MINUTES OF THE HOUSE.

TUESDAY, January 14th, 1873.

3 o'clock P. M.

This being the time appointed for the meeting of the Ninety-Seventh General Assembly of the State of New Jersey, and three o'clock being the hour for the organization of the House of Assembly,

The House was called to order by Sinnickson Chew, of Camden, Clerk of the last House.

Prayer was offered by the Rev. Mr. Pearne.

Gentlemen of the House of Assembly:

I thank you sincerely for the honor you have done me in elevating me to the position of presiding officer of this House. I am not unconscious of the grave responsibilities of this position, nor ignorant of the exhausting labors it imposes; but, relying upon your kind forbearance and generous assistance I shall endeavor so to discharge these duties and meet these responsibilities as to reflect no discredit upon the position, or the State of which we are all proud to be citizens. The session promises to be one of more than ordinary interest and importance, and we will no doubt be called upon to legislate in reference to many questions vitally affecting the welfare and reputation of our commonwealth. Let it be our aim to bring to the consideration of all these questions an intelligent and conscientious regard for the best interests of the people, acting in all things independently and fearlessly, for in so doing we shall justify the confidence reposed in us by our constituents, and promote the best good of the whole community. I shall endeavor, in all things, to protect the rights of the minority on this floor and secure at all times so far as lies in my power, harmony and good feeling among the members of the House. Let us especially foster the interests of education, the benevolent institutions, which are maintained by State charity; sustain the purity and dignity of the several departments of the State government and the administration of justice; guard carefully the public expenditures with a wise and liberal economy and avoid superfluous and class legislation.

A message was received from the Senate by the hands of Mr. Babcock, its Secretary, as follows:

I am directed by the Senate to inform the House of Assembly that the Senate has assembled, formed a quorum, elected the Hon. John W. Taylor, Senator from Essex County, President; John F. Babcock, of Middlesex, Secretary, and proceeded to business.

Mr. Carse, from the committee to inform the Governor of the organization of the House, reported that the committee had waited upon the Governor, and that he would communicate to the House by message.

The annual message of the Governor was received by the hands of his Private Secretary, Mr. Hall, and read as follows: (See Documents.)

“A Supplement to an act to incorporate the Treaty Island Bridge Rail Road and Ferry Company.”

Which was read a first time by its title, ordered to have a second reading, and referred to the Committee on Corporations, when appointed.

Mr. Carse, on leave, introduced

Assembly bill No. 2, entitled

"An act to exempt soldiers in the late war of the Rebellion from bounty tax."

Which was read a first time by its title, ordered to have a second reading, and referred to Committee on Claims and Pensions, when appointed.

Mr. Letson, on leave, introduced

Assembly bill No. 3, entitled

"An Act to incorporate the New York and Philadelphia Railway Company."

Which was read a first time by its title, ordered to have a second reading, and referred to the Committee on Corporations, when appointed.

Mr. Letson moved that double the number of the copies be printed.

Which motion was agreed to.

Mr. Plympton, on leave, introduced

Assembly bill No. 4, entitled

"An Act to tax the property of the Erie Railway and the Long Dock Company, within the limits of Jersey City."

Which were read a first time by their titles, ordered to have a second reading, and referred to Committee on Judiciary, when appointed.

Mr. Cole, on leave, introduced

Assembly bill No. 5, entitled

"A Further Supplement to an act to incorporate the Camden and Philadelphia Steamboat Ferry Company, passed March 5, 1836."

Which was read a first time by its title, ordered to have a second reading, and referred to Committee on Corporations, when appointed.

Also.

Assembly bill No. 6, entitled

A Supplement to the act entitled "An act to incorporate the Camden and Atlantic Railroad Company," approved March 19, 1852.

Which was read a first time by its title, ordered to a second reading, and referred to Committee on Corporations, when appointed.

Mr. McKinley, on leave, introduced

Assembly bill No. 7, entitled

"An Act to change the name of the National Life Insurance Company, of Elizabeth, N. J."

Which was read a first time by its title, ordered to have a second reading, and referred to Committee on Banks and Insurance when appointed.

Mr. Canfield, on leave, introduced

Assembly bill No. 8, entitled

"An Act to authorize the formation of railroad corporations and regulate the same.

Which was read a first time by its title, ordered to have a second reading, and referred to Committee on Corporations, when appointed.

Mr. Canfield moved that double the number of copies be printed.

Which motion was agreed to.

Mr. Canfield moved that the usual number of copies of the Governor's message be printed, and that one thousand copies be printed in the German language.

Which motion was agreed to.

Assembly bill No. 9, entitled

"An Act to authorize the executors of the last will and testament of Horace H. Olds, late of the city of Newark, in this state, deceased, to sell and convey certain real estate."

Which was read a first time by its title, ordered to have a second reading, and referred to Committee on Judiciary, when appointed.

Also, Assembly bill No. 10, entitled

"An Act to incorporate the German Young Men's Christian Association, of the city of Newark and vicinity."

Which was read a first time by its title, ordered to have a second reading, and referred to Committee on Corporations, when appointed.

Mr. Foreman, on leave, introduced

Assembly bill No. 11, entitled

"A supplement to an Act entitled, 'An Act to incorporate the Gloucester City Savings Institution,' approved April 2, 1872.

Which was read a first time by its title, ordered to have a second reading, and referred to Committee on Corporations, when appointed.

