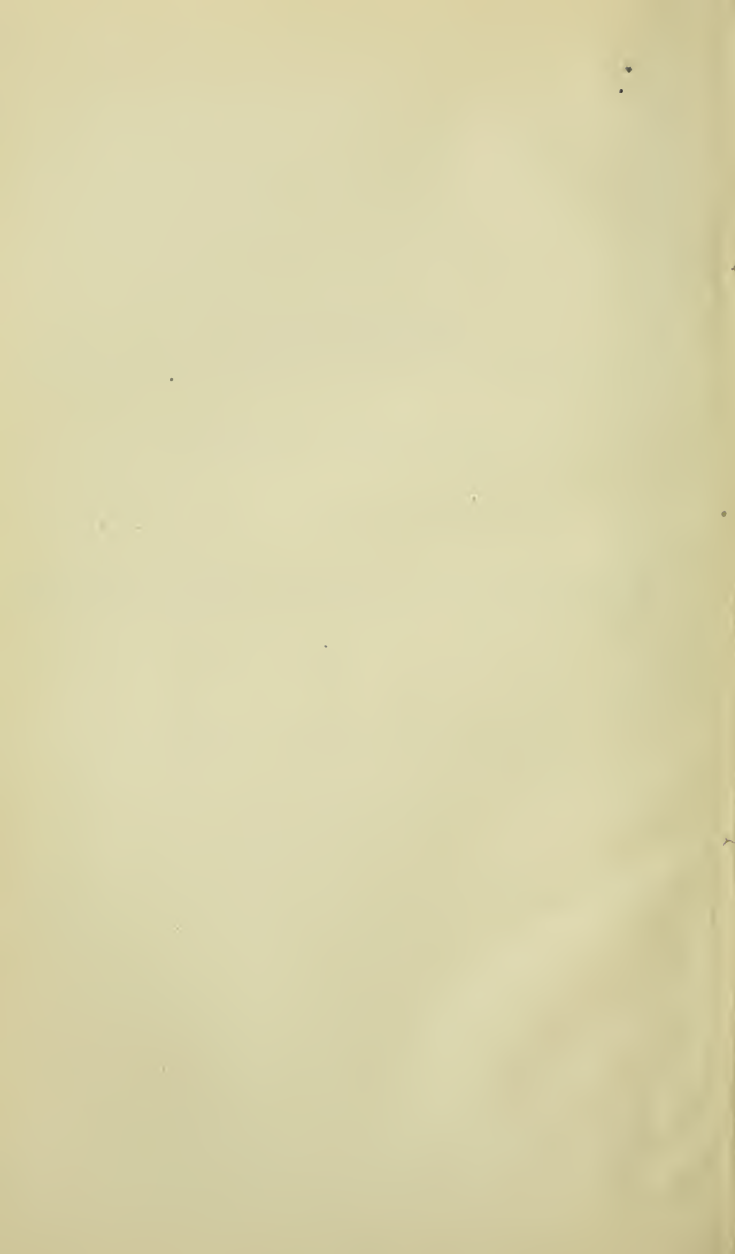

# REPORT.

STATE OF NEW JERSEY,  
OFFICE OF THE QUARTERMASTER-GENERAL,  
TRENTON, November 1st, 1886. }

*To His Excellency Leon Abbett, Governor and Commander-in-Chief :*

I have the honor to submit the following report of the principal operations of the Quartermaster-General's Department during the fiscal year ending October 31, 1886. The act for the "organization of the National Guard of New Jersey," makes it the "duty of the Quartermaster-General to make an annual report to the Governor and Commander-in-chief of the number and condition of the arms and equipments belonging to the State, the number loaned out, in whose hands, and whether they remain under proper responsibilities, including in said return all camp and garrison equipage in his charge."

## ARMS.

The total number of arms of different calibres belonging to the State is fourteen thousand and seventy-three (14,073).

Of this number three hundred and thirty-seven (337) are un-serviceable. In the Arsenal there are eight thousand one hundred and ninety-three (8,193) rifled muskets, calibre 58, and two hundred and twelve (212) rifled muskets, calibre 69, serviceable. These arms, although serviceable, are not issued to the National Guard and are kept in stock for loans to veteran associations, under the law. They could be changed to breech loaders at a moderate expense, but their calibre would not correspond with those in use by the United States Army, or with those already issued to the National Guard. Recent events have proved to the satisfaction of military men the great superiority of the repeating rifles over those now in use. In a few years these rifles will be adopted by our own and foreign countries.

