SYNOPSIS: UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING PROGRAM

THE NEW JERSEY UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING SYSTEM

DEFINITION

The New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting System is based upon the compilation, classification, and analysis of crime data reported by all New Jersey police agencies in accordance with the regulations prescribed by law.

DEVELOPMENT

The New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting Law (N.J.S.A. 52:17 B-5.1 et. seq.) was enacted on May 16, 1966, and became effective January 1, 1967. Responsibility for the establishment, direction, control, and supervision of the Uniform Crime Reporting System was assigned to the State's Attorney General. The Attorney General authorized the New Jersey State Police to collect and collate the crime data received from law enforcement agencies within the state.

At the request of the Attorney General, the New Jersey State Police researched crime systems in operation throughout the nation in order to establish a firm foundation from which to grow. The most logical approach was the paralleling of the federal crime reporting system. There was a distinct need for a compatibility feature that would enhance both the state and federal systems through the data entry at both levels.

This compatibility has, as its nucleus, the standard classification of offenses established by the Federal Bureau of Investigation. Regardless of the label placed on a particular offense in the various states' systems, *i.e.*, felony, misdemeanor, disorderly persons, if the incident meets the federal standard it will be reported as an offense.

The terms "crime" and "offense" are used interchangeably in this publication, and refer to an act committed in violation of a law which is reportable under the guidelines of the Uniform Crime Reporting Program.

The New Jersey State Chiefs of Police Association has served the program in an advisory capacity since 1966. The contributions of this association have proved valuable to the success of the program. This association works in close harmony with the State Police as a means of improving the quality of reporting through recommended program standards, policies and procedures.

COLLECTION OF CRIME DATA

As required by statute, all law enforcement agencies in the state submit monthly and annual summary crime reports to the program. During the year 1999, offense and arrest data were received from 481 full-time municipal police departments, three (3) part-time municipal police departments, and the New Jersey State Police (acting as the reporting agent for the 73 municipalities without local police services). In addition to the 481 full-time municipal police departments there are nine (9) police departments contracted by other municipalities.

In addition to the above agencies, arrest data was received from the state's twenty-one (21) prosecutors, sheriffs' departments, three (3) county police departments, and three (3) county park police departments. In order to incorporate all New Jersey law enforcement agencies under the system, the ten (10) other state agencies with law enforcement responsibilities, excluding state police, as well as thirteen (13) college campus police departments were incorporated within the program. Collectively, a total of 556 law enforcement agencies submit the reports to the New Jersey State Police.

METHOD

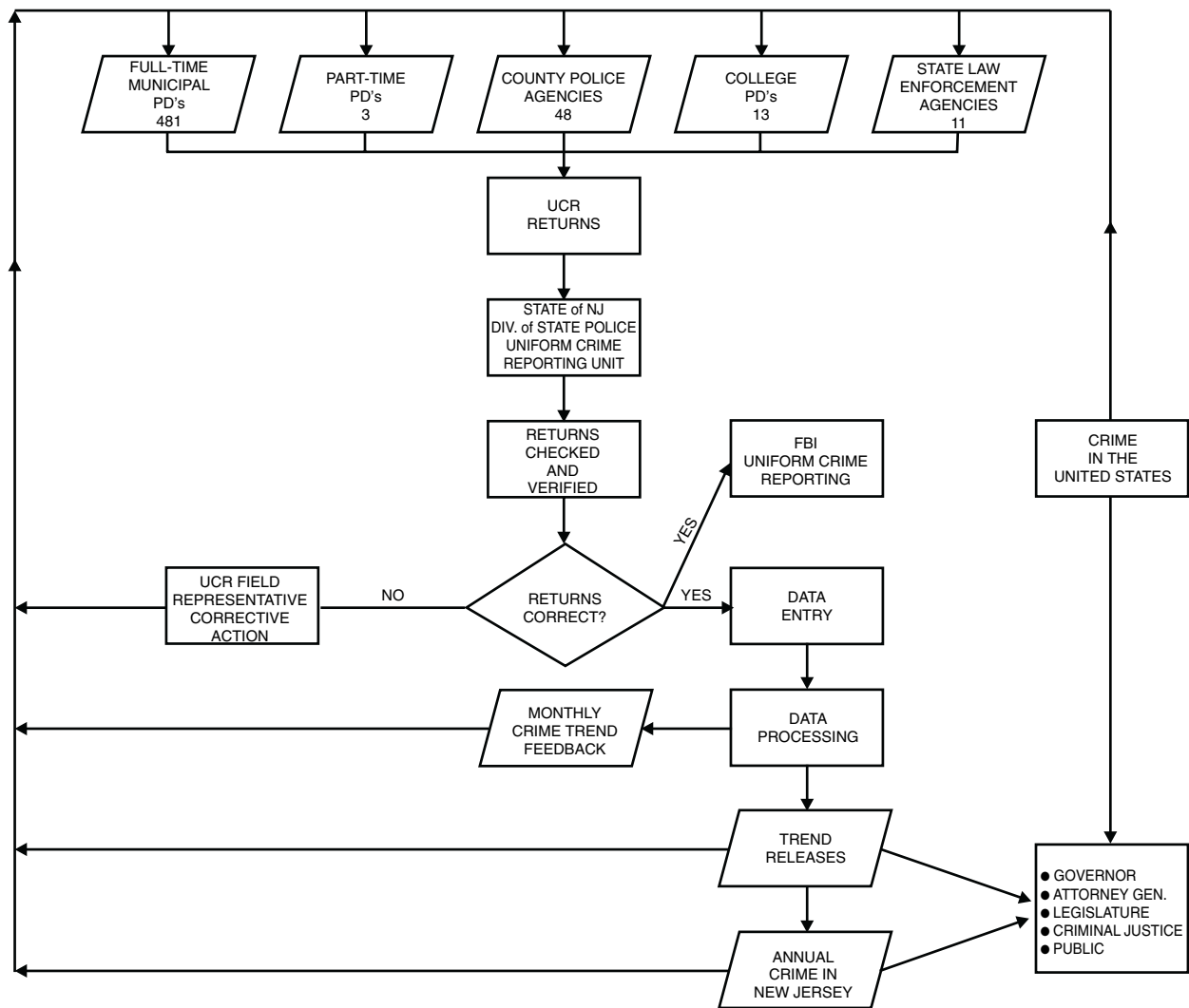
A State of New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting Guide has been distributed to all contributors. It outlines reporting procedures in detail, and is complete to the extent of providing examples and illustrations. Field representatives provide additional instruction and clarification when required.

All reported offenses are related to the municipality in which they occur rather than to the agency which may conduct the investigation. The clearance is credited to the municipality in which the offense occurred. Each contributing agency is responsible for compiling its own reports. Law enforcement agencies report the number of known offenses according to the following categories: Homicide (Murder and Manslaughter), Rape, Robbery, Burglary, Larceny-Theft, Motor Vehicle Theft, and Arson. The "Crime in New Jersey," and the Federal Bureau of Investigation's "Crime in the United States" publications exclude

manslaughters, simple assaults, and arsons from the “Index” offenses. These are further referred to as “violent” and “nonviolent” crimes as graphically illustrated in Section VII under “Municipal and County Offenses and Demographic Data,” and Section II, “State Summary and Offense Analysis.”

All reported offenses are compiled from a record of all criminal complaints received by police from victims or other sources, or discovered by the police during routine operations. Complaints determined to be unfounded are eliminated from this count. Analytical data pertaining to specific crime categories are also reported, i.e. total adult and juvenile arrests made during the month. Police killed or assaulted and arson data are also collected monthly. Police personnel information is submitted on an annual basis.

VERIFICATION PROCESSES

The uniformity and accuracy of data gathered from contributors must be safeguarded through various ways. Although guidelines and instructions are provided to each contributor, they are not the panaceas for the accuracy being sought.

The reports received by the Uniform Crime Reporting Unit are recorded and examined for mathematical accuracy and reasonableness of the interpretation of the offense classifications. Improper classifications, changes in reporting procedures, or actual change are identified in this manner. Errors of a minor nature are corrected by direct telephone contact with the contributors, while all other errors are resolved through a personal visit by a field representative to the reporting agency.

Further verification is accomplished through the analysis of statistical data accrued from the reports submitted. Fluctuations in crime rates noted from previous submissions are verified by the field representatives through their municipal counterpart.

FUNCTION

Police executives make use of this data in administrative, planning, and operational determinations for their respective jurisdictions. The State Police Uniform Crime Reporting Unit provides assistance to municipal police agencies through the individual analysis of statistics as they relate to specific crime problems within their jurisdiction. Police executives also use this data for identifying manpower and equipment needs. The Uniform Crime Reporting Program requirements not only have increased police efficiency in reporting and record keeping areas, but have helped police in their day to day operations.

Although the data collected on the offenses of manslaughter and simple assault are not presented in the annual report, they are required for the federal system. However, this data is processed and available for special research purposes.

PROFILE OF NEW JERSEY

New Jersey is situated between the major industrial markets of New York and Philadelphia and can be classified as the "Crossroads of the East." The geographic location of the state has been a major factor in its growth and development. The many miles of super-expressway facilities within the state connect New Jersey directly with the neighboring states of New York, Pennsylvania, and Delaware. Additionally, New Jersey as a corridor state, accommodates large volumes of traffic from both the eastern and western part of the United States.

The state is geographically composed of 21 counties which contain 566 incorporated municipalities. Nationally, New Jersey, although 46th in size, ranks ninth in population and first as the most densely populated state in the country. In addition to this density of 1,082.6 persons per square mile, New Jersey still has many miles of rural areas and sparsely settled communities. The areas of density show a heavy concentration around the major urban centers and those areas most accessible for commuting.

STATE, COUNTY AND MUNICIPAL PROFILES

The presentation of state, county and municipal profiles in this section is offered for the purpose of projecting, for the consideration of the reader, a group of recognizable factors which may affect the amount and type of crime that occurs from community to community. Selection of the areas of information to be related to individual municipalities was based on the immediacy and completeness of data available.

Population statistics presented here, and throughout this publication, were obtained from the Department of Labor, Division of Labor Market and Demographic Research. The 1998 estimated population count was used in this publication.

Character of municipalities by urban, suburban and rural classifications, and square miles, were initially compiled by the Department of Community Affairs, Division of State and Regional Planning, Bureau of Statewide Planning, and will continue to be used for comparative purposes. Following is a list of categories used and a description of each category.

- URBAN CENTER Densely populated with extensive development.
- URBAN SUBURBAN Near an urban center but not as extremely developed and more residential areas.
- SUBURBAN Predominantly single family residential, within a short distance of an urban area.
- RURAL Scattered small communities and isolated single family dwellings.
- RURAL CENTER High density core area with surrounding rural municipalities.

Certain other socioeconomic factors present in varying degrees in all communities may have an influence on resulting crime rates. Obvious difficulties in the identification, documentation and measurement of these factors, however, precluded their application in this report.

Those factors presented were listed to affirm their existence within the county and community and to provide a base for consideration in the evaluation of that community's crime experience.

RESORT MUNICIPALITY CRIME RATES

On July 10, 1998, section 4 of P.L. 1966, c37(C.52:17B-5.4) was amended to require the Uniform Crime Report to include, in addition to the regular statistics, an alternative calculation that takes into account the seasonal population of resort municipalities.

The Department of Labor has been mandated to determine which municipalities qualify as resort municipalities and certify their annual mean population (which includes seasonal population estimates.)

CRIME FACTORS

In order to provide a meaningful statistical profile of crime within the State of New Jersey, each law enforcement agency must provide the Uniform Crime Reporting Unit with data that depicts specific crimes that are occurring within their jurisdiction. There is a need for compatibility with the National Uniform Crime Reporting System and, therefore, categories of offense classifications used within the state are identical with those of the National System. This results in equitable conclusions being drawn from the data submitted.

Reported Part 1 offenses and arrests are recorded in the municipality where they occurred, regardless of the outside investigative agency which may investigate, arrest, or otherwise dispose of the case.

The factors which influence crime rates are dependent upon characteristics of the community. When attempting to interpret the crime statistics presented herein, one should be aware of the social structure and factors that lead to or cause criminal behavior.

Crime rates in this publication are based on the stable population of the municipality. Fluctuating seasonal population figures are too inaccurate to be used as a measurement for determining crime rates. Municipalities with high seasonal populations may indicate a higher crime per one thousand than may be normal for a municipality their size. This would also be indicated in municipalities that experience high population increases due to special events or commuters. Set forth below are some factors which, by type and volume, will affect the crime rate that occurs from place to place:

- Density and size of the community population and the metropolitan areas of which it is a part.
- Composition of the population with reference particularly to age, sex and race.
- Economic status, including job availability, and mores of the population.
- Relative stability of population, including commuter, seasonal, and other transient types.
- Climate, including seasonal weather conditions.
- Cultural conditions, such as educational, recreational, and religious characteristics.
- Effective strength of law enforcement agencies.
- Administrative and investigative emphases of law enforcement.
- Policies of other components of the criminal justice system (*i.e.*, prosecutorial, judicial, correctional, and probational.)
- Crime reporting practices of the general citizenry.
- Attitudes of the public toward crime reporting.
- The administrative and investigative efficiency of the local law enforcement agency, including the degree of adherence to crime reporting standards.
- Cooperation of adjoining and overlapping police agencies.

THE POLICE POINT OF VIEW

The New Jersey State Police Uniform Crime Reporting Unit surveyed various police agencies of the state, attempting to ascertain their opinion concerning factors contributing to the increase or decrease of specific crimes in their municipality. One of the goals of the Uniform Crime Reporting Unit is to assist police in reducing crime by first identifying its extent, type and location. The following viewpoints are offered with the expectation of reaching this goal.

ROBBERY

Decreases:

- More stringent sentencing requirements under the State Criminal Code.
- Advanced technology in communications has led to increased exchanges of information between police departments.
- Highly visible foot patrols being deployed in commercial areas and densely populated residential areas.
- Use of Anti-crime Unit in high robbery areas.

Increases:

- Resort areas have shown an increasing seasonal population.
- Our highly mobile society provides easy access to areas which were previously difficult to reach.

BURGLARY

Decreases:

- Better deployment of police personnel, such as highly visible foot patrols in high density crime areas, and increased patrols during probable time and at probable locations of burglaries.
- More stringent sentencing requirements under the State's Criminal Code have been a deterrent.
- Crime Prevention Programs are being stressed in many communities and citizens have been taking a more active part by reporting suspicious persons or circumstances.

Increases:

- Extreme increases in population in certain areas have led to new housing in suburban and rural areas.
- Husband and wife are both working; leaving homes frequently unoccupied for long periods of time.

LARCENY

Decreases:

- Public awareness programs contribute to the decrease in thefts from parked vehicles.
- Improved or additional lighting deters criminal acts from occurring in parking areas.
- "Safe Streets" Programs and Anti-crime Units have been established in many communities.

Increases:

- Shoplifting is a theft that police have little or no control over. Store security forces are under the control of the store administration, and their policies vary from strict enforcement, arrest and prosecution, to only a warning. Policy change has been directed toward prosecuting the offenders rather than warning them, causing to some extent an increase in the number of shoplifting offenses reported to the police.
- Certain types of property such as tape decks, radar detectors and radios are popular and present resale opportunities.
- Youth gang activity on the increase resulting in thefts from motor vehicles.

MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT**Decreases:**

- Stronger sentencing of career criminals has been effective.
- Modern ignition systems and anti-theft devices act as a deterrent.
- Better lighting in parking lots has helped decrease motor vehicle thefts.

Increases:

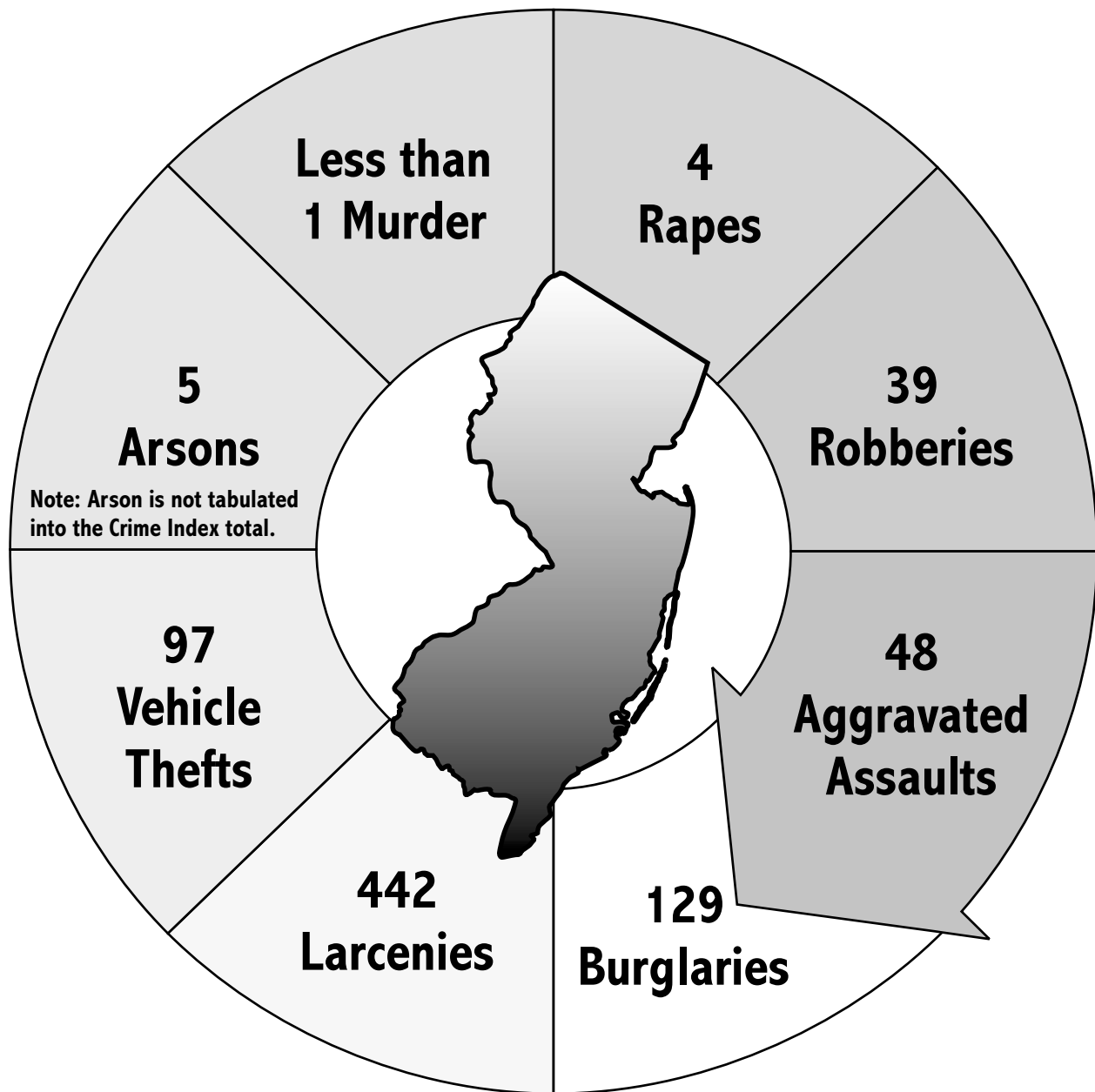
- The tremendous replacement cost of auto parts has contributed significantly to the increase in motor vehicle thefts for the purpose of auto parts resale.



