MINUTES

STATE OF NEW JERSEY
GENERAL ASSEMBLY

TUESDAY, January 13, 1981.

At 12 o'clock noon, Tuesday, January 13, 1981, Speaker Christopher J. Jackman of Hudson County, called to order the second annual session of the One Hundred and Ninety-ninth Session of the General Assembly (the twenty-eighth under the Constitution adopted by the people in 1947) by reading the following call:

"This being the second Tuesday of January, the time fixed for the beginning of the Legislative year, the General Assembly of the State of New Jersey is now called to order."

Prayer was offered by Sister Carmela Marie Cristianoa, Sisters of Charity, North Hudson's Children's Center, West New York, New Jersey.

The Speaker led in the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

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The Speaker announced:

Notice of and the calendar for this session of the General Assembly having been sent to the members of the General Assembly, the Secretary of State and the State House Press and posted in accordance with the open public meetings law, I declare the General Assembly to be in session.

The Clerk began to read the minutes of the previous meeting. Mr. Karcher moved that the reading of the minutes be dispensed with, which motion was adopted.

The Clerk then read and the General Assembly passed resolutions of welcome, condolences, commendation and recognition.

Mr. Karcher offered the following resolution, which was read by the Clerk and adopted:

Resolved, That the Speaker appoint forthwith a committee of six to wait upon the Governor and inform him that the General Assembly has organized the second annual session of the One Hundred and Ninety-ninth Session of the General Assembly of New Jersey and has proceeded to business.

1981 GENERAL ASSEMBLY

Organizational Resolution

Resolved, 1. That the Clerk of the General Assembly be directed to inform the Senate that the General Assembly has organized the second annual session of the One Hundred and Ninety-ninth Session of the General Assembly and has proceeded to business.

2. That the Speaker be and is hereby authorized to appoint such assistants as he may deem necessary.

3. That the working staff of the General Assembly shall at all times be subject to the direction of the Speaker and the Clerk, who shall have authority to designate to any member of the staff such duties as may be required.

That the "Manual for Use in Drafting Legislation for Introduction in the New Jersey Legislature," prepared and published by the Legislative Services Commission, be adopted as the official manual of practice and procedure of the General Assembly governing the form of bills to be introduced and amendments proposed in the General Assembly and governing the conduct of the preliminary examination of bills proposed for introduction and amendments adopted in the General Assembly required by the Rules of the General Assembly; and

In order to carry out said practice and procedure, H. Arthur Smith, Jr., Mary Joan Dickson, Walter R. Kennedy, Maurice E. Gold, Gertrude Erman, Albert Porroni, Leonard J. Lawson and Victoria P. Lawler of the Division of Legal Services be designated as counsel to conduct a preliminary examination of bills proposed for introduction and amendments adopted in the General Assembly under the general supervision of the Legislative Counsel.

9. That each member of the General Assembly be authorized to retain up to six aides at a total compensation per member as authorized by law.

10. That the Speaker may authorize more than six aides.

11. That the Rules of the 1978 General Assembly, as amended, be adopted temporarily as the Rules for 1981.

January 13, 1981. }

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 1023

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(a) of the Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 1023, without my approval.

This bill would permit an active member in good standing of a volunteer fire company or a volunteer first aid or rescue squad to display emergency warning lights on any motor vehicle operated by him. Under present law, a volunteer is only permitted to display emergency warning lights on a motor vehicle which is owned by him or a member of his household.

The apparent purpose of the bill as indicated by the sponsor's statement is to permit a volunteer to display emergency warning lights on a motor vehicle registered in the name of a business or church, or a charitable or other non-profit corporation. Despite the stated intent of the bill, the actual language of the legislation would permit the use of emergency warning lights on any vehicle operated by a volunteer. This could include a car owned by a friend or even several cars owned by several friends. It may be advisable to relax the law in order to permit the use of emergency lights on a company-owned car operated by a volunteer on a regular basis or in similar circumstances. However, this bill goes too far in permitting the use of

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emergency lights on any vehicle or vehicles at the discretion of a volunteer.

There is, therefore, no need for further consideration of Assembly Bill No. 1023.

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 819 (*2nd Official Copy Reprint*)

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(b) of the Constitution, I am returning Assembly Bill No. 819 (2nd Official Copy Reprint) with my objections, for reconsideration.

This bill would establish in the Department of Health a highly regulated program for research into the therapeutic use of certain Schedule I controlled dangerous substances in certain situations. Only those substances which have been approved by the Bureau of Drugs in the Food and Drug Administration may be utilized in the State's program.

The purpose of the bill is to provide some relief for patients involved in life-threatening situations, such as cancer, where the drugs administered have severe side effects.

I believe that this bill merits enactment, however I am concerned about certain technical defects. The bill does not clearly provide the Commissioner of Health the authority to require patients desiring to participate in the program to release their medical records or follow-up reports. In addition, the bill fails to provide safeguards to an individual's privacy regarding such records. Finally, the bill does not clearly require participating physicians to submit follow-up reports. This lack of clarity may create unnecessary litigation.

Accordingly, I am returning Assembly Bill No. 819 (2nd Official Copy Reprint) for reconsideration and recommend that it be amended as follows:

Page 2, section 4, line 10: Insert after "act": ", including but not limited to rules and regulations which may be necessary to require patients desiring certification pursuant to section 5 of this act to release their medical records for the purpose of certification and follow-up reports."

Page 2, section 4, line 18: Insert new subsection:

"c. The names and medical records of individual patients who have either requested certification or have been certified pursuant to section 5 of this act shall not be released

in any form which identifies the individual, except that the names and records of such individuals shall be made available upon request for use in the enforcement of laws regarding controlled dangerous substances (P. L. 1970, c. 226; C. 24:21-1 et seq.).”

Page 3, section 7, line 1: Insert as section 7 and renumber sections 7-10 accordingly:

“7. Participating practitioners shall submit to the commissioner reports on the use of Schedule I controlled dangerous substances received by their patients pursuant to this act.”

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 2040

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(b) of the Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 2040 with my recommendations for amendment.

This bill would permit property owners whose drinking water supply has been contaminated by a discharge of a hazardous substance to make a claim against the Spill Compensation Fund for restoration or replacement of that water supply source notwithstanding that the discharge may have occurred prior to the effective date of the “Spill Compensation Act” (P. L. 1976, c. 141).

The immediate purpose of the bill is to assist homeowners in Jackson Township whose wells have been contaminated by toxic wastes from a nearby landfill. I believe these homeowners and others similarly situated should receive such governmental aid to cope with these health hazards.

This bill as passed, however, would permit claims by public or private water purveyors which could deplete the Fund and leave nothing to recompense single-family home-

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owners. Claims on the Fund have been so great that since October of this year, the Fund has been in a statutory deficit position—pending reasonable claims have exceeded Fund balances. The Department of Treasury has been working with the Department of Environmental Protection on a controlled spending basis to enable continuing cleanup of the two most urgent spills, while also assuring adequate funds for sizeable obligations already incurred. At this time, a new responsibility should not be imposed on the Fund unless balances are first allowed to accrue to a prudent level or new funding is provided.

I would suggest amendments in order to match the reach of A-2040 with the resources of the Fund. The amendments would limit the Fund availability to private residential wells and limit payments to \$500,000 per year. These changes would direct this new Fund assistance to Jackson Township and similar cases. A technical change also would require the Department of Environmental Protection to consider its cleanup spending priorities.

Accordingly, I am returning Assembly Bill No. 2040 and recommend it be amended as follows:

Page 3, Section 1, Line 100: after “department” insert “after considering, among any other relevant factors, its priorities for spending funds pursuant to P. L. 1976, c. 141.”.

Page 3, Section 1, Line 102: after “of” insert “, or connection to an alternative water supply for,”.

Page 3, Section 1, Line 102: after “private” delete “or public” and insert “residential”.

Page 3, Section 1, Lines 102 and 103: after “well” delete “or other potable water supply source”.

Page 3, Section 1, Line 104: delete “.” and insert “. provided however total payments for said purpose shall not exceed \$500,000 for the period between the effective date of the subsection (e) and January 1, 1983, and in any calendar year thereafter.”.

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 2239 (OCR)

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(b) of the Constitution I am returning Assembly Bill No. 2239 (OCR) with my objection, for reconsideration.

This bill would provide a process for the State to assist financially distressed general hospitals to improve their financial and management capabilities. The bill provides for the Governor to appoint an interim board of managers and for the State to provide assistance for any general hospital which has been determined to be financially distressed by the Commissioner of Health.

I am in accord with the purpose of this bill. However, the bill was amended to provide for the advice and consent of the Senate in the Governor's appointment of an interim board of managers. While I have no argument with this provision because it is important for the interim board of managers to have full local political support, I believe that the period of advice and consent should be limited to 45 days. I believe that a time limitation is particularly necessary in this instance because an interim board of managers will only be appointed in cases of financial distress which require immediate remedial action.

Accordingly, I am returning Assembly Bill No. 2239 (OCR) for reconsideration and recommend that it be amended as follows:

Page 6, section 4, line 84: Insert after "Senate": "; provided, however, that if no action has been taken within 45 days after the nominations for appointment have been submitted to the Senate, the nominations shall be deemed confirmed".

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 679

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(b) of the Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 679 with my objections, for reconsideration.

This bill would amend L. 1972, c. 70, Section 6 (C. 39:6A-6) to include as a deductible collateral source of personal injury protection benefits, those benefits provided under Federal Law to active and retired military personnel. An insurer deducts certain collateral source benefits from the personal injury protection benefits it would otherwise provide. The bill is intended to allow the Commissioner of Insurance to reduce premiums paid by military personnel.

The bill has one minor flaw that should be corrected. Under current law, the deductible collateral sources need only be "collectible." Thus, for example, whether or not an injured party in fact chooses to collect worker's compensation benefits, the benefits paid by the insurer are reduced by the amount the insured could collect in theory. See *Wagner v. Transamerica Insurance Co.*, 167 N. J. Super. 25, 33 (App. Div. 1979), certif. den. 81 N. J. 60 (1979). However, in some cases it may be inconvenient or undesirable for military personnel to obtain federally provided medical benefits. Consequently, the bill should clearly provide that such Federally provided benefits should be deemed a deductible collateral source only in the case in which such benefits are actually collected.

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Accordingly, I respectfully recommend the following change in Assembly Bill No. 679:

Line 8, Delete "or benefits" and Insert "and benefits, in fact collected, that are".

WHEREAS, On January 22, 1981, Senate No. 1560 (OCR) was transmitted by the Senate to the General Assembly for reconsideration; now, therefore,

Be It Resolved by the General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

That pursuant to Article V. Section I, paragraph 14 of the New Jersey Constitution, this House upon reconsideration, the objections of the Governor to the contrary notwithstanding, agrees to pass Senate No. 1560 (OCR).

STATEMENT

Senate No. 1560 (OCR) amends and supplements the Administrative Procedure Act (C. 52:14B-1 et seq.) to accomplish the following purposes:

- to provide for the disapproval of proposed administrative rules and the suspension of existing rules by the Legislature.
- to ensure agency accountability to the public in rule-making actions and to promote public participation in rule-making proceedings.

