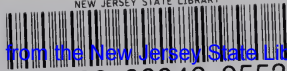

MINUTES

STATE OF NEW JERSEY
GENERAL ASSEMBLY

TUESDAY, January 13, 1976.

At 12 o'clock noon today, Tuesday, January 13, 1976, Assemblyman-elect Christopher J. Jackman of Hudson County, called to order the first session of the One Hundred and Ninety-seventh Session of the General Assembly (the twenty-sixth under the Constitution adopted by the people in 1947) by reading the following call:

“This being the second Tuesday of January, the time fixed for the beginning of the Legislative year, the General Assembly of the State of New Jersey is now called to order.”

Assemblyman-elect Jackman read the Certificate of Election.

Assemblyman-elect Jackman administered the oath of office to the members-elect.

Assemblyman Deverin administered the oath of office to Assemblyman-elect Jackman.

As Assemblyman Jackman called the roll, the members advanced to the bar of the House and signed the scroll.

Prayer was offered by Rev. Louis J. Vitale, Pastor of the Assumption Roman Catholic Church, Bayonne, N. J.

Mr. Jackman led in the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

Mr. Jackman entertained a motion for nomination of a temporary chairman.

A motion was made by Mr. Hamilton, seconded by Mr. Gregorio, further seconded by Mr. Bate, that Mr. Deverin be nominated as temporary chairman.

There being no further nomination, a motion was made by Mr. McManimon that nominations be closed.

Which motion was adopted.

The Speaker on assuming the Chair, addressed the General Assembly.

REVEREND CLERGY, CHIEF JUSTICE HUGHES, HONORABLE MEMBERS OF THE SUPREME COURT, MY FELLOW ASSEMBLYMEN, AND HONORED GUESTS:

This is a day of great honor for me. I wish to thank you for your vote of confidence. I deeply appreciate the trust you have placed in me by electing me your Speaker of this General Assembly. I am humbled. I am awed. I am overwhelmed with excitement, with expectation. You do me great honor and make my family very proud. I accept this mandate of authority, not for myself, but on behalf of all those who believe in the American dream, that hard work and perseverance are still worthwhile, and that service to one's Country, to one's State or to one's community is still a noble profession to which to aspire. I pledge to carry out this assignment with firmness and fairness, and always with the integrity of this House paramount in my mind. I pledge to you, ladies and gentlemen, as I pledge to all the people of New Jersey, that I shall strive to uphold the trust you have placed in me. To conduct myself, to conduct the business of this House, mindful of the dynamic leadership of those who served before me. Reverend Woodson stands tall among these and I would like to personally thank Speaker

Woodson for many of the sacrifices he has made on our behalf. For at a time when he experienced health problems, he still served with pride and dignity. He best exemplifies the integrity of this House.

We can look back with pride on the major legislative achievements of the past session. However, we cannot rest on these laurels. Our pride in these achievements must be tempered by our failure to reform a property tax which has grown to confiscatory rates in our urban centers. Our State cannot move forward until we act to alleviate the burdens which strangle our cities.

This greate dual challenge has plagued previous Legislatures and Governors. The enormity of the task before us is both a cause for alarm and an opportunity to hope. Massive problems call for sweeping solutions. In searching for these sweeping solutions, we can hope for a better tomorrow for all our citizens. I trust you share and hope with me and that this hope will sustain you during the difficult days ahead.

Although the last two years have been most difficult ones they have been progressive. You know, and I know, that the next two may be as exacting. I will call upon all members on both sides of the aisle in the two difficult years ahead to place partisan considerations aside and join together in meeting the State's most urgent needs. For we do not govern in a period of prosperity where the steady flow of revenues exceeds our needs. Nor do we share the luxury of good times when the operations of government flow smoothly, where many a vote is cast as measured by its relative popularity. No longer can we afford to be a government of all things to all people without concern for our fiscal tomorrow. We assume office amidst the hard, cold reality of recession; and we are battered and caught in a patch-work, bubble gum, horse and buggy web of regressive taxation, with our cities, our counties, our many institutions and services looking—urging—begging for relief, for fair treatment.

Yes, these are the realities in New Jersey 1976. These realities mandate a serious examination of our priorities, require a personal commitment from us all to reevaluate our past thinking, to maintain open receptive minds, minds willing to react to "what is"—not what we would prefer these realities to be.

