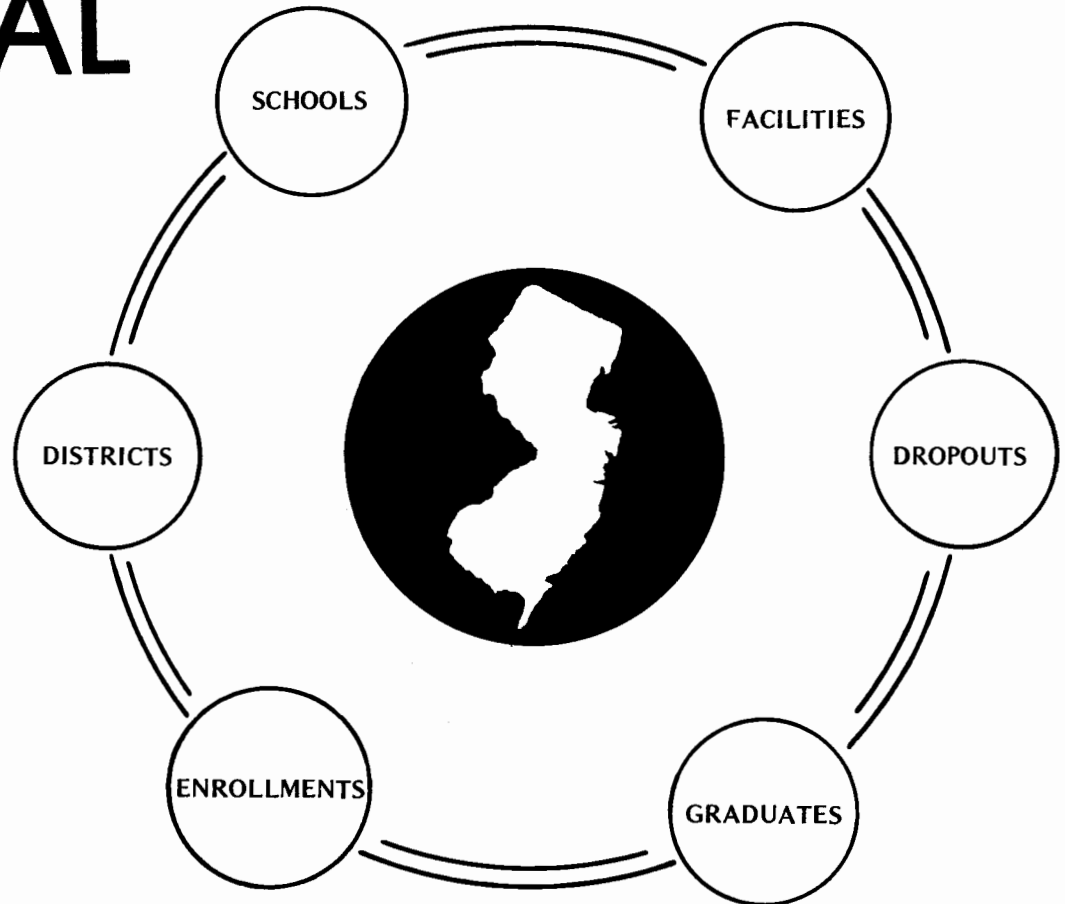

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PREFACE

The 1981-82 edition of Vital Educational Statistics is the eighth in a series which began in 1974-75. It is the fifth year of a revised series using data derived from re-designed instruments supported by detailed and illustrated instructions. It is also the fourth year the publication has been divided into two volumes. A glossary of terms and definitions was added for the first time in 1979-80.

The 1981-82 edition of Vital Educational Statistics inaugurates a change in publication policy due to a change in data collection policy. In order to reduce the paperwork burden at the school and district level, certain reports have been scheduled for collection every two or three years rather than annually. In 1981-82 the Follow-Up of Graduates report was not collected, resulting in five (5) tables on graduates being omitted from the report. Two tables showing high school graduate trends between 1972 to 1980 have been substituted. The Follow-Up of Graduates series will re-appear in 1982-83. The table on Estimated Cost of Capital Improvement Projects was omitted in 1981-82.

Two tables have been added for 1981-82: Table II, Universe of State, County and Local Educational Agencies and Table V, New Jersey Public Elementary and Secondary Schools by Enrollment Size. Table III, New Jersey Public School Districts by Enrollment Size, has been revised.

As in previous editions, Volume I contains school district and school data, including enrollments, dropouts, graduates and facilities data. Each of the sections contains narrative as well as numbers to accommodate reader and user preferences.

Volume II of Vital Educational Statistics contains certificated and non-certificated staff data exclusively and is available as a separate publication.

The data in the Vital Educational Statistics series are descriptive and were designed to establish a core database to help in reporting on the condition of education in New Jersey. Hopefully, the data when taken together will lead to insights with significant policy implications.

The back cover contains two forms for evaluating the publications. Users are invited to send comments or suggestions for improving the utility of the data.

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INTRODUCTION

This introduction presents selected trend data characteristic of public elementary and secondary education in New Jersey between 1977-78 and 1981-82. The four sets of data show enrollment and dropout declines experienced over the past five years; the schools that housed the public elementary and secondary pupils; and the instructional rooms available and needed. Trends focusing on high school graduates appears later in this report as a separate table.

INTRODUCTION

SYNOPSIS OF TRENDS
1977-78 to 1981-82

- Statewide, enrollments decreased by 12.8 percent or an average of 2.6 percent per year. Elementary school enrollments decreased by 12.6 percent or an average of 2.5 percent per year. Secondary school enrollments decreased by 13.2 percent over the period or an average of 2.7 percent per year.
- The number of schools decreased by 97 or 3.9 percent of the total in 1977-78. Schools for the handicapped increased by seven (7). Secondary schools decreased by 23 or 5.3 percent of those operating in 1977-78. Elementary schools decreased by 81 or 4.1 percent of those operating five years ago.
- Despite some sizeable increases in the available instructional rooms (during the period) the number of 1981-82 rooms available exceeded 1977-78 by only ten. By July 1981, additional rooms needed to accommodate excess enrollments and to replace substandard rooms was 1,889. Aging school buildings plus the increased enrollments reported by certain school districts, during the period, combined to create the need for additional instructional rooms.
- Because of declining enrollments and increasing enrollments in certain areas, of the state, the two factors - aging buildings and excess enrollments - continue to persist in creating anomalies in school facility construction needs.
- The total number of dropouts declined by 6.7 percent between 1977-78 and 1981-82. However, the number of dropouts classified as "minority" did not change appreciably during that period. The dropout rate (1980-81) of 1.6 percent was one-tenth of one percent less than 1979-80. The average dropout rate for the five-year period is 1.6 percent.

DISTRICT AND SCHOOL INFORMATION

Section I contains the following tables: Table I, Operating and Non-Operating Public School Districts; Table II, Universe of State, County and Local Educational School Systems; Table III, Enrollment Size of New Jersey Public School Districts; Table IV, New Jersey Public Schools by Type of School and Table V, Enrollment Size of New Jersey Public Schools.

Table I shows that the total number of "school districts" remained at 619. One non-operating district became operational during 1981-82 increasing the number to 597. Non-operating districts decreased to 22.

Table II appears for the first time in the Vital Educational Statistics publications. The table separates basic administrative units (with boards of education) from other administrative units. The latter group includes educational services commissions, jointure commissions, county special services districts and State operated schools. Excluding the four State operated schools (Col. 13), the Table II data are in agreement with the total number of operating districts (597) in Table I, Column 2.

Table III has been changed in format. The 1981-82 Table has been expanded to show school district enrollment sizes under 1,000. The upper limit of the table has been reduced to a maximum district size of "9,000 and over". Column six shows that 298 districts had enrollments under 1,000. One hundred and twenty-two (122) districts had enrollments between 1,000 and 1,999. The remainder, 177 districts, had enrollments ranging from 2,000 to well over 9,000.

