

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The number of visitors to Atlantic City is at a record high with an increase in overnight stays and money expended. As a result, 2005, was a banner year for Atlantic City's casino industry. For the first time, the 12 casinos surpassed the \$5 billion mark in gaming profits

along with their best ever year for gross operating profits. This all translates to record taxes paid to the State of New Jersey to help support our seniors and people with disabilities.

Since I was appointed to the Commission in late 2002, casinos have completed more than \$2.5 billion of new construction or capital improvements. And as I look around Atlantic City, there is at least another \$1.5 billion of new construction underway with new hotel towers at the Borgata, Harrah's and Trump Taj Mahal. That is a phenomenal amount of investment in a very short time in a very small city. I am confident that there will be announcements in 2006 from existing casino operators and from potential new entrants about enormous new investments they want to make here as well. Clearly, Atlantic City is being transformed into a multi-faceted destination resort with visitors coming not only for gambling, but for the fine restaurants, the great shopping and entertainment for virtually every possible audience.

This unprecedented growth is occurring while Atlantic City's competition is expanding in every state that borders New Jersey. Slot machines have been installed at tracks all around New York State and should be at New York City area tracks within a year. Regulators in Pennsylvania hope to have slots at race tracks by the end of 2006. And the Delaware Legislature allowed tracks there to install

up to 1,500 additional machines each in 2006 and to remain open virtually around the clock.

With all this new and expanded competition why is Atlantic City flourishing? Because we work diligently to maintain a business-friendly environment – one in which casinos can thrive while also meeting New Jersey's strict standards for good character, honesty and integrity. We regularly review our statute, regulations and procedures to make certain that they make sense within a rapidly changing environment.

During 2005, we worked closely with the industry and the Division of Gaming Enforcement to draft legislation and made scores of regulatory changes that extended the terms of casino and employee licenses and allowed casinos to enter into revenue sharing agreements with other companies that are willing to make a significant equity investment in Atlantic City. Shortly after those changes were made, we started a new series of meetings to review scores of statutory and regulatory changes recommended by the industry. By the end of the year, we had adopted numerous regulatory changes and drafted a bill that was pending before the Legislature.

Through the efforts of our dedicated employees, the commission handled major licensing issues in 2005 dealing with mergers, acquisitions, reorganizations and other issues. Because of their dedication and professionalism, those issues were addressed efficiently and effectively and in a manner that maintained our high standards of integrity. I am proud that our agency has fulfilled its mission of assuring the public trust and confidence in the credibility and integrity of the casino industry while fostering an environment that supports growth now and into the future.

MEMBERS OF THE COMMISSION

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Linda M. Kassekert Chair

Linda M. Kassekert was appointed by Gov. James E. McGreevey in November 2002 to chair the New Jersey Casino Control Commission. Prior to joining the Commission, Chair Kassekert was the associate director of government relations for the New Jersey Education Association and also has 12 years of experience in various positions in state and county government. She spent a year as an assistant county counsel in Camden County in 1994 and 1995. She represented the county in the state courts in litigation dealing with employment law, contracts and other governmental matters. Between 1990 and 1994, Chair Kassekert was the deputy commissioner in the New Jersey Department of Personnel in Trenton and served for a period as acting commissioner. She holds a law degree from Widener University School of Law and is admitted to practice in New Jersey and Pennsylvania. In addition, she received a masters degree in public policy from Rutgers University and a bachelor of science degree in political science from Gettysburg College. Chair Kassekert serves as the Commission's representative and member of the Casino Reinvestment Development Authority. She also holds board memberships on the American Red Cross Penn-Jersey Region and Cooper Hospital Health System. Chair Kassekert is the first woman to be appointed chair of the Commission. Her term expires in 2007.

Ralph G. Frulio was appointed to the New Jersey Casino Control Commission by Gov. James E. McGreevey and was sworn into office in May 2003. Commissioner Frulio served the remaining months of former Commissioner Diane M. Legreide's unexpired term. He became the the first former Commission employee to rise through the ranks from an inspector in 1978 to become a commissioner in 2003. Prior to his employment with the Commission, Commissioner Frulio worked for the Federal Bureau of Investigation as part of the Anti-Racketeering Unit in New York City. He holds a masters degree in Public Administration from the University of Central Michigan and a bachelors degree in Political Science from Richard Stockton State College. Commissioner Frulio is also a veteran of the United States Air Force. In January 2004, he was sworn in as Commissioner for his own five-year term. His term expires in 2008.