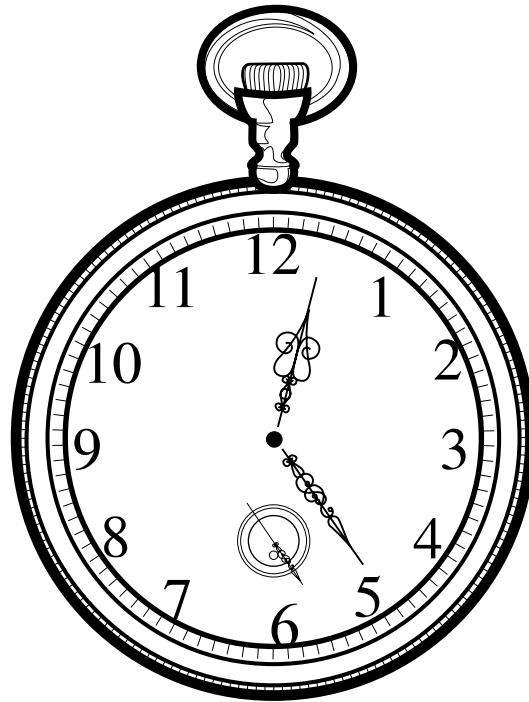

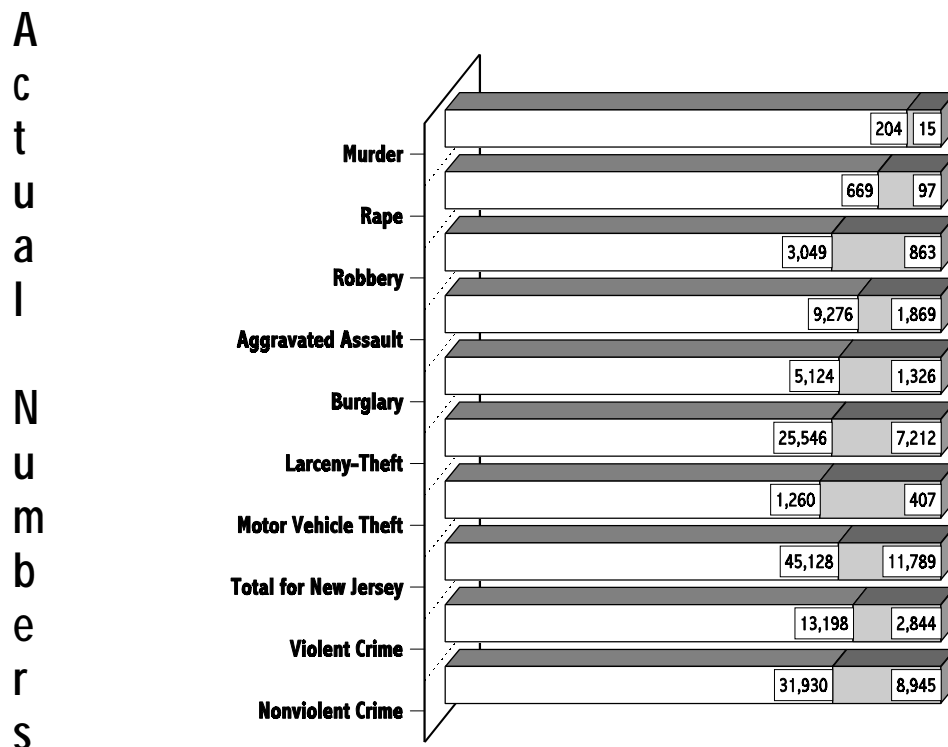
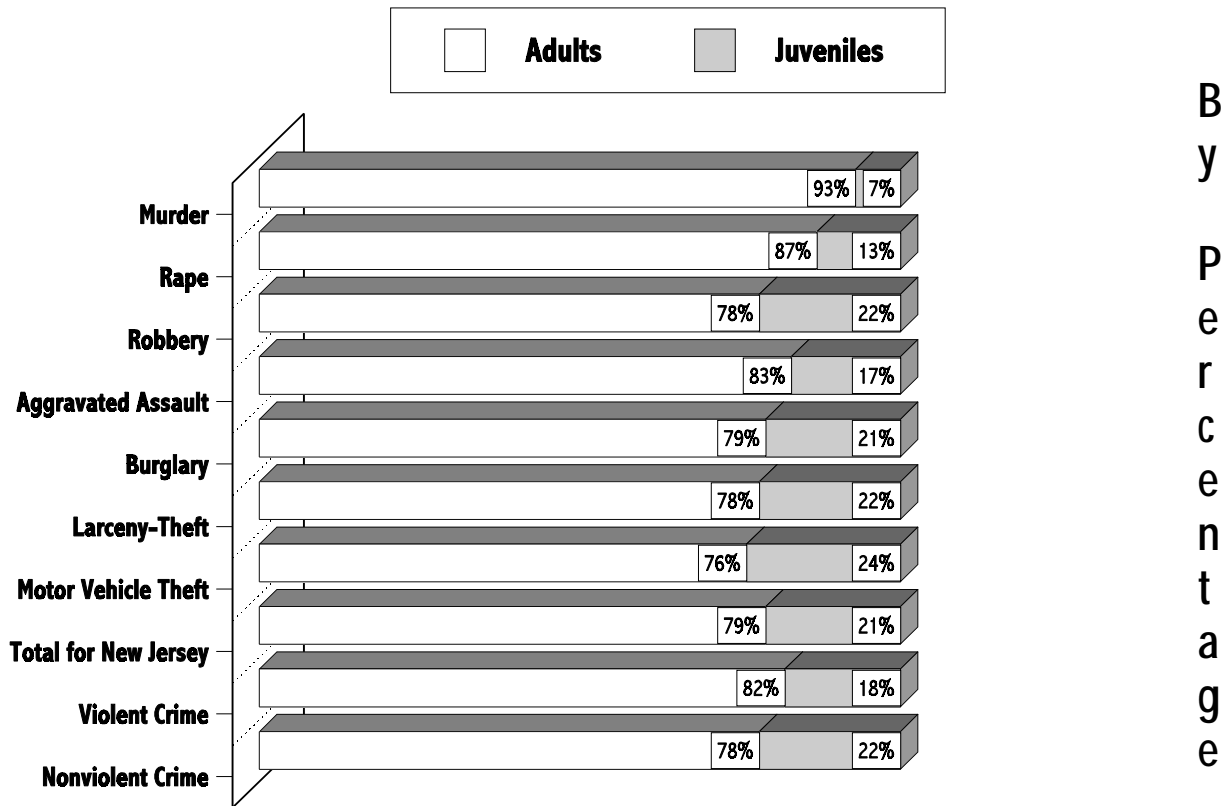

STATEWIDE CRIME SUMMARY - 1999

CRIME INDEX – VOLUME/RATE

- There were 277,472 Index offenses in 1999, a 6 percent decrease compared to 1998.
- The crime rate of the state is 34.2 victims for every 1,000 permanent inhabitants, a decrease of 8 percent compared to 1998.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- August with 27,058 offenses reported, recorded the highest incidence of Crime Index offenses while February was the lowest with 20,135 offenses.
- The total value of property stolen amounted to \$464.9 million in 1999, a 6 percent decrease from 1998.
- Value of property recovered was \$175.6 million, resulting in a recovery rate of 38 percent.
- Stolen motor vehicles accounted for 61 percent of stolen property and 91 percent of the recovered property value.

CRIME INDEX ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- A total of 57,215 persons were arrested for Index offenses, which represents a 10 percent decrease compared to 1998.
- Adult Index arrests decreased 9 percent and juvenile arrests decreased 13 percent.
- Crime Index arrests accounted for 14 percent of the total arrests in 1999.
- Males accounted for 73 percent of the Crime Index arrests and females accounted for 27 percent.
- Fifty-six percent of the Index arrests were white, 43 percent were black and 2 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 16 percent of the arrests for Index offenses.
- Police cleared 21 percent of the Index offenses and juveniles accounted for 21 percent of these clearances.

VIOLENT CRIME SUMMARY

This category consists of the following Index offenses: Murder, Rape, Robbery, Aggravated Assault.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 33,579 violent crimes reported in 1999, a 6 percent decrease compared to the violent crimes reported in 1998.
- Violent crimes accounted for 12 percent of the total Crime Index.
- The violent crime rate decreased 9 percent to 4.1 victims for every 1,000 permanent inhabitants.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- The highest number of violent crimes were reported in July with 3,269 offenses while the lowest number was reported in February with 2,432 offenses.
- The value of property stolen as a result of violent crime was \$11.8 million.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Arrests for violent crime offenses decreased 9 percent to 16,385.
- Violent crime arrests accounted for 29 percent of the Index arrests and 4 percent of the total arrests during the year.
- Adult arrests for violent crime decreased 8 percent and juvenile arrests showed a 13 percent decrease.
- Adults accounted for 78 percent of the violent crime arrests while the remaining 22 percent were juveniles.
- Males were responsible for 82 percent and females for 18 percent of the violent crime arrests.
- Forty-six percent of those arrested were white, 52 percent were black and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 17 percent of the arrests.
- Forty-eight percent of all violent crimes were cleared and juveniles accounted for 18 percent of these clearances.

NONVIOLENT CRIME SUMMARY

This category consists of the following Index offenses: Burglary, Larceny-Theft, Motor Vehicle Theft.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 243,893 nonviolent crimes reported in 1999, a 7 percent decrease compared to the 260,916 reported in 1998.
- Nonviolent crime accounted for 88 percent of the total Crime Index.
- The nonviolent crime rate decreased 8 percent to 30.1 victims per 1,000 inhabitants in 1999.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- The largest number of nonviolent crimes were reported in August with 23,832, while the lowest number was reported in February with 17,703.
- The total value of property stolen as a result of nonviolent crime amounted to \$453.1 million.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- There were 40,830 nonviolent crime arrests, this represents a decrease of 10 percent when compared to 1998.
- Nonviolent crime arrests accounted for 71 percent of the Index arrests and 10 percent of the total arrests during 1999.
- Juveniles were responsible for 29 percent of the nonviolent crime arrests and adults 71 percent.
- Adult nonviolent crime arrests decreased 9 percent while juvenile arrests decreased 13 percent.
- Males represented 69 percent and females 31 percent of persons arrested for nonviolent crime.
- Fifty-nine percent of all persons arrested for nonviolent crimes were white, 39 percent were black and 2 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 16 percent of the arrests.
- Seventeen percent of all nonviolent crimes reported were cleared in 1999, and juveniles accounted for 22 percent of these clearances.

TOTAL ARREST SUMMARY

- There were 407,534 persons arrested in 1999, which represents a 7 percent decrease compared to 1998.
- The arrest rate for 1999 decreased 9 percent to 50.2 persons arrested per every 1,000 inhabitants.
- Adult arrests decreased 7 percent to 335,967 and juvenile arrests decreased 7 percent to 71,567 in 1999.
- Adults accounted for 82 percent and juveniles 18 percent of the total state arrests.
- Persons under 21 years of age accounted for 32 percent of all arrests.
- Males accounted for 80 percent and females 20 percent of the total persons arrested during the year.
- Fifty-nine percent of the total persons arrested in 1999 were white, 40 percent were black and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 14 percent of the arrests.

POLICE OFFICERS KILLED AND ASSAULTED SUMMARY

- There were 2 police officers feloniously killed in the line of duty during 1999.
- New Jersey reported 3,191 police officers assaulted in the line of duty in 1999.

- The Crime Index in New Jersey decreased 6 percent, while the United States decreased 7 percent and the Northeast Region decreased 7 percent.

- Nonviolent crime in New Jersey decreased 7 percent, while the Northeast Region decreased 7 percent and the United States decreased 7 percent.

MURDER

DEFINITION

Murder is defined as the unlawful killing of a human being with malice aforethought. Any death due to a fight, argument, quarrel, assault, or commission of a crime is included. This Index offense is counted by police on the basis of their investigation without regard to findings of a court, jury or the decision of a prosecutor. Attempts to kill, are scored as aggravated assaults and not as murder. Suicides, accidental deaths, negligent manslaughters, and justifiable homicides are not counted, nor reflected in the murder classification.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 287 murders reported to law enforcement agencies of the state in 1999, an 11 percent decrease compared to the 321 murders reported in 1998.
- Murders accounted for one-tenth of one percent of the reported Index offenses, and 1 percent of the violent crime.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

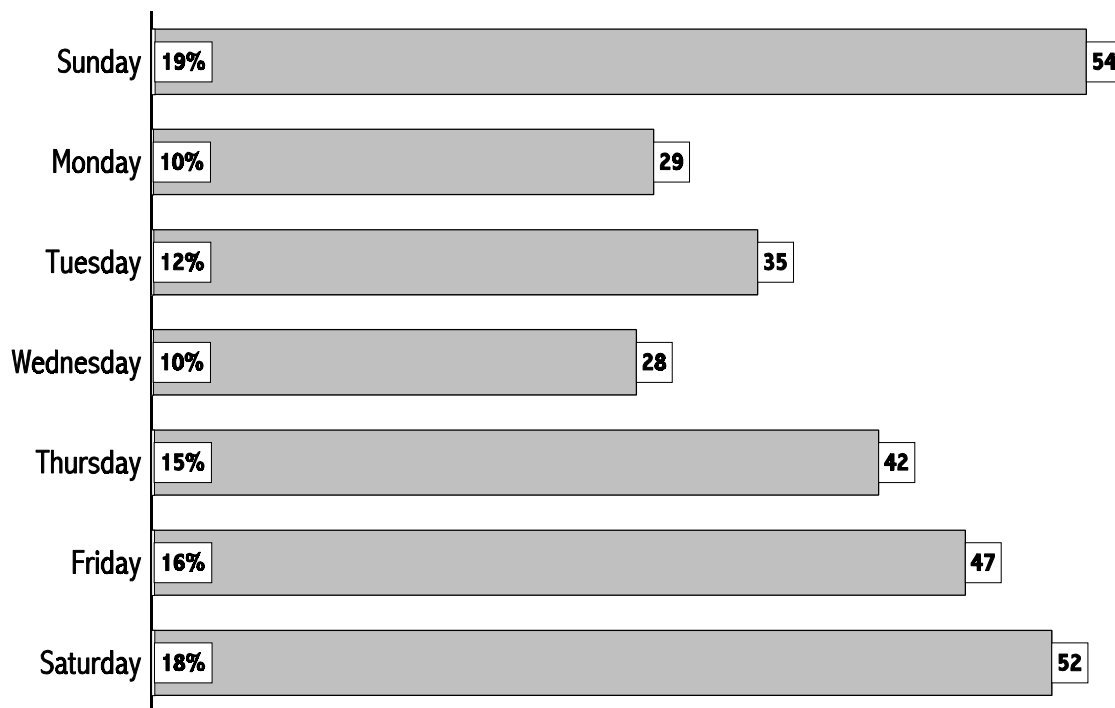
- The age group of 20-24 accounted for 15 percent of all murder victims.
- Firearms were used in 53 percent of the murders, knives or cutting instruments in 18 percent, blunt objects in 9 percent and physical force in 11 percent.
- Thirty-four percent of the offenders were friends or acquaintances of the victim, while 15 percent were relatives, and 14 percent were strangers.
- Felony murders accounted for 12 percent of all murder circumstances. Robbery was the motive in 80 percent of the 35 felony murders.
- Fifty-four murders were recorded on Sunday for the high, while Wednesday was the lowest, with 28.
- August recorded the highest number of murders, with 29, while November recorded the lowest with 19.
- Forty-three percent of the murders occurred on highways or streets, 24 percent in multi-family or apartment dwellings, and 17 percent in single family dwellings.
- The total value of property stolen because of murder amounted to \$34,006.
- Drug-related arguments accounted for 8 percent (22) of all murder circumstances.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- A total of 247 persons were arrested for murder in 1999, an 8 percent decrease compared to 1998.
- Adult murder arrests decreased 5 percent (from 241 to 229) and juvenile arrests decreased 33 percent (from 27 to 18).
- Sixty-eight percent of persons arrested for murder were black, 32 percent were white.
- Hispanics accounted for 13 percent of the arrests.
- Seventy-six percent of the murders were cleared in 1999 (219 out of 287). Juveniles accounted for 7 percent of those cases cleared.
- Males accounted for 89 percent and females 11 percent of those arrested for murder.
- Murder was at its lowest (287) in thirty-two years, since 1967, when 274 murders were reported in the state.

