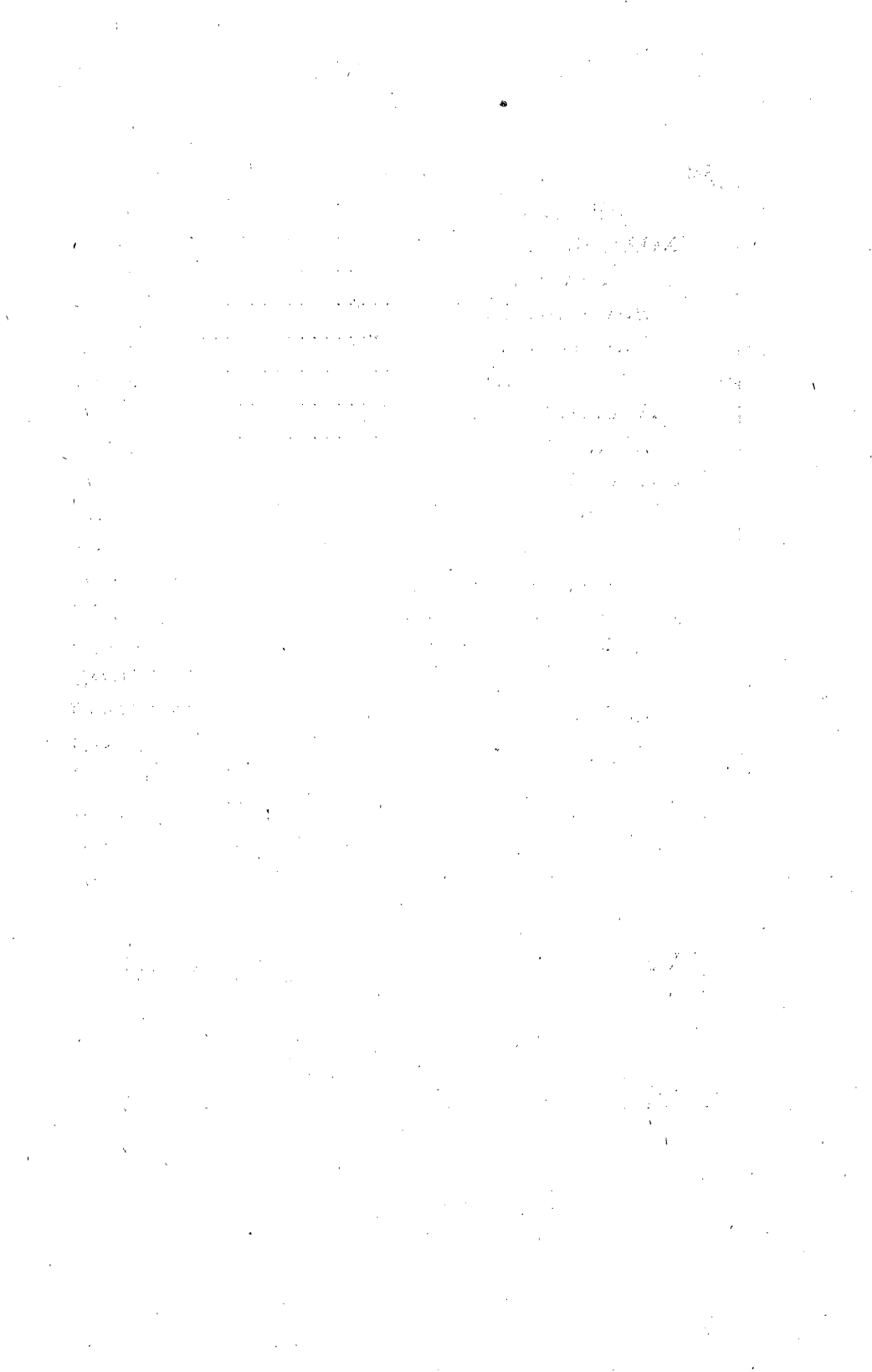

JOURNAL OF THE SENATE.

STATE OF NEW JERSEY,

SENATE CHAMBER,

TRENTON, N. J., TUESDAY, January 10th, 1922.

At 12 o'clock M., this being the time and place appointed by the Constitution for the assembling of the Legislature, the Senate was called to order by the Hon. Charles D. White, the Senator from Atlantic county, who read the following statement:

On motion of Mr. White, the Senate proceeded to the election of a President.

Mr. White nominated the Hon. William B. Mackay, of Bergen county.

Mr. Simpson nominated the Hon. Thomas Barber, of Warren county.

Under the direction of the President *pro tempore*, the Secretary called the Senate, with the following result:

The Senators voting for the Hon. William B. Mackay were:

Mr. Mackay, having a majority of all the votes cast, was declared by the President *pro tempore* duly elected President of the Senate for the ensuing year, and was conducted to the chair by Senators White, Reeves and Whitney.

The oath of office was administered by the President *pro tempore*.

The President on taking the chair addressed the Senators as follows:

MEMBERS OF THE SENATE, FRIENDS, AND LADIES AND GENTLEMEN FROM VARIOUS PARTS OF THE STATE:

I deeply appreciate the great honor which has been conferred upon me today by the members of the New Jersey Senate, and which is the highest gift that is within their power to bestow.

It is not my purpose to make a long address or speech, due to the fact that we have other business to transact, and I believe there are things to deal with later in the day which benefit the inner man most importantly. I do feel, however, that it will be my obligation, or at least a part of my obligation, to endeavor to conduct and preside over the proceedings of this body to the best of my skill, ability and understanding. I trust that the members of this body, on many matters which are for the benefit of the people, which are purely non-political, will co-operate from time to time and give the best that is within them. On matters which may divide, on questions of parties, I trust that all debates and arguments may be had without any bitterness or malice, hatred or any ill-feeling whatsoever.

I want to take this opportunity to say that I think it is a wonderful thing to have the women with us in politics today. I think it is the means of the making of better men and better women. It means that the woman who has taken an interest in the home, coming into political life, will take that interest in political life which will make an influence which will be better for good government and for better government.

I do want to say in closing, it often appears that bills are presented to members of the Senate, which perhaps the particular member, or, very often, other members, do not care to introduce. That bill is taken and introduced by request; that, as a matter of fact, really means nothing. It means that we do not care to have our names stamped on the bill as introducer. It means an added expense to the State in printing all such bills; and I trust that the Senators will introduce only such measures as they feel that they want to push and acknowledge, and bring before this body for consideration.

In closing, I want to thank the members of the Senate and all for the great honor they have bestowed on me, and I trust they will never have any need to regret the confidence that they have thus placed in me. I want to say to the people and the friends gathered here to-day from various parts of the State, and to my friends also from Bergen county, that we are glad to welcome you here to-day and we trust you will come down again and that you may confide in us and co-operate with us and consult with us in many matters in which you may be interested.

Prayer was then offered by the Rev. DeWitt C. Cobb, of Glassboro, N. J.

On motion of Mr. White, the Senate then proceeded to the election of a Secretary.

Mr. White nominated Mr. William H. Albright, of Gloucester county. Mr. Albright was elected by the following vote:

Under the direction of the President, the Secretary called the Senate, when the following Senators appeared and answered the call:

Messrs. Agans, Allen, Barber, Bright, Case, Fooder, Hagaman, Heath, Kays, Larson, Mackay (President), Parry, Reeves, Roberts, Runyon, Simpson, Smith, Stevens, Wallworth, White, Whitney—21.

Mr. White offered the following resolution, which was read and adopted:

Resolved, That a committee of three be appointed to wait upon His Excellency, the Governor, and inform him that the Senate has organized and elected Hon. William B. Mackay, Jr., of the county of Bergen, President, and William H. Albright, of the county of Gloucester, Secretary, and is now ready to proceed to business and also to receive any communication that he may make.

Mr. White offered the following resolution, which was read and adopted:

Resolved, That the Secretary of the Senate be directed to inform the House of Assembly that the Senate has organized and elected the Hon. William B. Mackay, Jr., of the county of Bergen, President, and William H. Albright, of the county of Gloucester, Secretary; and proceeded to business.

Mr. Whitney, for the Committee on Notification to Governor, reported that they had performed their duties.

Mr. White offered the following resolution, which was read and adopted:

WHEREAS, Chapter 158, Pamphlet Laws of 1914, requires that a requisition officer be appointed, and the acts regulating receipts and disbursements require the designation of approving officers for the payment of the necessary expenses of all divisions of the government; be it

Resolved (the House of Assembly concurring), That the Secretary of the Senate and the Clerk of the House of Assembly be designated as requisition officers for the Legislature, their compensation to be three hundred dollars each; and be it further

Resolved, That all statements of expenses of the Legislature be referred to the Committee on Incidental Expenses of the Senate and House of Assembly, respectively, and when approved by said committee said approval shall be indicated by the signature of the chairman of the Senate Committee on Incidental Expenses for expenses of the Senate, and by the chairman of the House Committee on Incidental Expenses for expenses of the House of Assembly, together with the signature of the Secretary of the Senate or the Clerk of the House of Assembly, respectively, and said bills, when approved, shall be forwarded to the Comptroller of the Treasury for payment.

Resolved by the Senate (the House of Assembly concurring), That no bills or joint resolutions (excepting the usual appropriation bills and bills submitted by special investigating committees) be offered in either House of the Legislature after the legislative week commencing Monday, February 6th, 1922, unless by the unanimous consent of the members of the body wherein such bills or joint resolutions are proposed for introduction.

The following messages were received from the Governor by the hands of J. Harry Foley, his Secretary, which were read, as follows:

GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE.

STATE OF NEW JERSEY,

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT,

TRENTON, N. J., January 10th, 1922.

Members of the Senate and General Assembly:

Conformably to the constitutional mandate that the Executive shall communicate to the Legislature at the opening of each session with respect to the condition of the State, and shall recommend such measures as may be deemed expedient, I now draw your attention to the following matters:

At the last session of the Legislature, Chapter 103, P. L. 1921, being "An act concerning intoxicating liquors used or to be used for beverage purposes," was made law. It is familiarly known as the Van Ness Act. Its enactment was over the Executive veto, which was based upon the fact that in its denial of the right of accused persons to a trial by jury, the statute in question was opposed to American principles. The experience which the people of the State have undergone since the act was put into operation has strengthened my belief that it is simply an instrument of oppression, and I am more strongly convinced than ever that legislation regulating and controlling the sumptuary habits and desires of our people and denying the right of trial by jury to persons accused of violations thereof has no proper place on our statute books. I urge the repeal of the Van Ness act and the substitution therefor of an enforcement statute which will conserve to the people of the State the right to indictment and trial by jury for acts interdicted by such a law. The belief that the surest protection against judicial and other forms of oppression and tyranny lies in the right of trial by jury is so well settled in the minds of our people that attempts to encroach upon or destroy that privilege can have but one effect, namely, to breed suspicion of the motives of legislators and contempt for law. It

is, therefore, in the interest of the maintenance of a proper respect for all law that I urge this change.

PUBLIC UTILITIES.

There has recently happened an event which, if allowed to become a precedent, will, in my judgment, destroy the well-established power of the Legislature to fix the rates charged the people of this State by public utilities. The Public Service Railway Company, upon being denied certain rates which it demanded, instead of adopting the procedure usual in such cases of going to the Supreme Court of the State for relief, applied to the United States District Court. The latter, upon an application based solely upon affidavits of the company, without notice to the Utility Board or any of the parties interested in the matter, issued an injunction restraining the Board from interfering with the collection of the rates which the company sought. It is true that within a day after granting the order the judge who made it revoked it, but to me it seems to be intolerable that a situation could exist under which it is possible for a utility, dissatisfied with a unanimous decision of the legislative agency, to ignore the courts of this State and apply to a Federal court which can assume to pass upon such questions, complicated and involved as they were, and requiring months of deliberation by the Utility Board, and in a summary manner set aside the order of the Board.

I am informed that such a situation can be corrected if the National Congress will amend Section 266 of the Federal Judicial Code, prohibiting the hearing by United States District Judges of cases decided by the Utility Board, and requiring that such cases shall only be heard, as indeed has been the practice until recent times, by the United States Supreme Court on appeal from the court of last resort of the State. The utilities of the State are purely intrastate concerns, and should be regulated solely by the State Legislature and its agencies. The Supreme Court of the State is unexcelled for learning and fairness. There is no excuse or justification whatever for a Federal judge presuming that the State legislative agency and the State courts will

not do justice. I would ask the Legislature, therefore, to adopt appropriate resolutions, directed to the National Congress, as well as to the representatives in Congress from this State, petitioning that body to pass corrective legislation for the avoidance of the recurrence of any such practice. In my judgment, unless corrective legislation is passed, it will be only a question of time when the fixation of rates for utilities, instead of being a prerogative of the State Legislature, will become the prerogative of the Federal District Court, and the age-long struggle which the people of the State have conducted to control and regulate corporations created for the service of the public will have been in vain.

Heretofore the cost of contesting the efforts of our utility corporations to increase rates has been largely borne by the municipalities of the State, the principal ones, such as Newark and Jersey City, having contributed most heavily to that cost. Inasmuch as there is now involved the fundamental principle or right of the State to regulate its utilities, it seems to me that the burden of demonstrating or establishing the soundness of the State's position should be lifted from the municipalities and borne by the State; hence I suggest an adequate appropriation be made to insure a full and complete defense to the pending litigation in which such question is involved.

I also direct your attention in connection with our utility corporations, to the fact that in the State of New York and other States a fee is charged upon the issuance of securities by such companies. In our own State, general corporations pay such a fee. I am informed that public utility corporations are not required by the laws of this State to pay fees on security issues. Inasmuch as all issues of securities by these companies require investigation and hearing by the Public Utilities Board, it would seem proper that some reasonable fee should be paid by utilities upon each issue of securities.

LABOR.

One of the most serious questions to which the Legislature should address itself is the Labor situation. During the past year

serious labor disturbances have occurred in this State, and our Courts have been filled with controversies over the legal questions involved. The right of men on strike to peacefully walk the streets in the neighborhood of the shop or plant against which the strike was declared or to peacefully persuade others from taking their places has been denied in our Court of Chancery, and the matter is now before the Court of Errors and Appeals for adjudication. To what extent injunctive powers of our Courts should be invoked in labor disputes is now engaging the consideration and thought of those who are interested in reconciling the differences between Labor and Capital. A more favorable view of the right of men on strike to peacefully picket seems to be taken by the United States Supreme Court than by our State Court.

In a recent opinion Chief Justice Taft of that Court indicates that men on strike have the right through the designation of an agent to act for them to picket the employer's plant, and that they also may attempt to persuade others not to take their places without any right, of course, of forcing such views upon the new employee. Some of our Vice-Chancellors, however, have gone so far as to adjudicate that the men on strike cannot do anything to aid or assist the strike, which, of course, would prevent the strikers from contributing strike benefits or even discussing the strike among themselves. Lately, it has been the practice of employers having strike troubles to seek out those members of our Court of Chancery who hold decided views in respect of the absence of the right on the part of the strikers to picket or to attempt to persuade others against taking their places, avoiding the submission of their litigation to other members of that Court who do not hold such decided views. In some instances alleged strikers and their sympathizers have been summoned out of the localities where the disturbances occurred and have been compelled to journey to other counties to answer the process of the Court. Some of the strikers have been tried for contempt in such other counties and at considerable distance away from the place where the contempt was alleged to have been committed. This is contrary, it seems to me, to established principles of justice and

equity and should not be allowed to continue. I therefore recommend the passage of an act which shall provide that whenever any person is charged with contempt of the Court of Chancery of the State for acts done or committed elsewhere than in the presence of the Court, such charge shall be tried by the Chancellor personally in the Chancery Chambers nearest the place where it is alleged such contempt was committed. I am also of opinion that the Legislature should give serious consideration to whether or not in contempt cases the accused should be tried before a jury.

It may be doubted that the measures suggested above would be constitutional. If it is concluded that they would not be, then I would urge the passage of an amendment to the Constitution accomplishing the desired result.

STATE HIGHWAY.

If our State roads are to be put in order and maintained in proper condition, additional sources of revenue will have to be found. I hesitate to recommend the submission to the people of a referendum on the question of a bond issue to complete the highway program, but some definite plan for raising the necessary moneys will have to be worked out if that program is to be accomplished. In this connection I urge the passage of a statute which will impose a tax of one cent on each gallon of gasoline used by both pleasure cars and automobile trucks, the tax to be collected from the producer, so as to insure collection at a minimum cost, and the proceeds to be devoted to the maintenance of our highways.

I hesitate to pass along to you a recommendation which comes to me from the Commissioners of the Palisades Interstate Park with reference to the incorporation in the State Highway System of Sylvan Avenue and the Boulevard in the Borough of Englewood Cliffs, Tenafly and Alpine, in Bergen County. I am determined to rigidly hold down any extension of the Highway System because of the tremendous cost involved in the completion of the present program. However, I have yielded in this particular for this reason. The Interstate Park, when completed, will furnish to the citizens of New Jersey a splendid playground. The

State has spent or obligated itself to spend approximately a million dollars in the development of the park. It is my understanding that unless the roads in question are improved this State will lack a convenient and accessible means of reaching the Park. Under those circumstances it is my thought that the highway in question should be incorporated as a part of the State Highway System and improved immediately so as to furnish a ready means of access to the Interstate Park.

MORRIS CANAL.

A difficult and important task facing this Legislature is the proper solution of the Morris Canal abandonment problem. It must be conceded, I think, that the canal has outlived its usefulness and is no longer a convenient or profitable means of freight transportation. In the cities through which it passes it has become a nuisance by reason of its pollution by dead animals, rubbish and the sewers and drains emptying into it. Everyone, I believe, is in agreement upon the proposition that the canal should be abandoned, provided that that is accomplished upon terms which are fair to the State. It is my view that this Legislature should make a real effort to work out a solution of this problem.

NEW JERSEY'S FORESTS.

Our forests constitute one of the State's great neglected resources. Nearly half of our area is forest land, most of which will lie idle unless it grows the timber that we need. Users in the State now import nine-tenths of their lumber and pay more than five million dollars a year in freight on the import. The greater part of this, and of the purchase price of the material, could be kept at home by growing the timber of which our own land is capable.

This situation is due mainly to forest fires; our soils are right, our climate is favorable. Through years of effort conditions have greatly improved; a small part of our woodlands, mainly in North Jersey, have a degree of security and a promise of recovered productiveness; in the major part, especially the great

pine areas of South Jersey, there is no assurance that the trees will escape being burned before they reach maturity. Exceptional seasons like that of last June, when nearly seventy thousand acres were burned within two weeks, but emphasize the hazard that we constantly face.

The forest fire service now costs the State two cents an acre a year, and gives full value for the outlay, but falls far short of complete efficiency. For not over four cents an acre, an organization can be maintained that will effectively handle critical as well as ordinary seasons, put our two million acres of forest on a secure, productive basis, and raise their assessable value from a meagre six or eight millions to a possible two hundred millions. And this takes no account of the value of forest playgrounds to a population forced to live chiefly in cities. It will take time to accomplish this, but a beginning is better now than later.

The Appropriations Committee, it seems to me, should take up at once with the Department of Conservation and Development, consideration of to what extent the efforts of that Department towards saving our forests can be augmented through an increased appropriation.

MEMORIAL AT WASHINGTON CROSSING.

The small appropriation made by the last Legislature to acquire the McKonkey ferry house and start this long-deferred project has had the effect of arousing various interests to the practical value of a worthy State undertaking. It is in every way desirable that there shall be a definite legislative determination of the character and extent of the State's program, and that there shall be a reasonable appropriation year by year to carry it forward.

STATE DEPARTMENT OF INSTITUTIONS AND AGENCIES.

There are approximately 10,000 residents of our State who are wholly or partly dependent, and who are wholly or partly disabled and incompetent from the following causes—tuberculosis, feeble-mindedness, insanity, blindness and waywardness.

The existing State institutions are incapable of caring for these people. On the contrary, because of the lack of the right kind of curative facilities and lack of room, the institutions are now overcrowded.

Moreover, the increase of crime among young men and women is most disquieting. This situation can be helped, provided proper facilities are furnished looking toward the reforming of this class of young offender, who has not yet reached the State Prison stage. If such of our State institutions as the Rahway Reformatory, Jamesburg School for Boys, Girls' Home at Trenton and if new training schools for the feeble-minded, unstable and delinquent youth of the State were provided with proper facilities for the care and rehabilitation of this youthful class of dependents and delinquents, a large amount of preventive work can be done. Similar facilities should be provided for the prevention, cure and care of the tuberculous and insane.

The accomplishments at the State Hospitals during the past few years have demonstrated beyond question that there are many of the State's wards who can be returned to more or less useful occupations in their respective communities if adequate preventive and curative treatment can be furnished, and who will otherwise become custodial cases, which means that the State will be obliged to care for them until they die. This would mean a distinct and certain saving to the State.

The State has always, and does now, lack facilities for preventing crime and disease, and it is with reference particularly to this phase of the situation respecting State institutions and agencies that I desire to call the attention of our citizens and the Legislature.

The referendum which was submitted to the people at the last general election, authorizing a bond issue to provide for the institutions in which the State's wards are housed, was rejected by the people. Nevertheless, the State must make provision for properly housing and caring for those unfortunates. In view of the expressed view of the electorate that there should not be a bond issue; it now seems to be incumbent upon the Legislature to provide some other method of raising the necessary funds, and I

call this matter to your attention so that the Appropriation Committee may begin its consideration of the matter just as soon as it is organized.

EMPLOYER'S LIABILITY LAW.

