Report of the State Board of Education

DECEMBER 1, 1909.

To the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

Herewith I submit, as required by law, the annual report of the State Board of Education and accompanying documents.

The enrollment in the State Normal School at Trenton was 540, a decrease of 24 from the preceding year, and the enrollment in the Model School was 565, a decrease of 46. The number of graduates from the Normal School was 224. All these graduates have secured positions, but the demand for trained teachers is so great that we are still compelled to employ a large number of teachers from the normal schools in other States. The stucco on the Normal and Model School Buildings is in very bad condition. It is recommended that an appropriation be made for re-stuccoing and painting the exterior of the buildings.

The enrollment in the State Normal School at Montclair is 352. The school is crowded and it has been found necessary to refuse admission to a number who have applied. If the State desires to provide normal school facilities for all who desire a professional training before beginning to teach in our public schools, and to supply the demand for trained teachers from residents of our own State, instead of drawing from the normal schools of other States, an addition to this school must be erected in the near future. It is estimated that the cost of providing additional accommodations at the Montclair School is \$75,000.

The School for the Deaf is doing admirable work, but it is sadly over-crowded. In the last annual report the attention of the Legislature was called to the necessity for increased accommodations. The number of deaf children in the State is increasing and over fifty applicants have been refused admission owing to lack of room. The Board renews its recommendation of last year, an appropriation be made to provide additional accommodations at this school.

SCHOOL REPORT.

The progress in the Manual Training and Industrial School for Colored Youth has been most satisfactory. The average attendance during the year was 65 boys and 56 girls.

The proceeds from the farm amounted to \$3,248.87. Products of the farm and garden were sold to the amount of \$800.49 and the proceeds paid into the State Treasury. Products used at the school were valued at \$1,458.64 and products valued at \$989.74 are on hand for use during the current year. It is quite certain that the next report will show a still more gratifying result.

In addition to the usual school course the girls have been taught sewing, cooking, laundering, etc., and the boys farming, gardening, carpentry, cabinet making, etc.

Considering the limited appropriation the industrial work is satisfactory, but if the school is to fulfill the purpose for which it was established it must be in operation twelve months, instead of about nine months as at present. This cannot be done without an increase in the appropriation.

The Infirmary has been completed, but so late in the year that it was impossible to furnish it before the close of the State fiscal year. Owing to this fact the appropriation for furniture lapsed. It is recommended that an appropriation be made for this purpose and also for providing an adequate water supply.

As required by law the Reserve Fund, being ten per cent. of the State School Tax, was apportioned at a meeting held on the second day of February as follows:

REPORT OF PRESIDENT.

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The appeal of Ephraim Rose from the decision of the State Superintendent in the case of Rose vs. The Board of Education of Madison Township, Middlesex County, was heard and the decision of the State Superintendent was reversed.

The appeals from the decisions of the State Superintendent in the cases of P. G. Vroom vs. The Board of Education of Bayonne; Gage and Anderson vs. The Board of Education of Bayonne; Lucy A. McDonald vs. The Board of Education of Harrison, and The Board of Education of Springfield Township, Burlington County, vs. H. A. Stees, County Superintendent, were heard and the decisions of the State Superintendent affirmed.

During the year the following public High Schools were placed on the Approved List for four years of academic work:

Clayton, Gloucester County; Collingswood, Camden County; Dennis (Cape May Court House), Cape May County; High Bridge, Hunterdon County; Metuchen, Middlesex County; Paulsboro, Gloucester County; Pemberton Borough, Burlington County; Ramsey, Bergen County, and Sussex, Sussex County.

The following schools were registered for three years of academic work:

Harrison, Hudson County; Hopewell, Mercer County; Oxford, Warren County; South River, Middlesex County; Springfield, Union County; Washington (German Valley), Morris County; West Cape May, Cape May County.

The following schools were registered for two years of academic work:

Absecon, Atlantic County; Belmar, Monmouth County; Blirstown, Warren County; Dennis (Dennisville), Cape May County; Dumont, Bergen County; East Rutherford, Bergen County; Greenwich, Cumberland County; Hightstown, Mercer County; Park Ridge, Bergen County; Plumstead (New Egypt), Ocean County; Swedesboro, Gloucester County, and Tuckerton, Ocean County.