Mr. Wandle, on leave, introduced

Assembly bill No. 12, entitled

"Supplement to an Act entitled, 'An Act to incorporate the Hudson County Fair Ground Association,' approved April 2d, 1872.

Which was read a first time by its title, ordered to have a second reading, and referred to Committee on Corporations, when appointed.

Mr. Morrow, on leave, introduced

Assembly bill No. 13, entitled

"A Further Supplement to the Act entitled, 'An Act for the better security of titles to land sold by Sheriffs or other officers,' approved March 25, 1865.

Which was read a first time by its title, ordered to have a second reading, and referred to the Committee on Judiciary, when appointed.

Mr. Hobart, on leave, introduced

Assembly bill No. 14, entitled

"A Further Supplement to the Act entitled, 'An Act incorporating the inhabitants of Townships, designating their powers and regulating their meetings,' approved April 14, 1846."

Which was read a first time by its title, ordered to have a second reading, and referred to Committee on Judiciary, when appointed.

"An Act to authorize the Board of Chosen Freeholders of Passaic county to borrow money, for bridge purposes."

AMENDMENTS

Proposed by the Special Committee of the House of Assembly to the amendment of the Senate to Assembly bill No. 8, entitled "An act to authorize the formation of railroad corporations, and regulate the same."

The committee report with the recommendation that the House concur in the Senate amendment with the following amendments thereto:

The references in these amendments refer to Senate reprint of Assembly bill No. 8, and not to House reprint.

Sec. 1, No. 1, line 23. Strike out the word "thereupon" and insert "upon tendering the said articles to the Secretary of State to be filed."

No. 2. Strike out all after "association" in line twenty-five, and insert

"Every corporation formed under this act, in addition to the general powers set forth in an act entitled, "An act concerning corporations," approved February 14, 1846, and the several supplements thereto, shall have power:

1. To cause such examination and surveys for its proposed railroad to be made as may be necessary to the selection of the most advantageous route, and for such purpose by its officers and servants to enter upon the lands or waters of any person, but subject to responsibility for all damages which shall be done thereto.

2. To take and hold such voluntary grants of real estate and other property as shall be made to it, to aid in the construction, maintenance and accommodation of its railroad, but the real estate received as a voluntary grant shall be held and used for the purpose of such grant only.

3. To purchase, hold and use all such real estate or other property as may be necessary for the construction and mainte-

nance of its railroad, and the stations and other accommodations necessary to accomplish the object of its incorporation.

4. To lay out its road as hereby provided, and to construct the same, and for the purposes of cuttings and embankments, to take as much more land as may be necessary for the proper construction and security for the road.

5. To exercise all other powers hereby granted.

Sec. 4, No. 3. Strike out from word "subscribed" in line four, to word "continue" in line six.

Sec. 10, Fo. 4. Strike out section and change the numbers of succeeding sections so as to follow in order.

Sec. 12, No. 5, line 5. Strike out words "president and directors their" and insert "company its".

No. 6, line 6. Strike out "their" and insert "its."

No. 7, line 9. Strike out "and erect."

No. 8, line 15. Insert at the end of line "upon payment or tender of such compensation as is hereinafter provided."

No. 9. Strike out from word "employ," line seventeen, to word "to," line nineteen.

No. 10. Insert in line twenty-five, after word "and," "for that purpose to enter upon, take possession of, hold, have, use, occupy, and excavate any lands, and to erect embankments, bridges, and all other necessary works and."

No. 11, lines 28 and 29. Strike out "subject to such compensation as is hereinafter provided."

No. 12. Strike out "through or," in line thirty.

Sec. 13, No. 13, line 36. Strike out word "which" and insert "and thereupon and on payment or tender of payment of the amount awarded as hereinafter provided, the said company is hereby empowered to enter upon and take possession of the said lands or materials for the purposes aforesaid, and the said."

No. 14, line 37. After word "county," insert "and proof of payment or tender of the amount awarded."

Sec. 14, No. 15. Add at end of section "and on such tender or payment of the money into court, in case it be refused as aforesaid, the said Company shall be empowered to enter upon and take possession of said lands and proceed with the work of constructing its road."

Sec. 16, No. 16, line 5. After word "railroad" insert "and any such company shall have power and be authorized to demand and receive such sums of money for the transportation of persons and property on said railways and their connections, and for any other services connected with the business of transportation on or over said railways or to and from the same as it from time to time shall think reasonable and proper."

No. 17, line 5. Strike out word "they" and insert words "said Company."

No. 18. Add at the end of section as follows: "and the said railroad, with its appendages, and the lands over which the same shall pass, and all the work and improvements, and all the property whatsoever belonging to the company shall be and are hereby declared to be vested in the said company, and its successors, for and during the continuance of its charter."

No. 19, line 1. Strike out the words "the president and directors of."

Sec. 18, No. 20, line 24. Strike out word "any" and insert word "said."

No. 21, line 25. Strike out word "other" and insert after word "companies" the words "so acquiring said stock, property, franchises and road."

No. 22, line 26. After word "them" insert the words "and transport freights and passengers over the same, and take compensation therefor."

No. 23, line 27. After word "act" insert words "notwithstanding any special privilege heretofore granted, or hereafter to be granted to another corporation for the transportation of freights and passengers between any points on the lines of said roads or any other points within or without this State."

Sec. 19, No. 24, line 5. Correct word "corporated" so as to read "incorporated."

