STATE SCHOOL TAX.

The State School Tax, amounting to two million one hundred and ninety-six thousand two hundred and forty dollars (\$2,196,240), has been received and disbursed to the several counties of the State in accordance with the apportionment of the State Comptroller.

LOAN TO THE SCHOOL FUND.

There was transferred from the State Fund to the School Fund the sum of eighty thousand dollars (\$80,000), to meet the deficiency in the appropriation for the support of Free Public Schools, and subsequently returned to the State Fund from the income of the School Fund.

AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE FUND.

The Agricultural College Fund amounts to one hundred and sixteen thousand dollars (\$116,000), consisting of eighty-four thousand four hundred dollars (\$84,400) in New Jersey War bonds and a certificate of indebtedness of the State of New Jersey for thirty-one thousand six hundred dollars (\$31,600). Interest on the war bonds, amounting to five thousand and sixty-four dollars (\$5,064) has been received and disbursed for the maintenance of Rutgers Scientific School. Interest on the certificate of indebtedness amounting to one thousand five hundred and eighty dollars (\$1,580), made payable from the State Fund, has also been disbursed for the maintenance of Rutgers Scientific School, making the total amount paid to said school for the fiscal year, six thousand six hundred and forty-four dollars (\$6,644).

UNITED STATES APPROPRIATION TO AGRICULTURAL COLLEGES.

The United States Appropriation to Agricultural Colleges, amounting to twenty two thousand dollars (\$22,000), has been received and disbursed in accordance with an act of the Congress of the United States approved August 30, 1890.

UNITED STATES APPROPRIATION FOR DISABLED SOLDIERS.

Under an act of the Congress of the United States entitled "An act to provide aid to State and Territorial homes for the support of disabled soldiers and sailors of the United States," approved August 27, 1888, the Treasurer of this State has received from the Treasurer of the United States forty-three thousand seven hundred and thirty-two dollars and five cents (\$43,732.05), and said amount has been paid to the Treasurer of the Home for Disabled Soldiers of New Jersey.

SALE OF REAL ESTATE

The Board of Trustees for the Support of Public Schools have sold during the year the Chas M. Dally farm, in township of Woodbridge, county of Middlesex, for \$8,000—\$4,000 in cash and \$4,000 on bond and mortgage.

OFFICE OF THE CLERK IN CHANCERY.

Under the provisions of an act of the Legislature, approved March 5, 1896, the fees received by the Clerk of the Court of Chancery are turned into the Treasury. The total receipts from this source for the seven months, since the law became operative has been twenty-two thousand eight hundred and fifteen dollars and eight cents (\$22,815.08), and the total disbursements for salaries and other expenses of the office, fifteen thousand four hundred and twenty-four dollars and fifty-one cents (\$15.424.51), leaving a net balance of seven thousand three hundred and ninety dollars and fifty-seven cents (\$7,390.57). The amount received is entered to account of Official Fees.
