BACKGROUND INFORMATION FOR THE GOVERNOR'S MISSION

TO SWITZERLAND

INTRODUCTION

This is the second report from the series "Governor's Investment Mission to Europe." The first report provided basic information for the German leg of the mission. This report covers Switzerland. As the reports were thought to be used separately for both countries, two sections of the German report, "New Jersey Outstanding Industries" and "Pollution Constraints in Locating in New Jersey", are included in this report. A section that covers U.S.-Swiss economic aspects is added to this report. There was no such corresponding section in the German report. The content is divided into six sections which provide discussion of the following key issues:

- the first section outlines the relationship between the U.S. and Swiss economies in light of Swiss investments in the U.S.,
- the second section underscores the theme which may be the basic
 thrust of public relations in Switzerland, i.e., "New Jersey the place
 to be for Swiss investors",
- the third section provides some historical background of Swiss investors in New Jersey,
- the fourth section outlines the recent activities by Swiss investors in the U.S.,
- the fifth section describes those New Jersey industries that historically perform outstandingly on a nationwide scale,
- the last section rates New Jersey industries according to pollution constraints.

In addition, Appendix 1 lists all present New Jersey-Swiss manufacturing investors, their products, number of employees, their location and their parent firms in Switzerland. Appendix 2 names all present New Jersey-Swiss nonmanufacturing firms with details as in Appendix 1. Appendix 3 names major (with over 100 employees) U.S.-Swiss investors with details as in Appendix 1. Appendix 4 lists Swiss banks and investment companies that are represented in the U.S. and their U.S. branches. Some Swiss investors may feel more confident if they can rely on Swiss banks in their dealings on the U.S. market. A Swiss bank may recognize their credit rating and business may be discussed in their native language. Appendix 5 provides a classified list of major Swiss firms, not necessarily established on the U.S. market, which are members of Swiss-American Chamber of Commerce, for industries that were screened out through this report as potentially interesting for New Jersey, and a list of 100 largest manufacturing firms of Switzerland in 1977. The lists are followed by an alphabetical list of these firms, with a name of a person to contact, address, phone and telex numbers. Appendix 6 provides short titles of the Standard Industrial Classification (SIC) code which is frequently referred to in the text of the report.

1. U.S. - SWISS ECONOMIC ASPECTS

The recent development of Swiss-American economic relations is overshadowed by the increased depreciation of the dollar compared to the Swiss franc. The exchange rate of the dollar, which was S. Fr 4.3 in 1970, averaged S. Fr 2.40 for 1977, and plunged to S. Fr 1.63 toward the end of January 1979. This is likely to have a braking effect on the growth of Swiss exports to the United States and an accelerating effect on Swiss investment in the United States.

Swiss exports to the U.S. increased between 1970 and 1977 by 41% in millions of S.Fr but defacto declined as the percent of total Swiss exports from 8.9% in 1970 to 6.8% in 1977. Had the 8.9% rate been kept through these years, Swiss exports to the U.S. would have amounted to 3882.4 million S.Fr by 1977. Actually it amounted to only 2768.4 million S.Fr - the difference between the two values equals to 1114 million S.Fr (\$675.1 million). The braking effect is probably one reason of the decline. Consequently, if Swiss manufacturers do not want to lose the U.S. market they would have to set up new production facilities in the United States through construction of new plants, acquisition of U.S. manufacturing plants or joint ventures with U.S. manufacturers.

The table on the next page shows the U.S. share of total Swiss exports by commodity groups. The groups with the strongest decline would be the most attracted to invest in the U.S. unless their decline was caused by other reasons, such as stiffer international competition (example: Swiss versus Japanese watches).