In issuing arms to companies care is taken that the corps is provided with a proper depository for the State property. There are also the following cannon, unserviceable, in the Arsenal.

- 5 bronze guns, 3½ inch, smooth.
- 1 " gun, 6 pdr., French.
- 2 iron guns, 6 pdr., U. S.

#### AMMUNITION.

Ammunition used by the National Guard is manufactured at the State Arsenal, the machinery for which purpose was bought and set up in 1880. During the year sixty thousand five hundred (60,500) rounds were manufactured. Of this amount five thousand (5,000) rounds were reduced cartridges. The number of rounds of reduced cartridges issued during the year is three thousand nine hundred and nineteen (3,919.)

But little interest seems to be taken in armory practice. This is to be regretted, as it is a valuable instructor in aiming and firing. I earnestly hope that the practice in the armories during the winter months will be resumed.

#### RECEIPTS FROM THE UNITED STATES.

In the appendix will be found a statement of the receipts from the United States on account of the quota due this State for arming and equipping the militia. The balance standing to the credit of this State on account of the above named quota is \$12,915.12. It is hardly necessary to do more than refer to the great need of larger appropriations for "arming and equipping the whole body of the militia." The subject has been fully treated of in previous reports.

#### THE NATIONAL GUARD.

The National Guard generally is in a very healthy and gratifying condition, and the discipline excellent. Some of our organizations, in drill, discipline and efficiency, are not surpassed by any in the country. Your Excellency has contributed much to its comfort, as well as efficiency, by a sound and liberal policy. During the year a new battalion, located at Orange, consisting of two companies of infantry, was organized and mustered. The Ninth Regiment was disbanded and the companies afterwards formed into a regimental organization known as the Second Regiment. The guard, with the exception of Gatling Gun Company A, is uniformed throughout with the New Jersey regulation uniform, according to the regulations adopted by the State Military Board.

## GUN SQUADS.

In 1885, a resolution was adopted by the State Military Board requiring the Quartermaster-General to furnish breech-loading howitzers and appliances for removing barricades. Gun squads have been organized in several of the regimental organizations of the guard, and they have been armed as far as the means at our disposal would permit. The following statement will give a list of these organizations :

*First Regiment*, Gun Squad, Lieutenant Henry W. Freeman, commanding. One (1) howitzer, pistols, sabres, &c.

*Second Regiment*, Gun Squad, Lieutenant Henry Weinhausen, commanding. Pistols, sabres, &c.

*Third Regiment*, Gun Squad, Lieutenant Julius C. Shailer, commanding. One (1) howitzer, pistols, sabres, &c.

*Fourth Regiment*, Gun Squad, Lieutenant Robert G. Smith, commanding. One (1) howitzer, pistols, sabres, &c.

*Fifth Regiment*, Gun Squad, Lieutenant Alexander I. Reilly, commanding. One (1) howitzer, pistols, sabres, &c.

*Sixth Regiment*, Gun Squad, not organized.

*Seventh Regiment*, Gun Squad, Lieutenant Richard R. Whitehead, commanding. Pistols, sabres, &c.

*First Battalion*, Gun Squad, Lieutenant Florian O'Bourski commanding. One (1) Gatling gun, pistols, sabres, &c.

*Second Battalion*, Gun Squad, not organized.

*Third Battalion*, Gun Squad, not organized.

We are in expectation of the receipt of two (2) more howitzers from the War Department. Requisition was made for them in April, 1886.

## SAPPERS' AND MINERS' CORPS.

On this subject I copy from my last annual report as follows :  
"After receiving the suggestions and opinions of competent authorities on the subject of the implements and appliances effec-

tive in the suppression of street riots and the breaking of street barricades, there is now being prepared at the State Arsenal an outfit, the result of these investigations, which it is confidently expected will meet the requirements of such emergencies whenever they arise.

