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## INTRODUCTION

This statistical report deals with the operation of the Bureau of Parole for the fiscal year July 1, 1964 through June 30, 1965. The Bureau has responsibility to conduct investigations, provide supervision, and submit reports concerning persons paroled from New Jersey penal and correctional institutions, and persons paroled from penal and correctional institutions of other states to reside in New Jersey.

In order to execute its responsibility, the Bureau maintains eight district offices throughout the state and an institutional parole office in each of the penal and correctional institutions, all under supervision of the Central Office in Trenton.

## CASELOADS

At the beginning of the fiscal year 1964-65 there were 4,902 under supervision, and at the end of the year, on June 30, 1965, there were 5,262 cases, for an increase of 360 cases (7.3%). Throughout the year 8,268 persons were supervised by the Bureau. (See Tables #1 and 1A). This figure shows a steady increase for each of the past five years, and is more than 12% greater than 5 years ago. With the continued high population rate in New Jersey institutions, it can be anticipated that the figure will continue to show an increase. The average caseload this year was 5,143 cases as compared to the average caseload of 4,863 in the previous fiscal year (5.7% increase).

At the end of the fiscal year 12% of the caseload was assigned to "intense" supervision status, 70% to "regular" status, 6% to "quarterly" status, 2% to "semi-annual" or "annual" status, 3% serving time in another institution, 5% "missing" status, and the remaining 2% were either in a medical facility, in the United States Forces, or in "deported" status. These figures are fairly consistent with those reported last year.

To discharge their responsibilities in supervising parolees and in completing assigned investigations, the parole officers made 325,024 contacts, as compared with 281,164 during the prior year, an increase of 15%. This included 40,376 home visits (compared to 44,624 last year); 27,576 community contacts other than employment or school (29,371 in 1963-64); 3,254 employment visits (3,081 previous year); and 1,712 school visits (as against 1,508 previous year). Their efforts resulted in the submission of 5,478 investigation reports, and 26,729 supervision reports (as compared with 6,054 and 24,857 in 1963-64).

During the year 3,230 persons were released to parole supervision in New Jersey, which included 183 persons from other

states. This compares with 3,109 released to supervision in this state last year, including 201 persons from other states. This figure continues to show an annual increase.

On June 30, 1965, there were 236 cases from New Jersey under supervision in other states, of whom 106 were released during the year. The total under supervision in other states as of the end of the fiscal year decreased by 10 cases, from 246 to 236.

Institutional parole officers conducted 17,006 interviews with inmates, their families, and institutional staff members, as compared to 16,630 last year. Summaries completed relative to admissions, pre-paroles, violations, and special situations amounted to 4,405 in this year, and 3,681 the prior year.

The number of missing cases on June 30, 1965 was 288, an increase of 6 cases over those recorded on June 30, 1964. This represents a 2.1% increase. (See Tables #3 and #3A).

#### PERSONNEL

On June 30, 1965, there were 73 budgeted Parole Officer positions in the 8 districts, of which 6 were vacant. There were 58 male parole officers and 9 female officers responsible for the field supervision. The institutional parole offices accounted for a staff of six senior parole officers and 5 parole officers.

#### PAROLEE EARNINGS (Calendar Year 1964)

During the calendar year 1964, parolees under supervision in New Jersey earned \$7,303,958, an increase of \$588,749 over the earnings of 1963. There was an increase of 169 individuals under supervision in 1964 as compared to 1963. Sixty-four percent (4,813) of the 7,469 under supervision during the year were classified as employed (worked all or part of period under supervision), and 17% (1,247) of the employables were unemployed throughout the entire period of their supervision during the year being reported upon. The other 19% were classified as unemployable by reason of being missing or in custody for the entire period of supervision, or attending school, being engaged in homemaking, or being incapacitated.

The rates for the past three years are fairly constant:

It should be noted that only 39% of the 7,469 parolees supervised were under supervision for a period of from 10 months to the full year in 1964; 16% from 7 months to 9 months; 22% from 4 months to 6 months; and 23% from 1 day to 3 months.

