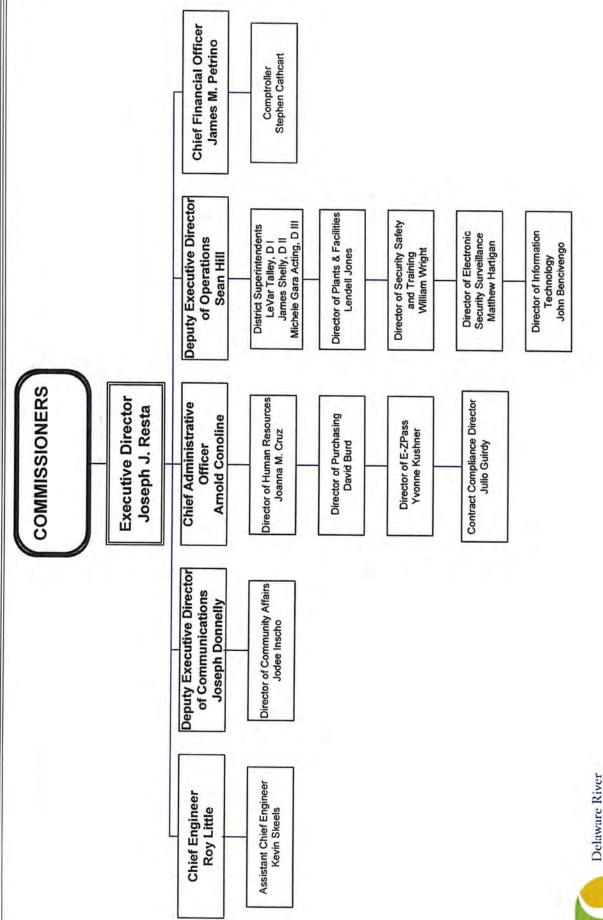

ROLL CALL

Joseph Resta, Executive Director, in his capacity as Secretary for this Meeting called the roll, and at the conclusion thereof, reported that there was a quorum present-there being four members present from the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and five members present from the State of New Jersey.

"SECRETARY'S NOTE

Commissioner Janvey had stepped out of the room during the Roll Call. She was present during the duration of the Commission meeting.

WELCOMING REMARKS OF CHAIRMAN

Chairman Lavery welcomed those persons whose identities are set forth hereinabove under "Appearances".

INTRODUCE ANY COMMENTS FROM THE PUBLIC

Chairman Lavery addressed the meeting and invited any comments from the public on items pertaining to today's Agenda. No questions were presented.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTORS REPORT

Joseph Resta, Executive Director, addressed the meeting and said;

"With the approaching onset of cold weather, the Commission is currently engaged in making winter-storm preparations as well as for its operations and capital program in 2018;

"Throughout our jurisdiction, maintenance crews are engaged in the annual task of readying trucks and equipment for snow and ice removal. Our personnel also

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are stocking up on road salt, magnesium chloride and other supplies. Whether the upcoming winter ends up being mild or severe, the Commission's operations forces will be at the ready and prepared;

"To strengthen our storm response capabilities, construction of the new, expanded salt barn at the Milford-Montague Toll Bridge began earlier this month. The project stipulates the facility is to be ready for use by the end of December;

"Looking to future years, a concept study for the expanded maintenance facility at our Morrisville location includes a proposal for a new salt storage building with significantly increased capacity. A concept study also is being launched for a new salt storage building here at New Hope. These envisioned salt facilities will give us the storage we need to handle anticipated increased winter-storm response needs throughout our southern region once the first span of the Scudder Falls Replacement Bridge opens in 2019 and that project's total completion in late 2021;

"Turning to the other capital projects currently underway, we are grateful for the warm weather trend that continues to extend this year's construction season. At the Lower Trenton Bridge, the upgrading of the iconic Trenton Makes the World Takes sign's lighting elements to a less costly energy-efficient system anticipates completion by the end of this year. The sign's letter housings have all been cleaned and painted and the installation of new electrical infrastructure has been completed. Work will resume once the sign's new LED lights are fabricated and delivered. The contractor is hopeful of having the lights in-hand early next month. which would allow for project completion in mid-to-late December. In our 6.5 mile I-78 jurisdiction, work on the I-78 Bridges and Approach Slabs Rehabilitation Project continues to move forward. Crews have completed painting at one overpass structure and are now fully engaged at a second overpass. Meanwhile, parking lot repairs, patching and pavement striping work at our Pennsylvania Welcome Center was completed last week. The project's most critical task – the replacement of dozens of bridge approach slabs – is set to begin today. This project remains on track for completion late next year. Turning to the expansive Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Project, work is currently taking place at nine distinct locations. Most significantly, the contractor has extended trestle causeways into the river from both the New Jersey and Pennsylvania sides. Installation of the first in-river cofferdam has begun on the New Jersey side. Similar in-water cofferdam installation work could begin as early as mid-November:

"Separate and apart from the bridge project, preparations are advancing for our new headquarters building at the Scudder Falls location. The building is in final design and site preparations will soon begin with removal of trees on a portion of the property that was acquired last year from Lower Makefield Township. This

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tree work is to be completed before the onset of the Indiana bat foraging season on April 1. This would allow building construction to begin in May. To further advance this schedule, today's agenda includes a resolution authorizing us to negotiate scope and fee with a firm to provide construction management services for this project. If successful, a contract award could be presented for Commission consideration next month;

"Today's agenda also includes a thorough reorganization of the Commission's Operation's Department. This measure involves a series of reclassifications, promotions and appointments to new positions. Once implemented, this reorganization will centralize management and personnel according to functions and areas of responsibility rather than the current decentralized structure by geographical districts. This is the largest and last in a series of departmental restructurings undertaken in recent years. As you may recall, prior reorganizations involved Accounting, Human Resources, Electronic Security and Surveillance, Purchasing, Information Technology, administrative staff and the corps of men and women who monitor the Commission's most vulnerable toll-supported bridges;

