GENERAL ASSEMBLY
1990 ORGANIZATIONAL RESOLUTION

Be It Resolved:

1. That the Clerk of the General Assembly be directed to inform the Senate that the General Assembly has organized, its Speaker being the Honorable Joseph V. Doria, Jr. of Hudson County, and its Clerk, Gail Marsh Saxer of Ocean County, for the First Annual Session of the Two Hundred-Fourth Session of the General Assembly, and has proceeded to business.

2. That the Speaker be and is hereby authorized to appoint such assistants as he may deem necessary.

3. That the working staff of the General Assembly shall be at all times subject to the direction of the Speaker and the Clerk, who shall have authority to designate to any member of the staff such duties as may be required.

4. That unless otherwise ordered the regular hours of meetings of the General Assembly will be on days and at times to be announced to the members, the news media and the public by the Speaker.

5. That no floor passes be issued by any officer or member of the General Assembly other than the Speaker, with the further provision that the privilege of the floor may be extended by a resolution duly adopted.

6. That in the absence of the Clerk, such other officers or employees as directed by the Speaker shall perform all duties imposed by law and the rules of the General Assembly upon the Clerk.

7. That the Bill Drafting Manual prepared and revised from time to time by the Office of Legislative Services be adopted as the official manual of practice and procedure of the General Assembly governing the form of bills to be introduced in the General Assembly and governing the conduct of the preliminary examination of bills proposed for introduction in the General Assembly required by the Rules of the General Assembly.

That in order to carry out the aforementioned practice and procedure, Albert Porroni, Legislative Counsel and such deputies and assistants as he shall assign be designated as counsel to conduct said preliminary examination of bills proposed for introduction and amendments adopted in the General Assembly under the general supervision of the Legislative Counsel.

8. That each member of the General Assembly be authorized to retain up to six aides at a total compensation per member as authorized by law, except the Speaker may authorize more than six aides.

Assembly No. 80, Assemblyman ZECKER—Directs DOT to conduct study and to construct noise barriers in Passaic county; appropriates \$3,000,000.

Assembly No. 81, Assemblyman ZECKER and Assemblywoman CRECCO—Exempts from rent control certain substantially rehabilitated multiple dwellings.

Assembly No. 82, Assemblymen ZECKER and GIRGENTI—The “Tenant Homeownership Mortgage Assistance Act,” to assist lower and moderate income tenants to purchase apartments being converted to condominiums.

Assembly No. 83, Assemblyman ZECKER—Exempts real estate brokers from licensing requirements of “Secondary Mortgage Loan Act” under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 84, Assemblyman ZECKER and Assemblywoman OGDEN—Provides tax credit under corporation business tax for contributions made to low and moderate income housing programs.

Assembly No. 85, Assemblyman ALBOHN—Changes the method of determining the public utilities franchise and gross receipts tax.

Assembly No. 86, Assemblyman ALBOHN—Provides for an ad-

justment in the amount of a constituent municipality's share in the costs of a regional school district under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 87, Assemblyman ALBOHN—Permits any municipality to pay all or a part of the premium for health benefits provided to a retired employee.

Assembly No. 88, Assemblyman ALBOHN—Extends immunity from civil suit to the State, political subdivisions and instrumentalities thereof and public employees engaged in the sponsoring, managing or directing of ski activities for certain injuries occurring during the ski activities.

Assembly No. 89, Assemblyman ALBOHN—Provides that a videotape recording made of a drunk driver shall be available for viewing by the driver, for a reasonable fee.

Assembly No. 90, Assemblyman ALBOHN—Provides for the regulation of beverage containers, requires certain containers to have refund values.

Assembly No. 91, Assemblyman ALBOHN—Requires the submission of local bond ordinances to the voters.

Assembly No. 92, Assemblyman ALBOHN—Amends the law concerning the payment of delinquent fines for motor vehicle violations.

Assembly No. 93, Assemblyman ALBOHN—Provides for payments in lieu of taxes by municipalities to host municipalities.

Assembly No. 94, Assemblyman ALBOHN—Divides proceeds from realty transfer tax between the State, county and municipality.

Assembly No. 95, Assemblyman ALBOHN—Provides that municipalities need not publish their budgets, but may publish a notice instead.

Assembly No. 106, Assemblyman ALBOHN—Increases penalties which may be imposed on former State officers and employees for certain conflicts of interest.

Assembly No. 107, Assemblyman ALBOHN—Authorizes sewerage authorities to establish insurance funds.

Assembly No. 108, Assemblyman ALBOHN—Authorizes municipal utilities authorities to establish insurance funds.

Assembly No. 109, Assemblyman ALBOHN—Permits county election commissioners to reduce or eliminate evening registration hours.

Assembly No. 110, Assemblyman ALBOHN—Permits use of two shifts of district election board workers on election days.

Assembly No. 111, Assemblyman ALBOHN—Changes the interest rate on loans to PERS members from 4% to a rate based on current certificate of deposit yields less 2%.

Assembly No. 112, Assemblyman ALBOHN—Requires the preparation of a red tape note, similar to a fiscal note, in order to provide an estimate of the regulatory impact of a bill.

Assembly No. 113, Assemblyman ALBOHN—Repeals references to the legislative veto of administrative rules in the "Administrative Procedure Act."

Assembly No. 114, Assemblyman ALBOHN—Eliminates State permits for the manufacture of homemade wine and allows more limited quantities of beer and wine to be manufactured for noncommercial purposes at home by persons of legal drinking age.

Assembly No. 115, Assemblyman ALBOHN and Assemblywoman CRECCO—Requires the cost of drafting, producing or printing and distributing of certain State publications to be disclosed thereon.

Assembly No. 116, Assemblymen ALBOHN and SHINN—Requires separate section in local budgets for solid waste activities or facility operations.

Assembly No. 117, Assemblyman ALBOHN—Requires reductions of weekly payments in extended unemployment benefits program when federal contributions to the program are reduced.

Assembly No. 118, Assemblyman ALBOHN—Provides for automatic cost-of-living adjustments for members of the Senate and General Assembly.

Assembly No. 119, Assemblyman ALBOHN—Prohibits restriction of any proportion of housing units created by a municipality to fulfill a fair share housing obligation for occupancy to residents based on age.

Assembly No. 120, Assemblyman ALBOHN—Permits counties and municipalities to publish budget summaries.

Assembly No. 121, Assemblyman ALBOHN—Establishes certain limits on the introduction of bills and resolutions.

Assembly No. 122, Assemblyman ALBOHN—Amends and supplements ECRA.

Assembly No. 123, Assemblyman ALBOHN—Authorizes employer-paid SHBP coverage for surviving spouses of certain local government employees.

Assembly No. 124, Assemblymen ALBOHN and FRELINGHUYSEN—Prohibits Public Advocate from challenging regional contribution agreements.

Assembly No. 125, Assemblyman ALBOHN—Prohibits Council on Affordable Housing from granting builder's remedies.

Assembly No. 126, Assemblyman ALBOHN—Requires that the revenue surplus of certain sewerage and municipal utilities authorities is used in a certain manner.

Assembly No. 127, Assemblymen ALBOHN and FRELINGHUYSEN—Appropriates \$16,500,000 from "Resource Recovery and Solid Waste Disposal Facility Bond Act of 1988" to Morris County.

Assembly No. 128, Assemblymen ALBOHN and Roma—Requires the source separation and recycling of certain beverage containers.

Assembly No. 129, Assemblyman ALBOHN—Reduces motor fuels tax rate from \$0.105 to \$0.08 per gallon and diesel fuel tax rate from \$0.135 to \$0.11 per gallon.

Assembly No. 130, Assemblymen ALBOHN and FRELINGHUYSEN—Clarifies the rights of residents of boarding facilities.

Assembly No. 131, Assemblymen ALBOHN and Felice—Permits increase by municipal ordinance of income limit, and expands types of excludable income for senior and disabled citizens' property tax deduction.

Assembly No. 132, Assemblymen ALBOHN and FRELINGHUYSEN—Requires development plans to obviate hazards of existing and abandoned mine workings.

Assembly No. 133, Assemblymen ALBOHN and FRELINGHUYSEN—Allows licensed speech-language pathologists to qualify as speech-language specialists in schools.

Assembly No. 135, Assemblyman ALBOHN—Permits freeholders of Morris County to reorganize the county library and to appropriate the sums necessary for its operation.

Assembly No. 136, Assemblyman ALBOHN—Requires the return and recycling of used batteries.

Assembly No. 137, Assemblymen ALBOHN, DORIA and Felice—Appropriates \$3,400,000 to New Jersey Commission on Science and Technology for planning and design of advanced technology centers in agricultural molecular biology, photonics and opto-electronic materials, and for architectural and engineering services.

Assembly No. 138, Assemblyman ALBOHN and Assemblywoman Randall—Prohibits sending commercial messages by FAX machine.

Assembly No. 140, Assemblyman ALBOHN—Permits historic site property tax exemption when rental income is used solely for charitable purposes of nonprofit corporation owner.

Assembly No. 141, Assemblyman ALBOHN—Requires the return and recycling of used automotive batteries.

Assembly No. 142, Assemblyman ALBOHN—Requires the proper disposal of used dry cell batteries.

Assembly No. 143, Assemblyman ALBOHN—Provides for payment of interest by local contracting units that do not promptly pay vendors.

Assembly No. 144, Assemblyman ALBOHN—Raises fee for municipal tax search and assessment certificates.

Assembly No. 145, Assemblyman ALBOHN—Provides for voluntary dedication of municipal construction code fees.

Assembly No. 146, Assemblyman ALBOHN—Requires voter approval of a school district lease purchase agreement.

Assembly No. 147, Assemblyman DE CROCE—Establishes a gross income tax refund check-off to provide counties with funds to acquire open spaces.

Assembly No. 148, Assemblymen DE CROCE and LITTELL—Establishes the Anthony Pompelio Commemorative Scholarship Fund for the children of crime victims.

Assembly No. 149, Assemblymen DE CROCE and MARTIN—Increases recycling tax to fund plastics recycling research.

Assembly No. 150, Assemblyman DE CROCE—Permits counties or designated local agencies to enforce compliance with district solid waste management plans.

Assembly No. 151, Assemblymen DE CROCE and MARTIN—Authorizes persons lawfully engaged in the solid waste collection or disposal business to provide recycling services.

Assembly No. 152, Assemblymen DE CROCE and MARTIN—Designates five solid waste management regions.

Assembly No. 153, Assemblyman DE CROCE—Directs private and public entities to place bar screens over storm sewer management basin pipes.

Assembly No. 154, Assemblyman DE CROCE—Requires counties to make a good faith effort to negotiate interdistrict agreements for the development of a regional resource recovery facility.

Assembly No. 155, Assemblymen PENN—Provides safeguards for those involved in residential real estate transactions.

Assembly No. 156, Assemblyman PENN—Requires fiscal note for any legislation that would increase or decrease revenue or expenditures of any political sub-division.

Assembly No. 157, Assemblyman PENN—Requires school boards to include material on waste management in curriculum.

Assembly No. 158, Assemblymen PENN and KAVANAUGH—Requires municipal and sewerage authorities to reimburse their members for up to \$1,000 of expenses per annum.

Assembly No. 159, Assemblymen PENN and KAVANAUGH—Exempts subchapter S corporations from the corporation business tax.

Assembly No. 164, Assemblyman PENN—Reduces distances from school that pupils must live for school district to receive transportation aid.

Assembly No. 165, Assemblymen PENN and KAVANAUGH—Permits counties to utilize terminated landfills and contaminated sites for solid waste disposal under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 166, Assemblyman PENN—Permits licensed psy-

chologists to certify disability under the Temporary Disability Benefits Law.

Assembly No. 167, Assemblymen PENN and KAVANAUGH—Directs the Department of Transportation to construct noise barriers in Warren Township and Watchung Borough, Somerset County, and makes an appropriation therefor from the New Jersey Transportation Trust Fund Authority.

Assembly No. 168, Assemblyman PENN—Permits a sole proprietorship or partnership to be eligible for workers' compensation.

Assembly No. 169, Assemblyman PENN—Allows the tax court to correct computational or descriptive errors in tax assessments.

Assembly No. 170, Assemblymen PENN and KAVANAUGH—Sets forth requirements for performance and maintenance guarantees to a county by a land developer.

Assembly No. 171, Assemblyman PENN—Clarifies rights of parties in a multiple-party account vis-a-vis certain creditors and trustees.

Assembly No. 172, Assemblymen PENN and KAVANAUGH—Entitled "Community Transit Service Assistance Act," appropriates \$3,781,000.

Assembly No. 173, Assemblymen PENN and KAVANAUGH—Provides tax relief for county seats.

Assembly No. 174, Assemblymen PENN and KAVANAUGH—Requires police inform victims of services provided by Violent Crimes Compensation Board.

Assembly No. 176, Assemblyman PENN—Clarifies obligations of certain notaries public.

Assembly No. 177, Assemblymen PENN and KAVANAUGH—Authorizes municipalities to finance sanitary landfill facility closure costs on an annual basis.

Assembly No. 178, Assemblymen PENN and KAVANAUGH—Appropriates \$8,300,000 from "Resource Recovery and Solid Waste Disposal Facility Bond Act of 1988" to Somerset county.

Assembly No. 179, Assemblymen PENN and KAVANAUGH—Permits credit under gross income tax for payment of RMEC by auto insurance policyholders.

Assembly No. 180, Assemblymen PENN and KAVANAUGH—Establishes a "Hazardous Waste Facilities Compensation Fund" and provides compensation for certain losses to certain New Jersey residents and municipalities from the location of a new major hazardous waste facility.

Assembly No. 181, Assemblyman PENN—Provides for direct deposit of certain welfare and unemployment compensation payments to certain depository institutions.

Assembly No. 182, Assemblyman PENN—Limits amount developers must deposit for inspection fees.

Assembly No. 183, Assemblymen PENN and KAVANAUGH—Authorizes Hazardous Waste Siting Commission to designate certain industrial areas as sites for new major hazardous waste facilities and to take certain other actions.

Assembly No. 184, Assemblyman PENN—Permits courts to issue a restraining order against a financial institution for protection of a ward's assets until the service of letters of guardianship.

Assembly No. 185, Assemblymen PENN and ROCCO—Requires the DEP to conduct a one-year study of alternatives to mass-burn incineration as a long-term solid waste disposal strategy; appropriates \$90,000.

Assembly No. 192, Assemblyman PENN and Assemblywoman CRECCO—Clarifies that individual borrower may use own attorney for certain mortgage loan transactions.

Assembly No. 194, Assemblyman PENN and Assemblywoman CRECCO—Permits banks to merge their common trusts with affiliate banks in other states.

Assembly No. 195, Assemblyman PENN—Permits closing of secondary mortgage loan in attorney's office in New Jersey.

Assembly No. 196, Assemblyman PENN—Provides for the modification of the State Development and Redevelopment Plan prior to final adoption.

Assembly No. 197, Assemblyman SCHWARTZ—Establishes a subsidiary corporation of the Port Authority of New York and New

Jersey to be called the Bank for Regional Development to finance infrastructure projects.

Assembly No. 198, Assemblyman SCHWARTZ—Establishes the “New Jersey Urban Neighborhoods Development Foundation Law,” and appropriates \$2,800,000 therefor.

Assembly No. 199, Assemblyman SCHWARTZ—Creates a Community Food and Nutrition Program in the Department of Community Affairs to provide community solutions to hunger and appropriates \$2,000,000.

Assembly No. 200, Assemblyman SCHWARTZ—The “New Jersey Affordable Housing and Tenant Ownership Act.”

Assembly No. 203, Assemblyman SCHWARTZ—Establishes a loan program to help first-time home buyers meet down payments.

Assembly No. 204, Assemblyman SCHWARTZ—The “Employer Assisted Community Housing Fund Act.”

Assembly No. 205, Assemblyman SCHWARTZ and Assemblywoman OGDEN—Authorizes programs to assist the homeless, appropriates \$14,335,000.

Assembly No. 226, Assemblymen NAPLES—Requires cordless telephone packaging to conspicuously warn that conversations may be overheard.

Assembly No. 227, Assemblyman NAPLES—Supp. approp. of \$300,000 to the Property Tax Assessment Study Commission.

notices to persons insured under group life insurance policies.

Assembly No. 241, Assemblyman NAPLES—Provides that a juvenile tried as an adult and convicted of murder is eligible for capital punishment.

Assembly No. 243, Assemblyman NAPLES—Supplemental ap-

Assembly No. 244, Assemblyman NAPLES—Permits a five year property tax exemption for certain historic buildings.

Assembly No. 245, Assemblyman NAPLES—Designates the photograph of the Statue of Liberty by Tom Herde, which appeared in The Times on July 5, 1986, as the State photograph.

Assembly No. 246, Assemblyman NAPLES—Designates “Washington Crossing the Delaware” by Leutze as the State painting.

Assembly No. 247, Assemblyman NAPLES—Makes provisions of P. L. 1985, c. 220 concerning certain veteran members of PERS, retroactive to December 31, 1984.

Assembly No. 248, Assemblyman NAPLES—Permits local units to continue dental insurance and prescription drug benefits to certain police and firemen on disability pensions.

Assembly No. 249, Assemblyman NAPLES—Enables municipalities to forgive or refund taxes levied against nonprofit charitable or religious organizations.

Assembly No. 250, Assemblymen NAPLES and WATSON—Appropriates \$400,000 to the Dept. of Health for Mercer County emergency medical services.

Assembly No. 251, Assemblyman NAPLES—Requires supervisors and members of public bodies to pay attorneys' fees in certain cases of employer retaliation against whistle blowers.

Assembly No. 252, Assemblyman NAPLES—Supplemental appropriation of \$113,746,000 to the Dept. of Education to provide full funding of State aid to local districts.

Assembly No. 263, Assemblymen NAPLES and WATSON—Revises layoff provisions regarding permanent State employees and requires appointing authorities to implement pre-layoff actions.

Assembly No. 264, Assemblyman NAPLES—Codifies right of patient to request and receive medical records.

Assembly No. 265, Assemblyman NAPLES—Regulates the use of certain motor vehicles owned or leased by the State; limits size of certain vehicles purchased by State agencies.

Assembly No. 267, Assemblyman NAPLES—Provides annual economic benefit to municipalities wherein sludge incineration facilities are located.

Assembly No. 280, Assemblyman SHINN—Removes portable grain or forage structures from definition of structures in Farmland Assessment Act.

Assembly No. 281, Assemblyman SHINN—Imposes fees on certain containers.

Assembly No. 282, Assemblyman SHINN—Appropriates \$5,500,000 from Resource Recovery and Solid Waste Disposal Facility Fund to Burlington county.

Assembly No. 283, Assemblyman SHINN—Revises and expands solid waste licensing program.

Assembly No. 284, Assemblyman SHINN—Clarifies law pertaining to economic benefits for municipality hosting a transfer station.

Assembly No. 285, Assemblyman SHINN—Extends the penalties for violating the "State Park and Forestry Resources Act."

Assembly No. 286, Assemblyman SHINN—Permits on-site disposal of inert construction debris and vegetative waste.

Assembly No. 287, Assemblyman SHINN—Establishes a technical assistance program for multimedia hazardous waste minimization and makes an appropriation therefor.

Assembly No. 288, Assemblyman SHINN—Imposes topsoil depth requirements for certain soils at development and construction sites.

Assembly No. 289, Assemblymen SHINN and ROMA—Permits the use of escheated property for low or moderate income housing.

Assembly No. 290, Assemblyman SHINN and Assemblywoman OGDEN—Establishes the “County and Municipal Cross-Acceptance Fund;” appropriates \$7.35 million.

Assembly No. 291, Assemblyman SHINN—Increases payment by State to certain municipalities for State parks and forests.

Assembly No. 292, Assemblymen SHINN and CIMINO—Permits counties and certain authorities to enforce compliance with all laws, regulations, permits and orders related to solid waste collection or disposal within their jurisdictions.

Assembly No. 293, Assemblyman SHINN—Appropriates \$10,000,000 from Water Supply Bond Act of 1981 as a State project for reconstruction of F. E. Walter project.

Assembly No. 294, Assemblyman SHINN—Exempts products made from recycled materials from the State sales tax.

Assembly No. 295, Assemblyman SHINN—Authorizes Hazardous Waste Siting Commission to designate certain industrial areas as sites for new major hazardous waste facilities and to take certain other actions.

Assembly No. 296, Assemblyman SHINN and Assemblywoman KALIK—The “State Transfer of Development Rights Bank Act.”

Assembly No. 297, Assemblymen SHINN and COLBURN—Directs NJ State Museum, in cooperation with Department of Military and Veterans’ Affairs, to collect Medals of Honor and related memorabilia for permanent display at State Museum in Trenton.

Assembly No. 298, Assemblymen SHINN and KELLY—Establishes Office of Business Advocacy and program to expedite permit process for low- or moderate-income housing projects.

Assembly No. 299, Assemblyman SHINN and Assemblywoman OGDEN—“Municipal Fair-Housing Incentive and Assistance Act,” appropriates \$2,005,000.

Assembly No. 300, Assemblyman SHINN—Authorizes certain solid waste facilities to include recycling costs in disposal rates.

Assembly No. 301, Assemblymen SHINN and COLBURN—Permits members of PFRS to continue membership in certain administrative and supervisory positions.

Assembly No. 302, Assemblymen SHINN—Changes deadline for filing reports concerning State Development and Redevelopment Plan cross-acceptance from six months to twelve months.

Assembly No. 303, Assemblymen SHINN and COLBURN—Exempts from 5% “cap” increases in municipal expenditures and costs associated with cross-acceptance under the State Development and Redevelopment Plan.

Assembly No. 304, Assemblyman SHINN—The “Refuse-Derived Fuel Act.”

Assembly No. 305, Assemblyman SHINN—Extends expiration date of certain provisions of the “Pinelands Development Credit Bank Act” of 1983, two years.

Assembly No. 306, Assemblyman SHINN—Extends expiration date of “Pinelands Municipal Property Tax Stabilization Act of 1983” two years.

Assembly No. 307, Assemblyman SHINN—Removes sanitary landfill facilities operated by counties or public authorities from Board of Public Utilities rate regulation.

Assembly No. 308, Assemblyman SHINN—Requires basic training for campus security officers employed by institutions of higher education.

Assembly No. 309, Assemblyman SHINN—Removes sanitary landfill facilities operated by the HMDC from BPU regulation.

Assembly No. 310, Assemblymen SHINN and COLBURN—Makes certain changes to law providing annual economic benefit to municipalities in which solid waste facilities are located.

Assembly No. 311, Assemblymen SHINN and COLBURN—Creates offense of distributing, dispensing or possessing controlled dangerous substance or controlled substance analog within area designated as drug free block zone.

Assembly No. 312, Assemblyman SHINN—Provides for the gradual deregulation of solid waste collection industry.

Assembly No. 313, Assemblyman SHINN—Limits disbursement of solid waste services tax revenues to counties wherein operational sanitary landfill facilities are located.

Assembly No. 314, Assemblymen SHINN and COLBURN—Entitles condominium association to collect certain unpaid assessments from proceeds of sale of foreclosed unit.

Assembly No. 315, Assemblymen SHINN and ALBOHN—Revises “New Jersey Statewide Mandatory Source Separation and Recycling Act.”

Assembly No. 316, Assemblyman DEVERIN—Establishes requirements for number of certified school nurses in public schools.

Assembly No. 317, Assemblymen DEVERIN and COHEN—Increases the membership of the Joint Comm. on Ethical Standards to include public members.

Assembly No. 318, Assemblyman DEVERIN—Amends the procedure for appealing decisions of the Commissioner of Education or the Chancellor of Higher Education by providing the right of appeal directly to the Appellate Div. of the Superior Court.

Assembly No. 319, Assemblymen DEVERIN and COHEN—Provides a minimum term of 2 years imprisonment without parole for repeat offenders convicted of assaulting the elderly.

Assembly No. 320, Assemblyman DEVERIN—Requires local school districts to provide nursing services to nonpublic schools.

Assembly No. 321, Assemblyman DEVERIN—Provides tenure for certain employees of the Depts. of Higher Education and Education.

Assembly No. 322, Assemblyman DEVERIN—Provides that school attendance officers are eligible for tenure under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 323, Assemblyman DEVERIN—Revises the tenure hearing procedures for educational employees.

Assembly No. 324, Assemblyman DEVERIN—Establishes a procedure for hearing on the nonrenewal of a nontenured teaching staff member.

Assembly No. 325, Assemblyman DEVERIN—Regulates the practice of occupational therapy.

Assembly No. 326, Assemblyman DEVERIN—Eliminates the waiting period for reinstating pay for a teaching staff member.

Assembly No. 327, Assemblyman DEVERIN—Establishes a procedure for the disclosure of information relating to adoption.

Assembly No. 328, Assemblyman DEVERIN—Requires employees of nursing homes to be examined for tuberculosis by means of a Mantoux skin test.

Assembly No. 329, Assemblyman DEVERIN—Permits certain local employees to attend veterans' conventions on paid leaves of absence.

Assembly No. 330, Assemblyman DEVERIN—Permits veteran members of PERS to purchase credit for certain service as an elected official in a municipality.

Assembly No. 331, Assemblyman DEVERIN—Requires mandatory extended prison term for repeat firearm offenders where prior conviction occurred in another jurisdiction.

Assembly No. 332, Assemblyman DEVERIN—Requires towers to quote rates and supply a certified fee schedule before towing.

Assembly No. 334, Assemblyman DEVERIN—Designated the "Professional Liability Insurance Fund Act."

Assembly No. 335, Assemblyman DEVERIN—Provides for registration of third-party liens searchers and set fees for information given thereto.

Assembly No. 336, Assemblyman DEVERIN—Permits recipients of public pensions or retirement allowances who accept elected public office to reenroll in the pension fund or retirement system.

Assembly No. 337, Assemblyman DEVERIN and Assemblywoman SMITH—Makes changes in the medically needy program.

Assembly No. 338, Assemblymen DEVERIN and MC GREEVEY—Establishes “New Jersey Organ Donor Study Commission” and appropriates \$30,000.

Assembly No. 339, Assemblymen DEVERIN—Provides State-paid health benefits for certain employees of county colleges.

Assembly No. 340, Assemblymen DEVERIN and WATSON—Supplemental appropriation for \$75,000 to Department of Health for a grant to Cancer Care.

Assembly No. 341, Assemblyman DEVERIN—Provides qualified senior citizens, disabled and surviving spouse homeowners with a \$25,000 homestead exemption.

Assembly No. 342, Assemblymen DEVERIN and HUDAK—Excludes certain services performed by the owner of a limousine franchise from unemployment compensation and temporary disability contributions.

Assembly No. 343, Assemblyman DEVERIN—Provides for the issuance of food stamps by supermarkets and other retail grocery stores.

Assembly No. 344, Assemblymen DEVERIN and HUDAK—Permits certain municipalities to impose hotel occupancy tax.

Assembly No. 345, Assemblymen DEVERIN and HUDAK—Designates “New Jersey (The State For You And Me)” as the State song.

Assembly No. 346, Assemblyman DEVERIN—The “Respiratory Care Practitioner Licensing Act.”

Assembly No. 347, Assemblyman PATERO—Designates a State jingle.

Assembly No. 348, Assemblyman PATERO—Provides certain individuals eligible for unemployment compensation benefits with health benefits and term life insurance.

Assembly No. 350, Assemblymen PATERO and CIMINO—Requires prenotification by State agencies of plant closings or mass layoffs resulting from agency actions.

Assembly No. 351, Assemblymen COLBURN and SHINN—Authorizes Class I mayor to appoint member of governing body to planning board.

Assembly No. 352, Assemblyman COLBURN—Authorizes county clerks to solemnize marriages.

Assembly No. 353, Assemblyman COLBURN—Establishes certain certificate of need requirement threshold amounts for hospitals.

Assembly No. 354, Assemblyman COLBURN—Requires hospitals to separately identify nursing costs in their budgets and bills to patients.

Assembly No. 355, Assemblyman COLBURN—Grants share of intestate estate to caregiver.

Assembly No. 356, Assemblyman COLBURN—Allows a blood donor to direct his blood to a specific recipient.

Assembly No. 357, Assemblyman COLBURN—Supplemental appropriation of \$82,700 to Department of Health to implement a Medicare/Long-term care information system.

Assembly No. 358, Assemblyman COLBURN—Establishes a teaching staff member smoking-cessation program in the Department of Education and appropriates funds necessary for the act from the Smoking-Cessation Education Fund.

Assembly No. 360, Assemblyman COLBURN—Entitles senior citizen, disabled veteran and handicapped drivers to self-service gasoline prices at certain full-service filling stations.

Assembly No. 361, Assemblymen COLBURN and DEVERIN—Expands Medicaid coverage to certain pregnant women and children.

Assembly No. 362, Assemblymen COLBURN and SHINN—Directs Council on Armed Forces and Veterans' Affairs to conduct study of impact of certain military reductions; appropriates \$25,000.

Assembly No. 363, Assemblyman COLBURN—Limits use of telephone by driver of moving vehicle.

Assembly No. 364, Assemblymen COLBURN and SHINN—Appropriates \$1.5 million for engineering study related to Route 73 in Mt. Laurel and Evesham Townships in Burlington County.

Assembly No. 365, Assemblyman COLBURN—Establishes 24-hour telephone hotline for alcohol and drug abuse information, referral and crisis counseling.

Assembly No. 366, Assemblyman COLBURN—Prohibits mail order sales of contact lens and prescription eyewear.

Assembly No. 367, Assemblyman COLBURN—Changes membership of New Jersey Health Care Facilities Financing Authority.

Assembly No. 368, Assemblyman ROONEY—Appropriates \$3.3 million to Department of Human Services to increase State supplement for SSI recipients.

Assembly No. 369, Assemblyman ROONEY—Establishes State-wide standards for high school entrance and creates high school entrance exam.

Assembly No. 370, Assemblyman ROONEY—Establishes a State-wide comprehensive program for secondary pupils and a Statewide comprehensive diploma for successfully completing the program.

Assembly No. 371, Assemblyman ROONEY—The "County Science and Technology School Pilot Program Act."

Assembly No. 372, Assemblyman ROONEY—Requires State to bear certain costs resulting from delays in determining dismissal or salary reduction charges for tenured school employees.

Assembly No. 373, Assemblyman ROONEY—Permits boards of education to contract with municipality for special police services.

Assembly No. 374, Assemblyman ROONEY—Amends procedure and fees for registration of broker-dealers, agents or investment advisors with the Bureau of Securities.

Assembly No. 375, Assemblyman ROONEY—Requires State to purchase energy efficient machinery and electrical equipment and requires governmental entities to prepare energy savings plans.

Assembly No. 376, Assemblyman ROONEY and Assemblywoman OGDEN—Requires governmental entities purchasing an electrically powered device to have it labelled with its component efficiency rating.

Assembly No. 377, Assemblyman ROONEY—Requires DMV to require certain eye tests.

Assembly No. 378, Assemblyman ROONEY—Clarifies the period for appeal from certain decisions of municipal governing body on board of adjustment decisions.

Assembly No. 379, Assemblyman ROONEY—Exempts legal fees, cost of expert testimony and related expenses incurred by municipalities in defending tax appeals from “cap” law.

Assembly No. 380, Assemblyman ROONEY—Requires municipalities to either purchase workers’ compensation insurance or to establish a workers’ compensation fund.

Assembly No. 381, Assemblyman ROONEY—Requires application of the penalties of the state in which a motor vehicle violation occurred for the purpose of suspension or revocation of a license issued by N. J.

Assembly No. 386, Assemblyman ROONEY—Allows nonresident law enforcement officers to carry weapons in NJ without permits.

Assembly No. 387, Assemblyman ROONEY—Makes unlawful certain practices governing the sale of cemetery memorials.

Assembly No. 388, Assemblyman ROONEY—Directs the N. J. Turnpike Authority to conduct a study concerning feasibility of prepayment of tolls.

Assembly No. 389, Assemblyman ROONEY—Provides for State aid to the public schools at 50% of total school budget expenditures.

Assembly No. 390, Assemblymen ROONEY and ZECKER—Requires counties and municipalities to deduct total amount appropriated for any purpose for which a cap exception is provided from their final appropriations prior to calculating the permissible cap increase.

Assembly No. 391, Assemblyman ROONEY—Permits members of PFRS to purchase credit for temporary service by agreeing, within one year of the effective date of the act, to make the required contributions.

Assembly No. 392, Assemblyman ROONEY and Assemblywoman KALIK—Provides that the homestead rebate shall be a credit against property taxes due.

Assembly No. 393, Assemblyman ROONEY—Prohibits parking an unregistered motor vehicle on a public highway.

Assembly No. 394, Assemblymen ROONEY—Permits issuance of special limited fishing and hunting licenses to members of approved non-profit organizations.

Assembly No. 395, Assemblyman ROONEY—Provides for annual inspections of auxiliary driving lights and outlines conditions under which they may be used.

Assembly No. 396, Assemblymen ROONEY and ZECKER—Prohibits closing of highway lanes during rush hours.

Assembly No. 397, Assemblyman ROONEY—Limits holdover period of members of boards or commissions appointed by the Governor whose terms have expired.

Assembly No. 398, Assemblyman ROONEY—Requires vehicles of State authorities and commissions to be marked "for official use."

Assembly No. 399, Assemblymen ROONEY and KELLY—Establishes mortgage loan program to enable low and moderate income persons to attain home ownership.

Assembly No. 400, Assemblymen ROONEY and KELLY—Establishes the Home Equity Conversion Demonstration Loan Fund and appropriates \$5,000,000.

Assembly No. 401, Assemblymen ROONEY and KELLY—Authorizes \$50,000,000 bond issue for Mortgage Assistance Fund.

Assembly No. 402, Assemblyman ROONEY—Encourages private efforts to promote sale of goods and services produced in State and in certain local areas.

Assembly No. 403, Assemblyman ROONEY—Appropriates

\$150,000 to Dept. of Commerce and Economic Development for Governor's Commission on International Trade.

Assembly No. 404, Assemblyman ROONEY—Authorizes assistance for small business incubators, appropriates \$2 million.

Assembly No. 405, Assemblymen ROONEY and COLBURN—Creates program in DHS for financial aid to victims of cancer and long-term illnesses, allocates funds for program from increased tax on cigarettes, and cancer research with revenues from new sales tax on tobacco products.

Assembly No. 406, Assemblyman ROONEY—Requires notice of intent to DEP before a county or municipality can undertake a project to clean a stream.

Assembly No. 407, Assemblyman ROONEY—Requires owners who redeem real property taken in a tax sale to post bond to guarantee the correction of outstanding code violations.

Assembly No. 408, Assemblyman ROONEY—Requires municipalities to appropriate funds in the annual budget for accrued sick leave and vacation days.

Assembly No. 409, Assemblyman ROONEY—Provides exclusion from gross income of payments to surviving spouses and dependent children under the federal retired serviceman's family protection plan and survivor benefit plan.

Assembly No. 410, Assemblymen ROONEY and FRELINGHUYSEN—Establishes vision screening for preschool children and appropriates \$500,000.

Assembly No. 411, Assemblyman ROONEY—Provides certain standards to Commissioner of Transportation for heliport licensing.

Assembly No. 412, Assemblymen ROONEY and DORIA—The "Nutritionist Licensing Act of 1988," provides for the regulation of the practice of nutrition and establishes licensure standards for nutritionists.

Assembly No. 413, Assemblymen ROONEY and BAER—Requires municipal utilities authorities to establish and publish salary ranges.

Assembly No. 414, Assemblyman ROONEY—Requires certain government motor vehicles to be marked "For Official Use."

Assembly No. 415, Assemblymen ROONEY and SCHUBER—Establishes monitoring and reporting requirements for local junkets.

Assembly No. 416, Assemblyman ROONEY—Provides for mandatory Statewide on-site improvement standards.

Assembly No. 417, Assemblyman ROONEY—The "Truth in Motor Vehicles Leasing Act."

Assembly No. 418, Assemblymen ROONEY and SCHUBER—Requires municipalities to set certain minimum starting salary of a chief of police.

Assembly No. 419, Assemblyman ROONEY—Creates an “Audio Visual Equipment Fund” to purchase equipment to videotape persons arrested for drunk driving.

Assembly No. 420, Assemblymen ROONEY and MORAN—Creates a new Bureau of Municipal Operations Review and Evaluation in the Department of Community Affairs.

Assembly No. 421, Assemblymen ROONEY and ROMA—Provides for rate averaging of solid wastes disposed by northern counties in this State on a regional basis.

Assembly No. 422, Assemblymen ROONEY and HUDAK—Requires certain authorities to obtain Merit System Board approval for positions in unclassified service.

Assembly No. 423, Assemblymen ROONEY and DUCH—Places certain regional authorities under civil service jurisdiction and qualifies terms of members.

Assembly No. 424, Assemblymen ROONEY and DUCH—Establishes ethical standards for authority members; appropriates \$95,000.

Assembly No. 425, Assemblyman ROONEY—Directs Commissioner of Personnel to reinstate list of eligibles for position of assistant district conservation officer in DEP.

Assembly No. 426, Assemblymen ROONEY and SCHUBER—Eliminates tolls at Interchange 165 of the Garden State Parkway.

Assembly No. 427, Assemblymen ROONEY and ROMA—Requires braking safety device on certain motor vehicles.

Assembly No. 428, Assemblymen ROONEY and SCHUBER—Prohibits contracts or agreements by casino licensees concerning transportation to casinos in certain vehicles unless those vehicles meet certain criteria.

Assembly No. 429, Assemblymen ROONEY and FRANKS—Establishes a County College Single Parent and Low Income Individual Educational Program within the Department of Higher Education.

Assembly No. 430, Assemblymen ROONEY and KELLY—Requires that certain housing units be credited to a municipality’s fair share of affordable housing.

Assembly No. 431, Assemblymen ROONEY and DUCH—Requires public contracting unit to solicit at least three quotations before awarding certain contracts for professional services.

Assembly No. 432, Assemblyman ROONEY—Appropriates \$48,000 to the Bergen County Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.

