Deployed Airmen visit orphanage

Deployed 177th Services Flight Airmen joined forces with the Manas Area Benefit Outreach Society to visit an orphanage in the village of Niz, Kyrgyz Republic.

"I was asked to go to the orphanage, and I fell in love with the children from the first visit," said 177th Fighter Wing Lodging Specialist Tech. Sgt. Kim King.

The New Jersey Air National Guard Airmen are deployed at the Transit Center at Manas, Kyrgyz Republic in support of Operation Enduring Freedom.

Master Sgts. Dean Burlew, Jill Kovak and Harry Steele, Tech. Sgt. King, and Senior Airmen Vanessa Torres and Tamikia Hart visited the orphanage where the children's ages ranged between six and 12.

"We participated in outdoor activities; played soccer and tag," said Services Sustainment Superintendent Master Sgt. Kovak. "We also brought them shoes which they were in need of."

"I saw that something can be done to make a difference in the children's lives and help build a relationship between America and with the Kyrgyz community," said Food Operations Superintendent Master Sgt. Steele.

The orphanage is one of 10 organizations, which include schools and children's heart and cancer centers; supported by MABOS, a non-profit base community service organization. During the visits, Airmen bring toys, clothes, school supplies and text-

books. MABOS holds fund raisers to purchase items for the visits, as well as raises money for the children's heart surgeries. So far MABOS has paid for more than 200 heart surgeries.

"The amount of joy and happiness I have received from MA-BOS volunteering is tremendous, and I will be taking home life-lasting memories," said Kovak.

No doubt about it - "Spring has sprung, the grass has riz" as the old poem states.

It is time for outdoor activities to begin in earnest. Keep the earth in mind as you work around the house in your sunny time off.

Take your car to the car wash! Those high-pressure nozzles use less water than the hose attached to the spigot at home. Most commercial car washes reuse the water and send runoff to treatment centers, not into the lakes and streams.

Washing your car at home averages 80-140 gallons of water; commercial car washes average 45 gallons.

If you do have to wash your car at home, here are a couple ways to cut down the shock to the environment.

Park your car on grass or gravel so the water soaks into the ground. Avoid soaps that say: harmful, danger or poison. Turn off the hose when you aren't using it.

Start a garden! You can have fresh veggies without driving to the store. Even if you don't have a large yard, or any yard - you can grow tomatoes or peppers in containers on your deck or herbs in your windows. Just think, picking fresh parsley, thyme or oregano for your supper.

Some communities have space to rent for those who want to garden and don't have the space or maybe you have a neighbor with a large yard who will lend you a corner if you offer to share some of your bounty.

It's time for everyone to pull out the grill, clean it up and start cooking your favorite meal outdoors. The debate can be heated (pun intended!) between the gas and charcoal grillers over which is better. Taste aside, according to a recent study by the Environment Impact Assessment Review, "The overwhelming factors are that as a fuel, LPG (liquefied petroleum gas) is dramatically more efficient than charcoal in its production and considerably more efficient in cooking." The two grilling methods were defined by their overall footprint, with charcoal using 998 kg of CO2, almost three times more than propane, which weighed in at 349 kg. Make sure that your propane tank has a trade-in option.

Participants learn to: supervise children and infants, basic child-care skills (diapering and feeding), choose safe, age-appropriate games and toys, handle bedtime and discipline issues, identify safety hazards Care for common injuries and emergencies such as choking, cuts, bee stings, communicate effectively with parents, and find and interview for babysitting jobs.

Vineland Home benefits from Girl Scout Gold award

Leah Weatherby, 15, received the Girl Scout Gold Award, the highest award a Girl Scout can earn, when she provided the Vineland Veterans Memorial Home with eight large sensory kits for the activities rooms and 300 individual bags with personal supplies for the residents.

A member of the Hessian Wood Community Troop # 64713, Weatherby is a ninth grader at Woodbury High School. She has been a Girl Scout since she was in second grade.

The Girl Scout website described this Gold Award as "what you really want to be remembered for" in girl scouting. Weatherby contacted the home about special projects for her Gold Award. Lois Ballurio, Volunteer Services Assistant, gave her a few ideas regarding need sensory stimulation items for the residents. She took the ideas, did her research and created the project.

On March 22, Weatherby, with the help her family, mother, father, brothers, and grandfather, arrived at Vineland with individual bags for each of the 300 residents. The bags contained personal care items, snack and stationery.

In addition, she provided eight large sensory kits for the activity rooms. The kits included banking, accounting, mail carrier, child care, and snoezelen kits. The term "Snoezelen" or controlled multisensory stimulation is used for people with disabilities, and involves exposing them to a soothing and stimulating environment. These kits are specially designed to deliver stimuli to various senses, using lighting effects, color, sounds, music, scents, etc. Each kit will provide sensory and cognitive therapy tools for the staff in rehabilitation programs for the residents. With the help of her community in the funding for the kits, Leah's project is a true success

Leah and her family personally delivered 60 bags with the help of the Activities staff to the residents on Honor Circle and Justice Court.