New Jersey was among the first to adopt a workable compensation schedule, and did so during 1911. The maximum payment was fixed at that time at \$10.00 and the minimum at \$5.00. During the session of 1919 these payments were increased to a maximum of \$12.00 and a minimum of \$6.00. When due consideration is given to the present purchasing power of a dollar, it is quite apparent that instead of an increase there has been to all practical purposes a material decrease in the compensation at present paid to the workers in this State.

Several of the provisions of the law would seem to require change, notably the payment for total disability cases, which now receive compensation for only 400 weeks, whereas many progressive States make payment in such cases for life. It would appear reasonable to include compensation for dependent children until they reach the age of 18 years, or at least 16 years, and not limit the payments—as in the case of the New Jersey law—to 300 weeks.

The present limit for medical aid of \$50.00 for the first 28 days is entirely inadequate for the reason that in all cases of serious injuries, first, either the worker does not receive the care his condition warrants, or, second, if such care is furnished him the doctor's fee must be paid by the worker usually from his compensation payment, or, third, the doctor does not get paid for reasonable and proper services rendered. No one of these three conditions can be defended, and increased medical aid should react not only to the benefit of the worker, but also to the employer or insurance carrier, in that treatment will in many instances reduce the amount of permanent disability. It is true that medical aid not exceeding \$200.00 may be ordered by the Workmen's Compensation Bureau in unusual cases, but there are many injuries requiring additional medical aid not coming within this classification.

It would now seem time that the New Jersey Compensation Law be brought more in accord with a number of the industrial States of the Union which are affording their workers a larger degree of protection.

The work of the Rehabilitation Commission has splendidly supplemented the administration of the Compensation Law, and is affording the workers of the State an unusual opportunity to secure physical rehabilitation, as well as mental and industrial. The combination of the rehabilitation work with the Compensation and Public Employment activities makes a condition which is working advantageously in the many hundreds of cases which are annually considered.

PORT AUTHORITY.

There will be submitted to you the report and plan of the Port of New York Authority in compliance with Chapter 152, P. L. 1921. It is my understanding that the Port Authority will not continue as a functioning body unless the Legislature approves or adopts the plan so submitted, or perhaps to state it more accurately in the language of the treaty or compact between New York and New Jersey, either State may by its Legislature withdraw from the compact in the event that the plan for the comprehensive development of the Port shall not have been adopted by both States on or prior to July 1st, 1923. The plan now submitted, I understand, is the one called for by Article 21 of the compact or agreement between the States. While I opposed the creation of this body believing that the interest of New Jersey lay in working out alone the development of its resources, it is my present opinion from an examination of the report and plan, that the Commissioners of the Port have dealt justly by this State and that the plan should be approved.

DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE.

An appropriation of \$75,000 was made for the partial indemnification of owners of cattle reacting from the tuberculin test administered by veterinarians of this Department. Material

headway seems to have been made in the eradication of tuberculosis, which is transmissible to children, and there is strong support for a continuing appropriation for this purpose. I submit this so that the Appropriation Committee may take it under immediate consideration.

LEGISLATION FOR WOMEN.

Last year I called the attention of the Legislature to the necessity for changes in our laws with respect to hours of employment and conditions under which the female is required to work. The suggestion was made that legislation should be passed prohibiting the engaging in industrial occupation or work of any woman for six weeks before and six weeks after the birth of a child. It was further suggested that our labor law should be so modified as to provide for women an eight-hour day within nine consecutive hours, and a forty-eight hour week, as applied to industries now covered by the ten-hour law, and the prohibition of night work for women employed in manufacturing after ten o'clock at night and before six o'clock in the morning.

I reiterate what was said at that time and urge upon you the necessity of legislation along these lines.

REVISION OF CRIMINAL LAW.

Likewise there was suggested to the Legislature of 1921 a revision of our criminal statutes. Attention was called to the fact that since the revision of 1898 various laws have been passed which render it difficult to reconcile existing conflicts, an illustration of which follows:

Under a statute passed in 1914, being Chapter 214, where a sentence of death is commuted to imprisonment for life the minimum term is fifteen years. The minimum term for second degree murder, however, is twenty years. Therefore, one who may have committed first degree murder could possibly secure his release from confinement at the expiration of fifteen years, having served a lesser period than that required to be served by one who committed a lesser crime. Other instances might be

given of the necessity and wisdom for a revision of the statutes dealing with crime and criminal procedure, but I deem it unnecessary, in view of the recommendation on the part of those who have to deal with the subject that the revision is required.

SHEPPARD-TOWNER ACT.

The Federal Congress enacted on November 23d, 1921, "An Act for the promotion of the welfare and hygiene of maternity and infancy and for other purposes." Under the act the privilege is given to this State to accept the benefits thereof. Upon acceptance by the State of New Jersey there is available to the State for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1922, \$36,284.55, \$10,000 given outright and \$26,284.55 additional if matched dollar for dollar by the State. For the succeeding five years a total of \$31,284.55 annually, \$5,000 is given outright and \$26,284.55, if matched by the State. The Legislature must designate the agency which it to co-operate with the Children's Bureau. In states having a Child Hygiene or Child Welfare Division in its State Health Department—that Division must be designated. This agency must then submit to the Children's Bureau for approval by the Federal Board the plans it proposes to follow in the expenditure of the funds.

The act of November 23d only authorizes an appropriation and the appropriation must still be made by Congress.

It is believed, however, there will be no undue delay in making the appropriation and inasmuch as the act provides that within sixty days after the appropriation is available State plans must have been approved by the Board and the money apportioned, it is important that states desiring to get the funds available this year, act promptly.

I make no recommendation with respect to whether the act should be accepted or not. I am calling it to your attention so that public opinion, with respect to the wisdom or desirability of operating under it, may be crystalized.

STATE POLICE.

This body was authorized by Chapter 102 of the Laws of 1921. For the purpose of carrying out the provisions of the

statute, three hundred thousand dollars, or so much thereof as might be necessary, was appropriated. I am now informed that, in order to properly equip and train the police, it will require an appropriation of four hundred thousand dollars. I am free to confess that my views, as expressed when I vetoed this measure, have not changed, and I am further impressed with the thought that four hundred thousand dollars seems to be too large a sum to expend for any such purposes. It is very questionable in my mind whether the benefit obtained by the people, if any, from the creation of the State police is worth the cost. I therefore urge the repeal of the statute and the dismissal of the force.

While I am adverting to the subject of economy, I desire to impress upon the Legislature that there are many demands each year for appropriations. Many of them call for the exercise of proper State functions, but many of them, in my judgment, do not, and there seems to be a growing tendency to have the State take over the administration of matters which are purely local. The State's expenses are increasing to such an extent that I think it is time such tendency should be checked and the State's activities confined to those which are purely State matters.

EDUCATION.

The education of the children is the greatest concern of the State. It is only saying the plain truth that never before was there such a pressure for more and better school facilities. From all parts of the State come reports of the increasing number of children who are seeking a fuller education.

The demand has far outstripped the present school facilities in the way of properly housing all the children. The elementary schools are crowded. In some cities half-day sessions are resorted to in order to meet the demand. The high schools are also crowded to the doors.

This condition should not be looked upon with alarm or with any misgiving. It should rather be looked upon as encouraging and hopeful.

Education of all the people is a costly enterprise. It will, however, be generously met by the people of our State. It always has been, for it is still the chief defense of nation and State.

The child is the biggest asset of the State, for it is the child more than any other gift that this world has to offer to mortal man that brings hope and forward-looking thoughts.

During the school year just ended June 30, 1921, there were enrolled in the public day schools of the State 612,277 boys and girls. This is an increase of 20,479 over the year before. Sixty-five thousand of this number were registered in the high schools.

The total number of teachers employed in the day schools was 19,114—an increase of 911 over the preceding year.

The total cost for the current expenses of schools, not including new buildings nor the payment of maturing bonds, was about \$38,000,000. This was an increase of about \$8,500,000 over the year before. The per capita cost on the total enrollment was \$63.82. This was an increase of \$11.69 over the preceding year.

In round numbers, the sources from which this thirty-eight million dollars or more came were as follows:

From the income of the School Fund,	\$300,000

While the foregoing record shows a tremendous expense for the maintenance of our schools, I think New Jersey has reason to be proud of the high standard of efficiency maintained in its school system, and it should make all endeavor to constantly improve and develop our school facilities.

CAMP DIX.

During the war the Federal Government took certain steps toward the acquisition of lands at Camp Dix, to be used for military purposes. The War Department has requested that jurisdiction over the lands acquired or to be acquired and forming part of Camp Dix should be ceded by the State to the Federal Government. Accordingly, there will be presented to you a draft of a bill making such cession of jurisdiction, and which bill follows the general form that has been adopted by the Legislature of this State in similar cases. I respectfully suggest that such measure should be enacted into law.

To the Legislature:

The summary of the Budget requests with my recommendations for appropriations of \$13,896,246.74 for the ensuing fiscal year ending June 30, 1923, is presented to you pursuant to Chapter 15, Laws of 1916, and Chapter 221, Laws of 1918.

The estimate of available revenues, as submitted by the State Comptroller and the State Treasurer in their report of October 15, 1921, is \$13,334,640.00, of which \$2,740,801.06 represents the amount of present appropriations from special funds, making the estimate of general State funds \$10,593,838.94 available for appropriation for the fiscal year 1923. This is the same amount as their estimate of receipts for the present fiscal year.

Since this estimate was made, business and financial conditions have improved and there seems every reason now to believe that the State's revenues for the present year, as well as for next year, will be substantially in excess of the estimate of three months ago. I am, however, required by the Budget Act to present my recommendations for appropriations not to exceed the estimated funds available.

Accordingly, out of the total requests submitted of \$20,502,692.71, I am recommending appropriations of \$13,896,246.74, of which \$10,549,647.51 would be from general State Funds.

I should have liked to include in my recommendations further expenditures for new buildings needed at the various institutions of the State, and would have done so had the estimated revenue permitted. It now seems possible, under the improved business and financial conditions, that the available revenues may exceed the estimate, both for this year and for next, by an amount of \$400,000 to \$500,000 per year. Also, if proper economies are practiced by the various Departments this year, the amount of unexpended balances to be lapsed into the Treasury next June 30th, should be substantial in amount. It may therefore appear, before the Appropriation Act is finally passed, that the available funds will exceed the estimate made last October sufficiently to admit of the following appropriations for new buildings at the institutions:

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The above recommendations are independent of any additional revenues to the State such as I have recommended for your consideration in my annual message, which is also transmitted to you to-day. If some such provisions were made for additional revenues, it should be possible amply to provide for the institutional needs of the State and also to include some of the other meritorious projects which I have been unable to recommend within the present Budget limitations, such as the Washington Crossing Park, increased forest fire service, etc.

It has seemed necessary to omit the usual appropriation of \$500,000.00 from General Funds to the State Road Fund, for aid to counties in road construction. The tax on gasoline which I am recommending would furnish funds from which such an appropriation might be made.

