

In addition to the income of School Fund, (which is derived from interest on bonds, bonds and mortgages, and dividends on stocks,) the Treasurer holds rentals of lands under water, amounting to five thousand and ninety-five dollars, (\$5,095,) which is paid in semi-annual payments. Also leases of lands under water, given by the Riparian

Commissioners, amounting to three hundred and seventy-one thousand seven hundred and seventeen dollars and ninety-one cents, (\$371,717.91,) on which amount seven per cent. is due semi-annually.

The Agricultural College Fund, amounting to one hundred and sixteen thousand dollars, (\$116,000,) is all invested in bonds of this State. The interest, amounting to six thousand nine hundred and sixty dollars, (\$6,960,) has been received and disbursed for the maintenance of Rutgers Scientific School.

By an act of the Legislature, approved March 26th, 1876, the balance of securities of "The Anchor Life Insurance Company" has, in part, been placed in the hands of Francis Robinson, trustee, to be applied as provided for in said act. No report has been made, as yet, by the said trustee, to the Secretary of State or Treasurer, as the law requires.

The International Life Insurance and Trust Company has on deposit in this office securities amounting to one hundred thousand dollars, (\$100,000,) in trust for all the policy holders in said company.

Application has been made for a relinquishment of these securities, on the ground that all the contracts of the company have been closed, and that there exists no further necessity for the deposit. Pursuant to the advice of the Attorney General, an examination of the policies of the company has been instituted and is now in pro-

gress. Should it appear that the deposit is no longer necessary for the protection of the policy holders, the securities will be relinguished.

I would also state that there is due from the county of Hudson twenty-two thousand nine hundred and seven dollars and ninetyeight cents, (\$22,907 98,) being for balance of State tax due for the year 1875, to the amount of which I have called the attention of the State Comptroller.

I have on deposit, as received from M. A. Hall, Treasurer of "Soldiers' Children's Home," two New Jersey bonds for one thousand dollars each, Nos. 1,273 and 1,274, dated January 1st, 1872, and redeemable January 1st, 1898, interest paid to January 1st, 1876, being for balance unexpended from Camden & Amboy Railroad Bounty Fund; there being no account to which I am authorized to place the same, would respectfully call your attention to their disposition.

There being several railroad corporations of the State from which no tax has been received for the year 1875, the revenue has been somewhat decreased. The Comptroller of the Treasury, in whose province the matter lies, will no doubt furnish a full explanation of the cases in question.

I would further report that upon assuming the duties of State Treasurer, on the seventeenth day of February, 1876, the committee appointed by the Legislature to examine the accounts of the Treasurer made a thorough examination of all the receipts and disbursements, the balance in bank, the securities of the several Funds of the State, and found them all correct. The same, with all property, instruments of writing and books of the State, have been received by me, as per statement on file in this office, from Gen. G. Mott, late Treasurer.