In May 2004, Commissioner Fedorko was re-nominated for another five year term by Gov. James E. McGreevey. His term expires in 2009.

William T. Sommeling was appointed to the New Jersey Casino Control Commission by Gov. Christine Todd Whitman in November 2000. Prior to joining the Commission, he served as undersheriff in Ocean County for 11 years. Commissioner Sommeling has more than 35 years of experience in law enforcement, including several positions in casino surveillance departments within the gaming industry. Active in politics for years, he held many positions in local and county government. He completed his undergraduate studies at Ocean County College and Trenton State College earning a bachelors of science degree in Criminal Justice. He also earned a masters degree in Administration from Rider University and also attended Cornell University's School of Hotel Administration. Commissioner Sommeling is active in a number of professional and civic organizations, including the FBI National Academy Associates, International Association of Chiefs of Police and the Emerald Society of New Jersey. Commissioner Sommeling served as vice chair during 2004. In December 2005, Commissioner Sommeling was re-nominated for another five-year term by Governor Richard Codey. His term expires in 2010.

He currently serves as commissioner on the Atlantic County Utilities Authority, is a member of the Advisory Board of the First Tee of Greater Atlantic City and serves on the Board of Directors of Atlantic City Special Improvement District and is a trustee of the Casino Law Section of the New Jersey Bar Association and is a member of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. In January 2005, Commission members elected him vice chair. His term expires in 2006.

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OPERATIONS OF THE COMMISSION

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Chief of Staff's Office

The Chief of Staff reports directly to the Chair. The primary responsibility of the Chief of Staff is to ensure that the Commission functions effectively. The Chief of Staff directs strategic planning, agency-wide policy development and the implementation of plans and policies. The Commission's budget process and all administrative matters for the division directors are also handled by the office.

The Public Information Officer reports directly to the Chief of Staff and is responsible for media relations for the Commission. Detailed information on the regulatory system, the casino industry and the impact of casino gaming on the City of Atlantic City and the state is provided through the Public Information Officer.

The Community and Employee Events Unit also reports to the Chief of Staff. This unit coordinates employee events, prepares publications for internal and external distribution and serves as liaison between the Commission and various community groups and non-profit organizations throughout Atlantic County.

The Chief of Staff's Office Year in Review:

- ▶ Wrote, edited and distributed the Commission's annual report information brochures and other publications;
- Distributed monthly and quarterly casino industry financial reports to approximately 100 subscribers:
- ▶ Posted monthly financial reports on the Commission's web site;
- ▶ Scanned copies of quarterly financial reports from earlier years so they could be distributed and stored electronically;
- ▶ Redesigned the Commission website to dramatically expand the amount of information available

on-line, including licensing, financial and compliance division forms and reports;

- ▶ Prepared various speeches and PowerPoint presentations for Commissioners to deliver to college classes, community groups, conferences, visiting officials and regulators from other jurisdictions and casino industry investors;
- ▶ Handled more than 2,000 inquiries from the news media, public officials, stock analysts, investment bankers, the general public and others about a wide range of topics dealing with the Commission, gaming and Atlantic City;
- ▶ Responded to requests filed pursuant to the Open Public Records Act for copies of public documents:
- ▶ Coordinated opportunities for people to sign up for the Self-Exclusion Program at off-site locations and continued distribution of information brochures about the program at casinos, conferences and treatment facilities.
- ▶ Organized two American Red Cross Blood Drives, the African-American Heritage Celebration, Family Night at the Atlantic City Surf, Employee Recognition events and Quality of Life Round-up.

The Office of the General Counsel/Legal Division is composed of three units: the Licensing Unit, the Compliance Unit and the Casino Licensing and Regulatory Affairs Unit, which includes the Administrative Practice Unit.

The Licensing Unit advises the Commission on the majority of the agency's contested cases.

The Compliance Unit is responsible for providing legal advice to the Commission and to the Operations and Inspection Units of the Compliance Division on matters relating to accounting and internal controls, gaming equipment, the rules of the games, and casino floor expansions.

The Casino Licensing and Regulatory Affairs Unit handles all casino licensing and renewals, and is the unit primarily responsible for regulatory review. The Administrative Practice Unit coordinates preparation of the public meeting agenda, notices and minutes, and access to public records.

The Office of the General Counsel/Legal Division's Year in Review:

- ▶ Participated in the drafting of legislative amendments which: extended the license terms of casino licensees, employee licensees and casino service industry enterprises; allowed casino licensees to enter limited revenue-sharing agreements with gaming-related casino service industry enterprises under certain circumstances; and permitted winners of annuity slot machine jackpots to assign or encumber their future jackpot payments upon approval by the Superior Court;
- ▶ Participated in a joint effort with the Division of Gaming Enforcement and casino licensees to identify statutory and regulatory changes that could make casino operations more efficient and effective without undermining the public's confidence in the

integrity of the regulatory process. Approximately half of the regulatory proposals suggested by casino licensees were accepted by the regulators and either have already been proposed for adoption or will be prepared for publication in the coming year. This review process also resulted in a joint legislative proposal that was pending before the Legislature at the end of 2005;

- ▶ Readopted three chapters of the Commission's regulations and supervised the adoption of 22 regulatory proposals involving 84 sections of the Commission's regulations. Some of the more significant regulatory proposals that were adopted: increased the monetary thresholds pursuant to which non-gaming casino service industry enterprises are requested to apply for licensure; created a new subchapter of rules governing the establishment and maintenance of casino computer systems; implemented recent statutory amendments by setting up a regulatory scheme for multi-casino progressive slot systems operated by a gaming-related casino service industry enterprise; and clarified and expanded the operations requirements applicable to the surveillance department of a casino licensee;
- ▶ Additional regulations drafted and adopted include regulations permitting coupons to be redeemed by gaming voucher systems; authorizing 13 new games and wagers; authorizing new gaming equipment; defining and regulating suspicious, unscanned and unverified gaming vouchers and authorizing non-cashable electronic credits, slot credits and coupons;
- ▶ Advised the Commission regarding the acquisition of Caesar's Entertainment, Inc. by Harrah's Entertainment, Inc., and assisted the Commission in the conduct of the related economic concentration hearing;

- Advised the Commission regarding athercoord nept from the New Jersey State Library. ization of Trump Hotel and Casino Resorts, Inc., now Trump Entertainment Resorts, Inc., and the related refinancing and qualification issues;
- Advised the Commission regarding consideration of the temporary and plenary qualification of 30 new holding company officers and directors, and over 50 requests for waiver of qualification;
- ▶ Advised the Commission during the renewal of the Borgata's casino license which was the first fiveyear license term;
- Assisted the Commission during proceedings regarding the issuance of an interim casino authorization to a Colony Capital affiliate that allowed it to purchase AC Hilton from Caesars Entertainment, including the affiliate's adoption of AC Hilton's Equal Employment and Business Opportunity Plan as its own;
- ▶ Reviewed and responded to 430 patron complaints, a number of which were referred to the Division of Gaming Enforcement for further investigation;
- ▶ Opened 923 new contested license and casino violations cases;
- ▶ Managed an average of 415 contested cases per month including conducting 11 hearings and closing 901 cases;
- ▶ Continued to maintain the official records of the Commission and responded to approximately 66 requests for information and/or documents under the Freedom of Information Act and the Open Public Records Act;
- ▶ Provided ethics training to Commission employees pursuant to Executive Order 41 issued by Governor Codey, which mandated that such training for employees of the state's Independent Authorities occur by the end of the year.

Division of Administration

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The Division of Administration encompasses four units: the Administrative Operations Unit, the Budget and Fiscal Office, the Human Resources Unit, and the Information Technology Unit.

The Administrative Operations Unit is the organizational hub of the Agency, and manages incoming and outgoing mail, transportation, central files, regulations processing, and all facilities operations.

The Budget and Fiscal Office oversees the Commission's annual budget, purchasing, and Agency fiscal operations services.

The Human Resources Unit is responsible for all personnel and employee services, including new hires, promotions, time and leave, and employee benefits and compensation.

