### **RESOLUTION 2023-30**

## REQUESTING AN ALLOCATION OF A PORTION OF THE NEW JERSEY WATERSHED MORATORIUM AID FOR HIGHLANDS MUNICIPALITIES THAT QUALIFY BUT ARE NOT CURRENTLY RECEIVING AID

**WHEREAS,** the Highlands Water Protection and Planning Act (Highlands Act), N.J.S.A. 13:20-1 et seq., created a public body corporate and politic with corporate succession known as the Highlands Water Protection and Planning Council (Highlands Council or Council); and

**WHEREAS**, the Highlands Act at N.J.S.A. 13:20-2 declares that the New Jersey Highlands is an essential source of drinking water, providing clean and plentiful drinking water for one-half of the State's population and contains exceptional natural resources such as clean air, contiguous forest lands, wetlands, pristine watersheds, and habitat for fauna and flora for the citizens of the State; and

**WHEREAS**, the Highlands Act at N.J.S.A. 13:20-2 further created a dedicated source of Watershed Moratorium Aid to compensate municipalities hosting watershed lands to offset the impacts to local taxes arising from the devaluation of watershed lands occasioned by the 1990 moratorium on any conveyance of watershed properties; and

WHEREAS, the intent of the enabling statute was both to allow for applications for aid and for an annual increase in the \$47/ per acre payment based upon the Consumer Price Index; and

**WHEREAS,** the N.J.S.A. 54:1-85 et seq. created the Highlands Municipal Property Tax Stabilization Board and Fund whose duties included allocating aid each year; and

**WHEREAS**, there are currently eight (8) Highlands municipalities that have watershed lands but do not receive any watershed aid. The estimated aid is reflected in the below table:

**WHEREAS**, the Highlands Municipal Property Tax Stabilization Board currently has no members leaving the above towns with no ability to apply for aid; and

**WHEREAS**, the Council is the lead state agency qualified to oversee the application for and allocation of Watershed Moratorium Aid; and

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** that the Highlands Council hereby authorizes the Executive Director to request that the legislature amend the current legislation to authorize the New Jersey Highlands Council to oversee applications for and allocation of Watershed Moratorium Aid; and

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**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED,** that as an alternative to a legislative change, the Governor appoint the necessary members to the Highlands Municipal Property Tax Stabilization Board.