MURDER BY DAY OF WEEK



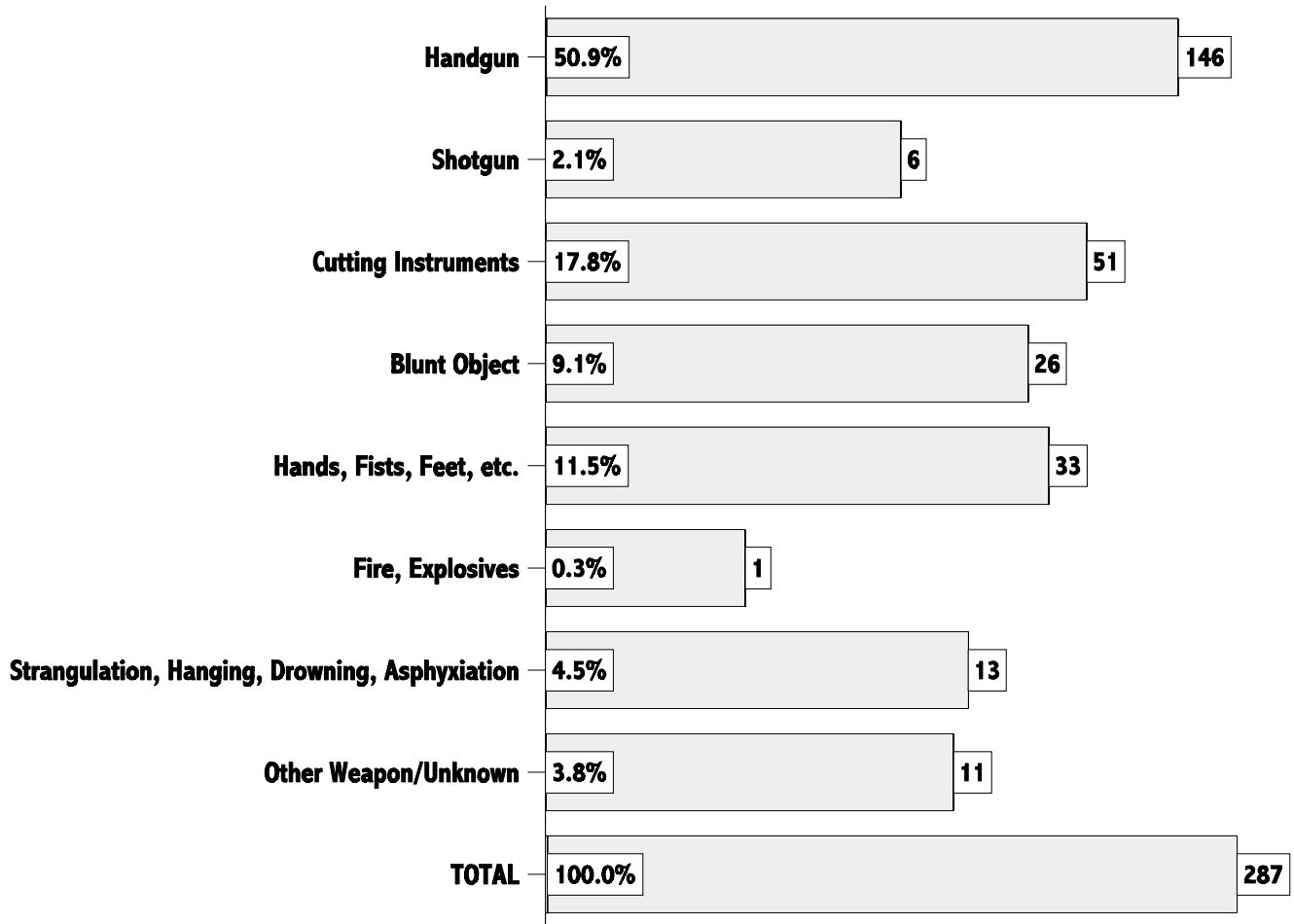

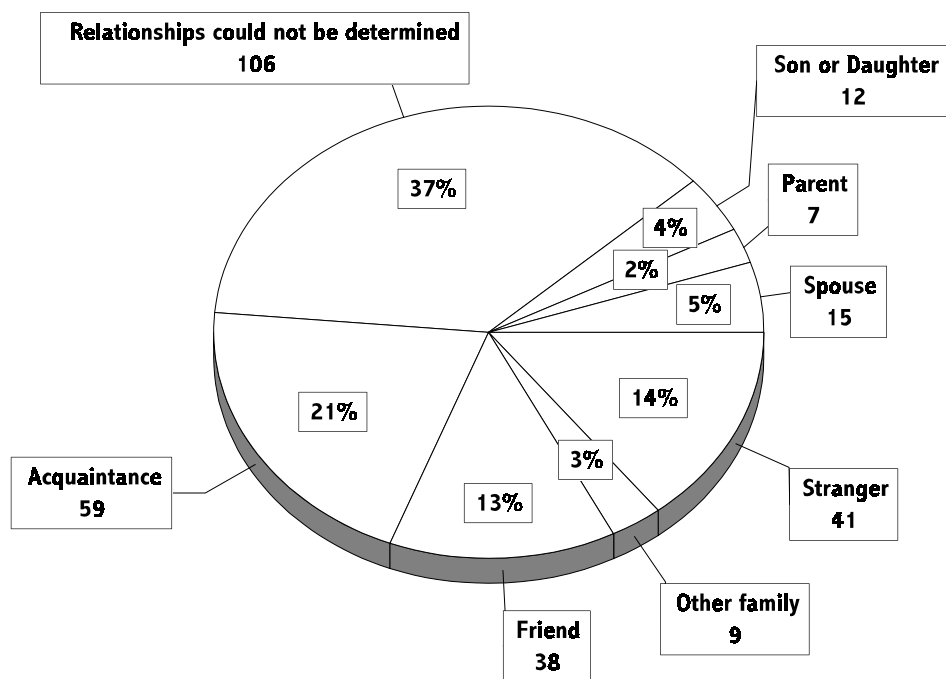

MURDER — DISTRIBUTION BY TYPE OF WEAPON



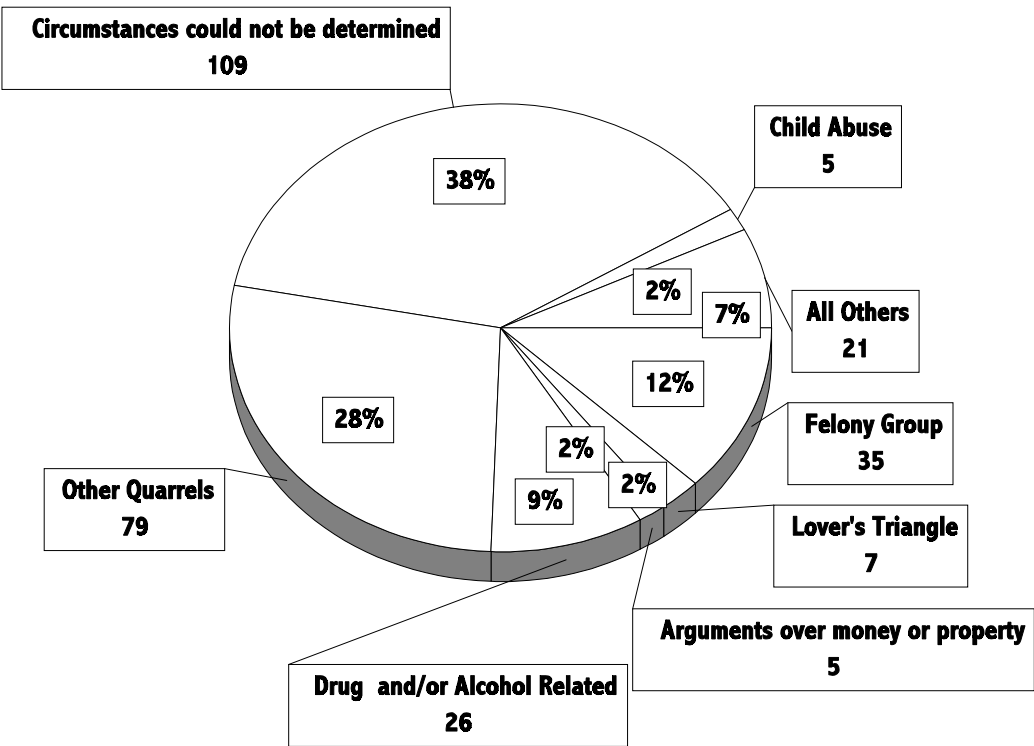
RELATIONSHIP OF MURDER VICTIMS TO OFFENDER



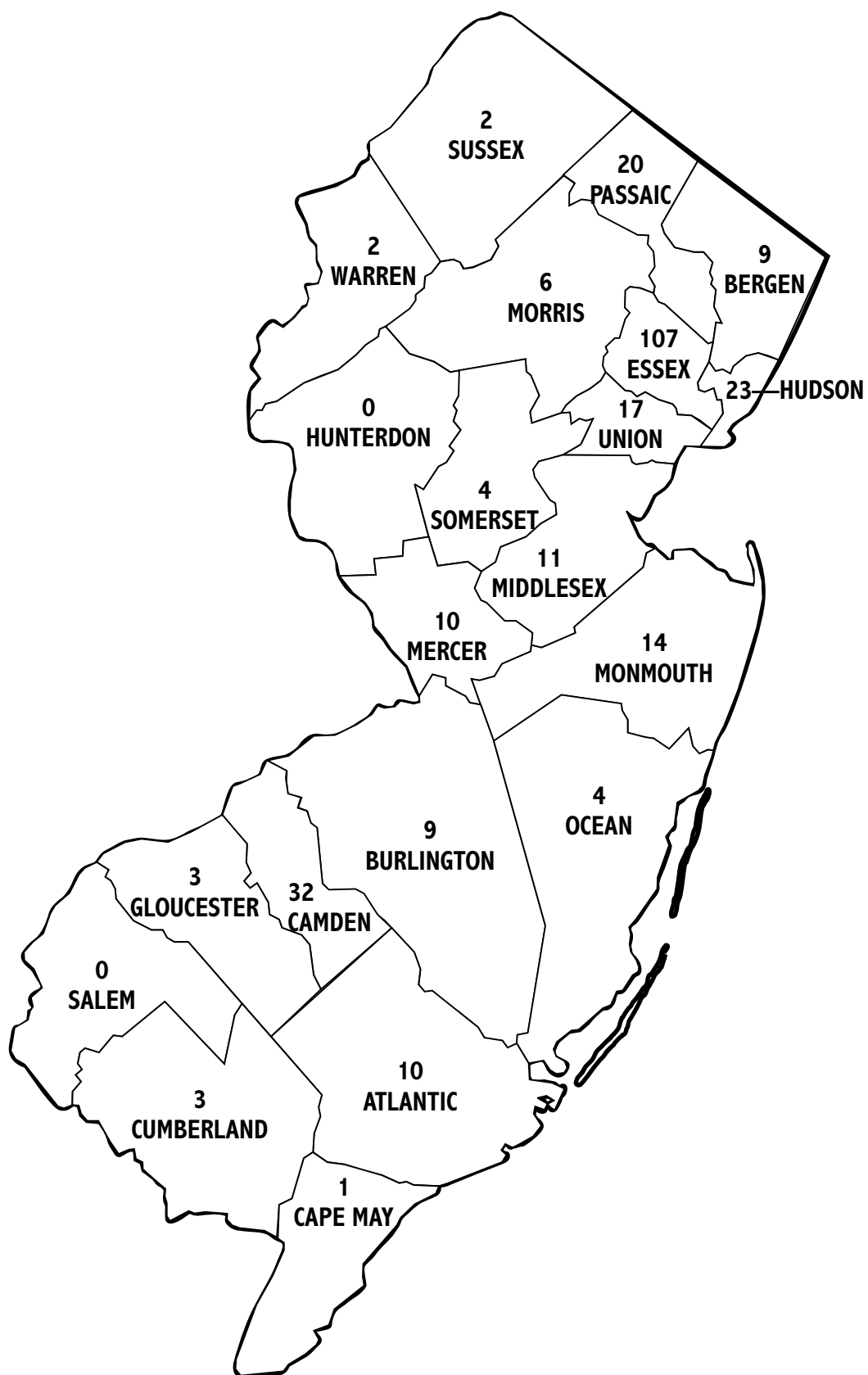

RAPE

Definition

Rape is defined as the carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. All assaults and attempts to rape are counted, but carnal abuse, rape without force (statutory rape) and other sex offenses are not included.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 1,412 reported rapes in 1999, a decrease of 13 percent compared to the 1,623 in 1998.
- Rape accounted for one-half of one percent of the total Crime Index and 4 percent of all violent crimes.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Eighty-eight percent of the rapes were forcible, the remaining 12 percent were attempts to rape.
- The total value of property stolen as a result of rape amounted to \$16,043.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- A total of 663 persons were arrested during 1999, a 14 percent decrease compared to 1998.
- Adult rape arrests decreased 15 percent, while juvenile arrests decreased 8 percent.
- Fifty-four percent of the arrested perpetrators were white, 45 percent were black and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 17 percent of the arrests.
- Thirty-eight percent of all persons arrested for rape were between 25 and 39.
- Fifty-four percent of all rape cases were solved during 1999. Juveniles accounted for 13 percent of those cases cleared.

ROBBERY

Definition

Robbery is defined as the felonious and forcible taking of the property of another, against his will, by violence or by putting him in fear. The element of personal confrontation is always present in this crime. Under the program, all assaults or attempts to rob are included.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 14,251 robbery offenses in 1999, a 6 percent decrease compared to 1998.
- Robbery accounted for 5 percent of the total Crime Index and 42 percent of all violent crime.
- The robbery rate was 1.8 victims per 1,000 population.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Highway robberies accounted for 64 percent of all reported robberies.
- Bank robberies decreased 35 percent and gas, service station robberies increased 11 percent.
- Total value of property stolen during robberies amounted to \$11,783,953.

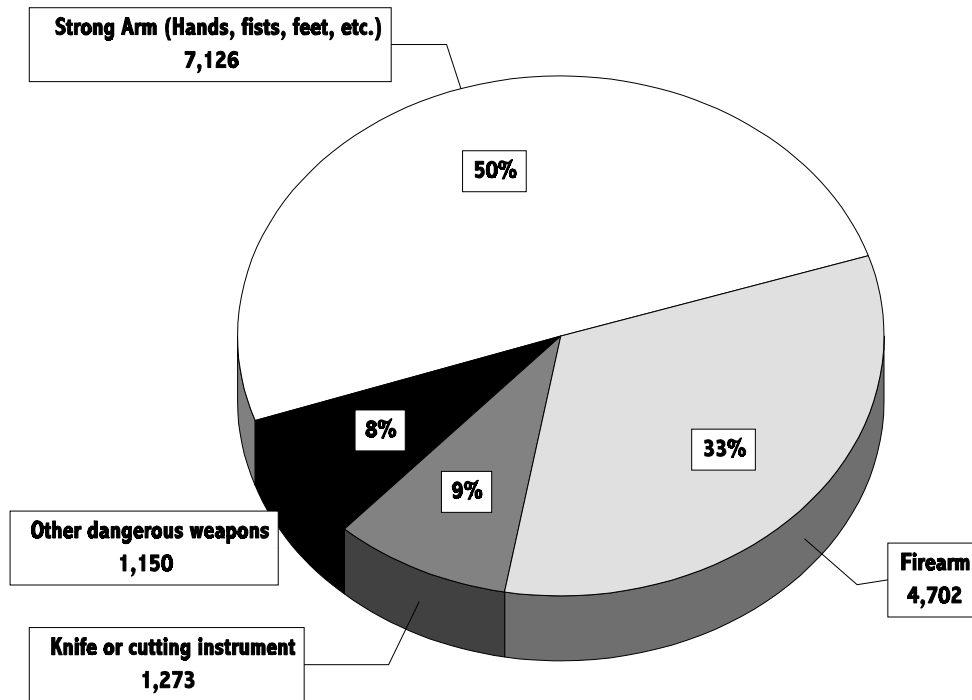

CARJACKING

- Carjacking is a form of robbery; therefore, further analysis is provided in this section for 1999.
- There were 391 carjacking offenses reported to the police; 11 were determined to be unfounded, leaving a total of 380 carjackings, involving 437 victims, including passengers.
- Carjackings decreased 9% when comparing 1999 to 1998.
- Sixty-three of the 566 municipalities in New Jersey reported carjackings.
- Firearms were involved in 50% (189) of all carjackings. One percent (5) of the firearms used were assault firearms. Shootings were involved in 2 percent (8) of all carjackings.
- New Jersey registered vehicles represented 90% (343) of all carjackings. Ford, with 14% (53), was the most frequently carjacked vehicle make, while 1995, with 11% (41), was the most frequently targeted vehicle year.
- Fifty-nine percent (224) of all carjacked vehicles were recovered. The average value of a carjacked motor vehicle was \$8,842.
- Carjackings occurred in a residential area 45% (172) of the time. The hours of darkness (6:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m.) accounted for 69% (264) of all carjackings.
- Twenty-one percent (80) of all carjackings were witnessed.
- The most frequent victim age group was 20-24, which accounted for 21% (90) of the victim total (437). Seventy-one percent (312) of all victims were male. Fifty-one percent (223) of all victims were white.
- The total number of offenders was 651. Insufficient analysis information was supplied on 20% (128) of the offenders. Of all known offenders (523), 20-24 was the most frequent offender age group and accounted for 38% (197). Ninety-four percent (494) of all known offenders were male. Eighty-one percent (422) of all known offenders were black.
- Juveniles accounted for 15% (8) of the total arrests for carjacking (54), while adults accounted for 85% (46).
- September had the highest number of offenses with (41) accounting for 11% of all reported carjacking offenses.
- Sunday recorded the highest number of offenses, accounting for 17% (65) of all reported carjackings.
- Region I, which consists of Essex, Hudson, and Union counties, accounted for 73% (277) of all reported carjackings.
- No murders were reported in 1999 as the result of carjacking.
- Eleven percent (42) of all carjackings (380) were cleared by arrest.

AGGRAVATED ASSAULT

Definition

Aggravated assault, as defined under the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting system, is an attempt or offer, with unlawful force or violence, to do serious physical injury to another. Attempts are included since it is not necessary that an injury result when a firearm, knife, or other weapon is used which could result in serious personal injury if the crime was successfully completed.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 17,629 reported aggravated assaults in 1999, a decrease of 6 percent when compared to 1998.
- Aggravated assault accounted for 6 percent of the total Crime Index and 53 percent of all violent crimes.
- The rate for aggravated assault decreased to 2.2 victims per 1,000 population.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Physical force (i.e. hands, fists, and feet) was used in 31 percent, and other dangerous weapons (i.e. clubs, bricks, tire irons, etc.) were used in 33 percent of all reported aggravated assaults.
- Firearms were used in 13 percent of all aggravated assaults committed.