The Information Technology Unit delivers Agency-wide technology services, including computer infrastructures, telecommunications, and eGovernment initiatives.

The Division Of Administration's Year in Review:

- ▶ Continued revision of agency-wide Policies and Procedures;
- ▶ Provided comprehensive Ethics and Workplace Violence training to all Agency personnel;
- ▶ Provided additional specialized education to Agency personnel, including AED/CPR, management and supervision, financial, and job-specific training;
- ► Continued enhancement of Agency Business Continuity Plan, including critical contact and emergency procedures;
- ► Completed reconciliation of the Agency's Outside Employment Database;

- ► Completed Agency's Job Description Compendium;
- ▶ Revised Agency Recruitment/Hire operating procedures;
- ▶ Accomplished physical plant upgrades, including interior and exterior refurbishment, HVAC enhancements, and security access control system improvements:
- ▶ Continuing efforts within the Division of Administration resulted in significant process improvements in purchasing functions and Agencywide fiscal collaboration;
- ▶ Initiated the rollout of automated workflow processes to modernize internal Agency administrative systems;
- ▶ Supported legislative changes, industry requests and internal business process change through IT applications modifications;
- ▶ Implemented Agency spam filter, resulting in approximately 70% filtered email identified as spam;
- ▶ Upgraded communications links to critical state resources and the internet to provide redundancy and improve access speed;
- ▶ Completed installation of an internal SDS environment to enable in-house training;
- ▶ Established off-site disaster recovery capability to support mission-critical application recovery in the event of a disaster at the Atlantic City site.

The Division of Compliance consists of a Director's Office and two operating units – the Casino Operations Unit and the Inspection Unit. The Division of Compliance is the largest division in the Commission, comprising over half of the agency's work force.

The Casino Operations Unit is responsible for assuring that each casino licensee provides adequate internal controls over gaming operations and is in compliance with pertinent sections of the Casino Control Act and related regulations. The unit also reviews submissions seeking approval of new gaming equipment, new games and new rule options on existing games.

The Inspection Unit continues to be the most visible unit within the Commission; they are present in the casinos 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. The Principal Inspectors and Inspectors assigned to each casino ensure the integrity of casino operations by monitoring gaming activities and certifying all gaming revenue. In addition they assist patrons by taking their complaints and addressing any problems or concerns they may have.

The Division of Compliance's Year in Review:

- ▶ Reviewed more than 2,000 internal control submissions:
- ▶ Participated in the review and approval of internal controls for the Harrah's merger with Caesars Entertainment;
- ▶ Reviewed more than 25 submissions associated with the Resorts International acquisition of the Atlantic City Hilton;
- ▶ Reviewed new gaming equipment and internal controls associated with the opening of 3 new poker rooms and the internal controls for more than 30

poker gaming tournaments, many of them nationally televised, in conjunction with the continued popularity of this game;

- Participated in the approval of several new multi-level in-house progressive systems and the implementation of several new games and multicasino linked progressive systems;
- ▶ Participated in the review of internal controls to permit several casinos to partition their computer systems to locate data in NJ from other jurisdictions in addition to reviewing information technology issues and problems as the industry continued to become more dependent on its computer systems;
- ▶ Participated in the industry's request for regulatory review and streamlining of several internal control processes.
- ▶ Began a review of server-based gaming in the preparation of promulgating new regulations in this area of emerging technology.

The Inspection Unit was involved in several major expansions taking place in the casinos during the year:

- ▶ The "House of Blues" opened at Showboat. This included new themed gaming space together with the House of Blues theater, the city's newest performance venue.
- ▶ Trump Marina also opened SKINZ, a new gaming venue in their marina deck area in time for the summer season.
- ▶ The Borgata is presently involved in an expansion monitored by the Inspection Unit which will increase their casino floor and add a new showroom plus additional restaurants and a new hotel tower by 2007

- The AC Hilton also when the New Jersey State Library. areas including a new Asian Game pit, poker room
- areas including a new Asian Game pit, poker roomand bar top slot area.
- ▶ The Inspection Unit accepted and processed 282 complaints from gaming patrons;
- ▶ Principal Inspectors approved 1,489 gaming related submissions and petitions, including 348 certificate of operation amendments approvals; and
- Principal Inspectors, through authority delegated to the Director, authorized an additional 105 gaming tables and 47,597 sq ft of gaming space.