The following schools were approved for one year of academic work:

The following private schools were registered for four years of academic work:

Centenary Collegiate Institute, Hackettstown; Mt. St. Mary's College, Plainfield, and Pennington Seminary, Pennington.

The following private schools were registered for one year of academic work:

Sacred Heart Academy, Trenton, and St. Agnes Academy, New Brunswick.

The courses of study in Manual Training submitted by the following districts were approved:

Glassboro, Gloucester County; Ocean City, Cape May County; Pensauken, Camden County; Pittsgrove, Salem County; Ridgefield Park, Bergen County, and Washington (Town), Warren County.

The courses of study for evening schools for Foreign-born residents submitted by the following districts were approved:

Mr. Henry Snyder was appointed a member of the State Board of Examiners, vice W. L. R. Haven, resigned.

The report of the State Superintendent shows a very satisfactory advance in the improvement of our schools. The total number of teachers was 11,235, an increase of 633 over last year. The average salary paid was \$718.40, an increase of \$42.58, or six and three-tenths per cent. The total enrollment of pupils was 424,534, an increase of five and one-tenth per cent. It is very gratifying to note that the regularity of attendance is increasing, for while the total enrollment increased five and one-tenth per cent., the average daily attendance increased six and six-tenths per cent. The improvement in attendance over the preceding year is very marked. In the last

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report I called attention to the fact that the total enrollment had increased two and two-tenths per cent. for the then preceding year and the average daily attendance four and seven-tenths per cent.

For more detailed information I beg to call your attention to the reports of the State Superintendent and of the principals of the several schools under the direct control of the Board.

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ANNUAL REPORT

SCHOOL YEAR OF 1908-1909.

At no former time have our school administrative forces had so large a sum placed at their disposal, and at the close of no other school year have they been able to give so satisfactory an account of their stewardship. The total receipts for the year were \$21,964,419.88, the amount expended was \$17,227,331.78, and the balance \$4,737,088.10.

So large a balance at the close of the year clearly proves the provident tendencies of our local boards of education and discredits the foresight of those who prophesied an era of "reckless extravagance." Of the \$17,227,331.78 covering every form of outlay related to our public schools, the sum of \$11,583,201.30 was used for "current expenses." This term as defined in Section 95 of the school law includes "principals', teachers', janitors' and medical inspectors' salaries (though not specified in the law, it necessarily includes also salaries of superintendents and supervising principals), fuel, textbooks, school supplies, flags, transportation of pupils, tuition of pupils attending schools in other districts with the consent of the board of education, school libraries, compensation of the district clerk, of the custodian of school moneys and of truant officers, truant schools, insurance and the incidental expenses of the schools."

The combined outlay for all the purposes above designated constitutes the current or running expenses of the schools, and is properly termed "the cost of education." If we regard the State as a unit, said cost must inevitably keep pace with our rapidly increasing school population; if we shall make the individual pupil the basis of estimate, the cost of education must just as inevitably increase in accordance with the standard of qualification and of living demanded of our teachers, and should likewise increase in accordance with the advanced cost of all standards of living.

The current expenses of the schools, \$11,583,201.30, divided by
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424,534, the number of pupils enrolled during the year, will give \$27.28 as not only the true but the necessary cost of education per pupil. Said current expenses divided by 309,661, the average daily attendance, will give \$37.40 as the average cost per pupil. This computation, however, is misleading and, except for the purpose of comparison, subserves no practical purpose.

If a district were to provide school facilities on the basis of average attendance, it would establish conditions that would encourage non-attendance and subject the district to constant embarrassment and the penalty of having its State appropriations withheld. Only the board of education that takes into consideration the demands incident to growth in population, changing conditions and an ever-advancing civilization can wisely administer its trust. "'Tis distance that lends enchantment" to the schools of forty years ago. They would prove a sorry substitute for those we have. We teach the "Three R's" better than then and much else that the youth of to-day need to know.

The next largest outlay was for permanent improvements, items designated in the General Summary as "Building and Repairs" and "Debt and Interest." The sum thus expended amounted to \$4,996,-877.38.