Sec. 21, No. 25, line 6. Strike out word "and" and insert after word "negotiation" the words "and sale."

No. 26, line 8. After word "company" insert "provided that said company shall not plead any statute or statutes against usury in any court of law or equity in any suit instituted to enforce the payment of any bond or mortgage executed under the provisions of this section."

Sec. 24, No. 27. Add at the end of the section "and all companies whose railroads are or shall hereafter be crossed, intersected or joined, shall receive from each other and forward to their destination all goods, merchandise, and other property intended for points on their respective roads, with the same despatch and at a rate of freight not exceeding the local tariff rate charged for similar goods, merchandise, and other property received at and forwarded from the same points for individuals and other corporations."

Sec. 36, No. 28. Strike out from words "New Jersey," in line five, to and including the word "court," in line nine.

Sec. 37, No. 29, line 21. After word "obtained" insert the words "who are hereby authorized to convey the same on receiving such compensation as they may fix."

No. 30. Strike out all after the words "New Jersey," in twenty-third line, down to word "except," in twenty-fifth line, and insert "or any franchise, lands, or located route of any bridge, railroad, canal, turnpike, or other corporation chartered for the purpose of facilitating transportation, except for the purpose of crossing said lands or route of said corporation, and,"

No. 31. Add at end of section, "*and provided further*, that no railroad shall be located under this act (elsewhere than in the counties of Essex, Hudson and Camden) for more than five miles within fifteen hundred feet of the route of any other railroad previously located on constructed, unless with the consent of such other railroad company, previously obtained therefor: *provided*, that a railroad may be located or constructed under this act on the surveyed route or location of any other railroad, with the consent of such corporation, and not otherwise: *and provided further*, that no railroad under this act shall cross another railroad at a less angle than forty-five degrees."

Sec. 39, No. 32, line 1. After the word "that" insert as follows:

"No franchise heretofore granted to construct a railroad, or to build or establish bridges or ferries, or operate any line of travel, and take tolls or fares therefor, shall hereafter continue to be or be construed to remain exclusive and that no like franchise hereafter granted shall be or be construed to be exclusive unless in such grant heretofore made or hereafter to be made; it be so expressly provided; and"

No. 33. Insert at end of section "all corporations organized under this act shall be subject to all general laws, now or hereafter to be passed, regulating railroads and their operations."

Sec. 40, No. 34. Add at the end of section "but such repeal or alteration shall not affect any corporations heretofore organized, unless the act making such repeal or alteration shall so expressly declare."

REASONS.

For the Amendments of the Assembly Committee to the Amendment of the Senate to Assembly bill No. 8.

The references herein are to Senate reprint of said bill and not to Assembly reprint.

No. 1. Amendment No. 1, Sec. 1, Line 23, is proposed because under Senate amendment, the association does not become a corporation until the Secretary of State has recorded the articles in a book; the proposed amendment makes it a corporation on filing the articles.

No. 2. Amendment No. 2, Sec. 1, Line 25, is proposed because under the Senate amendment no power is given to the cor-

poration created under this act to carry out the purposes for which it is created. This gives the power.

No. 3. Amendment No. 3, Sec. 4, Lines 4 to 6, is proposed for the purpose of giving to the parties who start any enterprise under this act, the right to retain control of it.

No. 4. Amendment No. 4, Sec. 10. Striking out the whole section is proposed, because Section 10 of the Assembly reprint imposed an individual liability upon stockholders, and the 11th section, which is the 10th section of the Senate amendment, exempted all persons acting in a fiduciary capacity as trustee, &c., from all liability, except to the extent of the trust fund. To retain the liability of the trust fund, when the liability of an individual stockholder is dispensed with, seems to the Committee unjust; and as the Assembly Committee assent to the Senate exemption of the liability of the individual stockholder, they think the trust fund ought also to be exempted.

No. 5. Amendment No. 5, Sec. 12, Line 5. This alteration is to give the franchises to the corporation, instead of the president and directors.

No. 6. Amendment No. 6, Sec. 12, Line 6. A verbal alteration to conform to the last change and make sense.

No. 7. Amendment No. 7, Sec. 12, Line 9, is proposed because the Senate amendment authorizes (evidently by mistake) the erection of the works upon the land taken, at the same time that the preliminary survey is permitted, and before compensation is required.

No. 8. Amendment No. 8, Sec. 12, Line 15, is proposed for the sake of clearness and to make it certain that compensation shall be paid before possession is taken of the owner's land. The amendment consists of transferring the clause in lines 28 and 29 "subject, &c.," to a more appropriate place, altering the expression to "upon payment, &c."

No. 9. Amendment No. 9, Sec. 12, Lines 17 to 19, strikes out a clause merely for clearness, and the next amendment restores it in another place.

No. 10. Amendment No. 10, Sec. 12, Line 25, is the clause in Amendment No. 9, transposed to its proper place, with the necessary words, "and for that purpose."

No. 11. Amendment No. 11, Sec. 12, Lines 28-29, strikes out the clause in lines 28 and 29 of Senate amendment, which is supplied by the foregoing Amendment No. 8.

No. 12. Amendment No. 12, Sec. 12, Line 30 strikes out the words "through or," which obscure the sense.

No. 13. Amendment No. 13, Sec. 13, Line 36, is proposed to delay entrance upon the possession of the owner until there is record evidence of the company's title by the filing of the report of the commissioners and by payment.