Division of Fina recital experience to proper from the New Jersey State Library.

The Division of Financial Evaluation provides expert advice and consultation to the Commissioners on all matters of a financial/economic nature, collects all taxes and fees required by the Casino Control Act, and through its team of auditors, ensures the sufficiency of various tax payments to the Casino Revenue Fund.

The division consists of three units; the Audit Unit, the Financial Evaluation Unit and the Revenue Unit. Working as a team, these three units provide oversight to over \$500 million in casino related revenues to the State of New Jersey.

The Division of Financial Evaluation's Year in Review:

- Collected \$388.7 million in Gross Revenue Tax used to fund programs that benefit the aged and disabled residents of the state; \$79.5 million in casino related taxes that were deposited to the Casino Revenue Fund; \$64.1 million in licensing fees paid by the industry to fund the operations of the Casino Control Commission and Division of Gaming Enforcement; and \$494,509 in Commission imposed fines that were deposited to the General Fund to provide funding for the Council on Compulsive Gambling;
- ▶ Facilitated the reporting of 416 past multi-casino annuity jackpot winners to the New Jersey Department of Human Services for the potential set-off of child support arrearages;
- ▶ Completed tax examinations to certify gross revenue, including adapting the audit program to take into account revised regulations and internal control procedures;
- ▶ Participated in the approval process for a new CSI to offer wide area progressive slot systems.

There are now three slot operators approved for such systems;

- ▶ Involved in the wish list review requested by the industry for regulatory reform, which resulted in a significant reduction to the record retention period for gaming vouchers;
- ▶ Reviewed 85 notices of document destruction and approved one petition for an off-site storage facility and one petition for an electronic record storage system;
- ▶ Completed the required agency annual internal control review resulting in a clean audit report to OMB:
- ▶ Analyzed the financial and the undue economic concentration issues surrounding Harrah's Entertainment's acquisition of Caesars Entertainment;
- ▶ Evaluated the Trump Entertainment Chapter 11 Bankruptcy restructuring and Colony Capital's acquisition of AC Hilton;
- ▶ Undertook a full financial stability review of Borgata in conjunction with the first five-year casino license ever granted under recent changes to the Casino Control Act;
- ▶ Implemented electronic filing of the Monthly Gross Revenue Tax returns.

Division of Licensing

The Division of Licensing, which consists of four operating units, manages all aspects of casino employee and business enterprise licensing and casino hotel alcoholic beverage licensing.

The Employee License Unit is responsible for the licensing and registration of casino employees.

The Enterprise License Unit oversees the licensing of gaming and non-gaming related casino service industries and junket enterprises and the registration of vendors and labor organizations.

The Support Services Unit provides application support services to Division of Licensing staff and is the main repository for all active license application files processed by the Division of Licensing.

The Director's Office administers the division's daily operations and all aspects of casino hotel alcoholic beverage licensing.

The Division of Licensing's Year in Review:

- ▶ Processed more than 8,500 applications for initial and renewed employee licenses and registrations;
- ▶ Oversaw the employment of approximately 47,000 people in Atlantic City casinos hotels;
- ▶ Authorized the service of alcoholic beverages by casino hotel alcoholic beverage licensees at 14 beach bars and Boardwalk locations as well as at 11 other special events during the summer;
- ▶ Maintained approximately 49,000 active casino employee and business enterprise license application files:
- ▶ Addressed more than 9,500 revisions to Atlantic City casino licensees' jobs compendia and tables of organization including modifications to organiza-

tional structures initiated by Harrah's Entertainment, Inc.'s acquisition of Bally's Atlantic City and Caesars Atlantic City and Resorts International Holdings, LLC's acquisition of Atlantic City Hilton;

- ▶ Implemented a legislative amendment increasing the license terms for initial and renewed casino employee and business enterprise licenses;
- ▶ Implemented a regulatory amendment revising and increasing the financial thresholds for filing non-gaming casino service industry and junket enterprise license applications;
- ▶ Participated in the bidding process to modernize the enterprise registration and licensing database through the redesign and relocation of the database to an in-house application.

Affirmative Action Officer an archived convergor the New Jersey State Library.

The role of the Affirmative Action Officer is to ensure that the Commission adheres to all Federal and State laws and equal employment opportunity and affirmative action policies for the protection of all employees at the Commission. The office provides Equal Employment orientation sessions to all new employees to make them aware of the State and Commission policies and procedures. All employees are also required to undertake sexual harassment training and pass the required test as part of their orientation.

The Affirmative Action Officer's Year in Review:

- ▶ Monitored employment and promotional activity at the Commission including the hiring and EEO/AA policy orientation of 20 new employees of whom seven (35%) were female and seven (35%) were minority and the promotions of 34 employees of whom 20 (59%) were female and 10 (29%) were minority; and
- ▶ Participated in 13 career fairs throughout New Jersey, speaking to approximately 1,375 individuals who are interested in considering careers with the Commission.



EMPLOYMENT BY ATLANTIC CITY CASINO LICENSEES BY COUNTY




NEW JERSEY CASINO INDUSTRY BY TYPE OF EMPLOYMENT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2005













Helping New Jersey senior citizens and persons with disabilities

New Jersey casinos pay the state 8% tax on their gross revenues appropriated to the Casino Revenue Fund for the benefit of the aged and disabled citizens of the State of New Jersey. Gross gaming revenue is the amount casinos win from gamblers after all payouts have been made.

Funding is also generated through five casino related taxes. The responsibility for administering these taxes was transferred by the State Legislature from the Division of Taxation to the Commission. The Casino Complimentary Tax imposes a 4.25% tax upon casino licensees on the value of complimentary rooms, food, beverage, and entertainment granted to patrons. The Casino Net Income Tax imposes a 7.5% tax on the adjusted net income of casino licensees. The Multi-Casino Progressive Slot Tax assesses an 8% tax on casino service industry multi-casino progressive slot revenue. Casino Room Fee requires casinos to remit \$3.00 per day for each hotel room occupied by a guest. Revenues for these four taxes are deposited into the Casino Revenue Fund.

The Casino Parking Fee requires casinos to remit a fee of \$3.00 per day for any parking space in use

in their facility. One-half of the parking fee revenue is deposited into the Casino Revenue Fund, with the remaining half forwarded to the Casino Reinvestment Development Authority for statutory restricted projects.

The State Legislature, through the budget, determines the allocation of funds. Input from the Casino Revenue Fund Advisory Commission directs where the money can be spent.

Senior citizens and persons 18 or older with disabilities may qualify for Casino Revenue Fund programs. Qualified New Jersey residents realize tremendous benefits from the tax dollars generated by Atlantic City casinos. New Jersey has a number of programs designed to assist eligible residents in receiving needed health and social services.

A few of the programs include, AIDS Drug Distribution Program (ADDP), Adult Protective Services, Adult Day Services with Programs for Persons with Alzheimer's Disease or Related Disorders, Pharmaceutical Assistance to the Aged and Disabled (PAAD), Safe Housing and Transportation, and Statewide Respite Care Program.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

We have audited the financial statements of the State of New Jersey Casino Control Fund as listed in the accompanying table of contents as of and for the years ended June 30, 2005 and 2004. These financial statements are the responsibility of management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in the *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As discussed in Note 1, the financial statements present only, the Casino Control Fund and do not purport to, and do not, present fairly the financial position of the State of New Jersey as of June 30, 2005 and 2004, the changes in its financial position, or its cash flows for the years then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Casino Control Fund as of June 30, 2005 and 2004 and the changes in financial position thereof for the years then ended in conformity with accounting pronciples generally accepted in the United States of America.

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated April 28, 2006 on our consideration of the Casino Control Fund management's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* and should be considered in assessing the results of our audit.

The budgetary comparision schedule is not a required part of the basic financial statements but is supplementary information required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board. We have applied certain limited procedures, which consist principally of inquiries of management regarding the methods of measurement and presentation of the required supplementary information. However, we did not audit the information and express no opinion on it.

The expenditure detail schedule is presented for the purpose of additional analysis and is not a required part of the Casino Control Fund financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the Casino Control Fund financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

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NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

NOTE 1 – Significant Accounting Policies

A. Basis of Presentation

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) as prescribed by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB).