The first purpose is met through the provisions of sections 1 through 9. The bill requires executive agencies to submit proposed rules to the Legislature for committee review. If, within 60 days of submission, the Legislature adopts a concurrent resolution disapproving the rule, the proposal is barred from taking effect. The Legislature also may extend the review period for up to 60 additional days. These provisions do not apply in the case of emergency rules or rules required by the Federal government. The bill further provides for the establishment of a Joint Legislative Oversight Committee, which, among other duties, is empowered to review existing rules (but not those in existence prior to the effective date of the act). The Legislature may by concurrent resolution suspend existing rules for 60 days.

Sections 10 and 11 of the bill provide numerous changes in the procedures to be followed by executive agencies in conducting rule-making proceedings. The bill requires an agency to describe the expected socioeconomic impact of a proposed rule; increases the comment period from 20 to 30 days; requires an agency to conduct a public hearing on a proposed rule at the request of the Legislature or other government agency; mandates an agency to prepare a report on comments received and the agency's response; requires gubernatorial concurrence prior to the adoption of an imminent peril rule and restricts the rule to an effective period of 60 days (unless extended by the Legislature for an extra 60 days); and sets guidelines for agency notices

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of intent with respect to a proposed rule-making and for the handling of petitions from the public for the initiation of a rule-making proceeding.

This action to override the Governor's veto of Senate No. 1560 (OCR) is based upon the following considerations:

— The veto message focused only on the issue of the legislative disapproval of rules and thereby gave tacit approval to those major provisions of the bill which are designed to promote a more accessible and responsive rule-making process.

— There is ample precedent in New Jersey law and in legislative action pursuant to the law to support both the concept and practicability of the legislative veto of rules.

— The court cases cited in the Governor's veto message do not support the conclusion that the legislative disapproval of rules is an unconstitutional concept.

— The Legislature's desire to retain a degree of jurisdiction over the implementation of administrative rules which seek to interpret or implement legislative policy (and which are invested with the force of law) is a legislative prerogative and is an appropriate means to safeguard the public interest against the adoption of rules which are not in accord with legislative intent and which would not be approved by the Legislature if put in the form of a bill.

1. The Governor's veto message was directed entirely towards that aspect of this bill that provides for the legislative veto of administrative rules. It was silent on those other provisions which seek to improve the rule-making process. The necessity for these improvements was amply documented in the report of the Assembly Legislative Oversight Committee, *Eye on the Executive*, issued in December, 1977. Since the adoption of the Administrative Procedure Act in 1968, vast changes in the structure, size and function of government, as well as the increased scope and complexity of issues in the public arena, have rendered the minimal procedural safeguards of the act ineffective in promoting an open, fair and responsive administrative rule-making process. Further evidence of the need for a more rigorous procedure is provided in the current efforts of the National Conference of the Commissioners on Uniform State Laws to develop a revised model Administrative Procedure Act. Additionally, the Office of Administrative Law has recently

proposed significant changes in its own requirements for the processing of rules.

That the Governor has offered neither constitutional, philosophical nor practical objections to the provisions of sections 10 and 11 of Senate No. 1560 is taken as an indication of his concurrence with their promulgation as State policy. There is no reasonable expectation that any of these provisions would be found unconstitutional.

2. The Governor vetoed Senate No. 1560 on the grounds that the procedure to permit the Legislature to prohibit or suspend rules was "an unconstitutional encroachment by the Legislative Branch upon the Executive" and "an attempt to aggregate power" by the Legislature in contravention of the separation of powers doctrine of the State Constitution. The Governor stated in his message that "it is my opinion that all legislative actions other than internal organization of the Legislature, expressions of sentiment, constitutional proposals (N. J. Const. Art. IX), or legislative response to executive reorganization plans (N. J. S. A. 52:14C-1 et seq.) are subject to gubernatorial veto." In support of his position, the Governor cited the State case of *Brown v. Heymann* 62 NJ 1 (1972) and the Federal case of *Chada v. Immigration and Naturalization Service*, No. 77-1702, U. S. Court of Appeals, Ninth Circuit (1980).

These findings overlook the fact there is ample precedent in support of the concept of the Legislative veto in New Jersey. At least twelve New Jersey laws — all enacted since 1969 and all with the signature of the Governor — contain provisions which permit the Legislature to veto rules or actions of Executive agencies by adoption of a concurrent resolution. All but one of these statutes were enacted during the administration of the Governor who now claims that the legislative veto is an unconstitutional intrusion into the affairs of the Executive Branch. The Governor never conditionally vetoed any of these laws in order to delete the offending provision.

These laws are: The Executive Reorganization Act (P. L. 1969, c. 203), the Public School Education Act (P. L. 1975, c. 212), the Water Pollution Control Act (P. L. 1977, c. 74), the Department of Energy Act (P. L. 1977, c. 146), the Safe Drinking Water Act (P. L. 1977, c. 224), the New Jersey Wild and Scenic Rivers Act (P. L. 1977, c. 236), the New Jersey Higher Education Tuition Act (P. L. 1977, c. 344),

the Garden State Scholarship Act (P. L. 1977, c. 345), the Beach and Harbors Appropriation (P. L. 1978, c. 157), the Pharmaceutical Assistance Program (P. L. 1978, c. 171), Minimum Standards in the Sale of Health Insurance (P. L. 1979, c. 78), and the New Jersey Public Transportation Act (P. L. 1979, c. 150).

Not only has the legislative veto been incorporated into the text of a dozen major laws, but it has actually been used to disapprove executive agency actions on at least three occasions (ACR-3037 of 1979, SCR-110 of 1980 and SCR-113 of 1980). Yet in the only court challenge involving the existence or application of the legislative veto and the one cited by the Governor (*Brown v. Heymann*), the New Jersey Supreme Court upheld the validity of the law.

3. This case involved a challenge to the Executive Reorganization Act. Under this act, an executive reorganization plan must be submitted to the Legislature and cannot take effect if, within 60 days, the Legislature adopts a concurrent resolution of disapproval. The law was challenged on the grounds that any action that has the effect of the law must be implemented with the formality of a bill, and that adoption of a reorganization plan in the absence of a positive legislative direction (i.e. a bill) constituted an encroachment of the Executive Branch upon the powers of the Legislative Branch. The Court refuted the challenge and upheld the law.

Thus, on a case which went to the heart of whether certain actions could or could not be initiated (and also suspended) on the basis of a legislative vehicle that fell short of a formal bill, the New Jersey Supreme Court gave no hint that the Constitution prohibited such an approach. The Chief Justice also noted in the ruling that it is a legislative decision as to how much power it may wish to delegate to an agency.

The other case cited by the Governor in support of his position involved a recent decision by the Ninth Circuit of the U. S. Supreme Court of Appeals which held unconstitutional a provision of the Immigration and Naturalization Act that permits one house of Congress to overturn an **Attorney General's** decision to suspend the deportation of an alien. Nothing in this case, however, parallels the legislative veto provisions of S-1560. The case did not involve an administrative rule, but rather a decision emanating from a quasi-judicial proceeding before a hearing officer. The Court was concerned with a legislative interference in a

quasi-judicial and enforcement function. Further, the case concerned the substantive legal rights of an individual. In essence, the matter involved what in this State would constitute a legislative intrusion into an individual contested case, such as when a hearing is held to determine whether a person's driver's license should be revoked. Nothing in S-1560 can be read to imply that the Legislature is claiming or desires to claim the authority to intervene in contested cases. The veto provision is applicable only to administrative rules — those agency statements that implement or interpret policy as established by the Legislature.

4. Given the current climate of concern regarding the nature and scope of administrative rules, it is perhaps astonishing to note that a little more than a decade ago each agency was free to adopt rules in any manner it wished and rules were neither published nor codified. Today there is widespread public concern that bureaucratically conceived rules are prohibiting, permitting, prescribing, promoting, protecting or punishing aspects of our social, cultural or economic behavior in ways that may be neither desired nor desirable. The suspicion that many of these rules may be unreasonable, arbitrary, capricious, inconsistent with legislative intent or beyond the scope of an agency's authority has prompted many states to adopt some form of procedure for the legislative review of regulations.

In this State, the Constitution is strikingly silent as to the procedures to be employed in the promulgation of a rule. It states merely that rules shall be effective upon filing and that the Legislature may prescribe the manner of filing. If the Legislature has the power to set forth the manner of rule adoption through enactment of the Administrative Procedure Act, or by limitations as to the effective date or length of time a rule may be in effect, it is logical to conclude that it can validly require a rule to be subject to legislative review prior to taking effect. In the case of a proposed rule, a Legislative disapproval by concurrent resolution does not even raise the issue as to whether the Legislature is engaging in a law-making function without the enactment of a formal bill. No law is being enacted; rather, a proposed policy is being debated and denied. There is no reason to assume that a Legislative review by concurrent resolution that is valid in the case of an executive reorganization plan, as the Governor agrees, would not be valid in other situations.

The Legislature can grant an agency great latitude in the scope and nature of the rules it may adopt in implementing a law or conversely, can adopt a law with such specificity of detail that an agency has little or no administrative leeway in carrying out its mandate. That the Legislature permits an agency some discretion does not imply a complete abdication of legislative responsibility to ensure that the law is implemented in accordance with legislative intent. Considering the relative ease with which a rule can be put into effect as compared with the more complex process of enacting statute, it is clear that safeguards are necessary to ensure that rules are not advanced which, if they were subject to the legislative process, would not attain the consent of the majority in both Houses. The irony of the argument that a legislative vote bypasses the constitutional provisions regarding the enactment of law is that rule-making itself (which gives the force of law to agency pronouncements) is completely void of any of the constitutional requirements or safeguards that apply to the enactment of legislation.

Legislative review of rules need not assume the nature of an adversary proceeding between branches of government. Just as the enactment of legislation is a partnership between the Legislative and Executive Branch, so can the rule-making process be. The review of rules should neither unduly delay program implementation nor provide a forum for private or parochial interests to shape government programs to their particular liking. Rather, it should forge a useful and necessary partnership to restore the public's confidence, pride and support of their government. As Chief Weintraub noted in *Brown v. Heymann*, "... there is no bar to cooperative action among the branches of government."

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 3034

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(b) of the Constitution, I am returning Assembly Bill No. 3034, with my objections for reconsideration.

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Assembly Bill No. 3034 would validate the past treatment of urban aid in regard to the municipal budget expenditure restrictions set forth in P. L. 1976, c. 68. In addition, the bill provides that in the future urban aid funds are to be treated with respect to P. L. 1976, c. 68 in the same manner that they were treated in 1980. Thus, we must look to the treatment of urban aid in 1980 to determine the rule this bill would impose on future budgets.

In 1980, with two exceptions, all of our urban aid municipalities expended urban aid within the budget limitations of P. L. 1976, c. 68 and included urban aid appropriations in the calculation of the expenditure limitations of that statute. This bill would permit those municipalities to continue that practice. I have no problems with that portion of the bill.

