The New Jersey Italian and Italian American Heritage Commission held its first annual NJ Congress of Italian American Organizations on Saturday, October 23, 2004 at the Rutgers University Student Center. The event was a success, **bringing together over 500 Italian American community leaders**, including two former governors, Italian government officials, leaders of Italian American organizations, prominent academics and New Jersey elected government officials to discuss issues of importance and to consider ways of working together more productively. The report details the activities at the Congress.





CONGRESS TOPS ATTENDANCE OBJECTIVE

In the Commission's efforts to unify the Italian American community, the Congress was a successful forum to bring various groups and individuals together. The Commission sought 300 to 500 attendees for this 1st Congress. As a result of a renewed enthusiasm for issues impacting the Italian American community, over 500 participants came to the Congress from all walks of life and validated the notion of a "Risorgimento" affecting the Italian and Italian American culture and heritage. 


THREE RESOLUTIONS PASSED UNANIMOUSLY

The Commission proposed three resolutions at the Congress. All of these measures were unanimously accepted at the Congress. Briefly, the first resolution – **Adopting the Principle of Unity** – calls on the Italian Americans in New Jersey to "work together to increase coordination of their efforts…during the coming calendar year". The second resolution – **Organizing a 2nd Congress in 2005** – petitions the Commission to "organize a 2nd Statewide Congress for Italian American Organizations during the coming year". The final resolution calls upon the NJ Italian American standing legislators to form a delegation or caucus, in order to represent important issues on behalf of New Jersey's approximately two million Italian Americans.

EXHIBIT FLOOR AND BOOK SIGNING HELP TO ENHANCE CONGRESS

Over 25 organizations and businesses set up exhibit tables at the Congress and provided literature and information of their groups' activities. Attendees found displays useful, as it helped highlight the efforts of several Italian American Organizations throughout the State. The displays also included information about Italian language programs and study abroad programs for university students. One particular table featured a book signing by the author of *Newark's Little Italy*. The exhibit hall was also marked by book sales of other Italian and Italian American authors.



ATTENDEES WATCH BRIEF NJN TRAILER ON ITALIAN AMERICANS

During the afternoon portion of the Congress, participants were treated to a 5-minute trailer of a new, New Jersey Italian American Foundation-sponsored documentary highlighting the achievements of Italian Americans in New Jersey. The NJN-produced trailer featured interviews of Italian Americans from a variety of professions and encapsulated their stories of success here in New Jersey. A tentative premier date of the full feature is scheduled for 2005.

BREAK-OUT SESSIONS TOUCH ON MAJOR TOPICS

The Commission organized eight specific break-out sessions during the Congress. These groups ranging in size from 25 to 75 individuals focused on specific topics affecting the Italian American community. The break-out sessions were selected from a survey of Italian Americans who attended the Commission's March 2004 Convocation.



The Congress featured two performances. The Bloomfield Mandolin Orchestra played an assortment of traditional Italian and Italian American music during the lunch session, while Mr. Alex Kariotis electrified the afternoon crowd with his Italian-English rock opera – "Vesti La Giubba".

DEMOGRAPHICS ANALYSIS PINPOINTS ITALIANS IN NJ



The New Jersey Italian and Italian American Commission created a preliminary research project detailing a demographic breakdown of Italian Americans in New Jersey. The project was compiled from a variety of sources based the 2000 US Census. At the Congress, a mounted display was created featuring a State map of New Jersey with colored pins indicating the size of that city or town's Italian American community. The Commission will continue to monitor and update statistical information regarding the approximately 2 million Italian Americans in New Jersey.

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The Congress publicly showcased the first phase development of a multi-purpose Casa Italiana a project involving the construction of a 10,000 square foot facility that would house the Commission and the Institute offices, offices for the Rutgers University Departments of Italian and Italian Studies Committee and facilities for the public and students. While architectural renderings and initial contractual arrangements have been on-going, the project is expected to be completed in 2007 for an approximate cost of \$4 million and would include large multimedia public auditorium, conference and lecture rooms, art displays and sculpture garden, audio-visual technology center, multiple office facilities and library and lounges and terraces.

YOUNGER PARTICPANTS PROVIDE MAJOR CONTRIBUTION TO CONGRESS

One of the major groups participating in the Congress was Italia-Oggi, a professional young Italian American association with over 1,000 registered members from the State of New Jersey.

In addition, over 80 students from throughout the state of New Jersey attended the Congress and contributed important ideas and goals for issues impacting the Italian American community. The Congress offered some of these individuals the opportunity to partake in a break-out session discussing the establishment of a Scuola Italiana. Modeled after the Governor's school in New Jersey, the scuola would incorporate an intensive Italian language program and the activities emphasizing Italian traditions. Many other students voiced their opinion on the curriculum infusion program, youth program and language initiatives for the state.

Given that the Congress took place at Rutgers University, more than 20 Rutgers University students volunteered to help. This assistance ensured that the Congress ran smoothly. The Commission would like to extend its most sincere gratitude for the contribution of these hardworking volunteers.