Assembly No. 433, Assemblyman ROONEY—Prohibits water supply public utilities from being corporately related to companies in real estate business.

Assembly No. 434, Assemblyman ROONEY—Directs Board of Public Utilities to establish regulatory standards for alternate operator telephone service providers.

Assembly No. 435, Assemblymen ROONEY and MARTIN—Creates the Local Government Ethics Law; appropriates \$90,000.

Assembly No. 436, Assemblyman ROONEY—Permits development of alternatives to resource recovery incineration technologies by counties.

Assembly No. 437, Assemblymen SALMON and SCERNI—Amends Statewide anti-littering law to expressly include beaches and increases penalties for littering in beach areas.

Assembly No. 438, Assemblymen SALMON, Rooney and Assemblywoman Kalik—Increases income eligibility limits for "PAAD" program.

Assembly No. 439, Assemblyman SALMON—Extends eligibility for "Lifeline Credit Program" to persons receiving certain disability benefits other than Social Security.

Assembly No. 440, Assemblymen SALMON and SCERNI—Exempts from cap law county and municipal appropriations to volunteer fire companies and first aid squads.

Assembly No. 441, Assemblymen SALMON and SCERNI—Requires the Division of Taxation to initiate a pilot statistical analysis of sales tax collection data in certain counties and appropriates \$50,000.

Assembly No. 442, Assemblymen SALMON and SCERNI—Provides State aid to certain seaside resort municipalities for special policemen, approps. \$1,000,000.

Assembly No. 443, Assemblyman SALMON—Requires the Dept. of Labor to determine adjusted population estimates for certain counties.

Assembly No. 444, Assemblyman SALMON—Provides that the annual mean population of a resort municipality shall be used in computing State aid under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 445, Assemblyman SALMON—Increases amount municipalities may appropriate to boards of fire commissioners of fire districts or volunteer fire companies.

Assembly No. 446, Assemblymen SALMON and SCERNI—Designated the "Local Tourism Initiatives Pilot Program Act," creates the Local Tourism Initiatives Revolving Loan Fund, appropriates \$200,000.

Assembly No. 447, Assemblymen SALMON and BRYANT—Appropriates \$5 million for additional police patrol activity in urban enterprise zones.

Assembly No. 448, Assemblymen SALMON—Requires a major

revision of the 10-year master plan for tourism growth. Appropriates \$50,000.

Assembly No. 449, Assemblymen SALMON and SCERNI—Increases membership of Highway Authority from seven to nine and stipulates that counties having at least eight miles of Parkway are to have at least one representative on Authority.

Assembly No. 450, Assemblyman SALMON—Establishes a nursing loan and loan redemption credit program in the Department of Higher Education.

Assembly No. 451, Assemblymen SALMON and Roma—Provides tort liability immunity for officials and members of volunteer fire companies.

Assembly No. 452, Assemblyman SALMON—Prohibits redirection of solid waste to out-of-district disposal facilities without an adopted interdistrict agreement therefor.

Assembly No. 453, Assemblymen SALMON and SCERNI—Establishes an annual matching grant program in the Division of Travel and Tourism.

Assembly No. 454, Assemblyman SALMON—Requires municipal and county approval of sewage sludge or dredge spoils discharge, and prohibits transport of sludge from one county to another for disposal.

Assembly No. 455, Assemblyman SALMON—Requires State employees to sign certain correspondence to include their telephone number in the correspondence.

Assembly No. 456, Assemblymen SALMON and SCERNI—Establishes a Senior Health Insurance Program and appropriates \$300,000.

Assembly No. 457, Assemblymen SALMON—Provides that fall term in public schools and public universities and colleges begin after Labor Day.

Assembly No. 458, Assemblyman SALMON—Limits liability of persons and municipalities engaging in lawful recycling activities.

Assembly No. 459, Assemblymen SALMON and VILLAPIANO—Appropriates \$90,000 to Division of Travel and Tourism for regional tourism councils.

Assembly No. 460, Assemblymen SALMON and VILLAPIANO—Appropriates \$1,500,000 to Division of Travel and Tourism for advertising campaign promoting the State's beaches.

Assembly No. 461, Assemblymen SALMON and SCERNI—Establishes Municipal Demolition Assistance Fund; appropriates \$500,000.

Assembly No. 462, Assemblyman SALMON—Directs DOT to

construct a new alignment for State Route 55 to Interchange 13 of the Garden State Parkway; appropriates \$100,000 from the Transportation Trust Fund.

Assembly No. 463, Assemblyman SALMON—Supplemental appropriation of \$400,000 to DCA for fire, rescue squad advertising.

Assembly No. 464, Assemblymen SALMON and VILLAPIANO—Establishes the Miss New Jersey Educational Scholarship program.

Assembly No. 465, Assemblyman SALMON—Creates Shellfish Industry Task Force; appropriates \$10,000.

Assembly No. 466, Assemblymen SALMON and DOYLE—Provides for the conveyance of specific property without a will.

Assembly No. 467, Assemblymen SALMON and VILLAPIANO—Supplemental appropriation of \$4,080,725 to DCA for the Volunteer Emergency Service Organizations Loan Fund.

Assembly No. 473, Assemblyman SALMON—Confers career service status on certain municipal utilities authority employees in counties of the sixth class.

Assembly No. 474, Assemblymen FRELINGHUYSEN, MARTIN and Rooney—The “State Expenditures Limitation Act.”

Assembly No. 476, Assemblyman FRELINGHUYSEN—Provides for the development and administration of a legislative summer internship program, appropriates \$50,000.

Assembly No. 477, Assemblyman FRELINGHUYSEN—Places the Junior Breeder Award Fund with the Farm Products Publicity Fund of the Department of Agriculture.

Assembly No. 478, Assemblyman FRELINGHUYSEN—Supplemental appropriation to the Department of Veterans’ Affairs and Defense for \$206,000 to establish field offices in counties.

Assembly No. 479, Assemblyman FRELINGHUYSEN—Appropriates \$153,400 in FY 1988 for the New Jersey History Film series.

Assembly No. 480, Assemblyman FRELINGHUYSEN and Assemblywoman OGDEN—Appropriates \$250,000 to DEP to continue Open Lands Management Program.

Assembly No. 481, Assemblyman FRELINGHUYSEN—Allows Director of Division of Investment to invest funds of joint self-insurance pools established by school districts, counties and municipalities.

Assembly No. 482, Assemblymen FRELINGHUYSEN and FELICE—Establishes the "New Jersey Commission for Children and Youth."

Assembly No. 483, Assemblyman FRELINGHUYSEN—Phases in medicaid coverage for children ages three to five up to poverty level.

Assembly No. 484, Assemblyman FRELINGHUYSEN—Appropriates \$131,000 to the N. J. Historical Commission for completion of pamphlet series publications and research project.

Assembly No. 485, Assemblymen FRELINGHUYSEN and MORAN—The "Garden State College Savings Act of 1988," providing for the sale of Garden State College Savings Bonds and other student financial assistance.

Assembly No. 486, Assemblymen FRELINGHUYSEN and STUHLTRAGER—Expands Police Training Commission to include representative of Police Academy Directors Association.

Assembly No. 487, Assemblymen FRELINGHUYSEN and HAYTAIAN—Creates the position of deputy clerk of the Superior Court; divides county clerk's office into two separate offices.

Assembly No. 488, Assemblymen FRELINGHUYSEN and ALBOHN—Supplemental appropriation of \$50,000 to DOL for mine shaft cave-in study in Mine Hill township.

Assembly No. 639, Assemblyman MAZUR—Changes the membership of the New Jersey Commissioners of the Port Authority of NY and NJ.

Assembly No. 644, Assemblyman MAZUR—Provides special programs in mathematics and science to permit teachers to upgrade their skills or receive certification.

Assembly No. 645, Assemblyman MAZUR—Provides a training program leading to certification in areas designated as having a teacher shortage for teachers facing a reduction in force.

Assembly No. 646, Assemblyman MAZUR—Requires public and independent institutions of higher education to develop programs to remedy teacher shortages as determined by the Commissioner of Education.

Assembly No. 647, Assemblyman MAZUR—Provides a fair dismissal procedure for nonprofessional county college employees.

Assembly No. 648, Assemblyman MAZUR—Requires electric, telephone, gas and Class A or B water utilities to give notice to the Board of Public Utilities before they undertake certain construction projects unrelated to the provision of their utility service.

Assembly No. 649, Assemblymen MAZUR and KRONICK—Prohibits sales of wild birds not raised in captivity.

Assembly No. 651, Assemblyman MAZUR—Provides immunity from civil suits to employers who hire replacement workers during a strike and who terminate those workers when the strike is over.

Assembly No. 652, Assemblyman MAZUR—Authorizes municipalities to enact ordinances requiring developers to provide adequate off-street parking or contribute toward the provision of parking, as a condition of subdivision or site plan approval.

Assembly No. 653, Assemblyman MAZUR—Provides that cemetery vandalism is a fourth degree crime in certain cases, permits juveniles to be tried as adults when charged with cemetery vandalism.

Assembly No. 654, Assemblyman MAZUR—Establishes mandatory training and certification program for municipal welfare directors.

Assembly No. 655, Assemblyman MAZUR—Requires a public utility to first notify real property owners of certain service cutoffs.

Assembly No. 656, Assemblyman MAZUR—Prevents BPU from considering electric generating plants which are not used and useful in determining rates.

Assembly No. 657, Assemblyman MAZUR—Requires full and reasonable disclosure to the Board of Public Utilities by holding companies that own or control public utilities.

Assembly No. 658, Assemblyman MAZUR—Provides that person who adopts and promulgates a rule in direct conflict with the statutory law shall be a petty disorderly person.

Assembly No. 659, Assemblyman MAZUR—Increases fines for motor truck operators and owners.

Assembly No. 660, Assemblymen MAZUR—Includes certain disabled veterans in the "Senior Citizens and Disabled Protected Tenancy Act."

Assembly No. 661, Assemblyman MAZUR—Supplemental appropriation to Borough of Cliffside Park, appropriates \$50,000.

Assembly No. 662, Assemblyman MAZUR—Establishes comfort standards for State employee workplaces.

Assembly No. 663, Assemblyman MAZUR—Provides for the abolishment of the toll road authorities and transferral thereof to State Department of Transportation.

Assembly No. 664, Assemblymen MAZUR and BRYANT—Authorizes \$3,000,000,000 sale of State bonds to retire outstanding bonded indebtedness of the toll road authorities.

Assembly No. 665, Assemblyman MAZUR—Increases the tax on gross revenues of casinos from 8% to 12%.

Assembly No. 666, Assemblyman MAZUR—Requires DOT to submit master plan to State Planning Commission and to justify deviations from its master plan for project construction.

Assembly No. 667, Assemblyman MAZUR—Requires Port Authority of New York and New Jersey to submit annually to legislatures of New Jersey and New York its proposed operating budget for review and approval.

Assembly No. 668, Assemblyman MAZUR—Permits municipalities to spread tax impact of a revaluation over a three year period through revaluation credits.

Assembly No. 669, Assemblyman MAZUR—Supplemental appropriation of \$20,000,000 for revaluation relief credits.

Assembly No. 670, Assemblymen MAZUR and SHUSTED—Establishes photo identification card system for local police officers and centralized local police registry and appropriates \$150,000.

Assembly No. 671, Assemblyman MAZUR—Provides \$1,000 salary supplements to certain educational employees who complete approved professional development programs.

Assembly No. 672, Assemblymen MAZUR and FELICE—Excludes from income under the gross income tax United States military compensation of \$5,000 or less paid to resident taxpayers in units of the National Guard.

Assembly No. 673, Assemblymen MAZUR and FELICE—Requires feasibility study concerning veterans outreach program at State veterans nursing home in Paramus.

Assembly No. 674, Assemblyman MAZUR—Permits municipality to object to certain zoning changes in other municipality within 500 yards of common boundary.

Assembly No. 675, Assemblymen MAZUR and COLLINS—Permits any candidate who believes that he has been libeled or slandered by an opposing candidate during a general election campaign to file a complaint against that candidate in Superior Court.

Assembly No. 676, Assemblyman MAZUR and Assemblywoman OGDEN—Requires Commissioner of Transportation to adopt regulations requiring ban of Stage 1 aircraft as part of airport licensing.

Assembly No. 677, Assemblymen MAZUR and FELICE—Authorizes DEP to designate sites for resource recovery facilities under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 678, Assemblyman MAZUR—Provides for the funding of private passenger automobile insurance through the State.

Assembly No. 679, Assemblyman MAZUR and Assemblywoman RANDALL—Strengthens current law regarding the identification of persons causing or paying for printed political matter.

Assembly No. 680, Assemblymen MAZUR and FOY—Extends prevailing wage requirements to certain hospital construction.

Assembly No. 681, Assemblyman MAZUR—Increases the retirement allowance for ordinary disability retirement in PFRS.

Assembly No. 682, Assemblyman MAZUR—Requires school bus drivers to receive training in the use of two-way radios.

Assembly No. 683, Assemblyman MAZUR—Establishes Office of Public Service Communications Policy and Planning and a commission in the Division of State Police; appropriates \$200,000.

Assembly No. 684, Assemblymen MAZUR and DUCH—Directs Chancellor of Higher Education to develop a "Pledge's Bill of Rights."

Assembly No. 686, Assemblyman MAZUR—Eliminates additional fee to Purple Heart recipients for special license plates.

Assembly No. 687, Assemblymen MAZUR and FELICE—Sets 30-day limit for approval or rejection of corrected Planned Real Estate Development applications.

Assembly No. 688, Assemblymen MAZUR and FELICE—Permits members of PFRS, PERS, and TPAF to purchase credit for service with certain interstate agencies.

Assembly No. 689, Assemblyman MAZUR and Assemblywoman RANDALL—Increases senior and disabled citizens' property tax deduction by \$50 and increases annual income limitation to \$15,000.

Assembly No. 690, Assemblymen MAZUR and PELLY—Requires executive directors of State toll road authorities to serve at the pleasure of the members of each respective authority.

Assembly No. 691, Assemblyman MAZUR, Assemblywoman OGDEN and Assemblyman Felice—Requires DOT to license certain airports and adopt regulations requiring ban of Stage 1 aircraft as part of airport licensing.

Assembly No. 692, Assemblyman MAZUR and Assemblywoman RANDALL—Permits individual exercise of constitutional right of speech and assembly in certain privately owned and publicly owned property.

Assembly No. 693, Assemblyman MAZUR and Assemblywoman RANDALL—Makes a person an accomplice if he illegally sells or transfers a firearm which is used in the commission of an offense.

Assembly No. 694, Assemblymen MAZUR and FELICE—Supplemental appropriation of \$61,000 to the Department of Education, Division of State Library to upgrade and purchase service contracts for reading machines for the blind.

Assembly No. 695, Assemblyman MAZUR and Assemblywoman RANDALL—Establishes evaluation and treatment centers for sexually abused children and their families and appropriates \$1,000,000.

Assembly No. 696, Assemblymen MAZUR and BAER—Revises the membership of the New Jersey Real Estate Commission.

Assembly No. 697, Assemblymen MAZUR, VILLAPIANO and Pelly—Permits DMV to impose counterpart fees on out-of-state limousine services.

Assembly No. 698, Assemblymen MAZUR and SCHUBER—Permits membership in public pension or retirement systems by persons receiving pensions for public employment in another state; permits purchase of credit for certain prior service.

Assembly No. 699, Assemblywoman SMITH—Allocates certain environmental fines and penalties to the "Hazardous Discharge Site Cleanup Fund."

Assembly No. 700, Assemblywoman SMITH and Assemblyman STUHLTRAGER—Establishes "Council on Disability" and appropriates \$500,000.

Assembly No. 701, Assemblywomen SMITH and FARRAGHER—Supplemental appropriation to the Department of Health for \$16,915,000 to implement the recommendations of the N. J. State Commission on Cancer Research.

Assembly No. 702, Assemblywomen SMITH and FARRAGHER—Appropriates \$500,000 to Department of Labor for Independent Living Centers.

Assembly No. 703, Assemblywomen SMITH and FARRAGHER—Provides a gross income tax credit for certain recreation and leisure service providers for the cost of equipment used to provide accessibility to the physically handicapped.

Assembly No. 704, Assemblywomen SMITH and FARRAGHER—Provides a corporation business tax credit for certain recreation and leisure service providers for the cost of equipment used to provide accessibility to the physically handicapped.

Assembly No. 705, Assemblywoman SMITH—Permits the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey to be named as a party in suits brought under the "Law Against Discrimination."

Assembly No. 706, Assemblywoman SMITH—Extends "Law Against Discrimination" to give Division of Civil Rights jurisdiction over interstate authorities and commissions.

Assembly No. 707, Assemblywoman SMITH and Assemblyman

PENN—Requires consolidation of property tax bills paid from escrow accounts.

Assembly No. 708, Assemblywoman SMITH and Assemblyman KYRILLOS—Exempts from sales and use tax receipts from sales by youth athletic leagues or elementary or secondary school booster clubs.

Assembly No. 709, Assemblywoman SMITH—Creates the New Jersey Office of Indian Affairs and appropriates \$75,000.

Assembly No. 710, Assemblywoman SMITH and Assemblyman KYRILLOS—Allows municipalities to levy \$25 fees in municipal courts when persons are convicted of certain offenses and crimes to help pay certain police overtime costs.

Assembly No. 711, Assemblywoman SMITH and Assemblyman KYRILLOS—Supplemental appropriation of \$3.5 million to Department of Transportation for State aid to Old Bridge township to reconstruct Route 516.

Assembly No. 712, Assemblywoman SMITH—Imposes maximum penalties for certain types of water pollution violations.

Assembly No. 713, Assemblywoman SMITH—Establishes 14-member “Casino Revenue Fund Advisory Commission” and appropriates \$50,000.

Assembly No. 714, Assemblywoman SMITH—Appropriates \$95,000 to Department of Health for a study on the need for more comprehensive competency assessments on senior citizens.

Assembly No. 715, Assemblywoman SMITH—Establishes the “New Jersey Homestead Exemption Act.”

Assembly No. 716, Assemblywoman SMITH—The “Act to Deter Ocean Pollution;” creates a commission and appropriates \$100,000 therefor.

Assembly No. 717, Assemblywoman SMITH—Creates the “New Jersey Nurse Practice and Quality Patient Care Advisory Committee,” appropriates \$50,000.

Assembly No. 718, Assemblywoman SMITH and Assemblyman KYRILLOS—Requires DEP to proceed directly against certain NJPDES dischargers that exceed their effluent limitations.

Assembly No. 719, Assemblywomen SMITH and FARRAGHER—Revises the definition of small business, female business and minority business for the purposes of set-aside contracts.

Assembly No. 720, Assemblywoman SMITH and Assemblyman KYRILLOS—Appropriates \$22,000,000 from “Resource Recovery and Solid Waste Disposal Facility Bond Act of 1988” to Monmouth county.

Assembly No. 721, Assemblywoman SMITH—Includes railroads under the “New Jersey Prompt Payment Act.”

Assembly No. 722, Assemblywoman SMITH and Assemblyman KYRILLOS—Upgrades assault while knowingly fleeing or attempting to elude a law enforcement officer; includes fleeing as a factor in criminal homicide.

Assembly No. 723, Assemblywoman SMITH—Provides \$30 allowance to persons with Alzheimer's disease for I. D. bracelets and appropriates \$335,000.

Assembly No. 724, Assemblywoman SMITH—Prohibits imposition of municipal recycling fees; requires State to reimburse local governments for excess costs incurred as a result of compliance with mandatory Statewide recycling legislation.

Assembly No. 725, Assemblywoman SMITH—Requires DEP to propose and municipalities to adopt woodlands management ordinances.

Assembly No. 726, Assemblywoman SMITH—Establishes job training program for disabled individuals; appropriates \$1.3 million.

Assembly No. 727, Assemblywoman SMITH—Establishes no-interest loan program for shore businesses experiencing economic losses due to beach closing; appropriates \$15,000,000.

Assembly No. 728, Assemblywoman SMITH—Supplemental appropriation for \$250,000 to DYFS for grants to latchkey programs.

Assembly No. 729, Assemblywoman SMITH—Provides for interstate recovery of certain unemployment benefits.

Assembly No. 730, Assemblywoman SMITH and Assemblyman KYRILLOS—Provides for current year funding under State school aid formula for capital projects in urban aid municipalities.

Assembly No. 731, Assemblywoman SMITH—Modifies the penalties on claimants and employers under the "Temporary Disability Benefits Law."

Assembly No. 732, Assemblywomen SMITH and FARRAGHER—Requires the isolation of patients with AIDS in State psychiatric hospitals.

Assembly No. 733, Assemblywomen SMITH and COOPER—Establishes an "Eldertech Program."

Assembly No. 734, Assemblywoman SMITH—Changes income eligibility determination for PAAD.

Assembly No. 735, Assemblywomen SMITH and FARRAGHER—Appropriates \$75,000 to Tourette Syndrome Association of New Jersey.

Assembly No. 736, Assemblymen ROBERTS and BRYANT—Establishes "Water and Sewer Lifeline Assistance Program" and appropriates \$13,450,000.

Assembly No. 737, Assemblymen ROBERTS and BRYANT—Requires DEP to establish a radon gas educational program for residential

buildings in tier two municipalities, and appropriates monies therefor.

Assembly No. 738, Assemblymen ROBERTS and BRYANT—Authorizes local law enforcement officers and State Police to enforce compliance with district solid waste management plans.

Assembly No. 739, Assemblymen ROBERTS and BRYANT—Appropriates \$150,000 to Glassboro State College for an Educational Opportunity Center at its Camden Campus.

Assembly No. 740, Assemblymen ROBERTS and COLLINS—Designated the “Mobile Intensive Care Services Support Act” and appropriates \$8,000,000.

Assembly No. 741, Assemblymen ROBERTS and BRYANT—Appropriates \$150,000 in State matching funds for Newton Creek flood control study.

Assembly No. 742, Assemblyman ROBERTS—Appropriates \$13,600,000 from Resource Recovery and Solid Waste Disposal Facility Fund for Camden county resource recovery facility.

Assembly No. 743, Assemblymen ROBERTS and IMPREVEDUTO—Permits optometrists to prescribe and utilize medication.

Assembly No. 744, Assemblyman ROBERTS—Establishes Office of Voting Information and Participation; appropriates \$75,000.

Assembly No. 745, Assemblymen ROBERTS—Provides that mail-in voter registration forms shall be detachable part of all applications for driver’s licenses; eliminates requirement that applicants signature be witnessed.

Assembly No. 746, Assemblyman ROBERTS—Provides that mail-in voter registration forms shall be included with annual State gross income tax forms; eliminates requirement that applicant’s signature be witnessed.

Assembly No. 747, Assemblyman ROBERTS and Assemblywoman Kalik—Directs the Secretary of State to furnish voter registration forms to certain government agencies for distribution to members of the public; eliminates requirement that applicant’s signature be witnessed.

Assembly No. 748, Assemblymen ROBERTS and BRYANT—Appropriates \$98,000 to Department of Community Affairs for Camden Roosevelt Manor security services.

Assembly No. 749, Assemblymen ROBERTS and SALMON—Increases the public members on the NJ State Council on the Arts from 17 to 21 and provides for representation from each county in the State.

Assembly No. 750, Assemblymen SCERNI—Grants exempt organization status under the sales tax law to Veterans and National Guard Associations.

Assembly No. 751, Assemblyman SCERNI—Permits gaming-related casino employees to gamble in any casino in the State except for casino where employed or other casino owned or operated by employer.

Assembly No. 752, Assemblyman SCERNI—Requires the Casino Control Commission and the Division of Gaming Enforcement to provide certain annual reports on their activities and costs to the Legislature and the Governor.

Assembly No. 753, Assemblyman SCERNI—Provides a deduction under the gross income tax up to \$250.00 for certain expenses of paid or volunteer firefighters.

Assembly No. 754, Assemblyman SCERNI—Increases membership of the New Jersey State Council on the Arts, includes representatives from the southern part of the State and ensures financial support to artists and art organizations in the southern counties.

Assembly No. 755, Assemblyman SCERNI—Authorizes 24-hour casino gambling for a limited period.

Assembly No. 756, Assemblymen DUCH and GILL—Regulates certain check casher activities, mandates community service for certain violations and requires certain actions by the Commissioner of Banking.

Assembly No. 757, Assemblymen DUCH and GILL—Requires drug and alcohol testing before reinstatement of certain suspended school students.

Assembly No. 758, Assemblymen DUCH and GILL—Makes the use of computerized automatic dialing devices a disorderly persons offense.

Assembly No. 759, Assemblymen DUCH and ROONEY—Requires financial disclosure statements by members of local and regional authorities.

Assembly No. 760, Assemblymen DUCH and GILL—Provides for possible commitment of persons acquitted by reason of mental disease or defect.

Assembly No. 761, Assemblymen DUCH and GILL—Designates the “Home Health and Community Care Demonstration Program Act” and appropriates \$3,000,000.

Assembly No. 762, Assemblymen DUCH and GILL—Establishes a Crime Prevention and the Elderly Pilot Program, appropriates \$250,000.

Assembly No. 763, Assemblymen DUCH and GILL—Creates statutory compliance unit in OLS.

Assembly No. 764, Assemblymen DUCH and GILL—Creates offense of employing juvenile for auto theft; imposes mandatory 18 months imprisonment.

Assembly No. 765, Assemblymen DUCH and GILL—Permits counties and municipal or county utilities authorities to enforce compliance with interdistrict and intradistrict waste flow orders.

Assembly No. 766, Assemblymen DUCH, DOYLE and Assemblywoman Kalik—Establishes a certification program for water treatment devices, and appropriates \$75,000.

Assembly No. 767, Assemblymen DUCH and GILL—Requires testing for lead concentrations in drinking water supplies of certain public and nonpublic schools and child care centers, and makes an appropriation.

Assembly No. 768, Assemblymen DUCH and GILL—Provides for the cleaning of debris that collects near dams.

Assembly No. 769, Assemblymen DUCH and GILL—Prohibits DEP from approving permits for new disposal facilities prior to completing a Statewide solid waste generation assessment and a study of the projected cumulative impact of resource recovery facilities upon ambient air quality.

Assembly No. 770, Assemblymen DUCH and GILL—Authorizes the DEP to issue NJPDES permits in certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 771, Assemblymen DUCH and GILL—“Central Passaic River Basin Floodway Acquisition Bond Act;” authorizes bonds for \$100 million; and appropriates \$5,000.

Assembly No. 772, Assemblymen DUCH and GILL—Revises the “New Jersey Conflicts of Interest Law.”

Assembly No. 773, Assemblyman ROMA—Permits a tax deduction under the New Jersey gross income tax for taxpayers who operate or maintain for their employees a licensed child care center or who have paid the cost of outside child care.

Assembly No. 774, Assemblymen ROMA and SCHUBER—Requires Department of Environmental Protection to monitor aircraft noise and delineate impact areas; appropriates \$95,000.

Assembly No. 775, Assemblymen ROMA and SCHUBER—Raises veteran’s property tax deduction to \$100.

Assembly No. 776, Assemblymen ROMA and FRANKS—Amends “Waterfront Commission Act” to extend term of stevedore license.

Assembly No. 777, Assemblyman ROMA—Appropriates \$125,000 to the Department of Law and Public Safety for a pilot program to evaluate the use of closed circuit television in certain juvenile detention hearings.

Assembly No. 778, Assemblyman ROMA—Establishes position of victim advocate in each county prosecutor’s office; appropriates \$1,050,000.

Assembly No. 780, Assemblyman ROMA—Supplemental appro-

priation of \$154,777 to Bogota to replace Chapter 212 funds that were eliminated in the FY 1988 budget.

Assembly No. 781, Assemblyman ROMA—Adopts certain federal income tax treatment of subchapter S corporations under the corporation business tax, and of their shareholders under the gross income tax.

Assembly No. 782, Assemblymen ROMA and Felice—Grants exempt organization status under the "Sales and Use Tax Act" to fraternal and humanitarian service club organizations.

Assembly No. 783, Assemblymen ROMA and SCHUBER—Permits roadway solicitations by bona fide veterans and volunteer emergency response organizations.

Assembly No. 784, Assemblyman ROMA—Regulates motor vehicle repair dealers.

Assembly No. 785, Assemblyman ROMA and Assemblywoman SMITH—Requires health insurers to provide coverage for mammograms, pap smears and infertility tests.

Assembly No. 786, Assemblymen ROMA—Supplemental appropriation of \$100,000 to the New Jersey Veterans' Memorial Home-Paramus.

Assembly No. 787, Assemblymen ROMA and MAZUR—Provides permanent status to certain local registrars of vital statistics.

Assembly No. 788, Assemblymen ROMA, KYRILLOS and Felice—Establishes State certified driver education program.

Assembly No. 789, Assemblyman ROMA—Establishes N. J. Veterans' Bonus Lottery to raise funds for \$1,000 bonus for certain veterans or their surviving spouses and creates a N. J. Veterans' Bonus Lottery Commission; appropriates \$50,000.

Assembly No. 790, Assemblymen ROMA and Felice—Provides immunity from liability for certain law enforcement officers and firefighters.

Assembly No. 791, Assemblymen ROMA—Permits municipality to provide \$500 property tax deduction for volunteer fireman, first aid or rescue squad member.

Assembly No. 792, Assemblyman ROMA and Assemblywoman COOPER—Establishes the Institute on Holocaust Studies; appropriates \$250,000.

Assembly No. 793, Assemblyman ROMA—Establishes additional enforcement measures to monitor sentences imposed on drunk boaters; establishes two day jail term for sentence violations.

Assembly No. 794, Assemblymen ROMA and SCHUBER—Permits police officer to wear Honor Legion medal without prior authorization.

Assembly No. 795, Assemblymen ROMA and ARNONE—Provides paid leave of absence for public employee as representative of certain veterans' organizations to attend their conventions.

Assembly No. 796, Assemblyman ROMA—Provides mandatory minimum terms for adults purchasing controlled dangerous substances from juveniles, 13 years of age or younger.

Assembly No. 797, Assemblyman ROMA—Increases the monetary penalties imposed for criminal offenses for the purpose of establishing a fund for rape and domestic violence victim programs.

Assembly No. 798, Assemblywoman BUSH—Mandates the establishment of a \$50 car seat reimbursement program in DYFS for foster parents of certain children; appropriates \$25,000.

Assembly No. 799, Assemblywoman BUSH—Provides deduction from gross income under the "Gross Income Tax Act" for persons who provide home care for an elderly medically impaired family member.

Assembly No. 800, Assemblywoman BUSH—Requires that cases of Acquired Immunodeficiency Syndrome (AIDS) shall be reported to the Department of Health and provides for the confidentiality of AIDS patients' records.

Assembly No. 801, Assemblywoman BUSH—Supplemental appropriation of \$125,000 to the Department of Health for a grant to Choices, Inc.

Assembly No. 802, Assemblywoman BUSH—Requires Medicaid coverage for mammograms.

Assembly No. 803, Assemblywoman BUSH and Assemblyman MC GREEVEY—Requires health insurers to pay for mammograms.

Assembly No. 804, Assemblywoman BUSH—Requires certain health service contracts to offer coverage for maternity care expenses incurred in pregnancy and childbirth.

Assembly No. 805, Assemblywoman BUSH—Designated the "Family Leave Act;" appropriates \$60,000.

Assembly No. 806, Assemblywoman BUSH—Designated the "Temporary Medical Leave Act."

Assembly No. 807, Assemblywoman BUSH—Enables elderly and physically disabled persons to request reassignment to a barrier-free polling place in certain cases.

Assembly No. 808, Assemblywoman BUSH—Revises statutes granting paid leave to police and firefighters employed by State or local government to attend certain conventions and adds National Organization of Black Law Enforcement Executives to this classification.

Assembly No. 809, Assemblywoman BUSH—Establishes an

Alzheimer's disease demonstration residential treatment program in the Department of Health, appropriates \$250,000.

Assembly No. 810, Assemblywoman BUSH—Provides senior citizens and handicapped citizens with around the clock reduced bus and rail fares.

Assembly No. 811, Assemblywoman BUSH—Establishes the "Foster Family Care for the Elderly Demonstration Program" in the Division on Aging and appropriates \$250,000.

Assembly No. 986, Assemblyman MC GREEVEY—Establishes the New Jersey Commission on Holocaust Education; appropriates \$250,000.

Assembly No. 987, Assemblyman MC GREEVEY—Changes requirements a public employee veteran must meet to qualify for a special veterans’ retirement allowance under the Public Employees’ Retirement System.

Assembly No. 988, Assemblyman MC GREEVEY—The “Pollution Prevention Act.”

Assembly No. 989, Assemblyman MC GREEVEY—Provides that a person who provides false information in response to questioning by a law enforcement officer is guilty of hindering his own apprehension.

Assembly No. 990, Assemblyman WATSON—Establishes a Municipal Owned Housing Rehabilitation Fund in Department of Community Affairs, approps. \$35,000,000.

Assembly No. 991, Assemblyman WATSON—Provides a host municipality benefit to municipalities in which solid waste transfer stations are located.

Assembly No. 992, Assemblyman WATSON—The “Insurance Consumers’ Advisory Board Act,” appropriates \$60,000.

Assembly No. 993, Assemblyman WATSON—Supplemental appropriation of \$60,000 to the Department of Higher Education for a grant to Essex County College for the Institute for Citizen Involvement in Education.

Assembly No. 994, Assemblymen WATSON and BROWN—Provides for minimum MPTAF distribution of \$60,000,000; appropriates \$30,000,000.

Assembly No. 995, Assemblymen WATSON and SCHWARTZ—Appropriates \$525,000 to DCA for Neighborhood Housing Services grants.

Assembly No. 996, Assemblyman WATSON—Requires executive departments of State government and certain authorities and commissions to promulgate and annually update a 10-year master plan concerning use of real property.

Assembly No. 997, Assemblyman WATSON—Permits certain previous noncontinuous service to be used in calculating vacation leave.

Assembly No. 998, Assemblyman WATSON—Authorizes chiefs of certain indian tribes to solemnize marriages.

Assembly No. 999, Assemblyman WATSON—Permits use of tribal records for correcting birth certificates of certain American Indians.

Assembly No. 1000, Assemblyman WATSON—Exempts members of certain American Indian tribes from requirement to obtain hunting, trapping, or fishing licenses.

Assembly No. 1001, Assemblyman WATSON—Appropriates \$60,000 for the Trenton Family Life Program.

Assembly No. 1002, Assemblyman WATSON—Requires an independent financial audit and operational audit of the Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission.

Assembly No. 1003, Assemblyman WATSON—Supplemental appropriation for \$40,000 to DHS, Division of Youth and Family Services for a grant to Triad House.

Assembly No. 1004, Assemblyman WATSON—Supplemental appropriation of \$200,000 to DYFS for grant to Trenton Area Soup Kitchen.

Assembly No. 1005, Assemblyman WATSON—Appropriates \$93,000 to DEP for Delaware and Raritan Canal park improvements.

Assembly No. 1006, Assemblyman WATSON and Assemblywoman BUSH—Provides for equitable compensation for State employees; appropriates \$20,135,000.

Assembly No. 1007, Assemblymen WATSON and CIMINO—Permits a tax collector to reinstate a denied senior citizen tax deduction.

Assembly No. 1008, Assemblyman WATSON—Increases membership of Advisory Council of State Museum.

Assembly No. 1009, Assemblyman WATSON—Enlarges time frame during which a Board of Education of a Special Services School District must annually organize.

Assembly No. 1010, Assemblyman SCHWARTZ—Creates a Public Authorities Control Commission.

Assembly No. 1011, Assemblyman SCHWARTZ—Supp. approp. of \$8,009,000 to the Depts. of Community Affairs and Education for nutritional programs.

Assembly No. 1012, Assemblymen SCHWARTZ and SMITH—Establishes a special State Police task force to assist certain municipalities in community narcotics enforcement; appropriates \$8,000,000.

Assembly No. 1013, Assemblyman KRONICK—Prohibits construction upon the Lower Palisades.

Assembly No. 1014, Assemblymen KRONICK and IMPREVEDUTO—Prohibits open season for black bear.

Assembly No. 1015, Assemblyman KRONICK—Requires inspection of hotels and multiple dwellings prior to sale.

Assembly No. 1016, Assemblyman KRONICK—Dedicates \$30,000 of New Jersey Arts Council funding for FY 1987-88 to the Jersey City Cultural Arts Commission.

Assembly No. 1017, Assemblyman KRONICK—Prevents eviction of pre-conversion tenants when residential premises are converted to condominium, cooperative or fee-simple ownership.

Assembly No. 1018, Assemblymen KRONICK and MAZUR—Prohibits the use of the Draize test method of animal experimentation under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 1019, Assemblymen KRONICK and IMPREVEDUTO—Permits certain members of county pension funds or retirement systems to transfer to PFRS.

Assembly No. 1020, Assemblymen KRONICK and MAZUR—Includes certain disabled veterans in the "Senior Citizens and Disabled Protected Tenancy Act."

Assembly No. 1021, Assemblyman KRONICK—Establishes competitive pilot grant program to combat graffiti; appropriates \$30,000.

Assembly No. 1022, Assemblymen KRONICK and KENNY—Requires DEP to develop methodology to assess impact of development on air quality and apply methodology to Hudson County; appropriates \$100,000.

Assembly No. 1023, Assemblyman KRONICK—Appropriates \$3.6 million in State Aid to Kearny Town for radon contaminated soil storage.

Assembly No. 1024, Assemblyman KRONICK—Provides for nonbinding referendum on whether Legislature should enact legislation providing for a Statewide deposit and refund system for beverage containers.

Assembly No. 1025, Assemblyman KRONICK and Assemblywoman OGDEN—Creates bi-state task force to make recommendations on land use and open space preservation in NJ-NY border region.

Assembly No. 1026, Assemblymen KRONICK and IMPREVEDUTO—Establishes post-employment restrictions for persons employed by or serving the Hackensack Meadowlands Development Commission.

Assembly No. 1027, Assemblymen KRONICK, KELLY,—Requires that mail-in voter registration forms be available on each motorbus and rail passenger vehicle owned and operated by or operated under contract with New Jersey Transit; appropriates \$25,000.

