TO THE GOVERNOR AND LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW JERSEY:

The two reports submitted since the inception of the Department were devoted to the discussion of the essentials of control and recommendations for statutory changes calculated to accomplish the legislative purpose of eliminating the racketeer and bootlegger and promoting temperance. These matters were pre-eminent. Comments on organization and statistical information with respect to operations have, therefore, been deferred until the present report.

The activities of the Department have been detailed in official bulletins, which have been issued at frequent intervals and widely distributed and publicized. In addition, printed pamphlets containing the Control Act and the formal rules and regulations and other materials have been sent to licensees and interested persons. For the sake of economy and brevity, this report will avoid repetition of the materials heretofore distributed and available for examination.

ORGANIZATION

To aid administration the Department has been divided into three (3) divisions, namely, legal, licensing and enforcement. The legal division is headed by the Chief Deputy Commissioner and Counsel, and includes 7 attorneys, 7 stenographers and 1 court reporter. The licensing division is headed by a Deputy Commissioner and includes 8 assistants and 13 stenographers and clerks. The enforcement division is likewise headed by a Deputy Commissioner and includes 1 Chief Inspector, 6 senior inspectors, 7 inspectors, 82 investigators and 16 stenographers and clerks. Aside from the foregoing there are 5 miscellaneous employees, making a total of 156, as of the close of the past fiscal year, in the entire Department, exclusive of the Commissioner.

1. LEGAL DIVISION.

Innumerable inquiries for legal interpretations of the Control Act are received from municipal officials charged with the issuance of municipal retail licenses, local enforcement officers, members of the industry and the public generally. The inquiries presented involve careful analysis and oftentimes extensive research into past precedents and experiences. In addition, the everyday affairs of the licensing and enforcement divisions involve continual legal study, not only for the guidance of the members of the Department, but also for the guidance of local licensing and enforcement officials cooperating in the administration of the Act.

Supplementing its foregoing activities, the following specific functions contemplated by the Act rest with the legal division:

(A) The preparation of rules and regulations.

The Act empowers the Commissioner to promulgate such general

rules and regulations and such special rulings and findings as may be necessary or desirable for the regulation and control of the manufacture, transportation, sale and distribution of alcoholic beverages and the enforcement of the Act. To date, the Commissioner has promulgated formal rules on various subjects, including the following:- (a) advertising notice of intention; (b) identification of State licensees and their employees; (c) employment by licensees of persons failing to qualify as to age, residence or citizenship; (d) solicitors' permits; (e) warehouse receipts licenses; (f) club licenses; (g) municipal scrip as payment of license fee; (h) transfers of licenses; (i) appeals; (j) revocations; (k) wine permits for personal consumption; (l) transportation insignia; (m) transportation of alcoholic beverages into New Jersey; (n) transportation of alcoholic beverages by railroad carriers; (o) conduct of licensees and use of licensed premises; (p) signs and other advertising matter; (q) identity of alcoholic beverages sold on licensed premises; (r) size of containers of alcoholic beverages; (s) labeling; (t) misleading trade names; (u) registration of stills; (v) seizure hearings; and (w) sales of seized property.

In connection with the promulgation of rules on the foregoing subjects, numerous public hearings and conferences with interested parties were held, the laws and rules of other States were examined, the materials furnished to the Federal Alcohol Administration at its public hearings were considered and the matters received individual study.

(B) Hearings on applications for State licenses and permits. - Prior to the issuance of State licenses by the Commissioner, investigation is made as to the qualifications and fitness of the applicant and the suitability of the licensed premises. Oftentimes a formal hearing under oath is considered desirable in aid of the investigation and when an objection is filed to the granting of the application, a formal hearing is invariably held. At these hearings interested parties may appear in person or by counsel and full opportunity to be heard is afforded. The testimony is transcribed by a court reporter and the entire matter is then submitted to the Commissioner for determination.