In 1980, two municipalities followed language in the appropriations act that permitted urban aid to be expended outside the spending limitations of P. L. 1976, c. 68 and yet include 1979 appropriations of urban aid in their 1980 spending limitation. A literal reading of this bill would permit this practice to continue, namely permitting the spending limitations to increase each year by the amount of urban aid expended outside those limitations. Such a policy is not needed in view of the exclusion of urban aid from the spending limitations. To avoid this effect, yet preserve the benefit these municipalities received in 1980, I would (1) permit these municipalities to continue to expend urban aid outside the cap, (2) prohibit a reduction in their existing spending limitations by any amount of urban aid received in the past, and (3) prohibit their spending limitations to be augmented by any additional appropriations of urban aid.

A final point to resolve is the treatment of urban aid funds received by a municipality for the first time in 1981 or thereafter. In order to treat those newly qualifying municipalities similar to present urban aid municipalities, I recommend the following. In the first year that urban aid funds are received, they may be expended outside the spending limitations of P. L. 1976, c. 68. The next year and each year thereafter appropriations of urban aid funds are to be included in the municipality's final appropriations for the purpose of calculating its spending limitations, and urban aid funds are to be expended within those spending limitations.

Accordingly, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 3034 for reconsideration and recommend that it be amended as follows:

Page 1, Section 1, Line 7: After "1980" insert "with the following exception. Any municipality which: (a) included a 1979 appropriation of urban aid funds within its 1980 final appropriations for the purposes of calculating its spending limitations pursuant to P. L. 1976, c. 68 (C. 40A:4-45.1 et seq.); and, (b) expended urban aid funds as an exception to the spending limitation in its 1980 budget, shall not include appropriations of urban aid funds made in 1980 or any year thereafter in its final appropriations for the purpose of calculating its spending limitations in its 1981 or any subsequent budget.

2. Any municipality which initially receives urban aid funds in 1981 or any year thereafter may expend those funds as an exception to the spending limitations of P. L. 1976, c. 68 (C. 40A:4-45.1 et seq.) in the initial year such funds are received. In each year following that initial year, appropriations of urban aid funds shall be included in the municipality's final appropriations for the purpose of calculating its spending limitations and shall not be expended as an exception to those spending limitations."

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(b) of the Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 1354 (2nd OCR) with my objections.

This bill would revise outdated dam and reservoir statutes to require periodic inspections and reports to the Department of Environmental Protection of all dams of environmental consequence. In addition, the bill would generally modernize and update the statutory law.

While the environmental protection aspects of the legislation appear worthwhile, the Legislature has included a provision for legislative oversight. All rules adopted by the Commissioner of Environmental Protection to implement this act would have to be submitted to the Legislature. If the Legislature passed a concurrent resolution within 60 days of submittal disapproving a rule, it would not take effect.

I see no need in the context of this legislation to elaborate on my continuing opposition to legislative oversight and would just refer to my statement on vetoing Senate Bill No. 1560 of this session.

Accordingly, I recommend that Assembly Bill No. 1354 (2nd OCR) be amended as follows:

Pages 1 and 2, Section 3, Lines 1-15: Omit in their entirety.

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(b) of the Constitution, I am returning Assembly Bill No. 773 (2nd OCR), with my objections for reconsideration.

This bill would prohibit an encumbrance or recovery of any kind from being imposed against or sought from the estate of a deceased person who had received benefits under the "Pharmaceutical Assistance to the Aged" (P.A.A.) program, except for assistance incorrectly or illegally paid or for third-party liability recoveries.

Since 1969, the Department of Human Services has been recovering payments correctly made to Medicaid recipients from their estates where there is no surviving spouse or child in order to conserve and replenish taxpayer funds after the recipient or his immediate family no longer require assistance. Last year, the Department attempted to institute the same recovery system in the case of P.A.A. recipients. This bill was introduced in order to prevent such action.

While I believe that the State should not recover benefits paid where there is a surviving spouse or child; given the limited taxpayer funds available to the State to satisfy a multitude of competing needs, I believe the State has an obligation to the taxpayers to recover benefits paid where there is no surviving immediate family and an estate is to be divided among degrees of relations and debtors. In addition, while I agree that the State should not attempt to recover benefits where either the amount to be recovered or the estate is insubstantial, I cannot agree with the principle that we should recover from the estates of our least fortunate citizens who are receiving Medicaid benefits but not from the estates of P.A.A. beneficiaries who may have far greater annual incomes and assets.

Therefore, I am returning A-773 (2nd OCR) with the recommendation that it be amended to preclude recovery from the estates of both P.A.A. and Medicaid recipients where the amount to be recovered is less than \$500 or the

extent of the estate is less than \$3,000 or there is a surviving spouse or child.

Accordingly, I recommend that A-773 (2nd OCR) be amended as follows:

Page 1, Title, Line 2: After "and"], insert "medical and health services and".

Page 1, Title, Line 4: After "413.]" delete entirely, insert "1968, c. 413."

Page 1, Section 1, Line 6: After "[the]", insert "'Medical Assistance and Health Services Act,' P. L. 1968, c. 413 (C. 30:4D-1 et seq.) or the".

Page 1, Section 1, Line 9: After "act", insert ", if the amount sought to be recovered is less than \$500.00 or the estate is less than \$3,000.00 or there is a surviving spouse or child".

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 1351

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, paragraph 14(b) of the Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 1351 with my objections.

This bill would exempt all contingent pensions and annuities payable to eligible beneficiaries from the transfer inheritance tax, regardless of whether the source of the pension or annuity was public or private employment. The present law exempts from the transfer inheritance tax contingent annuities payable to eligible beneficiaries of persons who were retired from employment in the public sector.

More specifically, contingent annuities under the New Jersey public pension system are exempt (P. L. 1954, c. 54, § 53, C. 43:15A-53). Also exempt are pensions of civil service employees of the United States Government (R. S. 54:34-4h). This year the exemption was further extended to military service pensions (Chapter 38, Laws of 1978, amended R. S. 54:34-4i).

There appears to be no theoretical justification for the distinction between the treatment of public and private pension benefits with regard to the inheritance tax. It is a current tax for a deferred receipt. Many, perhaps most states, exempt all pension benefits, including private ones, which qualify under federal law. These states include New York, Connecticut, Delaware and California. Yet while New Jersey faces a severe fiscal crisis, there is no need to extend the exemption beyond the needs of surviving spouses under plans qualified as exempt under the Internal Revenue Code. To do otherwise would permit unscrupulous personal incorporators to establish private annuities to avoid a reasonable tax.

Accordingly, I recommend the following amendment:

Page 3, Lines 73 through 78: After "j." delete in its entirety and insert new section "The value of any pension, annuity, retirement allowance or return of contributions, regardless of the source, which is a direct result of the decedent's employment under a qualified plan as defined by section 401 (a), (b) and (c) or 2039 (c) of the Internal Revenue Code, payable to a surviving spouse, and otherwise exempted pursuant to this section or other law of the State of New Jersey."

REORGANIZATION PLAN FOR THE BUREAU OF FINANCIAL REGULATION AND ASSISTANCE

The Bureau of Financial Regulation and Assistance in the Department of the Treasury, together with all its functions, powers and duties, is hereby transferred to the Division of Local Government Services in the Department of Community Affairs. All powers exercised by officials in the Department of Treasury in direct supervision of the Bureau of Financial Regulation and Assistance are hereby transferred to the Department of Community Affairs and shall be exercised by officials in the Department of Community Affairs.

The Bureau of Financial Regulation and Assistance, as presently organized, reviews and certifies all municipal budgets, is responsible for post-audit review of municipal and county government, and provides financial guidance to local governments. The Division of Local Government Services in the Department of Community Affairs provides technical assistance to counties and municipalities in the areas of management, financial operations, purchasing, personnel, electronic data processing, debt management, inter-local services and State and Federal grants. The Division also administers the urban aid, safe and clean neighborhoods and depressed rural centers aid programs. The Department of Community Affairs is predominantly involved in local government programs and services. A closer organizational relationship between the Bureau and the other units of the Division and the Department is logical, efficient and will permit these agencies to better serve local governments and the public. This reorganization is consistent with local government budget laws which have assigned responsibilities to the Director of the Division of Local Government Services and the Local Finance Board in the Department of Community Affairs.

In accordance with the provisions of the Executive Reorganization Act of 1969, c. 203 (C. 52:14C-2), I find and declare that this transfer and reorganization is necessary:

1. To promote the more efficient management of the Executive Branch;
2. To reduce expenditures and promote economy to the fullest extent practicable;
3. To increase the efficiency of the operations of the Executive Branch to the fullest extent practicable;
4. To group, coordinate, and consolidate agencies and functions of the Executive Branch, as nearly as practicable, according to major purposes;
5. To eliminate overlapping and duplication of effort.

All acts and parts of acts inconsistent with any of the provisions of this reorganization plan are superseded to the extent of such inconsistencies. All transfers directed by this reorganization plan shall be effective pursuant to the "State Agency Transfer Act," P. L. 1971, c. 375 (C. 52:14D-1 et seq.).

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(b) of the Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 67 (OCR) with my objections for reconsideration.

This bill prohibits persons of legal age to purchase alcoholic beverages from bringing such beverages "on any property used for school purposes which is owned by any school or school board," absent express written authority. A violation of this provision would constitute a petty disorderly persons offense.

I believe this is sound public policy. However, the bill presents an anomaly which should be corrected.

Under *N. J. S. A.* 2C:33-15, persons under the legal age to purchase liquor are prohibited from possessing liquor "in any school . . .," among other places. Violations of this statute constitute disorderly persons offenses.

Since the legal age to purchase liquor is now 19, enactment of this bill in its present form would mean that (1) juvenile violators would be subject to delinquency proceedings under 2C:33-15a, a disorderly persons offense; (2) violators who are 18 years old would also be prosecuted for a disorderly persons offense under 2C:33-15a, while (3) violators who are 19 years of age or older would be prosecuted for a *petty* disorderly persons offense under this bill.

I therefore return herewith Assembly Bill No. 67 (OCR) for reconsideration and recommend that it be amended as follows:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, paragraph 14(b) of the Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 1311 (OCR) with my objections.

This bill would direct each State department to establish rules and regulations governing the use, distribution, manufacture, duplication and possession of keys designated to be used in locks in or on real property under its jurisdiction. Any person who violates such rules and regulations would be guilty of a disorderly persons offense. The bill also

when calculating the 50% payment of arrears. In my opinion, the appropriate figure to use is the sum of the arrears due at the commencement of the proceeding and those accumulated during the pendency of the action. One half of that sum must be paid or a mandatory execution will issue. My concern is that the bill could be construed as requiring execution of the full amount of a defendant's income until the arrears are paid. Such a result is inappropriate, and I recommend that the bill be amended to permit the court to require payments in such amounts and for such a period of time that the court deems appropriate.

My remaining concern is that the bill would have the effect of prohibiting execution where the 50% of the arrears had been paid. Thus, a party could continually be in arrears yet avoid execution by paying 50% of the arrears. The courts should have the discretion of imposing execution in such circumstances.

Accordingly, I return Assembly Bill No. 1668 (2nd OCR) for reconsideration and recommend that it be amended as follows:

Page 1, Section 1, Line 3: After "1." insert "a."