Assembly No. 1028, Assemblyman KRONICK—Special legislation to allow the town of Kearny to receive certain State aid.

Assembly No. 1029, Assemblyman KRONICK—Revises unemployment benefit waiting periods for workers in training programs.

Assembly No. 1030, Assemblymen KRONICK and VILLAPIANO—Requires that residential buildings converted to condominiums be certified asbestos-free.

Assembly No. 1031, Assemblymen KRONICK and IMPREVEDUTO—Appropriates \$50,000 to Hudson County Council on Alcoholism and Drug Abuse.

Assembly No. 1032, Assemblymen KRONICK and IMPREVEDUTO—Requires DEP to complete feasibility study and commence cleanup of chromium contaminated sites in Hudson County.

Assembly No. 1033, Assemblymen KRONICK and SCHLUTER—Establishes reward for finding and turning in lost or abandoned fishing nets.

Assembly No. 1037, Assemblyman BROWN—Subjects certain junkyards to ECRA requirements.

Assembly No. 1038, Assemblyman BROWN—Transfers the Office of Consumer Protection to the Department of the Public Advocate.

Assembly No. 1039, Assemblyman BROWN—Prescribes a five year term for the Public Advocate.

Assembly No. 1040, Assemblyman BROWN—Prohibits the establishment of additional gambling in certain municipalities.

Assembly No. 1041, Assemblyman BROWN—Transfers the Division of Civil Rights to the Department of the Public Advocate.

Assembly No. 1042, Assemblyman BROWN—Prohibits a corporation from being eligible for a casino license unless it divests itself of investments in or from South Africa.

Assembly No. 1057, Assemblyman BROWN—Provides for a public question on changing the judicial selection process to election.

Assembly No. 1059, Assemblyman BROWN—Requires the preparation of personnel notes or legislative personnel reviews on proposed legislation affecting personnel policies of the State.

Assembly No. 1060, Assemblyman BROWN—Imposes a tax on certain retail sales and use of gold within the State.

Assembly No. 1061, Assemblyman BROWN—Abolishes death penalty for crime of murder.

Assembly No. 1062, Assemblyman BROWN—Designated the “New Jersey Antiapartheid Law of 1985”.

Assembly No. 1063, Assemblyman BROWN—Requires a person convicted of aggravated sexual assault to be sentenced to life imprisonment without parole.

Assembly No. 1064, Assemblyman BROWN—Establishes an Environmental Intern Scholarship Program within DEP.

Assembly No. 1065, Assemblyman BROWN—Creates a commission to revise the “New Jersey Corporation Takeover Bid Disclosure Law.”

Assembly No. 1066, Assemblyman BROWN—Provides guidelines and procedures for the searching of public school student’s person or property.

Assembly No. 1067, Assemblyman BROWN—Creates a Casino Reinvestment Development Advisory Board, appropriates \$50,000.

Assembly No. 1068, Assemblyman BROWN—Establishes the Rutgers Institute of Public Administration on the Newark campus of Rutgers, appropriates \$99,000.

Assembly No. 1069, Assemblyman BROWN—Requires divestiture of certain investments of institutions of higher ed.

Assembly No. 1070, Assemblyman BROWN—Deems traffic signals in operation for 20 years as having been properly approved by a public body.

Assembly No. 1080, Assemblyman BROWN—Requires use of seat belts by children five years of age or more but under 18 years of age who travel in the rear seat of a motor vehicle.

Assembly No. 1081, Assemblyman BROWN—Places the burden of proof on the inmate to prove eligibility for parole.

Assembly No. 1082, Assemblymen BROWN and ZANGARI—Establishes the "Municipal Services Supplemental State Aid" program to assist certain municipalities in augmenting and upgrading municipal services, appropriates \$20,000,000.

Assembly No. 1083, Assemblyman BROWN—Directs Commissioner of Education to study and report to the Governor and the Legislature on foreign language instruction in grades K-8.

Assembly No. 1085, Assemblyman BROWN—Supplemental appropriation of \$50,000 in State aid for FY 1988 to Dept. of Community Affairs for the Newark Boys Chorus School.

Assembly No. 1086, Assemblyman BROWN—Appropriates \$200,000 of State Aid for grant to Greater Newark Conservancy.

Assembly No. 1087, Assemblyman BROWN—Supplemental appropriation of \$125,000 to Commission for the Blind and Visually Impaired for grant to Electronic Information and Education Service.

Assembly No. 1088, Assemblyman BROWN—Supplemental appropriation for \$1,181,000 in General Funds and \$365,000 in federal funds to the Departments of Health and Human Services for community health centers.

Assembly No. 1089, Assemblyman BROWN—Authorizes issuance of special plates to Pearl Harbor veterans.

Assembly No. 1091, Assemblymen BROWN and PELLY—Sub-

jects motor vehicle driver and all passengers to fine for seat belt violations as a primary action, with certain exceptions.

Assembly No. 1092, Assemblymen BROWN and ZANGARI—Supplemental appropriation of \$2,000,000 to UMDNJ for Sammy Davis Jr. Liver Institute.

Assembly No. 1093, Assemblymen BROWN—Establishes certain guidelines and directives for the State Investment Council in the management of State pension funds.

Assembly No. 1094, Assemblymen BROWN and SMITH—Supplemental appropriation of \$300,000 to Grant Avenue Community Center.

Assembly No. 1095, Assemblyman BROWN—Appropriates \$250,000 to St. James A. M. E. Church in Newark.

Assembly No. 1096, Assemblymen BROWN and DORIA—Supplemental appropriation of \$237,767,000 to the Department of Education to provide full funding of State aid to local districts.

Assembly No. 1097, Assemblymen BROWN and FRANKS—Revises law requiring county clerk to submit voter registration lists to State political party chairmen.

Assembly No. 1098, Assemblyman BROWN—Establishes “indefinite temporary tenure” status under “Rooming and Boarding House Act of 1979”.

Assembly No. 1099, Assemblymen SCHUBER, ROMA—The “New Jersey Public Safety Officers’ Death Benefits Act,” provides a \$50,000 survivors benefit where public safety officers are killed in the line of duty; appropriates \$250,000.

Assembly No. 1100, Assemblyman SCHUBER—Promotes and assures fiscal integrity of independent local authorities.

Assembly No. 1101, Assemblyman SCHUBER and Assemblywoman KALIK—Exempts transfers of motor vehicles between family members from the sales and use tax in certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 1102, Assemblymen SCHUBER and ROMA—Provides for the sale and disposition of unclaimed carpets.

Assembly No. 1103, Assemblyman SCHUBER—Amends certain requirements a veteran must meet to qualify for special PERS retirement allowance.

Assembly No. 1104, Assemblyman SCHUBER—Changes references in certain special education programs from “handicapped” child to “challenged” child.

Assembly No. 1105, Assemblyman SCHUBER—Provides that no train be permitted to block any public road or street which intersects railroad tracks for a period of time in excess of five consecutive minutes.

Assembly No. 1106, Assemblyman SCHUBER—Amends the “New Jersey Wiretapping and Electronic Surveillance Control Act” to include conversations by cordless or cellular telephones.

Assembly No. 1107, Assemblyman SCHUBER—Creates the Office on Compulsive Gambling within the Department of Health; appropriates \$750,000.

Assembly No. 1108, Assemblyman SCHUBER—Expands definition of “war orphans.”

Assembly No. 1109, Assemblyman SCHUBER—Establishes a Baccalaureate Education Trust Fund Authority to allow parents to prepay college tuition at participating colleges and universities in New Jersey.

Assembly No. 1110, Assemblyman SCHUBER—Authorizes municipalities to establish handicapped parking enforcement units.

Assembly No. 1111, Assemblyman SCHUBER—Sets 35 as maximum hiring age for county police officers.

Assembly No. 1112, Assemblymen SCHUBER and ROMA—Gives county executive veto power over actions of certain autonomous county authorities.

Assembly No. 1113, Assemblymen SCHUBER—Supplemental appropriation of \$75,000 to purchase van for the New Jersey Memorial Home for Disabled Soldiers at Paramus.

Assembly No. 1114, Assemblyman SCHUBER—Limits sick and vacation leave benefits for toll road authority employees to those given to State employees.

Assembly No. 1115, Assemblyman SCHUBER—Permits members of TPAF and PERS who reach normal retirement age but remain in active service to elect to provide a retirement allowance to a designated person upon death in active service.

Assembly No. 1116, Assemblyman SCHUBER—Allows for municipal and county law enforcement of hazardous materials transportation laws; establishes a training program; appropriates \$250,000.

Assembly No. 1117, Assemblyman SCHUBER—Provides for veto power over action of authorities.

Assembly No. 1118, Assemblyman SCHUBER—Requires notification and enforcement when hazardous materials are transported.

Assembly No. 1119, Assemblymen SCHUBER and ROMA—Appropriates \$3,500,000 to the DEP for purchase of Borg’s Woods, City of Hackensack.

Assembly No. 1120, Assemblymen SCHUBER—Requires DCA to promulgate rules requiring identifying emblems on certain structures.

Assembly No. 1121, Assemblymen SCHUBER—Establishes three subsidiary administrations under the supervision and control of the New Jersey Transportation, Toll Road and Trust Fund Authority.

Assembly No. 1122, Assemblymen SCHUBER—Requires toll road authorities to comply with certain State policies.

Assembly No. 1123, Assemblyman SCHUBER—Requires that Department of Education reports about achievement in schools provide comparisons with similar schools.

Assembly No. 1124, Assemblymen SCHUBER—Requires DCA to promulgate rules requiring sprinkler systems in certain buildings with truss construction.

Assembly No. 1125, Assemblymen SCHUBER, ROMA,—Extends the moratorium on the conveyance of lands held for the protection of public water supplies.

Assembly No. 1126, Assemblymen SCHUBER,—Directs DMV to establish motorcycle safety education program.

Assembly No. 1127, Assemblymen SCHUBER and WATSON—Requires that all possible resources for alternate housing be exhausted before a petition is filed with the court for juvenile out of home placement.

Assembly No. 1128, Assemblymen SCHUBER and WATSON—Changes the detention criteria for juveniles.

Assembly No. 1129, Assemblyman SCHUBER and Assemblywoman CRECCO—Establishes “New Jersey Long-Term Care Study Commission” and appropriates \$50,000.

Assembly No. 1130, Assemblyman SCHUBER and Assemblywoman CRECCO—Reduces the insurance premium tax rate to one-half of 1% for all long-term care insurance policies.

Assembly No. 1131, Assemblywoman KALIK—Grants tenure to supt. of schools and administrative principals only for the duration of three to five year contracts.

Assembly No. 1132, Assemblywoman KALIK—Permits limited deduction from gross income for contributions to a trust established to finance the purchase of residential real property.

Assembly No. 1133, Assemblywoman KALIK—Grants pro rata real property tax deductions to senior citizens beginning in the quarter of the year in which the senior citizen has attained age 65.

Assembly No. 1134, Assemblywoman KALIK—“Small Municipality Safe and Clean Streets Loan Act,” provides State aid to certain municipalities with less than 15,000 population, appropriates \$1,000,000.

Assembly No. 1135, Assemblywoman KALIK—Provides that individuals precluded from working as a result of a lockout are entitled to collect unemployment compensation benefits.

Assembly No. 1136, Assemblywoman KALIK—Permits motorist to postpone on-the-spot motor vehicle inspection for up to 72 hour period.

Assembly No. 1137, Assemblywoman KALIK—Includes in the PERS definition of “veterans” those persons honorably discharged who have a service connected disability.

Assembly No. 1138, Assemblywoman KALIK—Eliminates fee charged for admission to, or use of, any State funded or nonprofit educational, historical, cultural or recreational facility or program one day per month.

Assembly No. 1139, Assemblywoman KALIK—Authorizes voluntary contribution from Gross Income Tax refunds and transfer of funds to the U. S. Olympic Committee.

Assembly No. 1140, Assemblywoman KALIK—Requires 51% of State Cash Management Fund deposits to be invested in New Jersey.

Assembly No. 1141, Assemblywoman KALIK—Supp. approp. of \$1,666,666 to the AOC for pilot project to study enforcement of child support orders.

Assembly No. 1142, Assemblywoman KALIK—Establishes a Dental Care Assistance program for the Aged and Disabled.

Assembly No. 1143, Assemblywoman KALIK—Requires the State to make up the loss of property tax to municipalities due to veterans tax exemption.

Assembly No. 1144, Assemblywoman KALIK—Establishes an Equine Disease Diagnostic and Research Center in the Dept. of Higher Ed, approps. \$14,000,000.

Assembly No. 1145, Assemblywoman KALIK—Exempts certain used automobile sales from sales tax.

Assembly No. 1146, Assemblywoman KALIK—Creates the Missing Persons Clearinghouse in the Missing Persons Unit of the Division of State Police, approps. \$1,000,000.

Assembly No. 1147, Assemblywoman KALIK—Requires insurers to give notice if a premium is automatically charged against the cash value of a life insurance policy.

Assembly No. 1148, Assemblywoman KALIK—Provides that the State may assess any fee imposed for offsetting federal or State income tax refunds to satisfy past due child support liability against the taxpayer in arrearages rather than the applicant for offset.

Assembly No. 1149, Assemblywoman KALIK—Requires the use of certain improved fire resistant materials on public school buses.

Assembly No. 1150, Assemblywoman KALIK—Creates an “Election Law Study Commission,” and approps. \$75,000.

Assembly No. 1151, Assemblywoman KALIK—Establishes South Jersey Business Technology Center at Glassboro State College, appropriates \$5,000,000.

Assembly No. 1152, Assemblywoman KALIK—Requires each board of education to establish a program on child abuse for teaching staff members.

Assembly No. 1153, Assemblywoman KALIK—Permits depository institutions to impose fees on certain inactive accounts after notice so as to eliminate the accounts.

Assembly No. 1154, Assemblywoman KALIK—Provides a one year “cap” exception for the amount of any decrease in MPTAF State aid a municipality experiences in the 1986 local budget year.

Assembly No. 1155, Assemblywoman KALIK—Requires Superior Court Clerk to index judgments with more particularity.

Assembly No. 1156, Assemblywoman KALIK and Assemblyman BRYANT—Establishes County College Urban Entrepreneurship Education Grant Program in Department of Higher Education, appropriates \$320,000.

Assembly No. 1157, Assemblywoman KALIK—Provides for the use of current year expenditures in the determination of equalization aid for school districts.

Assembly No. 1158, Assemblywoman KALIK—Provides for the regulation of the mortgage loan application and commitment process of mortgage lenders.

Assembly No. 1159, Assemblywoman KALIK—Transfers Real Estate Comm. to Division of Consumer Affairs.

Assembly No. 1160, Assemblywoman KALIK—Changes calculation of TPAF post-retirement death benefit.

Assembly No. 1161, Assemblywoman KALIK—Appropriates \$250,000 for seawall repair in Delanco.

Assembly No. 1162, Assemblywoman KALIK—Requires strict enforcement of certain environmental laws on federal facilities.

Assembly No. 1163, Assemblywoman KALIK—Establishes Office of the Ombudsman for Small Businesses, appropriates \$500,000.

Assembly No. 1164, Assemblywoman KALIK—Permits certain retired PERS members to receive compensation for holding elective public office.

Assembly No. 1165, Assemblywoman KALIK—Permits the beneficiary of certain State employees to receive compensation for unused sick leave of employee.

Assembly No. 1166, Assemblywoman KALIK and Assemblyman DORIA—Directs county colleges to establish and operate child care centers, available free of charge to certain students.

Assembly No. 1167, Assemblywoman KALIK—Establishes an enforcement procedure to ensure that certain surcharges are effectively levied on out-of-State drivers.

Assembly No. 1168, Assemblywoman KALIK and Assemblyman BRYANT—Reduces passenger motor vehicle registration fee for senior citizens and disabled persons.

Assembly No. 1169, Assemblywoman KALIK—Limits the expenditure of Casino Revenue Funds for capital improvements under the “Senior Citizen and Disabled Resident Transportation Assistance Act” to projects located in New Jersey.

Assembly No. 1170, Assemblywoman KALIK—Creates a loan program to help lower income tenants purchase their dwelling units when a multiple dwelling converts to condominium or cooperative ownership, and appropriates \$10,000,000.

Assembly No. 1171, Assemblywoman KALIK—Directs State Board of Higher Education to establish New Jersey University of Graduate Studies.

Assembly No. 1172, Assemblywoman KALIK—Permits disabled person to obtain resident’s fishing license at a reduced fee.

Assembly No. 1173, Assemblywoman KALIK—Absolves local government from civil liability for community service performed as part of a court ordered sentence.

Assembly No. 1174, Assemblywoman KALIK—Permits amateur radio operators who lease vehicles to obtain special registration plates.

Assembly No. 1175, Assemblywomen KALIK and FARRAGHER—Supplemental appropriation for \$50,000 to DOH to extend the infant mortality reduction program to Willingboro.

Assembly No. 1176, Assemblywoman KALIK—Establishes an Office of Hazardous Waste Minimization to promote multimedia hazardous waste minimization programs; appropriates \$800,000.

Assembly No. 1177, Assemblywoman KALIK—Appropriates \$1,000,000 to DEP for grants to the Alice Paul Foundation to purchase and renovate the Alice Paul home.

Assembly No. 1178, Assemblywoman KALIK—Amends ECRA to allow for hazardous discharge cleanups in absence of property transfer.

Assembly No. 1179, Assemblywoman KALIK and Assemblyman ROBERTS—Requires depository institutions to offer certain basic financial services, disclose certain information and, for registered non-customers, to cash certain checks.

Assembly No. 1180, Assemblywoman KALIK and Assemblyman ROBERTS—Requires depository institutions to cash certain checks.

Assembly No. 1181, Assemblywoman KALIK, Assemblyman SHUSTED—Amends and repeals portions of the laws governing child custody and supervision.

Assembly No. 1182, Assemblywoman KALIK—Clarifies various aspects of the law concerning strip searches; authorizes Attorney General to monitor compliance.

Assembly No. 1183, Assemblywoman KALIK—Changes name of Department of Commerce, Energy and Economic Development to Department of Commerce and Tourism.

Assembly No. 1184, Assemblywoman COOPER—Prevents parties to a religious wedding which is the subject of a divorce or annulment from maintaining impediments to remarriage by requiring an affidavit to that effect to be filed.

Assembly No. 1185, Assemblywoman COOPER—Requires certain safety features on public school buses.

Assembly No. 1186, Assemblywoman COOPER—Establishes an annual award for woman police officer of the year.

Assembly No. 1187, Assemblywoman COOPER and Assemblyman SMITH—Increases membership of the board of the NJT by two and provides for their qualifications.

Assembly No. 1188, Assemblywoman COOPER—Transfers regulatory jurisdiction of privately owned bridges from BPU to DOT in matters of toll rates and safety.

Assembly No. 1189, Assemblywoman COOPER—Directs the New Jersey Council on the Arts to conduct a competition for the selection of a State song.

Assembly No. 1190, Assemblywoman COOPER—Provides for the registration of financial planners as investment advisors under the “Uniform Securities Law.”

Assembly No. 1191, Assemblywoman COOPER—“Death with Dignity Act”

Assembly No. 1192, Assemblywoman COOPER—Permits municipalities to grant tax exemptions and abatements for newly constructed multiple dwellings in areas in need of rehabilitation.

Assembly No. 1193, Assemblywoman COOPER—Provides safety requirements for certain passengers on bicycles.

Assembly No. 1194, Assemblywoman COOPER—Requires county medical examiners to supply certain survivors with a copy of the autopsy report within 90 days of a request.

Assembly No. 1195, Assemblywoman COOPER—Permits gaming-related casino employees to gamble in any casino in the State except for casino where employed or other casino owned or operated by employer.

Assembly No. 1196, Assemblywoman COOPER—Upgrades the second offenses of prostitution.

Assembly No. 1197, Assemblywoman COOPER and Assembly-

man MORAN—Prohibits certain releases of balloons into the atmosphere and establishes civil penalties.

Assembly No. 1198, Assemblywoman COOPER and Assemblyman LO BIONDO—Increases number of members appointed to Highway Authority from seven to 13 and stipulates that each county through which the Parkway runs shall be represented on the Authority.

Assembly No. 1199, Assemblywoman COOPER—Establishes single parent grants for students at certain colleges, appropriates \$1 million.

Assembly No. 1200, Assemblywoman COOPER—Exempts contracts for distribution of food stamp coupons from "Local Public Contracts Law."

Assembly No. 1201, Assemblywoman COOPER—Creates trust fund of proceeds from certain drug-related forfeitures to be used for funding drug abuse treatment centers.

Assembly No. 1202, Assemblywoman COOPER—Provides State tuition payments for certain members of New Jersey National Guard and for certain children and surviving spouses of deceased members.

Assembly No. 1204, Assemblywoman COOPER—Authorizes 20-hour casino gambling daily from July 1, 1988 to January 3, 1989.

Assembly No. 1205, Assemblywoman COOPER—Permits municipalities to grant certain tax exemptions and abatements for certain residential property.

Assembly No. 1206, Assemblywoman COOPER, Assemblymen HARDWICK, Felice and Assemblywoman Kalik—Increases the income eligibility limits for the PAAD program by the same percentage as the Social Security benefit cost-of-living increase for that year.

Assembly No. 1207, Assemblywoman COOPER and Assemblyman MAZUR—Establishes the Homeless Veterans Transitional Center and appropriates \$200,000.

Assembly No. 1209, Assemblywoman COOPER and Assemblyman DORIA—Provides that a defeated regional school district budget may be approved by a simple majority of the governing bodies.

Assembly No. 1210, Assemblywoman COOPER and Assemblyman MAZUR—Provides property tax exemption for certain veterans with service-connected disabilities.

Assembly No. 1211, Assemblywoman COOPER—Allocates certain moneys from unclaimed parimutuel tickets from thoroughbred races to special trust account for support of thoroughbred breeding industry and to other purposes.

Assembly No. 1212, Assemblywomen COOPER and FARRAGHER—Prohibits possessing a loaded gun within 450 feet of picnic areas for the purposes of hunting.

Assembly No. 1214, Assemblywoman COOPER—Provides authority to DOT to inspect bridges.

Assembly No. 1215, Assemblywoman COOPER—Transfers regulatory jurisdiction of certain privately owned bridges from BPU to DOT in matters of toll rates.

Assembly No. 1216, Assemblywoman COOPER—Establishes operating rules for personal watercraft.

Assembly No. 1217, Assemblywoman COOPER—Expands special vendor license for veterans to include handyman services.

Assembly No. 1218, Assemblywoman COOPER and Assemblyman KYRILLOS—Directs DEP to post signs on dangers of plastic debris at State parks, forests and boat launching areas.

Assembly No. 1219, Assemblywoman COOPER—Increases maximum claim allowed in small claims section of Superior Court.

Assembly No. 1220, Assemblywoman COOPER—Permits use of .22 short cartridge by trappers on Sundays.

Assembly No. 1221, Assemblyman MARSELLA—Establishes a "New Jersey Silver-Haired Legislature;" appropriates \$42,000.

Assembly No. 1222, Assemblyman MARSELLA—Permits retired police officers to be fire police.

Assembly No. 1223, Assemblyman MARSELLA—Limits the medical expenses that may be counted toward meeting

Assembly No. 1224, Assemblyman MARSELLA—Eliminates requirement that a person must reregister to vote if name is changed.

Assembly No. 1225, Assemblyman MARSELLA—Requires 10% of the gaming tables in use at any time in a casino to have a \$3.00 stated minimum bet and 10% shall have a \$5.00 stated minimum.

Assembly No. 1226, Assemblyman MARSELLA—Exempts authorities whose budgets are approved by the public from DCA budgetary approval.

Assembly No. 1227, Assemblyman MARSELLA—Increases the limitation on transportation of pupils by school districts from 20 to 30 miles.

Assembly No. 1228, Assemblymen MARSELLA and SALMON—Requires that the rating systems for certain automobile insur-

ance coverage provide for reduction in premiums following completion of an accident prevention course.

Assembly No. 1229, Assemblyman MARSELLA—Prohibits the siting of a new sanitary landfill within the Pinelands.

Assembly No. 1230, Assemblyman MARSELLA—Prohibits disconnection of residential water service to needy persons during winter months.

Assembly No. 1231, Assemblyman MARSELLA—Provides for the civil liability of any person or entity selling, or offering for sale, obscene material to an unemancipated child under 16 years of age.

Assembly No. 1232, Assemblyman MARSELLA—Allows the hunting on Sunday of certain water fowl.

Assembly No. 1234, Assemblyman MARSELLA—Amends the Municipal Purposes Tax Assistance Act of 1980 qualification criteria.

Assembly No. 1235, Assemblyman MARSELLA—Amends current law to regulate pour point of heating oil in certain cases and to authorize the Superintendent of Weights and Measures to set standards for other properties of heating oil.

Assembly No. 1236, Assemblyman MARSELLA—Requires that lessors of certain motor vehicles provide the name and address of each lessee to the Division of Motor Vehicles.

Assembly No. 1237, Assemblymen MARSELLA and SALMON—Exempts land used for farming purposes from transfer inheritance tax for decedents' transfers to immediate family members under certain conditions.

Assembly No. 1238, Assemblyman MARSELLA—Requires two-way communications equipment on school buses.

Assembly No. 1239, Assemblyman MARSELLA—Permits certain municipalities in certain counties of the second class to adopt the provisions of the Police and Firemen's Retirement System.

Assembly No. 1240, Assemblymen MARSELLA and WATSON—Provides tax credit for seniors aged 62 or older with income under \$75,000, and an alternate credit equal to the homestead rebate amount for others.

Assembly No. 1241, Assemblyman MARSELLA, Assemblywomen MULLEN and Kalik—Increases the income eligibility limits for the "Pharmaceutical Assistance to the Aged and Disabled" program.

Assembly No. 1242, Assemblyman MARSELLA—Requires study of radium contamination in drinking water supplies.

Assembly No. 1243, Assemblyman MARSELLA—Provides for initial premium payment of 50% and semi-annual registration for certain persons whose auto insurance was cancelled for nonpayment of premium.

Assembly No. 1244, Assemblyman MARSELLA—Establishes South Jersey and Atlantic Transportation Authority as State instrumentality for operation and improvement of airport facilities, appropriates \$500,000.

Assembly No. 1245, Assemblyman MARSELLA—Appropriates \$90,000 to the DEP for gypsy moth control.

Assembly No. 1246, Assemblymen MARSELLA and ROCCO—Appropriates \$100,000 to mosquito control and equipment replacement.

Assembly No. 1247, Assemblyman MARSELLA—Amends shoplifting statute to include certain carts, carriers, and containers.

Assembly No. 1248, Assemblyman MARSELLA—Appropriates \$500,000 in State Aid to the DEP for Washington township water treatment.

Assembly No. 1249, Assemblymen MARSELLA and SHINN—Exempts sale or lease of sites for BPU regulated resource recovery facilities or sanitary landfill facilities from “Local Public Contracts Law” and “Local Lands and Buildings Law.”

Assembly No. 1250, Assemblyman MARSELLA—Authorizes municipal waterworks to establish special water rates for certain industrial users under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 1251, Assemblyman MARSELLA—Establishes safety standards for gasoline stations, prohibits self-service; appropriates \$95,000.

Assembly No. 1252, Assemblyman MARSELLA—Prohibits siting of new solid waste incinerator within 1000 feet of business or residence located within Pinelands area.

Assembly No. 1253, Assemblyman MARSELLA—Prohibits siting of certain types of incinerators within the Pinelands area.

Assembly No. 1254, Assemblymen MARSELLA and ROBERTS—Appropriates \$3,000,000 to Department of Agriculture for grants to South and North Jersey Resource Conservation and Development Councils for expanded program purposes.

Assembly No. 1255, Assemblyman MARSELLA—Supplemental appropriation of \$500,000 to DOH for Hepatitis B vaccination for police, fire, and emergency rescue personnel.

Assembly No. 1256, Assemblyman MARSELLA and Assemblywoman KALIK—Designated the “Sanitary Protection Act.”

Assembly No. 1257, Assemblyman MARSELLA—Limits number of urban enterprise zones designated to receive 50% sales and use tax exemption.

Assembly No. 1258, Assemblyman MARSELLA—Requires two-way radio communication on day training buses; appropriates \$350,000.

Assembly No. 1259, Assemblyman MARSELLA—Permits appointment by local governing body of alternates to board of recreation commissioners.

Assembly No. 1260, Assemblyman MARSELLA—Establishes "Telephone Access Plan" to provide special telephones for handicapped persons; appropriates \$100,000.

Assembly No. 1261, Assemblyman MARSELLA—Requires institutions of higher education to compile and report information regarding campus crime and security.

Assembly No. 1262, Assemblyman MARSELLA—Requires Department of Corrections to take custody within 48 hours of juveniles sentenced to State facilities.

Assembly No. 1263, Assemblyman MARSELLA—Designated the "Parent Partnership Program Act;" appropriates \$ 500,000.

Assembly No. 1264, Assemblyman PASCRELL—Abolishes Dept. of Higher Education and transfers its functions to the Dept. of Education.

Assembly No. 1265, Assemblymen PASCRELL and GIRGENTI—Prohibits county solid waste management plan from directing a disproportionate amount of county's solid waste to a municipality without municipal approval.

Assembly No. 1266, Assemblymen PASCRELL and Kyrillos—Establishes pilot program for character education and appropriates \$75,000.

Assembly No. 1267, Assemblyman PASCRELL—Allows teachers injured on school property to receive accidental disability benefits despite the fact that accident occurred before or after school hours.

Assembly No. 1268, Assemblyman PASCRELL—Increases the penalty for failure by a parent to ensure that a child attends school.

Assembly No. 1269, Assemblyman PASCRELL—Provides procedures when an administrative order is issued requiring a school district to implement a corrective action plan.

Assembly No. 1270, Assemblyman PASCRELL—Clarifies term of appointment of member of county governing body to other public entity.

Assembly No. 1271, Assemblyman PASCRELL—Requires in-service training for school bus drivers, appropriates \$1,500,000.

Assembly No. 1272, Assemblyman PASCRELL—Creates commission to study the role of the toll road authorities in the State's transportation system, appropriates \$75,000.

Assembly No. 1273, Assemblymen PASCRELL and KYRILLOS—Establishes incentive grants for schools in which students improve their basic skills achievement; appropriates \$3,100,000.

Assembly No. 1274, Assemblymen PASCARELL, DOYLE and Assemblywoman Cooper—Provides State aid for school districts which offer prekindergarten programs for three and four year old children.

Assembly No. 1275, Assemblymen PASCARELL and GIRGENTI—Distributes funds to municipalities and counties for additional drug enforcement police officers; appropriates \$35 million.

Assembly No. 1276, Assemblyman PASCARELL—Requires certain school districts to develop pupil attendance plans and establishes a grant program; appropriates \$100,000.

Assembly No. 1277, Assemblyman PASCARELL—Caps school tax increases resulting from actions of the Education Commissioner in certain school districts.

Assembly No. 1278, Assemblymen PASCARELL and GIRGENTI—Designates unlawful use of solid waste disposal receptacles as disorderly persons offenses.

Assembly No. 1280, Assemblymen PASCARELL and GILL—Provides for awarding of medals to Police Officer and Firefighter of the Year.

Assembly No. 1281, Assemblyman PASCARELL—Directs Dept. of Education to prepare high school instructional materials on the socioeconomic impacts of an aging population; appropriates \$15,000.

Assembly No. 1282, Assemblymen PASCARELL and GIRGENTI—Permits municipalities to spread tax impact of revaluation over three-year period; provides for State loans to assist phase-in.

Assembly No. 1283, Assemblymen PASCARELL and GIRGENTI—Supplemental appropriation of \$9 million for revaluation relief.

Assembly No. 1284, Assemblymen PASCARELL and GILL—Requires every district recycling plan to provide for the recycling of 50% of the total municipal solid waste stream by 1992.

Assembly No. 1285, Assemblymen PASCARELL, ROONEY—Prohibits appointment of certain elected officials as members or employees of certain authorities.

Assembly No. 1286, Assemblymen PASCARELL and GIRGENTI—Restricts post-employment activities of officers and employees of the Executive Branch of State Government.

Assembly No. 1287, Assemblyman PASCARELL—Makes certain statutory changes concerning the possession, purchase and illegal use of assault firearms and large capacity magazines.

Assembly No. 1288, Assemblymen PASCARELL and GIRGENTI—Requires DOH to prepare report on bottled water testing.

Assembly No. 1289, Assemblyman PASCARELL—Permits placement of vending machines by nonprofit entities in municipal buildings without bidding.

Assembly No. 1290, Assemblyman PASCRELL and Assemblywoman BUSH—Increases aggregate State aid to school districts to 50% of the total current expense budgets of all districts.

Assembly No. 1291, Assemblyman PASCRELL—Provides for categorical program support by State for educational programs for autistic pupils.

Assembly No. 1292, Assemblywoman CRECCO—Requires all current and prospective employees of child care centers to be licensed by the Department of Human Services.

Assembly No. 1293, Assemblywoman CRECCO and Assemblyman KELLY—Authorizes use of Spill Fund for research on methods of recycling and detoxifying hazardous substances.

Assembly No. 1294, Assemblywoman CRECCO—Provides for the appointment of a limited guardian for certain adults.

Assembly No. 1295, Assemblywoman CRECCO—Allows a deduction from New Jersey gross income tax of the cost incurred by a taxpayer in supporting a family member at least 65 years old, up to a maximum of \$1,000.

Assembly No. 1296, Assemblywoman CRECCO and Assemblyman KYRILLOS—Establishes New Jersey Adult Literacy Partnership Program in the Department of Education.

Assembly No. 1297, Assemblywoman CRECCO—Provides for a cost of living adjustment to taxable income tax brackets and personal exemptions under the New Jersey gross income tax.

Assembly No. 1298, Assemblywoman CRECCO—Revises the procedure to determine a local school budget after rejection by the voters.

Assembly No. 1299, Assemblywoman CRECCO—Provides for nonbinding referendum on whether Legislature should approve and submit to voters a Constitutional amendment providing for establishment of indirect initiative and referendum process.

Assembly No. 1300, Assemblywoman CRECCO and Assemblyman KELLY—Requires the New Jersey Highway Authority to submit to the Legislature, for review and approval, proposals for highway toll increases or new tolls.

Assembly No. 1301, Assemblywoman CRECCO—Provides State pay coverage under SHBP to retirants from TPAF with at least 25 years service.

Assembly No. 1302, Assemblywoman CRECCO—Allows for a deduction from the gross income tax for income deposited in or received as interest earned on an individual medical account.

Assembly No. 1303, Assemblywoman CRECCO and Assemblyman SCHUBER—Creates a corporation business tax credit for part of the costs of providing long-term care insurance policies to employees.

Assembly No. 1304, Assemblywoman CRECCO—Establishes the Volunteer Service Exchange Program.

Assembly No. 1305, Assemblywoman CRECCO—Changes the date of the annual school election to the first Tuesday in June, and adjusts the school budget process to conform to that date.

Assembly No. 1306, Assemblywoman CRECCO—Prohibits auto insurers from surcharging a policy when the insured is involved in a motor vehicle accident in which he is less than 50% at fault.

Assembly No. 1307, Assemblywoman CRECCO—Imposes mandatory minimum term for repeat juvenile offenders convicted of auto theft.

Assembly No. 1308, Assemblywomen CRECCO and FARRAGHER—Supplemental appropriation for \$2,000,000 to DYFS for Head Start day care programs.

Assembly No. 1309, Assemblywoman CRECCO—Appropriates \$350,000 to Department of Human Services for development of materials promoting family day care homes.

Assembly No. 1310, Assemblywoman CRECCO and Assemblyman ROMA—Creates offense of employing a juvenile for the commission of a theft.

Assembly No. 1311, Assemblywoman CRECCO—Requires public school sex education and AIDS education programs to stress abstinence.

Assembly No. 1312, Assemblywoman CRECCO—Denies admittance to day high school to any person who wishes to attend more than two years after his expected graduation date except upon application for exemption to the Commissioner of Education due to extenuating circumstance.

Assembly No. 1313, Assemblywoman CRECCO—Provides for long-term care health insurance policies by commercial insurers.

Assembly No. 1314, Assemblywoman CRECCO and Assemblyman SCHUBER—Provides for long-term care contracts by health service corporations.

Assembly No. 1315, Assemblywoman CRECCO, Assemblymen KELLY—Establishes an acquisition program for real property in the Central Passaic River Basin floodway; appropriates \$100,000.

Assembly No. 1316, Assemblywoman CRECCO—Permits municipalities to designate electrolysis as a permitted use in all residential districts for municipal zoning purposes.

Assembly No. 1317, Assemblywoman CRECCO and Assemblyman ZECKER—Provides for the abolishment of the New Jersey Highway Authority and the transferral thereof to the State Department of Transportation.

Assembly No. 1318, Assemblywoman CRECCO—Permits retired senior citizens at age 60 to enroll in public colleges without payment of tuition charges.

Assembly No. 1319, Assemblywoman CRECCO and Assemblyman KELLY—Exempts from local rent control buildings with three or fewer rental dwelling units.

Assembly No. 1320, Assemblywoman CRECCO and Assemblyman ZECKER—Exempts single-family residences from local rent control.

Assembly No. 1321, Assemblywoman CRECCO and Assemblyman ZECKER—Provides for the removal of tolls from the Garden State Parkway and the assumption of responsibility for the outstanding bonded indebtedness of the New Jersey Highway Authority.

Assembly No. 1322, Assemblywoman CRECCO and Assemblyman ZECKER—The “New Jersey Highway Authority Abolition, Toll Booth Elimination, Garden State Arts Center Privatization and Existing Debt Refinancing Bond Act of 1989,” authorizes up to \$500 million sale of State general obligation bonds.

Assembly No. 1323, Assemblymen KENNY and MENENDEZ—Amends the appropriation act to specify how the railroad property tax payment is to be distributed.

