The oath of office was administered to the President by Richard J. Hughes, Chief Justice of the New Jersey Supreme Court.

President Dodd introduced his family and delivered the following address:

ERA OF CHALLENGE

Mr. Chief Justice Hughes, Majority Leader Feldman, Minority Leader Beadleston, Fellow Senators, and Honored Guests:

Welcome to the House that today rededicates itself to the principles of government of the people and for the people — to the house that will open its doors to all who wish to come and participate — to the house that vows to once again make every citizen equate the word government with the highest standards of honesty and integrity.

Welcome to the New Jersey Senate.

This is the time of year for resolutions. Let us now commit ourselves to just a few. We must work hard, for the people who elected us deserve no less. We must resolve to meet the problems of New Jersey squarely and with courage. We will avoid no issues and will not shirk the challenges we have been elected to face. Each of us must affirm and resolve to work together in a nonpartisan manner, for only then can we weigh everyone's point of view.

It would be easy to sit back and passively wait for the Governor, his staff, or some other sincere and concerned group to propose legislation. But that's not the role we were elected to fulfill. We must seek our own answers. We must put forth that extra effort which separates excellence from mediocrity, success from failure. Nonetheless we must realize we are not absolute — the Senate must always welcome the public, and one way is to open all its doors, so any person can walk in and see exactly what we do, and how we do it.

At the same time we must never forget that although we have been chosen as leaders, we must be just as capable as listeners. Each of us has the duty and obligation of listening to the people who have sent us to Trenton. We bear the obligation to seek responsible criticism and proposals from all who wish to be heard. Only by opening our offices and

minds to everyone, by utilizing the ideas and talents of everyone, can we dare hope to succeed.

As I previously stated, we must squarely meet the issues. First on that list is the energy crisis. Admittedly, the Federal Government has usurped most of our authority in that area, but it certainly has not helped New Jersey. We must determine how much latitude we still have, and exercise that prerogative to its fullest. New Jersey is home to 60% of the East Coast's refineries, yet we have been most hurt by fuel shortages. Vigilance alone will not solve this crisis but at least we can deliver to our people all that they are entitled.

With innovative programs we can curtail the problem of violent crime. We all must realize that the mugger, robber, or murderer will own the streets unless we improve our penal institutions and procedures; unless we insure swift and impartial justice in our courts. Our correctional institutions must truly correct. And at all times we must remember that our *primary* duty is to protect society.

We must also face the plague that drug abuse has literally dropped on our doorstep. — Marshall whatever forces are needed to deal with hard core pushers by tightening our laws and stiffening penalties. New Jersey will not become a haven for New York's rejects. But at the same time we must find the patience, wisdom, and compassion to develop effective programs to rehabilitate our already-addicted young.

While being ever mindful of these serious social problems we must also consider the state of our environment. Together we can develop legislation which will reverse the pace of environmental spoliation and reclaim what we have already despoiled. We must carefully guard against sale of public lands to private interests. We cannot leave our youth a heritage of waste.

Youth — our greatest resource and our heaviest responsibility. Recently, this house passed and the Governor signed a bill which reformed our juvenile justice system. — There is so *much* more to be done. This Legislature will have the opportunity to pass the most far-reaching child abuse proposal in New Jersey's history — a proposal which I am proud to have drafted and sponsored. We also have the power and responsibility to be sure adequate care is

given to the young who are emotionally troubled. These silent children have no lobby — they cannot come and talk. They can only rely on the collective conscience of this house. We shall not fail them.

Countless other issues are equally pressing — financing education — senior citizen's problems — mass transportation — urban decay — our beleaguered farmers — the list can stretch from Cape May to Sussex.

At this point the task may seem overwhelming. That feeling can be alleviated if we professionalize the Senate. By that I mean we should retain sufficient staff to research, to recommend, to help reach our people, and to transform ideas into laws. Any cost this might entail would be returned threefold by increased governmental capacity and efficiency. The ultimate beneficiary will be the people.

Senators, we have a long road to travel. Late hours and hard work should be our companions. During these next four years I hope each of us recalls the words of Emerson, "The wise know that foolish legislation is a rope of sand which perishes in the twisting; but they who build on ideas build for eternity."

Let's build on ideas together.

It is with a deep sense of privilege and duty that I accept this post as Senate President. I shall do my best.

Be It Resolved by the Senate of the State of New Jersey (the General Assembly concurring):

That at 2:30 p.m. both Houses of the Legislature meet in joint session for the purpose of receiving the Annual Message of His Excellency, William T. Cahill, Governor of the State of New Jersey, which will be delivered in person.

Be It Resolved by the Senate of the State of New Jersey (the General Assembly concurring):

That at 2:30 p.m. both Houses of the Legislature meet in joint session for the purpose of receiving the Annual Message of His Excellency, William T. Cahill, Governor of the State of New Jersey, which will be delivered in person.

Mr. Feldman offered the following Resolution which was read and adopted:

A resolution to create an investigating committee consisting of 6 members, to be appointed by the President of the Senate, with power to investigate any public body receiving funds in whole or in part from the State.

Be It Resolved by the Senate of the State of New Jersey:

1. There is hereby created a committee to be known as the "Senate Investigating Committee" to be composed of 6 Senators to be named by the President of the Senate, who shall constitute a committee for the purpose of investigating the finances, affairs and operations of any and all departments, boards, officers and commissions of the State Government, and all other bodies and political subdivisions of the State who shall be receiving State moneys or public

funds of any kind. The committee is authorized to examine into the pay and duties of the employees and the conduct of the work and affairs of all such boards and political subdivisions of the State who shall be receiving State moneys, for the purpose of recommending ways and means of reducing costs of administration and promoting efficiency.