There are six sets of appliances, designed for six organizations, each consisting of the following :

- One (1) two-wheeled hand-cart made to contain the following appliances :
- Six (6) firemen's axes, or picks and axes combined.
- Six (6) shovels.
- Two (2) crowbars.
- Two (2) drag-ropes, fifty feet each, with hooks.
- One (1) battering-ram.
- Two (2) scaling ladders.
- Two (2) pairs cutting pliers.
- Six (6) bull's-eye lanterns.
- Six (6) large lanterns with brass guards."

These have been prepared and during the year five of them have been sent to the following organizations, the other remaining on hand at the Arsenal :

- One (1) to the First Regiment, head-quarters at Newark.
- One (1) to the Fourth Regiment, head-quarters at Jersey City.
- One (1) to the Fifth Regiment, head-quarters at Newark.
- One (1) to the First Battalion, head-quarters at Paterson.
- One (1) to the Third Regiment, head-quarters at Elizabeth.

#### ANNUAL RETURNS.

Printed forms of returns, with the law annexed, requiring reports to be made annually to the Quartermaster-General, were forwarded to all the companies, through the respective regimental and battalion headquarters. All have complied with the law, with the exception of Gatling Gun Company B. The following statement shows the number and condition of the arms, and number of uniformed men in the National Guard.

UNIFORMS.

In the appendix will be found a statement of the issues of uniforms during the year, and also a statement of the total issues of regulation uniforms to the National Guard, to October 31, 1886, under the act approved March 10, 1880. Upon a comparison of the quarterly returns made by company commandants to the Adjutant-General with the number charged against the organizations the following discrepancies are shown to exist:

Some of these discrepancies are believed to be caused by clerical errors of the company commandants in making their returns, yet it is fair to presume that many of the articles of uniforms have been lost or destroyed or worn out in the service, or have been carried away by soldiers who have removed from the State. The law, (section 38 of the act approved March 9, 1869) which reads, "the uniforms and equipments to be issued to each company shall be left at the company armory, for safe keeping" is not strictly complied with, and members of the guard are permitted to carry them to their homes. Had the companies kept their uniforms in their armories, not one would have been lost.

During the year the State Military Board adopted as a part of the regulation uniform a dark blue blouse of Oakes flannel, cloth face, for enlisted men. Mr. Cowan, the military tailor of the State, was awarded the contract for making them at three dollars and he is still engaged in their manufacture. One thousand six hundred and ten (1,610) have been issued to date.

#### ENCAMPMENT.

The farm at Sea Girt, belonging to the Sea Girt Land Improvement Company, was rented at the liberal price of three thousand dollars (\$3,000) per year. The rent has been paid to August 1, 1886. Four months are due on the first of December. Acting under orders of your Excellency, the ground was put in condition for the encampment of the Second Brigade, which began on the 23d of August and terminated on the 28th of August. The camp ground is large and sufficient to accommodate the entire division, either for an encampment, parade or review. The work of erecting the tents was done under the supervision of this department, the necessary labor being mostly obtained from the inhabitants of the neighborhood. Additional teams and wagons were purchased, and forage and fuel bought in the immediate locality at not exorbitant rates. Other necessary wagon transportation and carriage hire was procured of farmers. Quartermaster and commissary stores were received at the Post Quartermaster storehouse by Major Yard, of this department, assisted by Quartermasters Felton and Graff, of the Sixth and Fourth Regiments, and employes of the arsenal. Appended to my report will be found a report of Deputy Quartermaster Yard. Camp and garrison equipage were turned over in bulk at the camp. Exhibit J will show the quantity of clothing and camp and garrison equipage turned over at the camp, and Exhibit L the quantity of ammunition turned over.

The medical department received the careful attention of the Brigade Surgeon, Lieutenant-Colonel Franklin Gauntt. Your Excellency made frequent visits to the ground during the con-

struction of the camp and exercised a general supervision over the work being done. The total expenses of the encampment proper, as far as paid, amount to the sum of ten thousand three hundred and fourteen dollars and ninety-six cents (\$10,314.96). Most of these disbursements were made directly by me from funds received from the Comptroller of the Treasury for that purpose. On the 26th of October I submitted to your Excellency for approval, ninety-six (96) vouchers in duplicate, and explained that they were for amounts disbursed by me, for and on account of the Encampment of the Second Brigade, at Sea Girt, for expenses on account of purchases remaining on hand, and expenses on account of the Rifle Range and Practice during the season of 1886, amounting in all to the sum of eight thousand seven hundred and thirty-one dollars and thirty-one cents (\$8,731.31). The amounts received by me were as follows :

DRILLS AND PARADES.