Assembly No. 1324, Assemblymen KENNY and MENENDEZ—Appropriates \$1.13 million to the Treasury Department as special aid to Hoboken to compensate the city for in lieu of railroad property taxes not received.

Assembly No. 1325, Assemblymen KENNY and MENENDEZ—Provides relocation aid for tenants forced to move under certain conditions.

Assembly No. 1326, Assemblymen KENNY and MENENDEZ—Provides supplemental State aid for the Jersey City-Hoboken joint disaster service program and appropriates \$95,000.

Assembly No. 1327, Assemblymen KENNY and MENENDEZ—Provides for forfeiture of motor vehicles used for illegal dumping to municipality.

Assembly No. 1328, Assemblyman KENNY—Provides for property tax deferrals for certain senior and disabled homeowners and appropriates \$5,500,000.

Assembly No. 1329, Assemblymen KENNY and MENENDEZ—Limits reductions in a school district's State equalization aid to 10%.

Assembly No. 1330, Assemblymen KENNY and MENENDEZ—Provides certain procedures for filling certain municipal vacancies.

Assembly No. 1331, Assemblymen KENNY and MENENDEZ—Appropriates \$1 million for local road improvements.

Assembly No. 1332, Assemblymen KENNY and MENENDEZ—Extends expiration date of parking tax ordinances under “Local Tax Authorization Act” to December 31, 1999, and authorizes certain municipalities to impose parking taxes.

Assembly No. 1333, Assemblymen KENNY and MENENDEZ—Provides “cap law” exception for municipal contributions to volunteer fire, ambulance and rescue squads.

Assembly No. 1334, Assemblymen KENNY and MENENDEZ—Directs the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey to provide for discounts for senior citizens on its PATH railroad facilities.

Assembly No. 1335, Assemblyman KENNY—Changes definition of veteran to include members of the American Merchant Marine during World War II who are declared by the U. S. Dept. of Defense to be eligible for federal veterans’ benefits.

Assembly No. 1336, Assemblymen KENNY and IMPREVEDUTO—Requires municipal appropriation of one dollar for every four dollars of State Safe and Clean Neighborhoods Program funding.

Assembly No. 1337, Assemblymen KENNY and MENENDEZ—Directs the Department of Education to develop and distribute educational materials concerning compulsive gambling; appropriates \$15,000.

Assembly No. 1338, Assemblymen KENNY and MENENDEZ—Requires Port Authority to implement certain procedures to obtain bondholder consent concerning reduced or discounted passenger railroad fares for senior citizens.

Assembly No. 1339, Assemblymen KENNY and MENENDEZ—Upgrades prostitution and patronizing prostitutes to disorderly persons offenses with mandatory minimum in certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 1340, Assemblymen KENNY and ROMA—Clarifies definition of “donor” for the “Food Bank Good Samaritan Act.”

Assembly No. 1341, Assemblyman BRYANT—The “Right to Die A Act,” concerns use of life sustaining medical treatment of terminally ill persons.

Assembly No. 1342, Assemblyman BRYANT—The “Full Employment and Job Preparedness Act,” provides tax credit incentives to certain New Jersey employers and financial assistance to counties and municipalities for job development and training.

Assembly No. 1343, Assemblyman BRYANT—Requires certain State agencies and instrumentalities to prominently display notices of qualifications for voting and procedures to register.

Assembly No. 1344, Assemblyman BRYANT—Gives the State Treasurer the responsibility to insure the expansion of business opportunities for socially & economically disadvantaged contractors in all State contracts.

Assembly No. 1345, Assemblyman BRYANT—Mandates that public officials convicted of certain crimes lose their pension rights.

Assembly No. 1346, Assemblyman BRYANT—Allows boards of education and local authorities to provide for employee deductions for the establishment of individual retirement annuities and individual retirement accounts.

Assembly No. 1347, Assemblymen BRYANT and SALMON—Requires public water suppliers to notify their customers of certain water potability results.

Assembly No. 1348, Assemblyman BRYANT—The “Mail Order, Telephone and Electronic Order Act.”

Assembly No. 1349, Assemblyman BRYANT—Grants certain public employees attending the International Association of Black Professional Fire Fighters meetings a leave of absence with pay.

Assembly No. 1350, Assemblyman BRYANT—Eliminates maintenance payments by counties to the State for patients in State or county institutions.

Assembly No. 1351, Assemblyman BRYANT—Requires the NJ Sports and Exposition Authority award 10% of certain contracted expenditures to minority and female businesses.

Assembly No. 1352, Assemblyman BRYANT—Requires at least 25% of the concessions at any NJ Sports and Exposition Authority facility to go to minority businesses.

Assembly No. 1353, Assemblyman BRYANT—Adds a new category of regulated autobus service, “regular route in the nature of special or casino bus operation” to existing categories.

Assembly No. 1354, Assemblyman BRYANT—Requires the State to reimburse municipalities for 100% of the General Assistance welfare grants.

Assembly No. 1355, Assemblyman BRYANT—Prohibits the fraudulent representation of an entity as a small business or as a minority owned or woman owned business.

Assembly No. 1356, Assemblyman BRYANT—Requires State to pay for hospital expenses for a person receiving municipal public assistance.

Assembly No. 1357, Assemblyman BRYANT—Requires the posting of notices in certain licensed premises warning about the risk to the fetus of alcohol consumption during pregnancy.

Assembly No. 1358, Assemblymen BRYANT and CHARLES—Authorizes issuance of \$300,000,000 in general obligation bonds, upon approval by the electorate, for certain riverfront developments, and appropriates \$5,000 for the ballot question.

Assembly No. 1359, Assemblyman BRYANT—Provides for an electronic benefit distribution system for food stamp and AFDC recipients.

Assembly No. 1360, Assemblyman BRYANT—Permits municipalities to impose a tax to fund neighborhood preservation projects.

Assembly No. 1361, Assemblyman BRYANT—Requires the Department of Transportation in conjunction with the New Jersey Transit Corporation to prepare an urban transportation master plan.

Assembly No. 1362, Assemblymen BRYANT and WATSON—Creates loan fund for small businesses located in municipalities with urban enterprise zones but not in zones and appropriates \$2 million.

Assembly No. 1363, Assemblyman BRYANT—Authorizes municipalities to prohibit awarding of contracts to persons doing business with South Africa.

Assembly No. 1364, Assemblyman BRYANT—Provides that membership in PERS shall be optional for school crossing guards.

Assembly No. 1365, Assemblymen BRYANT and WATSON—Authorizes residency requirements for certain police officers.

Assembly No. 1366, Assemblyman BRYANT—Provides that voter registration forms shall have a space in which, at the option of an applicant, that applicant's telephone number may be entered.

Assembly No. 1367, Assemblymen BRYANT and ROBERTS—Permits a local board of education in a city of the second class to establish an urban vocational high school.

Assembly No. 1368, Assemblymen BRYANT and ROBERTS—Allows local governments to make payroll deductions for purchase of life insurance by employees.

Assembly No. 1370, Assemblymen BRYANT and ROBERTS—Provides annual economic benefit to municipalities in which certain wastewater treatment facilities are located; appropriates \$75 million.

Assembly No. 1371, Assemblymen BRYANT and MENENDEZ—Requires an assessment based upon multiple indicators of English proficiency for a child to exit from a bilingual education program.

Assembly No. 1372, Assemblyman BRYANT—Modifies certain provisions of "Fox-Lance" tax exemption law, concerning new recipients of exemptions and tax credits thereunder.

Assembly No. 1373, Assemblyman BRYANT—Makes permissive the revaluation of property in certain cities.

Assembly No. 1374, Assemblyman BRYANT—Establishes the Division of Child Advocacy within the Department of the Public Advocate.

Assembly No. 1375, Assemblyman BRYANT—Changes criteria for qualified business under “New Jersey Urban Enterprise Zones Act.”

Assembly No. 1376, Assemblyman BRYANT—Permits a local board of education in a city of the second class to establish a demonstration junior high school.

Assembly No. 1377, Assemblyman BRYANT—Allows county law enforcement officers to receive credit for time spent with certain other employers to qualify for payment of health insurance benefits by county upon retirement.

Assembly No. 1378, Assemblyman BRYANT and Assemblywoman BUSH—Changes the number of bidders required for small business, female business and minority business set-aside contracts.

Assembly No. 1379, Assemblyman BRYANT—Imposes a waiting period before a person can be tattooed and prohibits the tattooing of minors.

Assembly No. 1380, Assemblymen BRYANT and DUCH—Establishes a special State Police task force to assist certain municipalities in narcotics enforcement efforts; appropriates \$18,000,000.

Assembly No. 1381, Assemblymen BRYANT and ROBERTS—Permits certain members of PFRS to continue membership in position of county Director of Public Safety.

Assembly No. 1382, Assemblyman BRYANT—Replaces minority and women’s State public contract set-aside programs with a set-aside program for small businesses located in economically depressed areas or employing economically disadvantaged individuals.

Assembly No. 1383, Assemblymen BRYANT and CHARLES—Replaces minority and women’s public contract set-aside programs created by counties and municipalities with a program for small businesses located in economically depressed areas or employing economically disadvantaged individuals.

Assembly No. 1384, Assemblymen BRYANT and CHARLES—Replaces minority and women’s public contract set-aside programs established by local boards of education with a program for small businesses located in economically depressed areas or employing economically disadvantaged individuals.

Assembly No. 1385, Assemblyman BRYANT—Replaces minority and women’s public contract set-aside programs of N. J. Sports and Exposition Authority with program for small businesses located in economically depressed areas or employing economically disadvantaged individuals.

Assembly No. 1386, Assemblyman BRYANT—Requires long term automobile lessors to offer credit life and health insurance.

Assembly No. 1387, Assemblyman BRYANT—Abolishes New

Jersey Transit Corporation and creates South Jersey and North Jersey Transit Corporations as successors.

Assembly No. 1388, Assemblyman BRYANT—Establishes loan program to abate asbestos hazards in certain buildings; appropriates \$1,150,000.

Assembly No. 1389, Assemblymen BRYANT and ROBERTS—Provides for an electronic benefit distribution system for food stamp and AFDC recipients and appropriates \$750,000.

Assembly No. 1390, Assemblyman BRYANT—Establishes the Division of Child Advocacy within the Department of the Public Advocate and appropriates \$1,700,000.

Assembly No. 1391, Assemblymen BRYANT and ROBERTS—Permits sale of school property to nonprofit private schools for the handicapped without competitive bidding.

Assembly No. 1392, Assemblymen BRYANT and BAER—Provides that the area surrounding a housing project shall be designated as a drug free zone.

Assembly No. 1393, Assemblyman BRYANT—Strengthens the right to vote and facilitates the procedure for voting in New Jersey.

Assembly No. 1394, Assemblymen BRYANT and ROBERTS—Creates the "Senior and Disabled Citizens' Local Utility Rate Assistance Demonstration Act of 1989;" appropriates \$6 million.

Assembly No. 1395, Assemblymen BRYANT and ROBERTS—Appropriates \$777,000 in Casino Revenue Funds and \$777,000 in federal funds to DHS to expand the Model Waiver program.

Assembly No. 1396, Assemblymen BRYANT and ROBERTS—Appropriates \$250,000 to DOH for urban rodent control programs in the cities of Camden, Jersey City and Newark.

Assembly No. 1397, Assemblyman KAMIN—Authorizes the conducting of recall elections in certain municipalities.

Assembly No. 1398, Assemblyman KAMIN—Clarifies law pertaining to economic benefits for municipality hosting a transfer station.

Assembly No. 1399, Assemblyman KAMIN—Increases the personal exemption allowed to each taxpayer from \$1,000 to \$3,000, repeals the property tax deduction under the gross income tax and eliminates the refundable tenant credit.

Assembly No. 1400, Assemblyman KAMIN—Establishes the "Manufacturing Retention and Equitable Taxation Act."

Assembly No. 1401, Assemblyman KAMIN—Provides for revision in claiming excess contributions to the State disability benefits fund and the unemployment compensation fund.

Assembly No. 1402, Assemblyman KAMIN—Establishes procedure for designation of a fire district.

Assembly No. 1403, Assemblymen KAMIN and SCHLUTER—Designates the State House Annex as the “Walter E. Foran Legislative Office Building.”

Assembly No. 1404, Assemblymen KAMIN and SCHLUTER—Prohibits operation of motor vehicle on public or private property to avoid traffic signal or sign.

Assembly No. 1405, Assemblymen KAMIN and PENN—Clarifies that failure of write-in candidate to obtain sufficient votes in primary election to qualify for otherwise unfilled general election ballot position shall not be deemed to cause a vacancy subject to filling by party organization.

Assembly No. 1406, Assemblyman KAMIN—Authorizes any State agency to debar certain persons from contracting with the agency.

Assembly No. 1407, Assemblyman KAMIN—Extends the time period for filing a claim for refund under the Corporation Business Tax Act from two years to five years, in certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 1408, Assemblyman KAMIN—Permits certain residential development in compatible use areas of public use airports.

Assembly No. 1409, Assemblyman KAMIN—Repeals the “Homestead Tax Relief Act,” eliminating the property tax deduction under the gross income tax and permanently increasing the homestead rebate and gross income tax tenant credit.

Assembly No. 1410, Assemblyman KAMIN—Revises “Special Municipal Aid Act.”

Assembly No. 1411, Assemblyman KAMIN—Establishes additional requirements for the approval of certain board of education lease purchase agreements.

Assembly No. 1412, Assemblymen KAMIN and SCHLUTER—Appropriates \$450,000 to the Department of Environmental Protection for the Endangered and Nongame Species Conservation Act and provides for an annual appropriation for that purpose.

Assembly No. 1413, Assemblymen KAMIN and SCHWARTZ—Enacts the “New Jersey Declaration of Death Act.”

Assembly No. 1414, Assemblymen KAMIN and KAVANAUGH—Entitled “Airport Safety Area Act of 1988,” empowers Commissioner of Transportation to designate airport safety areas and standards therein.

Assembly No. 1415, Assemblymen KAMIN and KYRILLOS—Authorizes developer contributions to finance construction of low and moderate income housing.

Assembly No. 1416, Assemblymen KAMIN and SCHLUTER—Permits delegation of building inspections of State structures.

Assembly No. 1417, Assemblyman KAMIN and Assemblywoman CRECCO—Supplemental appropriation of \$90,000 to the Department of State, State Archives to exhibit the United States Bill of Rights.

Assembly No. 1418, Assemblyman KAMIN—Permits certain persons to perform defibrillation.

Assembly No. 1419, Assemblymen KAMIN and SCHLUTER—Increases certain fish and game license fees.

Assembly No. 1420, Assemblymen KAMIN and WATSON—Provides health and sick leave compensation benefits to certain employees of Department of Military and Veterans' Affairs.

Assembly No. 1421, Assemblyman KAMIN—Clarifies that self-insured public entities are not required to carry uninsured motorist coverage.

Assembly No. 1422, Assemblyman KAMIN—Requires performance bonds for certain no-bid contracts and DCA review of municipal emergency.

Assembly No. 1423, Assemblymen DOYLE, ROMA—Extends the inception and termination dates of World War II, the Korean Conflict and the Vietnam era to include the dates in federal law.

Assembly No. 1424, Assemblyman DOYLE—Provides tax credit under corporation business tax for certain wages paid to workers with cystic fibrosis.

Assembly No. 1425, Assemblyman DOYLE—Phases out the transfer inheritance tax statute concerning class c. and d. transfers increasing exemption amounts for first two years and exempting these transfers from tax thereafter.

Assembly No. 1426, Assemblyman DOYLE—Provides for annual cost-of-living adjustment to the personal needs allowance for institutionalized persons.

Assembly No. 1427, Assemblyman DOYLE—Provides financial assistance to persons with cystic fibrosis and appropriates \$600,000.

Assembly No. 1428, Assemblyman DOYLE—Permits certain TPAF veteran retirees to receive paid health benefits under State Health Benefits Program.

Assembly No. 1429, Assemblymen DOYLE and VILLAPIANO—Requires that municipal fire service representative be appointed to municipal planning and zoning board.

Assembly No. 1430, Assemblyman DOYLE—Appropriates \$90,000 to the Department of Community Affairs for transportation services to congregate nutrition sites.

Assembly No. 1431, Assemblyman DOYLE—Creates Animal Population Control Study Commission.

Assembly No. 1432, Assemblyman DOYLE and Assemblywoman COOPER—Appropriates \$65,000 to N. J. Historical Commission for grant to DOCUMENTARY III to produce film about early Jewish farm communities in New Jersey.

Assembly No. 1433, Assemblyman DOYLE—Supplemental appropriation of \$200,000 to Harbor House, Inc.

Assembly No. 1434, Assemblyman DOYLE—Expands eligibility for compensation for veterans suffering from paraplegia.

Assembly No. 1435, Assemblymen DOYLE and SALMON—Provides for the regulation of certain developments near tidal water bodies in the coastal area.

Assembly No. 1436, Assemblyman DOYLE—Provides for mailing of notices of election and sample ballots in school elections.

Assembly No. 1437, Assemblyman DOYLE—Limits the size of school district surpluses and modifies procedure for line item transfers.

Assembly No. 1438, Assemblyman DOYLE—Appropriates \$150,000 to Department of Education for grant to Toms River Alternate Learning Center.

Assembly No. 1439, Assemblyman DOYLE—Provides that motor vehicle violations by juveniles of any age be within the jurisdiction of municipal courts.

Assembly No. 1440, Assemblymen DOYLE and FRANKS—Revises "Municipal Land Use Law."

Assembly No. 1441, Assemblyman PELLY,—Increases the penalties for the purchase of alcoholic beverages by persons under the legal age.

Assembly No. 1442, Assemblyman PELLY—Increases the penalties for operating a motor vehicle without liability insurance coverage.

Assembly No. 1443, Assemblyman PELLY—Requests DOT to construct a grade separation or overpass at the intersection of Route U. S. 1 and Route 130 in Middlesex County.

Assembly No. 1444, Assemblyman PELLY—Makes certain credit card offenses crimes of the third degree.

Assembly No. 1445, Assemblymen PELLY and GIRGENTI—Regulates those commercial lines of insurance deregulated in 1982.

Assembly No. 1446, Assemblyman PELLY—Prohibits interest charges on credit card purchases if full payment is made within 25 days after the end of the billing period in which the purchase was made.

Assembly No. 1447, Assemblyman PELLY—Requires disclosure of credit card rates and fees to consumers.

Assembly No. 1448, Assemblymen PELLY and COLBURN—Directs certain licensing boards to establish impaired health professionals assistance programs.

Assembly No. 1449, Assemblyman PELLY—Requires the DEP to establish air emission standards for certain resource recovery facilities.

Assembly No. 1450, Assemblyman PELLY—Requires the use of certain forms in credit card transactions.

Assembly No. 1451, Assemblyman PELLY—Supplemental appropriation of \$99,000 to the Division of Veterans Affairs in the Department of Human Services to provide funds to create a memorial to the women who have served in the armed forces.

Assembly No. 1452, Assemblymen PELLY and SPADORO—Requires motor bus carriers to post route information signs along regular route lines.

Assembly No. 1453, Assemblymen PELLY and SPADORO—Requires DEP to inspect landfills accepting municipal solid waste to determine compliance with the facility's registration certificate.

Assembly No. 1454, Assemblymen PELLY and SPADORO—Provides State grant assistance to counties for traffic mitigation programs.

Assembly No. 1455, Assemblyman PELLY—Secures right of tenancy in mobile-home parks to heir or donee of mobile-home owners in certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 1456, Assemblyman PELLY—Requires instruction in cardio-pulmonary resuscitation to each secondary school pupil, appropriates \$50,000.

Assembly No. 1457, Assemblyman PELLY—Establishes a Governor's Fellows Program.

Assembly No. 1458, Assemblymen PELLY and SPADORO—Directs the Department of Transportation to construct a noise barrier on Route 287 in Metuchen.

Assembly No. 1459, Assemblyman PELLY—Permits municipal property tax deductions on condominiums and horizontal property regimes.

Assembly No. 1460, Assemblymen PELLY—Requires owner of closing mobile home park to provide relocation or compensation to mobile homeowners.

Assembly No. 1461, Assemblymen PELLY and SPADORO—Gives mobile home owners right of first refusal upon sale of mobile home park.

Assembly No. 1462, Assemblyman PELLY—Grants full State-wide police powers to trained county park police officers.

Assembly No. 1463, Assemblyman PELLY—Authorizes law enforcement officers to issue preliminary suspensions of drivers' licenses under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 1464, Assemblyman PELLY—Expands veteran's property tax deduction to cooperative housing ownership.

Assembly No. 1465, Assemblyman PELLY—Increases penalties for littering.

Assembly No. 1466, Assemblyman PELLY—Requires display of posters on Heimlich Maneuver in school cafeterias, faculty dining rooms.

Assembly No. 1467, Assemblyman PELLY—Requires transportation impact assessment for site plan review.

Assembly No. 1468, Assemblymen PELLY and SMITH—Provides tax credit under corporation franchise tax for costs of implementing staggered work scheduling.

Assembly No. 1469, Assemblymen PELLY and SPADORO—Provides a gross income tax deduction for annual expenses of resident taxpayers who commute to work using certain public transportation.

Assembly No. 1470, Assemblymen PELLY and MAZUR—Requires that projects that relieve traffic congestion be given first priority by Commissioner of Transportation when requesting funds from the Transportation Trust Fund.

Assembly No. 1471, Assemblymen PELLY and SMITH—Creates the Park and Ride Local Construction Fund and appropriates \$20,000,000 thereto from moneys available under the "New Jersey Trust Fund Authority Act of 1984."

Assembly No. 1472, Assemblyman PELLY—Requires 12-month warranties on sale of new mobile homes.

Assembly No. 1473, Assemblyman PELLY—Amends the wiretapping act to expand circumstances under which electronic surveillance is allowed and deletes obsolete references.

Assembly No. 1474, Assemblymen PELLY and STUHLTRAGER—Permits litter control programs employing inmates of county correctional facilities to be eligible for Clean Communities Account funds.

Assembly No. 1475, Assemblyman PELLY—Permits aunts, uncles or cousins of a minor child to seek visitation in certain circumstances; permits parent to object to visitation by his own blood relations.

Assembly No. 1476, Assemblymen PELLY and SPADORO—Appropriates \$50,000 for advertising and marketing program to promote ridesharing.

Assembly No. 1477, Assemblymen PELLY and SPADORO—Requires certain employers to plan and implement a traffic reduction program for their employees.

Assembly No. 1478, Assemblymen PELLY and SPADORO—Creates New Jersey Storm Sewer Safety Study Commission; appropriates \$50,000.

Assembly No. 1479, Assemblyman PELLY—Designates certain unlawful solid waste disposal activities as disorderly persons offenses.

Assembly No. 1480, Assemblymen PELLY and SPADORO—Permits counties to utilize terminated landfills and contaminated sites for solid waste disposal under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 1481, Assemblyman PELLY—Requires recycling of certain plastic containers.

Assembly No. 1482, Assemblyman STUHLTRAGER—Amends and supplements statutes concerning municipal court funding.

Assembly No. 1483, Assemblyman STUHLTRAGER—Establishes a Child Abuse Diagnostic Center in southern New Jersey.

Assembly No. 1484, Assemblyman STUHLTRAGER—Provides economic benefits to municipality contiguous to host municipality of solid waste facility.

Assembly No. 1485, Assemblyman STUHLTRAGER—Requires a board of freeholders to temporarily fill a vacancy in its membership.

Assembly No. 1486, Assemblyman STUHLTRAGER—Mandates that bond questions submitted to the electorate include an interpretive statement on the ballot which describes certain features of the debt created.

Assembly No. 1487, Assemblyman STUHLTRAGER—Requires hospitals to furnish data and information concerning organ donations to the Department of Health, and appropriates \$10,000.

Assembly No. 1488, Assemblyman STUHLTRAGER—Requires PERS to reactivate the former account of certain members who are employed again rather than to reenroll the members in a new account.

Assembly No. 1489, Assemblyman STUHLTRAGER—Increases juror compensation and provides certain fees to defray the costs.

Assembly No. 1490, Assemblyman STUHLTRAGER—Allows credit against corporation business tax equal to 50% of cost of hazardous waste recycling or reduction equipment.

Assembly No. 1491, Assemblyman STUHLTRAGER—Prohibits the introduction of testimony concerning the method of execution in a capital punishment case.

Assembly No. 1492, Assemblymen STUHLTRAGER and DORIA—Establishes eight distinguished chairs for scholarly studies at the State colleges and appropriates \$600,000.

Assembly No. 1493, Assemblyman STUHLTRAGER—Prohibits certain methods of concealing the proceeds of crime.

Assembly No. 1494, Assemblyman STUHLTRAGER—Requires survey by Commissioner of Health of incidence of Alzheimer's disease, appropriates \$50,000.

Assembly No. 1495, Assemblyman STUHLTRAGER—Expands coverage of "Criminal Injuries Compensation Act of 1971" to victims injured by persons driving under the influence.

Assembly No. 1496, Assemblyman STUHLTRAGER—Requires provision of vocational rehabilitation services to persons with mental illness and appropriates \$50,000.

Assembly No. 1497, Assemblyman STUHLTRAGER—Develops a licensing procedure for professional sign language interpreters and appropriates \$50,000.

Assembly No. 1498, Assemblyman STUHLTRAGER and Assemblywoman SMITH—Supplemental appropriation of \$400,000 to the Department of Labor for sign language services for the deaf.

Assembly No. 1499, Assemblyman STUHLTRAGER—Revises Titles 24 and 26 concerning local health officers.

Assembly No. 1500, Assemblyman STUHLTRAGER—Appropriates \$3.6 million to DEP for NJPDES program.

Assembly No. 1501, Assemblyman STUHLTRAGER—Permits real estate brokers to sell, buy or deal in mobile or manufactured homes.

Assembly No. 1502, Assemblyman STUHLTRAGER—Makes sundry changes to the statute establishing the Office of Administrative Law and establishes certain procedures for hearings.

Assembly No. 1503, Assemblymen STUHLTRAGER and KAMIN—Amends the "Son of Sam Law" to allow forfeiture of convicted criminals' profits earned from biographical books, movies and other expressions.

Assembly No. 1504, Assemblyman STUHLTRAGER—Appropriates \$3,331,000 for Burlington Marine Police Patrol Station.

Assembly No. 1505, Assemblyman STUHLTRAGER—Permits mayor to proclaim a state of local disaster emergency within municipality.

Assembly No. 1506, Assemblyman STUHLTRAGER—Authorizes the impoundment of a motor vehicle whenever the operator of that vehicle does not have in his possession a valid insurance identification card.

Assembly No. 1507, Assemblyman STUHLTRAGER—Authorizes boards of education to provide their own dental insurance.

Assembly No. 1508, Assemblyman STUHLTRAGER—Extends right to retire on veterans' special half-pay retirement allowance to PERS employee qualified under civil service law for disabled veterans preference as spouse or surviving spouse of disabled or deceased veteran.

Assembly No. 1509, Assemblymen STUHLTRAGER and COLLINS—Establishes a Congregate Meals Expansion Program and appropriates \$1 million from the General Fund.

Assembly No. 1510, Assemblymen STUHLTRAGER and LITTELL—Concerns appointment, evaluation, and salary of workers' compensation judges.

Assembly No. 1511, Assemblymen STUHLTRAGER and CIMINO—Requires the Attorney General to study and evaluate the waiver of juveniles from family court.

Assembly No. 1512, Assemblyman STUHLTRAGER—Appropriates \$2,000,000 to the Department of Higher Education for the Rutgers University Agricultural Experiment Station's Vision 21 project.

Assembly No. 1513, Assemblyman STUHLTRAGER—Establishes possession of an automatic firearm for unlawful purposes a crime of the first degree and imposes mandatory prison terms for crimes committed with an automatic firearm.

Assembly No. 1514, Assemblyman STUHLTRAGER—Appropriates \$75,000 to the Maurice River Oyster Culture Foundation.

Assembly No. 1515, Assemblyman STUHLTRAGER and Assemblywoman FORD—Creates the "Automated Traffic System Fund."

Assembly No. 1516, Assemblymen STUHLTRAGER and COLLINS—Permits rural letter carriers who use personal motor vehicles to display amber warning lights when delivering mail.

Assembly No. 1517, Assemblymen STUHLTRAGER and ZECKER—Establishes penalty for defacement or removal of traffic signs.

Assembly No. 1518, Assemblymen STUHLTRAGER, ROBERTS—Permits sale of alcoholic beverages in certain municipalities when Christmas and New Year's Eve fall on Sunday.

Assembly No. 1519, Assemblymen STUHLTRAGER and MCENROE—Requires distribution of environmental educational materials on adverse effects of plastic debris on the marine environment with boat registrations and fishing licenses, and making an appropriation therefor.

Assembly No. 1520, Assemblyman STUHLTRAGER—Appropriates \$20,000,000 from the "Petroleum Overcharge Reimbursement Fund."

Assembly No. 1521, Assemblymen STUHLTRAGER and ROMA—Establishes a shock incarceration program in DOC.

Assembly No. 1522, Assemblyman STUHLTRAGER—Provides a \$75,000 grant to the Pittman Fire Company for protective equipment and training.

Assembly No. 1523, Assemblyman GIRGENTI—Provides for the reporting of detailed financial information and the refunding of excess profits to policyholders by property and casualty insurers.

Assembly No. 1524, Assemblyman GIRGENTI—Eliminates the cap in the appropriation act on the June 1990 distribution of public utilities franchise and gross receipts taxes to municipalities.

Assembly No. 1637, Assemblymen SHUSTED and ROCCO—Increases fines for speeding violations.

Assembly No. 1638, Assemblymen SHUSTED and ROCCO—Permits municipalities to install speed bumps on self-contained residential streets.

Assembly No. 1639, Assemblymen SHUSTED and ROCCO—Permits fire districts within a municipality to jointly advertise election notices.

Assembly No. 1640, Assemblyman SHUSTED—Provides immunity from liability for members of certain fire departments and volunteer fire companies.

Assembly No. 1641, Assemblyman SHUSTED—Provides for appointment of retired police officers as special law enforcement officers.

Assembly No. 1642, Assemblymen SHUSTED and ROCCO—Changes the statutory title of “Municipal Court Clerk” to “Municipal Court Administrator”.

Assembly No. 1646, Assemblymen SHUSTED and ROCCO—Provides for immunity from liability for actions of certain professional review bodies.

Assembly No. 1647, Assemblymen SHUSTED and ROCCO—Requires a substance awareness coordinator at each institution of higher education.

Assembly No. 1648, Assemblyman SHUSTED—Requires public and independent institutions of higher education to study and reform fraternities and sororities and certain other organizations.

Assembly No. 1649, Assemblyman SHUSTED—Requires mandatory alcohol education at colleges and universities.

Assembly No. 1650, Assemblyman SHUSTED—Prohibits hazing at institutions of higher education.

Assembly No. 1651, Assemblymen SHUSTED and ROCCO—Prohibits entities which receive funds from the State or political subdivisions from refusing use of the building owned or leased by the entity upon request of election officials for elections.

Assembly No. 1652, Assemblymen SHUSTED and ROCCO—Increases the amount for which guaranteed arrest bond certificates may be issued by automobile clubs to \$1,000.

Assembly No. 1655, Assemblymen SHUSTED and ROCCO—Extends intestate distribution to great-grandparents and their children.

Assembly No. 1656, Assemblymen SHUSTED and ROCCO—Revises the fee structure for transcripts prepared by court transcribers.

Assembly No. 1657, Assemblymen SHUSTED and ROCCO—Appropriates \$2 million for sewerage system in Gibbsboro, Camden County.

Assembly No. 1658, Assemblymen SHUSTED and ROCCO—Authorizes DOT to erect "Older and Walking Impaired Persons Crossing" signs.

Assembly No. 1659, Assemblymen SHUSTED and ROCCO—Classifies assault on public utility workers as aggravated assault.

Assembly No. 1660, Assemblymen SHUSTED and ROCCO—Designates the Hadrosaurus Foulkii as the State Dinosaur.

Assembly No. 1661, Assemblymen SHUSTED and ROCCO—Authorizes Department of Corrections to sell inmate manufactured goods to other states and their political subdivisions.

Assembly No. 1662, Assemblymen SHUSTED and ROCCO—Permits tax court judges to serve on recall from retirement.

Assembly No. 1663, Assemblymen SHUSTED and ROCCO—Permits certain municipalities to extend coverage under PFRS to a fire district by ordinance.

Assembly No. 1664, Assemblymen SHUSTED and ROCCO—Augments and upgrades clinical treatment services for inmates in the Adult Diagnostic and Treatment Center.

Assembly No. 1665, Assemblymen SHUSTED and ROCCO—Requires Department of Corrections to take custody of juveniles sentenced to State facilities within 72 hours.

Assembly No. 1666, Assemblymen SHUSTED and ROCCO—Increases the fine for former employees of county prosecutor offices who use a badge falsely and imposes a fine for failure to return a service badge.

Assembly No. 1668, Assemblymen DUCH and ROONEY—Sets forth requirements for local and regional authorities and other local contracting units to fulfill prior to entering into certain public contracts.

Assembly No. 1669, Assemblyman ZECKER—Supplemental appropriation of \$4,000,000 to DEP to purchase flood prone properties in the Passaic River Basin.

Assembly No. 1675, Assemblyman WATSON—Validates school bond authorization proceedings.

Assembly No. 1676, Assemblyman IMPREVEDUTO—Revises statute governing employees' retirement system in a city of the first class having a population of less than 300,000.

Assembly No. 1677, Assemblymen SHINN and MC ENROE—Imposes limitation on annual DEP fees for medical waste generators.

Assembly No. 1678, Assemblymen ALBOHN and Frelinghuysen—Allows extended use of bond anticipation notes by municipalities.

Assembly No. 1679, Assemblyman ALBOHN—Changes requirements for publication of certain municipal notices.

Assembly No. 1680, Assemblyman ALBOHN—Permits physicians and surgeons to use emergency warning lights.

Assembly No. 1682, Assemblyman ALBOHN—Allows municipalities to charge inspection fees to boards of education under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 1683, Assemblyman ALBOHN—Requires school districts to pay costs when their graduates need remedial courses in college.

Assembly No. 1684, Assemblyman FRELINGHUYSEN—Requires DYFS to investigate persons applying to be registered family day care providers.

Assembly No. 1685, Assemblyman FRELINGHUYSEN—Supplemental appropriation of \$150,000 to DOL for mine shaft cave-in study in Mine Hill Township.

Assembly No. 1686, Assemblyman FRELINGHUYSEN—Provides funding alternatives to the New Jersey School of the Arts.

Assembly No. 1687, Assemblyman FRELINGHUYSEN—Establishes the Commission for Children and Youth.

Assembly No. 1688, Assemblyman SMITH—Permits a credit for volunteer firemen, first aid and rescue squad members under the New Jersey gross income tax.

Assembly No. 1689, Assemblyman SMITH—Permits an exemption of \$5,000 from gross income for volunteer firemen, first aid and rescue squad members under New Jersey gross income tax.

Assembly No. 1690, Assemblymen SMITH and SCHWARTZ—Appropriates \$26,000,000 as State share of federal flood control project for Green Brook sub-basin, requires local government matching share.

Assembly No. 1691, Assemblyman SMITH—Exempts United States military compensation paid to resident taxpayers stationed overseas from gross income tax.

Assembly No. 1692, Assemblyman SMITH—Provides matching funds to municipalities for construction of sidewalks facilitating physically handicapped persons and appropriates \$5,000,000.

Assembly No. 1694, Assemblymen SMITH and SHUSTED—Authorizes municipalities to modify firearm permit application process.

Assembly No. 1695, Assemblymen SMITH and SCHWARTZ—Requires even illumination of exterior areas at multiple dwellings.

Assembly No. 1697, Assemblyman SMITH—Requires local government unit or authority to include repayments for loans from the “New Jersey Wastewater Treatment Trust Act” and the “Wastewater Treatment Bond Act” in annual budget, requires budget disapproval if not included.

Assembly No. 1698, Assemblyman SMITH and Assemblywoman OGDEN—Authorizes issuance of \$50,000,000 in general obligation bonds to help finance library construction and renovation and appropriates \$5,000.

Assembly No. 1699, Assemblymen SMITH and SCERNI,—Prescribes additional powers and duties of the Environmental Prosecutor.

Assembly No. 1700, Assemblyman SMITH—Establishes the “New Jersey Senior Food Package Plan Act,” and appropriates \$1,600,000.

Assembly No. 1701, Assemblymen SMITH and SCHWARTZ—Provides rewards to persons assisting in uncovering violations of environmental statutes and requires deposit of certain fines and penalties into Hazardous Discharge Site Cleanup Fund.

Assembly No. 1702, Assemblyman SMITH—Allows local construction and subcode officials to engage in construction-related activity in any municipality except the municipality wherein he serves in an official capacity.

Assembly No. 1703, Assemblyman SMITH—Supplemental appropriation of \$50,000 to DCA for fire, rescue squad films.

Assembly No. 1704, Assemblyman SMITH—Permits municipalities to require private solid waste collectors to contract for recycling services.

Assembly No. 1705, Assemblyman SMITH—Amends and supplements ECRA.

Assembly No. 1706, Assemblyman SMITH and Assemblywoman SMITH—Appropriates \$15,000,000 from Resource Recovery and Solid Waste Disposal Facility Fund to Middlesex county.

Assembly No. 1707, Assemblyman SMITH—Includes property damage as matter subject to arbitration in certain automobile accident claims.

Assembly No. 1708, Assemblymen SMITH and SHINN—Provides a credit under the corporation business tax for the cost of purchasing and installing pollution abatement equipment.

Assembly No. 1709, Assemblyman SMITH—Requires publication of violations of designated environmental statutes and makes an appropriation.

Assembly No. 1710, Assemblymen SMITH and BROWN—Expands Rutgers' board of Governors to include representatives of certain municipalities.

Assembly No. 1711, Assemblymen SMITH and SPADORO—Caps N. J. Transit fares at average fare box recovery level of 12 similar transit systems.

Assembly No. 1712, Assemblymen SMITH and SCHWARTZ—Establishes clearinghouse for information on low and moderate income housing.