Page 1, Section 1, Line 5: Delete "and that the defendant has failed"

Page 1, Section 1, Line 6: Delete

Page 1, Section 1, Line 7: Delete

Page 1, Section 1, Line 7A: Delete "failure" delete "shall" and insert "may"

Page 1, Section 1, Line 14: Insert "b. In those proceedings where the defendant has failed to pay by the hearing date at least one half of the amount of arrears which were owed at the commencement of the action plus those accumulated during the pendency of the action and where the defendant has shown no good cause for this failure, the court shall grant an order directing that the execution shall issue. The execution shall be for such an amount determined by the court to assure payment over a reasonable period of time of the full amount of both the arrears payments and for the satisfaction of current support and maintenance payments notwithstanding any statutory limitation on executions issued against the wages, earnings, salary or other

income of judgment debtor and such execution shall have priority over any other executions.

This bill provides that pedestrians crossing intersections within crosswalks, whether marked or unmarked, shall have the right-of-way. In addition, this bill directs the Office of Highway Safety to conduct a public information campaign and a study to determine the most effective manner of implementation of the bill. Under present law, only pedestrians in marked crosswalks have the right-of-way.

Certain aspects of drivers and pedestrians responsibilities remain unclear in this bill.

Accordingly, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 1399 for reconsideration and recommend that it be amended as follows:

Page 2, Section 3, Line 10: After "yield." insert "Nothing contained herein shall relieve a pedestrian from using due care for his safety."

Page 2, Section 3, After Line 14: Add two new paragraphs
"Every pedestrian upon a roadway at any point other than within a marked crosswalk or within an unmarked

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(b) of the Constitution, I am returning Assembly Bill No. 2206 (OCR), with my objections for reconsideration.

This bill gives the Commissioner of Banking the authority to change certain license fees that he may charge regulated consumer lenders. Last year, he requested introduction of such a measure.

Before passing the bill, the Legislature added an amendment that requires the Commissioner to obtain approval from both the Assembly and Senate before he may change any of these fees. I have consistently expressed my opposition to amendments such as this one; moreover, the Attorney General has advised me that legislative oversight

amendments are an unconstitutional violation of the separation of powers doctrine.

I believe the oversight amendment is null and void.

Accordingly, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 2206 (OCR) for reconsideration and recommend that it be amended as follows:

Page 8, Section 13, Lines 1-13: Delete in its entirety.

Page 8, Section 14, Line 1: Delete "14" and insert "13".

For a relatively few additional parking spaces, this bill would create a potentially dangerous condition at stop sign intersections. Safety considerations must always override convenience.

Our crowded shore towns must devise and implement ride-sharing and shuttle bus programs to alleviate parking congestion. Diluting safety considerations is not the answer.

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(a) of the Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Joint Resolution No. 3017 without my approval.

This joint resolution would require the Department of Higher Education to appropriate to the Union County Technical Institute over \$400,000 in aid that is not properly due to the Institute under the applicable formula for State aid to county colleges.

A Department of Higher Education audit discovered that the Institute had overstated the size of its county college student population by about one third, or 605.5 full time equivalent students. As aid is awarded on the basis of student population, the Institute was slated to receive about one third, or \$416,942, more than it deserved in State aid.

The Department, with the concurrence of the Board of Higher Education, consequently withheld the final, fourth quarter installment of aid of \$328,606, offsetting most, but not all, of the error.

I cannot support this joint resolution which would compel the State to disregard, if not condone, a significant managerial error on the local level. State aid, from the Department of Education, has already been allocated to the Institute for more than 600 students. The students should not be counted twice. Instead, the funds withheld from the Institute by the Department of Higher Education should be redistributed, according to the existing formula, to the several county colleges in the State.

Lastly, I understand that Union County has already acted to appropriate to the Institute over \$500,000 in emergency funds. There is no need for the State to postpone implementation of its audit to allow the Institute to adjust its finances.

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 1417 (OCR)

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(b) of the Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 1417 (OCR) with my technical objection for reconsideration.

This bill amends, in various respects, the act creating the New Jersey Property Liability Insurance Guaranty Association, which assumes most obligations of insolvent property and liability insurers. See L. 1974, c. 17, sec. 8a. (C. 17:30A-8a.) The bill clarifies that the Guaranty Association does not protect insureds of insolvent surplus lines carriers in response to the Appellate Division decision in *Railroad Roofing & Bldg. Supply Co. v. Financial Fire & Casualty Co.*, 171 N. J. Super. 375 (App. Div. 1979) recently reversed by the Supreme Court March 26, 1981. The bill also clarifies that the Guaranty Association would stand in the shoes of insolvent insurers with respect not only to claims filed after the insurer has been declared insolvent, but also claims filed before insolvency but which claims had remained unpaid.

One technical defect remains, however. The Guaranty Association is now liable to pay up to \$300,000 for each

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covered claim. However, personal injury protection (PIP) benefits payable under "no fault" automobile insurance policies, are not subject to the ceiling. The bill states that such benefits paid in excess of \$75,000 shall be recoverable from the Unsatisfied Claim and Judgment Fund pursuant to P. L. 1977, c. 310. However, with respect to solvent insurers, the Fund only assumes the cost of one kind of PIP benefit exceeding \$75,000—medical expenses benefits. Other kinds of PIP benefits—income continuation, essential services, survival expenses and funeral expenses—are subject to statutory ceilings. P. L. 1972, c. 70, sec. 4b-e. The role of the Fund with respect to the Guaranty Association should be no different from its role with respect to solvent insurers.

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(b) of the Constitution, I am returning Assembly Bill No. 1427 with my objections, for reconsideration.

This bill would replace the Uniform Reciprocal Enforcement of Support Act adopted in 1950 with the Revised Uniform Reciprocal Enforcement of Support Act. These acts provide a mechanism for the enforcement of support orders when the parties reside in different jurisdictions. The revised version of the uniform law strengthens these procedures and eliminates many of the procedural and technical difficulties that have arisen under the current law. While I support most of these provisions in the revised law, a few adjustments are needed so that it will be more compatible with New Jersey's policies and procedures.

First, balancing the advantages and disadvantages of the criminal immunity provision in section 21, I have concluded that the provision should be deleted from the bill. Under this section no law enforcement official would have control over the decision of granting immunity. If the testimony in question involved an illegal source of income, immunity could still be granted. I note that five other states which have adopted this revision have deleted the criminal immunity provision from their statutes and I propose that New Jersey do the same.

In addition, two technical problems have been called to my attention which we can correct now. First, section 24 of the bill permits the county adjuster to send a certified copy of the order of support to a county adjuster in another county to complete enforcement of the order. From an administrative point of view, I am advised that it will be easier to maintain the present practice of making such transfers by court order. I propose that the bill be amended to do so. In addition, in order to provide a mechanism in that act for dealing with support orders entered by New Jersey Superior Court, Chancery Division, it has been suggested that the bill be amended to permit the Chancery Division support order to be docketed in the Juvenile and Domestic Relations Court and to serve as *prima facie* proof that a duty of support exists. In this way the benefits of the act can accrue to the holder of a Chancery Division support order.

In view of the above, I am returning Assembly Bill No. 1427 for your reconsideration and recommend the following changes:

Page 6, Section 21: Delete entire section.

Pages 6 to 10, Sections 22 to 39: Renumber as sections 21 to 38.

Page 7, Section 23 (formerly section 24) line 13: After "effective." insert "Before the County adjuster transfers an order to any other county adjuster for enforcement, he shall first obtain from the court an order permitting the transfer."

Page 10, before Section 40: Insert new section.

39. Notwithstanding any of the provisions of this Act, an obligee who has previously obtained a support order for support in the Superior Court of New Jersey shall be permitted to docket said support order in the Juvenile and Domestic Relations Court of the appropriate county, which Court shall then utilize said prior support order as constituting *prima facie* proof that a duty for support exists in the amount reflected in said prior support order.

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, paragraph 14(b) of the Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 1352 with my objections for reconsideration.

This bill requires the Commissioner of Education to provide in each of the State's 26 designated area libraries an optical scanner, which converts printed materials into synthetic speech for the benefit of the blind and visually impaired. Library personnel are to be trained in the proper use of the device. The bill appropriates \$550,000.00 to the Department of Education for this purpose.

While I support a program of providing optical scanners throughout the State, we do not have sufficient State revenues, in light of other demands, to fund the full amount of this supplemental appropriation. I recommend that we start with an appropriation of \$160,000.00. That sum should enable purchase of about seven such machines which I am advised is the minimum number necessary for a meaningful initiation of such a program. In addition, I would like to see more flexibility in fixing the location of such equipment and to require consultation with the Commission for the Blind and Visually Impaired in order to assure that the optical scanners are put in the most useful locations.

Accordingly, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 1352 for reconsideration and recommend that it be amended as follows:

Page 1, Section 1, line 1: After "Education", insert "after consultation with the Commission for the Blind and Visually Impaired."

Page 1, Section 1, line 2: Delete "each designated area library" and insert "designated area libraries or other public facilities accessible to the blind or visually impaired that may be appropriate."

Page 1, Section 1, line 5: Delete "library".

Page 1, Section 2, line 2: Delete "\$550,000" and insert "\$160,000".

To the Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, paragraph 14(b) of the Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 334, with my objections, for reconsideration.

This bill is the so-called "cross-burning" bill. It would require stiff penalties for those criminals who would make "terroristic threats" or desecrate churches, assembly

places or cemeteries by using a swastika or burning a cross in order to “cause fear . . . or create serious and imminent threat of causing such fear . . .”.

I am in full accord with the purposes of this bill. Our democratic society must not allow intimidation of racial, ethnic or religious groups by those who would use violence or would unlawfully vent their hatred. All members of racial, ethnic or religious groups must be able to participate in our society in freedom and with a full sense of security. This is what distinguishes America. And this is what this bill preserves.

After fully reviewing this bill, I believe that its purposes are constitutional. For instance, it is firmly settled that freedom of speech and assembly can be prohibited in narrow circumstances—e.g., where language causes “a clear and present danger”, *Schenk v United States*, 249 U.S. 47 (1919), where language constitutes “fighting words”, *Chaplinsky v. New Hampshire*, 315 U.S. 568 (1942), where language constitutes “obscenity”, *Gitlow v New York*, 268 U.S. 652 (1925), etc. As drafted, this bill only prohibits language “which causes fear . . . or creates serious and imminent threat of causing such fear . . .”. Accordingly, this comes within the “clear and present danger” exception, because the prescription goes to words or symbols which create or may create a situation where violence could erupt. Moreover, the bill’s scope is not void on due process grounds. Due process requires that statutes not be so vague as to afford defendants insufficient notice that certain conduct is proscribed and not allow enforcement officers to arrest people according to their personal preferences. *State v Zimmelman*, 62 N.J. 270, 290-291 (1972). This bill does give notice that the use of a swastika or a burning cross which “puts another in fear of violence” is illegal. The criterion of recklessly causing fear of unlawful bodily violence provides an objective standard and prevents law enforcement officers from arbitrarily selecting defendants on the basis of their personal preference. This statute is different from the Village of Skokie ordinance declared unconstitutional in *Collins v Smith*, 447 F. Supp. 676 (N.D. 111. 1978), *affd* 578 F. 2d 1197 (7th Cir. 1978), in that this statute proscribes actions leading to violence and acts of desecration whereas the ordinance in *Collins* proscribed political action by Neo-Nazis not designed to intimidate.