Table IV is a summary of schools by school type. Column 12 shows a total of 2,364 public schools, a net decrease of 32 from the previous year. Of the total number of public schools (1981-82), 1,929 were elementary and 435 were secondary. Increases in school type (compared to 1980-81) were as follows: nine (9) middle schools; four (4) four-year high schools; four (4) secondary schools designated "other" and two (2) elementary schools for the handicapped. Decreases in school type were primarily in the elementary school category, approved junior high schools and three-year high schools.

Table V is one of the tables added to the publication for the first time in 1981-82. It shows that of the 1,929 public elementary schools, 75 percent had enrollments under 499. The median enrollment size for all public elementary schools was 332. Twenty-five percent of the elementary schools had enrollments of 500 or more pupils. Fifty elementary schools had enrollments of 1,000 or more pupils.

Of the 435 public secondary schools in New Jersey, 34.5 percent had enrollments between 500 and 999. The median enrollment size for all secondary schools was 989.

Fifteen percent of the secondary schools had enrollments of 1,500 or more pupils. There were eight (8) secondary schools with enrollments of more than 2,500 pupils.

Counties reporting increases in the number of schools were: Atlantic, Mercer, Ocean and Sussex.

SECTION II

STUDENT INFORMATION

STUDENT INFORMATION

This section contains data on student enrollments, dropouts, suspensions, expulsions and high school graduate follow-up information. Of the 12 tables, six contain enrollment data; four carry dropout suspension and expulsion data, and two contain high school graduate follow-up information. With the exception of the graduate data, all of the data are reported as of September 30, 1981. The enrollment data are used to prepare 10-year enrollment projections and they are also used to develop lists of schools that have high concentrations of low income pupils. The data are supplied to the National Center for Education Statistics.

ENROLLMENTS

Table VI is a membership table i.e., pupils on roll during the last school day of September 1981. The data are reported for day school students and were compiled from individual school reports submitted by each district. The special education pupils (Column 17) are students on roll in self-contained classrooms. "Mainstreamed" special education students have been reported with the regular students in their respective grade levels. There were 1,204,718 students on roll in the public schools as of September 30, 1981.

When compared to the last school year, enrollment declines occurred in all grades with the exception of grades six, seven, pre-kindegarten, special education and the post-graduate group. Enrollment projections, indicate that the decline will continue into the middle of the decade.

Table VII consolidates enrollments in the various counties into regions conterminous with the Educational Improvement Centers (EIC's). The table shows that enrollments ranged from a high of 405,229 in the North-east Region to 203,812 in the Southern Region. The

Central Region serves 356,470 students and the North-west Region serves 239,207 students at the elementary and secondary levels. All of the regions experienced enrollment declines ranging from 3.6 percent in the Northeast Region to 2.7 percent in the Southern Region. The Northwest Region declined by 3.3 percent and the Central Region declined by 3.3 percent.

Table VIII is the first of two tables separating students on roll into elementary and secondary school tables. On September 30, 1981 there were 753,348 elementary students on roll--20,953 fewer than was reported during the fall of 1980. Additional elementary school enrollment trend data are available from Enrollment Trends 1963-64 to 1979-80, a publication of the New Jersey State Department of Education.

Table IX shows that in 1981, 451,370 secondary school students were on roll in grades seven through twelve, 20,337 fewer students than the number reported during the fall of 1980. However, at the close of the decade, Sussex County was still recording secondary school enrollment increases over the prior year. Additional secondary school enrollment trend data are available from Enrollment Trends, 1963-64 to 1979-80.

Secondary schools account for 19.9 percent of grade seven enrollments and 22.8 percent of grade eight enrollments. Elementary schools account for 80 percent of the 7th graders and 77.2 of the 8th graders.