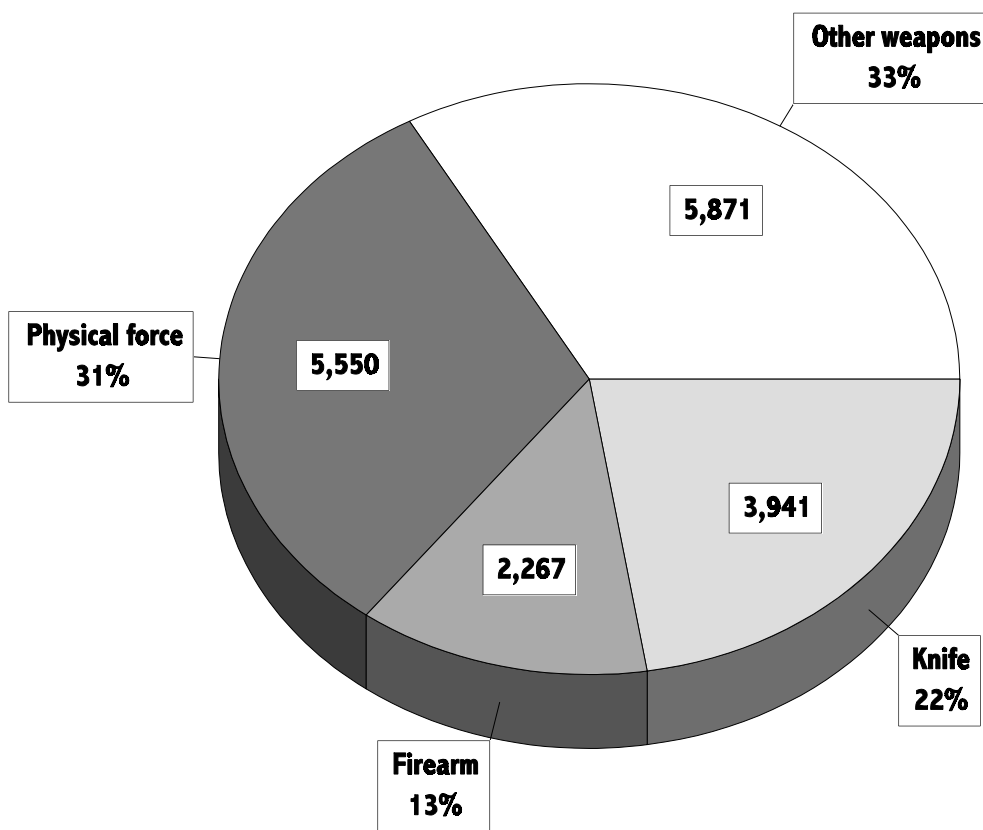

BURGLARY

Definition

Under this program, burglary is defined as an unlawful entry or attempted entry of any structure to commit a felony or larceny. Data collection for this offense is further categorized as forcible entry, unlawful entry (where no force is used) and attempted forcible entry.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 47,135 reported burglary offenses in 1999, a decrease of 13 percent.
- Burglary accounted for 17 percent of the total Crime Index and 19 percent of all nonviolent crimes.
- The burglary rate per 1,000 population decreased 15 percent to 5.8 in 1999.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Sixty-six percent of all burglaries involved forcible entry, 23 percent were unlawful entry where no force was used and the remaining 11 percent were attempts to forcibly enter, during 1999.
- Residences were targets in 69 percent of the reported burglaries.
- Fifty-four percent of the nonresidential burglaries are known to have occurred between the hours of 6:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m.
- Stolen property as a result of burglary statewide, amounted to \$59.9 million, for an average loss of \$1,270.
- The average loss as a result of both residential burglaries and nonresidential burglaries was \$1,270 respectively.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Burglary arrests decreased 18 percent with 6,812 persons arrested.
- Adult arrests decreased 17 percent while juvenile arrests decreased 21 percent.
- Males accounted for 91 percent, and females 9 percent of the burglary arrests.
- Juveniles accounted for 30 percent of all burglary arrests.
- Sixty-three percent of burglary arrests were white, 37 percent were black and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 17 percent of the arrests.

LARCENY-THEFT

Definition

The definition of larceny-theft, as provided under this program, is the taking of the property of another with intent to deprive him of ownership. All larcenies and thefts resulting from pocketpicking, purse-snatching, shoplifting, larcenies from motor vehicles, thefts of motor vehicle parts and accessories, bicycle thefts, etc., are included here. Embezzlement, unlawful conversions, larceny by bailee, frauds or bad checks are not included.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 161,363 larcenies reported in 1999, a decrease of 6 percent compared to the 171,267 in 1998.
- Larceny accounted for 58 percent of the total Crime Index and 66 percent of all nonviolent crimes.
- The rate for larceny per 1,000 population decreased to 19.9 in 1999.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Thefts of motor vehicle parts and accessories and thefts from motor vehicles, collectively accounted for 29 percent of all larceny-thefts reported.
- Thefts of auto parts and accessories decreased 15 percent in 1999 compared to 1998.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Larceny-theft arrests decreased 8 percent in 1999, with 32,593 persons arrested.
- Juvenile arrests decreased 10 percent and adult arrests decreased 8 percent in 1999.
- Males accounted for 64 percent, and females 36 percent of the larceny arrests.
- Fifty-nine percent of all persons arrested for larceny were white, 39 percent were black and 2 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 15 percent of the arrests.

MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT

Definition

In Uniform Crime Reporting, motor vehicle theft includes all thefts and attempted thefts of a motor vehicle. This includes the theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle which is defined as a self-propelled vehicle that runs on the surface and not on the rails. This definition excludes taking a motor vehicle for temporary use, such as family situation, or unauthorized use by others having lawful access to the vehicle. The motor vehicle theft category includes the subheadings of autos, trucks and buses, and other vehicles (motorcycles, mopeds, etc.)

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 35,395 motor vehicle thefts reported in 1999, an increase of 1 percent compared to the 35,158 in 1998.
- Motor vehicle theft accounted for 13 percent of the total Crime Index and 15 percent of all nonviolent crimes.
- The motor vehicle theft rate of 4.4 victims per 1,000 population represents no change when compared to 1998.

- Total value of stolen motor vehicles amounted to \$283.3 million during the year.
- The average value of a stolen motor vehicle was \$8,004.
- Recovered vehicle values totaling \$159.9 million represent 91 percent of the total value of recovered property.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- A total of 1,425 persons were arrested for motor vehicle theft, this represents an 11 percent decrease compared to 1998.
- Juvenile arrests decreased 20 percent and adult arrests decreased 5 percent.
- Males accounted for 89 percent, and females 11 percent of the motor vehicle theft arrests.
- Fifty-six percent of all persons arrested for motor vehicle theft were white, 43 percent were black and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 15 percent of the arrests.
- Five percent of motor vehicle thefts were cleared in 1999, juveniles accounted for 24 percent of these clearances.

Motor Vehicle Theft Scenario

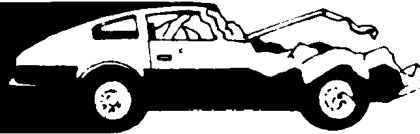

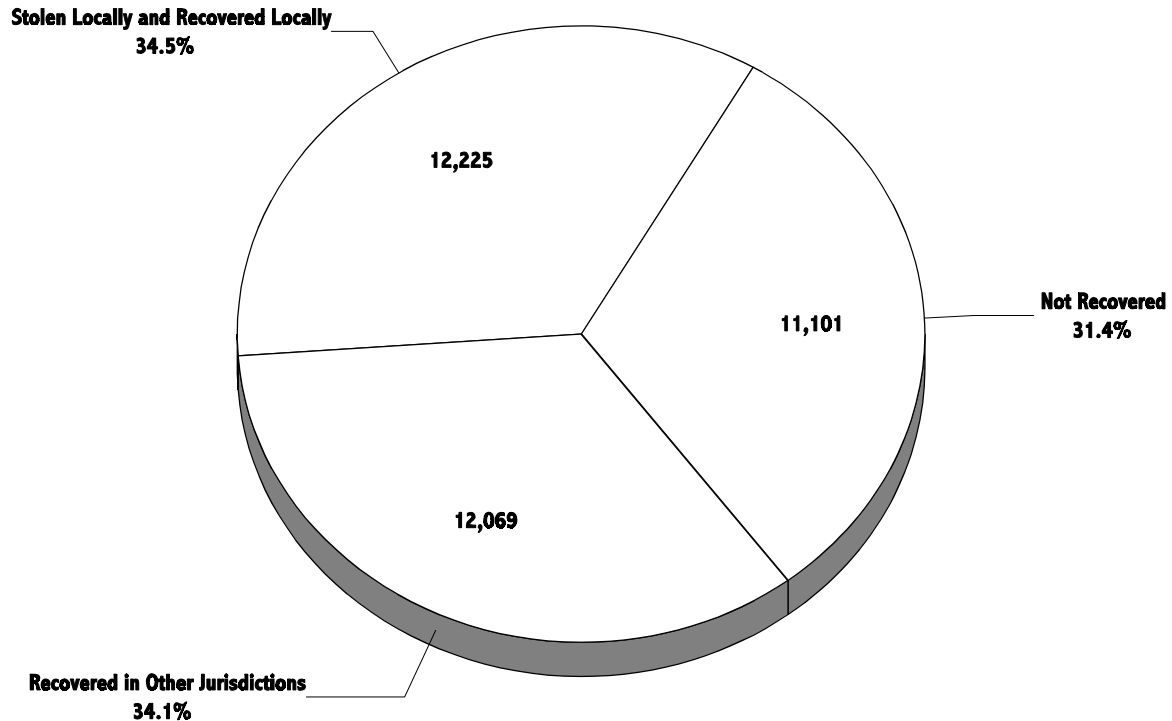

ARSON

Definition

Arson is defined by the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting program as any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling, house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc.

Only fires determined through investigation to have been willfully or maliciously set are classified as arsons. Fires of suspicious or unknown origins are excluded.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 1,890 reportable arsons in 1999, which represents a decrease of 17 percent compared to 2,275 in 1998.
- The arson rate dropped to 0.2 victims per 1,000 population, a decrease of 33 percent compared to 1998.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Forty-six percent of the arsons were structures, with residences accounting for 28 percent.
- Mobile property, including motor vehicles, accounted for 37 percent of the arsons in the state.
- Other property (timber, crops, etc.) accounted for 18 percent of the reported arsons.
- The total value of property damage due to arson amounted to \$20.1 million for an average dollar value loss of \$10,655.
- The average residential loss was \$17,217 while the average loss to industrial/commercial structures was \$18,172.
- The average loss to mobile property was \$7,187.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Arson arrests numbered 579 in 1999, representing a 9 percent decrease.
- Adult arrests decreased 24 percent while juvenile arrests increased 2 percent.
- Males accounted for 87 percent, and females 13 percent of the arson arrests.
- Juveniles accounted for 63 percent of the arson arrests.
- Seventy-two percent of the persons arrested for arson were white, 26 percent were black and 2 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 11 percent of the arrests.
- The arson clearance rate was 25 percent, and juveniles accounted for 55 percent of these clearances.

ARREST SUMMARY FOR NON-INDEX OFFENSES

MANSLAUGHTER

Definition

The unlawful killing of a human being, by another, through gross negligence. Arrests relating to traffic fatalities are included.

- There were 28 arrests reported by law enforcement agencies for manslaughter during the year, a decrease of 26 percent when compared to 1998.
- Adults accounted for 82 percent and juveniles accounted for 18 percent of the arrests.
- Males accounted for 71 percent of the arrests and females 29 percent.
- Fifty-seven percent of the persons arrested were white, 36 percent were black, and 7 percent were other races.
- The hispanic ethnic origin accounted for 29 percent of the arrests and 71 percent were non-hispanic.

SIMPLE ASSAULT

Definition

Simple assault, as defined under the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting System, is an assault or an attempted assault where no weapon is used and which does not result in serious or aggravated injury to the victim.

- There were 35,406 simple assault arrests in 1999, representing a decrease of 6 percent when compared to 1998.
- Of the total, 19 percent were juveniles and 81 percent were adults.
- Males accounted for 75 percent and females 25 percent of the persons arrested for simple assault.
- Sixty-two percent of the persons arrested were white, 37 percent were black, and 2 percent were other races.
- Sixteen percent of the persons arrested were hispanic and 84 percent were not of hispanic origin.

ARSON

Definition

Under this program, arson is defined as the willful or malicious burning, or attempting to burn, with or without intent to defraud; a dwelling, house, building, ship or vessel, motor vehicle or aircraft, contents of building, personal property of another, etc..

- There were 579 arrests reported for arson offenses, a 9 percent decrease compared to 1998.
- Juveniles accounted for 63 percent and adults 37 percent of persons arrested for arson.
- Eighty-seven percent of the total arson arrests were males while 13 percent were females.
- Seventy-two percent of the persons arrested were white, 26 percent were black, and 2 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 11 percent of those arrested and non-hispanics accounted for 89 percent.

FORGERY AND COUNTERFEITING

Definition

The definition of forgery and counterfeiting is the making, altering, uttering or possessing or attempting to make, alter, utter or possess, with intent to defraud, anything false which is made to appear true.

- There were 1,874 arrests reported during the year for forgery or counterfeiting, a 12 percent decrease compared to 1998.
- Adults accounted for 96 percent and juveniles accounted for 4 percent of the arrests.
- Males accounted for 70 percent of the arrests and females 30 percent.
- Sixty-four percent of the persons arrested were white, 35 percent were black, and 2 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 26 percent of the arrests and 74 percent were non-hispanic.

FRAUD

Definition

In Uniform Crime Reporting, fraud is the fraudulent conversion and obtaining money or property by false pretenses. This includes bad checks, confidence games, etc., except forgeries and counterfeiting.

- There were 6,337 arrests reported during the year for fraud, a 7 percent decrease compared to 1998.
- Adult arrests represented 96 percent and juveniles 4 percent of the persons arrested.
- Males accounted for 64 percent and females 36 percent of the persons arrested for fraud.
- Fifty-nine percent of the persons arrested were white, 36 percent were black, and 4 percent were other races.
- Eleven percent of the persons arrested were hispanic and 89 percent were not of hispanic origin.

EMBEZZLEMENT

Definition

The definition of embezzlement is the misappropriation or misapplication of money or property entrusted to one's care, custody or control.

- There were 114 persons arrested for embezzlement, a 58 percent increase compared to 1998.
- Eighty-nine percent of those persons arrested were adults and 11 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 56 percent and females 44 percent of the persons arrested for embezzlement.
- Fifty-one percent of the persons arrested were black and 48 percent were white, and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 10 percent of those arrested and non-hispanics accounted for 90 percent.

STOLEN PROPERTY

(Buying, Receiving, Possessing)

Definition

Included in this class are all offenses of buying, receiving, and possessing stolen property, as well as all attempts to commit any of these offenses.

- In 1999, there were 7,585 arrests reported for stolen property, a decrease of 7 percent compared to 1998.
- Of the total, 71 percent were adults and 29 percent were juveniles.
- Eighty-five percent were males and 15 percent were females.
- Fifty-seven percent of the persons arrested were black, 42 percent were white, and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 19 percent of the arrests and 81 percent were non-hispanic.

CRIMINAL/MALICIOUS MISCHIEF

Definition

Criminal/Malicious mischief is defined as the willful destruction, injury, disfigurement, or defacement of property without consent of the owner or persons having custody or control.

- There were 8,767 arrests for criminal/malicious mischief, a decrease of 10 percent compared to 1998.
- Both juveniles and adults each accounted for 50 percent of the persons arrested for criminal/malicious mischief.
- Males accounted for 86 percent and females 14 percent of the arrests.
- Seventy-two percent of the persons arrested were white, 27 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- Twelve percent of the persons arrested were hispanic and non-hispanics accounted for 88 percent.

WEAPONS: CARRYING, POSSESSING, etc.

Definition

Under this program, this offense includes all the violations of regulations or statutes controlling the carrying, using, possessing, furnishing, and manufacturing of deadly weapons or silencers, and attempts.

- There were 5,194 arrests reported for weapon offenses, a 9 percent decrease compared to 1998.
- Of the total, 69 percent were adults and 31 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 90 percent and females 10 percent of those arrested.
- Fifty-one percent of the persons arrested were white, 47 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 16 percent of those arrested and 84 percent were non-hispanic.

PROSTITUTION AND COMMERCIALIZED VICE

Definition

Prostitution and commercialized vice are sex offenses of a commercialized nature and attempts. Included in this category are prostitution, keeping a bawdy house, procuring or transporting women for immoral purposes, etc..

- There were 3,069 prostitution and commercialized vice arrests during 1999, representing a decrease of 13 percent when compared to 1998.
- Adults accounted for 99 percent, and juveniles 1 percent of the arrests.
- Forty-four percent were males and 56 percent were females.
- Fifty-eight percent of the persons arrested were white, 40 percent were black, and 2 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 24 percent of those arrested and 76 percent were non-hispanic.

SEX OFFENSES

Definition

Sex offenses, as defined under the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting Program, do not include rape, prostitution and commercialized vice. Included in this class are offenses against chastity, common decency, morals, and the like; attempts are also included.

- There were 2,146 sex offense arrests during 1999, representing a decrease of 11 percent when compared to 1998.
- Adults accounted for 77 percent, and juveniles 23 percent of the arrests.
- Ninety-six percent were males and 4 percent were females.
- Sixty-nine percent of the persons arrested were white, 29 percent were black, and 2 percent were other races.
- Nineteen percent of the persons arrested were hispanic and 82 percent were not of hispanic origin.