In addition to the recommendations for new buildings at the institutions, I am recommending the appropriation of an additional \$275,000.00 to supplement the \$300,000.00 which was last year appropriated for the new primary unit for the School for the Deaf. There is no question of the need of this school for better quarters, particularly for the younger pupils who are in a rather helpless condition.

The buildings for the Glassboro Normal School should be ready for opening the school next year, and recommendation is made for \$50,000.00 for furniture and equipment of the school and \$86,000.00 for other expenses. The necessary legislation should be enacted for payment of the expenses of this school in the same manner as the other Normal schools of the State.

A new power plant, and new heating, lighting and cold storage plant, to cost \$75,000.00, is needed at the Trenton Normal School, and it seems a matter of economy as well as prudence to grant it.

The total of appropriations as here stated does not include certain reappropriations, which are naturally excluded because they do not represent any additional expenditure from the estimated available revenues, but only affect the period during which expenditures may be made of the amounts previously appropriated.

There are, however, the additional expenditures from Road and from School Funds which by law are now made without definite annual appropriation.

The State Road Fund will, I understand, have the following estimated amounts:

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As stated last year, I see no reason why the Appropriation Bill should not carry the total of all these State expenditures, and it would certainly be much more informative to the citizens of the State if the authorized expenditure of all such funds was duly stated as the total of authorized appropriations.

A review of the Budget accounts as here presented will indicate that in many cases no material reduction is made in the amount requested by the Department. There has been no desire on my part nor on that of the Budget assistants to follow any uniform scale of reductions and where it appeared that the request covered only the fair requirements to meet the necessary activities of a Department, I believe it should be granted as made.

On the other hand, some of the reductions which I have made have been inspired by no feeling of lack of confidence in the honesty and good intent of the requests submitted, but rather by a belief that such Departments could curtail or reorganize their work so as to accomplish all necessary objects with a less expenditure than that requested.

There has been a very fine spirit manifested throughout the Budget hearings and there has been a general desire shown to co-operate in trying to meet the problem of reduction of expenditures which had to be faced this year. This spirit and attitude have been deeply appreciated by me.

The request for the Legislature and of the State Printing Board for the legislative printing have been recommended by me without change, since these are matters which rest almost entirely in the hands of the Legislature. I would, however, suggest these matters for your consideration and decision as to whether it may not be possible to effect some substantial reductions therein without detriment to the interests of the State.

Because of the material reductions made in many items of the Budget, I have felt it desirable to recommend \$250,000.00 for the State Emergency Fund to meet such contingencies as may arise. I also recommend the appropriation of \$50,000.00 for the State Insurance Fund as called for by Chapter 123, Laws of 1913. This I consider essential to the end that a proper fund may be created which will ultimately make unnecessary the heavy payments for insurance which are now required.

The question of scale of prices for commodities has been one for serious consideration during the preparation of the Budget. There has been a marked decrease in the price of many articles, but certain items such as coal and printing have not shown a proportionate decrease. This may appear while the Budget is under consideration by the Appropriation Committee, and, if so, corresponding reductions in these items should be made.

I have instructed Messrs, Fernald and Reddan, my Budget assistants, to furnish the Appropriation Committee with all the information upon which this Budget is based, and to give all assistance possible to the Appropriation Committee.

My whole desire in submitting this message is to have appropriations which will adequately support the necessary activities of the State, but in an economical manner; will maintain its existing buildings and equipment in proper order and condition; and will provide such additions as will mean real progress toward fully meeting its actual needs for new construction.

DEBT OF THE STATE.

Certificates of the State issued to the Commissioners of the Agricultural College, pursuant to Chapter 417 of the Laws of 1895, amounting to \$116,000.00, was at June 30, 1921, the only debt of the State.

Under an act of Congress of the United States, approved July 2, 1862, entitled "An act donating public lands to the several States and Territories which may provide colleges for the benefit of agriculture and the mechanic arts," there was invested for the benefit of the State Agricultural College the sum of \$116,000.00 in the war bonds of the State, being the proceeds from sales of land scrip. The war bonds have all matured and been paid. Owing to the inability of the Commissioners to invest the said sum of \$116,000.00 conformably to the said act of Congress, which provides, "That all moneys derived from the sale of the lands aforesaid by the States to which the lands are apportioned, and from the sales of land scrip hereinbefore provided for, shall be invested in stocks of the United States, or of the States, or some other safe stocks, *yielding not less than five per centum upon the par value of said stocks,*" the Legislature, at the session of 1895, passed an act authorizing the Commissioners to transfer and pay over, as money shall be by them received, to the Sinking Fund of this State, and authorizing the State Treasurer and Comptroller to issue and deliver therefor to said Commis-

sioners a certificate of this State to the effect that the State will pay to said Commissioners five per centum annually of the amount so paid into or transferred to the Sinking Fund.

Under an act approved April 8, 1903, the Sinking Fund has been assigned and is now a part of the permanent School Fund of the State.

The assets of the State Fund consist of 1,887 shares of stock of the United Railroad and Canal Company of New Jersey, the market value of which amounts to about \$320,000.00.

The small excess of resources as shown in the above statement indicates a serious financial condition if the total of the Appropriation Act this year cannot be very materially reduced from that of last. The attention of the Legislature is directed to this fact in the annual report of the Comptroller.

Last year's Appropriation Act exceeded the total budget recommendation by \$1,500,000.00, and, in addition to this, over \$500,000.00 was appropriated by the Legislature in separate supplemental appropriation acts.

Serious consideration of appropriations is requested at the present session of the Legislature, as it is obvious, in view of the above statement, that the total should not exceed the resources for the current fiscal year, approximating \$13,000,000.00.

The Budget Act requires a statement showing the estimate of revenue and the State's income available for appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1923. As no new sources of revenue over those of last year have been made, the estimate for the year ending June 30, 1923, is made the same as the year ending June 30, 1922, namely, \$13,334,640.00.

Pursuant to the Budget Act, the foregoing statements are submitted, and **should any further information** be desired, the same will be furnished.

STATE OF NEW JERSEY,
EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT,

To the Legislature:

February 7th, 1922.

I desire to call the attention of the Legislature to the bill introduced by Senator Simpson requiring the trolley corporations of the State to carry out any franchise contract which was obtained from the local authorities upon condition that the fare was not to exceed five cents. This bill, if passed, would help to relieve the State from the condition of virtual paralysis of the Public Utility Commission in the matter of fixing trolley rates. This condition is due to the action of the Public Service Railway Company in obtaining an injunction from the Federal court, tying the hands of the Public Utility Commission. The effect of this injunction, unless the United States Supreme Court shall dismiss it, is that for perhaps two years to come the Public Utility Commission is powerless to regulate trolley rates in New Jersey.

The Public Service Railway Company and the other companies operating trolleys are doing business in the streets of our municipalities solely by virtue of franchises granted by the respective localities through which they operate, which franchises limit them to a five-cent fare. Everybody supposed that these franchises constituted a contract between the public and the trolley companies. During the years when the five-cent fare was extremely profitable to the companies, and there was a public demand for a three-cent fare, the company managers pointed to these franchises as compelling them to furnish transportation at five cents, even though that rate should prove unprofitable. They claimed the advantages of the profitable use on the ground that they would have to stand the losses of possible unprofitable years. But when the unprofitable years came along these contracts were promptly repudiated by the company. They raised the cry, which the courts sustained, that these contracts had been abrogated or suspended by the act creating the Public Utility Commission and vesting in said commission the power to fix just and reasonable rates. This was held by the courts to be a legislative suspension

or waiver of the public rights under the franchise contract, and the courts have gone further and held that it is the duty of the Public Utility Commission, under the statute creating it, to fix rates in excess of the franchise rates if these are inadequate.

This interpretation of the Public Utility Act by the court was never dreamed of by any member of the Legislature when the bill was passed. There is no such language in the statute, and the court reads this abrogation of the contract into the law by judicial interpretation.

But, while we must respect the decisions of our courts and abide by them, the legislative province still remains of amending the Public Utility Statute so as to prevent any such interpretation in the future as the court has given the statute in the past. The Legislature can declare that the suspension of these contracts shall go no further, and that the corporations shall be held to the terms of their original franchises. This will operate to make it clear that the Legislature did not intend in the Utilities Act to impose upon the Public Utility Commission the duty to revoke franchise contracts, and the decision of the court as to the meaning of the statute will no longer apply.

We are now rapidly returning to conditions approximating those before the war. The prices of labor and materials are falling steadily, and it will only be a short time before the five-cent fare will be extremely profitable again.

I therefore urge upon the Legislature the duty to add to the Public Utility Statute the legislative declaration that this statute shall not be construed to authorize the fixing of any fare in excess of five cents for trolley transportation. The passage of the Simpson bill will accomplish this purpose.

"In counties of the first class the board of chosen freeholders shall under this act appoint each year with the advice of the superintendent of the hospital, an advisory and consulting staff of not less than five physicians resident in such county, whose duties shall be to confer and consult with the said superintendent and such board of chosen freeholders to promote and advance the scientific, medical and surgical development of each institution. Notice of meetings of the designated hospital committee of such board of chosen freeholders shall be given to each member of such advisory staff."

At the end of section two, page three, add the following:

"Any board of chosen freeholders in a county of the first class may at any time after the passage of this act, adopt a resolution delegating the duties and powers provided for in this act to be vested in a board of managers in counties other than counties of the first class, and from and after the passage of such resolution, and its approval by the county supervisor, the management of the county hospital for tuberculosis shall be by a board of managers appointed and functioning in the same manner as board of managers in counties other than the first class."

Strike out all of section four and all of section five, on pages five, six, seven, eight and nine, and insert in lieu thereof the following:

4. Section four of the act to which this act is an amendment be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

4. The superintendent shall be chief executive officer of the hospital and subject to the by-laws or rules and regulations thereof, and to the powers of the board of managers or of said committee of the board of chosen freeholders, as the case may be.

Shall have general supervision and control of the records, accounts and buildings of the hospital, and all internal affairs, and maintain discipline therein, and enforce compliance with and obedience to all rules, by-laws and regulations adopted by the board of managers or by said committee of the board of chosen freeholders, as the case may be, for the government, discipline and management of said hospital and the employees and inmates thereof. He shall make such further rules, regulations and orders as he may deem necessary, not inconsistent with law or with the rules, regulations and directions of the board of managers, or of said committee of the board of chosen freeholders, as the case may be.

Shall, with the consent of the board of managers, or of said committee of the board of chosen freeholders as the case may be, appoint such resident officers and such employees as he may think proper and necessary for the efficient performance of the business of the hospital, and prescribe their duties; and for cause stated in writing, after an opportunity to be heard, discharge any such officer or employee at his discretion.

Shall cause proper accounts and records of the business and operations of the hospital to be kept regularly from day to day in books and on records provided for that purpose; and see that such accounts and records are correctly made up for the annual report to the board of chosen freeholders, as required by section three of this chapter, and present the same to the board of managers or to said committee of the board of chosen freeholders, as the case may be, who shall incorporate them in their report to the said freeholders.

