 3057, by Assemblyman GREENWALD, State and Local Government -- Modifies requirements for preliminary site plans and subdivisions under Municipal Land Use Law.

Assembly No. 3062, by Assemblywoman PINTOR MARIN, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- Establishes three year Financial Empowerment Pilot Program.

Assembly No. 3063, by Assemblywoman PINTOR MARIN, State and Local Government -- Clarifies provisions concerning disclosure of existence and content of discrimination or harassment complaints; permits certain disclosures to person against whom complaint is made.

Assembly No. 3064, by Assemblywoman PINTOR MARIN, Commerce and Economic Development -- Establishes Emerging Technology Urban Grant Program in EDA.

Assembly No. 3065, by Assemblyman HOUGHTALING, Consumer Affairs -- Requires certain retailers to post signs regarding risks associated with use of beach umbrellas and requires anchoring of beach umbrellas.

Assembly No. 3066, by Assemblyman HOUGHTALING, Agriculture -- Authorizes award of reasonable costs and attorney fees to farmers prevailing in certain farm management disputes.

Assembly No. 3067, by Assemblyman HOUGHTALING, Consumer Affairs -- Requires certain disclosures under motor vehicle lease.

Assembly No. 3068, by Assemblyman HOUGHTALING, Appropriations -- Modifies \$100,000 income eligibility cap on pension and retirement income exclusion to allow for accounting of other deductions.

Assembly No. 3076, by Assemblywoman QUIJANO, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Requires BPU to adopt energy efficiency standards for general service incandescent lamps equivalent to federal standards.

Assembly No. 3077, by Assemblywomen QUIJANO, Lopez and Pinkin, Environment and Solid Waste - Creates "Coastal Climate Change Commission."

Assembly No. 3078, by Assemblywoman QUIJANO, Health -- Requires DHS to make list of drugs with "black box" warnings accessible through its website.

Assembly No. 3079, by Assemblywoman QUIJANO, Health -- "Parkinson's Disease Public Awareness and Education Act."

Assembly No. 3080, by Assemblywoman QUIJANO, Health -- Establishes one New Jersey Suicide Prevention Advisory Council in DOH.

Assembly No. 3081, by Assemblywoman QUIJANO, Aging and Senior Services -- Establishes "Comprehensive Geriatric Fall Prevention Pilot Program" in DHS; appropriates \$11.7 million.

Assembly No. 3173, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, State and Local Government -- Makes supplemental appropriation of \$750,000 to New Jersey Library Network for continuation of services.

Assembly No. 3174, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, Education -- Requires State to reimburse school districts for costs of transporting homeless students.

Assembly No. 3175, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, Education -- Prohibits administration of assessments developed by Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for College and Careers.

Assembly No. 3176, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, Education -- Requires institutions of higher education and public and nonpublic high schools and middle schools to adopt anti-hazing policies; expands activities encompassing criminal hazing and upgrades penalties for engaging in these activities.

Assembly No. 3178, by Assemblyman BURZICHELLI, Higher Education -- Applies provisions of "New Jersey College Student and Parent Consumer Information Act" to proprietary schools and limits eligibility for direct State aid and State student assistance programs under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 3179, by Assemblyman BURZICHELLI, Housing -- Revises definition of "landlord" to include rooming and boarding house owners and operators with regard to ordinances holding landlords to certain standards of responsibility.

Assembly No. 3180, by Assemblyman BRAMNICK, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- Prohibits certain provisions in liability insurance policies.

Assembly No. 3181, by Assemblyman BRAMNICK, Education -- Clarifies circumstances in which school board member may participate in volunteer activities.

Assembly No. 3183, by Assemblywoman MUNOZ, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- Prohibits payment of more than one copayment, coinsurance or deductible for series of vaccinations used in preventive treatment of rabies under certain health benefits plans.

Speaker Coughlin announced that he was advised by the Secretary of the Senate and the Clerk of the General Assembly that a quorum was present at this joint session of the 219th Legislature.

The Invocation was delivered by Pastor Albert L. Morgan, of the Union Baptist Church, in Bridgeton, New Jersey.

Assemblyman Moen led in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Speaker Coughlin recognized Senate President Sweeney who informed the joint session that the Governor had arrived.

Governor Phil Murphy delivered his budget message to the joint session of the 219th Legislature.

The Benediction was delivered by Bishop Timothy L. Pernell, Jr., of Bet HaShem YHWH Episkopos Worldwide Ministries in Bloomfield, New Jersey.

Speaker Coughlin recognized Assembly Majority Leader Greenwald who moved that this joint session of the 219th Legislature be adjourned, which was seconded by Senate President Pro Tempore Ruiz and passed by voice vote.

Speaker Coughlin declared the joint session adjourned and the Assembly to be in routine business.

Assembly No. 3196, by Assemblyman KARABINCHAK, Commerce and Economic Development - "New Jersey Venture Investment and Employment Program Act"; establishes program under NJ EDA to provide for qualified investments of capital in qualified businesses.

Assembly No. 3197, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, Judiciary -- Revises civil remedies for victims of invasion of privacy due to unauthorized recording or disclosure of sexual or intimate images.

Assembly No. 3198, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, Judiciary -- Permits, under certain circumstances, person adjudged juvenile delinquent to expunge record for act which would have constituted robbery if committed by adult.

Assembly No. 3199, by Assemblywoman MURPHY and Assemblyman BENSON, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- Prohibits discrimination against living organ donors in relation to life, health, and long-term care insurance.

Assembly No. 3200, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Requires DMVA to partner with National Guard Association of New Jersey to offer State-sponsored life insurance for members of New Jersey National Guard.

Assembly No. 3201, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, Tourism, Gaming and the Arts -- Recognizes Howell House in Cape May as Harriet Tubman Museum in New Jersey.

Assembly No. 3202, by Assemblyman DANCER, Health -- Establishes the New Jersey Rare Disease Advisory Council.

Assembly No. 3203, by Assemblyman DANCER, Human Services - Excludes veterans' benefits from calculation of financial obligation for care at psychiatric facility.

Assembly No. 3204, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, Homeland Security and State Preparedness -- Provides certain health care benefits to surviving dependents of accidental disability retiree who participated in 9/11 WTC rescue, recovery, or cleanup operations; clarifies eligibility criteria for recalculation of retirement allowance for such participation.

Assembly No. 3205, by Assemblyman DANCER, Human Services -
- Prohibits State from billing counties for cost of psychiatric hospitalization when patient or legally responsible relative is responsible for costs by court order.

Assembly No. 3206, by Assemblyman DANCER, Human Services -
- Amends Fiscal Year 2020 appropriations act to provide \$25 million of Expanded Addiction Initiatives appropriation to services for individuals with co-occurring mental health and substance use disorders.

Assembly No. 3207, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, State and Local Government -- Permits voter registration at age 16, under certain conditions.

Assembly No. 3208, by Assemblyman DANCER, Agriculture -- Permits community gardens to sell excess produce.

Assembly No. 3209, by Assemblyman DANCER, Women and Children -- Clarifies manner of public disclosure of findings or information about child abuse or neglect cases resulting in child fatalities or near fatalities.

Assembly No. 3210, by Assemblyman DANCER, State and Local Government -- Sets States mileage reimbursement rate at IRS rate for business use of automobile.

Assembly No. 3211, by Assemblywomen TIMBERLAKE and REYNOLDS-JACKSON, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Prohibits suspension of driving privileges and arrest for certain crimes and offenses.

Assembly No. 3212, by Assemblyman DANCER, Regulated Professions -- Requires psychiatrists to complete screening certificates no later than 12 hours after completion of screening documents.

Assembly No. 3213, by Assemblyman DANCER, Health -- Increases criminal penalties for selling fetal tissue and requires documentation of costs associated with processing, transportation, and storage.

Assembly No. 3214, by Assemblywomen TIMBERLAKE, REYNOLDS-JACKSON, JIMENEZ, Carter, Tucker, Assemblymen Conaway, Caputo, Moriarty, Assemblywoman Swain, Assemblyman

Mejia, Assemblywoman Sumter, Assemblymen Wimberly and Calabrese, Women and Children -- Prohibits the restraint of prisoners during and immediately after childbirth.

Assembly No. 3216, by Assemblyman DANCER, Agriculture -- Allows Dept. of Agriculture to sell Internet advertisements on its website as pilot program.

Assembly No. 3217, by Assemblywoman JIMENEZ, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Permits person with special needs to voluntarily make notation on driver's license and identification card.

Assembly No. 3218, by Assemblywoman JIMENEZ, Judiciary -- Provides that manipulation of certain caller identification information may constitute cyber-harassment and stalking.

Assembly No. 3219, by Assemblywoman JIMENEZ, Education -- Revises tenure for public school janitors and establishes tenure for certified educational facilities managers.

Assembly No. 3221, by Assemblyman DANCER, Tourism, Gaming and the Arts -- Establishes program authorizing lease of historic buildings and structures in State parks, forests, and wildlife management areas.

Assembly No. 3222, by Assemblyman DANCER, Tourism, Gaming and the Arts -- Requires consideration of ecotourism when evaluating and ranking applications by local government units or qualifying tax exempt nonprofit organizations for acquisition or development of lands for recreation and conservation purposes.

Assembly No. 3223, by Assemblyman DANCER, Environment and Solid Waste -- Creates process for termination of dormant mineral interests.

Assembly No. 3224, by Assemblyman DANCER, Agriculture -- Establishes certain requirements for a State entity planting vegetation in certain circumstances; provides for preferences for NJ businesses providing such vegetation.

Assembly No. 3225, by Assemblyman DANCER, Agriculture -- Allows use of stand-up paddleboards for fishing on lakes in wildlife management areas.

Assembly No. 3226, by Assemblyman DANCER, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Waives pet adoption fees for certain military personnel and veterans.

Assembly No. 3227, by Assemblyman DANCER, Human Services -
- Revises requirements for signage indicating accessible facilities for people with disabilities.

Assembly No. 3228, by Assemblyman DANCER, Regulated Professions -- Requires DOH to establish Statewide standardized requirements for licensure and operation of mobile food vendors; designated as "Streamlined Food Truck Licensure Act."

Assembly No. 3229, by Assemblyman DANCER, Human Services -
- Updates certain provisions concerning legal settlements and persons in mental health facilities to reflect changes in civil union, same sex marriage, and parentage laws.

Assembly No. 3230, by Assemblyman DANCER, Women and Children -- Clarifies that, while fetal death certificate and burial or removal permit are generally not required when fetal death occurs before 20 weeks of gestation, such documentation is to be prepared upon parent's request.

Assembly No. 3231, by Assemblyman DANCER, Agriculture -- Establishes trunk fighting as animal cruelty offense and crime of the third degree.