"Another noteworthy agenda item today is a proposed \$7.5 million contribution to the Commission's Other Post-Employment Benefits fund, better known as the OPEB Trust. This contribution further demonstrates the Commissioners' commitment to career employees. It's estimated that this contribution will place the Trust at covering approximately 80 to 85 percent of the actuarial liability for the agency's employee retirement benefit obligations. A new actuarial analysis of the Trust will be conducted after the first of the year;

"In closing today's report, I want to recognize and congratulate our chief engineer, Roy Little, on receiving the Dr. John L. Buzzi Engineering Excellence Award at the New Jersey Alliance for Action's annual Eagle Awards dinner earlier this month. The award is well deserved and reflects positively not only on Roy, but also — as he noted in his acceptance — on the entire Commission's staff for their continuing efforts to improve facilities and operations in the overriding mission to move people and commerce safely and efficiently. Roy, we applaud you, on your accomplishment and your career of public service. Mr. Chairman that completes my October report."

APPOINTMENT OF INNOVATIVE RISK AS BROKER OF RECORD OF POST 65-MEDICAL INSURANCE

At the conclusion of the review, Commissioner Stanley moved and Vice Chairman Ahmad seconded the adoption of the following Resolution:

"RESOLVED, by the Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission at its Regular Meeting assembled this 30th day of October, 2017, that the Commission has authorized the appointment of Innovative Risk as the Commission's Broker of Record for our post – 65 retiree medical and prescription benefit plans and, our dental, vision and life/LTD plans that cover our active employees and eligible retirees/dependents."

PLACEMENT OF MEDICARE-ELIGIBLE-RETIREE MEDICAL AND PRESCRIPTION INSURANCE

At the conclusion of the review, Commissioner Laurenti moved and Vice Chairman Ahmad seconded the adoption of the following Resolution:

"RESOLVED, by the Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission at its Regular Meeting assembled this 30th day of October, 2017, that the Commission authorizes the Executive Director to effect the placement of the current Medicare-eligible retiree medical and prescription supplemental insurance plans administered by NEBCO/AMWINS with the medical and prescription insurers Transamerica for supplemental coverage to Medicare for eligible retirees and dependents who are sixty-five years and older. That coverage is to be provided at the current benefit levels on an insured premium basis at a monthly rate per enrollee of \$513,00, reflecting overall increase of 1.4% for the one year period January 1, 2018 through December 31, 2018, for a total amount \$1,274,292.00."

"As a former Commission Employee who receives retiree health benefits, I abstain from voting on this resolution and have recused myself from any deliberation on this issue."

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RENEWAL OF MEDICAL, DENTAL, LIFE, ACCIDENTAL DEATH & DISMEMBERMENT, LONG-TERM DISABILITY INSURANCE PROGRAM-JANUARY 1, 2018 – DECEMBER 31, 2018

Chairman Lavery addressed the meeting and asked the Commission Members if, after their review, there were any questions.

At the conclusion of the review, Commissioner Stanley moved and Commissioner Van Vliet seconded the adoption of the following Resolution

"RESOLVED, by the Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission at its Regular Meeting assembled this 30th day of October, 2017, that the Commission The Commission authorizes renewal of the following plans with the identified provider:

Medical insurance plans that cover active employees/dependents and retirees/dependents under the age of 65, specifically to provide for:

- Self-insured policy with claims paid as incurred, estimated for 2018 at \$10,054,628;
- IBC's the third-party administrator, Independence Administrators, for all claims incurred by the program's PPO segment, with an Administrative Fee of \$52.50 per employee, per month, for an annual total of \$262,080; and
- Purchase a twelve (12) month Specific and Aggregate Stop Loss insurance policy with HM. The Specific deductible to be \$150,000, with a premium in the amount of \$909,404 The policy will continue to be a 12/15 contract covering claims incurred in 12 months and paid within 15 months of January 1, 2018.
- Projected cost assumes current enrollment of 128 "Singles" and 288 "Families".

Dental insurance to be provided by Delta Dental with an annual premium of \$448,863.60, reflecting an overall decrease of 3%, for 155 Single coverage, 191 Employee & Spouse coverage, 41 Employee & Child(ren) coverage, and 147 Family coverage.

Life, Accidental Death & Dismemberment and Long-Term Disability coverage to be provided by Cigna at the following rates:

Basic Life Insurance: \$0.510 per \$1,000 of coverage, per month (benefit level one and a half times annual salary) for an annual cost of \$216,012 to the Commission. (For all active, full-time employee and retirees who were hired before January 1, 1995).

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Accidental Death & Dismemberment: \$0.028 per \$1000 of coverage, per month (benefit level two times annual salary) for an annual cost to the Commission of \$17,659.49. (For all active, full-time employees, only).

Optional Life Insurance: \$0.50 per \$1000 of coverage, per month (benefit level one-half annual salary) benefit is an optional employee-paid benefit, resulting in no premium cost to the Commission

Voluntary Long-Term Disability: Rates are banded by age, with average for all covered lives at \$0.745 per \$100 of covered payroll per month (benefit level 60% to \$5000/month) benefit is an optional employee-paid benefit, resulting in no premium cost to the Commission

"RESOLVED the total cost of \$11,890,988 (\$10,054,628, estimate medical claims for 2018; \$262,080 Administrative Fees; \$909,404 Stop Loss (+\$150,000 deductible), \$448,863.60 dental, \$216,012 basic life insurance, and \$17,660 AD&D).

"As a former Commission Employee who receives retiree health benefits, I abstain from voting on this resolution and have recused myself from any deliberation on this issue."

2017 OTHER POST-EMPLOYMENT BENEFITS TRUST CONTRIBUTION

R: 3374-10-17- FIN-01-10-17

Chairman Lavery addressed the Meeting and asked the Commission Members if, after their review, there were any questions.

At the conclusion of the review, Commissioner Laurenti moved and Commissioner Grace seconded the adoption of the following Resolution:

"RESOLVED, by the Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission at its Regular Meeting assembled this 30th day of October, 2017, that the Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission ("Commission") is authorized to make an additional contribution of \$7,500,000.00 to the OPEB Trust from the General Reserve Fund, which contribution shall be made as soon as practicable.