DRUG ABUSE VIOLATIONS

Definition

Under the program, drug abuse violations are defined as the unlawful sale/manufacturing/possession/use of the below listed narcotics and drugs:

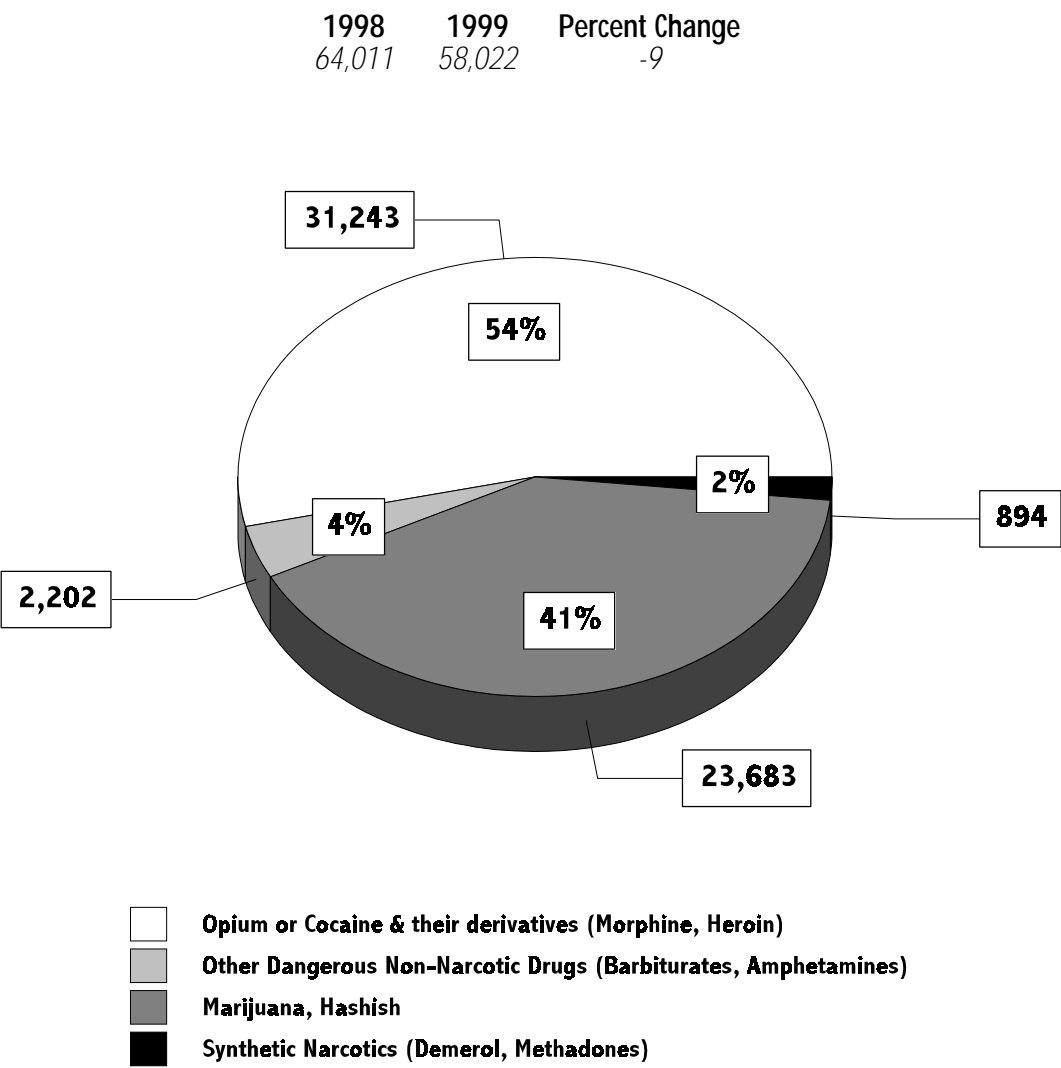
- a. Opium or Cocaine and their derivatives (morphine, heroin, codeine.)
- b. Marijuana, hashish, etc.
- c. Synthetic narcotics—manufactured narcotics which can cause true drug addiction—(demerol, methadones.)
- d. Other—dangerous non-narcotic drugs (barbiturates, amphetamines, hallucinogens.)

- There were 58,022 arrests reported by the law enforcement agencies of the state for drug abuse violations, a 9 percent decrease compared to 1998.
- Adults accounted for 86 percent and juveniles 14 percent of the arrests.

- *Thirty-eight percent of persons arrested for drug abuse violations were under the age of 21.*
- *Males accounted for 84 percent of all the arrests while females accounted for the remaining 16 percent.*
- *Fifty-two percent of the persons arrested were white, 47 percent were black, and less than one-half of one percent were other races.*
- *Hispanics accounted for 13 percent of those arrested and 87 percent were non-hispanic.*
- *Arrests for possession/use of drugs accounted for 75 percent of the arrests, and the remaining 25 percent were for the sale/manufacturing of drugs.*
- *Arrests for opium or cocaine and their derivatives represented 47 percent of the possession/use category and 74 percent of the sale/manufacturing category. Overall, they accounted for 54 percent of the total drug abuse violation arrests.*

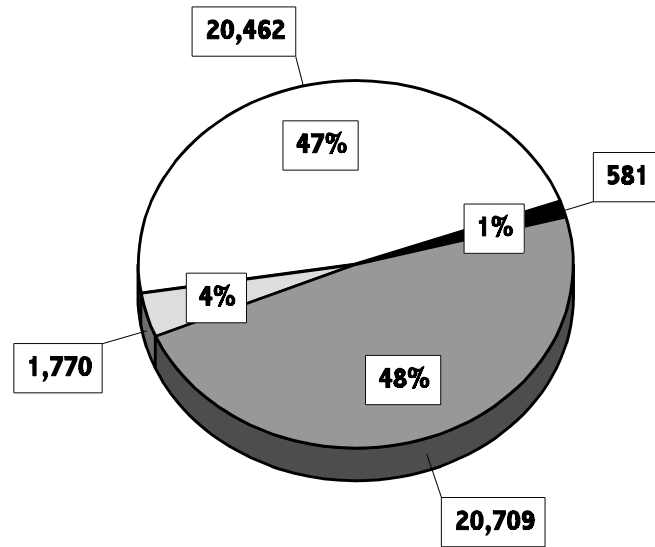

TOTAL ARRESTS FOR ALL DRUG ABUSE VIOLATIONS



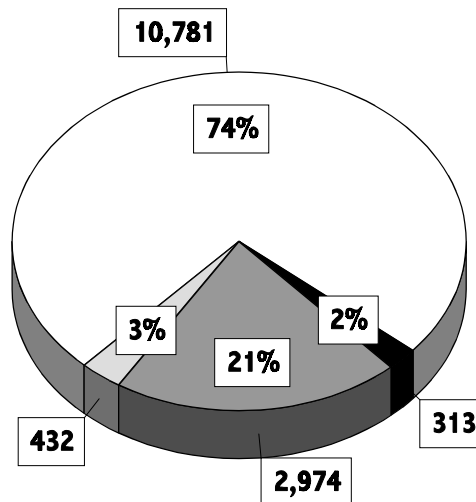
1999 ANALYSES OF DRUG ABUSE VIOLATION

GAMBLING

Definition

Gambling violations are defined as the promoting, permitting or engaging in illegal gambling.

- There were 905 gambling arrests reported during 1999, resulting in a decrease of 4 percent compared to 1998.
- Eighty-nine percent of the arrests were adults and 11 percent were juveniles.
- Males represented 88 percent and females 12 percent of the gambling arrests.
- Fifty-four percent of the persons arrested were black, 40 percent were white, and 6 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 18 percent of the arrests and 82 percent were non-hispanic.

OFFENSES AGAINST FAMILY AND CHILDREN

Definition

The definition of offenses against family and children is the nonsupport, neglect, desertion or abuse of family and children.

- There were 15,672 arrests for offenses against family and children during 1999, representing a decrease of 12 percent from 1998.
- Less than one-half of one percent of the arrests were juveniles, and nearly 100 percent were adults.
- Males accounted for 91 percent and females 9 percent of the arrests.
- Fifty percent of the persons arrested were white, 49 percent were black, and less than one-half of one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 11 percent of the arrests and 89 percent were not of hispanic origin.

DRIVING UNDER THE INFLUENCE

Definition

Under the New Jersey Crime Reporting Program, the offense of driving under the influence is defined as the driving or operating of any motor vehicle while drunk or under the influence of alcohol or narcotics.

- There were 29,109 arrests reported for driving under the influence in 1999, a decrease of 3 percent compared to 1998.
- Ninety-nine percent of the arrests were adults and only 1 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 85 percent of the arrests while females accounted for the remaining 15 percent.
- Eighty-eight percent of the persons arrested were white, 10 percent were black, and 2 percent were other races.
- Fourteen percent of the persons arrested were hispanic and 86 percent were non-hispanic.

LIQUOR LAWS

Definition

Included in this category are state or local liquor law violations, with the exception of "driving under the influence."

- There were 14,499 arrests reported for liquor law violations, a decrease of 14 percent from the previous year.
- Adults were responsible for 74 percent of the arrests while the remaining 26 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 80 percent of the liquor law arrests while females accounted for the remaining 20 percent.
- Eighty-two percent of the persons arrested were white, 17 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 8 percent of those arrested and 92 percent were not of hispanic origin.

DISORDERLY CONDUCT

Definition

In this category are placed all charges of committing a breach of the peace (disorderly person).

- There were 28,926 arrests reported for disorderly conduct, a decrease of 15 percent from the previous year.
- Adults were responsible for 75 percent of the arrests while the remaining 25 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 79 percent of the disorderly conduct arrests while females accounted for the remaining 21 percent.
- Sixty-three percent of the persons arrested were white, 36 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 14 percent of those arrested and 86 percent were not of hispanic origin.

VAGRANCY

Definition

In this category are persons charged with vagabondage, begging, loitering, etc..

- There were 2,699 arrests in this category, a decrease of 16 percent from the previous year.
- Adults were responsible for 96 percent of the arrests while the remaining 4 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 69 percent and females accounted for the remaining 31 percent of arrests in this category.
- Sixty-nine percent of the persons arrested were black, 30 percent were white, and less than one-half of one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 9 percent of those arrested and 91 percent were not of hispanic origin.

ALL OTHER OFFENSES

Definition

Included in this category are all violations of state and local laws, except those offenses that can be categorized into one of the specific crime classifications previously mentioned.

- There were 118,305 arrests reported for all other offenses, a decrease of 3 percent from the previous year.
- Adults were responsible for 92 percent of the arrests while the remaining 8 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 81 percent of the arrests while females accounted for the remaining 19 percent.
- Fifty-five percent of the persons arrested were white, 44 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 13 percent of those arrested and 87 percent were not of hispanic origin.

CURFEW AND LOITERING LAW VIOLATIONS

Definition

In this category are juvenile arrests made for violations of local curfew or loitering ordinances.

- There were 6,123 arrests reported for curfew and loitering law violations, an increase of 30 percent from the previous year.
- Males accounted for 78 percent and females accounted for the remaining 22 percent.
- Fifty percent of the persons arrested were black, 49 percent were white, and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 26 percent of those arrested and 74 percent were not of hispanic origin.

RUNAWAYS

Definition

For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, this category is limited to juveniles taken into protective custody, under provisions of local statutes, as runaways.

- There were 4,960 runaway arrests reported, a decrease of 5 percent from the previous year.
- Females accounted for 59 percent of the arrests while males accounted for the remaining 41 percent.
- Fifty percent of the persons arrested were black, 49 percent were white, and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 20 percent of those arrested and 80 percent were not of hispanic origin.

CRIME INDEX FOR POPULATION GROUPS – 1999

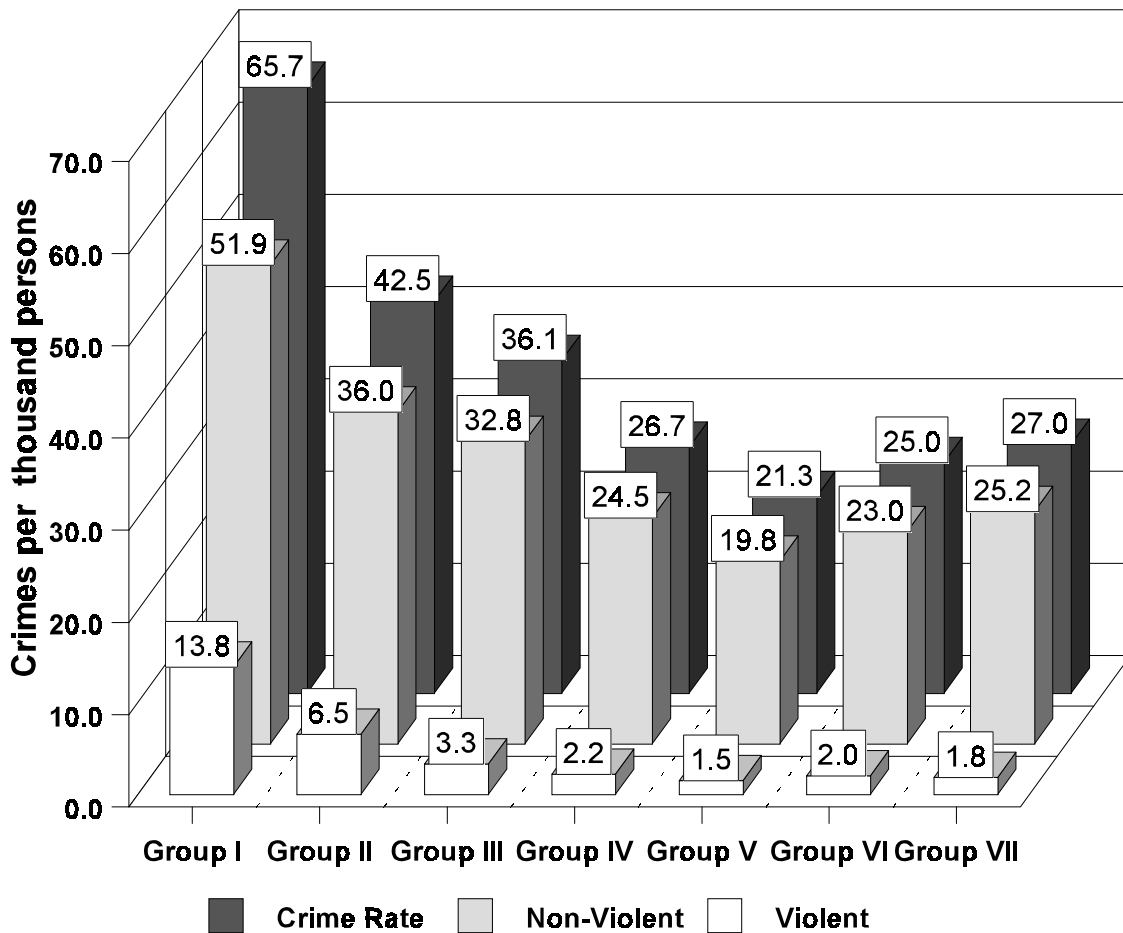
The presentation of crime statistics by population groups was made for the purpose of projecting, for consideration, the relative crime experience of communities of varying populations. Although the individual municipalities within the various groups may be geographically separated, their inclusion into a specific group was predicated by the similarity in population with the other municipalities within the group. Municipalities within the same group may differ widely when all factors are considered, but they do share the common bond of population size. The grouping of communities in this manner allows recognition of variances in the crime volumes, rates and clearances between the established groups.

This section deals with serious crimes reported in the large urban cities of the state. These cities represent 19 percent of the population and historically account for one third of the reported Crime Index of the state.

This analysis involves the latest ten-year period 1990-1999 and endeavors further to identify crime trends in these urban areas.

The cities included in this analysis were initially categorized as urban municipalities (i.e., densely populated with extensive development) by the New Jersey Department of Community Affairs, Division of State and Regional Planning, Bureau of Statewide Planning, and will continue to be used for comparative purposes.

The criteria used in the selection of these cities were (1) classified as urban character and (2) have a population of 50,000 or more inhabitants.

For further comparative analysis, the urban cities were subdivided into two distinct groupings.

Group number one consisted of the state's six largest urban centers with populations of 80,000 or over and is categorized as "Major Urban."

The second group included the "Major Urban" and the additional urban communities with populations of 50,000 or more inhabitants, and is referred to as the "Urban 15."

- During the ten-year period 1990/1999, the Crime Index in New Jersey has decreased 34 percent, while the "Urban 15" cities decreased 41 percent and the six major urban cities decreased 44 percent.
- Violent crime in the state decreased 33 percent, the 15 urban cities decreased 39 percent and the six major cities decreased 45 percent.
- Nonviolent crime in the state decreased 34 percent, the "Urban 15" decreased 41 percent and the six major cities decreased 44 percent.

Distribution:

- Six major urban centers—Camden, Newark, Jersey City, Trenton, Paterson and Elizabeth—collectively represent 11 percent of New Jersey's total population. These same urban centers, during the period 1990 through 1999, accounted for 25 percent of the state's total crime.
- "Major Urban" centers from 1990 through 1999 accounted for 46 percent of all violent crime and 22 percent of the nonviolent crimes in the entire state.
- The 15 urban municipalities represent 19 percent of the state's total population.
- "Urban 15" municipalities accounted for 36 percent of New Jersey's total Crime Index. Violent crime was 59 percent of the state total, while nonviolent crime was 32 percent of the state total during this ten-year period.
- Nearly seven out of every 10 robberies reported occurred in the "Urban 15" cities during this ten-year period.

STREET CRIME

There has never been a clear-cut definition for street crime within the criminal justice system. The nation's clearinghouse for the collection and dissemination of criminal statistics, the Federal Bureau of Investigation, has no criteria in the categorization of specific crimes to be designated or defined as "street crimes." More and more this media term has been confused with the violent crime group of murder, rape, robbery, and aggravated assault.

Although any particular crime can and does occur on the street, this analysis, because of reporting constraints within the Uniform Crime Reporting System, is limited to defining street crimes as those offenses which occur, or are most likely to occur, on streets, highways, parking lots, etc.. These crimes include highway robbery, purse-snatching, theft from autos, theft of auto parts and accessories, theft of bicycles, and motor vehicle thefts. All are crimes against property and only one, highway robbery, falls in the violent crime group.