The year has been one of great activity, and has involved much

labor and responsibility upon the Department in consequence. Parades have taken place during the year as follows :

The annual inspection of the First Brigade took place at Orange, May 31, 1886.

The inspection of the Second Brigade was made by regiments, as follows: The Third Regiment, at Elizabeth, May 30th; the Sixth Regiment, at Woodbury, May 17th; the Seventh Regiment, at Lambertville, June 8th; and Gatling Gun Company B, at Camden, June 3d.

The bi-centennial celebration of Acquackanonk, on the 12th of June, was participated in by the Fourth Regiment and First Battalion. Camp and garrison equipage and gun for firing a salute were sent to that place by this Department and men were detailed from the Arsenal as a firing party. Transportation was furnished to the Regiment by your direction.

#### OFFICERS OF THE QUARTERMASTER-GENERAL'S DEPARTMENT.

No changes have taken place during the past year in these officers. The *personnel* of this department consists of the Quartermaster-General, Assistant Quartermaster-General, Deputy Quartermaster, two clerks, one military store keeper, one engineer, one in care of clothing, two cleaning arms, one carpenter, three laborers, one teamster and one tent maker.

The charges to this account embrace all the expenditures connected with the maintenance of the militia of the State. The increase, as compared with the preceding year, in the expenditures for purposes of the National Guard is chiefly due to the expenses attending the encampment of the Second Brigade in August, 1884, the First Brigade in August, 1885, and the Second Brigade in August, 1886. Another cause of the increase of the military expenditure was the passage of the law, at the last session of the Legislature, providing for the pay of officers and men for services during encampments. The amount drawn from the Comptroller of the Treasury for this purpose was fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000), which was charged to this account.

INDEPENDENT MILITARY ORGANIZATIONS.

There are one hundred and eighty-one (181) stand of arms in the possession of independent military companies in the State, issued upon bond, by authority of special acts and resolutions of the Legislature. For a detailed statement of this property, you are referred to Tabular Statement D.

ARMS LOANED TO SCHOOLS AND ACADEMIES.

There are three hundred and sixty-two (362) stand of arms in possession of schools and academies in the State, issued by authority of law, and on security approved by the Commander-in-Chief. The institutions against which these arms are charged, and the number of each, are as follows :

Upon your Excellency's approval there were loaned to Prof. W. B. Scott, for use of Princeton Scientific Expedition of 1886, the following named stores, which have been returned in good order.

The cartridges above mentioned were sold to the expedition.

## RIFLE PRACTICE.

The interest taken by the National Guard in this invaluable branch of instruction for the soldier is undiminished. There were fifty-three thousand nine hundred and fifty-seven (53,957) rounds of metallic cartridges expended in practice at the range during the season of 1886, a much larger expenditure than the year previous. All the firing was done under careful supervision and the score kept by men appointed for the purpose and sworn to keep a correct record.

## MEDICAL DEPARTMENT.

This department is well supplied with the necessary surgical instruments to meet cases which might occur during a temporary service of the Guard or while on camp duty. No reports have been received during the year from regimental or battalion surgeons but it is believed that the property in their possession is in good condition.

## STATE ARSENAL.

The current expenses of the State Arsenal for the year amount to ninety-nine dollars and seventy-four cents (\$99.74). At the session of 1884 a special appropriation was authorized of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), for the purpose of making necessary improvements in the buildings, and of this appropriation the sum of three thousand six hundred and forty-four dollars and seventy-seven cents (\$3,644.77) has been drawn, leaving a balance still due of one thousand three hundred and fifty-five dollars and twenty-three cents (\$1,355.23).

## PROPERTY DROPPED BY AFFIDAVITS.

In the appendix will be found a statement of stores dropped by affidavits during the year ending October 31, 1886. These affidavits are submitted to your Excellency for approval before final action is taken by this department.