Shall receive into the hospital, under the general direction of the board of managers, or of said committee of the board of chosen freeholders, as the case may be, in the order of application, any person found to be suffering from tuberculosis in any form, who has a legal settlement in the county, or who has been an actual resident and inhabitant of the county for a period of at least one year prior to his application for admission to said hospital, or any person who may be committed to said hospital by an order of any judge of the Court of Common Pleas; subject, however, to the further provisions of this act. Said superin-

tendent shall cause to be kept proper accounts and records of the admission of all patients, their names, age, sex, color, marital condition, residence, occupation and place of last employment.

Shall cause a careful examination to be made of the physical condition of all persons admitted to the hospital and provide for the treatment of each such patient according to his need; and shall cause a record to be kept of the condition of each patient when admitted, and from time to time thereafter.

Shall temporarily discharge from said hospital any patient who shall wilfully or habitually violate the rules thereof; or who is found not to have tuberculosis; or who is found to have recovered therefrom; or who for any other reason is no longer a suitable patient for treatment therein; and shall make a full report thereof at the next meeting of the board of managers, or of said committee of the board of chosen freeholders, as the case may be, who shall make such final disposition of the case as they may think proper.

Shall collect and receive all moneys due the hospital, keep an accurate account of the same, report the same at a monthly meeting of the board of managers, or of said committee of the board of chosen freeholders, as the case may be, and transmit the same to the county treasurer within ten days after such meeting.

Shall, before entering upon the discharge of his duties, give a bond in such sum as the board of managers or said committee of the board of chosen freeholders, as the case may be, may determine to secure the faithful performance of such duties.

5. Section five of the act to which this act is an amendment be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

5. Any resident of the county in which the hospital is situated, desiring treatment in such hospital, may apply in person to the superintendent or to any reputable physician for examination, and such physician, if he find that said person is suffering from tuberculosis in any form, may apply to the superintendent of the hospital for his admission. Blank forms for such application shall be provided by the hospital, and shall be forwarded by the superintendent thereof gratuitously to any reputable physician in the county upon request. So far as practicable applications for admission to the hospital shall be made upon such forms. The superintendent of the hospital, upon receipt of such application, if it appears therefrom that the patient is suffering from tuberculosis, and if there be a vacancy in the said hospital, shall notify the person named in such application to appear in person at the hospital. If, upon personal examination of such patient, or of any patient applying in person for admission, the superin-

tendent and the board of managers, or said committee of the board of chosen freeholders as the case may be, are satisfied that such person is suffering from tuberculosis, he shall admit him to the hospital as a patient. All such applications shall state whether, in the judgment of the physician, the person is able to pay in whole or in part for his care and treatment while at the hospital; and every application shall be filed and recorded in a book kept for that purpose in the order of their receipt. *Provided, further*, that the legal settlement and the financial ability of the patient or the person or persons chargeable with his or her support, shall be determined in the same way and by the same method that those facts are determined in the case of insane patients under an act entitled "An act concerning the charitable, hospital, relief, training, correctional, reformatory and penal institutions, boards and commissions located and conducted in this State, which are supported in whole or in part from county, municipal or State funds," approved February twenty-eighth, one thousand nine hundred and eighteen; and a copy of the finding of the judicial officer shall be forthwith filed in the office of the clerk of the county in which such patient is confined and a copy duly certified by the clerk of the county shall be forthwith forwarded to the superintendent of the hospital to which the patient is admitted and by him kept on file, and if it appears by said finding that the patient has a legal settlement in any county of this State and is indigent, then he shall be supported in said institution at the expense of the county in which he has a legal settlement, and if it appears by said finding that the patient has no legal settlement in any county of this State, then he shall be maintained at the expense of the State; *provided, however*, that if said patient shall have a legal settlement in any county of this State other than the county in which he make application for admission and the county in which he has a legal settlement maintains an institution for the care and treatment of persons suffering from tuberculosis under an act to which this act is an amendment, then it shall be the duty of the superintendent of the institution to which he has been admitted to notify the superintendent of the institution of the county in which he has a legal settlement of the fact of his admission to the institution and the judicial finding as to his legal settlement and indigency; and said patient may be transferred to the institution in the county in which he has a legal settlement, by the superintendent of the institution of that county, unless the judicial officer who determines the legal settlement shall certify that, in his

opinion, his removal from the county would be detrimental to the patient's health or against the best interest of the patient's family, and in that event, he shall be maintained as aforesaid in the institution to which he has been admitted; *provided, however*, that the county in which he has a legal settlement shall be bound for the patient's maintenance until he be transferred as aforesaid. The expense of his maintenance in any institution of any county in which the patient has not a legal settlement shall be paid by the county in which he has a legal settlement if any such there be in this State, upon bills rendered by the superintendent of the institution in which he is maintained, to the board of chosen freeholders of the county in which he has a legal settlement, and suit may be maintained in any of the courts of this State having jurisdiction of the subject matter, for the collection of the same. And if the expense of maintenance of said patient is chargeable to the State under the provisions of this act, then the State shall pay for said maintenance in the same way it pays or contributes toward the support of indigent patients in any other institutions of this State according to the act approved February twenty-eighth, one thousand nine hundred and eighteen referred to in this section. Nothing herein contained, however, shall permit the removal of the patient to the State institution for the care and treatment of tuberculosis against his will. When said hospital is completed and ready for the treatment of patients or whenever thereafter there are vacancies therein, admission to said hospital shall be made in the order in which the names of applicants shall appear upon the application book to be kept as above provided, in so far as such applicants are certified to by the superintendent to be suffering from tuberculosis. No discrimination shall be made in the accommodation, care or treatment of any patient because of the fact that the patient or his relatives contribute to the cost of his maintenance in whole or in part, and no patient shall be permitted to pay for his maintenance in such hospital a greater sum than the average per capita cost of maintenance therein, including a reasonable allowance for the interest on the cost of the hospital; and no officer or employee of such hospital shall accept from any patient thereof any fee, payment or gratuity whatsoever for his services, and any such person having been so admitted shall not be discharged without having first obtained permission of the superintendent or board of managers of such hospital, or said committee of the board of chosen freeholders, as the case may be, so that such person may not become a menace to the community. The board of managers

or said committee of the board of chosen freeholders, as the case may be, shall have the right to hold and detain any patient admitted to said hospital when in their judgment it is for the benefit of said patient or of the community that said patient remain therein, but said patient or any person as his next friend, may apply to the court.

I return herewith without my approval, Assembly Bill No. 8, submitted to me in accordance with the provisions of the Constitution on February 7th, 1922, for these reasons:

Considerable opposition to this measure has been manifested by a number of members of the State Militia, who fear that the effect of the bill is to take the State Militia into politics. It is charged that the introduction of the bill is the result of a partisan desire to force upon the Militia as a whole the views of a clique therein concerning the propriety of the appointment of a former officer. I concur in the opinion that the effect of the measure would be to inject politics into the Militia and to weaken and impair the morale, efficiency and discipline of the men.

Further, it is my conception that the proposed act is materially at variance with the organic law as set forth in Articles III, IV and VII of the State Constitution. The act purports, as the title implies, to supplement an act entitled “An act to amend an act entitled ‘An act concerning the Militia of the State.’ Approved March fourth, one thousand nine hundred and eighteen.”

As I understand it, an act amending an act when finally enacted, becomes a part of the original law and if a supplement is intended the supplement should apply to the law as amended and not to an act designed wholly to amend that original law. That

in itself would appear to violate paragraph 4, section 7, Article IV, which provides that "every law shall embrace but one object, and that shall be expressed in the title." Assembly Bill No. 8, however, does not begin to express in its title the purpose of the act, which is as stated in the first section to disband the Fifty-seventh Infantry Brigade, place its officers on the reserve list and oorganize a new brigade designated in section 2 as the Fifty-seventh Infantry Brigade.

Article VII of the Constitution, in paragraph 1, section 1, says "The Legislature shall provide by law for enrolling, organizing and arming the Militia." There appears to be nothing in the article authorizing the Legislature by a special act, which this unquestionably is, or otherwise, to arbitrarily disband one brigade of the Militia and create another and this is what Assembly Bill No. 8 purports to do when it says "the new brigade shall be formed and organized in conformity with the laws governing the army of the United States and the regulations issued by the Secretary of War to be designated and stationed," etc. Therefore, the entire makeup of the brigade, including its title and location is determined by the act leaving little of anything for the properly constituted National and State officials to have to say in the matter.

Article V of the Constitution designates the Governor as the Commander-in-Chief of all the military and naval forces in the State. Section 5 of this bill seeks to make the Governor subordinate to the Legislature for this specific purpose and directs him to file a request and obtain the consent of the President of the United States for the disbandment.

The same section expresses more solicitude for legislative rights when it provides the foregoing action, "shall not be construed in any way as a waiver or limitation of the right of the Legislature," to exercise its Constitutional function as provided in Article VII. The act goes further and leaves its operation contingent upon some future action of the President of the United States.

It may be well for the Legislature to remember that Article III of the Constitution is still in force and has a very decided bearing on the rights of the Legislature as set forth in articles IV and VII and that of the Governor in Articles V and VII.

shall be printed the proposition to be submitted to the voters with instructions in the following form:

“If you favor the proposition printed below make an X mark in the square to the left and opposite the word ‘Yes’; if you are apposed thereto make an X mark in the square to the left of and opposite the word ‘No.’

The members of the district boards of registry and election holding such election shall within two days after such election make return to the township committee of the township of Chester, in the county of Burlington, of the result of such election by statements in writing under their hands and the same shall be entered at length upon the minutes of the said township committee, and thereupon and upon the adoption of this act by a majority of said electors voting thereon at such special election, and not otherwise, this act shall be in all respects operative.

“4. The register of voters within said above-described territory to be used in the conduct of such special election shall be prepared and made up by the boards of registry and election of the said township of Chester, in the county of Burlington, which conducted the general election next preceding the holding of such special election in each of the election districts of said township of Chester, in the county of Burlington, which include the territory above described, and for that purpose the said boards of registry and election shall meet at such places within said described territory and at such time as shall be designated by the clerk of the township of Chester, in the county of Burlington, at

least one week preceding said special election. Notice of the time and place so designated for such meeting shall be given by the clerk of the township of Chester, in the county of Burlington, by posting notices thereof in at least ten of the most public places in said described territory at least five days prior to said meeting. Said meeting of the said boards of registry and election for the making up of said new register of voters shall begin at one o'clock in the afternoon and shall continue until nine o'clock in the evening of the day fixed for that purpose, and said boards shall insert in said new register the names of all persons who are legal voters within said territory at the time of the approval of this act and who shall appear in person before them and establish to the satisfaction of the majority of the said respective boards that they are entitled to vote at said special election by reason of being inhabitants and citizens residing in said above-described territory at the time of the approval of this act, or who shall be sworn by the written affidavit of a voter residing in said territory to be entitled so to vote. A separate affidavit shall be required for each person so registered by affidavit which shall contain the address of the affiant and shall be signed by him. On the following day one copy of said register shall be mailed to the chairman of the county board of elections of the county of Burlington, to be filed by said board, and one copy thereof shall be retained for the use of said township board of elections at such special election.