But while the concept of the bill is constitutional, I believe there are problems with the bill as drafted. For example, the bill requires that purposeful terror be a third degree crime and all other terror a fourth degree crime. This could put someone in jail from 3 to 5 years for a third degree crime and 18 months on a fourth degree. This is harsh, especially in light of the fact that Harassment (2C:33-4) is a petty disorderly persons offense and Criminal Mischief (2C:17-3) and Desecration of Venerated Objects (2C:33-9) are both disorderly persons offenses, all of which now can be used to sanction violence arising out of "cross-burnings". Also, this bill would allow an owner or his friends to burn a cross on the owner's property without regard to his neighbor's fear; this anomaly should be eliminated and the sanctions should apply to all who would intimidate by use of cross-burnings or a swastika. Finally, the bill presents prosecutors with difficult problems of proof, especially in cases involving not actual fear, but an act which "creates serious and imminent threat of causing... fear." For the question arises as to who will testify concerning the capacity of a particular act to cause fear.

Therefore, I have decided to return this bill to you with the recommendation that some changes need to be made to the bill before it is signed and becomes a law. I commend the sponsors for their efforts on this legislation. If re-drafted according to my recommendations below, I will sign this important and significant piece of legislation.

Accordingly, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 334 for reconsideration and recommend that the "assault" section of the penal code be amended as follows:

Page 1, Title, Line 1: Delete "terroristic threats," insert "racial, ethnic or religious desecration."

Page 1, Title, Line 2: Delete "2C:12-3" insert "2C:12-1 and N. J. S. 2C:33-9".

Pages 1-2, Section 1, Lines 1-31: Delete and insert new sections as follows:

"1. N. J. S. 2C:12-1 is amended to read as follows:

2C:12-1. Assault. a. Simple assault. A person is guilty of assault if he:

(1) Attempts to cause or purposely, knowingly or recklessly causes bodily injury to another; or

(2) Negligently causes bodily injury to another with a deadly weapon; or

(3) Attempts by physical menace to put another in fear of imminent serious bodily injury.

Simple assault is a disorderly persons offense unless committed in a fight or scuffle entered into by mutual consent, in which case it is a petty disorderly persons offense.

b. Aggravated assault. A person is guilty of aggravated assault if he:

(1) Attempts to cause serious bodily injury to another, or causes such injury purposely, knowingly or recklessly under circumstances manifesting extreme indifference to the value of human life; or

(2) Attempts to cause or purposely or knowingly causes bodily injury to another with a deadly weapon; or

(3) Recklessly causes bodily injury to another with a deadly weapon; or

(4) Knowingly under circumstances manifesting extreme indifference to the value of human life points a firearm, as defined in section 2C:39-1 f., at or in the direction of another, whether or not the actor believes it to be loaded; or

(5) Commits a simple assault as defined in subsections a. (1) and (2) of this section upon

(a) Any law enforcement officer acting in the performance of his duties while in uniform or exhibiting evidence of his authority; or

(b) Any paid or volunteer fireman acting in the performance of his duties while in uniform or otherwise clearly identifiable as being engaged in the performance of the duties of a fireman; or

(c) Any person engaged in emergency first-aid or medical services acting in the performance of his duties while in uniform or otherwise clearly identifiable as being engaged in the performance of emergency first-aid or medical services.

Aggravated assault under subsection b. (1) is a crime of the second degree; under subsection b. (2) is a crime of the third degree; under subsection b. (3) and b. (4) is a

crime of the fourth degree; and under subsection b. (5) is a crime of the third degree if the victim suffers bodily injury, otherwise it is a crime of the fourth degree.

c. Racial, ethnic or religious assault. A person is guilty of racial, ethnic or religious assault if he purposely, knowingly or recklessly causes, or attempts to cause, another to be put in fear of imminent bodily injury by placing on public or private property a burning cross, a swastika or any appellation or characterization commonly representing hatred of any race, color, creed, or religion. Racial, ethnic or religious assault is a crime of the third degree.

“2. N. J. S. 2C:33-9 is amended to read as follows :

2C:33-9. *a. Desecration of Venerated Objects. A person commits a disorderly persons offense if he purposely desecrates any public monument, insignia, symbol, or structure, or place of worship or burial. “Desecrate” means defacing, damaging or polluting.*

b. Racial, ethnic or religious desecration. A person is guilty of racial, ethnic or religious desecration if he purposely desecrates any premises or property primarily used for religious, educational, residential, memorial, charitable or cemetery purposes, or for assembly by persons of a particular race, color, creed or religion by placing thereon a swastika, burning cross, or any appellation or characterization commonly representing hatred of any race, color, creed or religion. Racial, ethnic or religious desecration is a crime of the fourth degree.

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 3289

To the Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(b) of the Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 3289 with my objections for reconsideration.

This bill would require the State to purchase a tax sale certificate when: (1) there are not other purchasers at the tax sale; (2) the taxes were uncollected due to a court order,

and (3) the uncollected taxes were 15% or more of the total property taxes collected by the municipality the preceding year. The Treasurer would have a duty to certify annually for inclusion in the State budget the amount necessary to meet this obligation. The municipality involved would be able to anticipate in its budget revenues the amount expected to be generated from the tax sale.

While it is appropriate for the State to provide temporary relief to a municipality which has a sudden fall in its tax revenues due to a defaulting taxpayer, I do not believe that the State should bear the potential loss if the certificate is not ultimately redeemed. Accordingly, I recommend that the bill be amended to provide that if the certificate is not redeemed within two years, that the municipality shall buy the certificate from the State with payments to be made over a period of three years. In addition, I am recommending amendments governing the State's right to foreclose the right of redemption and eliminate the requirement that taxes be uncollected pursuant to a court order. This latter restriction is unnecessary.

Accordingly, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 3289 for reconsideration and recommend that it be amended as follows:

Page 1, Section 1, line 2: after "taxes" insert "due by a taxpayer".

Page 1, Section 1, line 3: delete "are uncollectible by reason of any order of a state or federal".

Page 1, Section 1, line 4: delete "court," after "taxes" insert "owed by the taxpayer and".

Page 1, Section 1, line 9: delete "for" and insert "subject to".

Page 1, Section 1, line 12: After "redemption." insert "If the tax sale certificate is not redeemed within the period of two years from the State's purchase of it, the municipality shall pay the State within a period of three years the full amount due the State on the certificate including interest pursuant to a payment schedule fixed by the State Treasurer after consultation with the municipal officials and the Director of Local Government Services. Once the State has received the total amount which it paid for the tax sale certificate plus interest due thereon, then ownership of the

tax sale certificate, if still unredeemed, shall be transferred to the municipality.”.

Section 1, after line 15: insert “The State may foreclose the rights of redemption of the property and if it does, it shall proceed under and in the manner provided in the “In Rem Tax Foreclosure Act (1948),” P. L. 1948, c. 96 (C. 54:5-10 et seq.). The exercise of this right may continue during any period the certificate is unredeemed.

Contrary to the Governor's veto message on Assembly Joint Resolution No. 3017, the Legislature believes that the budgeted and appropriated funds should be released to Union County Technical Institute (UCTI).

The current students and faculty at UCTI should not be unnecessarily penalized because of errors of past administrations. The cut in funding would impact most adversely on vocational students and acts as a discouragement to Vocational Education in general.

Additionally, the Department of Higher Education has knowingly paid out State aid to UCTI on the same basis since 1969, as it has to all County Technical Institutes. It is patently unfair to change procedures during the middle of

the fiscal year and then single out one institution for penalty. All other County Technical Institutes are receiving their full fair share of State aid and so should UCTI.

The Legislature does not condone any misdeeds by the school which have occurred during the past decade, but believes the overriding consideration is to take the action which best serves the public interest. That interest is best served by fully funding the institution.

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 1498 (SECOND OCR)

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section 1, Paragraph 14(b) of the Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 1498 (SECOND OCR) with my objection for reconsideration.

This bill establishes a rule of evidence which would prevent a finding of contributory negligence because a blind or deaf person did not use a cane or guide dog. It would apply to all personal injury suits brought by a blind or deaf person.

This rule replaces, in the same statute, (NJSA 10:5-29); an 'assumption of risk' clause governing a blind person's use of a public facility. Under present law, if a blind person is warned of a danger unique to his use of a public facility and he is injured because of it, he would be effectively barred from recovering for those injuries.

I agree with the Assembly Judiciary, Law, Public Safety and Defense Committee's statement, that each injury case involving a blind person should rest on its own merits and not be decided on the basis of presumptions. I therefore support the Legislature's efforts to remove this 'assumption of risk' clause from the existing law. I find, however, that the Assembly Committee amendment is inconsistent with its expressed goal. Instead of removing a presumption against blind persons and allowing the trier of fact to compare the negligence of each party, the Committee has created a presumption in the blind or deaf person's favor. Furthermore, the Committee amendment would apply this rule of evidence to all personal injury suits, not only those involving a public facility.

If the Legislature seeks to adopt a rule of evidence with such broad application, it should not amend the Law Against Discrimination but should act within the framework of the Evidence Act of 1960.

I fully support the removal of any and all legal obstacles facing the blind and deaf. I also sympathize with efforts to accord special consideration to this population. However, tort law already grants this consideration. A blind or deaf person is never held to the same standard of conduct as an ordinary plaintiff or defendant. Instead he must take the precautions, be they more or less, which the ordinary person would take if he were blind or deaf. W. Prosser, *Law of Torts*, §§ 32, 152 (4th ed. 1971).

I find then that the Assembly Committee amendment is a misplaced and unnecessary rule of evidence that unduly interferes with the trier of fact's role in the allocation of judicial fault. I recommend this bill be passed substantially as introduced.

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Accordingly, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 1498 (SECOND OCR) for reconsideration and recommend that it be amended as follows:

Actions such as this are not complicated. I am, therefore, concerned that this measure provides no upper limit on the attorney's fees a court may award. I am suggesting that the Assembly include language to limit the size of an award an attorney may receive.

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 2193

To the Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(b) of the Constitution, I am returning Assembly Bill No. 2193 with my objections for reconsideration.

This bill amends those statutes governing small estates which permit the family to obtain the assets without administration. The bill permits family members domiciled outside of New Jersey to execute the requisite affidavits in their domicile rather than travel to New Jersey to do so. Under the provisions in the bill the affidavit can be executed before any person or authority in the state of domicile of the affiant who is authorized in writing by the surrogate.

I support the purpose of this bill which is to relieve family members from the burden of travelling to New Jersey to execute an affidavit. My only concern is that the surrogate's power to delegate to "any person" his authority to take the affidavit is too broad. The authority to take the affidavit should be limited to those persons in the other state who are authorized under that state's law to take oaths.

Accordingly, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 2193 for reconsideration and recommend that it be amended as follows:

Page 1, Section 1, line 6: Delete "or"

Page 1, section 1, line 7: Delete in its entirety.

Page 1, Section 1, line 8: Delete "who is duly authorized in writing by said surrogate."

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 3377

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(b) of the Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 3377 without my approval.

This bill would exclude water and water rights from the general term "mineral" or "mineral rights" as used in deeds or other instruments which convey or reserve mineral rights in land.