2. Such committee shall serve without pay, but is authorized to employ counsel and such accounting, investigating, clerical or other assistants as it may deem necessary.

3. Such committee shall have the power to subpoena and examine witnesses and any accounts, records, or other matter pertaining to the operating of any department or departments of the State Government, of any political subdivisions of the State, or of any other body receiving State moneys or public funds of any kind, or of any bi-state commission which may be acting jointly with another State.

4. The committee may appoint a secretary who need not be a member of the committee. Said committee shall meet from time to time, hold hearings and examinations in a manner and in places which to them may seem best and proper.

5. Any agency, board or department of the State Government, any officer or employee of any political subdivision of the State or of any other body receiving State funds, and the officers and employees of any bi-state commission which may be acting jointly with another State, shall furnish to such committee such information, records, and data as may be required for a comprehensive analysis of the operation and financial affairs of such agency, board or commission, or other public body, including any bi-state commission, as from time to time such committee shall determine.

6. Investigations and examinations may be made privately or publicly, but it shall be unlawful for any person to divulge the results of any investigation or examination to any person or persons other than such committee, unless a public hearing shall have been first held. Whenever any person shall be examined by such committee or by its duly authorized representative or representatives, under the powers contained in this act, at a public hearing, the officer, department, board, bureau, commission or individual under investigation or scrutiny may, through his or its authorized representative or representatives, cross-examine any such person or any phase of the matter concerning which he has been examined or questioned, and such officer, department,

board, bureau, commission or individual may introduce other evidence to explain, enlarge upon, or clarify the matter, situation or condition under investigation or scrutiny to the end that the full details of any such matter, situation or condition may be developed and presented at one and the same time.

7. This committee shall remain in effect and force until the opening day of the 1975 Legislature, notwithstanding any sine die adjournment.

(To conform to single member districts; see also Rule 30, *infra*.)

2. Amend Rule 17 to read as follows:

17. In the event of a vacancy in the membership of the Senate occasioned by death, resignation or otherwise, the Senate shall direct a writ of election to fill such vacancy, unless such vacancy shall occur during a recess of the Legislature. In such event the writ may be issued in accordance with the provisions of Article IV, Section IV, paragraph 1 of the Constitution and in accordance with law. *No writ of election shall issue if the vacancy is such that the member may regain his seat pursuant to N. J. S. 2A:135-9.*

3. Amend Rule 22 to read as follows:

22. He shall state all questions before the Senate and shall distinctly put such questions *substantially* in the following form, to wit: "As many as are in favor of (the question) will vote aye;" and after the affirmative is expressed, "Those of a contrary opinion, will vote no." If the President doubts, or a division be called for, pursuant to the rules of the Senate, a roll call vote shall be taken.

4. Amend Rule 24 to read as follows:

24. He shall from day to day prepare a Calendar of Bills and Resolutions for consideration in the order of his pleasure, which Calendar shall be subject to the provisions of Rule 123. *He may include as part of such Calendar of Bills and Resolutions a consent list of bills and resolutions defined as bills and resolutions not requiring debate; but no bill or resolution shall appear on a consent list without the concurrence of the majority and minority leaders and the chairman of the standing reference committee, or committees, if any, which considered the bill.*

5. Amend Rule 30 to read as follows:

30. He shall, at the annual organization meeting, assign seats in the Senate [to the several Senate districts] for the use of [their] *the* members.

(See Rule 7 *supra*.)

6. Amend Rule 59 to read as follows:

59. When a member is about to speak in debate, or communicate any matter to the Senate, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to the President, confining himself to the question under debate, and avoiding personalities. *No member shall speak in debate or address the Senate until he has been properly recognized by the President.*

7. Amend Rule 60 to read as follows:

60. If any member [in debate transgress] *transgresses* the Rules of the Senate, the President shall, or any member may, call him to order, in which case the member so called to order shall immediately sit down, unless permitted to explain. The Senate, shall, if appealed to, decide on the case, but without debate, and the votes of a majority of those present and voting shall prevail; if there be no appeal, the decision of the Chair shall be submitted to. If the decision be in favor of the member called to order, he shall be at liberty to proceed; if otherwise, he shall not be permitted to proceed without leave of the Senate, and if the case require it, he shall be liable to censure of the Senate.

8. Amend Rule 72 to read as follows:

72. After the President has taken the Chair, the order of business, *unless the President otherwise determines*, shall be as follows:

- a. Prayer.
- b. Salute to the flag of the United States.
- c. Reading of the journal, unless dispensed with by order of the Senate, which journal may be corrected immediately after such reading, or at any meeting thereafter, by direction of the President or on motion adopted therefor.
- d. Presentation and disposal of petitions, memorials and communications.
- e. Introduction of bills.
- f. Reports of standing and other committees.
- g. Bills and resolutions on second reading.
- h. Unfinished business.
- i. Bills and resolutions on third reading.

9. Amend Rule 74 to read as follows:

74. The following Standing Reference and Administrative Committees, and Joint Committees shall be appointed, by the President, at the commencement of each annual session, and shall serve for the entire legislative year, unless otherwise ordered, that is to say:

shall consist of five members; the membership of the Senate on the Ethical Standards Committee shall consist of four members; the membership of the Senate on the Liaison committee shall consist of eight members and all Joint Committees shall consist of five members.

10. Amend Rules 76 to read as follows:

76. All reference committees shall meet [at least once each week], *at the call of their respective chairmen*, except when the Legislature [is in extended recess or was] *has adjourned sine die*, for the consideration of measures referred to them, and all committee public hearings shall be announced in open session and advertised by posting a notice thereof in a conspicuous place in the Senate Chamber and also at some prominent point in the main corridor of the State House.

11. Amend Rule No. 78 to read as follows:

78. The members of a reference committee may report a bill favorably, *unfavorably* or otherwise and in writing; but no bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution of either House shall be reported out of committee except upon the signed concurrence of a majority of the members of the committee.

12. Amend Rule 83E. to read as follows:

83E. a. The Chairman of a standing reference committee, *other than the Conference and Coordinating Committee*, shall cause at least one week's notice to be given to the Chairman of the Revenue, Finance and Appropriations Committee of his committee's intention to report any bill which would appropriate *State funds*, or *which would require the appropriation of State funds not set forth in dollars therein*, or *which would otherwise require or appear* by its terms to require expenditure of [\$50,000 or more of] State funds. [This rule is not applicable when the committee report is accompanied by a motion that the bill be accorded second reading by special order.]

b. *In addition, any bill of the type referred to in a. above, which involves an actual or potential appropriation or expenditure of \$100,000 or more of State funds shall, upon being reported by the committee and prior to being given second reading, be referred to the Revenue, Finance and*

Appropriations Committee for further fiscal study, evaluation and report.

13. Add new Rules 83F and 83G as follows:

83F. The Conference and Coordinating Committee shall act as a standing reference committee with regard to the following:

- a. All bills, joint resolutions and concurrent resolutions which have been referred to it in accordance with Rule 83G a.;*
- b. All bills, joint resolutions and concurrent resolutions released by any other standing committee which have been referred to it in accordance with Rule 83G b.;*
- c. All bills, joint resolutions and concurrent resolutions assigned to any other standing reference committee which have been re-referred to it in accordance with Rule 83G c.*

83G. Bills, joint resolutions and concurrent resolutions may be referred to the Conference and Coordinating Committee in the following manner:

- a. The President may refer any bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution introduced in the Senate or received from the General Assembly to such committee for review and consideration;*
- b. Any bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution released from any standing reference committee and receiving second reading, before proceeding to third reading, may be referred to the Conference and Coordinating Committee either by direction of the President or upon the filing with the Secretary of a written petition requesting such referral signed by 10 or more Senators;*
- c. Any bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution pending before any standing reference committee, upon which action has been requested pursuant to Rule 83D which has not been acted upon favorably within the 60-day period so provided, may be re-referred to the Conference and Coordinating Committee by direction of the President or upon the filing with the Secretary of a written petition requesting such referral signed by 10 or more Senators at least one of whom shall be the prime sponsor thereof.*

14. Amend Rule 88 to read as follows:

88. On the question of the final passage of all bills, *concurrent resolutions requiring three readings* and joint resolutions, *as well as on the question of proposed floor amendments thereto*, the yeas and nays shall be entered on the journal of the Senate. *The foregoing direction for recording of the yeas and nays shall, without limitation, apply to a vote taken on final passage of any bill, concurrent resolution requiring three readings or joint resolution which is thereafter the subject of a successful motion to lie over.*

15. Amend Rule 102 to read as follows:

102. a. Each bill, joint resolution and concurrent resolution shall be proposed for introduction by presenting to the Secretary of the Senate four copies thereof in type-written, printed or other similar form, in one original and three similarly duplicated copies thereof, each copy thereof endorsed with the names of the member or members sponsoring the same. A "Statement," containing not more than three hundred words, explaining the object and the localities or persons it will affect may be annexed to a bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution and the same shall be printed at the end of the bill or resolution under the caption "Statement."

In lieu of adding and designating a Senator as a co-sponsor of proposed legislation by a motion, any Senator may be added and designated as a co-sponsor of a bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution by the filing with the Secretary of a written notice to that effect signed by the prime sponsor of the bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution and by the Senator to be added and designated as a co-sponsor thereof.

16. Amend Rule 105 by the addition of a paragraph i. as follows:

i. In any bill which both amends and supplements existing law, each supplementary section shall be designated "(New section)" immediately following its section number.

17. Amend Rule 112 to read as follows:

112. Except when advanced prior to printing by special order or emergency resolution, printed copies of bills and joint resolutions and concurrent resolutions which are given

more than one reading shall be used on their second and third readings, and no amendment shall be received to any bill or joint resolution on its third reading.

[Upon the request of one-fifth of the members of the Senate, no] *No motion to advance a bill or joint resolution to third reading in advance of the availability of printed copies thereof shall be considered until duplicated copies of the bill or joint resolution* [, and fiscal note where required,] *shall have been made available to the members of the Senate and all available fiscal information has been provided to the members.*

18. Amend Rule 118 to read as follows:

118. On second reading, any bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution shall be open to amendment. Such bill or resolution [shall] *may* be advanced to third reading, subject to these Rules. No bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution shall be open to amendment on third reading.

19. Amend Rule 122 to read as follows:

122. No bill [or], joint resolution *or concurrent resolution ratifying an amendment to the Constitution of the United States proposed by the Congress* shall pass the Senate, unless there shall be a majority of all the members of the House personally present and agreeing thereto, and the yeas and nays of the members voting on such final passage shall be entered in the journal.