Table X is the first of two tables reflecting data by sex and "Minority" classifications. The data are shown in county and state totals. Additional racial/ethnic data, by district, is available through New Jersey Public School Racial/Ethnic Data, 1981-82, a publication of the New Jersey State Department of Education.

"Minority" is a composite of the racial/ethnic groups contained in Table XI, Columns 4 to 11. Those groups are: Black (not Hispanic origin), Hispanic, American/Indian Alaskan Native, and Asian or Pacific Islander.

Of the total number of students on roll, 28.4 percent were reported as "Minority"--an increase of 0.7 percent over 1980. Eight (8) counties exceeded the state average of 28.4 percent minority: Hudson, 63.5 percent; Essex, 61.3 percent; Passaic, 43.1 percent; Cumberland, 39.0 percent; Union, 38.5 percent; Mercer, 36.1 percent; Atlantic, 34.7 percent and Camden, 30.4 percent.

School districts that did not report minority enrollments were located in Burlington, Cape May, Gloucester, Hunterdon, Monmouth, Morris, Ocean, Somerset, Sussex, Union and Warren counties.

According to the data in Columns 3 and 5 of Table X, male student enrollments continue to exceed female enrollment by 2.6 percent.

Table XI contains racial/ethnic data by county, however, data by school district are available in a publication of the New Jersey Department of Education, titled, New Jersey Public School Racial/Ethnic Data, 1981-82.

Of the total public school students enrolled statewide, 71.6 percent were White; 18.2 percent were Black; 8.3 percent were Hispanic; 0.1 percent were American Indian or Alaskan Native; and 1.9 percent were Asian or Pacific Islander.

School districts reporting 50 percent or more minority students were located in 15 counties.

DROPOUTS

Table XII is the first of three tables reporting dropouts from both the elementary and secondary public schools. The data are reported by county, however, dropout data by district are available through a publication of the New Jersey State Department of Education, New Jersey Public School Racial/Ethnic Data, 1980-81. Table XII data reports dropout "reasons" that are in conformity with Handbook V, Students and Pupil Accounting of the National Center for Education Statistics. Seventeen detailed explanations concerning "reasons" for discontinuing school have been consolidated into seven (7) "reasons" for reporting purposes. (See report form in the appendix for the detail of the 17 reasons).

From September 1980 to August 1981, 20,373 dropouts were reported by the public schools. This was 1,095 fewer than the number reported last year. The data element titled, "New Residence: School Status Unknown," accounted for 1,383 students who had moved from the district and their educational status (entry into another school) could not be determined. The category, "Moved, Status Unknown," decreased by 109 from the figure reported last year. Seven counties accounted for 69 percent of the "unknowns":

Atlantic, Essex, Mercer, Middlesex, Bergen, Passaic, and Monmouth.

Three major areas (consolidated reasons) describe the reasons why students discontinue school: "behavioral or curricular", "economic or home influences" and a category titled, "other known or unknown reasons." The detailed explanations incorporated into the "behavioral or curricular" category (Col. 3) are items D5 to D10 on the survey instrument. (See appendix). "Economic or other home influences" (Col. 4) represents a consolidation of items D11 to D14. Column (5) "familial" is a combination of two items, married or pregnant. Column (7), "other known or unknown reasons" is a total of items D18 to D19.

Of the seven major reasons for discontinuing school, "behavioral or curricular" reasons were reported most frequently (8,462), followed by "economic or home influences" (5,660) and "other known or unknown reasons" (third with 5,303). There were 687 dropouts because of marriage and/or pregnancy. Column (4), "economic and home influences," includes 4,873 students who were reported as employed.

Table XIII contains two basic dropout categories: dropouts by grade and by sex. Ninety-three percent of the dropouts were from high school grades nine to twelve. Three grades continued to account for the majority of dropouts: grades 11, 10 and 12 respectively. Of the 20,373 dropouts, 4,283 were twelfth graders. Male dropouts continued to outnumber female dropouts, and, the percent of

dropouts for each sex did not change significantly when compared to last year.

Two counties, Cumberland and Somerset were successful in determining the status of all dropouts moving to a new residence.