Assembly No. 3232, by Assemblyman DANCER, Health -- Designated as "Protection of Fetuses from Dismemberment Abortion Act"; prohibits dismemberment abortions.

Assembly No. 3233, by Assemblyman DANCER, Health -- Requires hourly reimbursement rate for home health aide services provided through Statewide Respite Care Program and Jersey Assistance for Community Caregiving Program to be no less than Medicaid fee-for-service rate for personal care services; makes appropriation.

Assembly No. 3234, by Assemblyman PETERSON, Judiciary -- Permits counties to establish county-municipal courts with limited, countywide jurisdiction.

Assembly No. 3235, by Assemblyman PETERSON, Judiciary -- Provides for county-municipal courts with limited, countywide jurisdiction.

Assembly No. 3236, by Assemblyman PETERSON, Housing -- Clarifies DCA's authority to ensure planned real estate development builders comply with disclosure requirements.

Assembly No. 3237, by Assemblyman PETERSON, Environment and Solid Waste -- Requires DEP to develop, and solid waste management districts to use, standardized labels for recycling bins.

Assembly No. 3238, by Assemblyman PETERSON, State and Local Government -- Requires certain conditions affecting application for development or zoning variance to be recorded with municipality and county.

Assembly No. 3239, by Assemblyman PETERSON, Housing -- Requires builders of new homes to provide owners with building plans.

Assembly No. 3243, by Assemblyman PETERSON, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Requires hiring preference for veterans in non-civil service jurisdictions.

Assembly No. 3244, by Assemblyman PETERSON, State and Local Government -- Directs State Treasurer to establish State Government Electronic Payment Security Standards.

Assembly No. 3245, by Assemblyman PETERSON, Community Development and Affairs -- Provides for voluntary contributions to the "Homelessness Prevention Program" through real estate sales.

Assembly No. 3246, by Assemblyman PETERSON, Commerce and Economic Development -- Excludes paraffin used in manufacture of candles from petroleum products gross receipts tax.

Assembly No. 3247, by Assemblyman PETERSON, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Exempts storage facility space furnished to active duty military personnel from sales and use tax.

Assembly No. 3248, by Assemblyman PETERSON, State and Local Government -- Authorizes the Legislative Counsel in the Office of Legislative Services to accept proper and sufficient service of process on behalf of the State Legislature when either or both Houses are named defendants in any legal proceeding.

Assembly No. 3249, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, Judiciary -- Establishes circumstances when court may order physical or psychological examination of sexual assault victim in civil action for damages from sexual assault.

Assembly No. 3250, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, Judiciary -- Establishes circumstances under which court may order physical or psychological examination of sexual assault victim.

Assembly No. 3251, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, Law and Public Safety -- Concerns transportation of persons who are under influence of drugs to medical facility by law enforcement officers.

Assembly No. 3252, by Assemblywoman MURPHY, Law and Public Safety -- Conforms Megan's law to requirements of federal Sex Offender Registration and Notification Act.

Assembly No. 3253, by Assemblywoman CHAPARRO, Women and Children -- Requires AG to regulate and register certain youth football leagues.

Assembly No. 3254, by Assemblymen CAPUTO, BENSON and Assemblywoman DIMASO, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Establishes Office of the Advocate for Private Commuter Bus Service Customers and bill of rights for customers of private carriers operating motorbus regular route services.

Assembly No. 3676, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Health -- Requires certain parking garages to have on-site emergency vehicle capable of accessing low-clearance areas.

Assembly No. 3677, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Education -- Requires candidates for certain teaching certificates to pass written test on foundations of teaching reading and diagnosing reading difficulties.

Assembly No. 3678, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Human Services -- Clarifies that residents with mental illness or substance use disorders may be included on public safety special assistance municipal lists.

Assembly No. 3679, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Law and Public Safety -- Concerns diversion from criminal prosecution for persons with mental illness under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 3680, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Law and Public Safety -- Imposes time constraints on submission and analysis of rape kits.

Assembly No. 3681, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Law and Public Safety -- Authorizes State and local law enforcement entities to contract for bulk purchasing of heroin antidote.

Assembly No. 3682, by Assemblywoman LOPEZ, Education -- Requires public schools to comply with more stringent school lunch and breakfast nutrition standards adopted by USDA in 2012.

Assembly No. 3683, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Law and Public Safety -- Establishes right of sexual assault victim to notification of certain developments in criminal case.

Assembly No. 3684, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Homeland Security and State Preparedness -- Requires State employees to receive best cybersecurity practices.

Assembly No. 3685, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Human Services -- Allows municipality to establish reserved parking zone on property adjacent to disabled person's residence.

Assembly No. 3686, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Law and Public Safety -- Requires firearm owners who become New Jersey residents to obtain firearm purchaser identification card and register firearms acquired out-of-State.

Assembly No. 3777, by Assemblyman DANCER, Human Services -
- Establishes security standards for judicial hearings at mental health facilities.

Assembly No. 3778, by Assemblyman DANCER, Judiciary --
Expands crime of human trafficking to include individuals who benefit financially.

Assembly No. 3779, by Assemblyman DANCER, Judiciary --
Authorizes wiretapping to investigate crimes involving human trafficking or certain prostitution activities.

Assembly No. 3780, by Assemblyman DANCER, Judiciary --

Assembly No. 3786, by Assemblyman MOEN, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Increases fines for littering; requires DOT to develop program for litter reporting.

Assembly No. 3787, by Assemblyman MOEN, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- "Drew's Law"; allows counties and municipalities to establish, or request DOT to establish, 15 miles per hour speed limit in or near certain parks and to set increased penalty for violating speed limit.

Assembly No. 3796, by Assemblymen JOHNSON and KARABINCHAK, Judiciary -- Makes it aggravated sexual assault or sexual contact for transportation network company or taxicab driver to commit act of sexual penetration or sexual contact using coercion or without permission on passenger.

Assembly No. 3797, by Assemblyman BURZICHELLI, Law and Public Safety -- Establishes New Jersey Bias Crime Offender Registry.

Assembly No. 3798, by Assemblyman BURZICHELLI, Higher Education -- Makes Fiscal Year 2020 supplemental appropriation of \$150,000 to Rutgers University - Camden for Senator Walter Rand Institute for Public Affairs.

Assembly No. 3799, by Assemblywoman DECROCE, Environment and Solid Waste -- Prohibits sale of expanded polystyrene food containers by public schools and public institutions of higher education.

Assembly No. 3800, by Assemblywoman DECROCE, Health -- Provides for voluntary contributions by taxpayers on gross income tax returns for pediatric cancer research.

Assembly No. 3802, by Assemblyman MCKEON, Agriculture -- Directs Dept. of Agriculture to establish "Urban Farming Pilot Program"; appropriates \$100,000.

Assembly No. 3803, by Assemblyman ARMATO, Labor -- Enhances, and allocates funds for, pre-apprenticeship programs.

Assembly No. 3804, by Assemblyman ARMATO, Law and Public Safety -- Designates 9-1-1 operators or dispatchers as 9-1-1 first responder dispatchers.

Assembly No. 3805, by Assemblyman ARMATO, Higher Education -- Establishes annual grant program to recognize institutions of higher education that offer comprehensive array of veteran programs and services.

Assembly No. 3806, by Assemblywoman TIMBERLAKE, Assemblyman WIMBERLY, Assemblywoman JASEY, Assemblymen Spearman and Calabrese, Community Development and Affairs -- Requires inspection for pest infestation prior to certain demolition.

Assembly No. 3807, by Assemblywoman PINKIN, Higher Education -- Establishes certain rights for students with military obligations attending public institutions of higher education and permits late registration for students with military obligations.

Assembly No. 3808, by Assemblywoman PINKIN, State and Local Government -- Requires State and local public contracts for food services to require compliance with federal food service guidelines.

Assembly No. 3809, by Assemblywoman PINKIN, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- Prohibits attachment of homestead in medical malpractice judgment.

Assembly No. 3815, by Assemblyman SCHAER, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- Allows health maintenance organizations to include charity care assessments for purposes of meeting certain loss ratio requirements.

Assembly No. 3816, by Assemblyman SCHAER, Regulated Professions -- Eliminates 15% fee charged by cemetery company on transfer of graves, crypts and niches.

Assembly No. 3928, by Assemblymen DEPHILLIPS and BERGEN, State and Local Government -- Increases, from 18 percent to 30 percent, amount of rental payments defined as rent constituting property taxes for purposes of deduction from gross income for property tax payments.

Assembly No. 3929, by Assemblyman BERGEN, State and Local Government -- Permits taxpayer to file or make gross income tax, corporation business tax, or sales and use tax return or payment by July 31, 2020 without penalty.

Assembly No. 3930, by Assemblyman DIMAIO, Assemblywoman DECROCE, Assemblymen Bergen and DePhillips, Labor -- Excludes payments made for unemployment compensation benefits related to layoffs resulting from coronavirus disease 2019 pandemic from calculation of employer contribution for unemployment compensation benefits.

Assembly No. 3931, by Assemblymen DIMAIO and WIRTHS, Environment and Solid Waste -- Suspends local ordinances concerning single-use carryout bags, and prohibits use of reusable carryout bags in certain stores, during coronavirus disease state of emergency.

Assembly No. 3932, by Assemblymen MCCLELLAN and SIMONSEN, Health -- Requires coronavirus disease 2019 testing for certain persons.

Assembly No. 3933, by Assemblyman WIRTHS, Labor -- Revises workers' compensation coverage for certain injuries to volunteer and professional public safety and law enforcement personnel.

Assembly No. 3934, by Assemblyman DANCER, Homeland Security and State Preparedness -- Requires designation of certain intersections for alternative emergency power generator in event of Statewide emergency.

Assembly No. 3935, by Assemblyman DANCER, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Prohibits electric and gas public utilities from collecting payment from residential budget billing plan customers whose service was interrupted as a result of major emergency event.

Assembly No. 3936, by Assemblyman DANCER, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Requires NJT to refund customers or offer credit for certain tickets and passes due to COVID-19 pandemic.

Assembly No. 3937, by Assemblyman DANCER, Appropriations -- Allows 45 day extension for filing a return under the sales tax during state of emergency related to COVID-19 pandemic.

Assembly No. 3938, by Assemblywoman QUIJANO, without reference, on second reading -- Excludes from severance requirements under "Millville Dallas Airmotive Plant Job Loss Notification Act" mass layoffs resulting from coronavirus disease 2019 pandemic.

Assembly No. 3939, by Assemblyman HOUGHTALING, Labor -- Revises definition of seasonal employment in wage and hour law to exclude all farm labor.

Assembly No. 3940, by Assemblyman BURZICHELLI, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Modifies interest rates and accrual of interest on certain unpaid water and sewer utility bills and delinquent municipal taxes, assessments, and other municipal liens and charges.