(Rules silent on ratification of amendments to U. S. Constitution. See also Rule 179 *infra*.)

20. Amend Rule 123 to read as follows:

123. a. Any bill, joint resolution, concurrent resolution, or resolution may be made the order of a particular day, on which day it shall be taken up, whether or not it is up on the Calendar for said day, in preference to any others whether or not they are on the Calendar.

b. At any given meeting, the total number of bills, joint resolutions and concurrent resolutions which may be considered for final passage shall not exceed 30 excluding any bills or resolutions set forth on the consent calendar.

c. On the recommendation of the President, the Senate may, by resolution, limit its consideration of bills or reso-

lutions at its next succeeding meeting date exclusively to those bills and resolutions which are listed in the resolution.

21. Amend Rule 127 to read as follows :

127. When a motion once made, shall have been carried in the affirmative or negative, it shall be in order for any Senator who voted on the prevailing side to move a reconsideration thereof on the same day or a subsequent day of actual meeting; but no motion for reconsideration of a bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution, which shall have been lost, shall be in order until a motion to proceed to the reconsideration thereof shall have been made and carried; *provided, however, that in the case of a bill it shall be required that for any member to move for reconsideration thereof, the bill shall have obtained at least 15 affirmative votes.* No [and no] motion for reconsideration shall be in order after the bill, joint resolution, concurrent resolution, message, report, amendment or motion, which is the subject matter of the same, shall have gone from the possession of the Senate, unless the same shall have been returned to the possession of the Senate and every motion for reconsideration shall be decided by a majority of votes, except a motion to reconsider the vote on the final passage of a bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution, which shall require the same majority as is necessary for final passage.

Whenever a bill submitted by petition of the governing body of a county or municipality which pursuant to Article IV, Section VII, paragraph 10 of the Constitution requires the vote of $\frac{2}{3}$ of all the members of the Senate for its passage shall receive the votes of a majority but less than $\frac{2}{3}$ of all members, the same shall not be delivered to the General Assembly as a passed bill and a further vote on the bill may be had at any time, on motion therefor, without adoption of a motion for reconsideration.

22. Amend Rule 128 to read as follows :

128. [The] *When the annual appropriation bill and its accompanying supplemental shall originate in the Senate, they shall not be considered until at least one week has elapsed after they shall have been introduced, printed and placed upon the desks of the members.*

23. Amend Rule 142A to read as follows:

142A. Whenever any member of the Senate shall desire to introduce any bill, which if enacted, would increase or decrease county, municipal, school or special district revenues or require an increase in expenditures by any thereof, he [may] *shall* request, in writing, [the preparation and certification] *the Office of Fiscal Affairs to prepare and certify to him a fiscal note containing an analysis* [estimate in dollars] of the amount by which county, municipal, school or special district revenues or expenditures would be increased or decreased. Such a request for a fiscal note shall be processed in the manner prescribed by Rules 137 through 142.

Whenever the preparation and certification of a fiscal note with respect to a bill which would affect county, municipal, school or special district revenues or expenditures would require an extended period of time and unduly impede consideration of the bill by the Senate, the Executive Director of the Office of Fiscal Affairs may so certify together with the best estimates of the fiscal impact of the bill as can be ascertained within a reasonable amount of time and such a certification shall constitute compliance with the requirements for provision of a fiscal note.

24. Amend Rule 155 to read as follows:

155. [no public hearing shall be held by any Senate committee except with the consent of a majority of all members of such committee.] *Unless otherwise determined by the Chairman of a Standing Reference Committee, members of the public shall be permitted to be present at meetings of such a committee to the extent that space is available in the committee room. All bills, resolutions and other matters shall, in any event, be voted upon only at such a public session.*

In addition, with the concurrence of a majority of the members of a Standing Reference Committee, the Chairman may schedule a public hearing in connection with any bill or resolution then pending before the committee on such notice as may be determined by the Chairman and at which all interested parties shall have an opportunity to be heard.

Except as hereinabove or elsewhere in these Rules otherwise provided, each Senate Committee may adopt rules for its own operation and the conduct of its business.

25. Amend Rule 179 to read as follows:

179. The term "concurrent resolution" shall mean a formal resolution passed by a majority of the members of the Senate, the General Assembly concurring therein, which expresses the sentiment of both Houses or accomplishes some purpose with common interest to both Houses. A concurrent resolution is also the form of legislation used to propose an amendment or amendments to the *State Constitution and to ratify an amendment to the Constitution of the United States proposed by the Congress*. No action by the Governor is required *with respect to a concurrent resolution*.

26. Amend Joint Rule 14 to read as follows:

14. Whenever two or more members or members-elect of the same House shall separately propose for prefiling the same or substantially the same bill or resolution, the Law Revision and Legislative Services Commission shall notify such members and members-elect and seek their concurrence to co-sponsorship of a single bill or resolution, but, except as provided in [5] 13 above, no member or member-elect shall be denied the right to prefile any bill or resolution.

The item on page 19 would involve the State of New Jersey in the Metropolitan Regional Council’s closed cir-

cuit television system established to facilitate viewing of governmental activities. Participation in the system would cost substantially more than the \$35,000 appropriated in this bill for equipment rental and maintenance. Additional funds would be needed for operating expenses, scheduling and coordination personnel, studio space and equipment storage space.