Table XIV shows the state's public school dropouts by racial/ethnic origin. Compared to 1979-80, the White student dropout population dropped to 60.1 percent of all dropouts; the Black student population decreased to 26.2 percent of all dropouts and the Hispanic dropout population increased to 13.2 percent. The Asian or Pacific Islander group computed to five-tenths of one percent.

Table XIV shows that when we classify dropouts as "Minority" we are describing primarily Black and Hispanic students. Of the 39.9 percent of "Minority" dropouts, 98.7 percent were Black and Hispanic students.

Table XV pupils suspended and expelled, appears for the fourth time in the Vital Educational Statistics series. Column 7 shows the total number of students suspended (95,288) between September 1980 and August 1981. Column 10 shows the number of students expelled (103) from school between September 1980 and August 1981.

Of the pupils suspended (each pupil was counted once) 61,670 (64.7 percent) were White and 33, 618 (35.2 percent) were minority students. Male students were suspended more frequently than female students. Of all pupils suspended, 69 percent were male and 31 percent were female.

Statewide, the suspension rate was 7.6 percent of the students on roll. Eleven counties fell below the statewide suspension rate. Suspension rates of 10 percent or more were recorded by six counties.

GRADUATES

Table XVI is the first of two tables containing high school graduate data for the period 1972 to 1980. The table shows graduates continuing education at a college or university; graduates pursuing education at other schools such as industry sponsored schools, vocational schools, business schools, art schools, service academies, etc. A third category titled "other post secondary" includes those graduates pursuing education not identified in the first two groups.

Between the early part of the decade (1972) and 1980 the number of all graduates "continuing" education increased by 5.2 percent. Graduates continuing at a college or university increased by 6.2 percent. Graduates pursuing education at other than the college level also increased by 5.5 percent. The third category "other post secondary" decreased by 32.1 percent.

Table XVII shows that graduates not continuing education (between 1972 and 1980) tended to enter government service in increasing numbers. The two categories "employment" and "other" both showed percentage decreases. Statewide, the total number of graduates not continuing their education, (between 1972 and 1980), remained at essentially the same level (35,000).

SECTION III

FACILITIES INFORMATION

SCHOOL FACILITIES

This section contains two tables related to school facilities with particular attention to instructional rooms. The two tables show the net change (over the last year) in available instructional rooms and the instructional rooms available and needed in the public elementary and secondary schools.

Table XVIII: At the beginning of the fiscal or school year (1981-82)*, 69,029 instructional rooms were available to public school students. That number represented a decrease of 734 rooms, or a net decrease of approximately one percent. Eight counties reported an increase in the number of available instructional rooms. The greatest percentage gains (over last year) were made by Sussex, Gloucester, Atlantic, Ocean, Cape May and Hunterdon counties.

Table XVIII shows the total number of elementary instructional rooms was 45,255 and the total of secondary instructional rooms was 23,774. Approximately 65.6 percent of all instructional rooms was devoted to elementary education and 34.4 percent to secondary education.

Table XIX separates available instructional rooms into two categories: rooms available and rooms needed. The available rooms are further separated into rooms in use and rooms not in use. The rooms "needed" section reports on the numbers needed to meet excess enrollments and the number needed to replace substandard instructional rooms.

Of the instructional rooms available (69,029), 513 were reported "not in use". This is a decrease of 147 when compared to last year. Of all available rooms, the number not in use, was reported to be seven-tenths of one percent. Columns 5, 6 and 7 of Table XIX show that additional instructional rooms needed for excess enrollments and those needed to replace substandard rooms. The total number of rooms needed because of excess enrollments was 812 and 1,077 were needed to replace substandard rooms. The total number of instructional rooms needed was reported to be 1,889.

To alleviate excess enrollment, two counties reported needing more than 100 rooms: Atlantic and Essex.

Instructional rooms needed for replacement of substandard rooms were reported by all of the counties. Eight counties reported needing 50 or more replacement rooms.