The bill was introduced to clarify mineral rights and thereby settle a particular dispute in Sussex County. In doing so, however, it appears contrary to the weight of judicial authority in this and other jurisdictions in that it defines mineral as "any substance which can be extracted from beneath the surface of the earth, including every constituent of the earth's crust." Most courts have held that a grant or reservation of minerals does not include substances which would destroy the surface itself. See *Hartwell v. Camman*, 10 N.J. Eq. 128 (Ch. 1854).

I have no problem with the clarification of mineral rights on a prospective basis. I do not believe it advisable, however, to attempt to decide this case retroactively by including this expansive definition of mineral. This type of question is one of private law best dealt with by the courts based on the particulars of the agreement between the parties and precedent.

For these reasons, I hereby return Assembly Bill No. 3377 and recommend the following amendment:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(a) of the Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 1989 (OCR) with my objections.

This bill would amend the Sales and Use Tax Act, N. J. S. A. 54:32B-8.1, to exempt from the tax the sales of reagent products used by persons with diabetes to test the presence of glucose and ketones in their blood and urine. Exemptions under the current law are limited to prescription drugs and prosthetic appliances.

The estimated revenue loss if this bill is enacted would be as much as \$350,000 annually. As the members of the Legislature grapple with the difficulty of maintaining the existing levels of State services and State aid given the dramatic nature of the federal budget cuts and our own fiscal constraints, I believe it is undesirable to create another exemption to our sales tax law.

Furthermore, exemption of these diabetes-related products from the sales tax makes it difficult to justify continued taxation of other products equally necessary to their user's

health. A comprehensive review of the sales tax and exemptions from it is urgently needed.

Accordingly, I am returning Assembly Bill No. 1989 (OCR) without my approval.

If the intent is only one of insuring that the respective county and municipality are aware of the proposed sale or lease this can and should be accomplished by making such notification a routine part of State House Commission proceedings.

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(a) of the Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 363 without my approval.

This bill would permit any county or municipality to establish referral centers for victims of violent crimes. These referral centers would provide crime victims with information on financial assistance and professional help that may be available to them.

Although instituting referral centers for crime victims is a laudable goal, there is no need for legislation to confer the power to do so on counties and municipalities. They already possess the authority to do so under their general authority to preserve the health, safety and welfare of the municipality. In addition, this legislation may curtail the powers of already operational centers and limit the establishment of new ones since restrictive language in the bill only allows the formation of centers which assist victims of violent crimes. Presently, counties and municipalities have the power to establish any type of referral agency. Thus, while I believe that the concept behind this bill is a good one, it is nevertheless unnecessary legislation.

Therefore, I am returning Assembly Bill No. 363 without my approval.

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 1589 (OCR)

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(a) of the Constitution, I am returning Assembly Bill No. 1589 (OCR) without my approval.

This would require the secretary of a board of education to send by certified mail to school board candidates who have filed qualifying petitions "pertinent information regarding the legal requirements for becoming a member of a local board of education." The bill does not indicate what pertinent information is to be provided, although I am advised that the language is intended to refer to the qualifications to hold office.

In addition, the bill requires the secretary of the board of education at least 60 days prior to the school election to

make a public announcement of the contents of various laws governing campaign financing. Since all the candidates will not necessarily be at the public meeting, this method of providing notice has limited effectiveness. In addition, the secretary of the school board is given no guidelines as to what to say.

Legislation imposing a legal duty on school board secretaries to educate proposed candidates of these issues is unnecessary and inappropriate. The education community, through the New Jersey School Boards Association, the Department of Education and local districts, actively seeks to advise proposed candidates of this information. The bill will add bureaucratic regulations to these efforts. Ultimately, the responsibility of obtaining this information lies with the candidates themselves. I see no need for legislation which would put a legal responsibility on school board secretaries to do so.

For these reasons, I hereby return Assembly Bill No. 1589 (OCR) without my approval.

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 1736 (2nd OCR)

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(a) of the Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 1736 (2nd OCR) without my approval.

This bill would add a new section to the criminal code which punishes "Peeping Toms" as petty disorderly person offenders. Anyone on another's property, "surreptitiously" invading that person's privacy by peering into windows without a lawful purpose, could be punished by up to 30 days in jail and a \$500.00 fine. The provisions of this statute almost duplicate an earlier disorderly persons act, although the degree of the offense has been reduced. The earlier statute was repealed at the time of the adoption of the Criminal Code section on criminal trespass.

Peering into windows was not indictable at common law. In New Jersey, according to the 1980 case, *State v. Pierce* 175 N. J. Super. 149, 154, convictions for trespass, historically and today, have only been obtained when the trespass "is committed with force of violence or a breach of the peace." Only a small minority of the other 50 states have adopted Peeping Tom laws.

It may appear that the Anglo-American legal system has not dealt seriously enough with a type of person who is not welcome at anyone's window. In a society which values freedom of movement, however, not all potentially offensive behavior can be regulated. There is great difficulty in determining the intent, and therefore the unlawful purpose, of one who might be a "Peeping Tom."

The proposed statute does not make its underlying purpose clear. If the issue involved is a person's (or more narrowly, a property owner's) right to privacy, then the solution is within the victim's control. One who values his or her privacy will not, for instance, undress in front of a window whose shade is not drawn. Living close together, as many of us in New Jersey do, carries the recognition that privacy is better obtained by the one within, rather than attempting to restrict the action of those without. This is not to say that it is impossible to keep others off one's property: as long as notice against trespass is given (which includes "actual communication to the actor," as well as the erecting of signs or fencing), someone who enters or remains on another's property may be convicted of a petty disorderly person's offense under N. J. S. A. 2C:18-3(b). (This penalty is the same as that proposed by A-1736 (2nd OCR).)

If, on the other hand, the issue is the prevention of crime, the actions of the intruder should satisfy the requirements for attempted burglary. Criminal attempt is already defined in N. J. S. A. 2C:5-1; we are not trying to redefine it here. I believe that the current criminal provisions for trespass are sufficient to cover the true "Peeping Tom" and that enactment of this bill would entail a waste of valuable law enforcement resources.

Accordingly, I am returning Assembly Bill No. 1736 (2nd OCR) without my approval.

Municipal courts exercise civil jurisdiction over contract cases only if approved to do so pursuant to rules of the Supreme Court. N.J.S. 2A:8-24. Under the current rules, municipal courts are not authorized to exercise such jurisdiction. Although Assembly Bill No. 1828 would afford the Supreme Court the option to expand the civil jurisdiction of the municipal courts, I am not aware of any inclination of the Court to do so.

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 292

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(b) of the Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 292 with my objections.

This bill would require that the names and addresses of cosigners of loans obtained by candidates, committees and organizations be included in the final reports filed with the Election Law Enforcement Commission. Currently, such information is only required from the primary signer of a loan.

This proposed requirement would add little burden to those filing election reports; yet, it would close a loophole. Under current law a wealthy individual can persuade a number of individuals to take loans which he cosigns but alone repays, thus allowing him to contribute to his candidate far more than appears on the disclosure form.

The bill, therefore, has merit but it contains textual inconsistencies with other recent amendments to the Campaign Contribution and Expenditures Reporting Act, P. L. 1980, c. 74 and P. L. 1981, c. 151.

Accordingly, I am returning Assembly Bill No. 292 and recommend the following amendments:

Page 1, Section 1, Line 12: Delete in its entirety.

Page 1, Section 1, Line 13: Delete "any legislation".

Page 2, Section 1, Line 25: Delete "; provided,".

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 1518 (2nd OCR)

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(b) of the Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 1518 (2nd OCR) with my objections for reconsideration.

This bill amends the Child Labor Law to allow minors to work in theatrical productions on premises where alcoholic beverages are sold and consumed. The primary purpose of the bill is to allow child actors to work in dinner theatres, which generally present wholesome state entertainment. The bill would prohibit participation in productions that are "dangerous to the life, limb, health or morals of a minor," thus barring the child's employment in unsuitable surroundings or in inappropriate productions, such as casino night club shows. The bill also makes certain technical amendments to the law, enacted as P. L. 1981, c. 147, that would allow waivers of the curfew applicable to work in theatrical productions.

The bill also upgrades a criminal violation of the Child Labor Law to the level of a fourth degree crime. In some circumstances, I believe this may be unduly harsh. It has been established that knowledge or design is not a necessary element of a criminal violation of the law. See *State v. Resorts Int'l Hotel, Inc.*, 173 N. J. Super 290 (App. Div. 1980), certif. den. 84 N.J. 466 (1980). Where an employer violates the law inadvertently, it would be inappropriate to subject him to the higher penalties of a fourth degree crime. However, where an employer knowingly violates the law, then those penalties may well be justified.

Accordingly, I believe an unknowing violation of the law should be a disorderly persons offense. Where the violation is knowing, it should be a fourth degree crime. This would

also permit swift and economical prosecution of minor child labor offenses in municipal courts. I am aware that with two grades of the offense, there may be a tendency, in the case of knowing violations, to bargain down to the lesser grade without careful consideration of whether the circumstances warrant it. This tendency should be resisted, and the Child Labor Law should be vigorously enforced.

In addition, I note that under the bill the upgraded penalties would apparently apply only to violations of the theatrical production provisions *N.J.S.A.* 34:2-21.57 et seq., and the section prohibiting certain kinds of employment. *N.J.S.A.* 34:2-21.17. Violations of other sections, for example those relating to street trade or agricultural employment, would remain unchanged. I believe the upgraded penalties should apply across the board, except where the law specifically sets a higher penalty.

Lastly, in light of enactment of P. L. 1981, c. 83, one technical amendment is also called for to prevent an unintended repeal.

Accordingly, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 1518 (2nd OCR) for reconsideration and recommend that it be amended as follows:

Page 5, Section 3, line 64: Omit "and Industry".

Page 5, Section 3, lines 85-86: Omit in their entirety.

Page 5, Section 3, after line 86: Insert "Nothing in this section shall be construed to prevent minors 16 years of age or older who are members of a Junior Firemen's Auxiliary, created pursuant to N.J.S. 40A:14-95, from engaging in any activities authorized by N.J.S. 40A:14-98."

Page 7, Section 7, line 5: Omit "knowingly".

Page 7, Section 7, line 14: After "guilty of" insert "an offense. Where a defendant acts knowingly, an offense under this section shall be" and after "fourth degree." insert "Otherwise, it shall be a disorderly persons offense."

Page 8, after Section 8, line 12: Add a new section as follows:

"9. Section 19 of P. L. 1940, c. 153 (C. 34:2-21.19) is amended to read as follows:

9. Whoever employs or permits or suffers any minor to be employed or to work in violation of this act, or of any

order or ruling issued under the provisions of this act, or obstructs the Department of Labor, its officers or agents, or any other person authorized to inspect places of employment under this act, and whoever, having under his control or custody any minor, permits or suffers him to be employed or to work in violation of this act, shall be guilty of [a misdemeanor and shall be punished by a fine of not less than twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) nor more than five hundred dollars (\$500.00), or by imprisonment of not less than ten nor more than ninety days, or by other such fine and imprisonment] *an offense. Where a defendant acts knowingly, an offense under this section shall be a crime of the fourth degree. Otherwise it shall be a disorderly persons offense.* Each day during which any violation of this act continues shall constitute a separate and distinct offense, and the employment of any minor in violation of the act shall with respect to each minor so employed, constitute a separate and distinct offense.”

