REPORT.

To the Governor and Commander-in-Chief:

I have the honor to submit my report of the operations of the Quartermaster-General's Department for the fiscal year ended October 31, 1901.

A careful examination of the returns made by commandants of companies, troops, batteries and other organizations of the National Guard shows the small arms in their possession to be in a condition which might be called "fairly good," and while they would answer the purposes of actual service, were our troops called out to suppress riots or disorder, they are unfit for use on the rifle range for the attainment of any great degree of accuracy in practice. The arm now in use is the Springfield B. L. Rifle, calibre .45, of the model of 1879. They were not new when issued, but had been in service with the United States troops on the frontiers and in the war with Spain, and were loaned to the State temporarily for the use of the National Guard to replace those taken into the United States Army by the volunteer troops in the late war with that country.

Advices have been received from the Chief of Ordnance, U. S. A., that the Department is prepared to issue the magazine rifle and carbine, with their equipments and ammunition, on requisition made therefor by the Governor on the Secretary of War, the money value thereof to be charged against the State's quota of the annual appropriation made by Congress for arming and equipping the militia of the several States and Territories.

The amount standing to the credit of the State on the books of the War Department at this date, on account of the above-mentioned appropriation, is sufficient to procure eighteen hundred (1,800) of the calibre .30 arms with the necessary equipments; and if the legislative measures recommended to the Secretary of War by the Chief of Ordnance in his latest report are adopted, the State will be enabled to arm its entire military and naval

forces with the calibre .30 arm, upon the return to the government of the old model loaned for the use of the National Guard.

The section of the proposed act of legislation recommended for Congressional action, by which the States and Territories would be benefited, reads as follows:

"BE IT ENACTED *by the Senate and House of Representatives in Congress Assembled*, That the Secretary of War is hereby authorized to issue on the requisition of the Governors of the several States and Territories such number of the United States service magazine rifles and carbines, calibre thirty, as are now required for arming all of the regularly organized, armed and equipped militia, known as the National Guard, of each State and Territory; *provided*, that each State and Territory be required on receipt of the new arms to turn into the Ordnance Department, United States Army, without receiving any money credit therefor, all United States arms of whatever description now in its possession."

SPANISH-AMERICAN WAR CLAIMS.

Since November 1st, 1900, an allowance of \$9,827.80 has been made on these claims by the Auditor for the War Department. Items disallowed under the regulations of the Auditor's office amount to \$138,298.12. Of this amount the Auditor has consented, provided additional documentary or other evidence was presented within a specified time, to reopen for further consideration items from the first installment aggregating \$54,550.21. The evidence called for has been obtained and submitted to the Auditor, together with explanations and arguments urging an equitable decision on the part of the Auditor. From the consideration given this additional evidence, and the arguments made for its acceptance, the early and favorable action of the Auditor is anticipated, resulting in the allowance in full of the items in question in a few days.

The prosecution of these claims before the Auditor for the War Department, and the War and Treasury Departments at Washington, has entailed much labor, mental and clerical, necessary for the preparation of the vouchers and arguments requisite for their proper presentation. It may not be amiss here to state that this work has been ably done under Executive authority by Captain Samuel S. Armstrong, of this Department, without the assistance of claim agents, thus saving to the State the large fees

which otherwise would have been necessarily incurred for the compensation of such agents. In this connection it is respectfully but earnestly recommended that a reasonable amount, to be determined by the Governor, and commensurate with the importance of the work, be made to Captain Armstrong as a deserved recognition of his services in the prosecution of these claims.

STATE CAMP GROUNDS.

The First Regiment and First Troop, the Fourth Regiment and Battery A, Field Artillery of the First Brigade and two companies, K and L, Second Regiment, Second Brigade, encamped at Sea Girt in the order above named during the periods assigned to them respectively, from July 13th until Saturday, August 3d, 1901.

The encampment was a very satisfactory one, and the manner in which the troops were cared for and the excellent sanitary condition of the camp elicited the commendation of the commandants of the several organizations.

The thanks of the Department are due to Colonel William H. Earley, who acted as Post Commissary, and to Colonel George P. Olcott, who acted as Post Quartermaster, for the zealous and efficient manner in which they performed the important and exacting duties to which they were respectively assigned during the encampment.

The water-supply at the Camp Grounds is insufficient for the needs of the service during the encampment season. To insure an ample supply of wholesome water, and to guard against the possibility of a water famine, the boring of another artesian well on the grounds is recommended as essentially necessary.

The rebuilding of the rifle pits and butts at the rifle range with brick masonry is also recommended, as the wooden butts are easily affected by climatic changes at the shore, and have to be repaired and renovated every year at considerable expense.