When the project of devoting the increase in the railroad tax to the support of the public schools was under consideration, the advocates of the measure predicted that, if the State would make this additional provision for the current expenses of the schools, the school districts would improve the opportunity to relieve the congested condition of our schools and, so far as practicable, would discontinue the unfortunate expedient of half-day classes. This prophecy has been royally fulfilled.

The seating capacity of the schools at the close of the school year 1907-1908 was 395,296, and that for 1908-1909 was 426,719, an increase of 31,423. No other year in the history of the State has witnessed so encouraging an increase in school accommodations, in the aggregate value of school property, and in the average value of New Jersey school buildings. The setting aside of the increase in the railroad tax for the benefit of public education was well nigh an inspiration, and also most opportune.. It marked an era in New Jersey education whose importance will be more largely appreciated as our mental vision shall become clearer and results shall become more apparent.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT.

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Though an increase of 31,423 in the seating capacity of our schools surpassed the expectations of the most sanguine and afforded most gratifying relief, the relief was but partial, as an increase of 21,668 in school enrollment was sufficient to utilize more than two-thirds of the new school accommodations for which other thousands were already waiting. To one unfamiliar with conditions throughout the State, a reported enrollment of 424,534, an average of forty pupils per teacher, in connection with school accommodations for 426,719, indicates far more favorable conditions than really exist. Such provision for the seating of pupils as would correspond with their distribution is not practicable.

In the many one-room and two-room school buildings of the strictly rural districts, provision is made for forty pupils per class room where the attendance frequently ranges from but five to twenty. The unequal distribution of pupils throughout the State and among the grades makes it exceedingly difficult for our cities and larger towns to provide against congestion in the lower grades. The great disparity in the enrollment by grades is shown by the following table:

The preceding increases in the enrollment of the high-school and grammar-school grades are both gratifying and remarkable, and are by far the greatest ever recorded in the history of our schools. The increase in the high-school enrollment during the school year next preceding was 1,547, and in the grammar-school enrollment was 1,287. The average increase in the high-school enrollment during the next preceding *ten* school years was 604 and in the grammar-school enrollment was 2,941. When we contrast these data with a gain in a single year of 3,068 in high-school enrollment and of 11,853 in grammar-school enrollment, and also note that the increase in the high-school enrollment was nearly equal to that in the primary grades, we at once realize that even the unusual development of school interest and school sentiment due to improved supervision and the helpful influences of high-school inspection has been suddenly supplemented by some other potent factor, and look about us to find it.

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SCHOOL REPORT.

The discovery that rewards our mental quest is the amendment to our compulsory attendance law, advancing the maximum compulsory attendance age from fourteen to seventeen years. The value of a law consists in the feasibility of its enforcement and its consequent effectiveness. Judged by this standard, the said heroic amendment to our compulsory attendance law, with provisions so wisely adapted to existing conditions that neither hardship nor injustice need be wrought, was valuable legislation; and, if permitted to remain a part of our school statute, will prove an enduring honor to those who conceived it and secured its enactment.

The numerous and necessary items of school expenditure are properly grouped as follows:

(a) The sum expended for manual training was secured through State duplication of both district appropriations and private contributions, mainly the former.

(b) The State appropriation for the current expenses of the State Normal School at Trenton was \$60,000, and a sum in excess of the

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balance of the \$149,407.46 was secured through receipts from the Normal and Model School boarding halls, and for tuition in the Model School.

(c) The State appropriation for the Farnum Preparatory School was \$2,250. Received for tuition \$3,221.50. Interest and rent \$864.

(d) The larger portion of the sum expended for teachers' libraries was secured by subscription among the teachers, the rest by State duplication within the limits prescribed by statute.

(e) The expenses of the several County Superintendents are paid by their respective counties.

This fully accounts for the disbursements for school purposes and the results secured are ample justification of the amount expended. The school year of 1908-1909 surpassed all others in:

Balance on hand at the end of the year.

Increase in school enrollment.

Increase in school accommodations.

Increase in value of school property.

Persistency of school attendance.

These results are so important as to justify the recapitulation and clearly prove that, in school affairs, judicious expenditure is the truest economy.

The youth of the State constitute its most important possession, and their right to correct instruction in our free public schools is their most valuable inheritance. Any abridgment of this right, though it shall be in the name of economy, is simply wicked and dangerous waste. Economical school administration precludes congested class-rooms, half-day classes or the employment of poorly equipped teachers. Any feature of school administration which cheats the child robs the State.