Assembly No. 1713, Assemblyman SMITH and Assemblywoman COOPER—Establishes a Lupus Erythematosus registry in the Department of Health.

Assembly No. 1714, Assemblyman SMITH and Assemblywoman COOPER—Designated the "Lupus Treatment, Education and Research Demonstration Program Act" and appropriates \$750,000.

Assembly No. 1715, Assemblymen SMITH and KYRILLOS—Requires the DEP to study consequences of a slope failure at the Fresh Kills Landfill; appropriates \$70,000.

Assembly No. 1716, Assemblymen SMITH and SCHUBER—Establishes a Cable Television Industry Study Commission.

Assembly No. 1717, Assemblymen SMITH and ROONEY—Creates the New Jersey Commission on Housing Discrimination.

Assembly No. 1718, Assemblymen SMITH and SCHWARTZ—Designates the second week in May as Human Potential Week and appropriates \$25,000.

Assembly No. 1719, Assemblymen SMITH and SCHWARTZ—Appropriates \$45,000 to Metlar House.

Assembly No. 1720, Assemblymen SMITH and SCHWARTZ—Requires deeds conveying certain units of low and moderate income housing to be marked as such.

Assembly No. 1721, Assemblymen SMITH and SCHWARTZ—Appropriates \$750,000 in payments to school districts for services to persons residing on State property.

Assembly No. 1724, Assemblyman SMITH and Assemblywoman OGDEN—Expands citizens' authority to enforce environmental laws; creates Environmental Defense Litigation Fund; appropriates \$1 million.

Assembly No. 1725, Assemblymen SMITH and VILLAPIANO—Requires public colleges and universities to participate in State set-aside program for small businesses, female businesses and minority businesses.

Assembly No. 1726, Assemblyman SMITH—Increases criminal penalties for violations of certain environmental laws.

Assembly No. 1733, Assemblyman SMITH and Assemblywoman RANDALL—Requires radon testing in public schools, establishes the "Public School Building Radon Testing Fund", appropriates \$1,135,000.

Assembly No. 1734, Assemblymen SMITH and SHINN—Removes cap on air pollution permit fees charged by DEP.

Assembly No. 1735, Assemblymen SMITH and SCHWARTZ—Requires inclusion of community residences for the disabled in "fair share" affordable housing plans.

Assembly No. 1736, Assemblymen SMITH and VILLAPIANO—Protects employment of emergency services volunteers; provides tax credits for volunteers' employers and child care providers.

Assembly No. 1737, Assemblyman SMITH—Provides that effluent discharge levels reported on a permittee's submitted reports pursuant to the Water Pollution Control Act constitute an admission for enforcement purposes.

Assembly No. 1738, Assemblyman SMITH—Prohibits department heads and legislators from communicating with sentencing and parole authorities.

Assembly No. 1739, Assemblyman SMITH—Supplemental appropriation of \$450,000 to the Department of Higher Education for Union County College's Urban Education Center.

Assembly No. 1740, Assemblyman VILLAPIANO—Requires preferential hiring of volunteer firefighters for certain municipal positions.

Assembly No. 1758, Assemblyman MC ENROE—Reduces number of ADC children a municipality must have to qualify for State urban aid.

Assembly No. 1759, Assemblyman MC ENROE—Requires DEP to designate, construct, own and provide for the operation of certain regional landfills.

Assembly No. 1760, Assemblyman MC ENROE—Exempts certain public water systems from “Safe Drinking Water Act” tax.

Assembly No. 1761, Assemblyman MC ENROE—Increases certain fees charged by county clerks, deputy clerks of the Superior Court and registrars of deeds.

Assembly No. 1773, Assemblyman MC ENROE—Requires the Department of Health to prepare, and physicians to distribute, a booklet concerning the dangers of using cocaine during pregnancy, and appropriates \$75,000.

Assembly No. 1774, Assemblyman MC ENROE—Appropriates \$9 million from "Wastewater Treatment Fund" for loan to West Orange for wastewater treatment system.

Assembly No. 1775, Assemblymen MC ENROE and PELLY—Prohibits DEP from making State bond moneys available for the construction of resource recovery facilities to counties which have not demonstrated sufficient commitment to recycling.

Assembly No. 1776, Assemblyman MC ENROE—Creates Urban Aquifer Protection Pilot Program and appropriates \$60,000.

Assembly No. 1777, Assemblyman MC ENROE—Requires the administrative director of the courts to establish guidelines for electronic data processing contractors with municipal courts.

Assembly No. 1778, Assemblyman MC ENROE and Assemblywoman Randall—Establishes the New Jersey Commission on Land-fill Closure.

Assembly No. 1779, Assemblyman MC ENROE—Creates the Shore Regional Management Board.

Assembly No. 1780, Assemblyman MC ENROE—Extends sales tax exemption to all enterprise zones.

Assembly No. 1781, Assemblyman MC ENROE—Provides for in lieu tax payments for certain public water supply lands.

Assembly No. 1782, Assemblyman MC ENROE—Allows municipality to conduct referendum on abandonment of certain run-off elections.

Assembly No. 1783, Assemblyman MC ENROE—Requires HMDC to provide solid waste disposal facilities to certain counties under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 1792, Assemblymen MC ENROE and FELICE—Provides State matching grants to counties for increased solid waste transportation costs; appropriates \$100 million from General Fund.

Assembly No. 1793, Assemblyman MC ENROE and Assemblywoman BUSH—Permits certain individuals to be issued a municipal clerk’s certificate.

Assembly No. 1794, Assemblyman MC ENROE—Requires ordinance before county governing body can sell, lease or construct certain facilities on park land and recreation areas.

Assembly No. 1795, Assemblyman MC ENROE—Provides for the registration and regulation of athlete agents.

Assembly No. 1796, Assemblyman MC ENROE—Requires HMDC to provide ash residue disposal facilities to certain counties under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 1797, Assemblyman MC ENROE—Appropriates \$13,000,000 from General Fund to DEP for solid waste rate shock relief to Hudson County.

Assembly No. 1798, Assemblyman MC ENROE—Provides for rate averaging of solid wastes disposed by counties in this State on a regional basis.

Assembly No. 1799, Assemblyman MC ENROE—Grants tenure to clerks of county boards of elections in first class counties under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 1800, Assemblyman MC ENROE—Changes maximum duration of certain local public contracts.

Assembly No. 1801, Assemblyman MC ENROE—Requires DEP to survey beach ownership and public access; appropriates \$90,000.

Assembly No. 1802, Assemblymen MC ENROE and MATTISON—Defines role of Board of Public Utilities concerning transfer stations.

Assembly No. 1803, Assemblymen MC ENROE and FELICE—Appropriates \$20,000,000 in State Aid to the DEP as grants to certain solid waste exporting counties to replace lost landfill tax revenues.

Assembly No. 1804, Assemblyman MC ENROE—Prohibits the possession of weapons by persons convicted of certain weapons-related crimes.

Assembly No. 1805, Assemblyman MC ENROE—Removes HMDC from provisions of "Solid Waste Management Act."

Assembly No. 1806, Assemblyman MC ENROE and Assemblywoman BUSH—Supplemental appropriation of \$95,000 to DOH for grant to the New Jersey Poison Information and Education System.

Assembly No. 1807, Assemblyman MC ENROE—Requires Commissioner of DEP to disburse moneys in the Solid Waste Services Tax Fund within 30 days.

Assembly No. 1808, Assemblymen MC ENROE and ALBOHN—Requires certain persons to contract for private solid waste collection services whenever a municipal collection system is not available.

Assembly No. 1809, Assemblyman MC ENROE—Establishes certain standards for transactions between water utilities and real estate enterprises, and certain other real property transactions of water utilities; creates penalties.

Assembly No. 1810, Assemblyman MC ENROE—Permits boards of freeholders to investigate county improvement authorities.

Assembly No. 1811, Assemblymen MC ENROE and Assemblywoman Ogden—Authorizes local agencies to enforce compliance with all laws, regulations, permits and orders related to solid waste collection or disposal within their jurisdiction.

Assembly No. 1812, Assemblyman MC ENROE and Assemblywoman BUSH—Adds representative of School of Graduate Medical Education of Seton Hall University to Advisory Graduate Medical Education Council of NJ.

Assembly No. 1813, Assemblyman MC ENROE—Requires labeling of disposable diapers.

Assembly No. 1814, Assemblyman MC ENROE—Extends Senior Citizen Housing Coordination Program in DCA; appropriates \$95,000.

Assembly No. 1815, Assemblyman MC ENROE and Assemblywoman BUSH—Appropriates \$300,000 to DCA for East Orange housing police detail.

Assembly No. 1816, Assemblymen MC ENROE and MATTISON—Authorizes or mandates measures designed to reduce the volume and weight of nonrecyclable, disposable packaging and packaging materials entering the solid waste stream.

Assembly No. 1817, Assemblyman MC ENROE and Assemblywoman FARRAGHER—Prohibits persons operating vehicles utilized for the transportation of food to utilize that vehicle for the transportation of solid waste.

Assembly No. 1818, Assemblyman MC ENROE—Creates “Wastepaper Recycling Investigative Commission.”

Assembly No. 1819, Assemblymen MC ENROE and MATTISON—Provides for regulation of recycling centers.

Assembly No. 1820, Assemblyman MC ENROE and Assemblywoman BUSH—Appropriates \$43,000 for the Occupational Center of Greater Essex County.

Assembly No. 1821, Assemblyman MC ENROE—Exempts certain retirement benefits from attachment.

Assembly No. 1822, Assemblyman MC ENROE—Requires appropriation of State funds over one million dollars to support new program or service to be enacted separately from legislation establishing the program or service.

Assembly No. 1823, Assemblymen MC ENROE and MATTISON—Revises definitions of disposition and market in the “New Jersey Statewide Mandatory Source Separation and Recycling Act.”

Assembly No. 1824, Assemblymen MC ENROE and SHINN—Requires certain recipients of loans or loan guarantees from the State Recycling Fund to give preference in recycling to materials originating in N.J.

Assembly No. 1825, Assemblymen MC ENROE and SHINN—Authorizes local governments to engage in the cooperative marketing of recyclable materials.

Assembly No. 1826, Assemblyman MC ENROE—Requires Legislature to hold public hearings on sludge incineration plans.

Assembly No. 1827, Assemblyman MC ENROE—Supplemental appropriation of \$900,000 to fund Essex County Case Processing Improvement program.

Assembly No. 1828, Assemblymen MC ENROE and MATTISON—Clarifies legislative intent behind memoranda of understanding under the "Fair Housing Act."

Assembly No. 1829, Assemblyman DORIA—Places State school aid for debt service and budgeted capital outlay on a current year basis.

Assembly No. 1830, Assemblyman DORIA—Requires that additional categorical aid shall be paid to school districts for pupils enrolled in multiple categorical programs.

Assembly No. 1831, Assemblyman DORIA—Changes the service credit of certain members in TPAF.

Assembly No. 1832, Assemblyman DORIA—Exempts from the sales and use tax receipts from sales of products in school stores.

Assembly No. 1833, Assemblyman DORIA—Eliminates right turns at red lights.

Assembly No. 1834, Assemblyman DORIA—Provides procedure for objecting to physical or psychiatric examinations of school employees in certain cases.

Assembly No. 1835, Assemblyman DORIA—Provides that tenured employees who lose employment due to transfers in regional school district withdrawals are transferred to withdrawing district.

Assembly No. 1836, Assemblyman DORIA—Permits participants in the alternate benefits program to elect not to receive non-contributory life insurance benefit in excess.

Assembly No. 1837, Assemblyman DORIA—Provides financial assistance for asbestos removal from buildings of higher education institutions; appropriates \$20,000,000.

Assembly No. 1838, Assemblyman DORIA and Assemblywoman CRECCO—Doubles the present fines and penalties imposed for criminal and civil offenses involving cruelty to animals.

Assembly No. 1839, Assemblyman DORIA—Excludes from gross income certain annuity income sheltered from federal income tax under section 403(b) of the Internal Revenue Code.

Assembly No. 1840, Assemblyman DORIA—Authorizes municipalities to enact an ordinance providing for the parking of motor vehicles in front of private driveways.

Assembly No. 1841, Assemblyman DORIA—Regulates the sale and warranty of certain used motor vehicles.

Assembly No. 1842, Assemblyman DORIA—Provides that electrical subcode officials shall be qualified and licensed by BPU.

Assembly No. 1843, Assemblyman DORIA—Authorizes the cancellation of record of any mortgage upon which a foreclosure action is barred either by the statute of limitations or the presumption of payment.

Assembly No. 1845, Assemblyman DORIA—Authorizes boards of education to provide school-age child care programs in school buildings or other appropriate facility; appropriates \$5,000,000.

Assembly No. 1846, Assemblyman DORIA—Establishes a Landscape Irrigation Contractors Examining Board in the Department of Environmental Protection to regulate persons in the business of landscape irrigation contracting.

Assembly No. 1847, Assemblymen DORIA and PATERO—Designated the “Asbestos Air Monitor Licensing Act,” requires and provides procedure for the licensing of asbestos air monitors.

Assembly No. 1848, Assemblyman DORIA—Designated the “Professional Liability Claim Disclosure Act,” creates a mechanism for reporting and disclosing certain professional malpractice liability claims, settlements and judgments.

Assembly No. 1849, Assemblymen DORIA and ROCCO—Changes the definition of “veteran” to include veterans who participated in the Lebanon and Grenada peace-keeping missions; gives these veterans benefits accorded other veterans if employed in civil service.

Assembly No. 1850, Assemblyman DORIA—Establishes program for the encapsulation or removal of asbestos in a hazardous condition in buildings of institutions of higher education.

Assembly No. 1851, Assemblyman DORIA—Authorizes the issuance of \$40,000,000 in State bonds for grants to institutions of higher education for financing the cost of removing or encapsulating asbestos in a hazardous condition.

Assembly No. 1852, Assemblyman DORIA—Designated the “New Jersey Guaranteed College Tuition Investment Program Act of 1986,” allows for the prepayment of college tuition at a guaranteed rate.

Assembly No. 1853, Assemblymen DORIA and FELICE—Allows an HMO enrollee to be treated by a provider of his choice and receive HMO benefits.

Assembly No. 1854, Assemblyman DORIA—Establishes New Jersey Upward Bound Program to provide academic assistance, counseling and other support to certain students; appropriates \$500,000.

Assembly No. 1855, Assemblyman DORIA—Establishes Minority Faculty Educational Loan Buy-Out Program in Department of Higher Education.

Assembly No. 1856, Assemblymen DORIA and HUDAK—Requires examination for licensure as professional planner to include certain subject matter.

Assembly No. 1857, Assemblymen DORIA and CHARLES—Establishes the “Improved Municipal Services Grant” program to assist certain municipalities, either individually or jointly, to improve delivery of municipal services; appropriates \$10,000,000.

Assembly No. 1858, Assemblymen DORIA and MORAN—Provides for minimum salaries for full-time county college faculty members.

Assembly No. 1859, Assemblymen DORIA and MORAN—Provides employment credit for military service to employees of boards of education and county colleges.

Assembly No. 1860, Assemblyman DORIA—Establishes adult education pilot program for individuals with limited English proficiency; appropriates \$200,000.

Assembly No. 1861, Assemblyman DORIA—Amends and repeals sections of the “Teacher Quality Employment Act.”

Assembly No. 1862, Assemblyman DORIA—Establishes Institute for Urban Education, Assistant Commissioner of Urban Education, and Advisory Committee on Urban Education in the Department of Education; appropriates \$10,000,000.

Assembly No. 1863, Assemblyman DORIA—Establishes the “New Jersey Advance College Tuition Program;” appropriates \$1 million.

Assembly No. 1864, Assemblyman DORIA—Provides that teachers employed in public institutions other than local public schools will be included in the minimum salary law.

Assembly No. 1865, Assemblyman DORIA—Apportions costs in regional school districts on a per-pupil basis.

Assembly No. 1866, Assemblyman DORIA—Permits certain employees of school districts and county colleges to enroll in TPAF.

Assembly No. 1867, Assemblyman DORIA—Protects individuals currently holding principal’s certificates from changes in certification requirements.

Assembly No. 1868, Assemblymen DORIA and CHARLES—The “Harbor Development Bond Act of 1988,” authorizes bonds for \$30,000,000; appropriates \$5,000.

Assembly No. 1869, Assemblymen DORIA and MORAN—Allows certain public accountants to use the title “certified public accountant” and the abbreviation “CPA.”

Assembly No. 1870, Assemblymen DORIA and KRONICK—Provides for the certification of laboratories that perform certain asbestos analyses.

Assembly No. 1871, Assemblymen DORIA and MORAN—Establishes salary supplements for certain teaching staff members.

Assembly No. 1872, Assemblymen DORIA and CHARLES—Permits certain firefighters who, after separation from service, were required by court order to be reinstated to purchase credit in PFRS for the period during which the employer refused reinstatement.

Assembly No. 1873, Assemblymen DORIA and FELICE—Permits boards of education of type II school districts to determine the annual school budget without referendum.

Assembly No. 1874, Assemblyman DORIA—Modifies the authority of the Departments of Education and Community Affairs in the regulation of public school buildings.

Assembly No. 1875, Assemblymen DORIA and KYRILLOS—“School Children’s New Jersey State Attractions Act;” appropriates \$71,000.

Assembly No. 1876, Assemblymen DORIA and IMPREVEDUTO—Establishes a county college minority faculty loan and loan redemption program.

Assembly No. 1877, Assemblymen DORIA and IMPREVEDUTO—Establishes a summer research fellowship program for doctoral candidates in the Minority Faculty Advancement Loan and Loan Redemption Program.

Assembly No. 1878, Assemblymen DORIA and IMPREVEDUTO—Directs institutions of higher education to establish and operate child care centers, available on a sliding fee scale to certain students.

Assembly No. 1879, Assemblymen DORIA and CHARLES—Provides a State matching grant for the construction of a Science/Technology center at Liberty State Park; appropriates \$5,000,000.

Assembly No. 1880, Assemblymen DORIA and MORAN—Provides that State aid to county colleges be paid on an equalized basis.

Assembly No. 1881, Assemblymen DORIA and MORAN—Permits podiatrist to certify handicap for parking privilege.

Assembly No. 1882, Assemblyman DORIA—Establishes minimum salaries for certain administrative employees in public school.

Assembly No. 1883, Assemblymen DORIA and ROCCO—Establishes Advanced Undergraduate Engineering Laboratory at Stevens Institute of Technology; appropriates \$15,000,000.

Assembly No. 1884, Assemblymen DORIA and CHARLES—Requires the New Jersey Real Estate Commission to renew the real estate broker's license of A. John Ward.

Assembly No. 1885, Assemblymen DORIA and SMITH—Authorizes supplemental compensation for sick leave as a subject of collective bargaining for State college faculty members.

Assembly No. 1886, Assemblyman DORIA—Permits leave of absence for police officers and fire fighters serving as aide to director of public safety in certain municipalities.

Assembly No. 1887, Assemblymen DORIA and CHARLES—Requires cable television companies to provide notice when discontinuing a cable channel provided as part of basic cable service.

Assembly No. 1888, Assemblyman DORIA—Provides for the use of school facilities for community education programs; appropriates \$1,100,000.

Assembly No. 1889, Assemblyman DORIA and Assemblywoman Kalik—Removes the affidavit requirement on school district purchases of less than \$150.

Assembly No. 1890, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Exempts from sales and use tax the receipts from sales of motor vehicles that have been adapted for use by handicapped persons.

Assembly No. 1891, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Requires reporting of interest rates and other information for credit cards and the dissemination of that information.

Assembly No. 1892, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Provides that the veteran's property tax deduction is available to those veterans whose home-ownership is in the form of shares in cooperative housing.

Assembly No. 1893, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Establishes a Public Information Program on Medicare and Physicians' Fees in the Division on Aging in the Department of Community Affairs; appropriates \$50,000.

Assembly No. 1894, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Creates "Commercial Fisheries Assistance Loan Fund," appropriates \$5 million.

Assembly No. 1895, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Requires payment of real property taxes before approval of construction permits.

Assembly No. 1896, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Provides a \$1,000 gross income tax exemption for volunteers of the Office of Emergency Management, including auxiliary police.

Assembly No. 1897, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Exempts home filtration and purification devices from the sales tax.

Assembly No. 1898, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Exempts medical alert equipment and services from the sales tax.

Assembly No. 1899, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Requires State to offer surplus firefighting equipment to volunteer fire companies at a nominal fee.

Assembly No. 1900, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Designated the “County Offices on the Handicapped Act” and appropriates \$1,000,000.

Assembly No. 1901, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Requires relocation aid to senior citizen tenants of certain closing mobile home parks.

Assembly No. 1902, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Subjects persons engaged in illegal dumping to criminal penalties and subjects vehicles of illegal dumpers to forfeiture.

Assembly No. 1903, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Provides a Division of Travel and Tourism annual matching grant program.

Assembly No. 1904, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Requires immediate police investigation of certain missing person reports.

Assembly No. 1905, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Makes the unauthorized use or possession of food stamps a crime of theft.

Assembly No. 1906, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Amends the laws concerning sentencing for escape.

Assembly No. 1907, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Permits nonprofit organizations to receive municipal recycling tonnage grants.

Assembly No. 1908, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—The “School Fire Repair Fund Act,” appropriates \$1,000,000.

Assembly No. 1909, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Establishes spend down eligibility category for PAAD.

Assembly No. 1910, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Requires person to obtain permit to purchase body vest.

Assembly No. 1911, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Increases PAAD eligibility level for individuals with dependent children.

Assembly No. 1912, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Requires telephone companies to notify customers on how to have their names removed from telephone solicitation lists.

Assembly No. 1913, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Permits school boards, local housing authorities, municipal utilities authorities, and volunteer fire and rescue squads to participate in joint insurance funds.

Assembly No. 1914, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Provides a deduction from gross income under the gross income tax for contributions to individual retirement accounts or annuities.

Assembly No. 1915, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Requires owner of closing mobile home park to provide relocation or compensation to mobile home owner.

Assembly No. 1916, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Eliminates 10-year service requirement for vesting and deferred retirement applicable to PERS and TPAF members.

Assembly No. 1917, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Allows municipalities to exempt senior and disabled citizens from payment of beach fees.

Assembly No. 1918, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Allows municipalities to change certain speed limits previously approved by Commissioner of Transportation.

Assembly No. 1919, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Allows municipality to designate stop intersections.

Assembly No. 1920, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Supplemental appropriation of \$4,000,000 to the Volunteer Emergency Service Organizations Loan Fund in DCA.

Assembly No. 1921, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Excludes services performed by certain commercial fishermen from employment subject to unemployment compensation and temporary disability contributions.

Assembly No. 1922, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Establishes a New Jersey Artificial Reef Study Commission and appropriates \$50,000.

Assembly No. 1923, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Requires State agencies to consider purchase of acceptable alternatives to products made from polystyrene plastics utilizing chlorofluorocarbon.

Assembly No. 1924, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Amends "Teacher Quality Employment Act" to continue State aid to local districts.

Assembly No. 1925, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Prohibits diversions of fresh water for certain industrial uses.

Assembly No. 1926, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Appropriates \$1 million to NJIT to develop permit limits for industrial wastewater discharges.

Assembly No. 1927, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Reappropriates certain unallocated monies to be used to treat or replace contaminated water supplies.

Assembly No. 1928, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Provides for a registry of individuals affected by contaminated drinking water and appropriates \$50,000.

Assembly No. 1929, Assemblymen MORAN and DOYLE—Provides grants to schools for programs to locate absent pupils; appropriates \$250,000.

Assembly No. 1930, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Provides that prevailing party in suit to obtain access to public records may recover amount equal to three times reasonable attorney's fees.

Assembly No. 1931, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Establishes a New Jersey Oversight Commission on the Decommissioning of the Oyster Creek Nuclear Generating Station.

Assembly No. 1932, Assemblymen MORAN and STUHLTRAGER—Transfers functions, powers, and duties of Division of Fish, Game and Wildlife relating to shellfish law enforcement to Marine Law Enforcement Bureau.

Assembly No. 1933, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Requires power vessels to regulate speed to avoid damage to undeveloped water-front areas.

Assembly No. 1934, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Prohibits the exportation of out-of-district solid waste to certain counties; exempts certain counties from DEP orders requiring the development of resource recovery facilities.

Assembly No. 1935, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Requires Office of Highway Safety in Division of Motor Vehicles to establish a specified driver program for volunteer first aid and rescue squads.

Assembly No. 1936, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Establishes eagle nesting program; appropriates \$95,000.

Assembly No. 1937, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Excludes veterans' entitlements from income for determination of PAAD eligibility.

Assembly No. 1938, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Creates a Natural Resources Preservation and Restoration Fund to be funded by revenues from the realty transfer fee.

Assembly No. 1939, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Establishes fee for diversion of ground water used in air conditioning systems.

Assembly No. 1940, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Establishes a special account for the stranded marine animals using funds from voluntary donations on boat registration forms.

Assembly No. 1941, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Creates Marine Mammal Stranding Study Commission; appropriates \$25,000.

Assembly No. 1942, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Supplemental appropriation of \$100,000 in FY 1989 for the Women in Military Service for America Memorial Foundation, Inc.

Assembly No. 1943, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Raises reward for reporting ocean dumping to 50% of criminal penalty.

Assembly No. 1944, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Permits a tax collector to reinstate a denied senior citizen's or disabled person's tax deduction.

Assembly No. 1945, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Upgrades eluding police to fourth degree crime and imposes mandatory one year term of imprisonment.

Assembly No. 1946, Assemblymen MORAN and SHINN—Subjects persons engaged in illegal dumping of solid waste to enhanced penalties.

Assembly No. 1947, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Regulates the operations of sexually oriented businesses.

Assembly No. 1948, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Requires criminal history record checks of certain persons applying for jobs to provide care for the elderly.

Assembly No. 1949, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Includes senior citizens as members of certain State commissions, councils and boards.

Assembly No. 1950, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Establishes State aid program to upgrade and augment local police services and programs for senior citizens; appropriates \$3,000,000.

Assembly No. 1951, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Clarifies that certain lands are situate in Beachwood Borough.

Assembly No. 1952, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Regulates shallow-draft vessels in certain areas.

Assembly No. 1953, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Provides for the State acquisition of damage prone and environmentally sensitive lands in the coastal area.

Assembly No. 1954, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Provides a gross income tax deduction from the State gross income tax for donations of certain environmentally sensitive or undeveloped lands, or an interest therein, to the State of New Jersey.

Assembly No. 1955, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—“New Jersey Coastal Area Preservation Bond Act;” authorizes bonds for \$200 million; and appropriates \$5,000.

Assembly No. 1956, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Prohibits collision and comprehensive coverages by the JUA.

Assembly No. 1957, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Permits waiver or modification of construction code fees and surcharges in certain cases.

Assembly No. 1958, Assemblymen MORAN, CONNORS, Doyle and Assemblywoman Ford—Increases PFRS survivor’s pension from 35% to 50% of average final compensation and permits COLA based on date of retirement.

Assembly No. 1959, Assemblymen MORAN and DORIA—Provides employment credit for military service for county college employees.

Assembly No. 1960, Assemblymen MORAN and DORIA—Revises certain experience requirements for a certificate as a certified public accountant.

Assembly No. 1961, Assemblymen MORAN and DORIA—Provides for different shop requirements if only manicuring services are offered.

Assembly No. 1962, Assemblymen MORAN and DORIA—Allows barbers and beauticians two opportunities to pass the cosmetologist-hairstylist licensing exam prior to additional training and eliminates the oral portion of board exams.

Assembly No. 1963, Assemblyman MC ENROE—Supplemental appropriation of \$585,000 in State aid for grant to United Jewish Centers of Metro-West for renovations for handicapped accessibility and utilization.

Assembly No. 1964, Assemblyman MC ENROE—Alters the allocation of cost between municipalities comprising a type II school district with a board of school estimate.

Assembly No. 1965, Assemblymen MC ENROE and SHINN—Clarifies role of Board of Public Utilities concerning resource recovery facilities.

Assembly No. 1966, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Increases employer contribution in alternate benefit program for college faculty from 8 to 9%.

Assembly No. 1967, Assemblyman KELLY—Requires nonprofit corporations to disclose certain employees’ salaries to public bodies paying them more than \$50,000 in grants or contracts.

Assembly No. 1968, Assemblyman KELLY—Exempts certain property owners hosting charitable purpose events from liability for suits for civil damages alleging negligent service of alcohol.

Assembly No. 1969, Assemblyman KELLY—Creates the Senior and Disabled Citizen Property Tax Relief Loan Fund, appropriates \$10 million from the Casino Revenue Fund.

Assembly No. 1970, Assemblyman KELLY—Authorizes nurse practitioners to prescribe medications under certain conditions.

Assembly No. 1971, Assemblyman KELLY—Exempts persons 65 years of age or older from jury service upon written request.

Assembly No. 1972, Assemblyman KELLY—Creates an inference that a person performing a lewd act in certain public places is likely to be observed.

Assembly No. 1973, Assemblyman KELLY and Assemblywoman CRECCO—Permits county executives to exercise line-item veto.

Assembly No. 1974, Assemblyman KELLY and Assemblywoman CRECCO—Amends “Sheltered Workshop Act of 1971” to allow full payment of costs under extended employment program.

Assembly No. 1975, Assemblyman KELLY—Disburses \$50.00 of the \$75.00 filing fee to counties permitted to accept complaints for filing.

Assembly No. 1976, Assemblymen KELLY and FRANKS—Requires that new State mandated programs shall not be undertaken by any school district unless paid for by the State or federal government.

Assembly No. 1977, Assemblyman KELLY—Establishes part-time and full-time accounts in PERS, and requires the calculation of a retirement allowance on the basis of the separate accounts.

Assembly No. 1978, Assemblyman KELLY—Equalizes excise tax on wine coolers and distilled spirit coolers at \$.30 a gallon.

Assembly No. 1979, Assemblyman KELLY—Establishes New Jersey Sweepstakes to raise funds for low and moderate income housing; appropriates \$50,000.

Assembly No. 1980, Assemblyman KELLY—Conforms State contracts law with the local public contracts law with respect to retainage.

Assembly No. 1981, Assemblymen KELLY and LO BIONDO—Establishes the Volunteer Service Exchange Program.

Assembly No. 1982, Assemblyman KELLY—Supplemental appropriation of \$600,000 to United Cerebral Palsy Associations’ Rehabilitation Accessibility Modification Program (RAMP).

Assembly No. 1983, Assemblyman KELLY—Requires assessor to take into consideration effects of a protected tenancy when determining the assessed value of rental properties converted to condominium units.

Assembly No. 1984, Assemblyman KELLY—Equalizes the cost of public assistance among all counties.

Assembly No. 1985, Assemblyman KELLY—Provides that named insureds who are totally disabled do not have to pay a residual market equalization charge.

Assembly No. 1986, Assemblyman KELLY—Prohibits sale or development of certain portions of Rutgers Ecological Preserve and Natural Teaching Area.

Assembly No. 1987, Assemblyman KELLY and Assemblywoman CRECCO—Provides for compensation to certain persons for costs and damages related to radium-contaminated soil removal.

Assembly No. 1988, Assemblyman KELLY and Assemblywoman CRECCO—Provides for compensation to certain persons for property stolen while their home was under DEP control.

Assembly No. 1989, Assemblymen KELLY and LITTELL—Excludes certain nursing services from unemployment compensation and temporary disability insurance contributions.

Assembly No. 1990, Assemblyman KELLY—“New Jersey Housing Partnership Act,” appropriates \$7,500,000.

Assembly No. 1991, Assemblyman KELLY—Supplemental appropriation of \$15,000,000 to HMFA to continue its Affordable Housing Program.

Assembly No. 1992, Assemblyman KELLY—“Generation-to-Generation Home Purchase Assistance Act,” appropriates \$3,000,000.

Assembly No. 1993, Assemblyman KELLY—Requires publication of notice of appeal from local and regional board of adjustment and regional planning board decisions.

Assembly No. 1994, Assemblyman KELLY—Amends and supplements the “Fair Housing Act,” P. L. 1985, c. 222 (C. 52:27D-301).

Assembly No. 1995, Assemblymen KELLY and FRANKS—Provides criteria for reimbursement to counties for costs of maintaining offenders sentenced to State institutions in county facilities.

Assembly No. 1996, Assemblymen KELLY and ZANGARI—Allows PERS retirants to work part-time and not reenroll in the retirement system.

Assembly No. 1997, Assemblymen KELLY and ROMA—Exempts municipalities from air pollution permit fees.

Assembly No. 1998, Assemblymen KELLY and SHINN—Allows suspension of driving privileges for high school drop-outs.

Assembly No. 1999, Assemblyman KELLY—Permits municipalities to reimburse qualified private community for costs of certain municipal services not provided.

Assembly No. 2000, Assemblyman KELLY—Allows members of the New Jersey National Guard to attend institutions of higher education tuition free.

Assembly No. 2001, Assemblyman KELLY—Clarifies that the surety bonds posted by public works contractors are not to be used to pay damage claims, or be construed as liability insurance policies.

Assembly No. 2002, Assemblymen KELL and, ROBERTS—Exempts all fire apparatus operators from federal licensing requirements.

Assembly No. 2003, Assemblyman KELLY and Assemblywoman CRECCO—Requires mandatory testing for drug offenders while on parole or probation.

Assembly No. 2004, Assemblymen KELLY and KENNY—Exempts certain affordable housing projects from DEP-imposed sewer connection bans for certain class municipalities.

Assembly No. 2006, Assemblyman KELLY—Supplemental appropriation of \$1.5 million to UMDNJ for emergency medical services provided to the city of Newark.

Assembly No. 2007, Assemblyman KELLY and Assemblywoman CRECCO—Provides for rate averaging of solid wastes disposed by certain counties in this State.

Assembly No. 2008, Assemblywoman OGDEN and Assemblyman ROMA—Permits a corporation business tax credit or deduction for corporate taxpayer's child care program.

Assembly No. 2009, Assemblywomen OGDEN and RANDALL—The "New Jersey Conservation Corps Act;" appropriates \$2,700,000.

Assembly No. 2010, Assemblywoman OGDEN—Allows the holder of a driver's license to request the issuance of the license in another name under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 2011, Assemblywoman OGDEN—Changes the method of calculating in lieu of tax payments under the New Jersey Public Transportation Act of 1979.

Assembly No. 2012, Assemblywoman OGDEN—Permits administrator of a nursing home or residential care facility to establish reasonable visitation hours for pet visits.

Assembly No. 2013, Assemblywoman OGDEN—Creates a commission to study the establishment of the School of Science, Mathematics and the Humanities, appropriates \$90,000.

Assembly No. 2014, Assemblywoman OGDEN—Allows municipalities to enact ordinances requiring developers to contribute to certain necessary off-tract improvements.

Assembly No. 2015, Assemblywoman OGDEN—"Main Street Managers' Act," assists certain municipalities in employing main street managers, appropriates \$300,000.

Assembly No. 2016, Assemblywoman OGDEN—Provides for loans to counties to construct composting and sludge processing facilities, appropriates \$20,000,000.

Assembly No. 2017, Assemblywoman OGDEN—Directs DEP to establish a N. J. Chemical Waste Disposal Day Program to allow safe disposal of household chemicals.

Assembly No. 2018, Assemblywoman OGDEN and Assemblyman KYRILLOS—Requires DEP to adopt regulations limiting Statewide sulfur dioxide emissions.

Assembly No. 2019, Assemblywoman OGDEN and Assemblyman OTLOWSKI—Requires certain commercial group health insurance policies to provide benefits for treatment of mental illness and establishes minimum benefit levels.

Assembly No. 2020, Assemblywoman OGDEN and Assemblyman OTLOWSKI—Requires HMO's to provide services for treatment of mental illness and establishes minimum service levels.

Assembly No. 2021, Assemblywoman OGDEN and Assemblyman OTLOWSKI—Requires health service corporations to provide benefits for treatment of mental illness and establishes minimum benefit levels.

Assembly No. 2022, Assemblywoman OGDEN and Assemblyman OTLOWSKI—Requires certain commercial individual health insurance policies to provide benefits for treatment of mental illness and establishes minimum benefit levels.

Assembly No. 2023, Assemblywoman OGDEN and Assemblyman OTLOWSKI—Requires medical service corporation contracts to provide benefits for treatment of mental illness and establishes minimum benefit levels.

Assembly No. 2024, Assemblywoman OGDEN and Assemblyman OTLOWSKI—Requires hospital service corporation contracts to provide benefits for treatment of mental illness and establishes minimum benefit levels.

Assembly No. 2025, Assemblywoman OGDEN—Amends the "Municipal Land Use Law" concerning the review of alternative energy facilities.

Assembly No. 2026, Assemblywoman OGDEN—Requires auto insurance agents and carriers to verify and transmit vehicle identification numbers to the National Auto Theft computer upon issuance of coverage and payment of certain claims.

Assembly No. 2027, Assemblywoman OGDEN—Allows boards of education to provide transportation for children who do not live remote from school and to charge the parent for that transportation.

Assembly No. 2028, Assemblywoman OGDEN—Requires BPU to establish certain performance standards and financial penalties and rewards for use in fixing rates for nuclear power plants.

Assembly No. 2029, Assemblywoman OGDEN—Establishes alcohol and drug abuse treatment centers for adolescents, and appropriates \$2,000,000.

Assembly No. 2030, Assemblywoman OGDEN—Requires uniform nursing home application-for-admission form.

Assembly No. 2031, Assemblywoman OGDEN—Requires the Department of Education to employ an Arts Education Specialist who will coordinate and develop arts curricula and appropriates \$50,000.

Assembly No. 2032, Assemblywoman OGDEN—Establishes taxpayer problem resolution unit in the Division of Taxation, Department of Treasury.

Assembly No. 2033, Assemblywoman OGDEN—Establishes pilot project for negotiated environmental rulemaking.

Assembly No. 2034, Assemblywoman OGDEN—Ensures prompt payment to certain child support obligees not paid through probation.