The slight upturn between 1975 and 1977 may be explained by the difference in the inflation rate and price behavior between the two countries. In 1975, average GNP monthly inflation in Switzerland was running at an annual 6.7%, as high as in the U.S. In Switzerland, however, it dropped in 1976 to 1.7% annual rate and 1.3% in 1977, while the U.S. rate was 5.8% in 1976 and 6.5% in 1977. Therefore the prices for goods in Switzerland have remained stable since 1975. The consumer price index in Switzerland

was +3.4% in 1975, as compared to the previous year, +1.3% in 1976 and +1.1% in 1977. The consumer price index in the U.S. in corresponding years was +7.0%, +4.9% and +6.7%. The result was that the U.S. import price index (1975 = 100), even after adjustment for \$ - S. Fr exchange, rose 3.5% in 1977, compared to an increase in Swiss export prices of 1.0%. From these statistical averages, it can be deduced that Swiss products were more competitive in 1977 than in 1975 on the U.S. market, despite the depreciation of the dollar, due to the difference in the inflation rate between the two countries.

On the other hand, the U.S. export price index (1975 = 100) - adjusted for exchange - rose 0.9%, compared to an increase in Swiss import prices of only 0.4%. This means that the competitiveness of American goods did not improve between 1975 and 1977. The conclusion from the above is that the proper strategy for the U.S. is to attract Swiss investors to the U.S., as they will tend to be attracted in the long-run depreciation of the dollar, rather than emphasizing the export of American goods to Switzerland while the difference in inflation rates is so high. The 1978 data on inflation is similar to the two previous years. In Switzerland the annual average inflation rate was 0.8%, while in the U.S. it reached the two-digit figure.

2. NEW JERSEY - THE PLACE TO BE FOR SWISS INVESTORS

The history of Swiss investment in the U.S. begins at the end of the nineteenth century. "Switzerland General Insurance" opened an office in New York in 1872 and the company is still operating successfully today. According to the U.S. Department of Commerce statistics, Swiss investment in the U.S. multiplied some 6 1/2 times over the period 1950-1976, amounting to \$2.3 billion in 1976. That is 7.6% of the total foreign investment in the U.S. Switzerland occupies fourth place as a direct investor in the U.S. behind Canada, Netherlands and Great Britain.

According to the data gathered from the U.S. Department of Commerce and the Yearbook 1978/79 published by the Swiss-American Chamber of Commerce, as of 1978 there are 154 Swiss parent firms with investment in the United States. They formed 245 U.S. firms throughout the U.S. Out of 245, 129 (52.6%) are engaged in manufacturing or processing activities. (See the table on the next page.)

New Jersey is the state that is the most often selected by Swiss investors involved in manufacturing or processing activities. Over one-sixth (16.3%) of all U.S.-Swiss manufacturing firms are located in New Jersey. New Jersey is also the state with the highest number of firms with over 100 employees. This indicates that larger firms tend to choose New Jersey over other states. Nearly 62% of all Swiss manufacturing firms that located in New Jersey belong to that category while in New York, the second location choice, only 20%. With regard to employment by such firms, New Jersey has the highest number (16,775) - reaching 30% of total employment by such firms. New York is second and Ohio is third.

If a specific area has a higher growth in some sectors or the share of a sector is higher than in other areas, this would indicate that the area has a special advantage over other areas. Apparently New Jersey is the area for foreign companies to locate in. As shown by the analyses of American-German and American-Swiss manufacturing firms, their locational preference in the U.S. is New Jersey. The above facts provide a very good argument for convincing Swiss industrialists who are about to decide to invest in the U.S. that New Jersey is the place to be.

SWISS INVESTORS BY INDUSTRY TYPE - HISTORICAL TENDENCIES

The previous section covered the locational tendencies of Swiss investors in the U.S. through various states without regard to their manufacturing profile. The aspect of which industries historically choose New Jersey over other states is covered in this section. Historical tendencies in choosing one state over another by some industries indicate that these industries have found a good climate for some reason in a particular state.