No. 14. Amendment No. 14, Sec. 13, Line 37, is proposed because the Senate amendment made the commissioner's report alone, plenary evidence of the title of the company to the land taken without proof of payment of the compensation awarded.

No. 15. Amendment No. 15, section 14, at the end, is proposed to enable the company to execute the works, pending appeal, if the compensation awarded by the commissioners is paid or tendered.

No. 16. Amendment No. 16, section 16, line 5, is proposed because the Senate amendment omitted to give to the company any express right to take toll or fares. This is deemed vital under the recent construction of the courts.

No. 17. Amendment No. 17, section 16, line 6, is a mere substitution of a word to restrain the corporation and not merely its officers.

No. 18. Amendment No. 18, section 16, at the end, is proposed because the provision having been originally in Assembly bill No. 8, the shape which the Senate amendment has given to the bill seems to require the restoration of the clause substantially to vest the property in the corporation, and not in the officers.

No. 19. Amendment No. 19, section 16, line 1, merely strikes out the words "president and directors," so as to give the franchise to the company instead of its officers.

No. 20. Amendment No. 20, section 18, line 24, merely strikes out the word "any" and inserts the word "said," so as to restrain the power to railroad corporations, created by this act, instead of extending it to companies of any kind.

No. 21. Amendment No. 21, section 18, line 25, is proposed, for the sake of perspicuity.

No. 22. Amendment No. 22, section 18, line 26, is proposed because without the amendment there would not be a clear limitation of the right to take toll in case of consolidation, merger or lease.

No. 23. Amendment No. 23, section 18, line 27, is proposed so that a corporation created by this general act may have the same right as if it were created by special act, against corporations specially created, and, as recently held by the courts, having an implied monopoly.

No. 24. Amendment No. 24, section 19, line 5, a grammatical correction.

No. 25. Amendment No. 25, section 21, line 6, is proposed so as to enable the company to sell its bonds.

No. 26. Amendment No. 26, section 21, line 8, is proposed to prevent the company from setting up usury against its bonds.

No. 27. Amendment No. 27, section 24, at the end, is introduced to prevent discriminations against connecting roads.

No. 28. Amendment No. 28, section 36, lines 5 to 9, is proposed for the purpose of striking out the penalty for the violation of the third section, and to correct an evident misreference.

No. 29. Amendment No. 29, section 37, line 21, is proposed for the purpose of giving clear authority to the riparian commissioners to convey the necessary lands under water for route and terminus.

No. 30. Amendment No. 30, section 37, line 23, is proposed to prevent the occupation, longitudinally, of the routes of canals, turnpikes, railroads, and bridges of bridge companies, without consent of such companies.

No. 31. Amendment No. 31, section 37, at the end, is proposed to allow the occupation of the location of other roads, if they consent, but to prevent (without consent) locations of routes within fifteen hundred feet of each other, except for certain specified distances, and certain specified places, where it is necessary; and further, to prevent crossing at an improper angle.

No. 32. Amendment No. 32, section 39, line 1. The courts having recently held that a grant of a franchise is exclusively by implication, against every one but the State, which the State may at any moment extinguish, the object of this amendment is that hereafter no such monopoly shall continue, and that henceforth none shall be created, unless the representatives of the people shall declare their design so to bind the citizens by an express and unmistakable indication of their intention.

No. 33. Amendment No. 33, section 39, at the end, is proposed to put these railroad corporations on an equal footing with all others.

No. 34. Amendment No. 34, section 40, and last, at the end, is to save the rights of property of these corporations in the event of the repeal of this act.

I return to the House of Assembly, where it originated, bill No. 454, entitled "An act to set off a new township from parts of the townships of Ocean and Shrewsbury, in the county of Monmouth, to be called the township of Eatontown, and for other purposes," with my objections thereto.

New townships should not be created unless it clearly appear that the public convenience would be promoted thereby. By the term public convenience, I do not mean the accommodation of a few individuals, for every new township must necessarily bring the place for holding elections and transaction of the town business nearer to a few persons. Upon applications for new counties or townships the question to be settled is whether a majority of the people to be affected by the proposed change will be benefited, and but few injured thereby. If the present inconvenience to the public be such as to justify the disturbing of ancient lines and the increase of expenses necessarily resulting from an increase in the number of officers, such applications should be granted, but not otherwise.

Applying this test to the present bill, it is evident that there is no necessity for the proposed new township. Very few persons residing within its limits are more than three miles from the places where the town business is now transacted. A large population in the eastern portion of the new township are nearer Long Branch and Oceanville, their present voting places, than they are to the village of Eatontown, where the town meetings and elections for the new township would be held. But few persons in the new township would be better accommodated than now, while a large majority would suffer positive inconvenience by the change.