- During the ten-year period 1990-1999, the "Urban 15" cities accounted for 42 percent of the street crimes in the state.
- Three out of every four highway robberies occurred in the "Urban 15" during the ten-year period.
- More than half of all motor vehicle thefts during the survey span occurred in these 15 urban municipalities.
- Forty-six percent of all purse-snatchings were perpetrated in the "Urban 15" cities.
- The street crime categories of highway robbery, purse-snatching and larceny of motor vehicle parts and accessories, were at their lowest levels during 1999, in this ten-year period.

Section Eight

RESORT MUNICIPALITIES

As required by P.L. 1998, c. 50, annual mean population estimates for resort municipalities in New Jersey have been used in the preparation of per capita crime statistics.

These estimates were prepared based upon the methodology prescribed in P.L. 1998, c. 50 using the latest available municipality estimates of year-round population from the U.S. Bureau of the Census. Please note that these resort population estimates should only be used for crime statistics purposes. While they fulfill the requirements of the law, the seasonal components of these estimates are not a complete measure of seasonal population because they include only those living in rental housing units or in vacant year-round housing. Not counted are the many day visitors and persons who occupy campgrounds, hotels, motels or bed and breakfast establishments or who stay with friends or relatives.

+ Crime rates were not computed for municipalities with populations under 100.

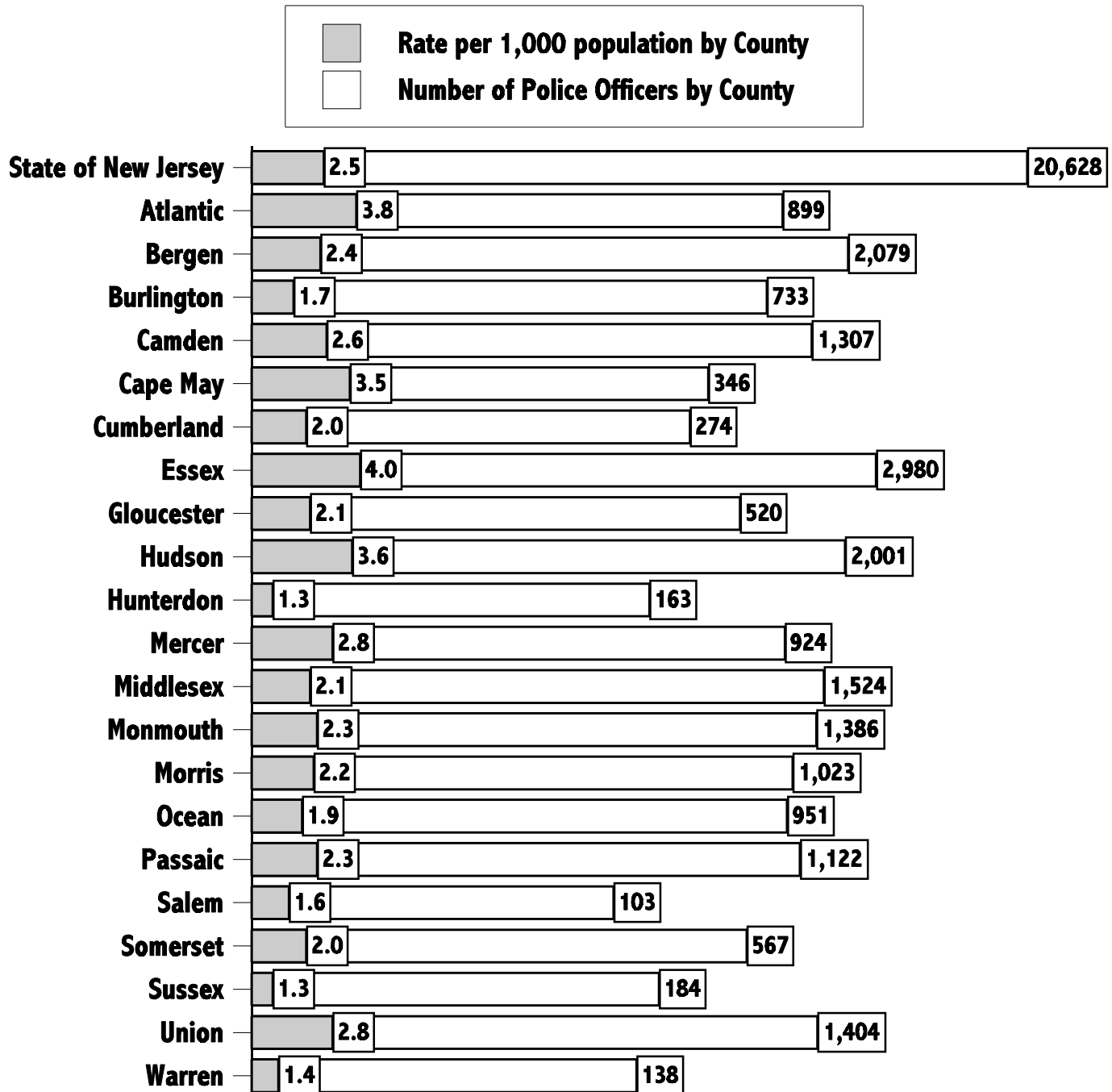

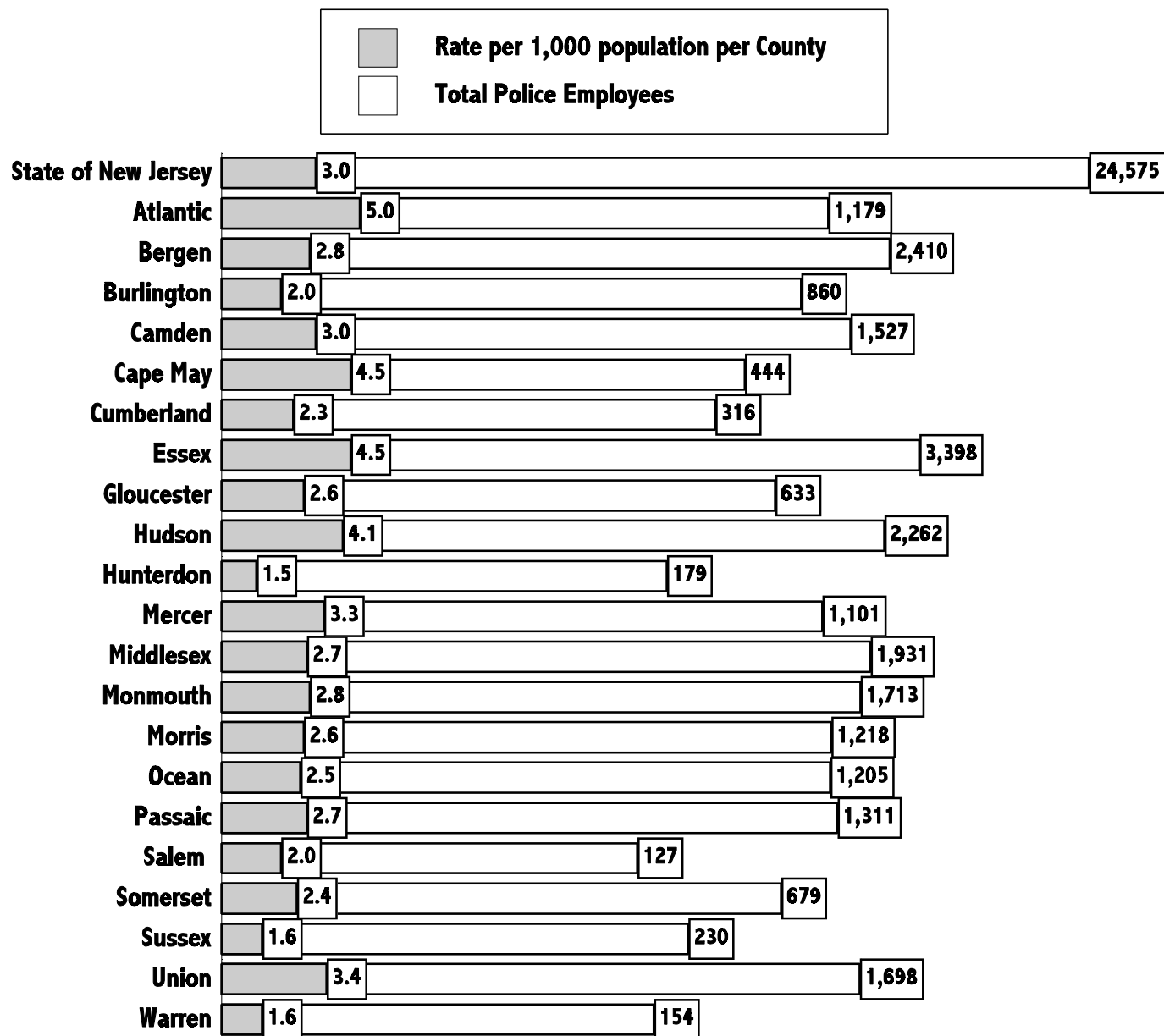

POLICE EMPLOYEE DATA

The Uniform Crime Reporting Program of New Jersey incorporates the collection of pertinent data relating to the police of the state. Information regarding police employees strength and trends are discussed in this section.

Individual listings of full-time state, county, university and college police departments are shown in tables within this section. Listings of municipal police departments will be found in Section VII.

The determination of police strength for any given area or municipality should be subject for serious consideration. Such consideration, however, should be based on the numerous factors which create the need for police services. For example, the increased need for police service in a municipality which has a highly mobile or seasonal population differs from a municipality which has a relatively stable population. Some other factors, discussed elsewhere in this publication, relate to size, density of population, geographic location, character, and proximity to metropolitan areas. The tables and charts shown in this section should not be interpreted as recommended strength for any given municipality.

TOTAL POLICE EMPLOYEES

Total police employees are defined as the total number of full-time police officers and civilian police employees (clerks, dispatchers, mechanics, etc.) employed by all law enforcement agencies in the state.

- During 1999, there were 49,330 full-time police employees in New Jersey. This represents an increase of 2 percent compared to the 48,507 full-time police employees in 1998.
- The number of full-time police officers increased 2 percent, from 37,028 in 1998 to 37,702 in 1999.
- The number of full-time civilian employees increased 1 percent, from 11,479 in 1998 to 11,628 in 1999.
- Seventy-six percent were sworn officers and the remaining 24 percent were civilian employees.

MUNICIPAL POLICE EMPLOYEES

This category consists of the number of police employees, including civilian personnel, employed full-time by municipalities of the state.

- During 1999, there were 24,575 municipal police employees, an increase of 2 percent compared to the 24,040 in 1998.
- For every 1,000 inhabitants of the state there were 3.0 municipal police employees.
- Atlantic County reported the largest increase in municipal police employees, an increase of 7 percent (79 employees).
- Atlantic County recorded the highest police employee rate; 5.0 per 1,000 population; (this rate is computed on the static population and does not take into account the large influx of seasonal and recreational population).
- Hunterdon County recorded the lowest police employee rate of 1.5 per 1,000 population.

MUNICIPAL CIVILIAN POLICE EMPLOYEES

The personnel of each department differ as to the demands and responsibilities placed before them. Many police officers are fully occupied with clerical tasks and are not free to perform active police duties. Employing civilians in police departments to perform clerical duties is in line with the thinking of many police administrators who recommended the use of civilians in this capacity. Thus, freeing the sworn personnel for actual police-related services.

- There were 3,947 municipal civilian police employees in 1999, an increase of 4 percent compared to the 3,792 in 1998.
- Sixteen percent of all municipal police employees were civilians.

MUNICIPAL POLICE OFFICERS

This includes the number of sworn police officers employed full-time by municipalities of the state. The police employee rate per 1,000 population presented here should not be construed as recommended ratios. The determination of police strength for any municipality should be based on the numerous factors that create the need for police services. These factors, as crime, vary in type and degree from place to place. Some examples are: seasonal population, geographic location, density and composition of the population.

- There were 20,628 full-time municipal police officers in 1999; this represents an increase of 2 percent when compared to the 20,248 full-time municipal police officers in 1998.
- The number of full-time municipal police officers was calculated at 2.5 per 1,000 population; this represents no change when compared to 1998.
- Sworn officers represented 84 percent of all municipal police employees.
- Hudson County recorded the largest numerical increase (59) which represented a 3 percent increase of municipal police officers.
- The largest numerical decrease occurred in Union County, a decrease of 16 municipal police officers, or 1 percent.
- Essex County, with 4.0 police officers per 1,000 inhabitants, recorded the highest rate of full-time municipal police officers. (This rate is computed on the static population, and does not take into account the large influx of seasonal and recreational population).
- Hunterdon County and Sussex County recorded the lowest rate of full-time municipal officers with 1.3 police officers per 1,000 population.

OTHER POLICE (State Agencies)

In addition to the State Police, there are ten other state agencies reporting to the system. These agencies consist of: NJ Forest Fire Service, Division of Parks & Forestry, Department of Corrections, Department of Human Services, Division of Criminal Justice, Division of Fish and Game, Office of Weights and Measures, Palisades Interstate Park, Port Authority NY/NJ, and NJ Transit Police. No rates were computed due to the variations in the types of police services rendered, and their statewide jurisdictions.

- Together, these agencies reported a total of 11,553 full-time employees; an increase of 1 percent compared to the 11,410 police employees in 1998.
- There were 8,175 sworn police officers in 1999, an increase of 3 percent compared to the 7,958 in 1998.
- These agencies reported 3,378 civilian police employees in 1999, representing a 2 percent decrease compared to the 3,452 reported in 1998.
- Seventy-one percent were sworn personnel, while the remaining 29 percent were civilians.

COUNTY POLICE, SHERIFFS AND PROSECUTORS

The functions of county law enforcement vary widely throughout the state. The operation of one sheriff's department may be limited exclusively to civil areas and the administration of the county jail, or they may be actively involved in criminal matters throughout the county.

County police departments are varied in their activities in that some are responsible for enforcement throughout the county, while others may have as their primary mission the policing of county parklands. The responsibilities of county prosecutors' officers include criminal investigations, trial preparation, court presentation and special probes. Because of the difference in the types of police service rendered, rates for county law enforcement agencies are not presented here.

- County law enforcement agencies reported a total of 8,670 full-time police employees in 1999; an increase of 1 percent compared to 8,626 in 1998.
- There were 5,881 full-time sworn police officers employed by county agencies in 1999. This represents an increase of 1 percent compared to 5,851 in 1998.
- County police agencies reported 2,789 civilian police employees in 1999; an increase of 1 percent compared to 2,775 civilian employees in 1998.
- Sworn personnel accounted for 68 percent while the remaining 32 percent were civilians.

STATE POLICE

The New Jersey State Police is empowered to provide all phases of law enforcement throughout the state. It also renders, upon request, police services to all the law enforcement agencies in the state. No rates are used due to the variations in the nature and extent of the police services performed by the State Police.

- The New Jersey State Police reported 3,732 full-time police employees; an increase of 3 percent compared to 3,624 in 1998.
- State Police employed 2,637 officers in 1999, this represented an increase of 2 percent when compared to 2,583 in 1998.
- The State Police reported 1,095 civilian employees in 1999; an increase of 5 percent over the 1,041 reported in 1998.
- Sworn personnel accounted for 71 percent and civilians represented 29 percent of the total State Police employees.



Section Ten

LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS KILLED & ASSAULTED SUMMARY

POLICE OFFICERS KILLED AND ASSAULTED

The killing or assault of a police officer has a deleterious effect on society that reaches far beyond the overt act. Such occurrences constitute an immediate threat to the well-being of the community and serious breach of the internal security of the country. Today a young person who considers a career in law enforcement must also consider the very strong possibility of being killed or assaulted by a member of the very same society they are sworn to protect. This deplorable situation should be a subject of serious concern, for in truth, an attack on a police officer is an attack on society. The violence directed against law enforcement officers acting in the line of duty is clearly demonstrated by the following information.

POLICE FELONIOUSLY KILLED

VOLUME/TREND

- In 1999, two police officers were feloniously killed while in the performance of their duties.
- On April 8, 1999, Orange City Police officer Joyce Ann Carnegie stopped to question a robbery suspect. The suspect drew a 9mm handgun and fired twice. One round struck the officer's body armor; the fatal round struck the officer in the head near the right temple. The offender was arrested.
- On October 1, 1999, Washington Twp. Police officer, Cpl. Steven L. Levy, a member of the Gloucester County Critical Incident Team, was assisting Woodbury Police with a domestic violence call involving an armed, barricaded suspect. Tactical entry was made to the residence by the Critical Incident Team. The barricaded suspect fired his shotgun and struck Cpl. Levy near the right eye causing the fatal injury. The offender subsequently committed suicide.

ASSAULTS ON POLICE OFFICERS

Police assault statistics are important to the police administrator who attempts to identify the causative factors of this type of criminal activity. Many factors contribute to police assaults, and circumstances vary from place to place. Identifying specific reasons for these assaults is therefore extremely difficult. The following information illustrates the frequency of these events, and any attempt at analysis of these assaults should include consideration of the unique variable present in each jurisdiction. Due to the broad field of services performed by many state and county police agencies, no assault rates are computed for total police officers.

VOLUME/TREND

- There were 3,191 police officers assaulted in 1999, a decrease of 7 percent when compared to the 3,433 in 1998.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Thirty percent (951) of the officers assaulted sustained injury.
- Personal weapons, such as hands, fists and feet were used in 83 percent (2,655) of all police assaults.
- Twenty-five percent of police assaults occurred when officers responded to disturbance calls.
- Fifteen percent of the assaults on police officers occurred during the 2-hour period of 10:00 p.m. to 12:00 midnight.

CLEARANCES

- The police of New Jersey were successful in clearing 95 percent of the assaults directed at them.

ASSAULTS ON MUNICIPAL POLICE OFFICERS

VOLUME/TREND

- A total of 2,751 municipal police officers were assaulted during 1999, a 4 percent decrease compared to the 2,857 assaulted in 1998.
- The assault rate, for every 100 municipal officers, was 13.3, a 6 percent decrease compared to 1998.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Twenty-nine percent of the municipal officers assaulted sustained injury.
- Personal weapons, such as hands, fists and feet were used in 84 percent of all municipal police assaults.
- Twenty-nine percent of municipal police assaults occurred when officers responded to disturbance calls.
- Attempting Other Arrests accounted for 23 percent of municipal police assaults.