TEACHERS' SALARIES.

The amount expended for teachers' salaries was \$8,071,177.45, an increase over the preceding year of \$906,109.41. This increase provided for the salaries of 633 additional teachers and for an average increase of \$42.58 in the annual salaries of all teachers employed.

For the school year ending June 30th, 1899, the average annual salary of all teachers employed in the State was \$534.20. For the school year ending June 30th, 1909, the said average was \$718.40. The average increase for the ten years was \$184.20. Let us put a

pin through this and label it *cause*. During the same period, the percentage of teachers holding the higher grades of certificates increased from 52.3 per cent. to 74.9 per cent. Through this we are justified in putting two pins and labeling it *effect*. To the average increase in salaries we can easily attach the dollar mark, but the value to the schools and to the State of the higher standard of qualification attained by our teachers can not be estimated. Any evidence of appreciation of the teacher's worth and work always meets with a response far more generous in kind. The districts which pay the most liberal salaries receive the largest return for each dollar thus expended.

All of these schools are organized to meet the requirements of the State Board of Education and provide one or more courses extending throughout four academic years.

The rapid growth of secondary education in our State can not be more plainly seen in any other way than in the great multiplication of High Schools and the rapid increase in their enrollment during the last five years, and this condition is no less true in counties such as Somerset, where the population has remained nearly stationary while the High School registration has more than doubled, than in Essex, where the High School enrollment is increasing more rapidly than the population.

The following schools after inspection were recommended for registration as "Partial" High Schools maintaining the standard course of three-years work:

An examination of this list will show that the State is now practically covered with accessible four-year High Schools. With few exceptions any pupil in the State may now in accordance with the provisions of the law finish a twelve-year course in the public schools without interruption and without individual expense to his parents. This consummation is a notable one and marks an era in the educational progress of our State. Five years ago when the policy of systematic High School inspection was introduced a large proportion of the pupils in our public schools were practically cut off from the opportunities guaranteed them by the school law. The great change during these years is a matter for congratulation to the State Superintendent, the State Board of Education, and to all those who have been concerned in promoting it.

A point is now reached where the public interest requires careful consideration of what our policy ought now to be. I venture to call your attention particularly to three of the most prominent considerations that present themselves:

First, our system of approval of High Schools places all four-year High Schools on the same educational plane. To the graduates of all alike the same rights are guaranteed, the same State creden-

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tials issued, the same opportunities for further study, if they so desire, opened.

If this policy is sound it imposes upon the State an obligation that may not be shirked. The four years course of study does not yield the same result under all conditions and a sufficient control over the conditions that surround the study of these years must be exercised by the State if the integrity of the State credentials is to be maintained and the good faith of the State in its relations with institutions of higher education within and without our borders is to be kept.

The larger High Schools in urban communities are in general well guarded. The local Superintendent should be, and generally is, a man of wide educational training competent to pass upon the quality of the work and the adequacy of the equipment in his own High School. Such High Schools, moreover, are in general under the care of a highly trained principal, whose whole time is given to the problems of High School administration as such, and to the maintenance of proper standards of excellence.

On the other hand, the large majority of small High Schools with which our State is now studded are too often without adequate supervision and control. They are mainly under the care of a supervising principal, who has charge of the entire system from the kindergarten to the 12th grade, who often is and ordinarily should be, better acquainted with the needs of the lower grades, in which are enrolled the large majority of the pupils under his care, than with the specific needs of the High School and the specific problems of High School administration. Moreover, such schools do not usually have the services of a principal. Generally the teaching force consists of three, four, or five teachers, all of them fully occupied with teaching. In case High School inspection by the State is abandoned the grade of work done in such schools will inevitably deteriorate, standards will not be maintained, and the pupils who graduate will be deprived of their guaranteed rights, and this through no lack of zeal on the part of local school men, or lack of interest on the part of local Boards of Education, but simply because of the conditions in which such small High Schools must grow and flourish if they are to be organized at all.

Nor can these smaller High Schools be dispensed with without depriving our pupils, as they formerly were deprived, of the school facilities which the law demands for them. On the one hand the

large High Schools are crowded beyond the possibility of accommodating the pupils from all surrounding rural districts. In the second place the distances to be travelled would in many cases demand so much of the pupils time daily in transportation as to cripple their educational progress.