The item on page 25 is being reduced from \$200,000 because the Opera Theatre appealed to the Joint Appropriations Committee for an appropriation in excess of the request recommended by the Division of Budget and Accounting. The Council on the Arts requested \$1,599,182 for fiscal year 1975, \$200,000 for the Opera Theatre. The Division recommended \$730,000, \$100,000 for the Opera Theatre. In preparing the requests and recommendations, the Council and the Division established priorities among the subsidized fine arts organizations. The Opera Theatre's appeal to the Committee, and the consequent increase from \$100,000 to \$200,000, alters these studied plans and priorities. In the future, in addition to any subsidized fine arts organization's being limited to subsidies approved by the Council on the Arts, the Council should monitor expenditures by the subsidized organizations to ensure proper accounting and efficiency, and should report its findings annually to the Department.

The item on page 29 establishes a new grant program in the Department of Agriculture which would provide funds to soil conservation districts even though no enabling act authorizes such funds. Soil conservation districts are currently eligible for grants under a program established in the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection pursuant to P. L. 1972, c. 49. The new program represented by this \$90,000 appropriation would interfere with effective program management and promote unnecessary competition between the Department of Environmental Protection and the Department of Agriculture.

The item on page 48 establishes a priority for a flood plain and watershed survey for the Jacobs Creek Watershed which does not conform to the Department of Environmental Protection's priorities. Such surveys are normally done by the Department, which has not requested funds for a survey of the Jacobs Creek Watershed.

The item on page 53 continues an anomaly in the State of New Jersey in that the Bridgeton Public Zoo is the only

State-subsidized zoo currently operating. The Division of Parks and Forestry in the Department of Environmental Protection has never requested such an appropriation.

The item on page 65 represents an increase in the Glassboro State College budget to provide \$50,000 in lieu of taxes to the Town of Glassboro, which presently receives \$2,500 pursuant to R. S. 54:4-21. Two bills pending in the Legislature, S-1245 and A-1874, would provide state in lieu of tax payments to all municipalities, not just Glassboro, in which the State owns any land. The pending bills, which I fully support, would make this individual appropriation unnecessary.

The item on page 74 provides \$350,000 for evening legal education at Rutgers University. The Rutgers University Board of Governors has endorsed the development of evening law schools and plans to submit formal recommendations to the Board of Higher Education in the near future. It is understood that the plans cannot be implemented until fiscal 1976, the 1975-76 school year. Therefore, the directed expenditure is unnecessary in this annual appropriations bill.

The items on pages 82, 86 and 156 include directions to the Department of Transportation regarding the expenditure of certain sums of money which are subsumed in the overall appropriation to the Department. The annual appropriations bill is an inappropriate vehicle for determining departmental priorities, and effective program management dictates that the Department decide for itself which highways and projects are most in need of work. On the other hand, some of the specific projects contained in the directions to the Department, particularly "the construction of jughandles and the installation of traffic lights on State Highway 70," have my support, and the Department has assured me that these projects will proceed.

The item on page 124 includes directions as to the expenditure of some of the \$2,000,000 requested by me and appropriated at page 121 for "additional salary and fringe benefits resulting from negotiated contractual agreements with various employee negotiations." The specific directions do not match the requirements of agreements consummated through collective negotiations, or the requirements of enacted legislation. For example, A-4 alters the amount of vacation time accruing to some State employees,

but bears a cost different from the \$320,000 included in the annual appropriations bill's direction. Since collective negotiations have allocated the \$2,000,000 differently from this bill, these directions are unnecessary and inappropriate.

The item on page 132 provides funds to the Town of Keansburg so that funds advanced by the State on behalf of Keansburg may be repaid. The State's obligation in the beach erosion and hurricane protection project begun in 1963 which is the subject of this appropriation, was at the time limited to 50% of the non-federal share of the project. The State, however, paid the entire local and state share to the federal government, the contracting authority, with the expectation of reimbursement from various units of government. All units of local government except Keansburg have reimbursed the State, but Keansburg has refused to pay its fair share. This \$283,225 therefore not only undermines agreements long in effect, but could lead the other units of local government, which have already paid their fair share, to request similar assistance from the State.

The items on page 135 relate to two small museums singled out from among 20 or more throughout the State for special assistance. There has been no serious consideration given as to whether the type of museum aid program of which these appropriations can only be regarded as a beginning is advisable, and whether the total cost of such programs can be borne. For example, the State currently provides the Newark Museum \$482,195, or about $\frac{1}{3}$ of the full cost. Were such support to be provided all museums in the State, appropriations in future fiscal years would far exceed the \$40,000 encompassed by these two items.

The item on page 136 assists the operation of a camp for handicapped children in Passaic County. Although such camps are beneficial, serious consideration should be given as to whether the State should in general subsidize similar camps in other counties. As it stands now, this \$50,000 appropriation represents a type of expenditure the implications of which have not been completely analyzed.

The item on page 144 provides aid to rural areas despite the Legislature's failure to enact enabling legislation for this type of program. It is also important to note that several administration bills currently pending in the Legislature, by having the State assume more of the costs of welfare, courts and the schools may well make the type of assistance contemplated by this appropriation unnecessary.

The item on page 157 includes a direction to the Department of Transportation to expend funds from the State Transportation Fund for the activation of the West Shore Railroad contingent upon receipt of federal funding. This type of provision would impede the State's flexibility in seeking and receiving the maximum available federal funding.

fish and game properties, payable from the Public Shooting and Fishing Grounds Fund, \$15,000.”