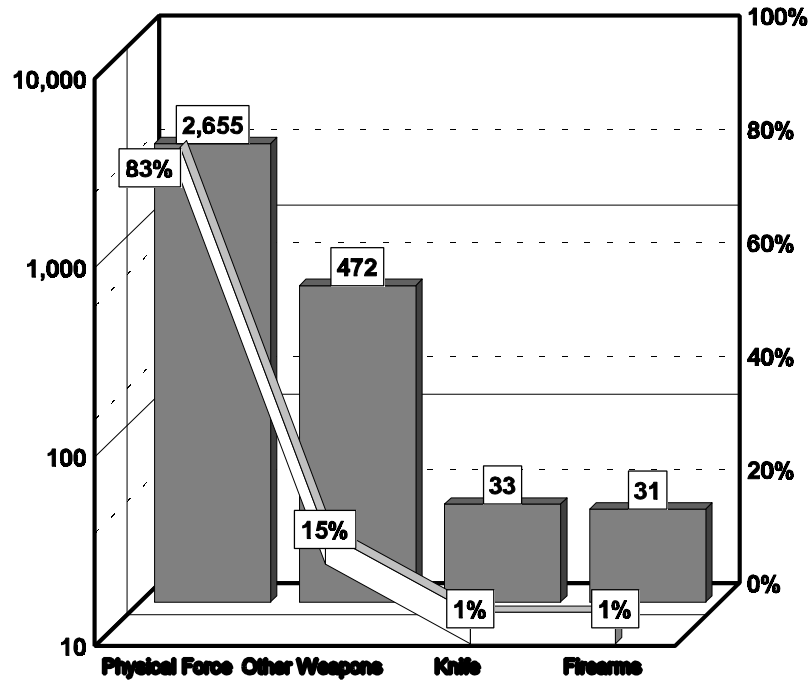
OTHER POLICE OFFICERS ASSAULTED

The following law enforcement agencies are dealt with separately and are not included when computing municipal assault rates; the services performed by these agencies vary greatly from the functions of municipal police agencies.

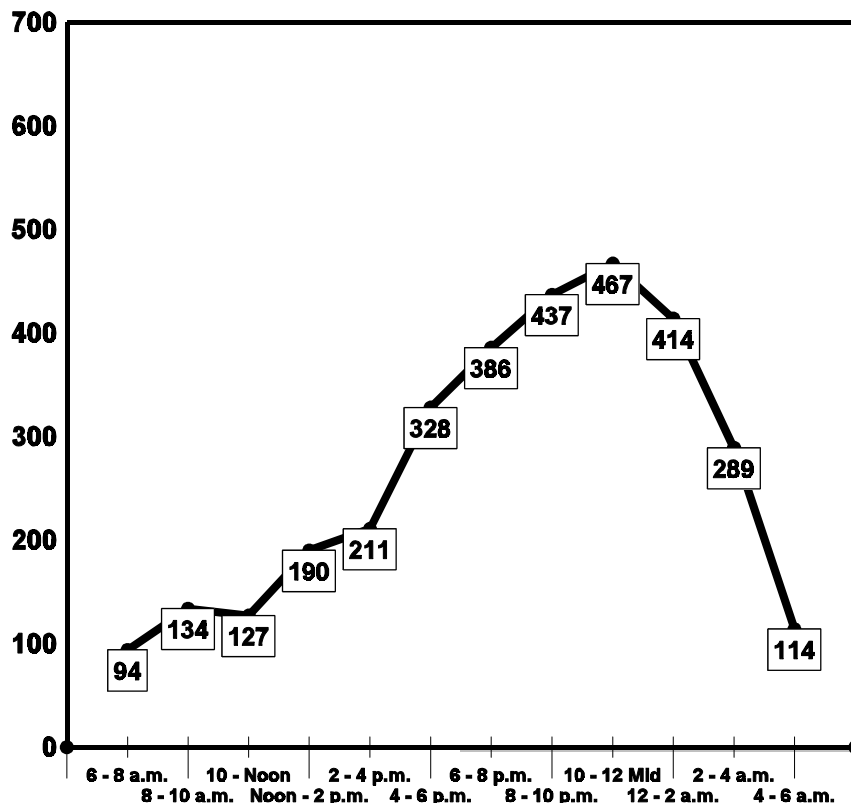
VOLUME/TREND

- County law enforcement agencies reported 111 officers assaulted with 52 sustaining injury.
- The New Jersey State Police reported 55 officers assaulted with 21 sustaining injury.
- Other state agencies, with police powers, reported 267 officers assaulted with 77 sustaining injury.
- University and college police agencies reported 7 officers assaulted with 5 sustaining injury.

Section Eleven

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

INTRODUCTION

The violence within the American domicile has been recognized for decades by elements of government and society with little done to correct the problem. Only recently has this phenomenon begun to receive the attention it deserves. In an effort to understand, identify and treat the incidents of abuse occurring in the home, the State of New Jersey, through its legislature, has provided the means to gain a meaningful insight into this issue.

In 1982, the Domestic Violence Act was instituted to protect battered victims and study the complex problems that spark such aggressive behavior. This legislation also provided the opportunity to identify the causes of violence in the home and put forth a more comprehensive effort to combat the crime of Domestic Violence.

Improvements since the implementation of the Domestic Violence Act are continuing. Pursuant to a change in N.J.S.A. 2C:25-24 enacted, June 9, 1999, arrest data is presented by county. Domestic violence restraining order violations are now captured and will be reported in next year's statistical publication. Revised investigation and reporting procedures by the police; improved processing of domestic complaints by the courts; mandatory in-service training for police and court personnel have all enabled the victim to come forward and implement the constitutional rights granted to all Americans.

The following pages of narrative and graphics in this chapter are the result of gathered data displaying the complexities of domestic violence found within the State of New Jersey. It is through analysis of this data that, hopefully, the keys to preventing future violence can be found.

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE STATISTICAL SUMMARY

Highlights of the 1999 domestic violence statistics are listed below:

- There were 80,681 domestic violence offenses reported by the police in 1999, a 1% decrease compared to the 81,454 reported in 1998.
- Murders decreased 11% in 1999 (55) when compared to 1998 (62). Dating relationships accounted for 7 of the 55 domestic violence murders.
- Assaults accounted for 49% (39,474) and harassment accounted for 36% (29,266) of the reported offenses in 1999.
- Arrests were made in 33% (26,240) of the offenses reported for 1999, a decrease of 1% when compared to 1998 (26,472).
- The most frequent day of domestic violence occurrences was Sunday (14,475).
- For the seventeenth consecutive year, the most frequent hours of domestic violence incidents were between 8:00 p.m. and midnight, when 29% (23,375) of the offenses were reported.
- Children were involved or present during 35% of all domestic violence offenses occurring in 1999. Specifically, 5% (4,254) were involved and 30% (24,290) were present.
- Wives were the victims in 23% (18,153) and ex-wives were the victims in 3% (2,494) of the reported domestic violence offenses in 1999. Overall, females were victims in 78% (62,896) of all domestic violence offenses.
- The number of domestic violence complaints that had prior court orders issued against the offender decreased from 16,515 in 1998 to 16,194 in 1999. This is a decrease of 2%.
- Alcohol and/or drugs were involved in 32% (25,780) of the reported offenses occurring in 1999. Alcohol involvement alone accounted for 28% (22,817) of the total domestic violence offenses reported.
- Persons age 60 or over were victims in 3% (2,407) of all reported domestic violence offenses that occurred in 1999. Elderly were the victims in 13% (7) of the domestic violence murders (55).
- Domestic violence does not occur at a regular frequency, but when viewed as a ratio of its occurrence to a fixed time interval, one act of domestic violence would occur every six minutes and twenty-six seconds.
- Domestic violence offenses arising from a dating relationship accounted for 13% (10,501) of the state total.

- The violent crimes of homicide (55), aggravated assault (2,801), and sexual assault (200) accounted for 4% of reported domestic violence offenses (80,681).

- Thirty-nine percent (31,464) of all domestic violence complaints resulted in injury. This is a 5% decrease when compared to the 33,044 that occurred in 1998.
- Of all the domestic violence offenses involving weapons (39,878), hands, fists, feet, etc. were used in 89% (35,609) of these offenses.
- Domestic violence offenses involving a gun decreased 21% when compared to 1998.
- Serious injuries were reported in 2,801 offenses, a 5% decrease when compared to the 2,959 reported in 1998.

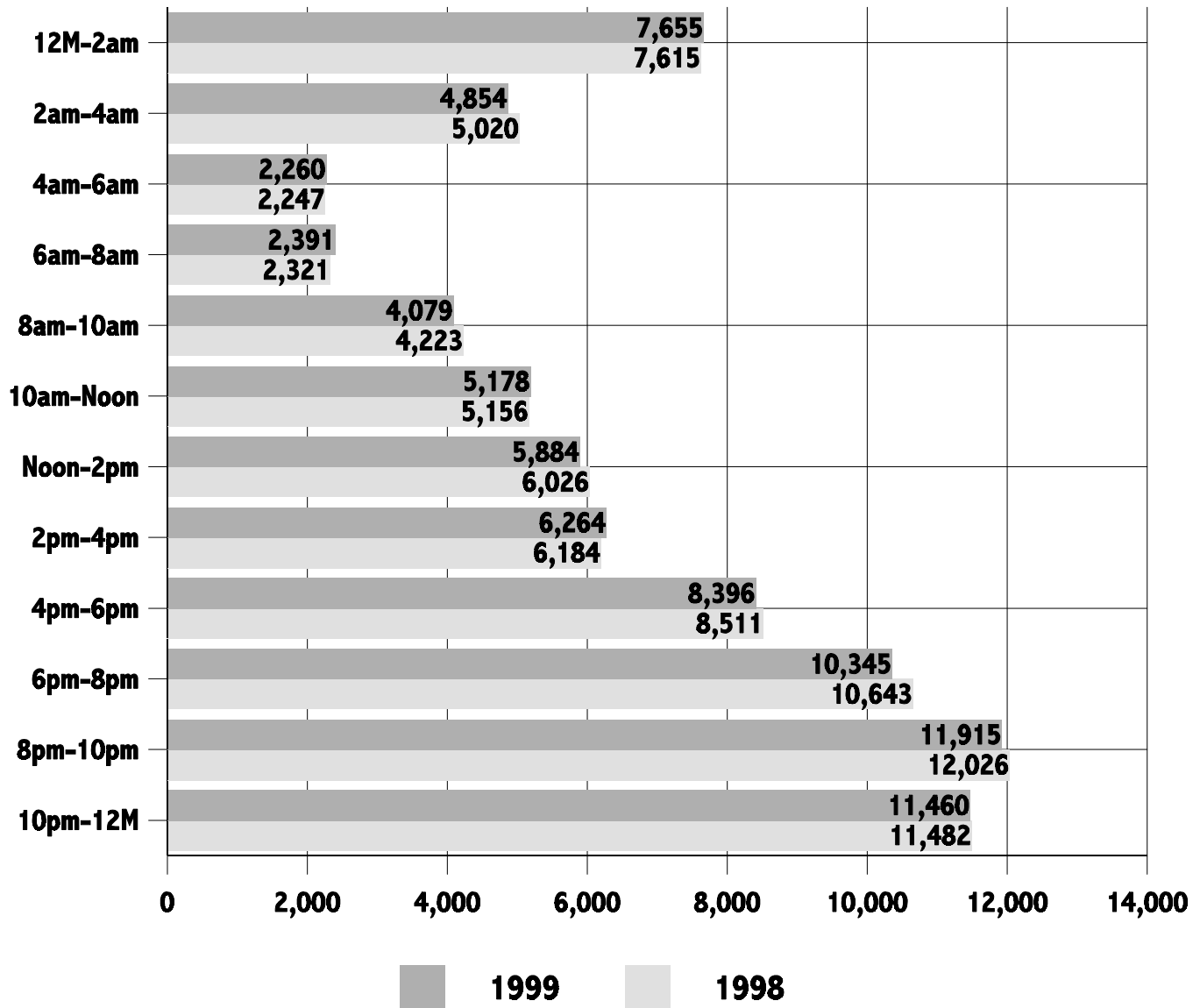

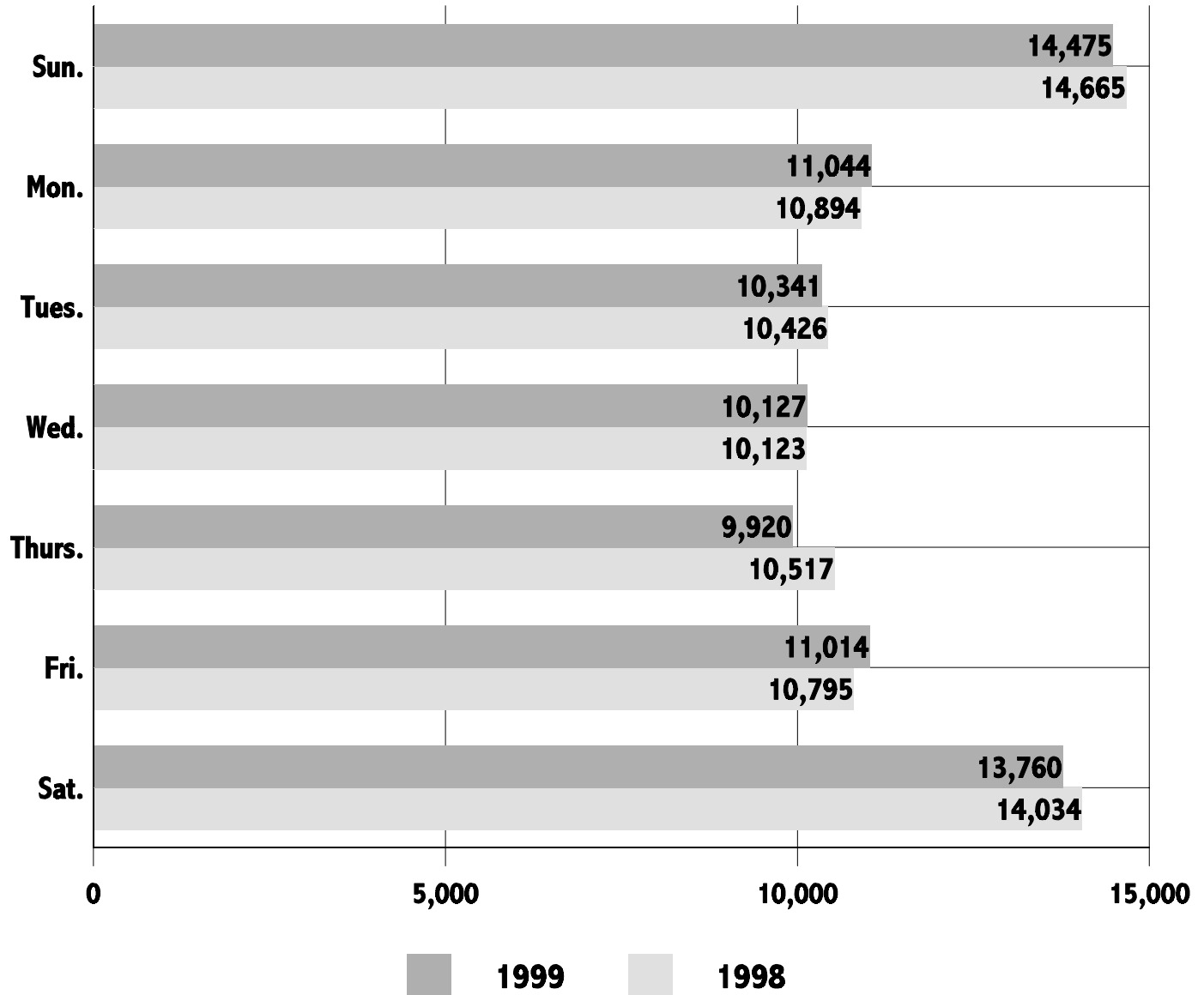
- Assaults accounted for 37% (882) of all domestic violence offenses for victims 60 years old or over.
- Females age 60 or over were the victims in 62% (1,497) of the 2,407 elderly abuse offenses.
- Persons age 60 or over were the victims in 3% (2,407) of all the reported domestic violence offenses during this period.

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE OFFENSES BY TIME OF DAY 1998 /1999



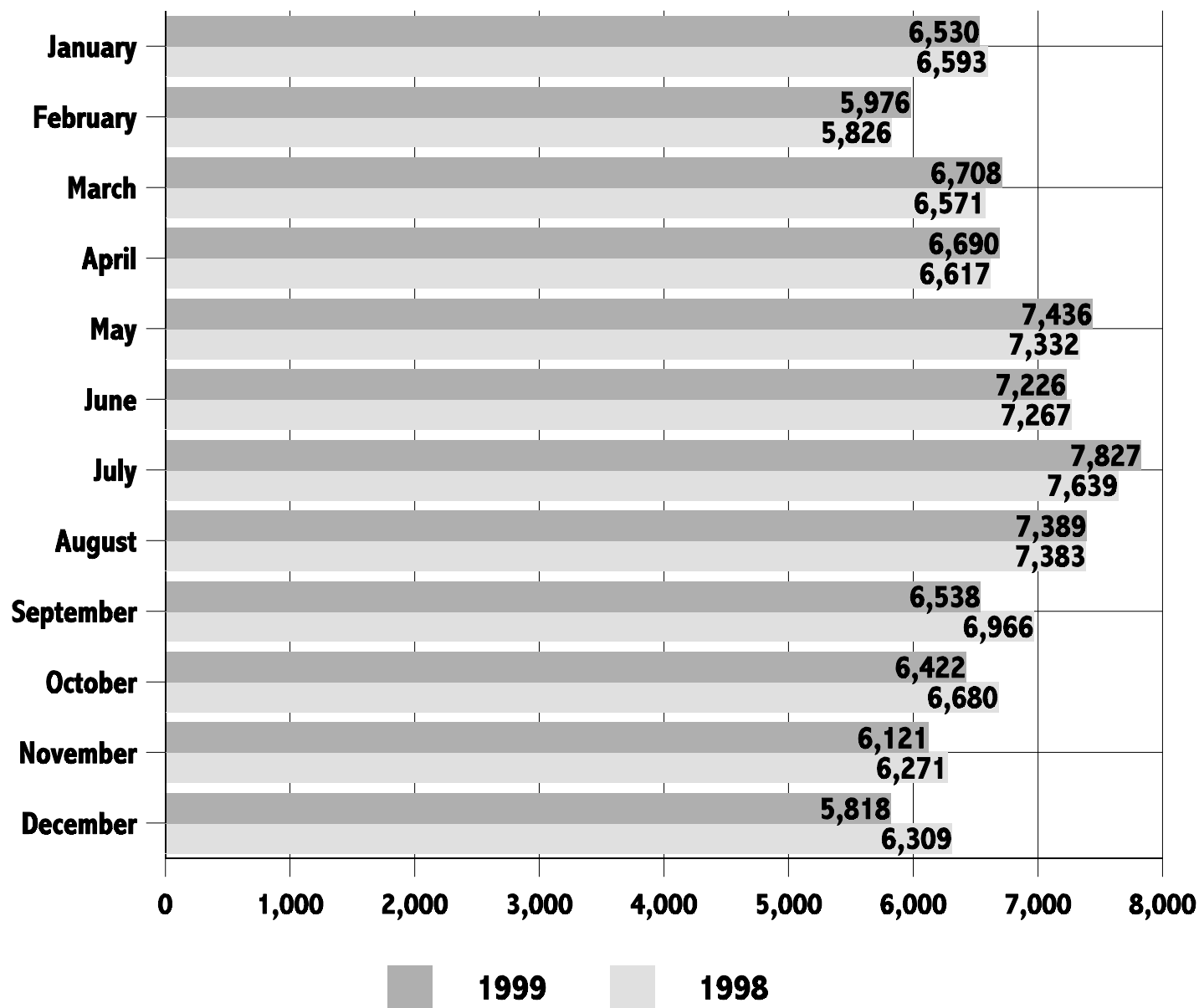
- During 1999, 29% (23,375) of the reported domestic violence offenses occurred between 8:00 p.m. and 12 midnight.