After an immense amount of correspondence, and after furnishing voluminous evidence from the records of the United States Treasury Department, our agent at Washington finally convinced Hon. John Scott, General Solicitor of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, of the justness of the claim of the State, and in the month of July a voucher for four hundred and sixty-one dollars and seventy cents (\$461.70), payable at the Philadelphia National

Bank, which was the amount claimed, was received at this office and deposited with the State Treasurer. The claim against the United States for assessments improperly imposed for taxes was adjusted and allowed, has been paid, and a draft for the amount, three hundred and twenty-eight dollars and sixty cents (\$328.60), was received in the month of September, and deposited with the State Treasurer. The Trenton Banking Company withheld the tax from the State, but never paid it over to the United States. The original returns in Washington show this. The company thus far has refused to pay it. It has been notified that unless paid, suit will be instituted. If suit is brought, duly certified copies can be obtained.

## STATE WAR CLAIMS.

In my last annual report it was stated that the differences arising in the settlement of these claims, embracing the suspended and disallowed accounts of all the installments, amounted to forty-two thousand seven hundred and sixty-nine dollars and fifty-five cents (\$42,769.55). Of this the State still claims twenty-two thousand and twenty-one dollars and ninety-two cents (\$22,021.92) as properly reimbursable under the acts of Congress, and it is believed that the reasons for the disallowances and suspension can be removed by explanations from this department, when it will be allowed and paid to the State.

## THE CHARLESTON EARTHQUAKES.

The following telegrams will explain themselves :

September 7, 1886.

*Governor South Carolina :*

The people of New Jersey are deeply affected by the great calamity that has overtaken the city of Charleston. If we can be of service in sheltering any of the people made homeless we hereby tender you the use of two hundred (200) wall tents and thirty-five (35) hospital tents, which we can send immediately by railroad or steamer to Charleston, in charge of an agent of our Quartermaster-General's Department to set them up for use. If you desire the tents, send us the name of a proper official in Charleston with whom our agent shall communicate upon his arrival. If the common "A" or wedge tent will be of service we can tender the use of over five hundred (500).

Acting under your orders by telegrams, we forwarded on the 8th of September, addressed to Hon. W. A. Courtney, Mayor of Charleston, the following camp equipage :

22 Hospital tents and flies.  
118 Wall tents and flies.  
150 Common tents.

These stores were forwarded through the courtesy of the Adams Express Co. to their destination free of charge, and were returned in the same generous manner. They were placed in charge of your private secretary and Capt. Makechney, of this department. Fortunately they were not used in Charleston, the people having become somewhat quieted down and returned to their homes. Capt. Makechney, on his return to Trenton, was the bearer of a complimentary note, of which the following is a copy :

PAYMASTER GENERAL'S ACCOUNT.

Seventeen men who served during the labor strike of 1877 remain unpaid, the amount due them aggregating one hundred and

sixty-nine dollars, (\$169.) The duties of this department have been vastly increased by the act of the Legislature, approved May 11, 1886. This act provided for the pay of officers and enlisted men of the National Guard for camp duty. In paying for services at the encampment of the Second Brigade at Sea Girt, checks were drawn to the order of each officer and man by the clerks in this office, forwarded to the respective paymasters and by them distributed. Below I copy their reports as transmitted to this office:

#### GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC.

The National Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic was held at San Francisco, California, during the year. The National Guard of this State was represented on this occasion by Gatling Gun Company A., of Elizabeth, an organization composed of veterans of the war for the Union. Transportation was furnished this command, by order of your Excellency, to the limits of this State and return on this occasion. The courtesy so kindly extended was fully appreciated by the men. The trip throughout was fraught with interest. There was no general encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic in this State. In the appendix will be found a statement of all the issues made to the Grand Army and Veteran Associations during the year. This department keeps pretty actively employed in work connected with these organizations.

In June an application was received from Col. A. J. Clark, on behalf of the survivors of New Jersey Regiments, for camp equipage and blankets to be used at the dedicatory ceremonies at Gettysburg, Pennsylvania, June 30th to July 3d, inclusive. The stores were loaned by your order and were promptly returned in good condition immediately after the conclusion of the ceremonies. They were sent in charge of Capt. Makechney, of this Department, who remained with them until they were shipped to Trenton.