If then the great progress of the last years is to be maintained as a permanent gain the responsibility of the State is one that may not be evaded.

The second point has already been called to your attention and to that of the State Board, but its importance justifies its repeated statement. This also has to do with the smaller country High Schools which draw their pupils from the lower grades of the local schools and by transportation from the surrounding country schools. In such places pupils graduated by the 8th grade County examinations enter the High School with such equipment only as they have obtained in ungraded country schools. Only the exceptional pupil under these circumstances is really fitted to do standard High School work. While this is true of all subjects it is of most pressing importance in its relation to the teaching of English and the foreign languages in the High School.

To enable the rural High School to do standard work in language, far better teaching in the grades is a prerequisite and no great improvement can be looked for in an ungraded school where a single teacher, frequently one of little or no previous training, has under her care all the grades from the first to the eighth inclusive. Pupils from such a school will come into the High School with such imperfect training in Grammar and reading that the first year of the High School course will present unsurmountable difficulties if the work is held to the standard grade appropriate to that year, and pupils beginning Latin or German will find themselves so handicapped by lack of previous language training that either they will fail to keep pace with their fellows or the entire class will be held back and fall below the reasonable standard. Work that is easy for the 9th year pupil, who has had carefully graded instruction during the grammar school course, becomes a task of discouragement or even an impossible burden to the student who has missed such training. It therefore becomes a matter of prime importance that the pupils in the four grammar grades even in the rural communities should by transportation be brought to convenient centres where their work can be superintended by trained teachers in regular

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grades, and the one-room school should be left as a home school, where needed, for the work of the four primary grades under a single teacher. Until this standard, or something approaching it has been attained, the disabilities of rural pupils will not have been removed and the equal opportunities promised to all will not have been fairly afforded.

This radical change in rural school conditions can not be made in any one year by any one piece of legislation. It should be attained by a persistent policy of improvement beginning at the most practicable point. I urgently recommend that the transportation law be so amended that for pupils within the district Boards of Education should receive the same rebates from the State as for those transported from one district into another. This slight change in the law would I believe start a policy of concentration and greatly benefit pupils of the country districts.

The third matter of pressing importance concerns the unnecessary multiplication of small High Schools.

A point has now been reached in the High School development of the State when the question ought to be carefully considered as regards every new application whether or not a new High School centre is demanded in the interest of the pupils. Local pride often suggests the establishment of an independent High School where the instruction of the pupils will be better done in a well organized neighboring school of convenient access. Moreover, the generous provisions of the law providing a State allowance of \$400 per teacher in four-year schools and making also large disbursements on the basis of attendance so far have reduced the cost of the maintenance of local High Schools to the community immediately concerned that a distinct temptation is placed before such communities to start a new High School where one is not needed and where the real interests of the pupils are injured rather than aided by its establishment.

Two schools of 30 pupils each are in general far less effective than one of 60 pupils and in general the excellence in teaching and equipment tends to increase with the size of the school certainly until the number of pupils passes beyond the hundred mark. It is quite clear therefore, that we should aim to develop a sufficient number of strong schools rather than to encourage the establishment of a number of small schools beyond the need of the pupils to be served.

So far the problem concerns only the interests of the pupils, but the interest of the State must also be conserved. It is such a waste of public money to multiply appropriations beyond the necessities of the case.

I therefore recommend to the State Board of Education that appropriate discretionary power should be secured, by enactment if necessary, to enable them to withhold their approval from all High Schools whose establishment or maintenance is unnecessary for the public good. The principle of general application might be formulated that the establishment of independent High Schools in communities where the total school enrollment is less than 500 is undesirable, except by special reasons of remoteness or isolation, and that a total enrollment of 60 for a four-year school and of 45 for a three-year's school should be set as a minimum except for reasons of remoteness or isolation.