In determining upon the propriety of setting off a township, our inquiry should not be limited to the effect upon the inhabitants within its borders, but we should also ascertain how it will cut the township or townships from which it is to be taken. Many members of the Legislature are unacquainted with the locality referred to in this bill, and I therefore, send herewith a map which shows the present lines of the townships of Ocean

and Shrewsbury, and also the boundaries of the proposed township. By examining this map, it will be seen that the townships of Ocean and Shrewsbury are long and narrow, and adjoin each other nearly their entire length. Shrewsbury township extends from the mouth of Shrewsbury River, southerly, a distance of about fourteen miles, while its width, in some places, is less than two miles. Ocean township, from the Shrewsbury river to Shark River, is more than fourteen miles in length. If at any time a new township be taken from Ocean and Shrewsbury, it should include the entire southern portion of each, from the line of Atlantic township to the sea. Such division would accommodate the people of both townships, in the vicinity of Shark River, some of whom are now obliged to travel a distance of nine miles to election. The proposed township of Eatontown does not include any part of the territory where the people are thus incommoded, but embraces a district about four miles long and three wide, in the central part of the two old townships where the people are already well accommodated. If this bill become a law, it will leave Ocean township over fourteen miles long, and where it connects with the southeastern part of the new township not more than a mile wide. Voters who reside in Ocean township would go across the new township nearly its whole width to get to Long Branch Village, where the township business of what remains of Ocean will be transacted, and some who reside in the southern part of Shrewsbury, in going to the polls, will pass through Eatontown Village, where the elections for the new township are to be held, and then travel more than three miles further to Red Bank, before they can deposit their ballots.

I cannot conceive of a single reason to justify the carving of these two townships as this bill proposes.

There is another serious objection to the bill. At the recent annual town meeting of the township of Ocean, all the township officers were elected for the current year. Voters residing in part of that township which this bill sets off, participated in the election of those officers. Some of the persons then elected reside in the territory embraced by the new township. Of this number is the gentleman who was elected Chosen Freeholder. The third section of this bill provides for a special election of town officers for the new township to be held on next Tuesday. If such election take place, the people of the new township will have participated in the choice of two sets of town officers

in the same year. They will elect a Chosen Freeholder to represent the township of Eatontown, and they have already aided in electing a Chosen Freeholder for what will remain of the township of Ocean, both of whom will take their seats in the County Board at the same time, unless the one already elected be decided ineligible by reason of being legislated out of the township of Ocean for which he was chosen. If Eatontown elect a new Freeholder, the one already elected could not act for the new township, for in Monmouth county each township is entitled to but one Freeholder, and if he could not act for what remains of Ocean county by reason of non-residence, he would be legislated out of office by this bill. Even if he could legally act for Ocean township, the Legislature should not place him in a position to do so after he is out of her territory and can have no interest in her affairs. If the proposed township be needed the bill should have been passed before the town elections in Monmouth county were held. Failing in this, it should have been postponed to the next session of the Legislature, or provision should have been made in the bill for this anomalous condition of things, either by providing that all officers already elected should hold during the term for which they were chosen for the township in which they reside, or by postponing the time for the law to take effect.

The passage of the bill at this time would produce other complications growing out of the vote of the late town meeting of Ocean, raising money for ways and means and roads, for which no remedy is given. It is represented to me that in the preparation of the description of boundaries of the new township, a small part of the township of Ocean has been separated from its main body. If this be so (and it is a matter that should be inquired into,) the bill is certainly improper, as every township should be composed of contiguous territory.

The final objection to this bill is, that it violates the fourth section of article seventh of the constitution, which proves that every law shall embrace but one object, and that shall be expressed in its title. The bill embraces two distinct objects. The words "and for other purposes," used in the title, prove that some object is contemplated, in addition to the setting off of a township. By reference to the eighth section, it will be seen that the bill not only creates the new township of Eatontown, but also removes from one legislative district to another a township located more than fifteen miles distant from the proposed new township of Eatontown. The people of the township of Matawan cannot lawfully be transferred to another district without a special act

for the purpose, the title of which shall clearly express such object.

Even if the Constitution permitted a bill to embrace more than one object, each object should be distinctly stated in the title. The words, "for other purposes," are too vague and general. If this act be constitutional, then under its indefinite title, the Legislature, while creating a new township, might have set off the township of Matawan, to the county of Middlesex, or chartered a bank, or authorized the construction of a railroad, for either of these objects, might, with equal propriety, be covered by the term, "for other purposes." In the haste of legislation, this feature of the bill must have been overlooked.

Even if the township of Matawan could legally be transferred from the Third to the Second District by this bill, it would be wrong to do so. The population of the districts are nearly equal. Matawan is now in a district of compact territory, composed of townships of the same general character of land and population. The proposition is to put this extreme northern township of the county with the township of Wall, which lies in the extreme south, thus forming a district over twenty-five miles long, and in one place less than a mile wide. The people of these townships have different interests and are comparative strangers to each other. Since the last census the legislative districts were arranged after long and careful consideration, and they should not be interfered with without good cause. In this case no valid reason for the proposed change has been given.— But even if proper and desirable, it cannot be legally accomplished by this bill, which embraces a different object, has a title that gives no intimation of the alteration of legislative districts, and is, therefore, unconstitutional.

For the above stated reasons, I respectfully return the bill for reconsideration.

I have received remonstrances against this bill, signed by a large number of citizens residing within the boundaries of the proposed new township, as well as within what would remain of the township of Ocean, which I herewith transmit for the information of the Legislature.

From a careful consideration of the information thus elicited, your committee are led to believe that the Stanhope Railroad bill was irregularly passed at the last session of the Legislature by the connivance of some person or persons within the House of Assembly, and others not connected therewith; but owing to

the impossibility of eliciting from the witnesses exact and precise information thereupon, and the neglect of others whom it was intended to examine, but who failed to appear, they are unable to report with precision the manner in which the bill was so passed, or the person or persons thus implicated.

