Nonagricultural wage and salary employment increased on a seasonally adjusted basis by 6,700 from November to a December level of 3,143,200, largely due to gains in construction and manufacturing.

December's increase marked the sixth consecutive month in which a gain had been recorded, and brought the cumulative recovery of nonfarm jobs since April to 65,100, surpassing New Jersey's September 1981 pre-recession peak by 29,700. Most of the job gain has been in nonmanufacturing, which hit a record high seasonally adjusted level of 2,425,500 in December; however, manufacturing has recently shared in the upward trend, resulting in a recovery of 18,100 jobholdings, or about 24% of the jobs lost during the recent recession.

Factory jobs increased by 2,300 from November to a seasonally adjusted level of 717,700 in December, as industry gainers outnumbered losers by more than two to one. Notable increases were recorded in nonelectrical machinery and rubber/plastics, up by 800 and 700, respectively. The upturn in nonelectrical machinery was primarily due to strike settlements, while increased hiring in the plastics segment accounted for the upswing in the rubber/plastics industry.

Construction employment increased by 3,300 to 111,800 during December, a level not reached since October 1980. Department analysts noted that seasonal decreases in the residential building, heavy construction, and special building trades segments were less than expected, due to good weather during the survey week and higher than expected demand.

Other nonmanufacturing industries showing strength in December were trade and government. Employment in wholesale and retail trade rose by 900 over the month partially due to larger than expected increases in holiday spending; and government, which was up by 800 in December, registered gains in the federal defense and local education segments.

After seasonal adjustment, the average factory workweek of manufacturing production workers continued to dip as expected during December as factory employment improved. Dropping by 0.1 hours over the month, the average workweek remained strong at 41.0 hours which reflected reduced overtime and was consistent with the 2,300 job rise in manufacturing employment.

The Department of Labor survey also revealed that the average pro-

duction worker in New Jersey's manufacturing industries earned \$392.81 during the December survey, \$4.27 more than in November and \$27.54, or approximately seven and a half percent more than a year ago.


#### LABOR AREA COMMENTS (Not seasonally adjusted)

Improvement in the jobs picture occurred in all labor areas with the exception of Atlantic City, Vineland-Millville-Bridgeton and Hackensack. The largest over-the-month upturn was recorded in the Camden Labor Area, which increased by 2,300, due entirely to increases in the nonmanufacturing sector. The largest decrease occurred in the Atlantic City Area, which dropped by 1,000, with all of the decline concentrated in nonmanufacturing.

Note: Preliminary review of employment reports submitted by employers in connection with their quarterly unemployment insurance tax payments suggest that the monthly sample survey may have missed some hiring during the early stages of the recovery, especially during the second quarter.

If this turns out to be the case, it will be reflected in upward revisions to the nonfarm employment statistics when the next annual benchmark adjustments are completed in March.

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#### TECHNICAL NOTES

##### Nonfarm Wage and Salary Employment

Employment data refer to persons on establishment payrolls who received pay for any part of the pay period which includes the 12th of the month. The data exclude proprietors, the self-employed, unpaid family workers, farm workers, and domestic workers in households. Salaried officers of corporations are included. Government employment covers only civilian employees; federal military personnel are excluded.

Persons on an establishment payroll who are on paid sick leave (when pay is received directly from the firm), on paid holiday or paid vacation, or who work during any part of the pay period but are unemployed or on strike during the rest of the period, are counted as employed. Not counted as employed are persons who, during the pay period which includes the 12th, are laid off, on leave without pay or on strike for the entire period, or who are hired but do not work during the period.

##### Average Hours and Earnings

Hours and earnings data are derived from reports of payroll and man-hours for production and related workers in manufacturing. When the reported pay period exceeds one week, the payroll and man-hour figures are reduced to a weekly basis.

Average hourly earnings for manufacturing are on a "gross" basis, reflecting not only changes in basic hourly rates, but also such variable factors as premium pay for overtime and shift work, and changes in output of workers paid on an incentive plan. Excluded from average earnings are irregular bonuses, retroactive items, payments of various welfare benefits, and payroll taxes paid by employers.