Commissioner Janvey addressed the meeting and said

"As a former Commission Employee who receives retiree health benefits, I abstain from voting on this resolution and have recused myself from any deliberation on this issue."

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Chairman Lavery then invited any furthers questions or comments on the Resolution. No questions were presented and the Resolution was adopted with 1 abstention from Commissioner Janvey.

APPROVAL OF AMENDMENT TO POST RETIREMENT HEALTH BENEFITS POLICY

R: 3375-10-17- ADM-03-10-17

Chairman Lavery addressed the Meeting and asked the Commission Members if, after their review, there were any questions.

At the conclusion of the review, Commissioner Laurenti moved and Vice Chairman Ahmad seconded the adoption of the following Resolution:

"RESOLVED, by the Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission at its Regular Meeting assembled this 30th day of October, 2017, via this resolution approves the revision to the post-retirement health benefits policy to allow for the following:

- (1) For employees hired on or after January 1, 2018, limit the number of years to be credited for employment in other state, county or municipal service to ten years in calculating years of service for eligibility for post-retirement health benefits.
- (2) For employees hired on or after January 1, 2018, increase the number of minimum years of service at the Commission to the last ten years for eligibility for post-retirement health benefits.
- (3) For employees who retire after January 1, 2018, the Part B Medicare reimbursement shall be limited to the standard Medicare premium.
- (4) For employees who retire after January 1, 2018, the retiree contribution shall be the lesser of what current employees pay and a percentage of their final year's annual income, as of the date of retirement, based on the following schedule:
 - a. Single coverage one percent
 - b. Two-party coverage one and one-quarter percent
 - c. Three-or-more-party coverage one and one half percent
- (5) Dental coverage one half of the annual COBRA equivalent rate for dental coverage.
- (6) For all current and future retirees, once a retiree becomes eligible for non-disability related Medicare and becomes eligible for non-disability related Medicare reimbursement, then his or her obligation to contribute to post-retirement benefits shall cease.

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(7) For any employee hired before January 1, 1995, eligibility for retirement shall be based on either the Rule of 70 Formula or the age and years of service as outlined for those hired after December 31, 1994 and before January 1, 2018.

"RESOLVED, all other terms and conditions of the post-retirement health benefits policy shall remain in full force and effect. The Commission, at its option, may change, delete, suspend or discontinue any part or parts of the retiree health benefits at any time without prior notice.

"FURTHER RESOLVED, Additionally, to direct the Executive Director to draft the language of the new policy in accordance with the provision of this Resolution and the Resolution of February 29, 2016, and to amend the Retiree Welfare Benefit Plan consistent with the language of the amended policy.

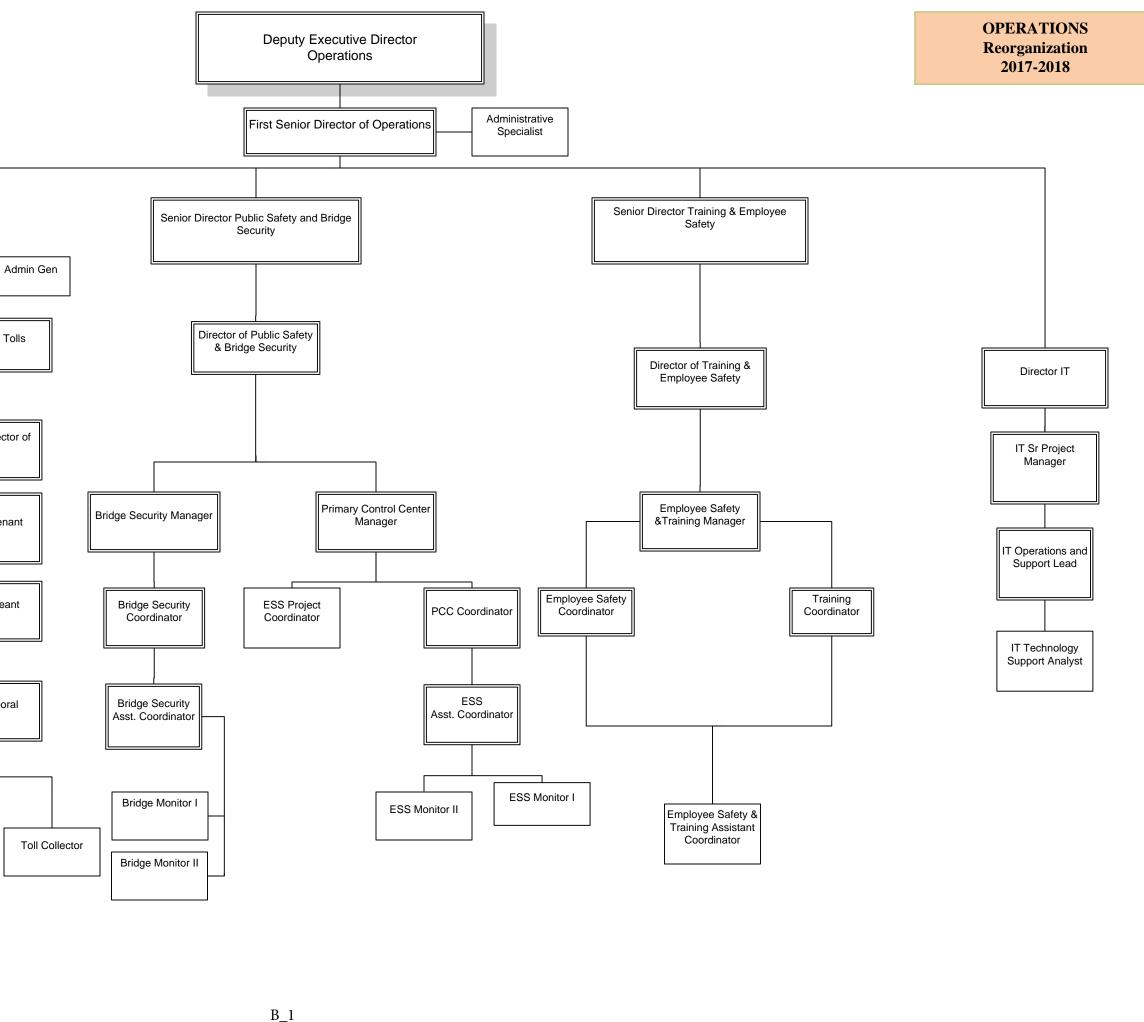

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DELAWARE RIVER JOINT TOLL BRIDGE COMMISSION Meeting of October 30, 2017 TOLL TRAFFIC AND REVENUE STATISTICS (September, 2017)