“Sandyston Township, Layton, New Jersey 07851, c/o Hixon Spangenberg, Township Clerk, Layton, New Jersey 07851, for payment in lieu of taxes for certain fish and game properties, payable from the Public Shooting and Fishing Grounds Fund, \$4,000.”

On pages 4 and 5 under 63100. State Highway Facilities :

Palmyra, New Jersey 08065, c/o Farr, Brandt, Haughey, Penberthy and Lewis, Kings Highway East, Haddonfield, New Jersey 08033, for acquisition costs of land and a building on Interstate Route #90 and for the moving expenses of The Jet Pulverizer Company and Micro Repair Company in connection with the condemnation proceedings, payable from the Transportation Benefit Fund; provided, however, that said amount be deposited with the Clerk of the Superior Court, as required by statute, \$158,000. It having been determined that the foregoing purpose of the appropriation is within the purview of C.54:8A-58 et seq. (Transportation Benefits Tax Act) said appropriation shall be charged to the Transportation Benefit Fund established in such Act.

“Royal Rack Service Company, Inc. 9545 Royal Highway, Pennsauken, New Jersey 08110, c/o Farr, Brandt, Haughey, Penberthy and Lewis, 4 Kings Highway East, Haddonfield, New Jersey 08033, for property acquisition costs in connection with condemnation proceedings during 1971 and 1972 related to construction of Interstate Highway #90, payable from the Transportation Benefit Fund, \$346,700.

County of Morris, Court House, Morristown, New Jersey 07960, c/o Robert T. Natoli, County Treasurer, for overtime expended by the Sheriff's Office for security in the jury selection for the Squires and Chesimard Jury, payable from funds appropriated to The Judiciary, \$7,491.”

These items are deleted in their entirety.

Senate Bill No. 1151 is a supplemental appropriations bill for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1974. The bill includes authorization for the payment of certain claims filed against the State of New Jersey. Among these claims are those which have been objected to by the Executive Departments of State Government and by the Attorney General, and in one instance, by the Administrative Office of the Courts. I have decided, for the reasons stated below, to delete entirely the following objected to claims.

In the Claim of Ellen R. O'Brien, it is alleged that the claimant loaned another individual \$1,000, which was to be secured by an interest in a motor vehicle owned by the borrower. Subsequently, the borrower obtained a duplicate certificate of title from the Division of Motor Vehicles which did not reflect the claimant's secured interest. He then sold the vehicle and absconded from the jurisdiction.

Although a mistake was made by employees of the Division of Motor Vehicles in the issuance of a duplicate certificate of title without the claimant's security interest being reflected thereon, N. J. S. A. 39:10-14 specifically provides that the Director of the Division of Motor Vehicles and its employees and agents shall not incur any personal liability with respect to the recordation and issuance of certificates relative to security interests in motor vehicles. The acceptance of liability by the State for every clerical error of a State employee in some way causing damage to a member of the public would open up a substantial area of potential claims against the State. Finally, during the course of the

hearing before the Legislative Subcommittee on Claims, the claimant testified that after she became aware that the borrower had sold the motor vehicle on the basis of the duplicate certificate of title which failed to mention her security interest, she attempted to negotiate with him directly without notifying the Division of Motor Vehicles. This course of action prejudiced the opportunity of the State to take any corrective action, and undercuts any equitable claim which Miss O'Brien otherwise might have had.

The Claim of Maurice River Township pursuant to N. J. S. A. 54:4-2.1 is based upon the present assessed value of the State land therein, not upon the valuation thereof at the time of acquisition. N. J. S. A. 54:4-2.1 provides, *inter alia*: “. . . said lands shall be assessed at the same value at which they were assessed at the time they were acquired by the State . . .” The lands owned by the State through the Division of Fish, Game and Shellfisheries in Maurice River Township comprise approximately 12,124.42 acres, representing periodic acquisitions of land commencing in the 1930's. Apparently, the only time that Maurice River Township submitted a claim for payment in lieu of taxes was in 1970. That bill was in the amount of \$1,406.71, based upon 50% assessed value at the rate of \$6.33 per \$100. The tax rate in Maurice River Township has decreased to \$5.49 per \$100 valuation. Not only has the tax rate fallen, but the amount of the claim in Senate Bill No. 1151 is higher than the 1970 claim. It is therefore apparent that the claim in question is based upon present assessed value in contravention of the statute.

The Claim of Sandyston Township, like that of Maurice River Township, appears to be based upon N. J. S. A. 54:4-2.1. One of the conditions set forth in that statute for the payment in lieu of taxes by the State for fish and game properties is that the aggregate area owned by the State must be at least 9% of the total area of municipality. However, the State only owns 7.8% of the land in Sandyston Township and is therefore exempt from taxation pursuant to N. J. S. A. 54:4-2.1.

In the Claim of Albert Burkham, the State constructed a drainage ditch within the State right-of-way alongside Highway 35. Unknown to the State, the claimant's septic overflow lines ended nearby. The water table in this area

is very high and had increased substantially due to increased annual rainfalls. The claimant alleges that he was required to relocate his overflow lines from his septic system because of the construction of the State's drainage ditch which was needed to prevent icing conditions on the highway. Claimant asserts that he was required to expend thousands of dollars making repairs and that the value of property was impaired by the construction of this drainage ditch. However, claimants subsequently sold their property for much more than he had originally paid for it. There is no evidence of any negligence or actionable conduct on the part of the Department of Transportation or its employees. Furthermore, if this claim were asserted under the Tort Claims Act, it would be barred under the plan-design immunity provisions.