Assembly No. 3941, by Assemblyman BENSON, Health -- Provides for funds received from opioid litigation or settlements to be dedicated for use in financing substance use disorder prevention and treatment programs and services in New Jersey.

Assembly No. 4021, by Assemblyman THOMSON, Health -- Requires DOH to administer coronavirus disease 2019 antibody testing.

Assembly No. 4022, by Assemblymen MCGUCKIN and CATALANO, Homeland Security and State Preparedness -- "The Reliability, Preparedness, and Storm Response Act of 2020"; requires public utilities to file certain information concerning emergency preparedness with BPU and increases certain penalties.

Assembly No. 4023, by Assemblyman DANCER, Law and Public Safety -- Upgrades certain penalties for resisting arrest; prohibits merger of resisting arrest with other criminal convictions.

Assembly No. 4024, by Assemblyman DANCER, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Requires BPU to consider certain revenue-raising limitations when determining whether to approve increases in public utility rates, fares or charges that may be assessed to municipalities.

Assembly No. 4025, by Assemblyman DANCER, Military and Veterans' Affairs -- Excludes military compensation of military personnel serving outside of this State from gross income tax.

Assembly No. 4026, by Assemblyman DANCER, Agriculture -- Clarifies voting ability of members of State Agriculture Development Committee.

Assembly No. 4027, by Assemblyman DANCER, State and Local Government -- Authorizes municipalities, by resolution, to require tax collector to remove parcel of real property from accelerated tax sale list if fourth quarter property taxes not paid but property materially depreciated following severe weather event.

Assembly No. 4028, by Assemblyman DEPHILLIPS, Budget -- Reduces CBT rate; retroactive to January 1, 2020.

Assembly No. 4029, by Assemblyman DEPHILLIPS, Budget -- Provides gross income tax credit to health care workers or first responders involved in COVID-19 response.

Assembly No. 4030, by Assemblyman MUKHERJI, Appropriations -- Establishes Employment and Business-Related Tax Deferral Assistance Program in EDA to allow small businesses to defer the payment and remittance of certain employment and business-related taxes during COVID-19 public health emergency.

Assembly No. 4031, by Assemblyman GREENWALD, Appropriations -- Requires State Treasurer to make loans to casino gaming properties for making required payments in lieu of property taxes to Atlantic City during current public health emergency and state of emergency.

Assembly No. 4032, by Assemblyman GREENWALD, Appropriations -- Provides temporary modifications to payment and use of certain casino gaming taxes and fees due to COVID-19 Public Health Emergency and State of Emergency; allows full deduction of promotional gaming credits and certain coupons from gross revenues.

Assembly No. 4126, by Assemblyman EGAN, Appropriations -- Permits local units and authorities to waive interest and lien enforcement for certain delinquent water and sewer utility payments during emergency circumstances.

Assembly No. 4128, by Assemblyman VERRELLI, Appropriations -- Concerns participation in certain meetings by means of remote communication during state of emergency declared by the Governor.

ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 3813

(First Reprint)

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the New Jersey Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 3813 (First Reprint) without my approval.

This bill would permit school districts, charter schools, county vocational school districts and county special services school districts to meet the 180-day school year requirement through virtual or remote instruction whenever schools are required to close for more than three consecutive days due to a declared state of emergency, a declared public health emergency, or a directive by the appropriate local health officer or agency, provided the program of virtual or remote instruction satisfies criteria established by the Department of Education (“Department”). In the case of an approved private school for students with disabilities that is required to close, the days of virtual or remote instruction would be counted as days of instruction for the purposes of calculating tuition, provided the program of virtual or remote instruction satisfies criteria established by the Department. The bill also would entitle public school employees covered by a collective bargaining agreement to the compensation, benefits and emoluments provided for in the collective bargaining agreement, as if the school remained open.

The bill was introduced and passed by the Assembly on March 16, 2020 and by the Senate on March 19, 2020. It was one of several bills that was introduced and quickly moved through the Legislature in response to the emerging COVID-19 public health emergency. I applaud the bill’s sponsors for taking quick and decisive action to assist New Jersey’s schools and educators in the transition to home instruction. The bill supported and expanded upon home instruction guidance documents issued by the Department in early March.

Since then, however, similar legislation was passed and signed into law, obviating the need for this bill. P.L.2020, c.27, signed into law on April 14, 2020, is the product of significant collaboration between my Administration and our partners in the Legislature. P.L.2020, c.27 contains a more comprehensive authorization of virtual or remote learning in the provision of special education and related services. While Assembly Bill No. 3813 (First Reprint) singled out speech therapy and counseling services as special education services that could be delivered remotely, P.L.2020, c.27 contains a broad authorization for all “special education and related services” to the greatest extent possible. Additionally, P.L.2020, c.27 clarifies that renaissance school projects are included in the list of schools and school districts permitted to meet the 180-day school year through virtual or remote instruction and provides boards of education with greater involvement in the implementation of a district’s virtual learning plan.

Accordingly, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 3813 (First Reprint) without my approval.

ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 3841

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the New Jersey Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 3841 without my approval.

This bill would automatically extend the April 15, 2020 annual and quarterly return filing deadlines and payment due dates for the Gross Income Tax and Corporation Business Tax to coincide with the extended due date established by the federal Internal Revenue Service ("IRS"), provided that the extended date is no later than June 30, 2020. Taxpayers filing by the extended due date would not be subject to penalties or interest payments.

Assembly Bill No. 3841 was passed by the Legislature on March 19, 2020. Although an extension of the federal tax deadline was widely anticipated at that time, it had not yet been fully announced. Shortly thereafter, on March 20, 2020, IRS Notice 2020-18 was issued through which the United States Treasury Department and the IRS announced that the federal income tax filing and payment due date had been extended from April 15, 2020 to July 15, 2020 and that taxpayers also may defer quarterly federal income tax payments due on April 15, 2020 to July 15, 2020, without penalties and interest, regardless of the amount owed.

I applaud the sponsors of Assembly Bill No. 3841 for their proactive efforts to enable New Jersey taxpayers to take full advantage of a federal tax extension. However, following the federal announcement, it became necessary to modify the language of the bill in order to match the State and federal filing deadlines.

To that end, my Administration worked closely with my partners in the Legislature on replacement legislation aligning the State's tax filing and payment due dates with the filing payment due dates established by the IRS. P.L.2020, c.19 was signed into law on April 14, 2020. In addition to removing the June 30, 2020 limitation, P.L.2020, c.19 includes language aligning technical aspects of the State filing

extension with the federal filing extension in order to reduce potential confusion among taxpayers and preparers.

Accordingly, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 3841 without my approval.

ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 3842

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14, of the New Jersey Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 3842 without my approval.

This bill would establish a "Bridging the Digital Divide in Schools Grant Program" in the Department of Education ("Department"). The program would allocate grants to school districts, charter schools,

This bill would establish a "Bridging the Digital Divide in Schools Grant Program" in the Department of Education ("Department"). The program would allocate grants to school districts, charter schools, renaissance school projects, and nonpublic schools to provide or expand access to education technology for students whose families do not have the means to purchase technology equipment such as laptops, tablets, or electronic mobile devices, or who lack Internet access at home. The bill would appropriate from the General Fund an unspecified amount "as may be necessary" to effectuate its purposes.

I commend the bill's sponsors for recognizing the challenges that home instruction presents to students and families with limited resources or who lack Internet access in their homes. I share the sponsors' commitment to removing barriers to remote learning so that all students may fully participate in the virtual classroom experience during this unprecedented time. However, the open-ended appropriation authorized by this bill would trigger an indeterminate, unbudgeted cost, potentially amounting to many tens of millions of dollars. Even under normal circumstances, I would be hesitant to endorse a bill with such far-reaching fiscal implications outside of the annual budget negotiation process; the State's current budgetary and economic conditions compel even greater restraint.

The COVID-19 pandemic is having a profoundly negative impact on the State's economy and finances. In order to ensure sufficient cash flows are available to meet emergency and statutorily required

obligations through the end of the fiscal year, over \$1 billion in items of appropriation have been placed into reserve since March. The hard reality is that we will be facing unprecedented budgetary challenges in the coming months and beyond. I have been advised by the State Treasurer that we expect this pandemic to cause precipitous declines in revenues both in Fiscal Year 2020 and Fiscal Year 2021.

Fortunately, federal assistance may be available to achieve the purposes contemplated in the bill. The Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act's Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Fund ("ESSERF") provides funding to address the impact that the COVID-19 pandemic has had on elementary and secondary schools across the country. New Jersey's ESSERF allocation totals over \$310 million. At least 90 percent of the funding (approximately \$280 million) will be allocated by the Department to local districts to provide educational services to their students, pursuant to a federally established formula. A maximum of ten percent of the ESSERF allocation may be reserved for State-level "emergency needs . . . to address issues responding to coronavirus."

The ESSERF funds allocated to the districts will be used at the districts' discretion and in accordance with their local needs. For those districts whose students lack the equipment or technology necessary to fully implement remote learning plans, the ESSERF funds will be available to assist them in the purchase of laptops, tablets, hot spot access, and other devices for the students who need them. Notably, the district allocation formula established by the federal government is based on economic need. This should further enhance the ability of those districts with the largest number of children living in poverty to bridge the so-called digital divide.

As my Administration continues to fight for direct assistance from our federal government, there are steps that our State must take on its own to secure our budgetary and cash flow position. Among the most crucial is swift passage of the New Jersey COVID-19 Emergency Bond Act ("Bond Act"), which will allow New Jersey to access billions of dollars in loans through the federal lending facility and the public and private markets. Passing the Bond Act is essential to ensuring the State can meet its short-term obligations in light of present revenue and liquidity challenges.

While I wholeheartedly share the sponsors' concerns for taking necessary steps to meet the critical educational needs of New Jersey's schools and students in this time of crisis and thereafter, I am compelled

to refrain from approving the new spending authorized by this bill at a time when the State's fiscal circumstances are so dire. I look forward to working closely with my partners in the Legislature in the days and weeks ahead to address the unprecedented budget challenges our State faces so we can ensure New Jerseyans have access to critical services during this time of crisis and recovery.

Accordingly, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 3842 without my approval.

ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 3846

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14, of the New Jersey Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 3846 without my approval.

This bill would appropriate \$20 million from the General Fund to establish the "Temporary Lost Wage Unemployment Program." Under the program, not more than \$10 million would be made available to fully compensate workers for lost wages resulting from a COVID-19-related absence from work. Up to an additional \$10 million would be made available to reimburse employers for wages paid to workers "who are ordered under quarantine by a licensed healthcare practitioner as a result of coronavirus disease 2019."

The COVID-19 pandemic is having a profound impact on our State's economy and the millions of dedicated workers who make it run. I share the sponsors' commitment to ensuring a robust safety net for the hundreds of thousands of New Jersey workers whose lives and livelihoods have been upended by the COVID-19 pandemic. That is why I was pleased to sign Senate Bill No. 2304, codified as P.L.2020, c.17, on March 25, 2020. The act expanded the scope of the State's Temporary Disability Benefits Law to allow more workers to access temporary disability insurance ("TDI") and family leave insurance ("FLI") benefits during a public health emergency. The new law allows employees to access TDI if they are required to take time off of work due to an illness caused by an epidemic of a communicable disease, a known or suspected exposure to a communicable disease, or efforts to prevent the spread of a communicable disease in response to an order from a public health authority or health care provider. The law allows

employees to access FLI if they need to care for a family member who is seriously ill or who must be quarantined or isolated due to COVID-19 precautions. The law also eliminates the one-week waiting period for temporary disability benefits to provide immediate relief to employees impacted by COVID-19.

I commend the sponsors of Assembly Bill No. 3846 for their efforts in advocating for the expansion of unemployment benefits during the COVID-19 crisis and I share their concern for workers who are unable to claim unemployment, TDI, and FLI benefits during this troubling time. However, the budgetary and economic consequences of the COVID-19 pandemic prevent me from approving the \$20 million in new expenditures authorized by this bill. The events surrounding COVID-19 are having a profoundly negative impact on the State's economy and financial condition, as demonstrated by the decision to place over \$1 billion in items of appropriation into reserve since March. These measures were necessary to ensure that sufficient cash flows are available to meet emergency and statutorily required obligations through the end of the fiscal year.

Moreover, I have been advised by the State Treasurer that we expect this pandemic to cause precipitous declines in revenues both in Fiscal Year 2020 and Fiscal Year 2021, which will cause us to face a number of very difficult decisions in the coming months. In order to ensure that New Jerseyans have access to critical assistance during this time of crisis and recovery, we must take immediate action to secure our budgetary and cash flow position. As my Administration continues to fight for direct assistance from our federal government, additional actions will be needed across all levels of government. Among the most crucial is swift passage of the New Jersey COVID-19 Emergency Bond Act ("Bond Act"), which will allow New Jersey to access billions of dollars in loans through the federal lending facility and the public and private markets. Passing the Bond Act is essential to ensuring the State can meet its short-term obligations in light of present revenue and liquidity challenges.

Yet, even if the State had the resources that passage of the Bond Act will provide, the \$20 million authorized by this bill represents only a tiny fraction of the amount needed to adequately address the large-scale unemployment caused by the COVID-19 pandemic. The \$10 million earmarked by the bill to compensate workers for lost wages would be enough to provide 10,000 workers with a \$1,000 payment. To put that number in perspective, as of April 13, 2020, there were 856,528

unemployment claims filed by New Jerseyans over the previous five weeks.

Once we have taken the necessary steps to improve our fiscal position, I invite the Legislature to work with me to revisit this issue and similar issues to aid in the State's recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic. I believe that this bill sets forth a solid but imperfect framework to aid our most vulnerable residents, specifically undocumented workers who are ineligible for traditional unemployment benefits and public assistance programs, such as Supplemental Nutritional Assistance Program (SNAP) and federal rent subsidies. However, until actions are taken to blunt the fiscal impact of this pandemic on the State, I cannot authorize new expenditures from the General Fund.

Accordingly, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 3846 without my approval.

ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 3856

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the New Jersey Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 3856 without my approval.

This bill would provide a Fiscal Year 2020 supplemental appropriation of \$10 million from the General Fund to provide financial assistance to health care and residential facilities for the purpose of meeting the sanitation demands imposed by the COVID-19 pandemic. Among the facilities eligible for the assistance are nursing homes, long-term care facilities, senior centers, State developmental centers, group homes for individuals with medical needs, and State psychiatric hospitals. Relevant commissioners, including the Commissioners of Health, Human Services, Children and Families, and Community Affairs, would determine the methodology for allocating the funds across the eligible facilities.

I commend the bill's sponsors for their efforts to assist our health care and residential facilities in managing the increased demands posed by the COVID-19 pandemic. Nursing homes and long-term care facilities are among the most at-risk for COVID-19 outbreaks. When the vulnerable populations who reside in these facilities are exposed to

the virus, the results are especially devastating. Vigilant cleaning and disinfecting of equipment, frequently touched surfaces, and communal areas are especially critical to control the spread of infection and protect our most at-risk residents.

While I certainly understand the urgent need for the resources that would be made available through this bill, my action must be dictated by consideration of the State's current budgetary and economic conditions. The COVID-19 pandemic is having a profoundly negative impact on the State's economy and finances. In order to ensure sufficient cash flows are available to meet emergency and statutorily required obligations through the end of the fiscal year, over \$1 billion in items of appropriation have been placed into reserve since March. The hard reality is that we will be facing unprecedented budgetary challenges in the coming months and beyond. I have been advised by the State Treasurer that we expect this pandemic to cause precipitous declines in revenues both in Fiscal Year 2020 and Fiscal Year 2021. While I absolutely share the sponsors' appreciation of the increased sanitization demands at these facilities, it is incumbent upon us to make informed decisions in full consideration of our budgetary and cash flow position.

Fortunately, federal assistance may be available to achieve the purposes contemplated in this bill. Under the President's approval of my request for a major disaster declaration for the State of New Jersey, government entities and eligible non-profits, such as public and non-profit health care facilities, may be eligible to apply for assistance under the Federal Emergency Management Agency ("FEMA") Public Assistance Program. Under the Public Assistance Program, FEMA may reimburse eligible entities for a portion of certain costs of emergency protective measures necessary to protect the health and safety of impacted communities, including for costs associated with cleaning and disinfecting equipment. To access this program, health care facilities should continue to work closely with their county and State emergency management partners to determine whether any COVID-19 related expenses can be reimbursed by FEMA.

As my Administration continues to fight for direct assistance from our federal government, there are steps that our State must take on its own to secure our fiscal position. Among the most crucial is swift passage of the New Jersey COVID-19 Emergency Bond Act ("Bond Act"), which will allow New Jersey to access billions of dollars in loans through the federal lending facility and the public and private markets.

Passing the Bond Act is essential to ensuring the State can meet its short-term obligations in light of present revenue and liquidity challenges.

Although I wholeheartedly support providing supplemental assistance to our health care facilities to protect the residents and frontline providers who live and work there, I cannot approve the new spending authorized by this bill at a time when the State's fiscal circumstances are so dire. I look forward to working closely with my partners in the Legislature in the days and weeks ahead to address the unprecedented budget challenges our State faces so we can ensure New Jerseyans have access to critical services during this time of crisis and recovery.

Accordingly, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 3856 without my approval.

ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 3857

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the New Jersey Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 3857 without my approval.

This bill would provide a Fiscal Year 2020 supplemental appropriation of \$15 million from the General Fund for grants to food banks to provide food assistance to households in need. Of the \$15 million, \$10.8 million would be granted to the Community Food Bank of New Jersey, \$2.4 million would be granted to the Food Bank of South Jersey, and \$1.8 million would be granted to Fulfill Monmouth & Ocean.

I commend the bill's sponsors for their efforts to provide much needed assistance to our State's food banks to help feed the community. Amid the widespread layoffs that have been triggered by the COVID-19 pandemic, food banks are a critical lifeline for a growing number of New Jerseyans. At the same time that the demand for food assistance is at a record high, food donations are in short supply, as many of the largest food donors, including restaurants, grocery stores, and farms, are either shut down or have little leftover inventory to donate.

While I certainly understand the urgent need for the resources that would be made available through this bill, my action must be dictated by consideration of the State's current budgetary and economic

conditions. The COVID-19 pandemic is having a profoundly negative impact on the State's economy and finances. ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 3858

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the New Jersey Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 3858 without my approval.

This bill would direct the Commissioner of Human Services to issue supplemental cash assistance payments to eligible recipients of the Work First New Jersey program. Supplemental payments would be available upon a finding by the Commissioner that the standard benefits issued under the Work First New Jersey program are not sufficient to support the needs of recipients in the State. The bill would appropriate from the General Fund an unidentified amount "as may be necessary" to implement the bill.

Work First New Jersey benefits provide a critical lifeline to vulnerable populations in New Jersey. I commend the bill's sponsors for their efforts in advocating for benefits for individuals in crisis who require additional assistance. However, the open-ended appropriation authorized by this bill would trigger an indeterminate, unbudgeted cost, potentially amounting to many tens of millions of dollars. Even under normal circumstances, I would be hesitant to endorse a bill with such far-reaching fiscal implications outside of the annual budget negotiation process; the State's current budgetary and economic conditions compel even greater restraint.

The COVID-19 pandemic is having a profoundly negative impact on the State's economy and financial condition. In order to ensure sufficient cash flows are available to meet emergency and statutorily required obligations through the end of the fiscal year, over \$1 billion in items of appropriation have been placed into reserve since March. The hard reality is that we will be facing unprecedented budgetary challenges in the coming months and beyond. I have been advised by the State Treasurer that we expect this pandemic to cause precipitous declines in revenues both in Fiscal Year 2020 and Fiscal Year 2021. While I

absolutely share the sponsors' concerns for the well-being of those in need, it is incumbent upon us to make informed decisions in full consideration of our financial position.

As my Administration continues to fight for direct assistance from our federal government, there are steps that our State must take on its own to secure our budgetary and cash flow position. Among the most crucial is swift passage of the New Jersey COVID-19 Emergency Bond Act ("Bond Act"), which will allow New Jersey to access billions of dollars in loans through the federal lending facility and the public and private markets. Passing the Bond Act is essential to ensuring the State can meet its short-term obligations in light of present revenue and liquidity challenges.

While I certainly support the expansion of Work First New Jersey benefits to aid our most vulnerable residents, I cannot approve the new spending authorized by this bill at a time when the State's fiscal circumstances are so dire. I look forward to working closely with my partners in the Legislature in the days and weeks ahead to address the unprecedented budget challenges our State faces. Once we have taken the necessary steps to improve our fiscal position, I invite the Legislature to work with me to revisit this issue and similar issues to aid in the State's recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic.

Accordingly, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 3858 without my approval.

ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 3864

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the New Jersey Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 3864 without my approval.

This bill would permit notarial acts to be performed remotely provided the notarial official has personal knowledge or satisfactory evidence of the identity of the remotely located individual and is reasonably able to confirm the authenticity of the record to be notarized. The notary or the notary's agent or representative would be required to retain an audio-visual recording of the performance of the notarial act for at least 10 years.