The General Assembly is the House of the people. The Governor and Senate serve four year terms. But we stand before the electorate every two years. In many ways, we are the citizen's closest, most direct link to his State Government. It is our duty to serve as the citizen's ambassador to State Government. We must make State Government simple, understandable and amenable to the needs of its citizens. We cannot expect people to have confidence in or trust a government they can't comprehend. Never in our history have our citizens been more attentive, more attuned to what is happening. Expanded press, T.V., and radio coverage have brought the operations of the State House into their living rooms. And these people who read, who watch, who listen, will expect you—will expect me—to stand up and to be counted—to tell them “what we are for” as well as what we are against. This will take courage. It is written “Courage is what it takes to stand up and speak; courage is also what it takes to sit down and listen.” They will look to each of us to participate in the process, share the responsibilities, and stop shifting the blame for inaction onto the other guy. Because of them, platitudes and slogans will not relieve the burdens of inequitable or over-taxation, nor provide aid for our senior citizens or disadvantaged, or bring industry into our State, or put our workers back into meaningful employment. The citizens of New Jersey have long since tired of political rhetoric, of political gamesmanship. Great speeches will not put bread on their tables, clothe their children, or pay their mortgages.

We have been elected to be more than just an echo of regional concerns—of special points of view—as important as these may be. We have not been sent to Trenton as fragmented individuals with fragmented local or partisan goals. We cannot function as just a representative of our individual districts, or as just a democrat, or as just a republican without regard for all the needs of all the people of New Jersey.

We have been sent to Trenton—to act as a group, as a team, as a unified body to initiate, to lead, to govern, to make those thorny, gutty, and sometimes sticky decisions—popular and unpopular—to preserve the public trust. *These Times—That Trust—Demand No Less.* If this State is to survive, if our people are to prosper, then you and I will have to persevere as never before. If we are to establish a record of achievement, of lasting consequence, then let it

be recorded that this Assembly—by deed—by action—preserved those institutions, and met those needs, without concern for political consequence—and we did right because it was right.

We must set an example in the conduct of our own affairs in the Assembly. The measure of a Legislature is not quantitative. It is not how many days we meet, how many hours we stay in session, or how many bills we pass. We will be judged by the quality of what we do. Against this standard of quality, we did very well in the last session; but, we must do better in the next session because the challenges confronting our Nation continue to escalate.

In order to build on previous reform and to strengthen the committee system even further, I will assign the members to one committee only with few exceptions. The change to one man - one committee will permit each member to develop expertise in a specific area and help this House as an institution to better discharge its obligation to oversee the operations of the Executive Branch. I call upon each member to approach his committee assignment in this spirit.

To increase the efficiency and effectiveness of the Assembly, access to the floor will be strictly limited. Decorum will be maintained. Sessions will begin and end on time. I look forward to fewer, shorter but more productive sessions in the next two years.

We have things to do—ladies and gentlemen—important programs to initiate.

In this day and age it is bitter irony, an evil contradiction, that we, who have developed the resources to land a man on the moon, cannot muster sufficient resources to land each who wants to work a place to work.

We have an urgent priority in this State: to get our people off the unemployment lines and into the payroll lines.

Although this State cannot solve double-digit unemployment all by itself, there are initiatives that we can take—must take—to alleviate this burden. For instance, we must try to improve and expand the operation of the highly successful Economic Development Authority to accelerate the coming of job producing industry. We must take steps to lessen the spiralling “day to day” cost of doing business

in New Jersey. We must actively engage in those legislative programs which will say "New Jersey wants commerce and industry to come, New Jersey wants commerce and industry to stay."

It can be done—it must be done. And so we must mobilize the power and muscle of government to do those things which will expand private and not public employment. For fewer and fewer people cannot continue to support more and more if the business of government is to remain solvent and intact.

Let us likewise remember that the business of government is the business of people. Its efficient operation the people's concern.

Here too, we need reform, continuous attention, to create by legislation a nonpartisan watch dog to evaluate the use of State funds; a permanent commission on economy and efficiency, made up of legislators, administrators, business and community leaders to guarantee the effective operation of State Government. For if lessons be learned during this era of fast, fiscal crunch, these are—as many of us had already suspected—that economies in government can be accomplished without disrupting vital State services; and that in the long run, a government that's spending less may be a government that governs best.

For we cannot continue to spend our way out of every crisis; more funds without direction, without supervision, for those in need will not eliminate the welfare cheat; more money for courts and prosecutors will not overcome an antiquated penal system; nor will the flow of added dollars without defined, accomplishable goals serve any purpose other than to invite more persons to dine at our public table.

