REPORT OF THE GRAND DICTATOR.

The Grand Dictator then presented his report, as follows :

HOBOKEN, N. J., October 1, 1886.

To the Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge, Knights of Honor of New Jersey :

BROTHERS : When I accepted the office of Grand Dictator, I was well aware of the duties and responsibilities pertaining to the same, and it was my innermost wish to visit every Lodge in the State, at least once, but unforeseen circumstances prevented me from doing so, namely, the long and distressing sickness and death of two of my children. Nevertheless, I have visited nearly one-half of the Lodges and some of them twice.

Soon after the Grand Lodge session I appointed D. D. G. D's for the several Lodges, in conjunction and with the advice of the Grand Reporter and Grand Treasurer, and as they have been named in Official Circular No. 1 there is no need repeating their names here. As far as I am informed, they have in all instances performed their duty faithfully. I also appointed P. G. D. Van Ness and P. D. Keyser D. G. D. at-large.

The following questions have been decided by me, and I leave them to your consideration :

1st. By Centennial Lodge, 216—Can we initiate a person as honorary member without a medical examination ?

Answer—Yes, providing it does not conflict with your By-Laws.

2d. By Garfield Lodge, 2775. (A)—We had re-elected our Dictator for a second term to succeed himself. He now declines to serve and to-morrow evening our officers will be installed. Have we the right to elect a Dictator and install him to-morrow at that time ?

Answer—Yes.

(B)—Having elected a sitting Past Dictator, will our present Dictator be entitled to the Past Dictator's chair for the ensuing term ?

Answer—No.

There have been no appeals.

I have granted, at the request of D D G. D. Sloss, a dispensation to Highland Lodge, No. 651, to consolidate with Ivanhoe, No. 509, to take effect July 20, 1886, deeming it for the best interests of the Order. A copy of the agreement is herewith submitted.

I have also granted dispensations to several Lodges to hold meetings on other than stated meeting nights, where such occurred on holidays.

I have approved an appeal circular from Protection Lodge, No. 634, in behalf of a destitute widow, whose husband was killed by an explosion a few days before he was to be initiated.

One new Lodge was instituted by Brother Van Ness, at Little Falls.

The Order throughout the State is in a healthy condition, and with the exception of a few, the Lodges are increasing their membership.

I recommend that this Grand Lodge take some action in extending the Order in that portion of the State where it does not exist.

I have but one complaint to make, and that is, that several Lodges allowed themselves to be suspended, either through carelessness or misconstruction of our Laws. I ask the Representatives of the different Lodges to impress upon the minds of Subordinate Lodge Officers the importance of prompt remittances to the Supreme Treasurer.

Several important changes have been made in our Constitution and Laws at the last session of the Supreme Lodge, which will be fully explained in the report of our Representatives to that body.

In closing, I thank the Officers of the Grand Lodge who have assisted me and accompanied me in my visits, Grand Reporter Mayhew in particular, for his advice and information on matters pertaining to the Order; the Officers and Members of the Lodges I have visited for their hearty welcome, and the District Deputies for performing their duty to the satisfaction of the Lodges and myself.

May the Supreme Dictator of the Universe so direct our minds that whatever is transacted by the Grand Lodge at this session will be beneficial to all Knights of Honor in this State.

REPORT OF THE GRAND REPORTER.

NEWARK, N. J., October 1, 1886.

To the Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge, Knights of Honor, of New Jersey :

BRETHREN: As required by usage and the laws of this Grand Lodge, I have the honor and pleasure of submitting in as brief a manner as possible the transactions of my office for the past year, and show you the condition of the Order in the State, so far as the Subordinate Lodges are concerned, to June 30th, and matters of the Grand Lodge to October 1, 1886.

With this report you will receive abstracts and tables that take a great deal of work to get correct, and I hope the labor bestowed upon them will be appreciated by my Brothers by carefully perusing them, as the information they contain can be procured from no other source.

They are as follows :

- No. 1, Abstract of Membership for term ending December 31, 1885.

- " 10, List of Lodges, giving time and place of meeting, and Reporter's address.

By my report you will see that we have not decreased in membership, but have during the year ending June 30th made an increase of 101, or about 3 per cent.

This is encouraging, but is not what we might have done, had we done our duty. The opportunity is ours to do better, and we must do it. The Supreme Lodge will now furnish supplies free for all new Lodges instituted with not less than twenty new Charter members. By this arrangement our Deputies can realize the full amount of the charter fee of One Hundred Dollars. As the maximum for members joining a new Lodge has been removed by the Supreme Lodge, the admission fee can be materially reduced by an increased number of applicants, thus enabling a Deputy to induce more to join than under the old law. Good, live Deputies can do themselves and the Order good, by going to work now with an earnestness that should show some good results during the coming year.

Our Order is firmly established, and has the confidence of the people, and what we now want in New Jersey, is a few earnest workers to enter the field, and lay our aims before the community. There is plenty of territory in New Jersey, small as the State is, that has never been visited by our Deputies, and where the Knights of Honor are unknown.

But we must not depend entirely upon the establishment of new Lodges for an increase of our membership. The old members must wake up and talk of the Order, for they are the ones that know its benefits and can tell of the vast amount of good we are doing.

While some of the States have been lukewarm and have decreased in membership, New Jersey has made a gain every year, as a perusal of Abstract No. 9 will show, and of which record we should be proud. With the admission fee at its reduced rate we should show a gain of twenty-five per cent. during the coming year. Let us try and see if it cannot be done.

At the session of the Supreme Lodge a committee was appointed with power to compose and issue a new Ritual, and recent information from the Supreme Reporter is, that the work is in the hands of the binder, and each Lodge will be furnished as fast as possible with a full set, at a cost of \$3.50. With the reception of the new work we should renew our old time interest, have a general waking up, and a material increase of membership. Let the ceremonies, whatever they may be, be memorized by the officers, and thus reflect credit upon our Lodges, and let us all contend for the name of doing the best work. The Lodge that excels will be the one that will have the best attendance, and consequently the largest accession to its ranks.

I would recommend that the Grand Lodge procure a sufficient number of the new Rituals, to furnish each Deputy with one, they to be the property of the Grand Lodge, and the Deputy to be held responsible for its return to the Grand Lodge when his term of office expires.

MINUTES OF THE GRAND LODGE.

As the printed proceedings of this Grand Body contain the only complete record we have of our transactions, I would respectfully ask that any member or Lodge having any copies of the proceedings of the three first sessions of this Grand Body to send them to this office, and that you authorize the Grand Reporter to have them bound in a substantial manner with the proceedings of the more recent sessions, as the time will, no doubt, come when we will wish we had them. Many of our Lodges would, no doubt, like to be in possession of a complete copy, and the cost would be comparatively small.

LODGES.

During the year we have added one new Lodge to our number. It is known as Little Falls Lodge, No. 3234, and was instituted December 30, 1885, by Deputy B. H. Van Ness, P. G. D. We have recently lost a Lodge by the consolidation of Highland Lodge, No. 651, with Ivanhoe Lodge, No. 509. This gives us forty-eight Lodges in the State.

ASSESSMENTS.

From October 1, 1885, to October 1, 1886, twenty-two assessments have been called by the Supreme Lodge.

At a recent session of the Supreme Lodge a new plan of calling assessments was adopted. It is the calling on the first of every month for a sufficient number to meet the number of deaths that will probably be registered during the month.

The dating of all assessments on the first of the month appears to give better satisfaction than the old plan, as every member knows that they must be paid by the last day of the month in which they are called.

SUSPENSIONS.

During the year there has been twelve suspensions of Lodges in this State, and upon enquiring, we find that in almost all cases the cause was carelessness on the part of the Treasurers in not remitting promptly. The remittances went *quick enough*, but were not started *soon enough*.

The irregular times that assessments were called was another cause. This is, however, obviated, as whatever are called now must be in the hands of the Supreme Treasurer by the 10th of the month.

The suspended Lodges have all been re-instated.

DEAR SIR AND BROTHERS:—Your appointment of me as a Deputy at Large, with a view to the institution of new lodges, I am gratified in being able to report, has not been entirely fruitless; as one lodge, Little Falls, No. 3234, was instituted in the latter part of December last, and, as the name implies, is located at Little Falls.

To the Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge, Knights of Honor of New Jersey.

Your Committee on State of the Order are gratified that they are once more able to feel that the Order which they represent appears to be regaining its old-time vigor and energy, and that brighter days are in store.

To the Grand Lodge, Knights of Honor of N. J.

BROTHERS: We report to you our attendance at the 13th Annual Session of the Supreme Lodge, held at Providence, R. I., commencing on Tuesday, May 11th, and continuing eleven days. The session was one of the most important ever held by that body.

Many minor changes were made in the wording of the Constitution, most of them being necessary, in order to conform to the change in manner of collecting assessments. As the new Constitution has been printed some time, and may be had by every member of the Order, we do not deem it necessary to name it here.

The most important change is the one above alluded to, viz: Change in collecting assessments. This is found in Article VII. of the Supreme Lodge Constitution. The new law requires the calling by the Supreme Reporter, on the first of each month, for a number of assessments sufficient to meet the requirements for the whole month, and makes the assessment or assessments so called payable on or before the last day of said month, directing, also, that it be in the hands of the Supreme Treasurer by the 10th of the following month.

We consider this a very important change and one that will be of great benefit to the Order, as it assures the more prompt payment of benefits.

Article VIII, as amended, provides that the G. D., G. V. D., and G. R., may, in cities of over 100,000 inhabitants, divide the said city into districts of not less than five Lodges each, and in such case the State Medical Examiner may appoint one or more Medical Examiners for each district.

The price of Benefit Certificates was raised from 50 cents to \$1.00 each.

Article IX. is so amended as to permit a divorced husband to obtain a new certificate on furnishing the Supreme Reporter satisfactory evidence of said divorce.

Article X. provides for changing the Supreme Lodge Constitution by a two-thirds vote of members voting, provided said vote is equal to a majority of the whole membership of the Supreme Lodge.

GENERAL LAWS.

Law 4 is amended so as to provide for admission beyond Lodge jurisdiction.

Law 10 permits Supreme Lodge to create P. G. D. by unanimous vote, &c.

Law 12 permits circulation of circular in Grand jurisdictions on approval of G. D., without submitting to Supreme Dictator.

Law 28.—The Suicide Law was repealed.

A new Law, called 28, permits a member to notify his Lodge not to receive assessments on him from any other person than himself, or such person as he may designate, and thereafter the Lodge shall not receive from any other person.

A new Law, No. 33, prohibits any person from using the words "Knights of Honor" for any outside purpose.

SUBORDINATE LODGE CONSTITUTION.

Section 1, Art. 1. Strikes out limit of forty members to new Lodges.

Art. 5, Sec. 4. Strikes out the words, "Shall refer to no other subject."

Sec. 6. Changed to conform to collection of monthly assessments.

Art. 6, Sec. 1. Changes the words "Supreme Power" to "Supreme Ruler."

Sec. 2. Makes the amount accompanying the application two dollars instead of four dollars, and requires at least one of the Investigating Committee to accompany the applicant to the Medical examiner and certify that he is the man proposed.

Sec. 4. Gives the candidate four months additional time after notice from Reporter of Election to appear for initiation.

Sec. 2. Is changed to read "More than three months in arrears of dues," but does not change the Law: "A member is six months in arrears for dues when he fails to pay the first three months dues before the close of the last day of the first three months.

Art. 8. Changes the form of Travelling Cards.

Sec. 2, Art. 9. Withholds the password until penalties are complied with.