The Claim of Edwin F. Fay and Elizabeth B. Fay, and also the claim of Royal Rack Service Co., Inc., are claims for payment of the money required to condemn property along a right-of-way for which the Department of Transportation lacks sufficient funds to complete condemnation. These claims are technically deficient. As one example, the bill requires the entire appropriation, including relocation funds, to be deposited with the Clerk of the Superior Court; absent the bill, the Department could take title to or possession of the property by depositing only the registered fair market value in court. No such type of deposit is provided for in the Uniform Transportation Replacement Housing and Relocation Act, N. J. S. A. 27:7-72 et seq., and the bill offers no guidelines as to the withdrawal of the appropriated relocation funds. As another example, by court order dated July 2, 1973, the action to condemn the property subject to the Royal Rack Service Co., Inc. claim was dismissed. Thus, the bill appropriates \$346,700 for the acquisition of property which is no longer in condemnation.

In addition, the provisions of the Supplemental Appropriations Act are an inappropriate means for the State to determine what property to condemn for public purposes or how much to pay for it. The appropriation of \$504,700 would only scratch the surface of the Department's money problems with regard to Route 90, Section 2. On this highway project alone, the Department is in need of approximately \$2 million for right-of-way acquisitions. Furthermore, there is no reason why the property owners on this highway project should be treated better than property

owners on other highway projects. In short, many millions of dollars would be required to solve problems throughout the State similar to those which the subject appropriations seek to resolve.

On the other hand, substantial equitable considerations favor the Claims of the Fays and of the Royal Rack Service Co., Inc. and I understand the Commissioner of Transportation is negotiating procedures with the claimants to provide appropriate compensation to them. I am informed that funds are available to the department to compensate these claimants and others along Route 90, Section 2 who are in similar situations.

The Claim of the County of Morris for \$7,491 would be paid from funds heretofore appropriated to the Judiciary (Account 970) for court operations (73100). The trial of Squires and Chesimard was transferred from Middlesex to Morris County to assure the defendants the opportunity for a fair and impartial trial. This is a procedure normally followed when there is some question that litigants or defendants in a case cannot receive a fair and impartial trial in the county where venue is regularly set.

It is inappropriate, however, to require the Judiciary to use funds appropriated to it for other reasons to defray the additional expenses the Sheriff's Office in one county may incur as the result of the transfer of a case, as was done in this instance, even if the case derives from the State-wide Grand Jury. The expense of providing security through the Sheriff's Office in a particular county is not an appropriate expense for the Judiciary in the first instance. There should therefore not be a requirement that the Judiciary assume this expense of security merely because a case is transferred from one county to another.

SENATE BILL NO. 754

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(a) of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 754 without my approval.

Senate Bill No. 754 would amend "The New Jersey Highway Authority Act" to add motorcycles to the list of vehicles permitted on that portion of the Parkway situated more than 5 miles north of its intersection with the northern boundary of Ocean County. Supporters of the bill, including legislators and others who testified at the legislative hearings and at an open forum I held after its passage clearly believed that the bill would abrogate a regulation adopted by the Highway Authority which bars motorcycles from the road and that it would prohibit the Authority from excluding cyclists.

An examination of Senate Bill No. 754 leads me to conclude that its supporters may well be frustrated in their desire to accomplish this intended purpose. By another section of its enabling legislation, N. J. S. A. 27:12B-17(b), the Authority may exclude any traffic other than passenger motor vehicles. The mere addition of motorcycles to the list of permissible vehicles does not seem to preclude a prohibition under this section. Indeed, the Authority may well conclude that no additional action is required to preclude cyclists, thereby avoiding any question of gubernatorial veto. In these circumstances, it does not appear desirable to adopt legislation which might not accomplish its purpose.

A review of the history of motorcycle use on the Garden State Parkway seems appropriate. On February 1, 1961 the Highway Authority prohibited motorcycles from using the road apparently on the basis of a study of the experience for the preceding seven years.

The Parkway's safety record is excellent. Some contend that this record is a result of the design of the road, while

others argue it is in part attributable to the selective exclusion of certain types of motor vehicles, including motorcycles. Others argue that the exclusion of motorcycles from the Garden State Parkway has increased the hazards of other State highways and that the motorcyclists are needlessly exposed to greater risks on more dangerous alternative roads.

I believe that these questions might be usefully resolved by a reasonable trial period during which the safety experience with motorcyclists on the Parkway can be evaluated. I request that the Highway Authority develop and implement procedures which will permit motorcyclists to use the Garden State Parkway on a trial basis. In the event that a fair test period is not undertaken, the Legislature may then by an effective bill decide to mandate that it be done.

SENATE BILL NO. 134

To the Senate:

I return Senate Bill No. 134 without my approval, pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(a) of the Constitution, for the following reasons:

The Division of Tax Appeals, in *Harold Keitelman v. Borough of New Shrewsbury*, L. 2871-67, L. 3539-68-1, held aboveground swimming pools lacking permanent connection to the land to be personal property, whether or not disassembled. This ruling, I am advised, is being followed, and this bill is therefore unnecessary.

Distinguishing between personal property and real property is a broader problem than the classification of swimming pools, and according to the Division of Taxation, requires early resolution. I have therefore directed the Division to assess the current state of the law in this area,

and to recommend needed statutory and administrative reforms as soon as possible.