Your committee in their examination have used every effort to reach the bottom of the irregular proceedings, yet have found the affair so shrouded in mystery as to baffle all direct attempts at its penetration. They desire, however, to bear testimony to the carefulness and fidelity of the Speaker of the last session, as also the Clerk, and are able to state positively that the irregularity (if not fraud), was not in any way through their connivance, and could not have been prevented by them under the ordinary circumstances, or the precautions of legislation.

In the matter of the United Railway Companies to the Pennsylvania Railroad, also referred to this committee, your Committee would report that owing to the large amount of work entailed upon them by the Stanhope investigation, they have been unable to find time to examine into the matter, and beg to be relieved from further inquiry therein.

STATE OF NEW JERSEY,
EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT,
TRENTON, April 2, 1873. }

To the Senate:

I return to the Senate, where it originated, Bill No. 365, entitled "A supplement to an act entitled 'An act relative to juries and verdicts,'" approved April 17, 1846, with my objections thereto.

This bill creates a commission of jurors for Hudson county.—The commission is to consist of two persons, to be appointed every two years by a major part of the judges of the court of common pleas of said county.

In this commission is vested the power of selecting all grand and petit jurors. No citizen can serve unless he be on the commissioners' jury lists, and be drawn by them. The law which makes it the duty of the Sheriff to make lists and impanel juries is repealed.

Each commissioner is to receive from the county treasury, compensation which may be ten dollars a day for the time employed and there is no limit to the number of days he may be employed.

The above brief statement of the provisions of this bill proves that it is a measure of more than ordinary importance. To the jurors of a county are committed not only the property of its citizens, but also their liberties and lives.

A trust of immense responsibility is confided to those who have the selection of jurors. In this State that duty has always been performed by the Sheriffs of the several counties. I am not aware that the trust reposed in these officers has been abused.

The verdicts of jurors in this State have generally given great satisfaction, insomuch that to-day New Jersey is famed throughout the country for her strict but impartial administration of the law. Before we sanction an innovation of our law in this regard,

established as it is by the experience of more than a century, we should be sure that the proposed change would give us better jurors.

What assurance have we that commissioners appointed by the major part of the common pleas judges chosen for the several counties by joint meeting of the legislature, would execute this important trust with greater fidelity and impartiality than the Sheriffs, who are elected directly by the people.

If we have just and fair men to select and impanel our jurors, it makes but little difference, practically, by whom they are chosen, or whether they are called by the name of commissioner or sheriff. But suppose the officer entrusted with this delicate and important duty shall abuse his trust and use his office for corrupt or selfish purposes, it is very important that the people get rid of him as soon as possible. The sheriff is elected annually by a direct vote of the people, and if he prove unfit or unworthy, the position may be filled by another at the next election; but an incompetent or corrupt commissioner, appointed in the way this bill proposes, would be beyond the power of removal by the people. He may be retained as long as the major part of the common pleas judges shall determine. The judges themselves are independent of the people of the county; for they are appointed for five years by a body composed of representatives from every section of the State.

I have no doubt that the framers of the law so long existing in this state, which allows the sheriff to hold the office for three years, and yet requires his election every year, had in view this vital question, and intended that the people should not part with their control over the officer, who had the selection of the jurors, to whom their dearest rights and privileges are committed. The trial by jury has been justly denominated the principal bulwark of the people's liberties. In the country from which we derive much of our judicial system; it was secured by *Magna Charta*.

The constitution of every well governed State recognizes it as the corner-stone of good government, and declares that it shall remain inviolate. An eminent writer on the subject remarks, that if the administration of justice be entirely left to the magistracy, a select body of men generally selected by such as enjoy the high offices in a State, their decision in spite of their natural integrity, will often have an involuntary bias towards those of

their own rank and dignity, and it is not to be expected that the few should always be attentive to the interests and good of the many. It is therefore wisely ordered that the principles and axioms of law should be deposited in the breasts of the judges, to be applied to the facts that come before them.

"A competent number of sensible and upright jurymen, chosen from among those of the middle rank, will be found the best investigators of truth and the surest guardians of public justice.

"This arrangement, therefore, preserves in the hands of the people that share which they ought to have in the administration of public justice, and prevents the encroachments of the powerful and wealthy."

The doctrine thus clearly set forth by one of the ablest lawyers the world has produced, whose commentaries form the text-book of every student, recognizes the broad difference between the province of the judge and the juror, and teaches that this distinction should be maintained.

Under our law, the court already has great power. Through the charge and instructions to the jury, the judges, in a measure, shape the verdict, and if the result be against the law or the weight of facts, they may in many cases set aside the finding of the jury. They also have large discretion in allowing challenges, and thus may purge the panel of objectionable jurors.

If to all this we add the power of the court through its agents to select the whole panel of jurors, we break down that line of demarcation which our law has already recognized, and experience has proved to be essential to the proper administration of justice.

I am, therefore, clear in the opinion that the right of trial by jury, which has justly been called the glory of the law and the safeguard of popular rights, can only be maintained in its purity by continuing in the officer elected by the people, and annually responsible to them, the power of selecting our jurors.

The clause in this bill which requires that of the two commissioners, one shall be of each political party, may have been intended to prevent partizan bias and partiality in the selection of jurors, and it may have aided its passage, but whether it would have that effect is open to great doubt, and would depend entirely on the character of the persons appointed as commissioners.

This provision, however well intended, does not remove from my mind the objections to the bill hereinbefore expressed, and which relate to an important principle affecting our judicial system. I have not much faith in the practical efficacy of that class of laws which give the power of appointment, and yet trammel the appointing power with political considerations.