Summary: The Commission experienced an increase in total toll revenue for September 2017 in comparison to the September 2016 traffic and revenue statistics. Total toll traffic also reflected an increase for the month of September. [It should be noted that 2016 was a leap year, and that Year-to-Date totals for 2017 reflect one less day].

Analysis of September 2017 / September 2016 toll revenue data comparison:

- An overall toll revenue increase of 0.46 percent was recorded at the Commission's seven toll bridges for the month.
- Commercial-vehicle toll revenue reflected a 0.47 percent increase.
- Passenger-vehicle toll revenue generated a 0.44 percent increase.

Analysis of September 2017 / September 2016 traffic data comparison:

- Total toll traffic increased by 5,136 vehicles, or 0.15 percent for the month.
- Commercial-vehicle traffic increased by 689 vehicles, or 0.14 percent.
- Passenger-vehicle toll traffic increased by 4,447 vehicles, or 0.15 percent.
- Average daily toll traffic for the Commission's seven toll bridges for September 2017 was 114,679 total vehicles as compared to 114,507 total vehicles in September 2016.
- Total recorded westbound traffic volume at the eleven vehicular toll supported bridges for September 2017 decreased by 7,717 vehicles, or 0.29 percent when compared to September 2016. Average daily westbound traffic at these bridges for September 2017 was 87,203 vehicles as compared to 87,460 for September 2016.

Traffic analysis for 2017 YTD:

- Total YTD toll traffic for the seven toll bridges is reflecting a 1.10 percent increase through the first nine months of 2017 as compared to the same period in 2016.
- Westbound traffic on the eleven toll supported bridges is reflecting a 0.76 percent increase through the first nine months of 2017 as compared to last year.

DISTRICT REVIEW

District 1

Total toll traffic at Trenton-Morrisville (TM) for September 2017 reflected a 2.73 percent increase compared to September 2016 as the result of an increase of 20,579 cars and a decrease of 105 trucks. At New Hope-Lambertville (NHL), an increase of 1,337 cars and a decrease of 1,585 trucks combined to generate a decrease in total toll traffic of 0.15 percent for the month of September 2017 as compared to September 2016.

District II

The I-78 Toll Bridge experienced an increase of 0.01 percent in total toll traffic for the month of September 2017 compared to September 2016 as the result of the decrease of 7,785 cars and the increase of 7,921 trucks. At the Easton-Phillipsburg (EP) Toll Bridge, decreases of 11,012 passenger vehicles and 4,172 trucks combined to generate a 3.35 percent decrease in total toll traffic for September 2017.

District III

Portland-Columbia (PC) experienced a 0.15 percent increase in total toll traffic during September 2017 as a result of the increase of 459 automobiles and the decrease of 300 trucks compared to September 2016. At the Delaware Water Gap (DWG) Toll Bridge, an increase of 3,464 passenger vehicles and a decrease of 477 trucks combined to generate an increase of 0.36 percent in total toll traffic for September 2017 as compared to September 2016. At Milford-Montague (MM), decreases of 2,595 passenger vehicles and 593 trucks combined to produce a 2.52 percent decrease in total toll traffic for the month of September 2017.

E-ZPass Penetration Rates

The table below provides a comparison of the *E-ZPass* penetration rates for the Commission's seven (7) toll bridges for the months of September, 2017 and September, 2016, and the year-to-date periods ending September 30, 2017 and September 30, 2016.

STATISTICAL SUMMARY OF EXPENDITURES

This includes reports entitled "Budget vs Actual" covering the month of September 2017 and the nine month year-to-date ("YTD") operations of fiscal year 2017 relative to Toll Bridges, Toll Supported Bridges and Administration departments.

Total expense plus encumbrance totaled \$6,314,491 for the month of September. For the 2017 fiscal period, total expense plus encumbrances amounted to \$45,140,858 or 93.5% of the YTD operating budget.

Most of the expense line categories are within their normal line item budgets. Overtime wages are currently exceeding budget by \$79,500 or 23.3%, mainly due to a number of full-time position vacancies. This line item is more than offset by budget surplus in Regular Employee Salaries and Part-Time Salary budgets.

The month of September was a three payroll month, and as such, had a higher than usual Salary expense. Three payroll months occur twice per year and are accounted for in the Commission's operating budget. There were no other unusual expense items during the month of September.

MONTHLY PURCHASING REPORT

Month of September 2017

This report itemizes all orders for purchases made for the month of September, 2017, showing the divisions chargeable for the expense and the source of authority for issuance of the purchase order. This authority is broken into three categories:

- (1) By authority of the Commission
- (2) By authority of the Executive Director or his designate
- (3) By authority of the Superintendent

The purchasing activities for the month of September, 2017, culminated in the preparation and placement of 62 purchase orders in the total amount of \$499,494.10. To secure competitive prices on items being purchased, 38 price inquiries were sent out for 12 of the requisitions leading to purchase orders, an average of 3.16 per order (38/12=3.16).