Assembly No. 2035, Assemblywoman OGDEN—Requires health care facilities to notify first aid, ambulance and rescue squads that they are transporting a patient who has AIDS or a contagious, infectious or communicable disease.

Assembly No. 2036, Assemblywoman OGDEN—Authorizes local governments to impose realty transfer fees.

Assembly No. 2038, Assemblywoman OGDEN and Assemblyman ALBOHN—Requires DEP to complete review process for solid waste facilities within certain timeframe, appropriates \$2,400,000 to DEP.

Assembly No. 2039, Assemblywoman OGDEN—Grants tenure to certain public school administrative personnel only for the duration of three-year contracts.

Assembly No. 2040, Assemblywoman OGDEN and Assemblyman KELLY—Requires discounts to be given to certain youthful drivers.

Assembly No. 2041, Assemblywoman OGDEN—Requires municipal courts to give priority to matters involving juveniles.

Assembly No. 2042, Assemblywoman OGDEN—Permits erection of traffic control devices at “public-private” intersections by owner of private road; prescribes conditions.

Assembly No. 2043, Assemblywoman OGDEN—Provides that a conditional use permit may be granted by municipalities for certain historic buildings or structures.

Assembly No. 2044, Assemblywoman OGDEN—Supplemental appropriation for \$122,500 to the Department of Human Services for a grant to the Elizabeth Coalition to House the Homeless.

Assembly No. 2045, Assemblywoman OGDEN—Establishes a program to provide reimbursement to public agencies and private organizations which undertake surveys and studies of historic places, appropriates \$200,000.

Assembly No. 2046, Assemblywoman OGDEN and Assemblyman FRELINGHUYSEN—Creates Commission to Study Historic Preservation.

Assembly No. 2047, Assemblywoman OGDEN and Assemblyman SHINN—"The New Jersey Heritage Trust Fund Act."

Assembly No. 2048, Assemblywoman OGDEN and Assemblyman KYRILLOS—Creates the Department of Natural and Historic Resources.

Assembly No. 2049, Assemblywoman OGDEN—Permits not guilty pleas to be entered by mail for parking offenses.

Assembly No. 2050, Assemblywoman OGDEN and Assemblyman KELLY—Establishes a program of State aid for the major maintenance, resurfacing and betterments of local roads, within the New Jersey Transportation Trust Fund Authority; appropriates \$10 million.

Assembly No. 2051, Assemblywoman OGDEN and Assemblyman SHINN—The "Household Hazardous Waste Management Act."

Assembly No. 2052, Assemblywomen OGDEN and FARRAGHER—Encourages inclusion of child care centers in nonresidential developments.

Assembly No. 2053, Assemblywoman OGDEN—Prohibits inclusion of recreation lands acquired prior to enactment of P. L.1985, c.222 in calculating fair share housing adjustments.

Assembly No. 2054, Assemblywoman OGDEN—Appropriates \$95,000 for the identification of endangered species wetland habitats.

Assembly No. 2055, Assemblywoman OGDEN and Assemblyman FELICE—Regulates the operation of historic preservation commissions.

Assembly No. 2056, Assemblywoman OGDEN and Assemblyman KYRILLOS—Establishes showerhead water conservation program in the Department of Commerce, Energy and Economic Development; appropriates \$450,000.

Assembly No. 2057, Assemblywoman OGDEN—Provides that interest shall be paid on gross income tax refunds paid after 45 days from the filing date.

Assembly No. 2058, Assemblywoman OGDEN and Assemblyman SCHUBER—Provides for the protection and acquisition of watershed and recharge areas; appropriates \$1 million.

Assembly No. 2059, Assemblywoman OGDEN—Increases in some cases the time period for which roll-back property taxes may be due when farmed property is converted to another use.

Assembly No. 2060, Assemblywoman OGDEN and Assemblyman ALBOHN—Imposes a tax on the development of farmland and certain other vacant land.

Assembly No. 2065, Assemblywomen OGDEN and RANDALL—Provides for an educational alternative to participating in animal dissection for certain students.

Assembly No. 2066, Assemblywoman OGDEN and Assemblyman PASCRELL—"The New Jersey Urban Heritage Park System Act."

Assembly No. 2067, Assemblywoman OGDEN and Assemblyman FRANKS—Provides \$500,000 in State aid in matching funds towards the construction of a new facility for the Summit Speech School for the Hearing Impaired.

Assembly No. 2069, Assemblywoman OGDEN and Assemblyman HARDWICK—Requires Port Authority to take certain aircraft noise abatement measures.

Assembly No. 2070, Assemblywoman OGDEN and Assemblyman MATTISON—Supplemental appropriation of \$200,000 to DOH for a grant to Newark Youth At Risk Program.

Assembly No. 2071, Assemblywoman OGDEN—Allows a public utility to include in its rate base costs for researching, marketing, and providing to ratepayers energy-conserving services and products.

Assembly No. 2072, Assemblywoman OGDEN and Assemblyman SCHUBER—Establishes a New Jersey Oversight Commission on the Decommissioning of Nuclear Power Generating Facilities.

Assembly No. 2073, Assemblywoman OGDEN—Removes Hospital Rate Setting Commission from control of DOH.

Assembly No. 2074, Assemblywoman OGDEN—Establishes Endangered Plants Study Commission.

Assembly No. 2075, Assemblyman CHARLES—Includes performing certain public services among the victim criteria courts consider in imposing sentences.

Assembly No. 2076, Assemblyman CHARLES—Requires certain public utilities to pay damages of \$500 a day plus attorneys fees to customers whose service is suspended due to error of utility.

Assembly No. 2077, Assemblyman CHARLES—Permits members of TPAF under service retirement to receive allowance based on last year of creditable service.

Assembly No. 2078, Assemblyman CHARLES—Permits person charged with a second or subsequent drunk driving violation to demand and receive a jury trial.

Assembly No. 2079, Assemblyman CHARLES—Eliminates certain voter challenges and provides a statutory remedy for certain persons denied the right to vote.

Assembly No. 2080, Assemblyman CHARLES—Prohibits certain activities by police officers at polling places.

Assembly No. 2081, Assemblyman CHARLES—Requires corporate owners of multiple dwellings to file certificate of incorporation with the county clerk.

Assembly No. 2082, Assemblyman CHARLES—Directs the New Jersey State Employees Deferred Compensation Board to make the "401 (k)" deferred compensation plan available to municipal, county, local school board and State employees.

Assembly No. 2083, Assemblyman CHARLES—Establishes the "New Jersey Poverty Study Commission" and appropriates \$50,000.

Assembly No. 2084, Assemblyman CHARLES—Authorizes \$200 million in general obligation bonds for financial assistance to fiscally distressed local governments for wastewater treatment systems.

Assembly No. 2085, Assemblyman CHARLES—Establishes an Urban Recreation and Parks Study Commission and appropriates \$50,000.

Assembly No. 2087, Assemblymen CHARLES and BRYANT—The “Distressed Municipalities Aid Act,” provides State aid to certain municipalities, appropriates \$50,000,000.

Assembly No. 2088, Assemblyman CHARLES—Appropriates \$50,000 to the North Hudson Chapter of the American Red Cross and \$49,000 to Cliffside Park for housing services.

Assembly No. 2089, Assemblymen CHARLES and DORIA—Grants 90 day grace period to renew certain real estate sales and brokers’ licenses.

Assembly No. 2090, Assemblyman CHARLES—Permits members of TPAF to purchase credit for temporary service.

Assembly No. 2091, Assemblyman CHARLES and BRYANT—Establishes an income eligibility limitation and lowers the minimum benefit on the homestead tax deduction or credit under the gross income tax.

Assembly No. 2092, Assemblyman CHARLES—Prohibits a public utility from terminating or refusing to provide electric or gas service during cold weather months.

Assembly No. 2093, Assemblyman CHARLES—Provides for State assistance payments for municipal services to public housing.

Assembly No. 2094, Assemblymen CHARLES and WATSON—Designated the “Urban Parks, Gardens and Horticulture Bond Act of 1987,” authorizes issuance of bonds in the amount of \$50 million and appropriates \$5,000.

Assembly No. 2095, Assemblyman CHARLES—Designated the “Urban Recreation Areas and Facilities Bond Act of 1987,” authorizes issuance of bonds in the amount of \$50 million and appropriates \$5,000.

Assembly No. 2096, Assemblyman CHARLES—Provides representation for indigent persons in termination of parental rights proceedings.

Assembly No. 2097, Assemblyman CHARLES—Requires persons selling motor vehicles privately to report changes of ownership to DMV.

Assembly No. 2098, Assemblymen CHARLES and BROWN—Provides for matching grants to urban enterprise zone municipalities in order to fund administrative and marketing costs associated with zone implementation, appropriates \$250,000.

Assembly No. 2099, Assemblymen CHARLES and DORIA—Appropriates \$142,000 to the Hudson County Health Services program.

Assembly No. 2100, Assemblyman CHARLES—Designated the “Developmental Disabilities Equipment Loan Fund Act” and appropriates \$250,000.

Assembly No. 2101, Assemblyman CHARLES, Assemblywoman FORD and Assemblyman Mattison—Includes among the factors that a court is to consider in sentencing a criminal defendant that the offense was motivated by the race, color, religion or national origin of the victim.

Assembly No. 2102, Assemblymen CHARLES and DORIA—Allows certain employees to enroll or reenroll in Hudson County Employees’ Pension Fund.

Assembly No. 2103, Assemblymen CHARLES and DORIA—The “Termination of Parental Rights Act.”

Assembly No. 2104, Assemblymen CHARLES and DORIA—Requires public hearings and gubernatorial and legislative approval of certain concessions to be located on State park lands.

Assembly No. 2105, Assemblyman CHARLES and Assemblywoman BUSH—Establishes the C. Clyde Ferguson Law Scholarships, appropriates \$200,000.

Assembly No. 2106, Assemblyman CHARLES—Establishes State aid program for recreation facilities and programs in certain municipalities; appropriates \$5,000,000.

Assembly No. 2107, Assemblymen CHARLES and DORIA—Appropriates \$90,000 to the Hudson County Association for Retarded Citizens.

Assembly No. 2108, Assemblyman CHARLES—Supplemental appropriation for \$60,000 to the Department of Health to fund a pulmonary function screening grant in Jersey City.

Assembly No. 2109, Assemblymen CHARLES and DORIA—Provides for deferrals of post-revaluation property tax increases for certain senior and disabled homeowners.

Assembly No. 2110, Assemblyman CHARLES—Permits municipal sale of residential properties with ground floor commercial units to nonprofit corporations for rehabilitation.

Assembly No. 2111, Assemblyman CHARLES—“New Jersey Collision Damage Waiver Act.”

Assembly No. 2112, Assemblymen CHARLES and DORIA—Directs the Chancellor of Higher Education to establish a Minority Undergraduate Fellowship Program; appropriates \$110,000.

Assembly No. 2113, Assemblyman CHARLES—Provides for the preparation and publication of an ethnic history of New Jersey; appropriates \$95,000.

Assembly No. 2114, Assemblymen CHARLES and DORIA—Requires air conditioning on certain buses.

Assembly No. 2115, Assemblyman CHARLES—Permits certain county employees to rejoin county pension fund and purchase credit for prior service.

Assembly No. 2116, Assemblymen CHARLES and MENENDEZ—Supplemental appropriation of \$95,000 to Hispanic/Women and Ethnic Affairs Office of Jersey City.

Assembly No. 2117, Assemblyman CHARLES—Concerns chromium contamination in Hudson county, and makes appropriation from Spill Compensation Fund.

Assembly No. 2118, Assemblymen CHARLES and WATSON—Provides that a person who brings a legal action pursuant to the "Law Against Discrimination" or the "Conscientious Employee Protection Act" is entitled to a jury trial.

Assembly No. 2119, Assemblymen CHARLES and BRYANT—Establishes Office on Minority Health and appropriates \$500,000.

Assembly No. 2120, Assemblyman ROCCO—Prohibits sale of certain non-biodegradable feminine hygiene devices.

Assembly No. 2121, Assemblyman ROCCO—Makes littering a petty disorderly persons offense punishable by fine and community service.

Assembly No. 2122, Assemblyman ROCCO—Appropriates \$170,000 for Marine Police boating safety education programs.

Assembly No. 2123, Assemblyman ROCCO—Provides that one-twelfth of the six cent surtax on cigarettes be deposited in the Cancer Research Fund and annually appropriated to the N. J. Comm. on Cancer Research.

Assembly No. 2124, Assemblyman ROCCO—Requires standardized test agencies to release certain information relating to tests to those taking them.

Assembly No. 2125, Assemblyman ROCCO—Requires notice to be sent to taxpayers of certain real property tax deductions and rebates.

Assembly No. 2126, Assemblyman ROCCO—Requires certain nonprofessional school district employees to be paid the State minimum wage.

Assembly No. 2127, Assemblyman ROCCO—Provides for a uniform 3 year period of limitations for the assessment of tax deficiencies and claims for refunds under various business taxes.

Assembly No. 2128, Assemblyman ROCCO—Requires a person who manufactures a recording containing a subliminal message or who transmits a subliminal message by electronic or telecommunication to warn persons likely to receive the message of its presence.

Assembly No. 2129, Assemblyman ROCCO—Exempts licensed firearms dealers and their registered employees from certain prohibitions relating to the possession of firearms under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 2130, Assemblymen ROCCO and KAMIN—Enhances penalty for illegally passing school bus.

Assembly No. 2131, Assemblyman ROCCO—Removes the requirement that a person standing in loco parentis be within the household in order to be guilty of aggravated sexual assault.

Assembly No. 2132, Assemblyman ROCCO—Requires owners of fire damaged property to reimburse municipal and volunteer fire companies for the costs of certain extinguishing agents.

Assembly No. 2133, Assemblyman ROCCO—Permits the employment of children age 14 or older in cooperative vocational programs if ordered by a judge for the purpose of rehabilitating juvenile delinquents.

Assembly No. 2134, Assemblyman ROCCO—Provides paternity leave equal to maternity leave for members of TPAF.

Assembly No. 2135, Assemblyman ROCCO—Permits members of TPAF to purchase pension credit for paternity leave.

Assembly No. 2136, Assemblyman ROCCO—Increases maternity or paternity leave for public employees to 2 years.

Assembly No. 2137, Assemblyman ROCCO—Permits members of PERS to purchase service credit for maternity or paternity leave.

Assembly No. 2138, Assemblyman ROCCO—Provides that driving schools, art schools, or music or dance schools do not have to collect unemployment taxes from instructors working on commission basis.

Assembly No. 2139, Assemblyman ROCCO—Regulates disposal of human fetal tissue and provides criminal penalties for violations.

Assembly No. 2140, Assemblyman ROCCO—Provides for the fingerprinting and photographing of persons arrested for certain disorderly persons offenses.

Assembly No. 2141, Assemblyman ROCCO—Provides for the direct reimbursement of certain physiological laboratory services under medical service corporation and health service corporation contracts.

Assembly No. 2142, Assemblymen ROCCO and Salmon—Establishes a South Jersey Center for Doctoral Studies, appropriates \$30,000.

Assembly No. 2143, Assemblyman ROCCO—Allows credit under State income tax for certain late payments of foreign taxes.

Assembly No. 2144, Assemblyman ROCCO—Exempts port authorities from the payment of motor vehicle registration fees.

Assembly No. 2145, Assemblyman ROCCO—Creates a special unit to handle parental abduction cases in the Department of Law and Public Safety, appropriates \$110,000.

Assembly No. 2146, Assemblyman ROCCO—Amends the law on interference with custody.

Assembly No. 2147, Assemblymen ROCCO and SHUSTED—Establishes a youth vocational education pilot program in the Department of Corrections, Division of Juvenile Services and appropriates \$3,000,000.

Assembly No. 2148, Assemblymen ROCCO and SHUSTED—Requires a fire district creating a paid fire department to fill newly created positions from membership of volunteer fire company presently serving the fire district.

Assembly No. 2149, Assemblymen ROCCO and SHUSTED—Allows a handicapped person who is a veteran with a service-connected disability to obtain a disabled veteran identification card and a disabled veteran motor vehicle placard.

Assembly No. 2150, Assemblymen ROCCO and DORIA—Provides for the registration as a public accountant of individuals who meet certain educational and examination requirements.

Assembly No. 2151, Assemblymen ROCCO and SHUSTED—Appropriates \$25,000 to Women Against Rape of Collingswood, N.J. for services to rape victims.

Assembly No. 2152, Assemblymen ROCCO and Naples—Renames the Governor's Annual Award for Outstanding Teaching as the Governor's Christa McAuliffe Annual Award for Outstanding Teaching.

Assembly No. 2153, Assemblymen ROCCO and SHUSTED—Clarifies procedure for officer or member of non-civil service police department to appeal disciplinary action to Superior Court.

Assembly No. 2154, Assemblyman ROCCO—Establishes a Division of Aquaculture in the Department of Agriculture and transfers certain functions, powers, duties, personnel and equipment relating to the shellfish industry from the DEP to the Division of Aquaculture.

Assembly No. 2155, Assemblyman ROCCO—Creates the "Municipal Court Drug Enforcement Reimbursement Fund."

Assembly No. 2156, Assemblymen ROCCO and SHUSTED—Preserves the right of public employees to purchase credit for prior service, temporary service, and leaves of absence when enrolled in a new retirement system.

Assembly No. 2157, Assemblyman ROCCO—Provides that certain school district employees shall be eligible for coverage under the State Health Benefits Program Act.

Assembly No. 2158, Assemblyman ROCCO—Appropriates \$1,148,000 to provide first-year operating support for Center for Agricultural Molecular Biology.

Assembly No. 2159, Assemblyman ROCCO—Appropriates \$75,000 to the Burn Foundation of Philadelphia for prevention and education programs.

Assembly No. 2160, Assemblyman ROCCO—Directs DOT to alleviate certain flooding conditions along Highway 130 in Camden county and appropriates \$2.5 million therefor.

Assembly No. 2161, Assemblyman ROCCO—Permits school districts to provide temporary financing of capital projects for 7 years after bond approval by the voters.

Assembly No. 2162, Assemblyman ROCCO—Permits municipalities to establish speed limits within school zones and certain school crossings.

Assembly No. 2163, Assemblyman ROCCO—The “Freshwater Wetlands Municipal Property Tax Stabilization Act,” appropriates \$5,000,000.

Assembly No. 2164, Assemblyman ROCCO—Transfers natural resource divisions from DEP to DOA.

Assembly No. 2165, Assemblyman ROCCO—The “Freshwater Wetlands Mapping Act,” appropriates \$10,165,000.

Assembly No. 2166, Assemblyman ROCCO—Appropriates \$200,000 to the Department of Education for the Library for the Blind.

Assembly No. 2167, Assemblymen ROCCO and SHUSTED—Lowers minimum age requirement for paid firefighters from 21 to 18.

Assembly No. 2168, Assemblymen ROCCO and SHUSTED—Provides that county juvenile detention officers are subject to compulsory arbitration.

Assembly No. 2169, Assemblymen ROCCO and SHUSTED—Increases the penalty for the illegal disposal of hypodermic needles or syringes.

Assembly No. 2170, Assemblymen ROCCO and SHUSTED—Permits military personnel and federal employees assigned overseas duty to terminate liability insurance on stored motor vehicles without surrendering registration plates.

Assembly No. 2171, Assemblymen ROCCO and SHUSTED—Supplemental appropriation of \$56,000 to the Division of Developmental Disabilities in the Department of Human Services for a grant to the Bancroft School.

Assembly No. 2172, Assemblymen ROCCO, SHUSTED and Naples—Requires standard, permanent certification for employment as a school principal.

Assembly No. 2173, Assemblymen ROCCO and SHUSTED—Appropriates \$10 million to DOT to construct noise barriers along I-295 in Cherry Hill Township and Haddon Heights.

Assembly No. 2174, Assemblymen ROCCO and SHUSTED—Requires circulators of certain petitions to be registered voters and signatories to the petition, and requires that they shall receive no compensation for their efforts.

Assembly No. 2175, Assemblymen ROCCO and SHUSTED—Includes certain handicapped persons in the definition of minority business for the purposes of the "Set-Aside Act for Small Businesses, Female Businesses, and Minority Businesses."

Assembly No. 2176, Assemblymen ROCCO and SHUSTED—Requires school districts which provide courtesy transportation to public school pupils to also provide it for nonpublic school pupils.

Assembly No. 2177, Assemblymen ROCCO and SHUSTED—Modifies seniority standards for certain public school employees.

Assembly No. 2178, Assemblymen ROCCO and SHUSTED—Permits development of alternatives to recycling and resource recovery technologies by counties.

Assembly No. 2179, Assemblymen ROCCO and SPADORO—Requires a uniform system of student identification at colleges and universities.

Assembly No. 2180, Assemblyman ROCCO—Requires institutions of higher education to submit alcohol policies to the Chancellor of Higher Education and the Director of the Division of Alcoholic Beverage Control.

Assembly No. 2181, Assemblyman ROCCO—Requires the chancellor to monitor and report on incidents of violence and hazing on college campuses.

Assembly No. 2182, Assemblymen ROCCO and SHUSTED—Specifies that filing of papers with Superior Court by police officer or firefighter is required for review of disciplinary board decision.

Assembly No. 2183, Assemblyman ROCCO—Requires test agencies to obtain written consent from test subjects for taking experimental sections of certain standardized tests.

Assembly No. 2184, Assemblymen ROCCO and SHUSTED—Supplemental appropriation of \$232,000 to DOL to reimburse certain vocational rehabilitation organizations for costs of disposing unusable donations.

Assembly No. 2185, Assemblymen ROCCO and SHUSTED—Appropriates \$25,000 to SOLACE for the construction of new shelter for victims of domestic violence.

Assembly No. 2186, Assemblymen ROCCO and PASCRELL—Requires study of Rutgers and BPU of environmental and economic impacts of resource recovery facilities and sewage sludge incinerators; appropriates \$75,000.

Assembly No. 2187, Assemblymen ROCCO and SHUSTED—Appropriates \$100,000 to Department of Transportation for a grant to PENJERDEL Regional Foundation for lighting of Benjamin Franklin Bridge.

Assembly No. 2190, Assemblymen ROCCO and SHUSTED—Prohibits the destruction of a national or religious symbol.

Assembly No. 2191, Assemblymen ROCCO and STUHLTRAGER—Permits arrest or search warrants to be electronically transmitted.

Assembly No. 2192, Assemblymen ROCCO and ROMA—“Solid Waste Disposal Alternative Technologies Bond Act of 1989,” authorizes bonds for \$50 million, and appropriates \$5,000.

Assembly No. 2193, Assemblymen ROCCO and SHUSTED—Limits adjournments in DYFS guardianship proceedings for ill and hard to place children.

Assembly No. 2194, Assemblymen ROCCO and SHUSTED—Validates Voorhees Fire District No. 3, Camden County, bond issue.

Assembly No. 2195, Assemblyman ROCCO—Appropriates \$75,000 to “Helping Hands” Senior Citizens Volunteer Service Exchange program at Our Lady of Lourdes Hospital.

Assembly No. 2196, Assemblyman ROCCO—Permits sale of historic motor vehicles at government facilities on Sunday.

Assembly No. 2197, Assemblyman SPADORO—Permits nondurable medical supplies to be included under the “Pharmaceutical Assistance to the Aged and Disabled” program, according to standards established for the State Medicaid program.

Assembly No. 2198, Assemblyman SPADORO—Establishes a Meals for Discharged Patients Program for patients recently discharged from hospitals who are homebound by reason of recuperation, illness or disability, appropriates \$1,000,000 to the Department of Human Services.

Assembly No. 2199, Assemblymen SPADORO and PELLY—Excludes Social Security payments received by the spouse of a person receiving care in a veterans facility from the formula of financial ability to pay.

Assembly No. 2200, Assemblyman SPADORO—Provides individual cause of action for unfair practices in the settlement of insurance claims.

Assembly No. 2201, Assemblyman SPADORO—Establishes a deposit on beverage containers sold in this State.

Assembly No. 2202, Assemblymen SPADORO and PELLY—Bans sale of plastic containers.

Assembly No. 2203, Assemblymen SPADORO, FRANKS and Shinn—Provides stronger regional planning role for counties and appropriates \$2,000,000.

Assembly No. 2204, Assemblyman SPADORO—Requires licensing of resource recovery incineration facility operators and prohibits operation of a facility in the absence of a licensed operator or by an unlicensed operator.

Assembly No. 2205, Assemblyman SPADORO—Requires testing of resource recovery facility ash; provides for siting of ash disposal facilities.

Assembly No. 2206, Assemblymen SPADORO and DOYLE—Establishes the New Jersey Veterans Assistance Trust Fund; appropriates \$2 million.

Assembly No. 2207, Assemblymen SPADORO and PELLY—Directs the Department of Transportation to construct a noise barrier on Route 287 in Edison.

Assembly No. 2208, Assemblymen SPADORO and MAZUR—Establishes Korean Veterans' Memorial Committee and creates Korean Veterans' Memorial Fund; appropriates \$50,000.

Assembly No. 2209, Assemblyman SPADORO—Appropriates \$100,000 to Department of Military and Veterans' Affairs to establish Alzheimer's Disease unit at the New Jersey Veterans Memorial Home—Menlo Park.

Assembly No. 2210, Assemblymen SPADORO and PASCRELL—Requires DEP to establish and enforce standards for resource recovery facilities.

Assembly No. 2211, Assemblyman SPADORO—Creates the AIDS Vaccine and Drug Research and Development Grant Program and appropriates \$20,000,000.

Assembly No. 2212, Assemblyman SPADORO—Imposes criminal penalties for illegal disposal of medical waste and increases criminal penalty for illegal disposal of hazardous waste.

Assembly No. 2213, Assemblymen SPADORO and PELLY—Provides for enforcement of municipal recycling ordinances.

Assembly No. 2214, Assemblyman SPADORO—Appropriates \$1,500,000 to DEP to hire additional solid waste enforcement officers.

Assembly No. 2215, Assemblyman SPADORO—Requires DEP to adopt criteria for approving permits for regional land-based sludge disposal sites.

Assembly No. 2216, Assemblymen SPADORO, PATERO and Cimino—Mandates preparation of Raritan River Recreation Plan; appropriates \$95,000.

Assembly No. 2217, Assemblyman SPADORO—Directs DEP to undertake ecological study of Spotswood Outlier in Middlesex County, appropriates \$200,000.

Assembly No. 2218, Assemblyman SPADORO—"Solid Waste Reduction and Recycling Act of 1989."

Assembly No. 2219, Assemblyman SPADORO—Supplemental appropriation for \$7,500,000 for grants to latchkey programs.

Assembly No. 2220, Assemblyman SPADORO—Supplemental appropriation of \$35 million to offset revenue deficiencies of the New Jersey Transit Corporation for FY 1990.

Assembly No. 2221, Assemblyman SPADORO—Establishes a deposit and refund value on all automotive or marine-type batteries and all other batteries sold in this State.

Assembly No. 2258, Assemblywoman FARRAGHER—Requires condominium governing board meetings be open to all unit owners and held upon adequate notice.

Assembly No. 2301, Assemblyman ARNONE—Establishes an “Adopt a Beach” program in DEP.

Assembly No. 2302, Assemblyman ARNONE—Establishes an early child endorsement to the teacher’s certificate.

Assembly No. 2303, Assemblyman ARNONE—Imposes strict liability for certain oil spills.

Assembly No. 2304, Assemblyman ARNONE—Provides that form DD-214 shall be accepted as proof of service for qualifying for veterans’ benefits.

Assembly No. 2305, Assemblyman ARNONE—Requires the coloring and labelling of caps for residential home heating oil tank fill pipes.

Assembly No. 2306, Assemblyman ARNONE and Assemblywoman FARRAGHER—Authorizes Department of Military and Veterans’ Affairs to sell certain surplus real property in Red Bank, Monmouth County.

Assembly No. 2307, Assemblywoman BUSH—Establishes the Child Care Facilities Incentive Assistance Fund and appropriates \$4,000,000.

Assembly No. 2308, Assemblywoman BUSH—Establishes the “Child Care Facilities Grant Program” in the Department of Human Services and appropriates \$2,000,000.

Assembly No. 2317, Assemblyman FRANKS—Requires “Planned Real Estate Development Full Disclosure Act”.

Assembly No. 2318, Assemblymen FRANKS and STUHLTRAGER—The “State Employee Growth Limitation Act.”

Assembly No. 2319, Assemblymen FRANKS and HUDAK—Designated the “New Products, New Jobs Act of 1988,” authorizes bonds for \$20 million, and appropriates \$5,000.

Assembly No. 2320, Assemblyman FRANKS and Assemblywoman OGDEN—Requires DOT to make State and interstate highway traffic noise level and impact studies and to take noise abatement measures under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 2321, Assemblyman FRANKS—Requires State agencies to accept attorneys’ checks as the equivalent of certified checks or money orders and imposes penalty on the attorneys who write nonnegotiable checks payable to the State.

Assembly No. 2322, Assemblyman FRANKS—Establishes a Pension and Health Benefits Review Commission; appropriates \$90,000.

Assembly No. 2323, Assemblymen FRANKS and ROMA—Permits resident taxpayers who claim gross income tax credit for taxes paid to other jurisdictions to receive deduction and refund, if applicable, for property taxes paid or rent constituting property tax.

Assembly No. 2324, Assemblyman FRANKS—Establishes a grant program in the State Council on the Arts for youth musical organizations, appropriates \$250,000.

Assembly No. 2325, Assemblyman FRANKS—Creates a center for the hearing impaired at Union County College and appropriates \$75,000.

Assembly No. 2326, Assemblyman FRANKS—Amends the “Continuing Care Retirement Community Regulation and Financial Disclosure Act” concerning liquid reserves.

Assembly No. 2327, Assemblyman FRANKS—Exempts from property tax property of a tax-exempt organization which is leased to an approved for-profit school for the handicapped.

Assembly No. 2328, Assemblymen FRANKS and STUHLTRAGER—The “State Payment for State Mandates Act;” requires full State funding of programs and services imposed upon counties and municipalities to perform.

Assembly No. 2329, Assemblymen FRANKS and PENN—“Noise Barrier Construction Bond Act of 1990,” authorizes bonds for \$40 million, and appropriates \$5,000.

Assembly No. 2330, Assemblymen FRANKS and FELICE—Provides for forfeiture of vehicles used in unlawful solid waste disposal activities.

Assembly No. 2331, Assemblyman FRANKS—Provides additional methods by which a voter may declare or change political party affiliation.

Assembly No. 2332, Assemblyman FRANKS and Assemblywoman CRECCO—Creates a New Jersey Privatization Study Commission; appropriates \$50,000.

Assembly No. 2333, Assemblyman FRANKS—Provides that chairmen of State political party committees shall receive certain election information after a primary or a general election.

Assembly No. 2334, Assemblyman FRANKS—The “Office of Permit Resolution Act”; appropriates \$140,000.

Assembly No. 2335, Assemblyman FRANKS—Establishes Office of Regulatory Services, revises the Administrative Procedure Act and appropriates \$200,000.

Assembly No. 2339, Assemblyman FRANKS—Provides training for workers over 55 who cannot receive training because of lack of certain federal funds; appropriates \$400,000.

Assembly No. 2340, Assemblyman FRANKS—Requires the testing of certain applicants for motor vehicle driver’s licenses for the use of controlled dangerous substances.

Assembly No. 2341, Assemblyman FRANKS—Requires BPU to consolidate expenses and revenues of all affiliated companies in finding a rate base for a transfer station.

Assembly No. 2342, Assemblyman FRANKS—Provides annual economic benefit to involuntary host municipalities in which transfer stations are located.

Assembly No. 2343, Assemblyman FRANKS—Requires transfer stations to furnish a performance bond or maintain an escrow

account under Board of Public Utilities supervision to finance cost of refunding excessive rates or charges to consumers.

Assembly No. 2344, Assemblyman FRANKS—Requires direct payment by municipalities of solid waste transfer station fees and charges.

Assembly No. 2345, Assemblyman FRANKS—"County Housing Opportunity Fund Act," appropriates \$100,000.

Assembly No. 2346, Assemblymen FRANKS and KELLY—Establishes three year youthful offender rehabilitation pilot program for first time non-violent youthful offenders; appropriates \$500,000.

Assembly No. 2347, Assemblyman FRANKS and Assemblywoman CRECCO—Requires forfeiture of motor vehicles in drug distribution crimes; creates presumption as to intent to distribute.

Assembly No. 2348, Assemblymen FRANKS and ROMA—Establishes penalties for unlawful discrimination in the sale or rental of housing.

Assembly No. 2349, Assemblyman FRANKS—Clarifies property subject to forfeiture and requires the filing of civil forfeiture actions in certain situations.

Assembly No. 2350, Assemblyman FRANKS and Assemblywoman CRECCO—Provides that drug-related murders are subject to capital punishment and increases the penalty for drug-related assaults against law enforcement officers.

Assembly No. 2351, Assemblyman FRANKS—Prevents the acquisition of school property leased to another school district or school for the handicapped until the expiration of the lease term.

Assembly No. 2352, Assemblyman FRANKS—Amends 1990 budget to allow HMFA flexibility to construct new boarding houses.

Assembly No. 2353, Assemblyman DOYLE—Improves the formula for computing retirement allowances for certain PERS and TPAF members retiring on deferred, early, service or ordinary disability retirement allowances.

Assembly No. 2354, Assemblyman DOYLE—Increases the percentage adjustment for retirants subject to Pension Adjustment Act from 60% to 100%.

Assembly No. 2357, Assemblyman SCHLUTER—Provides alternate procedure for filling vacancy on county board of chosen freeholders.

Assembly No. 2358, Assemblyman SCHLUTER—Requires joggers to wear reflective material at night.

Assembly No. 2359, Assemblymen SCHLUTER and PENN—Appropriates \$2,027,600 for improvements to Delaware and Raritan Canal State Park.

Assembly No. 2360, Assemblyman SCHLUTER—Amends implied consent law to allow for blood or urine testing to determine use of intoxicating liquors or controlled dangerous substances; permits use of portable roadside breath analyzers.

Assembly No. 2361, Assemblyman SCHLUTER—Clarifies measurement of alcohol concentration in blood or breath for drunk driving.

Assembly No. 2369, Assemblymen SCHLUTER and DORIA—Establishes requirements for removing, abandoning, or placing temporarily out-of-service residential heating oil storage tanks.

Assembly No. 2370, Assemblyman SCHLUTER—Provides limited confidentiality of certain motor vehicle information.

Assembly No. 2371, Assemblymen BAER and MAZUR—Requires that conversion of rental housing be agreed to by tenants and approved by municipal governing body.

Assembly No. 2372, Assemblyman BAER—Requires that conversion of rental housing be agreed to by tenants and approved by municipal governing body.

Assembly No. 2490, Assemblywoman RANDALL—Establishes standards and procedures for sale of property by parking authorities.

Assembly No. 2491, Assemblywoman RANDALL—Creates the “Furniture Fire Safety Act.”

Assembly No. 2492, Assemblywoman RANDALL and Assemblyman SCHUBER—Establishes the New Jersey Health Care Directive Act.

Assembly No. 2493, Assemblywoman RANDALL—Provides for acquisition of certain real properties by DEP; appropriates \$12,300,000.

Assembly No. 2494, Assemblywoman RANDALL and Assemblyman LITTELL—Requires posting of notices on licensed premises warning about alcohol consumption during pregnancy.

Assembly No. 2702, Assemblyman MARTIN—Extends to certain senior and disabled voters the right to vote by absentee ballot and permits them to request applications for all future elections.

Assembly No. 2703, Assemblyman MARTIN—Enacts chapter 19A of Title 3B known as the “Revised Uniform Principal and Income A Act.”

Assembly No. 2704, Assemblyman MARTIN—Provides immunity from civil liability in certain circumstances to insurers for certain consultation services.

Assembly No. 2705, Assemblyman MARTIN—Enables municipalities to advertise ordinances in a summary form.

Assembly No. 2706, Assemblyman MARTIN—Appropriates \$75,000 to the Department of Environmental Protection to complete a one-year Green Way plan.

Assembly No. 2707, Assemblyman MARTIN—Permits the governing body of any municipality to adopt PFRS by an ordinance approved by at least two-thirds of its members.

Assembly No. 2708, Assemblyman MARTIN—Revises “The New Jersey Campaign Contributions and Expenditures Reporting Act;” expands the disclosure and regulation of contributions received by certain public officials.

Assembly No. 2709, Assemblyman MARTIN—Requires municipalities to adopt ordinances limiting solid waste collections to twice weekly pickups and two containers per household.

Assembly No. 2710, Assemblymen MARTIN and HAYTAIAN—Defines eligibility for emergency assistance to AFDC recipients and requires State assumption of costs under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 2711, Assemblyman MARTIN—Establishes Vacancy Review Board; appropriates \$70,000.

Assembly No. 2712, Assemblyman MARTIN—Increases the maximum claim allowed in small claims section of Superior Court.

Assembly No. 2713, Assemblyman MARTIN—Requires Office of Legislative Services to tape-record meetings of the Legislature and legislative committees and provides for public access to the tapes; appropriates \$95,000.

Assembly No. 2714, Assemblyman MARTIN—Establishes a deposit on beverage containers sold in this State.

Assembly No. 2715, Assemblyman MARTIN—Requires Unsatisfied Claim and Judgment Fund claimant for personal injury pro-

tection (PIP) benefits to demonstrate lack of coverage under any liability policy before recovery.

Assembly No. 2716, Assemblyman MARTIN—Regulates employment agencies and related services and firms.

Assembly No. 2717, Assemblyman MARTIN—Permits members of PERS to purchase credit for service in certain schools within and outside the United States.

Assembly No. 2718, Assemblyman MARTIN—Designates certain solid waste disposal activities as disorderly persons offenses.

Assembly No. 2719, Assemblyman MARTIN—Directs DMV to redesign drivers' licenses to permit licensees to identify themselves as organ donors; appropriates \$600,000.

Assembly No. 2720, Assemblyman MARTIN—Creates State Investment Council Study Commission; appropriates \$50,000.

Assembly No. 2721, Assemblymen MARTIN and PENN—Provides for regulation of rental-purchase agreements.