The bill was introduced and passed by the Assembly on March 16, 2020 and by the Senate on March 19, 2020. It was one of several bills that was introduced and quickly moved through the Legislature in response to the emerging COVID-19 public health emergency. Although the bill was prioritized as a result of the COVID-19 outbreak, its text dates back several legislative sessions and is not specifically aimed at alleviating the unique burden social distancing orders impose on notaries and the individuals and businesses in need of their services. Significantly, the bill would not take effect until ninety days following enactment, severely limiting any relief it could provide during the COVID-19 emergency.

Following the passage of Assembly Bill No. 3864, my colleagues in the Legislature and I worked closely on legislation which is more precisely tailored to address the practical obstacles to the provision of needed notarial services during the present crisis. P.L.2020, c.26 largely tracks the language contained in Assembly Bill No. 3864, with several important exceptions. First, P.L.2020, c.26 took effect immediately when I signed it on April 14, 2020. Next, this law permits officers authorized to take oaths, affirmations and affidavits, as well as notaries public, to perform their services remotely for the duration of the public health emergency. Finally, this law also permits remote notarization of wills and codicils, in contrast to Assembly Bill No. 3864's express prohibition of that option. I fully appreciate and share the sponsors' recognition of the critical role notarial services play in preventing fraud and abuse in the particular context of wills and related bequests. However, the circumstances of the pandemic creates an urgency in these types of matters – where people may not have wills, or need to make changes to ensure that their loved ones are properly taken care of, while living in the shadow of this deadly virus – that shifts the balance to justify a temporary departure from the normal practice of requiring an individual's physical presence before a notarial officer which, due to social distancing, would otherwise make it impossible to complete these needed tasks.

Accordingly, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 3864 without my approval.

ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 3919

(First Reprint)

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the New Jersey Constitution, I am returning Assembly Bill No. 3919 (First Reprint) with my recommendations for reconsideration.

This bill would extend environmental permits and other governmental approvals for the duration of a newly-created "COVID-19 extension period." In order to protect the health, safety, and welfare of New Jersey residents, it was necessary to suspend, among other activities, non-essential construction projects from continuing in the State, effective April 8, 2020. As I explained in Executive Order No. 122 (2020), construction sites pose particular social distancing challenges, as they frequently require large numbers of workers to gather in close proximity, make contemporaneous, direct contact with the same materials and surfaces, and use common facilities. Although construction projects were allowed to resume beginning on May 13, 2020, I agree with the bill's sponsors that it is necessary to extend permits and other approvals in order to prevent previously approved projects from being abandoned as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic.

While I strongly support the bill's goal of providing businesses impacted by the pandemic with the flexibility and tools they need to support the State's economic development and recovery, I am concerned that the length of the extension period contemplated in the bill could inadvertently undermine this worthy objective. The bill would define the "COVID-19 extension period" to cover the period beginning March 9, 2020 and continuing for the duration of the public health emergency, or the state of emergency, or both, declared in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. In the case of construction projects suspended pursuant to Executive Order No. 122, approvals would be tolled for an additional twelve months following the conclusion of the COVID-19 extension period.

Because of the unprecedented and myriad impacts the COVID-19 pandemic has had and continues to have on the State, the current State of Emergency could remain in place for many years, even after the adverse conditions from the economic downturn caused by the pandemic have improved. By way of comparison, elements of the state of emergency declared in 2012 in response to Superstorm Sandy are still in effect today. Extending approvals potentially years into the future is not only unnecessary, that extension may also provide an unintended avenue that could actually frustrate the intended purpose of stimulating the State's economy. Additionally, an overly lengthy extension could be susceptible to manipulation to circumvent environmental standards. I am therefore recommending that the COVID-19 extension period be limited to just the public health emergency, a period of time that should be shorter in duration than the state of emergency and would more closely coincide with the State's COVID-19 recovery. For these reasons, I am also recommending eliminating the additional twelve-month extension for nonessential projects. At the same time, and in order to ensure that the extension period provides sufficient relief to permit holders, I am also recommending language specifying that the tolling must extend the approval period by at least six months beyond the COVID-19 extension period.

My recommended revisions also modify the bill's structure in order to create a stand-alone COVID-19 permit extension provision. As passed by the Legislature, the bill would amend P.L.2008, c.78 by adding a new COVID-19 related extension period. I am concerned that supplementing an outdated and inefficient paradigm of permit extensions established in response to the 2008 recession and Superstorm

Sandy could unintentionally resurrect non-viable permits or projects that no longer have active approvals. Indeed, when P.L.2008, c.78 was amended in response to Superstorm Sandy in 2012, several parties unscrupulously attempted to revive expired permits that had been initially extended when P.L.2008, c.78 was first enacted in response to the economic recession. This led to frivolous and unnecessary legal challenges that diverted resources from storm recovery efforts. My recommended revisions avoid such an undesirable outcome by creating separate provisions of law to be entitled "The Permit Extension Act of 2020."

My recommendations also expand upon the bill's transparency requirements by directing the Department of Environmental Protection (the "Department") to publish the list of impacted permits extended on the department's website. This will ensure that the public, as well as impacted government agencies and businesses, are able to more readily identify the permits that have been extended under the bill.

Therefore, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 3919 (First Reprint) with my recommendations for amendment.

ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 3959
(Third Reprint)

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the New Jersey Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 3959 (Third Reprint) without my approval.

This bill would establish the "New Jersey Hospitality Small Business Emergency Loan Program" and would appropriate \$100 million to the New Jersey Economic Development Authority ("EDA") to provide financial support to small businesses generally for the costs associated with business operation interruptions caused due to the impacts of COVID-19. Under the loan program, the EDA would be

required to provide loans to small hospitality industry-related businesses to cover immediate, unavoidable expenses, other than payroll costs, throughout the duration of the COVID-19 emergency declared under Executive Order No. 103 (2020). The loans that would be provided under the bill would not be permitted to exceed \$10,000 per month and would be subject to terms and conditions set forth in the bill. The bill would require the EDA to make available no less than a total of \$5 million for the purpose of providing loans to hospitality businesses.

The COVID-19 pandemic is having a devastating impact on small businesses throughout the country and here in New Jersey. On a business level, the impacts of the crisis have reached every industry in the world, but the pandemic's impacts on the small businesses that drive the State's hospitality industry have been particularly acute. The bars, restaurants, and hotels that provide outstanding food, drink, accommodations, entertainment, and hospitality and our beach towns, colonial-era villages, and nature preserves, and our main streets, country roads, and urban centers, are a critically important component of the State's economy, and I commend the bill's sponsors for their efforts to assist these businesses during this extraordinarily challenging time.

However, this proposed program would duplicate the already existing efforts of the EDA, initiated after my colleagues in the Legislature authorized the EDA to provide grants during periods of emergency. This bill would require the EDA to establish an additional program exclusively for small hospitality industry-related businesses that is nearly identical to other programs for which these businesses already qualify. Through various programs, including the Small Business Emergency Assistance Grant Program, Small Business Emergency Assistance Loan Program, Community Development Finance Institution (CDFI) Emergency Loan Loss Reserve Fund, NJ Entrepreneur Support Program, and Emergency Technical Assistance Program, the EDA is providing financing options to small businesses facing economic hardship due to the outbreak of COVID-19. Since these programs launched on March 26, 2020, the EDA has assisted more than 6,350 COVID-19 impacted businesses through grant and loan approvals in excess of \$23.5 million. Nearly all of the assistance provided through these programs went to New Jersey small businesses. In the coming weeks and months, the EDA will provide assistance to tens of thousands of additional businesses through existing programs and new initiatives, like the recently announced expansion of the Micro Business Loan Program.

In addition to the duplicative nature of the loan program to be established through this legislation, I am concerned that the statutorily mandated criteria set forth in the bill are too inflexible to allow the EDA to effectively respond to the continually shifting impact of the pandemic on market conditions and the economy. The bill's rigid requirements for loan amounts, loan terms, interest rates, repayment schedules, and deferrals do not account for the evolving needs of small businesses. As the COVID-19 emergency continues, the EDA will need the flexibility to shape its recovery programs so that they are responsive to rapidly fluctuating market conditions.

The EDA has established a suite of highly effective programs that have provided a crucial lifeline to our State's business community during this unprecedented time. Rather than establishing an unnecessary and duplicative program that targets only a narrow segment of the economy, it would be productive to devise strategies and take steps to acquire the financial resources necessary to expand upon the work that is already underway. To that end, my Administration will continue to fight for federal assistance for the State and its small business community. However, without the ability to access loans through the federal lending facility and the public and private markets through passage of the New Jersey COVID-19 Emergency Bond Act ("Bond Act"), the State will not have adequate cash flow to support programs that are integral to our State's economic recovery, such as small business assistance programs. I look forward to working closely with my partners in the Legislature in the days and weeks ahead to enact the Bond Act into law in order to secure additional funding for economic recovery programs that are flexible and responsive to continually shifting market conditions.

Accordingly, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 3959 (Third Reprint) without my approval.

ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 4132
(Second Reprint)

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the New Jersey Constitution, I am returning Assembly Bill No. 4132 (Second Reprint) with my recommendations for reconsideration.

This bill would make various changes to the State's Unemployment Compensation Law in order to encourage for-profit, non-profit, and

governmental employers to participate in the State's shared work program. Shared work, also known as short-time compensation, helps employers avoid layoffs by reducing the work hours of all workers in a department, shift, or other definable unit. Workers impacted by the reduction in hours receive a partial benefit paid from the State's unemployment compensation fund to make up for the wages they have lost as a result of the reduction of their usual hours of work. The State's shared work employer, including any public employer, that wishes to avail itself of the program since that time.

Before an employer can participate in the shared work program, the employer is required to submit a shared work plan to the Division of Unemployment and Temporary Disability Insurance in the Department of Labor and Workforce Development ("DOLWD") for approval. Prior to submitting a work plan to DOLWD, each employer is required to obtain approval for the shared work plan from the unions representing its employees. Once a plan is submitted, a string of actions implicating multiple State agencies must occur to ensure an employee's benefits, seniority, and other terms of employment are unaffected by the employee's participation in the shared work plan. It may take weeks for employers to accurately assess their workforce, identify "affected units," draw up shared work plans, secure union approval and ratification, and obtain DOLWD approvals.

Although historically very few employers have expressed interest in the program, participation in the program has increased since the enactment of the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security ("CARES") Act. Under the CARES Act, states with existing shared work programs, like New Jersey, can receive reimbursement from the federal government for unemployment benefits paid by states to employees participating in DOLWD-approved shared work plans created by their employers. In addition, employees participating in shared work plans are eligible to receive the \$600 weekly benefit made available under the CARES Act for individuals receiving regular unemployment compensation.

