AND ORDER

Holder of Plenary Retail Consumption License C-481, issued by the Municipal Board of Alcoholic Beverage Control of the City of Jersey City.

BY THE DIRECTOR:

Licensee pleads non vult to charges alleging that on January 8, 1967, he (1) permitted a bartender to work while intoxicated, in violation of Rule 24 of State Regulation No. 20, (2) sold drinks of alcoholic beverages to an intoxicated patron, in violation of Rule 1 of State Regulation No. 20, and (3) permitted foul and filthy language by patrons, in violation of Rule 5 of State Regulation No. 20.

Licensee has a previous record of suspension of license by the Director for fifteen days effective July 9, 1962, and again for twenty days effective November 27, 1963, both for possession of alcoholic beverages not truly labeled, and for twenty days effective July 21, 1964, for sale in violation of State Regulation No. 38. Re Bozzone, Bulletin 1470, Item 12; Bulletin 1541, Item 8; Bulletin 1577, Item 8.

The license will be suspended on the first charge for twenty days (Re Morrin, Bulletin 1705, Item 3), on the second charge for twenty days (Re Hudimac, Inc., Bulletin 1716, Item 6), and on the third charge for ten days (Re Your Girls, Inc., Bulletin 1713, Item 2), to which will be added fifteen days by reason of the record of three suspensions of license for dissimilar violation occurring within the past five years (Re Bruno Hardcastle, Inc., Bulletin 1694, Item 8), or a total of sixty-five days, with remission of five days for the plea entered, leaving a net suspension of sixty days.

Accordingly, it is, on this 10th day of April 1967,

ORDERED that Plenary Retail Consumption License C-481, issued by the Municipal Board of Alcoholic Beverage Control of the City of Jersey City to John Bozzone, for premises 74 Cambridge Avenue, Jersey City, be and the same is hereby suspended for sixty (60) days, commencing at 2 a.m. Monday, April 17, 1967, and terminating at 2 a.m. Friday, June 16, 1967.

BY THE DIRECTOR:

Licensee pleads non vult to charges alleging that (1), (2), (4) and (6) since June 10, 1966, it farmed out its license to John Albamonte for payment of a fixed monthly fee, in violation of R.S. 33:1-25, 34 and 52; (3) on October 4 and 10, 1966, hindered investigation by furnishing false information to a Division agent then conducting investigation, in violation of R.S. 33:1-35; and (5) failed to disclose in its current application for license the existence of a chattel mortgage on the fixtures in the licensed premises, in violation of R. S. 33:1-25.

Licensee has a previous record of suspension of license by the municipal issuing authority for twenty days effective January 3, 1967, for sale to minors.

The license will be suspended on charges (1), (2), (4) and (6) for twenty days (Re 172 Corp., Bulletin 1671, Item 9; Re The Sports Corner, Inc., Bulletin 1581, Item 7), on charge (3) for ten days (Re DiBiase, Bulletin 1559, Item 2), and on charge (5) for ten days (Re Elvee Corporation, Bulletin 1651, Item 5), to which will be added five days by reason of the record of suspension of license for dissimilar violation occurring within the past five years (Re Paul's Shore Liquors, Inc., Bulletin 1721, Item 1), or a total of forty-five days, with remission of five days for the plea entered, leaving a net suspension of forty days.

Accordingly, it is, on this 6th day of April, 1967,

ORDERED that Plenary Retail Consumption License C-135, issued by the Board of Alcoholic Beverage Control for the City of Paterson to Through Corp. for premises 279 Market Street and 10 Park Avenue, Paterson, be and the same is hereby suspended for forty (40) days, commencing at 3:00 a.m. Thursday, April 13, 1967, and terminating at 3:00 a.m. Tuesday, May 23, 1967.

BY THE DIRECTOR:

The Hearer has filed the following report herein:

Hearer's Report

Licensee pleaded not guilty to the following charge:

"On October 1, 1966, you sold, served and delivered and allowed, permitted and suffered the sale, service and delivery of alcoholic beverages, directly or indirectly, to a person under the age of twenty-one (21) years, viz., Thomas G.---, age 17; in violation of Rule 1 of State Regulation No. 20."

The factual setting for the Division's case was developed through the testimony of four minors, supplemented by that of two ABC agents specifically assigned to investigate the alleged sale to a minor on the date hereinabove referred to.