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 1532

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(b) of the Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 1532 with my objections.

This bill would amend the State Tax Uniform Law, N.J.S.A. 54:48-1 et seq., to permit the Director of the Division of Taxation to execute and levy upon real and personal property without court proceedings to collect all unpaid State taxes. Such a procedure is now available to the Director for State sales taxes only.

The bill would permit the Director to issue warrants for execution on real and personal property either to a county sheriff or to any employee of the Department of Taxation to collect any unpaid State taxes. When issued to a sheriff, the writ would be docketed with the county clerk and operate as a lien on real and personal property in the county. When issued to a State employee, the writ would give the State employee all the powers of a sheriff under the law governing execution and levy.

The bill in its present form would extend existing collection procedures in two important respects. First, it would dispense with the need for judicial proceedings. Under existing law, the State can levy only after either filing suit, obtaining a judgment, and applying for a writ of execution, or filing a certificate of debt with the court clerk, and applying for a writ of execution, N.J.S.A. 54:49-12. Second, it would free the Director from reliance on county sheriffs to actually execute the writ and make the levy.

In my judgment the bill fails to provide due process for the allegedly delinquent taxpayer. It makes no provision for prior notice to the alleged delinquent taxpayer nor does it require exhaustion of less preemptory means of collection. Furthermore, the language of the bill authorizing writ of execution for "real and personal" property appears to permit issuance of an execution against wages without the prior court hearing otherwise required by N.J.S.A. 2A:17-50.

Accordingly, I am returning Assembly Bill No. 1532 with the following recommendations for amendment which would require prior notice of taxes due and the right to contest execution in the Tax Court or Superior Court:

Page 2, Section 1, Line 27: After "duty." insert "Except in the case of an arbitrary assessment, any warrant issued and directed to any officer or employee of the Division of Taxation prior to the time for filing an appeal to the Tax Court has expired, or after an appeal has been filed, shall not be executed upon unless a notice of intention to proceed upon the warrant shall have been directed to the person named in the warrant, which notice shall state the amount of taxes, penalties and interest claimed to be owing and shall specify the right of the taxpayer to contest the execution upon the warrant in the Tax Court or in the Superior Court, within three days following receipt by the taxpayer

of that notice. The court shall restrain the execution upon the warrant upon a showing that the State's taxes, penalties and interest claimed to be owing will be adequately protected by bond or other security."

L. 1981, c. 281 authorizes the Department to inspect all endangered and nongame species in order to ensure that its rules concerning these species are complied with. It also authorizes the Department to publish a fee schedule to cover the costs of inspection. Because the definitions in the existing Endangered and Nongame Species Act are broad enough to include potentially dangerous animals, and because the Act already provides regulatory powers to the Department, a general authority to inspect for rule compliance as approved in P. L. 1981, c. 281 would include the authority to inspect any exhibit of a potentially dangerous animal. Every inspection and fee authorized by this bill is also authorized by P. L. 1981, c. 281.

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 3505 (OCR)

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 3505 (OCR) with my recommendations.

This bill would amend the distribution and disposition of the parimutuel pool at privately operated harness race meetings. Specifically, it would permit Freehold Raceway and Atlantic City Raceway, during its meeting at Freehold, to increase retroactively the share of the parimutuel pool it may retain by .8 of 1 percent at the expense of the share that would otherwise go to the State. In addition, this bill would provide that an additional .4 of 1 percent of the State's share be set aside for higher purses at Freehold Raceway.

This legislation had been sought by the Freehold Raceway in the face of a \$1,000,000 projected loss for the track's operation in 1981. The track's management requested an additional 1.5 percent of the “takeout” or portion of the pool not returned to successful bettors. The .8 of 1 percent figure in this bill was chosen as a cautious response to the track's anticipated deficit. It now appears that the management's estimates were correct and greater financial relief will be necessary to keep Freehold Raceway financially stable.

Freehold Raceway's problems cannot be considered separately, however, but must be looked at in conjunction with those of the private thoroughbred race tracks which

hold their meetings during the same time of the year, Monmouth Park and Atlantic City Racetrack. They, too, have had serious financial difficulties in recent years and resolution of these interconnected problems must be comprehensive not piecemeal.

I believe it is important to encourage the continuation of both thoroughbred and standardbred racing and breeding in this State. The revenues which the State realizes from its share of the wagering pools is negligible compared to the value that horse breeding and racing have for the retention of green, yet productive, open spaces and the promotion of tourism.

Accordingly, I am recommending amendments to this bill which would (1) increase Freehold Raceway's share of the parimutuel pool by 1.2 percent rather than .8 of 1 percent, (2) increase the portion reserved for purses from .4 of 1 percent to .6 of 1 percent, (3) increase Monmouth Park's share prospectively by 1 percent during those periods when both it and Freehold are operating simultaneously, (4) permit the Monmouth Park Racing Association to use the "breakage" in the parimutuel pool (that portion left over when payoffs are rounded off to the nearest dime for every two dollar bet) to supplement overnight purses to a level of \$85,000 per day, (5) increase the portion of the takeout at Monmouth Park for the thoroughbred breeder program from .12 to .20 of 1 percent, (6) increase Atlantic City Racing Association's share by slightly more than 1 percent at the expense of the portion of the pool set aside for purses but (7) allow Atlantic City Racing Association to use breakage to maintain a daily purse level at \$65,000:

a. Pay to the commission **[38%]** 30% of 1% of so much of the total contributions to all parimutuel pools conducted or made during such calendar year; but, notwithstanding the foregoing, for pools where the patron is required to select three or more horses, the permitholder shall pay to the commission **[1.38%]** 1.30% of the total contributions.

Payment on account of such sums to be paid to the commission shall be made every seventh day of any and every race meeting in the amount then due as determined in the manner provided above, and shall be accompanied by a report under oath showing the total of all such contributions, together with such other information as the commission may require. Except as otherwise provided by law, no admission or amusement tax, excise tax, license or horse racing fee of any kind shall be assessed or collected from any permitholder by the State of New Jersey, or by any county or municipality, or by any other body having power to assess or collect license fees or taxes.

b. Hold and set aside in an account designated as a special trust account 23% of 1% of such total contributions to be used and distributed as hereinafter provided in section 5 and as provided in section 2 of this act for the following purposes and no other:

(1) 18% of 1% thereof for contributions and awards designed to improve and promote the thoroughbred breeding industry in New Jersey through payments of awards to owners and breeders of registered New Jersey bred horses which earned portions of purses in open events on New Jersey tracks, and to owners of stallions posted on the official stallion rosters of the Thoroughbred Breeders' Association of New Jersey which sire such registered New Jersey bred money winners:

(2) 5% of 1% thereof for State horse breeding and development programs, research, fairs, horse shows, youth activities, promotion and administration.

c. Retain 9.73% of such total contributions for his own uses and purposes. For pools where the patron is required to select two horses, the permitholder shall retain 10.80% of the total contributions and for pools where the patron is required to select three or more horses, the permitholder shall retain 13.21% of the total contributions.

d. Distribute as purse money and for programs designed to aid the horsemen and the New Jersey Horsemen's Benevolent and Protective Association 5.92% of such contributions. Notwithstanding the foregoing, for pools where the patron is required to select two horses, the permitholder shall distribute as purse money 6.85% of such contributions and for pools where the patron is required to select three or more horses, the permitholder shall distribute as purse money 8.94% of the total contributions. Expenditures for programs designed to aid the horsemen and the New Jersey Horsemen's Benevolent and Protective Association shall not exceed 2.5% of the sum available for distribution as purse money from all parimutuel pools. The formula for distribution of the purse money as either overnight purses or special stakes shall be determined by an agreement between the New Jersey Horsemen's Benevolent and Protective Association and the permitholder.

e. (1) 50% of 1% of all pools shall be deducted and set aside in a special trust account for the establishment and support by the commission of the thoroughbred breeding industry in New Jersey; to improve purses for closed races; to provide awards for owners and breeders of registered New Jersey bred horses who earn portions of purses in closed races at New Jersey race tracks and and (sic) to owners of stallions posted on the official stallion rosters of the Thoroughbred Breeders' Association of New Jersey which sire such New Jersey bred money earners and awards to New Jersey thoroughbred breeders associations for programs beneficial to thoroughbred breeding in this State. The New Jersey thoroughbred award program shall be administered and disbursed by the commission while the thoroughbred open breeder awards shall be administered and disbursed by the New Jersey Department of Agriculture. The special trust account to be established pursuant to this paragraph shall be separate and apart from the special trust account established and maintained pursuant to subsection b. of this section.

(2) ~~[12%]~~ 20% of 1% shall be deducted and set aside in a special trust account for the purpose of stabilizing the Thoroughbred Breeding Award Program. These funds shall be used by the New Jersey Racing Commission to supplement both the opened and closed award program. When necessary, the Racing Commission shall forward a portion of the funds to the Department of Agriculture for

distribution to New Jersey bred horses that successfully compete in open races. Any sums not used shall revert to the State General Treasury.

f. 12% of 1% shall be deposited in a separate special trust account for use by the New Jersey Racing Commission in keeping thoroughbred tracks and stable facilities open during periods of time when they are not normally in operation when to do so would serve the public interest.

g. Notwithstanding the foregoing, for pools where a patron is required to select three or more horses, 50% of 1% of the total contributions shall be held and set aside in the special trust account referred to in subsection e. of this section.

3. Section 1 of P. L. 1981, c. 154 is amended to read as follows: 1. Notwithstanding the provisions of section 44 of P. L. 1940, c. 17 (C. 5:5-64), every permitholder engaged in the business of conducting running race meetings where the amount derived from the parimutuel handle does not exceed \$1 million per day based on such contributions accumulated and averaged during the calendar year [1981] 1982 shall retain the breaks during its [1981] 1982 meeting for use in supplementing the purses distributed by the permitholder up to a maximum average daily purse distribution of \$65,000.00; and every permitholder engaged in conducting running race meetings wherein the amount derived from the parimutuel handle exceeds \$1 million per day accumulated and averaged during calendar year 1982 shall retain the breaks during its 1982 meeting for use in supplementing the purses distributed by the permitholder up to a maximum average daily purse distribution of \$85,000.00.

Any funds not used for such purse supplements shall be paid to the commission for the use of the State at the conclusion of the permitholder's [1981] 1982 meeting."

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 1171 (3d OCR) with my objection and recommendations for amendment.

This bill would prohibit CETA prime sponsors from contracting for job training services with certain organizations unless they are accredited by the Commissioner of Education or other responsible State authorities, and comply with applicable local building and health codes. This bill would affect various technical schools and businesses that provide custom-designed training programs that are not now accredited.

I certainly support imposing standards of quality on the training programs that enter into contracts with CETA prime sponsors. However, the bill should clearly state that

it is not intended to conflict with the federal statutes or regulations that govern CETA programs. Moreover, since these programs are administered on the State level by the Department of Labor, it would be appropriate for the Commissioner of Labor, and not the Commissioner of Education, to pass upon the quality of training programs.

Accordingly, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 1171 (3d OCR) and recommend that it be amended as follows:

Page 2, section 1, line 25: Omit "Education, or".