From the facts available it is impossible to establish a meaningful average of parolee earnings, but for comparative purposes the average earnings of employed parolees are presented:

ARRESTS AND DISPOSITIONS: (See Tables #4A and #4B)

The Bureau was responsible for the supervision of 8,268 parolees during the fiscal year covering the period from July 1, 1964 through June 30, 1965, including 697 supervised for other states, under the Interstate Compacts. Of the 8,268 individuals, 2,628 (32%) were arrested for new offenses and technical violations. Dispositions of many of the arrests were rendered after June 30, 1965, and as of February 23, 1966, 162 arrests (3.9%) had not been adjudicated, or dispositions had not yet been reported. Last year, as this year, 32% of the individuals under supervision were arrested.

The 2,628 individuals accounted for 4,119 arrests, of which 3,861 were for alleged new offenses and 338 arrests for technical violations. This represents an increase of 281 arrests over last year.

Seven hundred and eighty-four (19%) of the arrests resulted in new commitments to penal and correctional institutions as against 18.1% last year; 588 (14.3%) were concluded by return for parole violations compared with 15.4% in the previous year; and 2,463 (59.8%) ended in continuance under supervision as opposed to 59.2% in the prior year.

Of the 684 new charges that were dismissed, 45 (6.6%) resulted in return for violation of parole, and 639 (93.4%) in continuation under supervision.

Arrests for new offenses totalled 3,861, accounted for by 2,828 parolees (34.2% of the caseload). These arrests were divided among the following general classification of offenses:

Arrests for technical violations numbered 338, accounted for by 321 parolees (3.9% of the caseload).

While the number of persons supervised during the year increased by 1.2% (from 8,170 to 8,268), the rate of known arrests increased by 9.4% (3,838 to 4,199).

The number of parolees supervised this year shows an increase of 12.4% over the number of five years ago, but the number of arrests increased 36.8%.

The percentage of arrests for indictable offenses increased by 2.4% over last year. This is the first time in the last 5 years that there has been an increase in this group of arrests. However, for the first time in the past 5 years the percentage of arrests for juvenile delinquency decreased (1.6%, from 29.5% to 27.9%). (See Table #5).

Sixty-five percent of the arrests (the same as last year) involved individuals 20 years of age, or younger, and 67% of the arrests (as last year) took place within the first year following release on parole. (See Table #4D).

Three institutions showed an increase in the percentage of individuals arrested over last year. The comparisons show:

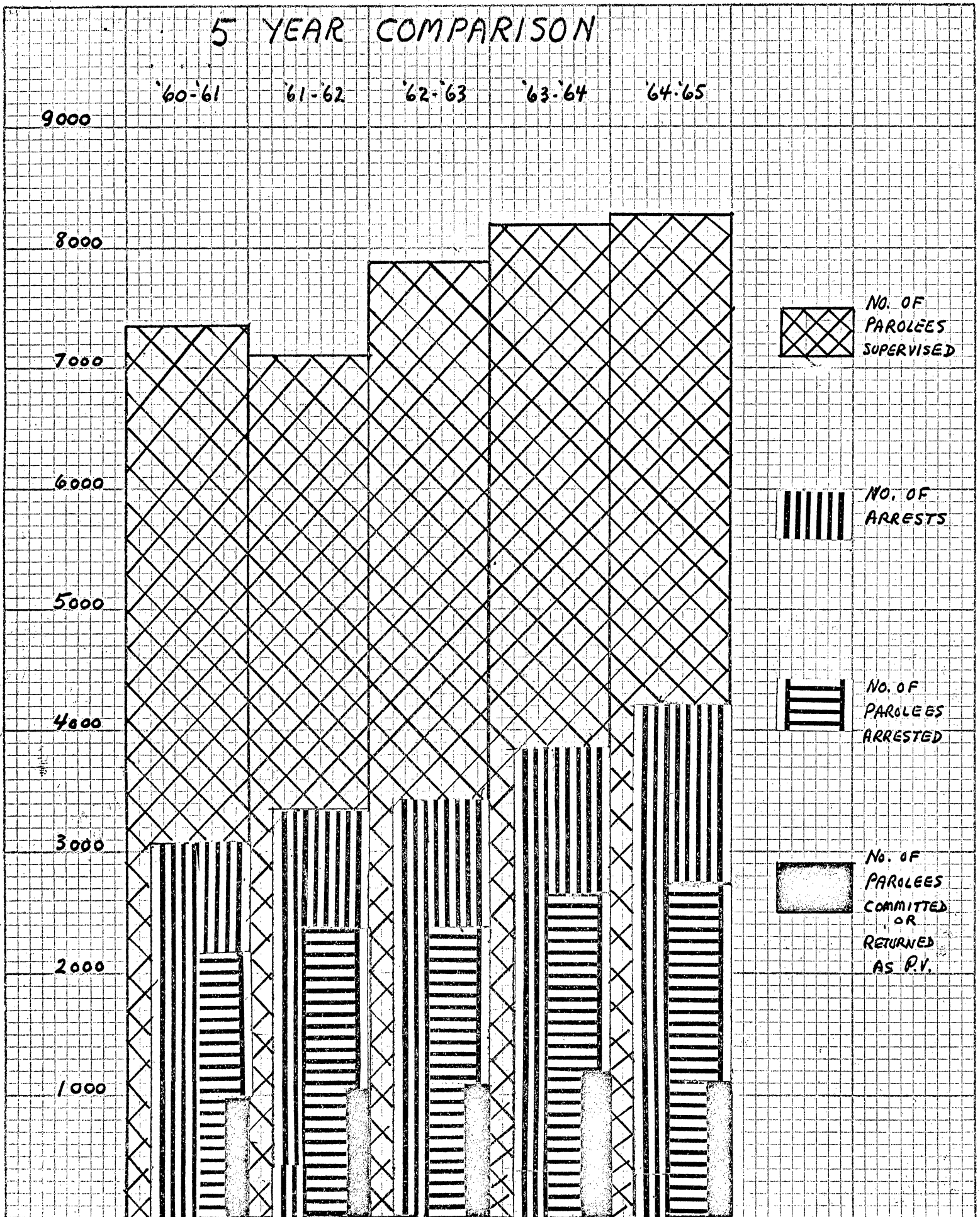

STATE HOME  
FOR GIRLS

The Bureau supervised 351 on parole from this institution during the year, of whom 60 (17.1%) had 68 arrests for new offenses and technical violations (as compared to 21% last year). There were 29 arrests for new offenses, accounted for by 26 individuals, and 39 arrests for technical violations, involving 38 individuals. However, 4 individuals had combined at least one arrest for a new offense and one arrest for technical violations.

Of the 29 arrests for new offenses, 24 (83%) resulted in an adjudication of delinquency or guilt, and 4 (13.8%) resulted in a dismissal by court action. Disposition of one is still pending. The arrests for new offenses were divided into the following general classification of offenses:

Indictable Offenses	-2 (7%)
Disorderly Persons Statute Violations	-3 (10%)
Juvenile Delinquency	-22 (76%)
Motor Vehicle Violations	- 2 (7%)

Concerning the 39 arrests for technical violations, 31 (80%) resulted in return as parole violators, 3 (7%) in return for adjustment and 5 (13%) in continuation under supervision.

In summary, of the 68 total arrests, accounted for by 60 individuals, 41 (60%) were disposed of by new commitments or return as parole violators, 3 (4%) in return for adjustment, 23 (34%) in continuation under supervision, and 1 is still awaiting disposition.

Parolees from the State Home for Girls (4.3% of those supervised by the Bureau) accounted for 1.6% of the total arrests for the year, .8% of the arrests for new offenses, and 11.5% of the technical violation arrests.

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REFORMATORY During the year, 392 from this institution were  
FOR WOMEN: supervised by the Bureau, of whom 41 (10.5%) had  
51 arrests for new offenses and technical violations.  
There were 27 arrests for new offenses and 24 for  
technical violations. None of those arrested had  
a combination of an arrest for a new offense and  
technical violations.

Of the 27 arrests for new offenses, 24 (89%)  
resulted in an adjudication of guilt, and 2 (7%)  
were dismissed by court action. Decision on one  
arrest is still pending. The arrests for new  
offenses were divided among the following general  
classification of offenses:

Indictable Offenses	- 7 (26%)
Disorderly Persons Statute	-16 (59%)
Juvenile Delinquency	- 1 ( 4%)
Motor Vehicle Violations	- 3 (11%)

Of the 24 arrests for technical violations, 16  
(66%) resulted in return for parole violation, 3  
(13%) in return for adjustment, and 5 (21%) in  
release for continuation under supervision.

In summary, of the 51 total arrests, accounted  
for by 41 individuals, 23 (45%) were disposed of  
by new commitments or return as parole violators,  
22 (43%) resulted in release for continuance  
under supervision, 3 (5%) in return for adjust-  
ment, and 1 (2%) is still awaiting disposition.

