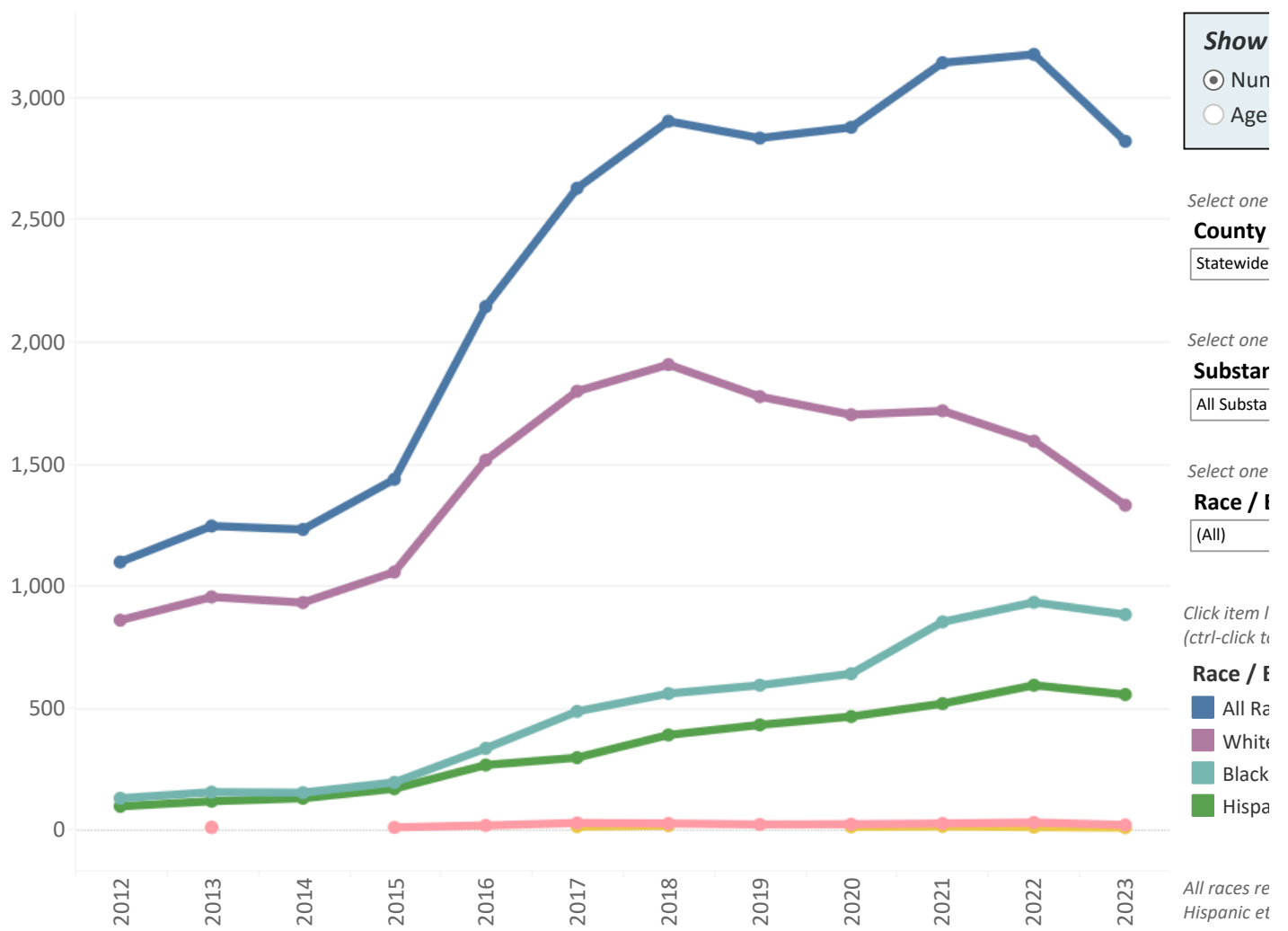

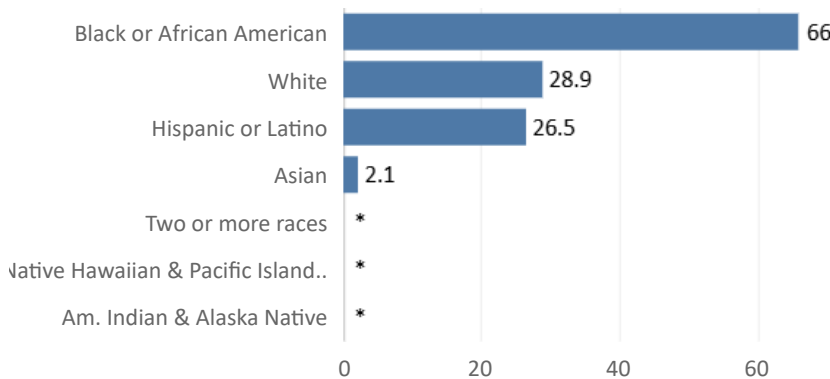
Snapshot of Unintentional Overdose Deaths

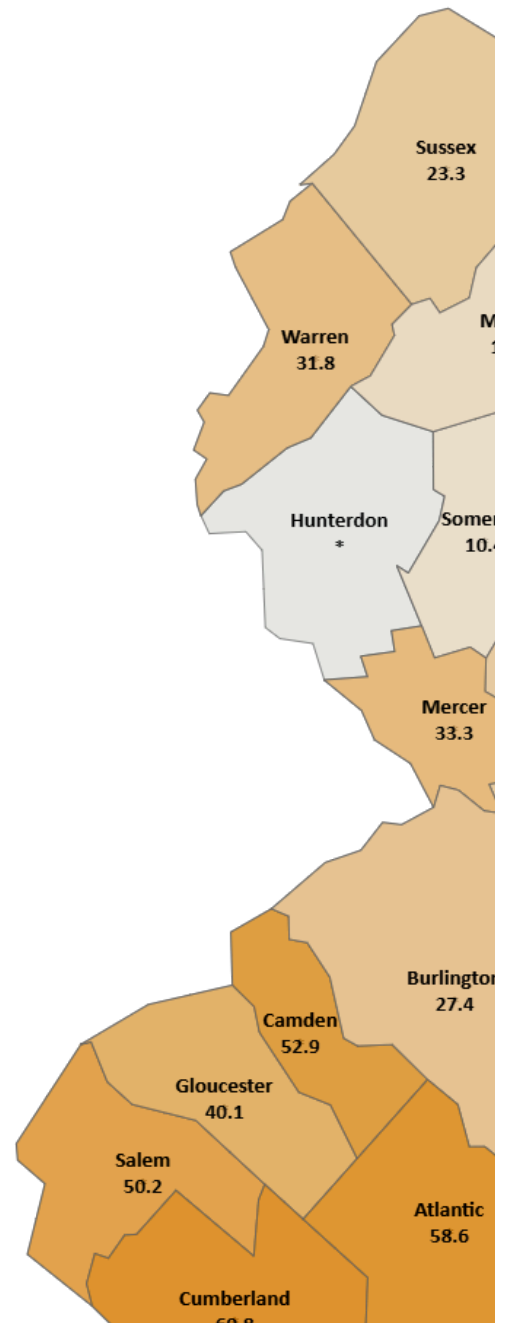
Breakdown by Race / Ethnicity

Age-adjusted death rates from overdose (per 100,000 population).



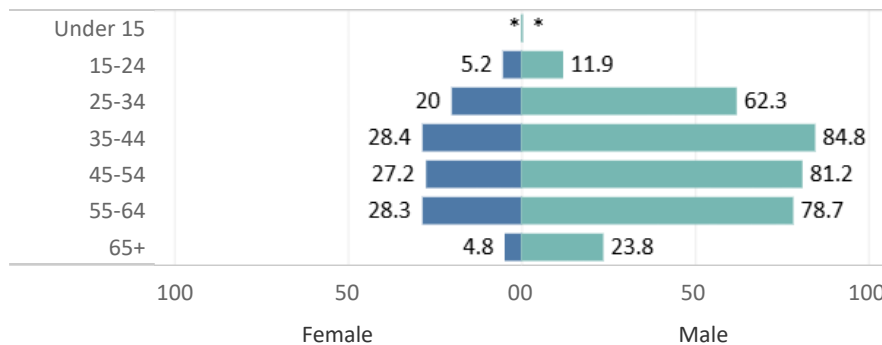
Breakdown by County

Age-adjusted death rates from overdose (per 100,000 population).



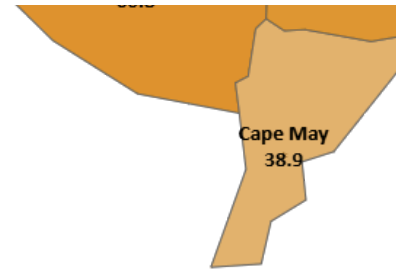
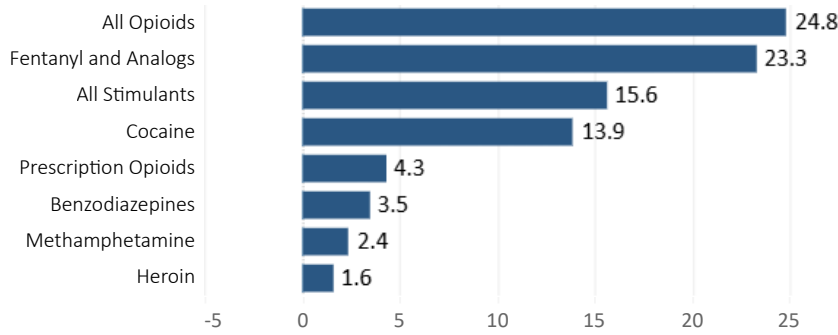
Breakdown by Age Group and Sex