Page 2, section 1, line 26: Omit "other State authority which has jurisdiction over such institution," and insert "Labor".

Page 2, section 1, line 39: After "business**." insert "This act also shall not be effective to the extent it would result in a violation of federal statutes or regulations or otherwise prevent the receipt of federal grants or contracts."

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 2293 (SR)

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 (b) of the Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 2293 (SR) with my objections, for reconsideration.

This bill would transfer jurisdiction over "refusal to submit to breathalyzer test" cases from the Office of Administrative Law and the Division of Motor Vehicles to municipal courts. With that concept, I concur.

The bill, however, provides that the court must conclude beyond a reasonable doubt that the arresting officer had reasonable grounds to believe that the person was driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs and refused to submit to a breathalyzer test before a conviction may issue. There are two problems with this requirement.

First, I believe that the beyond a reasonable doubt standard of proof is an unusually harsh burden of proof in a noncriminal case and will encourage more people to refuse to submit to a breathalyzer test. Thus, I recommend that the preponderance of the evidence standard currently utilized in the administrative hearing of this type of case be retained.

I also believe that it is preferable to require that a police officer have probable cause to believe that a person was driving under the influence before ordering a driver to take a breathalyzer test. This provides an objective test for the court, as opposed to a subjective reasonable grounds test, and is consistent with the standard for other types of investigative stops.

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 1784 with my objections.

This bill would grant use immunity to testimony adduced at a hearing held by the Director of the Division of Motor Vehicles or the Administrative Office of the Law on the suspension or revocation of, or the prohibition from obtaining a driver's license or a nonresident driver's privilege. Use immunity prevents the driver from refusing to testify at the administrative hearing on the grounds of self-incrimination as to criminal charges.

I believe that use immunity should not be granted on a blanket basis because generally sufficient evidence exists without the offending driver's testimony. Should the driver's testimony become critical, use immunity can be granted on an ad hoc basis.

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 1337 (OCR) without my approval.

Assembly Bill No. 1337 would provide for compulsory arbitration of wage and salary disputes involving probation officers. The New Jersey Employer-Employees Relations Act provides for compulsory interest arbitration of disputes concerning terms and conditions of employment that involve public police and fire departments as defined. *P. L. 1977, c. 85 (C. 34:13A-14 et seq.)*. The bill would define probation officers as police. Although county probation officers are responsible to and supervised by the designated Assignment Judge, *R. 1:34-4*, they would be deemed employees of the county for the purposes of the bill.

I have supported compulsory arbitration of disputes involving police and firefighters who do not have the right to strike, but whose uninterrupted services are essential to the public safety and welfare. I understand that probation officers in the State have complained of inadequate salaries and low morale. Whether probation officers should, in fairness, also be permitted to seek arbitration of wage and salary disputes is, however, a question that is foreclosed by our Constitution. The Supreme Court has exclusive authority "to make rules governing the administration of all courts in the State." *N. J. Const.* (1947), Art 6, sec. 7, par. 1. Probation officers are "so integral a part of our court system as to bring them within the scope of this power." *Passaic Cty. Probation Officers' Ass'n v. Passaic Cty.*, 73 N. J. 247, 253 (1977). In general, the Court's power may not be diluted or modified by legislation, including the Employer-Employees Relations Act. *Id.* at 254. This bill would, accordingly, constitute an unconstitutional intrusion into the Court's authority.

For these reasons, I hereby return Assembly Bill No. 1337 (OCR) without my approval.

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 1781 (2nd OCR)

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I am returning Assembly Bill No. 1781 (2nd OCR) with my objections, for reconsideration.

This bill allows a member of the Police and Firemen's Retirement System (PFRS) who becomes a data processing coordinator to remain in that system. A data processor is not a title covered by PFRS. Under present law, a policeman-data processor would have to transfer to the Public Employees' Retirement System (PERS). The theory behind the bill is that the person who, over a period of years, has earned credit in PFRS, a higher benefit system, should not forfeit those earned benefits because of a change in jobs.

I am sympathetic to the argument that in some cases it is unfair to require the transfer of a former police officer out of PFRS after he has moved to a job not covered by PFRS. However, this bill is not carefully tailored to identify and classify the groups of individuals for whom a transfer would be particularly unfair.

Accordingly, I recommend an amendment that would provide that the transfer requirement be waived only for those who have served in a position eligible for PFRS for a period of 15 years. This is a period of time sufficient to create equitable arguments against a requirement of transfer. In addition, I recommend that the employee be required to stay within a police or fire department to be eligible to stay in PFRS. This ensures that there is at least some minimal nexus between the job performed and the benefits received. Finally, I recommend that the benefit provided by this bill be enjoyed by all those who meet the

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first two criteria. There is little justification to single out a data processing position in a police or fire department from any other position in the departments that would otherwise not be covered by PFRS.

The recommendations which follow also include amendments to make this bill consistent with P. L. 1981, c. 301, approved October 23, 1981. They are deemed necessary to avoid an implied repealer of that Act.

Accordingly, I herewith return Assembly Bill 1781 (2nd OCR) and recommend that it be amended as follows:

Page 1, Section 1, Line 10: Delete

Page 1, Section 1, Line 10A: Delete "tem,"

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 2016 (OCR)

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 2016 (OCR) with my objections and recommendations for amendment.

This bill amends the laws which govern employees' retirement system in cities of the first class having a population of less than 400,000 by; (1) increasing survivors' benefits from \$2,100 and \$2,500; (2) eliminating the different contribution rates established for men and women; (3) eliminating the requirement that any widower receiving a survivor's pension be dependent; (4) fixing one rate for all members at the mathematical difference between the former higher rate for women and the former lower rate for men.

The latest census shows that the population in New Jersey's cities is declining. In order to accurately reflect the intent of the sponsor and avoid confusion with other acts dealing with employees' retirement system I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 2016 (OCR) and recommend that it be amended as follows:

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 2064 (OCR)

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 2064 (OCR), with my objections and recommendations for amendment.

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This bill would exempt 'vacation bible schools' from the New Jersey Youth Camp Safety Act except for the Department of Health's Water Safety Standards.

I basically agree with the purpose of this legislation. An organization or church that operates a summer program of religious instruction should not be burdened with building standards and inspections intended to regulate large recreation camps. On the other hand, if a summer program, whether primarily religious or recreational, engages in a hazardous recreational activity such as swimming, horseback riding or riflery, that activity should conform to State safety standards.

The language of A-2064 (OCR), as passed, creates an exemption for all day-time religious and recreation programs operated by a nonprofit religious organization. They would, however, be subject to State water safety standards. I believe that this language does not distinguish between recreation programs run by a church and religious programs with an incidental recreation component. Furthermore, I believe that all hazardous recreational activities, not simply swimming, should be regulated.

I have therefore recommended that programs with a 'minimal recreation component' not be considered youth camps. However, any time one of these programs engages in a hazardous activity it would be required to obtain the prior approval of the Department of Health. Only when a religious school operates as a youth camp will it be regulated as one.

Therefore, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 2064 (OCR) for reconsideration and recommend that it be amended as follows:

Page 1, Section 1, Lines 10-14c: After 'camp,' Delete in entirety and insert 'except that a day program which offers only a minimal recreational component shall not be considered a youth camp; however, no such program shall include any hazardous recreational activity such as but not limited to aquatics, archery, horseback riding and riflery without first obtaining the prior written approval of the Department of Health. Failure to obtain such approval or comply with the regulations established for the activity involved shall subject the program to penalties

in accordance with sections 10 and 11 of P. L. 1973, c. 375 (C. 26:12-10 and 26:12-11).'

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 3501

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I am returning Assembly Bill No. 3501 with my objections and recommendations for amendment.

This bill would permit municipalities to subsidize a municipal port authority, to guarantee payment of the authority's bonds regardless of the municipality's debt limitations, and to covenant with the authority to perform such acts as permitted by law.

By permitting municipalities to guarantee bonds in excess of their debt limitations, the bill would enable municipalities to incur excess debt without the approval of the Local Finance Board. Such excess debt could place a municipality in serious fiscal trouble. In addition, I note that while strengthening the financial power of municipal authorities, the bill places no additional fiscal controls on authorities.

Accordingly, I recommend that the bill be amended to subject such a municipal guaranty to the municipality's debt limitation and to strengthen the Local Finance Board's ability to assure the fiscal integrity of municipal port authorities. In addition, I suggest that an amendment be made to clarify that payments made by a municipality pursuant to a guaranty are outside the municipal "cap" law.

Accordingly, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 3501 and recommend that it be amended as follows:

Page 1, Title, line 1: After "amend" insert "and supplement".

Page 2, Section 1, line 29: Delete “may be made,”.

Page 2, Section 1, line 30: Delete “may be adopted, notwithstanding any” and insert “is subject to all”.

Page 2, Section 1, line 33: Delete “but” and insert “and”.

Page 2, Section 1, line 34: After “gross” add “and net”.

Page 2, Section 1, line 36: Delete “The”.

Page 2, Section 1, lines 37 to 47: Delete and insert “Any payment made by a municipality pursuant to a guaranty shall be considered “debt service” for purposes of the municipal spending limitations in P. L. 1976, c. 3 (C. 40A:4-45.3).

Page 3, Section 3: Delete. Insert

“3. (New Section) In accordance with rules and regulations which the Local Finance Board is hereby authorized to adopt, municipal port authorities created pursuant to P. L. 1960, c. 192 (C. 40:68A-29 et seq.) are subject to the following provisions:

(a) Every authority shall be required to submit an annual budget to the Local Finance Board for approval.

(b) The issuance of any obligations of an authority, agreements regarding municipal guaranties of authority bonds, financing agreements entered into by an authority, and all leases, sales or dispositions of real property made by an authority shall be subject to the approval of the Local Finance Board.

4. This act shall take effect 120 days after enactment.

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 275

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section 1, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 275 with my objections.

This bill would establish a South Jersey Sports and Exposition Authority whose principal purpose would be the construction or reconstruction of a track for thoroughbred and harness horseracing on the site of Garden State Racetrack in Cherry Hill Township or on a site of equivalent acreage in the South Jersey counties of Gloucester, Burlington, Salem, Cumberland or Camden. The bill would also delay establishment of the Authority for six months to give a private developer the opportunity to acquire the Garden State site and seek racing dates.

Several months ago I endorsed the concept of such an authority if it were the only means to achieve rebuilding of the Garden State Track. The bill as passed, however, presents many problems, particularly the magnitude of in lieu of tax payments, the requirement that a convention hall be constructed on the site within two years and the generous distribution of the parimutuel pool which would be afforded a private developer.

Those provisions raise serious questions concerning the financial feasibility of any construction or reconstruction proposal. The Governor-elect has requested, and I have agreed to give him, the opportunity to study this matter and determine the proper course of action.

Therefore, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 275 without my approval.

This bill raises the amount a municipal court may charge for court costs from \$15 to \$25.

Although existing law and this bill refer to "maximum court costs," municipal courts levy this amount in most cases. And while it is true that this maximum figure has not

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been increased since 1970, what has increased is the amount of fines for Title 39 and traffic offenses. I believe that further study of the need for this increase in the level of costs is warranted before this legislation is approved.

Therefore, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 3076 without my approval.