The table on the next page provides the percent distribution of locational preferences by Swiss industries through major groups (SIC 2-digit level) for New Jersey and New York and relates it to the percent distribution of industries that invested in the U.S. The New Jersey data show what the major Swiss industries are that chose New Jersey. It may be expected that these industries would be the most easy to attract to New Jersey. Therefore, an effort in Switzerland should be addressed to these associations or chosen large companies of this type (see Appendix 5).

The New York state data are provided under the assumption that similarities in economics and climate between both states as well as the location on the American continent from the European point of view allows us to assume that there is no great difference for a foreign firm to locate either in New Jersey or in New York. New Jersey has the capacity to attract the majority of firms that settled in New York had some additional incentives been provided.

The U.S. data are provided to identify the Swiss industries that invest in the U.S. Relating the U.S. list to the New Jersey list, industries that have shown interest in the U.S. market but did not locate in New Jersey can be screened out.

The majority, over 85.8%, of all the U.S. investment by Swiss firms is related to four major industry groups only (of a total of 16 major groups). These are: SIC 28 - Chemicals and Allied Products (35.1%), SIC 20 - Food (28.3%), SIC 35 - Machinery Nonelectrical and SIC 38 - Instruments. This indicates that these industries are the most effective investors on the U.S. market and possibly most of the effort should be directed to attract firms of these industries.

It should be noted that most of the U.S.-Swiss employment has been created by large Swiss corporations. The first five of these large corporations have established 24 U.S. companies with 99 plants and over 55,000 employees. They are as follows:

The majority of New Jersey investment by Swiss firms is related to three industry groups that correspond to the U.S. list with the exception of one group, SIC 20 - Food. For some reason, New Jersey did not attract Swiss investment in this area. A major Swiss investor in this group is Nestle Alimentana SA. Its employment is 24,000 - which is close to 30% of all the U.S.-Swiss firms' employment. Food industry is the main Swiss investor in the U.S. The majority of Swiss investment in New York state (33.3%) belongs to this group. This indicates that probably there is no special reason why New Jersey should not have more investment in this area. As Nestle is still very active

as an investor in the U.S. market, they should be addressed in Switzerland or at least their major competitors should be welcomed to New Jersey.

Of the four industries aside from Food especially Machinery and Instruments are those where our efforts should be directed to attract them to invest in New Jersey as they are of the non-pollutant type and need a fairly sophisticated work force and a well-established research and development base. The fourth industry group - Chemicals, also the main investor in the U.S., should be addressed in Switzerland but with some caution so as to not attract industries of a pollutant type (the list of pollutant and non-pollutant is provided in the sixth section of this report).

With regard to the historical tendencies as criteria to find industries with a high potential for investment in New Jersey, there follows a list of the four major industry groups that were chosen:

Durable

SIC 35 - Machinery - Nonelectrical

SIC 38 - Instruments and Related Products

Nondurable

SIC 20 - Food

SIC 28 - Chemicals and Allied Products

4. U.S. ACTIVITIES BY SWISS INVESTORS IN 1978

Due to the recently changed relation between the Swiss and the U.S. economy, it may be expected that new tendencies have developed in Swiss investment in the U.S. Therefore, a separate analysis of last year's investment events is provided below.

A total of 26 different activities took place during 1978. These may be divided into eight major categories that are listed below, together with the total number representing the frequency with which each type of activity has occurred.

From the above, it is possible to separate the recent approach of Swiss investors and accordingly, to set a policy as to how to convince Swiss firms to locate in New Jersey.

All activities are listed on the next two pages together with the name of the U.S. and Swiss company, its type of activity, the location of its headquarters and plant, and the type of industry it represents. From this, it is possible to distinguish the recent locational preferences in the U.S. and type of industries that are attracted under recently developed new conditions.

Of the 26 activities listed in the table, 50% are in the manufacturing sector and the balance are in the distribution and real estate sectors. Of the manufacturing activities, the majority (60%) were located in the Snowbelt states. This is the major difference between German and Swiss investors as most of the 1978 German activities concentrated in the Sunbelt states.