We should take a lesson from each housewife throughout the State and sensibly balance our priorities, and spend and distribute our limited dollars well. We must fairly and equitably raise the needed tax dollars without fear—but we must, at the same time, restore the concept of thrift in government. We must pay those public employees who are needed and do a fine job a decent wage, but, look to economize, to consolidate, where economies and consolidations can be made. We must honor our commitments to our counties, cities, communities, and schools; but, we must eliminate

the frills—the unnecessary programs, the mandated extra costs of administration.

If we are to succeed as a State, as citizens of a functioning viable community, we must reach out for these realities. For if we do not solve the problems of today, there will be no future to challenge for tomorrow.

We have much to do. There are many problems for which a solution must be offered. *There is no time to equivocate; there is no time for apologies. The time for action is now.*

Ladies and gentlemen, if the blessing of liberty and prosperity are to be preserved in this State if the very precepts upon which this great Nation were founded are to be furthered—in this our bicentennial year—then these fundamental, economic truths must be reasserted: that good government, concerned government is government that seeks to provide for us all an opportunity to obtain a useful job, adequate food, shelter and medical care, protection of our elderly, as well as the right to seek a decent education or trade.

We can do that in New Jersey—in this Assembly—if we try. We have in this State a great reservoir of human talent, concern, and compassion. Let us use it with discerning precision to restore a focus, a balance, a direction.

Our system can work—it will work. Let us be about our business. Let us offer to the Governor, to the Senate, these initiatives, our hands in a spirit of cooperation. But let us perform those needed tasks before us, without conjecture or worry as to whether everything we do and everything we say will receive the unanimous blessing of our partners in government. If we do our job, a consensus will be forged and the people of this State will benefit.

Many people who fail to appreciate the complexities of the issues before us will criticize our efforts. But in the words of President Theodore Roosevelt:

“It is not the critic who counts, nor the one who points out how the strong man stumbled or how the doer of deeds might have done them better. The credit belongs to the man who is actually in the arena, whose face is marred with sweat and dust and blood; who strives valiantly; who errs and comes short again and again; who knows the great enthusiasms, the great devotions,

and spends himself in a worthy cause; who, if he wins, know the triumph of high achievement; and who, if he fails, at least fails while daring greatly, so that his place shall never be with those cold and timid souls who know neither victory or defeat.”

So I ask you—ladies and gentlemen—my colleagues, to help me in my coming term. You have given me much authority. Together let us work to use it wisely so that common sense and justice will prevail.

In return, I pledge to you in the administration of my duties, with the help of Almighty God, that this General Assembly shall remain the House of the people of the State on whose behalf I accept this responsibility, and on whose behalf I shall exercise the prerogatives of my office.

Therefore, let us mutually resolve—each to each other—to carry this message forward. Together let us build a better State—a better Nation. Let us pledge to that end, as our founding fathers before us. “Our lives, our fortune, and our sacred honor.”

Speaker LeFante named Thomas O’Neal as his Executive Assistant.

The Clerk read a message from the Senate that the Senate has passed the following resolution in which the concurrence of the General Assembly is requested:

A committee of four escorted the Governor to the Joint Session.

Senate President Feldman introduced the Honorable Brendan T. Byrne, Governor of the State of New Jersey.

Governor Byrne delivered his message to the Joint Session of the 197th Legislature.

A motion was made by the Senate Majority Leader Merlino, seconded by Assembly Majority Leader Hamilton, that this Joint Session of the Legislature do rise.

Which motion was adopted.

Senate President Feldman declared the Joint Session adjourned.

The General Assembly reconvened.

Speaker LeFante entertained a motion for nominations for Speaker *pro tempore*.

There being no further nominations, a motion was made by Mr. Schuck that nominations be closed.

(Revenue raising.)

11. Transportation and Communications Committee

(Transportation including highways, passenger vehicle and truck regulation; mass transit, bus and rail; airport and aviation regulation; communications including public utilities regulation, public broadcasting system; general communications.)

12. State Government, Federal and Interstate Relations Committee

(State government including State structure and powers; employee relations including pensions; relations with county and municipal governments; election laws; Federal and interstate relations including Federal relations, interstate compacts and authorities; veterans affairs.)

13. Labor, Industry and Professions Committee

(Labor relations, including public sector collective bargaining; economic development.)