#### IRISH NATIONAL FESTIVAL.

On the 10th of June I received a communication from your Excellency, enclosing an application of Joseph Atkinson and others for loan of camp equipage for use of the Irish National Festival, at Caledonian Park, Newark, July 3d, 4th, 5th and 6th. As the Festival was instituted with the view of practically aiding the Irish people in their great battle for Home Rule, as the proceeds were to assist the Irish Parliamentary Party, and the occasion one in which the citizens of Newark were generally interested, no reason existed why the application should not be granted. With your approval and by your direction, after a satisfactory bond was filed, the stores asked for were forwarded and promptly returned in good order and all damages and losses paid for.

Loans of Battle Flags, by authority of a resolution of the Legislature, concurred in March 12th, 1880.

February 1st to 7th, 1886. Colors of the First, Eighth, Fifteenth, Twenty-Sixth and Fortieth Regiments, New Jersey Volunteers, on occasion of a Fair held at Newark, by the survivors of those organizations, under the auspices of Phil. Kearney Post, G. A. R.

June 17th, 1886. Colors of the Eleventh Regiment, New Jersey Volunteers, on occasion of annual re-union of survivors, at New Brunswick.

October 19th, 1886. Colors of the Fourteenth Regiment, New Jersey Volunteers, at annual re-union of survivors, at Plainfield.

By an act of the Legislature, these Colors are required to be kept at the State Capitol. There being no room in the building they are temporarily deposited in the office of the Adjutant General.

## EXHIBIT A.

### DEPUTY QUARTERMASTER'S REPORT.

---

FREEHOLD, N. J., August 30th, 1886.

*To General Lewis Perrine, Quartermaster-General of New Jersey :*

GENERAL:—In pursuance of your order of the 20th inst., I reported at your headquarters at *Camp Mott* on the 23rd inst. and was assigned to duty as Post Quartermaster. I found that the work of your department had begun on the 16th of July, under the supervision of Capt. John MacKeckney. The grounds were mowed and the hay was stored upon the premises for use during the encampment.

Ammunition and scorers and markers were furnished for the Rifle Range, practice on which commenced on the 12th of July. The Range was under the immediate charge of Gen. Bird W. Spencer, Inspector-General of Rifle Practice. Some of the ammunition served out proved to be defective from having been on hand too long, but when this fact was discovered it was at once withdrawn and fresher substituted for it.

Tents were erected for three regiments of Infantry, one Gatling Gun Company and two Gun Squads, the latter belonging respectively to the Third and Seventh Regiments. A camp was also constructed for the Brigadier-General commanding and his staff. In addition, four mess-halls, with kitchens adjacent to each, were erected for the men and supplied with tables and benches. Mess-halls and kitchens were also provided for the Brigade and Regimental Staffs. The carpenter work for this branch of the service was under the charge of Mr. Elias Dey.

Water for culinary and drinking purposes was supplied by driven wells, sunk at convenient points throughout the camp. An ample supply of water is found in this way at a depth of from twelve to fifteen feet, which is excellent for all purposes

when not affected by surface drainage. Some complaint was made, I am informed, that during our encampment this year these wells were so affected, but with no evil results. Experience has demonstrated, however, that it is only a question of time when such wells will become so contaminated as to be unwholesome. Such a contingency should be guarded against. Experiments at other places along the coast have been successful in showing that pure and wholesome water can certainly be procured by means of artesian wells, which at a depth of from four hundred to five hundred feet yield a supply of thirty to fifty gallons per minute. The first of these wells, the one sunk at Ocean Grove in 1883, has yielded an undiminished supply of fifty gallons per minute, flowing spontaneously to the height of fifteen feet above the surface of the ground. This supply was reached at a depth of 420 feet, and the experiment cost a trifle over \*\$3,000.

With the machinery now in use these wells can be sunk at a cost of about \$600. One such well, with a reservoir or tank to store the overflow, would be sufficient to furnish the camp an ample supply of pure and wholesome water, not only for drinking and culinary purposes, but also for sprinkling the roads. For the latter purpose during the past year a tank was constructed, having a capacity of seven thousand gallons, which was supplied by hand-pumps attached to driven wells. This service required the labor of nine men, working in relays, the entire day of twenty-four hours to supply the demand.