"5. Immediately after the statement of the result of such election shall be made to the township committee of the township of Chester, in the county of Burlington, another copy of said statement, certified by the clerk of the township of Chester, in the county of Burlington, shall be filed by him in the office of the county clerk of the county of Burlington."

It is frankly conceded, I believe, that the measure is designed to apply only to the city of Elizabeth, where there exists a deadlock owing to a division in the Council between the two dominant parties. This measure is intended to permit the deadlock to be relieved for partisan reasons and along partisan lines.

I return without approval Assembly Bill No. 115, being "An act to apportion the members of the General Assembly among the several counties of the State."

This measure is in conflict with Article IV, section 3, of the Constitution, which provides for an apportionment of members of the General Assembly by the Legislature at its first session,

after the then next and every subsequent enumeration or census, which apportionment shall remain unaltered until another enumeration shall have been taken.

The last census of the United States was taken in 1920, hence the Legislature has not complied with the mandate of the Constitution.

This measure should have been enacted at the Session of 1921.

The said ballots so cast for or against this act shall be counted and the result thereof returned by the election officers, and a canvass of such election had in the same manner as is now provided for by law in the case of the election of a Governor, and the acceptance or rejection of this act so determined shall be declared in the same manner as the result of an election for a Governor, and if there shall be a majority of all the votes cast for and against it at such election in favor of the acceptance of this act, then this act shall take effect forthwith.

49. This act shall take effect immediately.

Strike out clause reading "*provided*, that said commission shall not be authorized to make any settlement obligating the payment of any sum of money by the State to Lehigh Valley Railroad Company or said Morris Canal and Banking Company or any other person."; and insert in lieu thereof the following: "*provided, however*, that such settlement and agreement shall not become operative until it has been ratified by the Legislature of the State of New Jersey in the manner hereinafter set forth. The said commissioners shall make a report setting forth what sum or sums, if any, in their opinion, said Lehigh Valley Railroad Company should pay to the State for such release or releases for such portion or portions of the canal property as the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company is to secure under said proposed terms of settlement and agreement, together with all the other terms thereof; said report shall be filed in the office of the Secretary of State by said commissioners on or before the first day of December, 1922, Immediately upon the filing of said report with the Secretary of State, said Secretary of State shall advise the Governor that said report has been filed, with the request that the Governor request the Senate and General Assembly of New Jersey at the next legislative session to consider such proposed terms of settlement and agreement; that at such session, the Legislature may ratify said terms of settlement and agreement or it may refuse or fail to ratify the same.

"If the Legislature shall ratify said terms of agreement the said commissioners shall be authorized and directed in that event to cause to be executed on behalf of the State proper instruments in writing, approved as to form by the Attorney General, signed by the Governor, and with the seal of the State thereto affixed, duly attested, conveying to the said railroad company or the said canal company any and all right, title and interest of such portion or portions of said canal property agreed to be conveyed by said report of settlement and agreement, and to deliver such instruments to said company or companies, upon receiving from them appropriate instruments in writing, approved as to form by the Attorney General, to carry out on their part the terms of settlement as provided in said report, and upon said companies performing any other things on their part to be performed."

Strike out sections 4 and 5.

Insert a new section to be known as section 4—as follows:

"4. The control and management of all of the property, real and personal, conveyed and transferred to the State by the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company, the Morris Canal and Banking

Company, the General Securities Company, or otherwise acquired, pursuant to the terms of this act, in the event of the Legislature ratifying such proposed terms of settlement and agreement, shall be vested in the Board of Conservation and Development, subject to further action by the Legislature. Senate Bill No. 105 is returned unapproved. It is popularly known as the Full Crew Repealer. The effect of this measure is to shift from the railroad companies operating in this State the burden of applying to the Public Utility Commission for a reduction in the number of a trained crew under chapter 94, P. L. 1917, and place upon either the Public Utility Commission or others who may be interested in preventing such reduction. I take it, it is the purpose of the railroad companies, if this bill becomes law, to reduce the size of train crews. Relief, of course, from such actions may be obtained under the bill by application to the Utility Commission. But it is hardly necessary to point out burden of proof will no longer be upon the companies but rather upon the men who have been dismissed. Pending the determination of the propriety of the reduction the companies will operate with the reduced number. That means, of course, during the period consumed in a hearing before the Public Utility Commission and judicial review of any order made by it.

I see no good reason for this change in the law. As it now stands, full opportunity is given the railroad companies under section 3 of chapter 94, P. L. 1917, to apply to the Public Utility Commission for a reduction in the size of any train crew and that is all this bill accomplishes other than to shift the burden of proof and to place the obligation to initiate the proceeding upon someone other than companies.

To the Assembly:

Assembly Bill No. 1 is returned unapproved. Its purpose is to authorize the issuance of bonds of the State in the sum of forty million dollars for the purpose of paying the cost of constructing a State Highway System. The bonds are to run for a period not exceeding fifteen years for such portion as may be issued for highways and for a period not exceeding thirty years for such portion as may be issued for reconstruction of bridges.

While I recognize that the completion of the State Highway System is a matter of great importance, it seems to me that the highway program can, nevertheless, be proceeded with to completion without adding forty million dollars to the debt of this State. If there is one thing from which the people of this State and of the country generally are suffering, it is taxes. Business in this country may be described to be in a convalescent stage, after having gone through a very serious attack. The people of New Jersey are more fortunate than the rest of the country, and while prosperity, no doubt, is on its way back in the vernacular, the people should be given a chance to catch their breath before being asked to assume a forty million dollar debt. Were I confronted with choosing between giving up the State highway program altogether or asking the people to shoulder an additional debt of this size, I would unhesitatingly choose the first course, but I do not believe such a choice is involved. It is far better to progress with the State highway development more slowly and pay as we go than to load this proposed debt on the State.

I might call your attention to the fact that had the Legislature passed either the Blair bill, No. 463, or the Gaede bill, No. 448, imposing a tax of one per cent. per gallon upon gasoline sold for use in motor vehicles, the State would be in receipt of approximately two million dollars a year therefrom. Such a

revenue would have either obviated the necessity of any bond issue at all or would have materially reduced the amount of such issue. I cannot conceive of any justification for the failure to pass either of these bills and forcing upon the people in their place a forty million dollar debt.

No discretion is left with the board of freeholders of counties of first and second class as to the number of probation officers which may be appointed or as to the salaries to be paid either to the chief probation officer or the assistant or other probation officers. In these counties the judges of the Common Pleas Court are empowered under this measure to appoint as many assistant probation officers as they conclude may be needed, and to fix such salaries for such positions as they may deem wise.

The bill is in the nature of mandatory legislation which I am opposed to in principle. In my judgment the responsibility for

the creation of officers and the fixing of compensation should be left with the body which is responsible for the people.

the Department of Agriculture and is intended to provide a procedure authorizing the searching of any premises where it is expected there is being violated any of the provisions of the act which that department is charged with enforcing. Jurisdiction is given to District Courts as well as to justices of the peace and police justices to issue search warrants authorizing the searching of any building except dwelling houses and the entering upon any public or private lands. I am not in sympathy with the principal of this bill for two reasons, first, the District Courts are courts constituted for the trial of civil causes and the procedure sought here is quasi criminal in its nature. Secondly, this measure is a typical illustration of the constant effort of those in power to invade the privacy of the individual.

Committee Substitute "A", to be known as No. 477-A for Assembly Bill No. 477, is returned unapproved.

This bill is what is known in legislation as a "ripper" bill. It ends the terms of office of the present members of the New Jersey Interstate Bridge and Tunnel Commission and substitutes therefor a new personnel. The real purpose of the bill is to take from the Governor power of appointing to this commission. Its ostensible purpose is to get rid of Mr. T. A. Adams, chairman of the commission, because of certain alleged activities of his which are said to be objectionable.

I have examined into such charges and am satisfied that they are without foundation in fact.

Were the bill based upon any ground other than partisan reasons, it seems to me the bill would have provided for the reappointment of all the Democratic members of the commission except Mr. Adams, and against whom no charge or intimation of any kind was made.

The fact is, however, with the exception of one person, the remaining Democratic members of the Board have been dismissed without any reason being given at all. No provision is made in the bill for filling of vacancies or for the appointment of suc-

cessors to those named in the bill. I regard the measure as an invasion of the executive power of appointment, and therefore bad in principle.

Assembly Bill No. 480 I return without approval. This is one of the bills to which reference is made in the disapproval of the Assembly Bill No. 478. I regard this bill as particularly vicious. No property rights or privilege of any kind seems to be safe against assault by those who feel that in the enforcement of the Eighteenth Amendment lies the panacea for all ills. The bill declares that any building or place where the law is habitually violated shall be held to be a nuisance and jurisdiction is conferred upon the criminal courts of this State to abate such nuisances by directing that the building or place where the nuisance was maintained be closed and disused for a period of time not exceeding one year. There are many laws which may be habitually violated in buildings, but which have no relation either to the enforcement of the Eighteenth Amendment or to any moral dereliction. To punish the owners of property for the habitual violation, "and two instances. I think, might be held to be habitual," of such laws, seems to me is clearly an invasion of the constitutional protection against cruel and unusual punishment. To illustrate, it is the law of this State that in tenement houses lights shall be kept burning at certain locations between certain hours. Is it conceivable that one who violated such law, habitually if you will, should be punished by having this property closed for a year? The fact that the Legislature of New Jersey would enact such a law makes one contemplate what the end is going to be.

Assembly Bill No. 481 is returned without approval, and is another of the series of bills referred to in the disapproval of Assembly Bill No. 478. It confers a right of action to any person who shall be injured in person, property, means of support or otherwise by any intoxicated person. The action runs against the one who unlawfully sold or unlawfully assisted in the procuring of intoxicating liquor and who thereby contributed to the

intoxication. The right of action is made to survive against the estate of the person who sold or assisted in the procuring of the liquor. The measure also marks another substantial departure from the policy of the law of this State in respect of the amount of damages to be awarded in death cases. Our theory is to award only such damages as will represent the monetary loss occasioned by reason of the death and under this measure exemplary or punitive damages may be awarded as well.

This is about the last word it seems to me that can be said on the subject of prohibition enforcement. This bill, when read by one who has regard for the conservativeness and sanity of the jurisprudence and laws of New Jersey must produce a feeling best described as *naseau*.

Mr. Parry moved that Assembly Bill No. 275 be passed by the Senate, the objections by the Governor thereto notwithstanding.

Mr. Simpson raised a point of order and objected to the passage of the bill on the ground that a legislative day had not elapsed since its return to the Senate. The President decided that the point was not well taken.

The message was then read, as follows:

STATE OF NEW JERSEY,
EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT,

To the Assembly: March 15th, 1922.