GLOSSARY

Academic Difficulty: The student left school or was required to leave because of academic difficulty.

Additional Secondary School: Enrollment after graduation from high school (Grade 12) in a secondary school for additional school work.

Advanced Placement Program: A series of courses for upper grade secondary school students intended to provide college level instruction. Successful completion may enable the student (s) to bypass the usual initial college courses in the subject area and begin the student's college work with a more advanced course and possibly with college credit. (This category does not include students enrolled in special programs for the talented or gifted).

Alternate School: A school that offers a student a choice between it and the traditional school which most students in the district attend. The alternate school is frequently typified by modified curricular content, nonstandard classrooms, and/or instructional techniques based on individual student needs.

Apprenticeship/On-the-Job Training: Supervised training program for a beginner who wishes to learn a semi-skilled or skilled trade. At the apprenticeship level, two or more years work experience on the job, supplemented by related classroom experience.

Art School: A non-degree granting, postsecondary institution offering courses of varying length in preparation for occupations related to drawing, painting, sculpture, design, and similar arts.

Behavioral Difficulty: The student was required to withdraw from school because of behavioral difficulty.

Bilingual Program: A state board of education approved instructional program conducted in English and a second language. Such programs are intended to meet the special needs of students who have a native language other than English or who have limited English speaking ability.

Business or Secretarial School: A non-degree granting, post-secondary institution offering courses of varying length in preparation for technical business occupations.

Capital Improvement: Expenditures which result in the acquisition of fixed assets, additions to fixed assets, and increases the value of property and/or buildings presently owned. For a complete definition, consult the Chart of Accounts published by the Division of Finance & Regulatory Services and Handbook II (Revised) Financial Accounting published by the United States Office of Education.

College (four-year): A postsecondary institution offering a four-year curriculum and empowered to confer a bachelor's degree.

College (two-year): A postsecondary institution offering a two-year curriculum and empowered to confer an associate's degree.

Community Service Program: Programs through which students gain insight and experience in the problems and operation of such community services as recreation programs, civic activities, public libraries and community welfare agencies.

Compensatory Education Program: A program approved by the State Board of Education to provide preventive and remedial activities and services, supplemental to the regular school program, to meet the special needs of students performing below minimum levels of student proficiency as required by NJAC 6:8-1.1 and 3.8.

Continuing Education: A program extending opportunities for reading, study and training to young persons and adults following completion of or withdrawal from full-time school or college programs.

Cosmetology or Barber School: A non-degree granting, postsecondary institution offering courses of varying length in preparation for qualifying examinations and licensing.

Course: An organization of subject matter and related learning experiences provided for the instruction of pupils on a regular or systematic basis, usually for a predetermined period of time. Credit toward graduation or completion of a program of studies is given pupils for the successful completion of a course.

Credits Required for Graduation: Units of value awarded to all or some pupils for the successful completion of the work of a course or series of courses. (The minimum number of credits to be established by each high school are set forth in NJAC 6:27-1.4).

Deceased: Died subsequent to graduation.

Dislike of School Experience: The student left school because of an active dislike or one or

more aspects of his or her school experience other than physical illness, behavioral difficulty, academic difficulty, lack of appropriate curriculum, poor student-staff relationships and poor relationships with fellow students.

District Priority: The priority number assigned to the named project by the local board of education.

Dropout: An elementary or secondary school student who has been in membership during the regular school term and who withdraws from membership before graduating from secondary school (Grade 12) or before completing an equivalent program of studies. Such an individual is considered as having discontinued schooling, whether this occurs before or after the student has passed the compulsory school attendance age and, where applicable, whether or not the student has completed a minimum required amount of school work.

Economic Reasons: The student left school because of economic reasons, including inability to pay school expenses and inability of parents to provide suitable clothing.

Employment: Working full-time or part-time in one of the following categories cited in the Dictionary of Occupational Titles: Professional, Technical or Managerial; Clerical-Sales; Service; Farming, Fishing, Forestry and Related; Processing; Machine Trades; Bench Work; Structural; Miscellaneous.