The locational preference of Swiss investors was much more favorable for New Jersey when compared with German investors' preference. New Jersey, New York and California were the only three states with two manufacturing investment activities represented in each state.

Acquisition is the most popular form of investment. It refers to a transaction in which title to stock or assets of the U.S. target enterprise is secured - 51% of ownership - by another enterprise. When such a transaction is made between two manufacturing enterprises it usually reflects "direct investment" - investment in an economic sense - as opposed to portfolio investments that are usually made by private or institutional investors. A new plant is the second most popular form of investment. It is a new operating facility, established in conjunction with an existing foreign-owned productive enterprise or as a completely new venture. A joint venture is the third form of direct investment - it describes a situation in which parties establish a new operation to which each contribute according to the provisions of the joint venture agreement.

The most active Swiss investor was BBC Brown, Boveri and Cie. AG with three investment activities reported in 1978. BBC is a corporation that could be compared to Westinghouse. BBC Brown, Boveri and Cie. AG had its headquarters in New York until 1968 at which time it relocated to North Brunswick, New Jersey. BBC is active in three

fields; power generation, distribution and utilization with products such as electrical machines, electronic components, telecommunications and measuring equipment. In New Jersey these industries are strongly represented. This is a strong indication that the BBC should be a prime target in an effort to acquire Swiss investments for New Jersey, especially since it is one of the largest Swiss firms in these fields. A list of other sizable Swiss firms, not necessarily established on the U.S. market, classified according to their major business activities that are of special interest for New Jersey, is provided in Appendix 5 of this report.

It should be noted that Instruments and Electrical Machinery were the most active industries in 1978, accounting for nearly 40% of all the Swiss investment in the manufacturing sector. Other durable industries that had not been very active before have shown an increased interest in the U.S. market. This may mean that recently developed new relations between the Swiss and the U.S. economy have shifted the investment interest more into durable industries from nondurable (Chemicals and Food) that were number one in previous years.

With regard to the investment activities of last year as a pattern to follow to acquire industries with a high potential for investment in New Jersey, below is a list of industry groups that were selected and a list of the most frequent way of investing:

Industries: - SIC 38 - Instruments

- SIC 36 - Electrical Machinery

- SIC 20 - Food

- Other durable industries

Investing pattern: - acquisition

- new plant

- joint venture

5. NEW JERSEY OUTSTANDING INDUSTRIES

One reason why New Jersey is the number one State for Swiss firms to invest in is that many industries that New Jersey is known for are similar to those that Switzerland is known for also. Provided below is the list of New Jersey industries that historically have proved to perform outstandingly in the State outperforming their national counterparts.

This list may serve to point out to Swiss industrialists, in the event that they consider investing in the U.S., that New Jersey would provide them a better chance if established in the State.

The list was prepared using the shift-share analysis to screen out industries that have a faster growth rate when compared to the nation and the location quotient analysis to pinpoint industries with a stronger share than the national average. Both measures reveal a comparative advantage in a local area. If a local area is growing faster or the share is higher than the national this indicates that the area has a special advantage over the rest of the nation.

6. POLLUTION CONSTRAINTS IN LOCATING IN NEW JERSEY

Provided below is the list of industries classified on a scale from 1 (best) to 10 (worst) with regard to the pollution problems they create in New Jersey. Such a list would vary between states. Highly industrial states, such as New Jersey, have a low acceptance margin for some pollutants (example - hydrocarbon) due to already existing high densities of that pollutant in the air. Industries that are classified on the scale from 8 to 10 are not very desirable, and should be avoided. An average pollutant, easy to control, is indicated by 5. Industries are listed in their SIC (Standard Industrial Classification) that classifies industries on the 2-, 3- and 4-digit level. When only 2-digit SIC is shown in the table and no 3- or 4-digit subindustries appear, it would mean that all subindustries have the same classification. On the other hand, when a different class is assigned to the 3- or 4-digit industry, it would mean that this particular industry has a different class. SIC code and titles are provided at the end of the report.