Assembly Bill No. 275 is returned without approval. This supplements the Disorderly Persons act by providing that any pool room, billiard parlor, or any place or room where any malt or brewed liquors, or any other liquid or liquor that contains alcohol, is sold for beverage purposes, shall be so maintained that a clear view of the entire interior thereof may be had from the street, and shall be free from any screen or other device which may obstruct or interfere with such view.

It seems to me this bill is unwarranted interference with the freedom of the people. It would apply to all of the social clubs throughout the State which lawfully sell liquors containing less than one-half of one per cent. of alcohol, and also to such clubs which do not sell liquors, but which maintain pool rooms or billiard parlors. I take it that the measure is a part of the general program of those interested in seeing that the Eighteenth Amendment to the Federal Constitution is enforced.

It is quite in line with the policy of such organizations, which is that this particular law shall be enforced above all others and regardless of whatever rights of the people may be trampled upon.

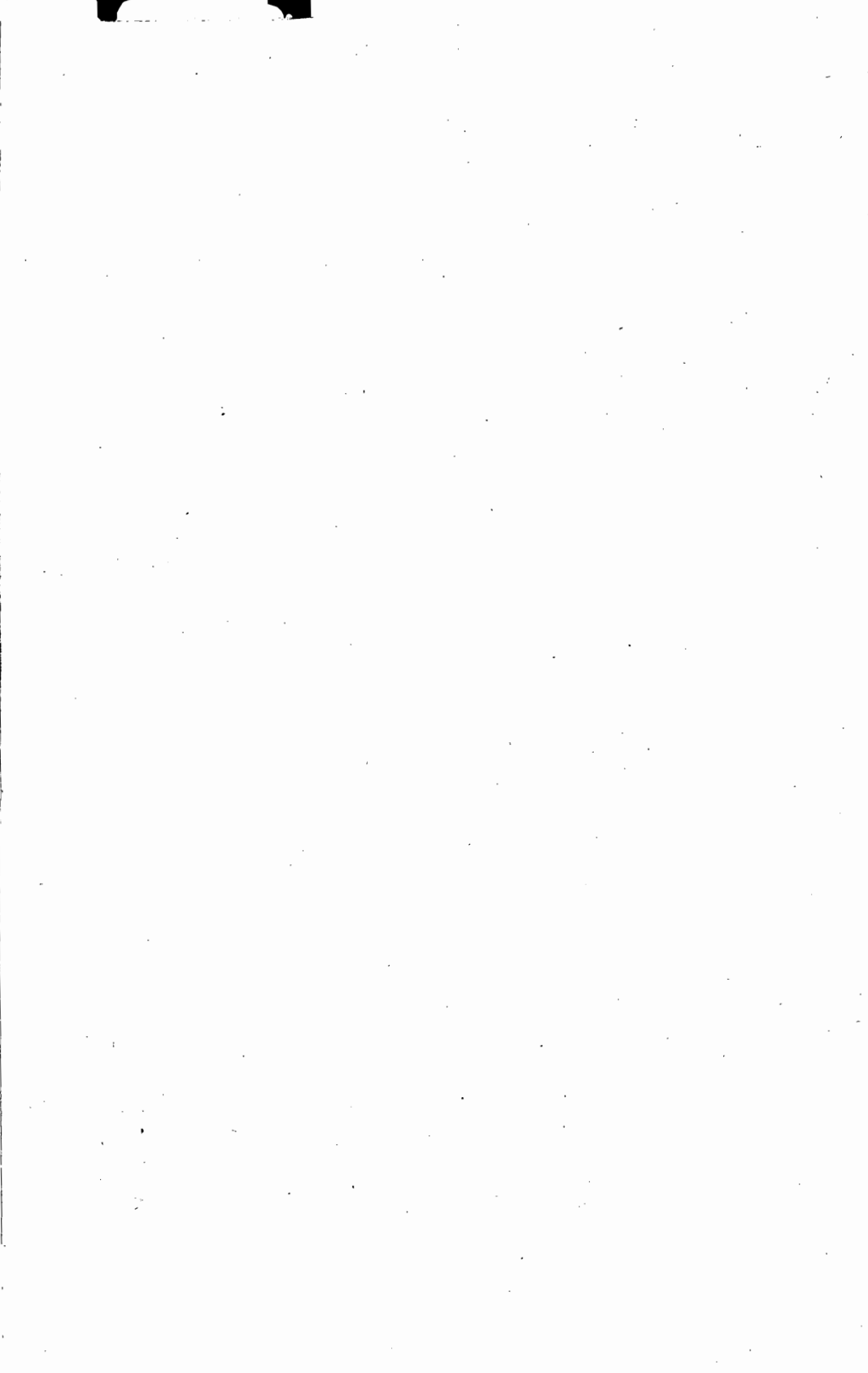

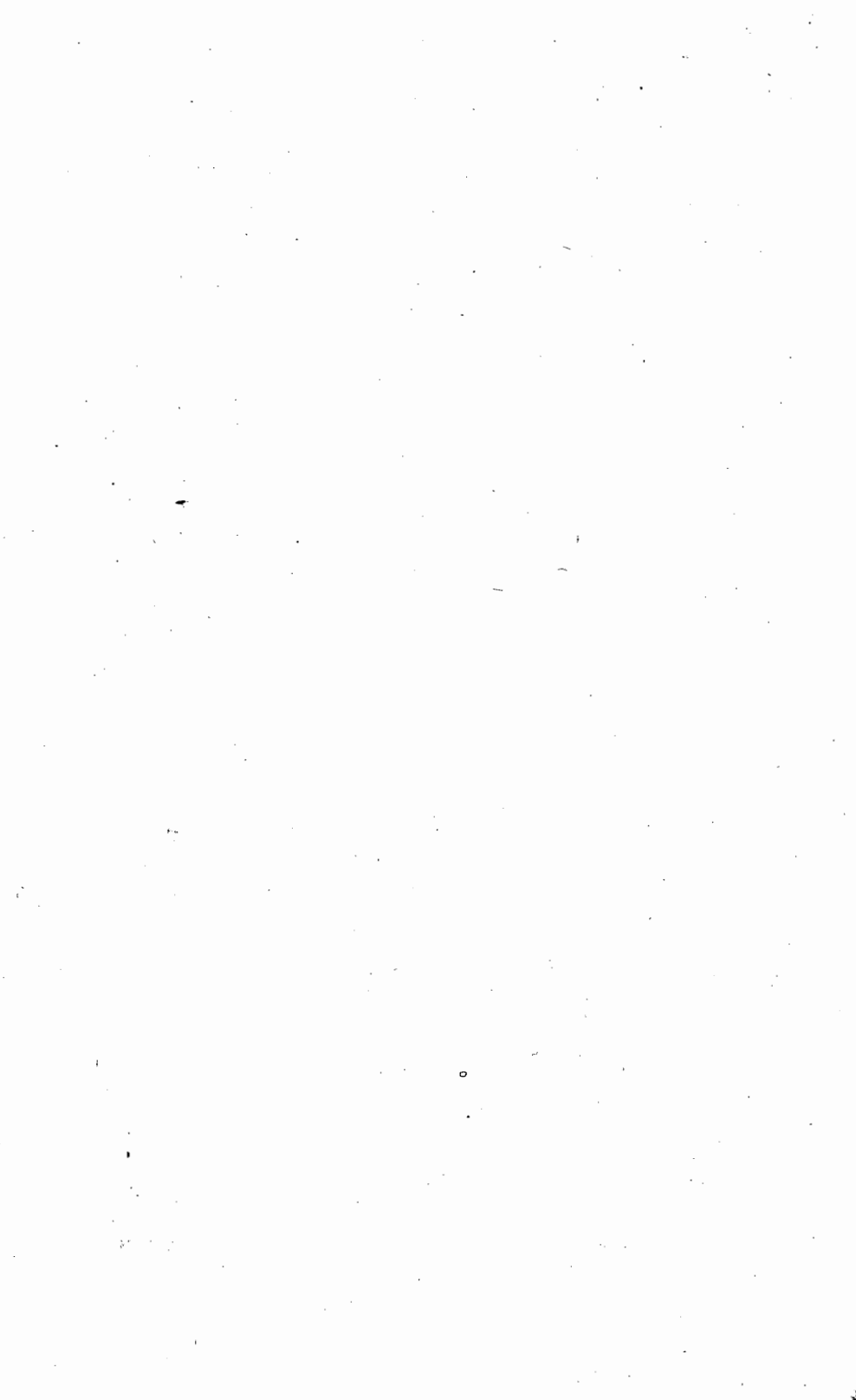

WHEREAS, Chapter 158, Pamphlet Laws of 1914, requires that a requisition officer be appointed, and the acts regulating receipts and disbursements require the designation of approving officers for the payment of the necessary expenses of all divisions of the government; be it *Resolved* (the House of Assembly concurring), That the Secretary of the Senate and the Clerk of the House of Assembly be designated as requisition officers for the Legislature, their compensation to be three hundred dollars each; and be it further *Resolved*, That all statements of expenses of the Legislature be referred to the Committee on Incidental Expenses of the Senate and House of Assembly respectively, and when approved by said committee said approval shall be indicated by the signature of the chairman of the Senate Committee on Incidental Expenses for expenses of the Senate, and by the chairman of the House Committee on Incidental Expenses for expenses of the House of Assembly, together with the signature of the Secretary of the Senate or the Clerk of the House of Assembly, respectively, and said bills, when approved, shall be forwarded to the Comptroller of the Treasury for payment—6, 249.

That no bills or joint resolutions (excepting the usual appropriation bills and bills submitted by special investigating committees) be offered in either House of the Legislature after the legislative week commencing Monday, February 6th, 1922, unless by the unanimous consent of the members of the body wherein such bills or joint resolutions are proposed for introduction—8, 248.

That the Congress of the United States be respectfully requested to change the Volstead Law so as to permit the sale of beers and light wines, or that Congress leave to the Sovereign States the right in law to define intoxicating liquors and by State law to permit the sale of beers and light wines. Concurrent Resolution—Congratulating the President of the United States upon his achievement in the promotion of world peace by the calling of the conference for the limitation of armaments. WHEREAS, The President of the United States has invited the chief nations of the earth to a conference on the limitation of armaments; and WHEREAS, The said limitation of armaments is the most important problem now confronting the nations of the earth; and WHEREAS, The action of the President of the United States in assembling said conference entitles him to world-wide gratitude; therefore *Be it resolved by the House of Assembly* (the Senate concurring), That we, the members of the One Hundred and Forty-sixth Legislature of New Jersey, do extend to the Honorable Warren G. Harding, President of the United States, our best wishes and cordial support in his noble and patriotic effort to achieve peace on earth and good will among the nations thereof; and *Be it further resolved*, That a copy of this resolution be sent to the President of the United States, to the Secretary of State and to our Representatives and Members of Congress—262.