Under the Act individuals may not solicit on behalf of licensed manufacturers or wholesalers without first obtaining a solicitor's permit. Where the applicant has been convicted of a crime involving moral turpitude, he is disqualified from obtaining such permit and oftentimes hearings are essential to aid in ascertaining whether the specific crime for which the applicant had been convicted involved moral turpitude.

To date, there have been no applications made to the Court to review the Commissioner's action in denying or granting an application for a State license or permit.

(C) Appeals. - The Act provides that appeals to the State Commissioner may be taken from orders granting or denying applications for issuance or transfer of municipal retail licenses; from orders entered in municipal revocations; from municipal denials of applications for refund; and from municipal limitations of the number of licenses and hours of sale. Appeals are instituted by filing notice and petition of appeal with the Department. Thereafter, notice of hearing is served and formal hearing is held, at which testimony is taken and transcribed by

a court reporter. From the inception of the Department to June 30, 1936, 523 appeals were filed with the Department. A table, designated Schedule "A", setting forth the disposition thereof, is annexed to this report.

Prior to June 30, 1936, there were 4 applications to the Supreme Court for writs of certiorari to review orders by the Commissioner on appeal from municipal action on applications for retail licenses. Two were abandoned before determination and the remaining two were decided in favor of the Commissioner.

(D) Revocations. - Under the Act the Commissioner may revoke or suspend any license issued by him or any municipal issuing authority and any municipal issuing authority may suspend or revoke any license issued by it. The Commissioner has followed the policy of referring violations disclosed by Departmental investigation by retail licensees to municipal issuing authorities for revocation or suspension except in special cases. Included within the exceptions are requests for revocation proceedings from the Beverage Tax Division of the State Tax Department, in which instances the proceedings are handled directly by the Commissioner. A summary of the revocation proceedings instituted by the State Department and proceedings referred to municipal issuing authorities by the Department during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1936 is attached to this report and marked Schedule "B".

There has been one application to the Supreme Court for a writ of certiorari to review an order of revocation entered by the Commissioner. This application was denied.

(E) Seizure hearings. - The Act provides that illicit alcoholic beverages, illicit stills and all other unlawful property, when seized, shall be under the jurisdiction of the Commissioner and shall be forfeited after hearing duly held. Following a seizure, notices are sent to all parties known or believed to be interested in the seizure, a formal hearing is held and testimony taken and transcribed. All parties are afforded full opportunity to be heard and oftentimes innocent lien claimants appear to establish their interests in seized property. Thereafter, orders are entered disposing of the property in accordance with law. In addition to many minor seizures which were disposed of collectively, 647 individual hearings involving formal transcripts of testimony and separate determinations were concluded prior to June 30, 1936.

(F) Miscellaneous. - The Act provides that municipal governing bodies may regulate the conduct of any business licensed to sell alcoholic beverages at retail, subject to the approval of the Commissioner first obtained. Regulations adopted by 454 municipalities and by the Judges of the Court of Common Pleas of Sixth Class Counties who issue licenses in such Counties have been passed upon by the Commissioner. These regulations consisted of approximately 2100 resolutions comprising 8850 sections, and 150 ordinances comprising 1300 sections.

The actual prosecution of criminal cases under the Act rests within the jurisdiction of county Prosecutors. However, the Department has been represented in numerous criminal proceedings under the Act and has filed briefs in support of its contentions. In addition, counsel has appeared on behalf of the Department and briefs have been submitted in all of the proceedings seeking to obtain reversal by the Courts of rulings of the Commissioner,

2. LICENSING DIVISION.

Under the Act, the Commissioner is authorized to issue all manufacturers', wholesalers', transportation, public warehouse, plenary retail transit and warehouse receipts licenses, special permits, wine permits, solicitors' permits and employment permits. The licensing division is charged with the actual administration of the issuance of licenses and permits and its specific activities to June 30, 1936 were as follows:

(A) Licenses. - During the licensing period from December 6, 1933 through June 30, 1934, 660 State licenses were issued; during the fiscal year 1934-1935, 785 State licenses were issued and during the fiscal year 1935-1936, 827 State licenses were issued. Revenue from all licenses issued from the inception of the Department, December 6, 1933, to June 30, 1936, totals \$1,392,262.71. Attached to this report are Schedule "C", which sets forth the number of State licenses and permits issued and the fees and other revenues received for the period from December 6, 1933 to June 30, 1934; Schedule "D" which sets forth the number of State licenses and permits issued and the fees and other revenues received for the period from July 1, 1934 to June 30, 1935, inclusive; Schedule "E" which sets forth the State licenses and permits issued and the fees and other revenues received for the period from July 1, 1935 to June 30, 1936 inclusive; and Schedule "F", which sets forth the State licenses and permits issued and the fees and other revenues received for the period from December 6, 1933 to June 30, 1936. Likewise, attached are Schedule "G", setting forth the expenses incurred from the Department's inception on December 6, 1933 to June 30, 1936; and Schedule "H", a recapitulation of expenses incurred and revenue received by the Department for the period from December 6, 1933 to June 30, 1936 inclusive.

(B) Permits. - Various types of permits are issued through the licensing division. These include special permits issued in contingencies not expressly provided for by the Act; solicitors' permits issued to salesmen employed by licensed wholesalers and manufacturers; wine permits authorizing the manufacture of wine for home consumption; and employment permits authorizing the employment of persons not qualified as to age, residence or citizenship. During the period from December 6, 1933 to June 30, 1934, 189 permits were issued; during the fiscal year from July 1, 1934 to June 30, 1935, 3393 permits were issued; and during the fiscal year from July 1, 1935 to June 30, 1936, 9484 permits were issued. The substantial increase is due mainly to the larger demand for permits authorizing the sale of alcoholic beverages at special social functions and the statutory amendments enacted in June, 1935, providing for solicitors' and employment permits. Revenue from all permits, issued from the inception of the Department to June 30, 1936, totals \$87,425.08. Schedules "C", "D", "E" and "F", referred to above, contain further statistics pertaining to permits.

(C) Miscellaneous. - The licensing division administers the issuance of transportation insignia, which must be attached to all vehicles authorized to transport alcoholic beverages. During the period from December 6, 1933 to June 30, 1934, 2151 transportation insignia were issued; during the fiscal year from July 1, 1934 to June 30, 1935, 4071 transportation insignia were issued; and during the fiscal year from July 1, 1935 to June 30, 1936, 3968 transportation insignia were issued. Revenue from this source from the inception of the Department to June 30, 1936,

totals \$20,380.00. Schedules "C", "D", "E" and "F", referred to above, contain further statistics pertaining to transportation insignia.

In addition to the issuance of licenses and permits and collection of revenue therefrom, the licensing division maintains records on the issuance of all retail licenses by municipal issuing authorities. These records cover all retail licenses and disclose any violations of the Control Act, surrenders, suspensions or revocations. The division also keeps the entire licensed alcoholic beverage industry advised as to all rules and regulations promulgated by the Commissioner as well as procedure in licensing and interpretations of the Control Act.

Schedules "C", "D", "E" and "F", referred to above, list the revenue obtained from the issuance of certifications, the sale of bulletins and mailing lists, and the sale of seized property. It should be noted that during the fiscal year 1934-1935, the revenue received in connection with sales of seized property totaled \$21,306.06. The amount realized during the fiscal year 1935-1936 was \$4,051.32. The decrease is due to the policy of the Department, inaugurated during the past fiscal year, to turn over substantially all seized property to the Commissioner of Finance for distribution among State institutions, pursuant to P.L. 1935, c. 308.