Assembly No. 2722, Assemblymen MARTIN and GIRGENTI—Designates the Legislative Staff Building as the "Garret A. Hobart Legislative Staff Building."

Assembly No. 2723, Assemblyman MARTIN—Repeals law requiring the Secretary of State to reimburse the counties for new voter registrants and \$.50 per registrant.

Assembly No. 2724, Assemblyman MARTIN—Allows municipalities to impose 3% hotel room occupancy tax.

Assembly No. 2725, Assemblyman MARTIN—Requires smoke detectors in one- and two-family dwellings constructed before January 1, 1977.

Assembly No. 2726, Assemblyman MARTIN—Requires court appointed overseer of rehearing of certain local actions voided by failure to comply with "Open Public Meetings Act."

Assembly No. 2727, Assemblyman MARTIN—Provides for automatic adjustment of restrictions on various amounts relating to campaigning for office of Governor under "The New Jersey Campaign Contributions and Expenditures Reporting Act."

Assembly No. 2728, Assemblyman MARTIN—Expands scope of "New Jersey Insurance Fraud Prevention Act."

Assembly No. 2729, Assemblyman MARTIN—Changes amount of fees for certain corporate filings with Secretary of State.

Assembly No. 2730, Assemblymen MARTIN and SCHUBER—Makes the SCI a permanent commission.

Assembly No. 2731, Assemblyman MARTIN—Creates a State Board of Public Movers and Warehousemen to replace the State Advisory Board of Public Movers and Warehousemen.

Assembly No. 2732, Assemblymen MARTIN and DE CROCE—Requires the maintaining of only personal protection auto insurance; eliminates mandatory liability.

Assembly No. 2733, Assemblymen MARTIN and DE CROCE—Prohibits the discharge of certain substances into waters of this State and imposes penalties for violations.

Assembly No. 2734, Assemblymen MARTIN and DE CROCE—Requires signer of a nominating petition for a candidate to also supply his full name printed clearly.

Assembly No. 2735, Assemblyman MARTIN—Increases penalties for violations of “The New Jersey Campaign Contributions and Expenditures Reporting Act.”

Assembly No. 2736, Assemblymen MARTIN and SCHLUTER—Changes deadline by which voter must declare change of affiliation with a political party to be eligible to vote in primary election of new party.

Assembly No. 2737, Assemblymen MARTIN and KELLY—Makes new regulations concerning septic systems prospective.

Assembly No. 2738, Assemblyman MARTIN—Permits commission payment to real estate brokers for lease of public property.

Assembly No. 2739, Assemblyman MARTIN—Extends period for DOT and DEP indemnification of contractors.

Assembly No. 2740, Assemblyman MARTIN—Makes permissive the presently mandatory requirement for investigation of voter registry lists every four years.

Assembly No. 2741, Assemblymen MARTIN and CIMINO—Supplemental appropriation of \$21,000 to the Division of Elections to update census maps.

Assembly No. 2742, Assemblyman MARTIN—Makes shipper liable for overweight trucks.

Assembly No. 2743, Assemblyman HUDAK—Authorizes sale of surplus real property owned by Department of Corrections.

Assembly No. 2744, Assemblyman HUDAK—Supplements “Fair Housing Act” to give municipalities a credit against their fair share obligation for certain units of military housing.

Assembly No. 2745, Assemblyman HUDAK—Conditions State permission to operate rooming or boarding house on issuance of certificate of compliance by municipality.

Assembly No. 2746, Assemblyman HUDAK—Makes assault upon persons 60 years of age or older “aggravated assault.”

Assembly No. 2747, Assemblyman HUDAK—Requires generator to report recyclable hazardous wastes, and justify their disposal.

Assembly No. 2748, Assemblyman HUDAK—Prohibits a person from reporting to the Division of Motor Vehicles a post office box as his address when registering a motor vehicle.

Assembly No. 2749, Assemblyman HUDAK—Requires Port Authority to compensate local governments for lost ratables.

Assembly No. 2750, Assemblyman HUDAK—Requires municipal utilities authority to obtain Board of Public Utilities approval for rate increases.

Assembly No. 2751, Assemblyman HUDAK—Prohibits acceptance of medical waste at a transfer station without approval of host municipality.

Assembly No. 2752, Assemblymen HUDAK and COHEN—Requires local authorities to hold public hearings on their annual budgets.

Assembly No. 2753, Assemblymen HUDAK and DUCH—Sets certain employment standards and qualifies term of office and appointment of members and employees of certain authorities.

Assembly No. 2754, Assemblymen HUDAK and ROONEY—Requires weekly unannounced inspections by DEP of certain sewerage and municipal utilities construction projects, appropriates \$95,000.

Assembly No. 2755, Assemblymen HUDAK and DEVERIN—Requires licensure of certain owners and operators of hazardous waste facilities as precondition to site review process.

Assembly No. 2756, Assemblyman HUDAK—Provides property tax relief for certain senior and disabled citizens.

Assembly No. 2757, Assemblymen MENENDEZ and KENNY—Requires the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey to notify the Legislature of any development to be undertaken in the port district on a parcel of land of at least five acres.

Assembly No. 2758, Assemblymen MENENDEZ and KENNY—Establishes the offense of ethnic intimidation.

Assembly No. 2759, Assemblymen MENENDEZ and KENNY—Provides for enhanced penalties for certain criminal offenses motivated by ethnic intimidation.

Assembly No. 2760, Assemblymen MENENDEZ and KENNY—Requires new police officers receive Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) training.

Assembly No. 2761, Assemblymen MENENDEZ and KENNY—“Housing Incentive Zones Act.”

Assembly No. 2762, Assemblymen MENENDEZ, BRYANT and Mattison—Supplemental appropriation of \$80,000,000 for distressed municipalities.

Assembly No. 2763, Assemblymen MENENDEZ and KENNY—Provides for a sharing by the State of certain State surplus revenues with municipalities for the purpose of offsetting revaluation induced tax increases for property taxpayers.

Assembly No. 2764, Assemblymen MENENDEZ and KENNY—Provides for postponements of certain revaluations.

Assembly No. 2765, Assemblymen MENENDEZ and CHARLES—Requires counties whose per capita welfare expenditures are below the Statewide average to assist counties whose per capita welfare expenditures are above the Statewide average.

Assembly No. 2766, Assemblymen MENENDEZ and KENNY—Appropriates \$50,000 to the Hudson County Association for Retarded Citizens.

Assembly No. 2767, Assemblymen MENENDEZ and KENNY—Supplemental appropriation of \$50,000 for an Arts Council grant to the Veronica Veil Theatre of Union City.

Assembly No. 2768, Assemblymen MENENDEZ and KENNY—Appropriates \$100,000 to North Hudson Regional Communications Center.

Assembly No. 2769, Assemblymen MENENDEZ and KENNY—Grants \$660,000 to Union City for additional aid to distressed municipalities funding.

Assembly No. 2770, Assemblymen MENENDEZ and SHUSTED—Supplements the statutory rules of evidence concerning the admissibility of the DNA print test in criminal matters.

Assembly No. 2771, Assemblymen MENENDEZ—Requires Commissioner of Labor to establish a Hispanic Employment Promotion Project; appropriates \$90,000.

Assembly No. 2772, Assemblymen MENENDEZ and KENNY—Provides for forfeited property, in cases involving controlled dangerous substances, to be shared with the municipality where the offense occurred.

Assembly No. 2773, Assemblymen MENENDEZ and KENNY—Requires the posting of notice in certain licensed premises concerning consumption of alcoholic beverages.

Assembly No. 2774, Assemblymen MENENDEZ and VILLAPIANO—Requires nonresident taxpayers under New Jersey gross income tax to compute income tax by prorating tax upon all income by the ratio of New Jersey source income to all income.

Assembly No. 2775, Assemblymen MENENDEZ and KENNY—Revises the “emergency transportation tax act,” reimposes the tax under certain circumstances and provides for use and refunds of certain collections.

Assembly No. 2776, Assemblymen MENENDEZ and KENNY—Requires Board of Nursing to offer competency evaluations for homemaker-home health aides in English and Spanish.

Assembly No. 2777, Assemblymen MENENDEZ and KENNY—Increases penalties for the offense of lewdness committed in presence of minor and committed near school property.

Assembly No. 2778, Assemblymen MENENDEZ and KENNY—Increases penalties for the offenses of false imprisonment if a child victim is involved or if committed near school property.

Assembly No. 2779, Assemblymen MENENDEZ and KENNY—The “Municipal Lottery Law;” authorizes urban aid municipalities to establish lotteries to raise revenue for the support of the municipal government.

Assembly No. 2781, Assemblyman MENENDEZ—Authorizes municipalities to make certain appointments to their police departments.

Assembly No. 2782, Assemblymen MENENDEZ and DORIA—Appropriates \$250,000 for the Ethnolinguistic Academic Preparation program.

Assembly No. 2783, Assemblyman MENENDEZ—Supplemental appropriation of \$95,000 to the New Jersey Hispanic Association for Higher Education.

Assembly No. 2784, Assemblyman LITTELL—Permits the developmentally disabled to have assistance in casting their votes at elections.

Assembly No. 2785, Assemblyman LITTELL—Prohibits the recordation of a deed or instrument acknowledged by witness who is not a party.

Assembly No. 2786, Assemblyman LITTELL—“Community Enterprise and Employment Development Act,” establishes Community Enterprise Development Fund and appropriates \$4.6 million.

Assembly No. 2787, Assemblyman LITTELL—Establishes uniform standards and ground rules for employee drug tests and makes an appropriation.

Assembly No. 2788, Assemblymen LITTELL and HAYTAIAN—The “Local Government Environmental Rights Act.”

Assembly No. 2789, Assemblyman LITTELL—Provides that a taxpayer under the gross income tax may make a voluntary contribution from a portion of a tax refund to support services for the homeless.

Assembly No. 2790, Assemblyman LITTELL—Requires Department of Community Affairs to use private agencies for building inspections and plan reviews in certain cases.

Assembly No. 2791, Assemblyman LITTELL—Requires courts to take certain factors into account before issuing orders in labor

Assembly No. 2792, Assemblyman LITTELL—Amends procedures for obtaining certified copies of records filed with the State registrar of vital statistics.

Assembly No. 2793, Assemblymen LITTELL and HAYTA-
IAN—Permits voting by mail in municipalities with fewer than 100 registered voters.

Assembly No. 2794, Assemblyman LITTELL—Establishes New Jersey Health and Life Insurance Plan for certain unemployed individuals, appropriates \$50 million.

Assembly No. 2795, Assemblymen LITTELL and HAYTA-

Assembly No. 2801, Assemblymen LITTELL and HAYTA-
IAN—Prohibits the formation of local, regional, or Statewide emer-
gency medical service coordinating areas.

Assembly No. 2802, Assemblyman LITTELL—Excludes certain
courier services from being subject to unemployment compensation
and temporary disability contributions.

Assembly No. 2804, Assemblyman LITTELL—Exempts certain
firing range owners from civil liability for noise caused by the ranges.

Assembly No. 2805, Assemblyman LITTELL—Supplemental
appropriation of \$40,000 for U. S.—U. S. S. R. High School Aca-
demic Partnership Program.

Assembly No. 2806, Assemblyman LITTELL—Provides State
school aid on a current year basis.

Assembly No. 2807, Assemblyman LITTELL—Requires DMV to notify Department of Education of school bus driver's license revocation or suspension.

Assembly No. 2808, Assemblyman LITTELL—"Grandfathers" certain roadside advertising signs.

Assembly No. 2809, Assemblymen LITTELL and ROCCO—Prohibits harassment of persons taking wildlife.

Assembly No. 2810, Assemblyman FRANKS—Requires the BPU to adjust the rates at a transfer station to reflect any savings realized by the owner or operator upon the recovery of the construction costs of the facility through those rates.

Assembly No. 2811, Assemblyman DORIA—Permits optometry associations offering continuing education courses to charge different fees to non-members.

Assembly No. 2812, Assemblyman DE CROCE—Limits the annual percentage increase in State expenditures to 5 percent.

Assembly No. 2813, Assemblymen DE CROCE and MARTIN—Makes school bus stopping requirements applicable to motorists on private roads.

Assembly No. 2814, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS—Provides for the application of a net capital loss from sales or exchanges of a principal residence against any category of gross income under the gross income tax.

Assembly No. 2815, Assemblyman CIMINO—Directs Rutgers, The State University, to establish graduate programs in industrial hygiene and occupational health nursing.

Assembly No. 2816, Assemblyman SCERNI—Requires DOT to study traffic flow and safety on U. S. 30, Atlantic County.

Assembly No. 2817, Assemblyman STUHLTRAGER—Supplemental appropriation of \$50,000 to the Department of Education for a summer program at Appel Farm.

Assembly No. 2818, Assemblymen SALMON and MARSELLA—Appropriates \$500,000 for business tourism development.

Assembly No. 2821, Assemblyman SMITH and Assemblywoman OGDEN,—Precludes siting of low-level radioactive waste facility in municipalities hosting certain solid waste facilities.

Assembly No. 2823, Assemblyman SMITH—Provides for the inclusion in the Governor's annual budget message of seven-year State capitol project plans.

Assembly No. 2824, Assemblyman COLLINS—Prohibits sale of certain beverage containers after January 1, 1991.

Assembly No. 2825, Assemblyman LO BIONDO—Requires a candidate for a public office who refers to another candidate for that office in an electronic communications media advertisement to appear in that advertisement.

Assembly No. 2826, Assemblymen PENN and LITTELL—Requires mortgagee to apply to have mortgage canceled of record under certain circumstances and increases applicable penalties.

Assembly No. 2827, Assemblyman DUCH—Amends the "Air Pollution Control Act (1954)" to increase permit fees and civil penalties, to impose criminal penalties, and to establish an "Environment Enforcement and Mitigation Fund."

Assembly No. 2828, Assemblyman CIMINO—Establishes inter-agency coordinating task force on occupational and environmental health hazards.

Assembly No. 2829, Assemblyman CIMINO—Establishes occupational health clinical center network demonstration program.

Assembly No. 2830, Assemblyman LO BIONDO—Amends the "Local Public Contracts Law" to authorize multi-year contracts for energy generation and transmission.

Assembly No. 2831, Assemblyman LO BIONDO—Permits redemption of certain tax sale certificates held at least 40 years.

Assembly No. 2832, Assemblymen SMITH, Gill, Doria, Naples, Pelly, Otlowski, Doyle, Cimino, Duch, Menendez, Schwartz, Pascrell, Roma, McGreevey, Spadoro, Patero, Assemblywoman Ford, Assemblymen Schuber, Jacobson, Rooney and Mazur—The "New Jersey Hazard Elimination Through Local Participation Act."

Assembly No. 2833, Assemblyman JACOBSON—Places certain restrictions on New Jersey Sports and Exposition Authority projects.

Assembly No. 2834, Assemblyman CIMINO—Provides for public financing of campaigns for election to Legislature; limits contributions in aid of such campaigns.

Assembly No. 2835, Assemblymen ZANGARI and MARTIN,—Allows TPAF, PERS and PFRS members to purchase service credit for civilian employment or military service with the United States Government.

Assembly No. 2836, Assemblymen ZANGARI and MARTIN—Expands right of members of TPAF, PERS and PFRS to purchase credit for temporary service and establishes uniform terms and conditions for the purchase of all service credit.

Assembly No. 2837, Assemblymen ZANGARI and MARTIN—Provides a procedure for resolving disputes between auto body repair facilities and automobile owners.

Assembly No. 2838, Assemblywoman FORD—Extends Commission on Sex Discrimination in the Statutes until 1995, appropriates \$70,000.

Assembly No. 2839, Assemblywoman FORD—Supp. Approp. of \$150,000 to Dept. of Ed. for State aid grant to Toms River Regional Board of Education Alternate School Program.

Assembly No. 2840, Assemblywoman FORD—Supp. Approp. of \$150,000 to Dept. of Ed. for State aid grant to Toms River Regional Board of Education for "Crossroads" alcohol and drug abuse program.

Assembly No. 2841, Assemblywoman FORD—Establishes a Senior Citizens' Shared Housing Matching Program and appropriates \$500,000.

Assembly No. 2842, Assemblywoman FORD—Establishes a Senior Citizens' Shared Living Residence Program and appropriates \$500,000.

Assembly No. 2843, Assemblywoman FORD and Assemblyman DOYLE, Higher Education—Permits students whose parents move out of State to continue to receive State financial aid.

Assembly No. 2844, Assemblywoman FORD and Assemblyman DOYLE, Health and Human Services—Provides for "New Jersey Runaway and Homeless Youth Act," appropriates \$1,000,000.

Assembly No. 2845, Assemblywoman FORD and Assemblyman DOYLE, Senior Citizens—Establishes volunteer service credit demonstration program and appropriates \$300,000.

Assembly No. 2846, Assemblywoman FORD and Assemblyman DOYLE, Veterans and Military Affairs—Supplemental appropriation of \$95,000 to the Women in Military Service for America Memorial Foundation, Inc.

Assembly No. 2847 Aca, Assemblywoman FORD and Assemblyman DOYLE, Judiciary, Law and Public Safety—Revises the law concerning the criminal offense of interfering with custody of a minor child.

Assembly No. 2848, Assemblyman SHINN, Waste Management, Planning and Recycling—Revises and expands solid waste licensing program.

Assembly No. 2849, Assemblyman ROONEY and Assemblywoman Crecco—Provides that English shall be the official language of the State.

Assembly No. 2850, Assemblyman ROONEY, Transportation Authorities, Telecommunications and Technology—Clarifies manner in which a public entity may own, control or manage a cable television company, and manner of exercising editorial control over that company.

Assembly No. 2851, Assemblyman ROONEY, Transportation Authorities, Telecommunications and Technology—Provides that a municipality's failure to rule on CATV company request for zoning variance shall be deemed a refusal.

Assembly No. 2852, Assemblyman ROONEY, Transportation Authorities, Telecommunications and Technology—Establishes procedures to be followed by CATV companies and municipalities when renewing municipal consents.

Assembly No. 2853; Assemblyman SCHUBER, Insurance—Prohibits discrimination based on sex or marital status in insurance.

Assembly No. 2854 Aca, Assemblymen NAPLES and PASCRELL, Education—Changes the date of the 1990 annual school election to April 24, 1990 and provides for the posting of budget statements.

Assembly No. 2855, Assemblywoman FORD and Assemblyman DOYLE, Senior Citizens—The "Senior and Disabled Citizens' Property Tax Deferral Loan Act.

Assembly No. 2857, Assemblywoman FORD and Assemblyman DOYLE, Conservation and Natural Resources—Establishes Municipal Residential Water Conservation Retrofit Program and fund therefor; appropriates \$1.2 million.

Assembly No. 2858, Assemblywoman FORD and Assemblyman DOYLE, Senior Citizens—"Senior and Disabled Citizens' Property Tax Deferral Loan Bond Act;" authorizes bonds for \$25 million, appropriates \$5,000.

Assembly No. 2859, Assemblymen SCERNI and COHEN, Transportation Authorities, Telecommunications and Technology—Appropriates \$850,000 for highway lighting program.

Assembly Concurrent Resolution No. 1, Assemblymen GILL and ZECKER—Proposes an amendment to the Constitution to require full funding of all statutes which provide for State aid to education.

Assembly Concurrent Resolution No. 2, Assemblymen CIMINO and MARTIN—Creates State Investment Council Study Commission.

Assembly Concurrent Resolution No. 3, Assemblymen VILLAPIANO and JACOBSON—Expresses the sense of the Legislature that the Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission declare striped bass a game fish.

Assembly Concurrent Resolution No. 7, Assemblymen KAVANAUGH and KAMIN—Amends constitution to require that State tax bills pass both houses of Legislature by three-fifths majority vote.

Assembly Concurrent Resolution No. 8, Assemblymen HAYTIAN and BROWN—Proposes constitutional amendment to establish Office of Lieutenant Governor, revises gubernatorial succession.

Assembly Concurrent Resolution No. 9, Assemblyman HAYTALIAN,—Proposes constitutional amendment to provide for full funding of any State aid to education formula established by law for each fiscal year under certain circumstances.

Assembly Concurrent Resolution No. 10, Assemblyman ALBOHN—Proposes an amendment to the Constitution to provide that the Secretary of State shall be the first in line of succession to fill the office of Governor.

Assembly Concurrent Resolution No. 11, Assemblyman ALBOHN—Proposes a constitutional amendment to prohibit the introduction or passage of a revenue raising bill by the Legislature during a “lameduck” session.

Assembly Concurrent Resolution No. 12, Assemblyman ALBOHN—Proposes an amendment to the Constitution to decrease from 20 to 19 the number of principal departments in the Executive Branch.

The Appropriations Committee shall consist of 15 members and each of its subcommittees shall consist of seven members; the Veterans and Military Affairs Committee shall consist of seven members; all other Standing Reference Committees shall consist of five members; the [Standing Select Committees shall consist of 11 members; the] Intergovernmental Relations Committee shall consist of five members; the Rules and Order Committee shall consist

The chairman, vice-chairman, and all other members of each committee shall serve at the pleasure of the Speaker, but no committee member shall be removed from his committee assignment except for good cause.

The Speaker and the majority and minority leaders shall be ex-officio members, without vote, on all standing reference committees.

2. Rule 81, as adopted temporarily on January 9, 1990, is amended to read as follows:

81. Any bill which shall require the adoption of rules and regulations, may, upon being reported by a committee and prior to being given second reading, be referred by the Speaker to the Oversight and Governmental Efficiency [and Oversight] Committee for further study, evaluation and report.

The Speaker announced:

Notice of and the calendar for this session of the General Assembly having been sent to the members of the General Assembly, the Secretary of the State and the State House Press and posted in accordance with the Open Public Meetings Law, I declare the General Assembly to be in session.

The Clerk began to read the minutes of the previous meeting. Mr. Bryant moved that the reading of the minutes be dispensed with, which motion was adopted.

The Clerk then read and the General Assembly passed resolutions of welcome, condolences, commendation and recognition.

Speaker Doria offered the following remarks to the members of the General Assembly:

Yesterday marked the 20th Anniversary of Earth Day, and everywhere in New Jersey our people have recommitted themselves to protecting our lands, water and air.

I have asked the Clerk to display the Earth Day Flag for the remainder of the year as a way of demonstrating our commitment to each other, to the people of New Jersey and to our Nation, that environmental values are among our first values.

I hope that the Flag will remind us of those values as we develop and consider legislation in this House. But I hope, too, that it will shape our behavior as a group.

We need to think about our own impact on the environment. We don't yet use 100% recycled paper in our bills and stationery; but I'm sure we will in a very short time. We don't recycle all of the glass bottles and aluminum cans that we use here in the Annex; but I'm sure we will. These are little things that we can do today to make a difference and to improve our environment.

We also need to stand proudly for our accomplishments as a State. New Jersey takes second place to no State in its commitment to Environmental Protection. Our history shows a deep and long-standing commitment to the protection of our State's Natural Resources and the quality of our State's environment.

Since the passage of the Air Pollution Control Act in 1954, New Jersey's Legislature has passed two dozen major environmental laws affecting solid waste collection, wetlands and coastal protection, environmental cleanup responsibility, toxic catastrophe prevention, spill control and pinelands protection, among other environmental concerns.

All of our Legislators should recognize how truly special this body's commitment to environmental issues has been. Partly as a result of the actions of some who sit here today and others who have moved on, New Jersey is recognized as a national leader in hazardous waste cleanup, in freshwater wetlands protection and in solid waste recycling.

May this Flag show all who visit our Chamber during this year that we strongly believe in environmental protection, and that we are prepared to act on those beliefs.

Which motion was adopted.

Assembly No. 3326, Assemblyman SCHWARTZ, Housing—Requires municipalities to petition COAH for certification of housing element with two years of filing.

Assembly No. 3327, Assemblymen SCERNI, COHEN and McGreevey, Veterans and Military Affairs—Designates May 7th of each year as "Vietnam Veterans' Remembrance Day."

Assembly No. 3328, Assemblywoman FORD and Assemblyman SCERNI, Judiciary, Law and Public Safety—Imposes civil liability on persons who commit the offense of shoplifting and certain other thefts.

Assembly No. 3329, Assemblywoman FORD and Assemblyman DOYLE, Housing—Permits nonprofit organizations to gain temporary possession of abandoned residential property for rehabilitation purposes.

Assembly No. 3330, Assemblywoman FORD, Labor—Establishes "New Jersey Homeless Employment Program Act."

Assembly No. 3331, Assemblywoman FORD and Assemblyman DOYLE, Judiciary, Law and Public Safety—Sundry amendments to the State's wrongful death act.

Assembly No. 3332, Assemblymen VILLAPIANO and JACOBSON, Senior Citizens—Supplemental appropriation of \$25,000 to DCA for grant to Monmouth County Office on Aging for a Senior Net Pilot Program.

Assembly No. 3333, Assemblywoman FORD and Assemblyman DOYLE, Judiciary, Law and Public Safety—Adds death by auto, if committed by a juvenile while under the influence of liquor or drugs, to offenses which may be waived from family court to adult criminal court under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 3334, Assemblyman SPADORO, Approp.—Subcommittee on Taxation and State Aid—Provides a deduction under gross income tax for certain amounts received by an employee from an employer for transportation expenses.

Assembly No. 3335, Assemblywoman COOPER, Independent Authorities—Permits up to two members of the planning board and two members of the zoning board of adjustment in Atlantic City to be employed by or associated with a casino.

Assembly No. 3336, Assemblywoman SMITH, Assemblyman NAPLES, Assemblywoman Cooper, Assemblymen Connors and Moran, Senior Citizens—Creates “Senior and Disabled Citizens’ Property Tax Deferral and Revolving Loan Fund.”

Assembly No. 3337, Assemblyman SCHUBER and Assemblywoman RANDALL, Veterans and Military Affairs—Supplemental appropriation of \$2.2 million to the Paramus Veterans’ Memorial Home.

Assembly No. 3338, Assemblywoman RANDALL, Assemblymen NAPLES, Cimino, Russo and Felice, Education—Requires Dept. of Education to prepare curriculum guidelines for course in environmental responsibility.

Assembly No. 3339, Assemblymen VILLAPIANO and JACOBSON, Economic Growth, Agriculture, Tourism and Coastal Protection—Appropriates \$16,668,750 to match federal funding for beach replenishment in Sea Bright, Monmouth Beach and Long Branch.

Assembly No. 3340, Assemblymen COHEN, MC GREEVEY, Villapiano, Mecca, Gill, Hudak, Deverin and Duch, Senior Citizens—Disregards the Social Security COLA as income for eligibility in PAAD program.

Assembly No. 3341, Assemblyman KELLY, Conservation and Natural Resources—The “Passaic River Basin Floodway Acquisition Bond Act,” authorizes bonds for \$200 million, and appropriates \$5,000.

Assembly No. 3342, Assemblymen KENNY and MENENDEZ, Education—Insures that no school district in Level III monitoring receives less State aid in FY 1991 than in FY 1990; appropriates \$1,383,749.

Assembly No. 3343, Assemblymen CIMINO, PASCRELL, Marsella, Salmon, Patero and Naples, Education—Provides that any student who satisfactorily completes an appropriate agricultural science course shall receive credit toward meeting high school graduation requirements for science.

Assembly No. 3344, Assemblymen STUHLTRAGER and COLLINS, Judiciary, Law and Public Safety—Permits use of blue emergency warning lights on motor vehicles owned by members of nonvolunteer fire companies or first aid or rescue squads.

Assembly No. 3345, Assemblymen JACOBSON and VILLAPIANO, Independent Authorities—Permits sewerage authorities to lease real property to non-profit corporations.

Assembly No. 3346, Assemblyman COHEN and Assemblywoman FORD, Senior Citizens—Provides for civil penalties in the "Continuing Care Retirement Community Regulation and Financial Disclosure Act."

Assembly No. 3347, Assemblymen SALMON and VILLAPIANO, Commerce and Regulated Professions—Provides for the regulation of burglar and fire alarm businesses by the Department of Community Affairs; appropriates \$25,000.

Assembly No. 3348, Assemblyman MARTIN, State Government—Authorizes ELEC to impose certain filing fees; establishes a revolving Financial Disclosure Law Enforcement Fund; appropriates \$2,000,000.

Assembly No. 3349, Assemblyman MARTIN, State Government—Authorizes ELEC to impose certain filing fees.

Assembly No. 3350, Assemblywoman OGDEN, Consumer Affairs—Requires item pricing of certain goods sold in grocery stores.

Assembly No. 3351, Assemblywoman OGDEN, Assemblyman FRELINGHUYSEN, Assemblywoman Cooper and Assemblyman Franks, State Government—Supplemental appropriation of \$9,000,000 in FY 1991 to the New Jersey State Council on the Arts for grant award programs.

Assembly No. 3352, Assemblywoman OGDEN, Education—Appropriates \$500,000 for the purpose of providing matching funds to the Summit Speech School for the acquisition and construction of school facilities.

Assembly No. 3353, Assemblywoman RANDALL and Assemblyman ROONEY, Transportation Authorities, Telecommunications and Technology—Directs BPU to limit call identification service to residential customers, public safety agencies and hospitals.

Assembly No. 3354, Assemblywoman RANDALL and Assemblyman KYRILLOS, Drug and Alcohol Abuse Policy—Prohibits the advertising of tobacco products on billboards.

Assembly No. 3355, Assemblyman BRYANT, Judiciary, Law and Public Safety—Requires structured verdicts where amount of future damages in medical malpractice case exceeds \$250,000.

Assembly No. 3356, Assemblyman SPADORO, Waste Management, Planning and Recycling—Authorizes study of potential of glass as a hazardous waste encapsulating material; appropriates \$75,000.

Assembly No. 3357, Assemblyman MC ENROE and Assemblywoman BUSH, State Operations and Personnel—Provides that

PFRS accidental death benefit would be payable to a member's spouse unless another beneficiary is named after the marriage.

Assembly No. 3358, Assemblyman MECCA and Assemblywoman FORD, Health and Human Services—Supplemental appropriation of \$90,000 to DOH for AZT treatment for emergency volunteers.

Assembly No. 3359, Assemblymen KAVANAUGH and KENNY, Commerce and Regulated Professions—Requires official State prescription for dispensing of certain drugs.

Assembly No. 3360, Assemblymen SMITH, COHEN, Hudak, Duch and Scerni, Energy and Environment—Requires the imposition of interest charges on certain unpaid fees and penalties imposed by the Department of Environmental Protection, the Attorney General, or the Board of Public Utilities.

Assembly No. 3361, Assemblymen MORAN and CONNORS, County Government—Increases term of office of county fire marshal.

Assembly No. 3362, Assemblymen CONNORS and MORAN, Education—Modifies school equalization aid formula to provide additional support for districts with large proportion of senior citizens.

Assembly No. 3363, Assemblymen CIMINO and Pascrell, Education—Eliminates the position of treasurer of school moneys and transfers the job functions to the board secretary.

Assembly No. 3364, Assemblymen COHEN, MECCA, Villapiano, Cimino, Roberts, Charles and Duch, Independent Authorities—Provides for veto power over action of authorities.

Assembly No. 3365, Assemblymen KELLY and FELICE, Veterans and Military Affairs—Reduces fees paid by members of New Jersey National Guard under the Fair Automobile Insurance Reform Act of 1990.

Assembly No. 3366, Assemblymen FRANKS and SHINN, Waste Management, Planning and Recycling—Provides reduced 10-year tax rate schedule under the corporation business tax for newsprint de-inking facilities.

Assembly No. 3367, Assemblymen MC GREEVEY, State Operations and Personnel—Allows certain participants in alternate benefit program to receive credit for 10 years out-of-State service to qualify for State-paid medical benefits upon retirement.

Assembly No. 3368, Assemblywoman FARRAGHER, Assemblyman KAVANAUGH, Assemblywoman Smith, Assemblymen Rooney and DeCroce, Education—Prohibits the offering of health services relating to birth control and abortion by a school district.

Assembly No. 3369, Assemblymen LO BIONDO and Kronick, Judiciary, Law and Public Safety—Authorizes special parking privileges for vehicles transporting handicapped.

Assembly No. 3370, Assemblymen LITTELL, HAYTAIAN and DeCroce, Energy and Environment—Grandfathers certain septic systems under new rules.

Assembly No. 3371, Assemblyman CIMINO, State Operations and Personnel—Provides for adoption of PFRS in fire district by referendum and option of adoption of PFRS in municipality or fire district by ordinance.

Assembly No. 3372, Assemblyman FOY, Judiciary, Law and Public Safety—Grants police, firemen and their estates the right to seek recovery and damages for injury, disease, and death in certain cases.

Assembly No. 3373, Assemblymen MARSELLA and PASCRELL, County Government—Allows appointment of fourth undersheriff in certain counties.

Assembly No. 3374, Assemblyman SALMON, Municipal Government—Amends the "Local Public Contracts Law" to authorize multi-year contracts for energy generation and transmission.

Assembly No. 3375, Assemblyman KYRILLOS, Assemblywoman OGDEN, Assemblymen Littell, Arnone, LoBiondo, Stuhltrager, Franks, Rocco, Shusted, Haytaian, Roma, Assemblywomen Faragher, Smith, Assemblyman Schluter, Education—Insures that no school district receives less State aid in FY 1991 than in FY 1990; appropriates \$97,051,977.

Assembly No. 3376, Assemblymen DEVERIN and HUDAK, State Operations and Personnel—Permits municipalities to pay health benefits for retirees with 20 years of service if approved by two-thirds vote of governing body.

Assembly No. 3377, Assemblywoman SMITH, Assemblymen MAZUR, Cimino, Kyrillos and Assemblywoman Cooper, State Operations and Personnel—Provides for accidental disability retirement for PFRS members as a result of any injury or disabling cancer under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 3378, Assemblymen SHUSTED and ROCCO, Housing—Exempts public housing authorities from fees under Uniform Fire Safety Act.

Assembly No. 3379, Assemblymen KENNY and IMPREVEDUTO, Judiciary, Law and Public Safety—Increases penalties for leaving the scene of motor vehicle accident.

Assembly No. 3380, Assemblyman MC GREEVEY, Municipal Government—Allows municipalities to send out two separate property tax bills.

Assembly No. 3381, Assemblyman MC GREEVEY, County Government—Allows firefighters to be reimbursed for expenses without producing documentation under certain circumstances.

Assembly No. 3382, Assemblymen MC GREEVEY and MENENDEZ, Labor—Encourages certain employers to provide health insurance coverage to employees and their dependents.

Assembly No. 3383, Assemblyman SPADORO, Independent Authorities—Prohibits persons from acting both as promoter and manager.

Assembly No. 3384, Assemblymen FELICE, DEVERIN and Cimino, Education—Requires that high school directors of athletics hold supervisory certificates.

Assembly No. 3385, Assemblyman SCHUBER, Conservation and Natural Resources—Prohibits sale of striped bass.

Assembly No. 3386, Assemblymen PATERO, CIMINO and Otolowski, Health and Human Services—Requires criminal history record background checks for employees of community residences for the developmentally disabled and the mentally ill and appropriates \$95,000.

Assembly No. 3387, Assemblymen PELLY and ROBERTS, Financial Institutions—Requires depository institutions to disclose service charges.

Assembly No. 3388, Assemblymen GILL, DUCH and Brown, Housing—Establishes “indefinite temporary tenure” status under “Rooming and Boarding House Act of 1979”.

Assembly No. 3389, Assemblyman BRYANT, State Operations and Personnel—Requires that provisions in contracts for prescription drug benefits shall apply equally to local pharmacies and any mail-service program.

Assembly No. 3390, Assemblymen KAVANAUGH, DUCH, Zecker, Gill, Penn and Kamin, Conservation and Natural Resources—Regulates certain types of pigeons; repeals R. S.23:4-54.

Assembly No. 3391, Assemblymen CHARLES, KENNY, Menendez, Imprevuto, Kronick and Doria, Education—Provides for review of capital projects of State-operated school districts by a Capital Project Control Board.

Assembly No. 3392, Assemblymen ROBERTS and SPADORO, Financial Institutions—Prohibits certain claims based on oral credit agreements.

Assembly No. 3393, Assemblyman FOY and Assemblywoman KALIK, Financial Institutions—Exempts certain municipal housing loan programs from licensure requirements of “Secondary Mortgage Loan Act.”

Assembly No. 3394, Assemblymen MENENDEZ, KENNY, McEnroe, Kronick, Brown, Assemblywoman Bush, Assemblymen Mattison and Pascrell, Education—Provides full State aid funding on a current year basis in FY91 for school districts in level III monitoring; appropriates \$99,186,532.

Assembly No. 3395, Assemblyman KRONICK and, Assemblywoman BUSH, Senior Citizens—Permit senior citizens to own pets in subsidized senior citizen housing.

Assembly No. 3396, Assemblymen CIMINO, PATERO and Naples, State Operations and Personnel—Provides paid health benefits for qualified retirees of PERS.

Assembly No. 3397, Assemblyman KYRILLOS, Waste Management, Planning and Recycling—Establishes voluntary environmentally preferred product certification program; appropriates \$75,000.

Assembly No. 3398, Assemblymen DORIA and COHEN, State Operations and Personnel—Authorizes Public Broadcasting Authority to establish fund-raising foundation.

Assembly No. 3399, Assemblymen HAYTAIAN and LITTELL, State Operations and Personnel—Provides for reclassification of person as surviving spouse in SPRS.

Assembly No. 3400, Assemblymen MC ENROE and JACOBSON, Waste Management, Planning and Recycling—Regulates the sale and disposal of certain used dry cell batteries.

Assembly No. 3401, Assemblyman FOY and Assemblywoman KALIK, Transportation Authorities, Telecommunications and Technology—Revokes authority of county bridge commissions to replace or reconstruct certain bridges.

Assembly No. 3402, Assemblymen MARSELLA and SCERNI, Labor—Requires Commissioner of Labor to notify Legislature if farm worker minimum wage adversely impacts on farmers' competitiveness.

Assembly No. 3403, Assemblymen OTLOWSKI and Deverin, Health and Human Services—Clarifies requirements for patient interviews for outpatient hospital services.