SENATE BILL No. 962

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(a) of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 962, without my approval, for the following reasons.

This bill permits a member of the Public Employees' Retirement System, within three months of the effective date of this act, to purchase credit for his temporary service, if that service resulted in permanent employment. Existing law permits a member to make contributions covering his temporary service only during the first year of his membership in the retirement system.

The cost of purchase of credit for previous service normally requires the employee to pay $\frac{1}{2}$ of the total cost of the purchase and the employer to pay the remaining $\frac{1}{2}$ of the cost. However, because a member is permitted, under the present statute, to purchase credit for his temporary service only during his first year of membership, the employee cost of such a purchase is based on the member's salary and age at enrollment. If he were permitted to purchase such credit on the same basis many years after his enrollment, when he is much older and has a considerably higher salary, he would be paying substantially less than $\frac{1}{2}$ of the total cost of such service. Therefore, for each of the thousands of employees who would become eligible anew pursuant to this bill, the cost to the individual would be minimal but the cost to the State or local employer would be considerably more than $\frac{1}{2}$ of the cost. The cost of each year of service benefit is currently \$2,000 for the average member. The employee's proper share of the \$2,000

cost of a year of service benefit should be \$1,000, but because his share of the cost of purchase of temporary service is computed on the basis of his age at enrollment, the average employee would pay substantially less, and the employer substantially more.

The cost to the State and to local participating employers resulting from signature of this bill could be slightly over \$8,000,000. This cost would have to be amortized by an increase in the contribution paid by the State and all participating employers.

In view of the windfall which would occur as a result of my signing this bill, I see no reason to provide a second opportunity to purchase temporary service benefits at nominal cost to employees who under existing law had the opportunity during the first year of their membership in the retirement system, a year in which the individual's salary and age as a temporary employee approximated his salary and age as a permanent employee, thereby minimizing any windfall.

Accordingly, I feel I must return Senate Bill No. 962 without my approval.

SENATE BILL No. 91

To the Senate:

I return Senate Bill No. 91 without my approval, pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(a) of the Constitution, for the following reasons.

This bill requires the publication of a notice of acquittal of criminal charges at the request of any acquitted defendant. Such notice would be placed in any two newspapers of general circulation chosen by the acquitted defendant, and the cost of publication would be borne by the county.

The New Jersey Press Association has expressed firm opposition to this bill on public policy grounds, and I concur in the Association's reasoning. As a free press is at the heart of a strong democracy, no newspaper should be mandated to publish any material, even as an advertisement, particularly when the size and layout of that material is also dictated. In requiring newspapers to publish material that the newspaper may not desire to publish, this bill raises the type of First Amendment issues that have been closely scrutinized by the United States Supreme Court. *See, e.g., The Miami Herald Publishing Co. v. Tornillo*, 42 U.S. L.W. 5098 (June 25, 1974).

As a practical matter, it is also questionable whether the \$37,000 cost resulting annually from this bill is an effective expenditure of funds. Any notice of acquittal would be too far removed in time from original publication of charges against an acquitted defendant, and would be too small and inconspicuously placed, to fulfill the intent of this bill. Furthermore, it forces acquitted defendants to make a difficult choice as to whether to further publicize criminal charges that may have originally escaped notice.

Accordingly, I feel I must return Senate Bill No. 91 without my approval.

Re Senate Resolution of July 28, 1974

Dear Senator Dodd:

By resolution adopted July 29, 1974, the Senate directed the Division of Motor Vehicles to study and make its recommendations to them concerning the practicability and feasibility of preparing and distributing license plates publicly commemorating, not only the Bicentenary, but the role of New Jersey in making it possible.

The Division of Motor Vehicles, in collaboration with the staff of the Bicentennial Commission, has evaluated several plans and herein makes its recommendation.

The use of a special commemorative license plate is more complicated for New Jersey than in many other states because of our requirement of both front and rear vehicle identification plates. A number of states use only a rear plate; some issue new plates annually.

We studied possibilities, including the issue of sets of two commemorative plates, one commemorative plate, attaching a special commemorative shield, metal strips or plates. We evaluated factors such as costs, the necessity to maintain registration files for at least three years, the law enforcement problems resulting from several million front plates being "at liberty," and the difficulty of combining an appropriate bicentennial message with the vehicle identifying numbers and letters on the license plates.

We recommend that the law be amended to permit the display of a special commemorative plate on the front of vehicles for an 18-month period extending from July 1, 1975 to December 31, 1976.

The commemorative plate of lightweight metal would be placed in front of the vehicle's regular license plate during the permitted period, but there would be no change in the requirement of two vehicle identification plates nor in the Motor Vehicle registration files. The commemorative plate would, of course, be a voluntary purchase by the motorist. The Bicentennial Commission will design the commemorative plate and arrange for the manufacture and distribution.

The Bicentennial Commission approved this proposal at its November 7 meeting and has designed a proposed commemorative plate (see attachment). The Commission has tentative plans that the plate be sold through nonprofit organizations, such as several county and municipal bicentennial committees, for approximately \$2.95 per plate. This fee includes a small profit above manufacturer's cost which will be retained by each selling group for its bicentennial celebration efforts. The manufacturer's cost will include a ten percent royalty for the State Bicentennial Commission.

An indication of intent concerning amending the law for this proposal is needed soon from the Legislature and the Governor to enable the Commission to firm up the contract for manufacture and the plan for distribution and sale.

We trust this provides a satisfactory response to the Senate Resolution.