That the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey meet in joint session on Tuesday, the thirty-first day of January, instant, at twelve o'clock noon for the purpose of electing a State Treasurer of the State of New Jersey, and for the further purpose of electing a State Director of Railroads and for the further purpose of electing Commissioners of Deeds for the State of New Jersey—267, 269.

That in view of the recent decision of the Court of Errors and Appeals, declaring unconstitutional the Prohibition Enforcement law (known as the Van Ness Act); the introduction of bills relating to prohibition enforcement and the liquor laws of the State be permitted up to and including the 13th day of February, 1922—318, 328.

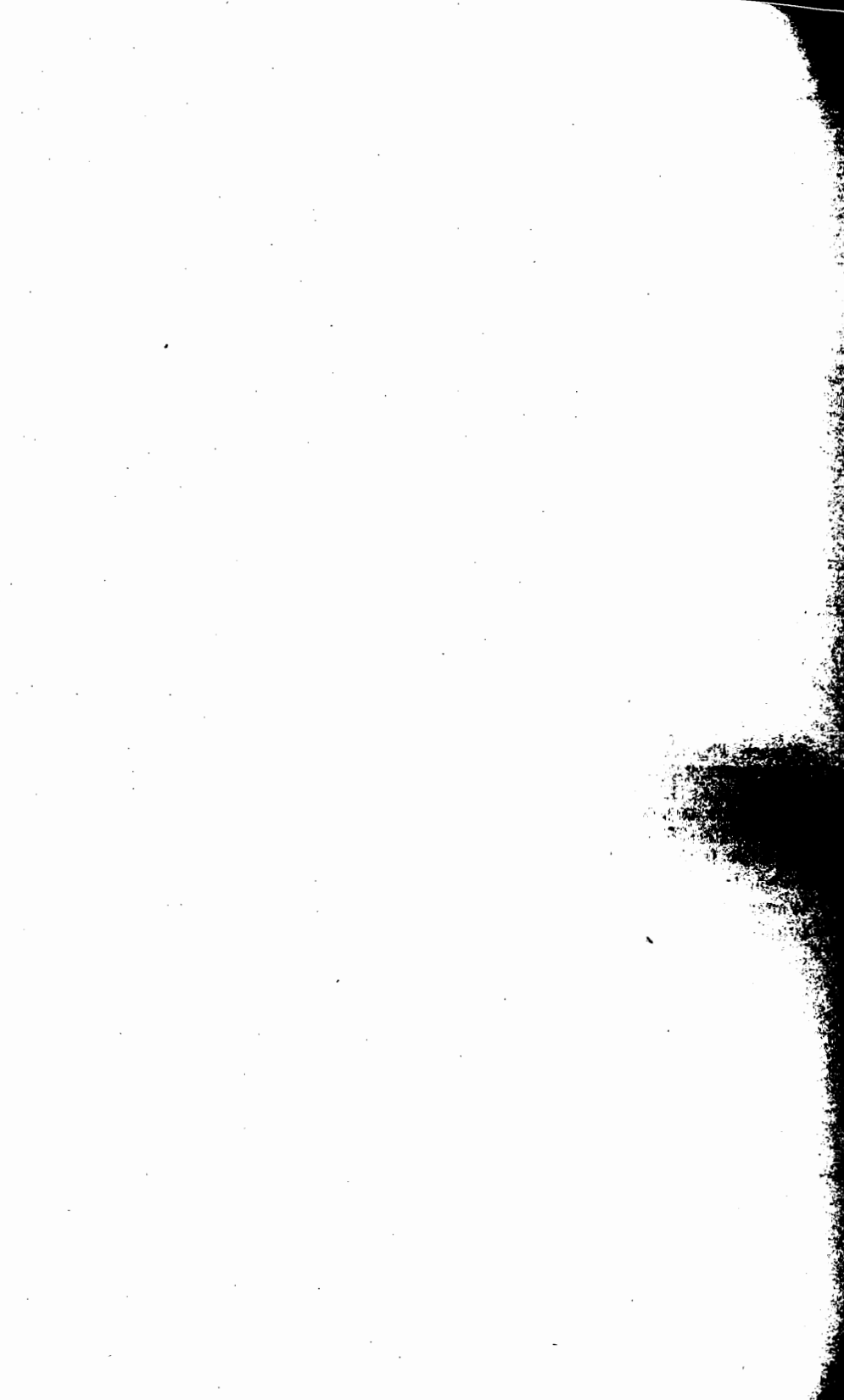

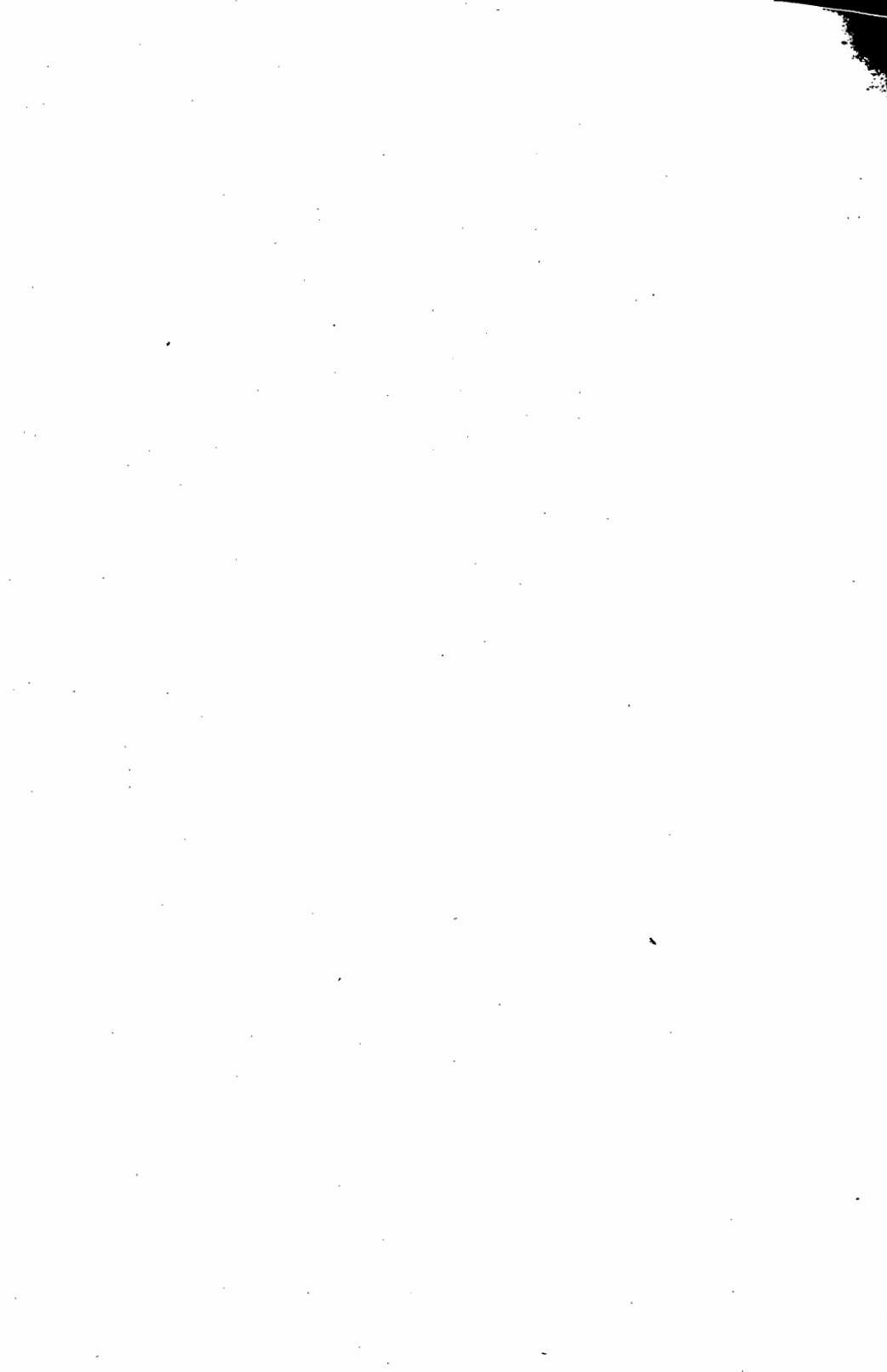

Disposition of Bills, Joint and Concurrent Resolutions Introduced During the One Hundred and Forty-sixth Session of the New Jersey Legislature.

Convened Tuesday, January 10th, 1922; Adjourned, Friday, March 17th, 1922. Duration, ten weeks.

The official record shows a total of 756 bills, 11 joint and 7 concurrent resolutions introduced, of which 256 bills, 4 joint resolutions and 1 concurrent resolution originated in the Senate, and 500 bills, 7 joint and 6 concurrent resolutions in the House of Assembly. Two of the Assembly bills developed an abnormal growth in committee, and were reported in duplicate, designated A and B, and covering different but kindred subjects. In that form they passed both houses, were vetoed, passed again, and the two original bills make four laws of the session of 1922.

Only 286 bills and 6 joint resolutions of the total introduced passed both houses and reached the Governor, 58 of the total arriving during the first eight weeks of the session and 234 on the last day of the ninth week, when a recess was taken until the following week. Of the total the Governor approved 251, vetoed 34, and filed 1 without approval, which the House had intended to recall. This bill is repealed by a subsequent act filed a few days later.

Of the 34 bills vetoed by the Governor, 27 were repassed, making the total volume of laws 279. In addition, the Governor approved 4 of the joint resolutions received and vetoed 2 others, which were passed over the veto, making the total joint resolutions 6.

Eight of the bills vetoed originated in the Senate, where 1 veto was sustained, and 26 in the House, where 6 were sustained. Of the bills which eventually became law, 103 originated in the Senate and 156 in the House. The only concurrent resolution which reached final passage originated in the Senate. The concurrent resolution of 1921 proposing a constitutional amendment making the terms of sheriffs five years was not readopted, and no amendments will be proposed for at least two years.

A.

Accident reports—amends the law concerning compulsory liability insurance. The employer who fails to make out a report of any accident shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$1,000—A. B. 328—683, 685.

Accountants—permits the employment of certified accountants in the examination of a trust company by a committee of the directors—A. B. 255—511, 513, 537, 566, 630.

Accounting, architecture, &c.—makes it possible for any soldier who was engaged in the study of accounting, architecture, law and nursing, and had been a soldier in the war with Germany, to be entitled to exemption from examination—A. B. 125—417, 422, 530, 531, 577.

Administration letters by surrogate of county where non-resident of State is killed by accident—S. B. 34—255, 324, 325, 338, 341, 384, 508.

Admission fee to boxing bouts—amends the "Boxing Law." Provides that referees and other officers shall be residents of the State of New Jersey for at least three years; provides that the price of seats shall be published in a newspaper at least two days prior to holding a match; also provides that no greater sum than \$15 shall be charged for admission—A. B. 3—541, 544, 568, 583, 691.