Thomas --- (a 17-year-old minor), gave the following account: In the company of three young companions, he drove his motor vehicle to the licensee's tavern on October 1, 1966, at about 9:00 p.m., and parked the same in the adjacent parking lot. Thomas was familiar with these licensed premises, having been employed in a nearby gasoline service station, and had purchased alcoholic beverages from this licensee on numerous occasions prior to October 1, 1966.

He entered the premises, ordered, was served and paid for three six-packs of beer and a couple of bags of pretzels and nuts by the licensee. He was not questioned about his age nor was he requested to make any representation with respect thereto.

Re-entering the motor vehicle, he drove up to the quarry in South Orange, where he and his companions consumed some of the beer. Shortly thereafter, this vehicle was involved in a serious accident near Morristown, as a result of which this minor was rendered unconscious for several days and suffered multiple injuries. He identified the licensee at the hearing as the person who sold him the beer, and stated unequivocally that this was the only tavern which he patronized on the date in question.

Richard --- (a minor) corroborated the testimony of Thomas, and stated that he was in the motor vehicle when it was

driven to the licensee's premises on the date in question. He saw Thomas leave the vehicle without any beer, enter the said licensed premises and shortly thereafter return with the six-packs of beer.

Nicholas --- (age 14) and Nicholas R. --- (age 15), the two other minors in the motor vehicle on the date in question, similarly corroborated the testimony of Thomas. Nicholas R. stated that, when Thomas emerged from the tavern, he held in his hand a cardboard box containing three six-packs (of beer), some pretzels and nuts. The package was placed in the rear of the car and all of the occupants consumed the same at the quarry, a short distance from the tavern.

ABC Agent N testified as follows: Pursuant to a specific assignment to participate in an investigation of this matter, he visited the licensed premises on four occasions. On November 16, 1966, in the company of Agent D and Nicholas R. (one of the minors), he was directed by Nicholas R. to this licensed premises who pointed out exactly where the car was parked immediately preceding and following the alleged purchase. The agent returned to the premises that evening with Agent D and Nicholas (another of the minors) who similarly identified the licensed premises.

On January 5, 1967, in the company of Agent F and Thomas, he was directed by the minor to the licensed premises and thereupon they entered the said premises. They questioned D'Alessandro about the alleged sale on October 1. D'Alessandro admitted that he had seen Thomas in his tavern on several occasions but each time "he drank root beer and never drank or purchased any beer."

Agent F, who was present at the confrontation between Thomas and the licensee on January 5, 1967, corroborated Agent N's testimony. He further pointed out that there are no other taverns in the immediate area; the nearest one, in his estimation, is located about three or four blocks away.

Henry D'Alessandro (the licensee herein) denied making any sale of alcoholic beverages to this minor. He had been a licensee at these premises for the past seventeen years and recognized Thomas as having been employed at a nearby gas station next door to his premises. Thomas came into his tavern about "a half dozen" times, and each time asked for beer. However, on these six occasions he served him root beer instead. On cross examination he did not have any specific recollection of the date alleged, namely October 1, 1966, but was certain that on every occasion, if the minor asked for beer, he served him root beer, which Thomas accepted without question, and consumed on the premises. He further added that the reason he served him root beer was that he knew Thomas was under twenty-one years of age.

Before commenting on the testimony, it might be well to state the general principles which guide us in the determination of these matters. These proceedings are civil in nature and require proof by a preponderance of credible evidence. Kravis v. Hock, 135 N.J.L. 259 (Sup. Ct. 1947); Butler Oak Tavern v. Division of Alcoholic Beverage Control, 20 N.J. 373 (1956). The finding must be based on competent legal evidence and must be "grounded on a reasonable certainty as to probabilities arising from a fair consideration of the evidence." Further, the finding "cannot be based on evidence which is inherently incredible or opposed to ... common knowledge and experience." 32A C.J.S. Sec. 1042.

I have carefully evaluated the testimony herein both on behalf of the Division and on behalf of the licensee, and have had an opportunity to observe the demeanor of the witnesses as they appeared before me. A study of the entire record gives rise to the inescapable conclusion that this charge has been amply supported by the credible, consistent and forthright testimony of the four minors. On the contrary, I have not been impressed with the credibility and veracity of the licensee. It seems utterly preposterous and does violence to human experience to accept the licensee's testimony that this minor ordered beer on six separate occasions and each time received and accepted root beer. In any event, on the date alleged I am satisfied that Thomas ordered and was sold three six-packs of beer. This was clearly and unmistakably corroborated by his three companions who saw him emerge from the tavern with the beer, and participated in the consumption of the said beer.

