To His Excellency Leon Abbett, Governor and Commander-in-Chief.

SIR—In obedience to law, I have the honor to submit herewith the report of the operations of this department for the fiscal year 1890.

On the 13th of January, 1890, I was appointed to the position of Quartermaster-General, made vacant by the death of General Lewis Perrine, and entered immediately upon the duties of the office. Under the law, the Quartermaster-General is also Commissary-General, Paymaster-General and Chief of Ordnance.

The total number of Springfield breech-loading rifles, calibre .45, the service arm of the National Guard, belonging to the State, is three thousand nine hundred and thirty-one (3,931); two hundred and twenty-seven (227) in the Arsenal, and three thousand seven hundred and four (3,704) in possession of organizations of the National Guard, together with a sufficient supply of accoutrements of the regulation pattern.

In addition to the breech-loaders, the State possesses nine thousand seven hundred and forty-nine (9,749) muskets and rifles in serviceable condition, but of obsolete patterns, twelve hundred and fifty (1,250) of which have been issued from time to time, according to law, to posts of the Grand Army of the Republic, and military academies and schools throughout the State. There are seven (7) breech-loading naval howitzers, and four (4) Gatling guns in possession of gun detachments and Gatling gun companies. For a list of small arms and other heavy ordnance and ordnance stores belonging to the State, reference is made to the Appendix, where will also be found a statement of arms loaned out, in whose possession, &c.

A glance at the abstract of the annual returns made by the company commandants, and published in the Appendix, will show the arms to be in good condition. I do not feel justified at this time, in view of the great expense, in recommending their condemnation in favor of rifles of a later model.

Several years ago, General Drum, then Adjutant-General, in his

annual report to the Secretary of War, strongly recommended that Congress be requested to pass an act providing for the exchange of such arms of obsolete patterns as were in the possession of the militia of the several States for improved Springfield rifles, calibre .45, and supplies of the necessary ammunition.

It seems to me that such a law would be a wise one, and that it would be well for your Excellency, through the Legislature, to urge upon our senators and members of Congress the advisability of such an act, and the great benefit that the National Guard would derive therefrom, as it would enable the State to dispose of its large accumulation of obsolete arms to great advantage, and re-arm the National Guard when necessary without the large expenditure that would otherwise be required, either by direct purchase or by heavy drafts on the appropriation annually set aside by the general government for the arming and equipping of the militia. It would cost nearly fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) for a sufficient number of new rifles and accoutrements to re-arm and equip our uniformed militia.

A disastrous fire in the armory of Companies A and B, First Battalion, at Paterson, on the night of the 7th of February last, destroyed all the ordnance and ordnance stores, the property of the State, and most of the uniforms in the possession of these companies. By your order, they were immediately re-armed and re-uniformed. The uniforms were covered by a policy of insurance for one thousand dollars (\$1,000), so that the loss, although bad enough, was not a total one. This fire led to an examination which disclosed the fact that, with the exception of the public stores in the Arsenal, there was no insurance against loss by fire on the vast amount of State military property in possession of the organizations of the National Guard, and further accident in this respect has been guarded against by a policy of insurance covering all the personal military property of the State wherever situate (except at the State Arsenal, which was already insured), for a period of five years.

The manufacture of ammunition at the State Arsenal has been discontinued, and hereafter all ammunition to be used for rifle practice, &c., will be drawn from the general government.

RESERVE AMMUNITION.

There are sixty-two thousand three hundred and eighty (62,380) rounds of ball cartridges stored at the various regimental, battalion and company headquarters throughout the State, for use in case of an emergency. This ammunition is replaced every year by fresh cartridges, and that taken, sent to Sea Girt and expended in rifle practice. The quantity in possession of each organization is shown in Tabular Statement "B" in the Appendix.

CLOTHING, CAMP AND GARRISON EQUIPAGE, AND
QUARTERMASTER'S STORES.

With the exception of ten (10) new hospital tent flies drawn from the United States, there has been no addition to our stock of canvas, which, owing to the wear and tear incident to last summer's encampment, will require some expense to put it in a serviceable condition. The camp cots are, many of them, in bad condition for camp service, and it will be necessary to obtain some new ones. There will also be required about two hundred (200) knapsacks to fill out the complement for a brigade encampment.

There have been issued during the year about two hundred (200) new uniforms. The exact number is shown in the Appendix.

OFFICERS' ACCOUNTS.

I found in this office a large number of affidavits, filed by officers of the State militia from time to time, covering a period of thirty years, accounting for the loss and expenditure of military stores during that time. After these affidavits were obtained there appears to have been no further effort made to have the charges dropped from the books of the department, but they were left there to encumber the accounts, and necessitate their publication from year to year.