Schedule "F" indicates that the total revenue received by the State Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control for the period from December 6, 1933 to June 30, 1936, was \$1,555,361.98. This figure is exclusive of the license fees received by the municipalities and the taxes on alcoholic beverages paid to the State. The tax revenue from alcoholic beverages during the calendar year 1934 was \$4,698,616.88. During the calendar year 1935, the tax revenue increased to \$6,341,182.61.

During the fiscal year 1934-1935, 12,406 licenses were issued by municipal issuing authorities and the fees collected aggregated \$4,300,999.49. During the fiscal year 1935-1936, 12,001 licenses were issued by municipal issuing authorities, and the fees collected aggregated \$4,268,778.13. Schedules "I" and "J" attached to this report set forth in detail the items comprising the foregoing.

3. ENFORCEMENT DIVISION.

This division is charged with enforcing the provisions of the Control Act and the rules and regulations promulgated by the Commissioner pursuant thereto. Its work consists mainly of the detection of unlawful manufacture, transportation, sale and distribution of alcoholic beverages, the apprehension of violators and the seizure of illicit stills, alcohol and other unlawful property. Numerous complaints received daily from officials and the public generally throughout the State are thoroughly investigated. In addition, routine investigations and contacts with local, State and Federal enforcement officials furnish valuable information. The specific activities of the division have been separated into the following groups:

(A) State Licenses. - The character and fitness of the applicant and the suitability of the premises sought to be licensed must be ascertained and approved prior to the issuance of the license. Complete investigations are made and reports sub-

mitted for consideration by the Commissioner. After a license is issued, there must be continual supervision of the licensee and the licensed premises to assure compliance with the Act and the rules and regulations.

As an additional precaution towards insuring that only qualified persons hold licenses, the Department has recently instituted a program which will ultimately result in the fingerprinting of all licensees. The fingerprint records are cleared through the files of the State Bureau and through the Bureau of Investigation, Department of Justice at Washington, D. C.

(B) Illicit manufacture and transportation. - The main work of this group is in detecting illicit stills, importations of bootleg liquor and unlicensed transportation, arresting violators and seizing unlawful property. As appears from Schedule "K" attached to this report, 933 illicit stills, 494 vehicles, 572,194 gallons of alcoholic beverages, and 42,449 gallons of denatured alcohol have been seized from the inception of the Department to June 30, 1936.

(C) Municipal licenses. - The main work of this group consists of the inspection of retail licensees to insure their compliance with the Act and the rules and regulations, and the detection of illicit retail outlets. No detailed statistics have been prepared with respect to the total number of inspections made. However, the records of the Department disclose that during the latter part of 1935, the licensed premises of 10,629 municipal retail licensees were inspected and 1083 violations discovered. In addition, there were 6,462 inspections on Primary Day, September 17, 1935, and 6,577 inspections on Election Day, November 5, 1935, to insure compliance with the Commissioner's Election Day regulation. There have been a total number of 2815 seizures from the inception of the Department to June 30, 1936 as appears from Schedule "K", referred to above.

(D) Miscellaneous. - A complete laboratory has been set up in the enforcement division and analyses are prepared by the Department chemist for use in criminal prosecutions and revocation proceedings. In addition, complete reports of cases involving arrests and seizures are submitted to the various County Prosecutors for their use in the prosecution of violators of the Act. Appearances in Courts by investigators and other representatives of the Department in criminal prosecutions in municipal, State and Federal Courts are frequent.

The disposition of seized property also rests within the jurisdiction of the enforcement division. Pursuant to P.L. 1935, c. 308, arrangements have been made whereby substantially all seized property is transferred to the State Finance Commissioner for distribution to State institutions and other boards, commissions, agencies and instrumentalities of the State government in accordance with law. No detailed statistics with respect to property transferred to the State Finance Commissioner are presently available. However, there is attached hereto Schedule "L" disclosing the amount of alcohol, whiskey, and wine delivered to State, county and municipal institutions and hospitals from the

inception of the Department to June 30, 1936, independent of deliveries to the State Finance Commissioner as aforesaid.