The only complete defense available to the licensee charged with sale of alcoholic beverages to a minor is a written representation, among other things, by a minor. See Rule 1 of State Regulation No. 20 and Special Note in Section 5 of Appendix to the 1957 pamphlet State Regulations. Re Bonanno, Bulletin 1716, Item 1; R.S. 33:1-77.

Since this issue resolves itself into a factual conflict wherein the licensee denies the said sale as charged, it is unnecessary to consider the applicability of such defense in this instance. If the licensee did not sell beer to the minor, obviously he did not require any written representation as to his age. Further, the licensee admits that he knew that the minor was under twenty-one years of age.

I find that the sale and service of alcoholic beverages to this minor was established by a preponderance of the credible evidence, and, indeed, by substantial evidence. It is, therefore, recommended that the licensee be found guilty of sale and service of alcoholic beverages to the minor Thomas as alleged.

Licensee has a prior record of suspension by the Director for fifteen days effective July 13, 1966, for possession of liquor not truly labeled. Re D'Alessandro, Bulletin 1690, Item 6.

The prior record of suspension for dissimilar violation within the past five years considered, it is further recommended that the license be suspended for twenty-five days. Re Central Liquor Co., Inc., Bulletin 1603, Item 8.

#### Conclusions and Order

No exceptions to the Hearer's Report were filed pursuant to Rule 6 of State Regulation No. 16.

Having carefully considered the transcript of the proceedings and the Hearer's report, I concur in the findings and conclusions of the Hearer and adopt his recommendations.

Accordingly, it is, on this 3d day of April, 1967,

ORDERED that Plenary Retail Consumption License C-29, issued by the Town Council of the Town of West Orange to Henry D'Alessandro, t/a Henry's Tavern, for premises 34 So. Valley Road, West Orange, be and the same is hereby suspended for twenty-five (25) days, commencing at 2:00 a.m. Monday, April 10, 1967, and terminating at 2:00 a.m. Friday, May 5, 1967.

BY THE DIRECTOR:

Licensee pleads non vult to a charge alleging that on March 2, 1967, it permitted Kenneth Scott, a minor employee, to sell a half pint of brandy, in violation of Rule 2 of State Regulation No. 13.

Permittee, age 18, pleads non vult to a charge alleging that on March 2, 1967, he sold a half pint of brandy in contravention of the condition of his employment permit prohibiting his sale of alcoholic beverages, in violation of R. S. 33:1-26.

Licensee has a previous record of suspension of license by the municipal issuing authority for twenty days for sale to minors, affirmed on appeal to the Director, the Appellate Division of the Superior Court, the New Jersey Supreme Court and the United States Supreme Court, wherein certiorari was denied, and ultimately reimposed by the Director effective November 12, 1964. Lake, Inc. v. Oaklyn, Bulletin 1531, Item 2; Lake Inc. v. Oaklyn and Division of Alcoholic Beverage Control (App. Div. 1964), not officially reported, recorded in Bulletin 1584, Item 1; certif. denied, id nom. 43 N.J. 358; Lake, Inc. v. Oaklyn, Bulletin 1597, Item 3.

During the pendency of these proceedings, Limited Employment Permit No. 5397 expired by its terms on March 31, 1967, and to date no application for its renewal has been received.

The license will be suspended for ten days (Re Baldanza and Pino, Bulletin 1652, Item 10), to which will be added five days by reason of the record of suspension of license for dissimilar violation within the past five years (Re Paul's Shore Liquors, Inc., Bulletin 1721, Item 1), or a total of fifteen days, with remission of five days for the plea entered, leaving a net suspension of ten days; and any renewal permit will be suspended for thirty days, with remission of five days for the plea entered, leaving a net suspension of twenty-five days. Re Gere, Bulletin 1652, Item 10.

Accordingly, it is, on this 10th day of April, 1967,

ORDERED that Plenary Retail Distribution License D-2, issued by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Oaklyn to Lake, Inc., t/a Karl's Liquors, for premises 210-12 White Horse Pike, Oaklyn, be and the same is hereby suspended for ten (10) days, commencing at 9:00 a.m. Monday, April 17, 1967, and terminating at 9:00 a.m. Thursday, April 27, 1967; and it is further