BIAS INCIDENT SUMMARY

INTRODUCTION

Crimes motivated by hate and bias tend to erode the basic fabric of society. Bias incidents having a racial, religious, ethnic, sexual or gender component as well as crimes against individuals with a handicap, manifest themselves in a wide spectrum of criminal activities. These bias incidents jeopardize the active and open pursuit of freedom and opportunity. They attack our citizens based on their race, religion, ethnic heritage, sexual orientation, handicap, or gender. Closely linked to such heritage are individual values, beliefs, and identities.

Realizing that no agency within the state was collecting complete data on bias incidents, a broad-based Ad Hoc committee was created to develop a comprehensive statewide reporting system. As a result of the committee's recommendation, Attorney General Executive Directive No. 1987-3 was issued mandating all New Jersey law enforcement agencies to begin reporting bias incident offenses to the Division of State Police, Uniform Crime Reporting Unit, on a monthly basis, effective January 1, 1988. On August 15, 1996, legislation was enacted which enhanced the state's definition of a bias incident to include crimes that are gender or handicap-motivated.

The directive was instituted to capture vital data in an effort to identify the problem. This information permits proper evaluation of progress in preventing bias crime and assist with necessary planning for the future.

This is the twelfth annual publication concerning bias crimes, which contains comparisons to the previous year's statistics. The published statistics and graphs are the result of data submitted by the police community of New Jersey.

Hopefully, the information contained in this publication will be of value to various segments of society and serve its intended purpose.

BIAS INCIDENT STATISTICAL SUMMARY

Highlights of the 1999 bias incident offense statistics are listed below:

- New Jersey law enforcement agencies reported 633 individual bias incidents, resulting in 679 specific bias incident offenses in 1999, a 23% decrease compared to 1998.
- Harassment accounted for 31% (210) of all bias incident offenses.
- Criminal mischief and damage to property accounted for 45% (304) of all bias incident offenses.
- Racial bias accounted for 49% (336) of all bias incident crimes in 1999.
- The target category of person accounted for 52% (356) of all bias offenses.
- The Black race represented the most frequent racial group victimized by bias crime, accounting for 40% (272) of all bias offenses.
- The Jewish religion represented the most frequent religious group victimized by bias crime, accounting for 26% (177) of all bias offenses.
- The Hispanic ethnicity represented the most frequent ethnic group victimized by bias crime, accounting for 9% (59) of all bias offenses.
- The most frequent day of occurrence was Thursday (120 offenses).
- The most frequent month of occurrence was April (80 offenses).
- The most frequent place of occurrence was a residence, where 27% (182 offenses) of all bias incidents occurred.
- Forty-two percent (288) of all bias incident offenses were cleared with 66% (191) being cleared by arrest, and 34% (97) being exceptionally cleared.
- A total of 224 arrests (136 adults and 88 juveniles) were made resulting from bias incidents. Compared to 1998 arrests increased 21 percent.

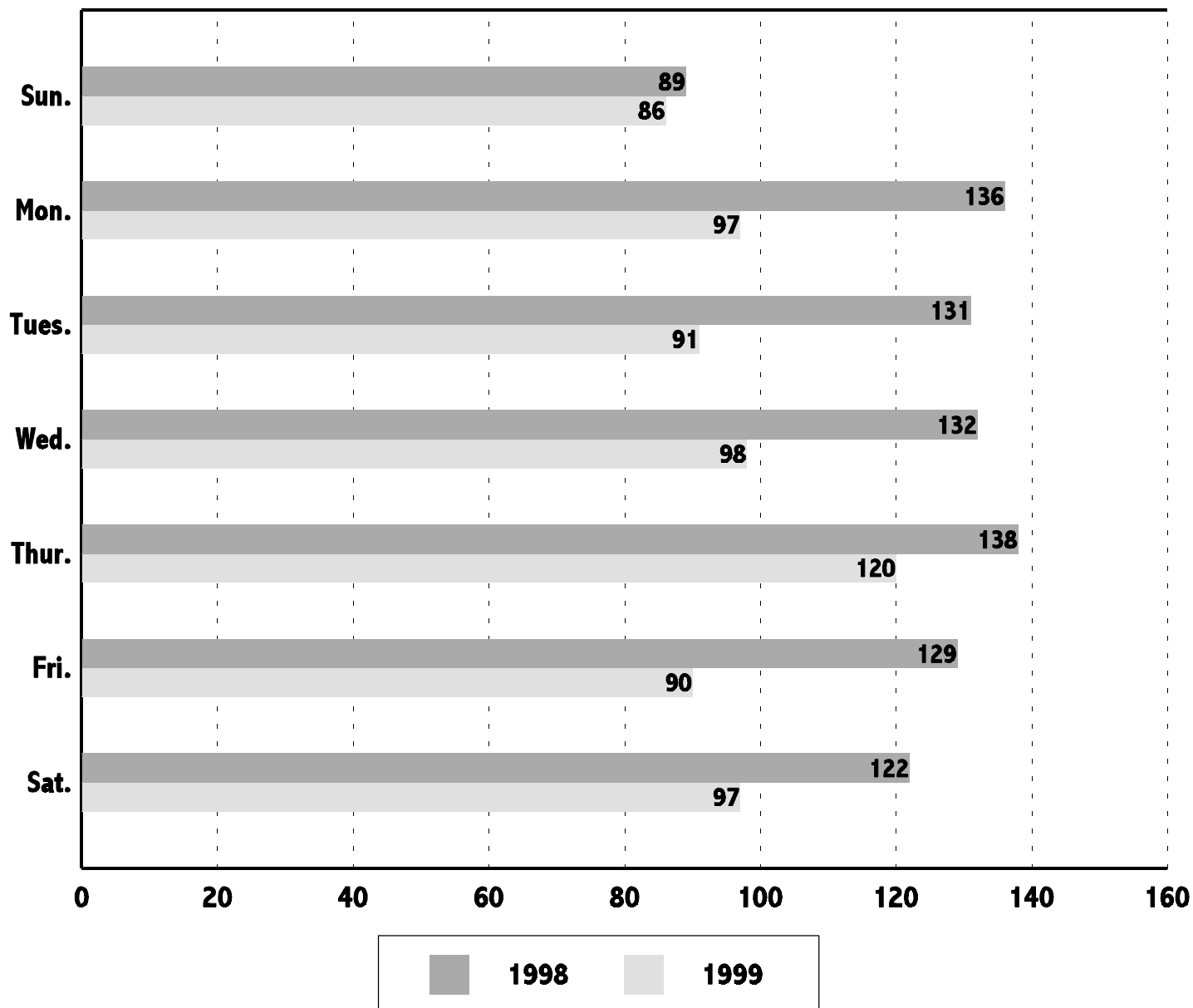

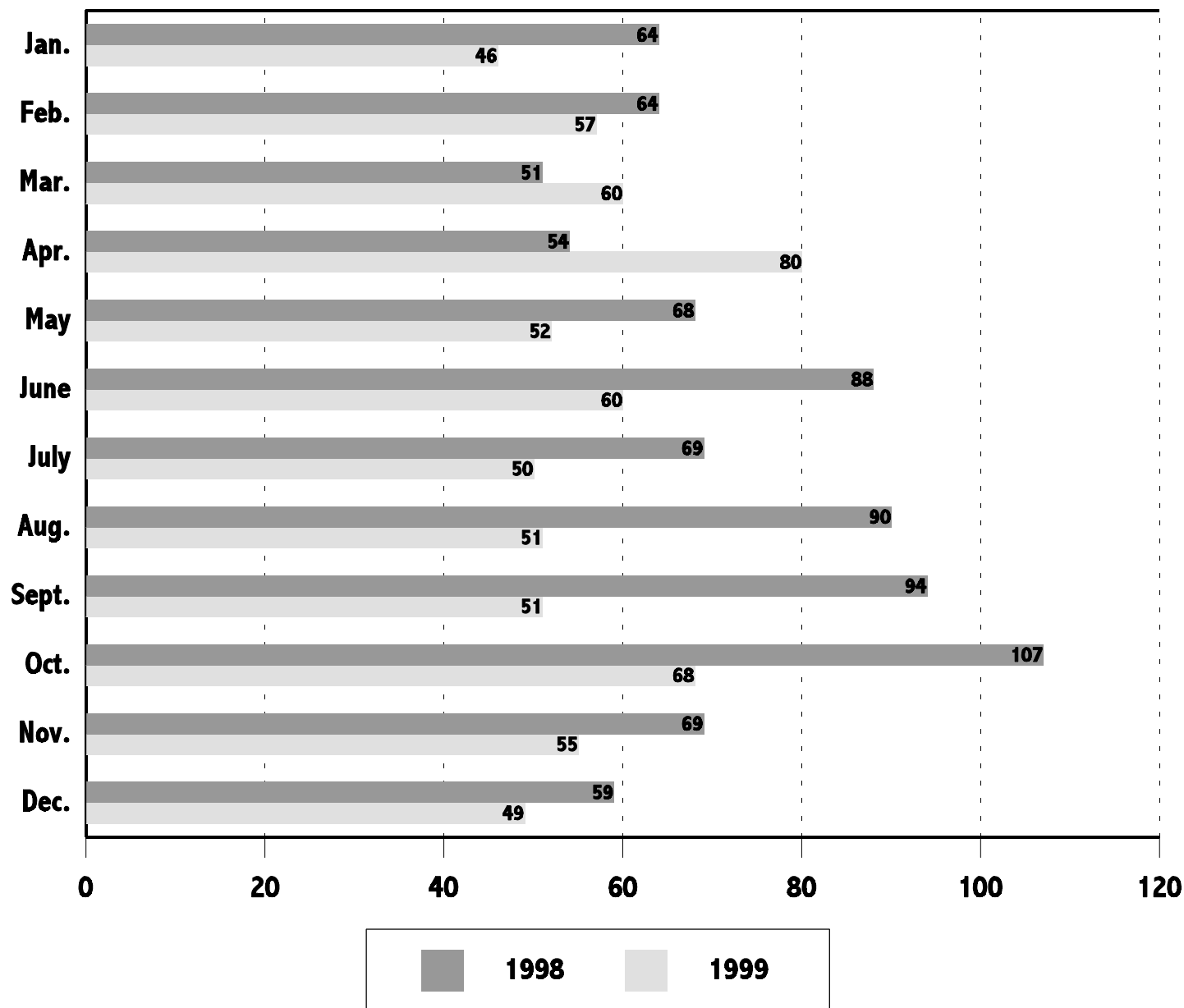
BIAS INCIDENTS BY DAY OF WEEK

GLOSSARY OF TERMS

ADULT	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, a person aged 18 or over.
AMERICAN INDIAN or ALASKAN NATIVE	A person having origins in any of the original peoples of North America, and who maintains cultural identification through tribal affiliation or community recognition.
ARREST RATE	The number of arrests for Part I and Part II offenses for each unit of population, generally per 1,000.
ASIAN or PACIFIC ISLANDER	A person having origins in any of the original peoples of the Far East, Southeast Asia, the Indian subcontinent, or the Pacific Islands. This area includes, for example: China, India, Japan, Korea, the Philippine Islands, and Samoa.
BLACK	A person having origins in any of the black racial groups of Africa, characterized by dark skin pigmentation.
CLEARANCE	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, the solution to a particular crime, usually by the arrest of the offender.
CLEARED BY ARREST	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, an offense is cleared when the offender has been identified, sufficient evidence has been obtained to formally charge and the offender has been ordered to appear in court.
CRIME INDEX	The total of the seven major offenses used to measure the extent, fluctuation and distribution of crime in a geographical area. The following crimes make up the index: Murder, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft; these offenses are referred to as Index offenses.
CRIME RATE	The number of Index offenses reported for each unit of population per 1,000.
CRIMES AGAINST PERSONS	Consists of the following Index offenses: Murder, rape, and aggravated assault.
CRIMES AGAINST PROPERTY	Consists of the following Index offenses: Robbery, burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft.
DAY	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, the hours from 6:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.
ETHNIC ORIGIN	Having or originating from linguistic or cultural ties with a specific group.
EXCEPTIONAL CLEARANCE	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, an offense is cleared exceptionally when an offender has been identified or located and sufficient evidence to charge has been obtained, but there is some reason beyond police control that prohibits the offender from being brought before the court.
HIERARCHY RULE	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, each crime or attempted crime is counted in only one offense category. If several offenses are committed, simply glance down the list of Part I offenses and stop at the first offense recognized from the facts given; this offense is the correct classification for this criminal activity.
HISPANIC	A person of Mexican, Puerto Rican, Cuban, Central or South American, or other Spanish culture or origin, regardless of race.
JUVENILE	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, a person under the age of 18.
JUVENILE CLEARANCE	Those crimes where the offenders are identified as juveniles.

NIGHT	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, the hours from 6:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m.
NONVIOLENT CRIME	Consists of the following Index offenses: Burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft.
POPULATION	Is the year-round population of the municipality shown in the most recent State population estimates published by the Department of Labor, except that in the year of promulgation of a Federal decennial census, the census figures shall be used.
RESORT MUNICIPALITY	Is a municipality which, because of its recreational, entertainment or amusement characteristics or facilities or its close proximity to such characteristics or facilities, experiences a total increase during the seasonal period in the number of persons temporarily resident therein of 25 percent or more of its population.
SEASONAL POPULATION	Is the average of the estimated number of persons temporarily resident in the municipality during the three consecutive months when the temporary population is greatest.
TEMPORARY RESIDENT	Means the occupying for any period of time during the seasonal period by any person not counted as a resident of the municipality for population purposes of an accommodation in a rented residential unit or vacation home.
UNFOUNDED	Classification of reported crimes that are found to be false or baseless.
VIOLENT CRIME	Consists of the following Index offenses: Murder, rape, robbery, and aggravated assault.
WHITE	A person having origins in any of the original peoples of Europe, North Africa, or the Middle East.

CALCULATIONS OF RATES AND TRENDS

1. **Crime Rate per 1,000 inhabitants:** This represents the number of Index offenses per 1,000 inhabitants. For example: What is the crime rate for a municipality with 513 Index offenses (murder, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny-theft and motor vehicle theft), with a population of 8,280?

$$513 \text{ (Index offenses)} \div 8,280 \text{ (population)} = .061957 \times 1,000 = 62.0 \text{ (crime per 1,000 inhabitants)}$$

2. **Crime Trend:** A crime trend shows the extent to which crime increased or decreased. This is done by comparing a period of the current year with the same period of a previous year. For example: A municipality experienced 264 Index offenses in a previous year and 513 Index offenses in the current year. What is the percent of the increase?

$$513 \text{ (current year Index offenses)} - 264 \text{ (previous year Index offenses)} = 249 \text{ (numerical increase)}$$
$$249 \text{ (numerical increase)} \div 264 \text{ (previous year)} = .943 \times 100 = +94\% \text{ (percent change)}$$

NOTE: If there were more Index offenses in a previous year than in the current year, we would have a percentage decrease.

3. **Number of Police personnel per 1,000 inhabitants:** This is calculated in the same manner as a crime rate. For example: A municipality with a population of 8,280 and 28 police personnel. How many officers are there per 1,000 population?

$$28 \text{ (police personnel)} \div 8,280 \text{ (population)} = .00338 \times 1,000 = 3.4 \text{ (police personnel per 1,000 inhabitants)}$$

NOTE: This formula can be applied to either total police personnel or just police officers per 1,000 inhabitants.

4. **Police Assaulted Rate:** This is calculated at a rate per 100 police officers. For example: A municipality with 25 officers had five of them assaulted during the month. What is the police assaulted rate?

$$5 \text{ (police officers assaulted)} \div 25 \text{ (police officers)} = .2 \times 100 = 20 \text{ (police assaulted per 100 officers)}$$

5. **Clearance Rate:** This refers to the percent of Index offenses cleared (solved), over a specific period of time. For example: A municipality with 513 Index offenses in a chosen time frame, cleared 95 of these offenses. What is the clearance rate?

$$95 \text{ (Index offenses cleared)} \div 513 \text{ (Index offenses)} = .185 \times 100 = 18.5 \text{ (percent cleared)}$$

6. **Annual Mean Population:** Is determined for each municipality designated a resort municipality by use of the following formula:

$$AMP = \frac{12P + 3SP}{12}$$

Where **AMP** equals Annual Mean Population; **P** equals Population; **SP** equals Seasonal Population.