It will be necessary before the ground is occupied again to provide some system of drainage to carry off the waste water from the pumps used by the men and the slops from the kitchens.

A number of bathing houses were erected on the beach on the easterly boundary of the camp ground, and one hundred bathing suits were procured and placed in charge of an attendant for the use of the men, enabling all of them who desired to do so to enjoy the benefits of sea-bathing.

The commissary department was under the charge of Lieutenant George G. Felton, Quartermaster of the Sixth Regiment. He went on duty on the 10th of July and arranged for the distribution of the stores and also provided for all the details for cooking at the several mess-halls for the men, for which purpose he organized a corps of thirty-five cooks and assistants. The Brigade and Regimental staffs furnished their own cooks. To organize such a corps in so limited a time, and to carry out successfully the arrangements necessary to supply food for so large a body of men, was an arduous task, and one requiring much

skill and unremitting attention. That he succeeded to an admirable degree is evidenced by the fact that the complaints from this source were few, and mostly upon insignificant grounds. The food supplied was of the best quality that could be procured in the market; it was issued with regularity and whenever required by the regimental officers; it was properly cooked and served, and there was no difficulty at any time to supply any reasonable demand upon this branch of the service. There are always persons, in camp as well as elsewhere, who can not be satisfied with reasonable service—constitutional grumblers and growlers—but whenever complaints were made to the department, no matter upon what grounds or from what source, they were promptly examined into, and if ascertained to be well-founded, efforts were immediately made to remedy the matter complained of.

The Brigade broke camp on Saturday morning. Ample transportation had been ordered for both men and material, and it was promptly on hand. The arrangements for the trains, under the direction of Superintendent Bannard, of the Pennsylvania Railroad, were complete and the trains were despatched, without confusion or disorder, in regular succession, as speedily as the men and material could be put on board.

The task of collecting the property and closing up the camp, always the most laborious part of the work, was left to the Quartermaster-General's Department. This work was begun as soon as the camp was vacated on Saturday. The Regimental Quartermasters turned in most of the property for which they were responsible upon their regimental grounds. They are at every encampment acquiring valuable experience and facility in the discharge of their duties, which enables them to relieve the Department of much onerous and vexatious labor. It is with much gratification that I refer to this fact, not only because it relieves the department of labor not fairly devolving upon it, but that it also shows a commendable zeal on the part of regimental officers to acquire a practical knowledge of their duties, and a praiseworthy diligence in their efforts to justly discharge them.

The work of striking the tents and shipping them to the arsenal was begun on Saturday and continued on Monday, when it was finished before evening, and nothing was left upon the ground occupied by the troops but the camp of the brigade staff at the northwest corner of the camp ground, and the mess-halls and kitchens, which latter are of wood and covered with canvas. The canvas will be removed and the remainder of the structures will be allowed to stand, to be used next year if required.

It would be a great saving of labor and expense to the State if suitable storehouses were erected on the camp ground for the storage of the tents and other camp equipage. In case of need

they could be shipped to any part of the State where required, as speedily from there as from the arsenal.

It would be a wise provision of law for the legislature to forbid the erection of booths or other temporary structures for the sale of drinks and refreshments, or for any other purpose, within certain prescribed limits of any encampment of the National Guard, without first obtaining the consent of the commanding officer of the division, brigade or detachment encamping, and authorizing him, at his discretion, to summarily cause to be removed any such establishment from the limits so prescribed. No serious trouble has yet arisen from this source, but experience teaches, and indications show, that a wholesome restraint put upon this matter at the start may save much trouble in the near future.

The peculiar adaptation for the purposes of a military encampment of the ground upon which this camp was located was the subject of general remark. In shape it is a perfect parallelogram, running from the railroad to the sea, and containing ample room, if necessary, to accommodate the entire division of the National Guard; it is level from end to end; the soil is capable of sustaining an excellent sod, and porous enough to absorb and carry off rapidly any ordinary rainfall; all the surroundings are pure and wholesome; it is at the junction of two of the principal railroad systems of the State, and is centrally located between the northern and southern boundaries of the State. It is entirely safe to say that another tract of suitable size, so eligibly located and in all respects so well adapted to the purpose, cannot be found in the State.