There was also paid to the Raritan Guard Armory Association of Keyport, from moneys received from the paymaster of the old Third Regiment (disbanded), the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150.00), being for rental due for the year

1896 for the use of the armory by Company G, Third Regiment (disbanded).

The act of 1899, providing additional compensation for the volunteers of this State during the Spanish-American War of 1898, was amended at the late session of the Legislature, so as to bring within its provisions the 11th Company Signal Corps and Company A, Eighth U. S. Volunteer Infantry, recruited in this State. Such members of these organizations who have presented their discharges at this office and established their eligibility to the benefits of the act, have received the additional compensation so awarded.

The total amount expended under the act of 1899 for additional compensation for the volunteers who enlisted from this State in the several regiments, companies and naval battalions embraced within its provisions, is \$161,898.75, including pay to rejected recruits.

PRESIDENTIAL INAUGURATION.

The Second Regiment Infantry, First Troop Cavalry and Battery B, Field Artillery of the National Guard, were designated as New Jersey's military representation at the inaugural ceremonies at Washington on the 4th of March, 1901.

The expenses, the bills for which were examined in this Department, and after approval by the Governor delivered to the

It will be necessary for the Legislature to make provision for the settlement of this deficiency, which represents a balance due the Pennsylvania Railroad Company for transportation.

WAR MEDALS.

The Joint Resolution of the Legislature, approved March 23d, 1901, awarding medals to certain survivors of the Civil War,

was promulgated by the Adjutant-General in the following circular :

STATE OF NEW JERSEY,
OFFICE OF ADJUTANT-GENERAL,
TRENTON, April 18th, 1901.

Circular No. 4.

I. JOINT RESOLUTION in relation to medals for the survivors of the officers and men who enlisted from the State of New Jersey during the war of the rebellion under the proclamation of the president, dated April fifteenth, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, and in consequence of the requisition of the war department for our quota of seventy-five thousand men from this state, dated April seventeenth, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, and to be known as the "first defenders' medal."

WHEREAS, The president of the United States did, on the fifteenth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, issue a proclamation calling for seventy-five thousand of the militia of the several states under the act of congress, approved February twenty-eighth, one thousand seven hundred and ninety-five, to "suppress insurrection," and on the seventeenth day of April a requisition was made by the war department upon the governor of the state of New Jersey for the quota of this state, and our said governor did, by his proclamation and order, detach one regiment from each of the four military divisions of the state, which said proclamation bears even date with said requisition;

AND WHEREAS, Under and by virtue of the proclamation and requisition aforesaid the "New Jersey brigade—militia" was organized, consisting of the "first," "second," "third" and "fourth" regiments, and was mustered into the service of the United States for three months, at Trenton, May first, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, and on the sixth day of May reported to the president, at Washington, D. C., and was the first fully-organized brigade to arrive for the defense of the national capital;

BE IT RESOLVED *by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:*

The governor of this state be and is hereby authorized to cause a medal to be prepared and presented to each of the honorably-discharged survivors of the officers and men who enlisted from the state of New Jersey during the war of the rebellion in the "New Jersey brigade—militia," consisting of the "first," "second," "third" and "fourth" regiments, and which was mustered into the service of the United States for three months, at Trenton, May first, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one; said medal to be known as the "first defenders' medal," to commemorate their services to their country during this eventful period, the cost not to exceed twelve hundred dollars; and that this resolution take effect immediately.

2. In order that the number of medals required may be ascertained, it is requested that the survivors described in the preceding resolution should send their names to this office at the earliest possible date. The medals will be distributed under orders from the Governor upon presentation of discharges to Brigadier and Brevet Major-General Richard A. Donnelly,

Quartermaster-General, Trenton, New Jersey. In the event of any survivor having lost his discharge, a certificate of service may be obtained from this office.

[Adjutants-General of the Grand Army of the Republic are requested to publish the information contained in this circular in their general orders.]

These medals are being prepared and will be promptly issued when received, pursuant to the conditions of the resolution, to the survivors of the organizations named therein, and whose identity has been established.

Applications for medals awarded to veterans of the Spanish-American War under the acts of 1899 and 1900 continue to be received and granted, upon compliance with the regulations governing their issue. It was not found necessary to expend the \$1,500 appropriated by the Legislature of 1900 for the purpose of purchasing an additional supply of medals, as those furnished under the act of 1899 have been sufficient to fill all applications under both acts.

RECEIPTS FROM THE U. S.

Receipts from the United States, under the act of Congress, for arming and equipping the militia of the several States and Territories:

Stores to the value of \$5,741.42 have been furnished upon the requisitions of the Governor during the year, and the balance standing to the credit of the State on the books of the War Department is \$32,891.47.

The balance standing to the credit of the State on the account of the Naval Militia, on the books of the Navy Department, is \$7,435.20.