6. That in order to carry out said practice and procedure, William M. Lanning, H. Arthur Smith, Jr., Mary Joan Dickson, Walter R. Kennedy, Albert Porroni, Joseph A. Marrazzo, Jr., George H. Bohlinger, Jr., and Gertrude Erman, be designated as counsel to the Judiciary Committee of the General Assembly and that the duties of such counsel shall be to conduct said preliminary examination of bills proposed for introduction in the General Assembly under the general supervision of the chairman of said committee and through the Division of Bill Drafting and Legal Services of the Legislative Services Agency pursuant to laws.

7. That each member of the General Assembly be authorized to retain up to six aides at a total compensation of \$15,000.00 per member:

This reorganization plan transfers the Division of Local Government Services in the Department of Community Affairs as reorganized and structured pursuant to the Reorganization Plan of the Department of Community Affairs filed June 20, 1972 (Law of 1972, Vol. I, p. 1045 et seq.) and the Local Finance Board in the Division of Local Government Services to the Department of the Treasury.

The reorganization plan, hereby transmitted, is designed to assure more effective oversight of municipal and county finance. The problems of local finance have changed to such a degree that a new organization of State oversight and advisory functions is necessary. The transfer proposed by this reorganization plan will enable the State to coordinate better its own financings with the borrowing schedules of local governments. Also a merger of governmental budgeting and financing functions will promote a greater sharing of expertise of the divisions of State government concerned with State and local finance. In addition, the transfer of the Division of Local Government Services to the Department of the Treasury enables the Division of Local Government Services to work more effectively with the Division of Investment to improve local investment and debt management practices.

The transfer of the Division of Local Government Services to the Department of the Treasury, in which the Division of Budget and Accounting and the Commission on Capital Budgeting and Planning are located, also consolidates economic planning for State and local budgeting.

This plan will substantially improve the ability of the State to meet the budgeting and financing needs of municipalities and counties. It is my hope that the Legislature will approve this reorganization plan.

REORGANIZATION PLAN OF THE DIVISION OF LOCAL GOVERNMENT SERVICES

The Division of Local Government Services in the Department of Community Affairs, together with all its functions, powers and duties is hereby transferred to and constituted the Division of Local Government Services in the Department of the Treasury. Placing the Division of Local Government Services and the Local Finance Board in the Department of the Treasury will assure more effective oversight of municipal and county finance. The problems of local finance have changed to such a degree that a new organization of State oversight and advisory functions is necessary. The transfer proposed by the reorganization plan will enable the State to coordinate better its own financings with the borrowing schedules of local governments. Also a merger of governmental budgeting and financing functions will promote a greater sharing of expertise of the divisions of State government concerned with State and local finance. In addition, the transfer of the Division of Local Government Services to the Department of the Treasury enables the Division of Local Government Services to work effectively with the Division of Investment to improve local investment and debt management practices.

The transfer of the Division of Local Government Services to the Department of the Treasury, in which the Division of Budget and Accounting and the Commission on Capital Budget and Planning are located, also consolidates economic planning for State and local budgeting.

In accordance with the provisions of the Executive Reorganization Act of 1969, P. L. 1969, c. 203 (C. 52:14C-2), I find and declare that this transfer and reorganization is necessary:

- (1) to promote the more effective management of the Executive Branch;
- (2) to reduce expenditures and promote economy to the fullest extent practicable;

- (3) to increase the efficiency of the operations of the Executive Branch to the fullest extent practicable;
- (4) to group, coordinate, and consolidate agencies and functions of the Executive Branch, as nearly as practicable, according to major purposes;
- (5) to reduce the number of agencies by consolidating those having similar functions under a single head; and
- (6) to eliminate overlapping and duplication of effort.

All acts and parts of acts inconsistent with any of the provisions of this reorganization plan are superseded to the extent of such inconsistencies. All transfers directed by this reorganization plan shall be effected pursuant to the "State Agency Transfer Act," P. L. 1971, c. 375 (C. 52:14D-1 et seq.).

The Local Finance Board approves fiscal transactions of municipalities in, or in danger of falling into, unsound fiscal condition, and has jurisdiction over municipalities which are insolvent.