As these losses appear to be of the nature contemplated by law, which gives the Quartermaster-General authority, at his discretion, to cancel bonds given for arms and equipments or other military property of this State, whenever he is satisfied by the accounting of officers of the militia, or their sureties, that the losses were incurred in the service of this State, without fraud or culpable negligence on the part of such officers, or their sureties, I have deemed it advisable, and for the best interests of the service, to remove these charges from the books, as there appears to be no reasonable probability of the return of any of the property involved, which, according to the affidavits, has been expended, worn out, destroyed by misadventure or unavoidably lost in the service of this State.

Much annoyance has been experienced by this department in consequence of officers of the National Guard returning property to the State Arsenal unaccompanied by either invoice or letter of advice, and unless there are some marks on the shipping cases, it is frequently impossible to identify the consignor. I have caused a circular to be issued, urging upon officers of the National Guard the necessity of accompanying all returns of State property with a letter of advice and proper invoice, stating specifically the number of packages, and the contents thereof. Tags for reshipment, addressed "To the Quartermaster-General," accompany each invoice of stores from this office.

I have omitted from the report this year as items involving considerable additional expense for publication, the long statements of the large quantities of clothing, camp and garrison equipage and other public stores that are loaned temporarily during the year to companies of the National Guard, posts of the Grand Army of the Republic and other military and civic organizations. These temporary issues necessitate a great deal of labor in handling, when issued, and cleaning, repairing and storing them away upon their return. The accounts of these issues and returns are carefully and accurately kept by the Military Storekeeper at the Arsenal, and reported daily to this office.

There are also large numbers of rifles and accoutrements returned to the Arsenal throughout the entire year for the purpose of cleaning, re-bronzing and repairs. The facilities for this work at the Arsenal are very complete, and all repairs are made under the personal supervision of Captain Snowden. About one-third of the Springfield rifles in the hands of the National Guard have undergone more or less repairs during the year.

ARMORIES.

The burning of the armory of the First Battalion at Paterson, demonstrated forcibly the importance of having substantial, fire-proof buildings for the various military organizations throughout the State, especially in the large cities, insuring safe depositories for the public stores.

Under the act approved March 23d, 1890, providing for the purchase of sites for and the erection and equipment of armories in cities of the first and second class, and making appropriations therefor, &c., and the supplement thereto approved May 5th, 1890, sites for armories for the Fourth Regiment and the First Battalion, National Guard, have been purchased in Jersey City and Paterson by the Board of Freeholders of the counties in which those cities are respectively located. The grounds purchased for an armory site for the Fourth Regiment are beautifully located on high ground, corner Bergen avenue and Church street, Jersey City. The plot is on a corner, one hundred and fifty feet front on Bergen avenue, one of the handsomest thoroughfares in the city, and two hundred and fifty feet deep on the Church street side, running through from block to block. The property was purchased by the county from Mr. John Wheelihan, by the Board of Freeholders, for the sum of \$25,000 in cash. The location of the property is all that could be desired, being in an excellent neighborhood, near the center of the city, and by rapid transit, contiguous to all the railroad depots in the city or county.

The property purchased in Paterson for an armory for the First Battalion is located in the eastern part of the city, fronting one hundred and eighty-one and fifty-four hundredths feet on Market street,

and running back nearly three hundred feet to a street called Armory Place, where it has a width of one hundred and eighty feet, and bounded on the sides by Graham avenue and Pennington street respectively. The price paid for this property was \$19,000. The Board of Freeholders of Passaic county have since appropriated the additional sum of \$6,000, and are now awaiting the action of the Military Board, which is the commission constituted by law, looking to the erection of the building before paying over this balance of the limit allowed by law for grading the premises, excavations and equipping the armory when completed.

I hope the State will be able to have the work on these armories commenced at an early day.

ENCAMPMENT.

The Second Brigade, National Guard, under the command of Brevet Major-General William J. Sewell, had its third annual encampment at Sea Girt from July 19th to July 26th, and for excellence of results as to discipline, drills, &c., was said to be one of the most successful ever held.

The day appointed for the review of the brigade by your Excellency as Commander-in-Chief unfortunately proved stormy and was the only unfavorable occurrence of the week.

The unsightly outbuildings that clustered about the headquarters cottage were removed to the vicinity of the barn and stables, and their former sites laid out in flower-beds, greatly improving the general appearance of the grounds, as was evinced by the favorable comments of visitors to the encampment.

The facilities for rifle practice were improved by the erection of an additional 200-yard range.

SURGICAL INSTRUMENTS.