To encourage participation in the State's existing shared work program, Assembly Bill No. 4132 (Second Reprint) would require DOLWD to create a guidance document available to all employers who may be eligible to participate in the program and to contact every non-profit and governmental employer in the State to provide, in addition to the indicated guidance document, information about possible reductions of employer costs under the CARES Act. I commend the Legislature

for their efforts to bring greater attention to this often-neglected program. However, I am concerned that several, substantive changes to the State's Unemployment Compensation Law, which also are included in this bill and are not necessarily related to the shared work program, would have wide-ranging and potentially detrimental consequences on the State's unemployment compensation system. Consequently, I am returning Assembly Bill No. 4132 (Second Reprint) and recommending that several provisions be omitted and altered.

My recommended revisions remove a provision of the bill that would amend the State's Unemployment Compensation Law to increase eligibility for the receipt of unemployment benefits by reducing the amount of wages an employee must have earned prior to being laid off, furloughed, or enrolled in a shared work plan in order to be eligible for the receipt of unemployment benefits. Under the bill, this provision would remain in effect during the time that there is federal reimbursement of shared work benefits pursuant to the CARES Act. While I am not opposed to expanding access to unemployment benefits, changing the eligibility requirements in the manner and period of time contemplated in the bill would shift a financial burden that is currently being absorbed by the federal government on to the State.

Until December 31, 2020, the CARES Act will provide up to 39 weeks of unemployment benefits to individuals who are not eligible for State unemployment benefits. Because the bill would expand eligibility for State unemployment benefits only until December 31, 2020 and because the individuals who would benefit from this expansion are already eligible for UI under the CARES Act, the bill would create the perverse outcome of shifting the cost of covering these workers from the federal government on to the State. Notably, once the federal benefits become unavailable to this population, the State benefits would become unavailable as well. As a result, the bill would have no impact on eligibility; it would simply shift a cost that is already being borne by the federal government on to the State.

I am also recommending the inclusion of several new provisions that will provide needed flexibility for the State to maximize the cost savings of personnel actions that my Administration is taking to reduce State costs while avoiding layoffs. These additional provisions are necessary to preserve the rights of public workers being furloughed or participating in shared work plans. On June 23, 2020, I announced that Communications Workers of America of New Jersey (CWA-NJ) has reached an agreement with the State to implement furloughs in lieu of

layoffs and to defer planned cost of living adjustments on wages, among other cost-saving measures. In order to ensure that pension, health benefits, and civil service rights are maintained during the period of any furlough taken pursuant to this agreement, and during any other furloughs the State may find necessary to implement to deal with the devastating fiscal impacts of COVID-19, I am recommending statutory changes to the State's pension, health benefits, and civil service laws.

The COVID-19 pandemic is having a profoundly negative impact on the State's economy and financial condition. The hard reality is that we will be facing unprecedented budgetary challenges in the coming months and beyond, which will require very difficult decisions and necessitate shared sacrifices. The State's dedicated public workforce will not be immune from these challenges. I am thankful to the Legislature for advancing the shared work program and putting forth a solid framework for achieving some much needed cost savings. I look forward to continuing to work closely with my partners in the Legislature in the days and weeks ahead to address these unprecedented challenges.

Therefore, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 4132 (Second Reprint) with my recommendations for amendment.

Assembly No. 4333, by Assemblywoman DUNN, Transportation and Independent Authorities -- Requires MVC to review certain services and provide certain services online.

Assembly No. 4334, by Assemblywoman DUNN, State and Local Government -- "Transparency in Government Act;" provides for establishment of State public finance website; requires certain public entities receiving State funds to establish similar website; makes an appropriation.

Assembly No. 4335, by Assemblywoman DUNN, State and Local Government -- Requires State Treasurer to publish certain State expenditure and revenue information on government transparency website.

Assembly No. 4336, by Assemblymen SPACE, HOUGHTALING and Auth, Agriculture -- Directs Department of Agriculture to pay annual premiums for the federal Dairy Margin Coverage Program to enrolled dairy farmers.

Assembly No. 4337, by Assemblywoman STANFIELD and Assemblyman PETERS, Financial Institutions and Insurance -- Concerns certain fees for credit card usage during state of emergency.

Conditional Veto of Assembly Bill No. 3971 (First Reprint)

ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 3971

(First Reprint)

To the General Assembly;

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the New Jersey Constitution, I am returning Assembly Bill No. 3971 (First Reprint) with my recommendations for reconsideration.

Assembly Bill No. 3971 (First Reprint) would allow counties and municipalities to borrow money, through the issuance of bonds and notes, to cover the revenue shortfalls and additional costs that are directly attributable to the COVID-19 pandemic. To accomplish this, the bill would establish a new financing mechanism, payable over a ten-year period. The process for authorizing the issuance of "coronavirus relief bonds" would follow the process currently applicable to the issuance of refunding bonds under the "Local Bond Law," N.J.S.A. 40A:2-1 et seq., except that a local unit would not be required to secure Local Finance Board approval unless the local unit seeks to issue debt that exceeds twenty percent of the local unit's prior year budget or the local unit seeks to issue bonds with a repayment term longer than ten years.

The bill would further authorize a local unit, in anticipation of the issuance of coronavirus relief bonds, to borrow money and issue and renew negotiable notes in accordance with the provisions of the Local Bond Law, provided that the coronavirus relief bond, or the anticipation note, is initially issued within twenty-four months after the end of the Public Health Emergency and State of Emergency declared in New Jersey due to COVID-19. Although the bill requires final maturity of

the bond or anticipation note within ten years of the initial issuance, the bill would permit a local unit to apply to the Local Finance Board for a longer repayment term.

I commend the bill's sponsors for their efforts to provide local governments with an essential tool to help them maintain fiscal solvency during and in the aftermath of the COVID-19 pandemic. However, the better pathway to accomplish this result is to build upon the well-established local budgetary and debt structures in facilitating this critical relief, rather than to create a new, additional financing mechanism for this singular purpose. By incorporating into our existing local borrowing framework certain tailored modifications designed to meet local units' emergent needs, we will be able to accomplish the goal of helping address local fiscal needs resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic while maintaining the protections of existing safeguards, which will help ensure that local borrowing is conducted efficiently and responsibly.

Accordingly, my recommendations amend local borrowing laws to enable counties and towns to issue five-year special emergency notes for a broad swath of COVID-19 related costs. In addition, and to meet ongoing operational needs, I am recommending that the special emergency mechanism be expanded to permit adoption of a special emergency to address certified COVID-19 related deficits in operations. This will permit local units that verify the existence of COVID-19 related operational shortfalls to raise the associated costs in their budget over five years, or up to ten years if they can demonstrate to the Local Finance Board that repayment in five years would present a significant financial hardship. Importantly, once a special emergency is adopted, the local unit also obtains access to related short-term borrowing, which avoids excessive long-term debt but provides stable cash flow while the local unit recovers from the fiscal impacts realized during the COVID-19 crisis.

These recommended changes provide both budgetary and cash flow relief using existing and conventional mechanisms that have been adapted to meet the unique local needs emerging during this anomalous period, while empowering local units to respond to and recover from the fiscal repercussions of this unprecedented global crisis.

Therefore, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 3971 (First Reprint) with my recommendations for amendment.

Speaker Coughlin announced that he was advised by the Secretary of the Senate and the Clerk of the General Assembly that a quorum was present at this joint session of the 219th Legislature.

Governor Phil Murphy delivered his budget message to the joint session of the 219th Legislature.

Speaker Coughlin recognized Assembly Majority Leader Greenwald who moved that this joint session of the 219th Legislature be adjourned, which was seconded by Senate Majority Leader Weinberg and passed by voice vote.

Assembly No. 4575, by Assemblyman SPEARMAN, Assemblywomen CHAPARRO and LAMPITT, Agriculture -- Directs NJ Department of Agriculture to request necessary waivers from US Department of Agriculture to provide food and meals during school closures due to COVID-19 public health emergency.

Assembly No. 4576, by Assemblymen CONAWAY and ZWICKER, Health -- Requires students and certain other children to be annually vaccinated for influenza as condition of enrollment at public and private K-12 schools, preschools, child care centers, and institutions of higher education.

Assembly No. 4578, by Assemblyman WIMBERLY, Law and Public Safety -- Establishes certain restrictions on qualified immunity defense for public employees.

Assembly No. 4587, by Assemblyman JOHNSON, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Requires electric public utility to reimburse customer for cost of spoiled food and prescription medicine resulting from service outage more than 48 hours after end of storm.

Assembly No. 4588, by Assemblywoman LOPEZ, Judiciary -- Increases strangulation assault to crime of second degree.

Assembly No. 4589, by Assemblywoman LOPEZ, Oversight, Reform and Federal Relations -- Extends time period during which seasonal retail consumption license holders may sell alcoholic beverages following COVID-19 pandemic.

Assembly No. 4590, by Assemblywoman LOPEZ, Judiciary -- Clarifies penalties for certain violations of pretrial release; directs prosecutor to provide written notice of release to victim.

ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 4475

(Second Reprint)

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the New Jersey Constitution, I am returning Assembly Bill No. 4475 (Second Reprint) with my recommendations for reconsideration.

This bill would require county boards of election to establish mail-in drop boxes in each county at least 45 days prior to the election. In addition, the bill would establish vote-by-mail procedures for the November 2020 General Election. I applaud the sponsors of this legislation for seeking to quickly codify, and expand upon, Executive Order Nos. 177 and 179 in order to facilitate participation in the democratic process this November.

My recommended revision corrects the effective date of section 1 of the bill, which is intended to dictate the requirements for mail-in ballot boxes beginning on February 1, 2021. Section 2, which takes effect immediately, will govern the election procedures, including requirements for mail-in drop boxes, in November.

Therefore, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 4475 (Second Reprint) with my recommendations for amendment.

ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 3965

(First Reprint)

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the New Jersey Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 3965 (First Reprint) without my approval.

This bill would expand an existing loan program administered by the New Jersey Economic Development Authority (“EDA”) to include loans to an eligible “small producer or retailer of alcoholic beverages” for qualified operating expenses during a pandemic. These loans would be issued until the Governor rescinds a declared state of emergency and public health emergency pertaining to a pandemic and would be at an interest rate equal to the prime rate or up to three percentage points above the prime rate. The bill also would expand the non-emergency loan program to allow the EDA to provide, on a permanent basis, loans to a small producer or retailer of alcoholic beverages to be used for “qualified small producer or retailer capital expenses.” As defined in the bill, a “qualified small producer or retailer capital expense” is an amount paid by a small producer or retailer for the purchase of plant, machinery, equipment, or other associated items, for the purpose of an expansion of the business model of the small producer or retailer to alleviate the financial burdens or economic hardship imposed by a pandemic and use by the small producer or retailer within the State in the manufacture, sale, or both, of alcoholic beverages.