Procurements of over \$5,000.00 during the period of September 2017 are shown below:

- Five (5) Purchase Orders were let, in the total amount of \$226,703.05, for the roadway salt needs of all Commission locations.
- > A Purchase Order was issued, in the total amount of \$38,381.65, for the approved Capital Equipment purchase of a skid steer loader for the Trenton-Morrisville Toll Bridge Facility.
- > A Purchase Order was issued, in the total amount of \$26,950.00, at the request of the IT Department, for replication software for the Commission.
- > Two (2) Purchase Orders were let, in the total amount of \$26,000.00, for the liquid fuel needs of District I.
- ➤ A Purchase Order was issued, in the total amount of \$20,600.000, for the entry doors and window replacements at the New Hope-Lambertville TSB Firehouse.

In addition to the practices employed incidental to purchase of materials, etc., from vendors on a direct basis, the Commission also purchases via direct utilization of the purchasing processes of the State of New Jersey, the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and other joint purchasing arrangements.

Activities for the In-Lane Toll System

IBE PROGRAM OVERVIEW

The Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission (Commission) established an IBE Program (MBE/WBE/SBE/DBE/DsBE/VBE) with a target of 25% for all Professional Services and Construction contracts awarded by the Commission effective July 1, 2014. To date, the Commission has awarded forty-two (42) contracts, with the IBE Program requirements.

Elation Systems

The Commission began using Elation Systems effective January 2017, as the online system for Payment Verification and Certified Payroll Reporting (CPR). All contracts awarded by the Commission to a Prime Consultant/Prime Contractor and their Subconsultants and Subcontractors use this service free of charge. Online training is available to users on how to use Elation Systems. The Contract Compliance Department and Elation Support Staff are available to assist all users. This is a mandatory requirement.

The Contract Compliance Department monitors and posts payment data and reviews all Certified Payrolls submitted into Elation Systems.

Prime responsibility includes:

- i. Register and Activate an account in Elation Systems
- ii. Require all Subcontractors to register and activate an Account in Elation Systems
- iii. To post payments to their Subconsultants and Subcontractors in Elation

Payment Verification:

The Commission requires all Prime Consultants / Prime Contractors and Subconsultants and Subcontractors to use the online Payment Verification System called Elation Systems to confirm payments received.

Certified Payroll Reporting:

The Prime Contractor is responsible to assign someone from their staff with the responsibility to review, approve, and upload their CPR(s) on a weekly basis into Elation Systems.

The Prime Contractor is also responsible for ensuring that all Subcontractors on the Project submit their weekly CPR into Elation Systems.

IDENTIFIED BUSINESS ENTERPRISES (IBE) PROGRAM OVERVIEW

The Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission established an IBE Program (MBE/WBE/SBE/DBE/DsBE/VBE) with a Target of 25% for all Construction and Professional Services contracts awarded by the Commission effective July 1, 2014. To date, the Commission has awarded forty-two (42) contracts, with the IBE program requirements.

PROGRAM UPDATES

Contract Compliance Department (CCD):

The CCD ensures that all Elation System users (Primes and their Subcontractors and Subconsultants) register and activate an account in the Commission's Elation System for tracking Certified Payrolls and Payment Verification. The CCD works with Prime Contractors and Consultants and their Subcontractors and Subconsultants to become familiar with the Elation Systems and are able to successfully enter all required tracking information.

Professional Services & Construction Contracts (Payment Verification):

The CCD has confirmed and updated all Professional Services and Construction Contract information and payments in the Elation System. The CCD Director continues to monitor all Prime Contractor payments made to its IBE Subcontractors and Subconsultants in the Elation System. Currently, the CCD Director is posting payments and monitoring a combined total of forty-two (42) Prime Consultant *and* Construction Contracts and all their Subconsultants and Subcontractors for payments towards meeting or exceeding the Commission's 25% IBE Target .

Construction Contracts (Workforce Utilization):

The Contract Compliance Department (CCD) is working vigorously to monitor all Certified Payroll reporting for Construction Contracts in the Elation System. Currently, the CCD Manager is monitoring ten (10) construction projects and (133 IBE Subcontractors) and has begun the groundwork for the recently awarded Scudder Falls Bridge Project.