Estimated Project Cost: The value arrived at by rough calculation or assumed to be approximately correct on the basis of judgments acceptable to the local board of education.

Excess Enrollment: The total enrollment of students on roll in September subtracted from the number of students that can be adequately housed in a school building without overcrowding.

Expulsions: The action taken by a board of education compelling a student to withdraw from school for reasons such as extreme misbehavior, incorrigibility, or unsatisfactory achievement or progress in school work.

Family Income: The combined incomes of all members of the student's family. Possible sources for this information are: the School Lunch Programs, Title I, County Welfare Boards or local survey.

Government Service: Enlistment in the armed forces, the Job Corps or another government sponsored program.

Homemaking: Spending full-time establishing and managing a household.

Industrial Arts Program: A program of instructional and laboratory experiences which provide basic education related to the industrial and technological aspects of life through experiences with tools, materials and processes.

Industry Sponsored School: A technical, trade or vocational school sponsored by a private industrial firm, primarily to train prospective employees.

Instructional Rooms: (Area or Space) A "room" is the equivalent of a single teaching station.

Instructional Rooms Abandoned: Complete relinquishment of classrooms.

Instructional Rooms Added & Occupied: New construction, including additions and temporary instruction rooms.

Instructional Rooms Available: Includes all permanent and temporary rooms, whether used or not used.

Instructional Rooms Available and In Use: Rooms for which an "Occupancy Permit" has been issued by the state department of education.

Introduction to Vocations Program: A guidance program to enable students in Grades 7 through 10 to explore occupational opportunities. The program includes classroom instruction, "hands-on" activities, field trips, job visitation days and speakers from business and industry.

Lack of Appropriate Curriculum: The student left school because the curriculum was not appropriate for his or her needs.

Location Unknown: School has no records concerning graduate's whereabouts.

Marriage: The student left school because of marriage.

Need at Home: The student left school to help with work at home, including work on the family farm.

New Residence: School Status Unknown: The student left school upon moving to a new residence. It is not known if the student entered a new school.

Nursing School: A non-degree granting, postsecondary institution usually associated with a hospital which prepares students to be nurses.

Open Classroom: A relatively large instructional area or multiclassroom space not separated by walls as in a traditional classroom. More important than these physical aspects is the accompanying philosophy of an open curriculum cooperatively developed by teachers and students without the constraints inherent in the usual prescribed curriculum.

Operation of Plant Services: Directing and managing personnel care and upkeep of buildings care and upkeep of grounds and care and upkeep of equipment. This includes custodians or building service workers and security services.

Other Post-Secondary School: Any non-degree granting, postsecondary school other than the foregoing.

Other Type College: Any postsecondary degree granting institution other than the foregoing.

Parental Influence: The student left school as a result of parental encouragement to do so.

Physical Illness: The student left school because of a physical illness.

Poor Relationships with Fellow Students: The student left school because of poor relationships with fellow students.

Poor Student-Staff Relationships: The student left school because of poor relationships with members of the school staff.

Post-Graduate: Students who after graduating from high school (Grade 12) re-enroll in the same or another secondary school for additional high school level courses.

Post-Secondary: Students who after graduating from high school (Grade 12) enroll for advanced study at the Grade 13 level or higher.

Pregnancy: The student left school because of pregnancy.

Pre-Kindergarten: Students in a group or class organized to provide educational experiences for children during the year or years preceding the kindergarten which are part of the elementary school program and are under the direction of a professionally qualified teacher.

Program Completion: Curricular activities or program set by the local board of education as a pre-requisite for graduation. The activities or programs shall be based on specific instructional objectives for an individual and/or group of individuals. In New Jersey, often described as "Plan B."

Program for Gifted or Talented: A program for students identified by professionally qualified personnel as being advanced in mental development and/or capable of high performance in one or more areas of special competence. Among these areas of competence are creativity, leadership ability, social adeptness and facility in the productive and performing arts. (This category does not include students enrolled in enrichment courses leading to advance placement).