Placing these local budgeting and financing functions in the Department of the Treasury will assure more effective oversight of municipal and county finance. The problems of local finance have changed to such a degree that a new organization of State oversight and advisory functions is necessary. The transfer proposed by the reorganization plan will enable the State to coordinate better its own financings with the borrowing schedules of local governments. Also a merger of governmental budgeting and financing functions will promote a greater sharing of expertise of the officials of State government concerned with State and local finance. In addition, this proposed transfer enables the Bureau of Financial Regulation and Assistance and the Local Finance Board to work more effectively with the Division of Investment to improve local investment and debt management practices.

In accordance with the provisions of the Executive Reorganization Act of 1969, P. L. 1969, c. 203 (C. 52:14C-2), I find and declare that this transfer and reorganization is necessary:

- (1) to promote the more effective management of the Executive Branch;
- (2) to reduce expenditures and promote economy to the fullest extent practicable;
- (3) to increase the efficiency of the operations of the Executive Branch to the fullest extent practicable;
- (4) to group, coordinate, and consolidate agencies and functions of the Executive Branch, as nearly as practicable, according to major purposes;
- (5) to eliminate overlapping and duplication of effort.

All acts and parts of acts inconsistent with any of the provisions of this reorganization plan are superseded to the extent of such inconsistencies. All transfers directed by this reorganization plan shall be effective pursuant to the "State Agency Transfer Act," P. L. 1971, c. 375 (C. 52:14D-1 et seq.).

Any provisions of this plan which conflict with Federal law are null and void.

On February 9, 1976 I submitted to you a plan of reorganization for the Division of Local Government Services in the Department of Community Affairs. The primary objective of that reorganization plan was to strengthen the ability of the State to meet municipal and county budgeting and financing needs and to improve economic planning for State and local budgeting. Upon further consideration of the issues raised by the reorganization of the Division of Local Government Services, I submitted a revised plan of reorganization for the Division of Local Government Services which would have transferred the Bureau of Financial Regulation and Assistance in the Division of Local Government Services in the Department of Community Affairs and the Local Finance Board in the Division of Local Government Services in the Department of Community Affairs to the Department of the Treasury. Upon further consideration and discussion of the issues involved, I hereby submit a revised plan of reorganization for the Division of Local Government Services which transfers the Bureau of Financial Regulation and Assistance in the Division of Local Government Services in the Department of Community Affairs, as presently constituted, to the Department of the Treasury.

The reorganization plan, hereby transmitted, is designed to assure more effective oversight of municipal and county finance. The problems of local finance have changed to such a degree that a new organization of State oversight and advisory functions is necessary. The transfer proposed by this reorganization plan will enable the State to coordinate better its own financings with the borrowing schedules of local governments. Also this merger of governmental budgeting and financing functions will promote a greater sharing of expertise of the officials in State government concerned with State and local finance. In addition, this proposed transfer enables the Bureau of Financial Regulation and Assistance to work more effectively with the Division of Investment to improve local investment and debt management practices. This proposed transfer of functions to the Department of the Treasury, in which the Division of Budget and Accounting, the Division of Investment, and the Commission on Capital Budgeting and Planning are located, consolidates fiscal expertise for budget and debt management.

This plan will substantially improve the ability of the State to meet the budgeting and financing needs of municipalities and counties.

REORGANIZATION PLAN OF THE DIVISION OF LOCAL
GOVERNMENT SERVICES

The Bureau of Financial Regulation and Assistance in the Division of Local Government Services in the Department of Community Affairs, together with all its functions, powers and duties, is hereby transferred to the Department of the Treasury. All powers exercised by the Commissioner of Community Affairs and the Director of the Division of Local Government Services in direct supervision of the Bureau of Financial Regulation and Assistance are hereby transferred to the Department of the Treasury and shall be exercised by officials in the Department of the Treasury.

The Bureau of Financial Regulation and Assistance, as presently organized, reviews and certifies all municipal budgets, is responsible for post-audit review of municipal and county government, and provides financial guidance to local governments.

Placing these local budgeting and financing functions in the Department of the Treasury will assure more effective oversight of municipal and county finance. The problems of local finance have changed to such a degree that a new organization of State oversight and advisory functions is necessary. The transfer proposed by the reorganization plan will enable the State to coordinate better its own financings with the borrowing schedules of local governments. Also a transfer of these governmental budgeting and financing functions to the Department of the Treasury will promote a greater sharing of expertise of the officials of State government concerned with State and local finance. In addition, this proposed transfer enables the Bureau of Financial Regulation and Assistance to work more effectively with the Division of Investment to improve local investment and debt management practices.