Assembly No. 3404, Assemblymen MATTISON and DEVERIN, Municipal Government—Revises calculation of hotel use or occupancy tax.

Assembly No. 3405, Assemblymen LITTELL, DUCH, Martin, Assemblywoman Farragher, Assemblymen Felice, Arnone, Assemblywoman Randall, Assemblyman Rooney, Energy and Environment—The "Clean Water Bond Act of 1990," authorizes bonds for \$100 million for pollution control, flood control, and recreation and conservation projects, and appropriates \$5,000.

Assembly No. 3406, Assemblyman SCHWARTZ, Municipal Government—The "Revenue Allocation Financing Act."

Assembly No. 3407, Assemblyman KYRILLOS, Energy and Environment—Requires DEP to establish a certification program for hazardous substance discharge cleanup contractors.

Assembly No. 3408, Assemblywoman OGDEN, Economic Growth, Agriculture, Tourism and Coastal Protection—Entitled the “Main Street and Downtown Revitalization Act;” appropriates \$460,000.

Assembly No. 3424, Assemblymen SCERNI and ZANGARI, Independent Authorities—Permits temporary licenses for gaming-related casino employees as well as non-gaming-related casino employees.

Assembly No. 3460, Assemblymen DE CROCE and LO BIONDO, Veterans and Military Affairs—Extends exemption from property taxes to certain disabled veterans of other emergency military actions.

Assembly No. 3461, Assemblyman DE CROCE, Commerce and Regulated Professions—Requires that real estate broker be provided with copy of closing statement at closing.

Assembly Concurrent Resolution No. 97, Assemblywoman SMITH and Assemblyman KYRILLOS, Energy and Environment—Calls upon the Port Authority to purchase boats with screening devices to collect floating debris in New York Harbor.

Assembly Concurrent Resolution No. 98, Assemblymen COHEN, VILLAPIANO, Mecca, Gill, Hudak, Deverin and Duch, Municipal Government—Amends Constitution to increase amount of and income limit for senior and disabled citizens property tax deduction.

Assembly Joint Resolution No. 77, Assemblymen KENNY, MENENDEZ and Collins Municipal Government—Declares annual “Baseball Day” in the City of Hoboken.

Assembly Joint Resolution No. 79, Assemblywoman MULLEN and Assemblyman MARSELLA, Conservation and Natural Resources—Declares May 6 through 12, 1990 as National Drinking Water Week in New Jersey.

Assembly Joint Resolution No. 80, Assemblymen ROMA and SCHUBER, Energy and Environment—Memorializes Congress to enact strict reauthorization of Clean Air Act.

Assembly Joint Resolution No. 81, Assemblyman KYRILLOS and Assemblywoman SMITH, Energy and Environment—Urges Congress to fund Oil and Hazardous Material Simulated Environmental Test Tank facility.

Assembly Resolution No. 115, Assemblymen JACOBSON and VILLAPIANO, Independent Authorities—Urges New Jersey Highway Authority and Department of Transportation to place suitable directional signs for Monmouth College on respective highways under their jurisdiction.

Assembly Resolution No. 116, Assemblymen COHEN and KRONICK, Consumer Affairs—Commends and endorses Consumer Product Safety Commission’s proposal that packages of balloons, marbles, and small balls display choke hazard warning labels.

Assembly Resolution No. 117, Assemblywoman RANDALL and Assemblyman KYRILLOS, Health and Human Services—Condemns R. J. Reynolds Tobacco Company's promotion campaigns for "Uptown" and "Dakota" cigarettes.

Assembly Resolution No. 118, Assemblywoman SMITH and Assemblyman KYRILLOS, Independent Authorities—Calls upon Governor to exert influence with Port Authority of New York and New Jersey to provide funding for the Bayshore Development Office in Monmouth County.

Senate No. 690 Sca, Senator COSTA, Health and Human Services—Allows parents of children abused in any out-of home placement access to child abuse reports.

Senate No. 894, Senators COWAN and Cafiero, Housing—Requires inspectors under the "Hotel and Multiple Dwelling Law" to issue immediate notices following inspections.

Senate No. 1066, Senator FELDMAN, Labor—Adds Commissioner of Education to PEOSHA Board.

Senate No. 1196, Senator MC MANIMON, Municipal Government—Permits municipality to establish service charge for checks returned for insufficient funds.

Senate No. 1210 Sca, Senator AMBROSIO, Health and Human Services—Designated the "Child Placement Bill of Rights Act."

Senate No. 1271 Sca, Senator CODEY, Commerce and Regulated Professions—Lengthens renewal period for electrical contractor licenses and permits from two to three years.

Senate No. 1346, Senator O'CONNOR, Judiciary, Law and Public Safety—Provides that "New Jersey Parentage Act" shall govern determination of parentage for purposes of intestate succession.

Senate No. 1483, Senator CONNORS, Senior Citizens—Allows municipalities to exempt senior citizens from payment of beach fees.

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 2868

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill 2868 (First Reprint) without my approval.

This bill would amend N.J.S.A. 2A:2-1 et seq. to authorize an additional Superior Court judge for Sussex County, increasing the total number of statutorily authorized Superior Court judges in Sussex from three to four. The bill also would make a corresponding change in the total number of authorized Superior Court judges in the State from 366 to 367.

In varying degrees, the court system in each county is laboring under the strain of growing criminal caseloads and the consequential impact that this growth has had on the civil calendar. Sussex County is no exception. However, given the current budgetary environment, I must scrutinize each initiative that demands State funding and must establish priorities that respond to the most compelling needs. In determining which counties are most in need of new judges, I am forced to make difficult decisions, but our current fiscal predicament requires tough choices.

Although I fully appreciate the demands upon our courts in Sussex County, I am unable, at the present time, to authorize the creation of a new judicial position in Sussex County and its associated costs.

Accordingly, I herewith return Assembly No. 2868 (First Reprint) without my approval.

ASSEMBLY NO. 12

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I am returning Assembly No. 12 with my objections for reconsideration.

This bill would create a voluntary registration program to combat motor vehicle theft, whereby the registered owner of the motor vehicle could agree to allow investigatory stops of the vehicle by any police officer between the hours of 1 a.m. and 5 a.m. The bill allows police officers to request to see the driver's license, registration and insurance card when the vehicle is stopped and establishes a rebuttable presumption that if the driver cannot produce these documents, he or she is not the registered owner of the vehicle and does not have the owner's permission to use the vehicle. This presumption would operate to give police officers probable cause to arrest drivers who cannot produce these documents on suspicion of motor vehicle theft.

I wholeheartedly support the goal of this bill, which is to combat the serious problem of motor vehicle theft in New Jersey. According to the F.B.I. crime reports, nine New Jersey cities are ranked in the top twenty-five among U.S. cities for auto theft rates. I also support the establishment of this program which will permit ordinary citizens and the police to join together to address this menace.

Nevertheless, this bill needs fine tuning that will permit us to avoid difficulties that may be encountered in enforcing the provisions of the bill. This legislation would create a rebuttable presumption that would too easily create a criminal arrest record for an innocent motorist who is stopped by police and is unable to produce a license, registration and insurance card even if he or she owns or has the owner's permission to use the vehicle. Although a driver would lagally be able to rebut this presumption of unautho-

rized use, in most instances an innocent driver would not be in a position to effectively take advantage of this legal right when stopped by police and would be arrested.

The goal of this bill could still be accomplished even if this rebuttable presumption were eliminated. If the presumption is removed, the police could still stop the car and request that the driver produce appropriate documentation. If a driver is unable to produce these documents, a police officer would be able to further investigate the matter. In most cases, the police officer will simply telephone the registered owner of the vehicle to determine whether the driver is authorized to use the car. If this further investigation reveals circumstances which lead the officer to believe that the vehicle has been stolen, the officer would have probable cause to arrest. Removal of the rebuttable presumption would thus allow the officer to decide what is appropriate under the circumstances of each case and would avoid unnecessary delay or detention of motorists.

In addition, this bill needlessly involves the State Police in certain day-to-day administrative aspects of this program. Accordingly, I suggest that this bill also be amended to give local law enforcement officers increased authority over the administration of this program in their municipality.

Therefore, I herewith return Assembly No. 12 and recommend that it be amended as follows:

ASSEMBLY RULES RESOLUTION

By Assemblymen Bryant, Brown, Doyle, Marsella and Smith

Whereas, The General Assembly Rules and Order Committee has conducted a thorough review of the Rules of the General Assembly; and

Whereas, The Committee conducted its business during a committee meeting held on May 31, 1990; and

Whereas, The General Assembly Rules and Order Committee recommends adoption of the following revisions to the rules in order to provide for more efficient, effective and orderly management of the operations of the General Assembly and conduct of the public's business; now, therefore,

Be It Resolved by the General Assembly of the State of New Jersey that the temporary Rules of the 1990 General Assembly be adopted as the permanent Rules, subject to the following changes:

1. Rule 17 is amended to read as follows:

17. [In the event of a vacancy in the membership of the General Assembly occasioned by death, resignation or otherwise, the General Assembly shall direct a writ of election to fill such vacancy, unless such vacancy shall occur subsequent to a sine die adjournment of the Legislature. In such event the writ may be issued] Vacancies in the membership of the General Assembly shall be filled in accordance with the provisions of Article IV, Section IV, paragraph 1 of the Constitution and in accordance with [law. No writ of election shall issue if the vacancy is such that the member may regain his seat pursuant to N.J.S. 2C:51-2] P.L. 1988, c. 126.

2. Rule 19 is amended to read as follows:

19. [He]The Speaker shall have a general direction of and preserve order and decorum in the Assembly Chamber and the lobby, gallery, meeting rooms and offices thereof, together with such rooms, corridors and passages in the State House and elsewhere as may be used by the General Assembly, its committees, commissions, officers, members and employees in the conduct of official business.

[He]The Speaker shall have full authority to protect the safety of members, officers and employees of the General Assembly in performance of their official duties, as well as that of the general public in connection therewith, and to preserve and protect property and records under the jurisdiction of the Legislature. In case of disturbance or disorderly conduct in the gallery or in the lobby he may cause the same to be cleared or the offending persons to be arrested and removed.

3. Rule 20 is amended to read as follows:

20. [He]The Speaker shall preserve order and decorum and in debate shall prevent personal reflections, and confine members to the question under discussion; but he shall not engage in any debate, nor propose his opinion on any question, without first calling on some member to occupy the Chair. When two or more members arise at the same time, he shall name the one entitled to the floor.

4. Rule 21 is amended to read as follows:

21. [He]The Speaker shall decide questions of order without debate, subject to an appeal to the General Assembly, when demanded by any member, on which appeal, unless it be an appeal pursuant to Rule 57, no member shall speak more than once, unless by leave of the General Assembly. The appeal shall be decided by the same number of votes as was requisite for the original motion. All appeals from incidental questions of order arising after a motion is made ¹[for the previous [questions]question] to terminate debate¹, and pending such motion, shall be decided without debate as provided in Rule 102.

5. Rule 22 is amended to read as follows:

22. [He]The Speaker shall state all questions before the General Assembly and shall distinctly put questions not involving a roll call vote in substantially the following form, "As many as are in favor of (the question) will vote aye;" and after the affirmative is expressed, "Those of a contrary opinion will vote no." If the Speaker is unable to determine the result of a voice vote, or a division be called for pursuant to the rules of the General Assembly, a roll call vote shall be taken. If the electronic voting machine is used, questions involving a roll call vote shall be put by the Speaker in substantially the following form, "The machine is open. All members will cast their votes either for or against (the question)." If the electronic voting machine is not used, questions involving a roll call vote shall be put in substantially the following form, "The Clerk shall call the roll and each member will cast a vote for or against (the question) as his name is called."

6. Rule 23 is amended to read as follows:

23. [He]The Speaker shall appoint all committees in accordance with Rule 70, unless otherwise specially directed by the General Assembly. He may, during the inability of a committee member of any committee or a subcommittee member of the Appropriations Committee to serve, appoint another member of the General Assembly to serve during such period.

7. Rule 24 is amended to read as follows:

24. [He]The Speaker shall prepare a Calendar of Bills and Resolutions for consideration which Calendar shall be subject to the provisions of Rule 110. He may include as part of such Calendar of Bills and Resolutions a Consent List of Bills and Resolutions defined as Bills and Resolutions not requiring debate; but no Bill or Resolution shall appear on the Consent List without the concurrence of the Majority and Minority Leaders.

8. Rule 25 is amended to read as follows:

25. [He]The Speaker shall sign certificates as to the passage by the General Assembly of all acts and joint resolutions; and all concurrent resolutions when so directed by the General Assembly. All writs, warrants and subpoenas issued by the order of the General Assembly shall be under his hand and seal, and attested by the Clerk.

9. Rule 28 is amended to read as follows:

28. [He]The Speaker may allow on the floor of the General Assembly, representatives of the press in an area designated by the Speaker, and such other persons whose official business may require their presence there, but he shall not permit any registered legislative agent to be present on the floor of the Assembly Chamber while the General Assembly is conducting official business.

10. Rule 29 is amended to read as follows:

29. [He]The Speaker shall present all petitions, memorials and other papers addressed to the General Assembly.

11. Rule 32 is amended to read as follows:

32. [He]The Clerk shall, at least ten days prior to the second Tuesday in January of each year, notify the members or the members-elect of the General Assembly, as the case may be, of the place where and the time when the General Assembly shall meet and organize.

12. Rule 33 is amended to read as follows:

33. [He]The Clerk shall, at the commencement of the annual session, call the General Assembly to order, proceed to call the roll of members, and, pending the election of a Speaker or Speaker pro tempore, preserve order and decorum, and decide all questions of order subject to appeal by any member.

13. Rule 34 is amended to read as follows:

34. [He]The Clerk shall keep a calendar of all bills, joint resolutions and concurrent resolutions which are to be printed.

14. Rule 35 is amended to read as follows:

35. [He]The Clerk shall, at each meeting of the General Assembly, read the number, title and Committee reference of each bill and resolution delivered to him by the Speaker, and shall also read all petitions and communications addressed to the General Assembly.

15. Rule 36 is amended to read as follows:

36. [He]The Clerk shall record the votes on all motions, bills and resolutions and inform the Speaker of the final vote, and shall maintain a copy of each amendment on which a vote is taken on the floor of the House.

16. Rule 37 is amended to read as follows:

37. [He]The Clerk shall deliver to the Office of Legislative Services for reprinting bills, joint resolutions, and concurrent resolutions amended by the General Assembly.

17. Rule 38 is amended to read as follows:

38. After bills and joint resolutions have passed their second reading, [he]the Clerk shall maintain them, together with amendments thereto.

18. Rule 39 is amended to read as follows:

39. [He]The Clerk shall supervise the Sergeant-at-Arms and such other officers and employees as designated by the Speaker.

19. Rule 40 is amended to read as follows:

40. [He]The Clerk shall keep on file in his office the roll call of all the employees of the General Assembly.

20. Rule 41 is amended to read as follows:

41. [He]The Clerk shall attest all writs, warrants and subpoenas issued by the order of the General Assembly.

21. Rule 42 is amended to read as follows:

42. [He]The Clerk shall sign and send all messages required to be sent from the General Assembly to the Senate.

22. Rule 43 is amended to read as follows:

43. [He]The Clerk shall distribute copies of all proposed amendments, veto messages and such material as the Speaker shall direct to the members and to the executive directors of the majority and minority staff.

[He]The Clerk shall also distribute a copy of the Minutes of the General Assembly for each session to the executive directors of the majority and minority staff as expeditiously as practicable after the session.

23. Rule 44 is amended to read as follows:

44. [He]The Clerk shall keep an accurate record of the attendance of the members at meetings of the General Assembly. The attendance of members shall be determined by the quorum call which is a roll call vote at the beginning of each meeting. A member who arrives at a meeting after the quorum call may be listed in the record of attendance for the meeting with the approval of the Speaker before the meeting is adjourned.

24. Rule 47 is amended to read as follows:

47. The Sergeant-at-Arms shall attend the General Assembly during its sittings and such public hearings of Assembly committees as the Speaker shall direct; maintain order and execute the commands of the General Assembly and all processes issued by authority thereof, under the direction of the Speaker or [Chairman]chair of a committee; and pending the election of a Speaker or a temporary Speaker, under the direction of the Clerk, execute the commands of the General Assembly and all processes issued by authority thereof.

25. Rule 48 is amended to read as follows:

48. [He]The Sergeant-at-Arms shall, as directed by the Speaker, enforce the Rules relating to the privileges of the Chamber.

26. Rule 49 is amended to read as follows:

49. [He]The Sergeant-at-Arms shall, 15 minutes before the hour of the meeting of the General Assembly, see that the floor is cleared of all persons except those privileged to remain, and kept so until after adjournment.

60. No member shall speak on any bill, resolution or [debatable]main motion more than three times, or longer than fifteen minutes the first and second time or longer than five minutes the third time without leave of the General Assembly.

The Speaker shall decide whether a motion is a main motion or a procedural motion or one incidental thereto and appeals therefrom shall be decided without debate by a majority of those present and voting.

The Appropriations Committee shall consist of 15 members and each of its subcommittees shall consist of seven members; the Veterans and Military Affairs Committee shall consist of seven members; all other Standing Reference Committees shall consist of five members; the Intergovernmental Relations Committee shall consist of five members; the Rules and Order Committee shall consist of six members; and the membership of the General Assembly on the Ethical Standards and State Library Committees shall consist of four members.

The standing administrative committees shall meet from time to time but not less than once in each annual session.

The Speaker shall appoint a [chairman]chair and a [vice-chairman]vice-chair for each standing reference and administrative committee and a [chairman]chair for each standing reference subcommittee of the Appropriations Committee. In the absence of the [chairman]chair, the [vice-chairman]vice-chair shall preside at any meeting of the committee duly convened by the [chairman]chair. In case of the disability of a [chairman]chair, the [vice-chairman]vice-chair shall, with the approval of the Speaker, assume all the responsibilities of the [chairman]chair. The [chairman]chair, [vice-chairman]vice-chair, and all other members of each committee shall serve at the pleasure of the Speaker, but no committee member shall be removed from his committee assignment except for good cause.

The Speaker and the majority and minority leaders shall be ex-officio members, without vote, on all standing reference committees.

¹[31.] 33.¹Rule 73 is amended to read as follows:

73. The [chairman]chair of a standing reference committee may, with the consent of the Speaker, establish, and appoint the members of, such subcommittees of the committee as he may desire, for such purposes as he may specify. Members of a subcommittee shall serve at the pleasure of the [chairman]chair. A subcommittee may be dissolved at any time by the [chairman]chair.

The provisions of this rule do not apply to the subcommittees of the Appropriations Committee established in Rule 70.

All incidental questions of order arising after a motion is made to terminate debate, and pending such motion, shall be decided, whether on appeal or otherwise, without debate.¹

The copies shall be marked as the House copy, the Office of Legislative Services' copy and the Public copy.

b. The Clerk shall number all bills and resolutions as they are presented and make a list of them. Bills and resolutions to be printed offered for introduction in the second annual session of the same Legislature may be numbered in a manner to distinguish them from those introduced in the first annual session.

c. After numbering and listing each bill and resolution, the Clerk shall deliver the copies to the Office of Legislative Services for examination as to form.

d. After such examination and when it shall be indicated on the bill or resolution that it has been released, the Office of Legislative Services shall return the House copy of said bill or resolution to the Clerk, retain the Office of Legislative Services' copy for the files of the Office and deliver one copy to the Office of Public Information in the Office of Legislative Services.

e. Thereupon the Speaker shall, unless he shall have theretofore referred the same, endorse upon the House copy the Committee, if any, to which it is to be referred and deliver it to the Clerk.

f. The reading by the Clerk of the number, title and committee reference if any, of each bill and resolution delivered to ~~[him]~~the Clerk by the Speaker shall be taken as the introduction and first reading of the bill or resolution.

g. All bills and joint resolutions and concurrent resolutions proposing an amendment or amendments to the Constitution shall, after their first reading, be referred to their appropriate committees, unless the Speaker shall otherwise order and shall, unless they have been previously printed, be printed for the use of the members. Other concurrent resolutions and resolutions shall take the same course as to printing unless otherwise ordered by the Speaker or the House.

h. During the second annual session of the Legislature, no bill, joint resolution, concurrent resolution or resolution introduced

after September 1st shall be printed except by order of the Speaker or special order of the General Assembly.

¹[44.] 46.¹The following new Rule 108A is adopted:

108A. No member or member-elect of the General Assembly may prefile as prime sponsor a total number of more than 40 bills, joint resolutions, concurrent resolutions or resolutions for introduction in the General Assembly.

¹[45.] 47.¹Rule 121 is amended to read as follows:

121. Except when advanced prior to printing by special order or emergency resolution, printed copies of bills and joint resolutions and concurrent resolutions which are given more than one reading shall be used on their second and third readings, and no amendment shall be received to any bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution on its third reading.

When copies of Assembly amendments have been distributed to the desks of the members, the text of the proposed amendments need not be read by the Clerk except upon request of the sponsor or upon order of the Assembly. The sponsor of any amendment shall append thereto a statement describing its effect. Such bill or resolution may be advanced to third reading, subject to these Rules.

(a) the Speaker shall certify thereon as of the date when the same passed third reading as follows:

General Assembly19.....

This (bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution), having been three times read in the General Assembly,

Resolved, That the same do pass.

By order of the General Assembly.

Speaker of the General Assembly.

unless the same shall have so passed amended, in which case the Speaker shall so indicate in the resolution as so certified, and

134. In printing legislative bills, joint resolutions, concurrent resolutions and resolutions:

a. The numbers 10 and above shall be expressed in Arabic figures, except where a number begins a sentence. Words shall be used for the numbers one through nine except that Arabic figures shall be used when any of these numbers is used as a section or paragraph number of legislation, as part of a date or in a statement of dollars and cents, time of day or measurement or as part of an authorized abbreviation or citation.

b. Material enclosed in bold-faced brackets shall be printed without change in all copies of the bills, joint resolutions, concurrent resolutions and resolutions notwithstanding that by subsequent amendment part of the material so enclosed is to be included in the bill, joint resolution, concurrent resolution or resolution.

c. A footnote shall be annexed to the first page of each bill, joint resolution, concurrent resolution or resolution which contains material enclosed in bold-faced brackets to the following effect:

“Explanation--Matter enclosed in bold-faced brackets [thus] is not enacted [or adopted] and is intended to be omitted.”

d. Material underlined shall be printed as underlined material.

e. A further footnote shall be annexed to the first page of each bill, joint resolution, concurrent resolution or resolution which contains new material underlined to the following effect:

“Matter underlined thus is new matter.”

f. A Senate bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution amended by the Assembly shall be reprinted with such amendments included therein.

g. In printing bills, joint resolutions, concurrent resolutions and resolutions which have been amended, with the amendments included, and proposed changes in Standing Rules (or Orders), all material intended to be omitted by the amendment shall be printed

in its proper place enclosed in superscript numbers corresponding to the reprint number and bold-faced brackets

¹ [thus] ¹

and all material intended to be added by the amendment shall be underlined and enclosed in superscript numbers corresponding to the reprint number

¹ thus ¹

Where the amendment adds a new supplementary section it shall be underlined and enclosed in superscript numbers corresponding to the reprint number

¹4. (New section)¹

Where the amendment adds a new section which is an amendment to the existing law, the section, including an amendatory clause, shall be enclosed in superscript numbers corresponding to the reprint number with material to be deleted enclosed in bold-faced brackets and new material underlined.

If the bill, joint resolution, concurrent resolution or resolution is amended a second time, the superscript number 2 shall be used and additional superscript numbers shall be used in the same manner as successive amendments are adopted.

h. A further footnote shall be annexed to the first page of each bill, joint resolution, concurrent resolution or resolution which has been amended to indicate which and when matter has been adopted by either House or a committee thereof to the following effect:

“Matter enclosed in superscript numbers has been adopted as follows:

- 1—Assembly (name) committee amendments adopted January 28, 19 .
- 2—Assembly amendments adopted April 12, 19 .
- 3—Senate (name) committee amendments adopted May 19, 19 .
- 4—Senate amendments adopted May 23, 19 .
- 5—Assembly amendments adopted in accordance with Governor’s recommendations October 5, 19 .”

i. The form of amendment to be adopted by the Assembly shall be consistent with the above rules in including the amendments in reprints of bills, joint resolutions, concurrent resolutions or resolutions.

j. Underlining shall not be used in printing any material except the material hereinbefore designated to be printed in that manner.

k. In any bill which both amends and supplements existing law, each supplementary section shall be designated “(New section)” immediately following its section number.

¹[48.] 50.¹ Rule 140 is amended to read as follows:

140. a. The [chairman]chair of a committee may, upon the consent of a majority of its authorized membership, schedule a public hearing upon any bill or resolution referred to the committee, or upon any matter under investigation or study by the committee.

The time, place and subject matter of any public hearing shall be communicated by the [chairman]chair to the Office of Legislative Services for public notice thereof at least ten days in advance of such hearing.

Every public hearing shall be conducted in the State House, Trenton, unless the Speaker shall approve another location.

b. A hearing duly authorized by the committee may be conducted by any number of the members thereof.

The [chairman]chair of a committee which schedules a public hearing may invite the members of the Senate standing reference committee or committees having the same or similar jurisdiction to sit with the General Assembly committee and participate in such public hearing. In the case of a public hearing conducted pursuant to a resolution directing the committee to undertake an investigation or study, the [chairman]chair may also invite the prime sponsor of such resolution to sit with the committee and participate in such public hearing. Neither the Senate committee nor the prime sponsor shall be entitled to participate in any deliberations of the committee upon the subject matter of the public hearing.

Each witness who is to appear at a public hearing shall file with the committee at least three days in advance of the hearing a written statement of his proposed testimony. Oral presentation at such hearing shall be limited to a brief summary of the statement and responses to questions by the committee or its staff. The [chairman]chair may, upon request, waive the requirement for advance filing of proposed testimony.

c. Each committee may have the proceeding of a public hearing recorded and may have the transcript of such hearings printed, bound and distributed[, except that a public hearing on a bill or resolution shall be recorded and the transcript printed, bound and distributed].

No bill or resolution on which a public hearing has been held before the General Assembly or a committee shall be considered on third reading or for final action, as the case may be, until [two calendar days after the Office of Legislative Services notifies the members of the General Assembly that a printed transcript]a record of the public hearing is available to the membership of the General Assembly.

d. No public hearing shall be scheduled by any committee after September 1 of the second year of any biennial legislative session without the leave of the Speaker.

No bill authorizing the creation of a debt of the State of New Jersey by the issuance of bonds of the State shall be calendared for third reading until a public hearing upon the bill shall have been held before the General Assembly or a committee thereof.

The provisions of Rules 141 et seq. shall be applicable to public hearings on proposals to amend the Constitution.

¹[49.] 51.¹ The Legislative Counsel is authorized to correct in the text of the Rules of the General Assembly any error or omission in legal reference, text, punctuation, spelling, grammar and form, the correction of which will not affect the substance of the text.

¹[50.] 52.¹ The Office of Legislative Services shall provide for the publication and distribution of the Rules of the General Assembly in such form and manner as the Speaker shall direct.

¹[51.] 53.¹ This resolution shall take effect immediately.

A-3612 imposes a 2.75% tax on the gross receipts of refiners and distributors engaging in the first sale of petroleum products in New Jersey.

While this tax is intended to be a business tax, a gross receipts tax is a cost of doing business, and can be passed through the end consumer in the form of higher prices. While home heating oil and propane for home heating are explicitly exempt from this tax, consumers may feel the impact of increased prices on such products as motor oil, gasoline, and even baby products such as Vaseline.

Additionally, this tax would apply to the purchase of oil by other utilities which would then be used in the production of electricity. The incidence of this tax at a rate of 2.75% on the fuel input for electric

generation would then be added to the public utility gross receipts, franchise and excise tax of approximately 13.5%. When added to that, the tax on oil-fired electricity will be more than 16%.

New Jersey is already a high tax state. Tax increases that can be passed through to the already overburdened resident of this State cannot be condoned.

Our greatest concern with this sales tax bill, which will generate well over \$1.3 billion in new tax revenue during the 1991 fiscal year, is that the administration has not completed an economic impact analysis of this tax increase.

Under the bill, New Jersey's new rate will be 7%. This lessens the attractive differential between New York City tax rates and Bergen County. New York City residents may opt to purchase goods and services in Westchester County (New York), rather than making the trip across the river into New Jersey. The New York State rate is 4%, and northern Sussex and Passaic County municipalities must compete with the current Orange County (New York) rate of 6.25%, and Bergen County Communities must compete with a current Westchester County (New York) rate of 5.75%. Businesses which lie along the Delaware River must compete with a current Pennsylvania rate of 6%.

Not only may a rate increase be devastating, the bill also extends the sales tax to sundry other items which are currently exempt from this tax.

Telecommunication services will be taxed as a result of enactment of this legislation. Given the testimony of AT&T, the Independent Pay Phone Association of New Jersey, the New Jersey State Chamber of Commerce, and the Securities Industry Association, which groups all expressed their severe concern over the taxation of telecommunication services, this committee should be unwilling to penalize an industry which is so vital to the economy of this state. Again, there is a current competitive advantage at stake. New York State only taxes intra-state telephone calls. This proposal would have inter-state telephone calls and other transmissions taxed as well. Concern has been expressed by members of the industry, and large corporate users of the service, that enactment of this tax will slow the movement of businesses into New Jersey which have, to date, been coming to New Jersey as a result of our Attractive tax structure.

This bill also breaks a confidence with the alcohol and tobacco industry in this state. Representatives of these industries came before this committee with the understanding that they would too, have to contribute to solving the current fiscal crisis in New Jersey. Representatives of these industries offered positive suggestions

to other components of the FY'91 tax package, which suggestions were taken and amendments made to other bills. They came before this committee in good faith only to have their future tax burdens substantially increased by the imposition of a 7% sales tax on cigarettes and alcoholic beverages.

Finally, this bill imposes a sales tax on household soaps, detergents and disposable paper products. A sales tax is a regressive tax and this component of the bill, further adds to its regressiveness.

In 1976, the courts found that New Jersey's education funding formula was not providing its children with the constitutionally mandated "thorough and efficient" education. The court also determined that too heavy a reliance for school funding was placed on the property tax base. So with promises of property tax relief and quality education for New Jersey's children, the income tax was enacted.

Yes, the income tax did lower property taxes. For one year and by a nominal \$51 million. By 1978, the property tax levy was higher than that of the pre-income tax year.

Recently, again the court has determined that New Jersey's education funding formula is not providing its children in certain areas with a "thorough and efficient" education. And again, with promises of property tax relief, and with a property tax levy that is currently well over \$8 billion, this legislature is about to enact a monumental income tax increase that will effect single filers with taxable income over \$35,000 and married filers with taxable income over \$70,000.

The new high rate will double from the current 3.5% to 7%, destroying the relative advantage New Jersey currently enjoys with regard to New York and Pennsylvania.

In a recessive economy, economic theory does not prescribe taking income out of that economy, especially in the form of higher taxes. The administration has not completed an analysis of the economic impact this proposed tax increase will have on New Jersey. Not only is this legislation counter to sound economic policy, it is unlikely that revenue from this increase will result in lower property taxes, and it places oppressive income tax rates on the people of this State.

Assembly No. 3734, Assemblymen MECCA and VILLAPIANO, Consumer Affairs—Directs the Commissioner of Education to develop bicycle safety curriculum guidelines for grades K-12.

Assembly No. 3735, Assemblyman SPADORO, Judiciary, Law and Public Safety—Mandates the awarding of attorney's fees to successful plaintiffs in civil rights cases.

Assembly No. 3736, Assemblymen SPADORO and KENNY, Transportation Authorities, Telecommunications and Technology—Provides billing standards for CATV companies.

Assembly No. 3737, Assemblyman SPADORO, Labor—Provides for paid leaves of absence for bone marrow donors.

Assembly No. 3738, Assemblyman PATERO, Labor—Provides compensation for PERC appeal board members and rule-making power to the board.

Assembly No. 3740, Assemblymen KELLY and ZECKER, State Operations and Personnel—Conforms State contracts law with the local public contracts law with respect to retainage.

Assembly No. 3741, Assemblymen CIMINO and PATERO, Waste Management, Planning and Recycling—Clarifies that major expansions of hazardous waste facilities are subject to same siting requirements as new major hazardous waste facilities.

Assembly No. 3742, Assemblyman CIMINO, Municipal Government—Authorizes landlords in rent-control municipalities to pass through mandated recycling costs to tenants.

Which motion was adopted.

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I am returning Assembly Bill No. 3697 with my objections for reconsideration.

This bill authorizes the Department of Environmental Protection to expend up to \$77 million in federal monies to provide loans to local governments for up to 50 percent of the eligible costs of 20 identified wastewater treatment system projects. The local governments that receive these loans will not be charged interest and will simply have to repay the principal by the year 2013. Moreover, the Department of Environmental Protection is authorized to make additional loans from any unexpended balances or funds available due to loan repayments resulting from similar appropriations for wastewater treatment system projects from 1987 to 1989. These no-

interest loans are coupled with matching State low-interest loans to cover the remaining 50 percent of anticipated project costs.

While I am zealous in my commitment to assist local governments in upgrading their wastewater treatment plants and thereby improve water quality throughout New Jersey, I cannot endorse this bill in its current form. My objection does not pertain to the merits of this legislation, as I am fully aware of the important role that these annual monetary infusions serve in upgrading our wastewater treatment systems. Rather, I return this bill on procedural grounds, because of language which conditions its effectiveness as law upon the passage of another bill. Specifically, Assembly Bill No. 3697 will not have the effect of law absent Senate Bill No. 2682 (First Reprint) also becoming law.

I am unable to endorse this practice of conditioning the effectiveness of one bill upon the passage of another. This practice prevents me as Governor from fully exercising my constitutional role in the legislative process because it deprives me of the flexibility necessary to ensure an independent review of the legal and policy implications of each piece of legislation that reaches my desk. To avoid a continuation of this unwarranted restriction on gubernatorial review of bills enacted by the Legislature, I have determined that the best approach is to send a clear message now by conditionally vetoing this bill to remove its conditional effective date.

Therefore, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 3697 and recommend that it be amended as follows:

Page 5, Section 12, Lines 44-46:

After "immediately" delete ", but shall remain inoperative until the enactment of P.L. 1990, c. (now before the Legislature as Assembly Bill No. 3696 of 1990)"

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the New Jersey Constitution, I am returning Assembly Bill No. 3419 with my objections for reconsideration.

This bill would require the Real Estate Commission to renew the real estate license of Mr. A. John Ward without the imposition of certain requalifying conditions. Mr. Ward's real estate license expired in 1979, and under current law he would be required to pass the State licensure examination before he could be granted a new license. The sponsors of this bill believe that given Mr. Ward's thirty years of experience in real estate and service-related disability, this requirement poses an undue burden which justifies special relief.

While I share the intent of the sponsors of this legislation, I am constrained by the New Jersey Constitution from endorsing this legislation in its present form. Our State Constitution provides that the Legislature shall not pass special legislation which grants any exclu-

sive privilege, immunity or franchise to any individual. This provision has been interpreted to mean that licensing legislation cannot be passed which benefits one person but denies the same benefits to others who are similarly situated. To meet this constitutional requirement, I suggest that this bill be amended to apply to all persons who may be faced with the same impediments as Mr. Ward.

Therefore, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 3419 and recommend that it be amended as follows:

Page 1, Section 1, Lines 6-16: Delete in entirety and insert "Any person who met the requirements under R.S. 45:15-9 for renewal of a broker's or salesman's license on June 29, 1979, may apply to the New Jersey Real Estate Commission for renewal of the license on or before the 30th day following the effective date of this act and shall obtain the license unless the Commission finds that the applicant lacks honesty, trustworthiness, integrity or other attributes of good moral character."

Assembly Bill No. 15

Submitted by:

Assemblyman Penn and Assemblywoman Randall.

This bill prohibits banks which receive a federal "Community Reinvestment" rating (CRA) of "substantial non-compliance or "needs improvement" from being a depository for public funds. Despite the good intention of the sponsor, this bill remains seriously flawed.

The current economic climate of the state, in addition to the new regulations imposed on financial institutions by the federal government are putting a substantial strain on the financial viability of the same institutions we will be constraining by this bill. Loss of public funds by these banks, savings banks and savings and loan associations could be the final blow.

In addition, this legislation is tied to a rating system totally in the control of an outside organization, the federal government. There still remains some question as to whether these regulators will be able to recognize a bank's marketplace and its favorable activities within its community.

We also question the implications of the bill on municipalities. Municipalities will no longer be able to choose the depository institution which provides the highest interest rates or the best ser-

vice. There is also a question as to whether these banks will be able to purchase municipal bonds.

Finally, banks will be seriously hurt in their efforts to compete with the New Jersey Cash Management Fund in attracting public funds. The Cash Management Fund currently has \$6 billion in public funds to invest. Funds come from a variety of sources including state funds and "other-than-State" funds, which include municipalities and school boards. Despite the new restrictions placed on the Fund by the bill, it will still be able to invest out-of-state and may soon even invest out-of-country.

For these reasons we are unable to support A-15.

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 271 without my approval.

This bill permits the governing body of a county that establishes a locatable mailing address system to require each municipality within the county to make changes to their address system. These changes include the naming and numbering of streets to ensure that there is only one correct name for each street, that confusing street names are eliminated, that numbering proceeds from a logical point of origin and that a system of odd-even numbering is used on opposite sides of a street. The bill also requires that in the event that two municipalities within a county have the same name that such duplication be eliminated and the bill directs the manner in which mail is to be addressed.

While I am sympathetic to the goals and intentions of this bill, I am constrained from enacting this bill into law. The bill permits counties to direct local governments to comply with the requirements of the bill without consideration for local costs. The administration, costs and financing of the program could be extensive and pose a heavy administrative and financial burden on some communities.

I hope that this issue can be revisited by the Legislature in an attempt to fulfill the worthwhile goals of this bill while addressing the administrative and financial burden imposed on local municipalities.

ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 1561