A very important matter still remains for a brief mention. Educational conditions in our State have in my judgment outgrown our present system of certifying teachers. After all the school is what the teacher makes it and the quality of the work depends more largely upon the efficiency of the teacher than upon any other one element. Our present system of certification does not sufficiently guard the interests of the High School. In the High School the teacher must be in some measure trained as a specialist in those departments which she is to teach. The problem is quite different from that of the grades, and therefore the system of certification should be appropriately differentiated. A revision of the entire system seems to me urgently demanded by which, among other things, it should be guaranteed that the teacher employed for a specific task should be certified specifically for that task. The certificate issued, valid for teaching in the High Schools, should bear upon its face the subjects in which its holder is qualified to give instruction. Neither college graduation nor graduation from any other school is a sufficient credential. Under modern conditions the qualification of the teacher must be specific for the subjects themselves. A young man may have graduated from college without having received any advanced instruction in the Sciences, and yet may be, and sometimes is required, as a teacher engaged for the High School, to teach subjects of which he himself has but the vaguest knowledge. Almost all the subjects of the High School curriculum are thus in some cases taught by teachers, duly certi-

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cated under our present system, who are not qualified to teach them. This results in irreparable loss to the pupils for whom our system of education is maintained. It is not so much that higher qualifications should be demanded, this is a separate question, and one which may be deferred, but it is that qualifications appropriate to the task to be assigned must be exacted if the system of certification is rightly to serve the interests of the State.

In closing I once more call your attention to the great importance of the movement for industrial education which is sweeping over all the States. Its bearing upon secondary school problems is so manifold that this is not the place to enter upon its discussion, but I can not refrain from calling to your attention the fundamental problem which to my mind is whether or not the industrial school of the future is to be a part of the public school system. If so, it will become an integral part of a vital system which grows with the people's growth and diversifies itself to meet the people's needs. It will be under the same general control as our present public schools. It will enlist the interest of communities and their support as no institution but a public school can. It will lend its vigor to the system and will act as a tonic upon the whole.

On the other hand should it be organized under separate control it will be a thing apart and we shall have missed a golden opportunity which may not recur for many years. And whatever the Legislature may have in contemplation for the furtherance of industrial education will best serve the interests of the State, and particularly the interest of real educational progress, if it be so ordered as to be a part of one public school system serving all the educational interests of the State.

This is a fundamental problem and one of pressing importance now. The attention of the State Board can not be devoted to any subject which will more amply repay a mature study.

ONE YEAR'S DEVELOPMENT.

A year ago paying membership was 2,817; to-day it is above 7,000. Income in 1907-8 was \$56,000; in 1908-9, \$97,000, and is now run-

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ning well above \$100,000. We expect the income to reach \$125,000 for the fiscal year which ends June 30th, next. Annuities paid in 1907-8 amounted to \$56,000; in 1908-9, to \$64,000; and from \$85,000 to \$90,000 will be paid this year. On January 1st, 1909, the cash and invested surplus was \$90,000; on July 1st, it had grown to \$128,000.

PROGRESS OF THE FUND.

Starting in 1896 without a cent, without guiding precedent, and combating powerful odds every step of the way, the Fund, to July 1st, 1909, had raised upwards of \$400,000; had paid benefits amounting to \$268,640.80; had contributed above \$15,000.00 to administrative expenses, and had accumulated a cash and invested surplus of \$128,356.22. The first benefits were paid in 1898, just eleven years ago, and totaled \$879.01; last year, benefits paid amounted to \$64,068.17.

SYNOPSIS OF BUSINESS OF FISCAL YEAR, 1908-9.

The operations of the past year may be summarized as follows:

Thirty-three annuities declared, value, \$15,655.02; average, \$474.39, the income on \$11,859.75 invested at four per cent. Annuities paid, \$64,068.17. Eleven annuitants died; value of their annuities, \$4,418. Rebates granted, 3; value, \$89.12. Of the thirty-three annuities declared in 1908-9, thirty-two were under the Act of 1907, and one under the Act of 1896. Five of the thirty-two paid their deficit to the Fund in a lump sum; the other twenty-seven took advantage of that provision of the Act of 1907 which allows such deficit to be liquidated by the accruing annuity.

ANNUITY RESUME FROM BEGINNING.

To June 30th, 1909, two hundred and thirty-six teachers, representing every county, had been granted annuities, and had received benefits amounting to \$268,640.80. Fifty-four annuitants had died, leaving in force 182 annuities, value \$69,131.65; average, \$379.84, equivalent to \$9,496 invested at four per cent. Annuities payable for 1909-10, \$69,131.65.