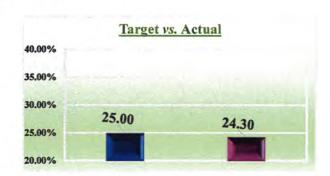

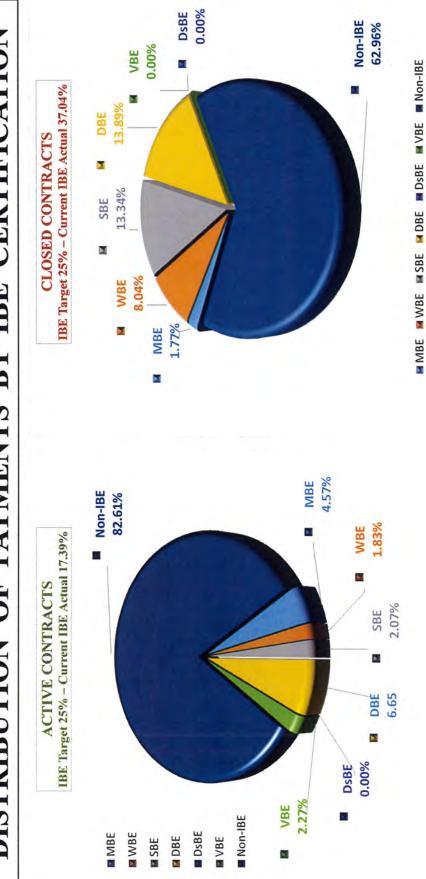

DISTRIBUTION OF PAYMENTS BY IBE CERTIFICATION

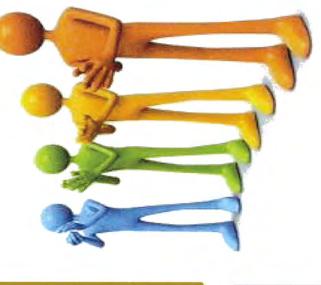

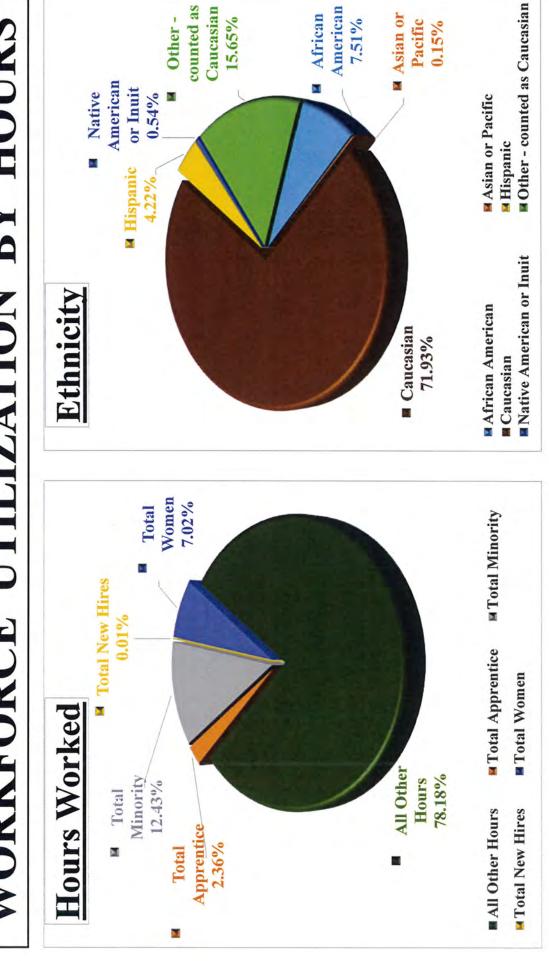

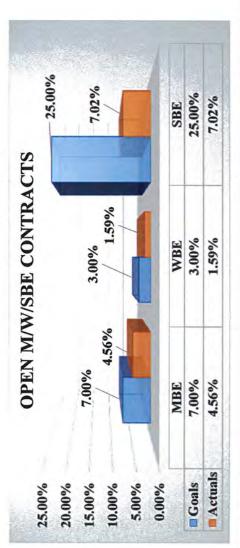

COMMISSION AWARENESS EFFORTS:

Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Project – The weekly regimen of travel alerts and construction activities continued with drafting of weekly travel advisories sent to area news outlets and corresponding postings on the DRJTBC website and the Scudder Falls project website. The release is further distributed via Facebook through primary outlets in Lower Makefield and Ewing. Also on a weekly basis, a travel alert was posted on drjtbc.org, travel and construction updates were posted on the home page of sccuderfallsbridge.com, and I-95 travel schedule was posted on NJ511, which also could be accessed by PA511 and DVRPC use. Several updates and corrections were made to the website. Finally, responses were drafted or edited to various phone and email inquiries submitted to the project public involvement team.

Free Bridge Movement – Conducted further research for an article and future presentations about the late 19th century- early 20th century free bridge movement that led to the public acquisition of toll-supported bridges currently owned and operated by the DRJTBC. A detailed article on this topic will be a featured focus of the Commission's annual report.

Scudder Falls Public Involvement

NJ APPROACH TRAFFIC SIGNAL UPGRADES

Contract No. C-627B-4

French & Parrello Associates (FPA) reviewed material/equipment submittals from the contractor and provided either approval or comments to be addressed. Additional services included responding to Request for Information from the contractor. FPA met with Commission Staff on site to review the installation of new pedestrian signal heads on all four corners of the New Warren Street and William Trent Place intersection. The conduits beneath the roadway are full and new wiring cannot be pulled to support the additional signal heads. Upon further investigation with Carr & Duff, there are several existing wires within the conduit that are not being used. Therefore, FPA performed a change of plans to include the additional pedestrian signal heads using the existing wires. Carr & Duff will complete a continuity test on the wires at the time of installation to confirm that the wires are useable.

Construction Contract No. TS-699A

Carr & Duff, Inc. (C&D) was awarded this contract at the Commission's March 2017 meeting and issued their full Notice to Proceed effective April 21, 2017.

During this reporting period C&D completed the punchlist items and installed two new traffic signs, completing all contract items with the exception of one UPS unit at the intersection of New Warren St. and William Trent Pl., which is being reordered to fit on the existing cabinet shelf. This new UPS unit should be installed by October 20, 2017.

A site meeting was held with C&D and the design engineer, French & Parrello (F&P), to discuss additional, out of scope, pedestrian signal upgrades at the intersection of New Warren St. and William Trent Pl. as requested by the Commission. F&P developed the change of plans for this additional work and these plans were issued to C&D with the request to provide their cost which, once negotiated, will be paid as a change order to this contract.

During the September reporting period Michael Baker Jr., Incorporated (Baker) of Hamilton New Jersey, continued their coordination and support with the utility relocation effort in PA and NJ; continued to review and respond to various Requests for Information (RFIs) and submittals from the Contractor and the Construction Manager; and, attended the following meetings: two (2) T-668A Progress Meetings; an I-95/I-295 Re-designation Conference Call Meeting and, various technical meetings involving design issues with the contractor and CM-CI team.

Construction Contract No. T-668A

Trumbull Corporation of Pittsburgh, PA (Trumbull) was awarded the Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Construction Contract T-668A in the amount of \$396,000,000.00 at the Commission's January 30, 2017 Meeting. The Commission issued a full Notice to Proceed on March 3, 2017.

Coordination Meetings continued between the Contractor and the Commission's Project team to discuss Project schedule, progress, and planning for ongoing or upcoming construction activities. Trumbull continued to submit Requests for Information (RFI's) and make required project submittals throughout this reporting period. Trumbull and the Construction Manager (Hill/Jacobs) have also been coordinating the submittal and review of the preliminary construction schedule. The Preliminary Baseline Schedule was approved in August and subsequently updated in September. This schedule update is under review.

Ongoing construction activities continued, while new activities started up in PA, NJ and the Delaware River. Trumbull has work areas extending throughout the project limits in order to complete parallel activities on the project. The Main River Bridge trestle causeway in-river construction commenced from both the NJ and PA sides of the river in September. Main River Bridge Abutment and Pier 6 work in NJ, and Pier 1 in PA continued in September. The mitigation site for the relocation of the Peregrine Falcon nest was completed in late August. The new nest, support pole and foundation were installed during the last week of August, which was followed up with regulatory agency notification of the completed installation.