If there be a disposition to evade the intent and spirit of such laws it can easily be done. It matters not to what political party the commissioners to be appointed may belong, if they are upright and conscientious men; and if they are not such men, they would not be fit persons to have the selection of jurymen, although attached to opposing political parties. My objection to such legislation is, that the very law, giving life to the appointing body, expresses on its face a doubt of the fairness and impartiality of the tribunal it has created.

It is best to place full confidence in the appointing power, and then hold it to a strict responsibility for the character and qualifications of its appointees, without reference to their political views. Laws are of too solemn a character to recognize in terms the existence of partizan considerations.

Such provision is certainly not flattering to the tribunal invested with the appointment, nor is it flattering to human nature.

The objections thus far stated would apply to this bill if it were a general law extending to all the counties. But there is another and still stronger objection. Its provisions effect but one county of the State.

This species of special legislation is especially to be deprecated.

All laws relating to modes of procedure in our courts should be general in their applications. As well might rules of evidence differing from those which govern the proceedings of other legal tribunals, be prescribed for the courts of Hudson county, as to enact a different mode of selecting jurors.

If this be a good law for one county, why not extend its provisions to all? Shall it be said that while the people of every other county of the State are capable of electing a sheriff to discharge all the duties pertaining to the office, that the people of the county of Hudson cannot be trusted to choose that officer, unless shorn of his most important functions? I am not willing

to affix my signature to a bill, which in effect, if not in words, declares that the people of that county are incapable of self-government.

To HON. ISAAC L. FISHER, *Speaker of the House of Assembly*:

The Special Committee appointed under resolution adopted by the House on the 11th day of March, A. D., 1873, to inquire into the truth of the charges made by VanCamp & Worthington against Josephus Sooy, Jr., State Treasurer, in regard to the rate of risk and amount of insurance, placed upon the State House and furniture; beg leave to submit the following report:

We have carefully examined the matters submitted to us under the aforesaid resolution, on the part of the complainants, VanCamp & Worthington, and on the part of the defendant, Josephus Sooy, Jr., State Treasurer, and find,

1st. That a resolution was adopted on the 29th day of February, A. D. 1872, at the last session of the Legislature, authorizing the State Treasurer to have the public buildings of the State properly insured.

2. That in accordance with said resolution, the State Treasurer placed one hundred and eighty thousand dollars insurance upon the State Capitol and upon the furniture, in the following companies, through the following agents, and at the following rates :

4. That the above amount was so placed by him after consultation with Senators Bettie, Irick, Beasley, Speaker Niles, Theodore Horn and other members of the House, and with other business men:

5. That the risk was three and a-half per centum for five years.

6. That such rate was the same as was the risk upon the policies then expired upon said buildings as previously placed by Governor Ward.

7. That at the time of placing the risks by the State Treasurer rates were from $25\frac{1}{2}$ -to $50\frac{1}{2}$ higher than they were previous to the Chicago fire—insurance companies having concluded that for purposes of safety, after the havoc made upon them by said fire, their rates were too low.

8. That the State Treasurer acting under the written opinion of the Attorney General, bearing date Feb. 13, 1872, and pending the resolution passed by the last Legislature (the previous insurance placed by Governor Ward having expired) proceeded in the absence of any insurance, to have placed upon the State Capitol through Mr. Horn, as aforesaid, insurance to the amount of \$40,000 at the same rate as was the former policies, and that the remainder of the insurance was subsequently placed at the same rate—the present policies being within either the old ones, at least so much as was placed by Mr. Horn, and the balance of them, either from the old ones, or from the new ones made by Mr. Horn.

9. That from evidence produced before us by leading Insurance Companies and men whose business is that of Surveyors of Fire Insurance Companies of the State, the rates were not too

high, nor was the amount of insurance placed too large, considering the original costs of the building and the improvements amounting to \$240,000, then lately made.

10. That Van Camp & Worthington made an application in writing through the post on the 28th day of March, A. D. 1873, to the State Treasurer for \$55,000 risk, or a larger amount if offered, in which no rate of premium was named—at which time the risks were either placed or arrangement made to have them placed.

11. That it was further alleged on the part of Van Camp & Worthington that pending the passage of the resolution aforesaid, a bid was made by them, or one of them in person, to the State Treasurer through his clerk John P. Lansing, which allegation was denied by the State Treasurer, and his clerks; they allege that the bill of Van Camp & Worthington, bearing date March 28, 1872, was the only bid in writing by the State Treasurer received.

12. That at the time the risks were placed, the companies on which they were placed were in good standing, excepting the American, at Jersey City—that as soon as it was discovered said company was not sound, the risk was placed in another company without any expense to the State; that one of the companies known as the international, has wound up by reason of the large fire at Boston, and the large risks taken there; which said company at the time the risk, was taken upon the State House was considered sound among other companies.

13. That with one exception, the agents who placed the risks, in the aforesaid companies, received no more than the usual commissions from the companies they represented, and that no part of the commissions were paid to the State Treasurer, or to any person in his office, or out of it; but were retained wholly by the agents; and that the State Treasurer had no knowledge directly or indirectly, in any way, shape, or manner, of the amount of commissions by the agents received.

14. That it appears from the evidence before the committee that since the policies were so placed they could have been placed at a less premium, but it does not appear to the committee that at the time the insurance was so placed, that the State Treasurer had any knowledge that it could be done at a less rate than is named in the policies; on this point the committee have affidavits

and letters from the leading insurance companies in this State, that they would not have taken risks at a less rate than is named in the policies placed as aforesaid.