In the Appendix will be found a statement of surgical instruments and medicine-chests in possession of Surgeons and Assistant Surgeons of the National Guard. To properly equip this important department for duty at the annual encampments and during the seasons of rifle practice, we require more operating and pocket cases and medicine-chests, and also some articles to replace those lost or expended, from the supplies now in service.

INDEPENDENT MILITARY COMPANIES.

By your order, fifty saddles, with sabres, belts and revolvers, were issued to the Essex Troop, Light Cavalry, of Newark, Captain James E. Fleming commanding. No other issues to independent companies have been made during the year.

MILITARY ACADEMIES AND SCHOOLS.

The Bordentown Military Institute has returned the arms and accoutrements loaned for use of the cadets. The few accoutrements of trifling value in the possession of the Military Institute at Orange have been dropped as a charge against that institution. The Peddie Institute at Hightstown exchanged forty of the muskets of the Trenton Arms Co. pattern for forty cadet muskets, Maynard primers, of the same calibre. The College of the Sacred Heart, of Vineland, also exchanged forty Trenton Arms Co. muskets for forty cadet muskets, Maynard primers, calibre .58.

DEPARTMENT OF NEW JERSEY, GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC.

There have been no loans of an unusual character to the Grand Army of the Republic this year. A statement of the loans made, under the act of 1879, to the various posts, is shown in the Appendix.

PAYMASTER-GENERAL'S ACCOUNT.

The total amount paid to officers and enlisted men of the Second Brigade, National Guard, for six days' encampment at Sea Girt, July 21st to 26th, 1890, was fourteen thousand six hundred and ten dollars and eighty-one cents (\$14,610.81). The sums paid to the several organizations are shown in the statement in the Appendix.

RECEIPTS FROM THE UNITED STATES.

There was standing to the credit of this State on the books of the War Department at Washington, on the 31st day of October, 1890, under the act of Congress for arming and equipping the militia, the sum of twelve thousand nine hundred and forty-seven dollars and eighty-two cents (\$12,947.82). A statement of the ordnance and ord-

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nance stores, and camp and garrison equipage, drawn during the year upon your requisitions under the above-mentioned act, appears in the Appendix.

QUARTERMASTER-GENERAL'S DEPARTMENT.

There were some important changes made in this department by enactment of the Legislature at its last session. The offices of Assistant Quartermaster-General and Deputy Quartermasters were abolished, and the officers holding those positions placed upon the retired list. Major James S. Yard, who has served in the militia of this State for forty-seven years, was retired from the office of Deputy Quartermaster with the brevet rank of Lieutenant-Colonel, in recognition of his long and faithful services to his native State.

This law provided for three Deputy Quartermaster-Generals with the rank of Lieutenant-Colonel, and upon my recommendation your Excellency appointed the following-named gentlemen to fill these important positions :

- Major Cyrus F. Loutrel, Deputy Quartermaster (retired).
- Captain William H. Earley, Paymaster Seventh Regiment, N. G.
- Captain George G. Felton, Quartermaster Sixth Regiment, N. G.

These officers have all seen considerable service in the National Guard, and have also, at different times, been connected with the

Quartermaster-General's department, and it was largely to their assistance that I am indebted for the successful management of the commissary department at the late encampment.

The office of Military Storekeeper, with the rank of Captain, was created, and conferred, at my request, upon Mr. Charles F. Snowden, who has been acting as such at the State Arsenal for a number of years, and this promotion, although tardy, was well deserved, as Captain Snowden has given the best years of his life to the service of the State.

For Chief Clerk of the department, I appointed Mr. Samuel S. Armstrong, whose long experience in all matters pertaining to the workings of the department serves to relieve me from much of the personal attention to its details that would otherwise be necessary.

EXPENSE ACCOUNT.

The militia expenses for the year at first glance appear larger than ever before, the disbursements aggregating one hundred and forty-eight thousand five hundred and sixteen dollars and forty-one cents (\$148,516.41), but it is due to yourself and to this department to show that the actual expenses of the National Guard for the fiscal year just ended, were very much less than for the preceding fiscal years of 1888 and 1889, and fall considerably below those of any year since 1885. This apparent large increase in the militia expenses is due to the fact that the sum of fifty-four thousand six hundred and fifteen dollars and fifty cents (\$54,615.50) of the disbursements was for bills contracted in the purchase of camp and garrison equipage, rifle practice expenses, camp expenses, purchase of uniforms, expenses of Washington Inaugural Centennial, &c., &c., for 1888 and 1889, and to which years these items are justly chargeable. Had the bills that go to make up this large excess of disbursements over the actual expenses of the year been paid promptly at the time the indebtedness was contracted, and not permitted to lapse from year to year, my report would have shown a gratifying diminution of expenses.