The Hill team continues to supply construction management personnel as necessary, monitor Trumbull's performance and progress, conduct bi-weekly progress meetings, oversee and coordinate the three (3) construction inspection firms, perform utility coordination in NJ & PA, perform schedule reviews, conduct bi-weekly scheduling meetings, maintain document control, perform health and safety inspections, adjust project staffing as required, address material testing and inspection plan requirements, prepare monthly contractor invoices and manage overall project budget.

Construction Inspection of PA Approach Contract No. CI-671A

This Contract is for Construction Inspection (CI) Professional Services for the PA Approach Roadway Improvements portion of the Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Project, Contract T-668A. TRC Engineers, Inc. (TRC) of Plymouth Meeting, PA was awarded this contract at the February 27, 2017 Commissioners' Meeting; and issued a full Notice to Proceed effective March 29, 2017.

During this reporting period TRC continued supplying inspectors to work on the Project under the supervision of the Construction Manager with three (3) Inspectors on board. Additional Inspectors will be provided as the need arises based on the Contractor's schedule.

This Contract is for Construction Inspection (CI) Professional Services for the Main River Bridge portion of the Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement Project, Contract T-668A. Additional Inspectors will be provided as the need arises based on the Contractor's schedule.

GF inspectors are also performing the quality control tests on the concrete that is poured within the New Jersey approach portion of the project.

MT has attended numerous C-660A progress meetings, and has successfully taken responsibility of maintaining the project hotline and website. MT organized and participated in the March 15, 2016 Open House/No Net Loss Public Hearing held in Ewing Township and April 27, 2016 Pennsylvania Noise Walls Update Meeting. MT organized and participated in the July 19th & 21st District I Open House/Toll Hearings held in Ewing Township (NJ) and Lower Makefield Township (PA) respectively. MT also organized and participated in August 2nd & 4th District II Toll Hearings in Easton (PA) and Phillipsburg (NJ) respectively also and the August 9th & 11th District III Toll Hearings held in Montague (NJ) & East Stroudsburg (PA) respectively. Sparwick Contracting, Inc. (SCI) completed all deck repairs and roadway striping by September 8, 2015. SCI's on-call and emergency spall repairs phase of the contract ended with the issuance of Notice to Proceed for the Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement project, T-668A on March 3, 2017.

During this reporting period, the Commission accepted SCI's cost proposal to demolish the back detached garage at the Commission's 1479 River Road property, in order to accommodate construction associated with the Scudder Falls Bridge Replacement project. Change Order No. 2 was executed and subsequently the garage demolition work was completed on September 22nd SCI is scheduled to remove some trees and the filter sock on the Commission-owned property at 1510 River Road in PA on October 6, 2017 to complete the remaining work associated with Change Order No. 1 to their contract.

COMMISSION ADMINISTRATION BUILDING AT SCUDDER FALLS

Design Contract No. C-707A

A conference call occurred to coordinate HazMat sampling of the existing Pool wall(s) at the 1799 House. Following this a Hazmat Report was completed and reviewed:

- The merits of an Advanced Work Package to eliminate the asbestos was discussed and agreed appropriate. This will allow the main project to bid more specifically with a focus on the required selective demolition of the additions, and significant alteration of the stone building, without the whole project becoming a Hazmat matter.
- An advanced work package for Asbestos removal has been prepared. It has been reviewed by the Commission Staff, and subsequently resubmitted.

A meeting focused on Interior Finishes and certain other design issues was conducted. A meeting was also held to review/discuss the Design Development / Preliminary Design Comments prepared by Commission Staff. Reactions and design updates have been addressed by the design team, and written responses are being finalized. For the IT Department Space, after a series of meetings and follow-up correspondence the configuration of the Server Room and adjacent spaces has been revised. Draft ESS Drawings have been submitted and Commission Staff have returned comments. The sculpture for the lobby was revised and a preferred option was selected.

Commission staff completed its review and provided comments on the Preliminary Design for the implementation of structural steel repairs and/or strengthening as well as spot cleaning and painting structural steel and bearings within vicinity of deck joints. This contract is for Construction Management (CM) Services in connection with the renovations and expansion of I-78 Maintenance Garage Project. As part of the CM services the Consultant scope of work includes Constructability Review of the Bid Documents during the Pre-Construction phase of T-508A.

STV Inc. (STV) was issued Notice of Award and Limited Notice to Proceed effective March 1, 2016. A meeting was held with the Consultant on March 2nd to review the Commission's expectations of the consultant's services during the Pre-Construction phase of T-508A. Constructability Review was provided by the Consultant on the Pre-Final Design Submission, attended its design review meeting on March 21, and reviewed the Final Design Submission to confirm all comments have been addressed.

STV attended the Pre-Construction Meeting on July 12, 2016 and is currently providing construction field inspections, conducting bi-weekly progress meetings along with processing Architectural Supplementary Instructions, Contractor's Submittals and Request for Information as part of providing construction management services.

October 30, 2017 PROJECT STATUS REPORT

CONSTRUCTION Contract No. T-508A

Bracy Construction Inc., was awarded this construction contract at the Commission's June 2016 Meeting. Notice of Award and Limited Notice to Proceed letter was issued effective June 28, 2016. Pre-Construction Meeting was held on July 12th and a Notice to Proceed effective date of July 25th was issued in accordance with the Contract Specifications.

Contractor completed set-up of the field trailers and temporary facilities, set-up Erosion and Sediment Controls in accordance with the County Conservation District's approved permit, started the demolition activities for Phases 1 & 2 of the Project. Phase 1 Construction Substantial Completion was reached November 11, 2016 as relates to the Commission's salt, brine & magnesium chloride operation. Phase 2 footings, foundation walls, new bearing walls, steel erection under-slab utilities, floor slab, watertight, closing the new building, rough-ins and final mechanical, electrical, plumbing, security, fire alarm,

equipment and exterior veneer installation has been completed. Greenman-Pedersen, Inc. (GPI) was awarded this Construction Management/Construction Inspection contract at the Commission's April 2017 Meeting with the Notice to Proceed issued effective May 24, 2017.

