

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

JOINT COMMITTEE'S REPORT.

TREASURER'S OFFICE, TRENTON, N. J., November 22, 1880.

To the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

The Joint Committee of the Legislature, appointed to audit the accounts of the State Treasurer, respectfully report, that they have carefully examined said accounts, together with the vouchers for the receipts and disbursements, for the year ending October 31st, 1880, and also the securities belonging to the State, and find the vouchers and securities correct in every particular, and the books of the office systematically kept.

A detailed statement hereto annexed, presents an accurate account of the business of the office for the past fiscal year, and the balance to the credit of the several funds, which show the finances of the State to be in excellent condition.

In addition to the income of School Fund (which is derived from interest on bonds, bonds and mortgages, and dividends on stocks), the Treasurer holds leases of lands under water given by the Riparian Commission, amounting to five hundred and eighty thousand seven hundred and eightythree dollars and twenty-eight cents (\$580,783.28), on which amount seven per cent. is due semi-annually; of the above amount I have delivered to the Attorney General, October 30th, 1880, leases amounting in the aggregate to one hundred and seventy-three thousand two hundred and seven dollars (\$173,207.00) the same being one year or more in arrearage of rent.

The Agricultural College Fund, amounting to one hundred and sixteen thousand dollars (\$116,000), is all invested in bonds of this State; the interest amounting to six thousand nine hundred and sixty dollars (\$6,960.00), has been received and disbursed for the maintenance of Rutger's Scientific School.

The indebtedness on war account has been decreased one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000), being the amount or bonds due and redeemed January 1st, 1880. Balance of war bonds outstanding, one million nine hundred and ninety-six thousand three hundred dollars (\$1,996,300), of which amount one hundred thousand dollars falls due the first day of January, 1881:
