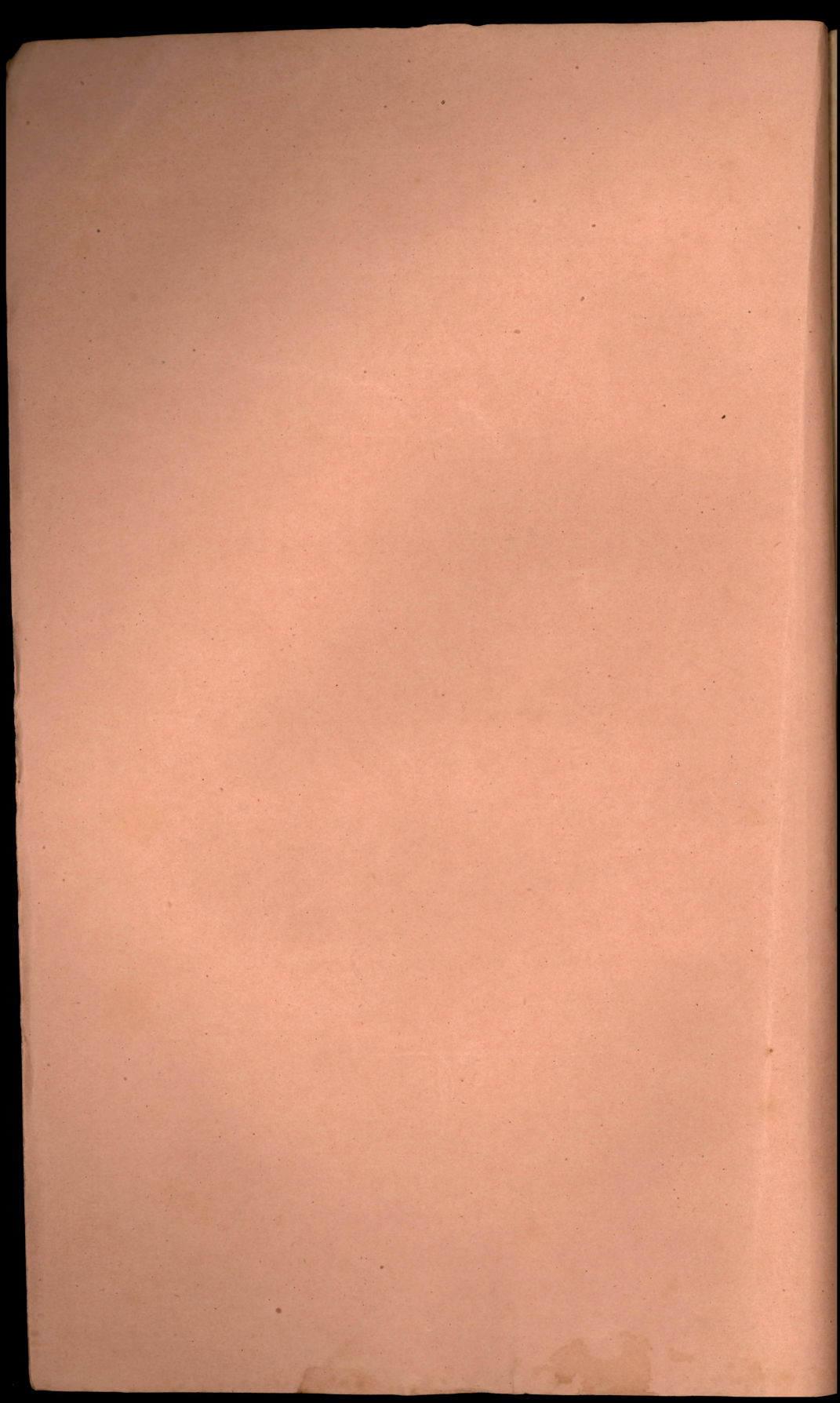

THE EIGHTH ANNUAL CONVENTION

MET IN

Trenton, Nov. 15th, in the Third Presbyterian Church.

HON. JAMES BISHOP, former President, called the Convention to order by reading a portion of scripture. After singing, prayer was offered by Rev. Mr. Chapin.

The President elect, MR. G. W. N. CUSTIS, took the chair, and opened the meeting with appropriate remarks, urging the laborers in the Sabbath School cause to greater exertion in the work of saving the destitute children of our State from sin, and fitting them for the church and usefulness on earth. War having ceased, we should now be preparing to reap a rich peacable harvest for our Lord and Master. He called upon the members of this Convention to be careful of the feelings of each other, that nothing be said to mar the interest or happiness of any member, and thus we might hope for blessed results.

Reports were then listened to from the County Secretaries of Atlantic, Burlington, Cape May, Cumberland, Essex, Gloucester, Hudson, Mercer, Middlesex, Monmouth, Passaic, Salem, and Warren Counties.

On motion of S. W. Clark, Messrs. W. H. Woodruff and Peter A. Voorhees were added to the Business Committee.

The session closed, with the benediction pronounced by Rev. Mr. Brace

WEDNESDAY EVENING.

The Convention assembled at 7½ o'clock, the President in the chair, and was addressed by Rev. H. C. Fish, D.D., Rev. John Paul Cook, of Paris, and Gen. Hite, of Kentucky. Gen. Hite's patriotic and stirring address called forth the applause of nearly the whole audience.

Dr. Fish offered the following:

"Resolved, That this Convention express pleasure in having heard from Rev. Mr. Cook about France; and that we extend to the Sunday Schools in France our cordial sympathies."

The resolution was adopted by a rising vote.

Adjourned with benediction by Rev. Mr. Miller, of Trenton.

THURSDAY MORNING.

Met at 8 o'clock, A. M. An hour was spent in prayer, singing, and exhortation. The Convention was then called to order for business: after prayer by the President, the minutes of last meeting were read and approved.

Reports were then listened to from Hunterdon, Somerset, Union, and more extended remarks from Atlantic Counties. A partial report was presented from Ocean County by Rev. Mr. Frazee.

Rev. Dr. Crane here offered the following:

Resolved, That the Convention allow five minutes for the report of each County Secretary: thirty minutes for each essay appointed to be read before the Convention, and ten minutes for each speaker in debate."

Amended so as to allow the President full time to read the essay, carried.

The Report of Corresponding Secretary was then read; (this report will be found in its appropriate place, among the Reports.) The Report was accepted and unanimously adopted.

Half an hour was then occupied by R. G. Pardee in discussing the "Opening of Sabbath Schools." The following question was then opened for discussion; "How shall the end of Sabbath School efforts be most directly attained?" After debate of an hour, the Convention was dismissed by the benediction.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON.

Vice-President Peter A. Voorhees was called to the chair. After prayer and singing, an essay was read by the President on "The design of Sabbath Schools." R. G. Pardee was then requested to address the Convention on "object teaching."

Rev. Dr. Crane addressed the Convention on "the object aimed at by the Sabbath School." Addresses by Rev. J. Paul Cook, of Paris, "on what France was doing in this Sabbath School work."

Mr. Williamson of Somerset County, offered the following:

Resolved, That Pastors be requested to preach more frequently to their respective congregations, urging upon *parents* the duty of more faithful religious instruction of their children."

Remarks by Mr. Seabrook, addresses by R. G. Pardee, of New York, Prof. A. Tacchella of Milan, Italy, and Rev. Frederick Hicks, Missionary from New Granada, South America.

The following resolution was then offered by Rev. Mr. Appleton:

Resolved, That this Convention express its heartfelt sympathy with Prof. Tacchella, of Italy, and Rev. F. Hicks, of South America, and beg these bretheren to express this sympathy to those whose interests they have brought before us.

Adjoined after benediction by Rev. Dr. Crane.

THURSDAY EVENING.

The meeting was called to order by the President, when the choir sung an anthem. After which Dr. Collier addressed the audience on "the theory of the Sabbath School, and its demands upon the Church." This was followed by an address from Rev. A. W. Seward, both of which were admirably adapted to the occasion. The exercises closed with singing, and benediction by Dr. Seward.

FRIDAY MORNING.

Devotional exercises for one hour. Convention called to order by the President; minutes read and approved.

Rev. F. A. Fernly, Rev. G. W. Lybrand, Thos. Perrens, and Prof. W. G. Fischer, a delegation from the Sabbath School Convention of the Philadelphia Conference of the M. E. Church, were presented and invited to sit as corresponding members. Rev. Mr. Fernly addressed the Convention in words congratulatory to all.

Rev. Mr. Sheeleigh offered the following:

"*Resolved*, That this Convention regard it as very evident, that even the best informed Sabbath School teacher needs special preparation for each lesson undertaken to be taught, just as it is apparent that every pastor, in order to the greatest efficiency, needs diligent preparation for each public service.

"*Resolved*, That we hereby earnestly express our hope that the teachers of the several Sabbath Schools in the State will determine to hold weekly meetings, if they have not already done so, for the purpose of securing from the pastors, superintendents, or other competent persons, such instruction as shall afford direct aid in preparing for the work of teaching the lesson of each succeeding Sabbath.

"*Resolved*, That it is recommended to all teachers to provide themselves with such books as are now prepared, and afforded at a small cost, designed to afford valuable help to teachers: for instance, such as Bible dictionaries; such as briefly and pointedly comment on the word of God; such as present the geography, history, manners and customs, and other archæological branches of sacred study; such also as throw light on the importance, and the best methods of teaching.

"*Resolved*, That, with the same end in view, we recommend all teachers to furnish themselves with some teachers' periodical, which come laden with fresh and invaluable lessons on the various phases of the Sabbath School cause, its necessities and operations, and presenting in briefest form a thousand suggestions, stirring hints, relating to the practical features of one of the most hopeful agencies that has been divinely raised up, in these latter days, within the Church of our blessed Lord." Adopted.

Hon. James Bishop offered the following preamble and resolution:

"WHEREAS, a leading object of this Convention is to bring under Sabbath School influence every child in our State; and

WHEREAS, it is seen by the various reports from County Secretaries, that after seven years of labor, there still exists in the destitute

portions of our field of work a large number of children who have not yet been brought within the reach of this hallowed influence; therefore,

Resolved, That the Business Committee be hereby authorized to employ a suitable person to labor during the coming year in such destitute portions of our territory, who shall make a special report of his labors at the next meeting of this Convention."

A spirited debate ensued for more than one hour, when the resolution was postponed for the present, to allow the committees an opportunity to report.

Rev. Dr. Crane, chairman of Nominating Committee, reported a list of officers of the Association for the ensuing year, which was unanimously adopted, and, the gentlemen named in the report declared elected. The list of officers will be found in its appropriate place.

Mr. G. T. Mulford being renominated as Recording Secretary, positively declined to serve; Rev. E. W. Appleton was nominated and unanimously elected.

S. W. Clark offered the following, which was adopted:

Resolved, That the Chair be requested to appoint a delegation of five to represent this Convention in kindred associations, and to report the results of their visits to the next Convention."

Rev. R. L. Collier, Rev. David Cole, Rev. M. Sheeleigh, Samuel W. Clark and G. T. Mulford, were appointed such committee; on motion, the President, G. W. N. Custis, Esq., was added to the Committee.

The resolution offered by Mr. Bishop was then taken up and vigorously discussed by Messrs. Harker, Lane, Davis, Frazee, Appleton, Miller, Anderson, Seabrook, Custis, Hilliard, Ellison, Hope, Thompson, Rodgers, and others. The resolution was postponed until next session of the Convention.

The following, offered by Rev. Dr. Collier, was passed by a rising vote:

Resolved, That this Convention hereby expresses its profound and heartfelt gratitude to Almighty God for the restoration of peace and unity throughout our beloved land, and also for the destruction of the cause of our national troubles."

Votes of thanks were passed to officers and speakers, to the pastor, trustees and choir of the Third Presbyterian Church, and to the citizens of Trenton, after which the chair announced that the closing hour had arrived, which had been set apart for devotional exercises. Feeling addresses were uttered by the chairman, Rev. Professor Cole, Rev. Dr. Seward, J. M. Freeman, Hon. John Hill, Rev. G. Henry Miller, Rev. James LeFevre, and Henry B. Chapin. The session was one of great tenderness, and altogether fitting the close of such a gathering, in such a cause.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON.

The children of the Sabbath Schools in Trenton met in three of the largest churches in the city, and were addressed by Rev. Messrs. Crane, Cook, Cole, Perrins, Collier, Canfield and Odell, and Messrs. Van Arsdale and Mulford.

ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
CORRESPONDING SECRETARY.

Your Corresponding Secretary, in presenting this his Third Annual Report to your Eighth Annual Convention, would desire renewedly to return thanks to our blessed Lord for the precious results growing out of Sabbath Schools, and for the increasing interest manifested in this blessed work by our Christian community. Our Association has, from its inception, continued to increase in its influence and power until the earnest prayers of its heartiest friends are beginning to be answered, in seeing its arms of love stretched over the entire State. We are enabled to present returns from 19 out of the 21 counties of our State, most of them thorough, reliable and complete statistics of the condition of the Sabbath School work. In fact, wherever we have an efficient county organization, we are enabled to reach every Sabbath School in the county, and only where we have had to rely on individual effort have we failed, and this not because of any lack of effort, but of the impossibility of effecting this work, save through organized labor.

The work of securing county and town organizations is being slowly but surely done, and each year shows an increase in effective organizations. We have this year county Associations in 16 counties, a gain of five over last year. In several of these, the design and spirit of the State Constitution has been further carried out by the establishment of town Associations. We do not believe the work of gathering statistics will ever be fully accomplished until we are able to have in every township some organization, either by an auxiliary Association, or by a township committee, whereby the interest of *every* school may be enlisted in this work.

The Secretaries appointed by the last Convention have all continued in co-operation with the Association, with the exception of those in Bergen, Mercer and Ocean. Mr. John A. Parsons, of Bergen county, resigned his position early in the year, and his post, at his request, was filled by placing the name of Jasper Demarest on the list of Secretaries. I have not heard from Mr. Demarest since his appointment. Mr. Morrison, the earnest Secretary for Mercer, having left this country for a field of missionary labor, his place has

been well filled by Mr. John Cox, of Princeton, who has labored diligently in bringing Mercer county into the line of co-operating counties. From the Rev. C. D. Nott, of Ocean, we have not heard for the last two months, although previous to that time we had encouraging reports from him.

In all the counties, save the two not reporting at all, the entire failure to furnish a complete tabular view, lies in uninterested town Secretaries; in many instances the county Secretary having to do not only his own work, but that of several of his subordinates, and that without that local knowledge so necessary to success. Six of the counties for this reason present but partial reports, although even some of these represent by far the greater portion of the territory under exploration.

Cape May, Burlington and Gloucester have for the first time, sent full reports to the association, leaving only Ocean and Bergen yet to be reached, to have the whole State brought within the reach of our effort and influence. We trust another year will complete the work.

From the detailed statistical tables presented to the Association yesterday and this morning, we are enabled to condense the following summary of Sabbath School returns;

Your Secretary would be glad to make a complete digest of the facts thus spread before you, but the late hour at which some of the returns have been sent to him, have precluded his reaching a summary until the close of the first session of the Convention, and therefore the inferences drawn are far less satisfactory than he had desired. But some few facts and comparisons demand especial attention.

First, the great disparity between the number of enrolled scholars and the average attendance, seems strangely disproportionate—being but slightly over 60 per cent. This must arise from the fact that many schools report as “Number Enrolled,” all who have entered since the last report, while in fact they have a much less number who are actual scholars. This should be rectified, if we expect accuracy in our statistics, and without accuracy, statistics are worthless.

Another startling fact, shown by these figures, is, that of nearly 16,000 teachers engaged in the work, nearly 4,000, or 25 per cent. are not church members, and, presumably, not partakers of that salvation of which they must be "blind teachers." We are aware that there is a great scarcity of earnest laborers,—but is not the church of God lamentably dead to the work of witnessing for Christ, when nearly one-third of the church family are turned over to strangers for support? This inference is plainly to be drawn from the figures, but we apprehend there must be some deduction made for inaccuracy in those counties where full reports are not made, as we notice that the disparity is greater in such cases. But, at the best, the fact is one which calls for serious and prayerful consideration.

The great end of the Sabbath School is "soul saving," and here we would raise thankful hearts to our Father in heaven for the blessed fruits he has given to the Sabbath School the past year. An army of converts! The number of conversions the past year is nearly two and a half thousand! Our labor is not in vain. Let us thank God, and take courage.

Another very encouraging feature is the large increase in benevolent contributions. Every year shows the Sabbath School taking higher ground in this regard, and paying more attention to the instruction of the young in the Christian grace of giving; over \$33,000 reported as being gathered from the children to do good unto others. Large as this sum is, we believe it but a tithe of what may be expected when our duty is fully done, and every school is infused with true Christian benevolence.

We approach the last item reported with sadness, for we feel that here is a great and seemingly unconquerable defect in our Sabbath School work. One-third of the entire number of schools in the State are reported closed in the winter—the Sabbath School thus practically teaching that religion is a thing of convenience, to be earnestly pursued under fair skies, but left to perish with the first frost. Can we not as an Association use our influence for good in this direction, and devise such means as shall wipe this reproach from our standard?

The Association is fast consummating one end of its organization—knowledge of the condition of the State in regard to the religious instruction of the young. There is another portion of the task we have undertaken, to which it becomes our duty to address ourselves, and that it is to ascertain and supply the destitute and waste places with the Bread of Life. Many of our counties are very thoroughly supplied with Sabbath School facilities, but in some counties there is wide

room for true missionary effort and philanthropy. Be it our task, Christian men and women of New Jersey, to light the torch of gospel truth in every dark corner of our State, and in our personal efforts, and by our gifts show our love to the Saviour, by "feeding his lambs."

COUNTY REPORTS.

ATLANTIC COUNTY.

Dear Brother Clark;

HAMMONTON, Nov. 14, 1865.

In presenting you my annual report, I am sorry to say that Atlantic county during the past year, has not made that progress in the Sabbath School work that we could wish. Some parts of the report present discouraging features, while others afford much encouragement. The number of scholars and teachers has decreased, but the number of conversions has almost doubled. Sixty of the lambs of the flock are reported hopefully converted,—this is a cause of great joy to our hearts and great gratitude to God, that he has blessed the public instrumentalities used to lead the children to Him.

During the past year, two Sunday Schools have been merged into one and two others have been discontinued, while four have failed to report. This will in part account for the decrease in numbers. You will perceive that the amount of benevolent contributions has increased, showing that the young are being trained in habits of Christian liberality.

On the whole, we think that we have no sufficient cause for discouragement, yet we feel that it is necessary that we put forth more earnest, more diligent, and more prayerful efforts in this great work of endeavoring to lead the children and youth to the blessed Saviour.

As you assemble in your Eighth Annual Convention, we greet you with joy, and with thankfulness for the great work that God has given it to you to do, in being instrumental in quickening the Church to an appreciation of her power, through the Sabbath School, to do the work committed to her by our blessed Lord and Master; and in giving ever increasing efficiency to this great agency for teaching the Gospel, by developing and making clear the truth concerning the Christian work on earth, and the best method of accomplishing it.

The totals of these summaries are practically correct, as also the figures of the sub-divisions, save in the case of Delaware Township, where the per centage of those in school is so very low: About 100 of the children in that Township are reported as attending school in adjacent sub-divisions and in Burlington county, which, if they could be taken into account, would make a material difference in the per centage, though it would still be very low.

In the facts revealed by this table there is much to be thankful for, and to encourage, when we compare it with past years. There are now about 57 per cent. of all between 5 and 18 years of age in the Sabbath Schools, where, though the teaching may be imperfect, they are learning something of the great salvation, and are brought under the influence of the Church. It was not always so. But in view of the extent of the great commission, "Go into all the world, and preach the Gospel to every creature;" and of the fact that eternal life or death depends upon faith in Christ as preached in the Gospel, how much there is for humiliation and shame when we note the fact that 43 per cent. or 4,748 are not even enrolled in the Sabbath School, which we know certainly is equivalent to saying, are growing up without a knowledge of Christ, and beyond Christian influences.

An examination of the table will reveal many interesting facts, and be a clear guide in our work; but permit us to call attention to two only. 1st; the wide difference between the per centage of those in Sabbath Schools in the several sub-divisions,—leaving out Delaware Township, they range from 41 to 86. The higher average is the result of zealous persevering labor by faithful Christians who are faithful Sabbath School laborers. The lower average is the result of the lack of such labor, more than of any thing else. Position and density of population has some necessary influence in determining per centage, and in comparisons between densely and sparsely settled districts, these things must be taken into consideration; but let it be observed, and this the 2d point we wish to notice, that in this case the highest and lowest averages occur within the limits of the City of Camden; the highest being in North Ward and the lowest in South Ward. The South Ward of Camden is not down in the Pines. From the centre of North Ward to the centre of South Ward, is not over one hour's walk for even a delicate lady; and just across the river, not a mile wide, with ferry boats crossing every fifteen minutes, lies the great City of Philadelphia; and yet the South Ward of Camden is the great missionary ground of our county.

That we may more fully comprehend the necessities to a perfect consummation of our work, we have prepared the following table which we respectfully submit;

By it we determine very clearly whether or not greater school accommodations are needed on account of capacity of rooms, and by the aid of a map, we readily determine whether or not more are needed on account of location, and a study of it brings us to this conclusion, viz.; that save in one or two districts possibly, responsibility for the work rests upon existing organizations.

There is room enough now occupied for all; and, as a rule with rare exceptions, all are within reach of the rooms. All we need, is the spirit of the Master, which led him to *go about* doing good, and which made it *his meat and his drink* to do the will of the Father and to *finish his work*.

CAPE MAY COUNTY.

In presenting this the first annual report of Sabbath Schools in the County of Cape May, it gives me great pleasure to say, that I am permitted through the goodness of our Heavenly Teacher and the kindness of the superintendents who have responded to the questions in the blanks that have been left with them, in giving a full report of the Sabbath Schools in this county.

For a minute statement, reference will be made to the statistical record. All of the schools that I have been permitted to visit have received me very cordially, and manifest much zeal and interest in the work of Sabbath School instruction. As we had no county organization prior to October the 10th of this year, the work has not been as thorough in visiting all the schools as desired; having no Township Secretaries, the whole of the work has devolved upon the County Secretary, and many of the schools situated at such a distance from my residence, I had to call in the aid of the superintendents for full statistics. Three of the Sabbath Schools having only given in a partial report, I am unable to give a full statement of the statistics as is desired by myself; trusting in the year 1866, at the Annual Meeting of the Association, Cape May will not be behind any of the counties in the State for a full and complete statistical statement.

On October 10th, 1865, a call was made for a public meeting of Sabbath School friends, to take place at the First Baptist Church, Cape May Court House, which was most heartily responded to by every minister of the Gospel and a large number of the friends of the Sabbath Schools in our county; at this meeting our county was organized into an Association, auxiliary to the New Jersey Sunday School Association, by the forming of a Constitution and By-Laws, and Secretaries elected for our Townships, to visit the schools, gather statistics and organize the Townships. Cape May has been somewhat sluggish in her organization, to the parent Society, but we trust in the future she will not be behind her sister

counties in her zeal and interest in aiding and sustaining this beloved Association, which New Jersey should be proud of. The cause of Christ in all of our schools is the deep and absorbing thought, as well as prayer, that the Great Teacher and Head of our schools, will, by his Holy Spirit visit each superintendent and teacher, and through them every scholar, so that the Sabbath School shall become a nursery to the Church *in fact*, as well as by name.

We praise and thank God for the sixty ransomed souls from death unto life, that our schools report during the year, but yet we feel humiliated before God, that the number is so small; our faith leads us to believe that a good work is now being manifested in the hearts of many in this county, in several places. Since making up the statistical record, one of our schools has been visited by the power of His Spirit, and nine from the Bible Class have given evidence of being born again, and yet the work is still increasing. It is to be deplored that so many of the schools in this county report a vacation during the Winter months; is God not as willing to bless in Winter's cold, as Summer's heat? Our children attend the week day school in the roughest of the weather, why not the Sabbath School? Many also report no Teachers' Prayer Meeting, or regular organized Missionary Association; yet we believe the day is approaching when it shall be reported that every school in our State shall have her Winter session, and will endeavor Prayer Meetings. Already in this county many of the superintendents, who have reported a discontinuance of schools in the Winter and no Teachers' Prayer Meeting, have commenced a Monthly Teachers' Prayer Meeting, and will endeavor also, to keep the doors of the Sabbath School open during the Winter. When the matter is fully brought before all of the superintendents, I trust the same results will follow.

In our county we have as reported by Town Superintendents of Public Schools, some 2,400 children from 5 to 18 years of age, which show us much is yet to be done in our Sabbath Schools, in bringing in those who are still not enrolled. These souls must be cared for, if we would obey the command of our Heavenly Master, who said "feed my lambs;" and how can the Church better do this, than by endeavoring to search out and bring to the Sabbath School door, and place them in charge of good pious and devoted men and women of God, who are not enjoying this Heavenly manna, and who know not the blessings of the Gospel of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ.

CUMBERLAND COUNTY.

In presenting my Second Annual Report for Cumberland county, permit me to acknowledge the goodness of our kind Heavenly Father. Reviewing the past year we feel that we have great cause for gratitude to the Giver of all good, that His mercy has still been extended to us, and that His blessing has been upon the Sabbath School cause; and we rejoice in knowing that our labor has not been in vain.

There is a growing interest, and there seems to be a desire to bring all the children in the county under Sabbath School instruction, and there is an earnest inquiry with many of the superintendents and teachers,—how can we conduct our schools to better advantage, and what means can we adopt to make them the most successful? During the year the spirit of God has been poured out upon several of our schools, and the hearts of superintendents and teachers have been made to rejoice in seeing many of the children give their hearts to the Saviour: One school, of one hundred and eighty-eight names on the register, reports forty conversions.

Last year we reported one hundred and four conversions in the county, this year two hundred and fifty-nine. While many of the schools report no conversions, we believe that impressions for good have been made, and that seed has been sown that will yet spring up and bear rich fruit. Since my last report two more schools have been organized in Vineland, in Londis Township, and one in the city of Bridgeton. One school in the county reports thirty young men and women out of seventy names on the register, over eighteen years of age. That is surely a noble example.

There are now in the county seventy-three schools, and we have this year reports from seventy-two of them. We report more children in the schools and a larger number over eighteen years of age.

There is another subject of great interest to me, and of it I spoke last year. It is the continuance of schools during the winter. I have labored to impress this subject upon the minds of the people, and it has not been without its good influence, for last year we reported twenty-nine schools discontinued, and this year only twenty-one. And I would rejoice to see the day, when not a school in the county would be discontinued during the winter. I am aware that considerable effort would be required in some country places, but schools are now continued during the year and with good success where it was formerly thought they could not be sustained.

I have visited most of the schools in the county, and would record the warm and cordial reception with which I have been met by all denominations. There seems to be a union of feeling, and all appear to be working for the good of the cause.

A great work is being done, and schools are established in nearly every place in the county where it is necessary to have one. Much has been done, but as I look around I see very much to be done. The meetings of our County Association, of which we hold two each year, are well attended and much benefit is derived from them. In conclusion we can truly say that there is life and energy in Cumberland county, and I believe from what I can learn that it occupies a high position among the counties of the state, and the county Secretary comes up here from his field of labor to this Annual Feast, with a deep interest in the work, and expects to receive many valuable suggestions, and when the convention shall close, return home with a warm heart to labor in that sphere which the Master shall point out.

ESSEX COUNTY.

Your Secretary in presenting his Annual Report would express his acknowledgements of God's goodness, in permitting him, during another year, to cooperate with the friends of Christ and of Sabbath Schools in their efforts to advance the Sabbath School work in our county.

I accepted the position, fully appreciating its importance, but not without the hearty assurance from earnest friends of the cause, of their sympathy and cooperation. In this, I am most happy to say, I have not been disappointed.

To this you are largely indebted for so full and complete a report as I am able to present.

Your Secretary has received returns from all the schools in the county, which are presented in a carefully prepared table, accompanying the report.

The whole number of schools in the county is One Hundred and Forty-two.

We are able to report 30 more schools, with an attendance of 2,951 scholars than ever before reported to this Association.

Several Mission schools have been opened, and the friends of the cause are active in supplying others where they are needed.

Your Secretary feels pained to find that so many of our schools fail to make any report of the hopeful conversion during the year. The schools reporting give a total of 533. The conversion and salvation of the children is the great object of Sunday School instruction, and when we read of the zeal of the Great Apostle, who counted not his life dear if he might lead sinners to the Saviour, have we not, dear brothers and sisters, felt a desire to follow in his footsteps: and have we not at times made the inquiry of the master, "What wilt thou have me to do?"

The large amount of over \$9,000 contributed for benevolent objects, (although the schools are only partially reported,) is another cause for gratitude. The habit of systematic benevolence cannot be too early impressed and encouraged. While we are far behind our duty in this particular, let us accept this as a hopeful sign for the future.

Thirty-six of our schools hold teachers' meetings, and thirty-eight have regular monthly concerts for prayer. The reports under these heads are only partial, many schools failing to report.

The Mission work in our county is a very important item in our report. There are 43 schools in successful operation where no regular church organization exists. Union or Mission Sabbath Schools, where Christians of every denomination may unite in labor and in effort to win souls to Christ.

This county is doing nobly in this direction. Let the Mission Schools continue to have a place in our hearts, and let us see to it that they are planted in every destitute place in the county.

The Sabbath School reports from several of the counties in the State report *Township Sabbath School Associations*. These have proved valuable auxiliaries, and your Secretary would recommend that such organizations be effected in all the townships in the county.

If we were more thoroughly organized, we should be better able to determine where the destitution was, and how to provide for it.

Your Secretary refers with pleasure to the one in active operation in Newark, (the only one in the county,) which holds its meetings on the second Monday evening of each month, in the different churches of the city. These meetings are highly valued by those who attend them, as they foster mutual acquaintance and sympathy. All denominational distinctions are here lost sight of. Christians of every name come together on one common platform, with one aim and object. Much is said to encourage and stimulate to greater exertion in the work, and valuable hints are given to superintendents and teachers. Such an organization should be effected in every township in the county.

By our report it will be seen there is much yet to be accomplished in gathering the wandering ones into our Sabbath Schools, many of them, without any one to tell them of a loving Saviour, or point out to them the way of life and salvation.

While these facts are before us, let us covenant, one with another, with united effort to give increased efficiency to the Sabbath School cause, as one of the best agencies for attaining this great and blessed result; and while we unite in effort and in sympathy, let us unite in prayer for God's blessing on the work and on the deliberations of this convention.

It is a pleasure for me to write you these few lines, this afternoon, for the County of Gloucester. There have been efforts made to bring this county worthy of notice in your State Sunday School Association, but they have failed. But Divine Providence has opened the gate of enlightenment more plainly, the good people of the County have put their shoulders to the wheel, and we have come out victorious. On the 7th of last September we held our Sunday School Convention; God was with us; we had a good time. In the morning we had our business meeting, and in the afternoon and evening there were addresses from prominent speakers of the county and adjoining county.

We have reported 24 Sabbath Schools from the county out of 28, leaving only 4 schools not heard from. We trust that we may have those to report next year. There are 5,938 children in the county between the ages of 5 and 18, and there are only about 2,400 in the Sunday Schools; My dear brother, is there not plenty of room for active service, when we see so many children out of Sunday School? will not the teachers and superintendents of Sunday Schools go to work in God's field, while the harvest is plenty. We hope next year to have our number increased 1,000 more if we can, and my humble prayer is that the good people of the State of New Jersey will go to work in earnest and that hundreds, nay thousands of those precious souls that are now out of the Sabbath School, may be brought in and fed with the bread of eternal life. HUDSON COUNTY.

Your Secretary for the County of Hudson in presenting his Third Annual Report to the State Association, would first express gratitude to God for His kindness and multiplied blessings during the year, as from week to week, He has aided his servants to go forward in the blessed work of Sabbath School teaching.

The schools of the county have increased during the year in number, and we hope in efficiency—we have now eight more schools in successful operation than we had one year ago. Seven of these are Mission Schools prudently located,—profitably conducted,—largely attended, and are exerting each in their place a healthful and truly religious influence. The friends of Jesus are making glad some hundreds more of little ones, and sending religious volumes and truth in many additional families.

Our Mission Schools continue to be managed well—Superintendents and Teachers in the main are indefatigable—self denying and devoted—they are sustained liberally by our churches—and are well worthy of their care.

Of our new Mission Schools, one is located at North Hoboken containing 110 scholars and 19 teachers—one at Guttenberg, (mostly German children,) numbering about 90 scholars and increasing—one at Secaucus, established by a young soldier returned from the army, which has thrown about it a peculiar interest, it numbers all in that immediate locality—one Home of the Friendless, known as "The Children's Friend Society," in Jersey city, conducted admirably by a few christian self-denying Ladies from various churches—one at Salterville, under the care of the Episcopal church at Greenville—one near Weehawken, containing 100 scholars, 10 teachers, and growing.

The 7th new Mission School embraces the young in our County Alms House, and numbers fifty-six scholars regularly taught by three devoted teachers. These give us 13 Mission Schools and 58 Church Schools in the county, all reported.

Our Church Schools have increased in numbers and interest—very few changes have occurred among our officers—faithfulness and christian love have appeared more evident among our teachers and a prevailing desire is manifest to become better fitted for their work and more useful in it—over one hundred and thirty youth of our schools have consecrated themselves to Jesus, and professed his name this year for which we are most devoutly thankful.

It has been the privilege of your secretary during the year to make about one hundred visits to the schools of the county, and as many or more addresses to schools and Sabbath School meetings of various kinds, this he hopes has been of some profit, while to him it has been very pleasant.

As a most valuable agency in the Sabbath School work of our county, your secretary mentions our Teacher's Association, of which we have three, one in Jersey City in which 16 Schools are represented, one in Bergen, including Hudson City and West Hoboken, and one at Bergen Point, including Greenville and Bayonne.

At the meetings of these associations, topics of interest to every school are discussed, aiding and stimulating the teachers. Their influence for good is being more and more felt in our schools.

The other Associations of the county have the same objects before them, the instruction, improvement and encouragement of teachers, and pursue a similar course to that in Jersey City. Intercourse by delegates between these Associations has proved very profitable and promotive of pleasant Sabbath School acquaintance, and is uniting the whole teaching force of the county in our great and good work of teaching Christ. The Clergy of the county have helped very much to make these Associations useful.

Your secretary gratefully acknowledges the kindness shown him by each of these associations, the aid they gladly afford him and makes it his special privilege to attend the meetings of all and extend through them the great objects of all our State Associations, deeming it a better mode than organizing separate Township Associations. These meetings are easy of access by means of our street railways, and we hope the day is near when every teacher in the county and many parents will avail themselves of their benefits.

The schools of the county adhere very generally to thoroughly committed scripture lessons, recitations of the catechism of the church to which severally they belong, quiet and attention during prayer and engagedness in the singing as an act of worship and not an exhibition of the school or the strength of little lungs, all these your secretary fosters gladly; especially he hails as an omen for good, an effort to render the singing of our schools strictly devotional.

In the last report from Hudson county, your secretary alluded to the need of public as well as [more] private aid and influence of parents and friends, this great want is yet noticeable, though some progress is being made. The friends in Hudson deeply feel that parents, guardians and others, should aid the scholars in the preparation of their lessons at home—aid them in their efforts to be charitable, in being prompt and regular in their attendance, inculcate love and respect for their teachers; the Missionary Association and all the objects of the school, encourage them also by their frequent presence in the school, and Missionary Meetings, and in every way foster the school as a part of the church of Christ. To this subject our superintendents often allude, and such help very much desire.

An adult Bible Class in the Baptist Church of West Hoboken, meeting with the school, is deserving of special mention, and its influence for good must be apparent.

While representing the cause as advancing in Hudson, we do not forget that there is yet very much to be done, and the work growing with the rapid increase of the population. Thousands of our children are to be gathered, many more Bible classes to be formed and new schools organized, parents enlisted, teachers aided and the schools advanced by every proper agency to their position: as a part of the Church of Christ, and all the various efforts in this field are to share more of prayerful and untiring attention, to all of which the friends of the cause are endeavouring to aid and provoke one another.

With humility for unfaithfulness and gratitude to God for his great goodness in visiting our schools by his spirit, calling some into his kingdom, quickening and encouraging others and that we have been aided by the Master to do something in the past year, we seek the presence of the Holy spirit for the future and devote ourselves anew to this blessed work.

To the New Jersey Sunday School Association.

P. A. Strobel, the half of your Sabbath School year had elapsed, before he has signified his acceptance of his appointment and had entered upon his duties.

Hence, although the Sabbath School machinery in our county had been pronounced in very good working condition, yet to a new incumbent there arose of very necessity several hindrances and delays, which may not probably occur in the future.

Even to one who has long been a resident of a county, there is no small difficulty in the timely obtainment of its true and proper Sunday School *status*, and it demands much time and toil and patience to reach the needful information and accurate statistics,

The present incumbent in Hunterdon County greatly rejoices before the Lord in having been led to accept the appointment, and whilst he regrets in common with many others, that the work has not been better done within his bounds and under his supervision, yet has he seen enough of the grace of God, in the Sabbath Schools of his county, to gladden his own heart, and the heart of his co-laborers.

We devoutly thank God for the doings and the blessings of the past year, and take abundant courage in hope of the future,

No small difficulty is experienced in obtaining full reports and statistics from the Township Secretaries; nor is the fault wholly or even chiefly lying at their door; the remissness, with kindness be it said, lies back of the secretaries, even with the beloved superintendents, and in instances not a few.

But our confidence is fixed in the future—that as our superintendents shall more clearly see the importance of this matter of fulness and promptness, then will the work be better done—the reports fuller and the statistical tables more promptly and accurately filled.

Nor would I fail to record the increasing zeal and devotion of the great majority of our superintendents, and secretaries in the blessed work. Surely these are they, who have gone forth for good—"a band of men whose hearts God hath touched."

Our correspondence and our intercourse with these fellow laborers has been of the most courteous, pleasant, and christian character.

Our fourteen Township Secretaries were all re-nominated by the committee, and at our late annual meeting unanimously re-elected—thus indicating the confidence reposed in their zeal and competency for the great and arduous work which lies before us.

The undersigned has no facts of especial interest to communicate—Yet, he is most happy to assure the brethren of the New Jersey Sunday School Association that the association is gaining favor and rapidly growing in the confidence of the Sabbath School men of our county. Many prejudices are being removed, and its objects and its benefits are fast becoming better understood.

In our annual report to our County Association, we called the especial attention of the convention to the excellent address of your business committee which sets forth so clearly, what *are*, as well as what *are not*, the objects of the association. To our own mind it is very plain that all that is needful, to secure, the grand consolidation of all the friends of Sabbath Schools in New Jersey, is that these objects be better known.

So far as our own county is concerned, I am well persuaded that these objects are becoming well understood and appreciated—that confidence is greatly increased—and heartily and speedy co-operation will follow.

We hope to be able to report next year an organization for one in each of the Townships of our county.

We do not report an increased *number* of schools in the county—but we are fully persuaded of a great increase in the *quality* of our schools—and we hope the time is at hand when the proper *qualifications* of teachers and superintendents will be still better understood. We have commended to those of our county, the importance of holding Sabbath School Teachers Institutes and model schools, where teachers may be taught better how to teach, and superintendents be instructed how better to superintend—for we have learned that not every simply good man, nor every simply well instructed man is fit to teach or govern a Sabbath School.

The Fifth Annual Convention of our County Association was held on Wednesday the 20th Sept., in the Borough of Lambertville—The attendance was good—and the character of the meeting such as to leave a most delightful influence behind—whilst the delegates went back to their post cheered in heart for no nobler toil.

May the presence of the spirit guide your counsel and lead you to wise utterance.

MERCER COUNTY.

To the New Jersey Sunday School Association.

In presenting this Annual Report of the condition of the Sabbath School cause in Mercer County, I do so with feelings of gratitude that we have been able to gather a few statistics, and with feelings of shame and mortification that so little

has been accomplished, and that there has been manifested so little concern in regard to this matter. It will be remembered that Mr. Morrison was the regularly appointed County Secretary, and his heart was certainly in the work, and had he remained with us no doubt he would have accomplished much, but called to leave, as he was in the midst of the year to labor in foreign lands, the work was transferred to me, and I have endeavoured to do what I could in the remaining part of the year. We were not able to secure town secretaries in but 3 or 4 townships, but those who were appointed have been faithful and attentive to their duties. I have however made individual appeals by correspondence and otherwise to the other schools throughout the county where we have had no Town Secretary, and but very few have responded, as my report will show. I am sorry that such is the case. But let us thank God and take courage. This is a beginning. We may yet expect that the Sunday School work will have the attention it demands. Only 23 schools have reported out of about 60 in the county, but these give accounts of 46 hopeful conversions during the year. A fact, calling for profound gratitude to Almighty God.

I have often thought however, in connection with the Sabbath School work, that in Mercer County, where so much is done toward properly qualifying men to "go, work in their Masters vineyard," and where so many are laboring "to feed the sheep," that that other injunction equally as binding and important "go feed my lambs," is much neglected. I do earnestly desire that an influence will go out from the State meeting at Trenton, that will stir up this county especially, and lead her Christian people to take such action in the Sabbath School work as shall place Mercer Co. where she ought to stand. Pastors, Superintendents, Teachers and Parents. Have we done our duty in this work?

I sincerely hope that when the schools of our county shall be called upon for a report in 1866, they will at once cheerfully respond, and to encourage them in so doing, I can only say, "come with us and we will do thee good."

MIDDLESEX COUNTY.

Having been appointed by the New Jersey State Sunday School Association its Secretary for Middlesex County during the year now closing, I take pleasure in rendering to the association and to the citizens of the county the following report of my work and its results.

At the time of my appointment, looking at the work as a whole, I hardly knew how or where to begin. My first thought, and that of many others, was to call at once a Convention, and endeavor to form a County Association, as I had formerly done in Somerset. But observation of this county for many years has taught me that county organizations are here rarely a success. I therefore determined to go, as far as I could, into the townships in person, and become acquainted with the Sabbath School men and women, to gather a correct list of the Sabbath Schools with the Superintendents and their addresses, with a view to form a county organization, if possible, next year. I had the advantage of an admirable band of township secretaries, already secured by Mr. Wm. M. Freeman, my predecessor in the Secretaryship. There are nine townships in the county, which with the Secretaries and Post Office addresses, are given in their proper place. In New Brunswick township, I have myself acted as Secretary. All these brethren consented to continue in the work. I have found them willing and earnest men, and desire here to return them thanks for their kind assistance in a labor which without them I should not have been able to perform. Some of the townships are not perfectly reported; this, however, is owing not to any want of earnestness on the part of the secretaries, but to the fact that the work is not thoroughly understood. The utmost energy has not been successful in bringing in all the schools. Another year we hope this may be better. When the nature and results of this year's work are seen in the printed county report, we believe the simple character of our work will be better understood, and all the schools will desire to be represented in the statistical tables.

No public meetings have been held this year in carrying on our work, except one township meeting in Woodbridge township, at which 1,500 persons were present, and steps were taken for forming a Township Association. A very fine impulse was given to the cause by that meeting. Rev. Mr. Lucas, the secretary, had fully aroused the township, and there was a oneness of feeling and sentiment manifested which gave excellent promise for the future. Other townships also moved for the same thing, but it was too late in the season when these movements were started, and the meetings were deferred till next season. We feel sure that we are now ready to form Township Associations at least, and perhaps a County Association.

The last Annual Report of our State Superintendent of Public Schools gives to Middlesex County 10,633 children and youth between the ages of 5 and 18 years. I give the names of the townships with three columns of figures opposite, the first denoting the number of children between 5 and 18 in each township, the second denoting the total, and the third the average number of children and youth of all ages given in this report as attending Sunday School. The asterisk (*) denotes that the township is not fully reported.

There are in all 90 schools, of which 14 are unreported. We may suppose these to contain 1,000 children enrolled, with 750 average attendance. This is a large estimate. Then we have out of 10,633 children in the county, at the largest estimate 7,096 enrolled in our Sabbath Schools, with 4,660 in regular attendance. Suppose 500 more attend schools over the border in other counties, and we have 3,037 children who *never* enter Sabbath Schools. And all observation teaches that very few of these belong to that select class whose parents value home religious instruction so highly as to detain their children from the schools that they may themselves instruct them. They are the spiritually destitute. We feel anxious on their behalf. It is the great object of this association to bring them in. Do not all Christians of any name sympathize in this great interest? Nothing can certainly be more pure than the aims of our State Sunday School Association. We feel thankful to God for what we are here able to present as a report, and hope we shall have all the schools next time, and all the children in them.

An effort will probably be made to form a county organization at the opening of next spring. Due notice will be given in time.

We have two or three model Secretaries, whom we hope to retain, while we pray the good Lord to give us a full corps like them. The successful working of our associations depend more largely upon the Town Secretaries than any other class of men. If they are efficient, and able to secure the hearty co-operation of Superintendents, both State and County associations will move harmoniously, and to grand results, otherwise, as broken cogs in a wheel derange all the machinery of a mill, we shall continue to have comparative failures.

SOMERSET COUNTY.

All the schools of the county, with very few exceptions, have been visited during the summer by the Secretaries of the respective townships, and, as the statistics show, there is encouraging progress in several particulars.

We cannot but feel that we have made some progress on a point where it is so much needed. That *fifty-six* schools, in our thickly populated county, should be closed in winter, is a *sad* item in our report. The real difficulty is not the "the short days," is not "the inclemency of the weather," is not that "the children will not and cannot attend in winter," but the *mountain difficulty* is with those who superintend and teach these summer schools. These laborers are good men and women—most of them are earnest friends of Christ—but they are strangely controlled by the notion that Sunday Schools have a mysterious and vital connection with the Dogstar. They have a *chronic* prejudice on this subject, that withstands every appeal to reason, conscience and duty. And many superintendents and teachers honestly believe (strange as it may seem), that it is best to kill a school outright by a former act of its friends on some autumn day, in view of a more vigorous resurrection in the spring. But, notwithstanding, we do cherish the hope that many of these schools will heed the above resolution, and *venture* an experiment on the *perennial* vitality of an institution that God himself hath planted. I may further remark, it is a fact well established by the schools that are open the whole year, that the teachers are more efficient, the scholars more attentive and active, and the religious interest more marked in the winter than the summer months. And another fact, closely related to the one just stated, is, that the schools which receive most of the Divine refreshing are those that are always open and always waiting to receive the blessings of grace.

After carefully surveying the whole Sunday School work in Somerset County, we are happy in believing that the friends of Christ are laboring from year to year in this interesting field, with increased interest and efficiency. In this increase we can trace the influence of our Sunday School

Association, co-operating with and stimulating the different churches and their pastors in the heaven-ordained work of instructing youth in the truths of the Bible. But this great and good work is but just begun in our country, as it is all over Christendom. We are now only in the initial steps of what the Church should do, and what she will yet do in the religious education of her children. In comparison with all that is interesting and hopeful in youth, what a *mere fraction* they receive at the labors of the church and the ministry. The attention of the church is so largely directed to the adult population, requiring two sermons to be preached to them, and expecting all Christians to be present at the second service, there is but a small remnant of the time and strength of the ministry and laity to be devoted to the children. If the services of the Sabbath must be unequally divided, the larger portion, according to reason and facts, should be given to the young. We would, therefore, respectfully suggest that the different religious denominations, at their next ecclesiastical assembling, devise some plan by which the entire services of the last half of the Sabbath might have special reference to the children and youth.

There is pressing need, also, in our county of some method by which our Sabbath School teachers may be trained in mind and heart for their responsible labors. There can be no argument against having *trained teachers* in our Sabbath Schools, any more than against having a *trained ministry* in our churches. Until some better plan is devised by the church, we recommend pastors and superintendents to meet once a week with the teachers to review the lesson for the next Sabbath; at which meeting, they will carefully and critically examine every word and doctrine, consider the circumstances under which the words were spoken or written, locating countries and places, and suggesting methods and illustrations by which the truth may be effectively applied. And most important of all, the teacher should constantly study his Bible with a devotional spirit. With diligence in preparation, earnestness in teaching, a constant reliance on the Divine Spirit, and faith in Him who hath said, "my word shall not return unto me void," blessed results must follow the Sunday School work.

DEAR BROTHER CIARK:

Until now, I had cherished the hope of being present at the annual meeting of the Sabbath School Association, but circumstances beyond my own control have arisen, which render it imperatively necessary for me to deny myself the pleasure I had anticipated. I regret this for several reasons, but chiefly because I have not the opportunity of meeting with those whose experience in the practical workings of the Sabbath School system is so far superior to my own. Then too, I shall not be permitted to meet those with whom I have been acquainted in other years, and whose friendship I highly esteem.

In reference to the operations of the Sabbath School in Sussex county, permit me to say that in some respects we have advanced. The object of the Sunday School Association is much better understood than formerly, especially in those townships where there is an active, working secretary. This I am sorry to say is not the case in all the townships. To give you an example, I found one of the secretaries who had held the offices from four to five years, who had but once attempted to make a report, and that was only a partial one. He thought that Sabbath Schools were a damage to the community, that the children learned more wickedness than anything else, that it was a very good place for them to go and have a frolic, &c. I am happy to say, however, that was the only one I found of that stamp, but in several of the townships, I found men holding that office who take no interest in the work of training the young.

At the meeting of our County Association, we succeeded in appointing others who we hope will do credit to themselves and their respective townships.

Our Annual Meeting was held September 28th, in the Presbyterian Church, Sparta, and was a decided success. Interesting and stirring addresses were delivered by Rev. A. A. Haines, Rev. J. M. Freeman, and Rev. J. T. Crane, D. D.

We hope next year to be able to furnish a complete report from this county. I send you in connexion with this, the tabular statements so far as I have been able to obtain them.

Though absent in person, my heart and prayers will be with you. May the smiles of Him who said "feed my lambs," rest upon you in all your devotions and deliberations.

UNION COUNTY.

In the reports from the Schools there are many items of interest, a few of which only I will mention.

The Irving Place School of Union, has been removed to Middleville, Essex county. The Salem School, Union, has been discontinued, as all the children in the vicinity, with two exceptions, attend other schools. The Mechanic Street Methodist School of Elizabeth, has been disbanded. We have welcomed the following new schools.—

Episcopal, - - - -	at Mulford Station,
Wheat Sheaf, - - - -	in Linden Township.
Congregational, - - - -	at Elizabethport, and
St. Paul's Methodist, - - - -	at Elizabeth,

which was organized in April, with 43 scholars, and has gained 100.

The Infant Class of First Presbyterian School, Rahway, has 130, and that of Fourth Presbyterian, Elizabeth, 128 members.

The St. John's Episcopal School, Elizabeth, collected \$1,200, and Second Presbyterian, \$1,041.40 for benevolent objects.

The Union Colored School, Rahway, is superintended by Miss Brown, who is untiring in her efforts for the salvation of souls. The schools of Rahway intend meeting at about the same hour, thus preventing scholars being enrolled twice, by attending different schools.

A lecture is given by the pastor of First Presbyterian Church, Westfield, each Wednesday evening upon lessons for following Sabbath.

The Second Presbyterian, Rahway, sends the following interesting and encouraging item; "We are enjoying the presence of the Holy Spirit and witness his power in the hopeful conversion of some of the scholars which we believe is in answer to prayer. We hope on the first Sabbath in November, it being our anniversary occasion, to welcome to the Church about 20, numbers of whom are from the school." With this exception, there has been no special work of grace reported in the county during the year. We rejoice that 72 members of our schools are brought from the darkness of sin, into the experimental light of the truth.

Among the 37 who have died, one teacher has gone to the reward of the faithful. In making this report for Union county, we regret to say that the county organization has not been in good working order since 1862, which will in part account for this imperfect report. Its constitution provides for an annual meeting on the third Saturday in October, at which the county and township officers are elected.