Parolees from Reformatory for Women at Clinton  
(4.7% of those supervised by the Bureau) accounted  
for 1.2% of the total arrests for the year, .7%  
of the arrests for new offenses, and 7.1% of the  
technical violation arrests.

STATE HOME The Bureau supervised 1,505 on parole from this  
FOR BOYS institution during the year, of whom 744 individuals  
(49.4%) accounted for 1,153 arrests for new offenses  
(1,068) and technical violations (85). Forty-two  
individuals had a combination of at least one  
arrest for a new offense and one arrest for  
technical violations.

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Of the 1,068 arrests for new offenses, 868 (81%) resulted in adjudications of guilt or delinquency, 181 (17%) were dismissed by court action, and 19 (2%) had dispositions still pending, or maximums expired while awaiting disposition of the new arrest. The arrests were divided among the following general classification of offenses:

Indictable Offenses	- 95 (9%)
Disorderly Persons Statute	- 93 (9%)
Juvenile Delinquency	- 816 (76%)
Motor Vehicle Violations	- 43 (4%)
Local Ordinance Violations	- 14 (1.3%)
Material Witnesses	- 7 (.7%)

Concerning the 85 arrests for technical violations, 33 (39%) resulted in return as parole violators, 40 (47%) resulted in release and continuance under supervision, 7 (8%) resulted in return for adjustment, 3 (4%) were turned over to police for new offenses, and 2 (2%) are still awaiting disposition.

In summary, of the 1,153 arrests, 487 (42.2%) were disposed of by new commitments or returned as parole violators, 632 (54.8%) resulted in release for continuance under supervision, and the other 34 (3%) were accounted for by expiration of maximum sentences while serving sentence or awaiting disposition (10), dispositions still pending (12), returned for adjustment (9), and turned over to police for prosecution on a new offense (3).

Parolees from the State Home for Boys (18.2% of those supervised by the Bureau) accounted for 27.5% of the total arrests, 27.6% of arrests for new offenses, and 25.2% of the technical violation arrests.

ANNANDALE  
REFORMATORY

The Bureau supervised 1,877 on parole from this institution during the year, of whom 820 individuals (43.7%) accounted for 1,369 arrests for new offenses (1297) and technical violations (72). Forty-one individuals had a combination of at least one arrest for a new offense and one arrest for technical violations.

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Of the 1,297 arrests for new offenses, 977 (75.3%) resulted in adjudication of guilt or delinquency, 238 (18.4%) were dismissed by court action, and 82 (6.3%) have dispositions pending or the maximums expired while awaiting dispositions. These arrests were divided among the general classification of offenses:

Indictable Offenses	- 424 (32.7%)
Disorderly Persons Statute	- 417 (32.1%)
Juvenile Delinquency	- 226 (17.4%)
Motor Vehicle Violations	- 191 (14.7%)
Local Ordinance Violations	- 33 ( 2.6%)

Concerning the 72 arrests for technical violations, 32 (44%) resulted in return as parole violators, 32 (44%) in release for continuation under supervision, 6 (9%) turned over to police for prosecution on alleged new offenses, and 2 (3%) are awaiting disposition.

In summary, of the 1,369 total arrests, 383 (28%) were disposed of by new commitments or return for parole violations, 886 (64.7%) by continuance under supervision, 35 (2.6%) by expiration of maximum sentence while serving a jail sentence or awaiting disposition, 59 (4.3%) were still awaiting disposition, and 6 (.4%) were turned over to police for prosecution of alleged new offenses.

Parolees from the Reformatory at Annandale, (22.7% of the individuals supervised) accounted for 32.5% of the total arrests for the year, 33.6% of the arrests for new offenses, and 21.3% of the arrests for technical violations.

BORDENTOWN  
REFORMATORY

The Bureau supervised 1,775 on parole from this institution during the year, of whom 638 individuals (35.9%) accounted for 1,046 arrests for new offenses (980) and technical violations (66). Thirty-seven individuals had a combination of at least one arrest for a new offense and one arrest for technical violations.

Of the 980 arrests for new offenses, 701 (71.5%) resulted in an adjudication of guilt or delinquency, 168 (17.1%) were dismissed by court action, and

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in 111 (11.4%) the dispositions were still pending or the maximums expired while awaiting dispositions. These arrests were divided among the following general classification of offenses:

In summary, of the 1,046 total arrests, 293 (27.9%) were disposed of by new commitments or return for parole violations, 624 (59.7%) by release and continuance under supervision, 56 (5.4%) by expiration of maximum sentences while awaiting disposition or serving a county jail sentence, 67 (6.4%) have dispositions pending, 2 (.2%) by return for adjustment, and 4 (.4%) by referral to police for new offenses.