Program for Pregnant Students: A program for students who would otherwise drop out of school because of pregnancy. In addition to meeting all curricular requirements, such programs usually provide special personal and educational counseling services.

Program of Studies: A program is a combination of related courses and/or self-contained classes organized for the attainment of specific educational objectives, e.g., a program of special education for handicapped pupils or a program of occupational (vocational) education.

Project: Any work, construction or alteration undertaken that is single in character.

Project Code: Code number that best identifies project as either land, buildings or equipment and furniture selected from code list supplied with these instructions.

Project Title: The official title of the capital improvement project or a brief, but descriptive title of the nature of the capital improvement planned.

Racial/Ethnic Groups: A pupil may be included in the group to which he or she appears to belong, identifies with or is regarded in the community as belonging to. However, no person should be counted in more than one racial/ethnic category. The categories are: White, Not Hispanic Origin, Black, Not of Hispanic Origin, Hispanic, American Indian or Alaskan Native and Asian or Pacific Islander.

Reason Unknown: The student left school for a reason which is not known.

Religion: The student left school due to religious convictions of the student and/or the student's parents.

Rooms Gained by Conversion: Non-instructional rooms converted to instruction rooms.

Rooms Lost by Conversion: Instruction rooms converted to non-instructional rooms.

School Functional Capacity: The number of students that can adequately be housed in a school building without overcrowding. Use "School Capacity Worksheets" published by the state department of education. Compute only for permanent facilities.

School Year: The "school year" begins on July 1 and ends on June 30.

Service Academy: An institution of higher education maintained by the federal government to prepare students for a professional career as officers in one of the armed services.

Shared Time Vocational: An arrangement whereby a student regularly and concurrently attends two schools which share direction and control of the student's studies. In this report, the time sharing relationship is between a public secondary school and an area vocational school.

Special Education: Students on roll in self-contained special education classes. (Special education students who are mainstreamed are reported in their respective grade levels).

Special Education Program: A special program for any student who is mentally retarded, visually handicapped, auditorily handicapped, communication handicapped, neurologically or perceptually impaired, orthopedically handicapped, chronically ill, emotionally disturbed, socially maladjusted or multiply handicapped.

Split or Curtailed Session: A school session with less than the minimum number of four hours prescribed by the State Board of Education. These hours are exclusive of recess or lunch periods. Such sessions are often described as double or half sessions.

Substandard Rooms: A substandard classroom is one which never received state board of education approval for permanent use. Such spaces require a county superintendent's annual approval as a temporary facility before being used for instructional purposes.

Suspensions: Temporary dismissals (at least one school day) of students from school by a teacher or principal. These are official suspensions reported to the superintendent of schools or other chief school administrator (if there is no superintendent). Count each pupil once regardless of the number of times he or she was suspended.

Technical, Trade or Vocational School: A non-degree granting, postsecondary institution offering courses to prepare individuals for employment as skilled workers or draftsmen.

Technology for Children Program: A program to provide children with individualized, experimental learning and opportunities to develop interests and self-awareness. Technological world-of-work activities are integrated throughout the traditional curriculum with emphasis on the needs and interests of individual students.

Total Enrollment: A count of students on roll on the last school day of September. Should agree with number reported in Part A of Current School Enrollment Data.

Unemployed: Not employed at any paid work.

Ungraded: Students in a class which is not organized on the basis of grade and has no standard grade designation. (Students in special education classes should not be reported here, but in their respective grade levels).

Vandalism: Glass breakage, fire, arson, theft, property destruction (smashed furniture, graffiti, carved desks, etc.) through carelessness or displaced aggression.

Vocational Education Program: Programs offering education and training in such semi-skilled, skilled or technical occupations as agriculture, home economics, office occupations, distributive education and technical education.

Year Bids Will Be Received: The actual or estimated year in which bids will be received for the named project.