The Supreme Dictator is empowered to issue supplies to new lodges at such cost, as may be for the best interest of the Order, which we hope, means free of cost.

A new Ritual of one degree was ordered made by the Supreme Body and is now nearly ready. We have no doubt this will prove of good value to our Order

The officers elected are equal to any that have ever presided over the affairs of the Order, and we confidently expect a prosperous season. Much, however, depends on the aid given them by the individual members.

Upon objection being made to Bro. Klotz' proceeding, it was on motion decided to let Bro. Klotz have the privilege of the floor.

Bro. Klotz waived the appointment of the committee, and offered a letter, which was read by the Grand Reporter exonerating Bro. J. P. Baker from the charges circulated by members of the Order against him.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS.

The Grand Lodge then went into election of officers for the coming year.

Nominations for Grand Dictator were then made as follows:

- J. P. Baker, of Alpha Lodge, No. 209.
- Oscar Wiener, of Essex Lodge, No. 1595.

- J. J. Hendrickson, of Palisade Lodge, No. 714.

Bro. Oscar Wiener was elected on the third ballot, and on motion of Bro. J. P. Baker the vote was made unanimous.

The hour having arrived for dinner, the Grand Lodge adjourned until 2 o'clock.

2 O'CLOCK.

The Grand Lodge was called to order and the election renewed.

Nominations for Grand Vice-Dictator were made as follows:

- R. J. S. White, of Montclair Lodge, No. 2638.
- W. H. Neefus, of Onward Lodge, No. 2858.
- L. I. Burk, of Ingomar Lodge, No. 80.

On the second ballot 79 ballots were cast, of which Bro. Burk received 38, Bro. Neefus 39, Bro. White 1, and 1 blank. The Grand Dictator decided there was no election. Bro. REPORT OF FINANCE COMMITTEE.

To the Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge, K. of H. of N. J.

Your Committee on Finance and Mileage respectfully report that they have examined and audited the bills presented to the Grand Lodge for payment during the year, and also the books of the Grand Treasurer, and the accounts of the Subordinate Lodges, with the Grand Reporter, as well as his books, etc. We have found these correct, and that there is a balance in the hands of the Grand Treasurer amounting to \$878.56.

Your Committee noticed that a large number of reports from Subordinate Lodges were made out in a very careless manner, thereby causing the Grand Reporter a great deal of unnecessary labor, which could have easily been avoided, if the Reporters would be more careful in filling out their reports.

A resolution was passed at the last session of the Grand Lodge, placing in the hands of the present Finance Committee and Treasurer the sum of \$75.00, to procure a suitable present to be presented to Past Grand Dictator Klotz. Your Committee decided, on a diamond

scarf pin, which was presented to him at Centennial Lodge in January. We trust the manner in which your Committee has discharged this pleasant duty will be satisfactory to this Grand Lodge.

A resolution was also passed at the last session, requiring all "Reporters of Subordinate Lodges within the Grand jurisdiction to make out and forward to the Chairman of the Finance Committee on the 30th day of June and 31st day of December in each year an itemized statement of all moneys paid by the Lodge to the Grand Reporter." With the exception of some Lodges in Newark and vicinity, no notice of the above resolution has been taken by Lodges, and your Committee would recommend that some action be taken by this Grand Lodge, compelling Lodges to comply with this Law.

Your Committee would also recommend that a sum, not exceeding \$50, be appropriated for the payment of rent for room for the Grand Reporter. Your Committee make this recommendation because we find that the Grand Reporter, in securing a residence for his family, is compelled to have more room in order to have a room for use of Grand Lodge business. We have approved of the report of the Committee on Supplies.

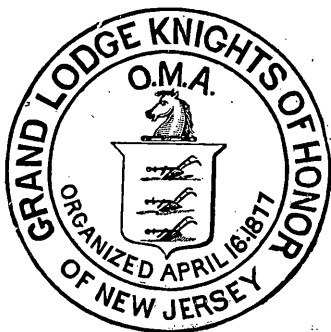