The COVID-19 pandemic is having a devastating impact on small businesses throughout the country here in New Jersey. Small producers and retailers of alcoholic beverages have not been immune from the devastating impacts of the crisis. The State’s burgeoning artisanal beverage industry has been the fastest growing in the entire country over the past five years. The hundreds of craft breweries, distilleries, cideries, and meaderies that call the Garden State home exemplify the State’s innovation economy, and I commend the bill’s sponsors for their efforts to assist these businesses during this extraordinarily challenging time.

However, the program proposed in this bill would duplicate the EDA’s existing efforts. Indeed, the bill would require the EDA to establish an additional pandemic-related program exclusively for small producers and retailers of alcoholic beverages that is nearly identical to other programs for which these businesses already qualify. Moreover, the EDA already offers financing for wineries and vineyards through various existing products, including the Premier Lender Program and Access, as well as through regular direct loans provided through the Small Business Fund. To date, the EDA has promoted the availability of these programs through the Garden State Wine Growers Association.

The EDA has also provided financing to craft and microbreweries through its existing suite of programs.

The EDA has established a collection of highly effective programs that have provided a crucial lifeline to our State's business community during the unprecedented economic turmoil caused by the COVID-19 pandemic. Through various programs, including the Small Business Emergency Assistance Grant Program, the Small Business Emergency Assistance Loan Program, the Community Development Financial Institutions (CDFI) Emergency Loan Loss Reserve Fund, the NJ Entrepreneur Support Program, and the Micro Business Loan Program, and E-Commerce Technical Assistance Program, the EDA has made more than \$115 million available to help businesses with cash flow and working capital shortfalls, and to reimburse lost revenue resulting from COVID-19 related business interruptions. Since the first of these programs launched on March 26, 2020, the EDA has assisted more than 16,000 small businesses through these programs. In the coming weeks and months, the EDA will provide assistance to additional businesses through existing programs and new initiatives, including the recently announced New Jersey Small and Micro Business Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) Access Program and the \$10 million expansion of the Small Business Emergency Assistance Loan Program.

In addition to the duplicative nature of this legislation, I am concerned that the statutorily mandated criteria set forth in the bill are too inflexible to allow the EDA to effectively respond to the pandemic's constantly changing impact on market conditions and the economy. The bill's rigid requirements do not account for the evolving needs of small businesses. As the COVID-19 emergency continues, the EDA will need the flexibility to shape its recovery programs so that they are responsive to rapidly fluctuating market conditions. I look forward to working closely with my partners in the Legislature in the days and weeks ahead to advance additional economic recovery programs that are flexible and responsive to continually shifting market conditions.

Accordingly, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 3965 (First Reprint) without my approval.

Assembly No. 4762, by Assemblyman DANCER, State and Local Government -- Provides that healthcare benefits plan, fully or partly paid by public employer, cannot cover public employee's spouse who is subject of divorce from bed and board.

Assembly No. 4763, by Assemblyman DANCER, Telecommunications and Utilities -- Requires electric public utility to identify communities within service territory where at least 40 percent of residential customers rely on private well water, develop service restoration plan for those communities, and provide watering stations.

Assembly No. 4764, by Assemblywoman DUNN, Women and Children -- Authorizes criminal history record background checks of employees and volunteers of nonprofit domestic violence victim serving organizations.

Assembly No. 4765, by Assemblyman DANCER, Judiciary -- Clarifies spitting in law enforcement officer's food or drink constitutes aggravated assault; requires certain sanctions on restaurant employees who commit this crime.

Assembly No. 4766, by Assemblyman CATALANO, Education -- Requires use of annual baseline concussion testing for student-athletes and cheerleaders in grades six through 12.

Assembly No. 4767, by Assemblywoman VAINIERI HUTTLE, Judiciary -- Restores civil liability of nursing homes and related facilities during public health emergency and state of emergency.

ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 4006

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the New Jersey Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 4006 without my approval.

This bill would postpone the comprehensive New Jersey Quality Single Accountability Continuum ("NJQSAC") review for certain school districts. The bill provides that the NJQSAC review will take place in the 2021-2022 school year for any school district that: 1) was required to undergo NJQSAC review in the 2019-2020 school year but was unable to complete such review due to Coronavirus disease 2019 ("COVID-19") related school closures; or 2) is scheduled to undergo NJQSAC review in the 2020-2021 school year. Further, the bill dictates that these districts will be required to undergo their next comprehensive NJQSAC review as if the postponement had not occurred. According to the statement accompanying the bill, the postponements are intended to allow districts to focus their time and resources on responding to the COVID-19 pandemic.

I commend the bill's sponsors for acknowledging the challenges that the COVID-19 pandemic has presented to our school districts and their standard operations. However, in seeking to deliver a degree of immediate relief to certain school districts, this bill imposes a substantial burden on the New Jersey Department of Education ("DOE").

Over the course of a traditional school year, the DOE completes an average of 190 NJQSAC reviews, each of which can require up to five days to complete. Under this bill, during the 2021-2022 school year, the DOE will be responsible for completing NJQSAC reviews for three different categories of school districts: 1) those regularly scheduled for 2021-2022 review; 2) those scheduled for 2020-2021 review; and 3) those scheduled for 2019-2020 review that were unable to complete the review due to COVID-19-related school closures. This translates into approximately 400 reviews over the course of one school year, which is

approximately two times the number of reviews conducted by the DOE in a standard year.

Furthermore, although the bill will alleviate the workload that the NJQSAC review imposes on school districts in the short term, it will ultimately subject certain school districts to increased demands. Because the bill requires the affected districts to undergo their next comprehensive NJQSAC review as if the postponement had not occurred, districts initially scheduled for 2020-2021 review will be subjected to two NJQSAC reviews in three years. The NJQSAC review process is comprehensive, complex, and time-consuming, and is designed to evaluate a district's compliance with State law and programs over a three-year period. Requiring certain districts to undergo two reviews in three years is redundant and unnecessary, particularly at a time when districts are focusing resources on COVID-19 response measures.

Fortunately, the DOE has already taken proactive measures to address the needs of school districts with respect to NJQSAC reviews affected by COVID-19 in a manner that will neither overwhelm the DOE nor subject dozens of districts to unnecessary reviews. In May 2020, the DOE implemented an emergency rule modification pursuant to Executive Order No. 103 (2020), which allowed reviews to be completed without the need for in-person interaction. For the duration of the COVID-19 public health emergency, all county offices of education are prepared to conduct NJQSAC reviews as scheduled, guided by the emergency rule modification. I have been informed by the DOE that many school districts scheduled for NJQSAC review during the 2019-2020 school year successfully utilized the modified review process to complete their NJQSAC reviews. I have been further advised by the DOE that those school districts scheduled for reviews during the 2020-2021 school year have been informed of the modifications to the review process and are readily able to undergo such review.

Accordingly, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 4006 without my approval.

ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 4312

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the New Jersey Constitution, I am returning Assembly Bill No. 4312 with my recommendations for reconsideration.

This bill would regulate the usage of body worn cameras by law enforcement officers by outlining the circumstances under which a body worn camera may be deactivated, restricting the use of body worn cameras in certain circumstances, and specifying the retention period for recorded footage.

I commend the sponsors of this legislation for their efforts to establish uniform statutory standards applicable to the use of body worn cameras by the thousands of law enforcement officers statewide. Body worn cameras are an important tool in promoting transparency and accountability in policing in our communities, and maintaining well-considered, effective standards is a critical component toward achieving those ends. The sponsors rightly recognize the importance of establishing parameters on how and when law enforcement officers in New Jersey use body worn cameras in carrying out their official duties. However, there are nuances in the use of body worn cameras reflected in applicable Attorney General guidelines that should be incorporated into this bill to enhance the utility and effectiveness of this technology in the context of policing. These provisions in the Attorney General guidelines take into account the needs of the community and individual residents while at the same time giving due regard to relevant law enforcement practices and practical considerations. Consequently, I am returning Assembly Bill No. 4312 and recommending salutary amendments to increase the effectiveness of the uniform statewide standards that law enforcement officers and agencies will adhere to in their use of body worn cameras in the performance of their duties.

I am recommending several revisions to clarify the circumstances in which deactivation of the camera is required to protect the privacy of civilians, such as when a civilian other than an arrestee seeks medical attention or when a civilian wishes to remain anonymous in order to provide information to law enforcement. To further protect the privacy interests of our residents, I also recommend limiting the use of body worn cameras in situations when an officer is in a sensitive location such as a school, medical facility, or a place of worship. Cameras should only be activated in these areas when an officer is investigating a criminal offense or responding to an emergency or call for service, or when an

officer reasonably believes that he or she will need to use constructive authority or force.

I also recommend revising the bill's default retention provisions that require recordings to be retained by law enforcement agencies for six months from the date they were recorded. Body worn camera recordings have tremendous value as a potential source of crucial evidence for use in investigations and court proceedings. Recordings can also be used to support or dispel a civilian's claim against a law enforcement officer. The current statewide retention policy for body worn camera recordings is 90 days, but the need for evidence captured in recordings may not arise until after that period has elapsed. For instance, a potential complainant may, due to health considerations, be unable to file a complaint within 90 days of an incident captured by a body worn camera recording. For this reason, I support requiring body worn camera recordings to be retained for a minimum of 180 days.

However, the new retention period should be prospective. As written, the bill's six-month requirement would go into effect regardless of whether there are existing agreements concerning the maintenance and storage of body worn camera footage. This would likely force some of the more than 200 law enforcement agencies currently using body worn cameras to incur additional costs and to renegotiate their existing contracts with vendors to meet the obligations of the bill. In order to avoid substantial disruption to these agencies currently using body worn cameras, I am recommending revisions that would allow existing contracts between law enforcement agencies and vendors to expire before agencies are required to retain recordings for the longer period.

Finally, my recommended changes remove the restrictions on supervisors' ability to view body worn camera recordings. Having body cameras can be a valuable tool for supervisors striving to ensure officers are properly trained and carrying out their duties appropriately. As written, the bill prohibits any superior officer from viewing footage absent a specific allegation of misconduct. Supervisors should be encouraged to proactively spot-check footage for compliance and identify potential problems that need correction. This aspect of body worn cameras is significant to many law enforcement agencies, who use the recordings not only to monitor officer performance (which may reveal both non-compliant and exemplary conduct), but for providing training and direction to strengthen officer performance and address internal agency problems. A number of law enforcement agencies in the

State currently use body worn camera recordings for this purpose because they recognize it is an essential tool to help the agency and its officers maintain the high quality of the public services they provide.