15. That your committee believe it would have been better had the State Treasurer advertised for proposals to place the insurance upon the State buildings; yet the matter under the resolution was placed under the sole control of the Treasurer without any direction as to the manner in which he should proceed; neither does it appear that any proposals were offered when prior insurance was placed; that if the State Treasurer erred in judgment, he is certainly, under the evidence, fully exonerated from any complicity with any person or agent in the matter of the premium realized, or with having in any way, shape, or manner received; or having been allowed, or that he expected any part of the same; and that his whole official conduct is above suspicion in this matter according to the evidence.

It is also to be congratulated on the amount and character of the business it has transacted and especially in the fact that it has been ever mindful of the rights and interest, not of any corporation or corporations, but of its constituency—embracing the whole people of the State, it has risen to the dignity of the situation, and enacted, whenever the same has been submitted to it, and originated in other cases laws which break down the barriers to a free and proper competition.

I commend the representative of the press in this House, who have been as it were, the photographers of the daily doings, for the general accuracy of their work. I bear testimony to faithful zeal and labors of the officers of this body, and I heartily appreciate the uniform kindness, forbearance and support my fellow members have ever given me in the discharge of the trying duties of my position. If at times I have ruled with undue severity, or without just cause aggrieved any member of this House, I plead in extenuation of my fault the weakness inseparable from human nature. I ask that by-gones be by-gones. And now, hoping that honor and prosperity may always follow you, I bid you farewell.

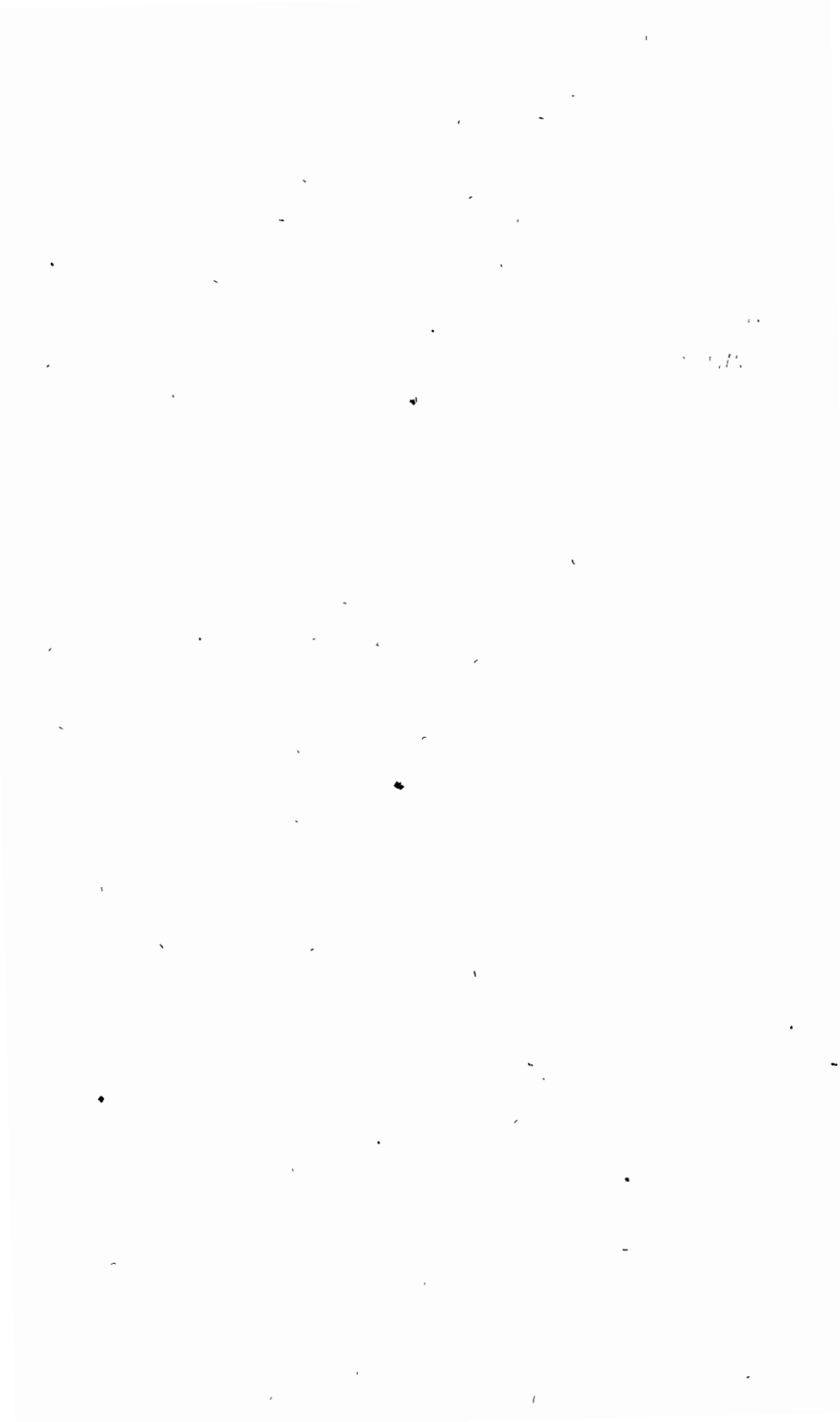