During this reporting period, GPI conducted three (3) Schedule Update/Progress Meetings and one (1) Blast Cleaning/Painting Pre-Activity Meeting with the contractor, J.D. Eckman (JDE). GPI provided comments to, and accepted, three (3) schedule updates, tracked RFIs, correspondence, submittals and shop drawings. GPI's current staff includes the Resident Engineer and one (1) paint inspector in addition to the part time Project Manager.

Construction Contract No. T-644A

J.D. Eckman, Inc. (JDE) was awarded this Construction contract at the Commission's April 2017 Meeting with the Notice of Award/Limited Notice to Proceed issued effective April 26, 2017. JDE received full Notice to Proceed effective May 22, 2017.

During this reporting period, JDE participated in three (3) Schedule Update/Progress Meetings and one (1) Pre-Activity Meeting. JDE mobilized to the site, dug test pits at the various bridge approach slabs, milled and paved shoulder rumble strips at traffic shift locations and installed the bridge blast cleaning containment system at the Carpentersville overpass bridge. JDE continued submitting RFIs, submittals, shop drawings, lane closure notifications and schedule updates.

RESTRIPING OF THE MERGE LANES EXITING THE I-78 TOLL PLAZA

Dewberry Engineers, Inc. (DE), through a standing Consultant Engineer Agreement, was requested to provide Engineering Services to design modifications to the existing striping of the merge area west of the I-78 westbound toll plaza. DE was requested to utilize Malick & Scherer, PC. Consultant conducted field visits to all five bridge sites February 18 & 19, 2016. Due to the departure of personnel, Berger submitted the name and qualifications of a new project manager which has been accepted by the Commission. Meeting is being scheduled to revise scope and discuss utilization of new communication infrastructure. As a result of the recent critical fracture of a truss member resulting in the closing of a PA Turnpike bridge, the scope of this contract was expanded. It has been decided to install sensors on all five bridges in the task order and to add the Milford Montague Bridge to the assignment. A revised scoping meeting was held on February 28th and a revised cost will be submitted. Cost for revised scope was submitted March 22 and was deemed excessive. Revised cost estimate was submitted on March 28 and has been accepted. Final plan submission is scheduled for October 2017.

ELECTRONIC SECURITY AND SURVEILLANCE REPORT MONTH OF SEPTEMBER 2017

The below-listed items represent meetings, communications, tasks, and projects involving the Electronic Security and Surveillance Department:

Radio System

- During the month of September 2017, ESS personnel continued working to complete the radio upgrade. Negotiations to procure space on the Solebury tower continue.
- During the month of September 2017, negotiations to update the existing lease
 agreement with the owner of the Gravel Hill IR site continued. Although the
 Gravel Hill site is optimum, ESS personnel and NJ State Police radio personnel
 tested some alternatives that could be utilized if the Gravel Hill site is not utilized.
- ESS personnel alone, and in conjunction with the New Jersey State Police investigated various other DRJTBC radio issues both during and after normal working hours.
- ESS personnel continue to work with the Districts and IT to update the Cartegraph radio inventory database.

Access Control System

- During the month of September 2017, members if the ESS Department continued to work with Schneider Electric to cut over the toll facilities to the new access control system. To date, District I and District II facilities are complete.
- During the month of August 2017, it was discovered that there are several old pad locks being utilized in the Commission that are not on the new lock system. The new locks have been received and distributed.
- During the month of September 2017, ESS personnel worked with General Supply (Commission's locksmith) to address various lock issues.
- In September 2017, ESS personnel created ID badges and toll cards for new employees and consultants.

- During the month of September 2017, the ACS database was audited and the system was purged of invalid employees and contractor cards. Various other employee ACS rights were updated and/or changed at the request of supervisors.
- Various door alarms and ACS issues were addressed both during and after normal working hours.

ESS

- At the September 25, 2017, Commission Meeting, Schneider Electric was granted a fifth year extension to their ESS current contract.
- During the month of September 2017, ESS personnel continued to work with Schneider Electric on various new Capital Projects, pending projects and current construction projects.
- During the month of September 2017, ESS personnel continued working with Engineering on the new Scudder Falls facility and the renovations to the I-78 administration building.
- During the month of September 2017, Schneider Electric sent the Commission the camera designs and equipment layout for the Lumberville-Raven Rock Pedestrian Bridge and the generator install plan for the Portland-Columbia Pedestrian Bridge. The designs are currently under review. The I-78 camera design is still pending.
- During the month of September 2017, ESS personnel reviewed the camera locations for the toll counting and banking areas at Portland-Columbia and the Delaware Water Gap. One additional camera will be added to Portland-Columbia and the Delaware Water Gap ticket office is still under review.
- During the month of September 2017, ESS and Schneider Electric continued to work with Telegra analytics to test their system. Other options are also being explored.
- ESS personnel reviewed and purged the ESS video storage database that contains copies of videos requested by DRJTBC personnel and outside agencies.
- ESS personnel worked during, and after normal working hours on numerous ESS issues and problems raised by Commission members.

- The ESS Primary Control Center (PCC) continues to operate 24/7 and detected, documented, and assisted the District bridges with various emergencies, traffic, and security related incidents.

As a result, ESS personnel investigated and processed seven video requests. Please see the attached "ESS Request Video Report" for a summary of information on each request.

- On September 7, 2017, ESS personnel attended the DRJTBC Staff Meeting at the New Hope Executive Headquarters.
- On September 12, 2017, ESS personnel met with Genetec representatives at the Primary Control Center to review the capabilities of Genetec's Mission Control reporting feature.
- On September 18, 2017, ESS personnel met with District I to review their toll collection security procedures.
- On September 27, 2017, ESS personnel attended the capital procurement meeting for Operations.