B. Financial Reporting Entity

The Casino Control Commission and the Division of Gaming Enforcement are agencies of the State of New Jersey. N.J.S.A. 5:12-143 established the Casino Control Fund to account for the financial transactions of these agencies.

C. Fund Level Financial Statements

The State of New Jersey issues government-wide financial statements that report information for all of the non-fiduciary activities of the State including that of the Casino Control Fund. Due to the legislative mandate that the Casino Control Fund be financed exclusively by licensing fees assessed upon the casino industry, a Fund Level Financial Statement is prepared for the Casino Control Fund.

A Fund Level Financial Statement includes a Balance Sheet and a Statement of Revenues, Expenditures, and Changes in Fund Balances.

D. Measurement Focus and Basis of Accounting

The Casino Control Fund statements utilize the current financial resources measurement focus and the modified accrual basis of accounting. Under the current financial resources measurement focus, only current assets and liabilities are included on the balance sheet. The operating statement for the fund presents increases and decreases in total fund balances.

In accordance with the modified accrual basis, revenues are recognized when they become susceptible to accrual; that is, when they become both measurable and available to finance expenditures of the fiscal period. Available means collectible within the current period or soon enough thereafter to be used to pay liabilities of the current period. Material revenues susceptible to accrual would include casino license fees.

Expenditures are recognized when the related fund liabilities are incurred. Disbursements for prepaid expenses, inventory items, and fixed assets are recorded as expenditures when incurred.

E. Fund Accounting

The financial activities of the State are recorded in individual funds, each of which is deemed to be a separate accounting entity. The State uses fund accounting to report on its financial position and results of operations. Fund accounting is designed to demonstrate legal compliance and to aid financial management by segregating transactions related to certain government functions or activities. A fund is a separate accounting entity with a self-balancing set of accounts, which represents the fund's assets, liabilities, equity, revenues, and expenditures or expenses. Separate financial statements are provided for governmental funds, proprietary funds, and fiduciary funds.

Governmental Fund Type - Special Revenue Fund

The Casino Control Fund is a governmental fund type - Special Revenue Fund. Special Revenue Funds are used to account for the proceeds of specific revenue sources (other than special assessments, private purpose trusts, or for major capital projects) that are legally restricted to expenditure for specified purposes.

The Casino Control Fund (N.J.S.A. 5:12-143) accounts for fees from the issuance and renewal of casino licenses and other license fees. Appropriations are made to the Casino Control Fund to finance the operations of the Casino Control Commission and the Division of Gaming Enforcement.

F. <u>Budgetary Process</u>

An annual budget is adopted for the Casino Control Fund. The Legislature enacts the budget through passage of specific appropriation, the sum of which may not exceed estimated revenues. The annual appropriations act for fiscal year 2005 authorized \$66,555,907 which consists of an original appropriation of \$65,600,000 and other authorized appropriations of \$955,907. Budgetary control is maintained at the program unit level.

During the year, the spending authority delineated in the appropriations act may be revised for supplemental appropriations approved by both the Legislature and the Governor. For fiscal year 2005, the Division of Gaming Enforcement was granted an additional appropriation of \$2,900,000.

A Statement of Revenues, Expenditures, and Changes in Fund Balances Budget and Actual-Budgetary Basis for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2005 is presented as required supplmentary information to these statements. This statement presents a comparison of the final budget adopted for the Casino Control Fund with actual data on a budgetary basis.

The State's budgetary basis of accounting differs from that utilized to present financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principals (GAAP). The main differences between the budgetary basis and the GAAP basis are that under the budgetary basis encumbrances are recognized as expenditures, and the budgetary basis reflects transactions only for the current fiscal year appropriation.

There were no expenditures in excess of appropriations in the Casino Control Fund.

G. Fund Balances

The fund balances of the Casino Control Fund consist of the following:

- 1) <u>Reserved for Encumbrances</u> Used to segregate a portion of fund balance to provide for expenditure upon vendor performance of purchase agreements.
- 2) <u>Reserved Other</u> Used to segregate a portion of the fund balance to provide for anticipated expenditures in future fiscal years.
- 3) <u>Unreserved Designated for Continuing Appropriations</u> Used to represent that portion of fund balance which has been appropriated by the Legislature.
- 4) <u>Unreserved Undesignated</u> Used to represent that portion of fund balance resources available for appropriation.

