STATE OF NEW-JERSEY.

An ACT to amend an Act, intituled, An Act to declare the Value of the Continental Currency through the several Periods of its Depreciation, and to provide for the more equitable Payment of Debts.

WHEREAS the Scale of Depreciation established by the Act, intituled, 'An Act to declare the Value of the Continental Currency through the several Periods of its Depreciation, and to provide for the more equitable Payment of Debts,' passed June the twenty-second One Thousand Seven Hundred and Eighty-one, is

too general in the early Periods of Depreciation, and in other Respects does not answer the equitable Purposes thereby intended;

SECT. I. Be it therefore Enacted by the Council and General Assembly of this State, and it is hereby Enacted by the Authority of the same, That so much of the said recited Act as respects the establishing the Table of

Depreciation therein specified, shall be, and the same is hereby repealed.

2. And be it further Enacted, That from and after the passing of this Act, the following Table shall be, and the same is hereby established in the Place and Stead of the above mentioned Table, viz.

St. JOHN'S (Antigua) November 27, 1781.

IT is with shame and indignation that we proceed to say a few words relative to the inglorious loss of the island of St. Eustatia, which has been too fully confirmed. The Marquis de Bouille landed on Sunday night the 25th ult. at a place called Tumble-down-dick, on the back of the island, with a handful of men only—some accounts say but 250, others go to 380, but we have not yet heard any body exceed the latter estimate. It seems he had three or four times that number upon the expedition, but the landing was so bad that it was with the utmost danger and difficulty those few had got on shore, and not without the loss of some lives. In landing, their boats were stove, and the Marquis de Bouille finding it impossible either to get more men on shore or to regain his ships, which last it is said he would willingly have done, instantly formed the gallant resolution of attempting the conquest of the island with the small force he had; and to the eternal disgrace of the Commander in Chief there (if the circumstances narrated, prove all true,) they succeeded without any resistance on our part, at least without any

worthy noticing. What number of troops the English had, is not in our power to ascertain; but we have not heard any military gentleman estimate them lower than 500. The 15th regiment and part of the 13th, which formed the garrison, are transported to Martinico, and from thence will, we presume, be speedily conveyed to France. Several particulars of this shameful business have reached us; but we abandon the ungrateful subject for the present, only adding, that every thing we have heard on the occasion relative to the Marquis de Bouille, proves him to possess both that spirit of enterprize as a soldier, and that liberality as a gentleman, for which he has long been celebrated and esteemed, even by us his enemies. St. Martin's, it is said, has also fallen, but we have heard nothing of Tortola. Some accounts say that, exclusive of 20 odd sail of the line under M. de Grasse from North-America, the French have received at Martinico, a reinforcement of ten sail from home. But this, we hope, is premature. December 4. The Sybil frigate, which went into English harbour yesterday morning, parted with the

British fleet, consisting of 18 ships of the line, on Wednesday last (two others with the Nymph frigate had separated in a gale of wind) and it is supposed that they must ere this have arrived at Barbados. MARTINICO, November 1. The schooner Defiance arrived here the 29th of last month from the Spanish coast; she brings very agreeable intelligence for our allies. According to advices which had been received by the Governor of the Carracas the 6th of October, from Lima and Sta. Fe, the famous Indian Joseph Gabriel Tupa Amaro, who attempted to have himself proclaimed King of Peru, had been taken and beheaded, together with his whole family and the other Caciques his allies. The Colonel of the Carthagena regiment was at Sta. Fe with 1500 men. A considerable number of the revoltors had been hanged, and others were upon the point of sharing the same fate. It is to be hoped these acts of severity will make some impression upon the minds of the disaffected, and that the flames of sedition will be totally extinguished. of the Carraccas and Cumana, were already dispersed in the mountains. Thus, whatever the English may say, we shall not see another Boston upon the southern continent.

The Amazon frigate, commanded by M. de Village, which sailed from hence the 9th of September, returned the 28th of last month from the Havannah, having on board a million of pistons. At her departure from that colony, Don Solano had still under his command 13 ships of the line. They reckon there may be there, besides 6000 regulars, 6000 well disciplined militia. M. de Village is greatly pleased at the reception he met with from the Spaniards.

L O N D O N, October 9.

L'Her privateer, of Dunkirk, commanded by Jean Malyn, of 16 guns, and which has done considerable mischief to our trade, under different names and commanders, was sunk on Wednesday, 19th instant, by the French frigate Emerande running her down in the night; and it blowing hard, not a man or boy was saved. She had been in company all the morning, had parted in chase at noon, and joined again about sunset.

Should the Emperor of Morocco really throw himself into the Spanish possessions, the diversion may be so alarming to the Spanish monarch, as to withdraw him from our foes, and give us once more hopes of becoming formidable.

The papers have formed several conjectures and given several reports of the intended relief of Minorca; some asserting that Admiral Darby has been detached from the grand fleet for that purpose. A correspondent suggests, that it is more probable that Sir John Lockhart Rois is dispatched for that purpose, which will account for Admiral Kempenfelt's being sent down to take the command.

[The following has been omitted several weeks for want of room.]

By the UNITED STATES in Congress assembled, October 29th, 1781.

Resolved,

THAT the thanks of the United States in Congress assembled, be presented to His Excellency General Washington, for the eminent services which he has rendered to the United States, and particularly for the well concerted plan against the British garrisons in York and Gloucester, for the vigour, attention and military skill with which that plan was executed, and for the wisdom and prudence manifested in the capitulation.

That the thanks of the United States in Congress assembled, be presented to His Excellency the Count de Rochambeau, for the cordiality, zeal, judgment, and fortitude, with which he seconded and advanced the progress of the allied army against the British garrison in York.

That the thanks of the United States in Congress assembled, be presented to His Excellency Count de Grasse, for his display of skill and bravery in attacking and defeating the British fleet off the Bay of Chesapeake, and for his zeal and alacrity in rendering, with the fleet under his command, the most effectual and distinguished aid and support to the operations of the allied army in Virginia.

That the thanks of the United States in Congress assembled, be presented to the commanding and other officers of the corps of artillery and engineers of the allied army, who sustained extraordinary fatigue and danger in their animated and gallant approaches to the lines of the enemy.

That General Washington be directed to communicate to the other officers and the soldiers under his command the thanks of the United States in Congress assembled for their conduct and valour on this occasion.

Resolved, That the United States in Congress assembled, will cause to be erected at York in Virginia, a marble column adorned with emblems of the alliance between the United States, and His Most Christian Majesty; and inscribed with a succinct narrative of the surrender of Earl Cornwallis to His Excellency General Washington, Commander in Chief of the combined forces of America and France, to His Excellency the Count de Rochambeau, commanding the auxiliary troops of His Most Christian Majesty in America, and His Excellency the Count de Grasse, commanding in chief the naval army of France in Chesapeake.

Resolved, That two stands of the colours taken from the British army under the capitulation of York, be presented to His Excellency General Washington in the name of the United States in Congress assembled.

Resolved, That two pieces of field ordnance, taken from the British army under the capitulation of York, be presented, by the Commander in Chief of the American army, to Count de Rochambeau; and that there be engraved thereon a short memorandum, that Congress were induced to present them from considerations of the illustrious part which he bore in effectuating the surrender.

Resolved, That the Secretary of foreign affairs be directed to request the Minister Plenipotentiary of His Most Christian Majesty, to inform His Majesty, that it is the wish of Congress, that Count de Grasse may be permitted to accept a testimony of their approbation, similar to that to be presented to Count de Rochambeau.

Resolved, That the board of war be directed to present to Lieutenant-Colonel Tilghman, in the name

of the United States in Congress assembled, a horse properly caparioned, and an elegant sword, in testimony of their high opinion of his merit and ability.

November 7, 1781.

Resolved, That the Secretary of foreign affairs be directed to prepare a sketch of emblems of the alliance between His Most Christian Majesty and the United States, proper to be inscribed on the marble column to be erected in the town of York, under the resolution of the 29th day of October last.

Resolved, That an elegant sword be presented, in the name of the United States in Congress assembled, to Colonel Humphrey, Aid-de-Camp of General Washington, to whose care the standards taken under the capitulation of York, were consigned; as testimony of their opinion of his fidelity and ability, and that the board of war take order therein.

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 7.

Extract of a letter dated St. Pierre, in Martinique, November 30, 1781.

"On the 26th inst. the Count de Grasse arrived at Fort Royal with the fleet; previous to his arrival, the Marquis de Bouille had embarked with about 1200 troops on board of three frigates, one sloop of war and one brig. The design of this expedition was concealed with a degree of secrecy which seldom occurs.

"The small fleet arrived at Statia on the night of the 26th inst. The island was garrisoned by 650 British troops, commanded by a Col. Cockburne. The winds being northerly the sea run very high, which prevented the Marquis de Bouille from landing more than 4 or 500 men, which was effected undiscovered, about two in the morning at Jenkins's bay. They concealed themselves among the canes till the hour at which the gates of the fort were usually opened. In the instant that the troops came out to perform their exercise on the Savanna, the Marquis caused the whole of his little army to discharge their muskets in the air, and run with their bayonets on the enemy. It is impossible to conceive the confusion into which this well concerted stratagem threw the British, though much superior in number, and in the actual position of battle.—Some called for quarters, and others took to their heels, endeavouring to regain the fort, which the French took possession of without opposition; one British soldier was killed as he endeavoured to let down the drawn-bridge of the fort, which was the only life lost on the occasion, except three French soldiers who were drowned in the debarkation.

"A considerable quantity of money belonging to the Dutch inhabitants of the island, and a large sum which the British officers had acquired there by illicit plunder, fell into the hands of the French; the former was restored immediately to the original proprietors, and the latter will be divided among the captors, as well as about fifteen small vessels which were taken in the harbour.

"Mr. Fitz-Morris is appointed Governor of Statia, and Mr. Chabert Intendant. Viscount Dumas was immediately sent to St. Martins, which being garrisoned by only 60 men surrendered on the spot. The Count de Bouille, nephew to the General, went immediately to France in the Eagle sloop of war.

"I have just taken these particulars from Mr. Chabert's letter to Mr. Texier of this place. I think therefore that their authenticity cannot be questioned."

Extract of a letter from St. Thomas's, dated December 13, 1781.

"Statia re-captured by the Marquis de Bouille for the Dutch on the 26th ult. after a most extraordinary and complete surprize. The whole force that went against it was not more than three frigates and a sloop of war, two small schooners and a sloop, with 1500 men; they lay close in with St. Bartholomew's in the evening of the 25th, and proceeded over in the night to Statia. Very early next morning the Marquis at the head of 300 men, landed at a very great hazard on the back part of the island, and marched in the course of a few hours into the fort, &c. without the least opposition, although a garrison there of seven hundred men, and strong works to support them. The vessels in the meantime went round with the remainder of the troops to the harbour.

"The British commandant was met as he was taking an airing out on horseback, and was pleased to alight to accompany the Marquis, more from compulsion, I believe, than wishes, though censured by his party inasmuch that it is said he sold the island. Immediately after the Marquis proclaimed, that all sufferers by the former capture by the English, should repair to head-quarters, and set forth

the losses they sustained, in order for redress; unfortunately a very few of the old sufferers were on the spot to answer the benevolent, great and good intentions of the Marquis: however, time, it is probable, may bring about more favourable events for them. No plundering was allowed, and every body opened store the same as usual, by the request of the Marquis.

"Colonel Cockburne, the British commander, having claimed three thousand Joes that were found at his quarters, the Marquis told him, that if he could lay his hand on his breast and say they were his, they should be returned him, which he did without hesitating, and the Joes were given up."

Accounts of good authority from the West-Indies say, that Count de Grasse, with a part of his fleet arrived at Martinico on the 12th or 15th ult. the other part of the fleet he dispatched for Cape Francois.