In accordance with the provision of the Executive Reorganization Act of 1969, P. L. 1969, c. 203 (C. 52:14C-2), I find and declare that this transfer and reorganization is necessary:

(1) To promote the more effective management of the Executive Branch;

(2) To reduce expenditures and promote economy to the fullest extent practicable;

(3) To increase the efficiency of the operations of the Executive Branch to the fullest extent practicable;

(4) To group, coordinate, and consolidate agencies and functions of the Executive Branch, as nearly as practicable, according to major purposes;

(5) To eliminate overlapping and duplication of effort.

All acts and parts of acts inconsistent with any of the provisions of this reorganization plan are superseded to the extent of such inconsistencies. All transfers directed by this reorganization plan shall be effective pursuant to the "State Agency Transfer Act," P. L. 1971, c. 375 (C. 52:14D-1 et seq.).

This plan shall be effective July 1, 1976.

ASSEMBLY BILL No. 1617

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, paragraph 14(a) of the Constitution, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 1617 without my approval.

Assembly Bill No. 1617 would allow a municipality which is expecting to receive Federal funds for a capital project to use short-term financing for 90 days longer than present law now allows. Under N. J. S. 40A :2-8 a municipality may float bond anticipation notes not exceeding 1 year for a period of 5 years. The bonds must all mature and be re-

tired no later than 5 years and 4 months after the original bond anticipation notes are issued. To extend short-term financing for an additional 90 days, this bill authorizes a 90-day extension of the payment date on the existing notes if two conditions are met. The holder of the present notes and the Director of the Division of Local Government Services both must approve the 90-day extension of the note payment date.

In the context of current problems in municipal finance, Assembly Bill No. 1617 would create unwarranted risks. Extending the payment date on certain notes could be viewed by the investment community as precedent for delaying debt payment obligations. It is essential that we demonstrate to investors that all levels of New Jersey government will continue to adhere to the rigorous protective standards of the existing State financing and budget laws.

This bill also is unlikely to help many municipalities. There is no guarantee that an additional 90 days of temporary financing authority will match Federal funding schedules and thereby enable municipalities to avoid the cost of floating long-term bonds. Even without this bill a municipality is able to obtain long-term financing in a manner which preserves the opportunity to take advantage of eventual Federal funding. A municipality can arrange a bond sale which enables it to buy back the bonds if and when it receives the anticipated Federal funds. If the Federal funds are then received in as short a period as the 90-day period included in Assembly Bill No. 1617, the cost of refinancing the capital project involved with Federal funds will be insubstantial. On the other hand, any investor wariness and concern resulting from the signing of Assembly Bill No. 1617 could create higher financing costs for local governments.

For these reasons, I hereby return Assembly Bill No. 1617 without my approval.

The placement of civil defense responsibilities within the Department of Defense has reflected the traditional concept of civil defense as preparation for possible enemy attacks. In recent years, however, civil defense's activities have been primarily confined to responding to natural disasters and other emergencies. During most emergencies, relief efforts have been undertaken by the State Police with the assistance of county and local relief units. This proposed reorganization is intended to promote coordination of such activities, and to eliminate duplication of effort in emergency relief situations. The reorganization will also improve disaster planning, which is now conducted by the Governor's Advisory Council on Emergency Services, an interdepartmental group of which the Attorney General is presiding officer.

In accordance with the provisions of the Executive Reorganization Act of 1969, P. L. 1969, c. 203 (C. 52:14C-2), I find and declare that this transfer and reorganization is necessary

- (1) to promote the more effective management of the Executive Branch;
- (2) to reduce expenditures and promote economy to the fullest extent practicable;
- (3) to increase the efficiency of the operations of the Executive to the fullest extent practicable;
- (4) to group, coordinate, and consolidate agencies and functions of the Executive Branch, as nearly as may be, according to major purposes;
- (5) to reduce the number of agencies by consolidating those having similar functions under a single head; and
- (6) to eliminate overlapping and duplication of effort.

All acts and parts of acts inconsistent with any of the provisions of this reorganization plan are superseded to the extent of such inconsistencies. The civilian defense director shall continue to be appointed by the Governor pursuant

to the provisions of N. J. S. A :9-35. All transfers directed by this reorganization plan shall be in accordance with the provisions of the "State Agency Transfer Act," P. L. 1971, c. 375 (C. 52:14D-1 et seq.).

Any provisions of this plan which conflict with Federal law are null and void.