H. Other

Other significant accounting policies are described in Notes 2 to 10.

NOTE 2 - Cash

Represents a \$500 petty cash fund maintained by each agency and a \$50,000 confidential fund maintained by the Division of Gaming Enforcement.

NOTE 3 - Accounts Receivable

Represents amounts due from casinos and related entities. Net receivables are substantially collected within three months.

Allowance for doubtful accounts represents one hundred percent of non-current receivables.

NOTE 4 - Due From General Fund

Cash transactions of the Casino Control Fund are made by and through the General Fund cash accounts. The balance of cash for this fund held in the General Fund, after receipt and disbursement transactions, is accounted for and reflected in the Due From account on the Balance Sheet.

NOTE 5- Capital Assets

Capital Assets acquired with fund resources are recorded as expenditures of the fund at the time of acquisition. Assets greater than \$20,000 are also recorded in the State's government-wide financial statements. Capital assets are depreciated using the straight-line method, with one half of the year's depreciation charged in the year of acquisition and in the year of disposal. The State assigned estimated useful life for machinery and equipment is 5-15 years. A summary of these capital assets and related accumulated depreciation for the year ended June 30, 2005 follows:

NOTE 6 - Deferred Revenue

Deferred Revenue represents fiscal year 2006 and fiscal year 2005 slot machine license billings collected and recorded in June 2005 and 2004, respectively.

NOTE 7 - Fund Balance

The positive fund balance as of June 30, 2005 and June 30, 2004 resulted from revenues exceeding expenditures. Pursuant to N.J.A.C. 19:41-9.1(e) the balance at June 30, 2005 will be credited to casino licensees during fiscal year 2006 in proportion to the relative amount of total fees incurred or paid by each casino licensee with respect to the fiscal year ended June 30, 2005. The balance at June 30, 2004 was credited in the same manner to casino licensees during fiscal year 2005.

NOTE 8 - Employee Benefit Costs

Fringe benefit costs which include pension, health benefits, payroll taxes, and amounts for unused sick leave are originally paid by the General Fund and are charged to the Casino Control Fund using a composite fringe benefit rate.

Cash payments for accumulated sick leave balances are made to retiring employees upon regular retirement. The payment is based on fifty percent of the employee's sick leave accumulation, at the pay rate in effect at the time of retirement up to a maximum of \$15,000. Employees separating from state service prior to retirement are not entitled to payments for accumulated sick leave balances. Sick leave accumulations

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may also be used by an employee for a personal illness or injury as a means of continuing regular pay. The liability for accumulated employee sick leave balances as as of June 30, 2005 and June 30, 2004 of approximately \$3.7 million and \$3.8 million, respectively, is reflected as a non-current liability on the State's government-wide financial statements and is not accrued in these financial statements.

Employees annually earn 12 to 25 vacation days based on years of service and are permitted to carry over those days earned within a one-year period. The liability for accumulated vacation pay as of June 30, 2005 and June 30, 2004 of approximately \$1.3 million is reflected as a non-current liability on the State's government-wide financial statements and is not accrued in these financial statements.

NOTE 9 - Interest

The General Fund charges interest to the Casino Control Fund when disbursements exceed receipts collected and credits interest to the Casino Control Fund when receipts collected exceed disbursements made. The interest rate used during fiscal year 2005 and fiscal year 2004 was equal to the effective rate of return on investments in the General Fund and varied from 1.24% to 3.02% in fiscal year 2005 and from 1.04% to 1.30% in fiscal year 2004. The net effect of these transactions is reflected in the Investment Earnings account on the Statement of Revenues, Expenditures, and Changes in Fund Balances.

NOTE 10 - Contingent Liability

As of the issuance date of these statements, the Casino Control Fund is not involved in any legal actions wherein there is potential for unanticipated expenditure. Should any legal actions subsequently materialize, <u>N.J.A.C.</u> 19:41-9.1 allows the Casino Control Fund to apportion any uncollected cost among the licensed casino facilities.