I look forward to continuing to work with my colleagues in the Legislature to promote police accountability and confidence in our law enforcement institutions, and the codification of uniform statewide standards for the use of body worn cameras by our law enforcement officers is an important step in that direction. I am heartened in the belief that we will continue on our path to more transparent, more accountable policing.

Therefore, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 4312 with my recommendations for amendment.

Absolute Veto of Assembly Joint Resolution No. 172 (First Reprint)

Assembly Joint Resolution No. 172
(First Reprint)

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the New Jersey Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Joint Resolution No. 172 (First Reprint) without my approval.

This joint resolution would establish a new seventeen-member task force whose mission would be to study the presence and prevalence of racial bias within New Jersey's criminal justice system, including in the areas of law enforcement, the courts, and corrections. Within one year, the task force would submit a report to the Governor and the Legislature with recommendations to reduce racial disparities and racial bias in the criminal justice system. The task force would dissolve after issuance of its report.

I applaud the joint resolution's sponsors' recognition of the critical importance of the need to launch an in-depth study to help us more fully comprehend the manifestations of racial bias within our criminal justice system. The data at hand paints a disturbing picture of disproportionate arrest rates based on race, and New Jersey's incarceration rate has in recent times featured the highest Black-to-white disparity in the nation. And the numbers reveal a disproportionate impact on our State's Hispanic population as well. Addressing these unacceptable disparities is a critical component towards building a criminal justice system that treats every New Jersey resident fairly and equally.

Thus, I could not agree more strongly with the premise underlying this joint resolution, that to more effectively address the problem of racial bias in our criminal justice system we must more fully understand the nature and extent of the problem. From that knowledge and insight, we can devise and implement informed strategies and effective solutions leading to its eradication. A focused exploration of relevant data, research, and policies related to racial bias and racial disparities within the State's criminal justice system by a select and uniquely qualified group of committed experts and stakeholders representing a wide range of criminal justice

perspectives and experiences will yield real-world, potentially visionary solutions. This will provide an important first step toward an outcome that ultimately will serve all our citizens by not only reducing the racial disparities that are rooted in our system but by reforming the system into one that is more effective and equitable, which will serve as a model for the nation and the world.

Fortunately, we already have at our disposal a fully-constituted commission that is specifically tasked with examining racial disparities in our criminal justice system, and is perfectly suited to fulfill the mission contemplated in this resolution. I believe strengthening this existing commission will ensure that racial disparities throughout our criminal justice system are examined far more swiftly than would happen with the creation of an entirely new task force.

The racial and ethnic disparities in our criminal justice system were in the forefront of my mind in the early days of this Administration when I recommissioned the Criminal Sentencing and Redispotion Commission ("Commission") after nearly a decade of dormancy. The Commission was established by law in 2009 and charged by the Legislature with, among other things, considering "issues regarding disparity in the criminal justice process, including but not limited to racial and ethnic disparity issues." The Commission's enabling statute, N.J.S. 2C:48A-2, further directs the Commission to review disparity issues in the criminal justice process, "whether evidenced in sentencing outcomes or at earlier stages of the criminal process, such as but not limited to charging and plea decisions," and instructs the Commission to recommend appropriate measures to address these disparity issues. Participants on the Commission include key stakeholders from the four corners of the criminal justice system, including the Attorney General, the Public Defender, a retired judge appointed by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of New Jersey, the Commissioner of the Department of Corrections, the Chairman of the State Parole Board, the President of the New Jersey County Prosecutors Association, and the President of the New Jersey Bar Association, or their designees. Public members appointed by the Governor, the Senate President, the Senate Minority Leader, the Speaker of the General Assembly, and the Assembly Minority Leader include individuals with experience, training, or academic background in victims' rights

advocacy, corrections, judicial administration or criminal law, and must include a representative of a police organization.

The newly-recommissioned Commission demonstrated its exceptional suitability for this task in November 2019, when it issued its first report, which proffered a series of comprehensive recommendations for systemic reforms by targeting some of the causes of racial disparity and unfairness in criminal sentencing. Significantly, the report recommended eliminating mandatory minimum sentences for nonviolent drug offenses and nonviolent property crimes, addressing some of the inherent inequities woven into the statutory fabric of our criminal justice system. The Legislature embraced many of these proposals, and earlier this year I was more than proud to sign into law several bills that grew out of these recommendations. I look forward to continuing to work with my legislative partners in enacting in the near future the remaining reforms recommended in this report, including, most importantly, the elimination of mandatory minimums for non-violent drug and property offenses. The elimination of those specific mandatory minimums was agreed on unanimously by the Commission, which included representatives from all three branches of government. Nothing should stand in the way of moving forward with these urgently needed reforms.

Ultimately, rather than standing up a brand new task force with a somewhat redundant membership and a somewhat parallel mission requiring the duplicative use of similar resources, the better approach is to expand the objectives of the Commission to incorporate the elements of the contemplated task force that are not explicitly identified in the Commission's enabling statute. To that end, I have worked closely with the sponsors of this joint resolution on legislation to revise the Commission's enabling statute to align our shared goals. This legislation would expand membership on the Commission to include representatives from the Legislative Black Caucus and the Legislative Latino Caucus, two groups that the joint resolution's sponsors rightly identified as critical voices in this effort. The legislation also would identify specific "front-end" areas of the criminal justice process that the Commission should examine. Significantly, amendments to the Commission's enabling statute will ensure a permanent home for these front-end analyses to take place over the long term, rather than creating a task force whose analysis would be limited in scope to a one-year window.

I thank the sponsors and the Chair of the Commission for their strong partnership in ensuring that close examination of racial disparities is prioritized, and I look forward to continuing our shared goals of promoting front-end criminal justice reforms that meaningfully transform people's lives.

Accordingly, I herewith return Assembly Joint Resolution No. 172 (First Reprint) without my approval.

ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 4525

(Second Reprint)

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the New Jersey Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 4525 (Second Reprint) without my approval.

This bill would make various revisions to current law intended to assist restaurants, bars, and other liquor license holders, as well as certain commercial farms, for the duration of the Coronavirus disease 2019 ("COVID-19") health emergency. Among other things, the bill would permit owners and operators of restaurants, bars, distilleries, and breweries to utilize outdoor spaces or public sidewalks as extensions of their business premises. Owners and operators seeking to take advantage of the expansions authorized in the bill would be required to file an application with their local municipal zoning officer. The zoning officer would be required to approve an application that complies with the criteria outlined in the bill, including the submission of plans for the outdoor space and litter control, within 15 business days of the

submission of the application. The bill also would prohibit municipalities from charging fees for accepting the application or issuing the approval.

Although the bill would permit municipalities to waive the bill's requirements if they so choose, municipalities would be prohibited from restricting the hours of outdoor dining beyond the timeframes established in the bill, unless the municipality had previously delineated more restrictive hours for indoor dining via ordinance prior to March 1, 2020.

The bill also would require the Director of the Division of Alcoholic Beverage Control ("ABC") in the Department of Law and Public Safety to issue a separate permit to each seasonal farm market at which a brewery, craft distillery, winery, or cidery and meadery licensee intends to be a vendor, in order to make it easier for these licensees to sell their products at farm markets.

Finally, the bill contains a provision aimed at providing relief to New Jersey farmers who host events and outdoor gatherings by permitting canopies and tents to remain erected on commercial farms until indoor dining resumes at full capacity, regardless of any constraints contained in current law, regulation, or ordinance on the amount of time temporary structures may remain in place.

I commend the bill's sponsors for their efforts to assist New Jersey's businesses and farms in finding creative ways to continue to operate during the COVID-19 emergency. Bars and restaurants are among the businesses hardest hit by the pandemic. Small producers and retailers of alcoholic beverages also have not been immune from the devastating impacts of the crisis. However, in seeking to deliver a degree of relief to these businesses, the bill circumvents existing licensing and regulation processes critical to protecting the public's health and safety.

For example, the process outlined in the bill for expanding into outdoor spaces would divest the ABC of the enforcement authority it concurrently shares with municipalities, and transfers review and oversight exclusively to local governments. At the same time, the bill would significantly limit a municipality's review by requiring approval of all applications that contain the requisite information. As a result, municipalities would have almost no ability to reject an application based on public health or safety concerns, such as a proposed expanded

area's proximity to a school or church, or a licensee's previous violations of the Alcoholic Beverage Control Act.

The bill would also restrict a municipality's ability to regulate the hours of operation of restaurants and bars in contravention of Executive Order No. 195 (2020), which empowers municipalities and counties to limit the hours of operation of non-essential businesses based on COVID-19 public health concerns. This would have immediate consequences, as the City of Newark currently limits outdoor dining after 9:00 p.m., pursuant to an Executive Order by Mayor Ras Baraka. Signing this bill into law would immediately overturn these restrictions and disrupt Newark's plan to combat COVID-19.

Other provisions of the bill raise similar concerns regarding health and safety. For example, the provisions of the bill related to tents and canopies could be construed to circumvent the Uniform Construction Code ("UCC") and Uniform Fire Code safety requirements.

Fortunately, the ABC and the Department of Community Affairs ("DCA") have already taken proactive measures to respond to many of the issues identified in this bill in ways that achieve the laudable goals of the legislation without compromising the public's health and safety. On June 3, 2020, the Director of the ABC issued Special Ruling 2020-10, which allows businesses to apply for a new "COVID-19 Expansion of Premises Permit," which enables licensees and permittees to expand their licensed premises into outdoor areas. On October 19, 2020, the ABC Director issued Special Ruling 2020-21, which extended the new permitting program until at least March 31, 2021. ABC has issued over 2,300 permits since June 2020. Importantly, the program maintains the concurrent enforcement authority between ABC and local governments. Under the program in place, the ABC provides notice to the Police Chief and Municipal Clerk in the municipality in which a licensee is located when the licensee submits an application to extend its licensed premises to an outdoor space or public sidewalk.

In November 2020, the DCA issued outdoor dining guidance to help establishments adapt to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic. Among other things, the guidance clarified that a UCC permit is required for tents and canopies in use from December 1st through March 31st and reminded local construction officials and business owners that variations to the code are permitted, provided safety is not compromised. The guidance also strongly encouraged local construction offices to work

with businesses to determine appropriate variations to the code and provided options and suggestions for granting these variations.

I applaud the sponsors of Assembly Bill No. 4525 (Second Reprint) for their efforts to assist New Jersey businesses that are struggling during this critical time. However, because aspects of the bill encroach on the authority of both the ABC and municipal governments to protect the public's health and safety, and because many of the bill's goals have already been achieved, I am unable to support it. I look forward to working closely with my partners in the Legislature in the days and weeks ahead to continue to advance creative solutions to help combat the economic turmoil caused by the COVID-19 pandemic.

Accordingly, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 4525 (Second Reprint) without my approval.