Parolees from the Reformatory at Bordentown (21.5% of the individuals supervised) accounted for 25.1% of the total arrests for the year, 25.4% of the arrests for new offenses, and 19.5% of the arrests for technical violations.

STATE  
PRISON

The Bureau supervised 1,582 on parole from this institution during the year, of whom 270 (18%) accounted for 363 arrests for new offenses (327) and technical violations (36). Fifteen individuals had a combination of at least one arrest for a new offense and one arrest for technical violations.

Of the 327 arrests for new offenses, 203 (62%) were adjudicated guilty, 68 (21%) were dismissed by court action, and 56 (17%) have dispositions pending or maximums expired while awaiting dispositions. These arrests were divided into

the following general classification of offenses:

Indictable Offenses	- 179 (55%)
Disorderly Persons Statute	- 89 (27%)
Motor Vehicle Violations	- 40 (12%)
Local Ordinance Violations	- 16 (5%)
Material Witnesses	- 3 (1%)

Concerning the 36 arrests for technical violations, 19 (53%) resulted in return for parole violations, 15 (42%) in continuance under supervision, and 2 (5%) in being turned over to police for prosecution on alleged new offenses or disposition is still pending.

In summary, of the 363 total arrests, 108 (29.7%) were disposed of by new commitments or in return for parole violations, 191 (52.6%) by release for retention under supervision, 41 (11.3%) by expiration of maximum sentences while awaiting disposition or while serving a county jail sentence, 22 (6.1%) were still awaiting disposition. One of the arrests as technical violators was referred to police for prosecution on an alleged new offense.

Parolees from State Prison (19.1% of the individuals supervised) accounted for 8.6% of the total arrests for the year, 8.5% of the arrests for new offenses, and 10.7% of the arrests for technical violations.

SEX  
OFFENDERS

(Mental Hospitals). The Bureau supervised 89 sex offenders paroled from Mental Hospitals, of whom 2 (2.2%) accounted for 2 arrests for new offenses. There were no arrests for technical violations.

One arrest resulted in an adjudication of guilt, and a dismissal by court action in the other. These arrests were divided among the following general classification of offenses:

Indictable Offenses	- 1 (50%)
Disorderly Persons Statute	- 1 (50%)

The arrest for the indictable offense resulted in a new commitment. The other arrest resulted in dismissal and continuation under supervision.

Sex offenders paroled from mental hospitals (1.1% of those supervised by the Bureau) accounted for .05% of the total arrests for the year, and .05% of the total arrests for new offenses.

OUT-OF-STATE INSTITUTIONS Under the Inter-State Compacts, the Bureau supervised 697 parolees released from institutions of other States to reside in New Jersey. Of these 697 parolees, 110 (15.8%) accounted for 147 arrests for new offenses (131) and technical violations (16). Four individuals had at least one arrest for a new offense combined with one arrest for technical violations.

Of the 131 arrests for new offenses, 87 (66.4%) resulted in an adjudication of guilt or delinquency, 22 (16.8%) were dismissed by court action, and 22 (16.8%) have dispositions still pending or maximums expired while awaiting sentence. These arrests were divided among the following general classification of offenses:

Indictable Offenses	- 66 (50%)
Disorderly Persons Statute	- 29 (22%)
Juvenile Delinquency	- 7 (5%)
Motor Vehicle Violations	- 22 (17%)
Local Ordinance Violations	- 6 (5%)
Material Witness	- 1 (1%)

Concerning the 16 arrests for technical violations, 6 (38%) resulted in return as parole violators, 8 (50%) were continued under supervision, 1 (6%) was turned over to police for prosecution on an alleged new offense, and 1 (6%) had disposition still pending.

In summary, of the 147 total arrests, 36 (24.5%) were disposed of by new commitments or return as parole violators, 84 (57.1%) by retention under supervision, and 27 (18.3%) had maximum sentences expire while awaiting disposition or serving a county jail sentence, or were awaiting disposition.

Parolees from out-of-state institutions (8.4% of the individuals supervised by the Bureau) accounted for 3.5% of the total arrests for the year, 3.4% of the arrests for new offenses, and 4.7% of the arrests for technical violations.
